After all these years and for many more to come, Mount Olive College is still a special place. It becomes a vital part of the future of those here and adds dimen-


sion to their lives. So here we endeavor to capture the memories for administration, faculty, staff and students and all those whose lives are touched by MOC.





## A Great Way of Learning

College is not only for those who have just graduated from high school, but it is also for those adults who want to further their education. It was because of this need that Mount Olive College applied for an extension of the college on Seymour Johnson Air Force Base. The idea was to provide an education for military personnel and those in the surrounding area who wanted to obtain a college degree. The extension is directed by Mr. Donald Leacott and his two assistants, Sandra White and Dee Bolender. The program is designed so that a student can receive a B.A.S. or B.S. in Business. After this, a student will have the courses needed to continue their education in a graduate program. While the business degree is the dominate course of study, there are other courses offered. Many students from the main campus often attend classes on the base because of the length of the course or because it might help to satisfy a humanities requirement. The program is divided into five sessions a year; two in the fall, two in the spring and one in the summer. Each session is nine weeks long and the average class meets twice a week for about two-and-a-half hours. The number of students who attend the college extension program has grown each year. There have been many hours of planning and organizing spent on this program and it has proven to be very successful. This year has seen a record attendance of 550, which is close to that of the main campus. The Mount Olive College extension is similar to that of a "mini college" or a junior college and has much to offer those who have attended and those who plan to attend in the future.
















