Dock Street is the only crossillo et in Philadelphia, begins at the bridge in Front street, and extends noth, welchward in a serpentine track through two fquares, across Second and Walnut ffreets, and terminates at Third ftreet: another branch of a extends fouth-westward across Spruce street, and terminates in Second fleet.

# CONSTITUTION

OFTHE

# UNITED STATES,

AS PASSED IN CONVENTION, SEPTEMBER 2, 1787.

E, the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common desence, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

#### ARTICLE I.

Sect. 1. ALL legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Sect. 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states, and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be appointed among the several states which may be included in with this Union, according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-sists of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut sive, New-York six, New Jersey sour, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Caronina sive, South Carolina sive, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the Executive authority thereof shall issue writes of election to fill such vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other

officers; and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

Sect. 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators form each state, chosen by the legislature thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The feats of the fenators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the fixth year; so that one third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen by resignation, or otherwise, during the recess of the Legislature of any state, the Executive thereof may make temporary appointments, until the next meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he

shall be chosen.

The Vice Prefident of the United States shall be Prefident of the Se-

nate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chose their other officers, and also a President protempore, in the absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose, they shall be upon oath or affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside: And no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

Judgment, in cases of impeachment, shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualisication to hold and enjoy any office of honour, trust or profit, under the United States; but the party convicted shall, nevertheless, be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment,

and punishment, according to law.

Sect. 4. The times, places, and manner of holding election for fenators and representatives, shall be prescribed in each state by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may, at any time by law, make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law

appoint a different day.

Sect. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorised to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner, and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behaviour, and, with the concurrence of two

thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to

time publish the same, excepting such parts as may, in their judgment, require secrecy; and the year and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of one sith of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house during the session of Congress, shall, without the confent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other

place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

Sect. 6. The fenators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall, in all cases, except treason, selony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house, they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No fenator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States, shall be a member of either house, during

his continuance in office.

Sect. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with amendments as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approve, he shall fign it, but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journals, and proceed to re-consider it. If, after such reconsideration, two thirds of that house shall agree to pais the bill, it shall be fent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all fuch cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by years and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill, shall be entered on the journals of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the President, within ten days, (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had figned it, uniefs the Congress, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, refolution, or vote, to which the concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be re-passed by two-thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed

in the case of a bill.

Sect. 8. The Congress shall have power,

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debt, and provide for the common defence and the general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform the give out the United States.

To borrow money on the credit of the United states;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the feveral flates, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws, on

the fubject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof, and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish post offices and post roads;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme courts;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high feas, and offences against the law of nations;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprifal, and make rules

concerning captures on land and water;

To raife and support armies, but no appropriation of money to that use, shall be for a longer term than two years;

To provide and maintain a navy;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the

union, suppress infurractions and repel invasions:

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia according to the dis-

cipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercife exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states, and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over the places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state, in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock-yards, and other needful buildings; And

To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officers thereof.

Sect. 9. The migration or importation of fuch persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when it causes rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it:

No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

No capitation, or other direct tax, shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to

the ports of one flate over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to, or from, one state, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury, but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of pobility shall be granted by the United States:—And no person holding any office of profit or trust under them, shall without the consent of Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

Sect. 10. No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance, or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money, emit bills of credit; make any thing but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the

obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any imposts or duties on exports or imports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and controul of the Congress.

No flate shall, without the confent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops, or ships of war in the time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

#### ARTICLE II.

Sect. 1. The Executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same term, to be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the Congress; but no senator or representative or person holding an office of trust or profit

under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the fame state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the perfons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which lift they shall fign and certify, and transmit fealed to the feat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The Prefident of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have fuch majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the Houle of Representatives shall immediately choose by ballot one of them for President; and if no perfon has a majority, then from the five highest on the list the said house shall, in like manner, choose the President. But in choosing the President the votes shall be taken by states; the representation from each flate having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of a President, the person having the greatest number of the votes of the eletors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them by ballot the Vice President.

The Congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the

fame throughout the United States.

