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

#### **DAILY PROCEEDINGS**

#### WEDNESDAY EVENING

The eighty-fifth session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Central Jurisdiction, convened in Simpson's Memoral Methodist Church, Charlotte, N. C., on Wednesday, October 27, 1943, at 7:30 p.m., with the pastor, Rev. G. E. Hogue, presiding.

Hymn, "Fairest Lord Jesus," was sung, after which Rev. W. S. McLeod led the conference in prayer. The choir sang an anthem, after which Dr. Embree H. Blackard brought to the conference greetings on behalf of Mecklenburg Ministerial Association, Miss Ruby Berkley on behalf of Bethlehem Center; on behalf of the city, Mayor H. H. Baxter; on behalf of Johnson C. Smith University, Dr. W. R. Mayberry; on behalf of Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance, Rev. H. W. Givens; on behalf of church, Miss Ruby Fulson. The response was given by Rev. H. C. Gannaway. An offering was lifted, after which Rev. William M. Wells, of Laurinburg, was presented for the evening sermon.

Rev. Mr. Wells delivered an inspiring and thought-provoking message from Psalms 1 Ch., third verse. "And he shall be like a tree." The conference then sang a spiritual, "He'll Understand and Say Well Done". The announcements were made and the benediction pronounced.

#### THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 28

Bishop Alexander P. Shaw led the conference in a brief but impressive devotional service and spoke from the words "Lord is it I?" An offering for emergency purposes was raised and given to the treasurer. A beautiful and impressive communion service was conducted by the bishop, district superintendents and Rev. G. E. Hogue. Rev. H. C. Gannaway led the conference in singing Hymn No. 209, "Amazing Grace".

J. E. Brower, the secretary of the last conference, was requested to call the conference roll.

named as nis assistants, G. E. Hogue, H. C. Gannaway, G. W. Patterson and B. W. Stewert.

On motion Rev. N. J. Pass was elected treasurer and

named as his assistants J. W. Hall and H. C. Woodland.
On motion or Rev. G. H. Caldwell the bar of the conference was made to include all seats in the auditorium save the last three seats.

On motion of R. W. Winchester, Rev. G. H. Caldwell was elected reporter to the papers, and Rev. G. E. Hogue was elected postmaster.

On motion of R. W. Winchester all visitors and friends of

the conference were given the courtesy of the floor.

On motion of Rev. H. L. Ashe the printed program was made the program of the conference with the exception that the hour for the anniversary of Woman's Society of Christian Service and the anniversary Board of Lay Activities be referred to the cabinet for an earlier hour in the program.

Introductions—Rev. L. W. Hedrick, Supt. of the Bluefield District East Tennessee Conference: A. E. Edwards, Asbury Church, Richmond, Va.; J. W. Golden, Field Secretary, of Evangelism Central Jurisdiction, and A. A. Phillips and J. H. Moore, First Baptist Church, Charlotte, N. C., were presented.

The hour having arrived for the memorial service for Rev. J. W. Simpson, deceased, Rev. R. B. Rhyne announced Hymn

No. 362, "Nearer My God To Thee".

Rev. R. B. Rhyne read the Scripture lesson the 14th chapter of St. John, after which T. C. Frazier led the conference in prayer, Hymn No. 73 was sung after which Rev. R. B. Rhyne presented Rev W. E. Hairston, who delivered a very appropriate and thoughtful message on the life of a "A Good Minister, J. W. Simpson", and pronounced the benediction.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions were conducted by Rev. H. A. Davis.

Bishop Shaw called the conference to order, after which E. Frost led the conference in singing "Until I Reach My Home".

Rev. W. O. Thomas was presented and read a resolution on evanglism which was adopted. Field Secretary of Evangelism Dr. J. W. Golden was presented and spoke enthusiastically on the evangelistic program of the church. Bishop A. P. Shaw followed by placing hearty approval upon the movement.

