


#### THE "HOLSTON PLAN."

[The following exhibit was prepared by Rev. P. L. Cobb.]

When the Leagues of the Holston Conference passed resolutions pledging themselves to guarantee the deficit of \$9,043 on the foreign and domestic missions assessments, they seemed to many to be attempting something impracticable; but they were building more wisely than they knew. The plans formulated were put in operation August 1, 1898. In a little over two months it was found that the foreign mission collection had increased \$1,080, and the home \$680—a total of \$1,760.

Encouraged by the result, plans were enterprised for the payment in full of both assessments in the Conference, amounting to \$17,000. At the end of the next Conference year it was found that the increase on the home and foreign collections was \$4,160.67; that the per cent of assessments paid had risen from forty-seven to eighty-three, and the per capita payment from fifteen to twenty-five cents, while the actual increase on foreign mis-

sions was forty-nine per cent more than the previous year.

This large increase gave an impulse to the movement in 1900 that secured every dollar of the \$17,000 assessed for home and foreign missions.

If no further increase were made in ten years, the excess of \$9,043.67 in 1900 over what was paid in in 1897, counted each year, would amount to \$90,436.70, which, added to the \$16,724, the actual increase since 1897, would reach the enormous sum of \$107,160.70, more than would have been put in the missionary treasuries if the Holston Plan had not been devised or if there had been no increase in the collections. Taking the ten years previous to the adoption of the plan as a criterion, there is little reason to believe that there would have been any considerable increase.



#### CONFERENCES.

The General Conference, our law-making body, which meets every four years, shall be composed of one clerical member for every fortyeight members of each Annual Conference, and an equal number of lay members. Of the lay members elected, one may be a local preacher. The clerical representatives shall be elected by clerical members of the Annual Conference, and the lay representatives by lay members.

The Annual Conference is composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, and four lay representatives—one of whom may be a local preacher—from each presiding elder's district. The lay members are elected by the laymen of each District Conference. Such members must be twenty-five years of age, and they must have been members

of the Church for six years of age, and they must have been members of the Church for six years.

The District Conference shall be composed of all the preachers, traveling and local, of the district, the recording stewards of the same, and of laymen, the number of whom, and manner of appointment, each Annual Conference may decide for itself. In compliance with this provision, the Holston Conference, in session at Abingdon, Va., in 1879, fixed the ratio at one delegate for every eighty laymen, to be elected by the Quarterly Conference of the several pastoral charges embraced in the said district; provided that no charge shall be entitled to more than eight nor district; provided, that no charge shall be entitled to more than eight, nor denied a less number than four, delegates. The District Conference meets annually.

The Quarterly Conference shall be composed of all the traveling and local preachers, including superannuated preachers residing within the circuit or station (whether without or within the limits of the Annual Conferences to which they belong), with the exhorters, stewards, trustees who are members of the Church, and class-leaders, of the respective circuits, stations, and missions, together with superintendents of Sunday-schools who are members of the Church, secretaries of Church Conferences, presidents of Senior Epworth Leagues, if eligible, and none others.

The Church Conference consists of all the members of a particular charge, or class, with resident members of the Annual Conference. It

should meet once a month on stations, once a quarter on circuits.



ELECTION OF DELEGATES.—The hour for election of delegates to the General Conference having arrived, Bishop Hendrix read instructions from the Discipline governing said election. Eugene Blake and A. B. Hunter were appointed tellers for the laymen, with J. H. Barnett as secretary. K. C. Atkins and T. J. Eskridge were appointed tellers for the clerical members, with I. S. French as secretary. The Bishop announced that the Conference was entitled to five clerical and five lay delegates. When the ballots were collected the tellers and secretaries were instructed to retire and count the same.

ADDRESSES .- Dr. P. H. Whisner addressed the Conference on the general work of the Board of Church Extension; Dr. J. J. Tigert, on the Methodist Review; and Dr. E. E. Hoss, on the Christian Advocate.

TELLERS' REPORT.—The tellers for the lay vote reported. 34 votes cast; necessary to a choice, 19; delegates elect, T. W. Jordan 21, E. C. Reeves 19. A second ballot resulted in no election.

The tellers for clerical members reported 138 votes cast; necessary to a choice 70; delegates elect, E. E. Hoss, 131; F. Richardson 80; R. G. Waterhouse 77. It was decided by a counted vote that the two receiving the next highest vote to those elected shall be the reserve delegates.

The third ballot of the laymen resulted in 35 votes cast; necessary to a choice 18; delegates elect, E. P. Rucker 25, J. W. Hicks 20. A fourth ballot resulted in no election.

ANNIVERSARY.—The Committee on Public Worship announced that the Missionary Anniversary of our Conference would be held in this church tonight at 7 o'clock, with addresses from G. B. Winton, of the Mexican Border Mission Conference, D. W. Carter, Superintendent of our Cuban Mission field, and C. G. Hounshell, who is soon to go from our midst to Korea as a missionary.

TELLERS' REPORT.—The fifth ballot of laymen resulted in no election. The sixth ballot was as follows: Votes cast, 36; necessary to a choice, 19; delegate elect, J. L. Jarman, with 19 votes. On motion the two receiving next highest votes—Creed F. Bates and George R. Stuart—were made the reserve delegates.

The second ballot of clerical delegates resulted as follows: Votes cast, 147; necessary to a choice, 74; delegate elect, W. S. Neighbors, who received 109 votes.

The time of the session was extended.

DELEGATES.—The tellers for clerical members reported the third ballot as follows: Votes cast 134; necessary to a choice, 68; delegate elect, J. A. Burrow, who received 76 votes: reserves, R. N. Price, Alonzo Monk.

