## VII

## Conference Rules of Order

## THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 a.m. and open with devotional exercises, and close at 12:30 p.m.
2. The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.
3. The nominating committee consisting of nine persons shall be appointed by the bishop quadrennially.
4. No person shall be a member, concurrently, of more than two standing committees or commissions (except as provided for by the Discipline).
5. The Conference fiscal year shall end 20 days before the first day of the Annual Conference.
6. The pastors' reports shall be in the hands of the treasurer and statistician 15 days before the opening day of the Annual Conference.
7. The reports of all major commissions and committees shall be mimeographed and passed out at the seat of the Conference on or before the day the report is read.
8. The roll of Conference lay members shall be called at the opening day of the Conference.
9. The Treasurer's report shall be mimeographed and passed out at the meeting of the Conference.
10. The minutes of the Annual Conference shall be printed and distributed within 90 days after the adjournment of the Conference.
11. All recommendations and memorials shall be presented to the Conference in duplicate form.
12. All motions from the floor shall be in writing when requested by the secretary of the Conference.
13. The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the Host Pastor, the Host Superintendent, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Conference Secretary, and two persons named by the Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Bishop.
14. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.
15. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.
16. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.
17. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be taken without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debates and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.
18. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.
19. No member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.
20. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here; (a) to adjourn

to a given time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely.

21. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.

22. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of one-third of the members present.

23. These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Conference.

24. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference at least one day before action is taken.

## Constitution

BOARD OF MANAGERS—BALTIMORE AREA PASTORS' SCHOOL  
THE METHODIST CHURCH

Herewith is transmitted the Constitution of the Board of Managers Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church, and adopted by the Board of Managers in session at Baltimore, Maryland, Sept. 11, 1957.

## ARTICLE I. NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. **Name**—The name of this Board shall be the Board of Managers of the Baltimore Area Pastors' School—The Methodist Church.

Section 2. **Purpose**—The purpose shall be to provide counsel, make plans, elect a dean and other officers, staff members and teachers (nominated by the dean), set up a budget, approve recommendations and reports, set the time and place of the Pastors' School and transact any other business pertaining to the school.

## ARTICLE II. BOARD MEMBERSHIP

The Membership of the Board shall consist of: The Resident Bishop and three members from each of the Annual Conferences of the Area. Two of the three conference representatives shall be nominated by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and elected by the Conference, the third representative shall be the Executive Secretary of Christian Education. They shall be elected at the first session of the quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium. They shall take office at the first meeting of the Board, called by the Resident Bishop, after each of the Annual Conferences shall have met.

## ARTICLE III. OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. **Officers**—The officers shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary and a Treasurer. Each conference shall be represented in, at least, one office. They shall be elected quadrennially from the membership of the Board at the first annual meeting of the new quadrennium, by a majority of the members of the Board, after being nominated by the Nominating Committee or from the floor.

Section 2. **President**—The President shall preside at meetings of the Board, countersign all checks drawn on the treasury, represent the Board when necessary and perform other duties normally performed by a president.

Section 3. **Vice-President**—The Vice-President shall preside and act in the absence of the President and assist the President when needed.

Section 4. **Secretary**—The Secretary shall record the minutes, send out notices of all meetings and keep the president and members informed of any matters germane to the Board of Pastors' School.

Section 5. **Assistant Secretary**—The Assistant Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary in his absence and shall assist the Secretary when necessary.

Section 6. **Treasurer**—The Treasurer shall have charge of all monies of the Board, deposit the same in an account known as "The Baltimore Pastors' School", and shall write and sign all checks. He shall disburse funds only upon written order signed by the Secretary with the exception of bills pertaining to the expense of the school session. In such case the dean shall sign the order and report the same to the Secretary.

#### ARTICLE IV. MEETINGS

Section 1. **Time**—The Board shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in October. The place and hour to be determined by the President in consultation with the Resident Bishop. This date may be altered by the Executive Committee provided it shall be held in the Fall of the Year. Special meetings may be called by the President or by a majority of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. **Quorum**—Seven members shall constitute a quorum for transacting business not otherwise specified, provided at least one member from three conferences of the Baltimore Area is present.

#### ARTICLE V. COMMITTEES

Section 1. **Committees**—There shall be the following committees representative of each of the Annual Conferences and consisting of not less than four persons: Executive Committee, Nominating Committee, and Recommendations Committee.

Meetings of committees shall be regulated by the Board of Managers, and time and place of meetings shall be subject to the call of the chairman.

Section 2. **Executive**—The Executive Committee shall be composed of the elected officers and the Resident Bishop. The President and Secretary of the Board shall be the chairman and secretary of this committee. It shall act for the Board between meetings in matters that are necessary to be acted upon before the next Board meeting and report its action to the next Board meeting. It shall constitute the Finance Committee and recommend a budget to the Board after consultation with the dean. It shall have the financial records audited by a certified public accountant.

Section 3. **Nominating**—The Nominating Committee shall nominate the officers of the Board of Managers, the business manager, the dean and other administrative officers provided that others may be nominated from the floor. It shall be composed of one person from each Conference elected by the Board and shall elect its own chairman.

Section 4. **Recommendations**—The Recommendations Committee shall examine all reports, receive recommendations from members of the Board, officers of the school, the Department of Ministerial Education and other sources; counsel with the dean and others; and shall make any recommendations, as a result of the above procedure or otherwise, to the Board of Directors. The vice-president shall be chairman of this committee.

#### ARTICLE VI. PASTORS' SCHOOL

Section 1. **Sessions**—The time and place of the school sessions shall be set by the Board of Managers.

Section 2. **Courses**—Courses of the school shall be elected by the dean according to the procedure of the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 3. **Dean**—The dean shall be elected at the first meeting of the new quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium, or until his successor is elected. He shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the incoming Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the administration of the school in keeping with the rules and recommendations of the Board of

Managers and the Department of Ministerial Education. He shall submit a written report, by mail, of the school to the Recommendations Committee following the school session; and a written report in person at the next Board meeting; at the same time he shall submit nominations for the faculty of the coming school session.

**Section 4. The Faculty**—The faculty shall be nominated by the dean after consultation with the resident bishop and the director of the Department of Ministerial Education.

**Section 5. Business Manager**—The business manager shall be elected quadrennially at the first annual meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the business proceedings of the school in cooperation with the dean.

#### ARTICLE VII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Board meetings in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of the Board.

#### ARTICLE VIII. METHOD OF AMENDING

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner:

A proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to the secretary, at least sixty days before the annual meeting of the Board of Managers. The secretary shall send the same through mail to all of the members of the Board. The proposed amendment shall be submitted by the secretary to the Board in session and shall require a three-fourths vote of the members present and voting, for adoption.

