The Woman's College of the University of North Carolina was the first institution established by the state for the higher education of women. Since the founding in 1892 many changes have brought about both physical and cultural progress.

In 1931 the General Assembly of North Carolina passed an act to consolidate the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the State College of Agriculture and Engineering at Raleigh, and the North Carolina College for Women, into the Greater University of North Carolina. At that time the North Carolina College for Women became the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. The Board of Trustees chosen by the General Assembly assumed control of the new university with Governor Clyde Roark Hoey Chairman of the Board of Trustees A few months later they elected Dr. Frank Porter Graham its president. The Trustees of the Greater University of North Carolina are the Administrative directors of the school, and they endeavor not only to solve the problems of the school as a whole, but to provide for the needs of the students themselves and to keep the University abreast with the modern ideas of education.





Every student of Woman's College is a member of the Student Government Association, and the success and spirit of our organization depends as much upon the individual student as it does upon the student officers. We live together here on our campus in an atmosphere of responsible freedom, and are all working toward the same goal—to strengthen our characters, our minds, our personalities.

HISTORY OF CLASS OF 1940

It was six hundred and twelve theoretically sophisticated, but actually demure, high school graduates who materialized their plans of enrolling in the class of '40 at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. They arrived wide-eyed that September morning in 1936, trunks bulging with everything from the white ribbon, white tissue wrapped graduation gifts to the "drinking cup and a teaspoon" specified on page 30 of the college catalogue. Their home backgrounds, their I. Q.'s, their preparation, their finances, and their high school recommendations of "college material" or no were average and deviated from the average.

They found themselves regimented into climb-practically-to-Mars third floor Gray rooms, overlooking-the-park East rooms, and walking-until-you-are-ready-to-drop-trying-to-find Spencer rooms. Those who were fearful of being lost in the rush (and there were many) found themselves looked after, counseled, advised, and readvised by specified juniors, faculty members, and counselors.

They were herded into the auditorium—oh, how could one ever find that place alone—and perked up with pride to hear from the Dean of Administration that "we are glad that you made this college the college of your choice" and from the Dean of Women "you are a part of Woman's College now; you have much to gain from and to contribute to its well being." And some man who had been striding around campus and making an appearance more often than casually talked to them telling them what to do next and what to do if they forgot or could not find out how to do that. He had some far-fetched title—class head, class president, no, maybe it was called class chairman. His official office was incidental to them; they liked him for his sense of humor that relaxed the ill-at-ease, wonder-what-the-folks-at-home-are-doing feeling of Freshman Week.

They went through the ordeal of registering and carried their complicated looking schedule cards around with them until nearly Thanksgiving before they were able to remember without them where they were supposed to be sixth period on Mondays. They asked and answered "Where are you from?" "Well, do you know—?" on the average of sixty-four times a day.

They wore white for October's Founder's Day; they came to have a reverence for the formerly meaningless words. "We raise our voices, let them swell." They haunted the post office in typical freshman style. They screamed and elated, "I'm a Deakean; my roommate's an Adellphine" and wore hair bows symbolic of their societies and feared the formal initiation. They came to realize that girls from skyscrapered cities and from wide place in the road villages, above the Mason-Dixon line and below it could be fine—and occasionally, not so fine. They marked off 90, then 30, then 2 days until Christmas vacation on little desk calendars and big hanging on the wall ones. They came back from the holidays feeling much more a sense of belonging to the campus, and some even ventured to say that coming back to college felt just as if they were coming back home.

Ushered in with second semester were rumors of approaching elections. As their first president, the class of '40 chose Alice Suiter, a competent leader capable of making a reality of the lavender and white mottoed banner "Seek Higher Goals." Snake dancing out of the game room, serenading under her South Spencer window, and cheering on the quadrangle, the class tried to show Suiter how glad they were to have her as their leader. Into the class she helped to instill for the first time a sense of loyalty for and unity of the disorganized parts. They were losing that New York Grand

Central station mob feeling. They became gorged with ambitious aims of college and after college success.

The freshmen of June had undergone a complete metamorphosis to become the sophomores of September. They felt old hands at this college stuff. Those who had tearfully left the freshman halls soon found that the maladjusted in upperclassman dormitories could with uncanny rapidity not only adjust, but could cultivate the same attachment to their new rooms. They played and were noisy in true sophomorish fashion, and the disapproval which the juniors and seniors might have had was rationalized by "they are having fun" smiles. Mass meetings ceased to be merely attendance required gatherings but took on a revised atmosphere. The "required" was superfluous, they thought; they would not dare to miss one Besides they were seated downstairs in the auditorium now, graduated from that nobody-cares-where-you-are section—the balcony.

