SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, October 21.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop McTyeire in the chair. Religious services were conducted by S. R. Wheeler. The minutes of previous session were read and approved.

Dr. McFerrin was introduced and addressed the Conference.

New Record Book.—J. R. Payne, Assistant Secretary, announced that the Conference Record Book was filled and a new one purchased, but not paid for. W. H. Price was appointed to take private subscriptions for this purpose.

Dr. Fitzgerald.—A communication from Dr. Fitzgerald, editor of the Christian Advocate at Nashville, was received, read and referred to the Committee on Books and Periodicals.

Remain on Trial.—THE SECOND QUESTION. "Who re-

main on trial?" was called, and B. W. Fielder, J. L. Prater, David McCracken, Claiborne M. Campbell, David V. Price, Joseph A. Cook, W. J. Sage and W. H. Horton were continued on trial and advanced to class of second year.

A. J. Brooks Transferred.—The name of A. J. Brooks, of the same class, was called and his transfer to the Western Virginia Conference announced.

Elected to Deacons Orders.—The EIGHTH QUESTION. "Who are elected to Deacon Orders?" was taken up, and W. M. Belamy, Eugene Blake, William M. Boring, George W. Jackson, Richard A. Kelley, James L. Kennedy, John W. Lloyd, J. Early Moore, Emory B. Robertson, Oscar F. Sensabaugh, Richard G. Waterhouse, W. A. Thomas, James H. Weaver and John C. Bays, having passed an approved examination by the Committee of the second year, were called, their characters passed and they were elected to Deacons Orders.

J. J. Brooks, S. L. Richardson.—J. J Brooks not having passed an approved examination, and S. L. Richardson, who is absent, were continued on trial in the class of the second year.

Time Prolonged.—The hour of adjournment having arrived, on motion, the session was prolonged until the examination of this class was finished.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY MORNING, October 22.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop McTyeire in the chair. Religious services were conducted by J. H. Brunner. Minutes read and approved.

E. H. Holland.—E. H. Holland, alternate, took the place of C. A. Nichols, of the Asheville district.

Good Templars.—A communication from the Order of Good Templars was received, read and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

Memorial from Wytheville District.—H. C. Neal presented a memorial from the District Conference of the Wytheville District which was read and referred to a special committee of three.

Communications from the Colleges.—Communications from the Trustees of Sullins College, Martha Washington College, People's College and Hiwassee College were read and referred to the Committee on Education.

Dr. Savage.—The Rev. Dr. Savage, Agent of the American Bible Society, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Class of 4th Year.—The Seventh Question, "Who are the Deacons of one year?" was taken up. Harvey P. Bailey, Geo. A. Maiden, Wm. B. Pickens, Geo. W. Summers, Robert Owens, Robert A. Hutsell, Geo. A. Oglesby and John R. Hixon having passed the requisite examination, were passed and advanced to the class of the fourth year.

THE FIFTH QUESTION, "Who are re-admitted?" was taken up, and John R. Stewart being recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Jasper circuit, of which he is a member, was re-admitted.

Class of 3d Year.—A. G. Blankenbeckler, Jas. M. Gross and Joseph F: Wampler were passed, but not having been before the committee of the third year were continued in the class of the third year.

Charles, of Rheatown circuit; Wm. R. Snider, of Sevierville circuit, and Lawrence Forkner, of Sweetwater circuit, having been four successive years local preachers in the M. E. Church, South, and being recommended by the quarterly conferences of which they are members, were elected deacons.

Time Prolonged.—The hour of adjournment having arrived, the session was prolonged until this case should be disposed of.

THIRD DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

FRIDAY, October 22.

Conference met at 3 o'clock, P. M., Bishop McTyeire in the chair. Religious services by F. M. Grace. Minutes of previous session read and approved.

Rev. J. H. Torbett.—A communication from Rev. J. H. Torbett, of the Western Conference, asking for transfers from this conference was read.

Local Deacons Elected.—The TENTH QUESTION, "What local preachers are elected deacons?" was taken up, and David McCracken having been four consecutive years a local preacher in the M. E. Church, South, and one year on trial in the traveling ministry, was elected to deacons orders.

