ECLIPSES for the Year 1792.

THere will be but two Eclipses this year, both of the Sun, as follows, *viz.*

1. The first will be a visible, but with us, a very small Eclipse on *Thursday* the twenty second day of *March* about 15 minutes past 2 o'Clock afternoon. the Sun's place at the apparent time of the true ☿ will be in 2 degrees 49 $\frac{1}{2}$ minutes of ♍, and the Moon's Latitude 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ minutes North. The Sun will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 9 minutes past 1 o'Clock P. M. in Longitude 17 degrees 15 minutes West from Boston, and Latitude 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ degrees North.
2. The second will be on *Sunday* the sixteenth Day of *September*, invisible. The ☿ will be at 36 minutes past 4 o'Clock in the morning in 24 degrees 8 minutes of the Celestial *Virgin*. ♃'s Latitude 1 min. South. The Sun will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 36 minutes past 4 o'Clock A. M. in Longitude 112 degrees 7 minutes east from Boston, and Latitude 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ degrees North.

The Planet *Venus* [♀] will be our morning Star from the beginning of the year to the 6th day of August. when she will be in conjunction with the Sun, from thence to the end of the year she will be our evening Star.

An Account of the Clock Equations.

On the 15th of April, 16th of June, 31st of August, and 24th of December, the Sun will agree with all those Clocks and Watches that are true and measure Time exactly even; on all other Days he will be either too fast or too slow of such Clocks and Watches. From the 24th of December to the 15th of April he will be slower; from thence to June 16th faster; from thence to August 31st slower; and thence to December 24th he will be faster than the Clocks and Watches, &c.

N. B. This Variation of the Sun from the Clocks and Watches is called Equation, and is set down in sundry places in each Monthly Page of this Almanack.

Clocks and Watches lose by warmth and gain by cold; therefore in Clocks there is a screw placed at the bottom of the Pendulum, which must be screwed upwards for faster, and downwards for slower.

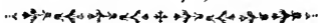

Continental Judicial Department.

THE *judicial power* of the United States, by the Constitution, extends to all cases in law and equity, arising under the constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies between two or more states; between a State and citizens of another State; between citizens of different States; between citizens of the same State, claiming lands under grants of different States; and between a State, or the citizens thereof, and foreign States, citizens or subjects.

The *judicial courts* are divided into the *supreme court*, the *circuit courts*, and the *district courts*; the supreme court has the decision, in the last resort, of matters of law, and of great legal questions of a national and political nature, but has no original jurisdiction except in these cases, nor has it appellate jurisdiction of any matters of fact, nor cognizance, by writ of error or otherwise, of any matters of law, but where the sums in dispute are of such magnitude as to remove the apprehension of the expence being too heavy for the suitors.

In the *circuit courts* are tried most of the causes of a civil or criminal nature, cognizance of which appertains to the courts of the Union, and which are of common law jurisdiction, and where the sum in dispute is of greater value than 500 dollars; they have also appellate jurisdiction of admiralty and maritime causes.

In the *district courts*, which are holden in each State, are to be tried crimes and offences of a smaller nature, cognizable under the authority of the United States, and committed within the district, or on the high seas; all civil causes of admiralty or maritime jurisdiction; all seizures under the laws of impost, navigation and trade; and all suits for penalties and forfeitures incurred under the laws of the United States, and other matters of limited extent.

In all questions of fact, arising in cases of common law jurisdiction, in all the Courts of the United States, the trial is to be by jury; and also in all cases of a criminal nature.

To the Clerk of the Supreme Court, 8 Dollars per Day.

To the Attorney of the District for travel to any Court 10 Cents per mile going, and the same for returning.

To the Clerk, 5 Dollars per day, and 10 cents for travel.

To the Marshal of the District, 5 Dollars per day, and for summoning a Grand Jury 3 Dollars; for a Petit Jury 2 Dollars, & for serving a Writ 5 cents a mile for travel.

The Marshal is also to be allowed the amount of his Expense for Fuel, Condues, and other Contingencies.

To the Grand and Petit Jurors, 50 cents per day, and 50 cents for every 10 miles travel from the place of their abode, and the like allowance for returning.

