ECLIPSES for the Year 1793.

THERE will be four Eclipses this Year, viz. two of the *Sun* (☉) and two of the *Moon* (☾) as follows.

I. The *Moon* will be eclipsed on Monday the 25th Day of February, and by calculation, partly visible, viz.

Beginning,	-	4 h.	42 m.	} Afternoon.

Middle,	- -	6	3	
End,	- - -	7	24	
Duration,	-	2	42	

II. The *Sun* will be eclipsed on Monday the 11th day of March; the *Conjunction* will be at 15 minutes after 1 o'clock in the morning. It will be invisible to us, but in lat. 46 and an half S. and long, 93 E. it will be centrally eclipsed on the meridian at 17h. 28f.

III. The *Moon* will be eclipsed on Wednesday the 21st day of August, at 11 minutes after 10 o'clock in the morning, invisible to us. In those parts of the world where it is visible, the *Moon* will be eclipsed 8 deg. 41m. on its south limb.

IV. There will be an eclipse of the *Sun* on Thursday the 5th day of September, beginning before Sun-rise, so that the going off will only be seen by us. The *Digits* eclipsed will be 8 deg. 41 min. on the N. limb.

There will be six Eclipses next year, viz. four of the *Sun* and two of the *Moon*, some of them visible; a particular calculation of which will then be given.

The Planet *Venus* [♀] will be our evening Star from the beginning of the year to the 27th day of May, when she will be in conjunction with the *Sun*; from thence to the end of the year she will be our morning Star.—

The times of her rising and setting are inserted once or twice in each Calendar Page.

Venus is easily distinguished by her brightness, which exceeds all the other Planets. She constantly attends the *Sun* in an orbit between that of *Mercury* and the earth and never departs from him above 47 degrees.

Three Certificates of the number of Votes for the President & Vice President, are to be sent, sealed up, one to the President of the Senate at the Seat of Government before the first Wednesday in January by Express; another to him by the Post; and the third to be delivered to the Judge of the District in which the Electors shall assemble. — The Names of the Electors are to be annexed to each of the lists of their votes.

By a Resolve of the General Court of the State of Massachusetts, passed in June 1792, relative to the dividing the Commonwealth into Districts for the choice of Federal Representatives, it was agreed to be divided into four, viz.

- No. 1. Consisting of Suffolk, Essex and Middlesex, to choose FOUR Representatives.
- No. 2. Worcester, Hampshire and Berkshire, FOUR.
- No. 3. Plymouth, Darnstable, Bristol, Dukes-County, and Nantucket, TWO.
- No. 4. The Province of Maine, THREE.— Making THIRTEEN.— To complete the number of 14, the 3 first Districts, at large, are to choose the other.

**POWERS of CONGRESS as authorized by the
CONSTITUTION of the United States.**

To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debt and provide for the common defence and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States :

To borrow money on the credit of the United States :

To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes :

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States :

To coin money, regulate the value thereof, and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures :

To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States :

To establish post-offices and post-roads :

To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries :

To constitute tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court :

To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offences against the law of nations :

To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water :

To raise and support armies, but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than 2 years :

To provide and maintain a navy.

To make rules for the government and regulation of the land forces :

To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions :

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress :

To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may by cession of particular states, and the acceptance of Congress, become the seat of the government of the United

States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards, and other needful buildings:

And to make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or office thereof.

The Laws of the United States, which shall be made in pursuance of the Constitution, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, are to be the supreme law of the land, and the Judges in every State are to be bound thereby.

MINT of the United States.

BY an Act of Congress, a Mint is to be established at the seat of Government, for the conducting of which there is to be a Director, with a yearly salary of 2000 dollars: an Assayer, 1500 dollars: a Chief Coiner, 1500 dollars: an Engraver, 1200 dollars: and a Treasurer, 1000 dollars. The Clerks salary are not to exceed 500 dollars each; and the Workmen & Servants, such wages as are customary and reasonable.

The Coins to be struck are to be of the following denominations, values and descriptions, viz.

- Eagles:* Each to be of the value of ten dollars or units.
- Half Eagles:* To be of the value of five dollars.
- Quarter Eagles:* To be of the value of two dollars & half.
- Dollars or Units:* Each the value of a Spanish milled dollar.
- Half Dollar:* Each to be of the value of a dollar or unit.
- Quarter dollars:* Each one fourth the value of a dollar.
- Dimes:* Each the value of one tenth of a dollar.
- Half Dimes:* Each the value of one twentieth of a dollar.
- Cents:* Each the value of one hundredth of a dollar.
- Half Cents:* Each to be of the value of half a cent.

☞ The penalty is fixed for debasing the Coins.

Upon said Coins there are to be the following devices, viz. on one side of each an impression emblematic of liberty, with an inscription of the word liberty, and the year of the coinage; and upon the reverse of each of the gold and silver coins there is to be the representation of an Eagle with this inscription, *United States of America*, and upon the reverse of each of the copper Coins, an inscription to express the denomination of the piece, namely, Cent or half Cent, as the case may require.

A quantity of Copper, not exceeding 150 tons, is to be coined into Cents and half Cents, and after the expiration of six months from the time of coining of the same has been delivered into the Treasury of the United States, thence to issue in circulation (of which notice is to be given in the news-paper) no copper Coins except said Cents, are to pass in payment for any debt, and if offered or received in payment, to be forfeited, besides incurring a penalty of one dollar.

Ten per cent more is to added to the rates of duties payable by the former law, if in vessels not of the United States. Except where an additional duty is laid on such articles.

The following Articles are exempted from Duty, viz.

Salt-petre, tin in pigs, tin plates, old pewter, brass, iron and brass wire, copper in plates, pigs & bars, wool, dyeing woods, and dyeing drugs, raw hides, and skins, undressed furs, bollian, tutenag, plaster of Paris, lapis caliminaris, unmanufactured wool, sulphur, wood, sea stores of vessels, cloaths, books, furniture and tools of persons coming to reside in the United States, philosophical apparatus for seminaries, goods to be exported to foreign places in the same vessels, and all articles of the growth, produce or manufactures of the United States.

Goods *ad valorem*, to be valued by adding *twenty per cent* to the actual cost, if from the Cape of Good Hope, or beyond, and *ten per cent* from any other place, exclusive of charges.

Drawbacks are not payable until six months after exportation, nor until a certificate in writing is produced, by the exporter, from two reputable merchants at the foreign port or place where landed, together with the oath of the master and mate, certifying the delivery thereof; except distilled spirits, in which case, a certificate from an American Consul, if such there be, or from two American merchants, residing at such foreign port.

