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
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
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

#### FIRST DAY.

CHATTANOOGA, TENN., September 30, 1891.

The Holston Annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in Centenary church, Chattanooga, in its sixty-eighth annual session, September 30, 1891, at 9 o'clock a. m., Bishop C. B. Galloway presiding.

## Report No. 1 of the Board of Education.

### ITEM I:

## Co-ordination of Schools and an Elucational Conference.

As early as the second session of our conference, held at Jonesboro in 1825, our fathers took steps to provide for the higher education of our youth. From that day onward they and their sons have striven to meet the growing demands of this important interest. As a result we are today unsurpassed by any conference in the connection in the number of chartered colleges. Considering the population and the financial resources within our borders it may be justly said that our people have done well. Yet it must be confessed that what has been done hitherto has been done by "main strength" with awkwardness. We have wrought without a plan. The work has grown to such an extent that we can no longer work by this method, or want of method, without great detriment to the cause. Our resources and numbers have greatly multiplied and we have reached a point at which our educational interests demand a simple but thorough organization.

There is urgent need of the proper co-ordination of the schools which are already in operation, and a need also of a general plan by which schools hereafter built shall come into being and be operated. The work of co-ordination should embrace all questions of *curricula*, grade and cast.

To secure this end, we suggest the holding, at as early a day as practicable, of an educational conference to be composed of representatives from all the schools under the patronage of the conference which are chartered and authorized to confer degrees of any kind. This conference should be composed of the presidents of these schools or a teacher instead of any president who might be absent, and one member from each of the boards of trustees. There are three things especially for which this educational conference ought to provide:

(1) The joint-production and circulation of a large amount of literature calculated to inform and arouse our people on the subject of educating their children.

(2) Uniformity of curricula in all schools pronounced by

the educational conference to be of the same order; and also uniformity of the standard of requirement in the work of pupils.

(3) Conformity in actual charges to the published prices except in such cases as may be agreed upon and classified by the said conference.

# ITEM II: Academies.

There is throughout our territory an evident want of primary and academic training. The opportunities of our people for this most important part of training are wholly insufficient. Our educational work has gone to seed in colleges. As a rule, the state schools do but a small part of the preparatory work that needs to be done, and they do that very poorly. Our people are, nevertheless, allowing these free schools to occupy the place of primary and academic schools.

The district high schools, which were established some years ago, promised to meet, in a large measure, this want. But they were, in the first place, not sufficiently numerous; and, in the second place, they lacked among themselves proper co-ordination, and they lacked also the leadership of some higher institutions toward which their work snould progress by a definite plan. We believe that the time has come for a unified of conference action on this line; and we, therefore, recommend the establishment of academies wherever practicable under the following general conditions:

I. That the property of such shall be deeded to the Holston Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, South, vested in a board of trustees, wholly or chiefly local.

II. Such property shall be so deeded as to confer upon the trustees of Emory and Henry college the right to determine the courses of study in the said academies and to select their principals. Each principal shall make annually a full report of his school to the board of trustees of Emory and Henry college; and the president of said board shall make an annual report of all these schools to the Holston conference through its board of education. Provided, That the work herein committed to the trustees of Emory and Henry college shall be done by the joint board of Hiwassee college in any case in which the academy established elects to assume the relation herein prescribed to Hiwassee college instead of to Emory and Henry college; and provided further, that should there be a cession to another conference of our territory containing such school, or schools, the property of the same shall be transferred without controversy to such conference and the controllment now vested in the trustees of Emory and Henry college and Hiwassee college

shall be transferred to whatever school the said conference may designate as its conference college.

## ITEM III: Loan Fund.

There is amongst us no more urgent need than that of a fund with which to help young men who are preparing for the ministry. Something must be done on this line or the church will continue to suffer at a most vital point.

We recommend the adoption of the following plan which was proposed by the executive committee of the board of education, and has been tried far enough to indicate its acceptability with our people:

## Loan Association.

1. The name of the organization shall be: "The Preachers' Loan Association of the Holston Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South."

