The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Central Jurisdiction, met in its ninety-second session November 2, 1950, at St. Peter Methodist Church, Hamlet, North Carolina, with Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, Resident Bishop of the Baltimore Area, presiding.

A brief period of devotion was led by Reverend Eugene Black, after which the attention of the Conference was turned to the roll call.

ORGANIZATION—The Conference Secretary, T. H. Wootten, offered his resignation, which was accepted on motion which was carried. C. L. Gidney and W. R. Crawford were offered as candidates for secretary. W. R. Crawford, by ballot, received 44 votes. C. L. Gidney received 65 votes, and was thus declared secretary of the Conference.

The Secretary was asked to nominate his assistants. W. T. Brown, W. R. Crawford, Marshall McCallum, and T. H. Wootten were nominated. They were elected.

The Statistician was asked to nominate his assistants. J. W. Jones, G. W. Patterson, S. L. Townsend, and M. S. Laughlin were nominated. They were elected.

The Treasurer nominated his assistants: J. F. Sawyer, J. W. Hall, and E. L. Raiford. They were elected.

Other elections were: W. T. Brown, reporter; J. J. Patterson, postmaster; J. H. McCallum, pianist, and I. A. Friend, song leader.

The Bishop presented Dr. R. E. Jones, who made some interesting suggestions. He suggested that each member of the Conference bring one young man into the ministry. His plan was accepted by vote of the Conference.

Dr. P. A. Taylor was presented and spoke interestingly of the Advocate.

A motion prevailed that all material be in the hands of the Secretary within sixty days following the close of the Conference session.

MEMORIAL SERVICE—The Rev. R. W. Winchester presided during this service. Rev. Ramsey Bridges delivered the Memorial address, using as a subject, "I Believe in the Life Everlasting."

The morning service ended with the benediction.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. E. N. Mattison.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Characters of the ministers were passed. Rev. J. E. Brower, Superintendent of the Greensboro District, gave his report. Following this, the pasters of the Greensboro District gave their reports.

- Dr. E. A. Love was presented and spoke in interest of Methodist Federation for Social Action and the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Permission was given Rev. C. A. Barrett, Conference Lay Leader, to conduct a program at the 4:00 o'clock hour rather than Saturday afternoon. (See Layman's report and program).

- Dr. A. R Howard, of the Board of Temperance, was presented and spoke in behalf of his work.
- Rev. H. J. Kirk and Rev. H. B. King, members of the South Carolina Conference, were presented.

THURSDAY EVENING

The chairman of the Conference Board of Education, Rev. W. C. L. Scarborough, presided during Bennett College and Allen Home Night. Music was furnished by the Bennett College Choir. Those representing the Board of Education were Rev. L. M. Mayfield, Bishop R. E. Jones, Dr. D. D. Jones, Dr. P. A. Taylor, and Rev. C. L. Gidney. Bishop R. E. Jones was the principal speaker.

FRIDAY MORNING—SECOND DAY

Following the devotions by Rev. C. E. Strickland, Rev. W. J. Cameron, Superintendent on the Western District, made his report.

Rev. W. S. McLeod, Superintendent on the Winston District, gave his report.

Reports of the pastors on the Laurinburg, Western, and Winston Districts were made. A motion prevailed that this Conference send a message expressing deep appreciation to the white Methodists, and to all others in High Point who made contributions to Brooks Memorial Methodist Church. A motion prevailed that greetings be sent to the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, now in session in Kinston, N. C.

Dr. T. A. Stafford, Executive Secretary of the Board of Pensions of the Methodist Church, was present and spoke in behalf of Pensions.

A motion prevailed that Bennett College Roll Call be held December 12, 1950. A motion prevailed that the Conference date be changed to the middle of May. (See resolution presented by Rev. J. E. Brower). A motion prevailed that a Memorial Church be established. Upon the vote of the Conference it was agreed that the Memorial Church be located at High Street in Greensboro, N. C. The churches at Durham, N. C. and Newport News, Va. are to receive consideration of the allocation of available money.

Rev. E. M. Saunders, of the First Baptist Church of Rockingham, N. C. was presented.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Following devotions, disciplinary questions were asked. (See record).

The Bishop made timely remarks commending the work of the Supply pastors.

The Conference voted unanimously to hold the next session (1951) at South High Point.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was made by Rev. L. M. Mayfield (see report). On motion of E. Frost, the report was adopted.

Mr. John Adams, president of a Cab Company in Winston-Salem, made brief remarks.

A report of the Board of Lay Activity was given by C. L. Gidney, Secretary.

C. A. Barrett was re-elected Conference Lay Leader.

Rev. R. C. Sharpe made a report on Conference Claimants. (See report).

Dr. Stafford, of the Board of Conference Claimants, made timely remarks.

On motion of Rev. G. E. Hogue, and seconded by Rev. R. W. Winchester, the Conference voted that a photograph of each retiring minister be published in the minutes. The Conference also voted to pass on their character and place in retired relation. (See list). An opportunity was given for remarks by retired ministers. Those responding were: R. J. Shipp, A. E. Robinson, D. L. Thomas, and W. T. Lomax.

In anticipating a change in the scheduled program for the evening, Bishop Shaw suggested that someone deliver a message. A motion was passed that the Bishop appoint someone. Rev. A. M. Erwin, of the Washington Conference, was appointed.

Following devotions, the minutes were read, and with necessary corrections, were adopted. The report of the Committee on World Service and Finance was given. (See report).

A motion prevailed that the District Superintendents be permitted to add to their apportionment \$25 for each district to help in the work of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Rev. R. C. Sharpe presented the **World Outlook** and urged the churches to support same. Rev. R. J. Shipp offered a resolution. (See resolution).

Mrs. Frances Querry was presented and spoke in the interest of the Federal Council of Churches.

Dr. D. H. Stanton was presented and spoke in behalf of the American Bible Society.

Dr. Ray Petrea, of Duke University was presented by Bishop Shaw. He used as a theme, "Eyeless Ergazers."

SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions were led by Rev. S. L. Townsend.

At a business session a motion prevailed that all minutes be given the committee for inspection.

The report of the Statistician was given. (See report).

Rev. P. I. Wells made his report. (See report).

 \boldsymbol{A} motion prevailed that the reports be referred to a committee for review.

The Treasurer, Rev. N. J. Pass, made his report. (See report).

SUNDAY MORNING SESSION

A Love Feast was the opening feature of the Sunday morning session. Rev. D. L. Thomas, assisted by other ministers, presided. (See report for those who were ordained).

Bishop A. P. Shaw preached an illuminating and inspiring sermon. Following the reading of the resolutions, and then the appointments, the Conference adjourned.

Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated ever the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the war the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS GREENSBORO DISTRICT

REVIEW OF YEAR

Bishop Shaw, members and friends of the 92nd session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, held at St. Peter's Methodist Church, Hamlet, North Carolina, November 1-5, 1950, Greetings!

