#### WEDNESDAY EVENING

The Eighty-Sixth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Central Jurisdiction, convened in Smith Memorial Methodist Church, Lenoir, N. C., on Wednesday evening, October 25th, 1944, at 7:30, with the District Superintendent G. E. Hogue, presiding. After the devotions were conducted, Rev. Hogue presented the pastor, Rev. W. L. C. Scarborough, to preside. Rev. Scarborough presented Mayor Earl Tate who brought greetings on behalf of the City of Lenoir. Rev. J. C. Cornett on behalf of the Lenoir Ministerial Association; on behalf of the Inter-denominational Ministerial Alliance, Rev. C. H. Walker; on behalf of the local church, Prof. J. H. Jones. The response was given by Rev. J. E. Brower. Rev. H. C. Woodland was presented for the evening sermon. Rev. Mr. Woodland delivered an inspiring and thought-provoking message, after which an offering was received for the local church. The benediction was then pronounced.

#### THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 26

Bishop Shaw led the Conference in a brief but impressive devotional service and spoke from the words, "If we walk in the light as he is in the

An offering for the church was received. A beautiful and impressive communion service was conducted by the bishop, district superintendents and Rev. W. L. C. Scarborough. Hymn No. 140 and "Lord I Want to Be a Christian," was sung.

At the calling of the names of Rev. R. D. Bethea, Marcus Munday, deceased retired elders, Coy N. Williams, an effective elder deceased, and Mrs. R. D. Bethea, Mrs. P. I. Wells, and Mrs. Anna Barnes, deceased ministers' wives, after which Dr. H. L. Ashe led the Conference in prayer.

Organization—On motion of W. O. Thomas, J. E. Brower was elected
Secretary, and he named his assistants, T. H. Wooten, E. C. Tatum, and
G. M. Phelps, Jr. On motion Rev. P. I. Wells was elected statistician, and
named as his assistants B. W. Stewart, G. W. Patterson, H. C. Gannaway

and A. M. Erwin.

The treasurer, N. J. Pass, named as his assistants, J. W. Hall and H. C. Woodland. On motion of H. C. Gannaway, the bar of the Conference was made to include all seats in the full auditorium to posts. On motion of L. M. Mayfield, Rev. E. C. Tatum was elected reporter to the papers. On motion of H. C. Gannaway the district superintendents were requested to appoint a man from each district to collect 50 cents from each minister and delegate for secretarial and statitic expenses. The following were appointed: Rev. J. W. Shuford, Greensboro District; Rev. Beverly Brown, Laurinburg District; Rev. S. B. McBrayer, Western District; Rev. J. W.

Jones, Winston District. A resolution read by Rev. R. W. Winchester, requesting the secretary to send greetings from the Conference to one of her illustrous sons now holding a Conference in Shreveport, La., Bishop R. N. Brooks, was passed. See resolution.

Introductions-Rev. C. H. Walker, pastor of the A.M.E. Church of Lenoir, and Rev. Marshall McCallum, of Columbia, S. C., were introduced.

The hour having arrived for the Memorial Service for Rev. R. D. Bethea, Rev. Marcus Munday, Rev. Coy N. Williams, Mrs. R. D. Bethea, Mrs. P. I. Wells, and Mrs. Anna Barnes, deceased. The organist played softly Hymn 73.

Rev. R. B. Rhyne announced Hymn No. 520 of which three verses were

sung.

The Old Testament lesson was read by Rev. T. C. Frazier. The New Testament lesson was read by Rev. R. C. Sharpe.

Hymn No. 248 was announced by Rev. R. C. Sharpe of which two verses were sung now and two verses after Dr. H. L. Ashe led the Conference in prayer. Rev. R. C. Sharpe delivered a very appropriate eulogy.

Rev. Sharpe closed his message with prayer and Rev. R. B. Rhyne led the Conference in singing a favorite song of Rev. Williams, deceased, "He'll Understand and say well done." Rev. R. C. Sharpe pronounced the benediction.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON, OCTOBER 26, 1944.

Devotions were conducted by M. S. Laughlin, using Hymns 142 and 379; prayer by J. W. Hall. Following the devotion question 16 was called, "Are there formulated complaints against any ministerial member of the Conference?" The answer was, none.

Bishop Shaw gave some timely remarks after which the reports of the District Superintendents were called and R. W. Winchester of the Greens-

boro District, made his report.

Reports of District Superintendents were continued with R. B. McRae,

of the Laurinburg District making his report.

The pastors' reports were called from the Greensboro District and

Laurinburg District respectively. They made their reports.
Dr. D. D. Jones, president of Bennett College, was presented by Bishop Shaw, His gratitude to the Conference for the untiring support during the Endowment Campaign was heartily expressed.