*Extracts from the Revenue Acts,**For the direction of Merchants, and Masters of Vessels.*

NO goods are to be imported, in any vessel, owned in the whole or in part by citizens, from any foreign port, unless the master shall have on board a manifest in writing, signed by him, containing the names of the ports or places where such goods were received, and the port where consigned or destined to, and the name and built of the vessel, and true tonnage by register, with the name of the master and place to which such vessel belongs, and particular account of all the cargo in packages, or loose, with the marks and numbers in words at length, and description of each by usual denominations.

For any goods not included in the manifest as above, the Master is to forfeit a sum equal to their value, unless it is made appear to the Collector, Naval Officer, and Surveyor, or to a court on trial, that no part of the cargo was unshipped, except what is mentioned in the report, or that the manifest has been lost or mislaid without fraud, or defaced by accident, or incorrect by mistake.

The Master of any vessel, bound to any port in the United States, on arrival within four leagues of the coast, or within any bays, harbours, ports, rivers, creeks, or inlets thereof, on demand, to produce such manifest to the Officer of the customs first coming on board, and deliver him a copy thereof subscribed by the master, and the Officer to certify on the original, that the same was so produced, and a copy delivered him, and the Master to produce the original so certified to the Officer first coming on board, on his arrival in the district where the cargo is intended to be landed, and deliver to such officer a copy thereof, to be provided and subscribed by the master, the delivery of which to be certified by the said Officer on the original manifest to be delivered to the Collector.

The penalty for not producing such manifests and delivering copies thereof, or for not informing such officer of the destination of such vessel, or giving a false account, is 500 dollars for each offence.

Any vessel within four leagues of the coast, or within the limits of a district, unloading goods, without authority from proper officers, the Master and the Mate forfeit 1000 dollars, and the goods forfeited, except in case of accident, necessity and stress of weather.

Information to Merchants, &c. continued.

Masters of vessels receiving goods to unloaden (except as before excepted) to forfeit treble value of such goods, and the ship, boat or vessel receiving them are forfeited.

If any vessel arriving within a district, shall depart, or attempt to depart from the same (unless to some more interior port, or by force of weather) without report made to the Collector, the master forfeits 400 dollars,

Any vessel arriving from a foreign port, the master is to report to the Collector within twenty-four hours of his arrival, and within forty-eight hours further to report the name, burthen and loading of such ship, whether in packages or loose, and of the marks, numbers & contents of each package, and place or places, person or persons, to or for whom they are respectively consigned or destined, also the place where she took in her loading, what country built, from what foreign port she last sailed, who was Master during the voyage, & is at the time of the report, and (if a vessel of the United States) who are owners.

Masters neglecting to make such report forfeit 1000 dollars.

Ships of war, or packets of any Prince or State, and not permitted by such prince or state to carry goods in way of trade, are not required to make such report.

Masters of vessels, after arrival and entry, may proceed to foreign ports, with goods reported for such foreign port, without paying duties thereon, on giving bond, and bonds are not required when vessels put in in distress.

Duties only to be paid where goods are landed (on giving bond if such vessel proceeds to another district.)

Collector to furnish the Master bound to another district, with a copy of his report, which he is to shew to the Collector of that district, within 24 hours after his arrival, on a penalty of 500 dollars.

Owners or consignees of goods imported, are within fifteen days after the Master's report, to make entry with the Collector of the marks, numbers and contents of each package, or quantity and quality in each bulk, with the neat prime cost thereof, and produce the original invoice, document and bills of loading, and declare all the party knows, on oath or affirmation, and subscribed by the same.

Sea-stores to be specified by Masters, and excepted from duty, but are not to be landed or sold.

Information to Merchants. &c. continued.

Cloaths, books, household furniture, tools or implements of trades, or professions of persons arriving in the United States to settle, exempted from duty on due proof.

No goods from foreign ports to be unloaded, but between sun-rise and sun-set, nor without a permit, under penalty of 400 dollars, disability from holding office for seven years, and being advertised in the gazettes, and forfeiture of goods, and if above the value of 400 dollars, of vessel and apparel.

Goods removed before gauged or weighed, without permission, are forfeited.

Inspectors and officers of revenue cutters, may go on board, examine and search vessels, have free access to the cabin, and seal packages, and after sun-set, secure hatches and communications.

Persons in charge of vessels, for breaking fastenings before sun rise and presence of officer, forfeits 200 dollars.

Goods not entered in fifteen days, to be delivered the Collector to store and sell, &c. except salt or coal, which may remain longer, the owners paying inspectors.

Packages wanting, or goods not agreeing with manifest the Master forfeits 500 dollars, unless made appear to the satisfaction of principal officers of customs, or courts, that no part has been unshipped except in report, or an accident or mistake.

Goods damaged on the voyage to be appraised by persons named by the Collector and Owner, and allowance made for duty.

Goods without invoice to be stored by the Collector, or appraised.

Ships arriving in distress to make protest before a Notary, or other person authorized, or before the Collector, within 24 hours, and within 48 hours to report of vessel and cargo to the Collector, as in other cases. Goods may be stored, and so much as necessary for repairs sold on payment of the duties.

Duties to be paid before permit, unless they exceed 50 dollars, in which case they may be secured by bond, with one or more securities, payable, viz. salt in 9 months, West India produce (except salt) 4 months, wines 12 months, teas from China 12 months, and if stored under care of the inspector, 2 years; all other, one half in six months, one

Information to Merchants, &c. continued.

quarter in 9 months, and one quarter in 12 months; or the importer may deposit double the value of duties in the goods to secure payment of duties, which on failure of payment are to be sold.

Teas from China may be deposited with the collector, and delivered on payment of duties, for such part as is delivered within eighteen months, and then sold for duties, if not paid.

Officers may seize within or without their districts, persons resisting or impeding them forfeit 400 dollars.

In cases of drawback, notice to be given to the Collector by the exporter, at least 24 hours before shipping the goods, except for distilled spirits, 6 hours notice only is required; all which are to be inspected and shipped in presence of an officer. Drawbacks are allowed at the place of entry only, on all goods exported to any country without the United States, within twelve months, after payment made or security given for the duties inwards, and excepting where the duties do not amount to 20 dollars, and distilled spirits to 100 gallons at least, retaining 1 per cent. of the duties, and half a cent per gallon for the charges of entry, &c.

Bonds with one or more sufficient securities to be given, that such goods shall not be re-landed in the United States.

In case of vessel cast away, or other accident, to produce protest in due form, or in case such protest cannot be had, the oath or affirmation of the exporter, or other proof to the satisfaction of the Collector.

Goods exported for drawback, and re-landed, subject to seizure, together with the vessel, boats, &c. and persons concerned suffer 6 months imprisonment; but if the voyage is altered, the collector may give permit for re-landing.

Salt fish and salted provisions to be shipped under the same restrictions as in case of drawbacks, and the bounty to be paid without abatement, but no drawback to be allowed unless it amounts to 20 dollars, nor bounty unless to 3 dollars.

The collector may give credit on bonds due, for amount of drawbacks, if given by the exporter, being the importer.