2. The object shall be to raise funds for the education of young ministers of the Methodist Episcopal church, from the territory of the Holston conference.

3. There shall be an executive committee composed of five members as follows: E. E. Wiley, J. A. Davis, George W. Miles, Jr., J. L. Jarman, and James Atkins.

4. This committee shall fill its own vacancies.5. It shall be the duty of this committee to determine the eligibility of applicants for loans in accordance with the conditions hereinafter given.

6. The officers of this comittee shall be a president, secretary and treasurer.

7. There shall be a local association in each pastoral charge and as far as practicable in each congregation. Membership in this association shall be conditioned upon the subscription of any given amount per annum for the term of five years.

8. Each local association shall elect its own officers annually. The officers shall be a president, secretary and treasurer.

9. The meetings of the association shall be held at least semi-annually at such times as the president and the pastor may direct. All meetings shall be public and popular. The order of work shall be: (a) A sermon or address of the pastor or some one appointed by him upon such subject as "A call to the ministry;" "The agency of the church in sending laborers into the field;" "The relation of the church to the ministry;" "An educated minister," etc.; and, (b) The increase of membership by the taking of additional subscriptions.

10. It shall be the duty of the officers to do what they can socially to advance the work of the association.

11. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep in a permanent book a roll of all members with the amount subscribed by each, to call the roll at all meetings, to keep a careful record of all proceedings, to send to the conference paper any items of special interest, and to keep in the hands of the treasurer of the executive committee a complete list of all subscribers and the post office address of each member.

12. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to collect all dues, either quarterly or semi-annually, as the association may direct; and he shall forward at once all funds to the treasurer of the executive committee with a complete list of those paying, giving the amount paid by each.

13. All funds of the association shall be disbursed by the executive committee, subject to the following provisions: All applicants for funds must be licensed preachers of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, from the territory of the Holston conference. The funds shall be loaned to none except such as attend one of the male academies or colleges owned and controlled by the Methodist Episcopal church, South, in the bounds of the Holston conference. Each applicant shall state in writing what school he is attending, or desires to attend by aid of this fund.

The amount loaned to each pupil shall not exceed the cost of his board, washing, text books and the school fees, except tuition which is otherwise provided for by the schools and church; provided further, that on no account shall a greater sum than one hundred and fifty-five dollars per annum be loaned to or used by any applicant, and provided that the whole sum loaned to any one applicant shall not exceed five hundred dollars. No second loan shall be made to any applicant unless the application be accompanied by the written statement of the principal or president of the school which he has been attending, that he has been making reasonably diligent use of his opportunities.

Each applicant shall, at the time of the loan, make to the treasurer of the executive committee a note for the amount borrowed with interest at five per cent. per annum; provided that, on final settlement, each note shall be credited by a sum equal to the interest accruing while the borrower was in actual attendance upon school duties.

Executive Committee Board of Education.

One feature is worthy of special emphasis. This fund is not given to anybody. It is bestowed upon the church for the preparation of her ministers, and is a permanent fund. It will run through generations and insure an educated ministry; the low, interest charged is to keep the fund up against losses. It is recommended that, as far as practicable, ladies be made treasurers of the local societies.

The executive committee of the board of education is charged with the organization of this work.

## Report No. 2 of the Board of Education.

The board of education begs leave to submit the following report of the schools under the patronage of the conference:

We are glad to present to the conference, as the result of careful inquiry, the statement that our schools are, in the main, in a state of prosperity and progress.

There are three matters, of special interest to the conference and the public, to which we have had special reference in our work during the present session. These are the items of patronage, finance and the kind of work done.

