### INTRODUCTORY NOTE

THE Parlins are from the Highland Scotch.

"The Scottish Highlanders are the remnant of the great Celtic race which remained untouched by the Roman and Saxon invasions on the south, and the Danes on the east and west of the country, and they were the last to oppose with perfect success the otherwise conquering arms of Rome.

"When, in the year 81 of the Christian era, Agricola invaded North Britain, it was inhabited by twenty-one aboriginal tribes or clans.

"The introduction of clanships and tartans seems beyond the reach of history, but in more modern times the following references may be quoted. In 1640, General Leslie states that the Highlanders under his command were composed of men of the same name or clan. . . . . When the last hope of the restoration of the Stewart dynasty was extinguished at Culloden,

'Culloden which reeks with the blood of the brave,'

the influence of the clans was greatly weakened, and by the making of military roads through the Highlands by General Wade, the face of the country and the habits of the people have been completely changed. Yet when time shall have drawn its veil over the past as over the present, when the *last* broadsword shall have been broken on the anvil, and the shreds of the *last* plaid been tossed by the

winds upon the cairn, or bleached within the raven's nest, posterity may look back with regret to a people who have so marked the history, the poetry and the achievements of distant ages, and who, in the ranks of the British army, have stood foremost in the line of battle, and given place to none."\*

Origin of the Surname Parlin. — One is naturally curious to know the origin of his family name, and this curiosity increases as soon as he begins to study his family history and genealogy.

All authorities agree that the Scottish Highland Clan Pharlane, or Mac Farlane, derived its name from the chief Parlan, who lived during the reign of King David Bruce, and who was a descendant from the ancient Celtic Earls of the district to which the clan belonged (the Lennox), and from King Kenneth III. The story is recorded about as follows:—

"Aluin or Alcuin was a younger son of Kenneth III, king of Scotland, who died in the year 994. From this Aluin descended in a direct male line Arkil, who was contemporary with King Edgar and King Alexander I, and seems to have been a person of considerable note in both these reigns.

"His son and successor, called also Aluin, next Earl of Lennox, was a liberal benefactor to the Church. This Earl Aluin left two sons, — Malduin, his successor in the earldom, and Gilchrist, ancestor to the laird of MacFarlane. Malduin was succeeded by his son Malcolm, and he again by a son Malcolm, who was father to Donald, the last Earl of Lennox of that family, because there was no son to succeed Donald, so the male descendants of Gilchrist continued the line.

"Gilchrist, ancestor to the laird of MacFarlane, obtained a tract of land by grant of his brother Malduin. This tract is very particularly bounded in the original charter, and was afterwards confirmed in the records of the privy seal; and these lands of Arrochar, obtained about the year 1200 in the reign of William the Lion, con-

tinued with his posterity, in a direct male line. 'The wild Mac-Farlane's plaided clan' occupied the land forming the western shore of Loch Lomond from Tarbet upwards.

"Gilchrist left a son Duncan, designated in old charters as Duncan Filius Gilchrist or MacGilchrist. Duncan married his own cousin Matilda, daughter of the Earl of Lennox, by whom he had a son Maldonich or Malduin.

"Malduin's son and successor was Partholan or Parlan, from whose proper name the family obtained the patronymical surname of Mac-Parlan, or Pharlane, or Parlan-sons, from which MacFarlane was derived, the letters P and F being easily convertible in Gaelic. For three generations before assuming the name Pharlane or MacFarlane these people were surnamed MacGilchrists, from MacGilchrist already mentioned.

"Parlan was succeeded by his son, Malcolm MacPharlane or MacParlan, who got a charter from Donald, Earl of Lennox, upon the resignation of his father, Parlan, son of Malduin, wherein he is confirmed in the lands of Arrochar, formerly called the Carrocate of MacGilchrist, together with four Isles in Loch Lomond, called Island-Vow, Island-Vanow, Island-Rowglass and Clang, for four merks  $(27\frac{1}{2}$  cents  $x \neq \$1.10$ ) of few-duty and service to the king's host. A later charter discharged him and his heirs of the four merks and few-duty both for byganes (the past) and the time to come. This last charter is dated at Bellach, May 4, 1354.

"To Malcolm succeeded his son Duncan, sixth laird of MacParlan, Pharlane, or MacFarlane, who obtained from Duncan, Earl of Lennox, a charter of the lands of Arrochar, which is dated at Inchmirin in the year 1395. The lands of Arrochar are situated in the northwest of Dumbartonshire.

"The direct male line of these ancient chiefs failed, and their estates were finally forfeited. The last named Duncan, laird of MacParlan, Pharlane or MacFarlane, married Christian Campbell, daughter of Sir Colin Campbell of Lochow, sister to Duncan, first Lord Campbell, ancestor to the Duke of Argyle."

In the sixteenth century the MacParlan, Pharlane or MacFarlane clan was strongly Protestant, and when Queen Mary escaped from prison, collected an army and attempted to re-establish her church, the MacFarlanes opposed her.

"In 1624 many of the clan were driven out of Arrochar and went to Aberdeenshire, where many of them assumed other names. The last descendant of the chiefs is said to have come to America, and his house of Arrochar became the property of the Duke of Argyle, and was long used as an inn for travellers from Tarbet, Glencroe and Inverary.

"The ancient Scottish territory Lennox comprised the basin of the Seven and Loch Lomond, the whole of Dumbartonshire, the greater part of Stirlingshire, and portions of Perth and Renfrew shires. It gave name to the earldom of Lennox from 1174 to 1581, and then to a dukedom conferred by Charles II, in 1680, on one of his illegitimate sons, Charles, Duke of Richmond and Lennox, who in 1702 sold the Lennox estates to the Marquis of Montrose."

The foregoing account was taken largely from William Buchanan's "An Inquiry into the Genealogy and Present State of Ancient Scottish Surnames."

Skene gives the name of the clan as Pharlan, and says:—"This clan is the only one, with the exception, perhaps, of the clan Donnachie, whose descent from the ancient earls of the district in which their possessions lay can be proved by charter, and it can be shown in the clearest manner that their ancestor was Gilchrist, brother of Maldowen, the third Earl of Lennox. Gilchrist had a son Duncan; from a grandson of Duncan, termed Bartholomew, or in Gaelic Parlan, the clan took their surname." Strictly speaking, the clan name was Pharlane and the chief's was MacFarlane.

The Pharlane or MacFarlane Arms. — The armorial device of the clan, like all the earlier heraldic bearings, is very simple, indicating their connection with the ancient Earls of Lennox, as traced on a preceding page, whose "coat" it closely follows, inasmuch as the Earl for the time being was regarded as the head of the family. The

chief difference between the blazons is found in the edge or border of the principal charge, which is a saltire, "an honorable ordinary called by Scottish heralds the cross of St. Andrew," well known as the patron saint of that kingdom.

