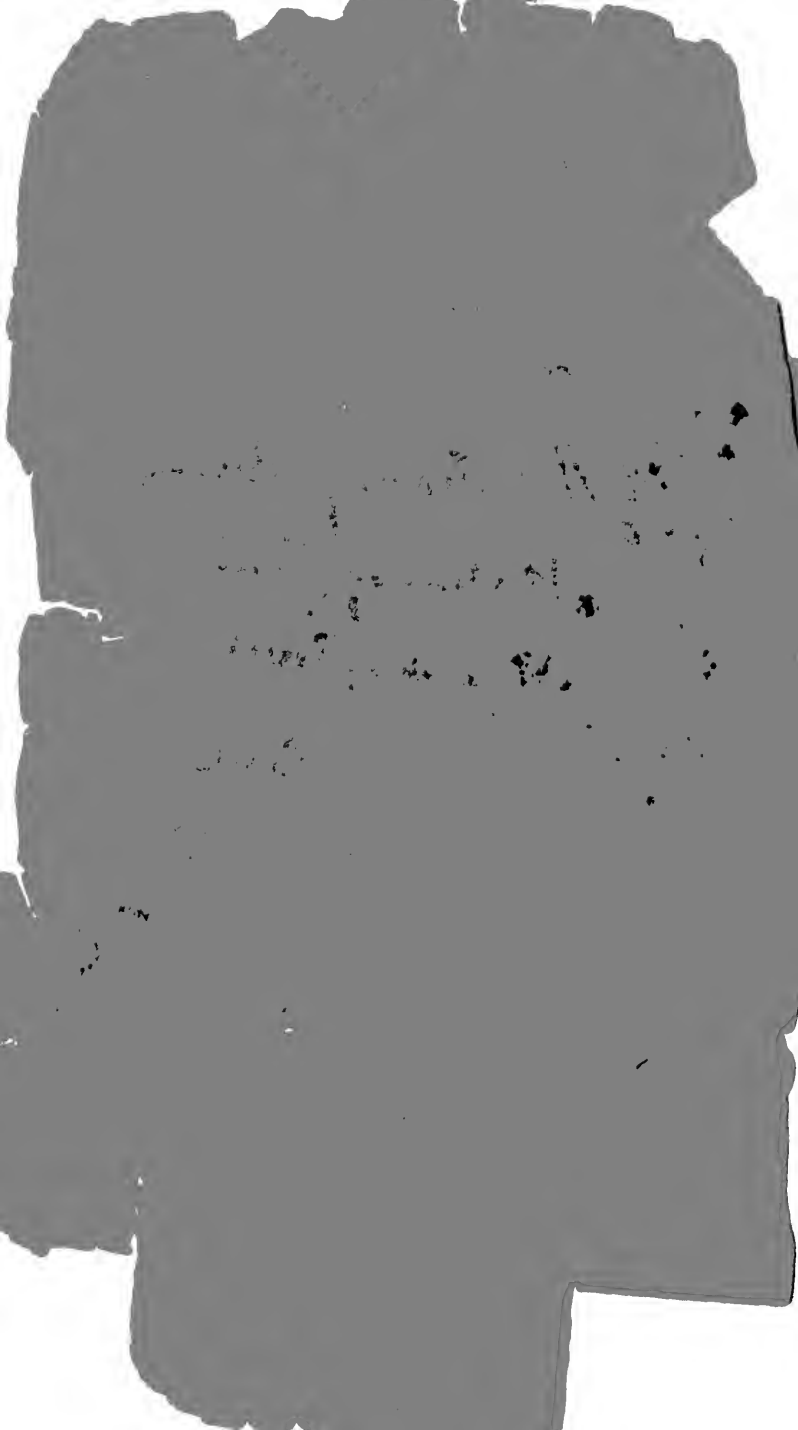

I N F O R M A T I O N

C O N C E R N I N G

T H E C I T Y O F

P H I L A D E L P H I A.

THE city of Philadelphia, capital of the state of Pennsylvania, and seat of government of the United States of North America, lies in Lat. $39^{\circ} 56'$ North and Long. 75° West from the meridian of London, upon the Western bank of the river Delaware, which is here about a mile in breadth, about one hundred and twenty miles from the Atlantic Ocean, by the course of the bay and river, and about fifty-five miles from the sea, in a South-Eastward direction. The Delaware is navigable from the sea to the falls of Trenton, about thirty miles above the city, by vessels of considerable burthen; and by boats of twenty and thirty tons, and by large rafts in the time of freshes, near two hundred miles into the state of New-York.

It was laid out by William Penn, the first proprietary and founder of the province, in the year 1683 and settled by a colony from England, which arrived in that and the preceding years, and was increased by a constant and regular influx of foreigners, to so great a degree, that in less than a century, and within the life time of the first person born within it of European parents, it was computed to contain 6,000 houses and 40,000 inhabitants in the city and suburbs.

The ground plot of the city is an oblong square, about one mile North and South, and two miles East and West, lying in the narrowest part of the isthmus between the Delaware and Schuylkill rivers, about five miles in a right line above their confluence. The plain is so nearly level except

upon the bank of the Delaware, that art and labour were necessary to dig common sewers and water courses in many places to drain the streets. In the beginning of this settlement it was expected, that the fronts on both rivers would be first improved for the convenience of trade and navigation, and that the buildings would extend gradually in the rear of each until they would meet and form one town extending from East to West, but experience soon convinced the settlers that the Delaware front was alone sufficient for quays and landing places, and that the Schuylkill lay at too great a distance to form part of the town on its banks; whence it followed that the town increased Northward and Southward of the original plot, upon the Delaware front, and now occupies a space near three miles in length, North and South, while the buildings in the middle where they are most extended, do not reach a mile from the Delaware.