Local Elders Elected — The FOURTEENTH QUESTION, "What local preachers are elected elders?" was taken up, when Samuel W. Brown, of the Wytheville circuit, Isaac N. Boyd, of Buchanan mission, Abner J. Dean, of Powell's Valley circuit, Lewis E. Miller, of Eleazer circuit, having been four consecutive years local deacons, and being recommended by the quarterly conferences to which they belong, and certifying their belief in the doctrine and discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, were elected elders. Report of Education.—The Committee on Education presented its report which was adopted as a whole, after addresses by Drs. Sullins and Brunner, also by Revs. E. E. Hoss, D. S. Hearon, J. Atkins, jr., and W. B. Stradley.

The Committee on Education have received reports and communications from the following institutions and submit the following report :

EMORY AND HENRY COLLEGE.

While not matriculating so large a number of students as in some years of its former history, has shown under its newly organized Faculty elements

of vigor and strength that augur a speedy return to prosperity equalling its palmiest days. The leaven of its Alumni, and the consecration given it by its projectors and founders, together with the necessities which the growth and development of Christianity, and the increase of population within our bounds, have created, will, we feel assured, renew its growth and assure its future usefulness and prosperity.

MARTHA WASHINGTON COLLEGE

Has matriculated 88 pupils for the present session and with its able Board of instructors promises to confer a high benefit upon the church by sending out her daughters, educated, and consecrated to the duties of Christianity and the elevation of society.

SULLINS COLLEGE.

Now under the direction of an able Faculty, has, in its opening session, enrolled quite a flattering number in its various departments. Conducted by its present Faculty, aided by an active and enterprising Board of Trustees, it gives us pledges of large benefits to the cause of liberal education and the Church.

HIWASSEE COLLEGE AND SWEETWATER FEMALE INSTITUTE.

Are under the direction of one and the same Presidency. Each department is furnished with an efficient corps of professors and teachers. These schools have already rendered valuable services to the church and the public, and deserve and will, we doubt not, command a more liberal patronage.

PEOPLE'S COLLEGE,

Situated in the extreme Western division of the Conference, is a desideratum to that section topographically cut off, as it is, from the main body of the Conference. It is now the property of the M. E. Church, South, in fee simple and without debt. It is properly organized with an efficient board of instruction, and promises well for the church and the section in which it is located.

ASHEVILLE FEMALE COLLEGE,

Though not a Conference school is conducted as a Methodist school by a member of this Conference. He has shown his ability as an organizer and a commendable enterprize in the efficiency of the Faculty he has chosen. The present patronage with an assured increase warrant a career of usefulness to the church for this institution.

WEAVERVILLE COLLEGE

Is not a Conference school but is under Methodist direction, and with a newly organized Faculty will, we feel assured, render valuable service to

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the church by educating Methodist youths not likely to be educated at any other college.

Thus much we have said by way of calling attention to the leading schools under our denominational direction within our Conference, but graver questions than mere complimentary notices of principals and teachers, or eligibility of location and surroundings, present themselves to your Committee. We leave the work of flattery to editors and correspondents while we, by the courtesy of the Conference, briefly discuss a question that concerns the future of the church in our bounds and involves considerations that reach into eternity. Action without conviction of duty is never reliabe and praiseworthy. To secure that patronage our schools so richly merit, and develope that degree of education which the necessities of the church and our own children demand, we must move under the force of strong conviction and go to the very foundation.

Your Committee have endeavored to arrive at the approximate numbers of Methodist children and youths under twenty years of age within our The nearest approach to that number may, we think, Conference bounds. be found in our Sunday School statistics. The numbers in our Conference Sunday Schools, as reported last, were a little over 26,000. This we take as the basis of the argument, and, whether the aggregate of our Methodist children be more or less, the approximation is ample for our present The aggregate of Methodist children and youth, for the last purpose. year, in graded schools, within our bounds, whether under Methodist direction or otherwise, is, according to the best light before us, about sixteen hundred. This leaves of the 26,000 by deduction 24,400. By deducting 25 per cent. from the 1,600, as probably not in the Academic course, it leaves us only 1,200 out of the 26,000 as really under Academic instruction. You will readily see by the figures, that of the assumed aggregate of our Methodist children, there are 24,800 not accounted for. Of this number, perhaps one-fourth are of proper age for an Academic course. According to these figures there are six thousand and two hundred Methodist youths within the bounds of Holston Conference not in any College or graded school, Methodist and otherwise. These facts have caused the faces of your Committee to burn with shame, and ought to fix the profoundest conviction upon the mind of every member of this Conference. We cannot survive as a church unless we go forward. We cannot be guiltless unless we secure to the children of the church a more liberal education than we have done in the past. We cannot meet the obligations we are under to God and the demands of Christianity if we allow our children to grow up in ignorance. The infidelity of the age, it may be said, is educated, and to meet it, and withstand and refute its sophistries we must have a consecrated education embodied in educated Christians and an educated Christian ministry. For this very purpose have our schools and colleges been built. To supply them with patronage we have over twentyfour thousand Methodist children besides the patronage we already derive from other Christian churches and the world, from which to crowd their

halls. With such a storehouse from which to draw there should neither be jealousy nor distrust among our colleges and schools.