#### Patronage.

In the matter of patronage the figures are as follows:

Of this number about 360 are boys and young men and 838 girls and young ladies. About 620 of these were boarding pupils and 578 day pupils. It is a noteworthy fact that while nearly all our colleges are drawing some patronage from many States a very large and constantly increasing per cent. of their boarding patronage is from the bounds of our own conference. This fact, taken in connection with the large general increase in matriculations, shows that our own people are becoming more aroused to the importance of educating their children. Another fact worthy of notice is that of the 1198 matriculates about 838, a very large

majority, are girls. This is probably due on the one hand to the fact that our educators of girls have constantly and vigorously agitated, throughout our bounds for the last ten vears, the subject of woman's education; and, on the other, to the fact that our boys and young men are everywhere going into business without first seeking an education-a matter of such momentous importance as to demand the attention of every educator, pastor and patriot within our bounds. Another fact brought out by the statistics of past years is that of the boarding patronage from year to year only about 33 per cent. return to take a second year. We fear that this betokens on the part of parents and pupils the want of an intelligent and fixed purpose in this most important matter. It seems to indicate a shallow ambition to have been at college rather than a definite purpose to become disciplined for a life work. Pastors, in their social work and in the formation of a proper public sentiment, can do much to help the educators in their work on this line.

#### Finance.

We are gratified to find that, in the aggregate, there has been financial improvement also. It is believed that all the schools are now able to meet their current expenses from their annual income. This, in the case of Emory and Henry college, includes the conference collection, without which that institution cannot yet meet running expenses.

It appears, from reports of managing boards, that Peoples' college, Pryor institute, Hiwassee college, Sullins college, and Princeton academy are entirely free from debt. The indebtedness of the other colleges, so far as we can ascertain, is as follows:

The aggregate indebtedness of these schools is \$61,500. The aggregate assets above liabilities are equal to not less than \$200,000.

In the case of Emory and Henry college it is due to be said that at the beginning of the present administration two years ago the total indebtedness to the State of Virginia and other friends of the school was \$83,494. Ten thousand dollars of the present indebtedness is for the lands purchased from the State of Virginia, which, together with other lands not necesary for the use of the college, are sufficient to pay of all the indebtedness of the institution. In this connection we would call attention to the fact that these lands have been in part laid off and placed on the

market so that the opportunity to purchase homes near this celebrated school is, for the first time, given to the public. Already lots amounting to more than \$5,000 in value have been sold to excellent citizens. This amount, when collected, will reduce the indebtedness by the amount mentioned. It is also worthy of notice that the deeds to all this property are such that no intoxicating liquors can be dispensed on these premises forever, nor can any other thing, made unlawful by the statutes of Virginia, be carried on there. The debt of Centenary college is not of serious embarrassment and its payment within the next two or three years from the income of the school has been provided for. The indebtedness of Martha Washington college ought to be paid off at once, that the school, which is otherwise in a highly prosperous condition, may be relieved of an incumbrance. We commend this matter to the lavmen of the patronizing territory who, with the leadership of the liberal laymen of Abingdon, can easily and quickly wipe the debt out. It is evident that in our school work we have reached in all other respects an era of prosperity. We ought from this day to make an era of debt-paving until not a dollar shall stand against a school within our bounds.

Among all our schools there is noticeable progress in repairing, in the addition of new buildings, and in larger equipment for both the comfort and instruction of pupils.

#### Work Done.

There are engaged in the conduct of these schools 63 officers and teachers. We have every reason to believe that they are a noble, conscientious and laborious company of workers—men and women who have spiritual discernment of the importance of this work and who strive to make their work a full, co-ordinate branch of the gospel ministry.

The grade of work done in the class-room is also in the main of a high order, so that there is no need upon that score for our people to send their children beyond our bounds to obtain for them first-class collegiate opportunities.

In conclusion, we bespeak a yet more painstaking effort on the part of all pastors in behalf of our educational institutions.

Finally and especially, we gratefully acknowledge the mercies of God, which have been throughout the past year upon the labor of our friends in this adjustment of our work.

# PAYNE AND LAYNE INSTITUTE REPORT.

Information received from the commissioner, Rev. W. M. Hayes, shows that Payne institute is in a flourishing condition. It has built up from the most humble beginnings —the school buildings in use having been originally barns and stables. It is in charge of competent educators, Rev. G. W. Walker and Rev. J. L. Campbell, members of the South Carolina conference. The property belongs to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Layne institute is the exclusive property of the colored Methodist Episcopal church in America. It is valued at \$6000.00. There are now in this school 196 pupils, and it is prosperous under the judicious presidency of the Rev. Mr. Saunders, of the Memphis conference.

