To his Excellency the President and the Honourable the Supreme Executive Council of Pennsylvania.

The Petition of Mary Adams of Pittsburg humbly Sheweth That her former Husband, The late Col. Eneas Mackay, some years before his decease, became possessed of the Books and papers of a certain Mr. Alexander Ross at that time a Citizen of Pennsylvania, containing accounts and credits to the amount of between four and five thousand pounds, Exclusive of Landed property which was also very considerable.

That as soon as she had information of Mr. Ross being Proscribed by the Laws for his Treasonable proceedings against it She immediately embrased the earliest opportunity of giving such information as the Law direct to the Agents for the County of Westmoreland of that part of his property then in her possession as will appear by some Vouchers herewith Transmitted.

That in consequence of this information the agents call'd upon and received of her the whole property she taking a rect, for the same and which was then considered to be of a Valuable nature, consisting chiefly of obligations and settled accounts with many Reputable Persons that it appears to her that this business has been conducted in a dark mysterious and confused manner in pasing thro the Hands of the several agents who have been successfully appointed and that she never could, upon application to any of them have the least satisfaction upon the subject.

That she is very certain of several sums of Money being received by them and a presumption of Mr. Huffagel having

sometime considerable, as the business appeard to have finally rested with him and he appearing very active in the prosecution of many of the debtors.

To his Excellency the President and the Honorble the Supreme Executive Council of Pennsylvania

The Petition of Mary Adams of Pittsburg Humbly Sheweth.

That her former Husband, late Col. Eneas McKay some time before his decease became possess'd of Books Bonds Notes &ca the property of Mr. Alexr. Ross (then a citizen of Pennsylvania) to a very considerable amount. Mr. Ross at the time of puting his property into the possession of Mr. Me kay gave him and a Mr. Ruisel full power to Transact his business while absent-Mr. McKay dying the year following the Book & Ca. remained in possession of your petitioner. That as soon as information of Mr. Ross's being proscribed arriv'd at Pittsburg-your Petitioner not being acquainted with the regular mode required by Law for giving information took the most early and readyest way she could devise by informing Mr. John Proctor one of the agents appointed by Council for Confiscated property in the County of Westmoreland informing him in two Letters both of which was within the time limited by Law of a Considerable property of Mr. Alexr. Ross a proscrib'd person being in her possession requesting him to act as the nature of the case required, not receiving an answer to either Letter she wrote him a third but receiv'd no answer. She then was advised to write to Council on the subject which she did, nothing was done in the business for some years altho, she had repeatedly inform'd Gentlemen in power of the whole transaction-At length Mr. Gallbraith and Mr. Huffnagle, the then agents for confiscated property received orders from Council to take the whole property into their possession, on their receiving the property they gave your Petitioner a Receipt for it.

That your petitioner conceives she is justly intitled to such compensation as the Law direct for her fidelity and care in discovering such Valuable Estate. Wherefore she humbly pray that your Honorable Body will take the premisses into Consideration and direct such inquirey into the Transaction as will do equal to Government and your Petitioner and she in duty bound will Pray.

I do Certify that during the time that I acted as agent for the County of Westmoreland in the business of Confiscated Estates, that I Received three Sundry letters from Mrs. Mary Adams (late Mary McKay of Pittsburgh) giving information of the Books Papers & estate of Alexander Ross then a Proscribed Traitor to the State of Pennsylvania—That having lossed or misslaid two of the said Letters I only find the last wrote one new in my possession which is without the limits given by Law for giving such information; But that it is my appinnion & belief, that either one or both of the said letters so lossed or misslaid, was fully within the time limited by Law upon that occasion given under my hand this 6th of January 1790

May it please your Excellency

Alexander Ross formerly a Resident of this county, left it at the Commencement of the War and left behind him a considerable property which consisted in lands Bonils and Book Debts.—In Consequence of his being an Enemy to America he was proscribed by Lane and his Estate confiscated-previous to his Embarkation for Europe he deposited into the hands of Colo. Encos McKay all his valuable papers giving his full power to act for him.-Some time after Mr. McKay Died being in the service of the United States, his widowed Mary my now Mother-in Law, then took charge of said papers-As soon as she heard that said Ross's Estate was forfeited and that this State would receive advantage by knowing what she had in her possession of his she gave immediate Information thereof to persons properly authorized to receive such information and that within the limited Time Directed by Law. tion, together with Mr. the papers relative to this McKers Peition were laid before the Honble Council long ago and lately put into your Excellency's hands by Doetr. John Wilkins one of that Honble Body for this County-Council has been pleased to give said petition one Reading and laid it on the Table nothing more seems to have been done resnecting the same .--

