

PITTSBURGH,

THE SEAT OF JUSTICE FOR ALLEGHENY COUNTY, PENN.

Is situated on a point of land formed by the confluence of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers, in lat. 40° 35′ N. long. 80° 38′ W. about 300 miles W. by N. from Philadelphia, 250 from Washington City, and 1100 (by land) from New Orleans.

In early times a fort was established here called Du Quesne, which in 1758 was blown up and evacuated on the approach of General Forbes.—Shortly after a fort was built by the British called Fort Pitt, and about the year 1760 a small town called Pittsburgh was built near the fort—but the present town of Pittsburgh

was first laid out in 1765, and afterwards laid out and surveyed, on its present plan, in 1784,

The ground plot of the town is triangular, the streets running parallel with each river, which at their junction form an angle of about 33 degrees.

The population in 1800 was about 2,400 souls—in 1810 the census gave 4,740, and in 1815, a calculation founded on what is believed to be correct data, makes an estimate of upwards of 9,000. This great increase of population is to be attributed to the late war with Great Britain, which converted a great portion of the capital of the seaboard into manufactures, much of which was concentrated in this place. The transportation of southern produce, during the

war, through Pittsburgh across the mountains, also contributed greatly to the increase of the population here.

Three weekly newspapers are published in the borough, besides two periodical literary works—the former have an extensive circulation—the latter are chiefly confined to the town and immediate vicinity.

The public buildings, (in additition to the churches, hereafter enumerated) are a Court house, Prothonotary's, Register's, Sheriff's and Commissioner's offices, a Jail, three incorporated Banks, a Dramatic Theatre, a Masonic Hall, three Market Houses, (one in the Diamond and two in Second street) an Academy, &c.

Few places can boast of more useful improvements in manufactures and the mechanical arts than Pittsburgh—it has been justly and emphatically styled "The Birmingham of America." A comparative view of its progress must indeed awaken admiration. Until about the year 1793 its increase was not rapid—in the year 1815 we behold it rich and flourishing, daily augmenting in manufactures and commerce.

It is but an act of justice to mention, that for the statement contained in the above description, I am in a great measure indebted to "The Navigator," published by Messrs. Cramer, Spear & Eichbaum.

- 1. Duty on Manufactures. This tax is confined to articles manufactured for sale. On all sums above § 20, the manufacturer is allowed a credit of six months. If the duty does not exceed § 20, it is payable at the time of making the return and a deduction of 2 per cent. is allowed.
- 2. Distillers. The new duty is in addition to that heretofore imposed on the capacity of the

still, which, on stills employed on domestic materials, is as follows: For 2 weeks, 9 cents—1 month, 18 cents—2 months, 32 cents—3 months, 42 cents—4 months, 52 cents—6 months, 70 cents—12 months, 108 cents per gallon, or the capacity of the still.

BREWERIES,

There are three large and extensive Breweries and one upon a smaller scale. They consume from 120 to 130,000 bushels of grain, and manufacture about 10,000 barrels of beer, ale, and porter, annually.

LEAD FACTORIES.

Two White Lead factories, by A Beelen and J. Stevenson—and a White and Red Lead factory by Trevor, Pettigrew and Troost, who also manufacture various acids, &c.

STIRRUP IRONS AND BRIDLE BITS.

There are three large and extensive Rope Walks, which make all kinds of ropes, twine and cordage. The principal part of the cordage for Perry's Fleet was made here. Two cables weighed each, about 4,000 lbs. and were 4½ inches in diameter.

GLASS.

There are two White and three Green Glass houses. The amount annually manufactured is estimated at § 200,000. Glass cutting is also executed equal to any in Europe.

WOOLLENS.

GEORGE COCHRAN,

AT THE CORNER OF DIAMOND ALLEY
AND LIBERTY STREETS,

Carries on the Manufactory of Woollen Cloths, such as Superfine and Common Broad Cloths, Blankets and Paper maker's Felting—Which he proposes selling at the Philadelphia Prices—and warrants the color and durability of his Cloths equal to that imported from Great Britain.