On motion of H. L. Ashe December 5th was chosen as the date for the

food and financial effort for the college.

Motion of G. M. Phelps prevailed that we recommend Bishop R. N. Brooks to the Board of Education as a member of the Trustee Board of Bennett College ....

Prof. P. A. Taylor was presented to the Conference. A check in the amount of \$1035.12 was given to the Conference. The check came from

the publishing house.

The following introductions were made: Rev. R. D. Crockett, of the faculty of Bennett College and Dr. M. Earl Cunningham from the Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn. Dr. Cunningham pronounced the benediction and the afternoon session was adjourned.

#### EVENING SESSION

President D. D. Jones, presiding, the Bennett Choir led the singing. Rev. P. A. Taylor, of Gammon Theo. Seminary led in prayer. President Jones introduced Miss I. R. Jones, a teacher in Allen High School, of Asheville, N. C. Dr. Murial Pettioni, physician of Bennett College, and Mr. Clayton Southern, II, musical director of Bennett College.

The Choir sang "Go Down Moses," after which Bishop A. P. Shaw was presented and spoke. President Jones presented Dr. Earl N. Cunningham, a representative of the Educational Board of Nashville, Tenn., who also spoke. The Choir rendered two other selections, after which an offering was received by Rev. G. M. Phelps, and others of \$91.46. President Jones divided the offering by leaving one-half with the local church. Rev. R. D. Crockett, religious instructor at Bennett College, was presented and spoke. The Choir sang for the closing number "Bennett Alma Mata Fairest."

#### FRIDAY MORNING

Devotions were led by Rev. B. F. Gleaves. Bishop Shaw commented upon the importance of the great hymns of the church.

The Committee on the Journal, reported that they had examined the

Journal and found it correct.

The District Superintendent, Rev. G. E. Hogue, of the Western Dis-

trict, was called and he made his report. See Report.

The District Superintendent, Rev. R. B. McCallum, of the Winston District, was called and he made his report. The reports of the pastors on the Western District were called and they made reports. The pastors of the Winston District likewise reported.

A motion by Rev. T. H. Wootten prevailed that the printed program of the Conference become the order of service with the necessary changes.

Motion by Dr. H. L. Ashe prevailed that a committee be appointed to study the question of Referendum and that they bring a report to the Conference.

Dr. H. L. Ashe, Mrs. A. D. Brower and E. Frost, were appointed. See

Report.

The District Superintendents were called to the platform to deliver a five-minutes address on the Crusade for Christ.

Dr. R. W. Winchester was asked to lead in these addresses.

All four of the District Superintendents spoke well and brought a great deal of information and inspiration to the Conference.

Bishop Shaw gave to the Conference the general plan of organization in a very inspirational way.

Prof. C. A. Barrett, Conference Lay Leader, spoke, assuring the Conference that the Layman will support the Crusade in a big way. A motion prevailed that the Conference go on record supporting the

Crusade one hundred per cent. Dr. Curtis, representing the Board of Pensions, was presented.

Rev. G. E. Hogue pronounced the benediction.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON, OCTOBER 27, 1944

The North Carolina Conference began its afternoon session with devotions led by Rev. J. W. Shuford, after which the business of the Conference was resumed.

Motion of R. W. Winchester prevailed that Trustee Board of the Annual Conference be empowered to sell the property belonging to the Conference at Moxville for an amount not less than \$800.00.

R. W. Winchester reported to the Conference the sale of the Church property at Waynesville for the sum of \$100.00, with \$50.00 paid on said

sale, and the balance in monthly installments.

G. M. Phelps offered a motion placing in nomination W. J. Cameron as Conference Youth Counselor. B. J. Stewart and H. C. Woodland were also nominated with the nomination closing on the three persons mentioned. A vote was taken and the results were as follows: H. C. Woodland, 31 votes; B. J. Stewart, 6 votes, and W. J. Cameron 21 votes. H. C. Woodland was declared elected.

A check from the Board of Education was presented by G. M. Phelps. which check is to be used by the Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The check of \$1.80, was given to the Conference Treasurer, N. J. Pass.

R. W. Winchester read a resolution to the effect that this Conference invite Bishop and Mrs. R. N. Brooks as their guest to the next session of the Annual Conference. See resolutions.

A motion for adoption prevailed. A brief recess of the Conference was called by the presiding Bishop

to make a picture of the Conference delegation.

On motion of G. M. Phelps, the Conference voted to have a certified Public Accountant to audit the books of the treasurer of the Trustee Board of the Conference and the Annual Conference Treasurer's books within 30 days. The motion prevailed.