Your Excellency will see by those papers that this business has been procrastinated for a considerable Time, the reason thereof is best known to that Respectable Body who I am satisfied will do what is Right in the End. I have only to add on this Subject that I know your Excellency's principal Delight is in doing good, and that your Love of Justice extends as well to Individuals as the Publick, and that if on examining said authentick vouchers your Excellency finds the Petitioners claim founded in Justice you will favor the same and bring it to a speedy Issue and not otherwise.

Permit me now Just to add my sincere congratulation on your Re-appointment to be our Governor. Long may your Excellency Fill the Seat of Government and Enjoy the Blessings of Health and Peace is the Real wish and prayer of your Excellency's faithful Friend and most obdt. hble. servt.

Sir

My son in law Col. S. Bayard informed me that he had received a Letter from your Excellency lately in answer to his respecting the Confiscated property of Alex. Ross which I gave information of your Excellency was pleased to observe that the largest sums due to that Estate were settled previous to Ross's attainder and none but the small sum of three pounds 9-8 appeared unsettled.

As I gave the first information respecting this forfiture I still think it my duty to give such further information as comes within my knowledge and which I can fully prove if called upon in a proper manner.

I beg leave therefore to mention to your Excellency that several sums of money have been received by the late commisses, and not accounted for to the public. And many sums in this neighborhood yet unpaid one of considerable amount (about 800 £) due from the Estate of the Deceased Genl. Thompson, This was never settled or paid agreeable to the declaration of this Expect is, his son George and Mother.—

Mr. George Thompson has lately advertized all his Landed property for sale and preparing to goe down the river next fall. This debt may be worth looking after before he goes.

I would not wish to dictate to your Excellency but would just observe that if a proper person was appointed in this County to look into and make a thorough examination into

this Estate I think that the State of Pennsylvania would receive an advantage thereupon.

Some of the Commissrs, appointed were indebted to this Estate and therefore I apprehend were careless about bringing it to a close.

From these few broken hints your Excellency will judge of the best method to be pursued to get a true and just statement of this forfeited Estate.

At a Court held at Philadelphia 17th April 1782 before all the Judges of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania upon the petition of the overseers of the Poor of Tinicum Township in Bucks County in behalf of Elizabeth Killyon a poor Woman setting forth that John Overholt by certain Articles of Agreement between the said John Overholt and Henry Killyon Husband of the said Elizabeth Killyon made in his life time it was agreed that the said Henry Killyon and Elzabeth his wife should have and enjoy the log Dwelling House on a certain Tract of Land since seized by the Agents of forfeited Estates for Bucks County as the Estate of John Overholt forfeited by his Attainder of Treason during their Lives and the Life of the longest Liver of them and that they should have sufficient Firewood for their use off the said Land and as large a Garden & in what place they should chuse to make it on the said Land and be permitted to keep a Horse & a Cow on said Land but to feed them with their own provender and the same being proved on oath to the said Court and the said Henry Killyon being dead The Court do decree the said Dwelling House to the said Elizabeth Killyon during her natural life with the several Privileges before mentioned

In the ejectment depending in Chester County, lessee of Thomas Barelay pr Procter, for Hog Island, I have had the Honour to be employed by the State, which is materially interested in the Event, on the part of the Plaintiff—The Plaintiff's Counsel have received very direct Intelligence, that Mr. Galloway had united every Title in him self before the War, by regular Conveyances & earried the Deeds to England. Indeed he promised to send them to us; but we are since informed, that it is out of his Power, as we are told that all the Deeds & other Documents, upon which claims of Lovalists have been allowed, are taken in the Hands of the British government & lodged in the office of the Commissioners of Claims, or some office instituted for Govr. Mifflin, the purpose, to prevent improper use being made of them, in attempting to procure double compensation for the same thing, as some one supposed to have done.

