




Report from Colleges.—The report of the Trustees of People's College, that of the Trustees of Sullins College, and

that of the Trustees of Martha Washington College, were received and referred to the Committee on Education.

Admitted on Trial.—QUESTION I. “*Who are admitted on trial?*” was taken up.

W. J. Sage and Boyd W. Fielder, of the Elk Creek Circuit, John L. Prater, of the Liberty Hill Circuit, David McCrackin, of the Lebanon Circuit, Wm. C. Farris, of the St. Clair Circuit, Claiborne M. Campbell, of the Whiteside Street Station, Chattanooga, David V. Price, of the Pikeville Circuit, and Wm. H. Horton, of the Sneedville Circuit, being recommended by the Quarterly Conferences of which they are members, respectively, and also by the Conference Examining Committee, were received on trial into the traveling connection.

A. J. Brooks, of the Tazewell Circuit, was not admitted.

Continued on Trial.—QUESTION II. “*Who remain on trial?*” was called, and W. M. Belamy, Eugene Blake, W. M. Boring, Geo. W. Jackson, Richard A. Kelley, James L. Kennedy, John W. Lloyd, J. E. Moore, E. B. Robertson, Oscar F. Sensabaugh, Richard G. Waterhouse, W. A. Thomas and James H. Weaver, having passed the necessary examination, were continued on trial and advanced to the class of the Second Year.

Joseph A. Cook, not having passed his examination, was continued on trial in the class of the First Year.

Report in the case of S. R. Wheeler and J. H. Brunner.—The following report was submitted and adopted:

Your Committee, to whom was referred the cases of Brothers Brunner and Wheeler, submit the following report, viz:

We have had the Brethren face to face, and after due and frank consultation and investigation have come to the following conclusions:

In the case of Brother Wheeler, it was complained, by Brother Brunner, that he, as Presiding Elder, did not remove the preacher from the Madisonville Circuit, when he knew of his great unacceptability on the work, and had tacitly agreed to do so. Brother Wheeler explained that while he knew him (the preacher) to be unacceptable to the people, and had advised him, before hand, not to go to the work and that there was no charge in his District, in his opinion, where he would have been more acceptable, and that he had no jurisdiction

beyond his district, and that he never thought of informing the Bishop of the case: he disclaims all intention of afflicting the Circuit by continuing an unacceptable man upon it; and states that, under similar circumstances, he would appeal to the Bishop for relief. Therefore we find no sufficient grounds for complaint against him and recommend that his character pass.

In the case of Brother Brunner, after free explanation, upon his part, and denial of any intention, on his part, to offend or treat with indignity Brother Wheeler, as his Presiding Elder: and after his denial of any intention to encourage dissension in the working of the Board of Stewards on that Circuit, and as Brother Wheeler, after such explanation and denials, expressed himself satisfied with Brother Brunner: therefore, we find in his case nothing worthy of complaint and recommend that his character pass.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, October 24th; 1879.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Pierce in the chair.

Religious services were conducted by Wm. Hicks.

On motion the calling of the roll was dispensed with for the remainder of the Session. The minutes of the previous Session were read and approved.

Committee of Trial Appointed.—The Committee, to whom was referred the case of Isaac H. Hoskins, reported a trial necessary, whereupon Bishop Pierce appointed the following Committee: Wm. Hicks, Chairman, H. W. Bays, R. H. Parker, D. H. Carr, J. R. Hixson, M. L. Clendenen, J. Mahoney, T. T. Sayler, Wm. Robeson, and W. H. Kelly.

Introductions.—Rev. Mr. Staples, Agent of the American Bible Society, Rev. Mr. Troy, of North Carolina, and Rev. Dr. Barr, of the Methodist Protestant Church, were introduced, and the first named addressed the Conference with reference to the Bible cause, as did also Dr. Sledd.

Admitted into Full Connection.—QUESTION IV. “*Who are admitted into full connection?*” was taken up.

Harvey P. Bailey, A. G. Blankenbeckler, James M. Gross, George A. Maiden, Wm. B. Pickens, George W. Summers, J. F. Wampler, and R. A. Owen, having passed an approved examination by the Committee of the Second Year, were called up and addressed by the Bishop and received into full connection.

Continued on Trial.—QUESTION II. John C. Bays, J. J. Brooks, S. L. Richardson, and J. O. Shelly, not having passed examination, were continued on trial in the class of the Second Year.

Superannuated.—QUESTION XVIII. George Stewart was granted a Superannuated relation.

Located.—QUESTION XVI. I. S. Ross was granted a location at his own request.

Deacons of One Year.—QUESTION VII. “*Who are the Deacons of One Year?*” was called.