No person, except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States, at the time of the adoption of this constitution; shall be eligible to the office of President; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-sive years, and been sourteen years a resident within the United Staets.

In case of the removal of the President from office, or his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the Vice-President, and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the President and Vice-President, declaring what officer shall then act as President, and such officer shall act accordingly, until the disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated times, receive for his services, a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

Before he enters on the execution of his office, he shall take the fol-

lowing oath or affirmation.

"I do folemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Sect. 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices, and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for of-

fences against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate, shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may by law vest the appointments of such inferior officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The President shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall

expire at the end of their next fession.

Sect. 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress information of the state of the union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extra

ordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them, and in case of difagreement between them, with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he may think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers; he shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

Sect. 4. The President, Vice-President, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

#### A. R. T. III.

Sect. 1. The Judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one fupreme court, and in fuch inferior courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The judges both of the supreme and the inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behaviour, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services, a compensation, which shall not

be diminished during their continuance in office.

Sect. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases, in law and equity, arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers, and confuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction: to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state and the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all other cases before-mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction both as law and fact, with such ex-

ceptions, and under fuch regulations, as the Cngress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and fuch trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

Sect. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture,

# except during the life of the person attained.

#### ART. IV.

Sect. 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records, and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records, and proceedings may be proved, and the effect thereof.

Sect. 2. The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, selony, or other crime, who shall slee from justice, and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he sted, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labour in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labour, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labour may be due.

Sect. 3. New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state; nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned, as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States, or of any particular state.

Sect. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union, a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened) against domestic violence.

#### ART. V

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or on the application of the legislatures of two thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided, that no amendments which may be made prior to the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eight, shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the 9th section of the first article; and that no state, without its confent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Senate.

#### ART. VI.

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Conflitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof; and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and judges in every state shall be bound thereby, any thing in the Constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before-mentioned, and the members of the several state legislatures, and all the executive and judicial offi-

ters, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or assirmation, to support this Constitution: but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

#### ART. VII.

The ratification of the convention of nine states, shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

DONE in CONVENTION, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty Seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth.


The gold and filver coins of Great Britain, France, Spain and Portugal, were allowed by law to be tendered in all payments, at the rates

following, viz.

The gold coins of Great Britain and Portugal of their present standard, at the rate of eighty nine cents for one penny weight: and those of France and Spain at the rate of eighty seven cents for one penny weight; the Spanish milled dollar weighing not less than seventeen pennyweights and seven grains at one hundred cents; and the Crowns of France, containing not less than eighteen pennyweights and seventeen grains at 110 cents, but at the expiration of three years after the coining of gold and silver shall commence at the mint of the United States, all foreign coins will by law cease from being legal tender except Spanish milled dollars and parts thereof. And at the expiration of six months after, cents and half cents to the value of 50,000 dollars shall have been issued all other copper coins are forbidden, under the penalty of ten dollars, and the forseiture of the pieces so offered.

By an act of Congress passed the 9th of February, 1793, all foreign filver coins, except Spanish milled dollars and parts thereof cease to be a legal tender for the payment of debts after the 15th of October, 1797;

and all foreign gold coins after the 31st of July, 1798.

#### ON THE

#### TONNAGE OF SHIPS OR VESSELS

ARE IMPOSED THE

#### FOLLOWING DUTIES.

To wit-

N'ships or vessels of the United States when entered from any for reign port or place; and when entered into a district in one state from a diffrict in another state (other than an adjoining state on the sea-coast or on a navigable river; and other than veffels duly licenfed, employed in the coasting trade, or in the bank or whale-fitheries, which are exempt from paying tennage, while so employed, more than ence in a year,) having on board goods, wares and merchandize, taken in one state, to be delivered in another, at the rate of fix cents per ton. On ships or vessels built within the United States fince the 20th July, 1789, but owned wholly or in part by foreigners, when entered from a foreign port or place, at the rate of thirty cents per ton; on all other flips or veffels, when entered from a foreign port or place, at the rate of fifty cents per ton; and on all ships or vessels not of the United States, when entered in one district from another Diffrict, having on board goods, wares, and merchandize, taken in one diffrict to be delivered into another at the rate of fifty cents pet ton.

