A COMPARISON.

Methodism was organized in America in 1748. The Baptists came in 1639; the Congregationalists in 1648; the Lutherans and Episcopalians began with the settlement of America; the Presbyterians came in 1703. From this it will be seen that the Methodist Church is the youngest in the country; 145 years younger than the Baptist, eighty-one years younger than the Presbyterian, 136 years younger than the Congregationalist. 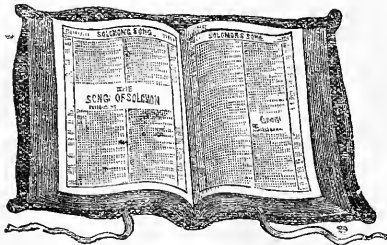
PLAN OF THE EPISCOPAL VISITATION,
1906-1907.

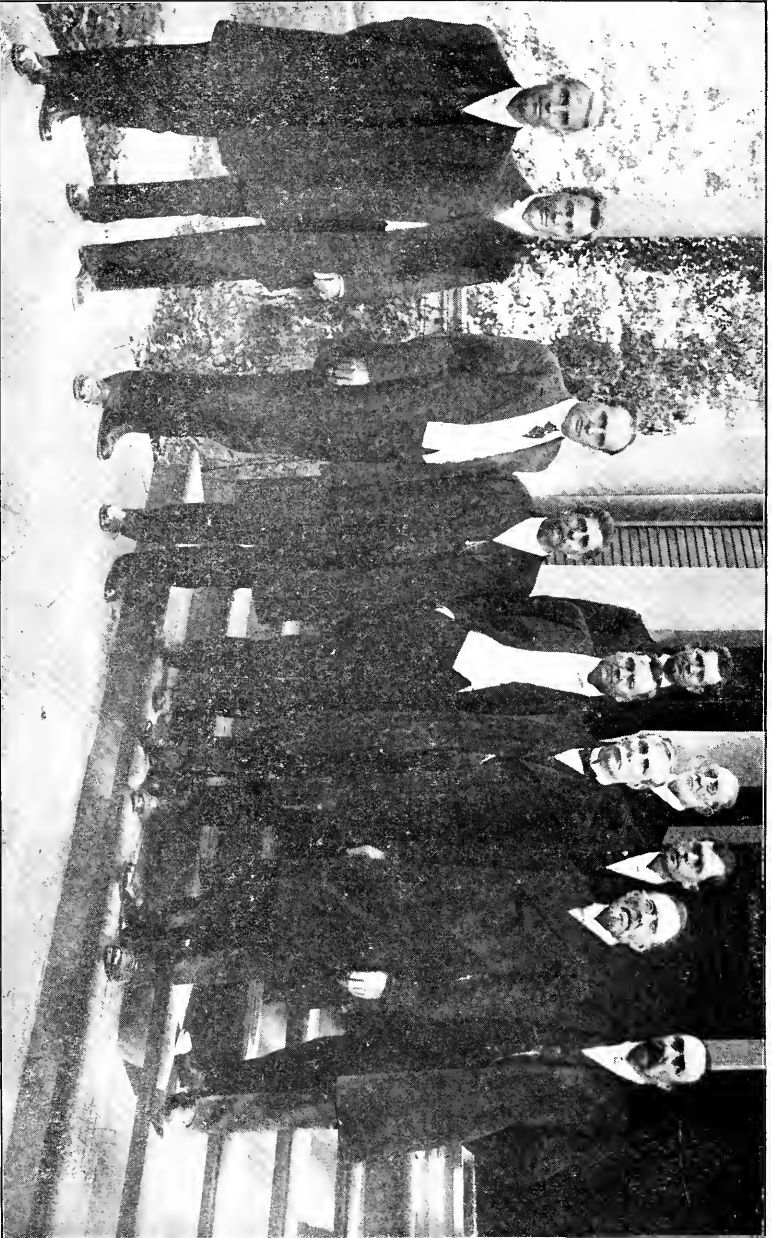

REPORT.—The Committee on Conference Relations submitted the following report:

Our Superannuated Roll is, or should be, one of honor commanding the respect, admiration and love of the Church. To accomplish this end it must be well protected. The majority of these brethren wrought well in their day—never ceasing to work until age and feebleness extreme compelled them to retire. Others were put on the list rather early in the fight. It is now perhaps too late to correct the mistake; the remedy lies in not repeating it. We have thirty-three applicants for the superannuated relation and eleven to be supernumeraries, with perhaps more to follow. To guard this roll against an increase out of due proportions and thereby to protect the Conference and Church, we offer two suggestions:

1st. By dealing kindly with our older preachers, not urging them to retire but rather encouraging them to remain effective by providing for them lighter work and more comfortable quarters, teaching our people to love them for their work's sake.

2nd. By guarding well the doors of admission on trial and into full connection. Strong and well equipped young men are always in demand and should be gladly and joyfully accepted, but feeble and poorly equipped young men are not good substitutes for older and stronger preachers. It is no reproach to be discontinued or to be granted an honorable location. "A superannuated preacher is one worn out *in the itinerant service*" and not before he enters upon it.

Death has dealt kindly with the veterans this year—only one has passed to his reward—the venerable J. S. Kennedy, D. D. In the purity of his character, in meekness and wisdom he stood at the head of his class.