Question 6 was called: "What are the reports of the District Superin-

tendents as to the status of their work?" Ans.: See reports.

Question 7. "What is the schedule for minimum support of pastors?" with "none" as the answer. R. W. Winchester offered a motion that a committee be appointed to study and recommend suitable plans. of W. T. Lomax prevailed that we have the District Superintendents, one minister from each District and the District Lay Leaders constitute this committee: The following ministers were appointed: R. C. Sharpe, for the Greensboro District; H. C. Gannaway for the Laurinburg District; W. C. Scarborough for the Western District, and W. S. McLeod for the Winston District.

Question 8 was called: "What is the plan and what are the approved claims for the support of the District Superintendents for the ensuing year?"

Ans.: "15% of the pastors cash salary."

Motion of J. E. Brower prevailed that the pastors of the Conference pay an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's cash salary on the Permanent Fund which amount is to be paid at the next session of the Conference in 1945. Some announcements were made, followed by the bendiction by W. O. Thomas.

#### FRIDAY EVENING

Rev. G. M. Phelps presiding.

Appropriate devotions were conducted, after which Rev. Phelps presented Rev. M. McCallum, of Columbia, S. C., who gave a very inspirational and informational address on "Faith."

Rev. Phelps next presented Prof. P. A. Taylor, of Gammon Theo. Semin-

ary, who spoke in the interest of the school.

An offering of forty-five dollars was received.

The Choir sang a selection after which Rev. D. C. Skeen pronounced the benediction.

#### SATURDAY MORNING

Devotions were conducted by Rev. F. D. Caldwell.

The boards, committees and commissions were recommended.

A motion to refer nomination of committees for further revision back to the committee was made by Rev. H. C. Gannaway. This motion carried with the exception of the Board of Ministerial Training and the Trustee Board which were adopted on first reading.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS

Bishop Shaw, District Superintendents and friends of the North Carolina Conference:

The committee on resolutions, Morals, Temperance and Religion sub-

mit the following report:

In these trying days when the whole world is being shaken by a global war that affects the religious, mental and physical life of all

people of the world and weakening our manpower.

Our young of today is passing through the most crucial crisis in this war-torn world that has ever been realized. This very day in every heart, brain and muscle of our American youth lies the future of our country. We are sure that those of you who have been so greatly blessed in being able to remain here on the home front, should feel a great responsibility.

Sinc the world war No. I, our country has witnessed an alarming increase of crime and juvenile delinquency. This is particularly evident in our young folk in the teen age. Leading the nation in the number of crimes committed, we are told today by the U.S. bureau of investigation.

In his report to Columbia university of January 23, 1943, Dr. Nicholas

Murray Butler said:

A chief reason why there is the present widespread and disturbing outbreak of crime and disorder on the part of our American youth is the fundamental principle of discipline toward self discipline is instilled in the schools, there can be only one result; namely: An undisciplined, disorderly youth without any effective training in morals and manners.

The harvest is great and the laborers are few. We are looking for the time when our husbands, brothers, sisters and friends will be mustered out and returned to their homes, many of them broken in spirit and morale. We see the great need of taking steps to improve present conditions as a whole and preparation for the future. This may be done by eliminating the many evils that are now existing on the home front—thus affecting the lives of the people.

One of the most horrible evils that we know about in these times is the liquor traffic. Millions of our men are being exposed to this deadly evil. Our homes and society are greatly affected with the uses of alcoholic liquors, which destroys mentally and physically and spiritually. Thus bringing about a low standard of the world that will be hard to rebuild

standards for better living.

We therefore recommend that the N. C. Conference go on record as

indorsing the total program of temperance as outlined by the Methodist Church through the Board of Temperance.

We further call upon our people to pratice total abstinence and by

precept and example lead others to do the same.

We recommend that each church in the conference appoint a strong committee on Temperance which will collaborate with the jurisdiction representative. We further recommend that the second Sunday in December, 1944, be set apart for or as World Temperance Sunday on which day each pastor be requested to preach a sermon on temperance and take an offering for the cause in harmony with paragraphs 235 and 236 of the discipline.

