

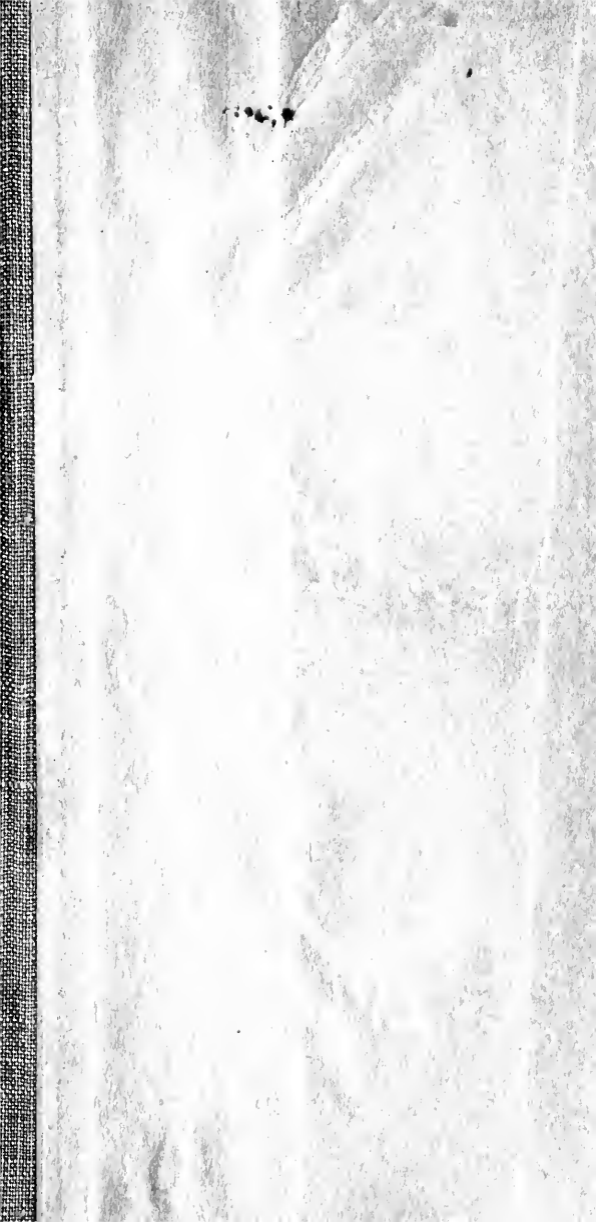

Yearly Meetings of the Quakers.

AT Hampton, on the 7th day before the 4th 1st day of the 1st month. At Salem, the 1st 6th day of the 6th month, At Falmouth, on the 7th day before the 4th 1st day in the 9th month. At Dover, the 7th day before the 4th 1st day in the 10th month. At Falmouth (Barrestable County) the 2^d 6th day in the 12th month, At Sandwich, the 6th day before the last 1st day in the 3^d month. At Nantucket, the 3^d day after the 4th 6th day in 6th month. And at Long Plain, the 7th day before the 2^d 6th day in the 10th month.

From the Rev. Dr. Truſler's London Almanack, for 1793.

1. A thick dark ſky, laſting for ſome time without either ſun or rain, always becomes firſt fair, then foul; that is, changes to a fair, clear ſky, before it turns to rain.

2. A change in the warmth of the weather is generally followed by a change in the wind: thus, the northerly and ſoutherly winds, commonly eſteemed the cauſe of cold and warm weather, are in reality the effects of the cold or warmth of the atmosphere.

3. Moſt vegetables expand their flowers and down, in ſunſhining weather; and towards the evening, & againſt rain, cloſe them again, eſpecially at the beginning of their flowering, when their ſeeds are tender and ſenſible: this is viſible in the down of dandelion, and the flowers of pimpernel. If the flowers be cloſe ſhut up, it foretells rain and foul weather; if ſpread open, fair weather. The ſtalk of trefoil ſwells againſt rain and grows more upright.

