




GENERAL CHURCH STATISTICS.

Number of traveling preachers in our Church at large, 6,293, a gain of 66; local preachers, 4,982, a decrease of 169; members, 1,505,241, an increase of 34,721; Sunday-schools, 14,133, an increase of 229; Sunday-school teachers, 103,486, an increase of 2,087; pupils, 884,329, an increase of 30,578; Epworth Leagues 3,234, a decrease of 165; Epworth League members, 115,099, a decrease of 5,137; infants baptized, 3,037; adults baptized, 9,086; societies, 17,898; charges, 5,037.

The North Georgia Conference has the largest number of traveling

The North Georgia Conference has the largest number of traveling preachers, 367; also the largest number of members, 99,486; the Northwest Texas Conference comes second with 290 traveling preachers; but the Virginia Conference is second in membership, having 91,654. Northwest Texas leads in local preachers, having 367; North Georgia is second with

303. The Virginia Conference is ahead in Sunday-schools, having 780; teachers, 8,414; scholars, 64,035. North Georgia holds second place. Baltimore Conference has 221 Epworth Leagues, and 9,636 members, with the Missouri Conference second, and Holston a close third.

CONFERENCES.

The General Conference, our law-making body, which meets every four years, shall be composed of one clerical member for every fortyeight members of each Annual Conference, and an equal number of lay members. Of the lay members elected, one may be a local preacher. The clerical representatives shall be elected by clerical members of the Annual Conference, and the lay representatives by lay members.

The Annual Conference is composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, and four lay representatives—one of whom may be a local preacher—from each presiding elder's district. The lay members are elected by the laymen of each District Conference. Such members must be twenty-five years of age, and they must have been members

of the Church for six years.

The District Conference shall be composed of all the preachers, traveling and local, of the district, the recording stewards of the same, and of laymen, the number of whom, and manner of appointment, each Annual Conference may decide for itself. In compliance with this provision, the Holston Conference, in session at Abingdon, Va., in 1879, fixed the ratio at one delegate for every eighty laymen, to be elected by the Quarterly Conference of the several pastoral charges embraced in the said district; provided, that no charge shall be entitled to more than eight, nor denied a less number than four, delegates. The District Conference meets annually.


The Quarterly Conference shall be composed of all the traveling and local preachers, including superannuated preachers residing within the circuit or station (whether without or within the limits of the Annual Conferences to which they belong), with the exhorters, stewards, trustees who are members of the Church, and class-leaders, of the respective circuits and the conference of Sunday. cuits, stations, and missions, together with superintendents of Sunday-schools who are members of the Church, secretaries of Church Conferences, presidents of Senior Epworth Leagues, if eligible, and none others.

The Church Conference consists of all the members of a particular charge, or class, with resident members of the Annual Conference. It

should meet once a month on stations, once a quarter on circuits.

To the Bishops and Members of the Holston and Tennessee Conferences: Dear Brethren: Your joint commission of the Midland Methodist begs to report that it has had under consideration the interests committed to it. As members of this commission we have felt the responsibilities involved and the difficulties to be overcome. The work of the paper hitherto has been prosecuted at great disadvantage and has been far from what was desired by your editors, publisher and commissioners. Notwithstanding the limitations, it has been of incalculable help to both Conferences in the development of the important interests of the Church and furnishing an easy medium of communication amongst us, and a strong bond of union in our work.

We have reached the place where we think it is practicable to do that which we have felt all along to be most desirable, viz., secure the undivided work of an editor. We have elected the Rev. James A. Burrow, D. D., editor. We feel that Dr. Burrow's full time devoted to this work under present conditions and outlook, together with the enlarged facilities which our publisher will furnish, along with the earnest, methodical and persistent work of the preachers and laymen of our territory, will warrant our con-

fident expectation of great and abiding good results.

The work of the Rev. Wm. M. Green D. D., as assistant editor, has been, under our arrangements hitherto, not only helpful but indispensable,

and we hereby express our appreciation of it.

We desire very earnestly to have the Memphis Conference join us in our enterprise and have the Midland Methodist become our Tri-Conference Organ; and we suggest that your respective bodies renew the invitation to Respectfully submitted, it to do so.

Keith; papers were read concerning Mrs. B. C. Horton, Mrs. E. W. Walker, Mrs. S. W. Bourne, Mrs. G. W. Renfro, Mrs. Josie V. Blankenbeckler and Mrs. D. Sullins by R. A. Kelly, C. E. Steele, R. A. Owen, E. H. Cassidy, D. H. Carr and F. Richardson. Appropriate and tender remarks were made by a number of the brethren. J. C. Orr, Eugene Blake and A. B. Hunter sweetly sang "When the Beautiful Gates Unfold." The Conference was much affected. Later it sang, with deep emotion, "The Home Over There." The report was adopted.

The Board of Education submitted report No. 2. In connection with this work R. G. Waterhouse made report of the Twentieth Century Fund, which was discussed by T. C. Shuler, D. S. Hearon, J. T. Frazier, J. I. Cash and F. Richardson, and then the entire report was adopted. See supplement "C".

Reports Nos. 2 and 3 of the Joint Board of Finance were read and adopted. See supplement "A".

The Committee on Distirct Conference Records submitted its report, which was adopted. See supplement "D".

The Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church submitted its report, which was adopted. See supplement "E".

CASE OF W. A. THOMAS.—The special committee in the case of W. A. Thomas made the following report:

The treasurer of the Sunday-School Board made report, which was adopted. See supplement "G", number 2.

MISCELLANEOUS.—T. J. Eskridge explained that the resolution of a previous session proposing an assessment to assist in entertaining the Annual Conference did not originate in Wytheville. His assurance that the good people of the town, not only of our own Church, but of all denominations, were more than glad to have the Conference, was heartily applauded.