He also manufactures Kerseynettes, and Sattinettes, and carries on the Hosiery business, such as Stockingnetts, Half Hose, &c. woollen and cotton.

G. C. having surmounted great difficulties in the establishment of a new manufactory, commenced nearly three years ago, when workmen and machinery were difficult to procure, relies on the patronage of a patriotic and generous public, for the support of an establishment important to the interest of the western country.

G. C. cards wool and dresses cloth, for those who may please to favor him with their custom.

POTTERY.

Messrs. Trotter & Co. have established a Queensware Pottery, at which they manufacture pitchers, coffee and tea pots and cups, bowls, jugs, &c. similar to those of the Potteries in Philadelphia.

LOCKS, &c.

James Patterson, in Birmingham, manufactures Door and House Locks of every description, Coffee-mills, and Saddler's Buckles. He also makes Printer's Composing Sticks, rules, and Chases.

BUTT HINGES, &c.

William Price, at his Foundry at the Round house, makes Crucibles to cast all kinds of

iron, brass, &c. of every dimension. All kinds of small castings in brass or iron, softened fit for turning or filing, for all kinds of machinery—he also casts Butt-hinges, and manufactures Fire Bricks for furnaces, foundries, bake houses, glass houses, &c.

NOTE.

It was my wish to give as full a statement as possible of the manufactures of Pittsburgh, and for this purpose gave an invitation, through the medium of the News-papers, to the manufacturers, to furnish me with the materials necessary for compiling such a statement—this, except in two or three instances, has not been done. I was therefore left to my own observation and the information to be gleaned from other publications on the same subject. This has rendered the article on manufactures more meagre than it otherwise might have been.

INSTRUCTIONS

For the Government of those who have claims for Pay and Bounty, Half-pay, Pensions, and Bounty-land, under the Acts of Congress, relative to the Military Establishment of the U. States.

1st.-Pay and Bounty.

Those persons who have claims for pay and bounty as the legal representatives of such noncommissioned officers, artificers, musicians and privates, as die in the service of the U. States, must make application to the Paymaster General of the Army, or to his sub paymasters, who act as his agents. All balances of pay and bounty, at the time of the decease of such noncommissioned officer, &c. will be paid by the Paymaster General or his sub paymasters, to the widow, child, or legal representative of the deceased, who must produce written and legal evidence of his or her authority to demand and receipt for the same. When administration is granted to a creditor, solely as a creditor, no more will be paid than is barely sufficient to cover his claim, and the balance, if any, will be reserved for the benefit of the kindred, or relations of the deceased. Affidavits of respectable persons, knowing the legality of the representative of a deceased soldier, will be sufficient evidence to be produced, provided the deceased died a minor, unmarried, and no administration has been granted on the estate. If any person administers, for the purpose of receiving the balance due, a copy of the letters of administration must be produced. Should the deceased leave a widow, and no administration has been granted on the estate, the balance will be paid to her, on her producing satisfactory evidence that she was his wife at the time he died.

2d.—Half-hay Pensions to Widows and Orphans.

Widows and Orphans, who have claims to five years half-pay according to an Act of Congress, must establish the following facts, before they can receive the above pension:—1st. The date of the decease of the officer or soldier, under whom they claim; this fact may be established by the records of the War Department, by the proper rolls of the army, by the testimony of military officers, or by that of other respectable persons. 2d. The legality of the marriage, the name of the widow, the name and number of the children, under sixteen years of age, at the father's decease, and the county, state, or territory, in which she and they reside. 3d. That the widow, at the time of allowing this half-pay, was not married: she must also repeat that she is not married, at the time of receiving EACH PAYMENT, and establish the fact by the testimony of respectable persons knowing the case, as, in the event of marriage, the half-pay reverts to such of her children as are under sixteen years of age.—In cases of orphans only, the guardians will act for them, establish their claims as above, and receive their pensions. All these evidences must be produced to and filed in the office of the Paymaster General of the army; and orders will be issued to the several district paymasters to pay the pensions on the spot where it falls due.