4. All wood, even the hardeſt and moſt ſolid, ſwells in moiſt weather, and foretells rain.

5. Stones and wainſcots, when they ſweat, portend rainy weather.

6. Cloſe weather with a ſoutherly wind preſages rain.

7. A red ſky at ſun-ſet indicates wind.

8. When the wind ſuddenly ſhifts and blows in a different courſe to the ſun's apparent motion in the heavens, which is from eaſt to weſt, it foretells wet and blowing weather.

9. A circle round the moon, at ſome diſtance, is generally followed with rain the next day.

10. Sheep will feed early in the morning, and cattle, deer and rabbits feed hard againſt rain; and a beifer will put up her noſe and ſnuff in the air, before wet.

11. Flame is more ſuſceptable of air than we are: thus, the trembling of the flame of a candle, foretells wind, as does the bending flame of a fire, and their throwing more aſhes than uſual.

12. The obſcuring of the ſmaller ſtars, indicates a tempeſt.

13. Sea-weed hung up in a dry place, will give, or grow damp before rain.

The Reverend Almanack maker, however, informs his readers, that there is more knowledge to be derived from a good weather-glaſs or barometer, they being more to be depended upon, and therefore recommends to Farmers, and other perſons (that can afford to lay out two or three guineas) to provide themſelves with one.

ECLIPSES for the Year 1794.

THERE will be *six* Eclipses this Year; *four* of the *SUN* and *two* of the *MOON*, in the following Order, viz.

I. The first will be a small Eclipse of the *SUN* on Friday the 31st of January, at 38 minutes after 6 o'clock in the morning, invisible to us.

II. The second will be of the *MOON*, on Friday the 14th day of February, in the Evening, total and partly visible.

Digits eclipsed 21 deg. 12 min. The *MOON* is almost in the centre of the *Earth's* shadow, and will rise 11 minutes before the middle of the Eclipse.

III. The third will be of the *SUN* on Saturday the 1st day of March, at 12 minutes after 5 o'clock in the afternoon, invisible. It happens in the 11th deg. of the *Fishes*.

IV. The fourth will be of the *SUN* on Saturday the 26th day of July, at 20 min. after 5 o'clock in the afternoon, invisible. It happens in the 4th deg. of the *Lion*.

V. The fifth will be a total and visible Eclipse of the *MOON* on Monday the 11th day of August in the Morning, viz.

Digits eclipsed 20 deg 33 minutes from the South Side of the *Earth's* shadow.

VI. The sixth will be of the *SUN* on Monday the 25th of August, at about 7 o'clock in the morning, invisible. It will happen in the 2d deg. of the celestial *Virgin*.

Attornies Fees, and Allowance to Parties, &c.

To parties recovering cost, for an Attorney, or Coun-
 llor's fee, where Counsel is employed, where an issue in
 w or fact is joined in the Supreme Court. 12*s.* And for
 l other causes in said Court, and all causes in the Court
 f Common Pleas, and Court of General Sessions of the
 eace, where an issue in law or fact is joined, 6*s.* And
 r all other causes in said Court, 6*s.*

For parties recovering costs, whether in the Supreme
 idicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, General Sessions
 the Peace, or before a Justice, 1*s.* 6*d.* for each day's
 tendance and travel; ten miles to be accounted as one
 y; no allowance to be made for travel to or from the
 erk's office, in order to make out a writ or summons,
 carrying the same to an officer. And no plaintiff is to
 allowed more than two days attendance, when the de-
 ndant is defaulted, unless the defendant appears in Court
 d makes answer to the plaintiff's suit, in which case, if
 e defendant is afterwards defaulted, no attendance shall
 taxed for the plaintiff, after the day whereon such de-
 ult happens.

In criminal causes where one or more defendants are
 ed by the jury at the same time, in the Supreme Court,
 where the cause is determined by an issue in law, 12*s.*
 d if no trial by jury, and the cause is not determined
 an issue in law, 6*s.* and in the Court of General Sessions
 the Peace, the same allowance for Counsel, as in the
 mmon Pleas.

Drawing an indictment in the Sessions, 3*s.*

Drawing an indictment in the Supreme Court, 6*s.*

Witnesses in civil and criminal causes, whether in the Supreme Judicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, Court of General Sessions of the Peace, 3s. a day, and 2d. for each mile's travel going out and returning home; and before a Justice of the Peace, 2s. a day; and the travel the same as at other Courts; provided the said witnesses do personally attend either of the said Courts and give in writing, to the Clerk of said Court, his time and travel.