The character of Rev. R. W. Winchester, district superintendent of the Greensboro District and the pastors of the Greensboro District were passed, and Rev. Mr. Winchester read his report. The pastors of the district then made their

reports.

Rev. R. B. McRae, district superintendent of the Laurinburg District, and the pastors of the Laurinburg District, were passed in character and Rev. Mr. McRae read his report, after which the pastors of the Laurinburg District made their reports.

Dr. R. N. Brooks was presented and spoke in the interest of the Advocate, Central Edition, also presented a check from the Methodist Publishing House in the amount of \$704.16, which was indorsed by Bishop Shaw and turned over to the secretary.

Rev. R. D. Sharpe, of the A. M. E. church was presented,

after which conference adjourned.

#### EVENING SESSION

Rev. W. C. Scarborough presiding. Appropriate devotions were conducted and a program given by students from Bennett College was enjoyed.

Rev. P. A. Taylor, heading the department of religious education at Gammon Theological Seminary, was presented and made an address in the interest of Bennett College.

President D. D. Jones was presented and in turn presented Miss Julia Titus, superintendent of Allen High School, Asheville, N. C.; Miss I. R. Jones, Miss J. Hanns and Miss Litchfield, teachers of Allen High School.

President Jones also presented the following persons from Bennett College: Mrs. M. D. McLaurin, director of residents; Mrs. T. C. Taylor, bookkeeper, and Mr. O. C. Southern, II, or-

ganist.

On motion O. W. Burwick was elected to elders orders. Question 28 was called, What other personal notation should be made? S. L. Townsend ordained deacon under election 1941.

Motion prevailed that all the persons coming into conference in full connection stand and take the vows. The following persons took the vows: S. L. Townsend, chaplain; S. P. Holland, James W. Gamble, Elmo C. Tatum, James F. Sawyer, and Thomas C. Tarpley.

Bishop A. P. Shaw made a most timely address to the six

men coming into the conference in full connection.

Rev. L. W. Hedrick, district superintendent of the Bluefield district; Dr. R. M. Williams, of the Washington conference; Rev. J. C. Johnson, of the Tennessee conference, and Dr. Caulkins, board of pensions, were presented and spoke. Dr. Caulkins presented to the bishop a check for \$75 from the board of pensions.

Dr. R. N. Brooks was presented and spoke to the con-

ference in the interest of the Advocate.

The courtesy of the floor was granted to Rev. B. L. Burge, who presented Rev. G. M. Phelps with a token of appreciation for his untiring services rendered on the Western District as superintendent for the past six years.

The time arrived for the order of the day, the election of ministerial and lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional

Conferences. The results of the election follow:

a ballot for Dr. R. N. Brooks as the ministerial delegate to the General Conference and the secretary declared the ballot cast, electing R. N. Brooks unanimously.

Motion prevailed that Miss I. R. Jones and Mrs. Bessie C. Pettiford become the first and second reserve delegates, respectively.

Dr. and Mrs. G. Ray Jordan, of First Methodist Church, Charlotte, N. C., was presented and Dr. Jordan brought an inspiring address to the conference.

Bishop A. P. Shaw called the delegates elected to the front and congratulated them on their election to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

Dr. William L. Sherrill, retired minister of the Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, brought greetings to the conference and pronounced the benediction.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session began at 2 o'clock with the laymen in charge. T. S. Wright, conference lay leader, presided.

Following this session Bishop Shaw proceded with the regular business.

Bishop Shaw led in singing "Every Day, Every Hour". The pastors of the Western District were called and made

Presentations were made as follows: Rev. K. D. Huff, of the South Carolina Conference; Rev. P. A. Taylor, Jr., head of the Department of Religious Education, Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Ga. In the absence of President W. J. King he represented the interest of the school. His illuminating words on the work of the school warrant our continued and increasing support of the scholarship which is made possible by our conference.