To afcertain the tonnage of a ship, if the same be double decked, take the length thereof from the fore part of the main stem to the after part of the stern post above the upper deck; the breadth at the breadest part above the main wales; half of which breadth account the depth, deduct from the length three-sists of the breadth; multiply the remainder by the breadth, and that product by the depth, and divide the last product by ninety-sive. If the ship be single decked, take the length and breadth as above directed; take the depth from the under side of the deck plank to the ceiling in the hold: and deducting from the length three-sists of the breadth, multiply

and divide as aforefaid.

Duties on tonnage must be paid within ten days after report of the cargo made to the collector; and any master of a vessel leaving or attempting to leave a port without paying such duties, forfeits sive hundred dollars.

#### DRAWBACKS AND BOUNTIES.

N all goods, wares and merchandize (spirits, manufactured tobacco must, and refined fugar, excepted) for which duties, on importation to the amount of twenty do lars, shall have been paid or secured, there is allowed, in the same, within twelle calendar mosths, be re-exported to any foreign country, a drawback equivalent to the suties so paid or secured, delacting therefrom, as an indemnification for the expences which may have accounted by strage, sees of o access, and the like, one per cent.

Besides the above specified dear backs and all mances, which entitle the experter, &c. to the receipt of money, there are sund y other allowances, which tend to diminish the duty to the importer, &c. Such are the allowances for leakage on liquors, and for draw-lit and ture on articles of

weight.

For the leakage on all liquors upon which duties are payable by the gallen, including spirits distilled within the United States, there is an allowance, of two per cent, according to the guage of the cases containing the same.

It being lawful also in any case where the original invoice is produced, and the tare appears therein, the importer or confignee concurring, to esti-

The preceding are the principal cases in which drawbacks and preminus are recognized by Congless: of the benefit of which no one can avail himself without a cariful adherence to the rules and restrictions of the law. Which restrictions, being enacted for the prevention of traud, are very particular and explicit; any material departure from which, will not only deprive the party of the benefit of the premium or drawback; but expose him to forteiture, and in some cases both of goods and vessel. We shall, in a concise view, collect and set forth the principal regulations on the subject, with the ferseitures annexed to the violation thereof, for the information of those who may not have had opportunity or leisure to attend minutely to the laws; referring such as wish for more particular information to the several acts of Congress relative to imports.

In case of the exp rection of goods, wares and merchandize, the exporter must, previous to lading them on board any vessel for that purpose, give to the collector of the district, from which the exportation is intended to be made, twenty-sour hours notice of such his intention, specifying therein the several articles intended to be exported, together with the cases, cases, chests, boxes, and other packages containing the same, and their respective marks, numbers and contents. And if they be imported articles, notice must also be given of the ship or vessel, in which the person fir, or by whom, and the place from which they were imported, accompanied with proof by oath of the persons, including the exporter, through whose hands they have passed, respecting their due importation, and the security of the duties thereupon. I roof must also be made in respect to pickled sish, and salted provisions, that the sish are of the sale.

After which, being duly impected and branded, they must be laden on board the vessel in preforce of the officer who impered them: And if afterward unthe poed or re-landed within the I mits of the United I takes, or within four lea ues of the coast thereof, unless the voyage shall not have presi pursued, or shall have been altered, or in distrets of weather, (theh di trefs must be immediately notified to the principal officer of the customs, refiding at the zearest port thereto) both the said spirits and the ship with her tackle,

apparel, and furniture, and all boats or vessels employed in unshipping or landing the same, and their tackle and furniture, are forfeited, and are liable to seizure by any officer of the customs or of inspection. The payment of the drawback is also in this case deferred till six months after

expo. tation.