Dr. M. P. Logan, rector of the Episcopal Church, was introduced.

J. Milton Browne, of the Board of Missions, reported that the assessment for Domestic Missions lacked \$236.80 of being out in full. A collection was taken, which more than equaled the amount needed.

The Board of Missions submitted report number 2, which was adopted. See supplement "B".

EMORY AND HENRY COLLEGE.—R. G. Waterhouse announced that inasmuch as the Conference could not go to Emory and Henry College on Saturday, he had arranged to have representatives from the College come to the Conference. Dr. J. S. Miller, Professor of Mathematics in the College, was introduced and made a happy address. Prof. F. L. Bruce, of the chair of English and German, made an interesting address on the work of the College in languages. Mrs. R. G. Waterhouse was introduced, and spoke of what the women were doing for the College. Bishop Morrison spoke of the excellent suggestions of Mrs. Waterhouse.

On motion it was decided that when we adjourn it be to





meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon. After announcements the Conference adjourned with the doxology, and benediction by D. Sullins.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference met at 3 p. m., with Bishop Morrison in the chair. The devotional service was conducted by R. N. Price. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved. All speeches for the afternoon were limited to five minutes.

MISCELLANEOUS.—T. C. Shuler, in behalf of some of the former pastors of Wytheville Station, presented to Mr. Creed Chapman, for many years the faithful janitor of the church, a beautiful cane in testimony of their appreciation and esteem.

Dr. A. W. Milden, of the chair of Ancient Languages in Emory and Henry College, was introduced, and addressed the Conference about his college work. Admirable speeches were also made by Dr. W. E. Martin, Professor of History and Economics; Prof. G. T. Surface, of the chair of Chemistry and Biology; Prof. J. W. Cole, Head Master of the Preparatory Work; Mr. Ray Trent, representing the Y. M. C. A. work of the student-body; and Mr. R. M. Hickey, Jr., representing the Literary Societies of this institution. D. Sullins made a talk in the interest of the woman's work at the college, and called for the sympathy and cooperation of the members, most of whom responded by a standing vote. Bishop Morrison made a touching talk on the nobility of strong, Christian young manhood. The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved—I. That we have heard with much satisfaction the suggestions of Mrs. R. G. Waterhouse with reference to the organization of Home-Makers' Bands throughout our bounds, believing them to promise much good to our young people, and that we will cheerfully co-operate with our good women in promoting their wise and beneficent design.

2. That November 28, being the anniversary of the birth of Rev. Creed Fulton, the founder of Emory and Henry College, and the 28th of November of this year being the hundredth anniversary of his birth, that the Sunday succeeding said November 28 of each year in the future shall be observed as Founder's Day throughout our Conference, and devoted to the promotion of our Conference schools, and especially of the work of the Home-Makers' Band.

If the Society will collect all that can be collected on the salary promised me the past year, and will raise for me a salary the coming year to be not less than \$750.00, I will at once go to work to condense the MS. which I have written down to 1824, and to continue the history down to 1844, so as to make only two volumes down to 1844; and will prepare, as soon as possible, Vol. I for the press. Out of the sales, the cost of publication to be paid first. After that, all paid-up subscriptions to my salaries for the coming year and past years, shall be refunded to the subscribers in the books at retail price, provided such claims be filed with the Treasurer on or before Oct. 1, 1903, and approved by the Society. IOINT BOARD OF FINANCE.

Your Joint Board of Finance has had under consideration the communication which you referred to us, from the Board of Trustees of the M. E. Church, South, relative to the furtherance of the work of securing the Superannuate Endowment Fund of \$5,000,000.00. Realizing, as we do, the inadequacy of the provision which has been made for the support of the superannuated preachers of our Church, and for the widows and orphans of our deceased preachers, we rejoice in the inauguration, by the General Conference, of this plan for giving these worthy people the support which their merit and need requires.

Resolved—I. That we endorse the enterprise and pledge our utmost efforts to the securing of this endowment fund.

2. That we are gratified at having Rev. A. F. Watkins, D. D., General Agent for this fund, with us. We hereby assure him of our cordial support in the work in which he has been appointed to lead us.

3. That we ask the Committee on Public Worship to provide a time,

during the session of this Conference, for the holding of a mass meeting, at which addresses shall be delivered in the interest of this cause and a

collection taken for this fund.

4. That we instruct our presiding elders and pastors to promote the success of the campaign in every possible way, the former to make special mention of this cause in their District and Quarterly Conferences, and the latter to present the cause and take a public collection for its benefit in every congregation in their pastoral charges, this collection to be taken if possible as early as Jan. 1, 1903. NO. 2.

Your Board of Missions appropriated \$6,560 to the support of fifty-one charges the past year, and has been able to pay the drafts of the missionaries promptly at the end of each quarter. It is a matter of congratulation that twelve of these no longer have need of help. We trust that the spirit of self-support will continue to grow among us, and that the Presiding Elders will continue the policy of so adjusting their work, when possible, as to avoid the necessity of asking aid from this Board. This is the more important in view of the new and inviting doors that are opening to us, which, if we fail to enter promptly, may soon be closed against us forever. For lack of sufficient funds we have been compelled to withhold appropriations where a profitable investment could have been made, and to grant a sum smaller than the amount asked for in many cases where the whole sum sought was needed to meet the wants of faithful men who are to serve the church in places of great difficulty and privation.

the church in places of great difficulty and privation.

The committee—W. W. Hicks and J. W. Smith—appointed to audit the books of the Treasurer, report that with the assistance of J. Milton Browne they have carefully gone over his books and accounts, and find

them correct.

