FIRST DAY.

MORRISTOWN, TENN., Oct. 2, 1889.

The Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in its sixty-sixth annual session in Morristown, Tenn., October 2nd., 1889, Bishop A. W. Wilson in the chair.

Rev. B. W. S. Bishop came forward holding in his hand a beautiful cane, and said he had been requested by the donor, J. W. Paulett, of Knoxville, to present it to Bishop A. W. Wilson.

The Bishop was in a most amiable mind and the little presentation speech commanded silent attention and won the applause of the conference.

Mr. Paulett had the cane made from a piece of rafter which came out of an old log house in Washington county, Va., in which was held the first Methodist conference, east of the Blue Ridge, in 1788, May 13th, by Bishop Asbury. On the cane was the following inscription;

"Bishop A. W. Wilson, from John W. Paulett, October 2d, 1889. Made from the timber of the old log house called Caywood's, Washington county, Va., in which the first Methodist conference, east of the Blue ridge was held."

Adjourned.—Announcements were made and the conference adjourned with singing the doxology and the benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY.

Oct. 3d, 1889.

The conference met at 8½ o'clock a. m., Bishop Wilson in the chair.

The devotional exercises were conducted by W. H. Leith.

A communication from Sullins College was presented and referred to the Board of Education.

The Twentieth Question.—"Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" was taken up.

J. O. Straley was called, W. W. Hicks, his presiding elder stated

that there was nothing against his moral character, but that he is charged with holding and disseminating doctrines contrary to our Articles of Religion, and he asked that a committee be appointed in his case. E. E. Wiley, K. C. Atkins and E. E. Hoss were appointed such committee.

When the name of W. H. Horton was called, W. W. Bays, his presiding elder, stated, that there were charges affecting his moral character, that a preliminary investigation had been made and that he is now under sentence of suspension; a committee of trial was therefore asked in his case.

The Bishop announced the following committee of trial:

Moser passed examination of character, also examination of course of study for the first year and were advanced to the class of the second year.

Discontinuance.—J. C. Kinzer and Newton C. Combs passed examination of character and were discontinued at their own request.

J. H. Harwell passed examination of character and was announced as transferred to Brazil.

Wm. I. Fogleman, Samuel L. Smith, Wm. P. Allison and A. W. Jacobs passed examination of character but not passing on course of study they were continued in the class of the first year.

Second Year.—The class of the second year was called and the following passed examination of character and the conference course of study for this year, viz: W. S. Neighbors, M. C. Graham, C. M. Bishop, D. V. York, W. L. Jones, J. A. L. Perkins and J. R. Chambers.

Charles M. Bishop, J. R. Chambers, J. A. Perkins and M. C. Graham were elected deacons.

W. G. Malonee and J. A. Darr passed examination of character and were continued in the class of the second year.

Announcements were made and the conference adjourned with singing the doxology and the benediction by Dr. Wiley.

THIRD DAY.

Oct. 4, 1889.

The conference assembled at 8½ o'clock a. m., Bishop Wilson in

the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Dr. D. Sullins.

The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

A paper from the Ashville District conference relative to the re-adjustment of our conference lines and asking this body to memorialize our next General Conference on this question was presented and read.

Other papers bearing on the same subject, from Franklin, Jeffersonville and Abingdon districts were also presented.

On motion a special committee of five was ordered and the above papers were referred to this committee.

The following were appointed by the Bishop:

Geo. Stewart, G. D. French, D. Sullins, T. F. Glenn and J. A. Lyons.

Bishop L. C. Holsey, of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church in America, was introduced to and addressed the conference in the interest of the educational work of his church.

A collection was taken and more than three hundred dollars was contributed for this work.

The Eighth Question.—"What traveling preachers are elected deacons?" was called.

Geo. W. Presley, Jos. C. Maness, C. W. Kelley, A. H. Tow and J. A. Duvall passed examination of character, also the course of study and were elected deacons.

C. B. LeFew and S. E. Houk, already deacons, passed to the class of the third year.

J. B. Simpson passed on course of study for the second year and was elected deacon.

The Fourth Question.—"Who are received into full connection?" was called.

W. S. Neighbors, M. C. Graham, C. M. Bishop, D. V. York, W. L. Jones, J. A. L. Perkins, J. R. Chambers, John A. Clark, J. B. Simpson, Geo. W. Presley, Jos. C. Maness, C. B. LeFew, C. W. Kelley, A. H. Tow, J. A. Duvall and S. E. Houk were called up before the conference, answered the usual disciplinary questions propounded by the Bishop, and were admitted into full connection.

The Tenth Question.—"What local preachers are elected deacons?" was called.

Chapman E. Weeks, of Hylton Mission, Wytheville district. D. C. Clendenen, of McDowell Mission, Jeffersonville district, I. N. Munsey, of Gladeville circuit, Abingdon district. J. P. Baird, of Broad Street station, Knoxville district. T. L. Bryan, of Sweetwater circuit, Chattanooga district. Robert H. Penland, of Cave Creek circuit, D. L. Balding, Hot Springs circuit, Ashville district. Frank Siler, of Webster circuit, and Wm. P. McGee, of Haywood circuit,

Franklin district, having been for four years consecutively local preachers and being duly recommended by the quarterly conferences of which they are members were elected deacons.

