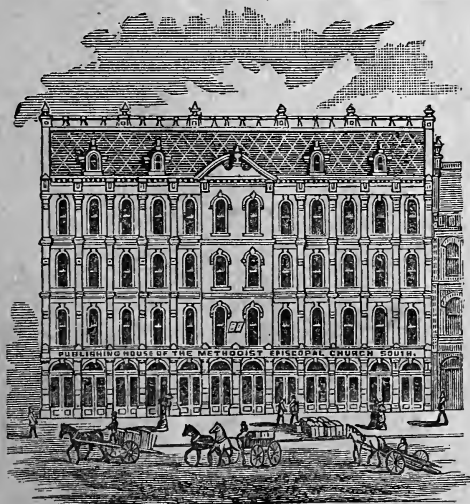

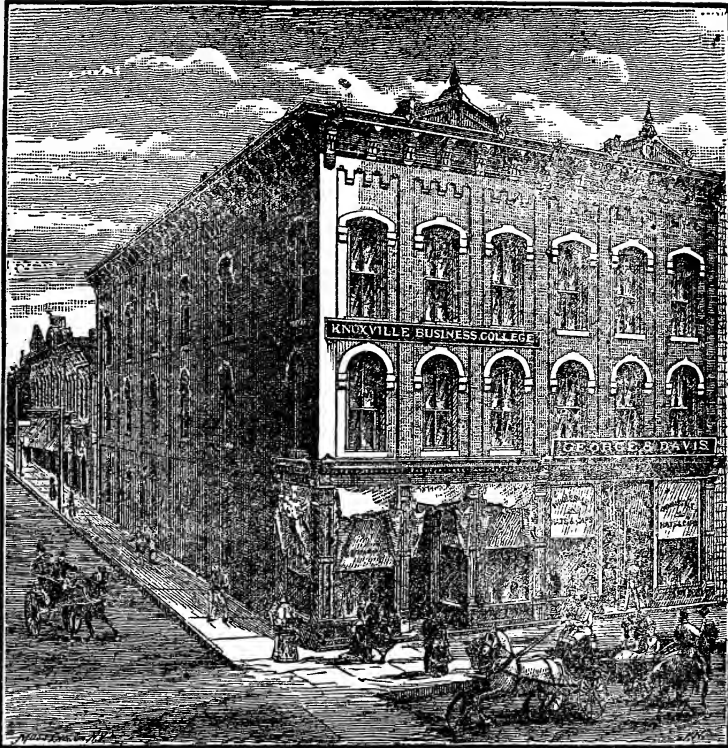

While not undertaking to do the work of a University, we yet try to give our pupils a sound and thorough drill in the Ancient and Modern Languages, Mathematics, and the natural and Moral Sciences. Hereto we are aided by good cabinets, apparatus, and libraries.

 3. Our location is most Excellent: we are in the Virginia mountains, twenty-five miles from the Tennessee line, and 2,100 feet above the Sea. Sickness is very rare among our pupils, and epidemic or malarial diseases are unknown. The surrounding scenery is equal in beauty to any in the country, and the society is of the best.

 4. Our purpose is to make this, in theory and in fact, a Christian College. A good religious spirit has almost uniformly prevailed from its foundation down to this date, and hundreds have here been converted.

 5. Our terms are liberal. Young men boarding at the College boarding-house can make \$175, easily cover all necessary expenses for the year, and by entering the messes, for which we have admirable arrangements, they can get through on \$150.

Missions, Church Extension, Education and Sunday School, together with a committee on Conference Relations, and the five Committees of Examination.

J. M. McTeer.—The committee of trial in case of J. M. McTeer, submitted their report, as follows;

The committee to whom was referred the case of John M. McTeer for trial on the following charge and specifications, viz:

CHARGE—Immoral conduct.