W. B. Baldwin, C. S. Bird, D. H. Coman, A. E. Housholder, Henry S. Lee, Wm. L. Richardson, and John R. Walker, having passed the requisite examination, were passed and advanced to the class of the Fourth Year.

Elders Elected.—QUESTION XII. “*What traveling preachers are elected Elders?*” was taken up.

W. D. Akers, John R. Cunningham, W. W. Hicks, James A. Lyons, W. B. Stradley, S. S. Weatherly, John T. Stover, and Ayres Kincaid, having traveled two years since they were ordained Deacons and being recommended by the Examining Committee of the Fourth Year, were passed and elected Elders.

QUESTION XX. J. D. Hickson's character passed, he being an Elder.

Deacons of One Year.—QUESTION VII. Richard T. Barton, Jackson V. Brown, Charles M. James, Phillip P. Kinser, R. M. Standefer, and J. R. Stewart, were passed, but not having been before the Committee of the Fourth Year were continued in the class of the Fourth Year.

Located.—QUESTION XVI. The character of M. D. Thompson was passed and he was granted a location at his own request.

Local Deacons Elected.—QUESTION X. "*What local preachers are elected Deacons?*" was called.

George W. Osborne and John P. Combs, of the Watauga Circuit, John N. Hobbs, of Morristown Station, and John Woolsey, of Kingston Circuit, having been four years successively Local preachers, in the M. E. Church, South, and being recommended by the Quarterly Conference, of which they are members, severly, were elected Deacons.

Local Elders Elect^d.—QUESTION XIV. "*What local preachers are elected Elders?*" was taken up.

Alexander C. Southerland, of the Hillsville Circuit, and Wm. B. Gale, of the Jonesville Circuit, having been four years Local Deacons and being recommended by the Quarterly Conferences to which they belong, severally, and certifying their belief in the doctrine and Discipline of the M. E. Church, South, were elected Elders.

Orders Recognized.—Wm. J. Witcher, having re-attached himself to the M. E. Church, South, and being recommended by the Quarterly Conference of the Cleveland Station and certifying his belief in the doctrine, and his willingness to be governed by the Discipline, of the M. E. Church, South, was voted a recognition of his orders as an Elder.

Conference adjourned, with a benediction by the Bishop.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY, October 25th, 1879.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Pierce in the chair.

Religious services were conducted by David Sullins.

The minutes of the previous Session were read and approved.

Introductions.—Dr. McAnally, editor of the *St. Louis Christian Advocate*; Dr. Fitzgerald, editor of the *Nashville Christian Advocate*, and Rev. Mr. Stewart, of the Presbyterian Church, were introduced to the Conference.

QUESTION XX. “*Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?*” was taken up.

The characters of W. P. Doane and W. H. Stevens were passed.

Supernumerary.—QUESTION XVII. J. W. Bird was passed and granted a Supernumerary relation.

Located.—QUESTION XVI. W. S. Jordan and P. P. Kinzer were passed and were each granted a location at their own request.

In Class of Third Year.—QUESTION VII. John R. Hixson, not having been before the Committee of Third Year, was passed and continued in the class of Third Year.

Admitted into Full Connection.—QUESTION IV. R. A. Hutsell, having passed the necessary examination, was passed and admitted into full connection. George A. Oglesby, having passed examinations by both First and Second Years' Committees, was admitted into full connection.

Deacons Elected.—QUESTION VIII. G. A. Oglesby, having traveled two years, was elected to Deacon's Orders.

Report of Trial of I. H. Hoskins.—The Committee of Trial in the case of I. H. Hoskins, reported the result of trial in the following resolution, which had been adopted unanimously:

“RESOLVED, That I. H. Hoskins be, and he is, hereby expelled from the M. E. Church, South.”

A Memorial Presented.—A Memorial from the Quarterly Conference of the Leadmines' Circuit with reference to ratio of representation in District Conferences was read and referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Wm. Hicks, E. E. Wiley, and Geo. Stewart.

Report on Bible Cause.—The Committee on the Bible

Cause submitted a report, which was read and adopted, as follows :

The Committee on the Bible Cause beg leave to report as follows :

We are glad to note the grand results achieved by the American and other Bible Societies in the circulation of the unfettered, wide-open Bible.

The pure Word of God, without note or comment, is now printed in more than two hundred and fifty languages and dialects of this babbling earth.

Every Christian minister and layman, who is seeking to spread scriptural holiness over these lands should be in active and hearty sympathy with this great movement. We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

RESOLVED, That we will co-operate with the agents of the various Bible Societies, in our bounds, in furnishing destitute families with the Word of God.

RESOLVED 2d. That the Clerical members of the Conference are hereby requested to preach, during the year, in their several charges, on the Bible Cause.