Benediction was pronounced by Dr. A. R. Howard.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

In the light of the important place Christian Education must take in our Conference life during the coming years and our responsibility in the furtherance of the paramount course, we wish to make the following recommendations:

(1) That we co-operate fully with the General Board at Nashville, Tenn., in advancing the interest of Christian Education.

(2) That we give our wholehearted support to educational institu-

tions within the bounds of the Conferene.

- (3) That we conclude the ten thousand dollar Endowment Drive by raising the remainder of approximately \$3,000 (three thousand dollars) by December 21, 1943.

  - (3) Each Charge shall be expected to send to least one delegate.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Mr. Chairman, Brethren and Friends of this Conference:

I have come before you representing the Greensboro District of the North Carolina Conference, Central Jurisdiction. I am delighted to relate to you the excellent work done by the pastors and laymen of the District. In the first place we organized our work in the beginning of the Conference year and pledged our selves to prorate in accordance with the laws and regulations of the church. This has been done in a very fine way. You will observe in the report of the pastors they have conformed to this law. We have presented all claims connecting with the benevolent interest of the Conference. And much interest has been manifested by the lay activity in co-operation with the pastors in putting the program over. Our group meetings have been safely guarded as to travel, yet to make them effective. Because of the gas situation we were campelled to curb our travel and grouped our meetings in most convenient places. The District Convention for the young people was held at Ramseur. Brother E. M. McLeod and his congregation made it very pleasant and profitable for us while there. The District Conference was held in Leaksville under the care of Brother B. W. Stwart, who spared no pains in rendering every effort to make us comfortable. The reports and business of the Conference were quite inspiring. Dr. R. N. Brooks was at his best in delivering timely ad-

There have been revivals of religion conducted in every charge throughout the District and in most places with successful results. There have been quite a umber of accessions to the church but on the other hand there has been quite a migration from the church, because of war conditions. We have endeavored to labor as best we knew under this unfavorable condition. The spiritual and social activities of the District been very active.

Such organization as the Brotherhoods, Woman's Society of Christian Service, The Youth movements, the Church Schools have all been great factors making this report which will be indicated by the pastors reports

factors making this report which will be indicated by the pastors reports. There has been much improvements in church buildings on the District. We make mention of New Port News, under the leadership of Brother Townsend. This is the most outstanding piece of church work according to membership on the District. But many other places have done well. We mention Ramseur under Brother E. M. McLeod, Leaksville with that energetic pastor, Brother B. W. Stewart, Reidsville with Brother Rush as pastor, Warren Street and Mt. Tabor with the late J. W. Simpson as pastor. Many churches have paid out of debt, and mortgages cancelled. South Greensboro Charge with the splendid leadership of Brother J. W. Suford, Raleigh with Brother W. J. Cameron, Kernersville has a nice bank account for improvement after Conference made possible by the leadership of brother D. A. Hill. St. Matthews church has paid every debt she owes and made a substantial increase in ministerial support and in benevolences of which the report of Brother J. E. Brower will indicate.

Sickness and death have visited the ministerial ranks this year. Brother R. D. Bethea has become incapicated for service since the first of August. On the 8th of July Brother J. W. Simpson died. He was pastor of North West Greensboro one of our best charges. No minister in my knowledge has made a more popular pastorate on that charge than the late J. W. Simpson. And to warrant the facts of this statement the entire official board met with the District Superintendent as chairman and requested that his wife, Mrs. Ophelia, remain in the parsonage until Conference and

pledged me that neither Mrs. Simpson nor the benevolent interest of the charge should suffer if this request was granted. They asked that I give the amount to Mrs. Simpson and they would follow her leadership until Conference, out of the high respect they had for both her and Brother Simpson. Yet with a saddened heart Sister Simpson accepted the request and comes to Conference with a better report than was brought from that chage when Brother Simpson lived. Mrs. Simpson has virtually been pastor since her'husband died and there is not a more lovely spirit existing no where on the Greensboro District than on this charge. God's blessings upon Sister Simpson, who has manifested such devotion and efficiency in the church activities of this charge.