John Guillim, one of the Pursuivants of Arms in the Heralds' College, and regarded as a high authority in his day, published a work on the "gentle science" at London, in 1724, entitled "A Display of Heraldry," from which (pp. 121, 122) we quote the following description of the Lennox arms: - "Argent, a saltire wavy between four roses gules, seeded and barbed proper." The reader who may not be familiar with heraldic terms will perhaps be glad to have this blazon explained in modern English. The field of the shield is argent (silver or white), on which is the saltire with wavy or undulating edges; in each of the triangular spaces which surround it is a rose; these and the saltire are gules (red); between the five petals of the roses are "barbs" vert (green), representing somewhat fancifully the green leaves which enclose the bud; "seeded or" (gold) means that the stamens are golden or yellow; when the barbs and seeds are thus shown, the rose is said to be in its "proper" or natural colors.

From Guillim we further learn that the arms as above described were "Borne by Edward Nappier, Esq., of *Halywell* in the North Suburbs of *Oxon*, who dy'd the 26th of Feb., 1654, aged 57." They were confirmed to Sir Robert Napier of Luton Hoo, by William Seger, Sir Robert having established his descent from the ancient Earls of Lennox; but as he bore them, the border of the saltire was not wavy but "engrailed," that is, edged with small semi-circles, the points of juncture of which turned in, not outward. The barbed roses and the engrailed saltire seem to have been used by the Napiers, and as thus modified they are found in the first and fourth quarters of the arms of the Napier-Ettrick branch of the family at the present time.

The Lennoxes of Woodhead, as Guillim tells us, bore the saltire with plain edge (not wavy) and the four roses, while the Macferlans

(as he spells the family name) of Kerton bore "Argent, a saltire waved between four roses gules," as in the engraving. Some of the old heralds used the word "cantoned" to indicate the arrangement of the roses in the spaces about the saltire; we have followed the language of Guillim.

The Crest, which is not mentioned by that authority, is a demisavage holding a sheaf of arrows in his right hand and pointing with his left to an imperial crown. (The tinctures or colors are not stated by our informant.) A reference to the engraving will sufficiently explain the interpretation of this device.

The Supporters, as shown, are two Highlanders in their native garb, kilted in the tartan of the clan, and armed with bows and claymores proper. In English heraldry, supporters are granted only to noblemen or to knights-banneret by favor of the sovereign, and may be traced to the customs connected with the tournaments of the age of chivalry. In after-times, when a peer of the realm was created, the heralds selected such supporters as they deemed most appropriate. They were not regularly established as accessories until 1425 or later, and at first were usually alike, but subsequently differed, as in the familiar lion and unicorn on the royal arms of Great Britain. The identity of the figures on the Lennox arms may perhaps be taken to indicate their antiquity. "Supporters," says Boutell, "are armorial symbols of a high rank; and with peculiar emphasis they record descent . . . . and blazon illustrious deeds." Only persons of rank should ever use supporters.

The mottoes used with the arms were "This I'll defend," above the escutcheon, and *Loch Sloy* on the ribbon or scroll beneath the shield.

The War Cry of the clan was "Loch Sloy" (The Loch of the Host). The Clan Pipe Music, "Thogail nam bo" (Gathering), "Lifting the cattle." The Badge, "A'Muileag" (cranberry), or "Oireag, faighreag, or feireag" (cloudberry).


The Pharlane or MacFarlane tartan is a plaid of five colors, in the following proportion: Red, 36; green, 113; dark blue, 10; white, 7;

black, 4, as shown on another page. The pattern is  $81\%_2$  inches wide. The tartan of mourning, or the mourning sett, was a plaid of black and white, as also shown.

In regard to the Scotch tartans, Frank Adam, F. R. G. S., F. S. A. (Scot.), says:—"The original use of these chequered garments was not, as now, to show the tribe or clan to which their owner belonged, but was a distinctive emblem of the rank or position which he held. There was but one colour in the clothes of servants; two in the clothes of rent-paying farmers; three in the clothes of officers; five in the clothes of chieftains; six in the garments of Druids or poets; while the King, Ard-righ, or chief, had right to seven colours."

# JOHN PARLIN AND HIS DESCENDANTS

### JOHN PARLIN

THE earliest, and, in fact, the only record of a Parlin coming to America before 1800, I find in Drake's "Founders of New England," which reads as follows:—

#### 20 Novembris 1636.

Theis under written names are to be transported to the Barbadoes, imbarqued in Expedition, Peter Blackler m<sup>r</sup>. The men have taken the oaths of Allegence and Supremacie. And have been examined by the minister of the towne of Gravesend touching their conformitie to the orders and discipline of the Church of England die et Ao p<sup>rd</sup>

There appears upon the list another name about which there is some doubt, — "Thomas S Parlin 19." The "S" and "P" are capitals, and one is written over the other. It may have been intended for either Thomas Parlin or Thomas St. Parlin. To me the former opinion seems more likely. He quite probably was a younger brother of John. I have been able to learn nothing more about either of them, however. I strongly suspect, nevertheless, that John married at Barbadoes, and that Nicholas Parlin, whose name appears in the Cambridge, Mass., records about 1660, was his son.

NICHOLAS¹ PARLIN (believed to be the son of the John above named) appears in Cambridge records about 1660. He moved to Concord, Mass., about 1680. Probably he was born about 1640. He married Nov. 30, 1665, at Cambridge, Mass., Sarah Hanmore, of Charlestown, Mass. He died Mar. 9, 1722, at Concord.

Revolutionary War Record. — Stephen Parlin was among the men who marched from Temple, N. H., to Cambridge, Mass., on the alarm of April 19, 1775; absent fourteen days. On Oct. 28, Stephen Parlin of Temple, N. H., was reported as having one gun and three-fourths pound of powder.

During the old French War there was much suffering for want of salt. Lieut. Drury, John Heald and Stephen Parlin were appointed at Temple as a committee to take care of the salt, and "£25 old ten." was paid per load for eight teams, on April 25, 1775.

In Oct., 1776, Stephen Parlin was one of nine men who went on an alarm from Temple to Ticonderoga, N. Y. They were absent twenty-three days.

On June 29, 1777, Stephen Parlin was one of nine men who, on an alarm from Ticonderoga, drew am-

munition. He drew thirty balls, three flints and one-half pound of powder. On June 30, 1777, he and thirty-six others marched in Capt. Gershom Drury's company, Lieut.-Col. Thomas Heald's regiment, to reinforce the Northern Continental Army at Ticonderoga; entered June 29, 1777; discharged July 12, 1777; served fourteen days. He was one of nine-teen men who marched in Capt. Gershom Drury's company of militia, Col. Daniel Moore's regiment, Gen. Whipple's brigade, Sept. 29, 1777, to join the Northern Continental Army at Saratoga; entered Sept. 29, 1777; discharged Oct. 26, 1777; served twenty-eight days.

In Oct., 1780, he was one of sixteen men who marched on the alarm at Coos, at the time when Royalston was burned.

## CROMWELL-WILLIAMS CONNECTION.

Note. — The ancestry of Elizabeth Robinson who m. Simon Parlin (74), and Increase Robinson who m. Abigail Parlin (78), is of sufficient interest to insert at this point.