To Witnesses the same as is allowed to Jurors.

Custom House Fees, &c.

Collectors Fees

Entrance of a vessel of 100 tons or upwards, *two Dollars and an half*. The same sum for a clearance.

Entrance of a vessel under 100 tons, *one Dollar and an half*. The same sum for a clearance.

Every permit to land goods, *twenty Cents*.

Every bond taken officially, *forty Cents*.

Every permit to land goods for exportation, which are intitled to a drawback, *thirty Cents*.

Every official certificate or bill of health, *twenty Cents*.

Every other official document, *twenty Cents*.

Where a *Naval Officer* is appointed, the Fees are to be equally divided between him and the *Collector*, the latter to pay one third of the expence of stationary and rent of office:—The Fees to be received by either of them and their accounts to be settled monthly.

To the *Collector* of each district (except the district of New York and Philadelphia, who are to have but three fourths per cent.) there is to be allowed one per centum on the amount of all monies by them respectively received and paid into the Treasury of the United States.

The *Collector* of the district of Penobscot, in addition to his fees, to be allowed 60 dollars a year.

The *Collector* of the district of Passamaquedy, the yearly sum of 100 dollars.

The *Collectors* of Frenchman's Bay and Edgartown the yearly sum of 50 dollars.

The *Surveyor* of Gloucester, 50 dollars.

Surveyors Fees.

For the admeasurement of every vessel of 100 tons or under *one cent per ton*.

For duty every vessel above 100 ton, and not exceeding 200 ton, *150 cents*.

For every vessel above 200 tons, *200 cents*.

Services on board vessels of 100 tons or upwards, having goods subject to duty on board, *three Dollars*.

Services on board any vessel of less burthen, having goods subject to duty on board, *one Dollar and an half*.

Services on board all vessels not having dutied goods on board, *two thirds of a Dollar*.

Inspectors, Measurers & Gaugers Fees.

For every day an Inspector shall be actually employed in aid of the customs, *one Dollar and twenty five cents*, to be paid by the *Collector* out of the Revenue.

For the measurement of every hundred bushels of grain, *thirty cents*.

For the measurement of every hundred bushels of salt, *forty cents*.

For the measurement of every one hundred bushels of coal, *fifty cents*.

For the weighing every one hundred and twelve pounds, *two cents*.

For the gauging and marking every cask, *eight cents*.

Measuring weighing and gauging goods for exportation, the same as for importation.

For computing contents, marking cases of distilled spirits, and wines, *three cents per case*.

For counting bottles of cyder, beer, ale or porter, *one cent per dozen*.

If any Officer of the Customs shall demand or receive any greater fee or reward than required of him by law, he is to forfeit and pay 200 dollars for each offence.

The Duties and Fees are to be received in *Gold & Silver* only, at the following rates, viz. The gold coins of France, England, Spain, and Portugal, and other gold coins of equal fineness, at *eighty nine cents* for every pennyweight.

The Mexican Dollar at *one hundred cents*.

The crowns of France and England, *one hundred and eleven cents*; and silver coins of equal fineness at the same rate.

Fees and allowances to the Custom House Officers, by the Act for regulating the Coasting Trade.

For the first register for every vessel, *two dollars*.

For every subsequent one, *one dollar and fifty cents*.

For every certificate of enrolment, *fifty cents*,

For every licence to trade between the United States, or the bark or whale fishery for one year, *fifty cents*.

For every entry of inward cargo, *sixty cents*.

For a permit to land foreign goods, *twenty cents*.

For every permit to proceed to the place of destination, *twenty five cents*.

For taking every bond, *twenty cents*.

Custom House Fees, &c. *continued.*

The foregoing Fees are to be equally divided between the Collector, Navy Officer and Surveyor; and where there is no Naval Officer, between the Collector and Surveyor; and where there is only a Collector, he is to receive the whole; and where there is more than one Surveyor in a District, each of them is to receive his proportionable part.

The fine for a Custom House Officer's taking of a bribe, to be not less than 200, nor more than 2000 dollars.

Any person who shall forcibly resist or impede any Officer of the Customs in the execution of his duty, for every offence shall be liable to a fine of 400 dollars.