MISCELLANEOUS.—The Committee on Public Worship announced preaching in this church at 3 p. m. by C. T. Carroll; at Brookside, 7:30 p. m. by J. T. Guy.

On motion it was decided that when we adjourn it be to meet again in memorial session Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

E. S. Finney, H. B. Graham and W. T. Ellis, lay delegates from the Big Stone Gap District, were reported to the secretary as present.

# MEMORIAL SESSION.

Sunday, Oct. 13, 1901.

The Conference met in memorial session at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon, with D. Sullins presiding by appointment of the Bishop. J. M. Wolfe led in prayer. The Conference Quartette sang, with much effect, "Just a Little While." The Committee on Memoirs submitted a report in sections. A paper on the life and death of William H. Henderson was read by E. H. Cassidy. Appropriate remarks were made by several persons, after which the Quartette sang, with wondrous sweetness, "Looking This Way." A paper on the life and death of E. W. Walker was read by J. W. Browning. Tender talks were made by some of the brethren. R. N. Price read a memoir of Mrs. M. P. Swaim, and J. D. McAlister, of Mrs. A. D. Stewart. These faithful women who had fallen on sleep were remembered by appropriate remarks which breathed a spirit of sympathy for the living and honor for the dead. The report as a whole was then adopted, after which the Conference stood in song, and was dismissed with the benediction by Dr. Sullins.

# SIXTH DAY.

Monday, Oct. 14, 1901.

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m., with Bishop Hendrix in the chair. The devotional service consisted of a Bible reading on a part of the 17th chapter of John, which was greatly enjoyed by those present. The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

INELIGIBLE.—Dr. R. N. Price stated that he was ineligible as a clerical reserve delegate to the General Conference to which he had been elected, and asked that a successor be chosen in his place. After some discussion as to the necessity of taking another ballot, or declaring the one who received the third highest vote on the talley sheet as the reserve delegate, it was decided to take another ballot. The tellers were directed to collect the votes. and retire to count the same.

QUESTION 45—"Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" Wytheville, Va., was unanimously chosen.

EDUCATION.—The hour for special order of the day having arrived, the report from the Board of Education was heard in three sections. J. D. Hammond, General Secretary of Education, addressed the Conference on the work which he has in hand. The reports were adopted in their order. See supplement "B," 1, 2 and 3.

ELECTION.—The tellers reported no election of reserve delegate to the General Conference. Later a second ballot was reported as resulting in no election, though S. D. Long had lacked only a few votes of the necessary number. On motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Conference for S. D. Long. Bishop Hendrix decided that A. Monk would take the place of first reserve delegate.

REPORTS.—The Committee on Books and Periodicals made report, which was adopted. See supplement "C."

The report of the Board of Missions was received. Bishop Hendrix highly commended the work of the Holston Conference for our missionary interests. See supplement "D."

The Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church made report, which was earnestly and impressively spoken to by E. E. Hoss and D. Sullins. Bishop Hendrix added a few earnest words, after which the report was adopted. See supplement "E."

The Treasurer of the American Bible Society Fund made report, which was adopted. The Committee on Bible Cause also made report which was adopted. See supplement "F." G. D. French, Field Agent of the American Bible Society, made a brief talk on his work.

The Joint Board of Finance made report which was adopted. See supplement "G."

The Committee on District Conference Records made report, which was complimented by the Bishop and then adopted. See supplement "H."

The Committee on Temperance made report which was discussed by E. E. Hoss, and then adopted. See supplement "I."

MISCELLANEOUS.—C. T. Carroll was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuated list. The committee afterward recommended him for that relation, and the report was adopted.

On motion of A. Monk it was decided that when we adjourn it be to meet this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

James I. Cash was placed on the Board of Church Extension in place of E. H. Cassidy, who is a presiding elder.

RESOLUTION.—The following resolution was adopted:

We recommend the passage, by this Conference, of the following esolution:

In the interest of the homes and the future of Virginia, the Methodists of Holston Conference favor the adoption, by the Constitutional Convention, now in session in the State of Virginia, of the amendment known as the "Quarles Amendment," the substance of which is, that no person can obtain a license to sell liquor until, as a condition precedent, he shall have obtained the affirmative consent of the legal voters of the community.

The secretary of this Conference is requested to communicate the substance of this resolution to the President of the Virginia Constitutional Convention.

The amendment was discussed by W. M. Dyer, J. A. Lyons and T. W. Jordan, and adopted. The report as a whole was then adopted. See supplement "B."

Dr. Waterhouse read a report in regard to Emory and Henry College, which was highly complimented by Dr. E. E. Hoss. On motion of J. S. French, Dr. Waterhouse was requested to have this published in pamphlet form and circulated throughout our bounds.

Report No. 2 of the Sunday School Board was received and adopted. See supplement "A."

The Treasurer of the Board of Missions made report. See supplement "D."

The following resolutions were adopted by a rising vote:



## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

REPORT NO. I-TWENTIETH CENTURY MOVEMENT.