Elizabeth<sup>6</sup> and Increase<sup>6</sup> were descendants of William Robinson of Dorchester (*Increase*,<sup>5</sup> *Increase*,<sup>4</sup> *Increase*,<sup>3</sup> *Increase*,<sup>2</sup> *William*.<sup>1</sup>)

William<sup>1</sup> Robinson was made a freeman of the town May 18, 1642, and the following year was made a member of the artillery company of Boston, now known as "The Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company" of Boston.

Increase<sup>2</sup> Robinson m. Feb. 19, 1663, Sarah Penniman, dau. of James and Lydia (Eliot) Penniman of Braintree, Mass. Lydia Eliot Penniman was sister to Rev. John Eliot, "The Apostle to the Indians."

Samuel<sup>2</sup> Robinson, brother of Increase,<sup>2</sup> was the father of the well-known Rev. John Robinson of Duxbury, Mass., who was b. Mar., 1671; grad. from Harvard College in 1695, being the earliest graduate of the name in America. In the autumn of 1698 he went as a missionary to Pennsylvania, but returned to Dorchester the next year. On Sept. 2, 1700, he received a call to settle as pastor of the church at Duxbury, although he was not ordained until Nov. 18, 1702. On Jan. 31, 1705/06, he m. Hannah Wiswall, dau. of Rev. Ichabod and Priscilla (Pabodie or Paybody) Wiswall. Priscilla Pabodie was the dau. of William and Elizabeth (Alden) Pabodie of Duxbury, and Elizabeth Alden was the dau. of John and Priscilla (Mullins) Alden, who came over in the Mayflower.

Increase<sup>3</sup> Robinson, son of the last-named Increase, and grandson of William, m. Feb. 11, 1694/5, Mehitable Williams, dau. of Joseph Williams, who was a son of Richard of Taunton, Mass; and his brother, Lieut. Ebenezer Robinson, m. Mary Williams, dau. of Thomas Williams, who was a son of Richard of Taunton.

Now, the ancestry of Richard Williams of Taunton is very interesting as appears from the following taken from the N. E. Historical and Genealogical Register for April, 1897.

Howell<sup>1</sup> Williams, Lord of Ribour, m. Wenlion, dau. of Llyne ap Jevan of Rady and had son Morgan.

Morgan<sup>2</sup> Williams of Lanishen, Glamorgan, m. Joan Batton, dau. of Thomas of Glamorgan, and they had Thomas<sup>3</sup> and Jevan.

Jevan³ Williams m. Margaret, dau. of Jenkin Kemeys of Bagwye Man. They had William⁴ Williams of Lanishen, Bailiff for Henry VIII, who (wife not known) was the father of Morgan⁵ Williams of Lanishen, Glamorgan, and later of Putney, Surrey ale brewer at Putney, Wansworth and Greenwich, for Henry VII and VIII, and the husband in 1494 of Katharine⁵ Cromwell (Walter,⁴ John,³ William,² Robert.¹) They had a son Sir Richard⁶ Williams, b. about 1495.

Sir Richard<sup>6</sup> Williams, alias Cromwell, m. in 1518, Frances Murfyn, dau. of Sir Thomas Murfyn, Lord Mayor of London in 1518. He d. at Stepney in 1547, and was buried in Gt. St. Helen's Church, London. He left a son Henry<sup>7</sup> Cromwell, alias Williams.

Sir Henry<sup>7</sup> Cromwell, alias Williams (called "the Golden Knight") of Hinchenbrook, Huntingdon, m. Joan, dau. of Sir Ralph Warren, Lord Mayor of London, and they had: Sir Oliver, Robert, Henry, Richard, Philip, Joan, Elizabeth, and Frances.

Robert<sup>8</sup> Cronwell of Huntingdon, brewer, m. Elizabeth Stewart, widow of William Lynn of Bassingbourn, and their fifth child was Oliver<sup>9</sup> Cromwell, "The Lord Protector."

Robert's sister, *Elizabeth*<sup>8</sup> *Cromwell*, m. William Hampden of Great Hampden, Bucks, and among their children were John<sup>9</sup> Hampden, "The Patriot," and Richard Hampden.

Thomas<sup>3</sup> Williams (Morgan,<sup>2</sup> Howell<sup>1</sup>) of Lanishen, Glamorgan, d. at St. Helens, Bishopgate, London; was buried in the church there with his brass on stone." He m. (1), —— Daniel of Edmonton, Midd.; and m. (2), Margaret ——; her brass on stone. He had a son John<sup>4</sup> Williams.

John\* Williams, steward of Wimbledon Manor, Surrey, m. Margaret Smyth, dau. of Richard Smyth, and grand-dau. of Margaret Cromwell (see ante). He d. at Mortlake in 1502, and she in 1501. They left two sons, John<sup>5</sup> and Richard.

John<sup>5</sup> Williams, b. in 1485; m. Joan Wykys, dau. of Henry Wykys of Bolleys Park, Chertney, and sister of the Elizabeth Wykys who m. Thomas Cromwell (brother of Katharine) secretary to Henry VIII, Lord Cromwell of Oakham, Earl of Essex.

Richard<sup>5</sup> Williams was b. in 1487, at Rochampton. He settled at Monmouth and Dexton, Mon., where he d. in 1559. He was twice

married, but the name of his first wife is not known. She is credited with one daughter, Joan.<sup>6</sup> His second wife was Christian ——, who had two daughters, Reece and Ruth, and one son, John.<sup>6</sup>

John<sup>6</sup> Williams of Huntingdon, near Watton-under-Edge, Gloucester, d. in 1579, leaving a son, William.<sup>7</sup> No other particulars of this family are given.

Williams of Huntingdon, m. (1), Nov. 15, 1585, Jane Shepherd. She d. about 1600; a child of hers having been baptized Dec. 2, 1599. He m. (2), Dec. 4, 1603, Jane Woodward. She d. Feb. 2, 1614, and he in 1618. The first child by his second marriage, b. in Jan., 1606, was Richard Williams of Taunton, Mass.

Thus it will be seen that Oliver Cromwell was a lineal descendant in the male line of Morgan Williams of Glamorganshire. His great-grandfather, Sir Richard<sup>6</sup> Williams, assumed the name of "Cromwell," it is true, but not until in mature years he had distinguished himself in the public service (temp. Henry VIII), under the patronage of his uncle, Thomas Cromwell (Vicar General, 1535), whom he proposed to honor by the adoption of his name. In fact, ever afterwards, Sir Richard used to sign himself "Richard Cromwell, alias Williams"; and his sons and grandsons, and Oliver himself, in his youth (1620), used to sign in the same manner. In important grants from the crown to Sir Richard (29 and 31, Henry VIII), the grantee's name appears in both forms, "Cromwell alias Williams," and "Williams alias Cromwell."

He built the Parlin tomb at Skowhegan, in which are the remains of the members of his family who have died.

Capt. Jonas Parlin died in Skowhegan, May 29, 1870, aged 79 years and 6 months. Mr. Parlin in the past has been one of the most prominent men in this part of Maine, and his death has cast a gloom over the entire community. His strength of mind, his keenness of perception, and his clear expression were remarkable.