There is still a profounder consideration underlying all we have saidone which, as christian ministers, we cannot ignore. The pastoral obligation, as we understand it, is not limited to parents and the adult members of the church, but extends with peculiar pledges to the children of the Every member of the Conference, before he was admitted into church. full connection, made a solemn pledge to diligently instruct the children in his charge. By this pledge every pastor in the church is made in a high degree responsible for the education of the children of the church. By the discharge of this pastoral obligation many of our children may be inspired with strong desires for education which will bring them into our colleges and high schools, and thereby insure a more general, liberal education amongst us. By this means, your committee believe that every school we have may be filled to overflowing from the Methodist ranks alone, and the cause of christianity and sanctified education greatly advanced.

One more consideration of primary importance we beg to be allowed to mention. The twenty-five thousand Methodist children in the Holston Conference, now without liberal education, and amongst whom are perhaps some of the brightest intellects of the age, appeal in the name of christianity to philanthropists—persons whom God has invested as stewards over the vast means they possess, to come forward and endow our colleges so as to cheapen education in them and thereby develope this great wealth of intellect.

The minutes of the morning session were read, corrected and approved.

Temperance.—The Committee on Temperance presented their report, which was read and adopted.

Report of Committee on Temperance.—Your committee submit the following :

We have not been able to collate such facts and figures as the magnitude of the subject demands. The Gospel, with open mouth, commands The observance of its precepts, in reus to be temperate in all things. gard to this phase of human life, will keep us from whatever is abusive of the body or hurtful of the soul, and will enable us to present our souls and bodies a living sacrifice unto God. That we might have the best bodies, as well as the purest souls, seems to have been Mr. Wesley's idea Therefore we are admonished, both by of human perfection on earth. his words and practice, to abstain from the gratification of every sinful fleshly appetite, and particularly to abstain from the use of ardent spirits. That he thought this a matter of prime importance is evidenced by the fact that he incorporated into the special rules of our church a specific law on this subject—a law which every loyal Methodist should respect and observe.

To confine our report more especially to this topic, we are glad to state we have found out from personal conversation with many of the members of this Conference, that while there is much to deplore, there is also a great awakening upon this all-important subject. How we shall put down the flood-gates of the river of woe, which desolates so many homes, destroys so many promising lives, makes unwilling and weeping serfs of once happy and honored wives, crushes every flower in the hearts and along the pathway of thousands of innocent children and buries in the darkest of all graves—the drunkard's—so many fond hopes, is a question of such immense magnitude as should cause us to watch with sleepless eye every channel by which it makes insidious advancement. That there are eighty thousand persons in these United States who are annually destroyed by this monster evil, is a fact that is appalling to every man who loves his race, and should bring out the prayers of those who nestle in the arms of safety for the miserable unfortunates who are in chains that no

hand can break, save that of Jesus Christ. God deliver us, as a church, from this dreadful sin. May our altars be as free from drunkards as that city of which no drunkard is ever an inhabitant!

In the light of the facts before us, we offer the following resolution, which, we conceive, covers the plea of the citizens of Morristown and the members of the Lodge of Independent Order of Good Templars, which was referred to us:

RESOLVED, That we, the Holston Conference of the M. E. Church, South, composed in Tennessee of some sixty ministers, and some twenty thousand members, being citizens of the State of Tennessee, most respectfully and earnestly declare our belief that the use of intoxicating liquors, as a beverage, is the greatest and most desolating evil in the State to-day; wasting the people's money by the million, depraving the public morals, producing wide-spread poverty and suffering, blighting thousands of homes. Therefore, we do earnestly memorialize the Legislature to enact a Local Option Law, giving the people the right to decide by vote whether they will have intoxicating spirits sold within their counties, towns and cities. We further

RESOLVE, That we will continue earnestly to pray Almighty God to deliver us from this evil, and lead us not into temptations.

RESOLVED FURTHERMORE, That we will endeavor prayerfully to enforce our wholesome legislation on this subject.