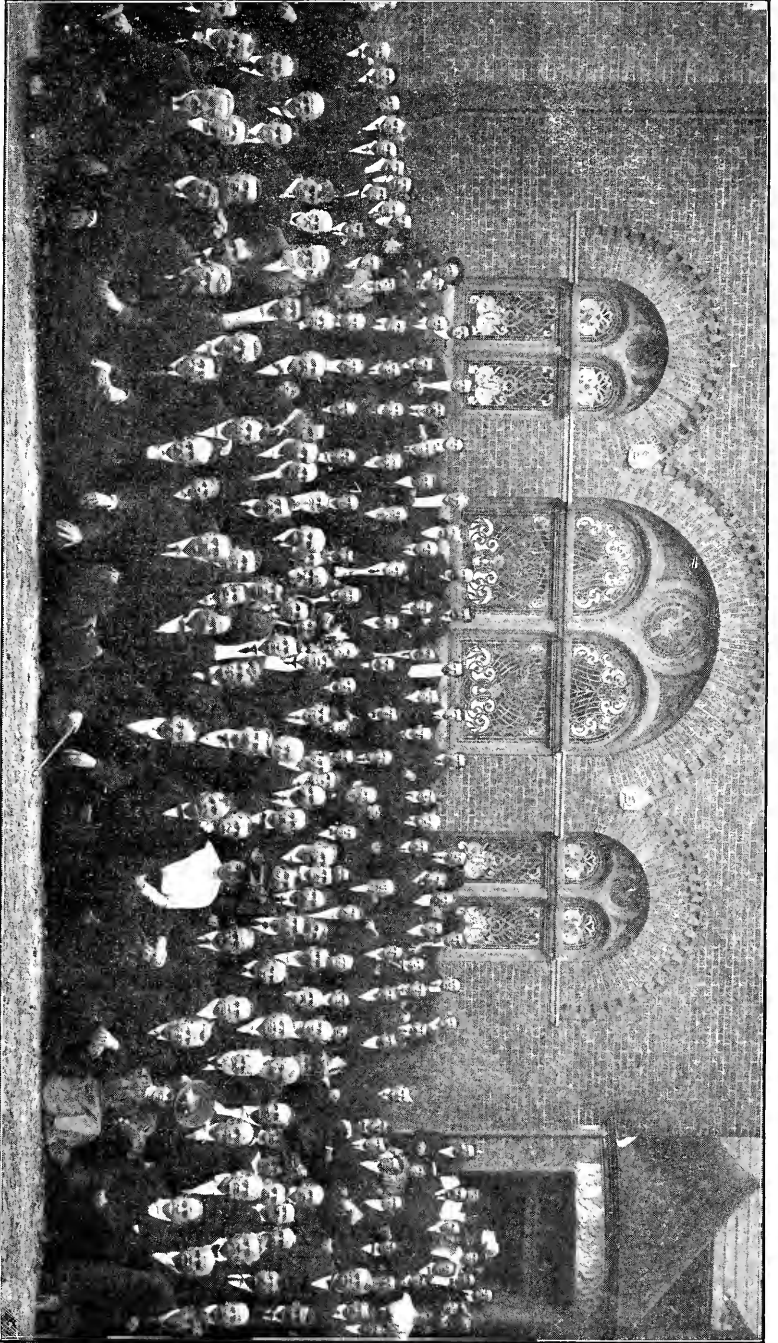

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

We, your committee of management appointed to direct in the raising and expenditure of \$77,000 for the improvement of Emory and Henry College, respectfully submit the following report:

The committee has held three meetings since your last session—one dur-

ing the Christmas holidays, one in July and one since the beginning of this Conference session. The business of importance transacted in the first meeting, was (1) The apportionment among our pastoral charges of the entire amount to be raised, not as an assessment, but as estimates to aid the agents in their work. (2) The appointing of the first Sunday in May as Emory and Henry day, to be observed in all our churches for the purpose of bringing this movement to the attention of our congregations, and directing that literature calculated to stimulate interest in this work be sent to each of the preachers. (3) A decision to secure, if possible, the services of Rev. J. O. Straley as financial agent.

At the meeting in July we considered and indorsed plans submitted by the trustees and their executive committee for the erection of two new buildings calculated to meet the most immediate and pressing needs of the college; heard the encouraging report of our financial agent and considered how we might further the work.

As giving information concerning our last meeting and indicating the progress of the work we submit as a part of this report the figures submitted by our agent:

As indicating the urgent need of the speedy completion of this work we also submit as a part of this report a communication from the faculty of Emory and Henry College:

To the Committee of Management:

Dear Sirs:—Being requested by your agent, Rev. J. O. Straley, to express to you briefly our opinion as to the immediate needs of Emory and Henry College, we respectfully communicate the following:

The \$77,000 you are authorized by the Conference to raise and invest in buildings and other material equipment is sorely needed. Every room in our college building is now occupied by students and some of them are too much crowded for comfort. The majority of our rooms are inferior to those our boys are accustomed to occupy in their own homes. We have lost several students during this and past sessions because of the inferior quality of our rooms and some students this session for lack of rooms of any sort. More and better rooms are not only essential to our growth, but for the prevention of future decline in patronage.

We think you could have done nothing wiser than indorse the plans and contract as you did for the erection, first, of the fitting school building, as this provides first-class living rooms for fifty-two boys and furnishes facilities for more thorough instruction and thorough discipline of the less mature. Scarcely second in importance and wisdom to this is your purpose to complete the Student's Home. In our judgment this should be followed as quickly as possible by the erection of a second home for college students, the installation of water works, other modern conveniences and the renovation or reconstruction of the main building.

Besides these material improvements the college faculty must be strengthened by the addition of at least two new men—one for modern languages and one for the natural sciences. The addition of the first should not be delayed beyond the close of the present session.

The Radford District Record is not well kept. More than half the pages are defaced, many whole lines are erased, which detract from the book. The writing appears to be hurriedly and carelessly done.

The Tazewell District Conference Record is written in such a small and irregular writing that it is hard to do the book justice.

The Wytheville District Conference Record has been well and faithfully kept.

The Abingdon District Conference Record is very thoroughly kept, and is neat and orderly in appearance. All the business has been carefully recorded in a systematic manner.

The Big Stone Gap District Conference Record is in plain and uniform writing. The arrangement is good, and the book is an example of good work.

The Morristown District Conference Record is well kept, and is very neat and orderly.

The Knoxville District Conference Record is well kept, but could be better as carelessness in writing is perceptible toward the close of the work.

The Cleveland District Conference Record is exceedingly well kept, the inscribing is finely done, and everything is in order, but the minutes do not state where the District Conference was held.

The Chattanooga District Conference Record is correctly kept, except in one instance, where no signature appears to a resolution.

The Spring City District Conference Record is not kept in the regular District Conference Record book, but is a model in neatness and is exceptionally well done.