Once again we endeavor to embrace within the narrow confines of a written report a year's achievements of the laymen and ministers of the Greensboro District, together with a forward look. We humbly hope there may be something of enduring worth which the Great Architect of the Universe may find useful in building His kingdom.

I want to register my deep appreciation for the hearty spirit of cooperation manifested by both ministers and laymen of the district. This year has been a momentous one for the Greensboro District. Almost to the man, we are expecting the pastors' reports to supercede any of preceding years.

We have visited every charge on the district. All of our Quarterly Conferences have been well attended, and in each of them keen interest has been manifested in the movements of our great church.

THE WORKMEN

Each pastor has stood loyally to his task and worked faithfully. No one has said, "Because you sent me here I will not work." Rather, each man has said, "I will do my best." In nearly every charge the pastors will report conversions and accessions.

THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We are encouraged by the way Methodist Men's Clubs have taken hold of some of our churches. Your Board of Lay Activities sees in the Methodist Men's movement an opportunity of harnessing the power of laymen in the Stewardship program as no other way has done it.

We have made great strides in organizing Methodist Men's groups and getting them chartered this year. There are more new chartered groups in the North Carolina Conference than in other conference in the Baltimore area, and if you will permit us to brag just a little, we will go a little further and state the facts as they are recorded. "The North Carolina Conference has more new chartered groups than the other three conferences of the Baltimore area combined, and most of them (they say in Chicago), are on the Greensbore District."

BENNETT COLLEGE THANKSGIVING OFFERING

We feel that the results realized by our college is well worth the efforts and labor given in our Thanksgiving offering. We feel that the cause of Christian Education has been strengthened, and that the Methodist people are more conscious of the contribution the church institutions have made and are making to Education. To all who have in any way made a contribution to this work, whether in a financial way or by moral support, we express our sincere thanks.

To Dr. David D. Jones, president of Bennett College, we owe and hereby express our deep gratitude for his wise and tireless leadership.

MINISTERS' WIVES

The Ministers' Wives' Association, headed by Mrs. J. E. Brower, and faithfully promoted by some of the best ministers' wives of our conference (if not the best), still have in mind our fathers who have helped to make this conference. They will, without a doubt, make a creditable report at this conference.

SUMMARY

Basses and Raleigh Cross Roads-Eugene Black, pastor.

On this charge there are two beautiful brick church buildings. Both have been newly covered, a new basement dug at Basses, and a furnace is being placed in each church. New pews are being purchased at Raleighs. Here is a pastor that gets in high gear, stays in high all day, and it looks as if he sometimes sleeps in high gear (if he ever sleeps). Although this charge was heavily loaded with local church matters, Brother Black led them to a one hundred per cent paying of all claims at Easter. Ten (10) have been added to the enrollment of the church and six (6) to church school enrollment. The return of the pastor was requested at the Quarterly Conference.

Brown Summit-W. T. Lomax, pastor.

Here we have three splendid groups with good church buildings. They are well pleased with their pastor, and they and the pastor are highly elated with his new wife.

The District Conference was held in the new church building at Garretts Grove. Much praise is due the pastor and his good people, and of the entire charge and surrounding communities for the splendid entertainment prepared for us. The evening offering ran from \$45.00 to \$85.00. Accessions, 9. Added to the church school enrollment, 11. The pastor's return with his wife is requested.

Bullock—C. A. Hill, pastor.

This charge has two rural charges. The people and pastor pull together well. Accessions, 2; added to the church school, 30.

Durham-R. C. Sharpe, pastor.

Despite a heavy debt, this charge reports benevolences in full. A large new lot on Austin Avenue has been purchased and paid for. The present building has been beautified with white asbestos shingles and paint. Accessions, 17. Added to the church school, 11.

Empire-H. A. Davis, pastor.

Rev. Davis is a conscientious worker, always successful with his claims, anxiously works with the unsaved in his communities. He has to his credit three beautiful churches since he has been the pastor.

Browning Chapel—J. E. Evans, pastor.

The pastor has worked hard and has succeeded along many lines. Accessions, 2; new members added to the church school, 20.

High Street-W. E. Hairston, pastor.

Here the pastor is making a fine record. He is giving this charge a leadership that is worthwhile. This church raised \$1,206.00 last Sunday, making cash in the bank for building purposes \$11,206.00. Benevolences to the amount of \$800.00 were paid in full at Easter for the first time in the history of the charge. Here in the center of our conference, under the eve of Bennett College should be built one of the best and most modern church buildings in our conference. Accessions, 13. The Fourth Quarterly Conference was loud in its request for the return of the pastor. Salary raised, \$300.00.

Mt. Carmel and Mt. Tabor-P. I. Wells, pastor.

The pastor has done a splendid year's work. This charge has two of the best furnished churches on the district. Mt. Tabor is making rapid strides in preparation to remodel their building, which we home to complete next conference year. There have been added to the church 13 new members. The return of the pastor is desired.

South Greensboro-J. W. Shuford, pastor.

We compliment this pastor for knowing how to stay at a place so long and do as he pleases. He has served his 15th year and they still cry for his return. Celia Phelps has just dedicated one of the most beautiful pulpit suites on the district. Holmes has also a beautiful suite for its pulpit. New Goshen purchased a beautiful suite a few years ago. Accession, 31; from other denominations, 4; added to the church school, 81.

St. Matthews-G. M. Phelps, pastor.

Each year of his pastorate on this charge brings to it greater achievements. We reported last year a beautifully renovated and, redecorated church. This year a remodeled and redecorated parsonage is added to the pastor's accomplishments. Accessions, 58. New members added to the church school, 30. The Fourth Quarterly Conference voted unanimously for the pastor's return.

Kernersville-J. W. Lynch, pastor.

This church has taken on new life. It is in advance of last year. The paster has worked hard and his efforts have been blessed with success. Accessions, I; new members added to the church school, 8.

Leaksville-I. G. Simpson, pastor.

Under new and young leadership this charge has done excellent work this conference year. The pastor had planned a one hundred per cent report and made that as he thought, for which we have the highest praise for him in this type of cooperation. Some errors in figures slipped in and cut his report short of the correct percentage, for which we do not hold him responsible. He is highly esteemed in his charge, and unanimously they call for his return.

The lot behind the church has been leveled and a nice playground made. The parsonage has been renovated and redecorated beautifully. The pastor is digging a basement under the parsonage.

Newport News-Beverly Brown.

Brother Brown possesses a great amount of enthusiasm and has used it well on his charge. Added to the church, 1; added to the church school, 7.

Oxford—J. W. Hall, pastor.

Here the pastor is serving his 24th year with greater appreciation for mon the part of his people and the entire community than ever. They have raised around \$2600.00 for building purposes this year. We have a beautiful plan for a new church building before the board now, and hope to complete this church before the next annual conference. Added to the membership, 6.

Raleigh-W. T. Brown, pastor.

This charge has done excellent work. They are preparing for new memorial windows in the church building and most of them have been paid for in full. The salary increased \$300.00 last year, and still another \$200.00 was added this year. Number added to the church school, 30. The Quarterly Conference requested the pastor's return.