On motion of George Stewart, F. W. Earnest was appointed to present the memorial contained in the Temperance Committee's report to the Legislature of Tennessee.

Orphan and Indigent Asylum.—F. W. Earnest presented a paper which was read and adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, It is a deplorable fact that there are many vagabond children of vicious parentage, and many orphan children in destitute circumstances in our towns and throughout the country in Tennessee; and,

WHEREAS, There is no public institution under the patronage of the State of Tennessee where these unfortunate children can be gathered and trained in the ways of morality and religion; and,

WHEREAS, Many of our sister States have such institutions operating successfully in this great work; and,

WHEREAS, There is in East, Middle and West Tennessee a movement to secure such an institution of this benevolent character; Therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE HOLSTON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, NOW ASSEMBLED, That we most heartily sympathize with said movement, and that we will co-operate with our sister churches and

other benevolent societies in petitioning the Legislature of Tennessee to take into consideration the importance of this enterprise, and to adopt such measures as will result in the establishment of such a benevolent institution. (Signed). J. W. EARNEST.

Report of Committee on Books and Periodicals.—The Committee on Books and Periodicals presented their report, which, after addresses by Dr. J. B. McFerrin, E. E. Hoss, Bishop McTyeire and Dr. Sullins, was amended and adopted.

After a careful examination of the reports of the preachers, and of other papers referred to us, your committee beg leave to report that there have been \$2,492.32 worth of books sold by our preachers and their agents, against \$2,095 as reported last year, showing an increase of \$397.32. Eight hundred and seventeen Christian Advocates are taken, and one thousand three hundred and thirty Holston Methodists, against six hundred and thirty-five of the first, and nine hundred and thirty-four of the second, including all other religious periodicals, except seven Quarterly Reviews. Quarterly Reviews now taken, thirteen, and three hundred and seven other periodicals.

It was impossible for your committee to determine, with any degree of accuracy, the amount of Sunday School periodicals taken, but we think they have had a corresponding increase of circulation with our books and other periodicals. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, 1ST, That we hail with gratitude the success of our Publishing House, and heartily endorse the administration of our Book Agent, Rev. J. B. McFerrin.

RESOLVED, 2ND, That we will strive to increase the sale of our own books and periodicals, especially our connectional organ, the Nashville Christian Advocate, and our conference organ, the Holston Methodist, and also of the "Woman's Missionary Advocate," edited by our Sister, Mrs. F. A. Butler, and of the "Advocate of Missions," edited by Dr. Wilson.


RESOLVED, 3RD, That the Holston Annual, published by Rev. J. R. Payne, is a necessity, and we pledge our support to the sale of the same.

Division of Conference.—J. S. Burnett, from the Special Committee on Memorial, from the Wytheville District Conference, presented the committee's report, which was adopted.

The committee to whom was referred the memorial from the Wytheville District Conference in regard to establishing a new conference embracing South-west Virginia, has had the same under consideration, and make the following report:

The question of division of territory is a grave one, and should be approached considerately; the memorial is from one district conference in our Virginia territory, and we have information through private sources that the same proposition was presented to Abingdon District Conference, and was withdrawn; so the question is equally balanced by the action of the two district conferences. This part of the Virginia territory has long been occupied by us, and as people and preachers, we are homogeneous; the grand valley stretching eastward to New River, our eastern boundary, and the railroad running through its centre and linking us together, facilitates our inter-communication and indicates our unity. Besides this, three of our leading educational institutions are located in this territory, the prosperity of which would be endangered by such division. It is perhaps not saying too much when we intimate that the conference has a property right in these institutions which ought not to be thoughtlessly alienated.

Having conferred with quite a number of representative brethren from different parts of the conference, we find the almost universal sentiment averse to it. Therefore we see no reason for the appointment of the committee asked for in the memorial.

RESOLVED, That Maj. F. W. Earnest is hereby appointed to present to the Legislature of Tennessee the memorial touching the establishment of a home for the indigent children of the State.

Church Property.—The Committee on Church Property presented their report, which was read, amended and adopted.

[The tabulated report being regarded as incorrect and incomplete, is not published, except the amount expended in "building and repairing churches," which find in financial exhibit. The balance of the committee's report is as follows:]

TO THE BISHOP AND MEMBERS OF THE HOLSTON ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

The Committee on Church Property have tabulated the reports coming into their possession. We can read for your hearing the entire report, the aggregate of districts, or the grand aggregate.

