SOME FACTS FROM 1903-04.

The Society gave \$13,122.96 to parsonages last year, the largest sum ever granted in the same length of time; sent 683 boxes of supplies, valued at \$19,339.18. *Mountain Schools*—Sue Bennett School, London, Ky., enrolled 339 students, incomes from fees \$5,226.28, eleven teachers; Brevard Industrial School, Brevard, N. C., enrollment 104, five teachers. *Cuban Schools*—The three schools for Cubans enrolled 487 children. Italian night school, forty-nine students. *Chinese and Japanese Schools*—Four night schools; enrolled 236 students; nine teachers employed. *Dallas Mission Home*—The Home accommodates forty inmates, and many were turned away last year; six teachers are in charge. *Paine Annex, Augusta, Ga.*—Indus-

trial work begun at Paine for negro girls, with 137 girls in the classes. City mission work carried on in 17 cities, 29 missionaries being employed. Total cash receipts of the general treasury for all purposes amounted to \$59,414.98; vouchers for city mission work, \$11,110.23; reports of local work, \$122,164.32; grand total, \$192,689.53. Schools for Cubans at Tampa, Fla., \$8,000; Sue Bennett Memorial School at London, Ky. \$28,000; Rescue Home at Dallas, Tex., \$15,000; Ruth Hargrove Institute at Key West, Fla., \$11,000; Paine Annex, Augusta, Ga., \$7,000; Rebecca Sparks Deaconess Home, Waco, Tex., \$2,500; Homer Toberman Deaconess Home, Los Angeles, Cal., \$10,000; grand total, \$81,500.

CONFERENCES.

The General Conference, our law-making body, which meets every four years, shall be composed of one clerical member for every forty-eight members of each Annual Conference, and an equal number of lay members. The clerical representatives shall be elected by clerical members of the Annual Conference, and the lay representatives by lay members.

The Annual Conference is composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, and four lay representatives from each presiding elder's district. The lay members are elected by the laymen of each District Conference. Such members must be twenty-five years of age, and they must have been members of the Church for six years.

The District Conference shall be composed of all the preachers, traveling and local, of the district, the recording stewards of the same, and of laymen, the number of whom, and manner of appointment, each Annual Conference may decide for itself. In compliance with this provision, the Holston Conference, in session at Abingdon, Va., in 1879, fixed the ratio at one delegate for every eighty laymen, to be elected by the Quarterly Conference of the several pastoral charges embraced in the said district; provided, that no charge shall be entitled to more than eight nor denied a less number than four, delegates. The District Conference meets annually.

The Quarterly Conference shall be composed of all the traveling and local preachers, including superannuated preachers residing within the circuit or station (whether without or within the limits of the Annual Conference to which they belong), with the exhorters, stewards, trustees who are members of the Church, and class-leaders, of the respective circuits, stations, and missions, together with superintendents of Sunday-schools who are members of the Church, secretaries of Church Conferences, presidents of Senior Epworth Leagues, if eligible, and none others.

The Church Conference consists of all the members of a particular church, or class, with resident members of the Annual Conference. It should meet once a month on stations, once a quarter on circuits.

