OUR TRADE WITH JAPAN, CHINA, AND HONGKONG, 1889-1899.

GROWTH OF THE TRADE.

One of the most striking features of the foreign trade growth recently enjoyed by the United States has been the wonderful development of the commerce with Japan and China. During the fiscal year 1899 the value of the merchandise exchanged with these two countries, including the port of Hongkong, reached as high as \$87,305,688. These figures were decidedly in excess of any previous record. The value for 1889, ten years before, was little more than half as large, amounting to only \$46,294,167. The four years following 1889 witnessed a steady increase that finally culminated in 1893 with a record of \$60,281,386, the highest up to that time. In the fiscal year 1894, during which our importations were greatly curtailed as a result of the prevailing financial depression, the trade dropped to \$51,513,149. During 1895 there was a recovery to \$57,509,859, and for each subsequent year the returns showed an important increase. The value amounted in 1896 to \$68,281,985, in 1897 to \$76,577,410, and in 1898 to \$82,943,077, while in 1899 the record-breaking figures already quoted were reported.

Of the \$37,305,688 valuation placed upon our trade with Japan, China, and Hongkong during 1899, \$47,815,035 represented the imports into the United States and \$39,490,653 the exports from this country. The excess of imports over exports amounted to \$8,324,382. Formerly the excess was much larger, as, for instance, in 1889, when the imports were valued at \$35,196,670 and the exports at \$11,097,497, a difference of \$24,099,173.

By comparing the figures for 1889 and 1899 it will be seen that the exports have increased much more rapidly than the imports. In the decade ending with 1899 there was a gain of \$28,393,156, or 256 per cent, in exportation, while the increase in importation amounted to only \$12,618,365, or 36 per cent. During the last few years, in fact, the imports disclosed an actual falling off, the value for 1899 being \$1,164,131 less than that for 1896, which was recorded at \$48,979,166. Our exports, on the other hand, amounting to \$19,302,819 in 1896, were more than doubled during the next three years, showing a gain of \$20,187,834.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE TRADE AMONG JAPAN, CHINA, AND HONGKONG.

The commerce carried on with Japan during 1899 amounted in value to \$43,981,181, and was slightly larger than the combined trade with China and Hongkong, which had a value of \$43,324,507. Of the trade recorded with Hongkong, amounting to \$10,211,799, a considerable portion should undoubtedly be credited to China. The value of the direct trade with China was \$33,112,708.

TRADE WITH JAPAN.

During the years 1889-1899 our trade with Japan showed an increase of \$22,673,204. The imports advanced from \$16,687,992 to \$26,716,493, and the exports from \$4,619,985 to \$17,264,688. In the last few years there was a remarkable growth of exports. From \$7,689,685 in 1896, the value of exported merchandise rose to \$13,255,478 in 1897, and to \$20,388,420 in 1898. The value for 1899, \$17,264,688, although somewhat less than that for 1898, was larger than any previous record.

TRADE WITH CHINA.

In our commerce with China during 1889–1899 there was a gain of \$13,293,168. The increase occurred almost entirely in the export trade, which advanced from \$2,791,128 in 1889 to \$14,493,440 in 1899. Our imports for 1899, amounting to \$18,619,268, were only slightly larger than in 1889, when a value of \$17,028,412 was reported. The exports to China, like those to Japan, showed an exceptional growth in 1897, 1898, and 1899, the records for these years being \$11,924,433, \$9,992,894, and \$14,493,440, respectively.

TRADE WITH HONGKONG.

Our trade with the port of Hongkong, although less important than that credited directly to China, was nearly doubled during 1889–1899, making a gain of \$5,045,149. The exports for 1899 had a value of \$7,732,525 as compared with only \$3,686,384 for 1889. The imports were considerably smaller and showed marked fluctuations. In 1889 they were valued at \$1,480,266, but these figures were not equaled again until 1899, when a value of \$2,479,274 was recorded.

GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE EXPORTS TO JAPAN, CHINA, AND HONGKONG.

Of the domestic merchandise shipped from the United States to Japan, China, and Hongkong during the fiscal year 1898^{1} nearly 40 per cent consisted of agricultural products. In 1889, the first year of the decade, products of the farm constituted only about 25 per cent. Proportionately the agricultural exports have increased even more rapidly than the nonagricultural. In 1898 they attained a value of \$14,356,614, as against \$2,782,914 in 1889. This remarkable growth occurred chiefly during the four years 1895–1898. The value for 1894 was only \$3,601,140.