And in case of allowances on sisting vessels, where the boats or vessels are under twenty tons, an account of the weight of sist caught, the original adjustment and settlement of the fare among the owners and sistermen, together with a written account of the length, breadth, and depth of the boat, or vessel, and the time the has been actually employed in the sistery during the preceding season, must be produced to the collector of the dutility authorised to pay the said allowance, and sworm or assumed to before him, in order to entitle the owner, has agent or lawful representative, to receive the same. And if any fraud or deceit in obtaining such allowance, shall, at any time within a year after paying it, appear to have been paid, is by law forsetted, if found within the district; otherwise the owner having practifed such fraud or deceit, forsets and is liable to pay one hundred dollars.

Where the vessels are of twenty tons or upwards, an agreement in writing or print must, previous to any voyage, be made between the skipper or master and every sisterman, expressing the terms of shipment; whether the same are to continue for the voyage only, or for the seaton; and that the sistermen, shall be divided among them in proportion to the quantity of siste be more than the majority of sisterment, shall be divided among them in proportion to the quantity of sisterment, shall be divided among them in proportion to the quantity of sisterment or his agent. # GENERAL ABSTRACT

FROM THE

#### REVENUE LAWS:

Wherein the several parts of the acts are digested, and transposed under distinct heads, agreeably to the subjects with which they have relation.

# 1. Of the Duty of Masters of Vessels.

Every master of a vessel, bound to the district of Nottingham, must, on penalty of five hundred dollars, deposit with the surveyor of the port of flown Creek, a manifest of the cargo, nucless he shall have previously delivered one to time chief of the customs coming on board; bound to the district of Capatha mack, with the surveyor of the part of Urbanna; to the district of Bermuda Handard, or City Foint, with the collector of Norsh k and Portim with, or of Hampson; to the district of South Quay, with the collector of Edenton. Which manifest, the respective collectors and surveyors must, after registry, transmit dely certified, to the officer with whom entry is to be made.

Which manifelt, every maker of a vellel, as aforefaid, must, on penalty of a sum not exceed a pure hundred to the special to the first obicer of the customs, who shall appear on board of so his arrival within four leagues of the custs of the Custod States; and this to the first such officer of the customs, who shall appear on board acts his arrival in a district in which any part of his cargo is to be discharged; delivering in either case, a copy thereof, by himself dissociated. The production of the manifest and receipt of the copy, such officer must vertify respectively, on penalty of sive

hundred dollars; certifying on the original, the day and year when produced, and the delivery of a copy; and on the copy the day and year it was delivered. He must also transmit said copy to the collector of the district to which such vessel is bound.

If any part of the cargoes of fich veffels, as laden with goods, and bound to the United States, have a rived within four leagues of the coaft, be unladen previous to their coming in o port, and being legally authorised to unlade, all the goods so unladen, and any veffel or boat into which they may be put are forfeited; and the master and mater of the veffel so enladen, forfeit, each, one thousand d llars; and every other person aiding and affishing, treble the value of the goods unladen. These forfeitures are not however, incurred in case of unavoidable accidents, necessary, or distress of weather, if duly notified and strictly proved.

Alfo, if any ship or vessel has arrived within the limits of a district of the United States, from a foreign country, she leaves or attempts to leave it, (unless to proceed to a more interior district,) previous to report and entry made, the master forfeits four hundred dollars. And the collector, naval officer, surveyor, or any revenue cutters may arrest and bring her back; unless the departure was occasioned by distress of weather, duress of enemies, or other necessity, which in either case must be strictly proved.

Further, every master of a vessel (ships of war and public packets excepted) must within twenty-four hours after his arrival in any port of the United States, (if the usual hours of business will permit) make report thereof to the chief officer of the customs at the port, and within forty-eight hours, a further report of the cargo, and deliver a manifest to the collector. In default of which, he forfeits one thousand dollars.

But masters of vessels, whereof only part of the cargoes is destined to any particular port of the United States, may, after paying or securing the duties of such part, and giving bond equal to the amount of duties on the remainder, that no part thereof shall be landed in the United States without due entry, proceed to the port or place of their destination.