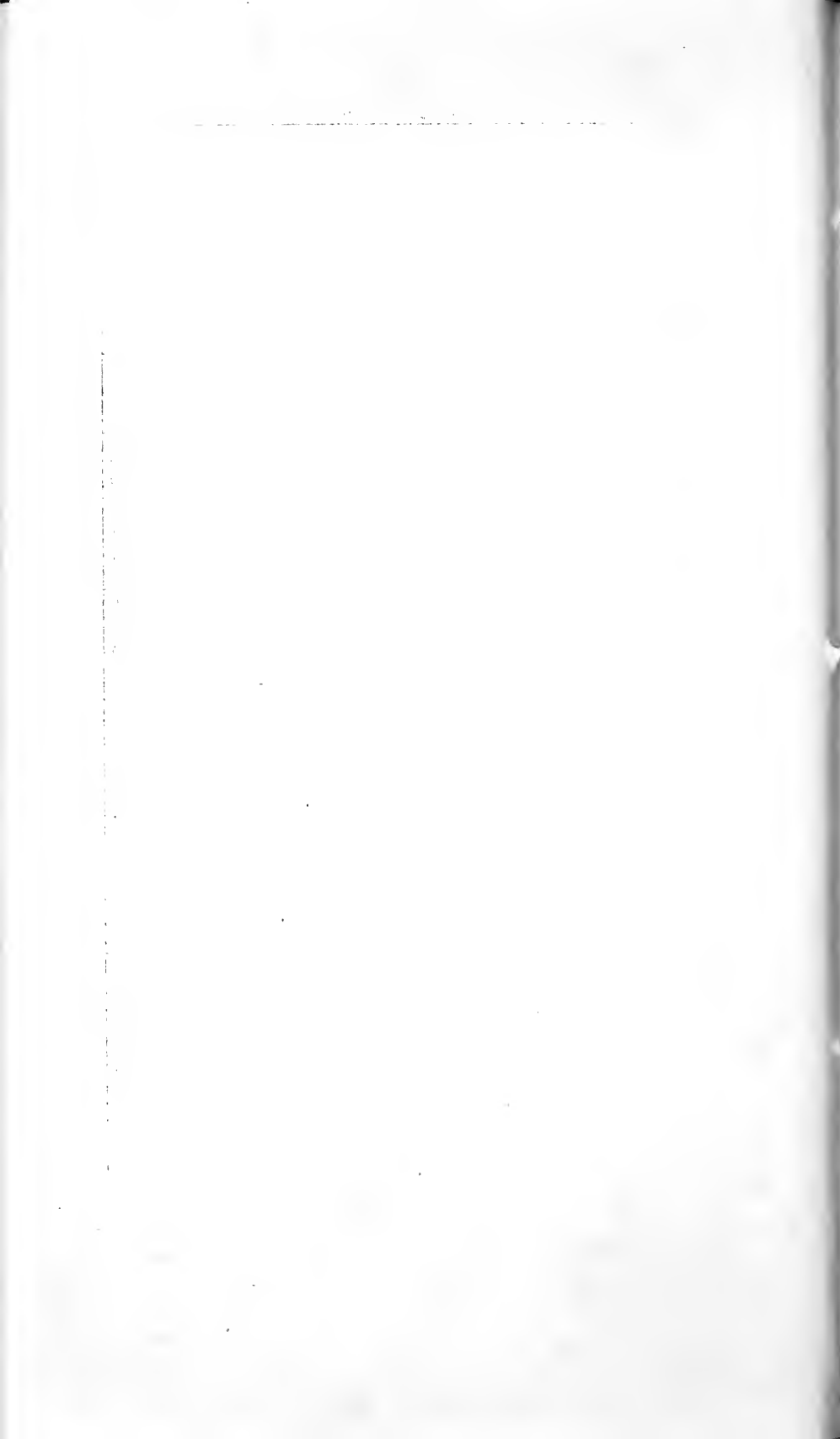

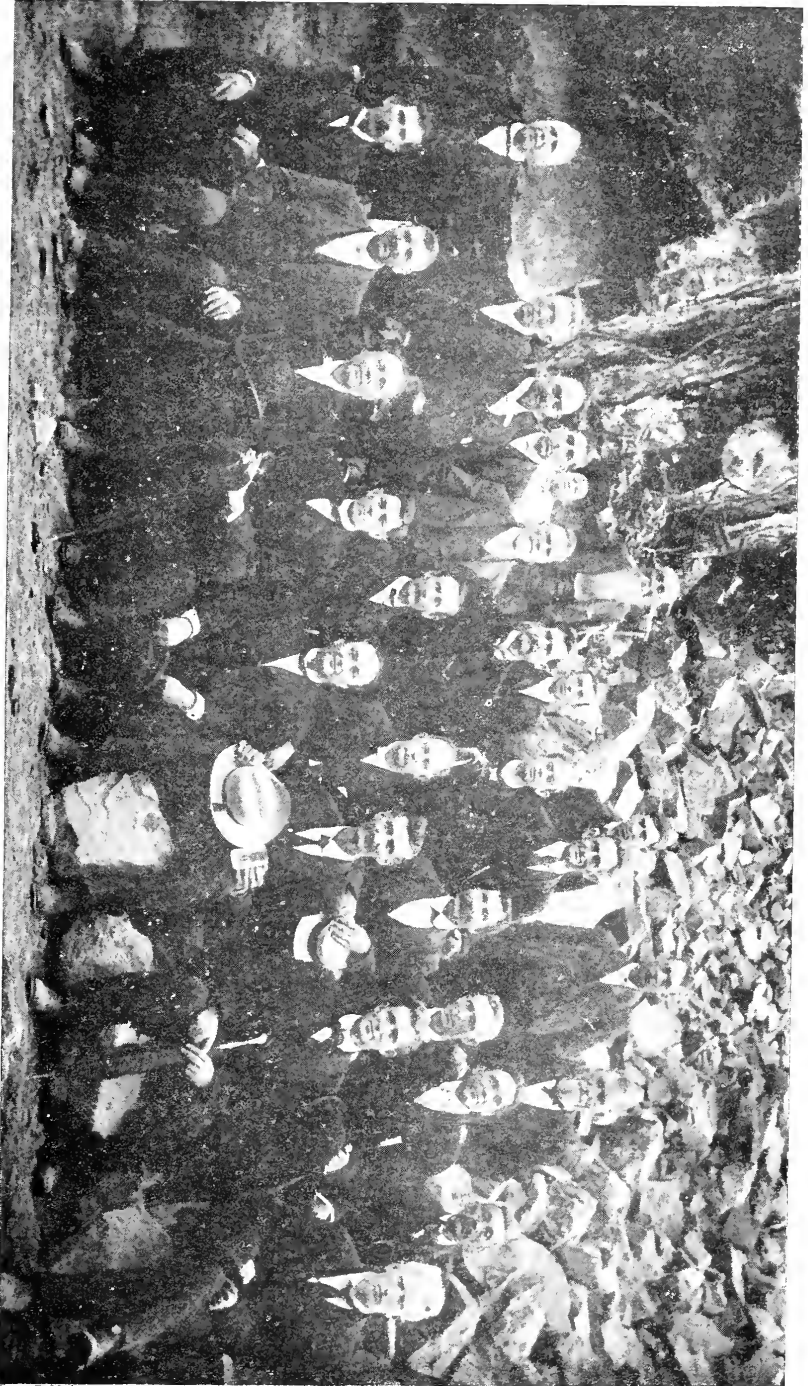

BIBLE BOARD.