The reports are far from being satisfactory. The best we could do is what we have done—tabulated the reports handed in.

We offer for your consideration and adoption the following resolutions :

RESOLVED, That reports of church property hereafter be made to cover the following items: Number of churches, number of sittings, value of churches, number of parsonages, value of parsonages, value of other church property, moneys expended for building and repairing church property.

RESOLVED, That the resolution of 1876, requiring the amount and value of property only once in five years, be repealed.

KENNERLY C. ATKINS, CHAIRMAN.

The aggregate shows $476\frac{1}{2}$ churches; 13,765 sittings; \$418,-176 value of churches; 58 parsonages; \$38,686 value of parsonages; \$196,920 value of other church property; \$35,288.89 expended for building and repairing churches.

The Committee on Sunday Schools presented their report which was read and adopted.

Bishop McTyeire took the chair.

J. A. Lyons, Sunday School Secretary, read a paper in connection with the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools, which was received and ordered filed with the papers of the Conference.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We submit the following brief statement in view of the very full report of the Sunday School Secretary, made from his extensive acquaintance with the whole work. Our Sunday School literature is excellent and we heartily recommend it to the Sunday Schools to the entire exclusion of any other Sunday School literature from whatever source. The abundant labors of the Sunday School Secretary, Rev. J. A. Lyons, induce us to ask his reappointment. His usefulness in this field is known by all throughout the Conference, and we recommend that a salary of \$800.00 be allowed him, and that this sum be divided among the Presiding Elder's Districts, taking the assessments of the salaries of the preachers as a basis, and that the District Stewards divide these sums among the Sunday Schools. The following summary of the statistics is given here:

Number of schools, 537; officers and teachers, 3,780; scholars, 33,011; volumes in libraries, 15,191; Sunday School Magazines, 750; Sunday

Quarterlies, 6,196; Sunday School Visitors, 1,611; Our Little People, 5,267; Infant Class, 2,270; money expended for Sunday Schools, \$3,605.78.

J. A. Lyons, Sunday School Secretary, furnishes the following abstract of his report for publication:

During the year Sunday School Conferences were held at the following places, in the order designated, number and locality being left to the option of presiding elders and preachers in charge: Jasper, Pikeville, Grassy Cove and Rhea Springs, Sequatchee District; Chattanooga and Cleveland, Chattanooga District; Decatur, County-Line and Unitia, Athens District: Andersonville and Mount Moriah, Knoxville District; Morristown and Jonesville, Morristown District; Rheatown and Johnson City, Jonesboro District; Abingdon and Temple Hill, Abingdon District; Dublin, Mount Airy and Independence, Wytheville District; Seddon and Jeffersonville, Jeffersonville District; Bakersville, Mills River and Asheville, Asheville District; Renno's C. G. and Franklin, Franklin District.

In addition to the 27 Conferences held I have preached 55 times, visited and addressed 35 Sunday Schools besides 29 miscellaneous services, such as addressing Sunday School Mass Meetings, District and Quarterly Conferences. Miles traveled, 1,589.

From a careful scrutiny of this department of church enterprise in the bounds of our Conference I am more than ever convinced of the importance, not to say necessity, of giving it closer consideration in our ecclesiastical councils, and more pains-taking labor in its practical details.

While a commendable degree of activity is manifested in some quarters and not a few examples of well organized, well equipped and well taught schools are to be found, yet there is a reason to fear that we are not keeping pace with the progress of secular education. The disastrous consequence of a failure at this point are so obvious as to require no elaboration.

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This report would be unworthy of your attention if it failed to recognize the obligations I owe to the brethren who so generously assisted me during the year as District Secretaries. To brothers H. W. Bays, L. K. Haynes, W. L. Richardson, T. R. Handy, D. W. Carter, J. I. Cash, J. W. Robertson, G. D. French, J. W. Smith, L. M. Pease, of Asheville, and W. C. Carden, and to all others who, by word and deed, have everywhere given me a Methodist preacher's welcome and a hearty God-speed, I return my most sincere thanks. To this poor reward, the best within my power, will, I trust, be added that of the Master's joy when He shall say, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of my disciples ye did it unto me."

Report on State of Church.-H. P. Bailey, from the

Committee on "State of the church," presented report of the Committee which was read, and after some discussion was laid on the table.

Report of Board of Missions.—J. A. Atkins, jr., from the Board of Missions presented their report which was read and ordered to record.