And when the cargoes of any veffels are defined to ports in different districts, the masters thereof may proceed from district do district, paying in each district, the duties on such goods as may be delivered therein, and giving bond to the collector of the district where they sirst a rived, for their due entry in every other district, and also obtaining from the respective collectors, to whom any part of their cargoes may be reported, copies of such reports, and certificates of the quantity and particulars of the goods delivered.—Any master, in default of obtaining such c py and certificate, or neglecting to produce them to any sub equent c llector, forfeits sive hundred delivered to the officers of inspection.

Sea-stores being exempt from duty, must be designated as such in the master's report, and if excessive, the duty may be estimated, on the excess, the value whereof is forfeited, unless such duty be paid; as also treble the value of any articles thereof, if landed for sale. I vessels not bound to the United States, but putting in, in distress, the master and mate must within twenty-four hours, make protest, setting forth the circumstances of the distress, before a notary public, or other person day authorized; and, within forty-eight hours, report of the cargo, as in other cares: and the distress being duly certified by the wardens of the port, permits may, if

necessary be granted for unlading; the collectors causing the goods unladen to be stored, and, if damaged, or if necessary in repairing the ship.

Masters of vessels bound to foreign ports, previous to obtaining a clearance, must deliver to the collector of the district from which they are about to sail, manifests of their cargoes; and any master departing without a clearance, forfeits two hundred dollars.

The penalty of falle liwearing, as well of masters of vessels, as of the owners or configures of goods, or their factors or agents, is sine or imprisonment, or both; not exceeding, in case of the sormer, one thousand

dollars; of the latter one year.

No master of a vessel arriving at any port, where there is a post-office, may report or make entry, till he has delivered to the post-master all letters in his possession, directed to any person within the United States.

# II. Of the Duty of the Owners or Confignees of Goods.

Within fifteen days after the master of any vessel shall have made report to the collector, the owners or consignees, or their factors or agents must, on oath or affirmation, make entry with the said collector, of the goods consigned to them, particularizing the marks, numbers and contents of each package; or if in bulk, the quantity and quality; producing the original invoices, documents, and bills of lading, and declaring, that should any other goods afterwards appear to be configned to them, they

will make it known in order to a due entry thereof.

Articles exempt from duty, as clothes, books, house-hold furniture, &c. must be separately and distinctly entered by the owner or his agent; who, according to the best of his knowledge, must make oath respecting such owner, his occupation, arrival or expected arrival; and that the said articles are really intended for his or his family's use, and not for sale; which oath being endorsed on the entry, must be subscribed by the person making it. And in case such person be not the real owner of the goods, he must give bond, that a like oath, shall, within a year be had of the real owner, either taken before the collector with whom the entry is made, or produced to him duly executed. A copy of which oath and entry must be transmitted to the secretary of the treasury.

Report and entry must also be made on the re-importation of articles of the growth or manufactures of the United States. Such articles being duty-free, their identity must be carefully proved. for which purpose, the oaths of such persons as have knowledge of the facts are required, relative to the time of their exportation, the ship in which and the person by whom exported; and if imported into any other district than that from which they were exported, a certificate from the collector of the district, certifying their exportation; such certificate, however, being dispensed with, where it cannot be immediately produced, on giving bond

for its production within four months.

No goods imported from a foreign country may be unladen till the duties, agreeably to an estimate made by the collector and naval officer (where there is one at the port) are paid or secured; and a permit signed by the said collector, and countersigned by the said naval officer (where there is one at the port) granted; nor in any case, except by special

licence unless between sun-rise and sun-set. Goods unladen in violation of these restrictions (as also the vessel and her tackle, where the value of the goods amount to four hundred dollars) are forseited; and every person concerned therein incurs a penalty of four hundred dollars, of being advertised in the public papers, and incapacity of holding office for seven years. Also goods requiring to be weighed or guaged, may not, on penalty of forseiture, be removed from the wharf where first landed, without the presence of a proper officer, till it be done.

Goods whereof the entry does not specify the particulars, are required to be stored till the particulars are ascertained, and the duties adjusted. And in all cases, where the final adjustments of the duties exceed the estimate thereof before taken, the difference is to be paid to the collector; and where it is less than such estimate, the party having paid or secured them agreeably thereto, to be refunded or credited, as the case may be.