Report on "Spiritual State of the Church"—

The Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church reported, which report was adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church have had that subject under consideration and beg leave to make the following report :

After a careful examination into the spiritual condition of the Church, in the bounds of our Conference, as time and opportunity afforded, we are pleased to venture as our opinion that there has been no retrograde movement in anything pertaining to her spiritual welfare ; and though some departments looking to this most heavenly and important side of our work have not advanced as they should, yet others fully compensate this lack, so that, upon the whole, there has been a decided advancement in our spiritual interests, which fact inspires us with increased courage to "go up and possess the land."

One point we notice with special interest, is the revival spirit which has been pretty general throughout the Conference. Both at Camp-meetings and other protracted services has God owned the labors of His servants, in making them instrumental in the ingathering of souls into the fold of Christ. Gracious manifestations of the Divine Spirit have been a marked feature during the closing months of this ecclesiastical year ; and His potency, through us, in the conviction and conversion of souls shows that we have not left the old landmarks of Methodism which our fathers inaugurated under the blessings of God. These tokens of success should have a two fold influence. 1st—In assuring us, as a Church, that we are still used as instruments in bringing revolted man back to his allegiance to God. 2nd—In inspiring all with increased energy to prosecute this most delightful part of Christian effort, which is the great central idea of God in Christ Jesus.

Methodism is truly a revival of religion and vital godliness. The conversion of souls lies as the basis of her success, and while this work is going on, under her supervision, no one need fear as regards her future.

But glorious as this primary work of our Church may appear, and urgent as its claims may impress themselves upon the heart of the devoted itinerant, still there are other points in our economy which should receive the most careful attention. It is one thing to get a person converted, and another to feed and nurture him till he grows up into a healthy and well developed Christian character. The means to this end, which has long been in vogue in our Church, we are gratified to say, has not lost its power ; and though much tamed by use, yet is there all the elements of spirituality and devotion calculated to advance the Christian life.

The claims of the Prayer-meetings have been urged upon the membership with

good results. These weekly devotions, in our stations and stronger country congregations, have served much to develop the latent forces of the Church. Here is where the newly converted are brought into service and made to take up the Cross while the fires of the Spirit burn vividly within the soul. Many a young man has been lost to the Church and, perhaps, to the Ministry, simply because his gifts were not stirred up in him while he was first anxiously inquiring: "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?"

An improvement might be made here by urging upon the Brethren who lead in these exercises the propriety of bringing the newly initiated to the front.

We think, perhaps, there has been a revival of class-meetings, to some extent. No doubt the utterances of our central organ has had its influence. But, while we would hail with joy any advancement in this experimental feature of our religion, we cannot entertain any sanguine hopes of its permanency. It is already intermittent and in some circuits sporadic. It seems a strange thing to us that we will, with universal consent, acknowledge that class-meetings are most successful means for the cultivation of practical piety, and at the same time let them die on our hands; nevertheless, this is true in a measure. These meetings are in the hands of the Pastors who have oversight of the Church of God. Should there be a determined effort to revive them, all along the line, Methodism could know no failure. Soon, in every church and settled cabin, where we preach the Gospel, this personal cultivation would go on, and that to the strengthening of the Church and glory of God. But should we relax our efforts, these sacred fires are bound to go out upon the altars of Methodism and we suffer loss.

Family worship or domestic religion should not be passed over lightly. It was around these hallowed altars where many of our hearts received their first impulse towards Christianity. The impressions made upon our minds by the old family Bible and hymn-book can never be erased. These reflections bring to our memory some of the sweetest associations of our childhood, and we are pleased to say, that family worship, to-day, occupies a high position in the affections of our Church. But as this, like every other means of grace, is liable to suffer decline when neglected, we would urge upon every Pastor the necessity of applying a constant stimulus, that he may bring out this household religion in all its beauty and perfection.

Before closing this report we would call attention to another item or two which we deem of vital importance to our prosperity. These are pastoral oversight and the administration of discipline. The Pastor should know his people, not only in their public walk, but, also, in their private life; and they should know him, not only as a faithful expounder of the Word, but, also, as a sociable sympathising friend. By this means they will be linked together by the strongest ties of sympathy and affection, and, by properly manipulating these cords, the Pastor will draw crowds to wait upon his ministry. By the knowledge thus gained he will be better able to restrain his membership and intelligibly administer discipline. We fear we are somewhat remiss on the subject of Church discipline. As we are suppliant before God, for his mercy, owing to our manifold transgressions, so should we be lenient as possible to those offending within our pales. But, like God, let us ever show to the world the exceeding sinfulness of sin by setting our faces against all sorts of offences against His Church—by counselling, exhorting, reproving, and, when these fail, excommunicating every refractory member.