Any part of this Constitution in conflict with the Discipline of the Methodist Church or the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education shall be amended after the Board of Managers reviews the same.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE  
COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Beginning June 8, 1964 and ending near May 15, 1965

Bishop Love, your Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church wishes to present its report for the coming Conference Year. The Commission has considered prayerfully all requests. Considering the increased askings placed upon us by the action of the General Conference and our own local Conferences:

- I. The Commission recommends for your action and determination here and now, the following budgets for the Conference year, beginning June 8, 1964 and ending near May 15, 1965, \$38,079.65.
  - A. In addition to the \$38,079.65 the Commission also recommends the amount of \$1.30 (one dollar and thirty cents) per church member for Higher Education and the Wesley Foundation.
  - B. That a Reserve Fund be established by setting aside 5% of all gross income of the conference. In addition to the 5% of all gross income of the Conference, the Conference also recommends that \$1,000 be apportioned to the several charges of the Conference annually, for this fund, until a total amount of \$5,000 has been established.
  - C. For World Service General Administration and annual Conference Benevolence .....\$38,079.65
    1. To be administered in the following apportionments:

- II. That the Cabinet make the apportionments for the individual charges on the basis of the ratio that other apportionments are made.

- A. Treasurer's expenses shall be \$1,000 (one thousand dollars).
- B. That the Conference Secretary shall receive an amount of \$400.00 (four hundred dollars).
- C. That the Statistician shall receive \$150.00 (one hundred fifty dollars).
- D. That the District Superintendents each receive a salary of \$5,000 (five thousand dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$700, and district parsonage rent at \$600.00 (six hundred dollars) making a total of \$6,300.00 (six thousand three hundred dollars) to be prorated to each charge.
- E. That the Episcopal Fund shall be an amount equal to 2% (two percent) of the pastor's cash salary.
- F. That the Conference claimants shall be an amount equal to 15% (fifteen percent) of the pastor's cash salary.
- G. Special Church Extension—That an amount of fifteen thousand dollars be apportioned to the several charges as special cultivation to be used in new church and parsonage construction and repairs greatly needed on buildings now being used. Special consideration is requested for Norfolk, Va. and Charlotte Mission.
- H. That we find a prepared Executive Secretary by next June to be appointed at the Annual Conference of June 1965. That this Executive Secretary receive a salary of \$4,000 (four thousand dollars) per year, travel expense items at \$600 (six hundred dollars), if single \$300 (three hundred dollars), office supplies \$125 (one hundred twenty-five dollars), part-time office secretary \$300 (three hundred dollars), postage \$35 (thirty-five dollars), expense for Conference Board \$200 (two hundred dollars), and District Staff \$200 (two hundred dollars) and District Staff \$200 (two hundred dollars) each, making a total of \$6,606.00 (six thousand sixty dollars) for the Board of Education.
- I. That the part time Executive Secretary this year shall receive a salary of \$1,000 (one thousand dollars) per year, travel expense \$300 (three hundred dollars) and secretarial service and promotional expense \$200 (two hundred dollars), making a total of \$1,500 (fifteen hundred dollars) to be taken from the amount raised for an Executive Secretary in last year's apportionment.
- J. That the Greensboro and Winston Districts be given 27% of all apportionments and that the Western and Laurinburg Districts be given 23% of all apportionments.
- K. That each charge, of the Conference observe the special days as set fourth by the General Conference.
- L. That the Minister's Wives be requested to continue their efforts in the interest of our Conference Reserve Pension Fund and that a special effort be made each year to report \$5,000 (five thousand dollars) on this fund.
- M. That \$1500.00 be apportioned for the printing of the Conference Journal.

The Conference has seen fit to give us certain responsibilities and authority. We are but fallible men and our judgments are always imperfect. But if we know our hearts, we desire to be good servants of Jesus Christ and his Church. The kindness of our brethren lifts up our hearts and the prayers of our people holds us steady. Thanks be to God for His unspeakable gift.

We have held Christian Workers Schools, training sessions in every phase of work of the church, and district conferences on every district.

If the Church has lost its place in the world it has done so because it has lost its sense of purpose. The recovery of its place will depend upon the rediscovery of its purpose.

It does have a reason for existence. That reason is written in the Holy Word of God.

The Church will be just what it is made by the Gospel Word which created it. But that Word is universal and final. Therefore every soul is born for society; and it is also born for the society of redemption. What society radically needs is salvation; and it is salvation that the church offers to all. The church also has this secret, the Church, the greatest product of man's past, and the only trustee of his future. Our Commissions of Membership and Evangelism have the interest of every person at heart, if they are in the church to keep them, and if they are out of the church to bring them in. Our reports will show a fair increase in membership.

We are moving forward in the area of Christian Education. The major concern of Christian Education is to reach persons with the kind of religious nature that results in vital Christian living. It seeks to win persons to Christ and enable them to grow toward spiritual maturity in the full richness of Christian faith. Our district staffs on Christian Education are doing a great job.

The directors of Stewardship on each district are trying to present a well-rounded program in the field of stewardship of Time and Ability, the Stewardship for All of Life, the Stewardship of Christian Vocation, and the Stewardship of Community Service, the Stewardship of Natural Resources and Stewardship on the Job.

As the result of strong efforts on the part of the Commissions on Christian Social Concerns in some of our churches we have more people registered than we have ever had.

For Christians, right and wrong in social situations depends on what they do to persons. Whatever enhances a man's worth and life as a child

of God is right and should be encouraged. Whatever in any way or to any degree keeps a man from being all that God wants him to be is wrong and should be rejected and resisted by every follower of Christ. Our directors of Christian Social Concerns have kept this before the people.

As witnesses of Jesus Christ we must serve Him by intensifying our missionary obedience. We have held before our young people through the Commissions on Missions the importance of going into full-time Christian service, the only way to have enough ministers and missionaries to carry the work of Christ. Our churches have been supplied with missionary materials, some held churchwide schools of missions.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service under the leadership of the conference president and the district presidents is doing everything in its power to strengthen our local churches both spiritually and financially.

Our district lay leaders have kept the program of the Board of Lay Activities before the layman of the Conference.

All of the districts held Youth Rallies. The Laurinburg district had an attendance of two hundred and seventy five youth. The theme was "Major Problems Facing Youth."

Some of the churches in the Conference have been cleared of debt this year, and others have paid a lot on old indebtedness.

Churches have been beautified, benevolent giving has increased, and ministers' salaries have been raised. We have not reached perfection but we have tried.