Three years ago this Conference adopted, without a dissenting voice, these words of the Board of Education: "Your Board is profoundly impressed with the importance, and heartily endorses the purpose and plans of the General Board to raise \$1,500,000 for educational purposes. To this end we suggest the appointment of W. S. Neighbors as Conference Secretary; and we request that the presiding elders be appointed district secretaries to take general oversight of this work, and see that the plan of the General Board is carried out in every charge, co-operating with the Conference Secretary." Two years ago this Conference adopted, without dissenting voice, the following report of the Educational Board:
"Your Board of Education having had under consideration some of the

business aspects of the Twentieth Century Movement, reports as follows:

"We must have, to meet pressing indebtedness upon Emory and Henry College, \$32,000; Martha Washington, \$22,000, and Centenary College, \$12,500—Total, 66,500. We further estimate that not less than \$60,000 additional will be required to give Emory and Henry the necessary equipment to enable her to meet the minimum requirements prescribed by the ment to enable her to meet the minimum requirements prescribed by the Educational Commission. These two amounts aggregate \$126,500; adding to this what is being raised and expended for Sullins College, we may expect the Twentieth Century Offering to reach \$150,000. It ought not to be less; for this is only an average of \$2.67 per member. \* \* \* If we are worthy the position we occupy as leaders of God's Israel in Holston, we will reckon this achievement easily within range of our possibilities. We present the following as a plan of campaign:

1. Let every member of this Conference make his minimum offering before the present session closes. 2. Let each pastor return to the presiding elder at each quarterly conference, names of all contributors to the Twentieth Century Fund, and to see that such names and amounts be entered upon the Quarterly Conference records. 3. Let each presiding elder make careful record, in a book to be provided by the Board, of such lists as are furnished by the pastors. Said books to be sent by him, when their object has been accomplished, to the President of Emory and Henry College for preservation. 4. Let the presiding elder in person and through the canvassing committees keep in constant touch with the work in every charge. 5. Let each pastor appoint as many helpers as may be necessary to effect a thorough canvass of the entire membership. 6. Let all amounts from \$1.00 to \$5.00 be secured in cash, but on the installment plan if necessary; and let notes for larger amounts be made payable on or before January 1, 1901. 7. Let all moneys and notes secured be sent to James S. Kennedy, Treasurer, at Emory, Va., who shall carefully list the same, giving credit to the appropriate charge."

One year ago, this Conference adopted without a dissenting voice these words from the Educational Board: "Let us today resolve that the Church of Holston, as represented by us, shall accomplish not only the work we planned one year ago, but a much broader, deeper and grander work. Pass the word down the line, through all the ranks, that the battle is renewed from this hour, with ten-fold vigor; that we esteem victory more precious than life. Our plan of campaign in partial outline for the incoming year is as follows: 1. A specially vigorous prosecution of the work of securing Thank Offerings under the lead of each presiding elder, preacher, and special committees, in their respective districts, charges and churches from about October 21 to January 1st, 1901. 2. A continuance of this movement throughout incoming Conference year, under the regulations of last year, as published on pages 48 and 49 of our Annual. 3. We announce it as our fixed and unalterable purpose to pay off, first, our indebtedness on Emory and Henry, Martha Washington and Centenary Colleges, and then give to Emory and Henry the \$60,000 additional we hope to secure for absolutely necessary improvements and the nucleus of endowment. Against any other direction of the offerings of our people (except what Bristol Methodism and friends in that town are doing for Sullins College, and what our friends and people in the particular pastoral charges where our academies are located are doing for their schools) we protest as most unwise, and tending to defeat our whole plan of endeavor."

That the foregoing utterances from your Board were clear, and fully appreciated by this Conference, we took for granted from the way you adopted them, from time to time, without a dissenting voice. But as to how nearly your non-dissenting vote has been verified, let facts and figures tell. Your Secretary's note-book shows the following record by districts:

The great discrepancy between the Secretary's report and that of the Pastors is accounted for in three ways: First. The \$7,023.00 subscribed by the preachers is not counted in their report; Second. Of the 168 pastors, 51 could not be induced to report at all, even after three urgent appeals to do so, and several of these are in our strongest charges; Third, Some of those reporting had never gotten the Pastor's Roll Book, and had lost the subscription list.

Brethren, this Twentieth Century Fund is a sacred fund—sacred as the hundred years of the blessings of God upon us, sacred as the cause for which it was given. We have promised our people a faithful, business-like record; nothing less than this will satisfy them; and nothing less than this is worthy of us. We make this final appeal to you:

1. Inasmuch as the Secretary, W. S. Neighbors, has agreed to continue the work of receiving and tabulating reports, let the preachers make out reports of those charges not yet reported, and send to him at earliest possible date.

2. Inasmuch as the work has not been thoroughly done, only about 25 per cent. of our 56,000 members having made an offering, we cannot do less than continue this work, at least until the next Annual Conference.

3. We must collect all that has been subscribed; the preacher in charge is the only person who can effectually do this work, or have it done. Some of the preachers have done well; but many have done very little, and some

have done absolutely nothing.

4. Brethren, press this cause through the next Conference year, not only collect what has been subscribed, but seek to have all the rest of your members to make their offering.

#### REPORT NO. 2.

Quite full reports have been received from Emory and Henry, Martha Washington, Sullins, and Centenary Colleges. We are pleased to note that Emory and Henry has, through the creation of a new chair and the addition of another professor, together with other possible changes, met the requirements of the standard recently published by the General Board of Education, and has reorganized and improved her preparation for doing preparatory work. The new session also shows an increase of nearly twenty per cent. over the registration at this period last year.

We do not think it necessary, or possible, for our Conference to sustain mera then are additional from the protection of Company and Compan

We do not think it necessary, or possible, for our Conterence to sustain more than one college of the grade required by our Educational Commission, hence we have adopted for recommendation to the faculties and trustees of our Female Colleges courses of study extending through four years which a committee of practical educators, authorized by you at your last session, has drawn up and furnished us. We also adopt and recom-

mend a course prepared in the same way for our academies.

The reports from Martha Washington, Sullins, and Centenary Colleges indicate some gratifying growth in important directions.

A special committee, appointed a year ago to look into the legal status of our schools, wrote to each school for an abstract of title to be filed with the Conference Board; but, up to the present time, none has been sent in.