RESOLVED, That we, as a Conference, are fully persuaded that God has been pleased to bless his work as carried on through our instrumentality; that to him we are sincerely grateful for the abundant success which has crowned our labors during the past year; and that we take courage, and in his name go out again, with renewed energy, to work through these same grand old channels—trusting in the same God to bless us with greater success than we have hitherto witnessed, and to His name be all glory and honor, now and for evermore. Amen.

Supernumerary.—QUESTION XVII. E. L. Barrett, J. P. Reynolds, and W. H. Stevens, were each granted a Supernumerary relation.

Superannuated.—QUESTION XVIII. W. H. Barnes was granted a Superannuated relation.

Applications Withdrawn.—QUESTION V. The motion by which J. W. Belt was readmitted was reconsidered and the application withdrawn.

QUESTION I. The motion by which W. C. Farris was admitted on trial was reconsidered and the application withdrawn.

Admitted on Trial.—QUESTION I. The motion by which A. J. Brooks, who was recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Tazewell Circuit and also by the Conference Committee of Examination, was rejected; was reconsidered and he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection.

Wesley Monumental Church.—A communication from Dr. J. O. Clark, Agent for Wesley Monumental Church, at Savannah, Ga., was received and laid on the table for the present.

Report on Books and Periodicals.—The report of the Committee on Books and Periodicals was adopted as follows:

Books have been sold to the amount of \$2,095.00—\$330.00 of which were sold by the Conference Book Agent, Bro. Jacob Smith.

There are taken, according to the reports placed in our hands, 635 copies of the *Christian Advocate*, 934 copies of the **HOLSTON METHODIST** and other periodicals—mostly of the former—and 7 copies of the *Southern Review*

Your Committee are impressed with the fact that we, as Christian workers, are largely failing to avail ourselves of the powerful aid of Christian literature. To judiciously and diligently distribute books, papers and periodicals is incalculably to multiply one's power; it is to introduce among one's people, teachers abler than himself; it is, indeed, to place them at the feet of the wisdom and piety of the ages, and to render one's self ubiquitous in his field—with a tongue of fire preaching in a hundred homes, sparsely scattered, of his widely extended territory, at one and the same time. No pastor need, for a moment, to leave an appointment unfilled—no, not for a week, since, so to speak, Wesley or Watson, or Marvin or Munsey, may be had, either one or all of them, to meet it; and since he may secure the presence of Baxter or Carvosso, or Drs. Fitzgerald and Cunnyngham and Bro. Price, at their hearthstones. That we so largely fail to avail ourselves of this auxiliary is to be the more deplored because of abounding venal literature.

In view of the auxiliary potency of religious literature, be it

RESOLVED, 1st. That we, as evangelical workers, will bestir ourselves in the circulation of Religious literature.

2d. We rejoice in the increased success of our Conference organ, the **HOLSTON METHODIST**—being glad to know that, though in debt, its assets exceed its liabilities, and that it more than paid expenses during the past year, and that we respectfully request the reappointment of Rev. R. N. Price as editor, and most heartily recommend it to our people.

RESOLVED, 2dly. That, in company with our sister Conferences, we look with joy upon the increasing efficiency and popularity of our connectional organ, the **CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE**; and that we will heartily endeavor to swell its list of subscribers to 30,000.

RESOLVED, 3dly. That our Sunday School Literature, so ably edited by Dr. W. G. E. Cunnyngham, is to us, as a Conference, a peculiar pride, and shall be placed in all our Sunday Schools.

RESOLVED, 4thly. That we highly appreciate the labors of Bro. Payne, in giving us the proceedings from year to year of the Conferences in permanent pamphlet form, and that we recommend his publication to the people.

RESOLVED, 5thly, and especially, That we are thankful to the great head of the Church for the success with which the efforts of the Book Agent, Dr. McFerrin,

have been crowned, in securing the subscription of \$300,000.00 for the relief of our Publishing House at Nashville; and that we, as a Conference, will pledge to him and our publishing interests there our most hearty co-operation.

RESOLVED, 6thly. That we are gratified to know of the successful management and able editorship of the *Quarterly Review*, of the M. E. Church, South, and will give it our support.

RESOLVED, 7thly. That the *Theological and Homiletic Monthly* meets a want felt among our ministers, and shall have our support.