NO vessel not wholly belonging to a citizen or citizens of the United States, is to be admitted to unload in any port or place, except the following, viz.

Portsmouth, in New Hampshire.—Boston, Salem, Newburyport, Gloucester, Portland, & Falmouth, in Massachusetts.—New-London and New-Haven, in Connecticut.—New-York, in New-York.—Perth-Amboy, and Burlington, in New-Jersey.—Philadelphia, in Pennsylvania.—Wilmington, in Delaware.—Baltimore, Annapolis, Georgetown, Thowmack, in Maryland.—Alexandria, Norfolk, Portsmouth, in Virginia.—Charleston, George Town, Beaufort, in South Carolina.—Savannah and Sunbury, in Georgia.—Wilmington, Newbern, Washington, and Edenton, in North Carolina.—Newport and Providence, in Rhode Island.

Duties on Tonnage of Ships or Vessels.

ON all ships or vessels of the United States from any foreign port or place, at the rate of 6 cents per ton.

On all vessels hereafter built in the United States belonging wholly or in any part to subjects of foreign powers, at the rate of 30 cents per ton.

On all foreign vessels, 50 cents per ton.

Vessels not belonging to the United States, entered in one district from another, having merchandizes on board, to pay 50 cents per ton.

The Duties on Tonnage to be paid in ten days after the Master makes report; and if the vessel leaves the port without paying the Duty, the Person commanding forfeits the sum of 500 dollars.

Not more than three quarters of the Directors in office, whose number is 25, are to be eligible for the next succeeding year, except the Director who shall be President, who may always be re-elected.

THE Bank is to be styled *The President, Directors and Company of the Bank of the United States*; and so to continue till the year 1811, the capital stock whereof is not to exceed 10,000,000 of dollars, to be divided into 25,000 shares, each share to be 400 dollars, one quarter part to be paid in gold and silver, at the time of subscribing, & three quarters in 6 per cent certificates, the first payment to be made the first monday in January 1792, in the ratio of specie to debt, at the distance of 6 months from each other.

Four Branches of this BANK are to be established, viz. one in Boston, a second at New York, a third in Baltimore, and a fourth in Charleston, South Carolina.

N. B. Whereas the establishment of Consuls is for the benefit of the trade of both countries, where they reside and where they come from, it is not improper to notify the American merchants that it is useful and necessary to them to take a passport from the Consul, or from the Agents residing in the ports from whence the vessels are to sail; because, in case of any accident happening to such vessels, that passport will be the best recommendation to the public functionary in the Islands.

The xliith article of an act of the King's Council of State, of December 29, 1787, mentions the following disposition: "His Majesty grants to the citizens and inhabitants of the United States all advantages which are enjoyed, or which may be hereafter enjoyed, by the most favored nations, in his Colonies of America: His Majesty assures to the said citizens and inhabitants of the United States all the privileges and advantages which his own subjects enjoy, or shall enjoy, in Asia and in the seas leading thereto: *Provided* always, That their vessels shall have been fitted out and dispatched in some parts of the United States."

For this last formality, the Consul only certifies the signature of the Justice of Peace before whom the Merchant made his affidavit.

It is likewise necessary that all papers sent to France or to any parts of the French dominions, which are authenticated by any civil or military American Officer, should be presented to the Consul to certify the signature of the said officer or officers.

Abstract of an Act of the American Congress, approved by the President Feb. 11. 1791, making Appropriations for the support of Government, &c. during the Year 1791. &c.

THAT there be appropriated for said several purposes, a sum not exceeding 203,276 dollars and 53 cents for defraying the expenses of the civil list, including the contingencies of the several executive officers, and of the two houses of Congress; a sum not exceeding 50,756 dollar and 53 cents. for satisfying several specified purposes; and a sum not exceeding 390,100 dollars, and 54 cents, for the use of the department of war, including the sum of 100,000 dollars for defraying the expenses of the expedition against certain Indian tribes (under Gen. Harmar and others) and the sum of 87,463 dollars and 60 cents, for one year's pensions to invalids, together with the contingencies of the said department. Which sums are to be paid out of the funds providing for the support of government.