Ramseur-P. W. Webb, pastor.

The report always on this charge is that they have a good pastor, and

a good man, and his wife is held in the highest esteem all over the charge. This pastor has done a splendid work for nine years. Added to the church school. 14.

Randleman-C. G. Bynum, pastor.

Here two new church buildings are still in the process and some new material has been gathered this year. There have been three added to the church.

New Bethel-F. D. Morehead, pastor.

Here a faithful pastor and loyal people have worked hard to bring things to pass, and have a one hundred per cent-plus report.

Reidsville-Marshall McCallum, pastor.

A sincere pastor wins the sincere support of his people here. An efficient and energetic pastor's wife is much appreciated by the people. Accessions, 12: added to the church school, 18.

A one hundred per cent report has been made for his two years of pastorate here.

Summerfield-Collins-R. W. Winchester, pastor.

This charge has been handled with a masterful hand. A pastor alive to every interest of the church and brings again a one hundred per cent report. Here are two churches in beautiful condition.

Wesleys-Chapel Hill-J. H. Ledwell, pastor.

This charge has had a good year in spite of the poor health of the ambitious pastor. Brother Delbert Wright, a local preacher at Wesleys, and Brother Carl Richardson, a local preacher at Chapel Hill, have been in charge of the respective churches while the pastor was out, and both have done splendid work. Many thanks to this loyal people for a surprisingly good report. New pews costing \$1,800.00 have been added and paid for at Chapel Hill.

Laughlins-St. James-T. C. Tarpley, pastor.

Little but loud are both pastor and people of this charge. He has proven himself to be the man of the hour by taking charge of this small work and bringing it up to a higher standard than ever before. The basement at Laughlins is almost completed, a new furnace has been ordered and put in at a cost of \$800. The main auditorium beautified. St. James underpinned and foundation laid for an annex. Forty have been added to the churches and 26 to the church schools.

Warren Street-D. C. Skeen, pastor.

This charge is spiritually alive. The membership is courageous. All claims were fully met at Easter. Accessions, $\bf 3$; added to the church school, $\bf 8$.

Zion Hill-J. H. Minor, pastor.

This charge has enjoyed under the leadership of Brother Minor a very successful year. The walls of the new church are finished, ready for the roof. Everything up to date has been paid for and enough money is in the treasury to put the roof on. Eight have been added to the church school. The people are pleased and request the return of the pastor.

The work on the charges this year has been the best of the five years of my administration. In membership there has been an increase of 266, and there has been 360 added to the church school rolls.

And now, if this district has done anything that is worthy of note, it is due to these hard-working pastors, their wives, laymen, and officials. All credit is due to them. We are not merely receptacles, but channels of energy.

Life and power are not so much contained in us. it courses through us. Man's might is not to be measured by the stagnant water in the well, but by the limitless supply of the clouds of heaven.

We are sincerely grateful for the guidance of our resident Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, repeating again our genuine delight to have him hold this our 92nd annual session of the North Carolina Conference.

Resolved, that unitedly, we, the members of the Greensboro District, rededicate our lives and our talents to the transformation of our world and its peoples, through the power of a living faith.

And now, in conclusion, I will pass on this resolution, copied from The Christian Advocate . . .

"I will start anew this morning with a brighter, fairer creed

I will cease to stand complaining of my ruthless neighbor's greed.

I will cease to sit repining, while my duty's call is clear,

I will waste no moment whining and my heart shall know no fear. I will look sometimes about me for the things that merit praise,

I will search for hidden beauties that elude the grumbler,'s gaze,

I will try to find contentment in the paths that I must tread.

I will cease to have resentment when another moves ahead. I will not be swayed by envy when my rival's strength is shown.

I will not deny his merit but I'll strive to prove my own.

I will try to see the beauty spread before me, rain or shine, I will cease to preach your duty, and be more concerned with mine."

In spite of disturbed conditions the ministers and laymen of the Laurinburg District have put forth strenuous efforts to carry out the preaching and teaching phase of the Advance for Christ and His Church. It is encouraging indeed to note that souls have been reborn, churches revived, and many brought into the fellowship of our churches. It is our earnest hope and our souls' desire that this Evangelistic program may continue its great work until the world shall be saved for Christ.

"O Master, Lord, show us Thy way, Nor suffer Thou our steps to stray, Then in the path that leads to day We follow Thee.

Thou hast passed on before our face, Thy footsteps on the way we trace, O keep us, aid us, by Thy grace, We follow Thee."

DISTRICT MEETINGS

By holding tri-monthly group meetings much has been done in the way of better understanding the program of our great church, and creating a sense of District responsibility for standing by the program which the General Church hands down and which the needs of the local community make necessary. Our District Conference, held at Salem Church on the Rowland-Salem charge, was noteworthy. Rev. McBrayer and his good people deserve much credit for the fine way in which they entertained the conference. The spiritual, educational, and financial objectives of the church were set forth in such clear and convincing ways during the conference by leaders from our own and other districts that much lasting good was accomplished. Re-ports showed an increase in all benevolent givings. And most all churches reported an increase in membership. Our Leadership Training School was held at Piney Grove Church. Unfortunately, the school was held at a most inconvenient time for the people. This being a farming section, the people were in the midst of the tobacco-curing season. Yet this very condition was the means of giving us one of the finest demonstrations of loyalty I have ever witnessed. Rev. McLeod and his faithful people went to the limit in sacrificing their time and their all to make the meeting a success. Rev. Hogue, the director of Religious Education, and Prof. J. F. McCrae, the dean of the school, and their faculty presented a broad and inspiring program that had a large educational value in lifting the standard of training among the youth of our day. The boys and girls were taught to adopt modern methods and ideals in their youth work. We believe that such training will develop them into a more efficient type of leadership. Many boys and girls between the ages of fourteen and twenty-three came to share in the inspiration and instruction of the institute. They adopted the motto: "Jesus' way, our way." Our youth wants to a side partner with Jesus Christ and help Him make a new world after the pattern of the Sermon on the Mount. They are willing to invest their energies to help make their communities as nearly like the Kingdom of God as may be humanly possible, and secure the adoption of Jesus' way in all social and community relations. Church, give them a chance.

WORK AMONG THE WOMEN

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is organized in most all of the churches. This organization is rendering an invaluable service to the pastors and churches. Mrs. Bessie McNair is the district president. Every fifth Sunday in the year they have a district-wide meeting. In this meeting reports are made of their work and plans discussed as how to do a better and more efficient work. Blessings upon these good and faithful women. They are indispensable and should be given every encouragement. They far surpass our men in spiritual, systematic and faithful service.