During the past year in most of our charges the centenary of the British Bible Society was celebrated, and offerings taken, making an increase in our Conference offerings of \$296.32, and we believe increasing intelligent interest in this great ally of all Church work in both home and foreign fields. Your committee could not get anything like an accurate estimate of the number of Bibles circulated in the Conference, but several Districts have been supplied, and whole counties where distribution was reported have been carefully furnished by our preachers. It is an inspiration to know that this Society has circulated this year nearly two million Bibles and Testaments, in one hundred different languages, thus adding to the moral health of the whole world. Inasmuch as the work of this organization is still in danger of being crippled by the \$73,000 deficit last year, and since only about two-thirds of this amount has been given, after the wide publicity given this sad fact; therefore,

Resolved, first, That we observe this year in all our charges, the first Sunday in January as American Bible Society Day.

Resolved, second, That we in every way continue to co-operate with our efficient Field Agent, Dr. George D. French.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Your committee find that there has been growth in the Sunday School work in the Conference during the year. The Children's Day collection is a little larger than last year. The fifth Sunday collection for the Greenville

Orphanage has amounted to more than a thousand dollars. The Sunday School Missionary Societies have contributed liberally for Missions. There has been a healthy growth in the enrollment of Sunday School pupils. We have been unable to get definite reports as to the results of Bible Teachers' Study Circle work this year.

The report of the Secretary of the General Sunday School Board is very encouraging, touching the general outlook of the Sunday School work. The report, in part, is as follows:

MEMBERSHIP.

The statistics of membership as given in the General Minutes for 1903 are as follows:

Number of schools 14,218, loss 207; officers and teachers 108,841, gain 4,191; scholars 979,935, gain 45,825; total attendance, 1,088,776; net increase for the year, 50,016.

LITERATURE.

The circulation of our periodicals on April 1, 1904, was as follows:

Sunday School Magazine 56,000; gain 4,000; Children's Visitor 85,650, gain 9,000; Senior Quarterly 352,000, gain 15,000; Intermediate Quarterly 330,000, gain 17,000; Home Department Quarterly 19,000, gain 4,000; Our Little People 200,000, loss 5,000; Illustrated Lesson Paper 140,000, gain 5,000; Olivet Picture Cards (sets) 105,165, gain 13,335; total circulation, 1,287,815; net gain for the year, 62,335.

Your attention is called to the fact that the Sunday School Board, on advice of the Sunday School Editor and Superintendent of Training Work, consolidated the Bible Teachers' Study Circle course to three books, with a fourth book for officers. The course as thus constituted consists of "The Bible and Its Books," "The Doctrines and Polity of the M. E. Church, South," "The Sunday School Teacher," with "The Organized Sunday School" for the special study of Sunday School officers. This makes a harmonious and available course, such as any teacher of ordinary diligence can easily master in a year.

You will recall that under the action of the last General Conference it is made the duty of every pastor to organize and encourage these Study Circles. If your Conference, either through the Sunday School Board, or through the agency and courtesy of the presiding Bishop, should institute an inquiry as to the extent to which this duty is being discharged by those upon whom the Church has made it incumbent, it would probably reveal the fact that while a few pastors have made careful and adequate use of this provision, many more have allowed the whole work to go without attention. Here, as in certain other matters, the indifference of the pastor kills the spirit of our work and renders our best organization inefficient. With the help of the pastors the department can realize its largest hope in the training of teachers for their great work.

While the operation of the Study Circle is designed to meet the needs of the corps of teachers for better equipment, and is accomplishing this result in very many cases, it is not of itself sufficient for the production of future supplies. To meet this demand it is urged that in every Sunday School where practicable a class consisting of the most advanced pupils be organized into a class for the study, Sabbath by Sabbath and within the school itself, of the books of the Teachers' Course. One-third of this volume of matter consists of the actual study of the Bible in a somewhat more advanced form than usual; another third consists of the study of the work of the Bible teacher, and the remainder is a short study of the leading doctrines of our Church and of the polity by which we seek to accomplish the spiritual and other ends for which we exist. Surely no more sacred or important matter can be prepared for the weekly study of those who desire to become active workers in our communion.

We offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, first, That all our Sunday Schools give the fifth Sunday collections to the Greeneville Orphanage.

Second, That all our Sunday Schools be organized into missionary societies according to the Discipline, and that the collection one Sunday in each month be given to missions.

Third, That we commend more and more "The Bible Teachers' Study Circle." We ask with more earnestness than heretofore that all our preachers get the books and read them, and thus put themselves in position properly to commend the work to the superintendents and teachers.

Fourth, That we will carefully and diligently observe Children's Day.

Fifth, That we observe Decision Day at least once a year in our Sunday Schools wherever it can be done.

Sixth, That we recognize the high grade of Sunday School literature furnished by our Publishing House, and urge that it be used by all our schools.

As to our connectional periodicals—*The Methodist Review*, *Christian Advocate*, *Epworth Era*, *Go Forward*, *The Sunday School Magazine*, *Children's Visitor* and other Sunday School literature, as also *The Woman's Missionary Advocate* and *Our Homes*, we are gratified to say they are each self supporting and deserve to be much more largely patronized. We hope to see the *Review* liberally patronized by the laymen, the *Advocate* and *Era* or *Visitor* in every home and *Go Forward* in the hands of every member.