The trade was convened at the office of Messrs. George Palan & Co., on Monday, when the following proceedings were had:

Mr. Loring Andrews was called to the chair, and Mr. Charles B. Platt was appointed secretary. The chairman in a feeling and appropriate manner, announced to the trade the object of the meeting. After further brief addresses, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, We are called upon to mourn the loss by death of our late associate and friend, Austin Melvin, and

WHEREAS, His fidelity and honor, in all his business and social relations, eminently entitle his memory to our affectionate regard, and

WHEREAS, The customary forms of language through which condolence and grief are expressed, fail to meet the demands of our hearts, or give adequate expression to our feelings, therefore

Resolved, That our chairman be requested to appoint a member of the trade, whose duty it shall be to collect and present in concise form some of the leading incidents in the social life and business career of the late Austin Melvin, to the end that a life so exemplary and a character so pure may have a record to guide others in like paths of usefulness and honor.

Resolved, That we now close our places of business and attend the funeral of the deceased.

Mr. Asher Parlin was born in a log cabin at North Hill (now Solon), Maine. There was only one log house between the place of his birth and the Canadian line. His parents moved back to Acton, Mass., when he was two years old, traveling all the way by wagon without springs.

At the age of eighteen, he went to Newton, where he engaged in the painting business, and a few years later he went to Natick, where he continued that occupation until advancing years compelled him to abandon active labor. For many years he owned a store on Summer Street, Natick, for the sale of paints, a business which his son, William Davis Parlin, purchased.

Mr. Parlin was for three years one of the selectmen of Natick. He was Justice of the Peace, and at one time a candidate against Henry Wilson for Representative, being defeated by only thirty votes. Wilson afterwards became Vice-President of the United States.

Mr. Parlin was one of the founders of Takawambait Lodge I.O.O. F., and was its first Noble Grand. He always took an active interest in the work of the order and at the time of his death was one of the oldest Odd Fellows in Natick. He was also a member of the Meridian Lodge of Masons and with one exception was the oldest member. He was a member of the Congregational Church for many years.

Mr. Parlin was a quiet, modest man, strong in his home and family attachments, honest and upright in all his dealings, kind and generous to everyone, and honored and respected by all who knew him.

## WILLIAM PARLIN.

HOW AN HUMBLE BLACKSMITH ROSE TO A PLACE OF POWER AND INFLUENCE.

When the book of American self-made men is written, if ever, it will contain no more interesting chapter than the life of William Parlin, head and founder of the great implement house of Parlin & Orendorff Co. His was an interesting career. Starting life in the humblest way and favored with little schooling he developed extraordinary ability as a business man, and in his declining years had the satisfaction of knowing that he left for posterity a monument in the shape of the largest jobbing implement house in the wide world. Like most self-made men he was proud of his career, but modest in exploiting it. Very few outside of his immediate friends knew the story of his life. It is given below partly as an example to the young and ambitious and partly as a matter of general interest. . . . . .

Back in the early days of the nineteenth century there lived in a rural village of Massachusetts an humble blacksmith. Warner Parlin was his name; like others of his time, he was content to drift along in an easy way. At his little church on Sundays he occupied a front pew, for he was a presiding elder, but he was better known as the man who could mould a plow-share as no one else could. This was an acquired talent in his case because his father and father's father did the same. William Parlin seemed ordinary and unpromising as a boy but later developed qualities which showed his sterling worth and brought him great achievements in the industrial world. Strong of will and stout of limb he left his home practically penniless. Fifty years later 1000 men marched in solemn procession at his funeral. He was their employer, friend and benefactor, and their grief was sincere.

When William Parlin left home he had health and trade. From his father he had learned the knack of making plows as they were seldom made in those days. Journeying along as a blacksmith and stopping betimes to earn expenses, he finally reached the little town of Canton, Ill., at that time a mere village. The next few years brought him steady employment at his trade, and in 1842 he started a little shop. To-day in the vast stretch of brick and mortar that compose the huge plant of Parlin & Orendorff at Canton, one can discern a small patch of darkened brick older than its surroundings. Around, above and beyond it as far as the eye can see there lead away endless walls in all directions, forming a good sized village in themselves. At morn and evening nearly 2000 workmen enter and emerge through the gates. Yet of all that vast plant the little patch of weather beaten brick was dearest to William Parlin. It is the wall of his original shop.

In 1868, Parlin & Orendorff shipped their first cargo of implements to Westport Landing, Mo. To-day their Kansas City office is the largest implement house in the world. It is a third larger than the next largest. It has 175,000 square feet of floor space—four acres in all. William Parlin realizing the value of brains and energy, surrounded himself with the best procurable. Every sterling quality of clerk or mechanic was recognized and encouraged, and every ambitious worker was aided to advance.

The following was taken from a biographical sketch prepared at the time the name of William Parlin was admitted to the Illinois Farmers' Hall of Fame: "It is pleasant to know that his work is appreciated. But we know that his Hall of Fame is not that room in the State University, but the broad fields of the continent. What those great big brave men did to feed the world is told whenever a farmer plows, or a trader sells, or a table is spread under the wonderful Providence of God. It is an honor, and a great one, to have known him and enjoyed his friendship."

So wrote one of the passing generation who knew William Parlin thirty, forty — possibly fifty years ago, and it crystalizes the sentiment of hundreds of others who knew him and understood his work.

William Parlin, who has been honored by a place in the Illinois Farmers' Hall of Fame, was born in Acton, Mass., Jan. 21, 1817. He came from a long line of sturdy New Englanders who were content to drift along in quiet, easy ways, their dreams generally undisturbed by visions of wealth or greatness. William Parlin's early days were spent in the old home, and when he reached young manhood he was apprenticed to a blacksmith, serving six years in this capacity, learning his trade in the thorough manner of the early days, when nearly everything was made by hand. That he was a master workman is proved by his later achievements in founding and developing the Parlin & Orendorff factory.

But the period of unrest was rife among the rising generation. They saw the limitations of their native heaths; they foresaw the time, rapidly approaching, when the broken and rocky fields of New England would no longer yield sufficient crops to sustain the increasing population; they realized in some measure the extent of the boundless prairies and plains of the Great West; they heard the call of the almost uncharted wilderness for men; the time was ripe for the younger generation of the Easterners to listen to the summons—and William Parlin heeded the call.

Big of frame and bone, a perfect specimen of physical manhood, with none of this world's goods except his kit of tools, but with a courage that can hardly be appreciated to-day, he took leave of his native home, the home of the Parlins for 200 years, cutting off with a single stroke the strong ties that bound him by affection and tradition, and resolutely faced the West. He started with good health and a trade—both invaluable assets, and journeyed along by easy stages studying the country and its conditions as he went and probably, if the truth were known, having very little idea where he would eventually stop and establish a permanent home.

MANUFACTURERS OF AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS,

CANTON, ILL.

NOTE. — This cut was inserted by the request of the author, and not at the suggestion of any person interested in the Parlin & Orendorff Company.

He reached Canton in 1840, after a river trip from St. Louis to Copperas Creek, Ill., then overland to Canton, for this was years before there were any railroad connections in this section.

The destinies of cities sometimes depend upon the whim, or possibly the good judgment of one man. The city of Canton owes its present size and importance to the mere fact that Mr. Parlin, after leaving New England for Illinois, came on without stopping at the boat landing near Copperas Creek and settled in Canton instead of going to Farmington, Lewistown, Cuba or any one of a dozen other little settlements in this locality, and any one of which would have developed into a city with the growth of the P. & O. factory.

