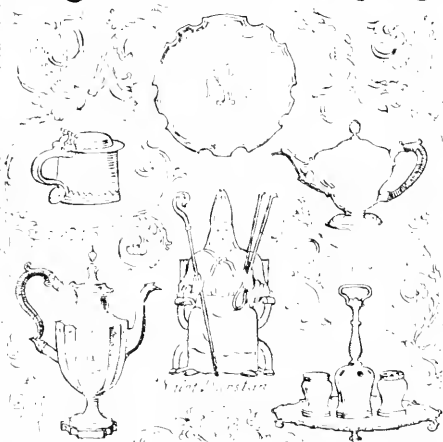

# P R E F A C E.

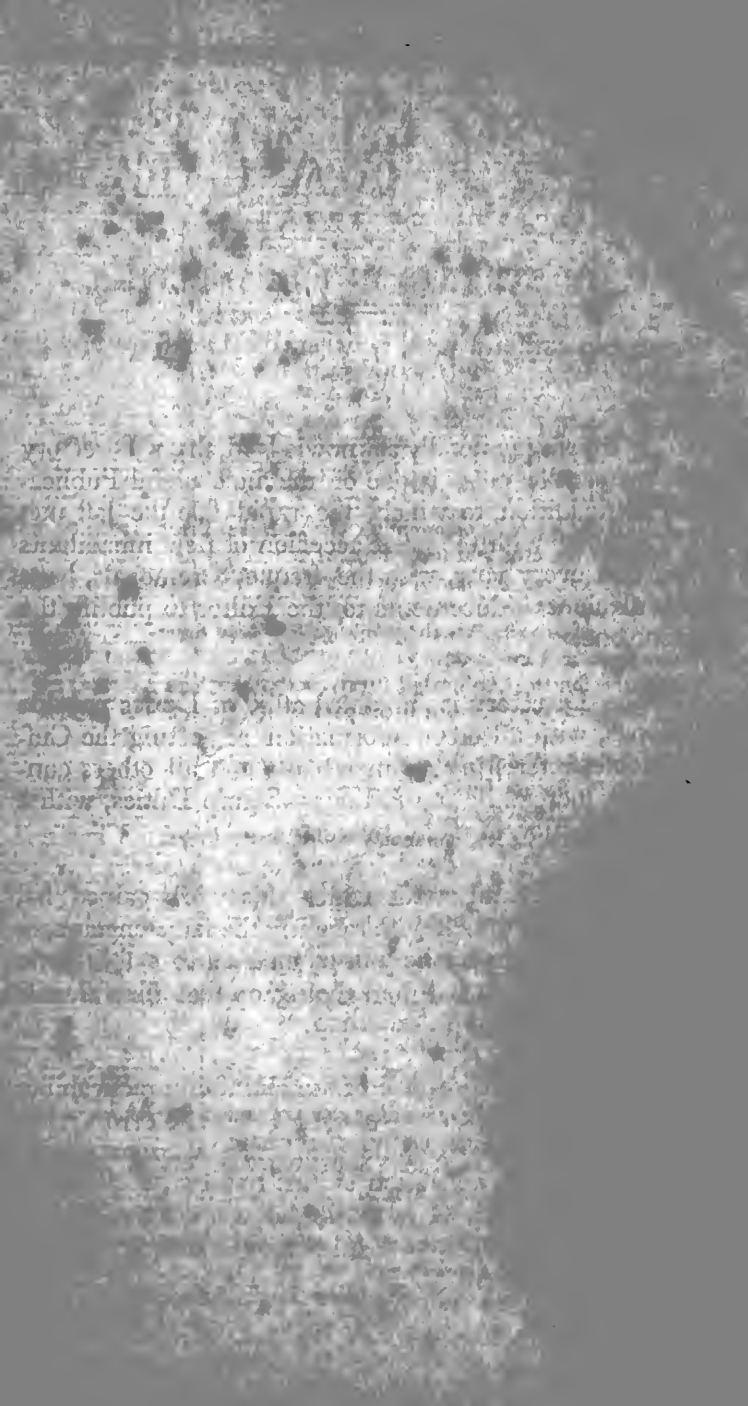

# A L I S T

OF THE

## MAIN STREETS IN PHILADELPHIA,

Which run east and west, between the Delaware and the Schuylkill.

---

**H**IGH-STREET, commonly called Market-street, is the principal street in the city, and near the centre.

Parallel to it on the north, the first street is Mulberry, commonly called Arch street.

The second is Sassafras, commonly called Race street.

The third is Vine street.

And the fourth is Callowhill street, in the Northern Liberties.

On the south side, the first street parallel to High street, is Chestnut street.

The second, Walnut street.

The third, Spruce street.

The fourth, Pine street.

And the fifth, Cedar, commonly called South street.

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A LIST of the private Streets, Lanes and Alleys ; with their original names, and those by which they are most commonly known.

**A**PPLETREE Alley, running east and west from Fourth to Fifth streets, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Baker's Alley, running north and south from Vine to Elm street, between Second and Third streets.

Bearlicker's Court, between No. 68 and 72, north Sixth street.

Benner's Alley, running north and south from Vine to Elm street, between Second and Third streets.

Biddle's Alley, running south from High street, between Second and Third streets.

Black-horse Alley, running east and west from Front to Second streets, between High and Chestnut streets.

Blackberry Alley, running north and south from Pine to Lombard street, between Eighth and Ninth streets.

Branch Street, running east and west from Third to Fourth street, between Vine and Sassafras streets.

Brooke's Court, on the west side of Front street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Carpenter street, running east and west from Sixth to Seventh street, between High and Chestnut streets.

Carter's Alley, on the west side of Second street, between Chestnut and Walnut streets.

Cauffman's Alley, on the south side of Cherry street, between Third and Fourth streets.

Chancery Lane, running north and south from Mulberry street to Combes's alley, between Front and Second streets.

Cherry Street, running east and west from Third to Ninth street, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Chimnies Fourteen, between No. 130 and 146, north Fifth street.

Church Alley, running east and west from Second to Third street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Coates' Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Vine and Sassafras streets.

