CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

These Rules of Order were adopted by the former North Carolina Annual Conference in 1956. Since they have not been officially adopted by the New North Carolina-Virginia Conference, they are subject to revision.

1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 a.m. and open with devotional

exercises, and close at 12:30 p.m.

- 2. The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.
- 3. The nominating committee consisting of nine persons shall be appointed by the bishop quadrennially.
- 4. No person shall be a member, concurrently, of more than two standing committees or commissions (except as provided for by the Discipline).
- 5. The Conference fiscal year shall end 20 days before the first day of the Annual Conference.
- $6.\ \,$ The pastors' reports shall be in the hands of the treasurer and statistician 15 days before the opening day of the Annual Conference.
- 7. The reports of all major commissions and committees shall be mimeographed and passed out at the seat of the Conference on or before the day the report is read.
- 8. The roll of Conference lay members shall be called at the opening day of the Conference.
- 9. The Treasurer's report shall be mimeographed and passed out at the meeting of the Conference.
- 10. The minutes of the Annual Conference shall be printed and distributed within 90 days after the adjournment of the Conference.
- 11. All recommendations and memorials shall be presented to the Conference in duplicate form.
- 12. All motions from the floor shall be in writing when requested by the secretary of the Conference.
- 13. The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the Host Pastor, the Host Superintendent, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Conference Secretary, and two persons named by the Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Bishop.
- 14. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.
- 15. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.
- 16. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.
- 17. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be table without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debates and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.

18. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.

- $19.\ \mathrm{No}$ member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.
- 20. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here; (a) to adjourn to a

given time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely.

- 21. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.
- 22. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of one-third of the members present.
- 23. These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Conference.
- 24. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference at least one day before action is taken.

SECTION I

Bishop Golden and brethren of the fold, it is with a deep sense of gratitude to our Heavenly Father and with a genuine sense of appreciation to our ministers and lay people that we, your Board of Education, submit this progress report.

L. Harold DeWolf in his book, Teaching Our Faith in God, says: "Among the reasons why a christian educator needs to know clearly the nature and task of the church, an especially obvious one, is that Christian education is carried on by the church."

The Board realizes that the church is always interested in what a person becomes, and what he becomes has to be involved with what he learns. The means by which he learns are vitally important. It is our aim to lead persons in making Jesus Christ their Lord.

This year the Board of Education has endeavored to deepen the influence of the over-all challenge of Christian education in the Annual Conference. Many meetings have been held with the other two Southeastern Jurisdictional Conferences in North Carolina to bring about a better educational program for all Methodists.

A full time program is very important in developing the educational program in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference. Again we seek the help of everyone in making our work more meaningful and successful.

REPORT

It is our privilege to sponsor the Methodist Student Movement (MSM). This year the MSM has been in the middle of the mission of the Church. At a fall retreat attended by more than 90 students and their leaders from 20 or so colleges, challenging messages were brought by the Reverend David Swain, Minister to Students in Tokyo, Japan. He had shown that his call to preach was a call to prepare, and he had never stopped that preparation. He saw that the mission is basically the same, whether in Chapel Hill or Tokyo, and that the need to make a Christian witness is enormous in either place. In that spirit, this missionary on furlough stimulated our students.

The mission was not forgotten. Students kept searching for the proper time and place to apply their talents to serve Christ. Tutoring projects were explored; letters were written on social concerns, including capital punishment, and the Speaker-Ban Law.

Students in some 20 schools began to project themselves into the day-by-day and week-by-week tasks of teaching those who for so long have been the victims of oppression. To the amazement of many students, a child who received tutoring in mathematics improved his grades in reading and spelling and other subjects also almost immediately. The knowledge that somebody cares is what counts. Few of these projects are directly under the auspices of the MSM, and not nearly all of the teachers are consecrated Christians. Some of them are students who have very little to do with the Church because they have observed how the Church in so many cases has refrained from making its witness in times and places of unpopularity and danger.

A North Carolina minister says that if it had not been for the interracial witness of the MSM when most of the rest of the Church was silent several years ago he probably would not be a minister now. But we have not reached enough such young men. Many in disillusionment have turned to other causes or given up in despair. More campus ministers are needed in order to make our witness more effective. The witness must be made wherever the way of freedom, dignity, and love is threatened.

During the year, as students conceived and initiated projects which involved Christian witness, they continued to search for what the mission of the Church really is. The MSM State Conference has as its theme "Our Unquenchable Quest: Love That Lives." The speaking talents of William Mallard of Emory University, the dramatic talents of Walter Hudgins of Greensboro College, the dedicated leadership of some 25 seminar leaders, and the organizing genius of several students combined to create the feeling expressed in F. W. Faber's hymn:

"For the love of God is broader Than the measure of man's mind And the heart of the Eternal Is most wonderfully kind."

An ecumenical witness was made by the participants, including student representatives from several denominations, a minister from the Evangelical United Brethern Church. Dean Robert Cushman of Duke Divinity School who spoke on the Vatican Council, and a grass-roots group of Roman Catholic laymen who presented the American Mass Program composed in the style of the Negro spiritual.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Edgar B. Fisher, N. C. Conference Secretary for Campus Ministry of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and many other dedicated laymen and ministers, thousands of dollars were raised to help send approximately one hundred students to the National Quadrennial Methodist Student Conference held in Lincoln, Nebraska, during the Christmas holidays. There, through fellowship with many others like them, our students were given a new vision of what it means to be in the middle of the mission of the Church in the twentieth century. They received a new glimpse of the power they have in government and politics and of the necessity that conscience control our actions.

At the spring Leadership Retreat for the MSM of North Carolina new officers gathered and received instructions for their tasks. Leaders were from the North Carolina Council of Churches, the campus ministry, the local pastorate, conference boards of Educations and Missions, and the overseas mission field.

Representatives from the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church have agreed to help the Interconference Commission in a study of our campus ministry in North Carolina. The initial part of the study, already under way in Chapel Hill will be limited to a few Wesley Foundations.

At Chapel Hill the long-awaited modern building to house the Wesley Foundation will be opened in the summer of 1965. This beautiful and spacious structure will include a chapel (with an organ donated by the Kresge Foundation), lounges, seminar rooms, a coffee shop, an art gallery, a library, a kitchen, guest rooms, and office space. Its design won the award for Methodist Student Centers at the National Methodist Student Conference in 1961.

Every school in the state has been invited to submit an estimate in the fall of 1965 concerning their needs five years hence and ten years hence, in order to enable the Interconference Commission to give a more realistic report to the commissions on World Service and Finance of the three Annual Conferences who supply our funds. Several Wesley Foundations and other groups already are engaged in this study. It is anticipated that the study will cover capital needs as well as program needs.

Developments taking place in the campus ministry in North Carolina include an added emphasis on securing and keeping qualified personnel to minister to students. A committee has been set up to explore training personnel, sabbatical leaves, and retirement.

We look with pleasure upon the fact that subscriptions to motive magazine in North Carolina have more than doubled during the past year. We commend our General Board of Education for producing this magazine of such high quality and for the pioneering way in which motive explores new ways of communicating the Gospel.

Much progress was made in this direction the past year.

One of the great experiences for the conference year was the work shop in Atlanta, Georgia for the North Carolina-Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida Conferences. We carried a bus of 30 men. Your conference Lay Leader served on the instructional staff. A Conference Wide Retreat was held in Greensboro where more than 200 men were in attendance. Stewardship and Methodist men's organizations were the feature areas. I have attended Districts Meetings of the Greensboro, Western, Winston, and Laurinburg Districts. I plan to visit the Virginia District during the month of May. I have organized one Methodist Men's Club, presented one charter, and delivered seven speeches.

Intensive plans are in process in all districts for a large representation at Purdue for the National Conference of Methodist Men. All indications point to the fact that our conference will be well represented.

Methodist Men's Organizations: We have 102 chartered Methodist Men's Clubs, but we still must stress to all that it is imperative that every club must renew its charter each year. Over half are in arrears.

Our aims for the coming conference year are continuous stress on sewardship Methodist Men's organizations, lay speaking, a closer working program with the North Carolina conference and Western North Carolina conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction's Board of Lay Activities. May I express my sincere thanks to all for having had the privilege of serving in this capacity and urge your prayers and efforts for the continuous growth of this noble work for the Christian development of men.

REPORT OF THE AREA DIRECTOR

To Bishop Golden and members of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference greetings.

In the few short months since I assumed the labors of this office, it has been the splendid cooperation that you, the District Superintendents, pastors and laymen of the Area, have given, that is most encouraging. I am grateful for your support and I solicit that support continuingly as together, we, through the direction of our Bishop, seek to institute and carry through a meaningful program on the Area level.

One of the concerns that has engaged our energy has been the publication of our bi-monthly Area paper, The Voice. We covet for this paper the continued good standing of a quality Methodist publication. We want it to serve our Area well. We ask you to share with us the newsworthy events in your Churches and on your districts, that we may share them with other persons and Churches of our Area.

We look upon The Voice as one of the promotional instruments of over Area, and we recommend it to all of our people. It is not, however, intended to be a digest of Methodist information. We commend to you the other publications of our Church: our Jurisdictional paper, The Central Christian Advocate and our general publications; Together and The Christian Advocate.

It has been our policy to provide all District Superintendents, pastors and lay leaders of our Conferences with complimentary copies of The Voice. Ordinarily, our subscription rate is \$1.00 per year. We trust increasingly pastors and laymen will desire to assume the cost of their individual subscriptions. This will help to underwrite our operating expenses and free us to make our publication available to a wider reading public. We trust that you will give this your thoughtful consideration.

A few weeks ago the leaders of this Conference, along with persons from the other two Conferences of the Area, met in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, in our Area Council. These leaders attempted to think through a program which we hope will meet with your approval. The recommendations coming out of the Council will be presented for your consideration during this session of the Conference. Among these recommendations are proposals to: (1) continue our Area Scholarship Fund to assist those young men of our Area who are studying for the ministry; (2) the establishment of a Freedom Relief Fund to assist those persons suffering from reprisals because of their involvement in the struggle for human dignity and freedom; (3) The sponsorship of certain Area lay and clerical training opportunities for the enrichment of our local Churches; and (4) the seeking of our Conferences to qualify for the new pension benefits provided by the General Board of Pensions. Your Conference leaders have given much thought to the merits of these programs and have passed them on to you. These kind of activities will be of great benefit to us as effective Methodist Conferences and will move us a long way toward the goals we hope ultimately to achieve.

Again let me thank you for the support you have given the Area program in the past, and may we together, ask God's blessing upon the labors of this ministry in which we are co-workers.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Bishop Golden, and members of the Annual Conference, it is with profound gratitude to our Loving Heavenly Father, that we submit this our first report of the new conference, in a new Quadrennian Program. "The Aim of Evangelism:

..... to bring all men into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Saviour and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit ... to gather them into the fellowship of the church."

This aim is summed up in the one central theme in the enunciative phrases "All Men!" This theme reveals the church's unforgettable historical awareness, as well as its chronicled conviction, that Methodism came into being as and in response to an inescapable mission. This is explicitly stated, or conscientiously presupposed, in every summons to heartly crusading action by the church and in every call to true faith by the church.

The church in the Mission of God. The church is in the first place, witness and evidence of what God has done, and the sign of that which He is doing and will yet do. By this alone the world is appraised of the historical event and its more than historical significance and issues.

Secondly, the Church is also the means through which God is carrying His purpose to effect. It is the body whose members are members of Christ, united with Him and at His disposal. Its life therefore, is both the extension of His earthly ministry and also a participation of His present and continuing work as risen Lord and Saviour.