Our Conference organ, *The Midland Methodist*, is ably edited by our own Dr. J. A. Burrow, and is the compeer of any Conference organ in the connection. It has now a circulation of over 6,000, 3,500 of which are in Holston, and which is steadily increasing and deservedly so, since the paper supplies a want no other paper does. It is constantly improving in mechanical and literary make-up. The editor and publisher deserve and have our heartfelt thanks. We recommend Dr. J. A. TEMPERANCE.

The use of wine and strong drink is unsparingly condemned in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, and so is inconsistent with Christian character, and fatal to all the hopes and claims of moral excellence. We would stand amazed if the oft repeated tragedies of the saloon and the trouble incident to the liquor traffic had not produced the splendid temperance sentiment of today. We rejoice over the effective use many towns have made of the opportunity to rid themselves of the great evil. This, with other ad-

vanced steps taken by the country, looking to the ultimate overthrow of the licensed saloon, are promises of the day of victory.

We are not for a so-called "respectable saloon," but for no saloon; not for an unadulterated whiskey, but for no whiskey; not for homes, by whiskey wrecked and ruined, but for homes prosperous, happy and untouched by drunkenness, and the excessive use of morphine and kindred drugs. The clock has struck high twelve in the day of the Church's opportunity, and it is time she was fully awake. Let us hear anew the prophetic words of Bishop McTyeire: "The sovereignty of this country must put down the saloon, or the saloon will put down the country."

We note with pleasure the active part taken by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in victories already achieved, but much remains to be done; therefore be it

Resolved, first, That we press the battle anew in the settlement of this great question, and that our Church recognize the purity of her morals and the stability of our republic as paramount, and that this conviction be above our political preferences.

Second, That we deplore the increasing and excessive use of morphine and kindred drugs, and that we endeavor to arouse public sentiment against it.

Third, That we, as a Church, resolve less and vote more, it being the vote and not the resolution that makes the saloon power tremble. Let us vote as we pray.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The secretaries of our General Board of Missions give us the encouraging intelligence that there was an increase in the contributions to Foreign Missions last year of \$22,000; and best of all, that the membership has increased in every field. Our Church now has approximately 15,000 communicants in these regions, representing a much larger constituency. The demands upon us grow with every year.

The circulation of "Go Forward," while large, is by no means what that most excellent periodical deserves. The price is so small that every home can easily have it. If it were read by all our people, many of the difficulties of paying in full would be met. We call the attention of our pastors, Sunday School, and Epworth League workers to the leaflets issued by the General Board for free distribution, and urge the largest use of them.

A committee has been appointed to arrange for a Missionary gathering for the South Atlantic Conferences, consisting of Holston, North Carolina, South Carolina and Western North Carolina. It has been decided to have the meeting at Asheville, N. C., next May. Your Board has pledged the program committee its hearty co-operation in preparing for this conference. All the traveling and local preachers are delegates. Each Quarterly Conference will be asked to elect three delegates, and each Sunday School Epworth League and Woman's Missionary Society one delegate to this conference. If a full delegation cannot be secured otherwise, we hope these several bodies will arrange to pay at least the expenses of travel for their delegates.

The work under the supervision of your own Board for the past year has been quite encouraging. One thousand, seven hundred and forty-two professions of faith are reported in the sixty-three charges under our supervision, and nearly as many accessions to the Church. The Sunday School work is especially encouraging and the growth has been very marked. 10,352 Sunday School scholars are reported.

We especially appreciate the liberal contributions of Centenary Church, Chattanooga, and the Pearisburg Circuit, in Virginia. The special fund of

the one, and the large surplus raised by the other has enabled us to report as paid more than the amount of assessment for both Foreign and Domestic Missions. We trust that more of our people will make ability and not apportionments the limit of their contributions.

Our mid-year meeting will be held at Asheville, N. C., at the time of the Missionary Conference, and the usual appropriation of traveling expenses for Presiding Elders and members of the Board has been made.

J. W. Perry is recommended for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary, and an appropriation made to cover his expenses, not to exceed \$300.

The General Board has apportioned \$12,100 to this Conference to be raised for Foreign Missions, and we need all of \$8,000 to carry on our work and enter the fields opening to us on every hand.

The following Missions have been absorbed or made self-supporting: Athens, W. Va.; Briceville, Damascus, E. Wytheville, Greeneville, Hixon, Lenoir, Pocahontas, Stony Point, Tacoma and Pound, War Eagle, Whitwell and Cleveland District. Hancock and Cleveland Circuit are discontinued. Tug River and Packet are left without appropriation until the mid-year meeting.

The results of our expenditure on the Riceville Circuit have been most encouraging. They made an increase in pastor's salary this year of \$100,

so we have paid to him \$100 of the conditional appropriation of \$150. We have appropriated \$50 to that circuit this year on condition that they make a further increase in the pastor's salary of a like amount, or a sum equal to any increase of salary less than that.

We have appropriated \$250 to the Floyd Circuit on condition that they pay their pastor \$125 more the ensuing year than last, or two dollars for every dollar of increase not exceeding the stipulated amount. These two appropriations are available at the time of the next annual Conference.