Combes's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second streets, between High and Mulberry streets.

Cooper's Court, on the north side of Mulberry street, between Front and Second streets.

Cresson's Alley, running east and west from Fifth to Sixth street, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Cresson's Court, between Cherry street and Cresson's alley.

Crooked-Billet Alley, on the east side of Water street, between High and Chestnut streets.

Crown street, running north and south from Sassafras to Vine street, and continued in the Northern Liberties, between Fourth and Fifth streets.

Cyprus Alley, running east and west from Third to Fourth street, between Spruce and Union streets.

Dock street is the only crooked street in Philadelphia, begins at the bridge in Front street, and extends north westward in a serpentine track through two squares, across Second and Walnut streets, and terminates at Third street: another branch of it extends south-westward across Spruce street, and terminates in Second street.

Drinker's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Drinker's Court, on the south side of Union street, between Second and Third streets.

Elbow Lane, running south from High street, between Second and Third streets, and turning west into Third street, between High and Chestnut streets. That part of Elbow lane which runs south from High street, is commonly called White Horse Alley.

Elfrith's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Elm street, running east and west from Second to Third street, between Vine and Sassafras streets, commonly called New street.

Etris's Alley, on the west side of Fifth street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Fayette street, running north and south between Mulberry and Filbert streets, and between Ninth and Tenth streets.

Fearis's Alley, on the west side of Front street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Fetter Lane, running east and west, from Third to Broad street, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Filbert street, running east and west, from Eighth street to Schuylkill, between High and Mulberry streets.

Franklin's Court, between 106 and 108 Market street.

Fromberger's Court, in Second between Market and Arch streets.

Gaskel street, running east and west from Second to Fifth street, between Lombard and Cedar streets.

George's street, running north and south from Gaskel to Cedar street, and continued in Southwark, between Second and Third streets.

Gray's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Chestnut and Walnut streets.

Grindstone Alley, between 81 and 83 Market street.

Gross's Alley, on the north side of Sassafras street, between Second and Third streets.

Hoffman's Alley, on the south side of Sassafras street, between Fourth and Fifth streets.

Jackson's Court, on the north side of Sassafras street, between Front and Second streets.

Key's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Vine and Sassafras streets.

Knight's Yard, between Fourth and Fifth street, opens southwardly from Sassafras street, at No. 130.

Læticia Court, running north and south from High street to Black Horse Alley, between Front and Second streets.

Laurel Court, on the north side of Spruce street, between Second and Third streets.

Little Water street, running north and south from Willing and Francis's wharf to Cedar street.

Lodge Alley, on the west side of Second street, between Chestnut and Walnut streets.

Lombard street, beginning at Front street, and running west between Pine and Cedar street.

Lownes's or Elmsley's Alley, on the west side of Second street, between Walnut and Spruce streets.

M'Calloch's Alley, on the west side of Front street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Mayor's Alley, on the east side of Third street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Mifflin's Alley, on the west side of Second street, between Walnut and Spruce streets.

Moravian Alley, running north and south from Mulberry to Sassafras street, between Second and Third streets.

Mulberry Court, on the west side of Sixth street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Nicholson's Court, runs from Sassafras to Cherry street, and between Sixth and Seventh streets.

Norris's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Chestnut and Walnut streets.

North Alley, running east and west from Fifth to Sixth street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Patton's Alley, on the west side of Fourth street, between High and Chestnut streets.

Pear street, running east and west from Second to Third street, between Walnut and Spruce streets.

Penn street, running north and south from Pine to Cedar street, between Front and Little Water streets.

Petty's or Greenleaf's Alley, on the west side of Fourth street, between High and Chestnut streets.

Pewter Platter Alley, on the west side of Front street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Priests Alley, on the west side of Front street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Pruan street, running west from Fourth street, between Walnut and Spruce streets, commonly called Shippen's Alley.

Quarry street, running east and west from Third to Broad street, between Mulberry and Sassafras streets.

Rawlinson's Court, on the east side of Second street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Relief Alley, running east and west between Front and Second streets, and between Lombard and Cedar streets.

Sassafras Alley, running north and south from Sassafras street to Scheibell's alley, between Fifth and Sixth streets.

Say's Alley, on the east side of Water street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Schievely's Alley, between Sassafras and Vine streets, and runs east from Sixth street towards the Fourteen Chimnies.

Scheibell's Alley, running east from the east side of Sixth street, between Sassafras and Vine street.

Shepherd's Alley, on the west side of Third street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Sim's Alley, on the east side of water street, between High and Chestnut streets.

Smith's Alley, running north and south from Dock street to Carter's alley, between Second and Third streets.

South alley, running east and west from Fifth to Sixth street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Star Alley, runs north and south from Cherry street to Sassafras street, between Fifth and Sixth streets.

Stamper's Alley, running east and west from Second to Third street between Pine and Lombard streets.

Steinmetz Alley, on the east side of Fourth street, between Sassafras and Vine streets.

Sterling Alley, running north and south from Sassafras to Cherry street, between Third and Fourth streets.

Story street, running east and west from Third to Fourth street, between Sassafras and Vine streets, commonly called New street.

Styles's Court, on the south side of Mulberry street, between Second and Third streets.

Sugar Alley, running east and west from Sixth to Ninth street, between High and Mulberry streets.

Strawberry street, running north and south from High to Chestnut streets, between Second and Third streets.

Taylor's Alley, running east and west from Front to Second street, between Chestnut and Walnut streets.

Turner's Court, running north and south from Market to Chestnut street, and between Nos. 210 and 212 Market street.

Union street, running east and west from Front to Fourth street, between Spruce and Pine streets.

Videl's Alley, on the west side of Second street, between Chestnut and Walnut streets.

Waggoner's Alley, running south from Sassafras street between Ninth and Tenth streets.

Whalebone Alley, running south from Chestnut street, between Third and Fourth streets.

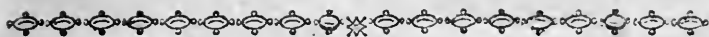
Willing's Alley, running east and west from Third to Fourth street between Walnut and Spruce streets.