It is thus of the very nature of the Church that it has a mission to the whole world. That mission is our participation in the work of God which takes place between the coming of Jesus to inaugurate God's Kingdom on earth, and His coming in glory to bring that Kingdom to its consummation. "Christ, the Hope of the World."

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD OF THE NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE, C. J.

JUNE 4, 1965 BENNETT COLLEGE, GREENSBORO, N. C.

Bishop Golden, Officers, Members, Delegates and friends of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

Serving unofficially, and recently officially as President of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service has been a challenge.

Newness and change have become a part of our everyday life. We are all affected by changes taking place in Church, in the home, in the community, and in society as a whole. Truly a New Age is upon us.

The Women of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild are ready and willing to answer the summons to take a creative part in the New Age!

A depth study of our 1964-1965 Program, "A New Program For A New Age", is being made to:

- 1. Clarify our role as women.
- To develop within ourselves the spiritual resources for the living of these days.
- 3. To evaluate our witness and service in these times.

We have tried to realize the above objectives through the following activities:

I. During the period between January 1964 and June 1966 we will observe the 25th Anniversary of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and The Wesleyan Service Guild. During this period Societies of all levels will remember the past, will evaluate the present activities, and will plan for the future.

We also will seek ways to make a more effective witness in the fulfillment of the Mission of Christ and His Church in the World: We believe we can do this if we truly give ourselves to "New Plans, New programs, New personnel, New dollars, and above all new committment of our lives to Jesus Christ and his mission, for us and all mankind."

II. On Saturday May 1, The Annual Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild Meeting of The North Carolina-Virginia Conference was held at St. Paul Methodist Church, Reidsville, N. C., Rev. Joseph Bethea, Host Pastor, challenged the several hundred women with a soil stirring message, using the theme: "One Witness, One World". Business consisted of reports by the five District Presidents, election of officers, and pledges for the 1965-1966 conference year. The pledges showed a total or over-all increase of 25%, however not every district increased its pledge 25%. We rejoiced to have reached this goal. Reports showed a slight increase in memberships, but this is the goal we must strive to meet. It is our hope that every local society will increase its membership by 25% or more before June 1966, Our study and action after study should be given prayerful consideration in every local church.

III. June 27th-July 2, 1965 The Dean-Chairman of The Conference School of Christian Mission, and other Conference Officers who will have responsibilities in the Conference School will attend The Southern Regional School of Christian Mission at Lake Junaluska, N. C. The Unified Theme is "Mission: The Christians Calling".

July 11-16, 1965 The North Carolina-Virginia Conference School of Christian Mission will be held at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C.

We urge every local Church to support its society and Guild in having women attend the School of Christian Mission. An able staff will help

the women to grow in understanding of the Mission of the Church, and the responsibilities of women for its fulfillment, who will help satisfy the quest for a deeper spiritual and educational experience, and provide training in leadership.

After twenty-five years of service on the home and foreign field, we will still hear far to often the question, "What is a Woman's Society of Christian Service?" The answer is simple in words and evidence can be seen in almost every local church. The Woman's Society is one arm of the Church through which women have additional opportunities to grow and develop as Christians and to share in the outreach of the church.

We would like to ask each pastor to take a look at his Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild in relation to the local Church. Is the President a participating member of the Quarterly Conference, and the Official Board of The Local Church? Does the society have representation on the four commissions, and other optional committees? We further beg you to give the women the opportunity to assume responsibilities, beyond Baby Contest, Church Suppers, etc., not that we wish to discontinue these, but we would like envolvement in the total program of the Church.

The Commission on Minimum Salary, after careful consideration of the challenge before us in the area of minimum ministerial support, submits the following recommendations:

I. That the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference initiate at the close of this session the following schedule for the establishment of a Minimum Salary Plan.

II. That the minimum salary will be increased \$100.00 each year at all levels until such time as further recommendations may be made by this commission.

III. That the maximum support to a claimant shall be \$300.00 per year with a yearly increase of \$100.00 up to the amount of \$500.00.

IV. That, with the exception of Student Pastors, only Pastors who are serving full time will be eligible for payments from the fund.

V. That no claimant shall continue to draw from the fund whose Charge does not pro-rate Ministerial Support.

V. That if any Charge has received maximum support for three years consecutively, the Commission shall request the District Superintendent to clarify the support.

VII. That, where possible, the Cabinet is urged to establish Circuits, group Charges, and consolidate Churches with the purpose of establishing a more effective ministry and greater ministerial support.

VIII. That, within thirty days (30) after the adjournment of this Conference, the District Superintendents shall present their askings to this Commission. Those accepted by this Commission shall be certified to the Conference Treasurer by the Chairman and Secretary which certification shall constitute the order for payments to be made to the designated ministers.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Bishop Golden, members and friends of the conference:

The people called Methodist have an overwhelming concern about social issues. I am happy to say that our board has no less concern.

BOARD MEETING

We met in a planning session October 31, in the Jackson Street Methodist Church, Lynchburg, Virginia, The Rev. James Pannell was the host Pastor. The Committees were organized and each committee planned a program in their respective area. The Rev. Joseph Haskins, gave the highlights of the Second Convocation on Christian Social Concerns.

ACTIVITIES

- 1. The Second National Conference on Christian Social Concerns. This conference was held October 8-14, The Marriott Twin Bridges Motel, Washington, D. C. The theme was, "The Mission of the Church in Social Change." The program featured, addresses by national leaders, presentations on election issues, job analysis workshops for conference and district leaders, and seminars on urgent issues with government officials. The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the conference board were in attendance at this meeting.
- 2. The Christian Convocation at Duke University. This meeting was held October 26-28. The members of our board in attendance were particularly interested in Dean Cushman, who addressed himself to the topic: "Import of the Second Vatican Council for Ecumenical Relations." And Dr. Samuel D. Proctor, who chose as his sermon topics: "A Christian Understanding of Justice." "A Christian Approach to Social Charge," and "A Christian View of History."
- 3. The Convocation on "Christianity Confronts Communism."
 This meeting was held March 1, in the Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, North Carolina. Sponsored by the N. C. Methodist Conference's Board of Christian Social Concerns. Three of our board members were present.
- 4. Southeastern Regional Conference on Christian Social Concerns. Your chairman participated in the planning session for this conference which was held in Dr. Trigg James' office, Atlanta, Ga. The conference will convene July 5-8, 1965, at Lake Junaluska.
- Work with other Organizations.
 Board of Christian Social Concerns of The North Carolina Conference (SEJ); and The Human Relations Committee, Christian Social Action Commission, North Carolina Council of Churches.

The joint study is, "Mission-The Christian's Calling."

Bishop Golden, words are inadequate to express our appreciation for your concern in Human Relations and World Peace. With the help of men like you who are loosing their lives for His sake, the church shall soon be open to whole family of God, "and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruninghooks: nations shall not lift up a sword against nations, neither shall they learn war any more. But they shall sit every man under his vine and under his fig tree; and none shall make them afraid."

AMENDMENT TO CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS REPORT

Let us be realistic for a short while. We are at war. We don't want war. No one here hates violence more than I, however, I feel as David felt: I San. 17:26, "Who is this uncircumcised Philistine, that he should defy the armies of the living God?"

Today our country would like a minimum of 4 minutes alert to try to ward off enemy attack and retaliate. Recently our country has been faced with countries that could launch an attack on the United States and devastate it in 10 seconds, which is less time than a countdown to launch a defense.

Now is not the time to criticize our President and Congress without first prayerful consideration. Patrick Henry once asked "if the price of peace was so sweet that it could be purchased by chains and slavery." Now is the time to let our leaders know that our country is together.

I therefore offer this alternate proposal:

That whereas the war in South Vietnam is getting more intense with no immediate victory in sight, in that this conflict is which North Vietnam, South Vietnam and the U. S. are heavily involved, and

Whereas all previous methods of settlement such as bombings and other forms of retalliatory actions have failed to change the attitude of the communists towards peaceful negotiations in Vietnam,

Be it resolved therefore that a delegation of this session of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference vigorously urge President Johnson and his Administration, our Senators and Representatives to continue to move toward a diplomatic settlement. There are no easy solutions to our involvement, but the following approach might help the Administration:

- That we as a conference will earnestly pray for divine guidance for our leaders.

- An internationally supported economic and social program of reconstruction and development to promote internal stability.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE,

CENTRAL JURISDICTION

Bishop Golden, and members of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference—Greetings on the Lord's Day. It is with a sense of humility that I come to you, by first giving honor to God from whom I have received the guidance to participate in the noble duties and worthy task that are set before the Board of Missions of this great and growing Conference. It too, was a pleasure to have made the acquaintance of the outstanding Bishop of this Conference, Bishop Charles F. Golden, one of the Sons of God. It was from such encounter that the Board of Missions of this Conference was given an inspiring statement of purpose which pointed the way toward the great ideas, ideals, concepts, and out reach into vast and never ending divine program of the Nature of Human Nature through the "One Witness in One World," the theme and emphasis for this Quadrenial Halmark of Methodism. Truly, the Bishop made the Board of Missions aware of its Commitment, aware of forward progress, and aware of the Missions in Missions of the Methodist Church.

The Story of Great Expectations: The Story of the Church is now being written by the door to door, city to city, region to region and seaboard to seaboard—Changes—which in future will be the superstructures of a regional America. To the Church, this change comes to us as the Capsule of Knowledge. Howard Thurman, in one of his late publications states that when knowledge comes, questions have to be answered, and answers demand depth reasoning, and reasoning seeking, strongly and boldly, the structure of revelation and then cognition will turn shallow worlds upside down, and the scattering social structures which have encountered change will then show their dust collected as before in periods gone by. With this sort of confrontation the church can no longer sit idly by, resting, in the rays of the sun displacing energy on a subject that is totally unaware, nor will it have the pleasure to find refuge, resting, in the tranquil eye of the Hurricane while turbulent winds, filled with divine calls to change, filled with divine and human challenges committed to a destiny far noble and more endearing than feeble minds of senseless mortals are able to scope. Let us be reminded that in change and in progress that there are not any great men, but there are great challenges that will by its nature spawn the Great men or make cowards of us all.

We have to get a sense of Missions at Home as well as in foreign cities. What are some of the factors confronted at Home for our concern? Some of the confrontations are the population explosion, the rapid urbanization with the changing inner cities, rural and urban redevelopment, mobility of our people, the changing industrial complex, the challenge for the minority groups and the threat of world wide Atomic Warfare,

The Church NOW is awakening to this mission at home. Mission USA has all the challenge and desperate need of the distant world field. National and World Missions—NOW must join hands within the framework of the home church. It is one task. We NOW must not run from responsibility mposed on us by challenging times—but we must welcome it. In conclusion, in all respects will be a bitter pill to take, but the bitterness is not from the Cross, but from a world that rejects the sweetness of the Divine, coming from the Prince of Peace.

Too long has the Church turned its head away from the technical, profound, aptitude of The Divine Maker of Things and All Things. For it was written, By Him all things were, and without Him was not anything made that was made. Therefore, let us come together at this great North Carolina-Virginia Conference and reason together, let us understand our history, and from that point-Let us begin. Every Church within a community must have, in that community, some form of Business or it has no business there. We find out that Philosophy and function as related to church structure is the way to say the same thing. We must set for ourselves stages upon which we are able to see the play of self evaluation. We must see the Church in its relationship, first in local Church Organization, we must know why we are doing what we are doing, only then will the eyes of many be open, then progress will come and relationship between the inclusive group be established. Bishop Golden and Conference we are appreciative of the experiences afforded to the members of the Board of Conference Missions that delegated them to attend National and Regional Meetings held in Miami Beach, Florida, and Atlanta, Georgia, and other parts of the Methodist Area. It was in such places as these Knowledges of the Vast Vistas of Methodism were discussed and related as to the empire we are building for the Kingdom of Christ.