TEMPERANCE.

The great improvement in the temperance cause in the state of Tennessee and that part of Southwest Virginia within the territorial limits of Holston Conference is, indeed, gratifying to all Christians and lovers of peace and good order of society. Twenty-five years ago, and prior thereto, it was only necessary to employ a lawyer, make a motion before a court, prove the applicant a fit person and the place suitable, which usually meant convenient to the public, and thereby secure a license for the sale of ardent spirits and malt liquors almost anywhere in the towns, cities and best communities within said limits. But, at the present time, under the benign influence of the Christian religion, general revenue laws have been passed, and local prohibitory laws not repugnant to, but, in aid of the general laws

which preserve the latter and declare them not repealed, though of a local nature, so that now judicial districts embracing several counties, are not only without a liquor license but it is impossible to acquire one. The legislature of Virginia, in an effort to suppress the illegal traffic in whiskey, has gone so far as to declare that the mere possession of a United States internal revenue license tax receipt not only makes the possessor *prima facie* guilty, but, contrary to the rule in all criminal procedure, throws upon him the burden of proving his innocence.

The penalties for violation of the laws, if properly imposed by the courts, and prosecutions vigorously made by the officers, are, in some instances, sufficient to suppress the evil. But if the legislature of the several states would enact additional laws to effectually suppress this great evil, and would make the second offense a felony, with power to the courts to sentence to the penitentiary, giving the minimum and maximum punishments for such periods as to the legislature might seem proper, (but not less than one year), it would be the means of ridding the country of the habitual dealer in the illicit sale of liquor, who is the secret agent directly responsible for a great majority of the crimes committed in those sections of the country where he is permitted to do business, yet others suffer the penalty of the law and he is permitted to go free.

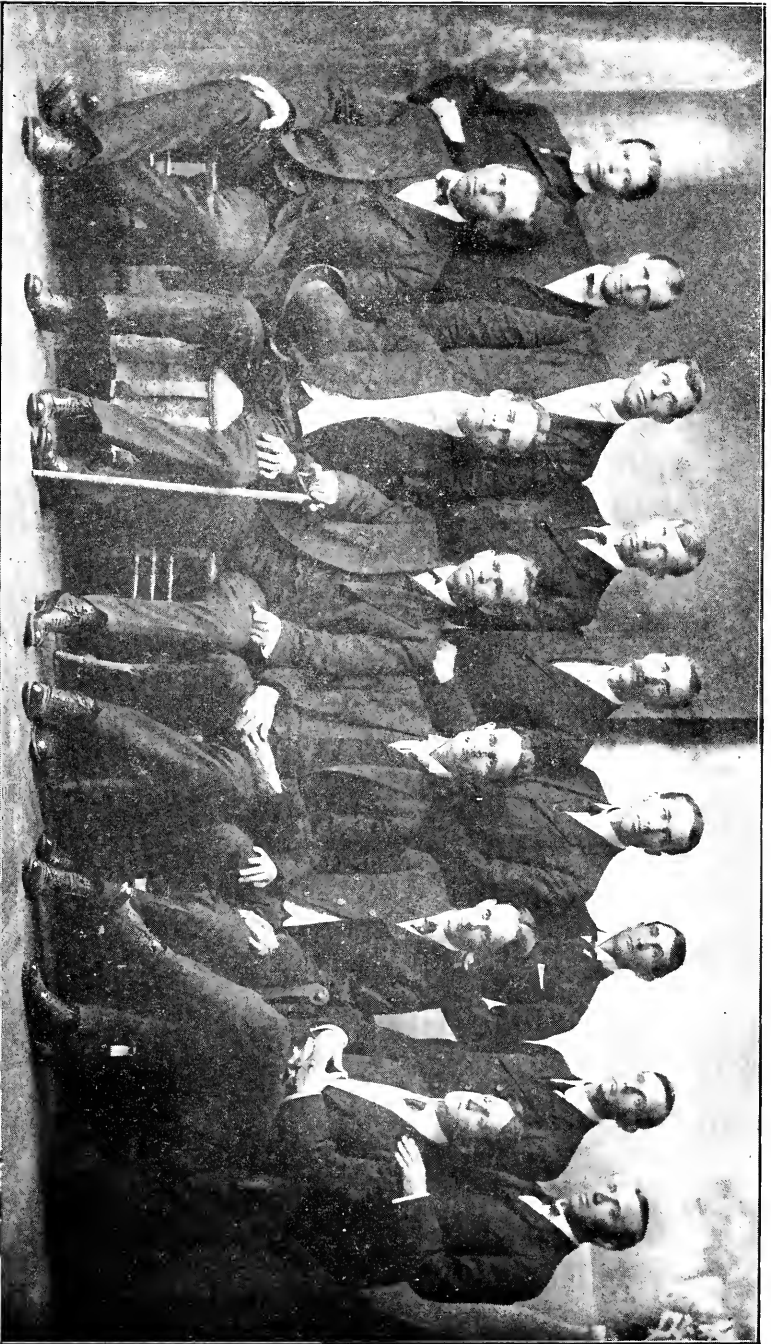
The laws of our states should not only prohibit the sale of whiskey, brandy, wine, ardent spirits, malt liquors, alcoholic bitters, beer or any mixtures thereof, and all other intoxicants, but also the sale of any drugs or other things injurious to health, except when sold upon prescription of a reputable physician for medicinal purposes only.

We call attention of our young preachers to the solemn warning given in the resolutions adopted by the recent General Conference, as well as that of our own Conference, on the tobacco question.

