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





CONFERENCE REPORTS.

Α.

REPORT ON SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church beg leave to submit the following report:

We are profoundly grateful to our God for the large number of conversions reported this year, and for the deepening of the currents of spiritual life among our people, as evidenced by the reports of the year's work; building of churches, parsonages, and improving those already built. We believe in a present faith, consecration and witness of the Spirit. A continuous religious experience is greatly to be desired. "All the time religion" is the great need of to-day. A spasmodic, or stale religious experience, is like old manna, unfit for use, and not worth keeping. Our great need to-day is a practical people in their religiouslife. We believe that a saving faith ought always to be attended by a continuous effort to do, or help to do, the work of the Church. We deplore the fact that so many of our people fail to give any practical evidence of their salvation. A member of the Church who does not attend upon its ordinances or support its institutions, has something radically wrong either with his profession, or his life, probably both. Our people need to be persistently taught that giving, working for the salvation of others, and helping others to do this, is as acceptable to God as prayer or the reading of the word.

We note with pleasure the large number of revivals, and trust that they may continue to increase in number and power. We believe the first, last, and great end of a preached gospel, is to save men; when it ceases to do this it has failed in its purpose. Our Church and her pastors stand opposed to all forms of worldliness, and condemn unsparingly those insidious amusements which ruin or mar the Christian life, and her perpetuity demands that we continue to oppose everything that has, or is, calculated to alienate the heart and life from God. We would suggest that whereunto we have already attained, we hold fast, and strive by precept and example to lead our people ever onward and upward.

To this end we offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, I. That as preachers called of God to proclaim the good news of salvation, we should look for the fruit of our ministry, feeling disappointed, even though we succeed in all else, if our preaching is not attended with direct results in the conversion of sinners and the strengthening of believers. The Methodist preacher must be pre-eminently an evangelist. This has been a characteristic of Methodism in the past; we cannot afford to lose it. Besides, nothing inspires a people with such confidence in their pastor as for him to successfully lead them to a victory against the enemy.

II. That our preachers give more attention and study to revival work, by cultivating a deep personal piety, by lovingly but plainly inquiring after the spiritual welfare of our people as we go among them; by being instant in season and out of season, letting our con

· cern for men's souls appear to all; by earnest supplication for God to pour out His spirit from on high, circulating religious literature and using all other consecrated means for promoting the work of God in our midst. Respectfully submitted. J. A. BAYLOR, Secretary. B. C.

REPORT ON DISTRICT CONFERENCE RECORDS.

The Committee on District Conference Records, after having carefully examined the records submitted to their inspection, make the following report:

The record of the Radford District has been well kept, with the exception of only two small errors, or rather inaccuracies, namely: In mentioning committee, the recorder uses an unnecessary abbreviation, using only the three first letters. Also, in recording reports, on the list of names to reports, he places the word "signed," which we think was unnecessary, being altogether superfluous. The records of Tazewell District are hardly subject to criticism.

The same, we are gratified to state, is true in regard to the records of Big Stone Gap, Morristown and Sequatchee Districts. Those of Morristown, especially, being a model of neatness, accuracy

and superb penmanship. The minutes of the Wytheville District Conference have been well kept. The penmanship, the punctuation, the orthography and the grammar all betoken that the recorder is an educated and painstaking person, who magnifies his office, and that he believes in the common and familiar adage that "whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well."

The records of the Chattanooga District are a model of beautiful penmanship and correct and accurate wording. The orthography and grammar of these records are, to us, seemingly faultless. There is an air of business-like neatness and perfection about them that is very pleasing and refreshing to those who take any sort of interest in such things; for they are so singularly free from blotching, interlining and erasing. In a word, these records, it seems to us, are just about all that the most fastidious critic could expect or desire in such literature.

The records of the Cleveland District have not been as faithfully and carefully kept as they could and should have been. Some of the penmanship is quite indifferent, while errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar frequently occur. A glance at these records betoken that they have, in part at least, been kept by a scribe not lacking in intelligence and education, but that his work was done somewhat carelessly and hurriedly.

The penmanship of the Abingdon District recorder is not firstclass; but otherwise these records have been properly, intelligently and faithfully kept.

It is with diffidence that we have ventured a criticism of any of these records, as we found them, in the main, so well and faithfully C. M. JAMES. kept.

Your treasurer is sorry to note a considerable falling off in our collections for this important work of the Church this year. Never before in the history of this board have we failed to advance on the previous year in collections, but now we are compelled to report a decrease of \$72.90. Besides this last year we raised \$188.73, special for Cuban churches in Florida, which makes our decrease in all this year \$261.63. This decrease is due mainly to the falling off of a few of our strongest charges. This report is not intended to discriminate, but to show facts. The following charges are those falling off most in their collections for this cause: Wytheville, Main Street, Bristol, Broad Street, Knoxville, and Centenary, Chattanooga. These four charges paid \$130.68 less than last year. Following are the charges which paid in full this year: Radford District—Grove Avenue, Allisonia, Bland Street, and West Bluefield Mission. Tazewell District—Welch. Wytheville District—Mt. Airy

paid two dollars over the assessment, and Marion Station paid in full. Abingdon District—Abingdon and Anderson Street, Bristol. Big Stone Gap District—Elk Garden Circuit and Lebanon Circuit; Big Stone Gap Station lacked only twelve cents of paying off in full. Morristown District—Morristown Station. Knoxville District— Church Street and Highland Avenue. Cleveland District-Sweeta charge to pay off in full. Twenty charges did not pay anything at all. Radford District paid \$50.00 more than any other District, while the whole Conference only paid a fraction over three cents ant department of our church work. T. C. SHULER, Treas.

REPORT No. 2.