3d .- Bounty Lands.

Claims for bounty-land must be substantiated; and this must be done by the REGULAR DISCHARGE of the ORIGINAL CLAIMANT, from the public service: the best voucher that can be produced. Certificates, from the pay office should be carefully preserved, as indexes to the records of the ORIGINAL RIGHT. If the original claimant does not personally apply for his land warrant, he must prove his indentity before a magistrate, by his own affidavit and the affidavits of two witnesses, whose CREDI-BILITY the said magistrate will CERTIFY; and must execute a power of attorney to whoever applies for the warrant in his behalf: the quality and signature of the magistrate, before whom the said affidavits are made, or the power of attorney is acknowledged, must be attested by the signature and seal of the county clerk, or other equivalent authority of the district in which he resides.

The power of attorney, to authorise the delivery of a land warrant, may be dispensed with in case a member of Congress, while that body is actually in session, will call at the War Department and sign a receipt for it, upon the record. In this case, a letter of order, in his favor, from the person who has the right to re-

ceive the warrant, addressed to the Secretary of War, will be deemed sufficient authority for

its delivery.

If the ORIGINAL CLAIMANT be dead, and an heir applies in his right, he must produce legal certificates from competent authority, to prove that he is a LEGITIMATE HEIR BY LAW; in which case, although there may be other heirs existing, a warrant will be issued in that name; adding thereto, "and other heirs at LAW of ," &c. &c.

A land warrant will not be issued to an executor or administrator.

All claimants for bounty-lands, must make application to the War Department.

The Spanish milled dollar weighing not less than 17 pennyweights 7 grains, at 100 cents, and the crown of France containing not less than 18 pennyweights 17 grains, at 110 cents.

RULES FOR REDUCING THE CURRENCIES OF THE DIFFERENT STATES INTO EACH OTHER.

To reduce the currencies of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and Virginia, into those of New York and North Carolina, to the given sum add ½ part thereof. Of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, and Maryland, to the given sum add ½ thereof. Of South Carolina, and Georgia, from the given sum subtract ½ the thereof.
 To reduce New York and North Carolina

2. To reduce New York and North Carolina, into New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut and Virginia, from the given sum deduct \(\frac{1}{2} \) thereof. Into Pennsylvania,

New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, from the given sum deduct $\frac{1}{16}$ thereof. Into South Carolina, to the given sum add $\frac{1}{16}$, then take half of the whole.

- 3. To reduce Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, into New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut and Virginia, from the sum given deduct $\frac{1}{5}$ thereof. Into New York and North Carolina, to the sum given add $\frac{1}{15}$ thereof. Into South Carolina and Georgia, multiply by 3 and $\frac{1}{9}$, and divide the product by 5, or multiply by 28 and divide by 45.
- 4. To reduce South Carolina and Georgia into New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut and Virginia, to the given sum add $\frac{2}{7}$ thereof. Into Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, multiply the given sum by 45 and divide by 28. Into New York and North Carolina, from the given sum subtract $\frac{1}{7}$ and double the remainder.

TO REDUCE THE CURRENCIES OF THE STATES TO DOLLARS.

6s. Add a cypher to the right hand of the pounds and divide by 3. If there be shillings add a dollar for every 6s.

7s. 6d. Multiply the pounds by 8 and divide by 3. If there be shillings, add a dollar for

every 7s. 6d.

8s. Multiply the pounds by $2\frac{1}{2}$. If there be shillings, add a dollar for every 8s.

4s. 8d. Add a cypher to the right hand of the pounds, multiply by 3 and divide by 7. If there be shillings add one dollar for every 4s. 8d.

Short method to calculate Interest for any number of days.—Multiply the sum by half the number of days, and divide the product by 30