The alarming extent to which liquor men have built up a large business, by means of express packages, in the sections where liquor licenses are not granted should awaken the sensibilities of the best citizenship of the land. The power to prevent this evil is with the legislatures of our states, but the power to prevent the present practice of selling and shipping from one state to another is with Congress. We recommend that our members of Congress recognize, not only the rights of communities to rid themselves of their greatest enemies to good order and peace of society, but, that they induce the federal government to prohibit the sale by package, or what is commonly known as the jug traffic, so that we may not be prevented from enjoying the benefits and protection granted by our state laws. As stated in the temperance report made at our last Annual Conference, (and we desire now here to reiterate that) "legislation can be secured only by legislators, legislators are secured by ballots and ballots are cast by citizens," we, therefore, urge our preachers, members of our church, the preachers and members of other churches, as well as the good and worthy citizens generally of our country, whether members of churches or not, to select representatives whose sympathies are with the thought and aim herein expressed. We beg leave to suggest, without fear of contradiction, that the proper men will be selected in all communities which have attained a high Christian standard, and, therefore, urge upon our ministers the necessity for accomplishing the task of pushing their respective charges to that standard where godliness in all things prevails and the Christian religion predominates above all secular affairs.

We recommend the most kindly and co-operative spirit toward all organizations to promote the temperance sentiment, and urge that each adopt the most feasible means, in his judgment best, to secure the end and to destroy the liquor traffic.

We urge upon all our legislative bodies the great importance of the enactment of the necessary laws, and upon the judiciary and the prosecuting officers the necessity of seeing that the violation of the laws are properly prosecuted, so that the country may see the destruction of the greatest evil

1. We find from the reports of the presiding elders, that there has been a healthy growth of the Sunday School spirit during the past year. The statistics are not yet tabulated, so that we cannot report as to members. There has been an increase in the collection for Children's Day.

Your Board submit the following recommendations:

1. That we urge our Sunday Schools, Superintendents and Teachers, to lean less upon the lesson helps, and more upon the Bible. Use the helps, as helps, but *study* the Bible.

2. We urge that every preacher attend Sunday School in person.

3. That the pastors continually urge upon parents, both from the pulpit and in personal visitation, the necessity of the children and young people remaining at the eleven o'clock preaching.

4. That more parents attend Sunday School with their children.

5. The propriety of preaching more sermons specially to the children—at least two sermons a year.

6. That in pastoral visitation the preachers look carefully after the interests of the Sunday School.

7. That we continue to give our fifth Sunday collection to the Orphanage at Greeneville.

During the past year Dr. and Mrs. Hamill have held Institutes at two points in the bounds of the Conference, and we recommend that during the coming year the Sunday School Board have them hold one or more Superintendent's Rallies in the bounds of the Conference.

We most heartily indorse and commend the action of the late General

Conference in setting on foot a plan for the endowment of a chair in Vanderbilt University for instruction in Religious Pedagogy and Sunday Schools. So that now paragraph 248 of our Discipline provides as follows:

"After the payment by the Sunday School Board of each Annual Conference of ten per cent. of the Children's Day Fund to the General Conference Sunday School Board and ten per cent. to the General Board of Education, and the expenditure of such sum 'as shall be necessary to supply all truly needy Sunday Schools within its bounds with our periodical literature, and to defray the necessary expenses of the Board,' all the remainder shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the General Sunday School Board, to be applied by that Board to the endowment of a Chair of Religious Pedagogy and Sunday Schools in the Vanderbilt University until the sum of \$50,000 shall have been raised."

This fact ought to give added interest to our Children's Day service. We urge with all earnestness that all the pastors see to it that Children's Day service be held at every appointment.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Sabbath desecration is a great evil, and is rapidly becoming a national one. We dare not forget that the law, "Thou shalt remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy," was spoken for all men of all times. No man or body of men can violate this law with impunity. No doubt it rests upon a two-fold foundation, viz.: The need of the physical and of the moral man. Our bodies are the handiwork of God, and should be taken care of. Among many provisions made for their comfort and preservation is the Sabbath. Those who rest one-seventh of the time will do better work and last longer than those who toil all the while. Our spirits need this day for study and worship. Many men have but little time for the study of God's word and meditation. The Sabbath gives them time for these gracious exercises and privileges. For these men to ignore the day is sad; to deprive them of it is fearful. God is interested in the entire man, and has made provisions for his comfort and development. We should insist on the use of all these.

Among other things we deplore the following:

1st. By many it is turned into a day of pleasure-seeking. Men and women visit their neighbors, thus keeping themselves from church, also those whom they visit. This practice in some communities so disturbs congregations that church services are almost ruined. Others are out on excursions. Corporations see their opportunities, hence railroad and street car lines bid for the travel by offering reduced rates, and managers of parks, etc., offer special attractions.

2nd. As a day of labor, many of our large corporations carry on their work without intermission. Thousands of our laboring men know nothing of the Sabbath as a day of rest. These men are denied the association of their families, kept away from church, and sacrificed body and soul to satisfy the greed of these companies.

We realize that in this complex age many works have become seeming necessities. But only such work should be done, and that by the smallest number possible.

3d. Our State laws are entirely inadequate. We need more stringent laws. Our legislature can be of great service to us at this point.

We hail with joy the recent Sabbath legislation in Canada and France, and we recommend a like legislation for our own land.

We urge that as preachers, laymen and churches we discourage all these evils, both by precept and example.

You can not be disloyal to the League and loyal to Methodism. A true Methodist pastor must aid in its progress with every possible effort of his ministry. We ask but for loyalty to your Church and therefore to the Epworth League.

We recognize the Epworth Era as our organ. It is an interesting and helpful periodical, and we urge our people to support it in every reasonable manner.

We realize the usefulness of the Holston Epworth League Conference, and commend its wise selection of officers. We urge our pastors to attend its sessions so far as possible, and give to it their earnest co-operation. In view of its great need of increased funds and in response to a petition from its last session, be it

Resolved, That the Holston Conference set apart the second Sunday night in February as League evening, to be devoted to the Senior and Junior Leagues, a free will offering to be taken for the support of the Epworth League Conference, provided that any surplus accruing from this movement go to the cause of foreign missions, looking to the support of a League missionary in the near future.

The report of the General Board shows a marked increase in the collections for missions in our Church. Believing that the new department of Home Missions, established by the last General Conference, to be most opportune, and that it will do much to help our Conference Board in solving many perplexing problems, we pledge the Secretary of this department our hearty co-operation, and assure him that his visit and counsel has been of great benefit to us.

