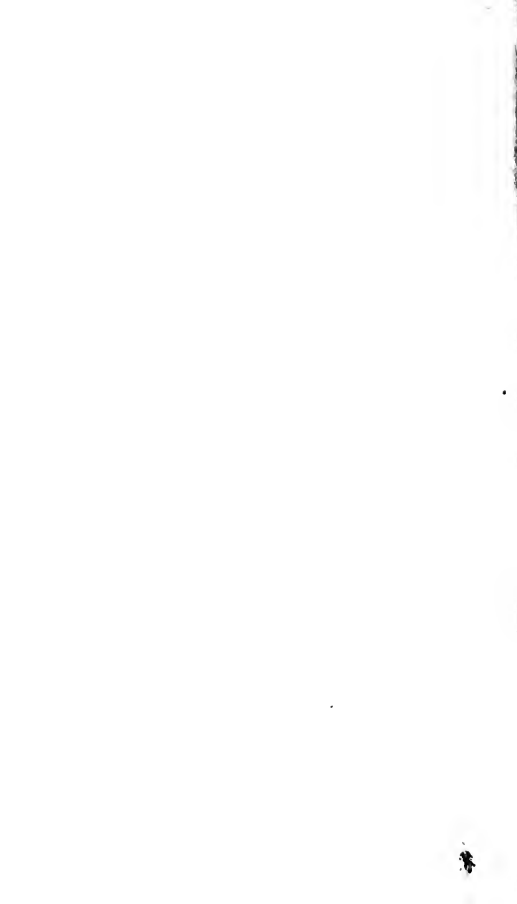

THIS is the fourth time Mess.'s Fleets have published the Massachusetts Pocket Almanack, &c. which has given general satisfaction as a necessary and useful Pocket Companion, showing in a small compass the Callender and other particulars of the Year:—But as some persons have expressed their desire to have in future the Judgment of the Weather inserted, they will therefore in this be gratified therewith; tho' indeed, among the multitude of astrological predictions, 'tis no wonder if some few fail; for without any defect in the art itself, 'tis well known that a small error, or a single wrong figure overseen in a calculation, may occasion great mistakes: but, however, tho' Almanack makers may miss it in some things, yet they always hit the day of the month, which, by many, is esteemed as one of the most useful parts of it.—

With regard to the Weather, the method sometimes used by others will not be followed in this, viz. as that there will be Snow here or some other part of the continent—Rain here or somewhere else—Cold to the northward—Warm to the southward, and the like; but (as it is of no service to any body to know what weather it is a thousand miles off) it will be positively set down what weather it will be at the time, let the reader be where he will; only desiring he will make the favourable allowance of a day or two before, and a day or two after the precise day against which the Weather is set; and if it does not come to pass accordingly, the fault must be laid upon the Printers, who, it is very like, may have transposed, or misplaced it, for the conveniency of putting in their remarkable days; and as some people give them part of the credit of compiling the Almanack, so it is but reasonable they also should take some share of the blame.—

ECLIPSES in the Year 1782.

THERE will be four Eclipses this Year—two of the SUN and two of the MOON, as follows, viz.

I. The first will be of the Moon on Friday Morning the 20th Day of *March*, visible, and calculated as follows:

Beginning,	- - -	2	30	} Morning.
Middle,	- - -	3	50	
End,	- - -	5	10	
Duration,	- - -	2	40	

Digits eclipsed about 8 on the South Side.

II. The second will be of the Sun, on the 12th Day of *April*, visible, calculated as follows:

Beginning,	- - -	0	52	} Afternoon.
Middle,	- - -	2	4	
End,	- - -	3	6	

Digits eclipsed, about 5 on the North-westerly Side.

III. The third will be of the Moon, on the 21st of *September*, at 10 in the Morning, invisible.

IV. The fourth will be of the Sun, on the 6th Day of *October*, about 8 at Night, invisible.

The Planet *Mercury* will this Year transit the N. W. Limb of the SUN on the 12th Day of November, in the Afternoon; but as *Mercury* will pass but just within the Disk it will scarcely be discernable.

TIME and TIDE.

BOTH *Time* and *Tide* for no Man stay;
 One flies, the other glides away;
 Though *Tide* return, and backwards glide,
Time ne'er returns as does the *Tide*.