Your board has been diligent in trying to increase interest and

to stimulate greater activity in this department of our work. As indicated in the reports of the preachers to this Conference, our people are in the spirit of building churches; and not only so, but a better class of churches is being erected. We trust, further-more, that church property is being kept in a more decent state of repair than it has hitherto been kept. Therefore, while there is a decrease in the collections for this property is being we this we this kit is decrease in the collections for this cause this year, we think it is not due to a decrease, or even a lack of interest, in the work.

Your board is furthermore glad to note the encouraging reports of the Woman's Parsonage and Home Mission Society in our midst, and to make commendable mention of the work of this society in this report.

The board offers the following for your consideration:

First. That we encournge our preachers and people in building good churches wherever practicable.

Second. That we discourage the idea of building either churches or parsonages on ground not deeded in *fee simple* to our Church; but that when conveyance is made to us, where possible, have used our blank form of deed, furnished by the Publishing House.

Third. That we urge our people to keep our church property in decent repair—clean, painted and insured.

Fourth. That the presiding elders are requested to urge their preachers to help organize and maintain a Parsonage and Home Mission Society in their charges.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee on Church Property report as follows:

The reports from preachers in charge show that there are, within the Conference, 824 organized societies-an increase of twenty-five during the year; that we own $562\frac{1}{2}$ houses of worship—a decrease from last year's report of $4\frac{1}{2}$. The value of said churches is reported at \$873,480.

We own 102 parsonages, valued at \$147,232. We have other church property valued at \$292,905. Total valuation of all church property, \$1,313,617.

There has been expended during the year on churches and parsonages \$44,089.60, an increase over last year's expenditures for like purposes of \$3,446.39.

Your committee have reasons to believe, however, that many of our churches and parsonages are not covered by insurance, and that in some cases titles are not secured and recorded as the Discipline directs.

In view of these facts your committee urge,

1st, That deeds covering all our property be secured and properly recorded.

2nd, That trustees, wherever practicable, should carry insurance on all church property. D. E. HAWK, Chm'n.



REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Our schools have all passed in review before us. Emory and Henry, Martha Washington, Sullins, Centenary, People's, Pryor In-stitute, Princeton Academy, and Hiwassee College. We have somewhat carefully looked into the condition and character of each. The report from Emory and Henry shows that the enrollment for The report from Emory and Henry shows that the enrolment for the year '95-6 was greater than the year before, and that more than 90 per cent of them were from our own territory. The enroll-ment for the present session is 87 now in attendance. The fac-ulty has not been enlarged but as now constituted has two new members, Prof. J. W. Cole, agraduate of the college and a suc-cessful teacher of ten year's experience, and Rev. Jas. H. Moss, M. A., of the Virginia University. The receipts and earnings of the college for the last three years have a little more than met the





current expenses. The debt of this institution has been reduced during that time from forty-one thousand to less than thirty-six thousand dollars. This indebtedness has been bonded in the sum of thirty-six thousand dollars, secured by a first mortgage on the property. The bonds have been issued and twenty-five thousand of them sold. In view of the fact that the educational collection does not meet more than half of the amount of remitted tuition to young preachers, and the further fact that the interest on the bonds sold must be met annually, we recommend that three thousand dollars be assessed for our home work for next year. The president, Dr. Waterhouse, proposes to go before the church and friends of the college to raise the remaining \$20,000. We commend his plan of prorating this amount over the Conference and of going forward vigorously to raise the same. We also urge the trustees of any of our schools that may be in debt to devise and put into operation plans looking to the speedy liquidation of said debts, and direct the preachers and the various churches to operate with such gentlemen as may come among them in the interest of these schools.

Martha Washington College enrolled for the year '95–6 153 pupils, 89 of whom were boarders. The vacancy made by Dr. Barker's resignation has been filled by the Rev. Wm. M. Dyer. He reports the college now reasonably well equipped for work, though not as well as he would like. The indebtedness of the college is twenty-one thousand dollars, but he believes the principal creditors will make liberal donations to this amount when satisfactory arrangements are made with them. There is an endowment of \$8,000, the interest of which is to be paid semi-annually on tuition fees to assist poor girls in securing an education. This endowment comes through a bequest of Col. Jas. Shumaker, of Gate City. Same to Emory and Henry for boys, making \$16,000 by Col. Jas. Shumaker. This fund becomes available after the 1st of January, 1897. The present session has opened with numbers in excess of the past year. The college seems to be well equipped and promises to do as good work as it has ever done.

Sullins' College is reported to have opened with a large increase of patronage, and with more hopeful surroundings than possibly any year of its history. The capacity of the buildings for boarding pupils will be used to the full by the time all engagements are met. The faculty is in place and ample for all the work required by a first-class college. There is no debt on this institution. We urge the board of management of this school to devise such plans as will in their wisdom speedily erect their central building, and so supply a long-felt need of the institution with ample accommodations for all who may wish to enter its halls.

Centenary College has had a successful and satisfactory year for '95-6. Nine young ladies graduated, five in the literary work and four in music. Its faculty is composed of thirteen experienced teachers; its buildings and outfit are excellent, and it has for the past two years met all current expenses, including interest on debt and insurance of property. The present session has opened with a larger patronage and a more hopeful outlook than for some years past. A report of your committee appointed last Conference to investigate the financial condition of colleges has already been read before this Conference, and shows that the indebtedness of the institution is being carefully considered and provided for by its board of management. The new members of our faculty, namely: Prof. Savage, musical director; Miss Staley, art teacher; Miss Jarnagin, teacher of preparatory department, and Miss Turner, assistant in music, have started well in their several departments. During the

past year, using the advantages conferred by the city water works and electric light company, the lessees of the school have put water on every floor of the building. The study hall is lighted by electricity, and bath room, with hot and cold water, furnished for the use of the school. With these and a gymnasium added this year, and other improvements, the school is better equipped for doing all grades of work than it has ever been before.