By another Act, approved March 3, 1791, A sum not exceeding 20 000 dollars is appropriated for effecting a recognition of the treaty with the Emperor of Morocco.

And by another, approved the same day, a sum not exceeding 312, 686 dollars and 20 cents, is to be appropriated for defraying the expense of an additional regiment of Infantry, to consist of 213 men, exclusive of unarm'd filiated officers, to be employed for the defence of the frontiers; their pay and allowances to be as follows, v. z. Major general, 125 dollars per month, 20 dollars for monthly frize, and 15 rations daily; Brig. Gen. 80 dollars per month, 16 dollars for frize, 80 rations daily; Lieutenant General, 60 dollars per month; Major commandant of a battery, 45 dollars; Major, 40 dollars; Captains, 30 dollars; Lieut.nants 20 dollars; Troopers 15 dollars; Sergeants 10 dollars, and Mates 20 dollars; Sergeants 9 dollars; Corporals 4 dollars; Privates 24. soldiers 3 dollars; Chaplains 50 dollars per month, including rations and frize.

The President is authorized to borrow the two last mentioned sums, to be repaid out of the monies which prior to the 1st of January 1792, may arise from the duties imposed upon Spirits distilled within the United States, and in case of any deficiency in that fund, the faith of the United States is pledged to make it good.

Ten per cent. is added to the several rates of duties, in respect to goods imported in foreign vessels, except in cases where an additional duty is specially laid on goods imported.

A drawback of 99 per cent. on the duty, for exporting any of the aforesaid articles to foreign countries, (except Spirits, the drawback of which is mentioned under that head) A Bounty is paid on dried and pickled Fish, of the fisheries of the U. S. and on other Provisions salted within the States, when exported to a foreign country—viz—On dried Fish 10 cents per quintal—On pickled Fish and other salted Provisions, 10 cents per barrel.

Foreign Goods, subject to duty, are so seized, together with the vessel, if imported in any vessel under 30 tons.

IN order to secure the collection of these duties, boats or cutters are to be equipped, not exceeding ten, to be employed for the purpose of the revenue, the expense not to exceed 2000 dollars, to be paid out of the duties and tonnage of vessels. Each of said boats or cutters to have one Master, and not more than three Mates, four Mariners and two boys; the Master to be allowed 30 dollars per month, first Mate, 20, second Mate 15, third Mate 14, each Mariner 3 and each boy 4 dollars. The Officers of these boats or cutters to be Officers of the Customs, with authority to go on board any vessel within 4 leagues of the coasts of the United States. Sixteen or 17 or four boats are to be provided for the use of the Surveyors & Inspectors in going on board vessels, for detection of frauds.

By vessels of the United States, are understood vessels built in the United States, and wholly belonging to a citizen or citizens thereof; or vessels built in foreign countries, but belonging, on the 6th of May 1789, to a citizen or citizens of the United States, and so continuing until the time of importation.

Vessels, not answering the above description, are deemed Foreign Vessels.

*Method of Proceeding at the Loan Offices,
in the United States.*

United States Treasury Department, Sept. 20, 1790.

IT is hereby made known, that the following arrangement has been adopted towards carrying into execution the Act, making provision for the debt of the United States, viz.

Loan-Office Certificates, and those issued by the Commissioners for the adjustment of accounts in the several States, will be receivable only at the Treasury and by the respective commissioners of Loans within the States in which they were respectively issued. The Certificates issued by the Register of the Treasury, by the Pay-Master General and commissioner of Army Accounts, by the Commissioners for the adjustment of the accounts of the Quarter Master's Commissary's, Hospital, Cloathing, and Marine Departments, Indents on Interest, and Bills of old Emission, will be receivable indiscriminately at the Treasury and by the Commissioners of all the States. The situation of the Checks has dictated this arrangement for the greater security of the public against impositions by forged or counterfeit paper, and the details which have been adopted from the same consideration for the execution of the business are such, that it will give facility and dispatch if applications from the holders of Certificates of the Register of the Treasury and of the Paymaster General, and Commissioners of Army Accounts, and of the Commissioners of the five Departments above mentioned are made in the first instance at the Treasury; and if applications from the Holders of Loan Office Certificates; and Certificates issued by the Commissioners for the adjustment of Accounts in the respective States, are made in like manner to the commissioners of Loans within the State in which they were issued. Transfers can afterwards be made to any Office that the Proprietors of these Certificates may desire.