Elections again, and as president came into office a leader early recognized as such, Ruth Gillmore. The class was more and more able to look at itself objectively, as a whole made up of parts not in any sense of the word standardized but rather loyalized. For their jackets the class selected white gabardine with a lavender 1940 seal on the pocket. They paraded in them in a manner that would have made Beau Brummel jealous. They presented a traditional sophomore Christmas pageant whose impressive effect brought tears to

the eyes of the audience. Their ingenuity was shown in the college project which they selected: that of putting up name plates in front of all the dormitories on the campus.

The next fall they were back for Freshman Week, but in a reversed position, advisers instead of advisees. As their president they had selected one of their number who had been introduced once by the head of the department in which she was majoring as "the girl with the best sense of humor in this college"—Ellen Griffin. By her witty cleverness, Ellen was able to show the sprouting freshman class that a big sister class could really be an asset. She led the junior class in entertaning them, in counseling them.

Being a junior was so self-satisfying. They were among the looked up to on the campus but still a long way from being those thought of as dignified. There was much of a prevailing air among them as if they all had taken a dose of "Quiet Please" medicine; and although they retained all of their spirit, there was a quietus on suggestions of boisterousness carried over from the sophomore year. There was such a difference between the sophomore and junior years; they seemed to have gotten a fresh off the press, entirely revised edition of eyes with which to get a better perspective of the situation in general. Maybe there could have been an inkling of a reason in the fact that they were all in their major fields of concentrated study now, and presumably they were most interested in these specialized courses of now.

They went around with their hands in such obviously conspicuous positions that an outsider might have thought them advertising for some new brand of hand lotion or finger nail polish. None of this at all though—they had on their new black sealed in a dull gold mounting college rings.

They had a jitterbuggy Junior Shoppe. They were more than ever hockey conscious and broke all precedent by doing the prophesied impossible, surely improbable act of defeating the senior team. They marched on Raleigh to oppose the legislature plans of increasing tuition. They feared the Men from Mars and the pending wiping out of civilization by them.

Probably the first faint realization that they were only slightly short of being seniors came when their names appeared on the ballots for major elections and when they were elected society and club presidents. Then at the Class Day exercises of the previous graduating class, the red bow was removed from the shovel and the lavender bow, the class of 1940 bow, automatically became the top. It gave them a kind of sickenlysad feeling inside. Here they were SENIORS! Where had the past three years gone? Surely the months must have shrunk to fifteen days instead of their customary thirty.

The senior year, the last year, the nine months into which they must cram everything which they had delayed or neglected doing was here. They were those persons they had looked up to as freshmen, sophomores, and even juniors. Strange that they did not feel as they had imagined "dignified seniors" felt. Why, there was not such a wide gap between the first and last years after all. They felt no older than the freshmen, just a little more mature in their thinking maybe and a little more familiar with the campus. If somebody would only lasso Time and tie it to a hitching post until they could merely make a dent in the barricade of things to be done.

Their president---Valerie Powell.

There were last times they would ever do this; last times they would ever do that. And in spite of the "we'll be glad when the work is all over" feeling, they envied the under classmen with one, two, and three years more ahead of them in college. They took last minute grabs at elective courses under Alexander, Friedlaender, Shivers and innumerable others without which they felt a college course would be incomplete. They exchanged annual pictures, which in an unbelievably short time would look much out of style but which would still be treasured. They dreaded being the first class to labor under threatening comprehensive examinations. They became vitally affiliated with various extra-curricular activities; and where formerly they had been obscure mere members, now they were more often than not chairmen, heads, leaders, and presidents of the groups.

They were fearful lest they had chosen the wrong major field. The grass always looks greener in distant pastures, and they looked over to other majors and wondered if they might not fare better were they in one of those. The uneasiness of after college kept bobbing up to haunt their consciences. They passed through a stage of feeling a Baby Rayish illiteracy; they were just learning how very much there was to learn and to attempt to try to know. Sparks of confidence were ignited in them—some to be kindled, some to be extinguished.

