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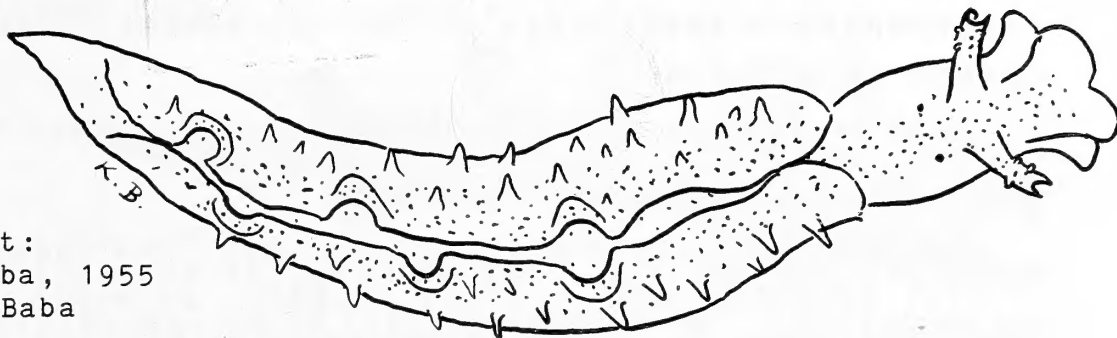


Illustration at right:

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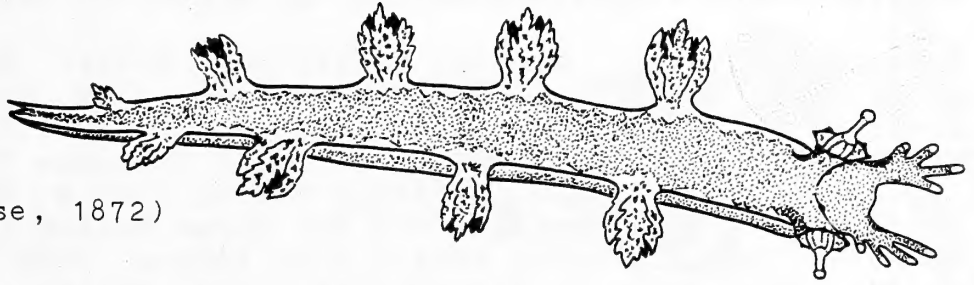


Illustration at right:

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BOOK REVIEW:

Pacific Coast Nudibranchs, A Guide to the Opisthobranchs of the Northeastern Pacific. by David W. Behrens.

At last, a full color guide to the opisthobranchs of the Pacific Coast! Dave Behrens has done a remarkable job putting this guide together and Dan Gotshall has provided excellent printing and composition. I am so happy to see color photographs of all these animals together in one book that almost anything else could be forgiven.

In fact, I have almost nothing to complain about. The nomenclature is right up to 1980 in every situation I am aware of. The color is great and that is approaching a miracle. Some of the original slides were my own and the color rendition is perfect. The focus is out a minute amount on one or two of the photos but would not be noticed by other than the original photographer.

One thing galls me about this book -- common names for animals which have no common names. It would be as useful to number them from one to two hundred. When will publishers give up this practice???

I hope that the inclusion of 25 undescribed species will spur the authors to finalize their descriptions and get them published. This book is fantastic and looking at it is almost as much fun as attending one of the [in]famous brancher's slide shows at the WSM meetings or the like.