Treasury Department, Sept. 28, 1790.

THE following regulations, which have been adopted towards carrying into execution the Act, making provision for the debt of the United States are announced for the information of the public creditors.

WHEN a transfer is to be made from one person to another, the *certificate* or *certificates* of the debt to be transferred, must be produced at the proper office, in order that the same may be cancelled, and a new one, or new ones issue, as the case shall require.

When a transfer is desired from one office to another, application must in the first instance be made to the office where the credit exists, whereupon the certificate or certificates of the debt to be transferred will be cancelled and a special one granted, as a voucher to the Secretary of the Treasury; upon the production and delivery of which to him a warrant will issue to the office, to which the debt is to be transferred, where the business will be completed. The form (A) has been adopted for letters of attorney, to make transfers, which, and the directions for completing it, it is expected will be carefully observed.

In every case of a transfer of the subscribed or *funded* debt, the new certificate will bear interest, only from the first day of the quarter, *in which* the transfer is made. The unpaid interest which may have accrued prior to that quarter, will be paid only to the person, who was stockholder at the time it accrued, or to his *special* assignee.

Fourteen days before the expiration of each quarter, the books of each office will be closed; so that no transfers will be made, nor except at the Treasury, will any subscriptions be received, or old certificates exchanged for new ones, on the application of non-subscribers, *during that period*. Those intending to become subscribers to the proposed Loan, who do not subscribe, prior to the commencement of any such period—or those intending not to subscribe, who do not present their old certificates to be exchanged, or if holders of certificates of the Register of the Treasury, who do not notify to the Treasury their intention not to subscribe, prior to such commencement of such period, will not receive the interest, which may have accrued antecedently, till the end of the quarter *in which* their subscriptions are made or *in which* their certificates are exchanged, or *in which* they shall so notify their intention not to subscribe. Thus, the order distribution of the funds, and the preservation of order render indispensable.

On the subscribed or funded debt, interest as it becomes due; will be paid without production of the certificates issued for the same. On the unsubscribed debt if any there shall be, the production of the certificates will be necessary, in order to the receipt of the interest, and an indorsement of the payment of it upon the certificates. This however, is considered of the risk and inconvenience of transmission, will not be required of those who hold certificates of the Register of the Treasury, and reside out of the United States. The form (B) of a letter of attorney for receiving interest and the directions therewith, it is expected will be carefully pursued.

Stock,) or the word 'Deferred' (which will designate the Stock bearing Interest at the end of ten Years) or the word 'unfunded' (which will designate the unsubscribed part of the debt.)

Look for the Dominical Letter for the Year, and underneath it stands the Day of the Week, which all the Figures in the Table shew to be such Days of the Month under which they stand.—In short whatever Day stands under the Dominical Letter, all the Figures in the Table will be the same Day of the Week in each Month under which they stand respectively. But it must be observed that in Leap Year there are two Dominical Letters, the first of which serves for January and February only, and the other to the Year's End.

Articles of Contract with the Post Riders.

THE Mail shall be conveyed three times a week from the first of May to the first of November, and twice a week from the first of November to the first of May, from Portland in Massachusetts, to Suffolk, in Virginia: And from Suffolk to Savannah, in Georgia, twice a week, from the first of May to the first of November, and once a week from the first of November to the first of May.

The contractors to be answerable for the care and fidelity of the persons to whom they entrust the carriage of the mail; and that both they and their drivers or riders take the customary oaths.

That bonds be given with two sufficient sureties for the performance of each contract.

That where the mail shall be conveyed by stages, a person must be sent with the same, whose sole business it shall be to take care of it; and there must be in each stage carriage a secure and convenient place appropriated for its reception.

That in case any accident shall happen to the stage to delay it, the mail shall be forwarded so as to arrive at each office at the stated hour, at the expence of the contractor.

Directions for sailing in & out of Boston Bay.