From the reports submitted we get the following figures of indebted-

ness:

Emory and Henry, \$16,961.56; Martha Washington, \$16,952.67; Sullins College, \$10,000; Centenary College, \$12,569; Princeton Academy, no debt; People's Academy, no debt; Pryor Institute, \$85.51; Jonesville Academy,

no debt.

Having been grounded in the doctrine that the Annual Conference must assume the financial burdens of our schools and that said schools can succeed only as they share in the sympathy and effort of its members, we naturally conclude that such responsibility carries with it the further obligation of careful supervision of said schools upon the part of the Conference. We therefore recommend:

(1). That in the future all school property acquired by the Conference shall be deeded to the Church through the Conference Board of Educa-

tion

(2). That hereafter no school be established, no school building erected, or debts for property or buildings for school purposes be incurred

without the sanction of the Conference Board of Education, or its authorized representatives—who for the ensuing year shall be named by the President of this Board after pastoral appointments shall have been made, the persons thus named to constitute the executive committee of the Board.

- (3). We recommend that in the future the trustees of each school under control of this Annual Conference be required to make an annual exhibit to the Conference Board of Education of its financial condition, including also such itemized statements of receipts and disbursements as are necessary to a clear understanding of its business administration, and that this exhibit be made not later than September 1, of each year.
- (4). We request the Annual Conference to confirm the following nominations as the Auditing Committee of our Board, viz.: J. B. Ward, W. S. Neighbors and Creed F. Bates.
- (5). We request the Executive Committee to ascertain and define the powers accorded the Boards of Visitors annually elected at the suggestion of Faculties and Trustees of our schools.
- (6). We recommend that the Executive Committee herein provided for be recognized by the Conference as the agents of this Board, ad interim, in all transactions relating to the establishment, organization and enlargement of our school work, and that all correspondence on this subject be addressed to chairman of said committee.
- (7). We recommend that the expenses of this Executive Committee be limited to \$100, to be paid out of our Conference Educational fund.
- (8). We recommend that presiding elders, after consultation and with the endorsement of said Executive Committee, be authorized by this Annual Conference to secure teachers for localities where, in their judgment, schools should be established by us. That the presiding elders be further empowered to detail any of their preachers to the work of supervision and instruction in mission centers when in their opinion, with concurrence of the bishop in charge and the Executive Committee of this Board, more good can thus be accomplished than by our customary methods in mission fields.
- (9). In conclusion it is to be explicitly observed that nothing contained in this report is to be construed as authorizing any one to involve either this Board or the Conference it represents in any financial obligation, or for any amount, however small.

### BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

The Church can not put too much emphasis upon the necessity of a wise and systematic distribution of her Books and Periodicals. We first call attention to the fact that the business of the Publishing House is in a prosperous condition, and is constantly increasing in the volume of its productions and sales. Net gain in sales over last year was \$17,000; gain in assets, \$37,000. The secular book stores do not keep on their shelves our publications, therefore our people are dependent upon the preachers for the proper introduction of our books. In the sale of books we do well to get the publications that are most useful to our young people. They are the

hope of the Church; what they read is of vital importance.

Our periodicals are worthy of all commendations. The "Nashville Christian Advocate," Dr. E. E. Hoss, Editor; the "Midland Methodist," by J. A. Burrow and Wm. Green; the "Epworth Era" for the Leagues, by Dr. H. M. Dubose; and the "Children's Visitor" for the Sunday Schools, by Dr. James Atkins are our weekly issues for general circulation. The Dr. James Atkins, are our weekly issues for general circulation. The "Sunday School Magazine," the "Review of Missions," the "Woman's Missionary Advocate," and "Our Homes," are our monthly issues. The "Methodist Review," published bi-monthly and edited by Dr. J. J. Tigert; the Sunday School quarterlies, Little People and Lesson papers are our monthly issues. All these are most excellent publications, and should be circulated by us as a Conference. Their excellences are so well known, that they need no further commendation by us.

Special mention should be made of our general organ, the "Nashville Christian Advocate," and special organ the "Midland Methodist," the former of which is easily the peer of any publication of like grade, and should be put into every Methodist home. Its editor, while gentle and forbearing, has ably defended our institutions when attacked by unjust crit-

icism.

The "Midland Methodist" has given perfect satisfaction under the skillful direction and able editorial management of Revs. J. A. Burrow and W. M. Green. It is believed by your committee that the circulation of this paper should be so increased that the whole time of the editor may be devoted to editorial work. The increased activity in church work demands, as never before, the wide circulation of our Church literature. Your committee would urge that each member of this Conference make an earnest effort to increase the circulation of the Midland Methodist which is so helpful to the Conference in its work.

"We recommend as members of the joint committee of publication for the ensuing year Rev. Eugene Blake, Rev. J. W. Perry, and Brother Z. T. Godwin, who have served us so acceptably for the past two years; and we further recommend that Rev. J. A. Burrow be appointed editor-in-chief."

We feel that it is impossible to over-estimate the importance of placing our Books and Periodicals in the homes of the people. During the coming year it is earnestly hoped that special attention will be given to this important feature of our work.

# BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Your Board of Missions has had supervision during the past year of forty-six missions. The full amount of the \$6,000.00 appropriated for their support has been paid, every missionary receiving what we promised to pay him. Six charges have during the year become self supporting: Grundy, Iaeger, Hillsville, Anderson Street, Jonesboro and Embreeville, and Whitwell. For the ensuing year the Board assumes control of 50 missions and has appropriated \$6,500.00 for their support as follows:

The assessments for the ensuing conference year are \$10,000 for Foreign Missions and \$7,000 for Domestic Missions, which we have apportioned as follows:

We recommend the appointment of P. L. Cobb as Conference Missionary Secretary, without salary, and appropriate \$300.00 for an expense fund of which he shall have charge. This fund has yielded such excellent results in the dissemination of practical missionary intelligence, and the development of a missionary conscience among our people that we deem its continuance a necessity. The Board has adopted the following by-laws:

1st. The Conference Board of Missions shall consist of fifteen mem-

bers, one-third of whom may be laymen.