The Board of Missions held its annual meeting at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, in October 1964. The District Superintendents, Conference Board of Missions Members and the representative from the Board of National Missions were present to share the business of the occasion. The Mission Aide Program was written for the year 1965-66. The National Board Representative was the most competent, Dr. J. H. Graham, Director of Section of Home Fields, Board of Missions. It is the pleasure of the Board to say that Dr. Graham was a very able Director and the Board enjoyed the meetings that included his fellowship.

There were adjustment and reductions made to some of the above items. The report therefore made allowances for such changes and refers corrections to National Board of Mission Letter—Home Missions, author of Letter J. II. Graham dated November 13, 1964.

The Board was vividly made aware, in the Bishop's Cabinet Meeting, of the pressing need of funds in the extention program for building the future productive church and the need of education in local charges and stations as the giving toward benevolence funds. However, we are in the process of restructuring this conference to be a great conference. As we reviewed our needs, one could not help knowing that there should be giant steps taken in this direction, for it is the right direction. The importance

of our full support of this endeavor fills many of the pages of the literature coming from our Church into our homes. These call our attention to:

- a. The steady migration of people from the rural to urban areas issuing in rapid growth of the city and increasing its problems.
- b. Meeting the needs of youth and the future Church.
- c. The education of Methodist to its purpose and philosophy of the "How" we should make proper adjustments and needed changes.
- d. The study involved in Church extension for this given area under boundaries of this Conference. The presentation of a fact finding report to this conference on the nature of our situation as it concerns this specific item.
- e. That Mission Aide should be wisely administered to churches that do not come under the mission of the New emphasis. The future sites for Churches should be made by graphic survey and detail research submitted to the National Board for scrutiny.

Preparations are underway for these proposals to be presented in a form and brief from committees that now have them under consideration, with the Conference Board of Missions. The Conference Board of Missions has functioned, actively through various meetings, seminars, and conferences within the North Carolina-Virginia Conference and then too, with district and Conference meetings, letters and seminars within the North Carolina and the Virginia Conference.

REPORT NO. II

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

Bishop Golden, Members and Friends of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference:

It is with honor and glory to God, and salutations to Bishop Golden—that I thank the members of this conference for the opportunity and the privilege given to me to serve as your conference Missionary Secretary. I would like to thank all District Superintendents and District Missionary Secretary. Secretaries and Local Commissions on Missions Chairmen who cooperated this year in a program of such vast greatness and of such divine importance. In spite of a very busy year the Conference Missionary Secretary attended several district conferences as the transition took place within this jurisdiction. It was an enlightening experience to attend the Regional Missions Conference in Miami Beach, Florida, for a short period in the month of October, 1964. The Parley between State and Conference delegates gave many ideas and the different points of view to this office and its prospective of what one can best do in service for the great North Carolina-Virginia Conference. The Conference Missionary Secretary has been helping the President of the Board of Missions set up the numerous meetings held in North Carolina.

Here again, we were utilized as the link between the Conference Board and various district outlets, which were supervised most effectively by the Dis-

trict Superintendents and District Missionary Secretaries.

It has been the aim of the Office of Conference Missionary Secretary to emphasize the importance of the Education of Church members to the "Spelled Out Program" of the Meaning of Missions. Here again, we find that the men are not serving in commission on Missions leadership because of the national myth, that this commission is only for the women. The Mission Program is trying very hard to push for an educational frontier in this phase of cultivation in Missions.

The president of the Board of Missions has now underway, a pilot project, which is certainly constructed to measure the effective growth of the Methodist Church or the lack of effective growth of the Methodist

Church in this Conference and the reasons for the Church Growth in local communities which are properly cultivated by Methodist education or those Churches in local communities which are not properly cultivated; thought provoking publicity and let us not forget the essential unit of power, "the well informed example of God"—the Methodist clergy.

It too, has been our practice each year to carry forth the aims and pur-poses of the district leaders, District Missionary Secretaries and Local Mission Chairmen with a dynamic function, presenting a great and glorious structure that the General Church affords in this capacity for Kingdom building through the Emphasis of this Quadrennium "One Witness and One World," Our task has involved the promulgation of our commitment to the office. We have asked that each office within the various levels of the local church to produce must effectively this year. Knowing the Motive of Missions, the classification and specificities of duties, prospectus for projects and local programing, the involvement in Workshops in the district areas or in the National Conference schools on Missions which are designated as or in the National Conference schools on Missions which are designated as Training Missions, with this emphasis, we have attempted to get the local church involved in the "New Explorations:" stemming from and moving toward the inclusive Church. We have encouraged the use of the vehicles that are of necessity to yield a great harvest, this harvest being, the participation of every local church connected with "a striving District to getherness" in completing the same task. We find that we are weak in the Audio-Visual department of supply and need and demand. The distribution of effective correspondence from District, Conference and National Levels suffers because most churches are not equipped with bulletin boards, Literature shelves or Church Libraries. In short, we find the lack of educational climate in the local church that would furnish the facilities to carry on the program of the Church. It is evident that most of our Churches have School of Missions, yet the education of the Congregation to the total outlook for all commissions and for the wast horizons of the Methodist Church through the local churches Commission Missions suffers greatly when the other vehicles, such as Mission Festival, Family Night, Mission Tours, Cultural Exchange with ethnic groups, Book Lectures, Missionary Visitor lecturers and Children Mission programs are not being effectively employed for the service of God and the enlightenment of Missions in the Methodist Church. We state here and now, the Methodist Church in our Conference needs the Extension of Purpose, of Aims, of Goals and of Outlook to people, then Churches in the hearts of men will build churches in the city of people. We pleasantly acknowledge the assignment of Dr. Harold S. Huff of the National Board acknowledge the assignment of Dr. Harold S. Hull of the National Board of Missions to the office of representative from the National Board of Missions to work with the North Carolina-Virginia Conference. He also will be the representative for the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference. Formerly, Dr. John H. Graham was with our Conference and because of the change, we wish the blessing of God be with him in the South Carolina Conference, which the works with them on their Mission Add Board and Carolina Conference, while he works with them on their Mission Aid Program.

The District Secretary used this period in the Conference to present a general view of procedures, outlook and demonstration of material which must be used in getting the Mission Program working on the District and within the local Church.

When one considers the meetings and fellowshin in its own local structure and the other communication from our district plus that addition from the Virginia Conference Churches this is the year of great progress.

The Conference President of the Board of Missions North Carolina-Virginia has enjoyed the fellowship from the Roanoke District, and the neighboring counties in that locality. There is definite oneness of purpose growing in that area. It would be a proper summary to say that due to the vast mileage between churches on the Virginia District, and due to the work load of the District Superintendent, the situation of "One Witness in One World" has taken shape and progress in the field of missions is a surging one toward the mountain of greatness.

REPORT OF THE INTER-JURISDICTIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE

NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE AUTHORITY and PURPOSE

This committee was duly appointed and authorized by the Organizational Session of this Conference in August of 1964. The Conference was acting by authority of Paragraph 1831 of the DISCIPLINE of the Methodist Church; this paragraph defines the administrative units which are requested to assist The General Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations to abolish The Central Jurisdiction. In addition the commission is to continue a program to promote interracial brotherhood through Christian love, and to achieve a more inclusive CHURCH.

The Main purposes of this Committee are to study, to discuss and to negotiate with the three conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction,

which our Conference overlaps, the possibilities of transfer and merger. (The three Conferences being: The North Carolina, The Virginia and The Western North Carolina, all SEJ.)

BACKGROUND

The Jurisdiction system was created in The Methodist Church at unification in 1929. The Plan of Union (The Uniting of three branches of Methodism to wit: The Methodist Episcopal Church. He Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Protestant Church) provided for six intermediate organizational units, i.e., 6 policy making and administrative structures between the General Conference and the Annual Conferences. These echelons are known as jurisdictions. Five of these are geographical or regional in character, One Jurisdictional—ours—the Central—is racial in character. As a racially segregated unit, it presently overlaps the Southeastern and the South Central Jurisdictions. At one time it (The Central Jurisdiction) overlapped all of the other five regional jurisdictions.

From the beginning of the Central Jurisdiction, Negroes in The Methodist Church have been concerned about its status as a racially segregated unit. They objected strongly to the Plan of Union by which it was created. In voting on the question of union 17 of 19 annual conferences under leadership of Negroes rejected the proposed united Church. Objections have been made since 1939, and THIS IS ANOTHER OBJECTION TODAY.

In the Episcopal Address of The Central Jurisdictional Conference of 1944 on this very site, Bennett College, the Bishops stated:

"We entered the work of the new Quadrenium in 1940 under a new arrangement in the New Church which had in it many forebodings and much uncertainty. It was an administrative arrangement against which a majority of us had voted . . . We hope in the near future our Methodism may become sufficiently Christian in character and maturity to find a more excellent way."

Since that time we, the members of the Central Jurisdiction, have worked to end this symbol of racialism in The Methodist Church. In 1948 The Central Jurisdictional Conference created a Commission to study this racial structure. The Commission was continued in 1952, 1956, 1960 and 1964. (At times this unit has been referred to as a Committee rather than a Commission, but each had about the same purpose.)

The reports and the findings of these groups are found in The Official Journals of the Central Jurisdictional Conferences as stated above.

In 1956 the General Conference enacted Amendment IX to The Constitution of The Methodist Church, and the amendment was duly adopted by the several Annual Conferences of The Church, This Amendment provides basically for two transfers from The Central Jurisdiction to the regional jurisdictions: (1) The transfer of a local church from one annual conference in which it is geographically located. (2) The transfer of an annual conference from one jurisdiction to another. To complete a transfer under one or two above the necessary vote must be obtained from the administrative units envolved.

The sole purpose of Amendment IX has been to provide a voluntary method to abolish the Central Jurisdiction, when and if the time is right in Christian love.

The General Conference of 1956 appointed a Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations, and this special Commission has been in existence since. The reports are found in The Daily Christian Advocates of The General Conference of 1960 and 1964. (These pages give a complete background on this subject.)

The General Conference in Session in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, received, considered and adopted THE REPORT and PLAN OF ACTION for THE ELIMINATION OF THE CENTRAL JURISDIC-

TION, subject to amendments as the record shows. Following are two recommendations that were adopted, among others:

"Recommendation 2: That each regional jurisdiction Conference urge any of its Annual Conferences which have not already done so, to study and when feasible to vote in favor of transfer to it of the Central Jurisdictional Annual Conferences lying within its boundaries."

"Recommendation 4: That each Jurisdiction act as promptly as details can be worked out and it is mutually agreeable, to merge Annual Conferences and in the process, establish a new Episcopal area or areas, and assign the Bishop who came from the Central Jurisdiction to an area."

The Central Jurisdictional Conference, meeting in Daytona Beach, Florida, on June 16-21, 1964, adopted the following Criteria for Annual Conference Transfer. (1) Agreement of the receiving regional Jurisdiction that all of its annual conferences shall be so constituted as to include all local Methodist Churches in a designated geographical area, regardless of the racial characteristics of the membership of the local churches.

(2) That the ministers transferring from the Central Jurisdiction to Regional Jurisdictions shall be guaranteed the same status, rights privileges and responsibilities under the same conditions as other ministers of those conferences.