THE Light House stands on a small Island at the north entrance of the channel (Point Alderton and Nantasket head being on the south) and is about 63 feet high; to steer for it from Cape Cod, the course is W. N. W. when within one league of the Cape: From Cape Cod to the Light House is about 16 leagues: From Cape Ann to the Light House, the course is S. W. distance 10 leagues. After making the Light, and the wind fair, you may bring it to bear W. by N. or W. N. W. and then run for it, till you come within two cables length of it. If the weather is so bad that a Pilot can't come off (as is sometimes the case) after running a-breast of it, so as to bring it to bear N. by E. you may run W. by S. about a mile and an half, to Nantasket head, where there is anchorage from 7 to 5 fathoms in safety. If the wind is a-head and you are obliged to work into Boston bay, stand to the southward till you bring the Light to bear W. N. W. and to the northward till you bring it to bear W. S. W. (till within one league of it); then you must not stand to the northward any further than to bring it to bear W. by N. and to the southward to bring it to bear W. N. W.

There is a Cannon at the Light House, to answer any signal Gun in thick weather.

There are two Lights at Cape Ann, on an Island call'd Thatcher's Island; they bear of each other when in one, S. S. W. a quarter S. and N. N. E. a quarter N. To go out into the Londoner, or Thatcher's Island ledge; you must give the light one league distance.

Fees of Pilotage for the Port of Boston.

Vessels drawing from 9 to 12 feet, 4s. per Foot.
 — From 12 to 15 feet, 4s. — From 15 to 18 feet, 5s.
 — From 18 to 21 feet, 6s. — From 21 to 25 feet, 9s.

Pilots are to be under Oath that they will from time to time, truly and faithfully perform the duties of a Pilot for the harbour or port of their assignment, according to their best skill and judgement. — They are to enter into bonds for the due performance of their Trust.

Directions for the Entrance of Boston Bay.

A Light House stands on the Gunner Head near Plymouth, with two Lanterns placed N. N. W. half W. and S. S. E. half E. at 15 Feet 6 Inches Distance.

These Lights are about 86 Feet from the Surface of the Sea, and cannot be brought into one to the Northward, unless you are on the Shore — But to the Southward, you may bring them into one, which is a very good Mark to clear you of Brown's Island or Sand Bank.

The High Land of the Monument bears from the Lights S a quarter W 3 Miles, and Monument Point S S E 3 Leagues, and Branches Point N half W about 3 Leagues, and Squash Head W half S 3 Miles, and the Eastermost Part of Bown's Islands or Shoal that dries S S W one Mile and a Quarter, and the Gurnet Rock from the Body of the Light-House E by S 3 quarters S the third part of a Mile; on this rock you have but 3 Feet at low Water. When you have shut in the first Sandy Hill with the Gurnet Head, you are clear of the Rock; after which you must mind not to hale in too close to the Head, as there are many sunken Rocks some Distance from the Shore. When you bring Squash Head to bear W by N, and not bound for Plymouth, you may steer for Boston Light.

At the Gurnet and Plymouth, the Tides are much the same as at Boston; that is, a S by E Moon makes Full Sea.

Directions for Newbury Port, & Ipswich Bay.

TWO Light-Houses have been lately erected on the North End of Plumb-Island, at the entrance of Merrimack river, which are kept constantly lighted from sunset to sunrise. — When any vessel shall fall into this bay, or shall be forced in by stress of weather, and shall make these lights, she may run safely in, over Newbury-Bar, observing the proper time of tide, and taking care to keep the two lights in one, until she gets within twice her length of the shore; then directing her course by the beach, where is bold water, she may proceed until abreast of the western Light House, where is good and safe anchorage in three fathoms of water.

A vessel passing near aboard the rocks of Cape-Ann, called the Salvages, and steering N.W. about five leagues, will come up with the Bar in about ten fathoms of water. There is good anchorage in twelve fathoms of water, about half a league short of the Bar.

The Light-Houses bear due East and West of each other, and are so constructed as to be moveable; and each

will be taken, in case the Bar shifts, to place them in such a situation as that the foregoing directions will always be a good guide to strangers.