Bennett College Endowment has been before us all the year. We have continually reminded the pastors and congregations the importantance of putting this project over while money is flowing like a river in the country. The reports of the pastors will show that something has been accomplished relative to this endowment fund. We have urged the cause of Allen Home and requested every pastor to remember Allen Home with a collection during the conference year. I hope they have done so. We are shaping up the plans for abouse to house visiting revival in every community of the

District such as has been advised by your excellency.

And now Mr. Chairman: I have submitted to you my report in keeping with my ability. But may I include in this report in behalf of the pastors, laity and personally for myself. Thanks to you for the way and manner you have deported your self as a residential Bishop of the Methodist Church among us. You have behaved as a Bishop in the most graceful manner before us, both as to speech and action. We are thankful to the Most High for you. And I think to make an expression of gratitude from acknowledgement to one for favor and kindness received, no words is more fitting in the English language than thanks. It is the soil of which joy thrives and is the tune of angels.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Dear Bishop Shaw, Members of the North Carolina Conference and Friends:

Through the well trained order of Providence we have come again to the Seat of another Annual Conference. I am happy that I am privileeged

to make this my fourth report of work of the Laurinburg District.

We began this year under the most glorious circumstances of any year previous. The change of economic conditions had given heart to a discouraged people. They were ready to show their appreciation to Almighty God for these better days. There were on the Laurinburg District humble homes, faithful souls, big hearts and small ones. There were good, bad and indifferent all walting the touch of sympathy and sane leadership. To these waiting groups twenty-one loyal pastors were sent. They have led on in a heroic way, and the response has been gratifying.

Providence has smiled upon us this year and our ranks have not been broken by death and there has been no serious illness in any of our par-

sonages.

How well we have done this year in a material way will be shown in the reports of the pastors. Many of the pastors have spared no pains in leading their people in beautifying their churches and improving church property. Time will not permit me to mention all that has been done by all of the pastors but I speak the truth when I say that most of them have done well.

We have lost two churches this year by fire. The New Zion church on the Philadelphia and New Zion charge was destroyed by fire in the early part of the spring, but they had the church insured and have raised quite a large sum of money and have the plans from the Board and hope to begin soon to rebuild. The St. Mark church on the Hickory Bend and St. Mark charge was destroyed by fire the first of the summer or last of the spring and they had no insurance and it will be impossible to rebuild this church. The members will not be lost to the church because they will be taken care of by the other church which is in the some community.

Because of the government priority on material we have just been able to get the material to complete the Philadelphia church, and we hope in

the near future to have this church complete.

At Southern Pines where our church was unwisely torn down some years ago and the material burned, we have in the process of erection a very beautiful cement block church which we hope to complete this year. This membership has shown the finest spirit to be seen anywhere in their deomination. Rev. Carey Hugley a supply pastor from Fayetteville is the pastor.

At the last Annual Conference Rev. J. L. Alford was assigned as pastor of Rowland and Salem, he went to his task with faith in God and confidence in the people and they have erected a very beautiful five-room parsonage and within the next few days he will move his family in it. This charge has experienced one of its best years in its history. They are happy over their accombilishments.

I would be false to my trust if I did not mention the heroic struggle of this worthy people whose guest we are. Every since the news reached them of your coming they have been planning and working for your comfort. They have planned well and while you have inspired their efforts the work done will better fit the church to serve its purpose in a city like

Charlotte.