We would also call attention to the meeting of Conference Missionary Secretaries provided for in our new book of Discipline as a most helpful agency for helping our Boards in planning and carrying forward their work.

Your Board was able, through the generosity of Col. J. C. Woodward and the efforts of three of our Presiding Elders, to send nine men to the Training School last year, all of whom brought most encouraging reports of the help and inspiration for their work received while there. We gratefully accept the following generous offer of Col. J. C. Woodward for the ensuing year with the hope that each Presiding Elder will make arrangements to send two men from his district.

Knoxville, Tenn., October 8th.

To the Ten Presiding Elders of the Holston Conference, M. E. Church, South, and Board of Missions of said Conference:

Dear Brethren:—I hereby propose to pay one-half the amount of money necessary to defray the expenses of the young preachers attending the Missionary Training School at Nashville, Tennessee, in January and February, 1907, on the following conditions, viz.: That the Presiding Elders in the several districts raise an equal amount of money for the same purpose, and that not more than four from each district shall attend, and that not more than twenty-five dollars (\$25) be allotted to each one attending; said young preachers to be nominated by their respective Presiding Elders and confirmed by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Missions; provided, furthermore, that this proposition be accepted on or before February 1st, 1907; and provided further, that each and every minister attending said school on these conditions, report to me in writing

at the end of the term, their candid opinion as to whether or not they are better equipped for their ministerial labors than they were before taking the course.

We urge the importance of the Mission Study Classes in the Epworth League as a means of cultivating the missionary spirit among our young people, and call your attention to the Summer Conference at Asheville, hoping that many of our pastors will be able to secure the attendance of young people from their charges next year.

"Go Forward" is indispensable to our Methodist homes as a medium of keeping in touch with the great forward movement of our Church.

We are planning to devote the month of March to a Missionary Campaign in the Holston Conference, and have instructed the Conference Missionary Secretary to arrange with the several Presiding Elders to hold their District Institutes in that month. We have secured the services of Dr. J. R. Nelson, Secretary for Home Missions, and George R. Stuart, for this campaign.

We have also requested the Conference Secretary of Missions to arrange for and hold a Missionary Institute in each of our Conference Colleges during the year, if possible.

Our work has prospered greatly the past year—great revivals have been had in nearly every charge helped by this Board, and there has been a large increase in the membership of the Church in them—2,311 conversions have been reported by the pastors.

The provision for Conference Missionary Evangelist by our late General Conference is, as we believe, a step toward the solution of one of the greatest problems of our Church. We have provided for the employment of one man for our Conference and adopted the following policy to govern him and this Board in their relations to each other:

The Conference Missionary Evangelist shall work under the direction of the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Missions, laboring wherever and for such time in each place as they may direct.

It shall be his duty to conduct protracted meetings for pastors of our Conference, preach special missionary sermons, deliver missionary lectures and addresses, hold institutes in the interest of missions, distribute missionary literature, acting as a special agent for "Go Forward" and the books and pamphlets relating to the work of our Church, receive contributions for missions and take collections for the Conference Board of Missions.

The Board of Missions shall pay his expenses and a salary fixed by the Board in monthly installments on draft of the Secretary, to whom he shall report monthly in writing touching such items as the Executive Committee may require.

He shall transmit all money received by him to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Missions, after deducting his necessary expenses for travel, together with a statement of the amount so deducted.

We recommend J. W. Perry for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary.

The General Board has fixed the assessment for our Conference for Foreign Missions at \$12,100. We ask you to give us \$10,000 for the work in our Conference, and have apportioned these sums to the several districts as follows:

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Board of Education has had referred to it reports and communications giving full information concerning the schools and colleges of our entire Church, the lines of work pursued by our General Board and its Correspondence School, and also full information regarding educational legislation by our recent General Conference.

These reports and communications show gratifying growth in the value of our educational plants, endowments and patronage; but no comparisons are instituted with other educational agencies, and it is impossible to know whether relatively considered our Church is waxing or waning as an educational factor.

It is certain that our General Board of Education and its Secretary are growing in efficiency as a connectional agency, that recent legislation has provided for accelerated growth and enlarged usefulness, and in these facts we rejoice.

We would call the attention of our preachers, Sunday School teachers, League leaders, parents and Christian workers generally to the excellent courses of reading and study offered them through the Correspondence School.

The special attention of this Conference is directed to the fact that the assessments for the work of the General Board of Education are combined, increased, and are to be taken separately from the Annual Conference Assessment for its local work and sent directly to the Secretary of Education at Nashville. This assessment is to be known as "The Assessment for Educational Extension," and includes the following items:

(1) The support of the General Board, publications, etc.; (2) The support of the Correspondence School, publications, etc.; (3) The colored work of the Board; (4) The development of education in the pioneer territory of the Church.

The amount of this assessment upon this Conference for these items the present year is \$1,710.

We have had before us reports from all the Colleges and Academies of our Conference, and submit for your information the following statistics as revealing the work and status of these institutions during the past school year:

Recent reports from most of these schools indicate largely increased patronage during the current session and material improvements costing several thousand dollars.

The proposition of Mr. Andrew Carnegie to give \$25,000 to Emory and Henry College so soon as we secure \$75,000 of the amount the Conference proposed to raise two years ago is gratefully acknowledged and its acceptance heartily approved. The proposition of this same gentleman to give to Martha Washington College \$12,500 conditioned upon paying off the debt of \$13,500, and investing \$12,500 in material improvements is also gratefully acknowledged, and its acceptance by the Board of Trust approved; and we approve of the purpose of the Trustees to call upon the friends of this College to aid them in meeting these conditions. But we advise that no special agent be put in the field during the incoming Conference year, and that nothing be done to interfere with the movement heretofore endorsed by the Conference for the betterment of Emory and Henry College; and we direct that the adjustment of all rights and privileges between the representatives of these two colleges shall be made by the Committee of Management of Emory and Henry College.

In view of the marked success of Rev. J. O. Straley in raising funds for Emory and Henry College, we unanimously request his continuance as financial agent of that institution.