MEN'S WORK

The Methodist Men's organization of the Laurinburg District has taken on new life this year under the leadership of Prof. E. F. Rayford, the district lay leader. Organizations that had lost interest have been revived, and charters have been presented to several groups. The men are helping in a very large way to carry forward the program of the church. We appreciate the value of such organizations.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

As always our Sunday Schools still furnish us with the major evange-listic opportunity of the church. There is an amazing awakening among the Sunday School officers and teachers as to where the children are on Sunday mornings. They are going out among the highways and hedges, trying to bring them in. Week-day religious education and Daily Vacation Bible schools are increasing and giving us a larger hope in the field of religious education. A child has the inherent right to know something of the world in which he lives. If he can feel God's breath blowing across the years, if he can catch the sunshine of God's favor, he will be helped greatly to weave into the web of life some of the better and brighter things of life. We must follow them up.

The Sunday School reports of the Laurinburg District in several of the churches show an increase in enrollment and attendance.

OUR SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

Our educational institutions have had successful periods. Bennett Colpate has just erected and dedicated a magnificent Student Union Building at a cost of a half-million dollars. President Jones has launched a campaign for \$260,000 to clear the indebtedness of this beautiful building. Bennett College rightly deserves the strongest moral and financial support and aid of the ministers and laity of our churches. The moral and spiritual interests of our young girls at Bennett are being given sympathetic and careful supervision by those in charge of, the school. Allen Home is still carrying on in a very fine way. We believe that schools like Allen Home are absolutely necessary and vital to the work of our conference, and the conference should never fail in providing for the needs of the school. Gammon Theological Seminary is still making a definite contribution in preparing and sending forth young men into the ministry. We should always support and appreciate the ministry of this good school in every way possible.

SUMMARY

I am sure now that it is permissable for me to say a few words about the work and faithfulness of the ministers and laymen who serve Christ and the church on the Laurinburg District.

Beaver Dam and Fairmont—Eugene Campbell, pastor.

Brother Campbell has made many sacrifices in carrying on the work here. The small debt on our church at Fairmont has been well cared for.

Bolton, Pembroke, and Mt. Zion-B. F. Gleaves, pastor.

The distance between these churches makes it somewhat difficult to pastor them. However, I think that with a little adjustment, much improvement can be made on this charge.

Bomore and Piney Grove-E. M. McLecd, pastor.

This charge has had a great year in soul-saving. Fifty-nine have been added to the church. Brother McLeod is well thought of by his people and is doing a splendid work.

Charlotte-Boulware Chapel-W. R. Walls, pastor.

This mission charge has had a fine year under the leadership of Brother Walls, a student at Johnson C. Smith University. Some improvement has been made on the church, and the membership increased.

Simpson Memorial-Ramsey Bridges, pastor.

Rev. Bridges has wrought well at Simpson Memorial. The church is well organized and each organization functioning. Much effort has been put forth by the pastor to find a better location for our church there. Some money has been raised, but a definite place has not yet been found.

Fayetteville-Wesley Chapel-E. N. Mattison, pastor.

This church has worked well under the leadership of its pastor. Rev. E. N. Mattison is bringing a good report to the conference.

Goldsboro—Rev. D. A. Williams, pastor.

A few weeks after conference Brother Williams met with a very sad acident. His leg was broken and he was not able to remain on the charge. The work was cared for by two supply ministers. Rev. Randolph served last, and will report for the charge.

Hamlet-Rev. J. J. Patterson, pastor.

Our church at Hamlet is still on the upward trend. Rev. Patterson and his good people have worked very hard in getting ready for the entertainment of this conference. A heating plant has been installed at the cost of \$2375. Completing the basement and remodeling the parsonage cost \$3,705. A total cost of \$6,080.

Hickory Bend, St. Mark, Millers and New Zion-

Rev. J. W. McCrae, John McEachin, and Bro. Huley Perry had the oversight of these charges. These pastors have done well.

Johns and Beauty Spot-J. F. Sawyer, pastor.

Rev. Sawyer has had another fine year on this charge. He and the faithful people at Beauty Spot are working hard to complete the new church.

Laurinburg and Cool Springs-J. H. McCallum, pastor.

The pastor of this charge has had one of his best years. All claims have been taken care of, salary raised, and the charge has asked for his return.

Lumberton—T. H. Wootten and his good people have enjoyed a fine year working together. At the beginning of the year, new furniture was placed in every room of the parsonage, at a cost of \$856. He is bringing a good report.

Maxton-R. D. Sharpe, pastor.

This charge has had a great year spiritually, and also financially. A

great revival was closed a few weeks ago with 17 conversions. Rev. Sharpe is loved by his people and is doing a fine work.

Philadelphia, Hoffman and St. Peters-J. L. Alford, pastor.

This charge is in fine condition. The old parsonage has been remodeled and a new parsonage started.

Red Springs-R. B. Rhyne, pastor.

Rev. Rhyne has had another fruitful year. Twenty-eight have been added to the church. The members still maintain a high regard for Rev. Rhyne's leadership.

Rowland and Salem-S. B. McBrayer, pastor.

This charge has maintained a high-water mark throughout the year. Nothing has been left undone, as his report will show.

Sanford Circuit-E. A. Rush, pastor,

This is one of the best Circuits in the conference, and Brother Rush has everything well in hand. He will make a round report.

Wilmington—Our future at Wilmington looks somewhat brighter. We are hoping that in the near future, we will have a nice church there.

CONCLUSION

As I conclude may I say that the loveliest quality of character found in the ministers and laymen of the Laurinburg District however, is the fact that they are loyal, devoted, and active in the program of the church. They love their Lord. And again I thank them all for their hearty support. I count it a high privilege to have had the opportunity of working with them another year.

WESTERN DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, District Superintendents, Pastors, Laymen and Laywomen of the North Carolina Conference:

I consider it a high privilege to have this opportunity to make this my first annual report as district superintendent of the Western District.

As I begin this report I wish to make an expression of profound gratitude to Almighty God for a year of achievements and blessings; and of sincere appreciation to our resident bishop for his kindly guidance and cooperation, and to the pastors and laymen for their loyal support given to the church program on the district.

I have not been unmindful of the honor of having been appointed to this office, and I hope I have been very conscious of the responsibilities the honor places upon me. In order to be able to predict and control a social situation, one must know the resources with which he has to deal. So my first major effort was to make a thorough survey of the entire district, as to organization, materials, and human resources. I found very few congregations that were without some type of organization. A large number was organized according to the Methodist Church regulations. In many congregations I found a mixture of all types of denominational programs. The human and material resources were quite adequate and encouraging.

CHURCH SCHOOL

I feel safe in saying that there was a substantial increase in Church School attendance over the entire district. An attempt was made to get all age groups down to study.

THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

In all our churches on the district, the Woman's Society of Christian Service has done a great job in helping to carry forward the program of the local church spiritually, financially, and educationally.

THE MINISTERS' WIVES' ASSOCIATION

The Ministers' Wives' Association met in its regular annual session at the seat of the district conference at Wilkesboro. It was there they revamped their program and went forth to labor harder for this cause.

DISTRICT MEETINGS

All of our district meetings were very well attended. The annual meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held at Granite Falls was a splendid success. The District Conference and Leadership Training School held at Wilkesboro was exceptionally good in reports and attendance.