The Twelfth Question.—"What traveling preachers are elected elders?" was called.

W. M. Dyer, James A. Burrow, Dayton C. Horne, E. F. Kahle, R. W. Kite, F. H. Farley and Frank Alexander passed both examination of character and course of study for the fourth year and were elected elders, excepting F. H. Farley and Frank Alexander, they being already elders.

W. R. Snider passed examination of character, but not passing his examination on the course of study he was continued in the class of the fourth year.

Drs. Prentiss and Fuller of the M. E. Church, and Dr. Morton, Secretary of Church Extension, in our own church, were introduced to the conference.

J. M. Lyle, alternate lay delegate from Franklin district, took the place of W. W. Stringfield, delegate absent.

John S. Martin, lay delegate from Chattanooga district, was announced as present.

G. C. Rankin was substituted for R. N. Priceto assist Frank Richardson in defence of W. H. Horton.

Announcements were made and the conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. J. S. W. Neel.

FOURTH DAY.

Oct. 5, 1889.

The conference met at 8½ o'clock a. m., Bishop Wilson in the chair.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Geo. A. Maiden.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

Credentials Restored.—The application of Hardy M. Bennett, of the Hamburg Mission, Franklin district, formerly a local elder of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, for a restoration of his credentials, which had been forfeited by his withdrawal from the church and ministry, was received, and he being duly recommended by the quarterly conference, his credentials were restored.

The Twelfth Question.—"What traveling preachers are elected elders?" was called.

J. E. Bruce passed examination of character, also course of study and was elected elder.

Geo. R. Stuart and G. W. K. Greene passed examination of character, but not having been before the committee for examination they were continued in the class of the fourth year.

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Fourteenth Question.—"What local preachers are elected elders?" was called.

Leander C. Taylor, of Hylton Mission, Wythville district, and J. B. Draper, of Rye Cove circuit, Morristown district, having served due probatoin as local deacons, and being duly recommended by the quarterly conferences of which they are members, and certifying their belief in the doctrines and discipline of the church, were elected elders.

Memorial.—J. Lyons and W. G. E. Cunnyngham presented and read a paper asking that this conference memorialize the General Conference as to certain interests of the Sunday School work, and it was referred to the special committee of five.

James P. McTeer was discontinued at his own request.

Revs. Horace Jewell, of the Little Rock conference, and Smith, of the Lutheran church, were introduced to the conference.

Dr. Geo. G. Smith, of the North Georgia conference, and Dr. Kirkland, Editor of the Southern Christian Advocate, were introduced to the conference.

The Twentieth Question.—"Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" was called.

The following elders passed examination of character: K. C. Atkins, P. P. Kinzer, E. W. Moore, S. T. McPherson, R. F. Jackson, J. J. Brooks, G. Maiden, Jacob Smith, D. V. Price, J. H. Kennedy, G. W. Simpson, T. F. Glenn, J. A. Cook, S. K. Byrd and F. D. Crumley.

W. H. Horton Expelled.—The trial committee in the case of W. H. Horton reported as follows:

The committee to which was referred the case of Rev. W. H. Horton begs leave to report, that he has been found guilty according to the charge and specifications, and he is hereby expelled from the ministry and membership of the church. Oct. 5, 1889.

APPENDIX A.

Report of Committee on Bible Cause.

The Bible Cause is, in the broadest sense, the cause of God and the hope of humanity. It is a matter of the *most supreme* concern to us and to the world to know what God says. We may not be indifferent to His sacred word. The Gracious Master said: "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life." As Christians, as men we should cultivate a love and an increasing veneration for this pure word of God. It is the light of the world. Says the prophet: "The entrance of thy words giveth light." Without it the nations grope in darkness, progressive movements are stilled by the night and the vices and forms of degradation run riot under cover. Studied by the honest mind, preached by an intelligent ministry, interpreted not only by the light of accumulated learning but by the Blessed Spirit it is the power of God to the salvation of millions of souls, it is the lifting up of humanity and the light and happiness of every believer. Too much emphasis can not be given to the reading, the careful study of the Bible; it is the Christian's daily bread, as prayer is his vital breath. To the individual believer there is no real spiritual progress without the communion of his mind and heart with God through His word.

The home, the Sunday-school, the church must be founded on the Bible. Christian civilization rests upon its teachings. The open and well used Bible is the unconditional demand and absolute need of protestant christianity.

For the supply of this blessed book the main reliance in this country and for the Foreign Missionary work of the Churches of this country is the American Bible Society. This Society is thoroughly unsectarian and benevolent in its character; it supplies the Scriptures at absolute cost.