From these statistics it will be seen that the principal gain in agricultural exports occurred in the shipments to Japan, which advanced from \$300,609 in 1889 to \$8,969,816 in 1898. The sum quoted for the former year constituted only 6.5 per cent of the value of the total exports to Japan, while that for 1898 formed about 44 per cent.

The agricultural exports to China, although much smaller than those to Japan, likewise made a noticeable gain during the decade, the value for 1898 amounting to \$695,549 as compared with only \$108,757 for 1889. The part of our total shipments to China formed by products of the farm was inconsiderable, averaging less than 5 per cent for the ten years. During the latter half of the decade, however, the percentage of agricultural exports showed a material increase.

In the exports to Hongkong farm products comprised the principal part, forming about 65 per cent of the total in 1889, and increasing to 75 per cent in 1898. The value advanced from \$2,373,548 in the former year to \$4,691,249 in the latter.

LEADING EXPORTS.

Our exports to Japan, China, and Hongkong consist largely of five leading items—cotton, cotton manufactures, kerosene oil, wheat flour, and manufactures of iron and steel. In 1898 these five items formed nearly 80 per cent of the total exports to the three destinations mentioned, their combined value amounting to \$28,859,635. Of this sum \$14,923,371 represented the shipments to Japan, \$8,889,374 those to China, and $$^{5},046,890$ those to Hongkong.

COTTON.

Raw cotton was the most important of the five items mentioned. It went chiefly to Japan, our exports to that country in 1898 amounting to 112,106,823 pounds, with a value of \$7,428,226. China took 5,650,856 pounds, worth \$370,670, and Hongkong 900,000 pounds, worth \$72,000. The total shipments to the three destinations during 1898 reached as high as 118,657,679 pounds, valued at \$7,870,896. These figures represent the remarkable trade development of a single decade, for prior to 1889 there were no records of cotton exports to Japan, China, or Hongkong. During that year 23,500 pounds, valued at \$2,341, were sent to Japan, but no shipments to China were recorded until 1892, and none to Hongkong until 1898. The exports to Japan alone increased more than 100,000,000 pounds during the five years 1894–1898.

The following table shows the quantity and value of cotton exported from the United States to Japan, China, and Hongkong from 1889 to 1898, inclusive:

COTTON MANUFACTURES.

The exports of cotton manufactures were consigned largely to Chinese ports. The shipments to Japan and Hongkong in 1898 were valued at only \$63,367 and \$40,458, respectively, as compared with \$5,203,427 for China. The total exports to the three destinations were worth \$5,307,252.

KEROSENE OIL.

After raw cotton, our chief article of export to Japan, China, and Hongkong is kerosene oil. During the ten years 1889–1898, the total shipments increased from 49,360,860 gallons to 111,582,814 gallons, and their value from \$4,617,863 to \$7,398,449. Of the exports for 1898, 51,621,050 gallons, worth \$3,592,587, went to Japan; 44,324,344 gallons, worth \$2,839,345, to China; and 15,637,420 gallons, worth \$966,517, to Hongkong.

WHEAT FLOUR.

Our exports of wheat flour to each of the three destinations under consideration were greatly increased during the ten years. The consignments to Hongkong in 1898 amounted to 939,053 barrels, as against only 378,634 barrels in 1889, while the shipments to Japan during the same period rose from 19,677 barrels to 161,654 barrels, and the exports to China from 9,744 barrels to 19,609 barrels. The combined shipments show an increase from 408,055 barrels, valued at \$1,746,622, in 1889, to 1,120,316 barrels, valued at \$4,569,071, in 1898.

IRON AND STEEL MANUFACTURES.

The various manufactures of iron and steel sent from the United States to Japan, China, and Hongkong in 1898 had a total value of \$3,713,967 as compared with only \$518,712 in 1889. The increase occurred chiefly during the three years 1896, 1897, and 1898. Japan was the principal market. Of the exports recorded for 1898 the consignments to Japan were valued at \$3,195,152, those to China at \$386,627, and those to Hongkong at \$132,188.

AGBIOULTUBAL EXPORTS TO JAPAN.

As has already been pointed out, our shipments of agricultural produce to Japan during 1898 amounted in value to \$8,969,816, form-

ing about 44 per cent of the total exports to that country. After cotton and wheat flour, the most important items, in the order of their value for 1898, were alcohol, leaf tobacco, milk, salted or pickled beef, wheat, canned beef, bones, butter, wine, and canned fruits.