The city has been twice incorporated, and the limits thereof restrained to the oblong, originally laid out by William Penn, without including the Northern or Southern suburbs. This plot is intersected by a number of streets at right angles with each other, nine of which run East and West from Delaware to Schuylkill, and twenty-three North and South, crossing the first at right angles, forming one hundred and eighty-four squares of lots for buildings. The streets running East and West are named (except High Street near the middle of the city) from the trees found in the country upon the arrival of the colony; Vine, Sassafras, Mulberry, High, Chestnut, Walnut, Spruce, Pine and Cedar Streets, and those running North and South from their numeral order, Front, Second, Third, Fourth, &c. to Broad Street, which is midway between the two rivers. In deeds and other descriptive writings which require exactness, these streets have the Delaware or Schuylkill prefixed to their numeral names, to distinguish to which front they belong; as Delaware Second Street, &c. but as there are very few buildings Westward of Broad Street, this addition is never made in common conversation, but when they are named they are always understood of the Delaware front unless Schuylkill be added.

Of these, High Street is 100 feet, Broad Street 113, Mulberry 60, and all the others 50 feet wide. Within the improved parts of the city they are paved, in the middle with pebble stones, for carts and carriages, which usually contains three fifths of the whole breadth, and on each side with bricks for foot passengers; between the brick and stone pavements, are gutters, paved with brick, to carry off the water, and the foot-ways are defended from the approach of carriages, by rows of posts placed without the gutters, at the distance of 10 or 12 feet from each other.

Besides the forementioned main streets, there are many others not originally laid down in the plot, the most public of which are Water Street and Dock Street. Water Street is 30 feet wide, running below the bank, at the distance of about 40 feet Eastward from and parallel to Front Street, extending from the North line of the city Southward to the bridge over the dock, which was formerly a draw-bridge, and retains that name in common use, altho' it was converted into a stone arch above thirty years since; from the bridge it is 40 feet wide in a right line to Pine Street, and leaves a row of houses without yards, on the bank, in its whole length, between it and Front Street; Southward of Pine Street there is an offset of about 80 feet Eastward, and the street from thence to Cedar Street is 45 feet wide and called Penn Street. This street, in the original plan, was intended only for a cart-way to accommodate the wharves and stores to be erected under the bank, and not to rise more than four feet above it, so as to leave the river open to the view from the West side of Front Street; but the inhabitants were soon convinced that the ground on both streets was too valuable to be kept unimproved, in any degree, merely for the sake of a prospect, and it is now closely built with lofty houses (except a very few vacancies here and there) throughout the whole front on both sides, and commodious wharves are extended into the river, at which the largest ships that use the port, can lie in safety to discharge and receive their cargoes, and are defended from the ice in winter by the piers, made of logs, extending into the river, sunk with stone and filled with earth so as to be equally firm with the main land. This street has been called in different parts, King Street and Plum Street, but those names are now disused, and the whole is called Water Street, except that part called Penn Street, between Pine and Cedar Streets.

Dock Street is the only crooked street in the city; beginning at the bridge in Front Street and extending North-Westward in a serpentine track, through two squares, across Second and Walnut Streets, and terminates at Third Street; another branch of it extends South-Westward across Spruce Street, and terminates at Second Street. The ground occupied by this street, and by an open space between it and Spruce Street, below the bridge, was formerly a swamp, and was given by William Penn to the corporation for the use of the city; it was intended as a place to dig a basin and docks to shelter the shipping, but experience proved that ships could be defended from the ice by the piers extended into the river, and that the dock could not be kept clean but at an expence far beyond its utility, wherefore it was neglected till it became a nuisance offensive to the smell and injurious to the health of the inhabitants, at

was, by act of Assembly, ordered to be arched over and covered with earth, whereby the city has acquired a beautiful street more than 100 feet in breadth towards the water, and not less than 90 feet in the narrowest part.

The number of the streets, lanes and alleys, laid out by the owners of the lots before they were built on, is too great to be enumerated here, there being scarce a square that is not intersected by one or more of them, some of them continued in a right line through several squares, and so spacious as to be easily mistaken for main streets, others only through one square; the names of these will be found among the explanations annexed, in alphabetical order, so that the reader upon being referred by the Directory to any of them, and searching in the list, will readily find the main street from which they begin and at which they terminate.

The city was first incorporated by charter under the great seal of the province, in the year 1701: before that period it was called the town of Philadelphia. By this charter William Penn nominated the first mayor, recorder, aldermen and common councilmen, and granted them, among other privileges and franchises, that of electing others to supply vacancies, and even to increase their own number at pleasure; the public grounds were granted to them by the name of the mayor and commonalty of the city of Philadelphia, but the commonalty had no share in the government or estate of the city, the whole body being self-elective, and not accountable to the citizens in any respect. It would be difficult to account for so extraordinary a charter from the wisdom of William Penn, did not tradition inform us that among the first settlers were a considerable number from the city of Bristol in England, whose charter, granted at an early period before the rights of the commonalty were well understood, had been familiarized by habit, which induced them to request a similar one; a copy of the Bristol charter was accordingly procured, and with little variations adopted. It was not long however, before the commonalty began to be dissatisfied with it, and to make frequent complaints to the assembly, of the abuses that were practised under it; many of which appear upon the minutes of the house. At an early period after the charter, the legislative powers of this corporation were very limited, they could not levy a shilling by taxes, for any use whatever, and could employ the income of the city estates only for the use and embellishment of the city; wherefore we see few monuments raised to preserve the memory of that corporation. Although the first men for integrity and abilities to be found in the city were elected into the office of the body politic, yet such is the nature of unlimited power, not accountable to the people, that it will divert the best men from purposes, which, before they were invested with the power, they would have