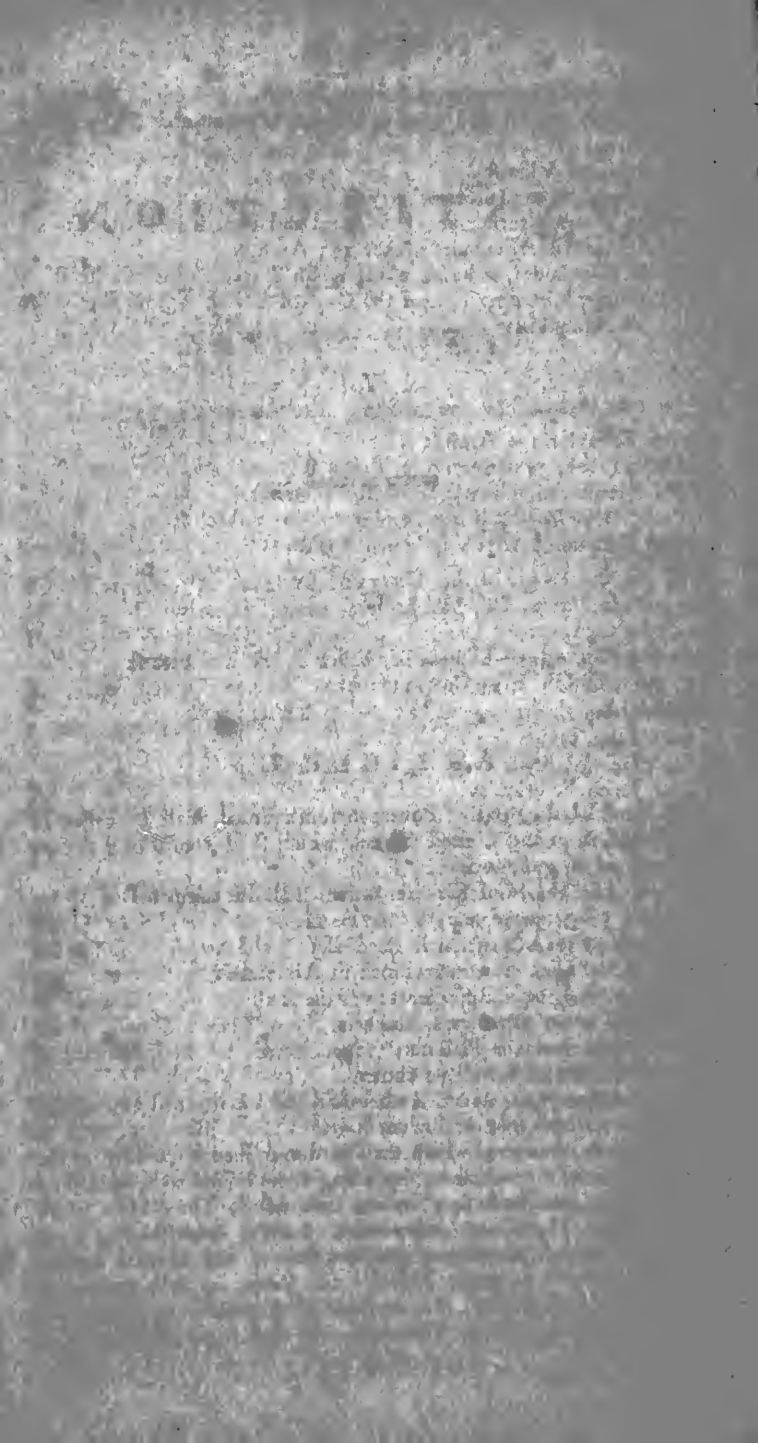

# CONSTITUTION

OF THE

UNITED STATES,

AS PASSED IN CONVENTION, SEPTEMBER 17, 1787.

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**W**E, the People of the UNITED STATES, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure Domestic Tranquility, provide for the Common Defence, promote the General Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to Ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this CONSTITUTION for the United States of AMERICA.

## ARTICLE I.

*Sect. 1.* ALL Legislative Powers herein granted, shall be vested in a CONGRESS of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

*Sect. 2.* The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second year, by the People of the several States; and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous branch of the State Legislature.

No person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of Twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and including Indians not taxed, Three-fifths of all other Persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such manner as they shall by Law direct. The number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every Thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at

least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of *New-Hampshire* shall be entitled to chuse three—*Massachusetts* eight—*Rhode-Island* and *Providence Plantations* one—*Connecticut* five—*New-York* six—*New-Jersey* four—*Pennsylvania* eight—*Delaware* one—*Maryland* six—*Virginia* ten—*North-Carolina* five—*South-Carolina* five—and *Georgia* three.

When Vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers, and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

*Sect. 3.* The Senate of the United States, shall be composed of two Senators from each State: chosen by the Legislature thereof for six years, and each Senator shall have one vote.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided, as equally as may be, into three classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

No person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

The Vice-President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall choose their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the absence of the Vice-President, or when he shall exercise the office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose, they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside: And no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

*Sect. 4.* The times, places, and manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each state by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing Senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

*Sect. 5.* Each house shall be the Judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members; and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the members of either house on any question, shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of Congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

*Sect. 6.* The Senators and Representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house, they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States, shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

*Sect. 7.* All bills for raising revenue; shall originate in the house of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with amendments as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to re-consider it. If after such re-consideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be re-considered, and if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill, shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the President within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, Resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

*Sect. 8.* The Congress shall have power—to lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts, and provide for the common defence and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian tribes;

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies, throughout the United States;

To coin money, regulate the value thereof, and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and Post roads;

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing, for limited times, to authors and inventors, the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offences against the law of nations;

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land or water;

To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use, shall be for a longer term than two years;

To provide and maintain a navy;

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the states respectively, the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states, and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock-yards, and other needful buildings;—And



To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or office thereof.

*Sect. 9.* The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year 1808, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in cases of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or ex post facto law shall be passed.