Fees of Sheriffs and Constables.

For the service of an original summons or scire facias on one defendant for trial, either by reading the same, or by copy, 1s. 4d. if served on more than one defendant, then for each other defendant so served, 1s. 4d.

For service of a capias or attachment on one defendant with or without summons, 1s. 4d. if served in like manner on more than one defendant, then for each other so served, 1s. 4d. and where the Officer is by law directed to leave a copy, in order to complete the service, he may charge at the rate of 8d. a page. For a bail bond and writing the same, including principal and sureties (to be paid by the person admitted to bail) 1s.

Serving a writ of possession, exclusive of the poundage on the cost of Court, 5s. if on more than one piece of land, 3s. each.

The fees for collecting the cost on a writ of possession the same poundage as in personal actions.

Serving a warrant, 1s. 4d. Sheriff's aid in criminal cases, to each person, 4s. including expences, for every twelve hours; and so in proportion for a less time, and 2d. for each mile's travel going out and returning home.

Summoning witnesses in criminal cases, 6d. for each witness, and travel as in civil causes, unless in special cases, when the Court may increase the fee to what the shall judge reasonable.

Levying executions in personal actions, for the first £. 20 or under, 8d. a pound; and above that, not exceeding £. 40, 4d. a pound; above that, not exceeding £. 100, is 2d. a pound; for all above £. 100, to be 1d. a pound.

Provided nevertheless, that the Sheriff or other officer who may serve any execution, issued by the Treasurer of this Commonwealth, or by any County or Town Treasurer, against any Constable or Collector of public, county or town taxes, shall not be intitled to demand or receive

ore than half the poundage, and half the travel, which allowed in other cases.

Travel for the service of each execution or mean process, warrant to him directed, 2d. per mile, the travel to be computed from the place of service to the Court where the writ or execution shall be returned, by the way that most commonly used; but one travel to be allowed to the writ or execution, and if the same be served on more persons than one, the travel to be computed from that place of service that is the most remote from the place of return, with all further necessary travel in serving such writ or execution; the travelling fee and fees of service, to be endorsed by the Sheriff or his deputy on each mean process or execution, otherwise not to be allowed.

Serving an execution upon judgment of Court, for partition of real estate, or for assigning dower, 5s. a day, and 1s. a mile out, from the place of his abode.

Every trial, 6d. Every default, 3d.

Returning the certificates of votes of the several counties for a Governor, &c. to the secretary's office, 4d. per mile, computing from his abode to the Secretary's office, to be paid out of the County Treasury, and but one travel to be allowed for the whole.

To the Officer attending the Grand Jury, each day, 5d. To the Officer attending the Jury for trial, 1s. every cause, to be paid with the Jury's fees.

For dispersing vealries for Jurymen from the Clerk of the Supreme Judicial Court, Treasurer's warrants, and proclamations of all kinds, 3d. each.

To each appraiser of real estates, for extending executions, or assigning dower, 4s. a day, and so for a longer or shorter time.

Every Constable who shall attend the Supreme Judicial Court, or Court of General Sessions of the Peace, or Common Pleas, by their order, 5s. a day, to be paid out of the County Treasury. And for encouragement unto the Sheriff to take and use all possible care and diligence in the safe keeping of the prisoners, that shall be committed to his custody, he shall have such a salary allowed for the same, as the Justices of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, within the same county, shall think proper to order, not exceeding 10l. a year for the county of Suffolk; and not exceeding 5l. for each of the other

counties within the government, at the discretion of the Court of Sessions, to be paid out of the County Treasury.

Criers Fees.

The foreman, *4s.* per day.

Each other juror, *3s. 6d.* per day, and *2d.* per mile for each mile he shall travel going out and returning home, and but one travel to be allowed for each term.

Fees of Jurors for Trial.

To the foreman in every cause at the Supreme Judicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, and Court of General Sessions of the Peace, *3s. 6d.*

To every other juror, *3s.* and allowance for travel, the same as the Grand Jurors, to be paid out of the County Treasury.