We are glad to learn through the report furnished us of People's College, that it is in a healthy condition. The buildings are in pretty good condition; the enrollment for '95-6 about 200. The school year in this institution has been divided into three terms of three months each for the year '96-7. The aim of this school is to give a thorough preparation of its pupils to enter the junior year at our best colleges. Two good boarding houses are needed, one for boys, the other for girls. With these and the facilties already in hand, the school will be well equipped for the work it proposes to do. The enrollment for this fall term is not quite as large as usual on account of the public school are hopeful for a good year. There is no debt on this institution.

Pryor Institute was represented before our board by Brother Robinson, the principal of the school, Brother Hunter not being present. The school has opened well for this year; better, perhaps, than for some years, and promises to do good work in preparing boys and girls for our colleges. It has excellent buildings and has been doing good work. There is no debt on this school.

Princeton Academy, under the management of Rev. Jno. E. Naff, did excellent work during the year of '95-6. Its buildings are in very good repair. Important improvements have been made in the outfit of the school for doing academic work. The present patronage of the school is about the same as it was last year. Bro. Naff has given up the principalship of this school, and Prof. J. Luther Sheppe is now principal of the academy. The Board of Trustees have concurred in this change of principals; they are alive to the interests of the school, and with a competent principal, a full corps of efficient teachers with a full attendance of pupils, the school is in a good and hopeful condition. It is out of debt. Hiwassee College reports for the year '95-6, 50 students under the

Hiwassee College reports for the year '95-6, 50 students under the instruction and management of three teachers. The opening of the present session is reported as smaller than that of last year. The present faculty consists of Rev. F. M. Grace, Prof. W. L. Lawrence and Prof. Jas. E. Willis. This school seems to be struggling in the midst of difficulties. Indeed, since the superannuation of that great and good man, Dr. J. H. Brunner, who for so many years successfully conducted the fortunes of this school, it seems to have languished, in a measure. The school has a worthy history. We are informed by the president, S. J. Gilbreath, that if the church does not rally to the support of this institution by increasing its patronage there is danger that it will go into the hands of other parties as a secular institution. We hope better things for Hiwassee.

Upon the whole, we are pleased to be able to report our schools for the most part moving off well and hopefully for the year '96-7 We heartily commend these institutions to the care of the Church.

CHILDREN'S DAY.

We call the attention of our preachers and school men to the importance of magnifying Children's Day, which is the third Sabbath in May. The day can and ought to be made more and more interesting year by year. Let us take this day to teach our children

the power of Christian education in the advancement of the kingdom of God and their interest in our church schools. The Parent Board says a collection shall be taken on that day for the aid of needy Sunday-schools, &c. (See law of the board.)

Your board suggests the name of Dr. Waterhouse for Conference Secretary of Education.

EDUCATIONAL DAY.

We suggest the first Sabbath in August as Educational Day for our Conference; and we urge the preachers to see that the day is observed, and the whole subject of Christian education be brought before the people, and that they commend our own schools, especially, to the patronage of our Church.

That the Conference allow the Mission Board to direct the Conference Corresponding Secretary to solicit, in the manner he shall see fit, the evangelistic services of such pastors throughout the Conference as can, and are willing, to give one or two weeks of their time to the brethren in mission fields and the poorer charges, wherever such help is desired and appreciated.

3. That the Bishop be requested to re-appoint Rev. W. Wisdom Newberry as Conference Corresponding Secretary.

4 That our people in all the charges of the Conference be encouraged to buy, and carefully study our missionary literature.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report as follows: Temperance, as a New Testament term, means self-control, the proper government of our passions and appetites, the moderate use of things lawful in themselves. As originally applied to alcoholic liquors, it implied their moderate use as opposed to drunkendess. But since the invention of distilled spirituous liquors, intemperance in the use of alcohol has become so great and widespread, and the traffic in it so enormous, so dangerous to morals and hurtful to society, that the term has taken on a new meaning, and is now, as commonly used, a synonym of abstinence from all intoxicating liquors as a beverage. It is the virtue recommended in the General Rules, that requires members of the society to avoid the evil of "drunkenness, or the drinking of spirituous liquors, except in cases of necessity."

About the evil, yea, the deadly sin of drunkenness, there is no debate. It is justified neither by those who are guilty of it, nor by those who minister to it. The evil of the moderate use of alcoholic drinks is not so well settled in the minds of mankind, but the Methodist Church has always taken high ground on the question. Deprecating the effect, she has struck at the cause. As she disallows drunkenness, she also disallows the "drinking of spirituous liquors, except in cases of necessity," as a cause of drunkenness. This rule has generally been strictly enforced, and we cannot be too careful in seeing that there is no relaxation in regard to it.

The question of the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors, as a beverage, is a question for the State rather than for the Church in its organized capacity. It is a civil question. and when introduced into political platforms it becomes a political question. It is necessary that the Church should not identify herself with any political party, as such. But her members are citizens, and are free to read, study and talk politics, within the bounds of prudence and propriety, to identify themselves with political parties, to vote their sentiments, and by fair means to influence the votes of their fellow citizens. It is, however, not the prerogative of the Church to require its members to do these things or to prevent them from doing them.

As the American government allows no religious tests in civil affairs, so the Church of Jesus Christ tolerates no political tests in ecclesiastical affairs. At the same time, the Methodist Church, as a whole, looks with abhorrence and consternation upon the enormous evils growing out of the liquor traffic, as generally conducted. She cannot but regard the open saloon, whether free or licensed, as a standing temptation for the corruption of our youth and as a menace to the perpetuity of our free institutions and of Christian civilization in this country. She therefore looks with favor upon all agitations, all organizations, all movements, social, civil and religious, all legislation, all judicial action, that contemplate the decrease of drunkenness, the suppression of the drinking usages of

society, and a wholesome and righteous restriction of the liquor traffic by honest, equitable and Christian means.