highly approved. The jealousy which the citizens entertained of the corporation, pervaded the general assembly of the province, and when the lighting, watching and paving the city became a desirable object, the representatives of the freemen would not entrust the corporation alone with the power of raising or expending the money necessary for these purposes; they could not however cast such a reflection on the respectable characters of which that body was composed, as wholly to vest these powers with others: they pursued a middle line, and constituted two separate bodies by the names of city wardens and street commissioners, to the former of whom the lighting and watching, and to the latter the paving of the streets was committed; the mayor or recorder and four of the aldermen concurring with each body, in laying the taxes and prescribing the mode of expending them; thus the city legislation for these purposes became compounded of two branches, the wardens and commissioners immediately elected by the people, in the same manner as their representatives in assembly, constituted the democratic, and the mayor and aldermen the aristocratic branch. These bodies, thus compounded, conducted the business committed to them, with great harmony, nor is there the least recollection of any disagreement between them; the taxes were laid with equality, collected with moderation, and expended for the real use and improvement of the city: one complaint only, had foundation, which arose from the nature rather than from any abuse of the powers; the number of wardens and street commissioners was so great, as at very moderate wages, to render those boards too expensive.

For the honour of the late corporation it ought not be omitted, that the mayors court was always filled with an able lawyer for the recorder, and another for the prosecution of criminal offences; and such was the orderly and upright administration of justice in it, that no court in the province or perhaps any other country exceeded it.

The prejudices under which the old corporation laboured from its original constitution, were so strong that upon the revolution, the general assembly declared by an act passed during their first session. "That the powers and jurisdiction hitherto exercised by the mayor, recorder and aldermen of the city of Philadelphia, were not founded on the authority of the people, and are therefore became null and void." Wherefore by that and several subsequent acts, the powers of the corporation were distributed between the supreme executive council, the city magistrates, and the wardens and street commissioners, who exercised them from the year 1777, to 1789. The prejudices which had no foundation as against corporations in general, but only against the constitution of the late corporation of the city, were how-

ever so strong, that it was with difficulty the people could be prevailed on to submit to a new incorporation of the city. The defects in the administration of justice and governing the police of the city at length became so glaring, that they were seen by all classes of people, and their minds prepared for an act of incorporation. The general assembly in the winter sessions of 1789, favouring the wishes of the citizens, passed an act intitled an act to incorporate the city of Philadelphia, which with a supplement passed in 1790, constitutes the present city charter. By these acts.

The common council consists of two branches: fifteen aldermen are chosen by the freeholders to continue in office for seven years; they chuse a recorder from the citizens at large for seven years, and a mayor from their own number for one year. Thirty common council men are chosen by the citizens at large, entitled to vote for representatives in assembly, to continue in office for three years; these were intended to form a balanced government upon the principle, that the choice by freeholders, and for a longer term would produce a more select body of aldermen, and that the citizens at large would chuse characters fitter to represent and form the popular branch of city government. Eight aldermen and sixteen common council men form a quorum or board, to transact business, at which the mayor or recorder presides; they sit and deliberate together, but no act is legal, unless, a majority of the aldermen, a majority of the common council men present, and the mayor or recorder concur.

There is not perhaps in the world a more liberal plan of city government, every class of citizens have an opportunity of representing and being represented. The body is sufficiently numerous to contain some of every description, and of every species of talents, and information necessary for deliberation and execution, and yet not so large as to be encumbered with its own weight; it possesses the powers of legislation and taxation in all cases necessary for the well governing and improving the city, except in contradiction to acts of the general assembly; and from the many improvements already introduced, there is reason to hope that its police will be equal to that of any modern city.

A city court is held by the mayor, recorder and aldermen four times a year, and holds cognisance of all crimes and misdemeanors committed within the city.

A court of aldermen having cognisance of debts above forty shillings, and not exceeding ten pounds, is held every week beginning on Monday morning, and setting by adjournments until the business of the week is finished.

Each alderman has separate cognisance of debts under forty shillings.

The number of inhabitants within the city and suburbs (including the district of Southwark and the compactly built part of the Northern Liberties, which to every purpose bear as to their government, are considered as parts of the city) is found by the late census to be 42,400, and the number of houses 6,651, and stores or work shops 415.

The houses for public worship are numerous, the principal of which are as follows;

Of the church of Rome three, of the Protestant Episcopal church three, of the people called Quakers five, of the Presbyterians of different sects six, of the Baptists one, of the German Lutherans two, of the German Calvinists one, of the Moravians one, of the Methodists two, of the Universalists one, and of the Hebrews one.

The city is provided with a number of public and private charitable institutions; the principal of which are, the house of employment, a large commodious building, where the poor of the city and some adjoining townships are supported, and employed in coarse manufactures to aid in defraying their expenses, under the care of the overseers and guardians of the poor, who are a corporate body created for this purpose by act of assembly, with power to lay taxes for its further support.

The Pennsylvania hospital, an institution erected at first partly by the bounty of the legislature, and partly by private subscription: its funds, arising mostly from the latter source, are considerable, and are under the care of twelve managers, chosen annually by contributors to the amount of ten pounds or more, who are incorporated by act of assembly. In this house, insane persons and the friendless sick and wounded, are taken care of and provided with every necessary and comfort their situation requires, and are attended by six of the ablest physicians and surgeons, who are annually chosen by the managers, and who cheerfully give their time and advice to the patients, for whose use a well furnished shop is kept in the house, by a skillful apothecary, who makes up the medicines prescribed.