Fees of Judges of Probate.

For granting administration, *3s.* Appointing or allowing guardians to minors, *2s.* and if more than one minor to the same guardian, *3d.* each, for all above the first. A decree respecting the probate of a will, or codicil, *3s.* Examining and allowing an inventory, and swearing the executor or executors, administrator or administrators, *1s.* Swearing the appraisers, *9d.* Examining and allowing accounts, *2s.* A decree for settling intestate estates, *2s.* A citation, *9d.* Summons for witness, *4d.* A quietus, *1s.* A warrant to appraise or divide estate, *1s. 6d.* Issuing commissions to receive and examine creditors claims, when estates are rendered insolvent, *1s.* An order of distribution, *1s.* Granting an appeal to the Supreme court, *1s.*

Fees of the Registers of Probate.

For writing a bond, and letter of administration, 2*s*.
 Writing a bond and letter of guardianship, and making record thereof, 3*s*. for one minor, and if for more than one minor to the same guardian, then 2*d*. each, for every additional one after the first. Drawing a decree respecting the probate of a will or codicil, 2*s*. Writing bond for the executor, 1*s*. Writing a warrant to appraise the estates of persons deceased, 1*s*. A warrant to divide an intestate estate among the heirs, 1*s*. Writing a warrant to set off a widow's dower only, or a warrant to examine the claims on insolvent estate, 1*s*. For entering on an inventory the oath of the executor or administrator, 8*d*. Entering the account of an executor or administrator or guardian, and allowance thereof, 8*d*. Drawing up a decree on the settlement or partition of estates, 1*s*. Drawing an order of distribution, 1*s*. A quietus, 1*s*. A citation, 3*d*. A summons for a witness or witnesses, 4*d*. Proportioning an insolvent estate among the creditors, at the rate of 3*s*. for every twelve creditors, every creditor's proportion being severally distinguished. Recording a will, inventory, account, or other matters, for every page, 8*d*. Copy of a will, inventory, or other paper, for each page, 8*d*. For a bond of appeal, 1*s*.

Whenever any fees shall be paid into the Probate Office, a particular account of such fees, and for what they accrued, shall before payment (if demanded) be by the Judge, or Register, set down in writing and given to the party paying the same, and any fees received without being thus ascertained in writing (when demanded as aforesaid) shall be deemed illegal fees; and the person or persons receiving the same, shall forfeit and suffer treble the sum by him so received, and be liable to an action of debt to be brought by him who shall so pay the same, in any Court proper to try the same.

Coroners Fees.

For serving a writ, summons or execution, and for travel in returning the same, or for returning an inquisition the same allowance as is by law allowed to Sheriffs. For a bail bond, 1*s*. Every trial where the Sheriff is concerned, 1*s*. Attending the Jury, 1*s*. Granting a warrant, and taking an inquisition on a dead body, 4*s*. if more than one at the same time, and who came to their death by the

same means, *1s.* for every other after the first. Trav-
 and expence for taking an inquisition, *4s.* per day, To
 foreman of the Jury at the rate of *3s. 6d.* per day, for tin-
 and expences, and to every other Juror, at the rate of *3s.*
 per day, exclusive of travel, for which, if above fo-
 miles, he shall have *2d.* per mile, out and home. To
 Constable for his attendance and expences, in summoning
 a Jury, *4s.* per day; and all the aforesaid charges of an
 inquisition to be paid out of the County Treasury, except
 such as are taken upon bodies of strangers, not belonging
 to this Commonwealth, and in such case the expence
 is to be paid out the Treasury of this Commonwealth
 such account of expences being first examined and allowed
 by the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, in the
 County in which such inquisition shall be taken.

To the Town Clerk for publishing the banns of matri-
 mony, and making a record thereof, *1s.* and recording the
 marriage when the certificate is returned by the Minister
 or Justice officiating, *6d.* and to the Clerk of the Sessions

 paper, of the length of one page, or under, *9d.* and for
 certifying on the original, the time when, the book and
 place where the same is recorded, *3d.* If the instrument
 recorded exceed a page, *8d.* a page, for as many pages as
 it contains, the fees to be paid at the offering the instru-
 ment. For all copies at the rate of *8d.* a page. For
 entering in the margin, the discharge of a mortgage to
 be signed by the person discharging the same, *8d.*

Fees of the Messenger of the General Court.