There is no society or party in the country demanding the annihilation or absolute prohibition of the liquor traffic; but there are, societies and parties that demand its restriction to medicinal and mechanical purposes; and along the line between the lawful and the unlawful uses of alcoholic liquors lie the main difficulties of the question. If it were right to annihilate the traffic, this would be a simple solution of the problem. But how to prohibit and not to prohibit at the same time, how the manufacturer and vendor are to be held responsible for the manner of the use of their goods after they have passed out of their hands, are vexed questions which the Christian citizenship of our country are now attempting to settle. The attitude which Christian society should assume to those who are engaged in the liquor traffic, in view of the lawful features of the traffic, and yet also in view of the enormous evils flowing from it, is a question which Christian society would fain settle righteously. But it is not the province of the Church, in its organic capacity, to settle these questions. These questions must be left to society and the citizenship of the country.

The Church deals mainly and directly with the individual. Her duty is plain. It is her duty, as an instrument in the hands of God, to save men from the love of sin, and, therefore, from the principle of intemperance in the heart. All theories that absolve the individual drinker from personal responsibility are wrong. When the question of intemperance is reduced to its last analysis, the bulk of the responsibility must be located with the drinker himself. It is, therefore, the duty of the Church, through her various agencies, to indoctrinate the people in temperance principles, and thus, by purifying the fountain of public morals, to lay the foundation of individual sobriety, healthy public sentiment and good government. She has before her an unending campaign of education. Men must be so saved and sanctified, so convinced and awakened as to the dangers of the cup, that they will not drink, whatever be the opportunity and the temptation to drink. Yet the Christian citizen, in his capacity as citizen, will not be slow to take an active part in all wise efforts to bring about a practical answer to the prayer, "Lead us not into temptation."

In view of these facts and truths, we offer for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we are as much as ever convinced of the evil of dram drinking.

Resolved, That the general rule on the use of spirituous liquors should continue to be strictly enforced.

Resolved, That while our members, as citizens, should use the ballot freely and independently of all meddlesome interference and of all political and ecclesiastical dictation, they should, at the same time, look upon it as a sacred trust, a sacred deposit of power from God, to be used for the glory of God and the good of the country; and that they should thoughtfully and prayerfully use it for the promotion of good morals and good government.

Resolved, That more than ever we see the importance of Christian temperance education, and, therefore, request our schools to adopt thoughtful methods of educating the youth of the land in the principles of temperance, especially in the physiological effects of alcohol; that we urge our preachers in the pulpit and our editors upon the tripod to give the trumpet no uncertain sound in regard to the evils of the liquor traffic. BIBLE CAUSE.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Bible Cause, respectfully submit, that they regret that there are not available data to intelligently represent the workings and results of the various agencies and instrumentalities promoting the Bible Cause within the limits of the Holston Conference. This church interest is of no minor importance. It was the open bible that dissipated superstition and left to the people the liberty of the gospel, that destroyed the oppression of a Priestcraft, and left the guidance of enlightened conscience: and it is now as much the conservator as it was then, an impulse to Protestantism and the promotor of Protestant institutions. It ought to be THE book of every home and every Sabbath School. Yet in this bible land the very success of the bible cause has dulled the sense of its importance. We would almost discredit the possibility of a bibleless home in our midst, and the brethren of Holston Conference would be astonished and humiliated to find that at their very doors there are homes so dark.

We lack exact statistics to enforce this conviction, but the American Bible Society in its last report, including at least a part of our territory, report a canvass of 430,014 families, among which they found 94,307 families without bibles—almost one in every five —a condition that to the ministry of fifty years ago would have been a source of appalling anxiety, we pass over at least without adequate concern.

We have, in the main, relegated this work to the American Bible Society, and so worthily have they performed it that our General Conference has endorsed it by authorizing annual aid in the way of collections. This collection is mandatory, and yet only 48 of the charges, out of a total of 159, have reported. It is due to the brethren to say that many of them hold receipts against funds furnished for this purpose in other directions, but that does not discharge the obligation our Church has put upon us to sustain the agency it has endorsed and chosen to this particular work. The 48 charges reported have collected and paid in \$94.56, as against \$62.22 acknowledgod by the Society to have been received from the Conference last year—an increase of \$32.34.

The apparent discrepancy that will appear between this report and the finance report is due to the fact that we have taken into consideration only the collections that have taken the direction provided by the General Conference.

REPORT OF SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOARD.

Your Sunday-school Board reports as follows: Number of schools, $633\frac{1}{5}$, an increase of $15\frac{1}{5}$; number of officers and teachers, 4.579, an increase of 72; scholars. 40,454, an increase of 729. Collected on Children's Day, according to Treasurer's report, \$281.51, an increase of \$30.21; expended for needy schools. \$165.70, a decrease of \$100.12. The Board notes that nearly two-thirds of our pastors report nothing collected on Children's Day. They are once more reminded of paragraph 248 of our Discipline, which says that "the third Sunday in May, or as near thereto as practicable, SHALL be

(not ought to be or may be) observed as Children's Day throughout our Church, with appropriate services, and on that day a collection SHALL be taken up for the aid of needy Sunday-schools, the advancement of the Sunday-school work under the direction of the Annual Conference Sunday-school Board, and for Christian education."

The Board notes with much pleasure the increasing excellence and growing circulation of our Sunday-school periodicals, and we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to place them in all our Sunday-schools.

Your Board respectfully submits the following resolutions:

1. That an Annual Sunday-school Conference be held at such time and place as the Board may in the future announce.

2. That the night of the first day of each session of our Annual Conference be set aside as the time for holding a Sunday-school Anniversary.

3. That the Home Department of our Sunday-school work be recommended to our pastors and Sunday-school workers generally.

4. That we deeply deplore the loss to the Sunday-school cause and to the church, of our former Secretary, Dr. W. D. Kirkland, and that we are highly gratified at the selection of our own Dr. Jas. Atkins to fill his place.