The Quakers alms house is supported by that society for the use of their own poor; it is divided into a number of separate houses and rooms, for families or single persons who have fallen into decay: most of them contribute by their industry towards their own support, but are supplied with whatever their industry falls short of procuring, by a committee of the society, and live more comfortably than many who, in full health and unhurt by accident, provide for their own subsistence: there is a considerable garden belonging to this house, from which the city is supplied, at very moderate prices, with every kind of medicinal herbs common to the climate.

A house founded by the late Dr. John Kearsley the elder, for the support of twelve elderly widows, of the Protestant Episcopal communion, in which a number of persons of that description, who have seen better days, are very comfortably and decently provided for.

The dispensary, a very useful institution, supported by voluntary annual subscriptions; it is under the care of twelve managers, chosen annually by the subscribers, who choose physicians and surgeons to attend the sick and wounded at their own houses, and keep a large apothecaries shop to supply medicines; each subscriber paying a guinea annually, has a right to recommend two poor patients at a time, and, to the honor of the faculty, it is mentioned, that the poor thus recommended, are attended gratis, with equal care and tenderness with those who are able to pay them, and many thousands have received the benefit of this institution, who otherwise would have languished, or perhaps perished for want of medical assistance and by the quackery of pretenders to the healing art.

The humane society for recovering persons supposed to be dead by drowning, established upon similar principles with those of the same name in most sea-ports in Europe; it is under the care of twelve managers, annually chosen by the subscribers; the physicians afford their aid to this institution gratis, a number of these being appointed for the purpose by the managers.

Almost every religious society has a fund under proper direction, some of which are incorporated for the relief of the widows and children of their clergy or other distressed members of their communion.

There are also societies formed for the relief of particular descriptions of persons, with funds raised by subscriptions or otherwise, for the purpose, such as the sea captains society the Delaware pilots society, separate societies for the relief and assistance of emigrants and other distressed persons, from England, Scotland, Ireland, Germany, &c. some of which are incorporated, so that there can scarce happen an instance of individual distress, for which a mode of advice, assistance or relief is not provided without resort to public begging.

Seminaries of learning are established upon the most enlarged and liberal principles, of which the principal are.

The university of Pennsylvania, founded and endowed by the legislature of the state. Professorships are established in all the liberal arts and sciences, and a complete course of education may be pursued here, from the first rudiments of literature, to the highest branches of science.

The college and academy of Philadelphia, founded by charter, between 30 and 40 years ago, and endowed by

generous subscriptions of liberal minded persons in England, Scotland, Ireland, the West Indies and many of the late colonies, now United States of America. Though this institution was interrupted in its progress for several years during the late war, yet being re-established since the peace, it has rapidly recovered its former state of prosperity, and to the bench of professors has lately been added one of common and Federal law, which renders it in reality, though not in name, an university. If these two institutions were consolidated, and the learned professors properly distributed into the different chairs of lectureships, Pennsylvania might boast of a seminary of learning equal to most in the world.

Almost every religious society have one or more schools under their immediate direction, for the education of their own youth of both sexes, as well of the rich, who are able to pay, as of the poor, who are taught and provided with books and stationary gratis; besides which, there are a number of private schools under the direction of masters and mistresses, independent of any public body; and there are several private academies for the instruction of young ladies in all the branches of polite literature, suitable to the sex, a particular description of these, would be too lengthy for the present publication; let it suffice, that there is no individual, whose parents or guardians, masters or mistresses will take the trouble to apply, but will be admitted into some one of these schools, and if they are unable to pay, will be taught gratis; it ought not to be omitted, that there is a school for the Africans of every shade or colour, kept under the care and at the expence of the Quakers, into which are admitted gratis, slaves as well as free persons of whatever age of both sexes, and taught reading, writing, arithmetic, knitting, sewing and other useful female accomplishments; this school was originally instituted by private subscriptions of the society, with a view to prepare that degraded race for a better situation in civil life; but the will of the late Anthony Benezet, of benevolent memory, a considerable donation from the society in England, and some other charitable devises, have provided funds adequate to its future support, and it will no longer be burthensome to individuals.

Sunday schools for the instruction of children who would otherwise spend that day in idleness or mischief, have lately been instituted, and it is to be hoped will tend to amend the morals and conduct of the rising generation.

The public library of Philadelphia is a most useful institution; it contains near ten thousand volumes, well selected, for the information and improvement of all ranks of the citizens; they are deposited in an elegant building

lately erected, in a modern stile, and are accessible every day in the week, except Sunday. Here the man of learning may consult the works of the remotest ages, and trace histories, arts and sciences from their infancy to this present state of improvement, and the mechanic, the labourer, the student or apprentice may be supplied with books to improve their minds or amuse them in their vacant hours at home. The company consists of some hundreds of proprietors, incorporated by charter, who pay ten shillings annually for the purchase of new books and defraying incidental expences, twelve directors are annually chosen, who manage the concerns of the company and keep a correspondence with Europe, from whence they are regularly supplied with new publications of reputation and merit.

The corporation have lately ordered the streets, lanes and alleys to be marked at every intersection with each other, and the houses to be numbered. The names painted on boards, with an index hand pointing to the progression of the numbers, are already affixed at the corners of the main streets, and the others will be marked in the course of the spring, so that with the aid of this Directory, a stranger may find without difficulty, any house whose street and number is known.

The numbers in the streets, &c. lying East and West, begin with No. 1 on the North and No. 2 on the South sides at the river Delaware or other Eastern beginning of the street, and proceed regularly in the excess of two Westward, hence all the houses marked with odd numbers are on the North sides of the way, and all those marked with even numbers on the south.