We recommend that our Conference Education Assessment be the same as last year, \$3,490; that J. W. Helvey and Marvin G. Maiden be appointed as students in Emory and Henry College, and that the constitution of our Conference Board of Education be so changed as to provide for the appointment of five laymen from the lay delegates in attendance upon each session of the Annual Conference to serve for that year, making the full membership of the Board twenty instead of fifteen.

We further recommend that you authorize the president of each college and academy, together with the Presiding Elder of the District in which each school is located, to name and have published in our Annual the Board of Visitors for each college and academy entitled to such.

We have had reported to us for the acceptance of the Conference a training school at Bull's Gap, Tennessee, known as McKinley Memorial Institute, and recommend that you empower your incoming Board of Education to recognize the same if they find that it meets with the requirements of the Conference touching such schools.

BIBLE BOARD.

We are happy to report that through the regular channels of the patronizing churches and the special effort put forth in the celebration of the 90th anniversary of the organization of the American Bible Society they were enabled to close the fiscal year with a small surplus. They are coming to rely more and more on the regular contributions of the churches than on the spasmodic and irregular contributions and bequests of individuals, thus securing regular help.

Three years ago the present Board took charge of the work. We found the work before had been done in a desultory way. We organized our forces and the following are the results:

We found that the Joint Board in 1902 had made an assessment of \$800, on which about \$600 was collected. We raised the assessment to \$900 and collected between \$900 and \$1,000. The next year we asked for \$1,000, and got about \$900. Last year we asked for \$1,100, and collected \$1,127.46, an increase during the three years of over \$500.

We urge the brethren to take the Bible collection early and be sure to send it to J. E. Swecker, the Treasurer of the new Board, or pay to the Field Agent, Rev. G. D. French. Payments made to others, though they may be authorized agents, confuses our reports.

We have assessed for the American Bible Society for the year 1906-7, \$1,100, the same as last year, and apportion it to the Districts as follows:

MEMOIRS.

JAMES S. KENNEDY.

James S. Kennedy was born in Madison County, Va., December 31, 1826; and died at the home of his son, Mr. E. M. Kennedy, in Knoxville, Tenn., November 19, 1905. His remains rest in the old Gray Cemetery to await the resurrection of the just. His grandfather Kennedy was of Irish blood, and was a soldier during the whole of the war for American independence. His father, too, was an American soldier in the war of 1812, and two of his brothers fought on the side of the South in the sixties. His maternal ancestors were from Bonnie Scotland, she being a Hume. Being so closely related to military people, we are not surprised at his dignified bearing, commanding presence, gentle and chivalric character.

He enlisted as a soldier of the Cross in his sixteenth year, after carefully considering the matter for a year. During his life afterwards he never surrendered his conviction, faltered in his course, or showed fear in the face of any foe. For his deep religious conviction he gave credit to the influence and character of the teacher of a classical school near his father's house.

Soon after his conversion he was made a class leader, then an exhorter, and while engaged in the duties of these offices was profoundly impressed that he ought to preach, but for some time resisted the Spirit because he had chosen another calling. He was accustomed to call this resistance a "sad blunder."

Having yielded, he felt that the obligation was upon him to thoroughly prepare himself for this very responsible work. He set out in January, 1846, and after traveling three hundred miles by stage, reached Emory and Henry College. Here his religious life was deepened by many experiences, and in 1848, while yet a student, he was given license to preach.

In 1849 he graduated, and that fall became principal of the town academy of Cleveland, Tenn. In 1850 he was made a professor in the Strawberry Plains College. In 1851 he became principal of the preparatory department of Randolph-Macon College, and had among his pupils W. W. Duncan, now bishop. In August of this same year he was married to Miss Melinda Williams Stringfield. Their happy union continued until the death of the former, just a few months before the end of his own pilgrimage. To them were born ten children, eight of whom survive, all active members of the Church and two of them missionaries in Brazil.

In the fall of 1852 he joined the Virginia Conference and was appointed to the Randolph-Macon Circuit. His health failed, as he said, "through want of sufficient physical exercise while a student at college." In 1853 his appointment was Smithfield. In 1854 he was sent to Brunswick Circuit, and remained two years, the limit of a pastoral term in that day. He says that while on this charge he witnessed the greatest revival in his whole ministry, scores and scores being converted and joining the Church. In 1856 his appointment was Nottoway Circuit, and in the fall of 1857 he was transferred by Bishop Pierce to the Holston Conference and became President of the Strawberry Plains College.

After two years he resumed pastoral work and served charges as follows: Abingdon District, three years; Wytheville District, two years; Asheville Station, one year; Holston Conference Female College, Asheville, N. C., ten years as President; President of Weaverville College, two years; Asheville District, four years; Knoxville District, three years; Abingdon Station, four years; Saltville, two years; Marion, four years; Fountain City, two years; Johnson City, two years; and in 1898 retired from active work.

He received from Emory and Henry College the degrees of A.B. and A.M., and from Wofford College the degree of D.D., in 1874. He was a

member of four General Conferences—1866, 1874, 1882, and 1894. Whatever he did was ably and well done. He was a scholar of rare merit, a painstaking and accurate student, versatile and entertaining in conversation. As a preacher he was thought-provoking and edifying; as a pastor, systematic, faithful, diligent, and efficient, a gentleman by instinct and practice, genial, companionable, and loveable, a Christian without rebuke, an Israelite in whom there was no guile. A mighty man and a prince is fallen. Among his last utterances in public was this: "I do desire above all things to leave my brethren the inheritance of a good name, without rebuke and without reproach." His life ended peacefully as closes a summer day—nay, beautifully, as dawns the fairest day of spring, for truly he has entered into life.

MRS. JAMES MAHONEY.