We rejoice that God has honored us in the past year by calling three talented young men from our ranks to labor in the regions beyond. We trust the Church may continue her prayers to the Lord of the harvest that

He send forth from us more laborers into this harvest.

Two of our churches—Centenary, Chattanooga, and Church Street, Knoxville—have, during the past year, been supporting a pastor at home and also one in the foreign field; others have paid the Treasurer more than their assessments. May God grant to all these grace to continue in well doing, and stir up other charges among us to do likewise.

Our missionary periodicals, the Review and Go Forward, are worthy of a place in every Methodist home, and furnished at a cost in the reach of the poorest. Their circulation is indispensable to the growth of the

missionary spirit among us.

We record our gratitude to L. L. H. Carlock, our Treasurer, and to P. L. Cobb, our Conference Missionary Secretary, who have been abundant in labors and have received no compensation.

We recommend J. W. Perry for appointment as Conference Missionary

Secretary.

Our by-laws have so facilitated our work that with some amendments we desire for them a place before the eyes of all the preachers:

1. This Board shall consist of one layman from each district, and an

equal number of clerical members.

2. The President of the Board shall have authority to call a meeting whenever in his judgment business of such importance arises as cannot properly be postponed until the regular annual meeting, and he shall select the place of meeting.


3. A committee shall be appointed each year to estimate what amounts shall be appropriated for the several missions, and report to the first meeting of the Board, which meeting shall be on the day preceding the opening

of the Annual Conference session.

4. An auditing committee of three members of the Board, appointed by the President, shall examine the Books of the Treasurer and report at some time during the annual session.

5. The policy of the Board shall be to reduce the appropriations to

different missions each year, when at all practicable.





6. The Board shall keep on hand a reserve fund of \$2,500 at least, to pay the first drafts of the missionaries, and to meet emergencies.

7. The Board will not grant appropriations when it is evident, after careful examination, that an adjustment of the work could be made so as

to avoid the necessity of such appropriation.

8. The Board will decline to make appropriations in the absence of satisfactory information, and in order to obtain this information will insist on the blanks furnished by the Board being filled and returned by the Presiding Elder.

Any district, church, Sunday School, Epworth League, or person, 9. may assume, in whole or in part, the support of a missionary, or mission, established by the Conference Board. Their contributions shall be applied established by the Conference Board. Their contributions shall be applied to the support of such object, provided the fund be sent to the Treasurer of the Board. The pastoral charge in whose territory such money shall be given shall have credit for the same in settling their assessment for Domestic Missions, provided such object is covered by appropriation.

The General Board has fixed our assessment for the ensuing Conference year at \$10,000 for Foreign Missions, and we again ask you for \$7,000 for Domestic Missions. These sums are apportioned to the several districts as follows:

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

No. I.

Your Board of Education, having found itself embarrassed in its work during the past quadrennium from lack of a definite statement of its powers and functions, respectfully submits, for your adoption, the following

CONSTITUTION:

ART. I.—This Board, authorized by paragraph 59 of the Discipline, shall be known as the Holston Conference Board of Education, and shall consist of fifteen members, elected quadrennially by the Conference, on nomination in whatever way the Conference may determine. The number present at any meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business and the present at the conference of the conferenc ness, provided due notification has been given. Announcement of the time and place in open Conference, during the regular sessions, shall be deemed sufficient; but, at other times, notice must be given in writing to each member at least ten days in advance of the meeting. Any vacancies occurring during the quadrennium shall be filled through election by the Conference upon the nomination of the Board. The officers of the Board shall be a president, vice-president, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, and executive committee, whose duties shall be defined in by-laws, which the Board shall adopt for the regulation of its business.

ART. II.—The purpose of the Board shall be to promote the cause of Christian education through enquiring into the state and character of our Methodist homes as institutions of Christian nurture, and the best means of improving them, as well as enquiring into the state and character of all institutions of learning that may be under the care of the Conference, and the best means of promoting their interests, and, if necessary, of increasing their number, and, further, by co-operating with other boards and agencies in developing the local churches as teaching forces.

ART. III.—It shall be the special duty of this Board, as auxiliary to the General Board, to build up a system of correlated schools under the direct supervision of the Conference. To this end it shall have power to encourage our people and friends to found training schools or academies wherever needed, and shall recommend such to be taken under the supervision of the Conference, upon condition that the Conference elect the trustees and give to them, through its Board of education, a constitution according to which the affairs of said training schools or academies shall be conducted. To the same end, said Board shall, also, have power to recommend to this Conference any changes in the titles, charters, organizations, and constitutions of our existing schools, that it considers necessary to the work of properly correlating them, and of giving to the Conference the power of efficient supervision.

ART. IV.—This Board shall require our schools and colleges to fur-

nish annually itemized statements, properly audited, of all sources of income and all lines of expenditures, together with a statement of assets and liabilities, also, a statement of the extent, valuation, and condition of the grounds, buildings, and other property that go to make up each plant. And it shall, also, be the duty of said Board, in the light of this information, to recommend to this Conference any change that it may deem wise in the policy pursued by any board of trustees in the management of any one of its institutions, and, also, to recommend the inauguration of any movement that it may deem necessary to the relief or improvement of any one or all

of them.

ART. V.—This Board, as further auxiliary to the General Board, shall recommend assessments, gather statistics, distribute such printed matter as is calculated to advance the cause of Christian Education, prescribe the miximum and minimum courses of study for our academies, and conduct a teachers' bureau for the purpose of placing in as many schools as possible

the Christian men and women among us, who are giving their lives to teaching. It shall, also, be the duty of this Board to co-operate in our Home Mission fields with our Conference Board of Missions and with the Woman's Home Mission Society in developing mission schools and a body of missionary teachers.