To keep clear from Flies.

Necessary HINTS to those that would be Rich.

THE use of Money is all the advantage there is in having Money.

For 6*l.* a Year, you may have the Use of 100*l.* provided you are a Man of known Prudence and Honesty.

He that spends a Groat a day idly, spends idly about 6*l.* a year, which is the price for the use of 100*l.*

He that wastes idly a Groat's worth of his time per day, one day with another, wastes the privilege of using 100*l.* each day.

He that idly loses 5*s.* worth of time, loses 5*s.* and might as prudently throw 5*s.* into the Sea.

He that loses 5*s.* not only loses that sum, but all the advantage that might be made by turning it in dealing, which, by the time that a young man becomes old, will amount to a considerable sum of money.

Again: He that sells upon credit, asks a price for what he sells equivalent to the Principal and Interest of his money for the time he is to be kept out of it.

Therefore, he that buys upon credit, pays interest for what he buys.

And he that pays ready money, might let that money out to use: So that, he that possesses any thing he has bought, pays interest for the use of it.

Consider then, when you are tempted to buy any unnecessary household-stuff, or any superfluous thing, whether you are willing to pay Interest, and Interest upon interest for it as long as you live; and more if it grows worse by using.

Yet, in buying Goods, 'tis best to pay ready money, because, he that sells upon credit, expects to lose 5 per cent. by bad debts; therefore he charges on all he sells upon credit, an advance that shall make up that deficiency.

Those who pay for what they buy upon credit, pay their share of this advance.

He that pays ready money, escapes, or may escape, at charge.

*A Penny sav'd is Two-pence clear,
A Pin a Day is a Groat a Year.*

Silence and Secrecy.

NO Man ever repented of having kept Silence, but many that they have not done so. He who talks all that he knows, will also talk what he knows not. — There are a set of Men who differ nothing from broken Pitchers, that can hold nothing, but let it run out by Dabbling.

Reputation.

CREDIT cannot be preserved with too great care, nor forfeited but with the greatest loss: There is no such infelicity as to survive one's Reputation, nor so great a Folly as to put it in hazard. The shortest way to attain Reputation is that of Merit; if Industry be founded on Merit, it is the true way of obtaining it.

Vain-Glory.

A Vain-glorious Man is like the Fly which sat upon the axle-tree of a Chariot wheel, and said, *What a dust do I raise!* It is the employment of a great soul, rather to do things worthy to be admired, than to admire what himself hath done.

Suits in Law.

IF you design to yourself happiness, and an improvement of your estate, let me advise you to avoid suits in Law; if you engage in any, you put yourself into a house of correction, where you must labour stoutly to pay your fees. There were two Lawyers very passionately pleading their Clients cause, to their great satisfaction; when the cause was done, the Lawyers came out of Court, and hugged each other; the Clients were much astonished at their behaviour, and one of them asked his Lawyer, *How they could be friends so soon?* Tush Man, says the Lawyer, *We were never foes, for we Lawyers are like a pair of Sheers, if you open them, and pull them down, they seem to cut one another, but they only cut that which cometh between them.*

Riches.

IT is no great matter whether a Man be rich or not, for the more he hath the more he wanteth. Substance of the new Constitution.

BY the present Constitution, or new Frame of Government, the late Province of Massachusetts-Bay is in future to be called *The Commonwealth of Massachusetts*. --- The General Court to consist of a *Senate and House of Representatives*, each to have a negative on the other, and to assemble every year on the last wednesday in May. --- No bill or resolve to become a law until approved by the Governor, except he neglects so to do five days after its being presented. --- Forty persons are to be elected *Counsellors and Senators*, at a meeting of the several towns to be called for that purpose on the first monday of April annually; the following is the number for each county, *Suffolk 6, Essex 6, Middlesex 5, Hampshire 4, Plymouth 3, Barnstable 1, Bristol 3, York 2, Dukis County and Nantuket 1, Worcester 5, Cumberland 1, Lincoln 1, and Berkshire 2*. --- Each Senator to be possessed of an estate of at least 600 *l.* value; and not less than 16 members to constitute a quorum. --- Every town having 150 rateable polls may elect one *Representative*; a town containing 375 may elect two; and if 600 they may elect three; after which 225 rateable polls is to be the mean increasing number for every additional Representative. --- They are to be chosen annually in May, ten days at least before the last wednesday in said month, each to have been one year an inhabitant of, and seized in his own right of a freehold of the value of one hundred pounds within the town he shall be chosen to represent, or any rateable estate to the value of two hundred pounds. --- Not less than 60 members to constitute a quorum; and no member can be arrested during