The class of 1940 plugged towards the final graduation exercises a much more enlightened, a much better educated in every sense of the word, a much broader in outlook, a much more mature, a much better rounded group than the wide eyed freshmen of the September morning, lo, these four years ago.

The frequently seen man of Freshman Week very rapidly became a familiar personality, and one of the first things that the class of 1940 came to realize was how fortunate it was to have Mr. James Painter as its chairman. Their seeminaly at the time insurmountable problems they found could be worked out understandingly, accurately, easily, and more often than not humorously, in his office. In him every student from the most obscure to the most prominent found a friend devoted to everything of, by and for the class of 1940 and to its members collectively and individually. As for his personal popularity, the senior class meeting at which the person to whom the class would dedicate its annual was to be decided sent vibrations through the rafters and students raised not one but both hands to vote "Yea," stomped the floor, and voiced in very undignified but hundred per cent affirmative approval, the suggestion of selecting the chairman of the class

If the class was fortunate in the chairman which it had, it was no less fortunate in having Miss Harriet Elliott as Dean of Women and Dr. Walter Clinton Jackson as Dean of Administration. To them each student was a distinct individual with a personality, maladjustments, specific capacities to adjust, and personal abilities all her own, and anything but a stereotyped duplicate of her classmates. They always understood and regardless of their decisions pro or con, the students could be assured that they had weighed both sides and every detailed angle before voicing an opinion, making a suggestion, or reaching any conclusion. The class of '40 found them to be sincere in their insistance that students stop in their offices to see them. They found that they would talk not to two executives, but to two companionable persons.

They, too, were glad that they had made Woman's College of the University of North Carolina the college of their choice. In four years, they, too, had come to realize that they had much to gain from and to contribute to their college. They had memories to hold, friendships to cherish, learning to retain, and better abilities with which to enjoy life. With bursting hearts they could "proise them today our fair college," and every other day for as long as they would live.

FAMOUS WOMEN OF CLASS OF 1940 HOLD REUNION AT WOMAN'S COLLEGE

GREENSBORO, N. C., Oct. 5, 1967—Nationally known women in many fields of endeavor, all olumnae of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, class of 1940 held a class reunion in the white-columned Alumnae house on the campus of Woman's College here today. Occasion for the reunion was the seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of the college known as "the alma mater of famous women".

The beautiful 200-acre campus was dusted with a light snowfall three feet deep. More than 3,500 students in white snow suits, attended the traditional Founder's Day exercises in the recently enlarged Aycock auditorium. The costumes were adopted as the customary college attree in tribute to the Finns of '40, a year which ushered in the changing weather conditions which bring an August-to-April winter to the south-land

Prominent alumna, Ruth Gillmore, well-known as the woman mayor of the city of Boston, and specialist in personal adjustments made a short address to her classmates on the subject of politics for women.

Alice Suiter Christian, mother and inspired coach of the professional football team, the "Crimson Christians", and Valerie Powell Jones, whose portrait entitled "American Womanhood" by the young artist Remm-Gogh won the International award last year, were seen chatting together

Nancy Yates, first woman Secretary of the Treasury, who balanced the national budget with her popular maxim, "A little bit more will do it!" dropped the national financial worries and relaxed in the pleasant upstairs rooms of the Alumnae house.

Anne Tillinghast, who has just published the sixth volume of CASE WORK IN NORTH CAROLINA COMMUNITIES discussed sociological problems with her friend, Natalie Krug, who is currently on a lecture tour of the south describing for audiences her method of writing American history in terms of mental tests given to a cross section of the population of the United States. Miss Krug received her first impetus in the field as historian of the class of '40.

Celia Durham Trabue, woman legislator who introduced the successful bill in Congress for the 25-hour day was accompanied by her two daughters, Celia and Douglina, who are making their debut into Washington society this winter.

Other outstanding women gathered in beautiful Alumnae house were Muriel Qua and Marian Fisher, founders of the Fishaquarium; Chrinstina Changaris, designer of long brushes for short painters which were endorsed by Mr. James Painter, adviser to the class of 1940; Eunice King, counselorconfidant of the Archbishop of Canterbury Ellen Griffin entertained with extracts from her book which has changed the whole character of American humor, FROM BITTER HUMOR TO BETTER LAUGHTER MUSCLES.