Mr. Parlin died on June 25, 1891, at the age of seventy-two, after a successful business career of half a century in his adopted home. The end came suddenly, as probably he would have wished. He left the factory at noon on that fated day, after spending the morning as usual in overseeing the mechanical departments of the factory. At one o'clock the city was electrified by the news that its leading citizen had passed away. His old-time partner, Mr. William J. Orendorff, followed in 1897, as the result of an accident with a runaway team. They both lived to see Canton grow from an isolated frontier village to a city of considerable importance; they saw their little shop develop into a mammoth factory, and they lived to see the day when P. & O. Canton Plows were known and used throughout the world.

The first building occupied by Mr. Parlin upon his location in Canton in 1840 was a frame structure on South Main Street, and directly north of the present Canton High School. This building was destroyed by fire in 1847, after which Mr. Parlin moved his shop to the southeast corner of East Elm Street and Second Avenue. This was the beginning of the factory buildings on the present site. After this second building was destroyed by fire in 1849, a brick building was erected, which for years was the location of the factory and offices combined. This old building after fifty-three years of service, was torn down in March, 1902, to make room for the more modern structure which is now located on that corner.

In 1852, Mr. William J. Orendorff, a native of Illinois, joined forces with Mr. Parlin, his brother-in-law, under the firm name of Wm. Parlin & Co., which was changed to Parlin & Orendorff in 1860. This partnership continued for nearly thirty years, during which time Mr. Parlin conducted the mechanical departments, while Mr. Orendorff was sales manager and in charge of the office work.

In 1880 the Parlin & Orendorff Co. was incorporated under the Illinois State laws, the sons of the founders having attained an age which fitted them to take an active part in the business. The first officers of the company in 1880, were as follows: — William Parlin, President; Wm. H. Parlin, Secretary; Wm. J. Orendorff, Treasurer; A. L. Orendorff, Cashier.

The fame of William Parlin does not rest on his achievement in building the foundation, and for half a century directing the destiny of the immense factory which was the outgrowth of his sterling integrity, industry and perseverance, but also and, perhaps to a greater extent, on his mechanical ability in developing agricultural implements to meet the requirements of a new country.

Mr. Parlin was a mechanical genius, a man who worked at the bench and the forge, who even in later years continued personally to improve and develop the numerous implements made by the Parlin & Orendorff Co. Many of the implements now in common use bear the marks of Mr. Parlin's handiwork in their development.

His ambition was to develop agricultural implements with the sole purpose of lightening the burden of the farmer, whose hardships in the early days of the settlement of the western prairies were much greater than the farming problems of to-day, and in this he was eminently successful. He was one of the very first to perfect a steel plow that would readily shed the rich soil of the Illinois prairies. He was among the first to make a plow entirely of steel, thus replacing the wood mold plows in use up to that time.

The first stalk cutter ever put on the market was made in the P. & O. factory. It is true that it was a crude affair, consisting of a log into which were set the cutting knives, but the principle was correct, and all the stalk cutters made to-day are built on the same mechanical principles that governed the manufacture of the first one.

Another notable improvement was the construction of a disc harrow or disc plow with concave discs, which originated in the P. & O. factory. The importance of the adoption of discs with concave surfaces is shown by the fact that all the disc harrows and disc plows now on the market are made in this manner.

Still another invention of prime importance was the double plow, which is now known either as a lister or a middle breaker, consisting of a right and a left hand plow fastened together so as to throw up the soil on both sides of the furrow.

The P. & O line consists exclusively of implements for tilling the soil, planting and cultivating the crops, stopping at the harvesting machinery. Every one of these lines — plows, harrows, planters, cultivators, and stalk cutters — bear the marks of Mr. Parlin's genius, either as inventor or in developing and improving those in use. His mechanical ability was directed along the lines of simplicity, strength and ease of operation, and in these lines he was pre-eminent among the manufacturers of his time.

## ILLINOIS FARMERS' HALL OF FAME.

Several years ago the Illinois State Legislature authorized the establishment of the Illinois Farmers' Hall of Fame, to be conducted in connection with the State University of Illinois at Urbana. The institution is under the control of a special commission composed of the following:—A. P. Grout, *President*, Winchester; Eugene Davenport, *Vice President*, Urbana; E. W. Burroughs, *Vice-President*, Edwardsville; Charles F. Mills, *Secretary*, Springfield; Geo. A. Anthony, *Treasurer*, Kewanee.

The object of the Illinois Farmers' Hall of Fame is to afford recognition to citizens of Illinois who have rendered signal and conspicuous service to the cause of Agriculture. Up to the present time but three canditates have had their portraits installed in the Hall of Fame, as follows:—Cyrus H. McCormick (1909); James N. Brown (1911); and Jonathan B. Turner (1912); all of whom rendered service for the betterment of Agriculture.

The candidates approved, but whose portraits have not as yet been installed in the Hall of Fame are Isaac Funk, Philip D. Armour, and B. F. Harris.

To this distinguished group in now added the name of William Parlin, which will forever perpetuate his name among the select few whose lives and work were devoted more or less to the betterment of agricultural conditions, to the uplifting of the farmer, to the science of farming, and to the ultimate gain of the entire human race.

Mr. Parlin gave the Parlin Library to Canton, and his widow and children have always generously supported it.

### DEATH OF GEN. C. H. PARLIN.

After a lingering illness Charles H. Parlin, former Surveyor General of Florida, died Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock. Funeral services were held at Trinity Episcopal Church, Thursday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock, Rector T. J. Purdue, officiating. Interment was in Magnolia cemetery, the procession forming at the church and ending at the grave. There were many beautiful flowers and evergreens sent in by thoughtful friends of the family. The pall-bearers were: Capt. A. S. Mohr, Mr. John H. Cook, Mr. S. E. Teague, Capt. T. J. Mohr, Mr. A. F. Whiteside, Maj. J. P. Hickey.

General Parlin was born in Fairfield, Me., in 1837, and served under Gen. U. S. Grant during the Civil War. Was a lieutenant of the 16th Me. vol., and was sent to Florida in 1861, serving at the Pensacola Navy Yard for a number of years. He came to Apalachicola in 1876, and in 1879 was married to Miss Cornelia Grady. One son, Mr. C. G. Parlin of Mobile, Mrs. J. E. Graves, Miss Alice and Miss Alma Parlin, of this city, are surviving children.

The deceased was the last Surveyor General of Florida serving in that capacity at Tallahassee until the office was abolished about two years ago. Deceased was one of the most companionable of men we ever knew. He was every man's friend and well wisher, and he numbered his friends by the hundreds. Generous to a fault, his hand was ever open to deeds of charity. As a friend he was loyal to the last. Nothing was too good for his friends, nor was any exertion too much if a friend in the hour of need was to be served.