1. Specification—Drunkenness, on or about the 20th of July, 1886, in the city of Knoxville, Tenn.

2. Specification—Drunkenness, or drinking intoxicating liquors in the town of Bristol, on or about the 20th of June, 1886, beg leave to report:

1. That the evidence before them does not sustain the second specification.

2. That the evidence before them does sustain the first specification, drunkenness in Knoxville in July, 1886. But the committee recognize the fact that drunkenness may be either a habit or simply an act. In the case before us, there is no evidence that the accused ever had such habit; but on the contrary, that during his life he had been an advocate of temperance and an abstainer from the use of spiritous liquors. But it did appear from the evidence that the accused, at the time stated, entered a saloon in the city, procured and drank two glasses of lager beer, from the effects of which he staggered and fell on the street. It was also clear to the committee that the physical condition of the accused was then, had been for several months and still is, abnormal; whether from paralysis or softening of the brain, was not apparent even to the physicians who testified before us, but certainly abnormal, and that the mind of the accused is so affected thereby, that it is questionable whether he is always morally responsible for all his acts. He did, however, state before the committee, that he now sees that he did wrong, and deeply regrets the occurrence, and pledges himself that there shall be no recurrence of a like act. Looking then at all the circumstances, many of them surely properly designated as mitigating, your committee cannot declare the specification sustained in sense of criminality in the intention. The charge therefore is not sustained, and we recommend that the character of John M. McTeer do now pass.

WHEREAS, The Louisville, the Kentucky, and the Western Virginia Annual Conferences have by a united effort secured in cash and solvent notes and subscriptions which are being promptly paid, and nearly all of which will be collected during our present fiscal year the sum of \$15,000, being an average of \$5,000 to each Conference, and have thus founded the Kavanaugh Loan Fund, and demonstrated the practicability of similar efforts and success in other Conferences ; therefore be it

Resolved, That all the other Annual Conferences be and they are hereby invited and urged to make through their Conference Boards the effort to secure within their respective bounds between this time and the 31st of March next at least \$5,000 each, to be constituted into a separate Loan Fund to be named by the Conference and to be turned over to this Board and held and administered by it.

2 That whatever may have been paid by any Conference directly to our Board on the Centenary Loan Fund shall be transferred on our books from said Centenary Loan Fund to the credit of such Conference as a nucleus for a separate Loan fund whenever this Board is officially notified by the Conference of its acceptance of this offer.

On motion, it was ordered that we recommend for the adoption of the Conference, the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Holston Annual Conference hereby accepts the proposition of the Parent Board of Church-Extension as set forth above, and requests the Conference Board to perfect and put in operation a plan for securing at the earliest practicable time, at least five thousand dollars for the purposes above named.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The committee on Temperance submit the following report :

That we hail with pleasure the deep and widening public sentiment against the iniquitous liquor traffic.

We rejoice in the fact that our church has always stood abreast with the foremost in battling against this great evil. We regard this prohibitory movement of the people as from God, a harbinger of good, “the sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees.”

We regard temperance as a fundamental part of the gospel. No minister can preach a whole gospel and leave it out.

We would deprecate the introduction of questions purely political into the pulpit; but temperance is no more a political question than polygamy, theft, or murder; against which the pulpit, by its very commission, is compelled to “cry aloud and spare not,” and to suppress which civil laws are enacted.

In a government like ours, being “of the people, by the people and for the people,” we cannot if we would, divest ourselves of citizenship,

We regard the voters of the land as responsible for the existence and perpetuation of the liquor traffic. For when laws are offensive to the voters, legislators change them. It is a burning shame to our patriotism, and religion as well, that many of the primary elections in the large cities should be held in saloons; that the liquor power influences to a large extent by the two great political parties of the country; that more drunkards are made in Africa and Japan for rum shipped by one distillery in the United States, than converts by all the missionaries sent there. That nine dollars are spent for strong drink, where only two are spent for education and religion. Therefore,

Resolved 1st. That regarding the liquor traffic as iniquitous, and condemned by the word of God, no legislative body, whether Federal, State or municipal, has any moral right to authorize its manufacture and sale as a beverage.

Resolved 2nd. That while we most earnestly oppose the union of church and State, as citizens regarding the ballot as the great constitutional defender of American homes, we will cast our ballots as we pray, for the best interests of the Kingdom of Christ, our homes and our common country.

Resolved 3rd. That we recognize the great work being done by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, as worthy of all praise and pledge our moral support to that organization.