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REPORT OF WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

When the women of Holston Conference were called to take part in the special work organized in 1878, they at once responded, and although a mountainous district, where much difficulty was often experienced in bringing the work before them, they came well to the front, ranking fifth among the Conference societies for sev-eral years. When western North Carolina was taken from her, Holston fell to seventh. Since then, although passing through years that have not only tried, but stranded, many organizations. We can say with boosts full of cratitude thet although from every we can say, with hearts full of gratitude, that, although from every side has come the cry of hard times, and the hand of care has lain heavy on many, still we have been able to hold our own. A part of the success of our work we owe to our ministers, who, with the

weight of their own work resting on them, yet, by their sympathy and counsel, have aided the women who, timid and afraid when called to stand before the public, even though that public were women, would, but for "the love that constrained her," have been unable to do a work so new to them.

And now, after eighteen years of education and experience, we need that help as much as when only beginning the work. One of our District Secretaries recently wrote, "I can do nothing unless the pastor is in sympathy with our work. Before going into new territory to organize work, 1 write to the minister in charge, and if his reply is favorable, I never fail, but unless he gives me his help I can do nothing."

The time has come when we are not satisfied to only "hold our own," we want to move forward. The Woman's Board this year asks of the women of Southern Methodism one hundred thousand members, and has pledged to raise one hundred thousand dollars to meet the increased demand for workers in the foreign fields.

Will you, presiding elder, and pastor, help the women of Holston Conference to do their part in fulfilling this pledge.

We ask your prayers, your sympathy, and your help, that we may do our share, and that at the close of our year's work we may indeed be "workmen approved," each having done well the part entrusted to her.

MEMOIRS.

REV. G. M. F. HAMPTON

Was born in Yancy county, North Carolina, December 6, 1850. He always regarded it as a good fortune that his early life was spent in the country, and that he was reared on the farm.

He was baptized with the names of two honored members of the Holston Conference—Goodson McDaniel and Creed Fulton, of precious memory. We know not the time nor the particulars of Brother Hampton's conversion, save that it was when he was quite young, and was thorough, genuine and satisfactory. He was licensed to preach when but 18 years old, by the quarterly conference of the Burnsville Circuit, Asheville District—then Holston Conference, December 12, 1868, the license being signed by Rev. John Boring as presiding elder. He was ordained deacon at Clarksburg, W. Va., September 7, 1879, by Bishop Dogget, and was ordained elder at Huntington, W. Va., October 14, 1883, by Bishop Granbery.

He was happily married to Miss Althea Amanda Profit, of North Carolina, April 20, 1875, who with her husband gladly shared all the sacrifices incident to an itinerant Methodist preacher's life. The fruit of this marriage was five children, all bright, beautiful, interesting girls—upon whose training and education his heart was so intently set that he felt no task too arduous, no sacrifice too dear that tended to the consummation of this one thing.

He joined the West Virginia Conference in the fall of 1879. His first work in that conference was Pikeville Circuit, where he remained for three years. His next work was Prestonsburg, Ky., where he remained for four years, two years of which time he taught in connection with his pastorate, and so overworked himself that his health gave way, during which time he went to Lebanon, Ohio. His health improving, he there finished a college course. He was then elected to take charge of a conference school at Barbersville, W. Va., where he began with twenty pupils, and at the end of two years tendered his resignation with one hundred and forty in regular attendance. His services as a preacher were in constant demand, so scarcely a Sabbath passed without his preaching from one to three times. This year he was sent to Ravenwood, where he preached with great acceptability and had large success. The fortunes of the college at Millersburg, Ky., a conference school, were such that his services were needed, and through the earnest solicitation of his brethren, and the appointment of the conference, he there accepted a position to which he had been elected, and which he filled with great acceptability for two years.

He then transferred to Holston Conference, and was received at Abingdon, Va., and was appointed by Bishop Granbery to the Riceville Circuit, where he made himself felt as a faithful minister of the Lord Jesus Christ. Every enterprise of the church grew and prospered in his hands. Never missing an appointment during one of the coldest and most disagreeable winters known in this country for years—holding revivals at nearly all of his preaching places—pressing his collections from the very start—encouraging, comforting, inspiring his people as he went.

For several weeks before his attack came on he had realized there was a preceptible decline in his health; but he steadily worked on, hoping all the time to get better. At an old Methodist battleground at Spring Creek Camp Ground, where, in the midst of the fight, while the cries from the slain of the Lord were great, and the notes of victory were in the air, he fell, and literally had to be borne from the field.

During the conference at Tazewell we heard from him every day or two, and thought he was better. He was appointed by Bishop Duncan to Decatur Circuit, but was never able to go to the work. Upon our return when we went to see him, we found him much worse, and, as he expressed it, "near the crossing of the river," but he was happy in the peace of God which passeth understanding. Without a shadow on his mind, he was resting in great triumph. He said, "I want to tell you how good God has been to me; and, from the very depths of my heart, I can say that it is good for me that I have been afflicted." He says, "You can say to the brethren, it matters not the turning of a hand's difference which way it goes with me, all is well." In our last prayer together he joined heartly in the service, and the spirit of the Lord was with him in great comfort and assurance. The sun of a well-spent life went down at its noontide, and G. M. F. Hampton was no more—"though being dead he yet speaketh."

The funeral services were held on a blue November afternoon in the Methodist Church in Riceville by Dr. Sullins, Brothers Lyons, Browning, Jackson and the writer, amid a large company of friends of all denominations from different parts of the country.

PHILLIP S. SUTTON.