Report on Education.—The hour of 10 o'clock having arrived, the Committee on Education submitted their report, which was considered seriatim, discussed at length by E. E. Hoss, President of Martha Washington College; Dr. J. L. Buchanan, President, and Dr. E. E. Wiley, Professor of Emory and Henry College; Rev. J. J. Lafferty, editor of *Richmond Christian Advocate*; Dr. McFerrin, H. S. Lee, L. L. H. Carlock, Dr. Sullins, J. Atkins, Jr., and R. N. Price, and then adopted as a whole, as follows:

Your Committee has received verbal and written statements from the representatives of the several institutions of learning under your care. Upon these statements we base the following report:

EMORY AND HENRY COLLEGE

Has long been the pride of the Conference. Its existence is the result of much toil and sacrifice on the part of its founders. It is fortunately located. It has a large and valuable farm; and buildings ample for the accommodation of 250 or 300 students. Its standard of scholarship has been gradually brought up to an equality with that of the very best Colleges North or South. Its Board of Instruction is able and effective. Its charges are moderate; yet its patronage is comparatively meagre—its matriculations, the present scholastic year numbering, to this date, only 73. This

decline in patronage is attributable, no doubt, in part, to the depressed financial condition of the country—to the abundant and active competition of rival institutions, and to the multiplication of high schools and academies, which furnish cheaper and inferior tuition. The joint Board of Trustees and Visitors has sought to secure increased patronage by changes, known to you all, in the Board of Instruction. Perhaps the best service which the friends of this College can render it is to press the claims of a high standard of education within our own territory. Surely a small per cent. of the young men within the bounds of the Holston Conference, who might and ought to be highly educated would crowd, to overflowing, the halls of Emory and Henry.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. M. McTeer, Rev. G. W. Miles, Rev. Geo. Stewart, Rev. Frank Richardson, Rev. E. W. Moore, Rev. R. N. Price, Rev. D. Sullins, Rev. A. J. Frazier, Hon. John A. Kelly, Peter Gallagher, Esq., J. D. Johnson, Esq., Jas. P. Kelly, Esq., and Albert G. Pendleton, Esq., as a Board of Visitors for Emory and Henry College, during the ensuing year.

MARTHA WASHINGTON COLLEGE

Has opened its present session auspiciously. More than one hundred pupils are now in attendance—an increase of thirty three per cent. over the number in attendance at this time last year. President Hoss has displayed great energy and zeal in his labors for the College, both in securing patronage and in meeting his varied and responsible duties in the institution. We deem it fortunate that your body holds its present session in immediate contact with the College—that your members may not only behold its beautiful exterior, but, also, become acquainted, by actual observation, with its internal operations.

Prof. Jas. A. Davis is a valuable acquisition to the College—bringing with him not only a ripe experience in teaching, but, also, a valuable apparatus for the illustration of the physical sciences.

The debt incumbering and embarrassing the institution, amounting, in the aggregate, to about \$19,000, should cause constant solicitude to its friends. Such a debt renders its very existence insecure. We have nothing to recommend in this behalf but that every effort be put forth by those interested in its welfare, to increase its patronage, with unanimity and concert of action, on the part of its friends, and economy in its management. We hope to see the debt liquidated in a few years.

We recommend the following Board of Visitors for the ensuing year: Rev. B. W. S. Bishop, Rev. John M. McTeer, Rev. W. H. Price, Rev. Jas. S. Kennedy, Rev. J. S. Burnett, Rev. J. S. W. Neal, Rev. H. W. Bays, Rev. T. P. Thomas, D. C. Miller, Esq., Geo. E. Penn, Esq., Paul C. Landrum, Esq., J. E. Reeves, Esq., and J. C. Noel, Esq.

HIWASSEE COLLEGE

Was adopted as a Conference school in 1870. Last year it had seventy-seven matriculations, and graduated twelve of its students. A large per cent. of its students have become ministers of the Gospel, and some are now studying for the ministry.

During the last year, the Trustees of the Athens District High School transferred, to the Trustees of Hiwassee College, their valuable school property located at Sweetwater, Tenn. In that property there is a flourishing Female School—a co-ordinate department of Hiwassee College, with a thorough course of instruction.

In the male department Prof. Street is a valuable acquisition, as well as Prof. J. K. Brunner, who has returned to the Chair of Mathematics from Vanderbilt University.

We recommend the following Board of Visitors for the ensuing year: Rev. J. H. Keith, Rev. L. L. H. Carlock, Dr. J. W. Duncan, Mr. A. C. Robeson, Mr. W. L. Clark, D. A. Browder, Esq., Dr. G. A. Long.

SULLINS COLLEGE

Has an increased patronage this year—numbering, at present, one hundred and forty-one pupils. The Trustees call the attention of the Conference to the fact that additional buildings are needed to meet the wants of its increasing patronage. This is a significant and gratifying fact. The property is unembarrassed and is so secured by charter, that no investment put into it can be forfeited to the Conference by mortgage or otherwise.

We cordially commend this institution to the favorable consideration of all inter-

ested in female education. We recommend the election of the present Board of Curators—viz: Rev. J. M. McTeer, Rev. J. T. Frazier, Wm. B. Aston, Esq., Rev. R. N. Price, and Elbert C. Reeves, Esq.