Bishop Love, we are grieved because of your impending retirement. You have been a sturdy fixture of the Methodist Church. Your unflinching courtesy, the high fidelity with which you performed the most difficult tasks, and your great sacrifice on behalf of the church more than justify all the nice things we can say about you. For your wise counsel, your brotherly spirit, and your blessed friendship, we are grateful. In saying farewell it is with the hope that it will not be good by but *au revoir*, and that you will come around to see us every time you get a chance. God bless you and may you continue to enjoy life at its best.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

### Renewal For Witnessing

Ways in which the District Committee on Evangelism can assist the Local Church Commission on Membership and Evangelism:

Bishop Love, and members of the Annual Conference, it is with profound gratitude to our Loving Heavenly Father, and to you and the cabinet that made it possible for me to make this my fourth report as Secretary of Evangelism. I believe that this is the most challenging task in the world, witnessing for Christ and His Church. One cannot be engaged in this race without becoming renewed himself. Therefore, I stand here as a better man too than I was four years ago because God, you and the cabinet made it possible for me to grow in depth through witnessing. Dietrick Bonhoeffer exemplified this renewal valiantly in his martyrdom

under Nazism he said, "When a man really gives up trying to make something out of himself—a saint, or a converted sinner, or a **churchman . . .** when in the fullness of tasks, questions or ill-hap. experiences and perplexities, a man throws himself into the arms of God . . . then he wakes with Christ in Gethsemane.

Mankind will never find its way to Christ by creeds, but by character; not by promise but by personalities; not by arguments but through demonstrations, not by words but by a life. Christ will be understood by the people you and I know, only as you and I live Him. Christ did not call us to defend Him. He can defend Himself. His call to us is to demonstrate Him and proclaim Him. The time for renewal has come. The call to call to "mission" is the hope of this renewal. In the recognition that "the church exists for mission as a candle exists for burning" lies the promise of the resurrection of the Church, the Body of Christ.

Pau! Tillich, speaks of a "dimension of depth." This is the renewal that is needed in our time. You cannot separate evangelism, mission, and social out-reach. No point in talking about creating a new social order with a nominal Christianity. If we are to create the climate in which a new social order can survive wherein every individual will have a better opportunity to grow as a child of God. Let us then not "pigeon-hole" evangelism. It belongs to all of life. Part of this renewal is to issue the warning that the social order must be changed, and that, that change must start within the individual. Renewal for renewal's sake is not enough. "Renewal's living counter-part is witnessing." Though life-giving water flows into the Dead Sea, the sea remains dead because there is no outlet. To live is to give, and to refuse to give is to die. Witnessing without renewal is shallow; renewal without witnessing is transitory.

Our business is people. Everything we do involves persons. We believe that God still can and does change human nature. This is redemption. This I believe. The gospel of "Another Chance." We must sharpen our focus on the individual and his needs—spiritual, emotional, mental, physical, economics, and material.

### **District Committee on Evangelism**

The District is a basic organizational unit of the Methodist Church. It has a unique opportunity to develop a program of evangelism within its boundaries. Not only does it have a Committee and the Vice-Chairman of the District on Evangelism, but it has a full time leader, the District Superintendent, who is responsible for all the program of the District. Therefore he has sixteen persons including the District Secretary of Evangelism to work with him.

"Each District of Annual Conference shall provide a District Committee on Evangelism which shall promote the program of evangelism as outlined by the General Board and in cooperation with the Conference Board of Evangelism." 1960 Discipline Paragraph 1481.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS AND FUNCTIONS:

1. Assist local churches in organizing and training commission on Membership and Evangelism.
2. Assist local church in planning and carrying out a yearly program of evangelism.
3. Inform local church leaders of the basic materials for the Commission, such as: the Manual which will be out in September, and the Action Handbooks, namely: Prospect discovery and cultivation, Personal and visitation evangelism, Church attendance increase, Membership care and conservation, Personal prayer and family devotions, Church membership rolls and records. These six needs are of vital concern to every local church from the heart of the city to the rural area. Approaches and attitudes may be different, but the basic evangelistic need of all churches is the same.

#### TRAIN LOCAL CHURCH EVANGELISM LEADERS:

1. Conduct district and Sub-district Institutes for members of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism.
  - a. Explain the functions of the six Action Committees.
  - b. Encourage establishment of groups of "The Twelve" small redemptive fellowship groups. These have been transforming churches all over the world, they are designed for prayer and witness.
  - c. Youth Weekends Christian Witness Mission.

#### KEEP CHURCHES INFORMED:

1. Inform local churches on current evangelistic programs of the Conference and General Boards.
2. Present a list of the new materials available from Methodist Evangelistic.
3. Have a District Evangelism report listing the monthly or quarterly record of each church in the District. The report should include:  
New members by:

Profession of Faith.....

Other Denominations.....

By Transfer.....

Total.....

Average Church Attendance.....

Average Church School Attendance.....

4. Have District Programs such as:
  - a. District-Wide Visitation Evangelism Missions
  - b. Simultaneous Preaching Missions or Revivals
  - c. Spiritual Life Mission
  - d. Weekends Spiritual Life Retreat  
One Great Day of Witnessing, this might well be a Sunday when every Church in the District, will have visitation teams all day.
  - e. Give special assistance to "barren churches" churches which did not receive a person on profession of faith the past conference year.

Let us prepare now to take hold of this Quad-rennial Program "One Witness in One World." I pray God that this Conference will set the pace, convened to pray and dispersed to witness, the "gathered" and the "scattered" Church, gives promise of renewal for the "Body of Christ" and of life-transformation for many outside the Church.

Witnessing by words can and often is ignored. Men may close their ears to the spoken word, but they cannot close their eyes to the lived Word. Here then is the ultimate in witnessing—a Christ-like life—a life lived in obedience to the will of God. Renewal will be confirmed when the renewed life awakens a God-need in another life—without a word. This world needs more than words; it needs a person who will incarnate it.

Let's evangelize the world with our Christian Faith!

**REPORT OF JOINT BOARD OF EDUCATION  
AND COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION  
NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

**June 3, 1964**

Bishop Love, Members and Friends of the Conference:

We are thankful to God and man for the privilege of making this report to the Great North Carolina Conference. It is the last to be made to our Beloved Bishop Love in this capacity and relationship. Our gratitude for the opportunity of sharing with you, Bishop Love, these joys and sacrifices are immeasurable. May God bless you and yours forever.

This Board is still dedicated to the ministry of nurturing persons in the Christian Fellowship. Our aim will continue to be development of a full-time program of Christian Education in the North Carolina Conference. We voted three years ago to begin this full-time program, but have been unable to do so because of insufficient finance and lack of interest. In each of the three years, the Board's income has been only enough to support part-time work. While many churches have paid their apportionment in full, (to these we are grateful) others have scarcely paid anything. In light of these facts, we recommend continuation of our Christian Education Program on a part-time basis and request permission to use two-thousand, two-hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250.00) of funds received to finance this part-time program. We urge the Bishop and the District Superintendents to exert every effort to impress upon pastors and laymen of the Conference the importance of Christian Education in the Conference and to make strenuous effort to raise the apportionment for the Conference Board of Education during the next conference year.