CONFERENCE MEETINGS

We were blessed with the presence of the North Carolina Conference on May 10th at Shelby in its after-Easter roll call. We were also inspired by the soul-stirring message from our resident bishop, Dr. A. P. Shaw. During the month of June the North Carolina Conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held its annual session at Marion. Everyone was inspired with the two-day program.

YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS

With Mrs. J. D. Morrison as their director much fine work has been done among the young people of the Western District. The Leadership Training Enterprise which was held at Wilkesboro August 23-25 was one of the finest I have ever witnessed. Mrs. D. A. Spencer served as dean of the school. A large number of young people from all over the district attended this school.

METHODIST MEN'S ORGANIZATION

Mr. Alvin Morrison, our district lay leader, has done a fine job among the Methodist Men of the Western District. Too much praise cannot be given both the work and the worker.

SUMMARY

Asheville, Berry Temple—L. A. Brown, pastor. He still has a firm hold on the people. They have on hand \$16,000 in cash, 40,000 new brick and cement blocks. They are hoping to build next year. They have also beautified the parsonage at a cost of \$2,000.

Brown and Motz—B. E. Staten, pastor. Rev. Staten returned to the charge a sick man and was unable to do much work. He passed the latter part of June. Rev. T. D. McCorkle was assigned to the work and did an unusual job on claims and accessions.

Cherryville Charge—C. O. Hill, pastor. This charge has done well when we consider their money crop—cotton, was almost a total loss.

Forest City.—W. O. Thomas, pastor. Rev. Thomas came to the charge sick and unable to do any work at all. He passed during the month of April. Rev. N. J. Pass carried the work on until his health failed. Then Rev. B. J. Dula was assigned to the work. He has finished the year with round reports in all benevolences.

Franklin—E. M. Felder, pastor. Here is a pastor who worked hard to advance this charge spiritually and financially.

Gastonia—O. M. Graham, pastor. Great improvement both in spirit and finance has been noted. They have completed the auditorium, installed a new heating plant, and are completing the Educational Department of the church.

Hickory—O. W. Burwick, pastor. This charge is round in every phase of its work. The organization is near perfection. The church voted a \$340.00 increase in pastor's salary.

Kings Mountain—D. A. Harkness, pastor. This charge is doing fine under existing circumstances. The boll weavil has destroyed their cotton, yet they are expected to have a round report.

Lenoir Circuit—H. H. Houston, pastor. This charge has made wonderfly progress under the present administration. The pastor and his people are loval to the district and conference program.

Lenoir—S. L. Townsend, pastor. This charge has done a good work this year. They had one of the greatest revivals in its history. They had sixty-four conversions and accessions. This charge has also increased its pastor's salary \$5340.00.

Lowesville Charge—A. W. Stowe, pastor. He has gone forward with his work and has done a good job for the church. Brother Stowe is an ideal rural pastor.

Lincolnton Charge—J. W. Gamble, pastor. The charge has done fairly well. The church at Lincolnton is about half-way completed. It will be a beautiful cement block structure when finished.

Marien—W. R. Royster, pastor. This charge has done considerable improvement. A new heating plant has been installed and paid for; also new pews and choir chairs have been purchased.

Mooresville Circuit—G. W. Patterson, pastor. Here is another good year's work done. Old debts were liquidated. The summer revivals served to stimulate spiritual growth. The pastor comes to the annual conference with round reports.

Newton—B. L. Burge, pastor. He has a fine grip on the people of both races. This charge has done one of the finest jobs on the district. The pastor will come to the conference with round reports.

Philadelphia—N. J. Pass, pastor. He has labored hard to advance his work, and he has accomplished splendid results under existing conditions. He will have a good report.

Shelby—C. E. Strickland, pastor. Here is another good year's work accomplished. Durham Chapel Church has been completed and financial obligations have been met to date. They have also increased their pastor's salary \$400.00.

Statesville—J. W. Ferree, pastor. This charge has had a fine year both

spiritually and financially. They paid all claims for district and conference at the Easter Roll Call. The pastor is well thought of among his people.

Union Mills—T. D. McCorkle, pastor. This charge has had one of its best years. The pastor will have a round report. Both spiritual and financial improvement have been made.

West Asheville—D. A. Hill, pastor. This charge has had a good year. The pastor and his people are rallying their forces to build a new parsonage.

Wilkesboro—C. W. Bailey, pastor. Rev. Bailey has proved himself to be a workman who need not be ashamed. They installed a new rest room in the church; also a new heating plant, painted the interior of the auditorium, graded and beautified the lawn at Saints Home Church. At Beaver Creek a new road has been graded. At Reed Chapel, the roof has been repaired. The total cost of all work done was \$2,000.00. This charge has also increased its pastor's salary \$300.00.

VOLUNTARY STAFF

I would not close this report without expressing appreciation to the persons who served and composed our voluntary staff of district workers. All of these persons have been faithful in doing all they could in promoting the work of the district. Rev. L. A. Brown, director of music; Miss Deliah Hogue, director of recreation; Mrs. J. D. Morrison, director of youth; Mrs. M. N. Morrison, director of adult work, also district WSCS president; Rev. B. L. Burge, keeper of finance; Rev. O. M. Graham, instructor in "Christian Community;" Mrs. D. A. Spencer, dean of the district school, and Rev. G. E. Hogue, conference executive secretary of Board of Education.

Let me say in closing that I have been inspired by my work this year. The cooperation from Bishop Shaw, the district superintendents, pastors, laymen and all has been surprisingly good. I ask your prayers for me that I may give my best to Christ in this challenging field of service.

In the providence of God we have been permitted to labor together on the Winston District in the building of the church and the bringing in of the Kingdom of God. We are grateful to a kind heavenly Father for guidance during the year. For the past four years I have said in my report that no more loyal company of pastors could be found than those of the Winston District. It is with satisfaction that I again begin this report with this statement. Again I want to express my appreciation and thanks to those ministers, their wives, and the people who make up the membership of the district. They have labored with great success and the finest cooperation during the year.

SICKNESS AND DEATH

During the year we have suffered the loss by death of one retired minister's wife, Mrs. B. F. Thomas. Early in the year Rev. W. P. Cole was sent to a veterans hospital in Texas where he underwent an operation, but soon recovered, and is now enjoying good health. Mrs. E. Frost has been ill a number of times during the year, and is at present confined to her home.

THE ADVANCE FOR CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH

Ninety per cent of the churches on the Winston District have made contributions to Advance specials. Most of the pastors have worked hard to advance the membership of their churches. Some have had great success. The Church school superintendents, with their boards of Christian Education, have been most effective in increasing the attendance and advancing the membership of the church schools. The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Methodist Men's group have made advances in that new groups are organized and making splendid contributions both spiritually and financially to the total program of the church.

EVANGELISM

We of the Winston District have come to realize more than ever that the program of Evangelism is an action program. Some of our pastors have been most active in using the method of personal evangelism. Some have used the visitation method, and others have had splendid seasons of revivals by these means, and others; pastors, laymen and women have been faithful in winning men, women, and children for the Kingdom of God.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There's been a great stirring of Christian educational interest throughout the district. Increases in church school and Sunday worship services are being reported from every direction. These and other activities will come to us through the report of the executive secretary of Christian Education, Rev. G. E. Hogue. I cannot fail to mention, however, that many of our pastors have assumed a very large place in planning and carrying out week-day schools with the cooperation of their Boards of Christian Education.