Phillip S. Sutton was born the 9th of April, 1827, in Smyth county, Virginia, and died in Princeton, W. Va., April 15, 1896, being 69 vears and 6 days of age. He was twice married. His first wife was years and 6 days of age. He was twice married. His first wife was a Miss Bryan, of Grainger county, Tennessee. To them were born two children. His second wife was a daughter of Judge Mahood, of Mercer county, West Virginia. She survives her husband, together with six children. The mother of Brother Sutton was left a widow when he was as yet an infant, and she took her baby and laid him in a manger, and, kneeling beside him, gave him to God, praying that He might take him and make of him a preacher of the gospel. Brother Sutton believed it was in answer to this prayer and influence that he was convicted and converted at the tender age of 10 years, and was called to preach. He became a traveling preacher in Holston Conference in 1854, was ordained deacon in 1855 and elder in 1857. His appointments were as follows: 1854-'5, Harrison elder in 1857. His appointments were as follows: 1554-5, Harrison Circuit, Hamblen county, Tenn.; 1855-'6, Rutledge Circuit, Tenn.; 1856-'7, Tazewell Station, Tenn.; 1857-'8, Rogersville Circuit, Tenn.; 1858-'9-'60, Asheville Station, N. C.; 1860-'1-'2, Hendersonville Sta-tion, N. C.; 1862-'3, Bristol Station; 1863-'4-'5, Pearisburg Circuit; 1866-'7, Estilville Circuit; 1867-'8, sickness prevented him from trav-eling; 1869-'70, Sedden Circuit; 1870-'1-'2-'3. Jonesville Circuit; 1873-'4, Lebanon Circuit; 1874-'5-'6, Pearisburg Circuit; 1876-'7-'8, Princeton Circuit; 1878-'9, no appointment was served; 1879-'80,

Bluestone Mission; 1880-'1, no appointment was served; 1881-2, East Tazewell Circuit; 1882-'3, Princeton Circuit; 1884-'5, agent for Princeton Academy; 1886-'7, supernumerary; 1887-'8, Staffordsville Circuit. Brother Sutton served faithfully the charges given him by appointment of the Conference, and when at last, from a complication of bodily afflictions, he was unable to do full work, he continued, at home, to preach, visit the sick and bury the dead. He was the friend of his pastors, loved the Church and his brethren was the friend of his pastors, loved the Church and his brethren and said to one of them, "It is hard to be laid on the shelf. You don't know how much I would love to answer roll-call with my brethren. I wanted to die in the harness, but I feel that my work is done; I don't know why God keeps me here longer. I await His call and am ready to go. I am growing rather anxious to go to my reward. It is all right; God is good to me." He was a pure man, and said of himself truly, "I have been a preacher many years; there is not a stain upon my character; I have brought no reproach upon the Church." He was a man of integrity of character, a preacher of superior endowments and gifts, and had a strong mind. preacher of superior endowments and gifts, and had a strong mind, with a brilliant imagination. The people came from far and near to hear him preach the occasional sermons he was able to preach. His last years were a blessing and benediction to his friends and Church. He grew old gracefully, possessed of a submissive, patient. cheerful spirit. The end of his checkered and useful life was peaceful as a summer's sunset. He passed away in full consciousness till the last, and in the bosom of his family. He called the wife and children to him, and, one by one, gave them his parting admonitions and blessing, and laid him down to sleep and slept soft as an infant slumbers, to awake, as he assured us and as we believe, in heaven. SEWELL PHILIPS.

Rev. Sewell Phillips was born in Haywood county, N. C., Aug. 20, 1830. His parents were plain, old-fashioned Methodists. His father was a farmer, and in his day was looked upon as one of the leading men in the community where he lived, both in the church as a layman, and in the county as a citizen.

In his early youth he was converted to God and joined the Methodist Church and at once began to show signs of promise—was even then a power for good in the community where he was reared. Many persons were moved to a better life by his invincible oratory. He was licensed to exhort April 23, 1851, and licensed to preach July 12, of the same year, by Rev. Wm. Hicks, who was at that time presiding elder of the Asheville District. The same year he was admitted on trial in the Holston Conference. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Paine at Wytheville, Va., October 15, 1853, and ordained elder by the same at Jonesboro, Tenn., November 18, 1855. He soon took rank among his brethren as a preacher of more than ordinary ability. As presiding elder, station and circuit preacher, he was equal to every demand, and in the lower end of the Conference, more particularly, he did more to mould and shape the church to which he belonged than any other man.

He was married to Miss Ada A., daughter of R. A. and Hannah Gillespie, August 1, 1856. In his last years he sustained only a nominal relation to the traveling ministry, having been on the supernumerary list, the state of his health being such as to render it impracticable for him to do pastoral work, yet he did almost as much preaching as a regular pastor. No other man of modern times possessed of sufficient ability to have filled the most lucrative pul-

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pits in the church, preached as much as did he with so little remuneration. Like that of our Lord, his ministry was to the poor. No school-house was too humble for him to enter and preach the gospel, and no home was too lowly for him to enter and pray with the sick. Being somewhat secularized, his great soul was hampered for many years. His heart was with his brethren in all their spiritual conflicts, while his body was on his farm. The upraiding of conscience and the chidings of the spirit of God, emphasizing the sen-timent, "Woe is me if I preach not the gospel," and this in full knowledge of his own native endowments and acquired qualifications to outrank many of his brethren, produced what was often uncharitably judged by others to be irritableness and high temper. Such localizing influences confined him to a smaller compass than the Master designed him to fill. Had he been a man of one work, the highest positions of honor among his brethren would have been within easy reach of his great gifts. He, however, had his faults and made mistakes, but he was always ready to confess the same, and to make all necessary amends. He was a man of marked sincerity-was pre-eminently a positive man. No individual possessed of a high temper and indomitable energy, and who is ambitious to succeed, will fail to provoke opposition. He was always true to his friends, loved righteousness and hated sin of every kind and everywhere. His preaching was in demonstration of the spirit and power of the gospel. He was a real orator.