In 73 years it has issued 51,270,018 volumes of the Holy Scriptures in more than 80 languages and dialects. It has made three general distributions and is now nearly completing the fourth in the United States; its work has been carried into Mexico, South America, China, Japan, India, Turkey, Egypt, Syria, Persia, South Africa and the Islands of the Sea.

It has colporteurs both in the home and foreign fields. "It has supplied hundreds of thousands of volumes to immigrants as they reached our shores, has given large numbers to the Negroes and North American Indians. It has prepared the Bible in raised letters for the blind. But we cannot mention even in a general way the varied forms of the Society's work. It is so great as to call for an immense expenditure of money.

Its sources of revenue are:

1. Voluntary Contributions.

2. Bequests.

3. Rents of room on 1st floor of Bible House.

It is a matter of deep regret that the income last year was \$57,-516.62 less than the year preceeding. The expenditures last year were about half million dollars. We have no data to show what this Conference is doing for this great institution and the cause it represents. We take it for granted our brethren are giving aid and encouragement; it would not be right to seek and receive its aid as we do in our home and foreign work and do nothing in return to promote its objects.

We recommend the following:

1. We continue our hearty endorsement of the objects, work and management of the American Bible Society and commend it to our people as worthy to receive their benevolent offerings and to have their prayers.

2. We will encourage the auxiliaries and the agents in their work and as far as practicable co-operate with them in collecting funds for the Society and in securing a distribution of Bibles among the destitute. Respectfully submitted.

APPENDIX B.

Report of the Board of Education, No. 1.

The state and character of our schools of learning have passed under our review, and we present the following report:

We take up in the order of importance and of time Emory and Henry College.

Long years ago our fathers profoundly impressed with the value and need of christian education in its higher and more systematic forms, projected plans for founding in Washington county, Virginia, this christian college—embracing the various branches of science and literature, the ancient and modern languages, and the useful arts. Emory and Henry College has had various fortunes from 1837 to 1889.

During all these decades her halls have been thronged with hundreds and thousands of young men in quest of education. The experience of a half century has only served the more strongly to impress us with the conviction that christian education through all its gradations from the university proper down to the primary school, is absolutely essential to the vigorous growth and expansion of the Church's influence and power for permanent and extended usefulness, and indispensable to a civilization having in it the elements either of national or individual prosperity. The Church—the M. E. Church, South—can never afford to surrender the education of her sons and daughters to the State; and so relegate to Cæsar a work which her divine Head has devolved upon herself under the most solemn sanctions.

Ignorance has always been the foe of christianity; and a purely secular education, apart from the influences of our holy christianity, will leave the minds and hearts of our children darkened and corrupted by religious agnosticism, "swept and garnished" for the easy entrance of a legion of evil spirits.

As a church we must educate, or forfeit our merited eminence and distinction as a prominent factor in the marvelous achievements and growth of the Nineteenth Century civilization.

The Board begs leave to emphasize the fact that Emory and Henry College, your oldest male school, never more needed and

never more deserved the hearty and unstinted support, moral and material, of our Conference than it does to-day.

In December, 1888, the row of Mess Houses, and on April 12th, '89, the Byar's House, were consumed by fire, subjecting the College to serious inconveniences. Fortunately the completion of the Science Hall has in part temporarily substituted these losses.

An appeal for help elicited but few responses. The Board of Trustees collected \$7,350 of insurance on the Byar's House, and are rebuilding as rapidly as possible a new and better boarding house. Some changes have occurred in the faculty.

Prof. Craighead having resigned, the Board elected to that chair Chas. E. Bishop, Ph. D., of Petersburg, Virginia. He is a graduate of the University of Virginia, and Doctor of Philosophy, of Leipsig, Germauny.

The College has opened with 108 students. Of this number 72 are from Virginia, 20 from Tennessee, and three from North Carolina, and a few from seven other states.

There are 21 young men present this year, studying and preparing for the ministry, and 15 sons of ministers. The college will remit, therefore, more than \$1,800 of fees in the interest of these young preachers and preacher's sons during the current year.

Emory and Henry College must be endowed, or sooner or later, perish. We need not disguise the fact. The Board would again recommend for the adoption of the Conference the following plan for raising an Education Fund, to reimburse the colleges for the large amounts remitted in tuition fees of the young preachers and sons of preachers, and also a uniform plan for District Loan Associations.

EDUCATIONAL FUND.

Last year the Board of Education reported to this Conference a plan for raising funds for the payment in our church colleges in Holston Conference the tuition of young men preparing for the ministry and of ministers' sons.

The Board also recommended the formation of Loan Associations in the several Presiding Elders' Districts. The Annual Conference referred the plan for an Educational Fund to the District Conferences for consideration, and endorsed the recommendation of the Board concerning Loan Funds. The District Conferences, by a vote approaching unanimity, have acted in favor of both these propositions, and several of these bodies have expressed the desire that the Annual Conference should formulate general plans for observance throughout the bounds of the Holston territory. Accordingly, we present the following:

I. FUND FOR PAYING TUITION.

Resolved (1). This Conference will undertake to raise an educational fund, the object of which is to pay in our church colleges the tuition fees of young men preparing for the ministry within the bounds of Holston Conference, M. E. Church, South, and the tuition fees of the sons of ministers in Holston Conference.