2nd. The President of the Board shall have the authority to call a meeting whenever in his judgment business of such importance arises as can not properly be postponed until the regular annual meeting, and he shall select the place of meeting.

3rd. A committee shall be appointed each year to estimate what amounts shall be appropriated for the several missions, and report to the first meeting of the Board, which meeting shall be on the day preceding the

opening of the Annual Conference session.
4th. An auditing committee of three members of the Board appointed by the President shall examine the books of the Treasurer and report at some time during the annual session.

The policy of the Board shall be to reduce the appropriations to 5th.

the different missions each year when at all practicable.
6th. The Board shall keep on hand a reserve fund of \$2,500 at least,

to pay the first drafts of the missionaries and meet emergencies.

7th. The Board will not grant appropriations when it is evident, after careful examination, that an adjustment of the work could be made so as to avoid the necessity of such appropriation.

8th. The Board will decline to make appropriations in the absence of satisfactory information, and in order to obtain this information, will insist on the blanks furnished by the Board being filled and returned by the

presiding elder.

John Milton Brown has been elected a member of the Board.

The Committee on Estimates for the ensuing year, as provided for in the by-laws, are: L. L. H. Carlock, J. W. Perry and John Milton Brown, with the Conference Missionary Secretary as a member ex officio. The Auditing Committee are J. W. Smith, W. W. Hicks and P. L. Cobb.

Two interesting and profitable meetings have been held during the present session of our Conference. At one of these the Board and Mis-

sionaries discussed the problems of self support. At the other, which was a joint meeting of the Board and of the officers and members of the Woman's Home Mission Society, the Educational work so auspiciously begun in the Flat Top Coal Field was the topic for discussion.

The Board of Missions will co-operate with the Missionary Committee of the Epworth League Conference in holding a mid-year meeting, and the Board will meet on the day before and at the place where this meeting

is held for the consideration of its own work.

We commend most heartily the promptness with which the collections were forwarded to the Treasurer during the past year. Four-fifths of the assessments were in the treasury six weeks before Conference. Is it not possible during the coming year to collect the entire amount by the end of the third quarter?

The Board is under obligations to Rev. J. W. Perry for the preparation of his most excellent pamphlet on Domestic Missions. The circulation of the pamphlet has done much to interest our people in this most E. W. Moore, President. vital topic.

# SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The spiritual state of the Church is of first importance. The reports of presiding elders and pastors show more than six thousand conversions in the Conference this year. This is a good showing, and encourages the hope that the gospel as preached by us is still the power of God unto salvation, and the promise of God that His word should not return unto Him void, has been kept. This year has been in marked advance of any previous year in the material development of our Church. A large number of churches and parsonages have been built. All missionary assessments have

been paid, and a healthy advance has been made on all other benevolent assessments of the Church. Our schools and colleges are prosperous; pastors, in the main, are well supported; Sunday Schools are increasing in numbers, and are well supplied with the best of literature, and, for the most part, are cared for by godly men and women. The Woman's Foreign and Home Missionary Societies are doing a good work; Epworth Leagues, Senior and Junior, are being better equipped each year for more effective work; the strength of the Church is being utilized today as, perhaps, never

before in her history.

For all these things we thank God and take courage; whereunto we have attained we would hold fast and still walk by the same rule, and mind the same things, that no man take our crown. Notwithstanding all this the Spirit might justly say I have somewhat against thee. Our experience and class meetings are largely neglected. In olden times when they that feared God spake one to another, they attracted Divine attention, made history, and obtained a promise, "They shall be mine in that day saith the Lord." We are of opinion that family religion, throughout the church, is being neglected. This ought not so to be. Let us stand in the way and see, and ask for the old paths where is the good way that we may walk therein.

Your committee is of opinion that the greatest danger of the church today is worldliness—this is a money-making and money-seeking age. "Covetousness is idolatry," and there is no remedy for it but giving. We feel, therefore, that our personal comfort, as well as the best interest of the Church can be best served by an unreserved, full and willing consecration of heart, head, life and property, to the service of God, that we may

have treasure in heaven and so follow our Lord.

## BIBLE CAUSE.

Fundamental to all Christian growth and development is the knowledge of the word of God; therefore it is obligatory upon those who are striving for the highest results attainable to the church, to aid by their efforts, prayers, and substance those institutions which have for their object the dissemination of the scriptures. The American Bible Society is recognized by the church as such an institution, and we at our last Conference, by resolution, acknowledged our obligations to it, by voting an assessment of \$800.00 to be raised along with the other collections ordered by the church. It is gratifying to your committee to note the readiness with which our people respond to this cause when it is presented to them. Of the \$800.00 assessed, \$567.05 have been paid to the treasurer, \$150.35 in advance of last year. In many sections of the Holston Conference, notably the coal fields and mountain sections, there are many homes destitute of the word of God. Much can be done to change this condition of things by the co-operation of the pastors with the agents who have been assigned to these sections.

Rev. Geo. D. French, D. D., of Morristown, Tenn., and Rev. John Pearson, 10 Roanoke, Ludlow Ave., Cincinnati, Ohio, are the agents who have charge of the territory which the Conference embraces. Rev. Mr. Wragg (colored) has been appointed by the A. M. B. S. to make a complete and systematic canvass of the south among the negroes in order that every home may have the Bible. Your committee feels that the Conference ought not to neglect the negroes at its doors in the matter of giving

them the Bible.