As a monument to his energy and liberality a beautiful new church stands at Asbury camp ground, in the bounds of Rockwood circuit, built almost entirely with his own means. This was the last public enterprise of his life. A fitting monument to perpetuate the name and liberality of a good man. Numerous acts of kindness were bestowed by him upon worthy subjects that the world knows nothing of. Just a few days before his death, which occurred February 27, 1896, a few friends were in his room. We found him rational, and he conversed freely with us. He said, "I know it is only a matter of a few days with me, and at first I was a little rebellious at the thought of physical suffering, and there appeared to be clouds in the way, but they have all disappeared. My way is clear and my soul is in an ecstasy of joy." He then said to the writer: "Tell my brethren at Conference next fall that I had looked forward to that otherwise. Tell them that I shall pass away in the faith of the same with much earnestness he said, "Would that I had strength now to preach it to a thousand people!" We had prayer with him and at his request we sang a few songs, and he being too much exhausted to speak further, in an audible whisper he shouted, "Hallelujah!" We then parted with him, but not forever, for we shall see him again in our Father's house.

ROSA ELVIRA SHULER.

Mrs. Rosa Elvira Shuler, wife of Rev. J. W. W. Shuler, was born in Grayson county, Va., June 20, 1860, and departed this life at the parsonage in Lebanon, Russell county, Va., August 25, 1896. Her maiden name was Cornett, being a descendant of a long line of honest, upright, Methodist ancestors. The mysterious law of heredity seemingly transmitted to her all of the virtues, and few, if any of the faults of all her antecedents. So far as human beings could discern, she was good from childhood, sweet-spirited, kind, obliging,





honest, truthful. But she had been well taught, and therefore recognized the necessity of regeneration by the Holy Spirit, and personal communion with God. In her eighteenth year she was joyously converted and at once joined the M. E. Church, South, in whose pale she lived an acceptable, happy and useful member till called from labor to reward. On the 29th day of October, 1879, she was happily married to Brother Shuler, when he had little thought of becoming an itinerant Methodist preacher. But when he felt moved of the spirit to give his whole time and strength to the office and work of the ministry, unlike too many others, he felt a call to get ready for it.

To make the most of his life-work, he must have broader literary training in college. And though they had four or five little children she did not hesitate to forego all the comforts of their cozy country home—a place so dear to a woman's heart—and become a homeless, houseless wanderer, for life, for Christ's sake. The home was disposed of, a little house rented, and she gladly moved with him to Emory and Henry College, where, by keeping boarders and in every way which feminine ingenuity could suggest and deft fingers perform, she stood a help-meet and tower of strength by his side. The sainted Dr. E. E. Wiley once remarked that Brother Shuler and wife were the best representatives of the old type of Methodist preacher and wife he had seen for years, and added, "See that Holston takes care of them." The Master has taken her to Himself. But He has left us her three boys and three girls as her representatives and His own. May He help us to discharge well the trust thus committed to us. She had no doubts, no fears, but talked of dying as one after a long and pleasant visit talks of going home. She delivered each member of the family an appropriate message or exhortation, and sang, in low, sweet, triumphant tones:

"Take the name of Jesus with you, Child of sorrow and of woe,"

and that sweetest of songs, "The Home of the Soul;" and, with glad hallelujahs upon her lips, from the joys of a perfected Christian life upon the earth she merged into the joys of heaven. In the lauguage she appropriated and made her own as she was passing the mystic river, we may sing:

> "O how sweet it will be in that beautiful land, So free from all sorrow and pain, With songs on our lips and with harps in our hands, To meet one another again!"

About two years later her venerable husband was called from labor to reward. Her pastor, Bro. D. H. SUSAN LETITIA NEAL.

Susan Letitia Neal, daughter of John S. and Letitia Gains, was born at Eden's Ridge, Sullivan county, Tenn.. December the 9th, 1831. She was converted in early life and joined the Methodist Church. On April 10th, 1851, she was married to Rev. W. W. Neal, of the Holston Conference, M. E. Church, South. This relation continued for twenty-six years, when God took the husband to his heavenly home. To these servants of God were given eight children, five of whom preceded the mother to the world beyond. In her Christian life and experience she was more than an ordinary woman. Her character at the close of her life was the product of more than a half century of growth. Twenty-six years of Sister Neal's life were spent in the itinerancy, and the judgment alone can tell the joy and peace she carried into, possibly, hundreds of homes, because she carried therein the love of God. She loved her work, and God blessed her in it. Her loyalty to the Church was strong, intense and constant, because it was, with her, a loyalty to Christ. Her reading was varied and profitable. She had a great store of Bible knowledge. She never lost interest in the subjects and movements

of the day, because she read much of its literature. The young people's movement was especially interesting to her. This was evidenced by the organization and management of a Junior Ep-worth League in her own church. It was beautiful indeed to see, on the day of her burial, these boys and girls, placing each a bunch of flowers upon her grave in token of their respect and love. The needy of the community where she lived were the objects of her care and prayers. A very poor and ungodly woman was heard to say a few weeks ago that Sister Neal was the only person that had ever come into her home and prayed with and for her. The symmetry and beauty of her Christian character was most clearly seen in her home life. Careful, thoughtful, gentle and loving, she always encouraged and sustained her husband as an itinerant preacher. There never was a more devoted wife or a more loving mother. In the absence of her husband she always gathered the children around the family altar for the morning and the evening worship. What a benediction to any home to have such a wife and mother! In this way she has left the impress of her Christ-like life that will be most lasting. Her afflictions were many and varied, but in the darkest day she always saw a bright spot, and to that she turned her attention. Her last illness was protracted somewhat, but in it she was so cheerful and bright that it was truly marvelous. She thought, for some time before her death, that she would not recover, but this thought seemed to have given her no anxiety whatever. She often said to her pastor and others that it was all right, she was ready to go. On the evening of July the 28th, 1896, at Rhea Springs, Tenn., she sweetly, quietly and triumphantly passed over the river, giving to us as her last words, "Jesus is mine." What a possession!

ELBERT FRANKLIN SEVIER.

DIED OCT. 15, 1862.