With faith in the Church and its founder, we ask the same hearty co-operation given us hitherto.

SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The spiritual state of the church must be judged by the spiritual results which it produces. Judged by this rule Methodism is by no means a spent force in the Holston Conference. We now have 56,850 members in our bounds, distributed into ten presiding elder's districts and 192 pastoral charges, with 215 local preachers and 244 traveling preachers. We have now 716 Sunday-schools, with 52,459 pupils, under our care, who receive instruction in the word of God every Sunday. We have 163 chapters of the Epworth League, with 6,077 members, who are being trained regularly for Christian work. The pastors report 3,619 additions on profession of faith, and a net gain of 503 members as result of their ministry this year. These figures show the facts so far as they can be tabulated, but the hopes inspired, the joys felt, the broken hearts comforted, cannot be written here. In fact all of the best things cannot be tabulated.

Your committee fears that the church has lost somewhat in family religion. The hurry and rush of our American life leaves but little time for family religion, and still less for family prayers. This state of affairs will surely weaken the moral character of our sons and daughters as they go out from our homes. We have also lost in the quarterly fast—very few of our people keeping it with any degree of regularity. It is doubtful if all the preachers keep it, and it is almost certain that but few of them ever announce it.

The gift of exhortation has been largely lost among us, both in the licensed exhorter and the pastor. Our people have more and better preaching than formerly, and the League compensates largely for the loss of the love feast and experience meeting. Yet your committee feels that there is no better means of grace than the old-fashioned love feast and experience meeting.

The church in our hands is confronted with some grave questions, growing out of our rapidly increasing material development. We are in constant danger of reaching that Laodicean experience where we shall say we are rich and increased in goods and have need of nothing, not knowing that we are miserable, and naked, and blind, having need of everything. In view of the above we offer the following resolutions:

First—That we will hold fast the old doctrines of Methodism, and seek to fix them in the experiences of our people, and will give ourselves no rest till our people know what is meant by the "witness of the spirit," and stand in the consciousness of a holy life.

Second—That we will seek to develop a witnessing church, where every member will have an experience to tell, and when necessary will not refuse to tell it.

Third—That we will, among ourselves, cultivate the gift of exhortation, direct and hortatory preaching, striving to make our preaching thoroughly evangelical, organizing for the salvation of sinners as well as the edification of believers.

Fourth—That we will strive with all diligence to show our people the importance of family worship, and to establish an altar of prayer in every

home if possible. In short, that we will, as men called of God to preach the gospel, give ourselves no rest till the Lord sends a mighty and wide-spread revival of religion upon all our charges.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Board notes with thankfulness the fact that the cause of education is making progress throughout the Church, and that the General Board of Education is steadily growing in efficiency. We are indebted to it for much of the progress made within our own bounds, effected by the pressure brought to bear in elevating the standard of requirements for admission to college and for conferring degrees, also by the literature it creates and circulates, and the persistence with which it insists upon the pastors preaching not simply a sermon, but a series of sermons each year to their congregations on education.

We are also in hearty sympathy with the efforts our General Board is making for the education of the colored people. We believe that the time has come when our own Church should do more for the negro. The solution of the race problem in the South can be greatly hastened by the best people among us taking the lead in Christly ministry to our brother in black. The best white people of the South alone have correct views concerning the relations of the two races, and, if left undisturbed, they will not miss of rightly interpreting and applying the requirements of the Gospel of Christ to the situation. The very least we can do in satisfying our own consciences is to heed every call made upon us for the advancement of the Paine and Lane Colleges. These schools are devoted to the education of preachers and teachers for the colored race. They should be viewed by us as creating and putting into the body of that race a most healthful and desirable leaven of Christian influence.

We wish also to heartily commend the work of the Correspondence School, intended to aid especially our undergraduates in the work of mastering the courses of study prescribed by the Church. The small fee required for enrollment in this school ought to be regarded as the best possible investment any of our candidates for orders can make; and, doubtless, many of us would find it exceedingly profitable to take the courses provided for graduates or those who have attained to Elder's orders.

The academies under our own care report prosperous sessions. There has been some little disturbance in the management of one of them, but we think a satisfactory adjustment has been made and that the present year will be one of success to them all. We hope that the Board may be able to increase their number during the present year. We need others and could easily have them were we in the possession of means to offer the encouragement of a little material aid.

Martha Washington and Sullins Colleges, and Centenary College, operated for the education of girls exclusively, did well the past year, and are entering quite successfully upon the duties of a new year. We heartily approve of the move by which Martha Washington and Sullins Colleges have been put under the same administration. The result thus far has been to give us riddance of a great deal of hurtful friction in the educational field and to brighten the prospects for the permanent usefulness of both. Martha Washington and Centenary have been able to decrease their indebtedness and increase their equipment very materially during the year. Centenary has the largest boarding patronage in her history, being one hundred and forty-seven.