Sir:

On looking over such Proclamations and other Papers as have come to my Hands, from the Honble, the Supreme Executive Council of this State, I do not find any mention made of six Men who left this County, soon after the British Army got Possession of the City of Philadelphia, and joined them there.

Soon after my Appointment as an Agent I wrote to his Excellency Thomas Wharton Esqr. all I knew concerning those Men; as this was about two years ago, and before the Act of Assembly for the Attainder of Traitors was made, tis probable my Letter might have been mislaid. Their Names are Alexr. McDonald, Kennet McKinzie and Edwd. Erwin all of Rye Township Farmers. Those three lived on small Farms, which were said not to be their Property, but I do not find that any Person has claimed the Places whereon they lived since they left them, if they are proscrib'd, the Lands may be advertised, and if there are any Claimers they will appear, William Smith blacksmith, William McPhersor blacksmith and Hugh Gwin labourer, all of Tyrone Township, these three were young Men, had no Land.

Thomas McCaban of Tuscarora Farmer went off afterwards, and I have received Information of him having been seen at New York. He was a single Man rented out his Farm, left no personal Estate, I think he ought to be proscribed.



I have very lately discovered a Piece of Land which is said to be the Property of Andrew Elliot late of Philada. Merchant, I believe he had removed to New York, before the War, Quare If I ought to do any Thing with his Land? Timothy Matlack, Esqr.

Sir:

Some Years ago, when the late Proprietaries of Pennsylvania thought fit to dispose of their Lands, near this Place they were pleased to grant about 200 as, part thereof to the Revd. Danl. Batwell, who, at that Time, was the episcopal Missionary for York and Cumberland Counties, from the Society in England for propagating the Christian Faith in Parts beyond the Seas; the Land was survey'd for him in pursuance of the Proprietary Warrant; he requested me to take Care of it, and prevent the Inhabitants of Carlisle from cutting the Timber, which I undertook, and have done ever since: soon after the Declaration of Independence, the Parson became an active Tory, was apprehended, by a Warrant from the Committee of Cumberland County, and confined in York Goal; after Congress removed to York, the Parson got Permission from that honble Bady to remove with his Family in New York, which he did after having sold his personal Estate. The Timber on his Land suffered very little Damage, until these four last Weeks; Whilest I was attending the Courts a number of People have cut & destroyed the Wood of about 30 as of it, against those Offenders, I have brought Suits in the Parson's Name. Now, Sir, if the Parson is proscribed, and his Land forfeited, my Suits are wrong, otherwise, Right. Your information how this Matter is, will greatly oblidge, &c. Timothy Matlack, Esgr.

Agreeable to my Promise, when I had the Honor of waiting of your Excellency at Carlisle, I now send Extracts of the Letters I then mention'd, to those Extracts I have to add, that, since that Time, the Inhabitants of Carlisle have destroyed the Timber of Mr. Batwell's Land exceedingly.

The principal Reason of this Destruction I take to be this, the Persons against whom I brought Actions of Trespass last Spring employ'd counsil and on motion of the Defendant's Counsil, and Argument before the Court of Common Pleas in July Term last, the Court ordered a Rule for Security for Costs or non Pross; whereupon, the People, (as I am informed) concluded, that Mr. Batwell had suffered a non suit, this Notion I conceive, and perhaps the advice of their Council, encouraged them to destroy the Timber: there is an Act of Assembly entiteeled "an Act to prevent Trespasses upon the lands of absent persons &c a." of which I was ignorant, at that Time, and I believe the Court also, for it was above six months enacted before it was known here; since I knew it, I have been silent, because I knew not whether Mr. Batwells Land is forfeited.

I have lately, received Information, that a certain John Myer late of Earl Township Lancaster County, went to the English some Time ago, and that he is owner of one full equal undivided moiety of a valuable Tract of Land in Letterkenny Township in this County.

Samuel Lindsay late of Guilford Township in this county went over to the English before the Declaration of Independency he left two or three Tracts of Land in that Township, said to be under a Mortgage, for how much I know not.