No capitation, or other direct tax, shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state. No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another: nor shall vessels bound to or from one state, be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury, but in consequence of appropriations made by law: and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money, shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them, shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

*Sect. 10.* No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make any thing but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

No state shall, without the consent of the Congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts laid by any State on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and controul of the Congress. No State shall, without the consent of Congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in a war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

## A R T I C L E II.

*Sect. 1.* The executive power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the Vice-President, chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each state shall appoint in such manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed) and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse, by ballot, one of them for President; and if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list, the said House shall, in like manner, chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote: a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the President, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors, shall be the Vice-President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall chuse from them, by ballot, the Vice-President.

The Congress may determine the time of chusing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person, except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States, at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the office of President; neither shall any person be eligible to that office, who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the President from office, or of his death, resignation or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the Vice-President, and the Congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the President, and Vice-President, declaring what officer shall then act as President, and such officer shall act accordingly, until the disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated times, receive for his services, a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation.

" I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States.

*Sect. 2.* The President shall be commander in chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states, when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion, in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of the respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offences against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present, concur: and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate, shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law. But the Congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper, in the President alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The President shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

*Sect. 3.* He shall, from time to time, give to the Congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration, such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them, and in case of disagreement between them, with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers; he shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

*Sect. 4.* The President, Vice-President and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

### A R T I C L E III.

*Sect. 1.* The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the Congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior, and shall, at stated times, receive for their services, a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

*Sect. 2.* The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between

two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizen thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions, and under such regulations as the Congress shall make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the Congress may by law have directed.

*Sect. 3.* Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

## A R T I C L E IV.

*Sect. 1.* Full faith and credit shall be given in each state, to the public acts, records, and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the Congress may by general laws prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

*Sect. 2.* The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

A person charged in any state with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice, and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered upon claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

*Sect. 3.* New states may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state; nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States, or of any particular state.

**SECT. 4.** The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union, a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and on application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic violence.

## ARTICLE V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on the application of the Legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided, that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article: and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the Senate.

## ARTICLE VI.

All debts contracted and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution, as under the confederation.

This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof; and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby; any thing in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by oath or affirmation, to support this constitution: but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

## ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

*Done in Convention, by the unanimous consent of the States present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.*

**IN CONVENTION MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 17th, 1787**

*Resolved,*

**THAT** the preceding constitution be laid before the United States in Congress assembled, and that it is the opinion of this convention, that it should afterwards be submitted to a convention of delegates, chosen in each state by the people thereof, under the recommendation of its Legislature, for their assent and ratification; and that each convention assenting to, and ratifying the same, should give notice thereof to the United States in Congress assembled.

*Resolved,* That it is the opinion of this convention, that as soon as the conventions of nine states shall have ratified this constitution, the

United States in Congress assembled, should fix a day on which electors should be appointed by the states which shall have ratified the same, and a day on which the electors should assemble to vote for the president, and the time and place for commencing proceedings under this constitution. That after such publication the electors should be appointed, and the Senators and representatives elected. That the electors should meet on the day fixed for the election of the President, and should transmit their votes, certified, signed, sealed and directed as the constitution requires, to the secretary of the United States in Congress assembled; that the Senators and Representatives should convene at the time and place assigned; that the Senators should appoint a President of the Senate, for the sole purpose of receiving, opening and counting the votes for President; and, that after he shall be chosen, the Congress, together with the President, should, without delay, proceed to execute this constitution.

IN CONVENTION, September 17th, 1787.

SIR,

WE have now the honor to submit to the consideration of the United States in Congress assembled, that constitution which has appeared to us the most advisable.

The friends of our country have long seen and desired, that the power of making war, peace and treaties, that of levying money, and regulating commerce, and the correspondent executive and judicial authorities, should be fully and effectually vested in the general government of the Union: but the impropriety of delegating such extensive trust to one body of men, is evident—Hence results the necessity of a different organization.

It is obviously impracticable in the federal government of these states, to secure all rights of independent sovereignty to each, and yet provide for the interest and safety of all—individuals entering into society, must give up a share of liberty to preserve the rest. The magnitude of the sacrifice must depend as well on situation and circumstance, as on the object to be obtained. It is at all times difficult to draw with precision the line between those rights which must be surrendered, and those which may be reserved; and on the present occasion this difficulty was increased by a difference among the several states as to their situation, extent, habits, and particular interests.

In all our deliberations on this subject we kept steadily in our view, that which appears to us the greatest interest of every true American, the consolidation of our union, in which is involved our prosperity, felicity, safety, perhaps our national existence. This important consideration, seriously and deeply impressed on our minds, led each state in the convention to be less rigid on points of inferior Magnitude, than might have been otherwise expected; and thus the constitution, which

we now present, is the result of a spirit of amity, and of that mutual deference and concession which the peculiarity of our political situation rendered indispensable.

That it will meet the full and entire approbation of every state, is not perhaps, to be expected; but each will doubtless consider, that had her interest alone been consulted, the consequences might have been particularly disagreeable or injurious to others; that it is liable to as few exceptions as could reasonably have been expected, we hope and believe; that it may promote the lasting welfare of that country so dear to us all, and secure her freedom and happiness, is our most ardent wish. ## A M E N D M E N T S.

### A R T I C L E I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

### A R T I C L E II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.



## ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

## ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

## ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

## ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defence.

## ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact, tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

## ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

## ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

## ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.

## ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

The gold and silver coins of Great-Britain, France, Spain, and Portugal, were allowed by law to be tendered in payments, at the rates following viz.

The gold coins of Great-Britain and Portugal of their present standard, at the rate of eighty-nine cents for one pennyweight: and those of France and Spain at the rate of eighty-seven cents for one pennyweight: the Spanish milled dollar weighing not less than seventeen pennyweight seven grains at 100 cents; and the crowns of France containing not less than 18 pennyweights 17 grains at 110 cents, but at the expiration of three years after the coining of gold and silver commenced at the mint of the United States, all foreign coins were to cease from being a legal tender, except Spanish milled dollars and parts thereof. And at the expiration of six months after cents and half cents, to the value of 50,000 dollars shall have been issued, all other copper coins are forbidden, under the penalty of ten dollars, and the forfeiture of the pieces so offered.