For serving every warrant which the General Court or
 either House may grant, for arresting, imprisoning, or tak-
 ing any person, *2s.* For travel each mile out, and the
 same for returning, *3d.* For keeping and dieting such
 person, *2s.* a day. For his discharge or dismissal, *2s.*

Fees in the Secretary's Office.

For all copies for the benefit of individuals, at the rate of 1s. for each hundred words. For copies of resolves and orders of the General Court, or of the Governor and Council, of a private or local nature, 3s. For an act for the benefit of individuals, companies or corporate bodies (except societies for the promotion of arts and sciences, agriculture and manufactures, religion and charitable purposes) 12s. For every ct. for the incorporation of a town, district, precinct or parish, excepting the incorporation of plantations, to be paid by the agent applying therefor, 6s. For every commission of sewers, 6s. For every warrant for a bra ch pilot, 6s. For every immission of the seal of the State with a certificate on private papers, 12s. For every pass or letter of recommendation for persons or vessels bound to foreign parts, 12s. For every notification of the Secretary for an appointment of inspectors, assay-masters, or surveyors of tobacco, flax-seed, pot ash, sea-lash, loaf-sugar, beef, pork, fish and butter, 6s. For every commission to the office of Coroner, 6s. For every commission to the office of Justice of the Peace, of the Quorum, and throughout the Commonwealth, 9s. For every commission of a letter of marque and reprisal, 14s. For every act of naturalization of a foreigner, £. 6.

The Secretary is to receive and keep an account of all the Fees by him taken, and pay them yearly into the Treasury of the Commonwealth; and a fair account of all the Fees by him taken, with the Names of the persons paying the same, is to be annually laid before the General Court.

All other Acts and Laws heretofore made for regulating Fees, are by this Act become null and void.

By the Fre-Bill the Clerks of the several Courts, and others keeping public Offices, are constantly to have a list of the Fees so far as relates to them respectively, printed or wrote, hung up in their several offices; and any person demanding a greater Fee than is by law provided, he is to forfeit and pay for every offence the sum of £. 10. with costs of suit, to them that will prosecute and sue therefor, within one year after the offence is committed, and also rendered incapable of sustaining any office within the Commonwealth for a term of time not exceeding seven years.

Rates of Gold and Silver COINS.

As established by an Act of Congress, February 9, 1793.

That after the first day of July 1793, foreign Gold and Silver Coins that pass current as Money within the United States, and be a legal tender for the payment of all debts and demands, at the several rates as follows, and not otherwise, viz. The gold coins of *Great Britain and Portugal*, of their present standard, at the rate of *one hundred cents* for every twenty seven grains of the actual weight thereof; the gold coins of *France, Spain, and the Dominions of Spain*, of their present standard, at the rate of *one hundred cents* for every twenty seven grains and two thirds of a grain, of the actual weight thereof. *Spanish milled Dollars*, at the rate of *one hundred cents* for each Dollar, the actual weight whereof not to be less than seventeen pennyweights and seven grains; and in proportion for the parts of a dollar. *Crowns of France*, at the rate of *one hundred and ten cents*, for each Crown, the actual weight whereof not to be less than eighteen pennyweights and seventeen grains, and in proportion for the parts of a Crown. But no foreign Coin that may have been, or shall be issued subsequent to the first day of January 1792, shall be a tender, as aforesaid, until samples thereof shall have been found, by assay at the Mint, to be conformable to the respective standards required and proclamation thereof shall have been made by the President of the United States.

That at the expiration of three years next ensuing the time when the coining of Gold and Silver shall commence at the Mint of the United States (which time will be announced by the proclamation of the President of the United States) all foreign Gold Coins, and all foreign Silver Coins, except *Spanish milled Dollars*, and parts of such Dollars, are to cease to be a tender.