Methodism's dream of an all-inclusive fellowship will soon become a reality. The Interconference Commission on College and University Religious Work is closing its first quadrennium as a fully-integrated body, serving and representing all three Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church in North Carolina. Where it is possible, the General Board of Education is planning its program on a regional basis, without regard to race. These changes affect us now, and will affect us more and more in the future. In these days, a trained leadership is not a luxury, it is a necessity. We must provide and participate in leadership training enterprises on the Conference, District, Sub-district and local church levels.

The Baltimore Area Leadership School has been discontinued. We have been invited to participate in the various leadership enterprises of the Southern Jurisdiction and we hope to take advantage of these opportunities. This summer our Christian Education workers are expected to attend the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership School which will be held at Lake Junaluska—August 3-14, 1964. Funds raised for Area Leadership School will be used to send our conference and district workers to the Junaluska School. In all of these changes we have had and we shall continue to have the guidance and support of the General Board of Education. We need your help. Let us work together, unselfishly for the Christian nurture of those whom we have in our charge and keeping.

## WE RECOMMEND THE FOLLOWING:

1. That at least one person from each local church attend the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership School at Lake Junaluska, August 3-14, 1964. Registration blanks may be secured from the Executive Secretary.
2. That the District Superintendents ask the staff workers of the several districts, as well as local church Christian Education workers to make themselves available to attend the Junaluska School and other leadership enterprises.
3. That the months of September and October be designated as Christian Education Months in the North Carolina Conference.
  - a. That a workshop for Conference Workers be held during this period.
  - b. That workshops for District and local church workers be held during this period on each district.
  - c. That a special Roll Call for Conference Board of Education Funds be held on each district during the period of this emphasis.
4. That each local church have its workers well prepared to use "The New Curriculum For Children" which begins in September of this year.
5. That each district hold a District Leadership School; that no district hold a District Youth Assembly unless a District Leadership School is held.
6. That Leadership training week-ends be provided on each district.
7. That each district be properly organized.
8. That more effective use be made of the Executive Secretary in local church situations.
9. That the District Superintendents invite the Executive Secretary to their Annual Planning Conference.
10. That the **Figure** for Wesley Foundation and Christian Higher Education be listed on the District Superintendent's apportionment sheet to each charge.
11. That Church School Rally Day be observed in the conference on Sunday, September 27, 1964.
12. That continued special emphasis be placed on the Race Relations Day offering.
13. That the First Sunday of Family Week be observed as Children's Day.
14. That each church observe all special days: World Service Sunday, Christian Education Week, Ministry Sunday, Methodist Student Day, Student Recognition Sunday, etc.

### Annual Report to the Interconference Commission, to the Board of Directors, and to the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdiction Year 1963-1964

It gives me a deep sense of pleasure to give to you a report of the work of the Wesley Foundation at The Agricultural and Technical College for this school year.

This has been a good year. Staff, faculty and student response has been wonderful.

#### Discussion Groups

There have been discussion groups in these areas: "Bible"; "Christian Theology"; "Sex, Morals, and Marriage"; "Psychology and Religion"; "Religion and Literature"; and "Christian Missions in a Revolutionary World."

In the area of "Christian Missions in a Revolutionary World," we have dealt with some of the factors of the world-wide revolution. These factors are: nationalism, population explosion, technological progress, communism, and resurgent religions.

#### Religious Emphasis Week

Each year Religious Emphasis Week is observed at the college. The theme this year was: "Seeking to Understand Religious Motivation Amid Social Revolution."

The speaker for this year's program was Dr. Daniel Webster Wynn, Chaplain at Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama.

Dr. Wynn spoke on the following topics at the worship services: "High Motives for Life"; "The Challenge of Change"; and "Seeking the Best".

Members of the Wesley Foundation and I participated in the Religious Emphasis Week Program.

### Library Lecture Series

Each year the library staff of The Agricultural and Technical College sponsors a series of lectures. This year I was invited to give one of these lectures. I spoke on "Sex Ethics and the Kinsey Reports." A very lively discussion followed the lecture.

### Extra Campus Activities

Two students and the director attended the fall retreat held at Camp Chestnut Ridge on October 5-6, 1963. The retreat was under the sponsorship of the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina.

One student and director attended the state leadership conference held at Camp Chestnut Ridge on April 4-5, 1964. This was also sponsored by the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina.

On February 7-9, 1964, eight students and the director attended the Methodist Student Movement State Conference held at Centenary Methodist Church, Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

Last fall, I taught a seven-weeks' course entitled, "A Theology of the Sacraments and the Sacramental Life," at the Episcopal Center at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Students from the following denominations took the course: Baptist, Episcopal, Methodist, Moravian, and Presbyterian. Taking the course were students from The Agricultural and Technical College, Bennett College, Greensboro College, and the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. The purpose of the course was to prepare the students for The 19th Ecumenical Student Conference held at Ohio University, Athens, Ohio, December 27, 1963-January 2, 1964.

The Wesley Foundation sent two student delegates to the Ecumenical Student Conference in Athens, Ohio.

On Friday, November 1, 1963, I addressed members of the Wesley Foundation at The University of North Carolina at Greensboro, on "Religion and Parapsychology."

On Sunday, November 24, 1963, I spoke to members of The Appalachian State Teachers' College Wesley Foundation, Boone, North Carolina, on "The Non-Violent Movement and Mass Demonstrations."

On Wednesday, January 22, 1964, I addressed members of the East Carolina College Wesley Foundation, Greenville, North Carolina, on "The Present Racial Revolution in America."

### Negro History Week

February 9-16, 1964 was Negro History Week at The Agricultural and Technical College. The theme was: "Negro History: A Basis for the New Freedom." Under the leadership of Miss Geneva J. Holmes, Methodist faculty member at the college, the Wesley Foundation sponsored one of the Negro History Week programs. The speaker was: Dr. Robert Martin, Associate Professor of Government, Howard University, Washington, District of Columbia.

### Visitor From Board of Missions of the Methodist Church

On March 5, 1964, under the leadership of Miss Geneva J. Holmes, Methodist faculty member, the Wesley Foundation brought Miss Lucy Gist to The Agricultural and Technical College. Miss Gist, Director of the Bethlehem Center, Charlotte, North Carolina, spoke in the interest of the home and foreign missions program of the Methodist Church.

### Visitors From Wesley Foundation, Pennsylvania State University

On March 25, 1964, a group of students from the Wesley Foundation, Pennsylvania State University, visited our campus. This group was making a study of race relations in the South. They discussed this problem with members of our Wesley Foundation.

This concludes our report for the school year 1963-1964.

I thank each of you for the wonderful cooperation that you have given this year.

### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS**

Bishop Love, members and friends of the conference:

This has been a great year for Methodists, concerned about social issues. I am happy to announce that our board has heard the call to involvement.