ART. VI.—This constitution may be changed, amended, or added to upon a recommendation of two-thirds of the Board, sustained by a majority

of the Conference, or by a majority of the Conference alone.

NO. 2.—TWENTIETH CENTURY FUND AND MOVEMENT.

Your Board, during the past quadrennium, has given much of its time and attention to securing a Twentieth Century Fund and promoting a Twentieth Century Movement. An examination of the recommendations made by the Board and adopted by the Conference, as well as the books of records and accounts provided, will make manifest the fact that no pains were spared in planning for a thorough performance of the work, and a full record of the results. But candor compels us to say that, while much that is valuable has been accomplished, we are far from being satisfied with what has been achieved. There have been failures that your Board had no rower to prevent; for we were compelled to rely mainly upon others to execute the plans. In quite a number of our pastoral charges there was not even an attempt to raise a fund; in many others, only a feeble effort was made; and in scarcely a half dozen can it be said that the work was done thoroughly. Yet the result of our efforts to raise a fund, judged by the reports of the pastors one year ago, was not altogether insignificant. These reports showed a subscription of \$66,042.05, and cash payments on the same aggregating \$42,050.78. Our disappointment in this tabulated result lies, first, in the fact that this subscription amounts to but little more than half the amount we asked, for the purpose of freeing from debt the three colleges that belong to us in fee simple, and of giving adequate equipment to the one institution to which the Church in Holston Conference looks for the collegiate training of her ministry and for college work of standard grade; second, that more than half of the whole subscription named as secured was directed to purposes other than the ones named above; third, that, of the amount properly directed, \$10,203.92 was uncollected one year ago; and, fourth, that, after the lapse of a whole year, only \$934.67 has been collected on the above. In the light of the above facts, we are compelled to recommend that this Conference require of the Board that will succeed us that it take up, as a first duty, the task of securing, as quickly as possible, all that can be got of the remaining \$9,269,25 of the above properly directed subscriptions, and that it devise means to supplement said subscriptions with other subscriptions and available assets sufficient to release, at the earliest moment possible, at least from debt, Emory and Henry, Martha Washington, and Centenary Colleges.

MOVEMENT.

The Twentieth Century Movement, in the thought of your Board, has always meant more than the mere securing of a fund. It is true that without a movement we could not have hoped for a fund; but we have always held that a fund was but a small part of the results that are expected from the movement. We sought to awaken gratitude in the hearts of our people through a consideration of the mercies and blessings of a hundred years past, and intelligent recognition in their minds of the importance of Christian education to the work of the church in the new century. An earnest effort was made to have put before our people the whole system of Christian education as consisting of Christian homes, Christian churches and Christian schools; and it was earnestly desired to so direct the movement that it might result in increasing greatly the number and value of our homes as institutions of Christian nurture, in perfecting the life and organization of our churches, especially as regards their ministry

of teaching the young, as well as increasing the number and efficiency of

our schools.

We sought, moreover, to give special emphasis to the fact that no one is fitted to receive, or can receive, a genuinely Christian educaton who has not had experience of the new birth; and, consequently, we cherished the expectation that our movement would result in a far-reaching revival of religion. We, therefore, announce it as our settled conviction that those who succeed us as guides and promoters of the educational interests of this Conference, will best serve our institutions of learning by recognizing that a genuine Twentieth Century Educational Movement should go on, broadening and deepening, through every decade of this century, after the manner we have tried to indicate, and according to the convictions we have here announced of what we regard as fundamental holdings.

May the men you appoint have wisdom from above, and an enduement of power; for there is no board provided for in our excellent book of Discipline, whose work is more vital to the progress of the Church and

the conquest of the world for Christ.

From reports made to this Board by educational institutions, avowedly owned and more or less definitely under control of the Holston Conference, we gather the following statistics:

By comparison with corresponding figures of last year, it will be seen that all these schools have had a gratifying increase in patronage. The history and character of all the schools named, with the possible exception of Russell Academy, have been so frequently canvassed in your hearing that we shall neither tax your patience nor burden your minutes with familiar details concerning them. Representatives of the schools who are present, are, of course, free to give you such further information as may seem desirable.

As indices of progress and prosperity, we note with pleasure the following facts: Emory and Henry, meeting all the requirements laid down by our Educational Commission as to its course of study, is recognized by that Board as doing educational work of such high order as entitles it to rank with the foremost colleges of the land. Our other colleges and preparatory schools, with one exception, have readily consented to requisite changes in their courses of study, and are adjusting themselves as promptly as is practicable to the new conditions necessary to a correlated educational

system.

Concerning our educational status in recent years there can be no frank discussion without confession, namely, that the unities which are vital to the best results have not obtained. The relations of Conference to school, and vice versa, have not been of that intimate character which was coveted by both. It is not too much to say, in diplomatic language, as regards the schools themselves, relations have been strained—sometimes to the point of a withdrawal of fraternal ministries and open declaration of war. It is but truth to say that this hurtful attitude has been recognized by all parties at interest, without exception, and equally true that all have sincerely deplored the fact.

Without purpose of obscuring or in the slightest degree diminishing the sense of uncancelled obligation resting upon us as a body, it will be remembered that in some instances school properties long regarded as ours in fee simple were found to be so deeded that the Conference tenure was only that of prospective heirship or minority stockholder; in one notable instance we were made painfully aware that not a shred of title It is within the record to say that only at a recent date has the business management of any of our institutions been subject to our official scrutiny. Add to this the factional spirit engendered by competition between the schools themselves and adequate basis for indifference, distrust and opposition are easily found. For these blameworthy conditions, the Conference cannot be excused from its legitimate share of re-

sponsibility.