Resolutions.—S. S. Grant presented the following resolutions, which were adopted :

RESOLVED, That reports from preachers in charge be handed to Committees on or before the second day of Conference.

RESOLVED, That the preachers in charge put their Missionary and Conference moneys into envelopes—separate envelopes—and properly label them for the Committees to which they belong.

F. W. Earnest presented the following resolutions of thanks which were adopted :

RESOLVED, That we, as a Conference, tender to the pastors and officers of the Baptist and Presbyterian churches of Morristown, our sincere thanks for the use of their churches and other courtesies shown us during the session of our Conference.

RESOLVED, That we do most heartily thank the good citizens of Morristown and vicinity, for their generous hospitality in the entertainment given to the Conference and the other friends of the church.

RESOLVED, That we thank the officers of the East Tennessee, Virginia and Georgia Railroad, and other roads who have given to members of this body reduced rates of travel.

Report of Memoirs.—E. E. Wiley presented a report from the Committee on "Memoirs," which was adopted.

MEMOIR OF WILLIAM M. CRAWFORD.

Though our departed brother was permitted to labor but a comparatively short time in the delightful work of winning souls to Christ in the fields of our beloved Holston, yet long enough to endear himself to us, his fellow-laborers, and to the people whom he so faithfully served. He was born Dec. 12th, 1842, in Giles county, Virginia, and died of pulmonary disease in Watauga county, North Carolina, March 2nd, 1880. He was converted while a boy, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; was licensed to exhort March 13th, 1869, and to preach August 28th, of the 'same year. He joined our conference in the fall of 1873; was ordained a deacon at the same session by Bishop Keener, and was ordained an elder by Bishop Doggett at Cleveland, Tennessee, October 28th, 1877. He was married in Wythe county, Virginia, to Miss Catharine A. Sharrits, March 27th, 1866.

After joining the conference, Brother Crawford traveled continuously, except one year, until the second quarterly meeting of last year, when, on account of failing health, he was compelled to relinquish his work and retire to his home. During the year and a half of his work on the Watauga circuit he impressed himself upon the people as a faithful and consecrated man, and their love for him was shown by the large assemblage which gathered at his funeral on the 4th of last March, when Brother Jas. T. Smith delivered an appropriate memorial sermon. He was buried with Masonic honors by his brethren of that fraternity, on a hill which overlooks Henson's Chapel.

A few days before his death, as is sometimes the case with even the best of men, clouds obscured his spiritual vision, and doubts burdened his struggling spirit; but when he came to the final hour, the clouds dispersed, the doubts were gone, the light broke in, and "glory" was the word that parted his dying lips.

Your committee feel constrained to exclaim with Paul, and they feel assured that the brethren of this conference will join them in it, "Thanks be to God, who give hus the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

MINUTES

OF THE

HOLSTON CONFERENCE,

OF THE M. E. CHURCH, SOUTH.

Held at Morristown, beginning October 20th, and ending October 25th, 1880, Bishop H. N. McTyeire, President,
B. W. S. Bishop, Secretary.

Question I. Who are admitted on trial?

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

ANNUAL REPORT OF HOLSTON CONFERENCE, WOMAN'S MIS-SIONARY SOCIETY.

To our Fathers and Brethren of the Holston Annual Conference:

We present the following report of work accomplished by the Holston Conference Woman's Missionary Society, of the M. E. Church, South, with cordial greetings. We gratefully acknowledge the courtesy, and the valuable assistance given us by many of your number. Their counsel, their prayers, and their cheerful co-operation in advancing all the interests of our work, have given us confidence and encouragement. We hope before another Conference year closes, that not one can be found who doubts the propriety and efficacy of woman's work, or who imagines for a moment that it can in any way conflict with his ministerial duties, or with his own collections. Cards have been written and annual reports of our Woman's Missionary Society have been sent to each Presiding Elder and to many other ministers, with the hope that they could be induced to form auxiliary societies in every district, at every point where it was practicable. Our work no longer needs an apologist, nor an argument to prove its value; it is known and recognized everywhere in all the churches. The facts and figures given below, are not as encouraging as we would like to report, but they give evidence of a vitality which is surely, though slowly maturing into an intelligent comprehension of duty, and the relation of woman to Foreign Missions.

Before closing we suggest that where a minister finds it impracticable to form an auxiliary society, it would be a good

plan to appoint one or two ladies to solicit contributions to the Woman's Missionary Advocate, thus forming a nucleus for an auxiliary in the future.