#### **The Second Methodist Conference on Human Relations**

This conference was held in Chicago, Illinois; August 26-30, 1963; in the Conrad Hilton Hotel. The chairman of this board was asked to serve as a discussion leader. We were confronted with the following questions:

1. Where is The Methodist Church currently in its structure and program in regard to race relations?
2. What are the immediate goals toward which The Methodist Church should move in race relations?
3. How can The Methodist Church make the greatest progress toward these goals?

#### **CONCLUSIONS REACHED:**

God made us one in His act of creation, one in His act of redemption of all mankind through Jesus Christ, and one in the fellowship of the Church, through the presence of His Holy Spirit among us. This oneness demands that the Church involve itself in today's racial crisis.

The Methodist Church is called to change now—"That in every conference bishops and cabinets carefully prepare the ground for the assignment of pastors and district superintendents without regard to race. That in every local church membership, service and office be clearly available to anyone who is willing and able, without regard to race."

We were called to identify ourselves with the agony and need of all men:

This conference delegated six of its members to share in the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom.

#### **State-Wide Methodist Convocation**

This convocation was held in Greensboro, November 15-16, 1963; at the West Market Street Church.

Dr. Lee C. Moorehead gave the Keynote Address, using as his topic: "Motivation for Christian Social Action."

Dr. Samuel Proctor spoke on the topic: "Revolution and Not Revolt." Dr. Byron Johnson used as his topic: "U. S. Responsibility For A Peaceful and Prosperous World." Dr. J. Metts Rollins, "How We Bring About Change;" and Dr. L. C. Moorehead brought us the closing message, "We Can and We Will."

Workshops were held on: The Local Church Commission, Public Morals, Pornography, Russia, Alcohol, Arms Control, the Central Jurisdiction, and Christian Witness in Racial Crisis.

#### **A Year of Crisis**

We are wasting an extremely valuable human resource when we fail to open up all jobs to properly trained persons and when we fail to provide good educational opportunities for the Negro. One result is a drag on the rate of economic progress, and another is excessive unemployment. But the loss of human life is the greatest.

Police dogs and high pressure fire hoses which were used during the year to keep the Negro "in his place" is a disgrace before the world. The demented mind of the assassin who took the life of John F. Kennedy in Dallas or Medgar Evers in Mississippi is no different from the mind of the murderers who snuffed out the lives of four little girls in Birmingham.

Our feeling should be the same as the Chief Executive of this land. In his address to Congress, President Johnson choked with emotion said, "This is no time for delay. It is a time for action. We have talked long enough in this country about equal rights. We have talked for 100 years or more. Yes, it is time now to write the next chapter, and to write it in books of law."

We call upon the conference to urge Senators: Sam J. Ervin, Jr., and B. Everett Jordan to support the earliest possible passage of the civil rights bill. And to all of Christendom, may our slogan be "we can and we will."

### **Optimism**

The heroism of whites who are willing to stand with the Negroes against police dogs and fire hoses and fight with them in the courts for a common cause may be the force that holds the concept of brotherhood together in this era of stress.

A significant pronouncement, calling for racial inclusiveness in all local Methodist churches, was issued by the bishops of The Methodist Church at a meeting of the Council of Bishops which was held at Detroit, Mich., in November.

In the Episcopal Address to the General Conference, Bishop Gerald Kennedy said: "God Almighty is moving toward a world of interracial brotherhood so speedily and so irresistibly, that to hesitate is to fight against God and be crushed."

### **The New Program**

During each of the next four years, Commissions on Christian Social Concerns are asked to center their attention on a basic question related to social concerns. The question for 1964-65 is: "By what authority does the church involve itself in social action?"

### **Conclusion**

Bishop Love, words are inadequate to express our appreciation for your concern in Human Relation and World Peace. You have met the challenge of Social Concerns, "fought a good fight, finished your course, kept the faith," and your "departure is at hand." As you go into retirement, you must not forget that the North Carolina Conference's Board of Concerns shall always be grateful; for your wise counsel, unflinching faith, good judgment, and your precious insights.

However, the most important basis for world peace is laid down in the New Testament. We refer to the doctrine of love. The doctrine of love is at the heart of the Christian Faith. Love is a law of life. It is a fundamental spiritual law that is written into the very nature of the universe. It is our best line of defense against hatred and war,



Love begets love. Hate begets hate.

Love is an integrative and creative power in the life of the individual and in social movements.

Dr. Smiley Blanton in his book, **Love or Perish**, made the following significant statement: "Love is the only true source of knowledge, and without it we lose our ability to learn and to understand. Once in the grip of hostility, we twist forward in a spiral of destructive action that envelops those around us and spreads beyond as a source of universal evil. It generates crime and encourages corruption in our personal lives. It leads to economic exploitation and social injustice. On a national and international scale, it foments the storms of political hatred that bring wars, revolutions and dictatorship.

"Nothing can stop the spiral except love."

### CONFERENCE LAY LEADER REPORT

Bishop Love, Members of the North Carolina Conference, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I submit to you this report of my Stewardship as your Conference Lay Leader, aware to a fuller degree than ever that the challenge to the

men of the Methodist Church and to Christendom magnifies as time goes by. In this age of transition, revolution and frustration we still have one of the greatest opportunities in the history of mankind to prove that the churches's one Foundation is Jesus Christ her Lord.

In the language of the Layman, let us ask a few questions: What is the church for? Is it a social organization only? The church is a fellowship but a very distinctive fellowship of those redeemed by Christ and called by Him to worship God and to serve and to serve our fellow man.

If to serve our fellow man is part of being a member of this fellowship, do we not need to examine our attitudes and actions as members of our various local churches.

It is through a fidelity born of trust in the power of God and the Lordship of Christ that the Church has survived many crises in the past and has come to this day of challenge and opportunity, bloody, but unbowed.

I appeal to the Laymen of North Carolina to join me in this army, I urge you to enlist with me to wage war on the complacency of the men of Methodism. I am imploring you to help wake up this sleeping giant—join us as we go forth singing "Onward Christian Soldiers".

Where are we asleep you ask? We are asleep to our membership in the North Carolina. When I was a boy and can first remember hearing of the membership of the North Carolina Conference it was 15,000—today 14,283.

We are asleep to our Ministers—year by year, like a cancer, our Ministers decrease. Shall we continue to sleep or will we laymen wake up and join forces and help to correct this.

We are asleep in our church extension—only a very very few congregations have been started in our conference in the 20 years, and many other areas find us nodding or asleep—but we can wake up now.

We have got to grow, we have got to move, we have got to spread. Anything, anything that is not growing is dying. You can't stand still long we've been still too long—too long—too long now.

In August of this past Conference Year, I carried 23 men to the Regional work shop in Atlanta, Georgia where we met with laymen of Georgia, South Carolina and Florida. I participated in the programing of this workshop and found it very helpful to the persons in attendance.

I made two addresses on Laymens day and have given speeches and discussions thru out the conference where ever and when ever called upon, which have been quite frequent.