(3) That the Annual Conferences of the receiving Regional Jurisdiction agree that opportunities for lay participation in the enjoyment of the benefits of all programs, activities, and institutions of those conferences shall be provided without regard to race or color.

The Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, meeting in Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, on July 8-12, 1964, adopted a resolution requesting its constituent conferences to vote in favor of inviting the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, lying within its boundaries, to transfer into the Southeastern Jurisdiction. At the time the resolution was adopted an appeal was taken to The Judicial Council of the Methodist Church to determine the following question (stated in lay terms): Does Jurisdictional Conference have the sole right to determine the boundaries of its Annual Conference? The matter is still pending before The Council.

This Conference last August adopted a "PLAN FOR THE MERGER OF THE NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA ANNUAL CONFERENCE WITH CONFERENCES OF THE SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION, for complete text see Journal of Organization Meeting of this Conference, pages 109-111.

This Committee divided itself into three Divisions as follows: North Carolina, Virginia and Western North Carolina. Each Division has had joint meetings with Regional Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. (Western N. C. 3; Virginia 2 and North Carolina 2.)

Each Division presented its interpretation of the problem of segregation in The Methodist Church by Jurisdiction and Annual Conferences. All discussions were frank, in a spirit of calmness, and an urgent desire to come to a common goal—An Inclusive Christian Brotherhood in an Administrative Unit.

From the meetings the following areas of cooperation were found:

- 1. Joint Committees from the North Carolina-Virginia, The North Carolina and The Western North Carolina Conferences supervises all student work in the State of North Carolina.
 - 2. Joint Managers of the North Carolina Pastor's School.
- 3. A Tri-Conference workshop under the Boards of Christian Social Concerns.
- Other activities as The Christian Worker's School, Annual and District Conferences of The Woman Society of Christian Service.

. Many activities on the local church levels were noted.

The above indicated that much more can be expected in the conference year and of course, where possible our units should take the lead.

In our discussions your committee was asked on several occasions: "Is it possible to transfer groups of local churches from the North Carolina-Virginia Conference to the three Regional Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, and thereby dissolve The North Carolina-Virginia?"

This has been suggested as a way by which the four conferences involved can solve the problem of transfer and merger in this "The Upper Region of The Southeastern Jurisdiction." This method would be cumbersome and time consuming with many votes of the local churches, the quarterly conferences and transfer of ministers and etc. However, your committee has not determined whether or not this method would be for the best interest of The Methodist Church, for the reason, other conferences of The Cenral Jurisdiction are not in the talking stage at this time.

From our study and discussions, the following are recommended:

- 1. That the Plan for The Merger of The North Carolina-Virginia Conference with conferences of The Southeastern Jurisdiction be continued as voted upon at the Organizational Meeting of This Annual Conference.
- 2. That this committee be authorized to continue its work which shall include discussions, negotiations and plans, if necessary, to transfer the North Carolina-Virginia Conference to the Regional Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction which it (N. C.-Va. Conference) overlap, by either provisions of Amendment IX.
- 3. That each administrative echelon of this conference is urged to establish new areas of cooperation with the conference which this conference overlaps.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

Bishop Golden and Members of the Conference, your committee on District Boundaries would like to make the following report:

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Be it resolved, that by authority of Paragraph 431.3 of The DISCI-PLINE Of The Methodist Church that the North Carolina-Virginia Conference shal have four (4) Districts.

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This Committee adopted the following portion of this report as a suggestion to assist the Resident Bishop in arranging the districts:

- 1. That the Virginia or Richmond District shall include all churches within the North Carolina-Virginia Conference that are in the geographical boundaries of the state of Virginia. The recommended names for the district are Virginia or Richmond. (Select one.)
- 2. That the Greensboro, Western, and Winston Districts as presently constituted, shall be reduced to two (2) districts which shall lie within the bounds of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Southerstern Jurisdiction. The recommended names for these two (2) districts are: Middle or Greensboro (Select one) and Western.

That the Middle or Greensboro district be composed of churches in the following counties:

Anson, Davidson, Davie, Forsyth, Guilford, Montgomery, Randolph, Rockingham, Stanley, Stokes, and Surry County (with the exception of Elkin).

- include all That the Western District shall Churches within the bounds of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference west of the western boundary line of the Middle or Greensboro District.
- That the present Laurinburg District shall include all churches within the North Carolina-Virginia Conference that lie within the present bounds of the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction save Campspring Church in Caswell County. The recommended name for this district is: Eastern District. (Will include parts of the present Greensboro District.)

Hamlet: This is a very valuable site. There is a rundown dwelling situated on it that does not afford any revenue.

Old Fort: Abandoned.

Franklin: Rundown building. No Church service.

North Wilkesboro: No Church service.

Dobson: No building. Walkertown.

Brown Property:

Charlottesville, Virginia: 68.46 acres; two houses, several outbuildings. Financial: At the last report, the trustee treasure was \$746.30.

Recommendations:

- 1. That Saint Peter's Church in Hamlet be granted permission to use the Hamlet property as a parking lot and that they may develop as much of it as they want for such purpose.
- 2. That a photostat copy of the deed of every church property be filed with the trustee board of the conference.

REPORT OF THE INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RELIGIOUS LIFE

It is our privilege to sponsor the Methodist Student Movement (MSM). This year the MSM has been in the middle of the mission of the Church. At a fall retreat attended by more than 90 students and their leaders from 20 or so colleges, challenging messages were brought by the Reverend David Swain, Minister to Students in Tokyo, Japan. He had shown that his call to preach was a call to prepare, and he had never stopped that preparation. He saw that the mission is basically the same, whether in Chapel Hill or Tokyo, and that the need to make a Christian witness is enormous in either place. In that spirit, this missionary on furlough stimulated our students.

The mission was not forgotten. Students kept searching for the proper time and place to apply their talents to serve Christ. Tutoring projects were explored; letters were written on social concerns, including capital punishment, and the Speaker-Ban Law.

Students in some 20 schools began to project themselves into the day by day and week by week tasks of teaching those who for so long have been the victims of oppression. To the amazement of many students, a child who received tutoring in mathematics improved his grades in reading and spelling and other subjects also almost immediately. The knowledge that somebody cares is what counts. Few of these projects are directly under the auspices of the MSM, and not nearly all of the teachers are consecrated Christians. Some of them are students who have very little to do with the Church because they have observed how the Church in so many cases has refrained from making its witness in times and places of unpopularity and danger.

A North Carolina minister says that if it had not been for the interracial witness or the MSM when most of the rest of the Church was silent several years ago, he probably would not be a minister now. But we have not reached enough such young men. Many in disillusionment have turned to other causes or given up in despair. More campus ministers are needed in order to make our witness more effective. The witness must be made wherever the way of freedom, dignity, and love is threatened.

During the year, as students conceived and initiated projects which involved Christian witness, they continued to search for what the mission of the Church really is. The MSM State Conference had as its theme "Our Unquenchable Quest: Love That Lives." The speaking talents of William Mallard of Emory University, the dramatic talents of Walter Hudgins of Greensboro College, the dedicated leadership of some 25 seminar leaders, and the organizing genius of several students combined to create the feeling expressed in F. W. Faber's hymn:

"For the love of God is broader Than the measure of man's mind, And the heart of the Eternal Is most wonderfully kind."

An ecumenical witness was made by the participants, including student representatives from several denominations, a minister from the Evangelical United Brethern Church, Dean Robert Cushman of Duke Divinity School who spoke on the Vatican Council, and a grass roots group of Roman Catholic laymen who presented the American Mass Program composed in the style of the Negro spiritual.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Edgar B. Fisher, N. C. Conference Secretary for Campus Ministry of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and many other dedicated laymen and ministers, thousands of dollars were raised to help send approximately one hundred students to the National Quadrennial Methodist Student Conference held in Lincoln, Nebraska, during the Christmas holidays. There, through felolwship with many others like them, our students were given a new vision of what it means to be in the middle of the mission of the Church in the twentieth century. They received a new glimpse of the power they have in government and politics and of the necessity that conscience control our actions.

At the spring Leadership Retreat for the MSM of North Carolina new officers gathered and received instructions for their tasks. Leaders were from the North Carolina Council of Churches, the campus ministry, the local pastorate, conference boards of Education and Missions, and the overseas mission field.

Representatives from the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church have agreed to help the Interconference Commission in a study of our campus ministry in North Carolina. The initial part of the study, already under way in Chapel Hill, will be limited to a few Wesley Foundations.

At Chapel Hill the long-awaited modern building to house the Wesley Foundation will be opened in the autumn of 1965. This beautiful and spacious structure will include a chapel (with an organ donated by the Kresge Foundation), lounges, seminar rooms, a coffee shop, an art gallery, a library, a kitchen, guest rooms, and office space. Its design won the

award for Methodist Student Centers at the National Methodist Student Conference in 1961.

Every school in the state has been invited to submit an estimate in the fall of 1965 concerning their needs five years hence and ten years hence, in order to enable the Interconference Commission to give a more realistic report to the commissions on World Service and Finance of the three Annual Conferences who supply our funds. Several Wesley Foundations and other groups already are engaged in this study. It is anticipated that the study will cover capital needs as well as program needs.

Developments taking place in the campus ministry in North Carolina include an added emphasis on securing and keeping qualified personnel to minister to students. A committee has been set up to explore training personnel, sabbatical leaves, and retirement.

We look with pleasure upon the fact that subscriptions to Motive Magazine in North Carolina have more than doubled during the past year. We commend our General Board of Education for producing this magazine of such high quality and for the pioneering way in which Motive explores new ways of communicating the Gospel.

THE INTER-BOAD COUNCIL

Recommends the following:

 - A. To co-ordinate, schedule, and send out notices of meetings for boards and agencies of the conference and to compile the reports and make copies available to all the members of the Conference.
- That the operating expense of the Inter-Board Council be drawn up by the chairman and presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 4. That the District Superintendents be requested to organize a General Cabinet in every district.

 - C. In co-operation with the Inter-Board Council, to seek ways and means to assist the local churches in all phases of the Quadrenniel Program.
- 6. That the personnel for the General Cabinet include the following district workers:
 - A. Missionary Secretary
 - B. Director of Stewardship
 - C. Lay Leader
 - D. President of the WSCS
 - E. Secretary of Evangelism
 - F. President of the Methodist Youth Fellowship
 - G. Director of General Church School Work
 - H. Director of Christian Social Concerns
 - I. Director of Publishing Interests
 - J. Director of Christian Vocations.
- 7. That the District Superintendents be requested to have during the conference year a World Service, and Conference and General Benevolence Workshop, and that the following persons be invited as resource persons for the workshop:
 - A. A Staff Representative from The General Commission on Promotions and Cultivation
 - B. Conference Chairman of World Service and Finance
 - C. Conference Executive Secretary
 - D. Chairman of the Inter-Board Council
 - E. Conference Missionary Secretary
 - F. As many additional Conference leaders as needed.

REPORT OF BOAD OF PENSIONS, 1965

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE

June 3, 1965

Bishop Golden, Members of the Conference (Both Ministerial and Lay), Honored Guest:

The first word of this report to the first session of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference must be one of gratitude, gratitude to God who has brought us to this day and hour in our lives. This is a day of challenge as well as blessing. Here we have an opportunity to gather up the best of the heritage which comes to us from four Annual Conferences—Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington and join them together to form a great Conference to face the new days before us.

This word must be followed by one of appreciation for Bishop Golden who is our leader in this new enterprise. We are coming to recognize him as a courageous leader, a wise counselor, and a Christian brother. We look forward to many pleasant moments of working with you and Mrs. Golden in this new Area and Conference.