2. To this end, an assessment of \$2500 shall be made and distributed by the Board of Finance as other collections ordered by the conference.

3. The collection of this educational fund shall devolve on the Presiding Elder, who shall have authority to use each year one quarterly meeting on each charge and such other occasions and means as he may deem proper for this purpose.

4. At the end of each round of quarterly meetings the Presiding Elder shall remit his collections to the Treasurer of the Board of Education of this conference.

5. The Presidents of our colleges, in which there are among the students, young men preparing for the ministry and the sons of ministers, shall report to the Treasurer of the Board on the 1st of November and April the number of these and sum of tuition fees remitted, according to the regular rates of tuition charged other students.

6. If the Treasurer of the Board of Education have sufficient funds he shall pay to the proper financial officers of these respective colleges the fees remitted—if there be a deficiency of funds he shall prorate them.

7. Every young man preparing for the ministry whose fees are remitted by the college and paid by the church, as herein provided, shall execute to the treasurer of the college in which he is a student an obligation to refund the tuition fees so paid by the church in case he leave the ministry for secular pursuit.

II. LOAN ASSOCIATIONS:

In each Presiding Elder's district the District Conference shall organize a Loan Association.

1. The object shall be to raise funds to lend to worthy, needy young men who are preparing for the ministry in our church.

2. To this end the District Conference shall appoint or elect a committee of five with the Presiding Elder, ex officio, Chairman.

It is suggested that they shall reside as centrally as practicable, so that meetings can easily be had.

3. This committee shall organize by electing a Secretary and Treasurer.

4. The Presiding Elder shall have general oversight of the interests and work of this association: with the advice and assistance of the committee he shall collect funds in such manner as he may deem wise.

5. Applications for loans shall be received and passed upon by the committee.

6. When a loan is granted, the recipient shall give a satisfactory note, promising to pay the principal without interest at such time as may be agreed upon by him and the committee.

These payments back into the hands of the Treasurer may be loaned to other applicants and thus constitute a perpetually circulating fund.

The Board of Education has also carefully examined the "Amended Constitution" of Emory and Henry College, sent up by the Board of Trustees to this conference and accompanied by the prayer that the conference ratify the same by a two-thirds vote, and we would recommend its ratification as amended in a few slight particulars, to wit: The erasure of *Article 26*, and the addition of *Article 30* after body, "subject to the ratification of the Holston Conference.

The Board would further recommend the appointment of Rev. W. W. Pyott as Agent for Emory and Henry College, to assist in collecting the dues on the present endowment notes, to solicit patronage and above all to increase the endowment funds.

CONSTITUTION

OF

EMORY AND HENRY COLLEGE.

ART. 1. There shall be erected and established in the county of Washington and State of Virginia a college for the instruction of youth in the various branches of Science and Literature the useful

Arts, Agriculture, and the Ancient and Modern Languages.

ART. 2. The said college shall be known by the name of Emory & Henry College.

ART. 3. There shall be a board of trustees, who shall, for the benefit of such college, possess, purchase, receive and retain to themselves and their successors in office, any lands, tenements, rents, goods, chattles, or any other kind of interest of any kind whatever which may hereafter be given or purchased for the use of said college, and to dispose of the same in any way whatsoever they shall adjudge most useful to the interests and legal purposes of the Institution. And it shall be the duty of the said trustees, and they are hereby empowered, to make all necessary regulations for the boarding apartment and for the cultivation and management of the farm, and to make and establish from time to time such By-laws, Rules and regulations, not contrary to this constitution, as shall by them be thought essential to the good order and government of the professors, masters and students of said college.

ART. 4. The first board of trustees for said college shall be appointed by the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, at its next annual meeting. The said Conference, at the same time, shall designate some one of the trustees whose duty it shall be to fix the time and place of meeting of said board and to give notice thereof to the rest of said board; and should there not be a quorum of said board present at said meeting, those in attendance shall have power to adjourn from day to day, or to any future day, until a quorum shall be had.

ART. 5. The trustees shall annually elect a president from their own body; and secretary and treasurer who shall be members of their own body or not, at their discretion.

ART. 6. The president shall preside at all meetings of the board, and shall perform all duties appertaining to the office, unless unavoidably absent. In such case, a president *pro tempore* shall be appointed from their body to supply his place. And the president shall, in no case, be entitled to vote, unless upon any question there shall be an equal division, in which case he shall give the casting vote.

ART. 7. The secretary shall keep a full and perfect record of the proceedings of the board, in a well bound book, and carefully preserve the same to be deposited among the archives of the institution.