As we go forth into a new Quadrennial, let us go with renewed zeal and energy 'tis a mighty work that we are about—and you—and you—and you much help to eradicate this doubt.

Our District and Associate Lay Leaders are a most consciousness and dedicated body. They have been holding the train for you to get on board and believe me there's room for many more.

WHEREAS, The Central and Northeastern Jurisdictional Conferences and their constituent Annual Conferences are committed to the elimination of all forms of racial segregation and discrimination in The Methodist Church, including elimination, with a framework of overall planning of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction itself.

BE IT RESOLVED, Therefore, That:

1. The Delaware Annual Conference, in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, by the adoption of this plan votes to transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

2. Each of the other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, by the adoption of this Plan votes to approve the transfer of the Delaware Annual Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

3. Each Annual Conference of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, by the adoption of this Plan votes to approve the transfer of the Delaware Annual Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

4. Each Annual Conference of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan votes to accept into its membership, upon the effective date of the plan, the following persons:

- (a) All ministerial members of the Delaware Annual Conference who are then appointed to churches geographically located within its boundaries.
- (b) All ministerial members of the Delaware Annual Conference under special appointment who then hold their quarterly Conference membership in a local church geographically located within its boundaries.
- (c) All retired ministerial members of the Delaware Annual Conference who then hold their Quarterly Conference membership in a local church geographically located within its boundaries.

All persons who shall become members of any Annual Conference of the Northeastern Jurisdiction under subparagraphs "A", "B", or "C" above shall have all the rights, privileges, and obligations of the other members of that Annual Conference.

5. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan determines the boundaries of the Delaware Annual

Conference to include all churches of the Central Jurisdiction located in the States of Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, (and Virginia, unless later transferred).

6. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan determines the boundaries of its Annual Conferences in such manner as to include each Local Church of the Delaware Annual Conference in the other Annual Conferences of the Northeastern Jurisdiction in which that church is geographically located; thereafter, a separate entity of the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

7. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this Plan requests the Council of Bishops to transfer to the Northeastern Jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision the Bishop of the Central Jurisdiction assigned to the Delaware Annual Conference at the time of transfer. The Secretary of the Jurisdictional Conference shall immediately transmit the request to the Council of Bishops.

**MESSAGE DELIVERED TO THE METHODIST ANNUAL CONF.  
GREENSBORO, N. C. — CENTRAL JURISDICTION**

June 5, 1964

Bishop Love, General Officers, Pastors, Delegates and Friends of the 106th Session of the North Carolina Conference, Central Jurisdiction: I am happy to be here. Permit me first to bring you greetings from the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, whose Thirty Seventh Quadrennial Session closed about thirty days ago in Indiannapolis, Indiana.

To say the least, this was a typical 1964 General Conference. The Ministers and Laymen met in an atmosphere of the day—that of Freedom. This kind of atmosphere, if fanned too much, can be destructive and if not fanned enough spells long delay or perhaps, serious defeat. It is our earnest prayer that middle ground will be the ultimate results and along with the struggle for freedom, the Church will move on.

I bring you greetings from the West Central North Carolina Conference, the conference over which your Humble Servant presides, the conference in which is located a part of your thriving work here in Greensboro, North Carolina including your great and growing institution, Bennett College.

Your Ministers and our Ministers; Your District Superintendents and our Presiding Elders; Your Members and our Members in and around Greensboro, as elsewhere, are having the finest of fellowship and most cordial cooperation.

Bishop Love, while this is the first time I have had the privilege to fellowship with you in an Annual Conference, our paths have crossed on other occasions. Quite well do I remember the occasion of Zion honoring the Russian Delegates, guest of the World Council of Churches, in the City of Newark, New Jersey. You were my partner in the procession, and we appeared on the program together. Quite well do I remember the Testimonial given your Humble Servant and his family in your City, Baltimore, Maryland in April of this year when you and Mrs. Love honored us with your presence. I have pleasant memories of the World Methodist Conference, the National Council where we met and exchanged smiles and hardy hand shakes. The deep in my heart has called to the deep in your heart and there has been and is a deep and abiding response; and why not? First, we are Brethren, we are Christians, and we are Methodist; and Methodist are one throughout the whole world.

This period in American History is somewhat akin to the period when John Wesley was born; when he grew to manhood, and when he set out to fulfill the dream of a warm heart. Religion at that time had reached a low ebb in England. Religion mentioned in high society brought nothing but laughter.

A Bishop of the Anglican Church declared "It is come to be taken for granted that Christianity is no longer a subject of injury; but that it is now at length discovered to be fictitious."

John Wesley's conclusion was "Ungodlyness is our universal, our constant, our peculiar characteristic."

Bishop Lichfield said in 1724 "The Lord's Day is now the devil's market day. More lewdness, drunkardness, more quarrels and murders, more sin is contrived and committed on this day than all other days of the week together."

Bishop Benson, in 1721 declared "The accursed spirituous liquors, which to the shame of our Government are so easily to be had, and in such quantities drunk, have changed the very nature of our people."

The English Criminal Law was a disgrace to a civilized nation. The attitude of the people was so morbid that thousands came to witness the execution of a criminal. It was the best public amusement. England was indeed in a slump. It was during this period of religious depression, social evils, and political inequalities that John Wesley was born and labored

A certain man, one day, was asked to explain the secret of his success. His reply was "It is not difficult to explain, for I have in my veins the blood of ancestors who had achieved." The same thing could be rightly said of the one our great church holds up as her founder—John Wesley.

John Wesley had the art of inspiring others and when Phillip Embury came to America, he found here many of the sins that were so prevalent in England. Slavery was the curse of America. Segregation was popular in the church. Injustices and indecencies were the lot of the Black man in America. The Black man being naturally religious, sought the church with a warm heart. The story to you, my friends, is well known and need not be repeated. Segregation, discrimination, God given rights cramped, injustices heaped upon our forefathers that would bring tears to an angel's eyes.

Some dreamed of a better day, prayed, although they did not like their status quo and there was a restlessness within their breast, feeling that God was working through them, the coming of a more glorious day, **stayed and took it** but not without complaint; for they felt that it was divine right to grumble, and you did grumble. Your history is one of grumbling and grumbling has brought you where you are today and grumbling is opening doors for you in your Church. For every frown, there is a smile.

In 1844, you asked for separate Conferences, a more general recognition for the Negro Preacher, a larger participation in the affairs of the church. In 1848, your church decided that separate churches in general were not expedient. You did not leave your Mother Church. In 1864, the General Conference, after discussing various memorials from the Negro Membership, gave encouragement to the Negro People, where even practical, and authorized the organization of Negro Mission Conferences. Time will not permit me, nor do I feel capable of even attempting to tell of your struggles, your hardships, your insults, but like Banco's Ghost, you would not down. But after the merge with the Methodist Church South and the Protestant Methodist Church, with the many problems involved in Organic Union, your Church finally came up, with six Jurisdictional Conferences—"One a Central". I am glad you stayed. You have not sacrificed one ounce of manhood, nor have you compromised one tittle in your thinking and in your God inspired ambitions. Your speeches in the General Conference have not lost their punch nor their power. You have stood up like men, like men of God, whose hearts have ben strangely

warmed and who are full fledged members of the Methodist Family, born of God, making your contribution to the great Methodist Church as God has blessed you, helping to build churches and colleges.