STEWARDSHIP

Facing the needs of our world with ever-increasing demands upon our time and gifts, and in view of the fact that stewardship has been made one of the chief points of emphasis in our Methodist program, we have been asking in all of our quarterly conferences that a large place be given in all our churches and church schools for the faithful teaching of stewardship, including tithing. For the most part pastors and church school superintendents have been most cooperative.

METHODIST MEN'S ORGANIZATION

For the past five years I have been urging that the manpower of the district assert its real leadership. It is with deep satisfaction that I report the men of the Winston District are doing a fine job. In some of the churches the men, like the women, have taken special projects and carried them through to a successful finish.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

In the most of our thirty-seven churches the Woman's Society of Christion Service is well organized, and the women can always be counted on to do a good job in the total program of the church.

MINISTERS' WIVES' ASSOCIATION

The ministers' wives have been faithful in helping their husbands advance for Christ and His church. Too much praise cannot be given to the ministers' wives for their effort to raise money for the retired ministers' fund.

DISTRICT AND SUB-DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

The Youth Institute held at St. John Church, Thomasville, under the direction of Dean William R. Crawford, was well planned and largely attended. It furnished much information and inspiration for the youth. The young people were well taken care of by Rev. R. F. McCallum and his loyal members. The district conference, held at St. Stephen's Church in Lexington, executed a program well planned by the district staff, and proved to be one of our very best. Members of the district and visiting friends from other districts were nicely entertained by Pastor C. L. Gidney and the fine members of St. Stephen's Church. In September, a very fine coaching conference was held at Saints Home Church under the direction of Rev. G. E. Hogue, conference executive secretary of Christian Education. Rev. W. C. L. Scarborough served as dean. This conference helpd to better prepare workers for the churches and church schools. We have not had as many sub-district meetings this year as before, however, those that were held were profitable and inspiring.

THE CHARGES

Advance and New Oak Grove—P. G. Carter, pastor. Elkin and Jonesville—J. Q. Dula, pastor. Asheboro—Glenn A. Brooks, pastor. Brooks Memorial—L. M. Mayfield, pastor.

All of these pastors have worked hard. The benevolent causes have been cared for; new members have been added to their churches. This is Rev. Brooks' first year on the Winston district, and he has done a fine job. The old parsonage has been repaired and members of St. Luke have been hard at work, raising funds to build a new parsonage. Rev. Mayfield and the members of Brooks Memorial have built a new church; the cornerstone will be laid on the second Sunday in November. This church is one of the best and most modern buildings in the North Carolina Conference.

St. Mark—R. B. McRae, pastor. East Thomasville Circuit—J. W. Jones, pastor. Lexington—C. L. Gidney, pastor.

These pastors have been active. For the most part the benevolences have been raised, and new members have been added to the churches. Rev. Jones and the members of Hoover Chapel have been raising funds to build a new church. They now have in hand for this purpose \$5,097.

Madison and Stoneville—B. W. Stewart, pastor. Mt. Airy, Jones Temple, and Pilot Mountain—I. A. Friend, pastor. Rural Hall and Red Bank—W. P. Cole, pastor. Oak Grove—T. C. Frazier, pastor. Penhook and Boones Mill—Otto Withers, pastor.

These churches are alive, spiritually. The pastors have done a good job. Under the leadership of Rev. Stewart a new church has been built at Hayes Chapel, and the people are now worshipping in it. Rev. Stewart and the people of Oak Grove Church at Stoneville are building a beautiful new brick church which they plan to have finished soon. Pastor Stewart is in good standing with his people. Rev. Friend has worked faithfully and smoothly in clearing off local indebtedness on the newly-built Jones Temple. Rural Hall has added two rooms to the church for church school purposes, and rest rooms for men and women. Boones Mill church has been remodeled and a room added to the church for pastor's study.

St. John and Midway—R. F. McCallum, pastor. Trinity Circuit—E. Frost, pastor. Walkertown—W. M. Burton, pastor.

Rev. McCallum and the good people of St. John have installed an electric organ. This makes the service more conducive to worship. Rev. Frost has had a good year. All claims have been paid and new members have been added to the church.

Mt. Pleasant—William R. Crawford, pastor. St. Andrews—M. S. Laughlin, pastor. Saints Home—H. W. Phillips, pastor. St. Paul—W. C. L. Scarborough, pastor.

All of these pastors have had a good year. Rev. Crawford and the people of Mt. Pleasant have been busy raising funds to build an annex to the church in order that they might have a more adequate program of Christian Education. Rev. Phillips is still carrying on in an effective manner though laboring under a heavy debt of the newly-built Saints Home Church. All claims have been paid and new members have been added to the church and church school. Rev. Scarborough has done a splendid job this year. The people are in fine spirit; the benevolent causes have been paid in full, and new members have been added to St. Paul church and church school. The fourth quarterly conference requests the return of Rev. Scarborough.

Bishop Shaw, we of the Winston District and the North Carolina Conference, are proud of your leadership. We congratulate you, sir, on being the first of our group to be invited to preside full-time over an all-white conference. You have reflected great credit on the North Carolina Conference, the Baltimore Area, and the Central Jurisdiction.

In the words of James Russell Lowell:

"Once to every man and nation comes the moment to decide, In the strife of truth with falsehood, for the good or evil side; Some great cause, God's new Messiah offering each the bloom or blight, And the choice goes by forever 'twix that darkness and that light.

Then to side with truth is noble when we share her wretched crust, Ere her cause bring fame and profit, and 'tis prosperous to be just; Then it is the brave man chooses while the coward stands aside, Till the multitudes make virtue of the faith they had denied.

By the light of burning martyrs, Christ, Thy bleeding feet we track, Toiling up new Calvaries ever with the cross that turns not back; New occasions teach new duties, time makes ancient good uncount; They must upward still and onward who would keep abreast with truth.

Though the cause of evil prosper, yet 'tis truth alone is strong: Though her portion be the scaffold, and upon the throne the wrong; Yet that scaffold sways the future, and behind the dim unknown, Standeth God within the shadow, keeping watch above His own."

Routh for the sum of One Hundred and Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars, cash, and to execute and deliver to said purchaser a good and sufficient deed, with full warranties, upon receipt of the said purchase price.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

November 2, 1950.

Bishop Shaw, members of the Conference, Ladies and Gentlemen:

For having been granted the privilege and honor of making my report as Conference Lay Leader, I consider myself honored and favored. I am devoutly humble and deeply indebted to you for the trust you impose in me and the honor you bestow upon me by elevating me to this noble and exalted position. It has been a task far more deserving of more valiant strength and power than my own feeble efforts.