This word of appreciation must be followed by other words of appreciation. One is for our comrades "who walk with us no more." We would bow in reverence as we think of those whom we remember and honor in the Memorial Service. The results of their labours are vital among us still and any plans we make in the future will be in part theirs. Blessed be their memories. Another is for our brethren in the ministry who after many years of noble and successful Christian service are asking for the retired relationship at this session of the Annual Conference. To those who have retired, their wives, and the widows of the Conference we express our gratitude for their fortitude in service. Their presence at this Conference and the remembrance of their past services, joyfully given in season and out of season, are a benediction to each of us. We further express our appreciation to those who are coming into our Conference this year. We need many more. There was a time when we were led to believe that lack of finances was the deterrent factor for persons coming into the ministry. Then came such enterprises as the Peace Corp, Job Corp, East Harlem Parish, Shepherds of the street, and other enterprises which have a financial enumeration below that offered in many parishes. A further examination of the factors have revealed that the apparent insincerity of the "saints" is the most deterrent factor. When our prospective ministers, see how the "saints" respond to the challenge of their present ministers, many seek other areas of service where their talents are to be more appreciated.

This report attempts to approach the Composite Report from a point of view different from that of the past. It is our hope to examine some of the current problems and by their examination stimulate whatever Boards, Agencies, Commissions, or Committees responsible for their consideration to give them serious thought and bring forth concrete suggestions as to how our Annual Conference may attack these problems.

A curious debate is going on about the success or failure of the local church. Churches have never lacked their critics, but in recent years the ranks have been swelling. Joining in are uninformed outsiders and keen laymen, conscientious pastors, concerned social scientists and responsible

theologians. Disturbing questions are being asked about the real state of the church. Critics would have us believe that what William Watson wrote in the poem, "The Church Today," comes perilously close to depicting the current state of affairs:

Outwardly splendid, as of old, Inwardly sparkless, void and cold Her face and fire all spent and gone, Like the dead moon, she still shines on.

These dominant criticisms of our churches have emerged from the current debate. (1) Churches do not seem to know what they are or what is their intended mission in the world. (2) Churches are virtually paralyzed by a crippling "organizational Sclerosis" and introversion. Organizational paralysis and stereotyped methods may be threatening the future of our churches and their outreach. (3) Congregations—the great source of potent witness and ministry in the world—remain largely frozen and immobilized. Time does not permit a detailed examination of these criticisms at this time. Admitting that they are valid, what can be done about them?

There are two general principles which must be observed: In the first place, what the church is determines what it does. The purpose of the ministry of the church is not merely to devise programs to which people come, but to help God's people to do their job in the world. In the second place, what the church is determines where it will go in the world. Like a physician it will go where sick people are. The purpose of the church is penetration in this world, not isolation from it. Fear of contamination from the world must be replaced by confidence in the Saviour who said, "Go ye into all the world." Separation from the world, an explicit teaching in the Scripture, is not to be equated with isolation from people in the world.

Underlying all that we may say about the future of the church is an understanding of the role of the laymen (both male and female). Too many laymen have the concept of their position as that of helping the minister do his work of the ministry. This is a far cry from the teaching of the Scriptures and the conviction of the Reformers. Martin Luther emphasized the ministry of all the people of God. "Every shoemaker can be a priest of God, and stick to his own last while he does it." Whoever, Wherever, we are, if we are believers, we are ministers of God. There are too many of us who view the doctrine of the priesthood of believers as referring only to the believer's right to approach God in prayer and worship apart from a human intermeditary. Few of us reflect upon the dimension of service and ministry which is the responsibility of every believer. Nothing short of a dedicated resurgence of the role of the layman will do if we are to have a true church filled with vitality. Dr. Merril C. Tenney writing in Christianity Today expresses a deep-seated conviction which must also become our conviction. "The impact of Christianity upon the secular mind in the next decade will be largely determined by the spiritual conviction of the laity. The acceptance or refusal of individual missionary responsibility may be the crucial factor in the perpetuation of a vital Christian Faith."

Obviously the implications of this to our church program are many. If the layman is to play a more active part, pastors will have to devote more time to mobilizing the congregation, instructing small groups, and developing effective leadership among the laity. Every member will have to be taught that to be a Christian means to assume some specific role in the church wherein his spiritual gifts may be exercised for the good of the body of Christ. While some may fear this "headless monster" emerging from this conception of the church, we need to recognize that we are on the threshold of a new understanding regarding the role of pastor and people.

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE. Financing in a local church is not materially but spiritually undergirded. In light of this, our stewardship program should not place an overemphasis on Stewardship of possessions at the expense of Stewardship of Time and Talent. Our total program of

the church must be rooted in a spiritual climate in which the whole person gives his all toward the developing kingdom of God.

In every local church we have emphasized the Discinlinary financial system. However, churches are encounting difficulty in setting up a budget and conducting an Every-Member Visitation due to the fact that the Conference budget does not allow for advanced planning. The way our financial system operates there is no adequate way to determine the subscriptions to the Conference budget at the fourth quarterly conference as should be. In order for the Superintendent to know the acceptance of the local for the next conference year and to be able to contact churches until his acceptance is reached, it will be necessary for the conference budget to be set a year in advance. This could be accomplished by the COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE setting the budget for a two (2) year period at a given time, and thereafter the budget would be a year in advance. This would make possible the setting of the budget of a local church in the fall of the year and the conducting of the Every-Member Visitation which could be completed by spring. The District Superintendent would be able to know the acceptance of the Conference budget and the local church would be ready to work immediately after conference.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD. The reorganization of the Board of Missions has also effected the Woman's work in the church. No longer are we operating a separate program in the local church. The Mission program is one. The School of Missions of the Society is now developing the mission program of the church. Toward this end we urge that men attend the School of Missions. Certainly the District Secretary of Missions should attend. We call attention to the fact that the Secretary of Children's work and Youth Work of the Society are now an intregal part of the educational program of the local church through the Commission of Education.

UNITED NATIONS

This is the 20th year of the United Nations. This year has been designated by the United Nations General Assembly as International Cooperation Year (ICY). It is imperative that our people know what has been done by the UN in keeping down many conflicts which would have arisen had the organization not been in effect. They should know of the many other functions of the UN; such as UNICEF. The Methodist Story for June, 1965, will be helpful here.

CHURCH AND STATE

The discussion of the Separation of Church and State has long past needed review. In the beginning of our country the defining of areas of the State and Church was not for the purpose of separation, but to keep the State from limiting religious freedom by establishing a State Church. No religious body was to receive the favor of the government at the expense of another religious body. If there is any reason today to believe that any segment of the church is being favored, the approach is not to separate government from all religious support. It is to enter a cooperative enterprise that this support may be controlled. The anti-poverty program is being hampered by POAU because it insists on separation of Church and State in all areas. This is a ridiculous stand to take in an age when the government has the responsibility of the welfare of all its people at stake. Their argument is that the program is undermining separation of Church and State by providing public funds by providing subsidy for anti-poverty programs in church schools.

It is our opinion that the church can assist the government in this program. We urge our churches to enter this field of service when they qualify, It may be that we will need to group ourselves and establish a "store-front church" that will reach the people.

"THE INNOCENT ENEMY" - POPULATION EXPLOSION

A worldwide calamity is shaping up around the tangle of human passions, ethical concepts and economic realities lumped together in the term, "The Population Problem." The calamity is being called an explosion—which is what happens when a force that becomes too great to be contained in a given space lets go. The given space is the useful area of the planet earth. The force that is building is the economic, physical, geopolitical pressure of human beings who are assuming that the command to "be fruitful and multiply" is as needful now as at the dawn of history.

World population figures do not encourage complacency. One scientist estimates that there may have been 10 million human beings in the early stone age. By the beginning of the Christian era there were perhaps 350 million people on the earth. The number was roughly constant, with fluctuations, for nearly 2,000 years. It reached 500 million early in the 18th century and by 1940 was 2.5 billion—a five-fold increase in just 200 years. It is now 3.2 billion, up 28% in 23 years and is expected to double again in 35 years.

At the close of each day there are nearly 100,000 more people than at the end of the day preceding. A few more centuries at this rate, and there will be standing room only on the inhabitable portions of the earth. The innocent lives we are bringing into the world literally carry the seeds of distruction.

INTERBOARD COUNCIL

We are in the active phase of the Quadrennial Program. According to the plan the statistical part is over; now is the time for action. However, we may have to carry both phases for while as many of our churches are behind in the timetable of the Program.

In this action stage we endorse the program but forth by Bishop Golden in "Voice," It was our hope to present some examples of how we have implemented this program thus far. However, in order that none may be left out, we have not listed in detail our actions. Some of them will be apparent in the appointments.

The Interboard Council may act as a clearing house for a project of conference interest. A project may be designated by the Conference in which the various Boards, Agencies, Commissions may give their specialty. For example: The N-1 program may have a church extension emphasis which would be the primary concern of the Board of Missions. We may choose a project in which the whole conference makes available its total resources for increase in membership or church attendance through Evangelism. An outpost Sunday School may be established in connection with a church extension project for a future church through Education. It may be that we desire to cross jurisdictional lines in an N-1 program. Here we may use the resources of WSCS and Board of Lay Activities as well as the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

BICENTENNIAL

The General Conference of 1960 and 1964 decided that 1966 is the best date to cite the beginnings of Methodism and so ordered a general celebration in 1966. We urge the observance of this Bicentennial in our Conference. We suggest that January 2, 1966, be set aside in each church as Methodist Heritage Sunday, and that a sermon be preached along this line in every church. We further suggest that each district choose the oldest local church within its bounds and have a district celebration at that church. If possible we may also join in with churches across jurisdictional lines as we celebrate together at some historic site of which we have a common interest. Our Annual Conference should set apart a time in its 1966 session for an address, sermon, drama or some other appropriate means of bringing the celebration to the attention of what has been called "the lessic body of Methodism."

ALCOHOL EDUCATION

At least 62 out of every 100 American adults use alcoholic beverages. They spend annually 2½ times as much on these drinks as the total population spends on religious and welfare activities. 24,000 persons will be killed this year by drunk drivers. Many people are turning to drink as a means of relieving the tension of this age of speed and frustration. It is the responsibility of the church to keep before the world the dangers of drinking; to provide a program for the alcoholic; to be deeply concerned with the problem of the college student who is faced with the need for counsel in this field.

Lay Speaking: We need to be mindful of the goal of the Lay Speaking program of the church. It is not a means of conferring honor upon a member of a local church. The main purpose of the Lay Speaking program is to provide the District Superintendent with properly trained and dedicated persons to fill vacant pulpits temporarily. The Lay Speaker is not a preacher; he is a layman who has been set apart to do a specific task under the Superintendent. Let us follow the procedure for certification of Lay Speakers and use them wisely.

We would not forget to mention the ministry to the aged, the handicapped, and others who need the church. Each Board and Agency which is charged with responsibility should function in these areas.

WHAT MAKES A CHURCH GREAT?

Not soft seats and subdued light, but strong, courageous leadership past and future. Not the sweet tones of the organ, but sweet personalities that somehow reflects Jesus.

Not the tall towers with the chimes and bell, but a lofty vision of its people. Not a budget, but big hearts in big people who love and serve.

Not the amount of money received, but the amount of service rendered in Jesus' name. Not a large membership, but God's presence and direction and power,

Not what it has done in the past, but what it is doing now and will do tomorrow.