The plan of the commissioner is to ask help from our annual conferences.

In view of our relations to the colored people in the past, and our amicable relations now; in view of their faith-

ful services when in servitude, and their fidelity when the toesin of war summoned fathers and sons from home; in view of the fact that one of our ascended fathers, Bishop Capers, laid the foundation of the missionary work among them, out of which these institutes have grown; in view of our relations to a large and ignorant citizenship, which is neighbor to us; and in view of the obligations of our common humanity, we recommend that the small sum of \$500.00, which is asked for, be assessed by the "joint board of finance" upon the conference and apportioned, with other claims, to the several districts.

# CHURCH PROPERTY.

The reports from the various charges show that in the territory now embraced in the conference there are 501 churches, valued at \$874,895; other church property, colleges, etc., \$366,311. Also, that there are 85 parsonages, valued at \$130,120. It appears from the reports that during the year \$68,953.13 have been expended on churches and parsonages.

Reports show a decrease in the number of churches. This is caused by improper reports of the preachers either last year or this.

We have a gain of seven parsonages.

We would insist upon greater carefulness and accuracy in reporting church property.

# REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, as a conference, solemnly declare ourselves in reference to the manufacture, sale and use, as a beverage, of spirituous liquors, to be in perfect accord with the Bible as interpreted by Wesley, and by the fathers of universal Methodism, as well as with the deliverances of our several conferences, and of the college of Bishops in their quadrennial addresses, and of the discipline of the Methodist Episcopal church, South. These teachings are uncompromising antagonism to the iniquitous business, in all its phases, to be continued until the making of drunkards and drunkenness shall cease from among men. There may be differences of opinion as to the best method of reaching this end, but surely there can be none as to the desirableness of the object itself. As a church, we neither require nor forbid our members connection with political organizations; in this we leave them to exercise their right of judgement as the free citizens of a free government. As we would not attempt to direct them as to their political party preferences, so we leave them to make their election among the methods best adapted to promote the cause of temperance. As they would consider it an impertinence on the part of the church to restrain them in the liberty which they claim, would not the church have the right to regard it an impertinence also to be told that she must favor, in her deliverances and efforts, any special view, party, or organization? Let the church, as such, keep herself free from all "entangling alliances" with all parties, as such, political and such like, and address her- . self earnestly to the work of proclaiming the gospel of Christ among men, a prominent feature of which is temperance-which Paul and Peter enumerate among the christian virtues. The Scriptures class drunkenness with murder, and declare that no drunkard can inherit eternal life. Every christian then is bound to do all in his power to stay the streams of misery and death flowing from liquor fountains, and to dry up the fountains themselves. Much can be done in this direction by a careful observance of our church vows and disciplinary regulations. While we have nothing to say against well conducted temperance societies, we believe it would be difficult to find better ones than those called societies in our beloved church. He who keeps the rules of these will never become a drunkard nor an opponent of wise legal prohibition. Would to God that the people were ready for it, and that all our law-making powers, national and state, were ready also to enact such wise prohibitory regulations as would extirpate forever from our land the liquor traffic. As much can be done to secure this desirable result by precept, example and personal effort, we will endeavor to bring our lives into complete harmony on the subject of temperance with the teachings of the blessed gospel, and we will earnestly recommend the same to all our people.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT.

Your Sunday school board submits the following report: The statistics show an increase of schools over last year of 9; of officers and teachers 230; of scholars 1,536; of money collected \$478.97; of money for missions \$19.80. The children's day collection falls below that of last year \$74.00. Number of destitute schools helped from children's day fund, 29. Money spent on these schools \$104.85, as compared with \$39.00 for similar purposes last year. Money still in the hands of treasurer, about \$950.