It is to perform an act of Christian justice to the memory of one whom I knew only to admire and love that I essay the task of sketching the character and life of our sainted brother, Rev. E. F. Sevier, adjudged by all standards to be one of the ablest and most distinguished ministers ever connected with the Holston Conference. In response to the question asked in our General Minutes in October, 1862, "Who have died this year?" the answer is. "E. F. Sevier," without even one line *in memorium*.

He was the eldest son of James and Nancy Sevier, and was born September 30, 1802, on the Sevier farm, nine miles south of Jonesboro, on Nolachucky river. His father was the son of Gen. John Sevier, the first Governor of Tennessee. His mother was the daughter of Col. Henry Conway, a brave officer of the Revolutionary War, and a man of marked ability. Sevier was sent to Washington College, where he laid the foundations of his intellectual culture. After leaving college, he went to Jonesboro, Shire town of Washington county, and applied himself diligently to the study of law. In due time he had made such proficiency in his legal studies as easily to obtain license to practice in the courts of the land.

Not long after the subject of this sketch completed his law course in Jonesboro, a Christian merchant, H. R. W. Hill, it is said, visited that town on business, and during his stay was moved to hold a series of prayer meetings in the village. Few attended at first. But the interest increased, and a revival of religion began. Young Sevier, and others of his companions, were attracted to the meetings from a sense of mere curiosity. He soon, however, became deeply interested, and in company with his friend, O. B. Ross, he knelt in deep contrition, and was happily converted. This intensified the religious awakening, and the revival resulted in sixty-five conversions. There is a current tradition that as a brilliant young lawyer Sevier had become profoundly convicted under the prayers of a faithful family servant, belonging, perhaps, to Dr. John Harris, of Jonesboro, who was himself accustomed to preaching and holding class meetings in his own house. At all events, soon after this memoroble crisis in his history, he felt it was his duty to preach the gospel which had saved him. Six months after his conversion he was duly licensed to preach, and in the fall of that year, November, 1823, he was admitted on trial into the Tennessee Conference, held at Huntsville, Ala. He served the following charges: In 1823, appointed to the Abingdon Circuit as a junior preacher under Wm. P. Kendrick. In 1824, junior preacher on Knox Circuit. In 1825, ad-mitted into full connection, and ordained deacon at Jonesboro, Tenn., and appointed preacher in charge of Maryville Circuit. In 1826, preacher in charge on Green Circuit. In 1827, ordained elder and appointed pregiding elder of Abingdon District. At the close of bis appointed presiding elder of Abingdon District. At the close of his fourth year he went to Shelby county, Ala., and was married to Miss Matilda Powell. In 1828, presiding elder on Greeneville Dis-trict. In 1829 and 1830, presiding elder on Abingdon District. In 1831, November 10, he located at Athens, Tenn., and remained local till November, 1839, when he was re-admitted, and appointed agent of Emory and Henry College with Timothy Sullins. In 1840, re-appointed to that agency. In 1841-4 presiding elder of Asheville District. In 1845-7, presiding elder on Abingdon District. In 1848, on Knoxville Station, where he won the love and esteem of all churches and of all classes by his superior pulpit ability and his high tone and gentlemanly bearing as a Christian minister. In 1849 and 1850, left without an appointment on account of ill health. In 1851, presiding elder of Greeneville District. In 1852-4, he was superannuated. In 1855, on Chattanooga Station. In 1856-9, presiding elder on the Chattauooga District. In 1860, preacher in charge on Harrison Circuit and Chattanooga Colored Mission. In 1861, superannuated. In 1862, he died at his home in Chattanooga, at 12 m., October 18, in great peace.

E. F. Sevier was the very soul of honor. He would sooner have died than to have defrauded his fellow-man. His character was pure as the spotless snow, and his piety as ardent as that of the cherubim. Physically, he was tall and straight as a Cherokee chieftan, a kingly man, and ever a model in and out of the pulpit. He had a keen, black eye, and a mouth that seemed made for oratory, reminding one of Henry Clay. On great occasions, at quarterly and camp meetings, vast crowds, numbering thousands not unfrequently, would gather around and give rapt attention to his bold, impassioned and eloquent discourses. Cicero truthfully said, "No man was ever great without divine inspiration." When E. F. Sevier ascended the pulpit and announced a text

When E. F. Sevier ascended the pulpit and announced a text like this, as an instance: "Who walketh in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks," he would gradually and clearly open up his theme, and then launch out into the mighty sea of Christian doctrine,

pouring upon his hearers a flood tide of illumining and quickening thought, unfolding with a masterful and logical skill the cardinal doctrines of the gospel, and transporting his hearers to awe-inspir-ing altitudes of Christian thought and emotion. He was, indeed, a superior preacher, much sought after, honored and loved by all who knew him. By nature highly gifted, he magnified his gifts by a varied and ripe culture. He was social and companionable, communicative without being loquacious, cheerful and humorous without levity. He was never morose or captious. He was great of heart, unselfish, magnanimous, courtly, courageous. His native nobility gave him the carriage and dignity of a king. Yes, he was a Christian, "God Almighty's gentleman." He was nine years the Secretary of the Conference. He was greatly honored by his brethren in being chosen to represent them in the General Conferences of 1840, 1844, 1846. 1850 and 1858. In the summer of 1862 he buried his second wife, daughter of Rev. Jesse James, of Chattanooga. His own health now rapidly declined. He had cherished the hope, however, of meeting once more his brethren at the Conference in Athens, October 15, 1862. The Master had ordered it otherwise. About 12 M., on Saturday, October 18, 1862, he died in great peace, assuring his friends present that through the merits of Christ he was entering upon a blissful immortality. The day before his death he suggested all the arrangements for his funeral; requesting that when he died some one should telegraph Rev. James Atkins, sr., to come and perform the funeral services, but not to preach a funeral sermon till some future time. Thus passed away one of the most popular, honored and gifted members of the Holston Conference. Let us keep sacred the memory of his many virtues, and emulate the excellencies which adorned and distinguished the character and life of our glorified brother.





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