Although cotton manufactures, kerosene oil, manufactures of iron and steel, and tobacco manufactures formed such a large part of our nonagricultural exports to China in 1898, there were numerous other items of considerable value, among the most important being lumber, unmanufactured iron and steel, paper and its manufactures, scientific and electric apparatus, vehicles, cycles, manufactures of wood, and lubricating oil.

AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS TO HONGKONG.

After wheat flour, which is decidedly the leading factor in our export trade with Hongkong, ginseng formed the principal item among the agricultural products shipped to that port during 1898. The other agricultural exports of chief importance were cotton, canned fruits, malt liquors, canned beef, wheat, and cheese.

NONAGRICULTURAL EXPORTS TO HONGKONG.

Among the nonagricultural exports to Hongkong in 1898, kerosene oil was by far the most important article. The items that came next in value were fish and fish products, and manufactures of iron and steel. Other items of considerable importance were tobacco manufactures, cotton manufactures, lubricating oil, perfumery and cosmetics, lumber, and manufactures of wood.

GAINS IN OUR EXPORTS TO JAPAN, CHINA, AND HONGKONG.

It is within the last five years that the most striking gains have occurred in our exports to Japan, China, and Hongkong. From 1894 to 1898 the value of the domestic merchandise sent from the United States to these three destinations showed an increase of \$22,532,373, or more than 150 per cent. The items that contributed most to this increase were cotton, cotton manufactures, iron and steel manufactures, wheat flour, and kerosene oil. The exports of raw cotton rose from \$360,492 in 1894 to \$7,870,896 in 1898, and the exports of cotton manufactures during the same period from \$2,921,236 to \$5,307,252, the gain for these two items alone amounting to nearly \$10,000,000. In the exports of iron and steel manufactures there was an increase from \$407,579 to \$3,713,967. The shipments of wheat flour advanced from \$2,098,240 to \$4,569,071, and the shipments of kerosene oil from \$5,664,531 to \$7,398,449.

PRINCIPAL GAINS IN OUR EXPORTS TO JAPAN.

A comparison of our domestic exports to Japan alone in 1894 and 1898 shows a gain of \$16,373,312, most of which occurred in the items of cotton, iron and steel manufactures, crude iron and steel, and kerosene oil. Exports of cotton from the United States to Japan were first recorded in 1889, the shipments for that year having a value of The trade grew with great rapidity, the value of the exports \$2,341. increasing to \$360,492 in 1894 and to \$7,428,226 in 1898. The gain during the last five years amounted to \$7,067,734. In the value of the iron and steel manufactures exported there was an advance from \$218,711 in 1894 to \$3,195,152 in 1898, an increase of \$2,976,441. Of unmanufactured iron and steel no exports were recorded for 1894. In 1895 there was an item of \$3,335, but in 1898 the shipments under this head had increased to \$1,793,284. The exports of kerosene oil showed a gain of \$1,383,517 during the five years, advancing from \$2,209,070 to \$3,592,587.

After the four items mentioned, the most important gains in our exports to Japan from 1894 to 1898 were the following: Paper and its manufactures, \$488,687; wheat flour, \$432,460; alcohol, \$316,787; tobacco manufactures, \$303,332; leather, \$234,323; lubricating oil, \$205,359; leaf tobacco, \$196,216; scientific and electric instruments and apparatus, \$195,597; and watches, \$109,496. PRINCIPAL GAINS IN OUR EXPORTS TO CHINA.

The increase in our domestic exports to China during 1894–1898 amounted to \$4,133,582. More than half of this gain occurred in the shipments of cotton manufactures, which showed an increase of \$2,349,206, the value for 1898 amounting to \$5,203,427, as compared with only \$2,854,221 for 1894. Although small exports of raw cotton to China were recorded in 1892, none were reported in 1893, 1894, and 1895, and the first exportation of any considerable importance was that for 1898, amounting in value to \$370,670. In the shipments of kerosene oil, which formed the most important item after cotton manufactures, there was an advance from \$2,435,794 to \$2,839,345, making a gain of \$403,551. Other leading examples of increase for 1894–1898 were: Iron and steel manufactures, \$321,931; tobacco manufactures, \$210,365; and lumber, \$113,136.

The important gains made in our exports to China during 1898, as compared with 1894, will be seen from the table following:

PRINCIPAL GAINS IN OUR EXPORTS TO HONGKONG.