REPORT OF THE TELEVISION, RADIO FILM COMMISSION

Bishop Golden, Members and Friends of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference:

The Television, Radio and Film Commission would like to submit the following report:

Working Policy and Practice for Radio and Television Programming

The church is the body of Christ—spiritually divine, institutionally human. Its purpose is to be the channel through which God's love is made known to the world. The church communicates God's love through service and witness.

Today, the percentage of the world's people who are Christian is diminishing in spite of technological advances which enable Christian to communicate God's love to increasing numbers of persons. The population explosion is creating more and more who are unaware of Jesus Christ.

In the United States, over 90% of the homes have television and over 99% have radios. Both media are a part of the lives of most Americans. The transistor has taken radio everywhere. These are the media of the people. Here is an opportunity to communicate God's love in the world to many who know it not.

What is the nature of radio and television?

When using the broadcast media, there are several characteristics which must be recognized:

- Basically radio and television are entertainment media. Viewers and listeners come to them primarily for entertainment and in a secondary way for information.
- Radio and television are commercial and thereby may be expected to see the world through the eyes of persons with large financial investments and commitments.
- Stations are licensed by the government of the people and are charged to operate in the "public interest, convenience and necessity."
- 4. Radio and television reach across religious, cultural and economic lines to large audiences of varied backgrounds, interests and beliefs.

The uses the Church can make of radio and television include:

- Inspiration: A pastor or a local church cannot enter the lives of each member of the congregation every day. A legitimate use of the media is the broadcast of programs of inspiration for both the involved and the non-involved.
- Confrontation: Radio and television programs can present issues of a moral, ethical and spiritual nature which point up areas of conflict and force or lead the listener or viewer to make a personal decision.
- Education: Programs can be designed to teach, to help the individual grow step by step toward a more meaningful faith. However, these programs often may be aimed at selected audiences.
- Information: Radio and television can be used to inform the public about the Church's program of service or its position on moral, ethical and spiritual questions.

Each of these uses of radio and television is a kind of witness—the church fulfilling its role as channel or communicator of God's love and creating opportunities for Christians to witness to their faith.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS DURING THE CONFERENCE YEAR:

- Attended the National Communication Consultation at the Statler-Hilton Hotel, New York, December 15-17.
- 2. Presented the Program and the needs of TRAFCO to the Greensboro and Winston Districts,

WEAKNESSES:

In reviewing the financial statement from the Council on World Service and Finance we found that the North Carolina-Virginia Conference had not reported anything for TRAFCO.

We feel that there should be a person in each local church designated to keep the church informed of the program and needs of TRAFCO.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- We recommend that the Cabinet select a day to be known as the Television Ministry Fund Sunday, and that each local church will receive an offering which will be sent directly to the treasurer.
- 2. We recommend that the District Superintendents encourage the ministers of their district to support the program of TRAFCO.
- 3. We recommend that the ministers appear on Radio and Television programs as often as possible with a meaningful message. And, that each minister keep his congregation informed of programs on Radio and Television sponsored and co-sponsored by TRAFCO, in their area.

EDUCATION AND PROMOTION

- That adequate preparation be made for the New Curriculum for Methodist Adults in the local church through training of selected persons in the Area as a team.
- That the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the Central Jurisdiction support and participate in regional training opportunities.

Lake Junaluska is suggested for the graduate level. Morristown College and Bennett College in the Upper Southeastern Region are suggested for beginners on conference, district, and local church staffs. Educational institutes should be stimulated and continued through

Inter-Conference and Inter-Jurisdictional operations,

That the N-1 Program be utilized as a leadership training opportunity on the local church level.

- That in cooperation with NAFOMM, and intensive study and evaluation of the effectiveness of Church Music Institutes be engaged in on the Conference, district and local church levels,
- 5. That each Annual Conference secure a full-time executive secretary.
- That a responsible relationship be maintained between the executive secretary and the cabinet which gives gress to an effectual program of the Conference Board of Education.
- 7. That there be consultation between the executive secretary and individual district superintendents prior to, throughout, and following up any promotion of educational work on the respective districts.
- That the Committee on Christian Vocations be utilized for the recruitment and encouragement of prospective full-time Christian Workers; especially youth in the High Schools.
- 9. That the significance of Special Days be poignantly recognized. The congregation should be made aware of a Special Day soon before its recognition and celebration. The Purpose and meaning of a Special Day should be emphasized on such day, and an offering taken as directed by the Discipline.
- 10. That the existing regulations of the Methodist Student Loan Fund be enforced.
- 11. That a sufficient effort be made to reach (in the immediate future) the General Church goal of \$1.50 per person for support of Higher Education Institutions, and \$.50 per person in support of Weslev Foundations.

III. ADDENDA TO EDUCATION AND PROMOTION REPORT

The concept of the Church School, which finds its essence to be the church's planned program of Christian Education, includes the Sunday School, the Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship, weekday activities, and home and extension service. Therefore, the appellations, "Church School: and Sunday School," are not synonymous.

The functions of the W.S.C.S. former officers, Secretary of Children's Work and Secretary of Youth Work, are continued by transfer into the total educational program of the church. Therefore, these functions have not been discontinued.

D. The fund will be administered in this way:

All requests should go to the area office. Such requests should be approved by each conference chairman of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, Confirmed by the Bishop and issued by the Area Treasurer. In case of clear urgency the Bishop should act for the Administering committee.

The fund will be reviewed by the Christian Social Concerns Group

at each Area Council.

The uses of the Fund should be included in the Report of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.

The issue of the inclusive church and merger of the Central Jurisdiction and the other Geographical Jurisdiction.

A. To urge local churches to study the following items as they consider transferring into the southeastern Conferences:

1. Consideration shall be given to the relative advantage of a group of churches . . . in the particular Geographical Area transferring rather

than a single Church in that area.

Definite agreements shall be concluded with the receiving Conference Regarding the future Conference Status of the Minister or Ministers of the Transferring church. This should include both Conference relationship and intineracy.

3. Determination shall be made of the responsibilities (appointments, minimum salary, etc.) of the transferring church once it has be-

come a member of the receiving Annual Conference.

4. Definite agreements shall be concluded with the receiving Conference insuring that opportunities for ministerial and lay participation in and enjoyment of the benefits of its programs, activities, and institutions shall not be restricted on account of Race or color. This includes

being on boards and agencies of the Conferences, and the use of Conference institutions such as hospitals, homes, camps, and colleges.

B. Each annual Conference is asked to study, adopt and understand the following resolutions. Each conference board of Christian Social Concerns and Interconference Board will seek to advance such a pain of merger.

PLAN FOR THE MERGER OF THEANNUAL

CONFERAENCE WITH THE SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION

WHEREAS, it is the avowed policy of the Methodist Church to effect ultimately the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction as one step toward achieving a truly inclusive Methodist Church, and

WHERAS, the Central Jurisdiction Conference and its constituent Annual Conference are committed to the elimination of all forms of racial segregation and discrimination in the Methodist Church, including elimination (within a frame work of overall planning of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction itself;

BE IT RESOLVED, Therefore, as follows:

- 1. The ______Annual Conference, by the adoption of this plan for merger of the ______Conference with the Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction (hereafter called "The Plan"), and in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of the Methodist Church, hereby votes to transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to the Southeastern Jurisdiction.
- 2. Each of the other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction by the adoption of the Plan, and in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of the Methodist Church shall be deemed to have approved

the transfers to the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

3. Each Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction by the adoption of the Plan, and in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of the Methodist Church shall be deemed to have approved the trans-

fer of the _____Conference from the Central Jurisdiction to Southeastern Jurisdiction.

- 4. Each Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction by the adoption of the Plan shall be deemed to have accepted into its membership, upon the effective date of the plan, the following persons:
- A. All ministerial members (whether on trial or in full connection) of the

_____Annual Conference who are then appointed to churches of the located geographically within its boundaries.

- B. All ministerial members of the Annual Conference (whether on trial or in full connection) under special appointment who then hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically within its boundaries.
- C. All retired members of the Annual Conference who hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically with its boundaries.

All persons who shall become members of any Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction under subparagraphs 'A,' 'B,' 'C,' above shall have all the rights (especially with respect to pensions and minimum salaries), privileges, and obligations of the other members of the Annual Conference.

5. The Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the

adoption of the Plan, shall be deemed to have agreed that opportunities for lay participation in and enjoyment of the benefits of all their programs, activities, and institutions shall be provided without regard to race or color.

6. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan, shall be deemed to have agreed to determine the boundaries of its Annual Conference in such manner as to include each

cated geographically. Upon the effective date of the Plan, the... Annual Conference shall be discontinued as a separate entity of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

7. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by adoption of this Plan, shall be deemed to have requested the Council of Bishops to transfer to the Southeastern Jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision the bishop of the Central Jurisdiction assigned to

the—Annual Conference at the time of transfer. The Secretary of the Jurisdictional Conference shall immediately transmit the request of the Council Bishops.

- 8. The Plan shall become effective upon its adoption by the required votes of each of the parties thereto, to-wit:
 - A. The Annual Conference.
 - B. The other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction.
 - C. The Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.
 - D. The Central Jurisdictional Conference.
 - E. The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.
- 9. The Secretary of each Annual Conference shall certify immediately the vote on the Plan to the College of Bishops of its Jurisdiction in accordance with Amendment IX of the Constitution of the Methodist Church so that prompt tabulation of all votes and announcements of the results thereof may be made.

LET US TAKE THE OFFENSIVE

- 1. Organize an inter-racial Council of Methodists in each city and town (p. 1813).
- 2. Survey every Methodist institution and see that they are serving all the public without regard to race.
- Invite our brethren of the Southeastern Jurisdiction to our Churches, our camps, work shops, schools of missions, Youth meetings, Board meetings and Conferences.
- Let each Pastor engage a pastor of the Southeastern Jurisdiction in creative and Genuine conversation. Let each District Superintendent do likewise.
- 5. Let each local church begin a seriously Christian Relationship with a congregation of the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

Let the bishop, Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns, District Superintendents, Pastors, Lay Leaders and all Conference officers help our area take the offensive. At first, most of our Southeastern Jurisdiction friends will not like this, indeed many will fear us, but some Christians must take the initiative in order to obey Jesus injunction that we all be one. We can not criticize our white brethren if we, ourselves, will not bear the cross of obedience.

WE URGE EACH CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS TO ADOPT AND IMPLEMENT THE FOLLOWING GUIDE LINES:

1. Organize according to the Discipline (p. 1545-49).

Employ on a volunteer or part-time basis a conference secretary of Christian Social Concerns.

- Study and implement the Commission of inter-Jurisdictional Relations (Para. 1813).
- Develop a conference program of Christian Social Concerns which will make the gospel more relevant to the concrete socio-economic and political issues of our day.
- 5. Each year send a report on conditions, progress, and recommendations to the Commission.
- 6. Ask each official Board and local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns to study diligently the Guidelines for the transfer of the local Church into the Southeastern Jurisdiction Annual Conference.

THE MINISTRY

Whereas our church requires for a trained ministry and, Whereas we are not admitting into our Annual Conferences sufficient ministers to replace those we loose through retirement and death.

Whereas there is a desperate need for ministerial recruitment in all conferences in this area, and, Whereas there are deserving ministerial candidates who find it impossible to continue their ministerial Education without some financial assistance.

Whereas there is a great need for a more adequate and comfortable salary for the ministers of this area.