ART. 8. The treasurer shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, execute bond and approved security in such penalty as the board shall require, payable to the president of the board of trustees for the time being by name for the benefit of Emory and Henry College, conditionally, faithfully to discharge the duties of his said office as from time to time may be presented by said board. The treasurer shall not disburse any of the funds of the institution except upon the order of the board of trustees, signed by the president and countersigned by the secretary, or in such other manner as the board of trustees shall particularly prescribe. And he shall moreover be required annually to render a strict and full account of all moneys, goods, chattels or other things received and expended by him on account and for the use of said college.

ART. 9. The board of trustees shall have power, the majority of the whole concurring, to remove any of their own body for a good cause.

ART. 10. The trustees shall cause to be kept a register, showing the whole amount of funds vested in said institution and the sources from whence derived and particularly the names of all donors; and

it shall moreover be their duty to report to the Holston Conference at its annual session the condition of the college.

ART. 11. Whenever any trustee shall absent himself for three successive meetings of the board of trustees, having been duly notified of such meeting, without assigning a sufficient reason at the fourth, the said board shall, by entry on their minutes, declare his seat vacant.

ART. 12. There shall be a stated annual meeting of the board of trustees at such a time and place as they at their first general meeting, or at any subsequent time, shall appoint, and the said board shall have power to provide for such called meeting as may become necessary.

ART. 13. The office of president shall be considered honorary, and no trustee shall receive or be allowed any compensation for his services in that capacity.

ART. 14. The board of trustees shall have power to elect the President and Faculty of Emory and Henry College. They shall also provide for the appointment of such teachers as may be necessary. They shall also have power, for cause, to suspend or remove the president or any of the professors of said college, and to supply all vacancies thus occasioned. And when, from any cause, a vacancy shall occur in the board of trustees it shall be filled as hereinafter directed.

ART. 15. The president of the college, or in case of his death or resignation, or refusal to act, a majority of the professors or masters, for the time being, shall have power to call a meeting of the board of trustees.

ART. 16. There shall be a president of the college and as many professors and assistant teachers or masters as may be necessary for the institution.

ART. 17. It shall be especially the duty of the president to watch over the faithful observance of all laws and regulations, and take, with the assistance of the professors and masters, proper means to secure their execution. He, aided by the professors, shall have the constant and concurrent superintendence over the teachers and assistant officers and other persons employed in the college, for whom, including professors, his decision shall be final until otherwise ordered by the board, to which appeals from the decision of the president shall be.

ART. 18. The president and faculty shall not be elected for a longer time than five years, but shall be re-eligible to the same offices. They shall receive a compensation for their services, to be fixed by the board of trustees, which shall be so regulated as inseparably to connect their interests with their duty.

ART. 19. It shall be the duty of the president and faculty to prescribe the course of study to be pursued in the college. They shall have full power and authority to enforce the observance of the by-laws and regulations of the college in reference to the college family, to inflict punishments for a breach of the same, and from their decisions no appeal shall be allowed.

ART. 20. The punishments of the institution shall not be corporal but wholly of a moral character and addressed to the sense of duty and principles of honor and shame.

ART. 21. So far as practicable the students shall be under the constant and unremitted superintendence of one or more of the faculty, teachers or masters day and night.

ART. 22. Especial care shall be taken to form and foster in the minds of students, by every proper means, a pure attachment to our Republican institutions and the sacred rights of conscience, as guaranteed by our happy constitution.

ART. 23. As to morals and religion, the purest morality ought to be instilled into the minds of scholars, so that on their entrance into active life, they may, from inclination and habit, evince benevolence towards their fellow creatures and love of truth, sobriety and industry. Therefore every teacher in the college, employed for whatever branches, shall also promote, so far as depends upon him, the moral and religious education of the students.

ART. 24. No person shall be employed in the college, for any purpose whatever, who does not sustain an irreproachable character.

ART. 25. No distinctive dress is ever to be worn by the students.

ART. 26. No person shall be ineligible to any office or trust appertaining to the college, or to be excluded from a free and full participation in the privileges and benefits of the college because of his religious tenets.

ART. 27. Literary degrees and honorary distinctions may be conferred upon any students, or other persons of merit, at the discretion of the faculty and trustees.

ART. 28. If there shall be, at any time, more applications for admission into the college than can be received, a preference shall be given to the applications of those who have contributed, or may hereafter contribute, to the funds of the institution.

ART. 29. The president of the college shall be ex-officio a member of the board of trustees; but no other member of the board of instruction shall be eligible to membership in the board of trustees.

ART. 30. The board of trustees shall consist of twenty-seven members to be constituted and appointed as follows: The board of trustees as at present existing, being thirteen in number, shall remain in tact; to which shall be added the president of the college, and thirteen other members to be appointed by the Holston Annual Conference at its next session, in such way as the Conference shall judge best. Provided, that a majority of the whole twenty-seven shall be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

ART. 31. The board of trustees shall have power to fill all vacancies as they may, from time to time, occur in their body.

ART. 32. Seven trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but when an election is to be held for the election of new member of the board of trustees, or for a president of the college, or for a professor, then nine shall constitute the quorum.