Persons giving or offering a bribe forfeit from 200 to 2000 dollars.

Captains or owners making false entry forfeit not exceeding 1000 dollars, and suffer not more than 12 months imprisonment.

Information to Merchants, &c. continued.

No goods of foreign growth or manufacture, to be brought into the United States on ships by sea, and not in vessels under 30 tons, on forfeiture of goods and vessel (except to Louisville on Ohio) except household furniture and cloathing of persons removing to the United State.

Vessels bound to foreign ports, the Master is to deliver a true manifest on oath and take clearance (but without specifying particulars unless required) under penalty of 200 dollars.

All permits granted by the Collector, for wines and distilled spirits, shall, prior to the landing of such goods, be produced to the Inspectors who shall by indorsement signify the same. Vices contrary to the above directions, are subject to forfeiture.

Spirits imported (except gin, in casks & cordials) in casks under 30 gallons are forfeited, and the vessel also, until the 30th day of April, 1793 --- after which distilled spirits except a rack and sweet cordials can be imported in casks or vessels of less capacity than 30 gallons, or pipe of forfeiture; as also beer, ale or porter, or of ale than 40 gallons; and in barrels in packages less than six dozen are forfeited together with the vessel.

Sumers in a bands over at the Custom House for duties, shall, in case of insolvency of the principal, have and enjoy like advantages priority and preference for recovery of the monies so bonded, out of the estate and effects of such insolvent, as reserved and secured to the United States by the 44th section of the Act for the collection of duties, &c.

No ship or vessel from foreign ports shall be permitted to report, on her entry, on board her, till the Master shall deliver to the postmaster all letters under his care or in his power, other than such as are directed to the owner or consignee. --- The collector to require an oath or affirmation from every master of such delivery. --- Masters of vessels to receive two cents for every letter so delivered.

Exporters are to make oath that no part of the merchandize specified to be exported, are intended to be landed within the United States.

Importers are also to make oath that the merchandize imported are of the same quality, quantity and value as at the time of importation.

Information to Merchants, &c. continued.

BY an Act of Congress, approved February 16, 1792, an allowance is to be made on the exportation of dried Fish (in lieu of a drawback on the duties paid on salt used in preserving the same) after the 10th of June 1792, viz. as an equivalent, to each fishing vessel, qualified agreeably to law, for carrying on the bank and other cod fisheries, who shall be employed therein at sea for the term of four months at least of the fishing season, for each ton of such vessel, according to her admeasurement, if of 20 and not exceeding 30 tons, *one and an half dollars*: if above 30 tons, *two and an half dollars*; of which allowance three eighths parts are to accrue to the owner, and the other five eighths to be divided among the fishermen employed in such vessel, in such proportions as the fish they may have taken may bear to the whole quantity of fish taken on board such vessel during the season: *Provided*, that the allowance on any one vessel for one season shall not exceed *270 dollars*.

An annual allowance is also to be made to the owner of every fishing boat of more than five and less than twenty tons, of the sum of *one dollar* upon every ton, to be accounted for as part of the proceeds of the fares of such vessel, and to be divided among those interested therein. This allowance is to be made only to such vessels as have been actually employed at sea in the cod fishery for four months at least of the preceding season, and that such vessel shall have landed in the course of the preceding season not less than twelve quintals for every ton of her admeasurement: But if at any time within one year after payment of the allowance (which is to be on the last day of December annually) it shall appear that any fraud or deceit has been practised in obtaining the same, the boat or vessel upon which such allowance shall have been paid, if found within the district, is to be forfeited; otherwise the owner practising such fraud and deceit, is to forfeit and pay 100 dollars.

No ship or vessel is entitled to any allowance, unless the skipper shall, before he proceeds on the fishing voyage, make an agreement, in writing or print, with every fisherman employed therein, excepting apprentices & servants, which agreement is to be countersigned by the owner or agent of such fishing vessel.

The Act is to continue in force seven years.

Eastern Circuit. In the District of *New York*, at New York on the 5th days of April and September. In *Connecticut*, at New-Haven and Hartford, alternately, on the 25th days of April and September. In *Massachusetts*, at Boston, on the 12th days of May and October. In *New Hampshire* at Portsmouth and Exeter, alternately, on the 24th days of May and October. In *Rhode Island*, at Newport and Providence, alternately, on the 7th days of June and November. In *Vermont*, at Bennington, on the 17th day of June annually.

Middle Circuit. In the District of *New Jersey*, at Trenton, on the 2d days of April and October. In *Pennsylvania*, at Philadelphia and York Town, alternately, on the 11th days of April and October. In *Delaware*, at Newcastle and Dover, alternately, on the 27th days of April and October. In *Maryland*, at Annapolis & Easton, alternately, on the 1st days of May and November. In *Virginia*, at Richmond, on the 22d days of May and November.

Southern Circuit. In the District of *South Carolina*, at Charleston, on the 25th day of October, and at Columbia, on the 12th of May. In *Georgia*, at Savannah, on the 25th day of April, and in each succeeding year at Augusta, on the 8th day of November. In *North Carolina*, at Newbern, on the 1st day of June and 30th day of November.

When any of said days happen on a Sunday the Court is to be held on the Monday following.

DISTRICT COURTS.

In the District of *New Hampshire*, District Courts are to be held, alternately, at Exeter and Portsmouth, on the third Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In *Massachusetts*, alternately at Boston and Salem, on the first Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In *Maine*, at Portland and Pownaiborough, alternately, on the first Tuesday of March, third Tuesday of June.

In *Maryland*, alternately, at Baltimore and Easton, on the first Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In *Virginia* alternately, at Richmond and Williamsburgh, on the third Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In *Kentucky*, at Harrodsburgh, on the third Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In *South Carolina*, at Charleston, on the third Mondays in March and September, the first Monday in July and the second Monday in December. In *Georgia* alternately, at Savannah and Augusta, on the second Tuesdays of March, June, September and December. In *North Carolina* at Newbern, Wilmington and Edenton, in rotation, on the first Mondays in July, October, January and April. In *Rhode Island and Providence Plantations*, alternately, at New York & Providence, on the first Mondays in August, November, February and May. In *Vermont* at Rutland and Windsor, on the first Mondays in May, August, November and February.

Note *The District Judges may also hold Special Courts.*—

FEEs of the Officers, of the District Courts.

For the Marshals for the service of any writ, warrants, or other process, on each person, *two dollars.*
 For travel out in serving ditto, *five cents per mile.*
 For each bail bond, *fifty cents.*
 For selling goods and velle's condemned, *three per cent.*
 For commitment or discharge of a prisoner, *fifty cents.*
 For summoning witnesses, each *thirty cents.*
 For summoning a grand or petit jury, each *three dollars.*
 For attending the supreme, circuit, or district courts, *five dollars per day.* and *ten cents per mile* for travel, from the place of his abode to either of the courts.