# III. Of the duty of the Officers of the Cufloms.

THE officers of the customs are required to take oath and give bond for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices; and for default of the former, they incur a penalty of two hundred dollars.

The collectors are empowered, in prefence of the naval officer, where there is one, to administer the necessary onths to masters of vessels, the owners of goods, &c. And collectors, naval officers, and surveyors of

ports, may, in case of absence or sickness, act by deputy.

To funerintend the delivery of goods, infectors may be put and kept on board of veilels, while lying in port, or while going from diffrict to diftrict, may prohibit any goods from being unladen without a permit, and after fun-fet fecure the hatches, which may not be opened, except in their presence, on penalty of two hundred dollars .- In like manner the officers of the customs, including those of the revenue cutters, may as well without as within their respective districts, go on board of all such vessels as, bound to the United States, have arrived within four leagues of the coast, may demand manifests, examine the cargoes, and designate any trunk or package, being separate from the rest of the cargo, sealing the same, if through: proper, and transmitting to the collectors of the diffricts, to which fuch veffels are bound, a particular account thereof; and any fuch trunk or package, on arrival, not appearing, or the feal being broken, fubjects the master to a penalty of two hundred dollars. Such officers may, in like circumftances, make feizures, where goods are legally forfeited; and if, in any case, impeded or resisted in the execution of their duty, the person offending forfeits a fum not exceeding four hundred dollars.

Entries, on the delivery of the cargoes of vessels, must, when such delivery is completed, be compared with the entries of the owners, or configurezs, and the result endorsed on the respective entries, and subscribed by the officers making the comparison. And in case any package which shall have been reported, be missing, the master forseits sive hundred dollars; but may save the pen sty by making due proof before proper authority, that no part of his cargo since taken on board, had been unshipped, except as contained in his report, or that such disagreement was by accident or mis-

take.

In case any goods, other than falt and coal, remain on board any vessel fifteen days after the mafter's report is required to be made, the fame must, by the inspectors, be delivered into the custody of the collector: who keeping them at the risk of the owner, may, at the expiration of nine months, if claim be not previously made, cause them to be appraised by two reputable merchants (to afcertain the duties thereon) and ield at public auction, retaining the duties, and paying the overplus, if any, for the use of the owner, into the treasury of the United State. And when goods are damaged, or not accompanied with the original invoice, the duties may be afcertained by appraifement of two merchants, the collector choosing one, and the owner the other; or goods not accompanied with invoices, may, at the option and risk of the owner, be knot by the collector till the invoice be obtained. But goods entered, and not invoiced, are forfeited; and any collector suspecting invoices to be not according to the true value of the goods, may caule an appraisement thereof to be made, as in case of damaged goods.

On suspicion of fraud, packages, whereof entry has been made, may, in the presence of two or more reputable merchants, be opened and examined; and in case of disagreement, unless it be proved to have been by accident or mistake, such articles as disagree with their respective entries, are subject to forseiture. Goods concealed, with intention to desirand the revenue, are also, if found, subject to forseiture. And are person purchasing goods liable to seizure, knowing them to be such, for seits double their value.

Officers of the cultoms, demanding or receiving other than legal fees, incur a penalty of two hundred dellars; and accepting a bribe or reward, for conniving at a falle entry of veffels or goods, a penalty of not less than two hundred, nor greater than two thousand dellars. And perions giving or offering such bribe or reward, incur a like penalty.

# IV. Of the payment of Duties, &c.

IN all cases where the duties do not exceed fifry dollars, they must be paid immediately; but where they exceed that rum, they may be either paid immediately, or fecured by bond, for their payment, if accruing on West India goods, other than fult, in four months; on falt in nine months; on wines in twelve months; and on all other articles, teas excented, one half in fix, one quarter in nine, and the remainder in twelve menths: which bond may, at the option of the obligation, either include one or more furcties, or, without furcties, be accompanied with a depolit of part of the goods. And the duties on teas may be feemed by a bond with furcties, payable in one year; or by bond, without furcties, in donble their amount, payable in two years; the teas being day fited at the risk and expense of the importers, in warehouses agreed on between them and an infpector. And in case of depolit, any part of teas may be delivered to the owners on paying, or further fecuring the gayment of duties, by bond, with fureties to be paid, where the daties do not exceed one hundred dollars in four months; where they exceed one hundred, and do not exceed five hundred dollars, in eight months: or where they exceed five hundred dollars, in twelve months. But the credit by the last-mentioned bond must not exceed two years from the deposit of the teas; the

collector then having power to cause so much thereof to be fold at public austion, as will discharge the arrears of duties still due, with cost of sale.