# Annual Report of Greensboro District, North Carolina Conference

Mr. Chairman, Members and Friends of the North Carolina Conference, Central Jurisdiction:

#### Greetings:

I come before you and this great conference to express my gratitude and appreciation to you for permitting me the privilege of making another report of the above named district. We have worked together as becometh good soldiers of Jesus Christ in unison in order to promote the greatest possible reults to the greatest number. We have done our best to promote workable organizations on the district pertaining both to temporal and spiritual activities. Our Bennett College rally in December, 1943, resulted in the total sum of \$945.00. Since then other small amounts have been reported to me on this fund. Our world service was in advance of previous years of which the reports from the pastors will indicate. We met in full our apportionments for General Conference, Jurisdictional Conferences and Area Council, in fact all causes required of us we have raised them in full. The ministerial support has never been better in my knowledge of the district. Most all the pastors have received their salary in full with a bonus. Of course this means, Episcopal Fund, Conference claimant Fund, have shared in proportion to the ministerial support. We strictly impressed this law and rule of prorating on the Greensboro district in everything the church requires prorating. The church School Institute held at Wesley Chapel, one of our best rural churches in the district and supervised by the pastor, J. H. Ledwell, brought much inspiration and information to our young people. The Youth Fellowship meeting was held at Bennett College. Here great numbers gathered. Dr. Jones, the president of the college, spared no pains in making things pleasant and inviting for them. The Dean, Dr. G. H. Caldwell, and the instructors were at their best in imparting the subjects that prompted the young people to return home gladly singing the praises of the Youth Fellowship Movement in the church.

The membership has increased some, but not like we had hoped to have seen it. The pastors and members put on a membership campaign the first of January. And for three months every church and pastor endeavored to evangelize his church and increase his membership. The results were worth while yet we had hoped even greater achievements. There have been several deaths in our membership this conference year. In the ministry there has been one minister passed in the person of Brothr R. D. Bethea. He died September 25, in a tragic accident. Struck by a sudway street car in New York city, death was instant. His wife, Bessie, preceded him last May. Mrs. Mamie Wells, the beloved wife of Rev. P. I. Wells passed from this world to the great beyond, leaving her husband, one son and a host of relatives and friends to mourn their loss. Her death, too, was speedy, only ten days. There are two retired ministers residing on the Greensboro district, namely J. W. Byers and D. L. Thomas. Brother Byers lives in Greensboro and brother Thomas lives in Raleigh. They are well. Brother Thomas is very active in the local church in Raleigh. The pastor very often speaks of his work in complimentary terms.

Church property: This has been a Jubilee year in church repairing and debt paying on the Greensboro district. The pastors will report in

brief their respective work. But allow me to mention a few of the outstanding charges. Reidsville has paid off that long standing debt there. Churches repaired and beautified are Wesley Chapel, Chapel, Hill, Warren Street, Mt. Tabor, Goshen, Red Mill. This is the finest country church on the district. Kernersville, Basses Chapel, Raleigh, St. James, Newport News, Pleasant Ridge, but this church was blown down September 15th in a hurricane. All the above named churches have made great repairs and improvements. There are other churches like Oxford, Collin Grove, High Street, Randleman, Stouts Chapel and St. Matthews, are flushed with bank accounts for improvements when opportunity permits. St. Matthews has inherited a gift of \$14,143.00 from the late and lamented member of that church, Mrs. Hooks.

The war conditions: This has greatly hampered our gatherings. The shortage of tires and gasoline have compelled us to curb our coming together many times when it was very necessary. The allotment of tires and gasoline do not measure to the full requirements of the needs and demands of this parish. I have used correspondence in most instances when I wanted to consult the pastors concerning district matters when heretofore we have met in a body somewhere on the district. The pastors on my district do not get enough gas to do the work the church requires them to do. Yet realizing the great sacrifice that is being made in this country to win the war we patiently wait and pray for better days to come.

The Disrict Conference was held in Kernersville July 5-7. Great preparation was made for the entertainment of this conference. More than a thousand dollars was spent on the remodeling and repairs on the church. The members and friends spared no pains to make things nice and comfortable for us. We had a fine and successful district conference in this beautiful little town.

Church Periodicals: We have ever kept before the people the importance of reading good literature. Our church papers most especially

I have earnestly urged them to read.

The Crusade: This movement is being given much study and prayer in the hope of great achievement in money, soul-saving, information, inspiration, numerical ingathering of members in church and schools for which the movement was launched. When we realize what it has cost us and is costing us in life blood of our sons, relatives and friends that we ourselves are permitted to be here this morning unbombed impels us to give as long as God gives us to spread His Kingdom upon the earth. We hope to do our part until the prophecy of Isaiah may become a realization that: He shall judge among the nations and shall rebuke many peoples; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks, nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. And we hereby pledge ourselves to do our part in making it possible that He shall not fail nor be discouraged till he have set judgment in the earth and the isles shall wait for his law. # Report of the Laurinburg District, October 26, 1944

Dear Bishop Shaw, Brethren of the North Carolina Conference and friends:

Providence has smiled upon us, and with health and strength we gather at the seat of another annaul conference to give an account of our stewardship. Twelve months ago upon leaving Charlotte we hoisted our

sails and embarked upon the sea for another year of sailing. We have not had a smooth sail all the way, many furious winds have we encountered and rough has been the sea over which we have traveled, but today we have reached the harbor and we drop anchors, exchange greetings and make our reports, and leave to you to say how well we have done. Truly as we gather we can sing with the song writer:

Through many dangers, toils and snares We have already come 'Tis grace that brought us safe thus far And grace will lead us home.