Your Board rejoices in the well-founded belief that we are in the dawning of a better era. The adverse facts just recited have been largely modified by recent events and in some important particulars have ceased to exist. The adoption of the Constitution embodied in our report number one gives us for the first time in our history an authoritative declaration of principles according to which our educational system is to be developed. We earnestly beg that every member of the Conference and all the friends of education will carefully study that platform and conform our activities as a Conference to its requirements. Otherwise our vantage ground will become a Kadesh Barnea and we shall again wander long in the educational wilderness from which we are just emerging. For the right adjustment of the difficulties which remain to us time will be required and patience must be exercised. The problems that perplex you are not unknown to us and we shall be glad to rid ourselves of them by correct solutions which may be brought to our notice.

We make no apology for insistent utterance regarding the necessity that is upon us in the matter of establishing schools as the center of missionary effort. A cordon of such forces is being drawn around this Conference by those who are not of us. Who educates, controls. We must, therefore, fear while yet compelled to say "God speed" to those engaged in this noble enterprise. We repeat with emphasis the recommendation of last year that nothing be left undone to secure to ourselves the gracious results of this kind of work. When we suggest that along the whole Appalachian slope from New River to the Georgia line we have not a school of any kind, the significance of this suggestion will be apparent.

We bespeak your hearty endorsement of the Correspondence School authorized by our last General Conference. This movement is now well established under the general direction of the Central Board of Education. and is being carried on in connection with the Biblical Department of Vanderbilt University. It is designed primarily to guide the young ministers throughout the entire Church in prosecuting the Conference Course of Study—breaking up each year's course into forty weekly lessons, suggesting to each undergraduate just what he should try to read each week, propounding a few leading questions, and then giving him an examination when he has finished the volume, covering the entire subject matter of the volume. This examination paper, along with the questions, and the grade secured, will be forwarded to the chairman of the committee having the undergraduate in charge, that the committee may inspect the work, and, if satisfied with it, allow it to count for the work which they would otherwise demand of him in the way of examination." As such examination will unquestionably be more thorough and satisfactory than is possible to us otherwise, we recommend that you grant your examining committees the privilege of accepting the work of the Correspondence School, in lieu of that to which we have been accustomed. We would make the same recommendation with reference to certificates held by students who come to us from the Biblical Department of Vanderbilt University.

Thanks are due W. S. Neighbors for gratuitous services in our teachers' bureau work-a department which we hope during the year to

see developed into organized and permanent efficiency.

The assessments for education for the year 1902-1903 are as follows: For our Conference, \$3,125; for parent Board, \$375; for Paine and Lane Institute, \$500.

SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church submits the fol-

lowing report:

The number of conversions in the bounds of the Conference, as reported by the Presiding Elders, is six thousand, six hundred and ninety. This is a very hopeful indication of faithful work on the part of the preachers, and confirms the truth that God has ordained that "by the foolishness of preaching, men are to be saved."

The woman's department of Church work is being vigorously pressed, and with most hopeful prospects. It is hoped that it will be greatly enlarged throughout the Conference during the coming year. Let us heed the apostle's call and "Help those women."

The work of the 190 Epworth Leagues, with their 6,215 members, has not, fully, met expectations. The hope was cherished that the young people of the Church, organized into Leagues and furnished with suitable literature, would become a great power for good, relieve the pastors, to a conture, would become a great power for good, relieve the pastors, to a considerable extent, in taking the benevolent collections, finding out and relieving the poor, visiting the sick, establishing prayer-meetings and Sunday Schools in out-of-way places, and so cultivate Immanuel's lands in every part of our home mission field. This expectation has not been realized but in part. The Leagues have not been barren of good, especially to themselves. They have grown in the grace of Christian knowledge. Your committee is of opinion that the greatest need of this department of church work is leadership.

Our Sunday Schools are furnished with the best of Christian literature. None better can be had than that furnished by our Publishing House in Nashville. The need of an active, interested Superintendent, and of converted, faithful teachers, is greatly felt. We think the inauguration of reading circles would aid in relieving the situation, but completed work can only be had when the children are brought to Christ and saved.

Our Church schools and colleges are growing in numbers and usefulness. Their power for good is being felt today as never before through the young men sent out as preachers of the gospel and others who have

been converted and trained under their care.

Christian liberality is larger today than at any time in the history of the Church in this country. This fact is shown in contributions to the cause of missions, other benevolent enterprises of the Church, and the support of the ministry. Notwithstanding all these things (good in them-

selves), your committee is of opinion that spirituality in the Church is not what it ought to be. We think this betrays itself in the neglect of family religion. The family altar in many Christian homes is unknown; attendance at prayer-meetings is small; class and experience meetings are almost things of the past. Men are no longer saying, "Come and I will declare what the Lord has done for my soul." There is danger of being satisfied with a form of Godliness. We are exposed to the temptation of Laodicea, "feeling secure in being rich and increased in goods and having need of nothing."

The Lord has indeed brought us into a good land—a land of brooks of water, of fountains and depths springing out of valleys and hills; a land of wheat and barley, of vines and figtrees; a land of oil, olive and honey; a land wherein we may eat bread without scarceness; wherein we shall not lack any good thing; a land whose stones are iron and out of whose hills we may dig brass. The Lord says to us, as to Israel of old, "When thou hast eaten and art full, then thou shalt bless the Lord thy God for the good land which He hath given thee. Beware that thou forget not the Lord thy God, His commandments and His judgments, lest when thou hast eaten and art full and hast built goodly houses and dwelt in them, and when thy herds and thy flocks multiply, and thy silver and thy gold is multiplied and all that thou hast is multiplied, then thine heart be lifted up and thou forget the Lord thy God and say, My hand hath gotten all this wealth. If so I testify against thee this day, that thou shalt perish as the nations that the Lord destroyed before thy face."