Bonds for duties, not being paid at the time they become due, the collectors are required to inflitute fuits for their recovery; and in case of infolvency the debts due to the United States have priority.

# V. Of the manner in which goods must be imported.

Spirits, wines, and teas, must, on pain of forfeiture, at least of the two former, be landed under the superintendance of some officer of inspection, to whom all permits from collectors for their landing must be previously

produced.

Distilled spirits may not be imported in any cask which shall have been marked pursuant to any law respecting such spirits, on pain of sorfeiture of the spirits, and the ship or vessel importing them. Nor may any distilled spirits, except arrack, and sweet cordials, be imported in casks of less capacity than ninety gallons, on pain of sorfeiture. Ale, beer, or porter may not be imported in less casks than of the capacity of sorty gallons, or in less packages than six dozen of bottles, on pain of sorieiture thereof, and of the ship or vessel importing them.

No goods, other than houshold furniture, and clothes of perfors coming into the United States, for the purpose of becoming inhabitants, may be brought from a foreign country, into any district thereof, Loudville, Champlain, and Sonth Hero excepted, in any other manner than by sea; nor by sea in vessels less than thirty tons burthen, on pain or forseiture of all such goods, and the carriages, teams, or vessels by which conveyed.

# Extract from the act making Provision in cases of Drawbacks.

ANY grods, waves, and merchandize, imported into the United States, may be exported from any of the portsat which ships and vassels from the Cape of Good Hope, or from any place beyond the same, are admitted to make entry

and entitled to the same drawbacks of the duties, as goods exported from the district into which they were imported, are entitled to; provided they be accompanied by a certificate from the collector of the District into which they were imported. And that in order to entitle any person to such certificate, be or they shall make out an entry of such goods; &c: specifying the marks and numbers, packages and contents, the names of the master and vessel in which, the time when, and the place from which they were imported, the names of the master and vessel in which they are intended to be laden, and the District in the United States, to which they are destined; and such merchandize shall also be entered with the collector of the District into which they shall be brought from the place of their importation, previous to the landing or unlading thereof. The foregoing requisites baving been complied with, the drawbacks are obtainable on merchandize exported to a foreign port on entry being made, and bonds given in the usual form.



Double letters are double, and triple letters, triple of these rates. A packet of the weight of one ounce avoirdupoise weight at the rate of sour single letters; and in like proportion for one of a greater weight. Newspapers one cent each for any distance, not exceeding 100 miles, to any distance in the same state where printed, the same; and for any greater distance from one state to another, one and a half cent.

All letters or packets conveyed in private veffels four cents, with the addition of legal postage, if destined to any other place than where such

veffel may arrive.

All letters and packets to and from the Prefident, and Vice-Prefident of the United States; and to and from the fecretary of the Treasury, the comptroller, the auditor, the register, the commissioner of the revenue, the treasurer, the fecretary of state, the fecretary of war, the postmastergeneral, his affistant, and deputies are free of postage. And also all letters and packets, not exceeding two ounces weight, to and from any member of Congress, the fecretary of the Senate, and the clerk of the house of Representatives, during any session of Congress, and twenty days after it. But no public officer can frank any letters, except his own; and any letter inclosed to any of them, and directed to any other person, shall be put into the post-office, and be charged with the usual postage.

Pamphlets and magazines, not exceeding fifty miles one cout per sheet, not exceeding one hundred miles, one and a half cent; and any greater

distance two cents per sheet.

All letters brought to any post-office half an hour oefore the making of the mail shall be forwarded therein; except in offices where the P. M. general, thinks longer time necessary, which in no case shall exceed one hour: And all these times so fixed, shall be notified to the public in one or more news-papers for six weeks ensuing said regulations.