Sir. I Received the directions of the Honourable Council of the 30th of June directing me to Seize on some Land in this Borough late the estate of John Kearsley Deceas'd which I have done, it is all laid off in Lotts and Let on Ground rent at 13 and 14 Sterling a lot, the Tenents are generally poor, I understand there is four Years Rent due on most of the Lots, the most of the tenents complain of the hardships of making up the Rent at the rate of Sterling, and as Council sent me no directions what money to demand, I shall be glad they will inform me at which rate I am to Receive the different kinds of money and how I am to proceed with those that wont pay, as I think some will be foolishly obstonant till they are compedd'd, I told them if they would pay then, I would Receive Gold or Silver or the new State money at the Exchange of 55 pr. Ct. or Sixty Continental Dollars for one of the former, but not one chose to pay at that rate now, but I have directed them all to be prepared at the time I go round among them next, as I should write to the Honourable Council for further directions-1 have been last week at Rankin's Ferry and John Cornhouse in the Presence of James Bayley. Esqr. who I got to go with me, confesses that he did convey to James Rankin, but plead, that his Wife did not sign the Deed, and that it was not acknowledged, and likewise that only the half of the ten and a half acres was sold to Rankin, as the Ferry and Premises was to be in partnership, which he proves by the agreement between them, a Coppy of which I herewith send, he likewise show'd us Rankins Bond of the same date for fifty two Pounds ten shillings and says the improvements which is a Squared log House, and Round log Stable, are of his Puilding, as Imilt at his expense, but says

Rankin was at great expense in getting Roads laid out— If Council thinks the Place should be sold they will please to inform me, and I will advertize and sell as soon as possible. There is no other estate that I know of in this County to sell except a small Gravil Island near McChesnts which Rankin took up for a fishing place, but I don't think it would bring more than would pay for Advertizing and the Cryer.

I think it is about a year ago I informed Council of Jacob Boyer of Denegall Township Farmer and Abraham Bare (1 think) of Earl Township being gone to the enemy. Boyer went away in February 1778 and Bare took some Hessian Prisoners into Philadelphia when Genl. How was there, he came back and Judge Atlee hearing of him Issued his Warrent for him, but he was not taken and went off again and was not heard of since but as they have not been Proscribed, I could make no Seizure, I am your Excellency's

Agreeable to the Order of Your Honourable Board of the 16th of January. Sixth, Eighty seven Acres of Land in Denegall Township late the Estate of Jacob Boyers, the Valuation you will see by the inclos'd coppy of an agreement, the Original with the Deeds being in the Hands of Martin Nessley of Mountjoy Township, who will not deliver them up without being compell'd to it, Abraham Ream the Purchaser wants a Deed, I shall be glad if Council will send me instructions what to demand if the sale is allow'd to be good, I told him I thought he could not expect a Deed till he paid the two hundred and twenty five Pounds either in Specia, or State money.

Seventh, Abraham Bare lately attainted, had his Father Alive at the time he Join'd the enemy who since died intestate, leaving a considerable estate, thooldest son administer'd but has made no Return to the Office. I therefore call'd an Orphans Court, I gave the sub Sheriff some directions when he went to serve it, he brought the inclosed paper which shews there is something considerable as it is not likely they have allow'd him more then the Law will.

Eighth, Thomas Carr was sometime ago convicted of Misprison of treason at Cumberland Court it is but lately I got inteligence of it and have not yet been to make Seizure, he was possess'd of either two or three fifths of five Hundred acres of Land in this County on Conewago Creek on the Road leading to Harris's Ferry. I hear he has made his escape from Cumberland Goal, I shall make further inquiry about it and if I find it so shall give Council notice of it.

The bearer is John Brubaker who purchased of Charles Lyng real estate of John Rine an attainted traitor Situate in Earl Township Lancaster County which was sold by the agents of forfeited estates & purchased by Lyng. By a Conp de main played by two of our justices & persons who Set up a claim to the estates as the representatives of Michael Rine the father of John to whom they alledge no conveyance was made by the father they have carried into effect in the County an inquisition of forcible detainer by which he has been turned

out of possession & been obliged to institute an electment which is pending for trial at our next Court of Nisi Pruis. The defendents bring forward this claim of the representatives of Michael Rine the father of John Rine on the validity of which claim the event of the Suit will rest. Under these eircumstances it seems the present is the moment when the interest of the Commonwealth requires the Situation of this property which they are bound to guarantee to be noticed to their representatives that he may have an opportunity of carrying into effect the spirit of the resolution of the executive Council of the 9th, of April 1787 on the petition of Charles Lyng respecting this property. Whether the immediate object of this resolution a title under the Sheriff can be combined with the ground of defence above mentioned I cannot Say from my present knowledge of the business but as the other appears to be seriously made & would if carried into effect be equally prejudicial to the interest of the government it seems to me that the resolution alluded to calls for the interference of the officers of the State in the one ease as well as the other.