REPORT ON THE SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your committee on the State of the Church, beg leave to report as follows:

We note, as occasion for gratitude, that every district and almost every charge, in the Conference, has been visited with spiritual refreshings from the presence of the Lord, and from five to six thousand have been converted and added to the church. The word of the Lord has had “free course and been glorified.” Living waters have gone forth from our sanctuaries, carrying life and joy to thousands of thirsty souls. These gratifying results have been achieved under God, through the joint labors of our traveling and local ministers, seconded by the prayers and faith of christian men and women.

The local ministry is still our right arm of power, and should be honored and fostered by the church.

They break the bread of life to many hungry souls, and feed and provide for the Lord's family.

The thousands of young converts brought into the church this year will need special pastoral oversight. The shepherd should know his flock.

The fact was developed in the statements made before the Conference, that the holy communion is not regularly administered in some of our charges, even where they have ordained ministers. We would stress the importance of giving all our people an opportunity to celebrate the death and passion of our Lord Jesus Christ, at least once a year; it will prove a means of grace to them, and without it they cannot be said to have a complete gospel.

In our rejoicing over the victories won for the Redeemer and the enlargement of his blessed kingdom, let us remember that new responsibilities are imposed upon us as ministers and laymen.

In order to hold the vantage ground we will need a double unction from the Holy One. And just here we realize how much we have lost in suffering the class-meeting—the training school of the church—to decline.

Many young converts are lost to the church, and lost to heaven, we fear, because we no longer have among us the class-leader, the sub-shepherd, who used to lead the lambs of the flocks in “green pastures and beside still waters.”

We offer for adoption the following resolutions :

1st. That whilst we rejoice in the material prosperity of the church, the multiplication of churches and parsonages and the increased facilities for the spreading of scriptural holiness over the land, we will remember that the great end of gospel preaching is the salvation of souls ; and that as messengers—watchmen, stewards of the Lord— we will diligently seek for Christ's sheep that are dispersed abroad that they may be saved forever.

2nd. That we will endeavor to turn all our cares and studies this way, praying continually for the assistance of the Holy Spirit, that we may grow stronger in our ministry.

3rd. We will continue faithfully to warn our people against the popular vices and worldly amusements of the day.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION—Nos. 1 and 2.

Your Board of Education beg leave to submit the following report :

The relation of the church to the education of the young is a vital one. The cultivation of the mind without a corresponding cultivation of the heart is little better, if any, than no education at all. Unsanctified learning is not only a curse to its possessor, but makes him a dangerous member of society,

The church that neglects the education of the young is recreant to the best interests of society and guilty of high treason against the purposes for which she has been established. She cannot afford to relegate a work so important and involving interests so vital to the State or commit it into the hands of irreligious and irresponsible individuals. She must, as far as practicable, control the education of her young people, if she would have them develop into intelligent and useful manhood and womanhood.

Methodism in Holston, though poor in the main, has made commendable effort to furnish to her sons and daughters the facilities for christian education. Seven chartered colleges and a number of high schools stand as monuments of her zeal and enterprise. But we deplore the fact that these schools are not sustained as they should be. The great mass of our people are either too poor, or too indifferent to the cause of christian education, to give to these schools the support which their merits, and the importance of the work they do, demands ; yet we rejoice and render devout thanksgiving to God for the good which these schools under His directing hand have achieved in the past, and for that degree of prosperity which they now enjoy.

Emory and Henry College.—This old and popular institution from whose walls hundreds of educated young men have gone forth to adorn the different walks of life, still maintains its high standard of excellence. With a full and able faculty, at no period in its history was it better prepared to do thorough work in all its departments than at present. The present session has opened under favorable auspices, ninety-one students having already matriculated, with a fair prospect of an increase in the near future. We are gratified to learn that the debt with which this school has been embarrassed is in process of liquidation, and we hope that at no distant day the entire debt will be wiped out. We think the Board of Trust has been fortunate in securing the services of Dr. E. E. Wiley as treasurer and financial agent, and we would commend him and the important interest which he represents to the favorable consideration and hearty co-operation of our people. We would respectively ask the Board of Trust to

consider the propriety of making Bishop R. K. Hargrove a member of their body and of appointing him to its chairmanship, made vacant by the death of the lamented Judge Campbell.