For levying an execution, and other services, such fees as are allowed in the supreme court of the state where the services shall be rendered.

To the clerk of the supreme court of the United States, *ten dollars* per day for his attendance and for his other services double the fees of the clerk of the supreme court of that state in which the court is held.

To the clerk of the district and circuit courts such fees in each state as are allowed in the supreme courts there, and *five dollars* per day for his attendance at court, and *ten cents* per mile for travelling to said courts.

To each grand and petit juror *fifty cents* per day, and *five cents* per mile for travelling expenses to court, and the like allowance for returning.

To witnesses summoned, the same compensations in each state as are allowed in the supreme courts of the same.

To the Attorney for the District, such fees as are allowed in the supreme courts of the same, and for travelling the same as the clerks of the district courts.

The Marshal is to have the custody of vessels & goods seized, be paid the expenses for fuel, candles and other contingencies that may accrue in holding the courts within his district, providing the books necessary to record the proceedings thereof; also the compensations to the grand and petit jurors, witnesses summoned on the part of the United States, to the clerk of the supreme court, to the clerks of the district and circuit courts for their travel and attendance, to the attorney of the district for travelling to court, to the marshal for his attendance at court; for summoning grand and petit jurors and witnesses in behalf of any prisoner to be tried for a criminal offence; for the maintenance of prisoners in goal for any criminal offence, and for his commitment or discharge; also the legal fees of the clerk, attorney and marshal, in criminal prosecutions, are to be included in the marshal's account; and the same being examined & certified by the court in which the service was rendered, is to be paid out of the treasury of the United States, and by him paid over to the persons entitled to the same, for which the marshal is to be allowed two and an half per cent. on the amount by him so paid, to be charged in his future account.

Any of the aforementioned officers receiving greater fees than those allowed, forfeit a fine not exceeding 500 doll.

EXPLANATION.

Look for the Dominical Letter for the Year, and underneath it stands the Day of the Week, which all the Figures in the Table shew to be such Days of the Month under which they stand.—In short whatever Day stands under the Dominical Letter, all the figures in the Table will be the same Day of the Week in each Month under which they stand respectively. But it must be observed that in Leap Year there are two Dominical Letters, the first of which serves for January and February only, and the other to the Year's End.

In the present Year 1793, it not being Leap Year, F is the Dominical Letter—Under which, for the Months of *September* and *December*, stands *Monday*, which shews that all the Figures in the Table are *Mondays* throughout the Year; by the knowledge of which the Date of the Day of the Month in the preceding or following Week may be easily known by reckoning from *Monday*.

Uniform Militia.

BY an Act of the second Congress, all citizens of the United States from the age of 18 and under 45, are to be enrolled in the Militia, and within one year from the 8th of May 1792, to be arranged into divisions, brigades, regiments, battalions, and companies, as the legislature of each State shall direct, and to be officered by the respective States. They are to be provided with a good musket, a sufficient bayonet and belt, two spare flints, and a knapsack, a pouch to contain not less than twenty four cartridges, suited to his musket, with a proper quantity of powder and ball; or a good rifle, &c. The commissioned officers to be armed with a sword or hanger, and spontoon, and that after five years from the said 8th of May 1792, all muskets for arming the militia are to be of bores sufficient for balls of the eighteenth part of a pound, which are to be exempted from all suits, distresses, or executions for debt or taxes.

The judicial and executive officers of government; the members of both houses of congress, and their officers; all custom-house officers with their clerks; all post-officers and stage drivers for the conveyance of the mails; all ferrymen employed on the post road; all inspectors of exports; all pilots; all mariners employed in the sea service; and all persons who now are or may be exempted by the laws of the respective states, are also by the law of Congress exempted from military duty.

Out of the militia enrolled, there is to be formed for each battalion one company of grenadiers, light infantry or rifemen; and to each division one company of artillery, and one troop of horse. The officers of artillery to be armed with a sword or hanger, a fusée, bayonet and belt, with a cartridge box to contain twelve cartridges; and each musket to be furnished with all the equipments of a private in the infantry. The commissioned officers of the troop of horse, to furnish themselves with good horses, at least fourteen hands and an half high, and to be armed with a sword and pair of pistols, the holsters of which to be covered with bear skin; the dragoons are to furnish themselves with a horse, saddle, bridle, male-pillion and valise, holsters, breast-plate and crupper, a pair of boots and spurs, a pair of pistols, a sabre, and a cartouch-box, to contain twelve cartridges for pistols. The artillery and troop are to be formed of volunteers from the militia.

Collectors of Excise in Massachusetts.

Chosen in June 1790, and to continue in Office by a Resolve of the General Court in June 1791, for the Collection of Duties on Carriages &c. and for settling their Excise Accounts with licenced Parsons.

Directions for sailing in & out of Boston Bay.

THE Light House stands on a small Island at the north entrance of the channel (Point Alderton & Nantaket heights being on the South) and is about 65 feet high; to steer for it from Cape Cod, the course is W. N. W. when within one league of the Cape. From Cape Cod to the Light House is about 16 leagues: From Cape Ann to the Light House, the course is S. W. distant 10 leagues. After making the Light, and the wind fair, you may bring it to bear W. by N. or W. N. W. and then run for it, till you come within two cables length of it. If the weather is so bad that a Pilot can't get off (as is sometimes the case) after running a-breadth of it, so as to bring it to bear N. by E. you may run W. by S. about a mile and a half, to Nantaket road where there is anchorage from 7 to 9 fathoms in safety. If the wind is a-head and you are obliged to work into Boston-bay, stand to the southward till you bring the Light to bear W. N. W. and to the northward till you bring it to bear W. S. W. till you come within one league of it, then you must not stand to the southward any further than to bring it to bear W. by N. & to the southward to bring it to bear W. N. W. You may anchor in the Bay with safety, if the wind is off the shore — There is a Cannon at this Light House, to be fired to answer any signals in thick weather.

There are two Lights at Cape Ann, on an Island call'd Thacher's Island; they bear of each other, when in one, S. S. W. a quarter S. and N. N. E. a quarter N. To go outside the Londons, or Finner's Island ledge, you must give the Light one league distance.

Pilots are to be under oath, that they will, from time to time, truly and faithfully perform the duties of a Pilot for the harbour or port of their assignment, according to their best skill and judgment. — Also to enter into bonds for the due performance of their trust. — And if any vessel shall be lost, set a-way, or run aground, thro' the unskillfulness or neglect of any Boston Pilot, he is to pay the just value of the damage the vessel or cargo may sustain.

The BANK is to continue, by the law establishing the same, till the year 1811, the capital Stock whereof is not to exceed 10,000,000 of dollars, to be divided into 25,000 shares, each share to be 400 dollars, one quarter part to be paid in gold and silver, at the time of subscribing, and three quarters in six per cent certificates, in the ratio of specie to debt, at the distance of six months from each other, from January 1792. —

Subscribers who shall have paid the specie proportion, and fail to make any of the future payments, forfeit the sum by them first made.