The Marine Society and other gentlemen of Newburyport, have, sometime since, caused to be erected upon Plumb-Island three small houses, for the reception of such unfortunate mariners as may be cast on shore there. They are situated near the beach, about three miles asunder, and have high poles erected on them. In each of them are deposited fireworks and proper fuel for speedily kindling a fire. It is hoped that no person will make a wanton use of these means of preservation, so humanely provided for the most distressed of our fellow men.

Strangers who may be driven upon Plumb-Island, or the sandy beaches of Salisbury, or Hampton, are earnestly cautioned to continue on board their vessel, if possible, until the tide shall leave them, when they can safely proceed on shore in search of the above mentioned houses. The number of instances of fatal misadventures, which have attended those who have too suddenly forsaken their vessel, which has afterwards been found safe and dry, and the almost constant safety of those who continued on board are a serious confirmation of the propriety of this advice.

N. B. There are seven feet of water on the shoal part of the Bar at low water, and at half-tide better than eleven feet.

Directions for going into Portland Harbour, (Calco Bay.)

A NEW Light-House is erected on Portland-Head, at the entrance of the harbour; the building is 72 feet high exclusive of the lantern. In coming in, bring the light to bear N.N.W. then run for it, allowing it a small distance on the larboard hand; and when abreast of the same, then run N. by W. This course will give good anchorage from half a mile to one and an half.

No variation of the compass is allowed. A more particular survey will be soon taken of the bearings of the Light from the several rocks and shoals, together with directions how far vessels may stand E. or W. when beating into the harbour.

THE Humane Society of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, have erected six small Houses for the relief and preservation of Shipwrecked Seamen. Two on Lovell's Island, in the harbour of Boston, one of which is situated on the north-east side, on a rising ground about sixty rods from the shore; the other on the south-east point, near to the black rocks: two on Nantasket long beach, one near Strawberryhill, the other near Point Alderton; one on the south-west end of Calef's Island and one on Scituate beach, a mile to the southward of the fourth Cliff, so called, and nearly opposite to White's ferry. And have caused poles to be erected with balls painted white, to point out where said houses stand, and have repeatedly deposited in them the necessary means of kindling and preserving a fire, and some other means necessary for the comfort, and relief of the Shipwrecked Mariner; and they wish that the benevolent purpose, for which the said huts have been erected and the eminent service they have already been to several persons, may protect them from lawless depredations: And whereas said Houses are frequently robbed of the means necessary for the relief aforesaid by persons destitute of the feelings of humanity, the Trustees request those who reside in the vicinity of the said Huts to use their utmost care, that the articles deposited herein may remain uninjured.

BY the Law for establishing public Schools, every town in the Commonwealth, containing 50 families and upwards, is obliged to be provided with one or more School-masters, to teach children to read and write, and instruct them in the English language, as well as arithmetic, orthography, and decent behaviour; and towns containing 200 families, are to be provided with a grammar School-master, well instructed in the latin, greek and english languages;—

The penalty for neglect of schools in towns of 50 families, is £. 10. those of 100, £. 20, and those of 150, £. 30.

Grammar School-Masters are to have a College education, and produce a certificate from one or more settled Ministers, that 'he is of competent skill in the Greek and Latin languages, for the purpose;' they are each, as well as true Reading, Writing and English Grammar Masters, before being employed, to produce a certificate either from a settled Minister, the Selectmen of the town to which he belonged, or Committee of the Parish or place, that 'to the best of their knowledge he sustains a good moral character.' This certificate, respecting morals, is not necessary where the candidate belongs to the place where the School is proposed to be kept.—No settled Minister is to be 'deemed, held or accepted to be a School-master.'

Free Mason Lodges, &c.

THE first Masons Lodge in America was held in Boston on the 30th of July 1733, by virtue of a commission from the Right Honorable and Right Worshipful *Anthony Lord Viscount Montague*, Grand Master of England, dated the 30th of June 1733, and in the year of Masonry 5733, constituting the Right Worshipful Henry Price, Grand Master in North America, with full power and authority to depute his Deputy Grand Master and other masonic Officers; as also to constitute Lodges of free and accepted Masons as often as occasion should require:—In consequence of which commission he established a Lodge in due form, and appointed the Right Worshipful Andrew Boucher (eldest son to the late Governor of that name) Deputy Gr. Master, and the Worshipful Thomas Kennelly and John Quann, Grand Wardens; and upon a petition of 18 brethren of the Craft, a regular lodge, by the name of *Saint John's*, was constituted in Boston, who unanimously chose their Worshipful Brother Henry Hope (afterwards an eminent merchant at Amsterdam) to be their Master, & their worshipful brethren Frederick Hamilton & James Gordon, Wardens.—After which, a Master's Lodge was formed, then a second *Saint John's*, and another called the *Rising Sun*. — Thus was MASONRY founded in America.