Your committee recommends that the \$800.00 assessment be continued, and that each pastor do his best to bring up this claim in full; also that the pastor of Morristown station be made the treasurer of this fund for the Conference.

#### TEMPERANCE.

A Methodist who is loyal to his God, his Church, and his country, must stand against, work against, fight against, and vote against the enemy—intemperance. "Drunkenness, or drinking spiritous liquors, unless in cases of necessity" is a crime in the eyes of God and man. A Methodist can not use liquor as a beverage, or manufacture it, or sell it, or sign petitions for its sale, or become a bondsman for obtaining a license, or rent property to be used for the liquor traffic. Our Church has but one voice on this great subject, and that voice has no uncertain sound, and it has been heard wherever Methodism has gone throughout the world. "Touch not, taste not," has been the cry, the example and the influence of the Methodist ministry in all our history, and we glory in that history.

In our own Conference, "the signs of the times" point towards a brighter future. Temperance is having victories, and we believe that the overthrow of liquor in Holston is a happy fact, surely approaching. In Tennessee, the Four-Mile law has practically removed all saloons from the rural districts. Liquor can not be sold within four miles of any institution of learning where there is no corporation. Indeed, far-reaching antiliquor legislation passed the Tennessee lower house of representatives at the session of 1901, by the very remarkable majority of seventy-five; and the fight was led in the house by some of Tennessee's most promising young men. At that session, one law was enacted, under the provisions of which, any town or community in the State of Tennessee, of 2,000 population or less, may altogether exclude liquor by becoming incorporated under the provisions of that law.

In Virginia, the law has removed the sale of intoxicants from a great part of our territory. Indeed, your committee is informed that Holston has one presiding elder's district wherein there is but one saloon. And, furthermore, a constitutional convention is now in session in Virginia, and the liquor question is under consideration. The "Quarles Amendment," if adopted, will leave to the people of the locality the right to deny the saloon

a place in their midst.

Not only do we find the law-makers of Tennessee and Virginia moving in the direction of temperance, but we find the great railways and other corporate enterprises in our country arrayed against this evil of drink. These corporations are seeking sober men, and it is now a rule of conduct that an employe is subject to discharge who uses liquor in any form, on or off duty. True, it may be said that this stand on the part of our quasi public corporations is taken for mere business interests and reasons, but the stand is encouraging, and it demonstrates the fact that the Church of God, on the one hand, and the country's business interests, on the other, are moving along parallel lines in a joint opposition to rum.

The outlook is full of encouragement, and the coming Conference year is a good time to renew the battle and carry it into every part of the territory. Your committee, however, notes some facts which are not so encouraging. We fear that too much laxity is practiced towards members of the Church who are known to be habitual dram-drinkers and even drunkards. We would urge our preachers to be stricter disciplinarians in this particular, believing it would be for the best interest of the Church

and society.

Resolved, That this Conference designate the first Sabbath in January, 1902, as Temperance Day, and that every pastor, on the stations, shall preach, on that day, a sermon on this important subject, and that on all the circuits, the month of January, 1902, be set apart by the pastors to a like temperance movement.

#### CHURCH EXTENSION.

We rejoice in the fact that there has been an increase of more than \$250.00 in the collection for Church Extension; also that the churches which have been erected are, as a rule, not only substantial, but of good design. Certainly these things indicate that our people are becoming more fully aroused to the great importance of this arm of the service. We believe that when the Church fully understands the importance of this department of church enterprise that deficiencies in the collections will become a thing of the past, and the assessments will be the minimum of payment. We believe that this much desired end can be attained when Church Extension is given the prominence of other missionary enterprises. For such it is, and of equal importance. Our pastors can not do successfully the work committed to them unless they have comfortable churches in which to assemble their congregations. A great crisis is upon us. No wide-

awake man can fail to read the signs of the times. Great commercial enterprises are being developed in our territory. If we meet the demands thrust upon us by erecting good churches of modern design (and manning them with good men, which is assured) success is certain. Then we will not be one whit behind in the wonderful strides of spiritual progress which will be made in the next few decades. If we fail to meet these obligations and privileges we should not whine when we are supplanted by other denominations.

Never perhaps have such pressing demands been made upon this Board. We can not meet these demands upon us with only thirty-five per cent. in the treasury of the amounts solicited. If hereafter the assessments are paid in full it will not only enable us to save the Bourne Memorial Church at Radford, Va., as well as others now in danger of being sold for debt, but it would enable us to help substantially in the erection of churches where

most needed. In view of the pressing demands upon us it is

\*Resolved\*, That we pledge ourselves to use our utmost endeavor to col-

lect in full the assessments for church extension.





#### EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

There are 190 Leagues in the Holston Conference, an increase of 13; with 6,215 members, an increase of 209. This shows a healthy growth,

though not as great an one as last year.

The annual League Conference, held at Sweetwater, was in many respects, the best in our history; but one thing is to be deplored, viz., the smallness of the delegation from the Virginia part of the Conference. Some excuse is furnished by the distance, but the fact to which we called attention last year, that comparatively little attention is paid the League in that territory, is still patent. We commend to you the work done by this organization and the present officers, bespeaking for them your earnest sympathy and help.

The report of the general secretary shows an increased circulation of the "Epworth Era" and a consequent decrease in the deficit arising, not from its publication, but the official recognition and establishment of the League as a part of the church. We assure Dr. DuBose, its editor, of our appreciation thereof, and beg that the Leaguers of the Conference give it

their earnest support.