As we traveled through the year the grim monster death came in and claimed some of our crew. All of our active pastors have been spared, but early in the conference year, Rev. Marcus Monday, one of our honored retired ministers, heard the master call, and obedient as he had always been he answered, and a tired heart stopped beating and a weary soul went home to rest. The first of August Sistr Anna Barnes, the wife of Rev. B. B. Barnes, took leave for the celestal city. She was a lover of the Master's work and a strong factor in the success of her husband. She finished her day's work and without warning walked away with the Master. These two lovable souls surrendered themselves to God freely because they were for many years buds and blossoms for eternity.

#### General Conditions.

This has been in many ways the best year for the Laurinburg District. In this report time will not permit us to mention all of the pastors one by one and their success, but at the close of the conference thirteen ministers of the District went back to their same charges and were received with great joy and five new ministers were welcomed to the District, and two others we changed. This gives us a total of twenty pastors on the Laurinburg District. All of the older men went back to their jobs and took up where they left off and their success has been great. Many improvements have been made in their charges and all reports are round.

#### New Ministers.

Among the several ministers who were received into the conference last year from other denominations two were appointed to the Laurinburg District. Rev R. D. Sharpe, from the A.M.E. Church, Rev. J. F. Sawyer, from the A.M.E. Zion church. These two ministers have proved themselves worthy pastors this year and their achievements have been gratifying. Rev. Sharpe was sent to Lumberton and New Zion. He has installed new windows in the Lumberton church at the cost of \$1,300 and made general repairs including windows of \$1,700. He has also led the people in building a new church at New Zion. This in many respects is the best rural church on the District. It is built out of Cinder blocks.

Rev. J. F. Sawyer was appointed to the Sanford Ct., an appointment that had been for many years used for the most part as a supply appointment. They have more than doubled their giving this year for all causes and this charge has taken its place with the other appointments on the district. They have on the ground at one point cement block to build a new church and have raised for the new church more than \$700. This charge is round in reports. They are loud in their praise of his work.

Dr. H. L. Ashe went to Fayetteville and took where they were and moved forward and has beautified the church. This charge paid all of its assessments at the Easter roll call and has spent the remainder of the year in its own local program. Their report is 100% plus. They have \$500 in the treasure now to build a parsonage. Thus Fayetteville takes its place among the leading appointments in the conference. Not a fourth grade

appointment but one of the First rank who ask no mercy but shoulders their responsibilities.

Rev. G. M. Phelps was appointed to Simpson Church in Charlotte. Ithere are those who had any apprenensions as to the future of Charlotte you can ease your mind and be assured that Charlotte is safe. Brother Phelps has done a great work there this year and brought to the conference a round report for everything and has the church in a fine financial condition. He has all the indebtedness of the church financed through the Building and Loan and has paid much in advance and a small weekly payment will take care of the building loan. Possible three-fourths of the building loan debt is accumulated street assessment that had to be met immediately and it has been paid. Twenty-two members have been received in the church and things are moving along nicely.

Rev. Glen A. Brooks went to Bouleware Chapel in Charlotte and according to the reports for the members this church has had its best

year. This church must be improved.

Rev. J. J. Patterson was appointed to Hamlet last conference and upon arrival was faced with an indebtedness of more than \$1,000 dollars. This has all been cleared and the church is clear of all indebtedness. He has had a fine year. Rev. O. W. Burwick was appointed to Johns and Beaver Dam. He has had a quite successful year there. He entertained our Youth Fellowship Institute at Johns in a very beautiful church that had been beautified for the institute and has raised quite a large sum of money to repair the Beaver Dam Church. His report was ready for conference almost two months ago. Brother Burwick has carried this charge to unthinkable heights this year.

#### Benevolence Giving.

At the last annual conference we pased a resolution giving to our conference a certain percentage of our World service to our own conference. This resolution put heart in the people and Laurinburg made almost a fifty per cent increase in their benevolence. All other claims of the general and local church have been met also. We played our part in the Bennett College Endowment and have made our contribution to Allen Home and Gammon Seminary.