We have had under careful consideration the report of the President of Emory and Henry College concerning that institution, referred to us by your action. We are thankful for the many tokens of Divine favor in her past

history, and especially for the record of sound life and healthy progress during the past few years. We rejoice in the convincing proof which that report offers of the fact that the Institution is meeting, in a measure exceeding our expectation, the ends for which it exists. We are also profoundly impressed, not merely by the facts of the report, but by our own personal observation and investigation, that the needs of the Institution are exceedingly urgent, and that the progress attained cannot be maintained without such a response in money as will liberate, further equip, and enlarge the College. The scheme of improvement, so far as outlined in said report, is heartily indorsed by us, and the call for \$77,000.00 is, we think, in view of the great needs, a very modest sum. We also believe in the adequate ability and willingness of the Conference to put this amount, or even more, into this, the oldest and most essential of our educational institutions. Therefore, after careful and prayerful consideration, we recommend that the Conference authorize the raising of not less than \$77,000.00, in as short a time as possible, for the benefit of Emory and Henry College, to be applied to meeting her needs in the order of their urgency—this order to be determined by those to whom this Conference has committed the care of these interests. For raising this needed sum of money, we recommend the appointment of L. L. H. Carlock, R. G. Waterhouse, W. S. Neighbors, D. D. Hull, W. P. Dungan and J. A. Burrow, as a committee of management, who shall make careful estimates as to the cost of every item mentioned in the scheme of improvements presented, and shall have power to determine the time it is deemed wise to take in raising this sum; also the methods, agencies or agents, basis of apportionment and the apportionments. This committee shall also appoint the Presiding Elder of each district, one layman and one preacher from among those whom the Presiding Elder recommends, to constitute a committee of co-operation in their respective districts, whose duty it shall be to aid in carrying out the plans of the Committee of Management, and shall, after consultation with the Presiding Elder of each district, arrange for the full and thorough consideration of this interest by the District Conferences to be held during the incoming year.

EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

We wish to emphasize the fact that the Epworth League holds an important place in Methodism to-day. The achievements of this department of our work since its first organization is its best and strongest recommendation to the Church and to the world. But notwithstanding the importance of the League work, and of the phenomenal success of the same within our Conference in the past, we have to report with much regret a decrease in both Junior and Senior Chapters during the past year, and also a decrease in its contributions to mission and other objects. The reports of the pastors show the following statistics: Senior Leagues 94, a decrease of 26; Junior Leagues 69, a decrease of 1; total League members, 6,077, a decrease of 87. Money raised for missions, \$804.10; for other objects, \$1,831.38; total, \$2,576.73, a decrease of \$1,041.80. This decrease may be due to the fact that the work has been largely committed to the care of the Holston Epworth League Conference, and pastors may not have felt as responsible for its success as they should.

The General Epworth League Board passed in its annual meeting in May last the following resolution, which we most heartily indorse:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that all Epworth League Conference organizations shall be subject to their respective Annual Conference League Boards and shall make annual reports to them."

We recognize the important claim of the Epworth Era, and recommend its hearty support by all our pastors and people. We also urge all our preachers and Leaguers who can to attend the seventh International Conference of Epworth Leaguers, to be held next July at Denver, Colorado. We earnestly exhort all our pastors and church members everywhere to endeavor to put fresh energy and zeal into the League work, so that it may assume its former proportions and usefulness, and thus be able to meet the ever increasing demands upon it.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We believe that every law of the decalogue was re-enacted by our Lord, and hence the demand upon the Christian Church to keep the Sabbath inviolate is imperative. We believe that the tendency to secularize the holy day is so alarming as to demand the earnest and prayerful consideration of all those who love God's laws. There are many prevalent forms of Sabbath desecration. In many localities are found open stores. Sunday excursions are frequent, trains make their day schedules, and street car companies find the Sabbath the most profitable of all days. There is also to be found in all localities Sunday visiting, the making of big dinners, which invariably depletes attendance upon public worship and subverts the purpose of the Sabbath as a day of rest and spiritual communion.

Because we believe the Sabbath to be a safeguard of our national liberty; that a day of rest and meditation is necessary to growth in personal piety; that any infringement upon God's law concerning the Sabbath is inimical to the Church, we recommend that the preachers of Holston Conference correct these abuses as far as possible by their own example and by clearly expressed disapproval of them.

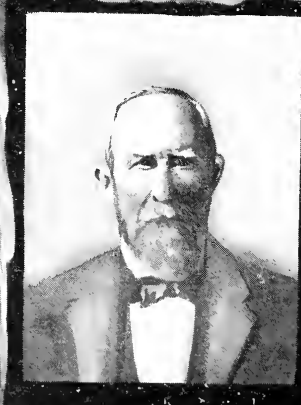

MEMOIRS.

ENOCH W. MOORE.

Enoch W. Moore, only son of Dr. William and Mary Moore, was born in Russell County, Virginia, August 20, 1833; and died in Independence, Virginia, August 6, 1904. September 22, 1861, he was married to Miss Laura Weaver, of Cocke County, Tenn., who, with five children, the fruit of their marriage, survives him.

Brother Moore was converted when a young man, and early felt the call to the ministry. While teaching school in Kentucky he applied for license to preach, which was granted and signed by Zephaniah Meek, presiding elder. In 1860 he was admitted on trial into the Holston Conference, and appointed junior preacher on the Newport Circuit. He did forty-four years' faithful work in the pastorate, sixteen as presiding elder and the remainder on circuits, except one year in Bristol Station.