William Harrison Parlin died very suddenly on Monday, Nov. 23, 1891. He was at church on Sunday and sang as usual in the choir, ate his regular meals, and called on a sick neighbor in the afternoon. As far as is known, he was in his usual health, except that he spoke once or twice Saturday of feeling weak. He arose as usual Monday morning, did his work at the barn, went down cellar and brought up some apples, then went and sat in his chair between the stove and a table, where he usually sat to read, and soon after fell forward upon his face, dead.

Mr. Parlin was long a prominent and most highly respected citizen of Winthrop, Me. He was born Dec. 4, 1812, in Somerset County, and the family moved to Winthrop when he was about five years old. He was the fourth child of Silas and Mary Parlin.

His father was a boot-maker and all the sons learned the business. The three brothers, Horace, Willard and Harrison, formed a partner-ship about 1835, and at one time carried on an extensive business, tanning the leather and doing all parts of the work at their factory. The partnership was dissolved in 1865, Harrison retiring from business, and the other two members continuing the manufacture of boots separately. Although retiring from the firm, he continued in active employment, working for a number of years for his brother Horace, who moved his manufacturing business to Hallowell.

Mr. Parlin was a "self-made man," having been a poor boy with few opportunities. Beginning with nothing, he was, at the time of his death, probably the wealthiest man in East Winthrop. He took great interest in public affairs, was a generous contributor to the support of the church, and always ready to aid any enterprise for the good of the public.

He was passionately fond of music. He taught many singing schools during his life. He was a member of the choir for more than fifty years,—being most of the time its leader and organist. In the gallery stands a monument to his devotion to music as well as to his personal ingenuity and skill. As is well known, the large pipe organ in the gallery of the Baptist Church, containing over three hundred pipes, all made and tuned to their proper pitch, which for more than thirty years has mingled its tones in the church services, was made, placed in its present position and presented to the parish by Mr. Parlin in 1853. He also made many other musical instruments of different kinds, and wrote much church music which has been published in various collections during a period of thirty years. Several of his compositions may be found in "The Jubilate" published by L. O. Emerson.

In town affairs few men were so actively prominent for so many years. He was Moderator of nearly every town meeting for half a century, and held various town offices, serving on the Board of Selectmen several times. He was a member of the Legislature in 1857, and served many times on juries. He possessed exceptional literary ability and contributed many articles to newspapers, besides writing a history of East Winthrop. His style was easy and "pithy," interspersed with many witticisms. He was fond of argument that brought the wits into play, and he always enjoyed a joke, and in argument or joke he rarely came out "second best."

Mr. Parlin was the oldest of four sons of Capt. Stephen and Elizabeth (Fletcher) Parlin. When about two years of age his parents moved to the Amos Fletcher farm about two miles above Bingham village on the west side of the Kennebec river in the town of Concord, later Pleasant Ridge plantation. In his youth he attended school in Norridgewock, and was a clerk in the store of his uncle Amos Fletcher of that town. Later he was a clerk in the store of Eben H. Neil in Skowhegan, and still later in the store of Daniel Steward in North Anson.

In 1832, Mr. Parlin entered business in Skowhegan, having a partner by the name of Jewett. They erected the building at the corner of Madison Avenue and Russell Street, where Mr. Parlin continued in business until 1846, when he retired for a time. He went west with the intention of locating there, but a severe illness caused him to return to Maine, and he located in Machias, where in April, 1847, he again entered into business. He continued in trade there about eight years.

In 1851, he received the appointment as Register of Probate for Washington County, but held the office only one year, when he was removed by Governor Crosby.

In 1854, he was appointed Postmaster of Machias and held the office during the balance of President Pierce's administration.

In 1857, he was appointed Collector of Customs of the Machias district by President Buchanan, and served during the term. He also held the office of Trial Justice in Machias for several years.

In May, 1864, he returned to Skowhegan and purchased the Edward McClellan homestead on Elm Street, where he resided during the remainder of his life. He engaged in farming and gardening in which he justly took much pride.

Mr. Parlin received the title of Major by service in the State Militia in the days of his vigorous and active young manhood. He was for some years Captain of cavalry, being in command of a company at the time of the Aroostook war, and his command was held in readiness to move to the scene of action, but was not called upon. He was later promoted to Major by Governor Hubbard.

He was a life-long temperance man, being a total abstainer from intoxicants throughout his life. He was one of the active Washingtonians of the town when Washington Hall, corner of High Street and Madison Avenue, Skowhegan, was erected.

While living in Machias he became a member of the Order of Odd Fellows and Sons of Temperance, in which he took much interest.

Mr. Parlin was a life-long Democrat and enjoyed the confidence of his party to an unusual degree, because of his well-known probity and great popularity. He was a man of convictions and had the courage to maintain them in action. He served as State Senator during two terms—1879 and 1880. During his term he served on several important committees, and was instrumental in securing a law providing for a woman on the Board of Trustees of the State Insane Hospital.

Mr. Parlin was respected and loved by all who knew him, for his sterling qualities of head and heart.

The American Horse Breeder of last week published the unpleasant news that Simon W. Parlin had severed his connection with the publication and in the future would make his home in Phillips, Me. Mr. Parlin has been editor of the Breeder since the first issue of the paper, which was the growth of the Horse Department of The American Cultivator, which he conducted for so many years.

The retirement of this writer comes as a personal loss to every horseman of the East, and those who knew him in the days when he worked so unselfishly to make the New England Trotting Horse Breeders' Association a power for good, will ever believe that the light-harness horse never had an abler champion.

#### A TRIBUTE TO SIMON W. PARLIN.

The following from the New York *Telegraph*, voices the esteem in which he is held the country over:

"The announcement from Boston that Simon W. Parlin, editor of *The American Horse Breeder* and one of the oldest writers connected with the harnes's turf, has severed his connection with that publication and will immediately retire from active work, will certainly cause much regret to trotting horsemen all over the country, particularly to breeders.

"No other man perhaps in the history of the American light harness horse has done more for the breeding and racing interests than Mr. Parlin, who for over forty years has studied the question and given the result to country breeders, much to the latter's benefit and advantage.

"Mr. Parlin's knowledge on pedigrees and breeding lines was unsurpassed, while his simple method of giving them to horsemen weekly through the publication with which he was so long identified, proved more beneficial than the Official Year and Stud books.

"On account of his one hobby, the 'thoroughbred blood in the trotter,' he was not only ridiculed but continually criticised, yet year after year and season after season, as turf champions showed up, the evidence was strongly in favor of his doctrine.

"Many are to-day among the ranks of successful horse breeders who listened to his weekly arguments—the same always being based upon actual facts—and directed their breeding operations accordingly. The great success of many New England and Eastern breeders who have died and whose establishments are things of the past, was also due to the fact that they believed implicitly in what the veteran writer told them, and the present generation is reaping the harvest.

"There is the consolation, however, that the veteran author in all matters pertaining to the American trotter will still be at the service of breeders in his village home in Maine.

"With his retirement Mr. Parlin carries away the everlasting friendship and gratitude of his numberless friends and followers, who will surely miss his weekly articles from now on. He may also rest assured that his name will stand pre-eminent among the benefactors of a great industry as long as light harness horses are bred in this country, and that no one will ever replace him in the respect, estimation and love of America's trotting horsemen.