Lumberton under the leadership of Rev. L. A. Watson has placed an order for windows for their church. They have raised on this cause \$500 and have paid the same on windows. Laurinburg under the leadership of Rev. W. M. Wells has installed new pews and pulpit set. This church is in position to do a great work in Laurinburg. Maxton-8t.George under the leadership of Rev. H. C. Gannaway has completely renovated the inside of the church and has one of most attractive churches on the District. Red Springs church under the leadership of Rev. R. B. Rhyne and Beauty Spot churches have been renovated and the parsonage at Red Springs has been made a thing of Beauty. Goldsboro—Rev. C. E. Strickland, pastor, this church has done a marvelous work this year. They have added to the church a pastor's study and a choir room which gives us a very attractive church in Goldsboro. This church is struggling and must have special attention.

Mr. Chairmen and Brethren these are the major improvements that have been made, but in all of the charges there have been some improvements.

The work of the Laurinburg District has moved forward because there are no particular pastors known as big and little pastors. We have tried to worke together as brothers of a common cause with the understanding that the biggest pastor is the one who does the biggest job, and that big jobs can be done in small appointments. Until pastors learn to see their opportunity in the charge they serve we will never have the growing church that we should have.

#### Ministers' Wives Association

This organization will give a good account of its self this year. Inspired by what they did last year they have labored with renewed interest this year and deserve much praise for what they have done. This organization has not only served to raise money for Conference claims but has brought about a closer tie and a sisterhood between the Ministers' Wives. The cause for which they labor inspires their effort. The words of the poet seem to ring in their ears.

If I can stop one heart from breaking, I shall not live in vain If I can ease one heart the aching or cool one pain,

Or help one fainting robin into his nest again

I shall not live in vain.

Woman's Society of Christian Service, is still going forward and their influence and helpfulness is being felt as no other group in the church is. They are always the motivating power in the church.

The Board of Lay Activities is headed the right way at last. They have realized that for any organization to live it must tie its self up to some great cause or enterprise. They have set out to do something definite this year and you will hear from them in a definite way during the Conference setting forth their ideals and accomplishments.

#### Ministerial Support

Coming to the District four years ago I found only four charges whose promised salary was \$1,200, and one whose promised was slightly more than that. The work was divided up so as to give every fellow who thought he wanted to preach a chance to exercise his thought to the gift. Many cogregations were without adequate leadership and had become discouraged, and many pastors who were giving their full time to the ministry were doing it without a sufficient support for their families. We have rearranged the work so as to give to each pastor who puts his full time to the work at least a comfortable support. We have today on the Laurinburg District eleven appointments that will pay \$1,200 and upward. Of these only three will pay as low amounts as \$1,200 and the others arranging up to \$1,800. People will do more with half the service they are used to if the minister is prepared to live, and unless we pay better salary we are going to find ourselves even shorter for ministers. I am convinced that as the standard for entering the ministry is raised the salary you have entered must be raised.

Each paster on the District has been paid in full this year and at least half of them or more have been paid more than their promised salary. Unless there have been some misgiving every report is round for

the year.

#### Church Members

We have not only made advances in the material and financial way the churches have been adding to the church constantly new members. The membership may not show a great increase but in times likes this when our people are changing so rapidly as they are it has taken the increase for us to hold our own. The old time revival is not as popular any more as it once was, it is gradually fading into a form now and evangelistic method is coming in some of our churches.

#### Retired Ministers

One retired minister lives on the Laurinburg District, Rev. Marcus Munday. He is in as good health as could be expected for a man who has

been spared to live over into the ninetys. He is still sweet spirited and always carries a ray of sunshine.

#### Youth Fellowship

This has been a fine year for the youth, and they had a very fine institute. Never before has the youth been more interested in the church than they are at present. We are greatly in need of som one to help guide them. We have been looking forward hopefully to the time when our Conference would hold a conference wide institute at Bennett or some other place for the Youth. We wait patiently for the report of the committee on the same.

#### Future Out Look

The outlook for new developments on the Laurinburg District is bright. Now is the time to make our advances, By some means in the past we have lost out in some of the largest cities in North Carolina and today we have promised help if we will but bestir our selves. In Wilmington, where we once had one of our most prosperous churches and lost out, we have the promise of the four white Methodist churches there that they will help us rebuild. More than a thousand of our members have gone into that prosperous city and find no Methodist Church. We need to prepare our selves to meet the challenge.