In the year 1734, the worshipful Benjamin Franklin, (lately deceased) being a visiting brother at the Lodge in Boston, upon his return to Philadelphia, petitioned the Grand Lodge for a Deputation to establish one in Pennsylvania, which was granted, and he appointed Master.— Since which time the following Lodges were empowered by the Grand Lodge in Boston, for a constitutional and regular manner of meeting under their jurisdiction, viz.

Extract from Massachusetts Militia Law.

THE Militia Law of this Commonwealth obliges every non-commissioned officer and private soldier to be constantly provided with a good fire arm, bayonet, &c. a cartridge box that will hold 15 cartridges, 6 flints, 1 pound of powder, 40 leaden balls suitable for his fire arm, a haversack, blanket and canteen.—The fine for non-appearance on muster-days is 10s. and for non-equipment not to exceed £.3. in proportion to the value of the articles deficient. The train-band consists of all able bodied men from 16 to 40 years of age with exception of the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas, Judges of Probate, Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Elders and Deacons, Church Wardens, Masters of Arts, Masters of Vessels of more than 30 Tons, Constables and Deputy Sheriffs, Physicians and Surgeons, School-masters, Ferry-men & Millers.—The Alarm List consists of all Persons under 60 years of age, with the following exemptions both from that and the Train-band, viz. the Lieut. Governor, Members of the Council, Senate and House of Representatives, Members of Congress, the Secretary of the Commonwealth, Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court, Selectmen, Ministers of the Gospel, Grammar School masters, Officers and Students of Harvard College, Quakers, Indians, Negroes and Molattoes.—Each Town in the Commonwealth is to be provided with 100 weight of gun-powder, 300 weight of leaden balls, of various sizes, and 300 flints, for every 60 soldiers, under penalty of a fine of £.5, for not being so provided.

The following Summary Method of Treatment to be used with Persons apparently dead from Drowning, Suffocation, &c. is re-inserted at the Request of the Massachusetts Humane Society, see p. 83.

Convey the person to the nearest convenient house, with his head raised:—Strip and dry him as quick as possible; clean the mouth and nostrils from froth or mud—if a child let him be placed between two persons naked, in a hot bed—if an adult, lay him on a hot blanket or bed, and in cold weather near a fire—in warm weather, the air should be freely admitted into the room.—The body is next to be gently rubbed with warm woollen cloths sprinkled with spirits, if at hand, otherwise dry:—A heated warming-pan may be now lightly moved over the back, properly covered with a blanket—and the body, if of a child, is to be gently shook every few minutes:—Whilst these means are using, one or two assistants are to be employed in blowing up tobacco smoke into the fundament, with the instrument provided for the purpose, or a Tobacco Pipe, if that cannot be had—the bowl filled with Tobacco, and properly lighted, being covered with a handkerchief, or piece of linen, so as to defend the mouth of the assistant in blowing: Bathe the breast with hot rum, and persist in the use of these means for several hours. If no signs of life should then appear, let the body be kept warm several hours longer, with hot bricks, or vessels of hot water, applied to the palms of the hands, and soles of the feet, and this for a longer or shorter time, as the circumstances of the case may dictate.

The *Humane Society* adjudges premiums to those who by signal exertions shall save others from death, or who shall first discover and endeavour to recover persons apparently dead, or shall bring the first intelligence to one of the Physicians of the Society of such accidents as produce apparent death.

Such Gentlemen in this Commonwealth as wish to encourage this benevolent institution, are requested to apply to either of the Trustees, with whom subscription papers are lodged; and those, to whom it may not be convenient to apply in person, may, on transmitting their names, with the sum they incline to subscribe annually, have their names entered as members of the Society.