THE PEOPLE'S COLLEGE.

At Pikeville, Tenn., is owned by the Conference, but held by a conditional title, the conditions not being fulfilled. The Trustees ask, through their committee, an agent to collect funds by which to perfect their title and improve the grounds.

HIGH SCHOOLS.

We would mention, with commendation, the following District Schools, located in various parts of the Conference, and contributing largely to the cause of education among our people—viz: Elk Creek Academy, presided over by W. W. Smith, A. M., and claiming seniority over all similar enterprises in our Conference; Morristown District High School, located at Morristown, Tenn., and efficiently and successfully conducted by Rev. Thomas P. Summers, A. M., a local preacher and lay delegate to this Conference; Abingdon District High School, located at Temple Hill, Russell county, Va., and presided over by Prof. James W. Hicks; Chattanooga District High School, located at Trenton, Ga., and under the charge of Rev. C. D. McTeer, A. M.

ASHEVILLE FEMALE COLLEGE.

This property once belonged to the Conference, but is now owned by an incorporated company. It has been unoccupied for sometime, but is now under the Presidency of Rev. Jas. Atkins, Jun., a member of your body. It has opened, recently, with very encouraging prospects. It will run in the interest of Christian education of the Methodist type. Located in an intelligent and refined community, distant from all similar institutions, with several railroads progressing towards completion in its immediate vicinity, there is hope, on the part of its friends, of building it up and making it worthy of a place under your fostering wing.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. Atkins to its Presidency.

RESOLVED, That while, as a Conference, we are gratified at our success hitherto, in the work of Christian education, we regard its claims upon us as constantly increasing, and not to meet them would be to cripple our efficiency and disparage our character as a Conference.

RESOLVED, That we urge the claims of *our own Conference schools* upon all our people.

Prof. Longley's Donation.—E. E. Hoss read a communication from Prof. E. Longley, tendering each member of the Conference a steel engraving of Rev. Thomas Wilkerson, deceased. On motion the pictures were received and the thanks of the Conference returned to Prof. Longley.

Conference adjourned.

MONDAY AFTERNOON, October 27th, 1879.

2. **RESOLVED**, That we recommend to our preachers the importance of urging upon the attention of our Stewards the wise and just provisions of our Discipline: Chapter IX, Section 1, Paragraph 4, in the case of those who fail to pay amounts assessed against them.

Report on Temperance.—The report of the Committee on Temperance was presented and adopted.

Your Committee, to whom was referred the interests of Temperance, reports as follows:

We regret to state that there is, at present, no available means by which definite information can be elicited respecting either the progress or retrogression of this great cause within our Conference bounds; and that, therefore, we are forced to deal with the subject on general principles only. We believe the importance of this subject demands, at our hands, more comprehensive and minute investigation and information.

Temperance, in all things, is a plain and imperious demand of the Word of God, whose relationship is clearly disclosed to every observing mind. And among the various ways in which this command is disregarded, indeed, among all the vices with which our civilization is cursed, there is, perhaps, none so stupendous in its proportions, so glaringly and totally evil in its effects, as is the use, as a beverage, of alcoholic stimulants.

Used thus it works evil, and only evil: destroying, at once, the highest capabilities of humanity—physically, mentally and spiritually. It is socially, governmentally and financially an awful scourge. It blasts human happiness, human hope and all the higher possibilities of human nature, both for time and eternity. Like a loathsome leprosy, it infects all classes and conditions of our race—not exempting, to an extent, even the Church of God.

As we stand in the presence of this wide and wasting desolation, the question thrusts itself upon us with fearful and startling force: How can this dreadful scourge be stayed. Believing, as we do, that the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ is the only panacea for the ills incident to this life, while we do not undervalue or disparage the wholesome temperance literature now so abundant, nor other temperance organizations

which have been fruitful of so much good, we are persuaded that the Bible is the best of all temperance books and that the Church of God is the best of all temperance societies.

If, therefore, this evil is ever thoroughly and permanently cured, it must be done by the wholesome example of the Church of Christ and the earnest promulgation of Scripture truth.

Believing, as we do, the above to be the most efficient means to the attainment of the great end proposed, we offer the following resolutions for adoption:

RESOLVED, 1st. That both in our social contact with our people and in our pulpit ministrations, we will insist upon the observance of the great Bible doctrine of temperance.

RESOLVED, 2nd. That both by private administration and public discipline, if need be, we will endeavor to elevate the standard of Christian living, in this particular, up to our Discipline regulation, requiring our people not to use intoxicating liquors, except in case of necessity.

We also recommend that \$800.00 be allowed him as a salary and to cover traveling expenses, to be paid him by the Sunday Schools of the Conference.