Mrs. Maria Mahoney, wife of Rev. James Mahoney, of the Holston Conference, M. E. Church, South, died in great peace at her home at Wallace, Va., February 25, 1906. Her maiden name was McCall. She was born in Burk County, N. C., October 22, 1828. Her father, Alexander McCall, died when she was but a girl, when her mother moved with her family to Washington County, Tenn. She professed religion at Brush Creek camp meeting in 1845. She was very happily married to Rev. James Mahoney May 7, 1848. They were blessed with nine children, two sons and seven daughters. One of the daughters died in 1862. The following children survive her: Mrs. Mary E. Candler, Dillsboro, N. C.; Mrs. Sallie C. Waugh, Todd's Point, Ky.; Mrs. Jennie Mallory, Stevens Creek, Va.; John A. Mahoney, Telford, Tenn.; Thomas F. Mahoney, Norton, Va., and the three daughters at home, Misses Cynthia A., Ellen S., and Laura E. Mahoney.

Brother Mahoney joined the Holston Conference in 1859, and during the forty-two years of effective work in the Conference was cheered and sustained by his loving and faithful wife. Her devotion to the church and to her husband was a constant solace and comfort to him in all the hardships of the itinerant's life. Many of the removals incident to the itinerancy were laborious and expensive; but her patience and courage, coupled with her trust in God, always brought success. The oil frequently got low in the cruse, yet it never failed. Sometimes there was but little meal in the barrel, yet she and her household never went hungry and always had enough left to make a cake for every one of God's prophets who passed her door. She was a lover of hospitality, but took special pleasure in entertaining ministers of the gospel. Her influence was potent for good in every community where she lived.

During the last twenty years of her life she was more or less afflicted. The last nine years of her life she was not able to attend church, which to her was a great privation. During the last weeks of her life, when it was known to her and her family that she would soon be taken from them, it was beautiful to behold the tender solicitude and affection shown by her husband and children. Their refulgence shone in the joy and reflected light in the face of the dying saint. On February 25, 1906, she quietly and sweetly fell asleep in Jesus. Her life was like the rod of Jonathan; it had honey at the end of it. The memory of such a life and such a death is to her children a greater inheritance than all earthly honors and riches.

MRS. JOHN CHRISMOND.

Elizabeth Shannon was born in Burk's Garden, Va., June 6, 1823. She professed faith in Jesus and united with the M. E. Church, South, early in life. She was united in marriage to the Rev. John M. Chrismond in the

year 1849. Sister Chrismond never traveled with her husband, but lived on her farm in Burk's Garden and bore all the responsibility of rearing the children, leaving her husband free to attend to the duties of his ministry, thus making it possible for him to do work which he could not otherwise have done. Especially was this true during the troublous days of the Civil War. The charges served by her husband lost much by not having known this sweet-spirited, intensely Christian woman, but the consecrated lives of her seven children, who lived to manhood and womanhood's estate, stand out as an enduring monument to her life and influence. Six of these—Mrs. Sarah M. Fox, Mrs. Mary A. Mahood, W. Brown Chrismond, Mrs. Lizzie E. Wynn, Anna E. Wynn and Emile V. Snyder—survive her, while George and Charles, who died in infancy, with Mrs. L. Jane McGuire, of Cedar Bluff, Va., had preceded her to the spirit world.

Since the death of her husband in 1875, Sister Chrismond was not a pensioner of the Church, but made her home with her daughters, Mrs. Mahood and Mrs. Anna E. Wynn. She was a great sufferer during the last years of her life, but bore her suffering with patience and resignation. Her physician said of all the patients he ever treated, she was the best. She expected her pastor often, and always talked of his work and the interests of the Church she so dearly loved, always saying, "I am praying for your meetings." An hour with her was an inspiration and benediction. The very atmosphere about her was surcharged with spirituality. Truly a Mother in Isreal has gone to her reward. For several days she hung at the very gates of death, unconscious the greater part of the time, only to arouse at intervals and talk of her Savior and speak words of comfort and advice to her children. In the early morning of March 19, 1906, she fell asleep triumphant over death and the grave. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."

The funeral was conducted by her pastor from the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. F. Wynn, the following day, and the remains were laid to rest in the family cemetery.

"Thou hast gone to yonder city
Where no mortal feet have trod;
Thou hast gone to be with Jesus,
In the city of our God.

Thou hast gone to yonder city,
Gone, eternal joys to share;
But sometimes at Heaven's portal
Look for us, we'll meet thee there.

Thou hast gone to yonder city,
Gone, the ransomed hosts to swell;
We shall meet thee in the morning;
Until then, we say farewell."

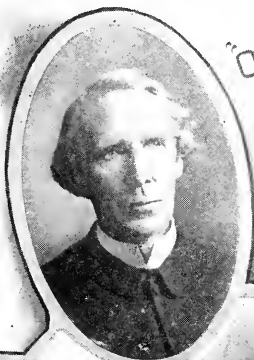

Thus early placing her hand in that of her Lord's, walking in His footsteps, and faithfully heeding His loving counsel, she was exalted into an experience untrammelled by doubts or beclouded by uncertainties. Her Christian integrity and motherly kindness were but characteristics of her love for Christ, whom she delighted to confess as Lord and Master.

In the year 1847 she was happily married to Fleming D. Crumley, who later became a member of Holston Conference. This happy union was blessed with seven children, five of whom survive to mourn the loss of a

tender and loving mother. Their itinerancy embraced a period of thirty-seven years, during which time they served seventeen charges.

Firm in convictions, and unswerving in faith she became a strong assistant to her husband, alternately encouraging him under trials and through vicissitudes, and sharing with him the many blessings incident to faithful itinerant service. She never complained, but was resigned to the will of her Master. As the wife of an itinerant preacher, she submitted to the wisdom and judgment of superiors in office. She was a good mother. She was much loved. She loved and defended the Church.

Since September 4, 1897, she met life's stern realities without the aid of him by whose side she had walked for fifty years. During her widowhood of more than eight years she was affectionately received and cared for in the homes of her children. The last three years of her life were spent in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Melvina McConnell, near Nickelsville, Va. Here I was first privileged to meet with this mother in Israel. I remember, with pleasure, her manifestations of loyalty to the worthy cause she had espoused. She often spoke of the Church and Church responsibilities. She remained a subscriber to her Church paper until death. She always called for a copy of THE HOLSTON ANNUAL, from which she could ascertain the location of ministers, and reports of their labors; thus keeping in pleasant remembrance former friends and their labors in which she took delight.