The numbers in the streets lying North and South, begin at the several corners of High Street, with No. 1 on the East and No. 2 on the West sides. High Street is considered as the common line of division, and the part of these streets lying North of it, has the addition of North to its name, and those lying South, the addition of South, the numbers proceed in each street from No. 1 on the East corner and No. 2 on the West corner, in excess of two Northward and Southward from High Street, having all the odd numbers on the East and all the even numbers on the West sides.

Thus if a stranger wishes to find any house in a main street, as No. 29, South Front Street, he will know from the odd number that it is on the East side of the way, from the word South, that it is Southward from High Street, from the word Front that it is the main street nearest to the river, and cannot be at a loss to discover the residence of any person whose name in the Directory calls for a main street.

When the person sought resides in any other street,

lane or alley, the enquirer must turn to the alphabetical list of the lesser streets &c. where he will find opposite to its name the main street from whence it begins, its direction whether East or West by the letters E. & W. or North and South by the letters N. & S. prefixed, and proceeding to the intersection of it, he will discover the progress of the numbers and follow them till he finds the house sought.

Thus to find No. 60, Union Street, look under letter U in the list and Union Street will be found to begin from the West side of Front Street between Spruce and Pine streets, and extending E. & W. across three squares, to terminate at the East side of Fourth Street; now if you come to any intersection of Union Street you examine the first number you see; you know by the even number 60, that you are to seek on the South side, by the index hand the progress of the numbers, and by the first number you meet, whether you are to go Westward for a higher or Eastward for a lower number.

The like modes serve for the lesser streets, &c. in a N. & S. direction, except that the odd numbers are on the East and the even numbers on the West side.

The city within a few years past has experienced a very remarkable revolution in respect to the healthiness of its inhabitants; the bill of mortality proves that the number of deaths has considerably decreased since the year 1783, notwithstanding the great increase of its population; this change in favour of health and life is ascribed by physicians to the co-operation of the following causes. 1st, The arching the dock, whereby a very noxious and offensive nuisance was removed. 2d, The cultivation of the lots adjoining and partly surrounding the city, whereby another extensive source of putrid exhalations is dried up. 3dly, An increased care in cleaning the streets. 4thly, An increase of horticulture, and consequently greater consumption of vegetable aliments. 5thly, The institution of the dispensary, which has extended medical aid to many hundreds in a year, who either perished for the want of it or were sacrificed by quacks. 6thly, The more improved state of physic, whence several diseases formerly fatal in most instances are better understood and treated, and therefore more generally cured. And 7thly, From a general diffusion of knowledge among all classes of people from our libraries, our numerous societies, monthly, weekly and daily publications, whence the people at large are better acquainted than formerly with the means of preserving their health, as may be exemplified in one instance: there was but one death last summer from drinking cold water, whereas some years ago twenty has not been an uncommon number from this single cause. It is with pleasure that the editor gives this

information from the best authority, and he hopes that the same or other proximate causes will continue this valuable blessing, an increase of healthiness to his fellow citizens.

These notes, concerning the city it is hoped, are free from any material error; should any be discovered, the editor will thankfully receive hints from any of his fellow citizens, and correct them, or supply deficiencies in an ensuing edition; and by a communication of future particulars, he hopes the information to be conveyed, will be rendered hereafter more interesting.

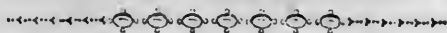

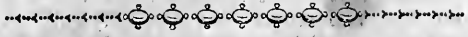

The *Supreme Court* of the United States will hold two Sessions annually, at the Seat of general Government, one

to commence on the *first* Monday in February, and the other on the *first* Monday in August.

The *Circuit Court* of the United States will hold two sessions annually, in each of the following states, viz.

In New-Hampshire, on the 24th May and 24th December, at Portsmouth and Exeter.

In Massachusetts, on the 12th May and 12th December, at Boston.

In Rhode-Island, on the 7th December and 7th June; at New-Port and Providence.

In Connecticut, on the 25th April and 25th November, at Hartford and New-Haven.

In New-York, on the 5th April and 5th November, at New-York.

In New-Jersey, on the 2d April and 2d November, at Trenton.

In Pennsylvania, on the 11th April and 11th November, at Philadelphia and York-Town.

In Delaware, on the 27th April and 27th November, at Newcastle and Dover.

In Maryland, on the 7th May and 7th December, at Annapolis and Easton.

In Virginia, on the 22d May and 22d December, at Richmond.

In North Carolina, on the 18th June and 8th November, at Newbern.

In South Carolina, on the 12th May and 25th October, at Columbia and Charleston.

In Georgia, on the 15th October and 25th April, at Augusta and Savanna.

The *District Courts* of the United States will hold four sessions annually in each of the States, and at the Times and Places hereafter mentioned.

In New-Hampshire, on the *third* Tuesdays in December, March, June and July, at Exeter and Portsmouth.

In Massachusetts, on the *first* Tuesdays in November, February, May and August, at Boston and Salem; and on the same Day in Maine District, at Portland & Pownalborough.

In Rhode-Island, on the *first* Mondays in August, November, February and May, at New-Port and Providence.

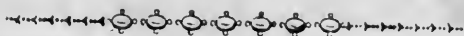

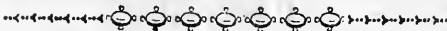

MODE of transacting business at the CUSTOM-HOUSE of the UNITED STATES, for the port of Philadelphia, and extracts from the REVENUE ACTS

for the direction of Merchants, Masters of vessels and others concerned.