By an act of Congress passed the ninth of February, 1793, all foreign silver coins, except Spanish milled dollars and parts thereof, ceased to be legal tender for the payment of debts after the 15th of October, 1797; and all foreign gold coins after the 31st of July, 1798; but this act was suspended for three years, by an act of last session, during which time foreign gold and silver coins are to be received as usual.

TONNAGE OF SHIPS OR VESSELS.

ARE IMPOSED THE  
*FOLLOWING DUTIES,*

*To wit—*

---

ON ships or vessels of the United States when entered from any foreign port or place; and when entered into a district in one state from a district in another state (other than an adjoining state on the sea-coast or on a navigable river; and other than vessels duly licensed employed in the coasting trade, or in the bank or whale-fisheries, which are exempt from paying tonnage while so employed, more than once in a year,) having on board, goods, wares and merchandize, taken in one state, to be delivered in another, at the rate of six cents per ton. On ships or vessels built within the United States since the 20th July, 1789, but owned wholly or in part by foreigners, when entered from a foreign port or place, at the rate of thirty cents per ton; on all other ships or vessels, when entered from a foreign port or place, at the rate of fifty cents per ton; and on all ships or vessels not of the United States, when entered in one district from another district, having on board, goods, wares and merchandize, taken in one district to be delivered into another at the rate of fifty cents per ton.

To ascertain the tonnage of a ship, if the same be double decked, take the length thereof from the fore part of the main stem to the after part of the stern post above the upper deck; the breadth at the broadest part above the main wales; half of which breadth, account the depth, deduct from the length three-fifths of the breadth; multiply the remainder by the breadth, and that product by the depth, and divide the last product by ninety-five. If the ship be single decked, take the length and breadth as above directed; take the depth from the under side of the deck plank to the ceiling in the hold: and deducting from the length three fifths of the breadth, multiply and divide as aforesaid.

Duties on tonnage must be paid within ten days after report of the cargo made to the collector; and any master of a vessel leaving or attempting to leave a port without paying such duties, forfeits five hundred dollars.



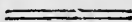

# GENERAL ABSTRACT

FROM THE

## REVENUE LAWS:

*Wherein the several parts of the acts are digested, and transposed under distinct heads, agreeably to the subjects with which they have relation.*



### I. *Of the Duty of Masters of Vessels.*

**E**VERY master of a vessel, bound to the district of Nottingham, must, on penalty of five hundred dollars, deposit with the surveyor of the port of Town Creek, a manifest of the cargo, unless he shall have previously delivered one to some officer of the customs coming on board; bound to the district of Tappahannock, with the surveyor of the port of Urbanna; to the district of Bermuda Hundred, or City Point, with the collector of Norfolk and Portsmouth, or of Hampton; to the district of South Quay, with the collector of Edenton. Which manifest, the respective collectors and surveyors must, after registry, transmit duly certified, to the officer with whom entry is to be made.

Also, every master of a vessel, belonging wholly or in part, to citizens of the United States, must, on arrival from any foreign country, have an accurate and true manifest of the cargo on board; and in default thereof, he forfeits the value of all goods not included in such manifest, unless due proof be made, that no part of the cargo had been unshipped since taken on board, and that such manifest had been lost, or mislaid, or defaced by accident, or was incorrect by mistake.

Which manifest, every master of a vessel, as aforesaid must, on penalty of a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars, produce to the first officer of the customs, who shall appear on board after his arrival within four leagues of the coasts of the United States; and also to the first such officer of the customs, who shall appear on board after his arrival in a district in which any part of his cargo is to be discharged; delivering in either case, a copy thereof, by himself subscribed. The

production of the manifest and receipt of the copy, such officer must certify respectively, on penalty of five hundred dollars; certifying on the original, the day and year when produced, and the delivery of a copy; and on the copy the day and year it was delivered. He must also transmit said copy to the collector of the district to which such vessel is bound.

If any part of the cargoes of such vessels, as laden with goods, and bound to the United States, have arrived within four leagues of the coast, be unladed previous to their coming into port, and being legally authorized to unlade, all the goods so unladed, and any vessel or boat into which they may be put are forfeited; and the master and mate of the vessel so unladed, forfeit, each, one thousand dollars; and every other person aiding and assisting, treble the value of the goods unladed. These forfeitures are not however, incurred in case of unavoidable accidents, necessity, or distress of weather, if duly notified and strictly proved.

Also, if any ship or vessel has arrived within the limits of a district of the United States, from a foreign country, she leaves or attempts to leave it, (unless to proceed to a more interior district,) previous to report and entry made, the master forfeits four hundred dollars. And the collector, naval officer, surveyor, or any revenue cutters may arrest and bring her back; unless the departure was occasioned by distress of weather, duress of enemies, or other necessity, which in either case must be strictly proved.

Further, every master of a vessel (ships of war and public packers excepted) must within twenty-four hours after his arrival in any port of the United States, (if the usual hours of business will permit) make report thereof to the chief officer of the customs at the port, and within forty-eight hours, a further report of the cargo, and deliver a manifest to the collector. In default of which, he forfeits one thousand dollars.

But masters of vessels, whereof only part of the cargoes is destined to any particular port of the United States, may, after paying or securing the duties of such part, and giving bond equal to the amount of duties on the remainder, that no part thereof shall be landed in the United States without due entry, proceed to the port or place of their destination.

And when the cargoes of any vessels are destined to ports in different districts, the masters thereof may proceed from district to district, paying in each district, the duties on such goods as may be delivered therein, and giving bond to the collector of the district where they first arrived, for their due entry in every other district, and also obtaining from the respective collectors, to whom any part of their cargoes may be reported, copies of such reports, and certificates of the quantity and particulars of the goods delivered.—Any master, in default of obtaining such copy and certificate, or neglecting to produce them to any subsequent collector, forfeits five hundred dollars.—But in case of spirits such certificates must be had from, and produced to the officers of inspection.