We therefore submit the following recommendations for your consideration:

- 1. We recommend that the Area Scholarship Program be continued.
- 2. We recommend that the Specific Policy Guidelines be developed by the Area Scholarship Committee for adequate administration of scholarship. We further recommend that the policy guidelines be made available to the Chairman of the Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and the District Superintendents.
- 3. We recommend the amount of Seven (\$7,000) Thousand Dollars for the Area Scholarship fund annually. This amount to be apportioned to the Annual Conferences in according with the percentage scale developed for the Area.
- 4. We recommend that the Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and the Commissions on Christian Vocations make effective the work of recruitment in each annual conference.
- 5. We recommend that each Annual Conference adopt a Financial Program which provide an adequate salary and comfortable support for the ministers and their families.
- 6. We prayerfully request our resident Bishop and the Cabinets of the Area in accordance with the areas ten-point Program to re-align charges to make the ministry of the church more effective.
- 7. We recommend that each pastoral Relations Committee in this area be requested to re-examine with the minister its budget for ministerial support, housing, travel, and other expenses related to his duties, and make

provisions for Financial assistance for his attendance at such schools or institutes as may serve his intellectual and spiritual growth, and to recommend to the Commission or Commissions on Stewardship and Finance and to the Official Board or Boards a budget sufficient to cover the same. We further recommend that the District Superintendents make this request in the first Quarterly Conference after the approaching Annual Conference Session and to do all in his power to effect this Program.

8. We recommend that the Boards of Pensions provide adequate protection for their ministers by

(a) adopting the Death benefit Program for the ministers

(b) present a plan to the 1965 session of the Annual Conferences which will qualify our retired ministers, their widows and orphans for the thirty-five (\$35.00) dollars annuity program to be effective by July 1, 1965.

(c) Study the reserve Pension Fund and make specific plans for entering the Program not later than General Conference in 1968.

- 9. We further recommend that since the Jurisdictional Conference Course of Study School is yet a new and united venture, that our representatives on the Board of Managers, under our representative on the executive Committee will assess and evaluate the effectiveness and availability of said school on the basis of this evaluation reach a decision on or before October 30, 1965; whether we should continue to participate in this venture or consider such said School along an Area line.
- 10. We recommend that a Committee be formed consisting of the Chairmen of the Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the Registrars, the Chairmen of the Boards of Education and the Executive Secretaries to study the need and desire relative to ministerial retreats and Graduate Pastors retreats and to report its findings to the 1966 Annual Conference Session. This Committee shall meet the same day and place as the representative of the Board of Managers.

THE LAITY

Bishop Golden, Members of the Area Council: The work group representing the Laity met under the direction of Brother C. M. Winchester, and discussed various areas of Lay Activities including: Christian Stewardship, Every Member Visitation, Methodist Men, workshops, retreats, and Lay Speaking.

We, the committee on Lay activities make the following recommendations: Be it resolved that we consider Christian Stewardship, as one of the most important areas that should be emphasized.

God is the owner of all things, Man is a steward. God's ownership and man's stewardship ought to be acknowledged.

Stewardship is the practical expression of one's experience of God. Therefore, all one's life, all personal abilities, and all material resources constitute a gift from God, which should be used for His glory and for the welfare of mankind. This is central in the Christian faith and should control and direct all one's being.

Stewardship involves both motives and methods in the utilization of time and talent. It also governs motives and methods in the investment and expenditure of one's total material gained.

We as a group recommend the following:

1. A Spiritual Rededication

2. Proper Leaderships

3. We stressed the importance of the Secretary of Stewardship being

a dedicated person.

- We further recommend that emphasis should be put forth to capture and use all the various talents in the Church.
- The training of young people to dedicate themselves early in life to work in the Christian Church.

Every Member Visitation:

We recommend that there shall be an Annual Every Member Visitation. Pr. 267 S.1.

We further recommend that every member participating in the every member visitation program be properly trained.

Methodist Men:

We recommend that there be at least one Chartered Methodist Men Organization on each charge, and that each club engage in some special project.

We further recommend that charters be renewed Annually.

Workshops:

We recommend that at least one workshop or retreat be held on the district level Annually and that its program include all phases of Lay Activities.

Lay Speaking:

We recommend that the Church promote the program of Lay Speaking.

MINISTERIAL SUPPORT

- I. We recommend that each of the Annual Conferences of the Nashville-Carolina Area make every effort to have sufficient funds on hand at the close of the 1965 Conference session to qualify for maximum assistance from the Temporary General Aid fund to lift the Conference Annuity rate to \$35.00 for 1965-66. These \$35.00 payments should begin with the new conference year.
- II. We recommend that each Annual Conference include in its 1965-66 budget an amount at least equivalent to the amount needed to qualify for 1965.
- III. We recommend that the Death Benefit Program (Plan B) be presented to each Annual Conference for its consideration and possible adoption to become effective July 1, 1965.
- IV. We recommend that each Annual Conference include in its 1965-66 budget an amount sufficient to cover the cost of this program for all ministerial conference members (on Trial, Effective, and Retired) and all full-time approved supply pastors.

In order to have the contribution for the DBP reach the Evanston office in time for the program to go into effect by July 1, 1965, we suggest that each conference make special arrangements to have the quarterly payments for this program sent in advance during the first year of participation by the conference,

Chairmen of Conference Boards of Pensions, D. L. Williams, C. F. Ferguson and R. L. Clifford suggested Formula for Estimating Amount needed to qualify for Conference Assistance from the Temporary General Aid Fund.

A REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF THE NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE AT ITS FIRST SESSION.

BENNETT COLLEGE

GREENSBORO, NORTH CAROLINA

JUNE 3-6, 1965

- In compliance with the Legislation of the General Conference which met in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, 1964, your Historical Society recommends the following:
 - That at our Annual Conference Session in 1966, we hold an observance of the Bicentennial Celebration of the Methodist Church in America.
 - We recommend that the Bishop and his Cabinet, at its earliest convenience, select a fit person to deliver the Annual Address setting forth in bold relief the outstanding history and transactions of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference as it relates itself to the General History of the Methodist Church. Perhaps most of this history will refer to the former North Carolina Conference in that our present North Carolina-Virginia Conference will be but a babe of two years when this celebration is held.
 - We recommend that this address shall be spread on the pages of the Journal for the year 1966, and shall become a definite part of the history of that Conference year.

4. That at the Baltimore Meeting, April 21-24, 1966, our Conference be represented by our District Superintendents and by a selected delegation of not less than eight persons. A minister and layman from each of the four Districts, which representatives shall bear their own expenses to, at, and from this Meeting, and shall constitute the Chairman and Co-Chairman of a Committee from each of the Districts. That the responsibility of these delegates shall be to conduct a similar meeting within some central point within each of the Districts to further disseminate information of historical importance and attempt to create a new interest in the beginnings of our Conference, and to point a direction into which our Conference should further advance.

We further suggest that these delegates representing our Conference shall be appointed by the Bishop and approved by the Districts.

We recommend that at least one-half of the delegates shall be persons forty years of age or younger.

We also recommend that members of the Historical Society shall be delegates ex-officio at the Baltimore Meeting who shall be expected to support tre local plans instituted for a Conference-Wide Celebration of the Meeting in Baltimore, April 21-24, 1966.

II. We recommend that preparations for attendance at this Baltimore Bicentennial Meeting may begin as the District Superintendents hold their First Quarterly Conference for the Conference Year, 1965-66, and that the Bishop of the area be kept informed as to procedure and success.

We finally recommend that such literature as is available be secured and used in execution for our plans for this Celebration: Amonk these are the Quarterly Historical Magazine which may be had at subscription price of \$3 per year from the Publishing House, and a three volume History of American Methodism published in 1965, available through the Methodist Publishing House at \$27 for the three volumes, secured by those of us who are sufficiently interested in the History of Methodism. REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA-VIRGINIA CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE For The Conference Year 1965-66

Our Conference has experienced changes in many areas in the past few months in its endeavors to carry on the program of The Methodist Church. "New occasions teach new duties", so we should assume these new opportunities which will make for larger responsibilities. Your Commission believes that the financial objectives herein proposed aer necessary to meet the pressing needs in promoting Kingdom work in the total program of our Church.

A. Policies and Procedures

- We recommend that the treasurer's books be audited once each year, within 60 days after Conference, by the firm of Ernst and Ernst, and that a summary of this audit be carried in the Conference Journal.
- 2. The treasurer of the Annual Conference shall be the custodian of the funds of all Commissions, Boards, and other Agencies of the Conference, as well as the Conference itself; with the power to deposit such funds in banking depositories as heretofore and as hereinafter directed, and withdraw or transfer the same as ordered by the Conference.
- 3. The treasurer shall maintain at all times books and records, showing the names of the respective Commissions, Boards, and other Agencies, and the amount to which each is entitled in the aggregate fund on deposit in each depository maintained by him.
- All monies raised on the charge shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly, except pastors salary, local church expense items, Woman's Society of Christian Service. Rev. L. A. Brown — 625 Asheboro Street, Greensboro, N. C.
- 5. District Superintendents:
 - a. The salary of the District Superintendent shall be seven-thousand (\$7,000.00) dollars annually.

- b. The District Superintendent shall receive (\$1,000,00) dollars for rent.
- c. The District Superintendent shall receive four-hundred (\$400.00) dollars for office expense and seven-hundred (\$700.00) dollars for travel expense. The Commission on World Service and Finance is authorized to adjust the travel expense of the Superintendent of the Virginia District if same exceeds \$700.00.
- d. The District Superintendents shall have the right to apportion the charges of their district for conference benevolences, and District Parsonage Maintenance, after consultation with the District Stewards.
- e. The distribution of apportionments to the Districts shall be on the following percentages:

We have examined the statement of recorded cash receipts and cash disbursements of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference for the period August 1, 1964, through June 2, 1965, in the manner and to the extent outlined below.

Cash on deposit at June 2, 1965, was reconciled with the balance reported by the bank. We were unable to trace individual recorded receipts to the bank deposits. We inspected paid bank checks representing recorded disbursements for the period. No vouchers, invoices, or other evidence supporting disbursements were submitted for our inspection. We did not request independent confirmation of recorded receipts from the various contributing churches and individuals.

As the scope of our examination did not include independent confirmation of cash receipts and as vouchers, invoices or other evidence supporting disbursements were not available, we are unable to express an opinion upon the statement of recorded cash receipts and cash disbursements.

4. Each Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan shall be deemed to have accepted into its membership,

upon the effective date of the Plan, the following persons:

All ministerial members (whether on trial or in full connection) of the Upper Mississippi Annual Conference who are then appointed to churches located geographically within its boundaries.

All ministerial members of the Upper Mississippi Annual Conferences (whether on trial or in full connection) under special appointment who then hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically within its boundaries.

All retired ministerial members of the Upper Mississippi Annual (C) Conference who hold their quarterly conference membership in a

local church located geographically within its boundaries.

All persons who shall become members of any Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction under subparagraphs 'A,' 'B,' 'C' above shall have all the rights (especially with respect to pensions and minimum salaries), privileges, and obligations of the other members of that Annual Conference.

5. The Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan, shall be deemed to have agreed that opportunities for lay participation in and enjoyment of the benefits of all their programs, activities, and institutions shall be provided without regard to race or color.