Martha Washington College, still holds her proud position among the female colleges of the land. She is now under the presidency of that able and experienced educator, the Rev. D. S. Hearon, A. M.—Drs. Wiley and Buchanan having severed their connection with the school. President Hearon has a full faculty of experienced and competent teachers, and is well equipped for thorough work in all the departments of female education. The present session has opened well and the prospect for a liberal patronage is flattering.

The department of music is now full to overflowing.

We are pleased to note that the charges of this school have been reduced. By the sale of northeast college and a small portion of land cut off from the campus, the trustees have made a reduction in the debt of about seven thousand dollars. We commend Martha Washington to the confidence of our people and the public generally, and bespeak from them a generous patronage.

Sullin's College.—This school, for female learning, is located in the thrifty and growing town of Bristol. Rev. D. S. Hearon having resigned the presidency of Sullin's College, to take charge of Martha Washington, the curators elected the Rev. L. L. H. Carlock an honored member of your body, to preside over its fortunes. President Carlock brings to this responsible position, courage, energy and enterprise, and with the assistance of a carefully selected and capable faculty, with the blessings of the Great Head of the Church, will be able to keep the school up to that high standard of usefulness which it attained under its former management. The enrollment to date is one hundred and forty-four. Let all the friends of christian education do what they can to sustain this institution.

Centenary College.—Located in Cleveland, Tenn., the youngest of our female schools, has begun its second session under the most flattering auspices. From the report of the Board of Trust, we take the following extract :

“For this scholastic year to date, one hundred and ten have matriculated, fifty-six of whom are boarding in the college; seventy-five are taking lessons in instrumental music and ten in vocal music, while there are twenty-eight in the art department.”

A large and handsome new building has been projected to meet the demands of a steadily growing patronage. While there is a debt of seven or eight thousand dollars on the property, with the large and increasing patronage and solvent subscriptions not yet collected, the Board of Trust represent the school to be on a sound financial basis. Much might be said of the importance of this institution to the cause of education in the section in which it is located; of the liberality of those who projected it and who have chiefly borne its financial burdens, and of the zeal and energy of the president and his able faculty, but we must forbear.

Hiwassee College.—We are not insensibie to the noble work which Hiwassee College has done for the church and the country. Eighty-one of her students have already become active workers in the Christian ministry and her alumni are found in every honorable profession and pursuit of life. The biennial catalogue contains 102 names of students, representing twelve States in the Union. A beautiful additional building for college purposes is now receiving the finishing touches of the painter's brush, and is ready for occupation.

We bespeak for Hiwassee the cordial sympathy and earnest support of our people, throughout the limits of the Conference.

Sweetwater Female Institute, formerly known as Victoria College, and located at Sweetwater, Tenn., has been transferred to the Quarterly Conference of the Sweetwater Circuit. A local Board of Trustees have been appointed, and Prof.

W. W. Smith has been elected president. He has associated with him a sufficient number of excellent teachers to fill every department in the Institute. We commend this school to the liberal patronage of the public.

People's College.—Located at Pikeville, in the beautiful Sequatchie Valley, in lower East Tenn., remains under the efficient management of C. C. Fisher, A. M., assisted by a corps of excellent teachers. The past session was one of the most prosperous in the history of the school, and the indications are that the present session will be an advance on that of last year. It is vitally important to Southern Methodism in that part of our territory where it is located that People's College be sustained; and we would urge upon our people the importance of rallying to its support.

Weaverville College.—Located in the quiet village of Weaverville, N. Ca., is still under the efficient direction of the Rev. D. Atkins, A. M., as its president. The teachers in the different departments are worthy and well qualified to do thorough work. The school is widening the sphere of its influence, and steadily growing in popular favor. The catalogue shows a matriculation of 120 students last year. The enrollment to date of the present term is ninety. Weaverville is located in a very important part of our conference territory, and its success involves in a large measure the destiny of Southern Methodism in Western North Carolina.

Asheville Female College.—We are gratified to note the large and growing patronage of this popular institution of learning. One hundred and ninety-one names were catalogued as students last year. Up to date this year about one hundred and forty. There has been an increase of boarding pupils over last year of fifteen per cent. Every department is thought to be in better condition than in any former year. The faculty is full and well organized and prepared to do efficient work in every department.

We commend this school to the confidence and cordial support of our people.