Anne Pike Lamb, wife of the Prime Minister of Canada came from her home in Quebec, as did Jean Noel Yarborough of the Bahama Islands, and Helen Wygant Bussey of Brazil

Also present were Lynette Moss Tender, wife of multi-millionaire B R Tender who made his first million as director of the famous Hotel Des Moines Coffee Shop Mrs. Tender dissolved the famous chemistry partnership of Wyatte and Moss with her marriage Frances Hall Smith, wife of Chief Justice Smith came from her Washington home. Dorothy Herbert, author of SINCE THE FORTIES, a biriliant work of post-war England, came to Greensboro direct from New York where she docked yesterday.

Women of interest in the business world who were present included Josephine Kellogg, advertising expert and editorial group head of the Hugh Henry Advertising company; Emily Goodrum, secretary to the American editor of the Encyclopedia Brittannica; Emma Sharpe Avery, personnel manager of Best and Company; Jean Kinsey, director of the Travelon travel bureau; Betty Burns, secretary to the mayor of the growing city of Lumberton, N.C.; Mary Day, head of the circulation department of the New York HERALD-TRIBUNE; Dorothea Matthews, holder of the world's record for typing speed for whom the new Flyenkeys typewriter was designed; Mildred Haugh, distinguished ex-manager of the Palmer House of Chicago who is opening her new entertainment center in New York within the week. Miss Haugh's Bar Tavern widely publicized through-

out the nation is expected to add many new angles to the night life of the nation. Marguerite Koonce motored to the reunion from her beautiful home "Brown Acres" near Murfreesboro, N.C. Miss Koonce originated the popular Date-While-You-Wait bureau, well-known throughout the South. Ruby Morgan, founder and manager of the Morgan Meals cafeterias chain was present, as was one of her competitors for the feeding of the country, Adell Sherard, inventor of Sherard's Sure Shredd, condensed breakfast food which makes it possible to eat breakfast on the way to work.

Kate Black, famous court stenographer, Josephine Conley, dictation expert who once dictated 9,866 words per minute; Esther Londner of the planning and research department of Macy's; Patsy Jones, member of the Board of Trustees of Woman's College; and Mary Frances Futrell, prominent social reformer of North Carolina attended the class reunion.

Helen Cunningham, who is famous as player of the bells at Bok Bell Tower in Florida renewed her acquaintance with Elizabeth Holmes, composer of the music used in the filming of the "Great American Saga" which featured the handsome blonde opera star, Annie Lea Rose. Miss Rose, also of the class of '40, is on the West Coast and was unable to attend the reunion. Other personalities in the field of music who gathered in Alumnae house included Frances Harward, called "the pianist who made of the piano a symphony orchestra"; Sarah Pardo responsible for the sudden improvement of music broadcast from her native stations in Cuba, Kathlyn Saltman, pionist for the Philadelphia Philharmonic symphony; Betsy Davison, band leader and originator of the recent rhythm vogue, the "swing canter"; Cotherine Station, state supervisor of music; and Madelyn Schultz, first soprano in the Riverside choir.

Lois Barnes, illustrator of children's books; Evelyn Brown, designer preeminent of the best in American furnishings; Emeline Roberson, founder of the Ocracoke School of Art, Hilda Brady, director of the Modern American Art museum all received their initial art training in the art department of the Woman's College. Other alumnae artists and decorators included Mary Frances Hawkins, fashion illustrator of HARPER'S BAZAAR; and the Rebecca Davis-Prather Sisk decorator team. Miss Davis and Miss Sisk who became famous as beach club interior artists have just redecorated the Gold Room of the White House.

Eleanor Ross, brilliant author of the Pulitzer Prize winning book WE SAY IN THE COUNTRY, headed the group of women writers who held a discussion in the library of the Alumnae house. Joyce Chambliss, the women's poet, autographed a copy of her SONNETS IN GOLD FILIGREE for the library of the Alumnae house. Other literary lights included Kathryn Holman, scenario editor of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer; Elizabeth Pettigrew, interesting author of a series of articles "Agrarianism in South Carolina"; Alice Sircom, theatre critic for the NEW YORKER; Maude Staton, revealing columnist for VOGUE, author of BEHIND HER FORE-HEAD; Dorothy Kanipe, author of children's books; Dorothy Lovell, author of MEMOIRS OF HORDES OF CASANOVAS; Anne Shook, author of CURRITUCK TALES or HOW WE LIVE HAPPILY ON PIG FEET AND TURNIP GREENS.