The Central Jurisdictional Conference, by the adoption of the Plan, shall determine the boundaries of the Upper Mississippi Annual Conference in such manner that said Annual Conference shall be wholly within the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

The Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, by the adoption of the Plan, shall be deemed to have agreed to determine the boundaries of its Annual Conferences in such manner as to include each local church of the Upper Mississippi Annual Conference in the other Annual Conferences of that Jurisdiction in which that local church is located geographically. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Proposed Amendment No. 13 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning the Time and Place of Meetings of Jurisdictional Conferences:

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (%) on Monday morning, May 4, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church:

Amend Division II. Section IV, Art. IV. Paragraph 14 of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Para. 14. Art. IV.—Each Jurisdictional Conference sholl meet within the twelve months succeeding the meeting of the General Conference at such time and place as shall have been detrminhd by the preceding Jurisdictional Conference, or by its properly constituted committee. The first meeting of each Jurisdictional Conference after the General Conference shall be called by the Council of Bishops at a date fixed by them and at a place selected by a committee on entertainment appointed by them." by deletion and substitute for it the following:

"Para. 14, Art. IV.—Each Jurisdictional Conference shall meet at the time determined by the Council of Bishops or its delegated committee, each Jurisdictional Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed by its College of Bishops unless such a committee has been appointed by the preceding Jurisdictional Conference."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Proposed Amendment No. 14 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning Residential and Presidential Supervision of Bishops:

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (%) on Monday morning, May 4, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Division III, Art. V, Paragraph 38, the first subparagraph, of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Para. 38, Art. V.—The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected. A bishop may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision by the Council of Bishops when such transfer is requested by the Jurisdictional Conference to which such proposed transfer is to be made."

by deletion and substitute for it the following:

"Para. 38, Art. V.—The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two basis: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in each shall be balanced by the number transfered out, or

(b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer until he has served one quadrennium in, or under assignment by, the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committee on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference. Conditions (2), (3) and (4) above shall not apply in the case of the transfer of a bishop from the Central Jurisdiction in connection with the transfer of one or more Annual Conferences of that Jurisdiction under Amendment IX."

"Amendment X, Article 1.—The Annual Conference shall be composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, together with a lay member elected by each pastoral charge, the President of the Conference Women's Socity of Christian Service and the Conference Lay Leader."

Amend Amendment X (Para. 47, amending Div. II, Sec. VII, Article 1, para. 21), last two sentences of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which reads as follows:

"Amendment X. Article 1.—Each pastoral charge served by more than one minister in full connection shal be entitled to two lay members. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The Methodist Church." by deletion and substitute for them the following:

"Amendment X. Article 1.—Each pastoral charge served by more than one minister in full connection shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are effective full-time ministers in full connection. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of The Methodist Church."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Proposed Amendment No. 17 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning the Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction.

At its seventh quadrennial session, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, April 26-May 8, 1964, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (%) on Thursday

morning, May 7, 1964, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Amendment IX, the entire sub-paragraph 5 of Art. V and the final sentence of the last paragraph (the addition to paragraph 26) of the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church which read as follows:

"Amendment IX. Art. V.—5. Whenever twenty-five percent of the local church membership of the Central Jurisdiction have been transferred by the process to another jurisdiction or jurisdictions, the hishop of the area from which the largest number have been transferred shall be transferred to the jurisdiction which has received the largest number by such transfer, and the representation of the Central Jurisdiction on the boards and accuracies of the church shall thereafter be proportionately reduced.

and the representation of the central surface of the church shall thereafter be proportionately reduced.

Abolition of the Central Jurisdiction—The Central Jurisdiction shall be abolished when all the Annual Conferences now comprising it have been transferred to other jurisdictions in according with the voluntary procedure of Article V of this section. Each remaining bishop of the Central Jurisdiction shall thereupon be transferred to the jurisdiction to which the majority of the membership of his area have been transferred, and the Cen-

tral Jurisdiction shall then be dissolved."

by deletion and substitute for them the following:

"Amendment IX. Art. V.—5. Abolition of Central Jurisdiction. The Central Jurisdiction shall be abolished when all of the Annual Conferences now comprising it have been transferred to other jurisdictions in accordance with the voluntary procedure of Article V of this section."

RESOLUTION FOR THE TRANSFER AND MERGER OF THE CENTRAL WEST CONFERENCE AND THE SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE TO THE SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION AND GEOGRAPHIC CONFERENCES

(OF THE SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION)

WHEREAS, it is the avowed policy of the Methodist Church to effect ultimately the dissolution of the Central Jurisdictions as one step toward achieving a truly inclusive Methodist Church, and

WHERAS, the South Central and Central Jurisdictional Conferences, and their constituent annual conferences, are committed to the elimination of all forms of racial segregation and discrimination in The Methodist Church, including elimination of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction itself,

BE IT RESOLVED, THEREFORE, THAT:

1. The Central West Annual Conference, by the adoption of this reso-

lution, in accordance with the provisions of Amendment IX of the Constitution of The Methodist Church, shall be deemed to have voted to transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to the South Central Jurisdiction.

- 2. The other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, and the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction, by adoption of this resolution, in accordance with the provisions of the said Amendment IX, shall be deemed to have voted to approve the transfer of the Central West Annual Conference from the the Central Jurisdiction to the South Central Jurisdiction.
- 3. The Central West Annual Conference, the Missouri West Annual Conference and the Missouri East Annual Conference, by the adoption of this resolution agree that the Central West Annual Conference, after it shall have been transferred to the South Central Jurisdiction, shall no longer continue to exist as a racially segregated conference; and the said Conferences further agree to proceed with the merger of the Central West, the Missouri West, and the Missouri East Annual Conferences pursuant to Section 4 of the aforementioned Amendment IX.
- 4. The Missouri West and Missouri East Annual Conferences, by the adoption of this resolution, shall be deemed to have agreed to accept into their respective membership the following persons:
 - (a) All ministerial members of the Central West Annual Conference (whether on trial or in full connection) appointed to charges located geographically within their respective boundaries.
 - (b) All ministerial members of the Central West Annual Conference (whether on trial or in full connection) under special appointment who hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically within their respective boundaries.
 - (c) All retired ministerial members of the Central West Annual Conference who hold their quarterly conference membership in a local church located geographically within their respective boundaries.
 - (d) All accepted Supply Pastors in their present relationship.
- 5. All persons who shall become a member of either the Missouri West Annual Conference or the Missouri East Annual Conference pursuant to subparagraphs "a," "b," or "c" of paragraph 4 hereof, shall have the same status, rights, privileges and obligations as may be enjoyed or entailed by other members of the Missouri West and Missouri East Annual Conferences, respectively (with particular reference to participation in salary plans, pensions, the privilege of enrolling in group hospital programs, etc.). It is further agreed that cabinets shall be requested to give careful consideration to providing opportunities for Central West Annual Conference pastors to itinerate among churches other then those now comprising the Central West Conference.
- 6 The ministerial and lay persons now serving on boards and agencies of the Central West Annual Conference shall serve during the current quadrennium on like or similar boards and agencies of the Missouri West and Missouri East Annual Conferences, respectively. It is further agreed that in ensuing quadrennium steps shall be taken to insure that all boards and agencies of the Missouri West and Misouri East Annual Conference (or their successors) shall be racially inclusive.
- 7. The Missouri West Annual Conference and the Missouri East Annual Conference, by the adoption of this resolution, shall be deemed to have requested the presiding Bishop there (a) to establish districts, pursuant to his authority under Paragraph 431.3 of the Discipline, without regard to the racial composition of the membership of local churches, and (b) to insure that the cabinets of said conferences shall be racially inclu-

sive at such time when a more favorable climate shall have been created.

- 8. The Missouri West and Missouri East Annual Conferences, by the adoption of this resolution, shall be deemed to have agreed that within their respective boundaries opportunities for spiritual and intellectual growth and Christian service shall be made available to all without regard to race or color. It is agreed that such equal opportunities shall be provided particularly in such aspects of conference programs as activities of the W. S. C. S., W. S. G., youth work, and leadership training enterprises.
- 9. It is hereby agreed that wherever necessary, existing congregations of the Central West Annual Conference shall be continued until such time as a more favorable climate shall have been created for the consideration of possible merger of congregation in close proximity.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of this Annual Conference shall forward certified copies of this Resolution, together with a record of the voting thereon, to (a) the College of Bishops of the Central Jurisdiction, (b) the Colege of Bishops of the South Central Jurisdiction, (c) the secretaries of the other Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, and (d) the secretaries of the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction.

RESOLUTION FROM ADVISORY COUNCIL OF THE SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION ON PROPOSED PLAN TO TRANSFER THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE SOUTHWESTERN AREA OF CENTRAL JURISDICTION TO THE SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION.

WHEREAS the 1964 General Conference of The Methodist Church voted to move as quickly as possible toward the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction, and the development of an inclusive church at all levels of the church's organization and life; and

WHEREAS the South Central Jurisdictional Conference Advisory Council and the Central Jurisdictional Conference approved resolutions to implement the General Conference actions; and

WHEREAS the Committee on Interjurisdictional Relations of the South Central Jurisdiction had had meetings with a like committee of the Central Jurisdiction Advisory Council, and the said joint committees desire to present a minimum basis for united action whereby all Annual Conferences involved can express their desire to proceed as rapidly as possible toward achievement of the objectives of the said conferences;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. (a) The Central West, the Louisiana, the Texas, the West Texas, and the Southwest Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this resolution in accordance with Amendment IX, shall be deemed to have voted to transfer from the Central Jurisdiction to the South Central Jurisdiction, subject to the condition that (1) the South Central Jurisdictional Conference shall request the Council of Bishops to transfer

to the South Central Jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., and (2) the Secretary of the said Jurisdictional Conference shall transmit such request to the Council of Bishops.

- (b) The Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction, by the adoption of this resolution in accordance with Amendment IX, shall be deemed to have approved the transfers of the aforementioned Central Jurisdiction conferences to the South Central Jurisdiction.
- 2. (a) Each Annual Conference, by the adoption of this resolution, thereby commits itself to work faithfully for the development of an inclusive church at all levels of the church's organization and life. To implement this purpose the Annual Conferences within the States of Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas agree to appoint representatives to State Interconference Commissions on Mergers (hereafter referred to as "State Commissions").
- (b) Each State Commission shall report its recommendations to its constituent Annual Conferences, and to the 1968 South Central Jurisdictional Conference.
- (c) By the adoption of this resolution each Annual Conference declares its intent to accomplish the merger of all transferred conferences not later than 1968.
- (d) Each State Commission provided for above shall be composed of one layman, one laymonan, one pastor, and one district superintendent from each Annual Conference in that State. These persons shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference.
- (e) The Bishop who presides over each Annual Conference that may be a party to a merger agreement shall also be a member of the particular State Commission involved.
- 3. Inasmuch as it is contemplated that some of the transferred Annual Conferences may desire to merge in the immediate future with Annual Conferences having overlapping geographic boundaries, the adoption of this resolution shall be deemed to be a request of the College of Bishops of the South Central Jurisdiction to convene a special session of the South Central Jurisdictional Conference, as needed, to take such action as may be necessary to implement the objectives sought by the transfers of the aforementioned Central Jurisdiction Conferences to the South Central Jurisdiction.
- 4. The Annual Conference adopting this resolution shall be deemed to have requested thereby the Council on World Service and Finance to consider the problms of pnsions and minimum salary support growing out of Annual Conference mergers as church-wide problems, and to recommend to the General Conference that it provide adequate supplemental support for merged conferences on a continuing basis.

The North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference voted 136, none concurrance.

HISTORICAL VIEW

The North Carolina Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, with Bishop Charles F. Golden, of the Nashville Carolina Area presiding. At this time boro, Laurinburg, Western, and Winston Districts of the former North Carolina Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdicthere were five districts to include the Virginia District of the former Washington Annual Conference and the original Greenstion of the Methodist Church. At the first main session of the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference held in Greensgoro at Bennett College on June 3-6, 1965, the districts were reduced to four. They are: Central, Eastern, Virginia, and Western. The new Conference was composed of 65 Pastors and District Superintendents, 3 under special appointment, 11 retired, making a total of 79 members.