It is not the rich country, nor the wealth we acquire, the numbers in our churches, the perfection of our organizations, nor the degree of learning we may attain; it is not a splendid church service, nor a gifted ministry, that will prolong our days, increase our usefulness, or crown us with success. But it is the spirit of a life, personal consecration of heart and life. The undoubted assurance of acceptance in His sight alone will give us peace and continue the favor and blessing of God. A substitution of temporal things, as an offering to God, for the affections of the heart, will not meet the requirements of the gospel nor satisfy the demands of the soul. One of the complaints of the Master against the Pharisees was, "Ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy and faith. These ought ye to have done and not to leave the other undone."

CHURCH EXTENSION.



TEMPERANCE.

awful curse.

Whereas, We find this deadly enemy established in many of our towns, and nearly all of our cities, and

Whereas, Our government authorizes, fosters, and protects liquor dealers in the manufacture, exportation, importation and sale of intoxicants, flooding our new territory, and even our mission fields; therefore,

Resolved, That we not only oppose the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors as a beverage as expressed in the law and discipline of our Church, but that we do welcome, and will support, every wise and just movement, organization, or influence, that will oppose or restrict the liquor business, and stop forever the unrighteous use of the same.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The strict Christian reverence of the Sabbath-The "Lord's Day"-is vital to the universal dominion of the kingdom, and the preaching of the Gospel of the Son of God. Civilization and evangelization go hand in hand, and, as in the past, so to-day, the Sabbath has been and is one of the most potent factors in bringing a knowledge of the Christ to men. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" is not only a moral duty, but it fixes a focal point around which cluster the agencies, and from which radiate the influences that are mighty in the salvation of men, and the betterment of the world. The nation or people who dishonor the "Lord's Day" are implanting the seeds of decay. We can but deplore the tendency in some sections of our country, not only to secularize, but to ignore the Sabbath as a day of worship and rest. In commercial spirit, unrestrained, has no God but Mammon, and rushes unblushingly into places where angels would not dare to tread. Carelessly, or thoughtlessly, or godlessly, they turn the Sabbath into a day of traffic and trade. We boast that we are a Christian nation, that we honor God and His laws, but do we as a people "femember the Sabbath day to keep it holy"? Our last census shows that while our population increased only 27 per cent. during the decade, Sunday labor augmented 58 per cent. in the same time; that over three million, five hundred thousand of our fellow-citizens are engaged, by the demands of commerce, in Sunday labor. Add to this, Sunday amusements, horse-racing, theatrical performances, Sunday saloons, Sunday picnics, and all sorts of things that are foreign to our civilization, contrary to the best interests of our people, and gross violations of the laws of God and the law of the land. Do not these facts, like prophetic fingers, point to dangers; that the hordes from the East—the slums of Europe—that are pouring in upon our shores, instead of being Christianized and civilized by our Christian institutions, are in a fair way to heathenize us? As a Conference Christian institutions, are in a tair way to neathernze us: As a conference of Christian ministers, it is our duty to lift a warning cry against the godless profanation of the holy Sabbath. Let us proclaim from our pulpits, and preach it by our example, "that righteousness exalteth a nation, that sin is a reproach to any people," and that one way to honor God is to keep holy the "Lord's Day."

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

From the information gathered by the Epworth League Board, based on the reports of the pastors, we announce a decrease of seven chapters in the Conference, but an increase of 487 members, compared with last year. There are 110 Senior Leagues, with a membership of 3,640; 73 Junior Leagues, with a membership of 2,621. These figures being approximately correct, we conclude that the League interest in the Conference is practically the same as it was a year ago.

The League meeting at Bristol, Va.-Tenn., in July, was, in many respects, the best of its character yet held in the Conference. It was marked by spirituality, and an intellectual grasp of the League's responsibility as an

auxiliary of the Church.

Your Board regrets the fact that the League Department of our Church has not been self-supporting, and we heartily commend the legislation of the recent General Conference in the assessment of ten cents per member on the local League chapters, and respectfully urge the pastors and League presidents to see that this assessment be raised.

There seems to be more interest now than hitherto in the Junior League work. Dr. DuBose urges, in his report to this Conference, that attention be called to the paragraph in the Discipline which particularly

charges pastors in the interest of the Junior Epworth Leagues. The language of this institution closely associates the Junior League with the question asked in each Quarterly Conference concerning the pastoral instruction of children. The General Conference believed that the Junior League affords the pastor a practical means of answering the question.

The Reading Course, the Mission Study Class, and other literary accessories of the League, demand the closest attention of each pastor, for therein is supplied a literary training for our young people, which many of them will not otherwise get. We heartily endorse and cheerfully recommend to all the members of the Epworth League, the Epworth Era, and assure Dr. DuBose, its editor, of our appreciation of his work in giving the excellent paper which he does.

Our prayers go up for our former president, Bro. S. A. Neblett, in his

work in Cuba, and we assure him of our continual sympathy.

At the point of creation of our literature, our Church is strong, able and ample. Your committee report, in their judgment, that it stands at the very forefront of the religious world's best production. Our higher periodicals are great masterpieces of mind, matter and mechanism, which have few equals and no superiors in their several fields. In this connection we may mention the Nashville Christian Advocate, The Southern Methodist Review, The Review of Missions, The Sunday School Magazine and The Epworth Era as being well advanced to the world's leadership in the work they are set to do. The other classes of our periodicals, the quarterlies and lesson-papers of the Sunday School—Our Homes, for our women; the Visitor, for the children—are all of the very best for the fields which they occupy. We endorse these publications, commend them and bless them on their mission of giving light, health, and life to our people.