Rules & Regulations established to be observed at the BANK of the United States

THE Bank shall be open for transacting business, every day in the year (Sundays, Christmas, and the fourth of July excepted.) The books and accounts shall be kept in dollars and cents, and shall be regularly balanced on the 1st Mondays in January and July, in each year; when the half-yearly dividends shall be declared and published.

The bank shall take charge of the cash of all those who chuse it there (free of expence) and shall keep it subject to their order, payable at sight; and shall receive deposits of ingots of gold, bars of silver, wrought plate, or other valuable articles of small bulk, in the same manner, and return them on demand of the depositor.

The bank shall receive all specie coins, according to the rates and value that have been or shall hereafter be established by congress.

That until offices of discount and deposit shall be established there shall be at least two discount days in every week, when meetings of the board of directors shall be assembled. — Discounts shall be made at a rate not exceeding six per cent. per ann. on notes or bills of exchange that have not more than sixty days to run, and with at least two responsible names, and under such modifications as the board of directors, in their discretion, shall deem satisfactory and expedient.

The President shall have power to convene the directors on special occasions, with the approbation of the board of directors; and the Seal, when fixed, is always to remain in the custody and safe keeping of the President.

BANK Matters *continued.*

A committee of the board, consisting of at least three members to be elected monthly by ballot, shall visit the vaults, in which the cash and other effects shall be deposited at least once in every month, and make an inventory of the same, to be compared with the books, in order to ascertain whether they perfectly agree therewith.

No notes of the bank shall be struck or signed, or bank paper made but by the direction of the board.

In case the board of directors shall at any time make a dividend exceeding the profits of the bank and thereby diminish the capital stock, the members assenting thereto, shall be liable in their several individual capacities for the amount of the surplus so divided.

The board of directors shall, previous to the first day of December in every year, call a general meeting of the stockholders to be assembled, within three days after each annual election.

The board of directors are authorized to ascertain and determine in what manner the remaining portions of the capital stock, due on the shares subscribed, consisting of specie and public debt, shall be paid and received.

They are also authorized to fix and establish requisite, safe and convenient forms for transferring bank stock; for receiving yearly half dividends; for conveying a right to proxies to represent stock holders at any general meeting; for the certificates of capital stock of the bank; for the circulating and post notes of the bank; and for the oath or affirmation of the officers of the bank, previous to their entering on the execution of their respective duties.

The board of directors are authorized to establish a common seal, with suitable devices; to ascertain and mark out the various duties and employments of the officers, clerks and servants of the bank, and to direct them accordingly—as well as to determine the amount of securities they shall respectively give for the faithful discharge of their duties; to assign to the president such additional functions, as are not already designated by law—and to re-issue or renew at their discretion the notes in circulation.

The directors shall have power to make loans to the government of the United States or of any state, to such extent, and on such terms as they shall deem expedient, not contrary to law.

That Monday and Thursday in each week be the days for making discounts at the Office, and that applications therefor must be left with the Cashier before One o'clock on said days.

That discount be made at the said office, at the rate of six per cent per annum, on Notes and Bills of Exchange, with at least two responsible names, and under such modifications, as the Directors shall deem satisfactory and expedient.

N. B. Whereas the establishment of Consuls is for the benefit of the trade of both countries, where they reside and where they come from, it is not improper to notify the American Merchants that it is useful and necessary to them to take a passport from the Consul, or from the Agent residing in the ports from where the vessels are to sail; because, in case of any accident happening to such vessels, that passport will be the best recommendation to the public functionary in the islands.

The viiith article of an act of the King's Council of State.

of December 29 1787, mentions the following disposition:

“ His Majesty grants to the citizens and inhabitants of the
 “ United States all advantages which are enjoyed, or which
 “ may be hereafter enjoyed, by the most favoured nations,
 “ in his Colonies of America: His Majesty assures to the
 “ said citizens and inhabitants of the United States, all the
 “ privileges and advantages which his own subjects enjoy,
 “ or shall enjoy, in Asia and in the seas leading thereto:
 “ *Provided* always, That their vessels shall have been fitted
 “ out and dispatched in some parts of the United States.”

For this last formality, the Consul only certifies the signature of the Justice of Peace before whom the Merchant made his affidavit.

It is likewise necessary that all papers sent to France or to any parts of the French dominions, which are authenticated by any civil or military American officer, should be presented to the Consul to certify the signature of the said officer or officers.

BOSTON is the Capital of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. It is built upon a peninsula, of an irregular form, at the bottom of a large bay; the length, running about N. N. E. at the entrance from Roxbury, exclusive of the Neck leading therefrom (which is about one mile) to the extremity at Winnisimmet ferry, is 1 mile, three quarters, and 199 yards. The breadth of the Town is various; near the entrance it is narrow, but passing thro' it widens; and the greatest breadth is from Fort-Hill, (near the centre) to the utmost point at the West part of the town, which is 1 mile and 139 yards. The breadth towards the northward diminishes, for from the Mill-pond on the west (thro' Cross-street) to the sea on the east, it is but 275 yards; however, it increases again to the northward, for from Charles's river bridge to Gov. *Hancock's* wharf, it is upwards of 730 yards. The whole length of the Town, including the Neck which joins Boston to Roxbury (being 1 mile and 39 yards) is 2 miles, 3 quarters and 238 yards. The number of acres upon which the Town is built, has never been ascertained, but supposed to be about one thousand.

Certain Questions and Answers,

*Concerning the Mystery of MASONRY, taken from a very
ancient Record, as the stile evidently manifests.*

Q. WHAT may that be ?

A. It be the knowledge of nature, the understanding of the power that is therein, and its sundry operations; particularly the knowledge of reckonings, of weights and measures, and the true manner of forming all things for man's use, chiefly dwellings and buildings of all kinds, and other things that make good for man.

Q. Where did it begin ?

A. It did begin with the first men in the east, which were before the first man of the west; and coming westerly, it hath brought with it, all comforts to the savage and comfortless.

Q. Who did bring it westerly ?

A. The Phenicians, being great merchants, came first from the east into Phenicia, for the conveniency of merchandizing, both E. & W. by the red & mediteranean seas.

Q. How came it to England ?

A. Pythagoras, a Grecian, journeyed for knowledge in Egypt, and Syria, and in every land where the Phenicians had planted masonry, and gaining entrance in all Lodges of Masonry, he learned much and returned, and dwelt in great Greece, growing & becoming a mighty Philosopher, and greatly renowned, and there he framed a great Lodge at Cretona, and made many Masons, some whereof died journeying in France, and made many Masons, wherefrom, in process of time, the Art passed to England.