#### Ministerial Support

The change of economic conditions and the very fine work of the pastors, the people have been inspired to increase the salaries of the pastors in almost every charge on the district. The total increase in salary on the district for the coming year is \$2300. This was given as a tribute to the fine leadership the pastors have furnished. There are several of the charges who are planning to build new parsonages and we have urged the people to make the old ones more comfortable. This I am sure will make the Laurinburg district one of the most desirable to serve.

#### District Activities.

Our Youth Fellowship held at Johns was a decided success and the interest was good and the institute was very helpful. We also had a large group from the district to take part or attend the conference institute held at Bennett College. This was a very successful undertaking and we hope will be continued. Our district conference was held at Piney Grove church on the Maxton charge. At this same time the W. S. C. S. was held and these two meetings were largely attended. Facing as we do the new opportunities that are offered the laymen I feel sure that with the beginning of this quarter we will see new life in the laymen throughout the district.

#### Ministers' Wives.

The ministers' wives of the district are still doing a fine work for the conference, but whatever it is it represents the voluntary efforts on their

part to suppliment the funds of the Retired ministers. They not only raise money but their thoughtfulness when something happens or when a word of encouragement means much is one of the main reasons that this group should continue their oranization.

#### **Future Outlook**

We have never had a greater opportunity anywhere and at any time than we have today in Wilmington, N. C. I have spent much time there in surveying the field and making plans for the organizing of a church there. Wilmington has grown wonderfully since the war. Before the war there were 35,000 people in Wilmington. Today there are 105,000 people there, and I have contacted more than fifty persons who are waiting the opening day for the new Methodist church in Wilmington. We have made the first payment on a nice neat church there and only need some fine energetic pastor to go in there and take care of it. The North Carolina conference could not devote its time anywhere that would be more profitable than in this undertaking. We must concentrate our entire effort to this one point at this time. The people are awaiting the close of this conference to welcome some minister to be their spiritual leader. I trust we will not disappoint them.

We still are looking forward to completing the church in Southern Pines. If we are to carry on in North Carolina we must look forward to developing new fields of labor. We can duplicate in other cities what

we have done in Fayetteville.

#### Appreciation.

Bishop Shaw, we greatly appreciate the heights to which you lead us the past quadrinium, and we welcome your return for another. We feel safe in following your leadership. For in you we follow one with ability plus experience. You have traveled from the humble pastorates to now the position of chief pastor. You know the struggle through which a pastor travels. For all of this we welcome you.

#### Conclusion.

We rejoice in the fact that we are living and are permitted to serve in a day such as this, when the church has launched such a vast program, the Crusade for Christ. I speak for twenty pastors, thirty-five churches and several hundred members when I say that the Laurinburg district stands ready to shoulder its part and march forward in this great undertaking for Christ. I am happy for the fellowship that I have had this year throughout the entire district and pledge my continued interest in His cause wherever I may be permitted to serve another year.

## Report of District Superintendent, Western District

To the Eighty-Sixth Session of the North Carolina Conference: Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, Ministers and Delegates of the North Carolina Conference:

It became a very profound and happy task of mine at the last annual conference by the appointment of our beloved bishop to take up the work of the sluperintendency of the western district of this conference, which was so nobly carried on by Rev. G. M. Phelps.

On entering the work we found forty-four (44) preaching-places, which were being shepereded by some of the best pastors of the conference, and a very large and worthy group of laymen and laywomen united in the

common cause of bringing unsaved into the fellowship of Christ. With these competent workers we set to the task of programming the church to achieve the greatest good possible for the largest number. This task called for the supervision by our best trained and earnest church leaders to direct or give leadership in Christianity for the smallest babe up to the oldest person in and out of the church.

#### Evangelism.

I feel that Evangelism is or ought to be the concern of every individual in the church. Across the district, we appointed chairmen on evangelism in every church to work with every group in the church, stimulating interest for this work. On February 2nd we invited Dr. J. W. Golden, the field secretary in our church on Evangelism, to visit our district, in the interest of this work, who came to us in Hickory and gave us a day lecturing and helping us to plan a district-wide campaign. Much has been accomplished in this effort on the district this year. However, I hope this is just the beginning of a far-reaching movement in soul-saving.

#### Church Records.

I urged for every church a membership register so there could be a up-to-date record for every Methodist born babe as well as members coming into our church. I found that so many of our churches are weefully in need not only a membership record but for finance as well. I feel that our membership is too important, our church is too great to not have an adequate record for the business of our church. I urged a revision of our church membership roll so that we may keep up with our migrating membership.