Of the thirty-four churches on the Laurinburg District, not one has a morgage on it. In times like this we need a conference budget so as to help in some of the needy places in the Conference, Wilmington, Monroe, Fayetteville, Southern Pines and Goldsboro need the careful consideration

of this Conference,

#### Conclusion

I have mentioned the progress of the church in the material, financial and ingathering of members and as important as these may be they do not always tell of the progress of the church. For the church exist to interpret Christ to the people in the community where it exists. Ihave never been more convinced than 1 am today of the need of the Christian church with its unique function of creating social and spiritual idealism, of inspiring faith and good works, of fostering Christian Worship and cultivating personal religious experience.

As I bring my fourth report of the District to close, I am perfectly conscious of my limitations and the personal need of the guidance of the Holy Spirit. There is much to be done, and so little time in which to do it. I am saying to all who are to work with me for another year that we redouble our determination to be good soldiers for Christ, I am grateful to

you all for your knidness and good-will.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WESTERN WISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Brother Ministers and Friends:

Twenty-five years ago I stood before this sacred altar, and was admitted into the Holy Fellowship. Six and a half of these years were spent at St. Paul Church, Reidsville, five and a half years on the Laurinburg District, seven years at St. Paul Church, Winston-Salem, and six years on the Western District. I have striven each year to surpass the previous year, as a result of which I come today with the most satisfactory report of all. Claims having been presented and met.

You probably know better than 1 do that all of our work is being effected by war conditions found more or less in all parts of the world. Shifting of people from one place to another, most of those who can meet

the requirements being called to the service of their country, as a result of which some places are being over crowded while others are being empted, all of which creates added problems for the church. With one less than we started out with the courageous and tireless workers of the Western District are solving these problems in a remarkable way. That we have been kept and guided by the power Divine will be seen in the glowing report of each pastor. These reports will show that together with the regular program something special has been done in each charge, as a result of attempting to go the second mile.

This year long standing debts have been canceled, old buildings remodeled and new ones built. In taking care of these our local obligations, we have not in one instance neglected our other claims. World service went beyond our highest expectation, while the cause of Education was amply taken care of. Heeding the call of our Bishop we have raised more than three times as much as any other year in the drive for the Bennett College Endownent Fund. You will be interested also in knowing that Gammon Thelogical Seminary, and Allen Home will receive what they were promised, Allen Home located on the Western District, under the wise and consecrated leadership of Miss Julia Titus and her efficient staff is still meeting a need unprovided for in any other way in that section. We pray for the continued support of each District.

As you probably know we entered the contest last summer in securing subscriptions for The Christian Advocate. To win in the contest which was assured from the starte was not the main urge which pushed us ahead, attempting to get the paper in every home. The main urge which gave impetus in this endeavor was placing a paper in the bands of our members which has no equals in furnishing them with the information so much

needed in making them loval Methodists.

We have enjoyed the fellowship and support of the retired ministers and their families. We have had to call some of them back into the active service, and all of them with their windom and ripe experience

have ment much to our success in every way.

In this you will not expect me to report for the work done in the well organized organizations on the District. The ministers' wives who will speak for themselves, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Lay Activities and the Youth Division, are so interwoven in our church life, thus becoming indespensible in our total church program. To these organizations we must increaseingly look to furnish the leadership in all our evangelistic movements.

Bishop Shaw through your wise leadership in this needed field of evangelism, demonstrated in the recent meeting held in Baltimore. We shall go forth reclaiming members grown cold and indifferent, and leading

new ones into a saving knowledge if Jesus Christ.