Disease and intense sufferings kept pressing their deadly work until March 26, 1906, she succumbed to death's merciless intrusion. She bore her sufferings with Christian patience and fortitude. Truly the righteous die not. She sweetly fell on sleep, resting her soul on the bosom of Jesus. She left no patrimony, but a rich heritage—a Christian character pointing heavenward. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

Some of her last words were: "I'm ready to die; I do not fear death; I want to go." To her daughter she said: "I'll soon be with your pa. Don't wonder and grieve after me. I'll soon be out of my sufferings."

Quietly and tenderly we placed her body away to rest, yet in our hearts we sing:

"Thou art gone to the grave, we no longer behold thee,
Nor tread the rough paths of the world by thy side;
But the wide arms of mercy are spread to enfold thee,
And sinners may hope, since the Sinless hath died.

Thou art gone to the grave; but we will not deplore thee,
Whose God was thy ransom, thy guardian, thy guide;
He gave thee, He took thee, and He will restore thee;
And Death has no sting, for the Savior has died."

MRS. R. K. TRIPLETT.

Birdie Nett Wardell was born in Knoxville, Tenn., January 7, 1882. Here she was educated in the city schools and grew to young womanhood. When seven years of age she was converted in the First Baptist Church and joined the Centennial Baptist Church of her native city. On November 11, 1902, she was married to Rev. R. K. Triplett, who was then the pastor of Highland Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of the same city. In the Erlanger Hospital, in Chattanooga, Tenn., at 6:15 Friday morning, February 23, she peacefully breathed her last breath and went home to be with God.

On the Sunday after her marriage to Brother Triplett she united with the Church of which he was the pastor, and the life and work of a Methodist preacher's wife began. In this delicate and difficult relation she ever sought to properly adjust herself and to fully discharge every duty. She had

convictions of right which made her strong; at the same time she was gentle and tactful, which made her useful and popular. When I was present in the Sunday school of Hill City it gave me great pleasure to witness the interest which she had in her large Sunday school class and also the class's interest in her. In the Epworth League she was elected to probably its most difficult office—that of the Third Vice President—which made her the head of the Literary Department. All who have had experience with Epworth Leagues and young people's societies know how difficult it is to succeed in getting the young people interested in the study of the Bible and solid, helpful literature. She was successful in an unusual degree. She was also a member of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society and of the Home Mission Society. In the work of both of these organizations she was reliable—always to be depended upon.

She was domestic in her tastes, loving not only her husband and his work, but also his home. Her house was well kept, and she gave to it the charm of a genuine hospitality. Its monotonous duties—the duties which repeat themselves every day, and therefore become hard to perform—were made light by reason of her love for her home.

She was a bright, sensible, practical woman—at the core of her life sound and pure. She was modest, unassuming, industrious, and helpful in all the relationships in which she found herself. A humble and devoted disciple of her Lord and Saviour, she was an eager student of the Word of God, and an interested reader of good books, even joining her husband in the study of books dealing with problems of theology and philosophy. She was a kind neighbor, a pleasant companion, a dutiful daughter, a loyal Church member, a true friend, a devoted wife, and an earnest Christian.

Sister Triplett for some months suffered from an organic stomach trouble; indeed, for years she was in rather delicate health, but always so bright and cheerful and so free from the complaining habit that we did not realize how serious was her condition. On the afternoon on which she went to the hospital (her physician having decided that an operation was necessary) I went to see her. I found her suffering and weak, but calm and of good cheer. We talked over the situation, and when I arose to leave I took her by the hand and said: "Sister Triplett, the Bible says the steps of a good man are ordered of the Lord, and I think that is doubly true of a good woman." She smiled as she said, "Whichever way it goes, I shall be satisfied." That was the last time I saw her. I do not know that I understood the expression on her face, but I took it to mean, as she looked into my eyes, that she felt that she was telling me good-by. I went away to my appointment with a heavy heart, but so good was the news after the operation that I dismissed my heaviness of heart and rejoiced in the prospect of her speedy recovery. But I believe now, being close to the silent sea, she heard the muffled oar. But thank God! she knew

"No harm from him could come to her,
On ocean or on shore."

On Thursday she was considered practically out of danger, and the day for her return to her home was set. Late in the afternoon unfavorable symptoms began to appear—the heart was weakening, and there was no satisfactory response to the stimulants administered by the skillful physician. She realized her condition, and told her loved ones she was going to leave them. She gave directions as to her funeral and burial and asked her mother and husband to kiss her good-by, and then she said, "Jesus is with me." With her hand in the hand of her husband, and with a smile upon her lips, she passed behind the veil.

The news of her going away from us surprised and shocked us all. The throngs at the parsonage and the crowded church in Hill City at an early hour attest her place in all our hearts. Flowers woven into such beautiful shapes and designs are but faint tokens of our appreciation of her life; and while they will wither and their rich aroma will pass away, the

memories of her sweet face, her cheerful spirit, and her tender love will live on through the coming years. Good-by, dear sister, until we shall see you again in the realms of light, "where those long parted shall meet again, and those who meet shall part no more."

Her life was enough, had she left no words of comfort. Her trust in the Saviour had been unfaltering, and the blessed sense of his presence and sustaining power and grace in her last hours was vivid and very full of comfort. Her dying testimony to the saving power of her blessed Lord will long linger in the hearts of her husband, children, and friends. The last words spoken to her husband were: "Dear, I want to take you in my arms." As the two little ones were lifted up to her, she kissed them and said: "You dear, sweet darlings!" Later, "I am slipping away;" and again, "I will soon be at rest," and sweetly passed away. She had only to close her eyes and fall asleep in the arms of Jesus, our Saviour. From the arms of her husband she went to the arms of the blessed Master.

Thus passed away at 5 p. m., Sunday, July 22, one of our best women. The writer, assisted by Rev. J. F. Jones, conducted the funeral services at the parsonage in Dickensonville on Monday afternoon at two o'clock, and she was laid to rest at Emory and Henry College Tuesday, July 24. May God sustain and comfort her bereaved husband, children and friends!