Albert Norton Parlin, being left an orphan at the age of eight and a half years and inheriting little property, lived with his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Sarah Howe (Edmester) Pickering, at South Malden (now Everett), Mass. He attended the public schools and graduated from the Malden High School at the age of fifteen, being the only member of the class of 1864. At the age of sixteen, finding it impossible to go to college and feeling that he must no longer be a burden to his grandmother, he went to Boston to look for employment, and, finally, secured a position at three dollars a week in a retail cloak store to sweep the store and do errands. He worked about eight months here. His services were so satisfactory, however, that his pay was increased to five dollars at the end of the first week and, when he left, he was a salesman at eight dollars a week. He then accepted a position with a stove and furnace dealer on Union Street, Boston, as bookkeeper. Two years later the firm for which he worked was incorporated as the Magee Furnace Company. He continued for six years as bookkeeper and then went on the road as a salesman. In just ten years after beginning work here, he was made Treasurer and General Manager of the corporation. He remained in this position for thirty years more, when he retired. many years before his retirement from active business in 1905, he was the largest stock owner in the corporation.

Mr. Parlin has been connected with many large and important business enterprises in which his unusual energy and business ability

found ample and profitable employment. In 1884 he became a Director and a Member of the Committee on Reorganization of the Cleveland, Canton & Southern Railroad and in 1885, after the reorganization, became President of the Chicago & Ohio Railroad. In 1894 he became President and Treasurer of the Houston Electric Street Railroad of Houston, Tex., in which position he continued until 1900 when he sold his interests. In 1900 he became interested in the American Glue Company, acting as its President.

At the time of writing (1912) Mr. Parlin is Vice-President and Treasurer of the Library Bureau; also Director, Chairman of the of the Finance Committee and Member of the Executive Committee of the American Malt Corporation of New York; also Director of the Fourth Atlantic National Bank of Boston, and of the New England Mortgage Security Company; a Member of the Committee on Reorganization of the Standard Cordage Company, and a Director of the Standard Assets Company of New York. He is a Trustee of the Woodlawn Cemetery, Managing Trustee of the New England Storage Warehouse Company, and Trustee of the Blue Mountain Forest Association, whose park of 30,000 acres joins his New Hampshire farm. This park is stocked with many kinds of wild animals — elk, deer, wild boar, buffalo, etc., the buffalo herd being the largest in the United States.

Mr. Parlin served as President of the National Association of Stove Manufacturers two successive terms — 1902-05 — an unusual honor.

Mr. Parlin has travelled extensively in foreign countries, being especially interested in the history of ancient peoples and in the evolution of the race. He is also much interested in farming. His country home is at Craydon, N. H., where he owns about seven hundred acres, mostly woodland, beautiful groves of pine, fir, spruce and maple abounding. His town home is at Danvers, Mass.

Some years after the death of his grandmother, Mr. Parlin purchased the old Pickering homestead, a one-story frame dwelling house situated just southwest of Everett Square, the birthplace of his mother and of himself, and gave it and several thousand dollars to the city of Everett for a public library in memory of his son and only child, who died at the age of eighteen, the library to be known as the Frederick E. Parlin Memorial Library. Later Mr. Parlin gave six thousand dollars more towards enlarging the building, and soon after gave

the city two acres of valuable land for a playground to be associated with the library.

The preparation and publication of this genealogy of the Parlins in America is due in large measure to Mr. Parlin's generous interest.

Frederick Emmons Parlin was a young man of rare personality and great promise. Even as a child his loyalty and tenderness towards his insane mother were remarkable, and his love and devotion to his father did much to dull the keen edge of affliction and to knit more closely the natural ties between them. Although richly endowed both in mind and body he never was conscious of his unusual ability and attractiveness. He was brilliant but modest, thoughtful but cheerful, gentle but not effeminate, generous but not weak, He combined the best qualities of a genuine boy with the tenderness of a woman and the strength of a man. Energetic, intelligent, unselfish, wholesome and true, it was natural that he should become the favorite of his associates and the pride and comfort of his father. The following extract from a letter written after his death by Mr. M. Grant Daniell, his old teacher at Chauncey Hall, voices the opinion of all who knew him:

"Fred Parlin, as a pupil in this school was distinguished first of all for unswerving fidelity to his school duties. He was conscientious to a fault. What he had to do he always did to the best of his ability. When he came to a recitation, I never had any doubts about his faithful preparation of the lesson. He was as liable to occasional slips and failures in recitation as other good scholars are, but I never felt that such failures were the result of willful neglect. He was ambitious. A failure troubled him. When the right answer to a question would not come immediately, his face would flush with mental distress (hardly too strong a word), and his vexation with himself for failure of memory showed itself in other ways.

"His was a very amiable disposition. Teachers and school-mates were fond of him. His conduct was as nearly faultless as one could wish. He did right because it came natural to him to do right. He was thoroughly incapable of doing a mean act. And yet, with all his

gentleness and amiability of character, there was nothing in it that one could call soft or weak or namby-pamby. He was strong and manly as well as gentle and gentlemanly. His scholarship carried him very successfully through the Harvard admission examinations, and he gave good promise of future attainments of a very high order.

"I am aware that the above is a meagre and inadequate estimate of the boy's character and personality, but such as it is, it comes from one whose heart is still warm with pleasant and tender recollections of one of the best fellows it has ever been his lot to come in contact with."



Mr. Parlin was born on a farm situated in the town of Leeds, Me., north of the Dead river where it empties into the Androscoggin. About 1863, his parents moved to a small farm in Livermore on the west side of the Androscoggin river about a mile above North Turner bridge. About 1865, his father moved to a farm of over four hundred acres at the foot of Bald Mountain in Perkins Plantation, Franklin County, Me.

After his father's death in 1870, he remained at home about a year, and then, at the age of eleven, went to live with a maternal uncle in Strong, Me., where he remained for five or six months. From this time until he was fifteen years old, he worked for farmers during the summers and went to the common schools winters. During the years 1875 and 1876, he lived with a farmer and carriage maker by the name of Roscoe Vaughn, who lived about a mile from Beans Corner

in the town of Jay. He thought a great deal of Mr. Vaughn and his family, and Mr. Vaughn's influence over him was very strong for good. It was during this period that Mr. Parlin decided to get an education instead of learning a trade, as his mother had intended.

In the fall of 1876, he entered Maine Central Institute at Pittsfield, Me., expecting that he would be able to remain only two or three terms on account of the lack of funds; but, by working on a farm summers, teaching district schools winters, and doing such work as he could get during term time, he succeeded in completing the college preparatory course, graduating in June, 1881. In the fall of the same year he entered Bates College at Lewiston, Me. After struggling to secure means to continue his college course for two years, he decided to remain out a year to earn enough to enable him to go back and finish his course. He did so and graduated with commencement honors for general scholarship in June, 1886, receiving the degree of A. B. In 1889 he received the degree of A. M., and in 1912, the honorary degree of Doctor of Pedagogy (Pd. D.).

