## GREATER UNIVERSITY COUNCIL

The development of a friendly spirit and a cooperative understanding between the three divisions whth make up the Greater U'niversity of North Carolina is the aim of the Greater University Student Council. Cooperation based on mutual esteem. consideration of conflicting needs and common problems, and a closer unification both academially and socially bave been long felt needs on all three campuses. The Council in only its second year bas taken impressive steps toward the realization of these aims.

Last fall at the Carolina-State football game, the group initiated a Greater University Day with all three schools participating. The occasion, which the Council plans to make an annual aftair, was smgularly important in promoting a feeling among the students that all three schools were a part of one great organization. Another of the activities of the Council was the presentation of the students' choice of a new university president to the committee making the decison.