ART. 33. The board of trustees, a majority of the whole concurring may prepare amendments to this constitution, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of it, when ratified by two-thirds of the Holston Conference at one of its annual sessions. Provided, That no amendment shall in any manner affect the liberal and catholic principles upon which it is now declared that Emory and Henry College shall be conducted.

Report of the Board of Education, No. 2.

We have had reports as to the condition and work of Hiwassee, Weaverville and People's Colleges, and also of Martha Washington, Sullins' and Centenary Colleges—all schools of our church—from which we learn that they are all entering upon a prosperous year, and in some of these institutions with a marked increase of patronage.

Hiwassee, Weaverville and People's Colleges seem to be doing good work for education in their respective fields. Martha Washington, Sullins' and Centenary, our chief female schools, are well officered and equipped, and do most excellent work, and are emi-

nently worthy of the confidence and support of our people. We learn indirectly that Asheville Female College is having a high degree of prosperity under its present management.

The Trustees of the *Pryor Institute* have opened that new school under encouraging auspices, with Prof. E. B. Craighead, as principal. It is needful that further action be had to perfect the relations of that school to our Church. The Board of Education, therefore, submit the following paper for the consideration and adoption of this Conference, to wit:

PRYOR INSTITUTE.

Whereas, it appears to this Board that Washington Pryor has by deed of gift vested the title to ten acres of land, situated near Jasper, Marion county, Tennessee, in Jackson Pryor, A. L. Spears, M. W. Anderson, W. E. Donaldson and W. Byrne as trustees for the M. E. Church, South, for the purpose of erecting a school building thereon to be known as Pryor Institute.

And it further appears that said trustees have erected such building at a cost of more than twenty thousand dollars and have partially furnished the same and inclosed the grounds.

And it further appearing to this Board that the Quarterly Conference of the Jasper Circuit of the M. E. Church, South, has confirmed and ratified the appointment of the said Jackson Pryor, A. L. Spears, M. W. Anderson, W. E. Donaldson and W. Byrne, and has appointed four other suitable persons, to wit: R. M. Payne, W. R. Rankin, S. H. Alexander and W. B. Mitchell as additional trustees and has also appointed F. V. Brown in the room and stead of Jackson Pryor, who has resigned. And it further appearing to this Board that said board of trustees so appointed by the Quarterly Conference of the Jasper Circuit aforesaid have employed E. B. Craighead and competent assistant teachers, and have opened a school in said building.

It is therefore resolved that it is the sense of this Board that the action of said Quarterly Conference in appointing and confirming said Board of Trustees should be ratified and confirmed by this Conference. And that the action of said Board of Trustees in employing a faculty and opening a school in said building should also be ratified and confirmed. And that A. L. Spears, F. V. Brown, W. Byrne, M. W. Anderson and W. E. Donaldson be requested and empowered to make a deed vesting the title to said property in the new Board of Trustees, to wit: A. L. Spears, M. W. Anderson, W. B. Mitchell, S. H. Alexander, W. Byrne, W. E. Donaldson, R. M. Payne, W. R. Rankin and F. V. Brown, and their successors in office, who shall hold said property in trust for the M. E. Church, South, and who shall be clothed with full power to employ teachers for said Institute, and in connection with such teachers to fix rates of tuition, establish rules for the discipline and government of said school, to fill all vacancies in said Board that may occur from death, resignation or otherwise, subject, however, to the ratification of the Quarterly Conference within the boundaries of which said school is located; to improve and enlarge said property from time to time and to erect other buildings on said ground, if in their judgment it shall become necessary, and to do any and all things requisite to advance the interests of said Institute. And to this end, that they be empowered and requested to obtain a charter under the laws of the State of Tennessee and form themselves and their successors into a *Body Corporate*, with such powers as are usually vested in such corporations.

The Board of Education would also recommend that the matter of an agency to aid the Trustees in bringing to completion their

plans as to Pryor Institute be left to the discretion of the Presiding Elder of the Sequatchie District and the said Board of Trustees, when they shall have been duly constituted as herein before provided; provided, further, that no new debt be made which may endanger the property, or embarrass the Church.

The Board is gratified to learn that District High Schools are in successful operation on the Chattanooga, Franklin, Marion, Jeffersonville and Morristown Districts. Let our people encourage and strengthen these high schools.

THE PAINE AND LANE COLORED SCHOOLS.

A paper from Commissioner Dunlap, setting forth the urgent needs of these schools established for educating preachers and teachers of the colored M. E. Church in America, has been carefully considered. We submit the following report:

Resolved, That this Conference try to raise the amount asked for by the Commissioner, \$200; and that it be raised by the Presiding Elders privately, the amount being divided equally among the Districts.

HOLSTON SEMINARY, NEW MARKET, TENN.