Q. Doth Masons discover their Arts unto others ?

A. Pythagoras, when he journeyed to learn, was first made, then taught; even so shou'd all others be in right. Nevertheless, Masons have always in every time, from

time to time communicated to mankind such of their Secrets as generally might be useful, they have kept back such only as might be harmful if they came into evil hands, or such as might be beneficial without the teachings to be joined there-together within the Lodge, or such as do bind the brethren more strongly by the profit and conveniency coming to the Fraternity therefrom.

Q. What Arts have the Masons taught Mankind?

A. The Arts of Agriculture, Architecture, Astronomy, Geometry, Numbers, Music, Poetry, Chymistry, Government and Religion.

Q. How cometh Masons more Teachers than other men?

A. They themselves have only the Art of finding new Arts, which Art the first Masons received from God; by which they find what Arts they please, and the true way of teaching the same. What other men do find out is only by chance, and therefore but little, I imagine.

Q. What do Masons conceal?

A. They conceal the Art of finding new Arts, & that's for their own profit and honour. They conceal the Art of keeping secrets, that so the world may conceal nothing from them. They conceal the Art of working miracles, and of prophesying things to come, that so the wicked may not use the same Arts to an evil end. They also conceal the Art of Changes, the Way of gaining the Faculty of Abrac, the knowledge of becoming Good and Perfect, without the help of fear and hope, and the universal language of Masons.

Q. Will they teach me the same Arts?

A. You will be taught, if worthy and able to learn.

Q. Do all Masons know more than other men?

A. Not so. They only have Right and Opportunity, more than other men to know, but many do fail in capacity, and many more do want industry, that is absolutely necessary for the gaining all knowledge.

Q. Are Masons better Men than others?

A. Some Masons are not so virtuous as some other Men, but in the most part they are better than they would be if they were not Masons.

Q. Do Masons love each other greatly as it is said?

A. Yes, verily; and that cannot be otherwise. For good Men and true, knowing each other to be such, do always love the more as they be more good.

*Of the several Courts and Civil Officers in Massachusetts,
Established by Law.*

Justices of the Peace Fees.

FOR every blank writ of attachment and summons thereon, or original summons, 1s. The declaration in a writ triable before a Justice 1s. 8d. Subpoena for one or more witnesses, 4d. Entry of an action or filing a complaint in civil causes, 1s. Filing papers, 1d. each paper. Writ of execution, 1s. 4d. Examining, allowing and taxing a bill of costs, 3d. Entering up judgment in civil and criminal causes, and recording the same, 1s. 4d. Copy of every evidence, original paper, or record, if under a page, 6d. if one page or upwards, at the rate of 8d. per page. A recognizance or bond of appeal, including principal and surety, 1s. Taking affidavits out of Court, in order for the trial of any cause, 1s. and for the Justice's travel every ten miles, 2s. 6d. the same for returning, and so in proportion; the travel to be certified by the Justice to the Court, before whom the cause is to be tried, and for writing deposition, caption and notification, at the rate of 8d. a page. Taking affidavits *in perpetuum rei memoriam*, to each Justice, 1s. and writing the same and travel as afore-mentioned. Administering an oath, to persons appointed to appraise estates, or to appraise and divide real estates, together with certificates of the same, 1s. Administering an oath to one or more witnesses, at the same time, before referees or arbitrators, 1s. and for travel for that purpose, the same as in taking affidavits. Taking the acknowledgment of a deed, with one or more seals, provided it be at one and the same time, and certifying the same, 8d. Receiving a complaint, and issuing a warrant in criminal cases, 2s. Granting a warrant, swearing appraisers relating to slaves, and entering the same, 1s. 5d. Administering oaths in all other cases, with certificates, except oaths to any town, district or parish officers, 1s. Trial of an issue, 2s.

Fees in the Court of General Sessions.

TO each Justice for every day's constant attendance in Court, 4*s*. and no Justice shall be allowed pay for more than two day's attendance at any one term; travel for such Justices as are ten miles and upwards distant from the Court-house, or place where the Court sits, 4*s*. for every twenty miles, computing out and home; the travel and attendance to be paid out of the County Treasury, except such Justices as are sworn Attornies at law, or Clerks of the several Courts of Sessions, who shall not be allowed for travel or attendance. The Clerk to keep an account of their attendance as aforesaid; and all fines and forfeitures assessed by the same Court, and not otherwise appropriated by law, to be paid into the County Treasury, for the use of the County.

Fees of the Clerks of the Sessions.

Entering an indictment, complaint, presentment or information, 1*s*. Recording the judgment of the Court thereon, 8*d*. Discharging a recognizance, 6*d*. Each warrant for criminals, 1*s*. Each summons or subpoena for witness or witnesses, 4*d*. Each recognizance for inholders or retailers, including principal and sureties, and for transmitting the name of the licenced person to the Selectmen, and recording the licence 8*d*. A warrant for county tax, 1*s*. Warrant to lay out or alter a road, 1*s*. Examining and casting the Grand jurors account, yearly, and order thereon, 1*s*.6*d*. Examining any other accounts, 4*d* each. Recording the reports of highways and other matters, by order of Sessions, 8*d*. a page. Copies of all records or original papers, 3*d*. a page. Filing each paper, 1*d*. Entering an appeal and recognizing the principal and sureties, 8*d*.

Justices Fees in the Supreme Judicial Court.

ENTERING an action or complaint, 5*s*.4*d*. Taking special bail, 2*s*. Allowing a writ of error, or granting certiorari, habeas corpus, or other writ on motion, 2*s*. The foregoing fees to be paid to the Clerk of the said Court, who is sometime in the month of December, annually, to certify to the Governor and Council, the sums by him so taken, and received, and paid over to the said Justices, that the same may be deducted from the last quarter of the said Justice yearly salary; and the Governor and Council are empowered to deduct the same accordingly.

Attornies Fees and allowance to Parties, &c.

To parties recovering cost, for an Attorney, or Counsellor's fee, where Counsel is employed, where an issue in law or fact are joined in the Supreme Court, 12s. And for all other causes in said Court, and all causes in the Court of Common Pleas, and Court of General Sessions of the Peace, where an issue in law or fact is joined, 6s. And for all other causes in said Court, 6s.

For parties recovering costs, whether in the Supreme Judicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, General Sessions of the Peace, or before a Justice, 1s. 6d. for each day's attendance and travel; ten miles to be accounted as one day; no allowance to be made for travel to or from the Clerk's office, in order to make out a writ or summons, or carrying the same to an officer. And no plaintiff shall be allowed more than two days attendance, when the defendant is defaulted, unless the defendant appears in Court and makes answer to the plaintiff's suit, in which case, if the defendant is afterwards defaulted, no attendance shall be taxed for the plaintiff, after the day when such default happens.