Sea-stores being exempt from duty, must be designated as such in the master's report, and if excessive, the duty may be estimated, on the excess, the value whereof is forfeited, unless such duty be paid; as also treble the value of any articles thereof, if landed for sale. Vessels, not bound to the United States, but putting in, in distress, the master and mate must within twenty-four hours, make protest, setting forth the circumstances of the distress, before a notary public, or other person duly authorized; and, within forty-eight hours, report of the cargo, as in other cases: and the distress being duly certified by the wardens of the port, permits may, if necessary be granted for unladen; the collectors causing the goods unladen to be stored, and, if damaged, or if necessary in repairing the ship, allowing them, the duties thereon being first paid, to be sold.

Masters of vessels bound to foreign ports, previous to obtaining a clearance, must deliver to the collector of the district from which they are about to sail, manifests of their cargoes; and any master departing without a clearance, forfeits two hundred dollars.

The penalty of false swearing, as well of masters of vessels, as of the owners or consignees of goods, or their factors or agents, is fine or imprisonment, or both; not exceeding, in case of the former, one thousand dollars; of the latter one year.

No master of a vessel arriving at any port, where there is a post-office, may report or make entry, till he has delivered to the postmaster all letters in his possession, directed to any person within the United States.

## II. *Of the Duty of the Owners or Consignees of Goods.*

Within fifteen days after the master of any vessel shall have made report to the collector, the owners or consignees, or their factors or agents must, on oath or affirmation, make entry with the said collector, of the goods consigned to them, particularizing the marks, numbers and contents of each package; or if in bulk, the quantity and quality; producing the original invoices, documents, and bills of lading, and declaring, that should any other goods afterwards appear to be consigned to them, they will make it known in order to a due entry thereof.

Articles exempt from duty, as clothes, books, household furniture, &c. must be separately and distinctly entered by the owner or his agents; who, according to the best of his knowledge, must make oath respecting such owner, his occupation, arrival or expected arrival; and that the said articles are really intended for his or his family's use, and not for sale; which oath being endorsed on the entry, must be subscribed by the person making it. And in case such person be not the real owner of the goods, he must give bond, that a like oath, shall, within a year be had of the real owner, either taken before the collector with whom the entry is made, or produced to him duly executed. A copy of which oath and entry must be transmitted to the secretary of the treasury.

Report and entry must also be made on the re-importation of articles of the growth or manufactures of the United States. Such arti-

cles being duty-free, their identity must be carefully proved, for which purpose, the oaths of such persons as have knowledge of the facts are required, relative to the time of their exportation, the ship in which, and the person by whom exported; and if imported into any other district than that from which they were exported, a certificate from the collector of the district, certifying their exportation; such certificate, however, being dispensed with, where it cannot be immediately produced, on giving bond for its production within four months.

No goods imported from a foreign country may be unladen till the duties, agreeably to an estimate made by the collector and naval officer (where there is one at the port) are paid or secured; and a permit signed by the said collector, and countersigned by the same naval officer (where there is one at the port) granted: nor in any case, except by special licence unless between sun-rise and sun-set. Goods unladen in violation of these restrictions (as also the vessel and her tackle, where the value of the goods amount to four hundred dollars) are forfeited; and every person concerned therein incurs a penalty of four hundred dollars, of being advertised in the public papers, and incapacity of holding office for seven years. Also goods requiring to be weighed or guaged, may not, on penalty of forfeiture, be removed from the wharf where first landed, without the presence of a proper officer, till it be done.

Goods whereof the entry does not specify the particulars, are required to be stored till the particulars are ascertained, and the duties adjusted. And in all cases, where the final adjustments of the duties exceed the estimate thereof before taken, the difference is to be paid to the collector; and where it is less than such estimate, the party having paid or secured them agreeably thereto, to be refunded or credited, as the case may be.

### III. *Of the duty of the Officers of the Customs.*

The officers of the customs are required to take oath and give bond for the faithful discharge of the duties of their respective offices; and for default of the former, they incur a penalty of two hundred dollars.

The collectors are empowered, in presence of the naval officer, where there is one, to administer the necessary oaths to masters of vessels, the owners of goods, &c. And collectors, naval officers, and surveyors of ports, may, in case of absence or sickness, act by deputy.

To superintend the delivery of goods, inspectors may be put and kept on board of vessels, while lying in port, or while going from district to district, may prohibit any goods from being unladen without a permit, and after sun-set secure the hatches, which may not be opened except in their presence, on penalty of two hundred dollars.—In like manner the officers of the customs, including those of the revenue cutters, may as well without as within their respective districts, go on board of all such vessels as, bound to the United States, have arrived within four leagues of the coast, may demand manifests, examine the cargoes, and designate any trunk or package, being separate from the rest of the cargo, sealing the same, if thought proper, and transmitting

to the collectors of the districts, to which such vessels are bound, a particular account thereof; and any such trunk or package, on arrival, not appearing, or the seal being broken, subjects the matter to a penalty of two hundred dollars. Such officers may, in like circumstances, make seizures, where goods are legally forfeited; and if, in any case, impeded or resisted in the execution of their duty, the person offending forfeits a sum not exceeding four hundred dollars.

Entries, on the delivery of the cargoes of vessels, must, when such delivery is completed, be compared with the entries of the owners, or consignees, and the result endorsed on the respective entries, and subscribed by the officers making the comparison. And in case any package which shall have been reported, be missing, the master forfeits five hundred dollars; but may save the penalty by making due proof before proper authority, that no part of his cargo since taken on board, had been unshipped, except as contained in his report, or that such disagreement was by accident or mistake.

In case any goods, other than salt and coal, remain on board any vessel fifteen days after the master's report is required to be made, the same must, by the inspectors, be delivered into the custody of the collector: who keeping them at the risk of the owner, may, at the expiration of nine months, if claim be not previously made, cause them to be appraised by two reputable merchants (to ascertain the duties thereon) and sold at public auction, retaining the duties, and paying the overplus, if any, for the use of the owner, into the treasury of the United States. And when goods are damaged, or not accompanied with the original invoice, the duties may be ascertained by appraisement of two merchants, the collector choosing one, and the owner the other: or goods not accompanied with invoices, may, at the option and risk of the owner, be kept by the collector till the invoice be obtained. But goods entered, and not invoiced, are forfeited; and any collector suspecting invoices to be not according to the true value of the goods, may cause an appraisement thereof to be made, as in case of damaged goods.