Brother Moore was remarkable for the strength of his character. Physically, intellectually, and morally he was much above the ordinary. He was what the world calls a self-made man, having had quite limited opportunities for self-culture in his boyhood. He educated himself by teaching and attending school as a student alternately, which is probably the best way one was ever educated. Really, all men are self-made who are made at all. All that home or school or Church or any other advantage can do for one is to help him help himself. The gods and men can only help those who help themselves. A young man who has the root of the matter in him will create opportunities and manufacture helps, and one who has not is a hopeless case in the midst of the greatest profusion of props and aids.

In his mental makeup Brother Moore was most distinguished for logical acumen and strength, though he was not without imagination and an exquisite sense of the beautiful. He excelled as a preacher. Every one who has heard his best efforts will indorse the estimate of Bishop Hoss when he calls him "a great preacher." He delighted in discussing great themes, and did it in a masterly manner. His physical form was rough and angular and his voice sharp and harsh; but in spite of this, by the force of his logic and the divine unction that was nearly always upon him in the pulpit, he held vast audiences spellbound for an hour.

He was a moral hero. I have seen the strength of his moral fiber tested. It would endure any strain. No breath of suspicion ever blew upon him. As a preacher he maintained the dignity of his calling. He never compromised with sin nor yielded to the popular clamor for the sensational and the silly. He had the courage to do right. He never lowered his colors in the face of any foe.

The bed rock of his character was an exquisite sense of obligation and a high sense of honor, but he was also warm-hearted and sympathetic. He was a most companionable man. I first became acquainted with him in 1864, when he was in charge of the Asheville Circuit. We formed a friendship then which never suffered a lapse for forty years. My heart counted his friendship and fellowship among its best treasures.

Such a life cannot but have a good ending. He conquered the last foe in the strength of his faith in Jesus. He is not dead, but sleepeth. Sleep on, my brother. The trump of God will one day wake that stalwart form to the vigor of a new life, and we shall renew our sweet fellowship in heaven.

ALEXANDER E. WOODWARD.

Alexander E. Woodward, son of Rev. Valentine and Mary E. Woodward, was born on Sugar Run, Lee County, Virginia, April 23, 1831. His parents being devout people, and his father a local Methodist preacher of excellent standing, he was reared under wholesome religious influences. He was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, in his early boyhood, and from the beginning to the end of his Christian life he was zealous and consistent. He was licensed to preach in 1852, admitted on trial into the Holston Conference at Jonesboro, Tenn., in 1855, and served the following charges in order: 1855, Wytheville Circuit, preached under Wm. Robeson; 1856, Taylorsville Circuit; 1857, Montgomery Mission; 1858, Maryville Circuit; 1859, Dandridge Circuit; 1860, Louisville Circuit; 1861, Little River Circuit; 1862, Jasper Circuit; 1863, Morristown Circuit; 1864, Jonesville Circuit; 1865 and 1866, Powells Valley Circuit; 1867, Benton Circuit; 1868, Dandridge and New Market Circuit; 1869, Decatur Circuit; 1870, Rutledge Circuit; 1871, Sevierville Circuit; 1872, Batesville Circuit; 1873, supernumerary; 1874, Tazewell Circuit, Tennessee. In 1875, owing to declining health, he was forced to locate, and his name does not appear in minutes any more until 1884, when it appears as supernumerary, and in 1885 he was superannuated and remained in that relation until his death.

During all of his active relation to the Conference, except a few months, he was unmarried and made his home with the people whom he served. He was a man of clean lips and chaste life. Brother Woodward was a man of great energy, was never unemployed; for several years after he was superannuated he was engaged in selling religious books and preaching when his health would permit. He was always ready and willing to serve the Master, under all conditions of life. He was married to Miss Maggie Rucker, of Thorn Hill, Tenn., February 3, 1874, Rev. Jacob Smith officiating. To Brother and Sister Woodward were born ten children, six of whom preceded their father to the home of the good. The four who survive him are Mrs. Kate Cunningham, of Abingdon, Va.; Mrs. Maude Camper, of Jamestown, Tenn.; Mr. George W. Woodward, of Knoxville, Tenn.; and Edith, a bright fourteen-year-old girl, who is with her mother in the old home at Tate Spring, Tenn. Brother and Sister Woodward were very careful and prayerful in the training of their children, and as a result they are noble in principle, bright in intellect, and are all members of the M. E. Church, South.

Brother Woodward was a great sufferer for several years, but continued to preach and help the pastor in his work at Tate Spring, Marys Chapel, and other points near his home, until he lost his mental bearing, which was about two years before his death. It is a remarkable fact that when he did not know his friends or even his family, he did not fail to read his Bible and conduct family prayer. Truly, he was a man of God and was faithful to the end, which came January 22, 1904. The funeral service was conducted in the home by Dr. J. W. Pierce and the writer, after which we laid his body to rest in the family grave-yard on the hill, to await the trumpet sound that shall bid his sleeping dust arise.

FRANCIS MITCHELL GRACE.