As the report of the Committee on Nominations next year will very likely be handed in before this Board can report, we would now suggest that such ones be nominated as are officers of the Conference League organization, so that these officers and this Board may continue to work harmoniously.

#### MEMOIRS.

#### WILLIAM H. HENDERSON.

William H. Henderson was born September 29, 1846, in Sullivan county, near Paperville, Tenn. He was the son of Thos. J. and Sarah Henderson, of whom we know but little, but we are informed that they were honest, industrious, and good people. Brother Henderson joined the M. E. Church in 1865. About the same time, he was converted, though there is no record of the date of that important event. After reaching his majority he taught school, worked on a farm, and for several years was an engineer on the N. & W. R. R. He was married to Miss Laura A. Pippin, of Washington county, Virginia, in 1885. To this union were born five children,—four daughters and one son,—all of whom are living and are in the care of Mrs. E. E. Wiley, at the Greeneville Orphanage. Brother Henderson's early advantages were not the best. He had a life of much labor, but he made the best of his talents that his circumstances would permit.

He was licensed to preach by the M. E. Church in 1887, and the same year was admitted on trial into the Holston Conference, M. E. Church, and received regular appointments from that Conference until the fall of 1895, when he united with Holston Conference, M. E. Church, South, at Tazewell, Va., and was appointed to Bristol Circuit. He served with great acceptability the following charges: Bristol Circuit, Mendota Circuit, Grundy Mission and Decatur Circuit. He was a close and diligent student in matters of religion, and kept well informed upon all that was occuring in the religious and political world. But it was in the daily study of the Holy Scriptures that he took the deepest and most constant delight. Here he found the source of all his, joy, his comfort, and his strength. He stored his mind full of its precious truths, and when in great sorrow and deep

trouble they were his solace and comfort.

He had been in good health and spirits with the exception of a light attack of la grippe and a slight case of indigestion, but the doctor did not regard it as of a serious nature. He preached twice on Sunday, February 24, 1901,—in the morning at Decatur and in the evening three and one-half miles away at Stewart's Chapel. He was unusually happy and preached with great power and liberty. At the close of his sermon on Sunday evening, hearing of a sick member three miles away, he went to see her and spent the night with the family. He talked joyfully with the family about religion and the interest of the Church. He retired seemingly well, not complaining in the least, except that he felt a little tired from the day's labor. He was found next morning dead in his bed, just as he had retired. He had passed away some time during the night without a struggle, and a peaceful smile rested on his face. It was a great shock not only to his family and friends, but to the members and friends of the Decatur Circuit. No man in so short a time could hope to gain a higher place in all hearts. The people seemed to take to him at once and recognized him as a man of God. He was a faithful and earnest pastor, a good practical preacher and zealous worker. He had a fair education, and possessed a vigorous native intellect, all of which he consecrated to Christ and his church. He possessed a clear conception of the great doctrines of the Holy Bible and of Methodism and failed not to proclaim them with an earnestness born of a burning zeal for the salvation of immortal souls. Many souls saved by his life and preaching will doubtless rise up in the morning of the resurrection and call him blessed.

Brother Henderson was loved and respected by all who knew him. He never forgot a friend or a kindness. He was a man of clean lips and pure speech. He never murmured or complained at the hard places that fell to his lot, but like a good soldier of Jesus Christ he stood at his post, and dis-

charged his duties like a hero that he was.

He desired to live that he might rear his children and serve his Savior and Church. His last conversation with the writer, about ten days before his death, was relative to his children and the Church. Said he, "I want to live to raise my children, and preach the gospel." He was laid to rest in the cemetery at Decatur, Tenn., on the evening of February 26, 1901, after suitable services conducted by R. P. Gouldy, J. A. Burrow and others. E. H. Cassidy.

#### E. W. WALKER.

E. W. Walker was born in Hawkins county, Tenn., September 10th, 1866, where he grew up like most country boys, working on the farm, and going to school as opportunity afforded. His father was a consistent member of the Primitive Baptist Church; his mother a devoted Methodist. She died when he was only ten years old, but she had well laid the foundation of a true Christian character in her son, and her dying request to meet her in heaven, was a perpetual inspiration to him to live a holy consecrated, Christian life, and had no little influence in causing him to become a Methodist preacher. He was converted in 1884 under the ministry of Rev. J. K. Wolfe, and from the first felt a strong conviction that it was his duty to preach, and at once began to exercise his gifts and graces, and soon thereafter entered upon his life's work. He was married to Miss Callie V. Kite, November 13th, 1887. The fruit of this union was six children, two of whom preceded their father to the heavenly rest—one, the baby boy, fol-

lowing after.

Brother Walker joined the Holston Conference at Morristown, Tenn., October, 1889. His first charge was Erwin Mission, a hard work, where he did effective service. In 1890 he was sent to Kingsport Circuit, which charge he served with great acceptability for three years. From there he went to Hawkins Circuit, in the bounds of which he had been brought up. There he remained until removed by the four year time limit. He was perchance more successful there than in any other field in which he labored. It was with profound regrets that his people gave him up. He went from there to Cumberland Gap Circuit for two years, and from there to Jasper Circuit for two years. While there his health began to decline. At Conference last fall at Chattanooga, he thought he was able for work and that, with a change of climate, he would be as effective as ever. He was sent to Welch and Panther, W. Va., where he arrived in due time and entered hopefully and heartily into his work with very encouraging prospects. His humble, affable and gentle Christian bearing won for him friends from the start; and had his health held up, he would no doubt have done a great work. The people were pleased with him, and he was pleased with them. His strength, however, instead of increasing as he had hoped, began to decline, and what his friends had feared, sure enough had happened-consumption, that invidious foe, had laid hold on him with an unrelenting grasp. When most men would have given up and stopped, he still kept on, visiting the sick when he ought to have been in bed himself, preaching the gospel when his voice was so weak that he could scarcely be heard, stopping in the midst of his discourse many times and gasping for breath he would still declare the message of life and salvation. He seemed determined to die at his post. When he had to surrender it was without a murmur. He said to the writer time and again, "it is hard to have to quit work, but it is the Lord's will and I know it is right." During his illness and great suffering his physician told me that he could not understand how he could bear it all and never complain. Many who were with him much said they never saw such an exhibition of Christian patience in any one. His people stood by him nobly and did all that was possible to be done for his temporal comfort. I never saw a greater exhibition of kindness and devotion than the people of every Church showed, and those who were of no Church.