No goods are to be imported, in any vessel, towed in the whole or in part by citizens, from any foreign port, unless the Master shall have on board a Manifest in writing, signed by him, containing the names of the ports of origin

where such goods were received, and the port where consigned or destined to and the name and built of the vessel, and true Tonnage by Register, with the name of the Master and place to which such vessel belongs, and particular account of all the Cargo in packages, or loose, with the marks and numbers in words at length, and description of each by usual denominations.

For any goods not included in the Manifest as above, the Master is to forfeit a sum equal to their value, unless it is made appear to the Collector, Naval Officer, and Surveyor, or to a Court on trial, that no part of the Cargo was unshipped, except what is in the report, or that the Manifest has been lost or mislaid without fraud, or defaced by accident, or incorrect by mistake.

The Master of any vessel, bound to any port in the United States, on arrival within four leagues of the coast, or within any bays, harbours, ports, rivers, creeks, or inlets thereof, on demand, to produce such Manifest to the Officer of the Customs first coming on board, and deliver him a copy thereof subscribed by the Master, and the officer to certify on the original, that the same was so produced, and a copy delivered to him, and the Master to produce the original, so certified, to the Officer first coming on board, on his arrival in the district where the Cargo is intended to be landed, and deliver to such Officer a copy thereof, to be provided and subscribed by the Master, the delivery of which also to be certified by the Officer on the original Manifest, and the original Manifest to be delivered afterwards to the Collector.

The penalty for not producing such Manifests and delivering copies thereof, or for not informing such Officer of the destination of such vessel, or giving false account of destination is five hundred dollars for each offence.

Any vessel within four leagues of the coast, or within the limits of a district, unloading goods, without authority from proper Officers, the Master and Mate forfeit one thousand dollars, and the goods forfeited, except in case of accident, necessity and stress of weather, which shall be proved before the Collector.

Masters of vessels receiving goods so unloaden (except as before excepted) to forfeit treble value of such goods, and the ship, boat, or vessel receiving them are forfeited.

If any vessel arriving within a district, shall depart, or attempt to depart, from the same (unless to some more interior port, or by stress of weather) without report made to the Collector, the Master forfeits four hundred dollars.

Any vessel arriving from a foreign port, the Master is to report to the Collector within twenty-four hours of his arrival, and within forty-eight hours further to report the name, burthen and loading of such ship, whether in packages or loose, and of the marks, numbers and contents of each package, and place or places, person or persons, to or for whom they are respectively consigned or destined, also the places where she took in her loading, what country built, from what foreign port she last sailed, who was Master during the voyage, and is at the time of the report, and (if a vessel of the United States) who are owners.

Masters neglecting to make such reports forfeit one thousand dollars.

Ships of war or packets of any Prince or State, and not permitted by such Prince or State to carry goods in way of trade, are not required to make such report.

Masters of vessels, after arrival and entry, may proceed to foreign ports, with goods reported for such foreign port, without paying duties thereon, on giving bond, and bonds are not required when vessels put in in distress.

Duties only to be paid where goods are landed (on giving bond if such vessel proceeds to another district)

Collector to furnish the Master, bound to another district, with a copy of his report, which he is to shew to the Collector of that district, within twenty-four hours after his arrival.

Owners or consignees of goods imported, are within fifteen days after the Masters report, to make entry with the Collector, of the marks, number and contents of each package, or quantity and quality in bulk, with the neat

prime cost thereof, and produce the original invoice, document and bills of lading, and declare all the party knows, on oath or affirmation, and subscribe the same.

Sea stores to be specified by Masters, and exempted from duty, but are not to be landed or sold

Cloaths, books, household furniture, tools or implements of trades, or professions, of persons arriving in the United States to settle, exempted from duty on due proof.

No goods from a foreign port to be unladen, but between sun-rise and sun-set, nor without a permit under penalty of four hundred dollars, disability from holding office for seven years, and being advertised in the gazettes, and forfeiture of goods, and if above the value of four hundred dollars, of vessel and apparel.

Goods removed before gauged or weighed, without permission, are forfeited

Inspectors and Officers of revenue cutters, may go on board, examine and search vessels; have free access to the cabin, and seal packages, and after sun-set, secure hatches and communications.

Persons in charge of vessels, for breaking fastening before sun-rise and presence of Officer, forfeit two hundred dollars.

Goods not entered in fifteen days, to be delivered the Collector to store and sell, except salt or coal, which may remain longer, the owners paying inspectors

Packages wanting or goods not agreeing with the Manifest, the Master forfeits five hundred dollars, unless made appear to satisfaction of principal Officers of customs, or Court, that no part has been unshipped except in report, or an accident or mistake.

Goods damaged on the voyage to be appraised by persons named by the Collector and owner, and allowance made for duty.

Goods without invoice to be stored by the Collector, or appraised.

Ships arriving in distress to make protest before a Notary, or other person authorized, or before the Collector, within twenty-four hours, and within forty-eight hours to report of vessel and her cargo to the Collector, as in other cases. Goods may be stored, and so much as necessary for repairs sold on payment of duties.

Duties to be paid before permit, unless they exceed fifty dollars, in which case they may be secured by bond, with one or more securities, payable for West-India goods in four months, Madeira wines in twelve months, ~~other~~

goods in six months, or the importer may deposit double the value of duties in the goods to secure payment of duties, which on failure of payment are to be sold.

Teas from China may be deposited with the Collector, and delivered on payment of duties, for such part as is delivered within eighteen months, and then sold for duties if not paid. But this altered by Act of March 1791, herein after published.

Officers may seize within or without their districts, persons resisting or impeding them forfeit four hundred dollars.

In cases of drawback, notice to be given to the Collector, by the exporter, at least twenty-four hours before shipping the goods, which are to be inspected and shipped in presence of an Officer. And drawback allowed at place of entry only, on all goods exported to any country, without the United States, in the original package, and within twelve months after payment made, or security given, for duties, and retaining one per cent. of duties paid and excepting where duties do not amount to twenty dollars at the least.