The paper referred to the Board touching the joint ownership and management of said Seminary, contains matters of some moment, which we recommend to be turned over to the Quarterly Conference of Mossy Creek Circuit to be managed as it may deem wisest.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That Rev. S. N. Barker be appointed to the Presidency of A. F. College.
2. That Rev. J. F. Austin be appointed Financial Agent of Weaverville College.
3. That Rev. H. P. Baily be appointed Principal of Haysville Male and Female School.
4. That Rev. John W. Carnes be appointed Principal of Chattanooga District High School.
5. That Dr. E. E. Wiley be appointed to his present position at E. & H. College

The board also recommends that the thirteen persons appointed a visiting board, be the thirteen new trustees to be added to the present thirteen trustees as contemplated in the amended charter, and the amended constitution as based thereon already adopted by a two-thirds vote of the Conference.

Report of Sunday School Board.

Your Board beg leave to submit the following:

The charges report; schools 705, officers and teachers 4,634, scholars 49,938, money expended \$6,038.08. Increase of schools over last year 11, of scholars 1,328.

The report of the treasurer of the Children's Day fund shows an encouraging increase over last year, yet it falls far short of what it ought to be. Only fifty-six charges out of the hundred and sixty-two have taken the collection, and some of these are very meagre indeed, and in no sense worthy of this great interest of our church. We are gratified to find an increased demand for our periodical literature, and our schools, so far as we are able to learn from the reports of our pastors, all use our own literature. There is a shameful lack of libraries. We rejoice to note the fact, that, our children are receiving more attention from the church than at any time in her past history, and as a result many more are being brought to Christ, and becoming active members of the church. We trust that this is one of the signs of these times, that foretells a glorious harvest. We most devoutly pray that the time may not be far distant when every preacher may feel that he has a divine call to feed the lambs of the flock as well as the sheep.

Report on Temperance.

Your committee to whom was referred the subject of Temperance, beg leave to submit the following report:

Intemperance is *the* evil of our time. Rooted in depraved human nature, it has formed a compact with avarice and brought into being that arch-enemy of our race, the liquor power. This hideous monster rules our land with most despotic sway. He demands as his annual tribute more than seventy thousands of her sons. Like an imperious Pharaoh, with blistering lash, he drives a people born for a nobler destiny, into a servitude worse than death. The cry of the oppressed has gone up to heaven and entered the ears of the Lord of Hosts, "and the time of our redemption draweth nigh." God is moving in the realm of human conscience and preparing his people for an exodus from the land of the oppressor to a land of freedom. The country is being aroused as never before on this question. It will not down. It has been settled time and again to the satisfaction of the friends of rum, but ere their congratulations over the defeat of the right, had died on their lips it came forth stronger than before. The question that kindled the fires of the American Revolution was: Shall we be slaves to the tyrant beyond the sea, or shall we be free? Shall the rum-power destroy us or shall we destroy it? To answer this question and answer it rightly, is the duty of the hour. The eyes of God and man are upon us. Enslaved humanity stretches out its menaced hands to us for help. The mothers and wives of our land demand that the immolation of sons and husbands upon the altar of this infernal god shall cease. We rejoice that the churches all over our land are speaking out in ringing tones on this question and declaring that the saloon must go. The time for meaningless platitudes is past. Methodism would be untrue to her past history did she not place herself in the front rank of this noble army which is marching on to victory.

Your committee beg leave to offer the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, There is a manifest disposition on the part of many to adopt compromise measures, pleasing alike to the liquor interest and to the temperance people favoring such measures; and

WHEREAS, We are convinced that there should be no compromise with an acknowledged evil; and

WHEREAS, We believe that radical measures are necessary to remove this evil; therefore

Resolved, 1. That we are heartily in favor of the absolute prohibition of the liquor traffic, believing this to be the only effective method of destroying this evil.

2. That we are unalterably opposed to license, high or low, as being "vicious in principle and powerless as a remedy;" vicious in principle, in that it makes the State, or the individual favoring such license, a partner in the crimes arising from the traffic; powerless as a remedy, in that it does not abate the evil.

3. That we, as ministers of the gospel of Christ, enlighten our people on this question, and emphasize the duty of total abstinence from all intoxicants.

4. That while we do not presume to dictate to our brethren in the matter of their party affiliations, that we regard the principles of Prohibition as more sacred than party ties, and that we cannot consistently lend our influence or give our suffrage to men of any party who are the avowed friends of rum.

5. That we appreciate the unselfish labors of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in behalf of temperance, and that we bid them God-speed in their efforts in behalf of "God and Hom

and Native Land;" that we regard the various temperance societies of our land as educators of public sentiment on this question, and as such we wish them success.

APPENDIX H.

Report of Committee on Church Property.

Your committee on church property beg leave to submit the following report:

It is impossible to gather the facts from our tables of statistics, because they are defective and incomplete. Many of the preachers report some items of statistics, and omit others. There are no statistics whatever from the following charges: Sparta church, Greeneville church, Chattanooga mission.

We believe that there has been considerable progress along the line of church building and parsonage building; but the statistics do not show what has really been done.