In criminal causes, where one or more defendants are tried by the jury at the same time in the Supreme Court, or where the cause is determined by an issue in law, 12s. and if no trial by jury, and the cause is not determined by an issue in law, 6s. and in the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, the same allowance for Counsel, as in the Common Pleas.

Witnesses in civil and criminal causes, whether in the Supreme Judicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, Court of General Sessions of the Peace, 3*s.* a day, and 2*d.* for each mile's travel going out and returning home; and before a Justice of the Peace, 2*s.* per day; and the travel the same as at other Courts; provided the said witnesses do personally attend either of the said Courts and give in, in writing, to the Clerk of said Court, his time and travel.

Fees of Sheriffs and Constables.

For the service of an original summons or scire facias, on one defendant for trial, either by reading the same, or by copy, 1*s.* 4*d.* if served on more than one defendant, then for each other defendant so served, 1*s.* 4*d.*

For service of a copy or attachment on one defendant, with or without summons, 1*s.* 4*d.* if served in like manner on more than one defendant, then for each other so served, 1*s.* 4*d.* and where the Officer is by law directed to leave a copy, in order to complete the service, he may charge at the rate of 8*d.* a page. For a bail bond and writing the same, including principal and sureties (to be paid by the person admitted to bail) 1*s.*

Serving a writ of possession, exclusive of the poundage, on the cost of Court, 5*s.* if on more than one piece of land, 3*s.* each.

The fees for collecting the cost on a writ of possession, the same poundage as in personal actions.

Serving a warrant, 1*s.* 4*d.*: Sheriff's aid in criminal cases, to each person, 4*s.* including expences, for every twelve hours; and so in proportion for a less time, and 2*d.* for each mile's travel going out and returning home.

Summoning witnesses in criminal cases, 6*d.* for each witness, and travel as in civil causes, unless in special cases, when the Court may increase the fee to what they shall judge reasonable.

Levying executions in personal actions, for the first £. 20 or under, 8*d.* a pound; and above that, not exceeding £. 40 4*d.* a pound; above that, not exceeding £. 100, is 2*d.* a pound; for all above £. 100, to be 1*d.* a pound.

Provided nevertheless, that the Sheriff or other officer who may serve any execution, issued by the Treasurer of this Commonwealth, or by any County or Town Treasurer, against any Constable or Collector of public, county or town taxes, shall not be intitled to demand or receive

more than half the poundage, and half the travel, which is allowed in other cases.

Travel for the service of each execution or mean process, or warrant to him directed, 2*d.* a mile; the travel to be computed from the place of service to the Court where the writ or execution shall be returned, by the way that is most commonly used; but one travel to be allowed to the writ or execution, and if the same be served on more persons than one, the travel to be computed from that place of service that is the most remote from the place of return, with all further necessary travel in serving such writ or execution; the travelling fee and fees of service, to be endorsed by the Sheriff or his Deputy, on each mean process or execution, otherwise not to be allowed.

Serving an execution on judgment of Court, for partition of real estate, or for assigning dower, 5*s.* a day, and 2*d.* a mile out, from the place of his abode.

Every trial, 6*d.* . . . Every default, 3*d.*

Returning the certificate of votes, of the several towns for a Governor, &c. to the Secretary's office, 4*d.* per mile, computing from his abode to the Secretary's office, to be paid out of the County Treasury, and but one travel to be allowed for the whole.

To the officer attending the Grand Jury, each day, 2*s.* 6*d.* To the officer attending the Jury for trial, 1*s.* for every cause, to be paid with the Jury's fees.

For dispersing venires for Jurymen from the Clerk of the Supreme Judicial Court, Treasurer's warrants, and proclamations of all kinds, 3*d.* each.

To each appraiser of real estates, for extending executions, or assigning dower, 4*s.* a day, and so for a longer or shorter time.

Every constable who shall attend the Supreme Judicial Court, or Court of General Sessions of the Peace, or Common Pleas, by their order, 3*s.* a day, to be paid out of the County Treasury. And for encouragement unto the Sheriff to take and use all possible care and diligence for the safe keeping of the prisoners, that shall be committed to his custody, he shall have such salary allowed him for the same, as the Justices of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, within the same county, shall think fit to order, not exceeding £.10 a year for the County of Suffolk; and not exceeding £.5 each, for the other

counties within the Government, at the discretion of the Court of Sessions, to be paid out of the County Treasury.

A default or non suit, a judgment assigned or complaint, a verdict or demurrer, 8*d.* each.

Discharging a recognizance by proclamation, 4*d.* The fees to be paid to the Clerks of the respective Courts for the use of the Crier.

Goalers Fees.

For turning the key on each prisoner committed, 2*s.* for letting in, and 1*s.* for letting out.

Disting each person, such sum weekly, as the Court of Sessions shall judge reasonable.

Grand Jurors Fees.

The foreman, 4*s.* per day.

Each other Juror, 3*s.* 6*d.* per day, and 2*d.* per mile for each mile he shall travel going out and returning home, and but one travel to allowed for each term.

Fees of Jurors for Trial.

To the foreman in every cause at the Supreme Judicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, and Court of General Sessions of the Peace, 3*s.* 6*d.*

To every other Juror, 2*s.* and allowance for travel the same as the Grand Jurors, to be paid out of the County Treasury.

Fees of Judges of Probate.

For granting administration, 5*s.* Approving or allowing guardians to minors, 2*s.* and if more than one minor to the same guardian, 3*d.* each, for all above the first. A decree respecting the probate of a will, or cordicil, 3*s.* Examining and allowing an inventory, and swearing the executor or executors, administrator or administrators, 1*s.* Swearing the appraisers, 9*d.* Examining and allowing accounts, 2*s.* A decree for settling intestate estates, 2*s.* A citation, 9*d.* Summons for witnesses, 4*d.* A quetus, 1*s.* A warrant to appraise or divide estate, 1*s.* 6*d.* Issuing commissions to receive and examine creditors claims, when estates are represented insolvent, 1*s.* An order of distribution, 1*s.* Granting an appeal to the Supreme Court, 1*s.*

Fees of the Registers of Probate.

For writing a bond, and letter of administration, 2*s*.
 Writing bond and letter of guardianship, and making record thereof, 3*s*, for one minor, and if for more than one minor to the same guardian, then 2*d*; each, for every additional one after the first. Drawing a decree respecting the probate of a will or codicil, 2*s*. Writing bond for the executor, 1*s*. Writing a warrant to appraise the estates of persons deceased, 2*s*. A warrant to divide an intestate estate among the heirs, 1*s*. Writing a warrant to set off a widow's dower only, or a warrant to examine the claims on insolvent estate, 1*s*. For entering on an inventory the oath of the executor or administrator, 8*d*. Entering the account of an executor or administrator or guardian, and allowance thereof, 8*d*. Drawing up a decree on the settlement or partition of estates, 1*s*. Drawing an order of distribution, 1*s*. A quietus, 1*s*. A citation, 9*d*. A summons for a witness or witnesses, 4*d*. Proportioning an insolvent estate among the creditors, at the rate of 3*s*. for every twelve creditors, every creditor's proportion being severally distinguished. Recording a will, inventory, account, or other matters, for every page, 8*d*. Copy of a will, inventory, or other paper, for each page, 8*d*. For a bond of appeal, 1*s*.