We are glad to note with pleasure and pride the book-making ability and power evinced by the great books coming from our own Southern Methodist men and our own Publishing House. Some of the late books are great productions, giving great literary prestige and character to our whole Church. Our space forbids a mention of all these good books which ought to be circulated and read. Without the purpose of invidious distinction, we make note of a few of these great works: "Personal Salvation," by Dean Tillett, of Vanderbilt University; "The Way of the Preacher," by Dr. Kern, of the same university; and "Theism," by Dr. Tigert, Book Editor, are great productions and ought to make the heart of every Southern Methodist swell with gratitude and honest pride. We commend these books, with scores of others, to the attention of our Methodist readers.

Our Publishing House is on a solid and substantial business basis, and deserves the loyal support and hearty patronage of all our people. We are glad to note that it will continue a book house, and supply all the book needs of our people. We have all needed book and periodical literature at our command, through our Publishing House; we have only to have this literature circulated and read. While our Church is strong at the point of production, it has always been weak and ineffectual in methods of circulation. The methods have been feeble and short-lived. Whatever we might offer would be only suggestive and experimental, and would, doubtless, prove unsatisfactory. We believe the late law of the General

Conference making the preachers directly accountable and amenable is the most hopeful for a fuller and more effectual circulation. If our presiding elders, in their Quarterly Conferences, in asking the question concerning the circulation of the literature, will vitalize and enforce the question, we will have at once a vast increase in the sale of books and the circulation of our periodicals. Already there are forceful agents at work quickening the conscience of the Church on reading our publications. The courses of reading for the Teachers' Study Circle, the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, and the Epworth League courses, are living agencies, stirring up our people to more and better reading. We believe if we can get our publications into the homes of our neople that they will be read and become abiding and established powers in the homes of our people for lasting good.

In regard to our own paper, the *Midland Methodist*, we commend the action of the Conference as the very wisest and best course to pursue in behalf of this paper, so ably and delightfully edited. We recommend that

MEMOIRS.

REV. W. L. JONES.

Rev. W. L. Jones was born January 10, 1853. He was educated at Carson and Newman College, located at Jefferson City, Tenn., being a graduate of that institution. He was converted in young manhood and at once united with the M. E. Church, South, in whose doctrines and polity he sincerely believed, and was devotedly attached. He soon gave himself to the work of the ministry, and in 1882, at Asheville, N. C., was admitted on trial into the Holston Conference, and was appointed to the Rutledge Circuit. During his ministry he served the following charges: Rutledge Circuit, Tate Spring Circuit, Morristown Circuit, Clinton Station, Jonesboro Station, Greeneville Station, Rogersville Station, and St. Clair Cir-He was successful on all these charges.

On October 25, 1881, he was happily married to Miss Julia Tate, daughter of John C. Tate, who faithfully stood by him in all the conflicts, struggles, and triumphs of his ministerial life. Five bright children, some of whom are almost grown, blessed their home, and were the pride and joy of the father's life.

On the morning of January 16, 1902, at his home in Rogersville, surrounded by his patient wife and devoted children, Brother Jones passed from the Church Militant to the Church Triumphant. On the morning of the day following his death, the casket was carried to the Southern Methodist Church in Rogersville, where, in the presence of a large concourse of people, Dr. C. T. Carroll, a life-long friend of the deceased, preached a strong and helpful sermon from the text: "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." The services ended, the remains were taken to Morristown and interred in the city cemetery by the Masonic fraternity, of which he was an honored member.

In the death of Brother Jones the Holston Conference has lost one of its truest and best preachers, the wife a devoted husband, and the children a most affectionate father. Brother Jones served in the active work of the itinerant ministry for nearly twenty years, during which time hundreds of souls were saved, and influenced to a higher and better life, and these will rise up in the cloudless day to call him blessed. May the blessing of God rest upon the stricken wife and children, and may they come at last to join the loved one in the home of the just.

REV. W. H. DAWN.

Rev. W. H. Dawn was converted in 1871, at Church Street Church, Knoxville, Tenn. He joined the Holston Conference in 1872, and was appointed to Rogersville Circuit; second year, Tazewell, Tenn.; third, at Rogersville. He married Miss Looney, who was a helpmeet indeed. His fourth appointment was to Morristown Circuit; fifth, Ooltewah; sixth, Murphy, N. C. Here his health failed. His preaching was earnest and practical. Being a mechanic, when his health failed he devoted himself to contracting and building houses, and accumulated considerable means, and was a liberal giver. But the collapse of the boom in Knoxville swept it all away.

His death was occasioned by a fall into a cellar he was having excavated for a large building; his head, striking a rock, affected his brain, from which he never recovered. While in health, he was always attentive to preaching and prayer-meetings, frequently filling appointments for the brethren and assisting in the sacraments. REV. JOHN H. KEITH.

Rev. John H. Keith, M. D., D. D., was born in Rhea County, Tennessee, April 27, 1839, and died at his home in Rogersville at 2 o'clock a. m., Saturday, September 20, 1902, aged sixty-three years, four months and twenty-three days. At the early age of fifteen, our sainted brother pro-fessed saving faith in Christ, and at once affiliated with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In the eighteenth year of his life, Dr. Keith was licensed to preach, so that at the time of his translation he had worn the clerical robes for more than forty-five years. In his early manhood he studied medicine, and became a successful practitioner of the healing art, but a dispensation of the gospel had been committed unto him, and he very soon completely and permanently divorced himself from all secular pursuits, and irrevocably consecrated himself to the work of the Christian

ministry. I greatly regret my inability to give dates as to his admission on trial and his ordination as deacon and elder. Of the following facts in relation to his ministerial career I am reasonably certain:

He was licensed to preach in 1857, traveled as a supply for two or three years, practiced medicine during the war between the States, was admitted into the Holston Conference on trial about 1870, and was received into full connection at the session of the Conference held in the fall of 1873. Very soon after his entrance into the regular work of the ministry, the fact became patent that Dr. Keith was a man of extraordinary. ministry, the fact became patent that Dr. Keith was a man of extraordinary gifts, grace and usefulness, and he soon took high rank in his holy calling. With signal ability and acceptability he filled the following prominent pastoral charges: Decatur Circuit, Sweetwater Circuit, Asheville Station, Church Street, Knoxville; Broad Street, Knoxville; State Street, Bristol; Cleveland Station, Chattanooga District, Morristown District, Newport Station, Rogersville Station, and perhaps some others in Holston Conference. Some years since, in the hope of regaining his health, Dr. Keith transferred to the North Texas Conference, and filled some of the leading pulpits in the "Lone Star State." He also served one year as the popular pastor of the Concord Station, in the Western North Carolina Conference.

Dr. Keith was happily married to Miss Anne Myers, of Rhea County, Tennessee, and the fruit of this union was eight children, seven of whom, with the stricken widow, survive to mourn their irreparable loss. His domestic life was true, tender and beautiful, and his home was almost a little paradise. As a man, our sainted brother was kind, genial, social. think, more fully than any other person with whom I have been intimate, he was possessed of the milk of human kindness. To the art of making enemies he seemed to be a total stranger. He was the friend of every man, and every man was his friend. In the most practical manner, he recognized the brotherhood of human-kind, and as far as in him lay, he bore the burdens of those about him, and so fulfilled the law of Christ. Modest, quiet, unassuming, bearing about in his body the dying of his blessed Lord,

his walk alone among his parishioners was a benediction.

As a preacher, Dr. Keith was topical, rather than textual. On his knees he read the Holy Scriptures; he read the Pilgrim's Progress; he read Baxter's Saints' Rest; his whole intellectual and spiritual organism, under the domination of such pabulum, and his soft, musical, pathetic voice, coupled with the most graceful gesticulation, rendered his pulpit deliverances not only entertaining but genuinely edifying. For the terrors of the law he had no taste; the compassion of the Father, the love of Christ, the beauties of religion, the glories of the heavenly inheritance—on these and kindred themes he delighted to expatiate. He was a fine word-painter, and, in the zenith of his power, it is no exaggeration to say that Dr. Keith was a great preacher.

Dr. J. H. Keith was a model Christian gentleman. He believed in God; he calmly, sweetly trusted in Jesus; his life was hid with Christ in God. Just a few days before he went to heaven, I talked with him freely, and he gave me to understand that his house was in order, and that he was ready to depart and be with Christ. Brethren, he is not, for God took

Tazewell Lee Bowling was born at Tazewell, Claiborne County, Tennessee, and was reared from infancy in Lee County, Virginia, near Jonesville. His parents were the sturdy, honest, devout people who grew up amid the peaceful scenes, interrupted, now and then, by the Indian raids of the pioneer days of that section. He enjoyed the more than ordinary rural advantages of the Jonesville District High School, and was converted at Hurricane Church, under the ministry of Rev. J. M. Wolfe. The eager eye and helpful hand of Rev. D. V. York for struggling young men, found in young Bowling the qualities and call of a Methodist preacher; and his home and library were opened to him and his masterful spirit and methods were breathed upon him. That man of strong caste, Rev. John H. Kennedy, examined him and found him worthy to be added to the ranks of our local preachers. Ordained a local deacon by Bishop Granberry, he was received on trial and served Surgoinsville Circuit for two years faithfully; and scores of the best people and many sinners mourn their loss and bear the impress of his work and consecrated life.

Brother Bowling was happily married to Miss Mink. She was an ornament of grace and a crowning blessing to his life and ministry. Whether economizing to live within the scanty income of a stinted salary, or staying alone with the little children when the protector and provider of her household was away, or encouraging his faltering faith in trials

and afflictions, she was the brave and faithful wife and helpmeet.

Immediately after last Annual Conference session, he was called to bury a bright and promising little son of six summers, and before he could leave the Surgoinsville charge to go to his new appointment. With heavy hearts they went to the Clinch Valley Circuit. He opened out a year of great promise with two far-reaching and thorough revivals at Alley and Pendleton Churches. At our District Conference in June a letter came to me from his wife, saying, "Mr. Bowling is not able to attend the Conference, owing to his right severe sickness from typhoid

fever. He says please report that he has the Foreign and Home Mission assessments in sight." We prayed for him at the Conference, and when next heard from he was convalescent, but a week later we were startled and stunned with the tidings of his death, in the parsonage at Fort Blackmore.

Brother Bowling was a manly man, a strong and faithful, growing preacher, a successful revivalist, and a pure, true, good man. All but penniless, the poor, worn widow, with four of the five helpless little children, were taken by a friend, Brother Cox, down the Clinch River and across the mountains, following the remains of husband and father back to Lee County, where, in a church which bears the family name, we preached to a large company of his friends and people the funeral sermon, and buried him. The first log cut for the mill and to go into that church was felled and cut by Brother Bowling. He laid the flooring with his own hands and stayed with the enterprise until it was finished. Just in the rear of the church, among a few fresh graves, we laid his well-wrought frame to rest.

There survive him an aged father and mother, who, unable to support themselves, have called to their help Brother Shufflebarger, who married Mrs. T. L. Bowling's sister. It will be all that Brother Shufflebarger can do to support his own family and these old people, and Sister T. L. Bowling and her five little children, from twelve years to five months old, are homeless, helpless and comfortless, except as helped by others.

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
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