To me there is no greater assignment. The biggest task before the church today is the development of Christian laymen. The one great need of our church today is the harnessing and use of this great latent and loose in the church. Once we can tap these fruitful resources our "Advance" will be easier.

To this one task alone we dedicate and rededicate ourselves and our services. The task has not been burdensome nor irksome. It has been one of pleasure and satisfaction in seeing the gradual unfoldment of great laymen powers.

This report is no attempt to evaluate the work of lay activities in the Conference. Nor is there any effort to explore the possibilities of the program. We merely point out tendencies and trends that might guide us in our future plans of development.

WORLD CONFUSION: The world is upset — it's in a woeful distress and dismay. A few years ago we fought a bloody and devastating war to end all wars. Soon our hopes of world peace continuing were blasted and we were again engaged in a more deadly conflict, and still the war clouds hover over the world and men speak of peace with abated breath. We live in a state of wonderment and fear. We are reaping the harvest of our years of futility and short-sightedness.

THE NEW DAY: But thank God a new day is dawning. "God is in His heaven and all is right with the world." Men are determined that strife and hatred shall cease among the nations of the world and are willing to work to that end. They have been assigned the highest task in the world. They have accepted it and now go out to conquer.

OUR NEEDS: The task calls for God-guided personalities to secure the charter for the new world in this new age. The late President Franklin D. Roosevelt said in a radio message on one occasion: "No greater thing could come to our land today than the revival of the spirit of religion—a revival that will sweep through the homes of the nations and stir the hearts of men and women of all faiths to rededicate themselves to their belief in God."

AWAKENING SUPPLEMENT: Behind the world struggle surely the coming events cast their shadows and the better order is dimly seen. The task of organized religion is to keep the vision from being obscured by the dust and sweat of conflict. The instruments of destruction must be turned into instruments of constructive development.

SENSE OF DEVOTION: Behind the reports of the ministers made in this conference is the heart, sweat and toil of the laymen. Ministers are the generals and the guiding spirit, but the laymen are carrying out the orders. These reports, good or bad, are the laymen's. If good, they have a sense of pride and honor; if bad, they are ashame.

God of our fathers known of old Lord of our far-flung battle line, Beneath whose awful hand we hold Dominion over palm and pine. Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet, Lest we forget, lest we forget!

The tumult and the shouting dies, The Captain and the Kings depart, Still stands thine ancient sacrifice An humble and a contrite heart. Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet, Lest we forget, lest we forget!

Petrea, representing the General Conference Committee on Theological Education, desires to go on record as expressing its very great interest in the campaign to make the whole Methodist Church more aware of the importance of training more and better ministers. The North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction pledges its wholehearted and prayerful cooperation in this effort.

To the futherance of this end, we urge that pastors and district superintendents not only seek out recruits for the ministry, but when young men and young women have expressed a desire for advanced theological education, seek to provide adequate scholarships for them.

THE FIRST ANNUAL REPORT TO THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND BOARD OF EDUCATION

Hamlet, North Carolina, November 4, 1950.

Bishop Shaw, District Superintendents, Lay Leaders, Delegates of the 92nd session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, and the Board of Education:

I take great pride in bringing to you my first annual report for the work attempted to do in the program of Christian Education. I do appreciate this appointment in the work of the Conference Board of Education, in carrying out the policies in the program of Christian Education, as it involves increasingly effective commitments to the person of Christ and the values expressed in the life and teachings of Jesus, so all will work together for the greatest benefit of all.

I am grateful again to the Board of Education for sending me to Grand Rapids, Mich., to attend one of our great schools in an intensive study of "Christian Education in the Local Church." On my return, taking up where my predecessor left off, I set myself to the task of contacting and writing the pastors, placing before them the purpose, or some of it, as the local church's task in building a greater church school.

VISITATION IN THE LOCAL CHURCH

I have visited this year thirty-five local churches, setting up, wherever possible, young adult classes, and the youth where there were needs on the total organization in schools, in keeping with the disciplinary plan. I have gone as far on the Western District as Franklin, Laurinburg, to Fayetteville, Greensboro, to Oxford and Winston, to Mt. Airy. On the Greensboro district the superintendent and pastors planned with me the setting up of a two-nights' training conference; then I visited other churches, preaching, meeting with youth organizations and lending my help wherever needed. In Laurinburg, I had the privilege of preaching, having conferences with youth groups, Sunday School officers and teachers, giving whatever guidance possible. I was given the same on the Winston and Western districts. There also I had the privilege to speak from the pulpit, conferring with groups of various ages, rendering the same services as on the other two districts. I distributed from place to place such materials as would help persons to understand, accept and share the Christian gospel.

WORKERS' TRAINING CONFERENCES

We held on three districts the Workers' Training Conferences, namely, Greensboro, Laurinburg, and Winston. These meetings were well attended and many places crowded, as Maxton, on the Laurinburg District, Mt. Airy, on the Winston district, and Mt. Carmel on the Greensboro District. In all these conferences we had classes, group discussions, and forums, dealing with practical problems facing the church school officers and teachers, with an increase enrollment and attendance, creating interest in program-planning, the wider use of program facilities for training of teachers and workers.

INSTITUTES AND DISTRICT CONFERENCES

I was granted the invitation to attend three district conferences where I displayed many leaflets and booklets on Christian Education in the Local Church, and also spoke on the same subject, as it related to the local church work. I too made visits to the zone meetings of the WSCS, and again made a display of materials.

WSCS SCHOOL OF MISSION AND YOUTH EPWORTH INSTITUTE OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

President David D. Jones extended a cordial invitation to the WSCS and MYF of the conference to hold a joint institute for furthering the training of adults and youth, on Bennett College's campus. He, having to be away, writes his regrets but leaves Mrs. Lillian Jones, Dr. Willa B. Player, and Mr. J. Scarlette in charge, who did everything in their power to make it not only comfortable, but profitable for all who participated in both schools. We feel very grateful to President Jones and his staff for this grand privilege he gave us for our combined school.

PLANNING THE CHRISTIAN EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM IN THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

On September 9, Dr. M. Earl Cunningham, of the Board of Education, met the conference staff in Lexington, to plan the program on Christian education in our annual conference. After some discussion and reports from the staff members, we planned the following:

Needs of the Local Churches' Sub-Districts and Districts—In the light of the discussions, the following needs were (a) informing and training; (1) Sunday school superintendents in the administration of his office;

(2) finding and training teachers of classes in the church school; (3) secretires in the enrollment of different age groups and classes, keeping accurate for church school permanent record. Recruiting workers. (b) Acquainting pastors and laymen with the entire curriculum of all our Methodist literature.

THE PROPOSED PLAN TO REACH NEEDS

To invite Dr. Cunningham to hold a one-day institute or training conference on each district for pastors and church school officers. To hold a coaching conference for the good of all in the annual conference, for old and new workers. And the same training in the coaching conference be used in the sub-districts, districts, as well as in the church schools. And that all workers, superintendents and conference staff do the finding these new persons for this training.