All packets or letters water-borne in packet-boats, provided by the United States, for every fingle letter 8 cents; for every double letter 16 cents; for every triple letter 24 cents; and for every letter or packet brought in any private veffel 4 cents if delivered at the place where the veffel arrives, and if directed to any other place, the additional legal postage.—If any postmaster, or other person under him demand more than the legal postage, they shall forfeit for such offence 100 dollars, and be

rendered incapable of future truft.

The master or commander of every vessel arriving in the United States, shall deliver to the post-master at the port where he arrives, all letters under his care; except such as are directed to the owner or configuee, or directed to be delivered at the port where the vessel arrives; for which he shall receive from the postmaster, or deputy 2 cents for each letter and packet. Any person that shall set up a horse post or stage waggon, or packet boat, on any route by land or water, where regular communication has been established by Congress; and shall receive any letter or packet, other than news papers, magazines or pamphlets, or letters directed to the owner of the conveyance, or to the person to whom any packet on board is directed, shall forfeit 50 dollars.

Way letters shall be received, if presented more than two miles from a post-office, and delivered at the first office, subject to an additional rate of one cent; letters directed to perfons living between post-offices shall be delivered where directed, subject to the addition of two cents for the use of the carrier; unless the receipt and delivery of letters on the way (in the opinion of the postmaster general,) be incompatible with the time or

manner of carrying or the speed required.

If any person in any department of the general post-office, shall secrete, embezzle, or destroy any letter or packet entrusted to him (except in the case that follows) shall be fined 300 dollars, or imprisoned 6 months, or both according to the aggravation of the offence; and if said letter or packet contain a bank note, bill of exchange, warrant of the treasury, assignment of stock, letters of attorney to receive annuities or dividends, to fell stock, or to receive the interest thereof, letter of credit, bond warrant, drast, bill or promissory note whatsoever, for the payment of money; or he shall take any of these articles out of a letter or packet, on conviction he shall suffer death.

Every printer of a news paper may fend one paper to a brother news printer within the United States, free of postage.—Every printer or other person, who shall conceal a letter or other memorandum in writing in a news paper, or package of papers, shall be liable to a fine of 5 dollars. And if any of the persons employed in the department of the post-office, shall detain, delay, embezzle or destroy any news paper, magazine or pamphlet, with which he shall be entrusted he shall forseit 50 dollars for

every such offence. And if any post-master (or other person) shall open or permit to be opened any mail of news papers not directed to his office (unless it is directed to a place where there is no office) shall forfeit 20 dollars.

Letters or packets left at any post-office to be conveyed beyond sea, or to any other port of the United States, by water pay one cent. Letters delivered by letter carriers 2 cents, at the post-office one cent, in addition to the common postage.

A pound of pure gold is valued at 15 pounds pure filver.

The gold and filver coins of Great Britain, France, Spain and Portugal, are allowed by law to be tendered in all payments, at the rates following, viz.

The gold coins of Great Britain and Portugal of their present standard, at the rate of eighty-nine cents for one penny-weight, and those of France and Spain at the rate, f eighty-seven cents for one penny-weight: the Spanish milled dollar, weighing not less than seventeen penny-weights and seven grains, at one hundred cents; and the crowns of France, containing not less than eighteen penny-weights and seventeen grains, at 110 cents, but at the expiration of three years after the coining of gold and silver shall commence at the mint of the United States, all foreign coins will by law cease from being a legal tender, except Spanish milled dollars and parts thereof. And at the expiration of six months after cents and half cents to the value of 50,000 dollars shall have been issued, all other copper coins are so bidden, under the penalty of ten dollars, and the forseiture of the pieces so offered.

And the faid duties are chargeable upon each and every Bill of Exchange and Bill of Lading without respect to the number contained in each set.

III. Bends required in any case by the Laws of the United States, or of any State, upon legal process, or in any judicial proceeding, or for the faithful performance of any trust or duty, are exempt from the payment of Stamp Duties.