District High Schools.—The board is pleased to learn that High Schools have been established in most of our districts, and that they are receiving a liberal patronage from our people. Let such schools be established wherever it may be practicable.

New Market College Property.—We learn from a paper submitted for our examination, that the property of New Market College is now in the possession of our people; and, we recommend, that it be sold and that the proceeds of the sale be applied to the erection of a church edifice at New Market, Tenn., for the use and benefit of our congregation which worship at that place, as recommended in the paper referred to above.

The board would offer the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st. That we recommend the appointment of Rev. James Atkins to the presidency of Asheville Female College.

Resolved 2nd. That we request the pastors on the different charges to impress upon our people, both from the pulpit and in their pastoral and social visits, the importance of affording as far as practicable to their children the facilities of christian education, in connection with the various institutions under our own control.

Your committee on Books and Periodicals beg leave to report the following: To emphasize the importance of the general diffusion of a healthful religious literature, we would regard at this time as a work of supererogation. The immemorial policy of the Methodist church is so well understood, that extended remarks on that line, would be superfluous. It may not be amiss, however, to say that there are peculiar circumstances now encompassing us which make it important that we should even quadruple our diligence in furnishing our people with an abundance of good reading matter. This is the book-making and the book-reading age. In our day a man is known not so much by the company he keeps, as by the books and papers which he reads. Much of the current literature is positively vicious, of a great deal more it is appropriate to say that it is idle, senseless jargon, yet charming still the greedy reader on, till done he tries to recollect his thoughts, and nothing finds but dreaming emptiness. The imperative is upon us, in self-defense and for Christ's sake, we are bound to see to it, that our own publications, which are pure, and healthful and helpful,

are widely disseminated. Our fathers read the works of Wesley, Fletcher, Watson, *et id omne genus*, and we are impressed with the idea that were the deeply pious and thoroughly brainful productions of these grand old masters more extensively circulated and read the tone of our common Methodism would soon be perceptibly elevated and improved.

We heartily congratulate all concerned upon the present prosperous condition of our Publishing House; the Rubicon has been passed, the house enjoys a splendid patronage; its credit is first-class, and with the continued co-operation of all our people, the Southern Methodist Publishing House will enter upon a career of unexampled prosperity and usefulness. The venerable book agent, Dr. J. B. McFerrin and the magnetic and efficient business manager, Mr. L. D. Palmer, are entitled to honorable mention in connection with the hopeful condition of this important institution.

The Nashville CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, edited by Dr. O. P. Fitzgerald, is a strong, bright pure paper. Its circulation now approximates twenty-eight thousand, (28,000) with other districts to hear from, which we earnestly hope will in the near future give it the fifty thousand so pathetically asked for by the gifted and cultured editor.

The bi-monthly REVIEW, edited by Dr. W. P. Harrison, is printed on excellent paper, in clear bold type; mechanically it is a gem, and being under the control of Dr. Harrison, is the highest possible guarantee of its ability and respectability. We feel humiliated in view of the insufficient support hitherto accorded by our church to publications of this character, and most cordially commend the REVIEW to our ministers and more intelligent and thoughtful laymen.

Our Sunday School periodicals are simply *ne plus ultra*, edited by our own dear brethren, Cunyningham and Lyons, they ought by every token to be in all Southern Methodist Sunday Schools, and let all the people say, Amen.

As the recognized organ of our Conference, we cordially commend the HOLSTON METHODIST to all our people. Recently the mechanical make-up of the paper has been greatly improved, and it is now a thing of beauty. The editor, Rev. R. N. Price, is one of the most versatile and forceful writers belonging to Southern Methodism, while Mr. W. H. Valentine, as business manager, has shown himself to be a workman that needeth not to be ashamed. The paper ought to have at least three thousand paying subscribers. The list numbers about seventeen hundred. Your committee are of the opinion that the great body of our ministers are in hearty sympathy with the METHODIST. We all realize the indispensable importance of a Conference organ, but by reason of the multitudinous purposes for which, by virtue of their positions, the preachers are required to solicit contributions, they are, in a measure, incapacitated for becoming efficient agents for the HOLSTON METHODIST.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

Your committee on the Bible Cause submit the following: The reports of the preachers, with a few exceptions, show that their collections for this important enterprise, have been quite meager. We are glad to note, however, that some of them received liberal donations from their people, and other, smaller contributions for this cause. We have ascertained that the receipts of the American Bible Society, during the fiscal year, as compared with the previous year, have fallen off \$64,000 and for the corresponding period, the Society fell off in its issues 110,000 volumes. While there has been very efficient and thorough canvassing by Bible agents within the bounds of our conference, we yet find many families and individuals, who are in part or altogether destitute of the scriptures. This is a deplorable condition of things, and it ought not so to be. It is a divinely inspired declaration that the entrance of God's word giveth light.