Up to the present time (1913) Mr. Parlin has devoted himself to education. He taught his first school at the age of seventeen, in Perkins Plantation, in the district in which he attended school in his childhood. He taught four winters in country ungraded schools two in Perkins Plantation, one on Sawyers Island in the town of Boothbay, and one at Wells Branch. During the year 1882-83, he was Principal of the grammar school at Yarmouth, Me.; from September, 1883, to June, 1885, Principal of Greely Institute, Cumberland Centre, Me.; from March, 1886, to June, 1890, Principal of Brigham Academy, Bakersfield, Vt.; from September, 1890, to September, 1893, Principal of Williams Academy and Stockbridge High School, Stockbridge, Mass., being also Superintendent of the Stockbridge public schools from April, 1891; from September, 1893, to September, 1900, Superintendent of schools at Natick, Mass., being also Superintendent of the Needham schools during the first half of this period; from September, 1900, to September, 1909, Superintendent of schools in the city of Quincy, Mass., and from September, 1909, to September, 1912, Superintendent of the schools of the city of Cambridge, Mass.

At the time he left Bakersfield, Vt., he was a member of the Franklin County Board of Education. He has served as President of the Middlesex County (Mass.) Teachers' Association, of the Norfolk

# UNPLACED DATA.

In the records of the Kingssessing Swedes' Church, Philadelphia County, Pa., Olove Parlin appears as godfather to Catarina Linkhorn, born 16 June, 1751, father Jacob Linkhorn, mother Anne (Rambo) Linkhorn, godmother Mary Rambo, baptized June 30, 1751. The Linkhorns are said to have been ancestors of Abraham Lincoln. Olove Parlin advertised in the *Pennsylvania Gazette* of Feb. 19, 1754, a plantation, situated in Pilesgrove township, Salem County, N. J., for sale.

Ann Chadarin (probably Catherine) Parlin and others were petitioners for 3000 acres of land in the County of Albany, N. Y., Nov. 10, 1766. There was another petition dated Mar. 9; a certificate of the Land Commissioner that they had laid out for the petitioners 3000 acres of land on the west side of Lake Champlain, dated April, 1772; a letter from one William Denning requesting that a decision of the claim of the above named parties be postponed until he could appear, dated Oct. 28, 1785; the withdrawal of Zephaniah Platt's claim to the land claimed by the petitioners, dated Mar. 13, 1786; a certified copy of a warrant of survey to the petitioners, dated May 1, 1771, and Feb. 18, 1785.

# GENERAL MCPARLIN

### BREVET BRIGADIER GENERAL McPARLIN

Surgeon Thomas A. McParlin who held the rank of Colonel, and brevet rank of General United States army, died at his late residence on West street, Annapolis, on Thursday afternoon, from general debility.

Gen. Thomas A. McParlin was born in Annapolis, Md., July 10, 1825, graduated at St. John's College in 1844, began the study of medicine in office of Drs. Dennis and Abram Claude, of this city, and received the degree of M. D. after a full course at the University of Maryland, and immediately entered the army during the time of the Mexican War in 1847.

His long service in the Medical Corps of the army, his familiarity with the duties pertaining to it, and his well-known administrative ability, were recognized by those distinguished heroes of the war, Grant, Sheridan, Meade and Pope, and by his associates in the Medical Corps.

He was on duty in the field for many years, serving in Mexico during the Mexican War in 1848, in the Florida Indian (Seminole) War in 1856–57, and during the War of the Rebellion. For a brief period he was a Surgeon-in-Chief at the Naval Academy hospital. In 1862 while on duty as Chief Assistant to the Surgeon General, he yielded that important position in answer to the call of his country, and again took service in the field, where he displayed courage and zeal, and wonderful knowledge and ability, which won for him the honor of being made Medical Director of the whole army in the field operating against Richmond under command of General Grant.

Dr. McParlin never shrank from duty. He voluntarily went into cholera and yellow fever epidemics of 1848-49, '56, '67 and '70, and

risked his life to save others, and once contracted yellow fever, which nearly proved fatal to him, and for the valuable service rendered, the rank of Brevet Brigadier General was conferred on him Nov. 26, 1866, for "meritorious and distinguished services at New Orleans, where cholera and yellow fever prevailed."

His familiarity with the administrative duties in every position, incident to military service, and connected with the public health, was well known. His generals have spoken of him as full of ability, fidelity, energy and devotion to the public interests of his country, and his care of the sick and wounded was unexcelled. He was frequently praised for faithful and valuable service on the battlefield, and was brevetted Lieutenant Colonel Aug. 1, 1864, for faithful and meritorious services in the field, and again brevetted Colonel Mar. 13, 1865, for "faithful and meritorious conduct during the war."

His well-known ability as a surgeon and medical purveyor proved him honest, capable, faithful, and his distinguished services to his country entitled him to be esteemed and remembered by all true patriots.

Since the war, while on duty at West Point, through his efforts an appropriation was made for the new cadet hospital, which was planned under his direction and partially built, and it was with great pride and pleasure that he pointed to this as the crowning event of his active army life.

General McParlin was 42 years in active service when he retired in 1889 with the rank of Brevet Brigadier General, being the only officer of the Medical Corps holding this rank at the time of his death.

In 1858 Dr. McParlin was married to Miss Alida Roca. In 1893 he returned to Annapolis, his native place, and died Jan. 28, 1897, in the house where he was born.

He leaves four daughters, Alida (Mrs. Manuel Elguera of Lima, Peru), Agnes, Clare and Eleanor, their mother having died in 1877.

The funeral of the deceased took place from St. Anne's Church, Saturday morning, and the remains were conveyed to Washington on the noon train over the A., W. & B. R. R., and interment took place in the Arlington cemetery, with the highest military honors. The funeral was under the direction of the Loyal Legion, of which he was a member. His remains repose near Sheridan's—a place selected at his request.



## NOT PARLINS

EDMUND EUGENE PARLIN, so-called, of Chicopee, Mass., had no blood relationship to the Parlins. His real name was Edmund Eugene Hackett, son of George F. and Ella (Soper) Hackett, born in 1866, at Freeman, Me., although his parents were residents of Phillips, Me. On May 2, 1869, Edmund went to live with a family by the name of Parlin but was not adopted by this family. Later Mr. Parlin moved to Massachusetts, taking with him the Hackett boy whom he found to be "as healthy and intelligent as the average of children." In Massachusetts the boy went by the name of "Eddie Parlin" although in no way related to either Mr. or Mrs. Parlin. When eighteen or nineteen years of age, he left the Parlins and went to work, still retaining the name "Parlin." On July 14, 1886, he married at Chicopee, Christine M. Arnot, daughter of James and Eugenie Arnot of Glasgow, Scotland, giving the names of the Parlins as those of his parents. Miss Arnot was born in Scotland about 1861.

Mr. Hackett died at Chicopee in 1890, several months before the birth of his only child, Edmund Eugene Hackett, known as Edward Eugene Parlin, who was born Mar. 9, 1891.

Mrs. Hackett, known as Mrs. Parlin, married again and resides near Fairbanks, Alaska.

The son, Edmund, is a graduate of the Adams, Mass., High School and of the Fitchburg Normal School, and is a bright, promising young man.

In Chicago and New York, I found Russians who had assumed the name Parlin when they came to this country.





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