This prodigious phenomena-a surplus' in the church treasury-indicates one of two things: First, That there are no destitute communities within the bounds of the Holston conference-no places needing the assistance of this Sunday school fund, the only rich adjunct of the Southern Methodist Church. Or, second, that the preachers of this conference have lost their usual shrewdness in keeping an eye open to a good opportunity and have lapsed into a state of coma, from which even the musical jingle of hard cash can not arouse them. If the first hypothesis be true, this board extends hearty congratulations to old Holston, and suggests a bugle blast of triumph through her valleys and over her mountains, where the trooping multitudes of bright-eved boys and girls are all safely cared for in the Sunday school fold, unpinched by poverty, and untouched by spiritual destitution. If, on the other hand, the second theory be true, then this board urges the immediate necessity of the proverbial coal of fire on the itinerant turtle's back-said coal to be seven times hotter than its wont, as a sleepv Methodist preacher is-not denominationally, but practically-the hardest of hard shells.

Your board expresses the emphatic belief that the territory is *not* all occupied, and that the preachers of this conference are *not* wide-awake on this important subject; that there are swarms of children in cities, towns, and country, growing up in poverty, without religious restraint, or religious influence, unreached by the church, and unenlightened by the gospel of the Son of God. And ten children, our discipline says, form a sufficient nucleus for an organized Sunday school. In spite of this lamentable state of affairs, nearly one thousand dollars lie idly in our plethoric treasury, while from every other field of church labor comes the pleading cries, "give us gold or we perish." The Sunday school patient is gorged, until appetite is gone, and the powers of assimilation very seriously impaired. We recommend the tonic of ministerial energy, taken liberally with clerical exercise.

Your board purposely omits the usual whereases, and declines to "resolute," for the single reason that such procedure is with form, but void. The double-quick time of a conference close-out has a deleterious effect upon the memory, and, too often, leaves the resolutions pining on the pages of the "Annual," "unwept, unhonored, and unsung." The following recommendations are made and immediate action asked thereon:

First, That the five dollar limit for literature, with kind of literature, be rescinded, leaving this matter to the discretion of the officers of this board.

Second, That the officers of the board be given power to appoint an agent in each presiding elder's district, who shall work up the Sunday school cause, and represent it on the floor of the district conference.

With a profound conviction that youth is the time for the impress of religious character, this board once more calls upon the members of the Holston conference to put forth new strength and energy in this field already white unto the harvest. The Sunday school is no kindergarten for babies. It should be made a place of spiritual power for the children, for young manhood and young womanhood, and for the fathers and mothers in Israel who still find comfort and power in the Sabbath morning study of the Word.

### MEMOIR OF H. F. KING.

H. F. King was born in Wythe county, Virginia, October 27, 1866.

He joined the church at the age of fourteen; professed religion at Asbury camp-ground at or near the time he joined the church; was happily married December 24, 1889, and departed this life August 13, 1891.

It is with his life as a preacher that we have, chiefly, to do. He was admitted on trial in Holston conference at Morristown, Tennessee, October, 1889. He was, therefore, still a probationer. He was first sent to Creston circuit, Ashe county, North Carolina, where he did a good work. He was next sent to Sharon Springs circuit. He was removed from there by the presiding elder and put on the Grassy Cove circuit. Last year he was on the East Tazewell circuit, Jeffersonville district, where, in the midst of the busiest labors for the Master, he was smitten of death.

He was a young man of fine promise. He was a worker. His consecration was complete. His life was pure. As a preacher he had the gifts of a fine person, a good voice, a persuasive manner. He was thoughtful, studious, prayerful, diligent, never triflingly employed. On his last charge he was singularly successful. It was said that his report at his district conference was the best in the district.

His illness was protracted. He was ready to die. In our eyes he was fit to live a long life, in God's eyes he was fit to die. God took him. His young wife, doubly bereaved, her babe having been taken a few days before her husband, we commend to the mercy of Him who is always good though His way be mysterious.

We loved our young brother; we honor his memory.

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
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
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