But in spite of physicians and kindly attention Brother Walker had to die. The last religious service held with him was conducted by J. W.

Browning and J. W. Rader, and at his request his baby boy was dedicated to God in holy baptism. At this service he requested them to sing the hymn, "Just a Little While," and as the song was being sung he became very happy, and said, "Tell my brethren that all is well, that there is not a cloud in my sky." "All that bothers me," said he, "is leaving my wife and little ones alone in the world." Truly it may be said, his was a useful life, and a triumphant death. In May, 1901, the weary wheels of life stood still, and his soul went away to live with God. The funeral services were conducted in the Methodist church in Welch, where he had preached his last sermon, by J. W. Browning, J. W. Rader, J. R. Hunter and T. R. Handy, his presiding elder. His remains the next day were laid away in the cemetery at Graham, Va., to await the resurrection of the just.

#### MRS. A. D. STEWART.

Mrs. Jane Bennett Stewart, daughter of B. L. and Mrs. Elizabeth Bennett, was born November 27, 1841, in Marion county, Tennessee, and died at Dunlap, Tennessee, September 20, 1901, aged 59 years, 9 months, 23 days. She was twice married: First to John R. McCulloh, of Georgia; the second time to Rev. A. D. Stewart, on the 1st day of February, 1866. By her first marriage she was possessed of one daughter and by the second, of three sons and four daughters-eight children in number, all of whom are alive and were present at her funeral. She was converted in her 15th year while attending school at McMinnville, Tennessee, and soon thereafter joined the M. E. Church at Chapel Hill in Sequatchie county, Tennessee. For 45 years she exemplified and adorned the life of Christ, 35 years of that period being

spent in the arduous and responsible position of an itinerant's wife.

To human ken Sister Stewart's life seemed complete. She filled up the measure of three score years, living to see all her children grown and members of the Church. She reached the superannuate period of a Methodist preacher's life, settled in her own home with all her family close around Finally she ascended in holy triumph, while brother and sisters, husband and children were witnesses to the beauty of her translation.


She filled to the brim the measure of wife and mother. In all the years of his peculiar calling the heart of her husband safely trusted in her and she did him good all the days of her life. To her children she was a wise counsellor and a thorough companion, opening unto them her mouth with wisdom and revealing the law of kindness under her tongue. afternoon talks with mother," said one of her daughters—herself a matron—"were the strength and inspiration of our lives." All of her family listened to mother when she counselled and felt secure when walking in the ways of her admonition.

Her personal Christian character was strong and symmetrical—rich in coloring and mellow with ripeness. With the eye of faith she constantly beheld the things not seen, hence never fainted by the way. Hope burned sweetly in her heart and she helped the despairing. Her love was perfected with that perfection that casteth out all fear. She was a most careful

With dusk came the red glowing lines which, with deepening night, became white sheets of glorious flame, ranging the mountain sides as far as the eye could see, throwing upon nature's background of night a panorama of glory and heauty never to be nature's background of night a panorama of glory and beauty never to be forgotten. So in the last years of Sister Stewart, amid pain and suffering, gentleness, patience and joy, Christliness in heavenly flame blazed and was glorified, until suddenly the sun shone and she was hid forever in Him.

#### MRS. M. P. SWAIM.

Mrs. Lou L. Swaim, whose maiden name was Kirklin, was born in what was then Marion county, Tennessee—the county occupying the lower portion of Sequatchie Valley—May 2, 1840. The writer became acquainted with her mother, a most estimable lady, in 1852, and knew the daughter as a modest, retiring girl. Mrs. Kirklin was at the time a widow, and she discharged her duties as mother and head of the family with remarkable wisdom and dignity, as well as with unremitting motherly affection. Her pious influence left its impress upon her family; and Mrs. Swaim began life with a thorough bent towards good manners, virtue and religion. She was happily married to the Rev. Mitchell P. Swaim, of Holston Conference, April 26, 1859, and was to the end of life a devoted companion, dividing his sorrows and augmenting his joys for more than forty years. She died at her home near Morristown, Tenn., August 28, 1901, aged 61 years, 3 months

and 26 days.

Mrs. Swaim was baptized in her infancy, and brought up in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the Church of her mother. She made a public profession of Christ, and formally united with the Church in her 17th year. She was not demonstrative in her religious experience even on revival occasions; but she was often profoundly stirred, especially under the solemn preaching of the Word. In her religious and social life she was naturally timid and retiring; but she was as true to the principles of truth and right as the needle to the pole, not fearing to challenge even the opinions of the great and wise, if she believed them to be in conflict with the truth. She bowed to truth rather than to authority. Being of a quiet nature she made acquaintances slowly, but always grew upon them; and having made friends, she easily retained them. She left a stricken husband and two children, but has gone to join two children, who had preceded her to the skies.

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
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
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
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