Bonds with one or more sufficient securities to be given, that such goods shall not be reloaded in the United States.

Goods not entitled to drawback, until after six months, and until the exporter shall produce certificate in writing of two respectable merchants at the foreign place or port where landed, together with the oath or affirmation of the Master and Mate of the vessel, certifying the delivery thereof.

In case of vessels cast away, or other accident, to produce protest in due form, or in case such protest cannot be had, the oath or affirmation of the exporter, or other proof to the satisfaction of the Collector.

Goods exported for drawback, and reloaded, subject to seizure, together with the vessel, boats, &c. and persons concerned suffer six months imprisonment

Salt fish and salted provisions to be shipped under the same restrictions as in case of drawbacks, and the bounty to be paid without abatement, but no drawback to be allowed, unless it amount to twenty dollars, nor bounty unless to three dollars.

The Collector may give credit on bonds due, for amount of drawbacks, if the exporter was the importer of the goods.

Persons giving or offering a bribe forfeit from two hundred to two thousand dollars.

Captains or owners making false entry forfeit not exceeding one thousand dollars, and suffer not more than twelve months imprisonment.

No goods of foreign growth or manufacture, to be brought into the United States unless by sea, and not in vessels under thirty tons, on forfeiture of goods and vessel (except to Louisville on Ohio) except household furniture and clothing of persons removing to the United States.

Vessels bound to foreign ports, the Master is to deliver a true Manifest on oath and take clearance (but without specifying particulars unless required) under penalty of two hundred dollars.



By ACT of CONGRESS, for MAKING FURTHER PROVISION for the COLLECTION of DUTIES on TEAS, and to PROLONG the TERM for PAYMENT of DUTIES on WINES, passed the third of March, 1791, it is directed,

That the importer of TEAS may give bond in double the amount of DUTIES, with conditions to pay the same in two years, the teas to be deposited at the expence and risk of the importer, with two keys to the store, one kept by the importer, the other by the inspector. Teas to be deliv-

red on payment to the inspector of duties, or on securing payment by bond with surety, if not exceeding one hundred dollars in four months, one hundred to five hundred dollars in eight months, and exceeding five hundred dollars in twelve months---provided the time does not extend beyond the two years originally allowed. For duties not paid in two years, the Collector may sell so much of the teas as will pay the same.

The Inspectors permits to go towards satisfying bond to the Collector.

All teas imported after first of April, 1791, from any foreign port, are to be landed under care of Inspectors and permit from the Collector, produced to them, and endorsed with the time when produced, before landing the teas, and each chest, box or package to be marked by the Inspector, with numbers and name of vessel imported in, and a certificate to be given by the Inspector, to accompany each chest or package.

Twelve months allowed by this Act for payment of DUTIES ON ALL OTHER WINES (as well as Madeira wine.)



DUTIES ON DISTILLED SPIRITS.

After the last day of June, 1791, by Act of Congress of the 3d of March 1791.

The Duties heretofore layed on distilled Spirits, imported from abroad are repealed.

On all Spirits imported, more than 10 per cent below proof, according to Dicas' Hydrometer

If the Duties do not exceed 50 Dollars to be paid immediately.

From 50 Dollars and not more than 500 Dollars to be secured by Bond or deposit in 4 months.

If above 500 Dollars to be secured by Bond or deposit in 6 months.

The Master of any Vessel having distilled Spirits on board within 48 hours of arrival, to report the same to one of the Inspectors of the port, under penalty of 500 Dollars.

Two Manifests to be delivered and the Permit from Collector for landing, to be endorsed by the Officer of Inspection before the Spirits are landed.

Casks containing Spirits to be branded, when landed.

Certificate of Entry of the whole to be given by the Officer of Inspection to the importer, and one Certificate for each Cask, to accompany the same wherever sent.

On all Spirits distilled within the United States from foreign materials.

If more than 10 p. Ct. below proof, p. Gal. a duty of 11 cents
 Under 5 and not more than 10 p. Ct. below proof do. 12
 Proof and not more than 5 per cent below proof do. 13
 Above proof but not exceeding 20 p. cent -- do. - 15

On all Spirits distilled, from articles of the growth or produce of the United States, in any City Town or Village:

 Above proof but not exceeding 20 per cent - do. - 13
 Do. - more than 20 and not more than 40 p. Ct. do. 17

The Duties to be paid or secured before removed, at the option of the proprietor of Distillery to be paid down with 2 cents per Gallon abatement, or the whole secured by Bond payable quarterly.

Before removal the Officer to brand the number and name of Distiller, place where situate, quantity of Gallons and proof, and the Duties being paid, the Officer is to grant a Certificate which is to attend each Cask on removal. If removed without such brands and Certificate, the same together with Horses, Carriages, Vessel or Boat employed in removal forfeited; the Officer also forfeits the value of the Spirits.

No Spirits to be removed from Distillery except between sun-rise and sun set, except by consent of and in presence of the Officer on pain of forfeiture.

Stills employed in distilling from materials of growth or product of United States, in any other place than a City, Town or Village, to pay 60 cents for every Gallon of such Still including the head.

Duties to be paid in the first 15 days in January and July.

Proprietor of Stills keeping daily accounts of Spirits distilled, may on proof by oath or affirmation pay 9 cents per Gallon on the quantity distilled, in lieu of duty on Stills.

Distillers from foreign Materials, to have painted or written, in front of the house or building used for distilling, and upon the door or entrance of the place where the liquors are kept, the words "Distiller of Spirits." And three days before distilling to make entry of such Distillery and building under forfeiture of 100 Dollars, and the Spirits.