2nd. That a special meeting or convention be held at each Annual Conference and that similar meetings be held at each District Conference in our bounds.

Conference met at 7 o'clock, P. M., pursuant to adjournment, Bishop Pierce in the Chair. Minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Memorial Service.—The Committee on Memoirs offered a report, giving appropriate testimonials to the life and services of Revs. Leander W. Thompson and Francis A. Farley, members of the Conference who have died during the year. At the conclusion of the reading, Tributes of Respect to the memory of the deceased brethren were made by G. W. Miles, W. M. Kerr, A. J. Frazier, G. D. French, J. T. Frazier, G. Taylor, D. H. Dickey, and B. W. S. Bishop. The report was adopted

Your Committee on Memoirs beg leave to submit the following report; two of our brethren have died during the year just passed, viz: Leander W. Thompson, and Francis A. Farley.

Leander Wade Thompson was born in Floyd County, Virginia, November 11, 1849, and died at Princeton, West Virginia, November 27, 1878. His early advantages for mental culture were limited, yet he obtained a good, substantial English education, and afterwards, by persevering effort became well versed, for one of his age, in Theology. By nature he was gentle, modest and inclined to virtue. He was converted at the age of nineteen and joined the M. E. Church, South. In the fall of 1870, he was licensed to exhort, and was licensed to preach September 12, 1872, by the Quarterly Conference of the New Hope, now Jacksonville Circuit, and by the same Conference recommended to the Holston Annual Conference for admission on trial—was admitted October, 1872, and appointed junior preacher on the Wytheville circuit. His fields of labor were thenceforward successively, 1873-4 Hillsville circuit; 1874-5 Bean's Station circuit; 1875-6 Marion circuit; 1876-7 and

1877-8 Jacksonville circuit. From the Conference held in Knoxville, Tenn., October, 1878, he was appointed to the Princeton circuit, where he died November 27, 1878. On the 15th of May, 1878, he was married to Miss Kittie Lane, of his native county. Brother Thompson was a good preacher, and earnest worker, and during his short stay with us, rendered valuable service to the church; while living, walked in the path of duty and as a sequence died at his post. He reached his new field of labor, preached three times, spent a few days pleasantly with his people—was then prostrated by a violent fever which terminated his life in ten days from the attack. During his last illness he manifested his submission to the will of God, and expressed his readiness "to depart and be with Christ," leaving for his distressed wife, who vainly endeavored to reach him while alive, this message: "Tell Kittie I will be her guardian angel—tell her to meet me in Heaven!" His remains were carried to Jacksonville, Va., where, in the presence of a large concourse of people, they were buried to await the resurrection morn.

RESOLVED, That in the death of Brother Thompson this Conference has lost one of its most faithful ministers, and that we hereby express heartfelt sympathy with his afflicted wife in this her early and sore bereavement.

Of Brother Francis A. Farley, your committee has been unable to procure *data* from which to make an accurate report concerning the time of his entrance into the Conference, and in fact, have not the exact date of his decease, but have the evidences of his triumphant death. Brother Farley was known by us as an earnest and successful traveling preacher; and, therefore,

RESOLVED, That we recognize in the death of Brother Farley, the loss from our ranks of one of our most earnest and efficient preachers, and that this Conference hereby express their heartfelt sympathy with his wife and children—praying that God may bless them, and guide them through life and ultimately to eternal bliss.

Report of the Secretary of the Board of Missions of the Holston Conference M. E. Church, South, for the year 1878-79:

The Board begs leave to make the following report of its work during the present session.

The amount assessed the Holston Conference by the Parent Board for Foreign Missions for the year 1879-80 is \$3,480.00, which is an increase over the last assessment of about 20 per cent. The amount set apart by the Conference Board for its own use in supplying the Gospel to the destitute fields in the bounds of the Conference is \$3,895.00. This makes the aggregate sum called for by the two Boards \$7,345.00, which has been apportioned as follows:

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

WAYNESVILLE, N. C., October 14th, 1879.

To the Ministers and Members of Holston Conference, assembled in Abingdon, Greeting, from Holston Conference Woman's Missionary Society:

You are aware that a Conference Society was organized at your last annual meeting, held in Knoxville, Tenn., October, 1878. Also, that this specific Woman's work had already been adopted by the General Conference and incorporated in the Discipline, side by side with the Ritual of the Church. Such being the case, it is, therefore, no longer left optional with the Ministers whether they shall encourage the movement or not, but it has become their duty, as much as *any* pastoral or ministerial duty—holding its subordinate place, of course. We are glad this fact has been recognized and acted upon with so much cordiality by our preachers. The Conference Society is impressed with the importance of enlisting the sympathies and gaining the active co-operation of every Presiding Elder and pastor in charge of station or circuit; they *must* approve, they must *go in advance*, if *we* keep pace with our convictions of right, and *even in sight* of our sisters in other Conferences.