As Dr. J. Beverly F. Shaw said: "We know we have chosen a hard way. We must suffer many disappointments, disillusionments, and some failures, ere we reach our goal, but confidently with faith, we face forward".

"We see our way as birds their trackless way.

We shall arrive! what time, what circuits first,

We ask not; but unless God send His hail

Or blinding fireballs, sleet or stifling snow,

In some time, in His good time, we shall arrive."

Some of us left and set up housekeeping for ourselves, led on by James Varick, Abraham Thompson, William Miller, Francis Jacobs, Peter Williams, and others. The A.M.E. Zion attracted the attention and inspired the fellowship of such great souls as Sojourner Truth, Harriet Tubman, the Underground Zealot, who made trips with her human cargo, whose slogan was "Children, Keep going".

If you are tired, keep going,

If you are cold, keep going,

If you are hungry, keep going,

If you want a taste of freedom, keep going.

She boasted of never having lost a passenger or wrecking her train.

The A.M.E. Zion Church attracted the attention of Frederick Douglas, a great abolitionist, who became a local preacher in our Zion.

Booker T. Washington, going South with a dream in his soul, going to Tuskegee, Alabama to set up an Institution found Butler Chapel A.M.E. Zion Church and began teaching in it. Now, the Institution has grown to world wide renown.

Our history's pages are many giving account of great souls; sung and unsung who have made an impression on the world and now live on in the hearts and lives of men and women today.

James W. Hood was a member of the Reconstruction Constitutional Convention and helped to write the Constitution of the State of North Carolina. He was the Assistant Superintendent of Public Instruction in the State of North Carolina. Joseph Charles Price was one of the world's greatest orators and founder of Zion's Chief Institution, Livingstone College. Alexander Walters, one of the charter members of the NAACP; Stephen Gill Spottswood, now Director of the National Board of the NAACP; W. J. Walls, member of the National Board and Vice President of the National Council of Churches and on, and on, and on, we go.

The Negro is now in a great fight for complete integration in all areas of American life. Your remaining with the Mother Church is proving to be a great blessing to the Black Man's cause. For like Moses, you have in a peculiar way, been exposed to the best in education and culture. You are now accorded the right of the floor of your General Conference where more than ten millions of Methodist assemble through representation. You have made friends; yes, lasting friends, with Bishops, Ministers and Laymen, leaders in American life, and you are using it to fight the Black Man's cause. Side by side the A.M.E. Zion Church stands, the Church that left, the Church that has been building for herself a denomination, letting their brothers in White know that we too, have had the touch divine and the genius of true Methodism coarsing through our vein and we too have something to offer when the day of complete integration comes. Yes, both of us are needed: We can work together in getting our people to register and vote; living and preaching the gospel; buying and building better homes; educating our children; supporting our schools and colleges, yes, in all areas of life that affect the people in America.

When Zion, Bethel and the Christian Methodist Church unite (and we have seriously started a new conversation) and we are able to speak

in thunderous tones of two and a half million, and when the United Negro Methodist Church joins hands with the Mother Methodist, then, we can speak in a trumpet voice that will raise the dead; Yes, the dead in sin. There will be a mighty shaking of the dry bones so much so that the Church of God everywhere will come together in answer to the accessory prayer:

"That we may all be one"

Bishop Love, as you near the period of your retirement, remember "Old Bishops never die, they just fade away".

"Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord;  
He is tramping out the vintage where the grapes of wrath are stored;  
He hath loosed the fateful lighting of His terrible swift sword;  
His truth is marching on.

I have seen Him in the watch fires of a hundred circling camps;  
They have builded Him an altar in the evening dews and damps;  
I can read His righteous sentence by the dim and flaring lamps;  
His day is marching on.

He has sounded forth the trumpet that shall never call retreat;  
He is sifting out the hearts of men before His judgment seat;

## HISTORICAL VIEW

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conference. In the year 1886, the General Conference was set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference but when it adjourned, there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 10,495 white members and 3,100 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A.M.E. Church, some the Colored M.E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.

The treasurer shall maintain at all times books and records, showing the names of the respective Commissions, Boards, and other Agencies, and the amount to which is entitled in the aggregate fund on deposits in each depository maintained by him; and that in each case where such deposits are carried in the name of the Conference, the same shall be specifically designated so as to disclose the custodial nature of such deposits and the name and interest of each beneficial owner shall be disclosed on the record of the Conference Treasurer.
  4. All Conference funds raised on the Charge shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly. Rev. L. A. Brown, 625 Asheboro Greensboro, N. C.
  5. District Superintendents
    - a. The salary of the District Superintendents shall be six thousand annually (\$6,000.00).
    - b. The apportionment, or the salary, house rent, office and travel expense of the District Superintendents shall be an amount equivalent to 15% of the Pastor's cash salary.
    - c. The District Superintendents shall receive six hundred dollars (\$600.00) for house rent except the Superintendent of the Virginia District.
    - d. The District Superintendents shall receive three hundred dollars (\$300) for office expense and four hundred dollars (\$400) for travel expense: the Superintendent of the Virginia District shall receive six hundred dollars (\$600) office expense and seven hundred (\$700) travel expense.
    - e. The District Superintendents shall have the right to apportion the charges on their districts for District Parsonage maintenance after consultation with the District Stewards.
    - f. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance will send the apportionment to each charge within 30 days.
  6. The minimum salary fund be created in the amount equivalent to 3% of the pastor's cash salary.
  7. The apportionment for Conference Claimants be in an amount equivalent to 15% of the pastor's cash salary.
  8. The apportionment for the Episcopal Fund be in the amount to 2% of the pastor's cash salary.

### REPORT OF JOINT BOARD OF EDUCATION AND COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

#### NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE

August 11, 1964

Bishop Golden, Members and Friends of the Conference:

We are happy to present to this historic special session of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference the report of the Joint Board of Education and Commission on Higher Education.

Our warmest personal greetings are extended to you Bishop Golden. We dedicate ourselves to the service of Christ and to the program of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference as it shall develop under your leader-

ship.

The many changes which are taking place in our Methodist Church affect us now!! Necessity is upon us.