#### Church School.

Here we are confronted with the most important task of church work. Here where we are called upon to combine our interest and give our best in training, guiding, and influencing men, women, boys and girls to become strong dependable Christians. Here where we may build a strong membership for all time. I have urged every pastor to join in somewhere here with his membership training class. Because too many enter our church not knowing what it is all about and unless he is trained in a day like this which is full of much evil, he will care less. Many of our church schools had their Bible daily vacation school this year and we hope for another all church schools will have a daily Bible vacation school. Unless we train our children religiously ourselves, it will be done by a group outside the church.

Bishop Shaw, we were forced to have our district conference and our institute at the same place and time, because of the shortage of gas and crowded conditions of travel. This kind of a combined interest proved to be a very impressive and grand success. This school was under the auspices of the board of education in Nashville, Tenn. They certified two of our Negro teachers and not only gave us two of their certified teachers but paid all of their expenses. Then the district conference set aside one night for Youth Promotional effort and raised enough to take care of the expense of the other two teachers, leaving a nice sum for the local church. This being the first year of this institute under their supervision they planned these courses: "The Educational Work of the Small Church," "Teaching Children in the Small Church," "Worship in the Small Church," "Planning for Children. "Go Ye Therefore" Evangelism No. 1. All four classes were well attended wih an average of 32. There were 23s class-card certificates given to those who made five class periods. Because of the high appreciation permeating its enthusiasm through the entire school, there was an asking of an additional day for this work another year.

#### Improvement of the Local Church on the District.

This has been a high and most gratifying year of my life, as I watched the old church seemingly at her best. Under the leadership of our most efficient and eminent pastors and laymen things to my mind, have happened. In Asheville Rev. L. A. Brown and his loyal followers have programmed a big effort to renew the strength of Methodism by making over their place of worship. In Newton, Rev. S. B. McBrayer and his congregation have up to now more than \$2,500 on the erection of a new \$7,000 St. Paul; In Hickory Rev. T. H. Wooten is holding a most beautiful blue-print plan to renovate both up and down stairs of his church with already money on hand around \$2200, or more, Rev. D. C. Skeen has already placed the cornerstone in one of his churches and now worshipping in it. And many others who are just as worthy of mentioning, have either repaired or paying on remodeling of their building. This church in which we now worship, under the competent pastor, Rev. W. C. Scarborough, and his most worthy members have sold well Methodism in Lenoir, by making this church the most beautiful church in the city, yes, even in the North Carolina conference. I have nothing but praise for these gallant men. Rev. T. C. Frazier has a fine work started five miles from Stanley, N. C., known as Luckey Chapel and Rev. Bailey has organized a church about 17 miles from here known as Beaven Creek and has started erecting a new church.

#### The Coming Crusade To Our District.

Bishop Shaw, we are setting the stage for our all out drive for the second crusade of the church. I think the church is asking only a trifle as what she demanded of the people in the first crusade. Voicing the sentiment of the men on the district, we shall do our uttermost in this drive to make Christ real to men and bring the required sacrificial gift to His altar.

Bishop Shaw, we are happy to receive your leadership for another four years. Your presence, your warm fellowship calls out the best there is We feel that this fellowship is akin to that angelic felicity which is enjoyed in heaven. We feel that under your most profound leadership which is the best in Methodism we shall reach the highest heights in Kingdom building. I close with the poem which describes the type of men the church demands to carry on his Program in the days that lie ahead. "God give us men a time like this demand, Strong minds, brave hearts, true faith, and ready hands. Men whom the lust of office cannot kill; Men whom the spoils of office cannot buy; Men who have opinions and a will; men who have honor and who will not lie; Men who will face the treacherous demagogue, And damn his flatteries without winking; Tall men, sun-crowned, who will live above the fog in public duty and in private thingking. For while the rabbles with their thumb worn creeds, Their large pretensions and their little deeds, Mingled in selfish strife, lo Freedom weeps, Wrong rules the world and waiting justice sleeps."

# Report of District Superintendent, Winston District

Dear Bishop, Brethren and Friends of the North Carolina Conference: I have come on this day to bring my second annual report to you of the Winston District, North Carolina Conference, Central jurisdiction. I count it a privilege to relate to you the labors of the pastors of the district for the present year. Certainly we make the confession that desired heights have not been reached. Yet the very excellent work of the men in general claims notable recognition. We have presented all claims of

the church and the pastors, in general, have made outstanding efforts to

conform to the total program of the church.

Our first getting together after the conference was to complete the effor for Bennett College. Bishop you were present on December 21, to witness what was done. The amount required of us at this time is in hand. On the same day of the meeting we attempted to organize evangelism as we were taught at the Area Council of '43. This, however, brought varied experiences with only limited success. We still believe that this form of evangelism will bring telling success when properly outline and zealously fostered.