Finally all praise to the ministers of the Western District, most of whom have been with me through the six years. In not one instance has your loyalty been questioned. Therefore, whatever success or honor comes to all alike. I have both enjoyed and profited by your fellowship. I rejoice that my change in position will not result in my change in fellowship. May God bless you and the devoted members of the Western District.

# REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WINSTON DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw and Members of the North Carolina Conference:

This day I come to the end of the year's work.

I am pleased to be favored with the high privilege of bringing to you

the annual report of the Winston District.

I found, upon assuming the duties of the District, an organized program; with all but three charges filled with pastors. Within a short time

these had been supplied.

Our first major task, after the Annual Conference, was an effort for Bennett College. Each man on the District was contacted in a few weeks. It was inspiring to find such ready response to the cause, Bishop, you were present on December the fourteenth, at which time reports were made.

The year has been busy, filled with many perplexing problems. However, joy has come to each of us in some measure, as we realized the work of the Master. We have given ourselves largely to each task and its par-ticular senson. We have made an effort to raise each assessment as it came to us. The results in each case will show as the pastors shall make their reports.

The Winston District is composed of twenty charges with their pastors. and around four thousand members. To this group goes the credit of what

ever achievements may have come through the year.

We have two retired ministers on the Winston District. The Reverend B. F. Thomas has been energetic through the year, both in his local church and on the District. The failing health of Reverend Dorsey McRae, has caused us much concern through the year. However, his spirit was excellent when I last talked with him.

### The Charges

Each Charge deserves special mention. However, since reports in detail are not the custom, I beg you to be permitted to mention only a few of the cases of much anxiety to many of us through the past years:

### **Buildings and Improvements**

The St. Mary's church at Trinity, St. Andrews church at Winston Salem, and our Walnut Cove church at Walnut Cove have been brought to completion by their respective pastors, Rev Frost, Rev. Ashe and Rev. Phillip. St. Marks at High Point and Mallalieu Temple at Mt. Airy have been renovated and painted from their first floors throughout.

The parsonages of Thomasville, Brooks Memorial at High Point, St. Marks of High Point and St. Paul of Winston-Salem have all been

repaired and painted.

### Debts

All debts on the churches of Thomasville, St. Johns at Thomasville, and Mt. Pleasant of Winston-Salem have been paid. In one instance the and M. Piensant of Winston-Sahem have been paid. In one instance the mortgage was burned. To Lexington and St. Marks of High Point goes the credit of paying the larger amounts on complete debts. During the year St. Marks paid \$1.800 for improvements and \$1.200 on the standing debt. Last, but by no means least, St. Homes Church in Boston Cottage of Winston-Salem, goes the credit of raising \$2.300 for the erection of a new church edifice.

### LAYMEN'S LEAGUE

Bishop Shaw, Laymen and Friends of the North Carolina Christianity:

This has been a somewhat difficult year for the laymen. The causes being such that we had no control; First, I have been handicapped in getting around to the charges because of the shortage of gas; Second, men are constantly being called into service and the work of the laymen on such a charge suffers.

Of the Charges I have reached I have found the work going on nicely where not interrupted, Amounts from \$50 to \$90 have been raised, and the Methodist men have taken cure of the expense of the Church Bulletin amounting to \$200 yearly. This is a great improvement over former years, for many charges reported nothing.

In some few instances the outlook for increasing our number of ministers is bright. This gives us renewed hope for the picture has been

sad.

In spite of these difficulties we are trying to carry on. Although these are dark hours, we must not become discouraged. As laymen we cannot afford to be quitters, instead we must hold out our banners high. The great cause we represent is the solution to the salvation of the world. A great challenge faces us: To keep alive that sustaining influence in our lives, in the life of our Churches and throughout of world.

I should like to recommend that we use our women resources for

laymen work where men are not available.

### CONFERENCE EVANGELISTIC PROGRAM

The Christian Church was never faced with a greater challenge than it is today. With the greatest world conflict of all times, when there is turnoil and unrest everywhere and when the spirit of graft and greed has possessed individuals and nations and have thrown the people of every continent into a world catastrophe, it means that the choice must be either Christ or chaos.