Methodism's dream of an all-inclusive fellowship will soon become a reality. The Interconference Commission on College and University Religious Work has closed its first quadrennium as a fully integrated body, serving and representing all three Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church in North Carolina. Where it is possible, the General Board of Education is planning its program on a regional basis without regard to race. These changes affect us now, and will affect us more and more in the future. In these days, a trained leadership is not a luxury; it is a necessity. We must provide and participate in leadership training enterprises on the Regional Conference, District, Sub-district, and Local Church Levels.

Our Area Leadership School has been discontinued. We have been invited to participate in the various leadership enterprises of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, and we hope to take advantage of all of these opportunities. Our North Carolina Christian Education workers attended the Southeastern Jurisdiction school which was held at Lake Junaluska last week, and the Virginia workers are now in session. In all of these changes we have had and we shall continue to have the guidance and support of the General Board of Education.

The New Curriculum for children, which we will begin using in September, will demand the best of what we are and have. It is the result of study, and will develop in growing persons that moral and spiritual maturity toward which the church strives. It is our hope that every local church will take advantage of all that this new curriculum offers.

Recognizing the importance of value of Christian Education in the Church, we stand firm in our belief that ours must be a full-time program. We need your help. Let us work together, unselfishly, for Christian Nurture of those whom we have in our charge and keeping.

#### WE RECOMMEND THE FOLLOWING:

1. That the North Carolina-Virginia Conference employ a part-time Executive Secretary of the Board of Education to serve until the 1965 session of the Conference.
2. That the Bishop appoint Samuel E. NeSmith part-time Executive Secretary of the Board of Education.
3. That the 1965 session of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference employ a full-time Executive Secretary of the Board of Education.
4. That the Commission on World Service and Finance provide sufficient funds for a full-time program of Christian Education in the Conference.
5. That the District Superintendents ask the staff workers of the several districts as well as local church workers, to make themselves available to attend the various leadership enterprises.
6. That the months of September and October be designated as Christian Education Months in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference.
  - a. That a workshop for conference workers be held during this period.
  - b. That workshops for district, sub-district, and local church workers be held during this period on each district.
7. That each local church seek to have its workers well prepared to use "The New Curriculum for Children".
8. That each district hold a District Leadership School, that no district hold a District Youth Assembly unless a District Leadership School is held.
9. That leadership training week-ends be provided on each district.

10. That each district be properly organized.
11. That effective use be made of the Executive Secretary in local church situations.
12. That the District Superintendents invite the Executive Secretary to their Annual Planning Conference.
13. That special effort be made to raise full apportionments for Higher Education and Wesley Foundation.
14. That Christian Education Sunday be observed in the conference on Sunday, September 27, 1964.
15. That one fourth (1/4) of funds received from each district for Christian Education Sunday be returned to the district to be used to promote its program of Christian Education.
16. That continued special emphasis be placed on the Race Relations Day Offering.
17. That the First Sunday of Family Week be observed as Children's Day.
18. That each church observe all special days. World Service Sunday, Christian Education Week, Ministry Sunday, Methodist Student Day, Student Recognition Sunday, etc.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS**

BE IT RESOLVED:

- I. That the ministers of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference who are members of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund on August 12, 1964; and ministers received on trial by the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference after August 12, 1964; and ministers admitted into full connection after said date; together with such other ministers as may be qualified under the provisions of paragraph 1644 of the 1964 Methodist Discipline, be continued or enrolled as members of the MRPF, and  
That all members so enrolled in MRPF shall contribute annually, in monthly installments, in accordance with paragraph 1646:1, the equivalent of 3% of the average salary of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference, and
- II. That the ministerial members of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference in the effective relation, who are not members of the MRPF on August 12, 1964; and all full-time Approved Supply Pastors be enrolled as members of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund under the provision of paragraph 1656 of the 1964 Methodist Discipline, and  
That under the provisions of paragraph 1656, all PRPF members shall contribute to the fund annually, in monthly installments, the equivalent of 3% of the average salary of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference, which contribution shall be credited to the Income Annuity account of each PRPF member, and
- III. That a Distribution Reserve Account of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference be established; such account shall consist of the balance of the North Carolina Conference Distribution Reserve Account on deposit with the General Board of Pensions as of August 12, 1964; together with such amounts as the Joint Distributing Committee shall distribute to the North Carolina-Virginia Conference and allocate to such Distribution Reserve Account; and
- IV. That an amount equivalent to 15% of the cash salaries of the pastors be placed in the 1964-65 Conference budget apportioned to the churches for the support of Conference Claimants.

**RESOLUTION NO. 3****Plan For The Merger of The North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference With Conferences of The Southeastern Jurisdiction**

WHEREAS, it is the avowed policy of the Methodist Church to effect ultimately the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction as one step toward achieving a truly inclusive Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, the Central Jurisdictional Conference and its constituent Annual Conferences are committed to the elimination of all forms of racial segregation and discrimination in The Methodist Church, including elimination (within a framework of overall planning) of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction itself:

BE IT RESOLVED, Therefore, as follows:

1. The North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference, by the adoption of this Plan for the Merger of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference with Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction (hereafter called "The Plan"), and in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, hereby votes to transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

2. Each of the other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction

by the adoption of the Plan, and in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church shall be deemed to have approved the transfer of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

3. Each Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction by the adoption of this Plan, and in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of the Methodist Church shall be deemed to have approved the transfer of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

4. Each Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan shall be deemed to have accepted into its membership, upon the effective date of the Plan, the following persons:

- (A) All ministerial members (whether on trial or in full connection) of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference who are then appointed to churches located geographically within its boundaries.
- (B) All ministerial members of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference (whether on trial or in full connection) under special appointment who then hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically within its boundaries.
- (C) All retired ministerial members of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference who hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically within its boundaries.

All persons who shall become members of any Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction under subparagraphs (A), (B), or (C) above shall have all the rights (especially with respect to pensions and minimum salaries), privileges, and obligations of the other members of that Annual Conference.

5. The Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan, shall be deemed to have agreed that opportunities for lay participation in, and enjoyment of, the benefits of all their programs, activities, and institutions shall be provided without regard to race or color.

6. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan, shall be deemed to have agreed to determine the boundaries of its Annual Conference in such manner as to include each local church of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference in the other Annual Conferences of that Jurisdiction in which that local church is located geographically.

7. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by adoption of this Plan, shall be deemed to have requested the Council of Bishops to transfer to the Southeastern Jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision the bishop of the Central Jurisdiction assigned to the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference at the time of transfer. The Secretary of the Jurisdictional Conference shall immediately transmit the request to the Council of Bishops.

8. The Plan shall become effective upon its adoption by the required votes of each of the parties thereto to-wit:

- (A) The North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference.
- (B) The other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction.
- (C) The Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.
- (D) The Central Jurisdiction Conference.
- (E) The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

9. The Secretary of each Annual Conference shall certify immediately the vote on the Plan to the College of Bishops of its Jurisdiction in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church so that prompt tabulation of all votes and announcement of the results thereof may be made.