We believe also that the Bible possesses a vitality and a potency of its own, altogether independent of the efforts of man. Of the truth of this we have abundant evidence in the conversion of numbers of people in our own, and even in heathern lands, resulting alone from the reading of God's word. In consideration of these things and in view of the fact that there is an urgent demand for the Bible at home and abroad, we submit the following resolution:

1. That the preachers be urged to present the claims of the American Bible Society to all the congregations in their respective charges, and that they take up collections for the same at the earliest opportunity.

2. That they be requested to encourage, and to heartily co-operate with the agents of the American Bible Society who may be prosecuting their labor of love within the bounds of their respective fields of labor.

REPORT OF OMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

WILLIAM M. BELLAMY, was born in Scott county, Va., August 8th, 1847. Of his early life we have no knowledge. He was converted, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the Autumn of 1863. He was licensed to exhort Nov. 20th, 1869. His license to preach bears date August 23d, 1873. Impressed with the thought that he must enter the pastoral work, he sought to fit himself for that high vocation by attending Hiwassee College. His college life was blameless. His influence among his fellow-students was excellent. In the prayer-meetings, and in the revival that blessed the college, during his stay there, he was an active and efficient worker.

He was received on trial into the Holston Conference, October 1878, and appointed to Sneedville circuit, where he labored two years. October 24th, 1880,

he was ordained Deacon by Bishop McTyeire, and appointed to Rye Cove circuit where he also spent two years. He was next employed for two years on Bristol circuit. In October 1884, he was ordained Elder by Bishop Keener, and appointed to Powells Valley circuit, where he closed his life.

In the latter part of July, 1886, his family was afflicted with fever. His wife was so ill for weeks that he scarcely left her bedside. At last, when he was enfeebled by long watching, disease fastened upon him, and he gradually sank until death came, on the morning of September 12th, 1886.

Bro. Bellamy was an earnest efficient preacher. His heart was in his work. Snow and rain did not keep him from his appointments. Often in weariness and pain he held up the standard when others were faint from fatigue. The last year of his life was the richest revival season he perhaps ever enjoyed. Nearly two hundred conversions followed his labors. His christian experience was rich. He had faith in God, and from that faith he had peace. While on his bed of death he experienced the fulfillment of the promises of God. On Saturday the 11th, he was informed that his end was probably nigh. He promptly responded "thank God, I am ready." He then made arrangements as to his earthly business. His mind then fixed itself upon eternal things. Camp-meeting was in progress at Jonesville camp-ground, three miles from his residence, and on Monday of the meeting he had expected to take part in a memorial service. Thinking of this he said "I shall meet Bro. Havelly in heaven before his funeral sermon is preached." Through the day, Saturday, he was, in his own words, "sailing on a sea of glory." On through the night he continued to rejoice, and before the light of the Sabbath came he entered the Sabbath of heaven. Bro. Bellamy's memory will be cherished by hundreds whom he led to Christ. And his flock, among whom he died, will not soon forget his faithful labors. It was a sore bereavement to his charge, and the tear-dimmed eyes, and broken voices around his coffin told how strong was the hold he had upon the affections of his people.

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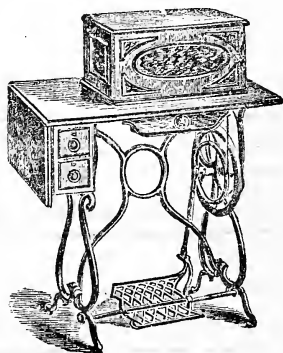
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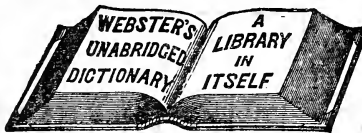