Therefore, the Church should now rise up and speedily lead the restless, dissolutioned, sin wrecked world to Christ, rather than be lost into

the chaos and death.

Many of our Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction are accepting and planning to designate the coming year as a period during which

Evangelism shall be given place of first importance.

First—Consideration will be given to widespread organization of groups of the fellowship of Evangelism, stressing united prayer, cultivation of Christian experience, witnessing and training of individuals for personal work.

Second—Training classes to prepare children and young people for

church membership.

Third—Systematic and continuous home visitation of inactive church members and unchurched families, and the bringing to the church school ad children not under religious instructions. And to visit all new conners into the communities and seek to bring them into the fellowship of the church, and a close follow up of all members who move away by sending transfer certificates to pastors at places to which members move. If ministers are not known where members move, write or notify the office of the Central Jurisdiction Commission on Evangelism, 1103 S. Orleans St., Memphis, Tennessee, Help in the follow-up will be gladly given.

Fourth—And an effective Commission in each Conference District and local church should be organized. A diligent effort to locate and evangelize unoccupied territory, whether town or country and to form missions and church schools in industrial areas where the people are moving in

and far from established churches.

Fifth—A youth fellomship organization in every local church, also a Daily Vacation Bible School, and earnest efforts in the promotion of the "suggested Program of Church Loyalty Advance, making Thanksgiving a refil devotional occasion and putting Christ in Christmas and at the center of all life. Observing the Watch-night, followed by a Special Week of Praykr, Calling for the establishment of Family Altars, and through of Jahmary special emphasis on Re-Construction, and perfecting Commissions.

Training personal workers, Enlisting and visiting prospects. The first week of February to be given to study of Christian Stewardship, the second week, enlisting titehers, followed by week of Dedication, public evangelism, revivals, preaching missions, visitation, including the observance of Holy Week, Easter and Pentecost.

# REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The World Service and Finance Commission of the North Carolina Conference Methodist Church, has recognized the fact that this is a day when missionary causes are imperative. The voices of needs come ringing clearly and distinctly; and the great commission that fell from the lips of our Saviour falls with resounding emphasis upon our ears, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." All of us can not go in person, but we give thanks to the Almighty God for the privilege of applying much, we trust, of our finance to the aid of our fellow men who can go and for the relief of the suffering, therefore;

Whereas the Methodist Church is faced today with a greater emergency needs here at home and abroad than ever before in the history of our church, including relief for the suffering in war-torn countries;

Be it resolved (1) that we, the North Carolina Conference accept the following apportionments for the Conference year 1943-1944: World Service

World Service \$10,000 (Including \$8,748.00 apportioned by the General Commission of W. S. Z. F.) General Administration Fund

- (2) That we, the North Carolina Conference urge each individual charge to raise its apportionment quota in full.
- (3) That thirty-five per cent (35%) of World Service raised be set aside for the promotional and field cultivation within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.
- (4) Treasurer's Expense; Shall be two per cent (2%) (not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300) of all funds collected.
- (5) For our educational institutions

   (a) Bennett College Endowment Fund
   3,500,00

   (b) Allen Home High School
   500,00

   (c) Gammon Theological Seminary
   100,00

   Total Budget
   \$14,285,04

### Recommendations for Ministerial Support

- (1) That the Episcopal Fund shall be equal to two and one-fourth per cent (2½%) of the pastor's cash calary.
- (2) That five per cent (5%) of the pastor' cash salary shall be the amount to be raised for Conference Claimants.
- (3) That the District Superintendent's salary shall be equal to fifteen per cent (15%) of the pastor's cash salary.
- (4) That each charge of the Conference observe the special days as required by our discipline—Race Relation Sunday, World Service Sunday, etc., and other special days as may be designated by the general church.




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
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