The early part of the year brought to our attention claims such as General Conference, Jurisdictional Conference, World Service, Area Council, and the numerous other claims as occur in each conferenc year. By the After Easter Roll Call three-fourths, or more, of all claims had been

brought in.

#### Youth Conferences and Institutes

For the first time we were able to carry through a conference-wide Youth Conference, the seat of which Bennett College brought together credited delegations from each district.

The Winston District Institute Was Held at St. Home Methodist

#### Church, Winston-Salem.

At this meeting plans were formulated and taken to each church on the District to secure representation. The response was inspiring. We as youth and other look forward to this pleasant treat another year was the cry on leaving Bennett at its close.

#### District Conference.

The Winston District Conference was held at Rural Hall. The conference was of inspiration, especially to those generous people who entertained.

The absence of the former editor of the Christian Advocate at that time, Dr. R. N. Brooks, now Bishop R. N. Brooks, was noticeable, and even though Rev. Dr. G. Haven Caldwell represented the paper in a very enthusiastic way still we recognized the sag in subscriptions at that time. We made attempts to pull out of that sag at this conference. Dr. N. G. Crolley was present with us on Wednesday night and in his usual manner lifted the congregation in spiritual thought and action of the church.

#### Improvements and Clearing of Debts.

Our church at Rural Hall and two of the churches at Winston, namely, Mt. Pleasant and Saint Paul have made outstanding improvements in paint and other labor. Our churches at Asheboro and Thomasville have made good in the raising of funds for improvements, the work to be done at a later date.

Two years ago now Rev. H. W. Phillips was sent to our St. Home Church in Winston. He at once realized the need of building both the congregation and church. Within the two years 30 new members have been added to the church, and a sum of \$6,000.00 has been raised with the closing of a rally October 8. (3,400.00). To this young pastor and loyal membership we await the final culmination of your endeavor, with the hope that you may soon worship together in the desired ediffice.

Our St. Stephens Church at Lexington and St. Mark at High Point

Our St. Stephens Church at Lexington and St. Mark at High Point have cleared debts of long standing and have had their mortgage burning. In the same manner something of note can be said of each charge on the

district, time will not permit.

### Woman's Society of Christian Service

The Woman's Society of Christian Service, of the Winston District, held its meeting at Hoovers Chapel, Thomasville. This was a day of inspiration and information to those of us present. Their contribution to the total program of the district accounts in a large measure for whatever our accomplishments may be at present.

In many of the charges through the summer months revivals have been carried on. The success of these revivals will be heard of in the report of pastors. The result as an increase in membership being felt in

many of the charges of the district.

### The Changing of Pastors.

The Winston District has lost three of its standard pastors this year. Death removed from us the Rev. Coy N. Williams in the month of February. The Rev. L. E. Watson was transferred to the Delaware Conference the latter part of April. The Rev. Dr. G. Haven Caldwell was transferred to the west Texas Conference the latter part of August, effective the early part of September. The loss of each of these brothers added to the labors and struggles to all who were concerned, but out of all the Lord has brought us thus far on the way. To Him be glory now and always.

My thanks to you as pastors, members and friends of the Winston District are here recorded in this short word with long member and kind

### REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE COM-MISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE.

There has been no day in the history of our church when the needs of a suffering humanity were more clearly recognized and presented a greater challenge for service and sacrificial giving than today.

In recognition of the tremendous responsibility that rests upon us as a conference in helping to promote the program of our great church, for over seas relief and rehabilitation and continued kingdom building both at home and abroad: Therefore your commission recommends for your action and determination here and now the following apportionments for the conference year 1944-45:

That we, the North Carolina Conference urge each individual charge

to raise its apportionment in full.

(7) That the Episcopal Fund shall be the amount equal to one and three-fourth per cent (14%) of pastor's cash salary.

per cent (7%) of the pastor's cash salary.

(9) That the District Superintendent's salary shall be an amount equal

to fifteen per cent (15%) of the pastor's cash salary.

(10) That at the seat of the next annual conference, each minister shall pay into the permanent fund (Pension and Relief) an amount equal to one per cent (1%) of cash salary received.

(11) That each charge of the conference observe the special days as required by our discipline: Race Relations, World Service Sundays and other

special days as may be designated by the general church.

## HISTORICAL VIEW

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afferwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned, there were two Con-Carolina. ferences. Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those

the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A. M. E. Church, some of the Colored M. E. Church of America, but thousands turned gadly to the boson of the old Methodist Episcopal Church At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 10,495 white members and 3,100 colored. Without consulting years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.