Distillers on 1st July to make entry on that day or within three days.

Stock of Spirits on hand on 1st July to be branded by the Officer "Old Stock" And on removal to be accompanied by Certificate from Officer on pain of forfeiting 50 Dollars.

Every importer of distilled Spirits on 1st July next or within three days, to enter all Spirits in possession, to be marked and accompanied with a Certificate in case of removal, as is directed above from Distilleries, on failure of such entry to forfeit value of Spirits.

Any Cask with Spirits which ought to be marked, found in possession without such mark and Certificate may be seized and if not proved to have paid Duties or to have been distilled as aforesaid, forfeited.

Officers in day time, on request may enter such Houses, Stores, &c. entered as aforesaid and take an account and sample, on paying the usual price for the same.

For defacing the marks set as aforesaid on any Cask, the person to forfeit 100 Dollars.

No Cask marked "Old Stock" to be used for putting any other Spirits in, nor shall Distillers use such Casks after 12 months on pain of forfeiting the Spirits, except Casks of 200 Gallons and upwards not intended to be removed.

Spirits fraudulently hid or concealed are forfeited, and any Judge of United States or Justice of the peace, on reasonable causes of suspicion by oath or affirmation may by Warrant authorise the Officer in day time, in presence of a Constable, to enter and seize and carry away the same.

After the last of June next, no Spirituous liquors except Gin or Cordials in cases, jugs or bottles, to be brought from foreign ports in less Casks than 50 Gallons, on pain of forfeiting Spirits, Vessel and Cargo, except Spirits not exceeding 4 Gallons for each Seaman.

Every Distiller of Spirits on which Duty is charged by the Gallon, is to keep a daily account of the Spirits which he shall sell, send out or distill, to be entered the day after in a book to be furnished them by the Supervisors on demand, and to be returned at the end of each year or when filled up to the Officer of Inspection, and the truth of the entries verified by oath or affirmation of the person making them; the book to be open to the inspection of Surveyor, who may take minutes; for every neglect or refusal to keep such book or shew the same, the Distiller forfeits 100 Dols.

Penalties are not to extend to persons having one Still only not exceeding 50 Gallons including the head.

Any Supervisor or Officer of inspection convicted of oppression or extortion forfeits 500 Dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding 6 months or both and forfeits his Office.

No fee to be taken for any Certificate.

Supervisors or Inspectors neglecting to perform the duties enjoined, are subject to damages to the party suffering.

Actions for any thing done in pursuance of this Act, are to be commenced within 3 months, and in the County, unless brought in a Court of the United States.

One half of the penalties and forfeitures are for benefit of the person making seizure or discovering the offence.

Counterfeiting or forging Certificates under this Act, accepting or fraudulently altering the same, the person guilty forfeits 500 Dollars.

Taking false oath or affirmation, punishable as for perjury.

Giving or offering a bribe to Officers, the person forfeits not exceeding 500 Dollars.

For obstructing or hindering Officer in execution of his duty, or rescuing or attempting to rescue Spirits after seizure, forfeit not exceeding 200 Dollars.

Officer entering into collusion or concurring in fraudulent delivery of Spirits, or for false marks or guilty of fraud or embezzlement, forfeits 1000 Dollars, loss of Office and disabled from holding any other Office.



D R A W B A C K S.

On any of the Spirits charged with Duties by this Act on exportation, the Duties are to be allowed the exporter except half a Cent per Gallon, and adding to Spirits distilled in the United States from Molasses 3 Cents per Gallon, provided 24 hours notice at least be given to the proper Officer of entries to export, and of the number, quantity and marks, place where then deposited, and place to and Vessel in which they shall be exported; and on examination and if found right the Officer to brand each Cask, &c. "Exported" and the same to be shipped in presence of the Officer, who is to receive back the Certificate attending such Cask, which he is to deliver to the Collector with a Certificate of shipment, for voucher to pay such allowance; the allowance not to be made unless the exporter makes oath or affirmation, that the Spirits are to be exported and not re-landed, and that the Duties thereon have been paid or secured and gives Bond with two sureties one of which the Master, that the Spirits shall be landed in some place out of the United States, and shall not be re-landed in the United States, shipwreck or accident excepted. The allowance

not to be paid until 6 months after exportation, and if the voyage of Vessel is altered, the Collector may grant permit to reland the same.

Any Spirits so exported and relanded in the United States (unless by permit from the Collector as aforesaid or in case of necessity or distress, to be immediately made known to principal Officer of Customs) are forfeited with the Ship or Vessel, also the Vessel into which the same may be put after unshipping.

Drawbacks are not allowed unless the Spirits are shipped in Vessels of thirty Tons and upwards.

The Bonds are to be discharged by producing within one year if to Europe or America, or within two years if to Asia or Africa, a Certificate from the Agent or Consul of the United States if any, or if not from any two known and reputable American Merchants, residing at the place, or if none, of two other reputable Merchants, of the delivery of such Spirits, the Certificate to be confirmed by oath or affirmation of the Master and Mate of the Vessel, to be taken before the chief civil Magistrate of the place of delivery, or before a person within United States qualified to administer oaths, and the same is to include that two American Merchants were not to be found if none such are there. In case of loss or capture, proof to made to the satisfaction of the Collector also, where the proofs before-mentioned cannot be obtained when the Duties shall not amount to one hundred Dollars and if upwards to the satisfaction of the Comptroller of the Treasury.

Rates of PORTERAGE of GOODS, &c. not more than half a mile--also, Rates of Porterage above half a mile, and not more than a mile, and for storing and housing the same.