The reports show an increase of thirty in the number of churches in our bounds, making 624 in all, with a value of \$739,626.00. If to this should be added omitted items we should have about 630 churches, with a value of about \$775,000.00. According to the reports we now have 83 parsonages as against 89 last year, showing that 6 parsonages have strayed off, have been lost, or have been stolen, and we hereby offer a reward for their return. Still the reports show an increase of value in parsonages of \$3,058.00

We believe full reports would have shown an increase in the number of parsonages of at least 8, and in value of \$20,000.00. According to reports the total value of church property is \$1,255,553.00, or decrease of \$17,194.00.

We believe the truth is that there has been an increase of \$50,000.00 in value of our church property.

We are glad to note that there is a growing interest in church building and in furnishing comfortable homes for our preachers, and we trust that the preachers will not be too lazy to report their successes in this direction. Respectfully submitted,

APPENDIX M.

Report of the Committeæ on the Spiritual State of the Church.

Your committee on the state of the church submit the following as their report:

We regret our inability to get such information as would enable us to make a clearer and more intelligent statement.

We have based our conclusions upon the assumption that to get at the true spiritual condition of the church we must have a thorough insight into all its operations and its spirit. The information we have is only an approximation of the true fact. We proceed to give the following analysis of the information we have.

The number of conversions for the past year under our ministry will approximate an aggregate of 7,000. This number exceeds by 25 or 30 per cent. the aggregate number of those who have joined our

church during the year. This ratio of conversions over the number of accessions furnishes some guarantee, at least, of a healthy spiritual condition in the bosom of the church.

We find from the figures obtained that the average attendance upon the sacrament of the Lord's Supper amounts to about 85 percent. of the membership of our church. The fidelity with which the members of the church attend communion is, perhaps, the surest index to the spiritual state of the church we have, and while it ought to be 100 per cent instead of 85 per cent., yet, this per cent. of faithful ones furnishes grounds to believe that we have spiritual life and strength in the great body of the church.

There has been of late a growing spirit on the subject of building church houses and parsonages. There has been some advance in the practice of family prayer. The missionary spirit is on the increase, although, the collections are not what they ought to be. In regard to tippling and dram drinking the sentiment of Holston Methodism is sound. Our Sunday-school cause has had a steady and healthy growth, both in increase of children in attendance, the amount of literature taken, and the efficiency, and spirituality of the management. All these facts are indexes to the spiritual condition of our Holston Methodist church, and when summed up and analyzed present to us an encouraging prospect for the future. It needs but careful nursing of a spiritual and consecrated pastorate to develop it into a power that shall cover these Holston mountains and valleys with the glory of the Lord.

APPENDIX P.

Memoir of W. L. Turner.

Your committee on memoirs beg leave to report the following:
 Rev. William L. Turner was born in Claiborne county, Tenn., March 23rd., 1811, happily married to Phoebe E. Ely in 1844, and died at his home, near Jonesville, Lee county, Va., January 13, 1889, aged 77 years, 9 months and 20 days.

At about the age of fifteen years he professed faith in Christ and joined the Methedist church at a camp-meeting held in Campbell county, Tenn., and soon thereafter was licensed to exhort by the Rev. R. W. Patty.

In the autumn of 1837, at a session of the conference, held in Madisonville, Tenn., Bishop Morris presiding, he was admitted into

the Holston conference on trial. After traveling in the conference two or three years his health failed and he was forced to take a supernumerary relation. He remained in that relation until a short time before the outbreak of the civil war, when his health having improved, he returned to the active work of the ministry. At the commencement of the war, his health again giving away, he was once more placed on the supernumerary list. He then engaged in the mercantile business and succeeded in the accumulation of considerable property, which was all swept away by the ravages of war. He brooded over his losses till, as some think, who knew him intimately, his mind was perceptibly impaired; and candor compels the statement, that for a few years subsequent to the war, his life was not as consistent as it should have been.

But, returning from his backsliden state, he resumed active work in the ministry and was appointed successively to the following charges: Pattonville circuit, Etna circuit, Pikeville circuit, Crossville mission, Watauga circuit, and Rye Cove circuit.

His health having now become permanently impaired, he was granted a supernumerary relation. He located near Jonesville, Va., where he led a peaceable and quiet life in all godlines and honesty until he was removed from his humble home on earth to his home in Heaven.

Brother Turner was no ordinary man. His mind, naturally vigorous, was enriched by a large fund of information, the result of keen observation, extensive reading and close application to study. He was above the average, in his day, in pulpit ability. Commanding in person, agreeable in manner, affable and entertaining in the social circle he rarely failed to impress himself favorably upon all with whom he came into contact.

In his early ministry he was quite successful in winning souls to Christ. The last years of life were spent in poverty and affliction; yet amidst it all he was patient, resigned and cheerful. His christian life glowed with increasing lustre and his experience in the things of God grew richer as he approached the end. While the outward man was perishing, the inward man was renewed day by day, until the weary wheels of life stood still; the bowl was broken at the fountain, and the checkered life of W. L. Turner ended in the light of eternal day. His aged companion in sadness and feebleness extreme, still lingers on the shore waiting the summons to depart and join her loved ones in the skies.