On suspicion of fraud, packages, whereof entry has been made, may, in the presence of two or more reputable merchants, be opened and examined; and in case of disagreement, unless it be proved to have been by accident or mistake, such articles as disagree with their respective entries, are subject to forfeiture. Goods concealed, with intention to defraud the revenue, are also, if found, subject to forfeiture. And any person purchasing goods liable to seizure, knowing them to be such, forfeits double their value.

Officers of the customs, demanding or receiving other than legal fees, incur a penalty of two hundred dollars; and accepting a bribe or reward, for conniving at a false entry of vessels or goods, a penalty of not less than two hundred, nor greater than two thousand dollars. And persons giving or offering such bribe or reward, incur a like penalty.

#### IV. *Of the payment of Duties, &c.*

In all cases where the duties do not exceed fifty dollars, they must be paid immediately; but where they exceed that sum, they may be either paid immediately, or secured by bond, for their payment, if accruing on West-India goods, other than salt, in four months; on salt in nine months; on wines in twelve months; and on all other articles, teas excepted, one half in six, one quarter in nine, and the remainder in twelve months: which bond may, at the option of the obligator, either include one or more sureties, or without sureties, be accompanied with a deposit of part of the goods. And the duties on teas may be secured by a bond with sureties, payable in one year; or by bond, without sureties, in double their amount, payable in two years; the teas being deposited at the risk and expence of the importers, in warehouses agreed on between them and an inspector. And in case of deposit, any part of teas may be delivered to the owners on paying, or further securing the payment of duties, by bond, with sureties to be paid, where the duties do not exceed one hundred dollars in four months; where they exceed one hundred, and do not exceed five hundred dollars, in eight months: or where they exceed five hundred dollars, in twelve months. But the credit by the last-mentioned bond must not exceed two years from the deposit of the teas; the collector then having power to cause so much thereof to be sold at public auction, as will discharge the arrears of duties still due, with cost of sale.

Bonds for duties, not being paid at the time they become due, the collectors are required to institute suits for their recovery; and in case of insolvency the debts due to the United States have priority.

#### V. *Of the manner in which goods must be imported.*

Spirits, wines and teas, must, on pain of forfeiture, at least of the two former, be landed under the superintendence of some officer of inspection, to whom all permits from collectors for their landing must be previously produced.

Distilled spirits may not be imported in any cask which shall have been marked pursuant to any law respecting such spirits, on pain of forfeiture of the spirits, and the ship or vessel importing them. Nor may any distilled spirits, except arrack, and sweet cordials, be imported in casks of less capacity than ninety gallons, on pain of forfeiture. Ale, beer or porter, may not be imported in less casks than of the capacity of forty gallons, or in less packages than six dozen of bottles, on pain of forfeiture thereof, and of the ship or vessel importing them.

No goods, other than household furniture, and clothes of persons coming into the United States, for the purpose of becoming inhabitants, may be brought from a foreign country, into any district thereof, Louisville, Champlain, and South Hero excepted, in any other manner than by sea; nor by sea in vessels less than thirty tons burthen, on pain of forfeiture of all such goods, and the carriages, teams or vessels by which conveyed.

Double letters are double, and triple letters triple of these rates. A packet of the weight of one ounce avoirdupois weight at the rate of four single letters; and in like proportion for one of a greater weight. News-papers one cent each for any distance not exceeding 100 miles: to any distance in the same state where printed, the same; and for any greater distance from one state to another, one and a half cent.

All letters or packets conveyed in private vessels four cents, with the addition of legal postage, if destined to any other place than where such vessel may arrive.

All letters and packets to and from the President, and Vice-President of the United States; and to and from the secretary of the Treasury, the comptroller, the auditor, the register, the commissioner of the revenue, the treasurer, the secretary of state, the secretary of war, the postmaster-general, his assistant, and deputies are free of postage. And also all letters and packets, not exceeding two ounces weight, to and from any member of Congress, the secretary of the Senate, and the clerk of the House of Representatives, during any session of Congress, and twenty days after it. But no public officer can frank any letters,



except his own; and any letter inclosed to any of them, and directed to any other person, shall be put into the post-office, and be charged with the usual postage.

Phamphlets and magazines, not exceeding fifty miles one cent per sheets, not exceeding one hundred miles, one and a half cent; and any greater distance two cents per sheet.

All letters brought to any post-office half an hour before the making of the mail shall be forwarded therein; except in offices where the P. M. general, thinks longer time necessary, which in no case shall exceed one hour: And all these times so fixed, shall be notified to the public in one or more news-papers for six weeks ensuing said regulations.

All packets, or letters water-borne in packets-boats, provided by the United States, for every single letter 8 cents: for every double letter 16 cents; for every triple letter 24 cents; and for every letter or packet brought in any private vessel 4 cents if delivered at the place where the vessel arrives, and if directed to any other place, the additional legal postage.—If any postmaster, or other person under him demand more than the legal postage, they shall forfeit for such offence 100 dollars, and be rendered incapable of future trust.

The master or commander of every vessel arriving in the United States, shall deliver to the post-master at the port where he arrives, all letters under his care; except such as are directed to the owner or consignee, or directed to be delivered at the port where the vessel arrives; for which he shall receive from the postmaster, or deputy 2 cents for each letter and packet. Any person that shall set up a horse post or stage waggon, or packet boat, on any rout by land or water, where regular communication has been established by Congress; and shall receive any letter or packet, other than news papers, magazines or pamphlets, or letters directed to the owner of the conveyance, or to the person to whom any packet on board is directed, shall forfeit 50 dollars.

Way letters shall be received, if presented more than two miles from a post-office, and delivered at the first office, subject to an additional rate of one cent; letters directed to persons living between post-offices shall be delivered were directed, subject to the addition of two cents for the use of the carrier; unless the receipt and delivery of letters on the way (in the opinion of the postmaster general,) be incompatible with the time or manner of carrying or the speed required.