The Corresponding Secretary has, therefore, been requested to send to your body this appeal for your continued support, and, also, a statement of work accomplished within the bounds of the Conference during this first year of our organized existence, feeling assured that such appeal will not be made in vain, and the information gladly received; believing, also, that, as opportunity arrives, every Presiding Elder and pastor will not only co-operate, but himself inaugurate the work, by organizing societies at every station and on every circuit where it is possible to do so. Few preachers will find a place so barren that three or four leading, intelligent women may not be found, who, after being taught the object of this Associa-

tion and the manner of conducting auxiliaries, will not enter into the spirit of it with a zeal according to their knowledge, and the pastor will soon find the influence vitalizing to every other church interest.

At the annual meeting of the Conference Society, held in Knoxville last April, the districts were apportioned between the four Vice Presidents, so as to bring them into the *very heart* of the work, Mrs. Wiley, of Emory; Mrs. Ray, of Asheville; Mrs. Davis, of Knoxville, and Mrs. McMillen, of Chattanooga. Some of these ladies have written to every pastor in their Districts, and have done what they could to have auxiliaries formed. Mrs. Matt. McClung, the President, will spare no labor or pains to push on the work, while the Recording Secretary, Miss Lou Jorolmon, and the Treasurer, Mrs. Nat. Woodward, are ready, in season and out of season, to do anything in their power. The Treasurer gave a bond of \$500.00, unasked, of course, and her work is always correctly and promptly finished. So much for the distinctive work of the Conference Society. For the details of work done by the whole body—the General Association—you are referred to the Annual report lately published. You will there find historical sketches dating the origin of *all Women's Missionary Societies*, back to the time of *Dr. Olin*, also an account of the first annual meeting, held in Louisville, Ky., with an epitome of work *accomplished* and *projected* in China, Brazil, and Mexico, all plainly set forth in our untiring Corresponding Secretary's Report, Mrs. McGavock, of Nashville, who devotes her whole time to this work. By looking at the report of the Committee on Extension of Work, you will see that these women are in earnest and mean to make this a life-time work for themselves and to leave it for an inheritance to their children. Below you will find the report, which is believed to be correct, as far as it goes, but it is regretted that many of the Auxiliaries are *very slow* to send in their quarterly reports, and some of them do not send any at all. This is embarrassing to the Conference Secretary, who desires and is required to send her reports promptly. It is believed there are Auxiliaries formed who have not yet sent in their reports of organization, and, of course, their names cannot appear on our list.

We hope a closer study of our Constitution and By-Laws

will remedy this serious drawback to our success. Before closing there is one phase of our work that must not be overlooked; but how shall we estimate or measure it? By what standard shall we measure the increase of faith, the confirmation of hope, the perfectness of love? We cannot calculate, in figures, the rich "*gifts of the Spirit*" that are poured out upon those who, prayerfully and with liberal souls, give their time, talents and money to send that Gospel, which has so enriched them, to the benighted wives and mothers in heathen lands. We cannot measure the *fruits of the Spirit*, that so refresh those who do not become weary in *this* well-doing; neither can we estimate the blessedness that comes in the effort to bless others—the rich recompense of reward to self-denial, nor the *knowledge* that is the *sure result* of DOING the will of God. All these must be placed under the head of "Unreported Work," and right here may be found some of the *richest* results of the Woman's Missionary Society, and it is gratifying to believe that in *this* part of the work there will be found a *reflex growth* in the hearts of those for whom we are praying and working; and this is a *sure foretoken* of our complete success.

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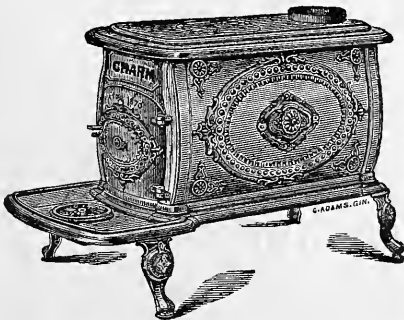
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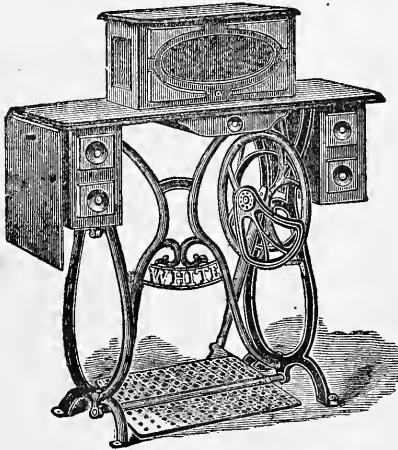
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