Francis Mitchell Grace was born of well-to-do parents near Birmingham, Ala., in the year 1832. After going through the best schools of his section, he attended the University at Knoxville, Tenn., and graduated with honor in the class of 1849. While in the University a great revival of religion occurred under W. G. E. Cunnynggham and D. R. McAnally. The talented Grace was one of the converts. He laid his all upon the altar of

God, and became an itinerant preacher. Preachers' salaries were then \$100, in all grades, while large salaries were paid to trained men in business pursuits. He joined the Alabama Conference. I have not access to all the records, but find that he served at Newbern, 1853; Eufaula, 1854; Demopolis, 1855-56; Talladega, 1857-58; Tuscaloosa, 1859-60; Newbern, again during the war, 1861-65. He edited the Selma Daily Messenger in 1866, and served as professor in the University at Knoxville, Tenn., 1867-70. He served as President of Hiwassee College in 1871-72. Then he took his orphan children to Alabama and taught till recalled to old Hiwassee. Time would fail to enumerate his teaching services at Sweetwater, Fincastle, Tenn., at Marion, Va., and Franklin, N. C. For some years he was President of Mansfield Female College, Louisiana. Then he was pastor in New Orleans. His last service as teacher was as professor of Latin and Greek in North Alabama Conference College, at Birmingham. There he built a home for his family—the only one he ever owned.

Bishop Paine once remarked to this scribe that "F. M. Grace is one of the greatest men in the Southern Methodist Church."

The *Holston Christian Advocate* has a notice of Dr. Grace's death, written by Dr. R. N. Price, in which it is stated that "Bishop McTyeire once thought of him for the editorship of the Nashville *Christian Advocate*."

Sidney G. Gilbreath, superintendent of the city schools, Chattanooga, writes to the *Madisonville Democrat* that "Bishop Hoss once said of Grace: 'He is the best writer of pure English in the Southern Methodist Church.'" Dr. Hoss ought to know, for Dr. Grace wrote many of the papers that graced the *Nashville Advocate*, for which he was liberally paid.

The *Methodist Recorder*, of London, and *Zion's Herald*, of Boston, delighted to publish the productions of his pen. We need not wonder why. His whole life was given to scholarly pursuits. A man of rare sensibilities and fine taste, he won success at great labor and expense. He bought and read almost constantly the best productions of the press. No wonder his writings, sermons, and conversation were chaste as the pure Easter lily.

Three times he was married to elect women: First, to Miss Mary Borden, in 1854, who died in Knoxville; secondly, to Miss Kitty Green, in 1872, who died at Mansfield; thirdly, to Miss Ida Hoskins, in 1894, who, with four little children, survives him. He died a superannuate member of the Holston Conference, but by rights he ought to have had his membership transferred to the North Alabama, as he was a teacher in the North Alabama Conference College for years after he left Holston.

His end came suddenly. His last Sunday on earth found him preaching and administering the Lord's Supper in Trinity Church. Wednesday night he was at the prayer meeting, talking and praying as usual. But in the night he was taken ill. Remedies were applied. In the morning he insisted on getting up. In the afternoon and night he called on some disconsolate nearby neighbors. Returning home, he had family prayers as usual, and retired to rest. At 1 o'clock he was seized with pain; the doctor was called. Remedies failed. Cramps came on and intense suffering. He then passed into a comatose state, and then breathed his life away as serenely as a child goes to sleep on its mother's breast. He died just twenty-four hours after his first attack. He fell on sleep August 13, 1904, and was buried in Elm Leaf Cemetery, within a mile of the place where he was born and reared to early manhood. A large concourse of bereaved friends were at his funeral.

Many appreciative notices of his death have appeared in the papers. All have had something good to say of him. Thousands have tested his kindness of heart. High and low, rich and poor shared his sympathy in times of sickness or distress. A man with a kinder heart I never knew. As Dr. Price states the case: "He was a perfect embodiment of altruism. He had no selfishness, no envy, no jealousy, no revenge. His life was a life of much work and little pay, but he is getting his wages on the other side of the river."

JOHN W. ROBERTSON.

J. W. Robertson was born in Habersham county, Georgia, February 1, 1850. He was converted at the age of 16, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He was licensed to preach in 1873 by Rev. W. W. Neal, presiding elder of the Sequachee District. He was admitted into the traveling connection of the Holston Conference the same year, at Marion, Va. Brother Robertson served the following charges: Kingston, Philadelphia and Loudon, Unita and Morganton, Riceville, Rheatown, Washington, Athens, Rogersville, Mossy Creek, Hendersonville (N. C.), Rockwood, Jasper, Sweetwater and Ridgedale. Believing a change of climate would be beneficial to his health, he went to the northwest and was stationed one year at Senesee, Idaho.

He was married to Miss Laura A. Smith, in Roane county, Tennessee. She was his strong supporter in his work, and a tender nurse in his sickness. To them were born two children, Carrie W., and Mary Lou.

For several years he had been in feeble health, not able to do the work of an itinerant preacher, but as his strength permitted he labored diligently with his hands, and preached when opportunity was afforded. After a few days of intense suffering he went to his reward in heaven, Wednesday, May 4, 1904.

The funeral was conducted by the writer at the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, assisted by the following preachers: Revs. J. A. Darr, A. B. Hunter, M. J. Butcher, D. McCracken, M. A. Hunt, of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church; J. K. Ford, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and George E. Delamere, of the *Wesleyan Methodist*. Loving and sympathizing friends laid his body to rest in Rosewood Cemetery to await the resurrection. May our Heavenly Father comfort and bless the sorrowing wife and children. We shall meet Brother Robertson in the home of the good.