a going unto, or returning from, or his attending the
General Court. — The Governor and Lieut. Governor to
be chosen annually, and to be of the christian religion, to
have been inhabitants of the Commonwealth seven years,
and to be seized in their own right of a freehold of 1000 l.
value. --- The several towns are to give in their votes on
the first monday in April, when every male person, being
twenty-one years of age, and otherwise qualified, has a
right to vote. --- The choice to be declared and published
on the last wednesday in May. --- A Council of nine (be-
sides the Lieut. Governor) for advising the Governor are
also to be chosen on the said last wednesday in May, by
the joint ballot of the Senators and Representatives; and
not more than two to be chosen out of any one district. ---
The Secretary, Treasurer, Commissary-General, Notaries
Public, and Naval Officers, to be chosen annually by joint
ballot of the Senators and Representatives: No person to
be eligible for the office of Treasurer more than 5 years.
--- All commissions of Justices of the Peace to expire and
become void in seven years after their respective dates. ---
The Delegates in Congress to be chosen in the month of
June annually, and to serve for one year from the first
monday in November following. --- No person to be capa-
ble of holding at the same time more than one of the fol-
lowing offices, except being Military Officers and Justices
of the Peace, viz. Judge of the Supreme Judicial Court;
Judge of Probate; Sheriff; Register of Probate; and
Register of Deeds. --- No person holding the office of Judge
of the Supreme Judicial Court; Secretary; Attorney-
General; Solicitor-General; Treasurer; Judge of Pro-
bate; Commissary-General; President, Professor, or In-
structor of Harvard-College; Sheriff; Clerk of the House
of Representatives; Register of Probate; Register of Deeds;
Clerk of the Supreme judicial Court; Clerk of the Infe-
rior Court of Common Pleas; or Officer of the Customs,
including Naval Officers, shall at the same time have a
seat in the Senate or House of Representatives. --- All
Commissions, and Writs in any of the Courts of Law to
be in *The Name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts*. ---
And all the Laws heretofore adopted to be in force until
altered or repealed by the Legislature. --- The Constitu-
tion is to be revised in the year 1795, and, if thought ne-
cessary, may be amended. ---

By the Militia Act of this Commonwealth, the Training Band is to consist of all able bodied Men from 16 to 50 years old, excepting the Lieut. Governor, members of the Council, Senate, and House of Representatives, members of Congress, Secretary, Justices of the Supreme and inferior Courts, Judges of Probate, Justices of the Peace & Sheriffs, Officers and Students of the College, Ministers, Elders and Deacons, Church Wardens, Grammar School-masters, Masters of Arts, Quakers, Selectmen, and all who have held the post of a Subaltern or higher Officer, Masters of Vessels, Constables, Deputy Sheriffs, Negroes, and Mulattoes:—

And the Alarm List of all able bodied Men from 16 to 65 years of age (the Lieut. Governor, members of the Council, Senate, and House of Representatives, the American Congress, Secretary, Ministers, Quakers, Selectmen, Indians, Negroes and Mulattoes only excepted) each to be equipt and constantly provided with a good Fire Arm, with a Steel or Iron Ram-rod, with a Spring to retain the Jawe, a Worm, Priming-wire and Brush, and a Bayonet fitted to his Gun, Scabbard and Belt therefor, a Cartridge-box that will hold fifteen rounds of Cartridges at least, six Flints, one pound of Powder, forty leaden Balls fitted to his Gun, a Loversack and Blanket, and a Canteen that will hold one Quart:—Any Officer or Soldier, of sufficient ability, not so furnish'd, is liable to a Fine of Five Pounds, and for not appearing on Muster-Days, Ten Shillings; for not attending Military Watches, Five Shillings; and for refusing to march to the place of destination, when detached by the commanding Officer, Ten Pounds.—