You will please therefore at the instance of Brubaker to make Known to the Governor the contents of this representation that he may determine whether the interest of the Government does not require that the Attorney General should be requested to defend at the instance & compensation of the State the present Suit & whether the papers essential to support the title derived from the act of the Government should not be furnished gratis. It will at least obviate all difficulties to his return to the treasury in case the event should be adverse

The papers we want from the minutes of the Executive Council are

1st.—The appointment of the Commissioners or agents of forfeited estates.

2nd.—their return of Sale & Copy of their certificate of the payment of the purchase money.

3rd.—Their order of confirmation & resolution to execute a deed.

If possible we should have the advertisement of the agents of the Sale if anything of the Sort appears in the minutes or any notice taken of it in any of the proceedings of Council let it be certified

You will readily preceive the necessity of these papers duly

authenticated when you take into view the special authority deligated to those agents

We should have wrote at the same time with Mr. Hubley, but Mr. Charles Hall having been present at the Trial, and we having seen his Letter to your Honorable Board with a State of the Case drawn up by Mr. Yeates, a Copy of which we inclose, which we believe to be strictly true; we thought it unnecessary to give Council any further Trouble. It appears to us, that the Lands are escheated to Government for Want of Heirs, and it would perhaps be best for the parties, that the Lands were seized on by the State; for the parties will keep each other in Law as long as they can; If at a future Day any Heirs should appear, there is no doubt Government would do them strict Justice—

Mr. William Henry having shewn me Your Letter of the 23d Instant on the Subject of Rubeys Estate; and at the same Time informed me that Mr. Baily being on his way to Philadelphia Mr. Zanzinger and himself had just Time to send with him the Case as stated by Mr. Yeates for Mr. Hall. I beg leave just to inform you, that the State of Facts which I heretofore aquainted you with were drawn up, at the particular desire of Mr. Henry and Mr. Zanzinger and by them considered as done truly before I sent them to you .- I had not an opportunity of Seeing the Facts stated which-Mr. Hall has sent you before to day and I observe therein it is said that no Claim has been made since 1763-This is erroneous as the Letters wrote by the Heirs are directed to Nicholas Johns and Philip Brendle, who had nothing to do with the Estate till the latter end of 1765-John Rubey made his Will and died in 1763-His widow managed the Estate during her Life and after her decease on the 21st. October 1765. Administration of her Estate was granted to Nicholas Johns & Philip Brendle -They wrote Letters to Switzerland and the Heirs and the Parson of the Parish where they live, wrote Letters in return, which could not be untill some Time in 1766—You will please to understand that all the Papers, Letters &c respecting this Estate were loged with Nicholas Johns in his Life Time and after his decease, came into the Hands of one of his Sons in Law and are now in the Hands of Mr. Yeates and I cannot give you any of their Contents as they don't choose to Shew them, Yet the Person who read them for Mr. Yeates says that he thinks that some of the Letters bare date as late as 1769-It is also stated by them that Johns and Brendle passed their Admion Acet, in which a Balance of £24 19 10 was In their Hands for the Heirs of Ruby-It is true that there was such a Balance but it was realy and truly in the Hands of Johns only, who was the keeper not only of the Papers, but also of the Money belonging to the Estate and Brendle has since Accounted for all the Monies that have came to his. Hands and Credited himself for the Expenses of building a House payment of Taxes &c which brings a balance in his favor of £26 16 7. However I think these Matters are of no further Consideration than to shew that there are Heirs and Money is due to the present Landlord Brendle, which he ought to be reimbursed should the Estate be taken out of his Hands,-The principal Consideration before Council will be



whether they think that Rubeys Estate is Escheated, and if they are of that opinion whether they will claim it imidiately as such, or wait a future day for that purpose-Or more principally whether they mean to prosecute their Claim (if any they think they have) under Mr. Yeate's allegation that they hold under the Landlord by Deed since the Commencement of the Lease .- I am