If any person in any department of the general post-office, shall secrete, embezzle, or destroy any letter or packet entrusted to him (except in the case that follows) shall be fined 300 dollars, or imprisoned 6 months, or both according to the aggravation of the offence; and if said letter or packet contain a bank note, bill of exchange, warrant of the treasury, assignment of stock, letters of attorney to receive annuities of dividends, to sell stock, or to receive the interest thereof, letter of credit, bond warrant, draft, bill or promissory note whatsoever, for the payment of money; or he shall take any of these articles out of a letter or packet, on conviction he shall suffer death.

Every printer of a news paper may send one paper to a brother news printer within the United States, free of postage.—Every printer or

other person, who shall conceal a letter or other memorandum in writing in a news paper, or package of papers, shall be liable to a fine of 5 dollars. And if any of the persons employed in the department of the post-office, shall detain, delay, embezzle or destroy any news paper, magazine or pamphlet, with which he shall be entrusted he shall forfeit 50 dollars for every such offence. And if any post-master (or other person) shall open or permit to be opened any mail of news papers not directed to his office (unless it is directed to a place where there is no officer) shall forfeit 20 dollars.

Letters or packets left at any post-office to be conveyed beyond sea, or to any other port of the United States, by water pay one cent. Letters delivered by letter carriers 2 cents, at the post-office one cent, in addition to the common postage.

FOR REDUCING THE

INTO EACH OTHER.

1st. **T**O reduce the currencies of New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, into those of New-York and North Carolina, to the given sum add  $\frac{1}{3}$  part thereof.

Of Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, to the given sum, add  $\frac{1}{4}$ th.

Of South Carolina and Georgia, from the given sum, subtract  $\frac{2}{9}$ ths thereof.

On the contrary.

2d. To reduce New-York and North Carolina, into New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, from the given sum, deduct  $\frac{1}{4}$ th thereof.

Into Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, from the sum given, deduct  $\frac{1}{16}$ th thereof.

Into South-Carolina and Georgia to the sum given, add  $\frac{1}{6}$ th and then take half of the whole.

3d. To reduce Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, into New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, from the sum given, deduct  $\frac{1}{5}$ th thereof.

Into New-York, and North Carolina, to the sum given, add  $\frac{1}{15}$ th thereof.

Into South-Carolina and Georgia, multiply by  $3\frac{1}{3}$ th, and divide the product by 5 ; or multiply by 28 and divide by 45.

4th. To reduce South-Carolina and Georgia, into New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, to the given sum, add  $\frac{2}{7}$ ths thereof.

Into Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, multiply the given sum by 45 and divide by 28.

Into New-York and North Carolina, from the given sum subtract  $\frac{1}{7}$ , and double the remainder. I i

Standard silver is 1485 parts pure, and 179 alloy.

A pound of pure gold is valued at 15 pounds pure silver.

The gold and silver coins of Great Britain, France, Spain and Portugal, are allowed by law to be tendered in all payments, at the rates following, viz:

The gold coins of Great-Britain and Portugal of their present standard, at the rate of eighty-nine cents for one penny-weight, and those of France and Spain at the rate of eighty-seven cents for one penny-weight: the Spanish milled dollar, weighing not less than seventeen penny-weights and seven grains, at one hundred cents; and the crowns of France, containing not less than eighteen penny-weights and seventeen grains, at 110 cents, but at the expiration of three years after the coining of gold and silver shall commence at the mint of the United States, all foreign coins will by law cease from being a legal tender, except Spanish milled dollars and parts thereof. And at the expiration of six months after cents and half cents to the value of 50,000 dollars shall have been issued, all other copper coins are forbidden, under the penalty of ten dollars, and the forfeiture of the pieces so offered.

## THE YEAR 1800.

The year 1800 having arrived, and its number being divisible by 4, might induce many to think it a bissextile or leap year, which will not be the case; from which mistake confusion might arise in Bills of Exchange and other transactions of social life: we have thought proper, for general information, here to set forth the reasons, why the year 1800 will be no bissextile or leap-year. Our globe revolves round the Sun in the period of 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 43 seconds; this is called the annual revolution of the earth. Our civil year consisting of 365 days and no more, the remaining 5 hours 48 minutes 43 seconds, which our globe consumes in moving round the Sun, amount at the end of every four years, to 23 hours, 15 minutes, 12 seconds. For that reason, in the time of Julius Cæsar, it was determined, that one of every four years should consist of 366 days, under the appellation of Bissextile, because 5 hours, 48 minutes, 43 seconds, multiplied by 4, give 23 hours, 15 minutes, 12 seconds, thus in the 4 years, 44 minutes, 48 seconds, were taken too much by adding one whole day of 24 hours. This produces, in four centuries, a difference of upwards of three days, in the following manner:

4 years give 44 minutes, 48 seconds, how much give 400 years? Answer, 3 days, 2 hours, 40 minutes—to make up this difference it is requisite, that 3 years bissextile are cut off in the course of 400 years. This defalcation is made of the years of 100 or a century: Thus 1700 was no bissextile, 1800 and 1900 will not be so neither, but 2000 will be a bissextile.

The origin of the French Republic has introduced a new improvement, 1792 and 1796 were bissextiles; 1800 must not be so; 1804, 1808, and so forth, would have been such; in lieu thereof, the 4th year of the Republic, which began 22d September, 1795, is declared *Sextile*: that is, having six complimentary days in lieu of five, which, in common years, succeeded our 12 months of 30 days each, divided into three decades of ten days each; the years of the Republic 8, 12, 16, 20, &c. will be *Sextiles*; but the years 100, 200, and 300 common years; 400, 800, &c. *Sextiles*. The beginning of the Republican Year is fixed at midnight preceding the Sun's entering on the Autumnal Solstice or Equinox.

The above being copied from an European paper, satisfactorily and on mathematical principles accounts for the beginning of the Nineteenth Century, about which so ludicrous a contest was carried on some time ago.


# HERVEY'S WORKS