Our domestic exports to Hongkong in 1898 showed a gain of \$2,025,479 as compared with 1894. The increase was due chiefly to larger shipments of wheat flour, the exports of this article advancing from \$1,809,319 in 1894 to \$3,835,727 in 1898. Kerosene oil, which was the second item in value, exhibited a slight falling off, but the losses in this and several other commodities were more than offset by the gains reported. The increase in wheat flour alone amounted to \$2,026,408. The first recorded exports of raw cotton to Hongkong occurred during 1898, the value being \$72,000. These shipments were probably destined to China. The exports of ginseng showed a gain of \$63,154, increasing from \$538,339 to \$601,493. Among the other instances of increase during 1894-1898 were: Cotton manufactures, \$23,914; lubricating oil, \$20,929; malt liquors, \$20,841; and wheat, \$10,415.

GENERAL CHARACTER OF THE IMPORTS FROM JAPAN. CHINA, AND HONGKONG.

About four-fifths of the merchandise imported into the United States from Japan, China, and Hongkong during the ten years 1889–1898 consisted of products of agriculture. In 1898 our agricultural imports from these sources were valued at \$38,843,236 and our nonagricultural imports at \$7,453,327.

The following statement of values permits a comparison of our agricultural and nonagricultural imports from Japan, China, and Hong. kong for each of the ten fiscal years 1889–1898:

Agricultural products naturally form a larger portion of the imports from China than of those from Japan. In 1898 nonagricultural commodities comprised less than 10 per cent of our imports from the former country, and slightly more than 20 per cent of our imports from the latter. Of our imports from Hongkong in 1898 over 40 per cent consisted of nonagricultural articles.

LEADING IMPORTS.

Silk and tea form the principal part of the imports received in our trade with Japan, China, and Hongkong. During the fiscal year 1898 these two items amounted in value to about 70 per cent of the total importations from the sources mentioned. The silk imports for that year were valued at \$23,959,935, and the tea imports at \$8,896,836. Silk comes in largest quantities from Japan, while tea is received most extensively from China. The small consignments of these products recorded as from Hongkong are undoubtedly reshipments of goods coming originally from Japan and China.

IMPORTS FROM JAPAN.

Our imports of raw silk from Japan in 1898 were valued at \$16,453,406, and our imports of silk manufactures at \$2,068,668. Tea was imported to the value of \$3,045,079. Straw matting formed an item of considerable importance, the value amounting to \$903,747. Other leading imports from Japan during 1898, with their values, were: Rice, \$399,652; earthen, stone, and china ware, \$313,712; camphor, \$286,191; hat materials, \$207,820; paper and its manufactures, \$199,556; fans, \$151,822; sulphur, \$146,813; vegetable-fiber manufactures, \$136,153; wood manufactures, \$104,005; and brushes, \$101,256.

IMPORTS FROM CHINA.

From China raw silk was imported in 1898 to the value of \$7,506,409. The imports of silk manufactures were comparatively small, amounting to only \$135,906. The value of the Chinese tea imported reached as high as \$5,827,177. After silk and tea, the largest imports were wool, and hides and skins, the former item having a value of \$1,564,803 and the latter one of \$1,210,788. Other items of considerable importance among our imports from China, with their values for 1898, were the following: Opium, \$650,644; hat materials, \$632,065; rice, \$557,163; straw matting, \$350,379; furs, and manufactures of, \$206,953; spices, \$187,027; sugar, \$176,751; firecrackers. \$141,132; bristles, \$122,244; silk waste, \$106,144; and vegetable oils, \$100,129.

IMPORTS FROM HONGKONG.

Among the commodities imported from Hongkong during 1898 straw matting and sugar were the leading items. The imports of straw matting were valued at \$163,713, and the sugar imports at \$107,295. It is probable that the matting came chiefly from China, while the sugar was presumably of Philippine origin. It is also apparent that a large part of the remaining imports from Hongkong should be credited to other sources, that port being primarily a point of reshipment. After matting and sugar, the most important imports in 1898, with their values, were as follows: Vegetable oils, \$77,476; rice, \$58,095; spices, \$48,689; Manila hemp, \$31,459; vegetable-fiber manufactures, \$25,082; tea, \$24,580; firecrackers, \$19,816; camphor, \$17,827; coffee, \$13,841; and silk manufactures, \$12,383.