Whenever any fees shall be paid into the Probate office, a particular account of such fees, and for what they accrued, shall before payment (if demanded) be by the Judge, or Register, set down in writing and given to the party paying the same; and any fees received without being thus ascertained in writing (when demanded as aforesaid) shall be deemed illegal fees, and the person or persons receiving the same, shall forfeit and suffer treble the sum by him so received, and be liable to an action of debt to be brought by him who shall so pay the same, in any Court proper to try the same.

Coroners Fees.

For serving a writ, summons or execution, and for travel in returning the same, or for returning an inquisition, the same allowance as is by law allowed to Sheriffs. For bail bond, 1*s*. Every trial where the Sheriff is concerned, 1*s*. Attending the Jury, 1*s*. Granting a warrant, and taking inquisition on a dead body, 2*s* if more than one at the same time, and who came to their death by the

same means, 1*s.* for every other after the first. Travel and expence for taking an inquisition, 4*s.* per day. The foreman of the jury at the rate of 3*s.* 6*d.* per day, for time and expences, and to every other Juror, at the rate of 3*s.* per day, exclusive of travel, for which, if above four miles, he shall have 2*d.* per mile. out and home. The Constable for his attendance and expences, in summoning a Jury, 4*s.* a day; and all the aforesaid charges of the inquisition to be paid out of the County Treasury, except such as are taken upon bodies of Strangers, not belonging to this Commonwealth, and in such case, the expence is to be paid out of the treasury of this Commonwealth; such account of expences being first examined and allowed by the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, in the County in which such inquisitions shall be taken.

Fees for Marriages, &c.

To the Town Clerk for publishing the banns of matrimony, and making a record thereof, 1*s.* and recording the marriage when the certificate is returned by the Minister, or Justice officiating, 6*d.* and to the Clerk of the Sessions to be paid by the respective Town Clerks, 2*d.*

For every certificate of a publishment, 6*d.* Recording births and Deaths, 2*d.*

For each marriage, to the Minister or Justice officiating and for certifying the same to the Town Clerk, 6*s.*

To the Town Clerk for a certificate of the births or deaths of every person, 4*d.*

Fees of County Registers.

For entering and recording a deed of partition or other paper, of the length of one page, or under, 3*s.* and for certifying on the original, the time when, the book and page where the same is recorded, 3*d.* If the instrument recorded exceed a page, 8*d.* a page, for as many pages as it contains, the fees to be paid at the offering the instrument. For all copies at the rate of 2*d.* a page.

For entering in the margin, the discharge of a mortgage to be signed by the person discharging the same, 8*d.*

Fees of the Messenger of the General Court.

For serving every warrant which the General Court or either House may grant, for arresting, imprisoning, or taking into custody any person, 2*s.*

For travel each mile out, & the same for returning, 3*d.*

For keeping and dieting such person, 2*s.* a day.

For his discharge or dismissal, 2*s.*

Fees in the Secretary's Office.

For all copies for the benefit of individuals, at the rate of 1s. for each hundred words. For copies of resolves and orders of the General Court, or of the Governor and Council, of a private or local nature, 3s. For an act for the benefit of individuals, companies or corporate bodies (except societies for the promotion of arts and sciences, agriculture and manufactures, religion and charitable purposes) 12s. For every act for the incorporation of a town, district, precinct or parish, excepting the incorporation of plantations, to be paid by the agent applying therefor, 6s. For every commission of sewers, 6s. For every warrant for a branch pilot, 6s. For every impression of the seal of the State with a certificate on private papers, 12s. For every pass or letter of recommendation for persons or vessels bound to foreign parts, 12s. For every notification of the Secretary for an appointment of inspectors, assay-masters, or surveyors of tobacco, flax-seed, pot-ash, pearl-ash, loaf sugar, beef, pork, fish and butter 6s. For every commission to the office of Coroner, 6s. For every commission to the office of Justice of the Peace, of the Quorum, and throughout the Commonwealth, 9s.

The Secretary is to receive and keep an account of all the Fees by him taken, and pay the same yearly into the Treasury of the Commonwealth; and a fair account of all the Fees by him taken, with the names of the persons paying the same, is to be annually laid before the General Court.

All other Acts and Laws heretofore made for regulating Fees, are by this Act become null and void.

By the Fee Bill the Clerks of the several Courts, and others keeping public Offices, are constantly to have a list of the Fees, so far as relates to them respectively, printed or wrote, hung up in their several offices; and any person demanding a greater Fee than is by law provided, he is to forfeit and pay for every offence the sum of £. 10, with costs of suit, to them that will prosecute and sue therefor, within one year after the offence is committed, and also rendered incapable of sustaining any office within the Commonwealth for a term of time not exceeding seven years.

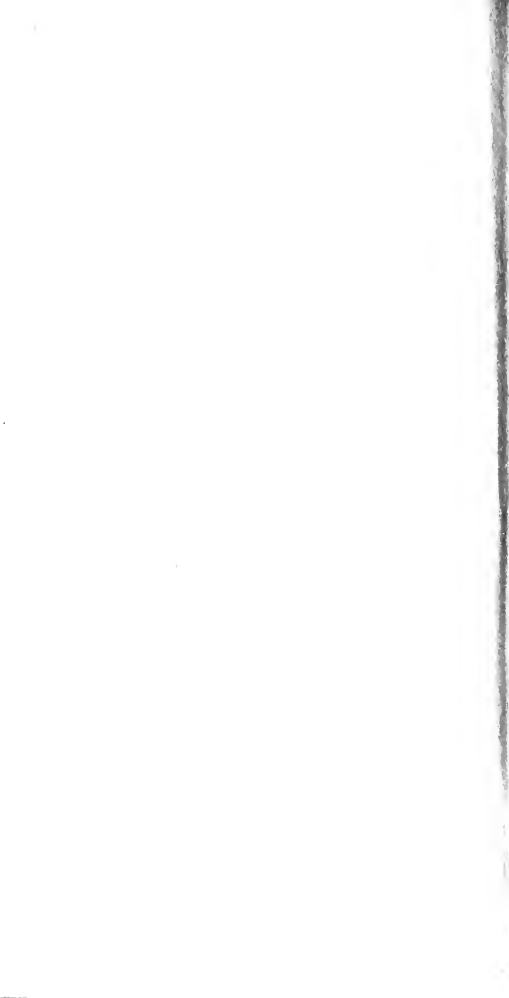