On October 14 the youth officers or council, with the conference and district directors of youth work, were called to Lexington to plan a one-day conference, to be held on Saturday during the annual conference at Hamlet, and Dr. Cunningham to be invited to address the youth on Saturday, November 4, 1950, at 2:00 p. m. There were planned workshops and business meetings during the one-day conference.

A Plea for a Higher Recognition of our Youth in the Conference: This plea is to all the conference, that we encourage our youth as never before, by supporting their CARAVAN this summer. And if our Conference Board is not able, that individuals give donations for this purpose. (One youth from each of the districts). I am glad to report that last summer we organized the youth in an annual conference and also the young adults.

On October 28 and 29 I had the esteemed honor of being one of the workshops consultants (No. 1, "The Contribution of Religion to Mental Health.") There were eight workshops. To my mind, these workshops, dealing with pertinent problems in physical and mental social responsibility, personal security, gave much indispensiable guidance and profitable information to so many of our grave problems in daily life.

CERTIFIED DEANS

Miss L. R. Jones, Western District, of WSCS; Mrs. Mary N. Morrison, L. A. Brown, Mrs. D. A. Spencer (Western) J. F. McRae (Laurinburg) W. T. Brown, R. D. Crockett, (Greensboro). We have seven deans certified in our conference.

But when we think of the great needs of our Conference Board of Education responsibility in (approximately) 152 church schools, having 6,837 members, 166 preaching places, 13,909 church membership, these few certified volunteers (non-salaried) workers are by far too few to come near the task of the Board of Education, when in 1949 38,000 young children lost from the nursery rolls, however, some of these went into the kindergarten, but our increase in population shows that we should have gained rather than lost. The report from all annual conferences show that the net gain a little over 2 per cent which still shows a bigger loss according to the increase in our U. S. population.

I recommend for the general director of Church School work, Mrs. Florence T. Reynolds; Rev. Marshall McCallum, Conference Director of Student Work; Miss I. R. Jones, Mrs. T. Y. Brincefield, Miss Emma Ruth McLean and Rev. J. M. Jones for non-salaried workers.

There will be a Training Conference in Nashville, Tenn., at Scarritt College January 8-14, 1951, for the conference directors of youth work and their associates. A letter from the Youth Department of the General Board of Education, requesting that the Conference MYF Council while in their session at Hamlet, to nominate one of their top persons for a delegate and an alternate to be considered by the National Committee to go to the Ecumenical Conference to be held in London, England, August 28-September 7, 1951.

The National Convocation of Methodist Youth will be held August 27-31, 1951, at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana. The cost of the convocation includes \$5.00 registration fee, plus 50c insurance, (this is to be paid in advance), \$17.00 for room and board (4 nights and 12 meals), plus your transportation.

In our Conference MYF two names were given from each district (I would appreciate the guidance from each superintendent in this matter of choice). Or, if each superintendent would call his district council together and let them nominate the two who are to go to the convocation.

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP FOR CHRISTIAN YOUTH

1951 Parshed Youth Week Awards: A College Education Made Possible through National Awards. To the top-ranking boy and girl may be awarded \$400 per year for four years. Regional Award: To the winner in

each of the seven regional contests or regions of the U. S. may be awarded \$250.00 per year for four years (this will be paid to the college).

Additional Awards: The United Christian Youth Movement offers additional awards in each of the seven regions. One full scholarship. Three half-scholarships to the regional conference of the movement.

Five \$100-scholarships will be awarded to the five highest Parshed entries who do not receive the national or regional awards.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That there be on each district Prayer Cells (in all the local churches) to not only bring the deepening of spiritual life to the youth, but the adult (groups of five, not more than twelve, meeting on college campuses, churches, homes) that all may be enriched.

That each district superintendent urge the local churches to have the disciplinary Rally Day Offering so we may have additional funds for travel (staff meetings and other needed expenditures.) And that each district superintendent be invited to all our Conference Board of Education meetings.

That our Conference Board help in every way in supporting our Youth Assembly at Bennett College another year. And the district superintendent who has the largest group of young people at the Assembly be awarded the best Panama Hat, same to be presented at the close of the Assembly.

And that the superintendent, adult workers (conference, districts and sub-districts) with youth encourage high school (senior in high school or freshman in college) and first year college to try for the Parshed Youth Week Awards. (Send to our office for further information.)

And we further recommend that each conference, district and sub-district worker become certified for the work he is to direct through the Board of Education. And that our Conference Board of Education appoint Mrs. Florence T. Reynolds, Mrs. T. Y. Brincefield, and Miss I. R. Jones as special, non-salaried workers to be used anywhere in the conference.

And I also request that all conference directors and workers be placed in our next issue of the Official Journal.

THE FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE, 1951

The Methodist Church is planning to send a Fellowship of fifty young men and women to Africa for a three-year period of service. An additional group of 25 will be sent to India. There will be a six-week period of intensive training in July and August. A salary of \$1,200 with housing, medical care and travel to and from the field.

There is another call for teachers, religious educators, nurses, agriculturists, workers with youth, technicians, builders, and those qualified for music, manual labor, arts, commercial skills, children's workers, sports, and recreation. These will serve Algeria, Tunisia, Liberia, Southern Rhodesia, and Belgium.

I am soliciting your support for the program of Christian Education sponsored so faithfully by our Conference Board of Education, supervised and encouraged in every way possible by our General Board of Education, whose purpose is to present a program in such a way that it would evolve increasingly effective commitment to the person of Christ and the values expressed in the life and teachings of Jesus as a center around which are developed habits of thinking, feeling, and acting, and that it will bring our lives in accordance with the life of Christ, lifting the levels of life of a person in his actions among his fellowmen as he follows Christ.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE (PROGRAM)

(At seat of the North Carolina Annual Conference)

Mrs. A. P. McLeod, Vice-President, Presiding Theme: "Health in a Rural Community"

Saturday, November 4, 1950.

The program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was opened with worship service, conducted by Mrs. G. E. Hogne, after which Mrs. A. P. McLeod spoke of the rapid progress in rural community life. She emphasized the fact that electricity has become the dependable servant of all within its reach. It furnishes power for plumbing, stove, refrigerator, deep freeze, heating, and many other labor-saving devices. "Nevertheless," said Mrs. McLeod, "the health problem is still a big one. Statistics show that only 3.4% of the people in the rural areas are being served by public or private health agencies."

The main purposes of the program were pointed out as follows:

- (1) To present health needs in the rural community.
- (2) To show how the rural worker as a representative of the church cooperates with other agencies in meeting these needs.
- (3) To emphasize to Methodist women their responsibility for helping to improve national health conditions.
- (4) The fourth purpose is to promote the recognition of good health as the responsibility of a Christian, because good health is essential to an abundant life.

An interview which brought out rural community needs and how they may be coped with by Christian women was presented by Mrs. L. Thompson and Mrs. Mary Morrison.

Music was rendered by Mrs. Evangeline Jones. Edith Mayfield recited a poem, "We Would Be Building," following which remarks were made concerning Religious Education among our youth and children. She spoke of the importance of our continued persistence in these areas.