That all foreign Gold and Silver Coins (except *Spanish milled Dollars*, and parts of such Dollars) which shall be received in payment for Monies due to the United States after the said time, when the coining of Gold and Silver coins shall begin at the Mint of the United States, shall, previously to their being issued in circulation, be coined anew, in conformity to the Act for establishing a Mint.

Money accounts of the United States are to be expressed in Dollars or Units, Dimes or Tenths, Cents or hundredths and Mills or thousandths. A Dime being the tenth part of a Dollar, a Cent the hundredth part of a Dollar, and a Mille the thousandth part of a Dollar.

Money accounts of the United States are to be expressed in Dollars or Units, dimes or tenths, cents or hundredths, and milles or thousandths. A Disme being the tenth part of a Dollar, a Cent the hundredth part of a Dollar, a Mille the thousandth part of a Dollar.

MINT of the United States.

BY an Act of Congress, a Mint is to be established at the Seat of Government, for the conducting of which there is to be a Director; an Assayer; a Chief Coiner; an Engraver; and a Treasurer; also Clerks, Workmen and Servants.

The following Officers are already appointed.

David Ricehouse, *Director*, 2000 Dollars per ann.

William Daiton, *Treasurer*, 1200.

Henry Voight, *Chief Coiner*, 1500.

Assayer, 1500.

Engraver, 200.

Three Clerks, at 500 Dollars per annum each.

The Workmen &c. are to be allowed such Wages as are customary and reasonable.

The Coins to be struck are to be of the following denominations, values and descriptions, viz.

Eagles: Each to be of the value of 10 dollars, and to contain 247 grains and four eighths of a grain of pure, or 270 grains of standard gold.

Half Eagles: Each to be of the value of 5 dollars, and to contain 123 grains and six eighths of a grain of pure, or 135 grains of standard gold.

Quarter Eagles: Each to be of the value of 2 dollars and an half and to contain 61 grains and seven eighths of a grain of pure, or 67 grains and four eighths of a grain of standard gold.

Dollars or Units: Each to be of the value of a Spanish milled dollar as the same is now current, and to contain 371 grains and four sixteenth parts of a grain of pure, or 415 grains of standard silver.

Half Dollars: Each to be of half the value of a dollar, and to contain 185 grains and ten sixteenth parts of a grain of pure, or 207 grains of standard silver.

Quarter Dollars: Each to be one fourth the value of the dollar, and to contain 92 grains and thirteen sixteenth parts of a grain of pure, or 104 grains of standard silver.

Dimes: Each to be of the value of one tenth of a dollar, and to contain 37 grains and two sixteenth parts of a grain of pure, or 41 grains and three fifth parts of a grain of standard silver.

Half Dimes: Each to be of the value of one twentieth of a dollar, and to contain 18 grains and nine sixteenth parts of a grain of pure or twenty grains and four fifth parts of a grain of standard silver.

Mint Matters *continued.*

Cents : Each to be of the value of the one hundredth part of a dollar, and to contain 208 grains of copper.

Half Cents : Each to be of the value of half a cent, and contain 104 grains of copper.

Upon the said Coins respectively there is to be the following devices and legends, viz. Upon one side of each an impression emblematic of Liberty, with an inscription of the word "Liberty," and the year of the coinage; and upon the reverse of each of the gold and silver coins there to be the figure or representation of an Eagle, with this inscription, "United States of America" and upon the reverse of each of the copper coins, an inscription of which shall express the denomination of the piece, viz. Cent or half Cent, as the case may require.

The standard for all gold coins of the United States, to be eleven parts fine to one part alloy; the alloy to be composed of silver and copper.

The standard for all silver coins of the United States, to be one thousand four hundred and eighty five parts fine to one hundred and seventy nine parts alloy; which alloy to be wholly of copper.

Every officer and Clerk of the Mint is to make oath of affirmation faithfully and diligently to perform the duties thereof. And the Assayer, chief Coiner, and Treasurer, are respectively to become bound, with one or more sureties, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, for the faithful and diligent performance of the duties of his office.

If any officer or person employed in the Mint shall decrease any of the gold or silver coins, or make worse as to the proportion of fine gold or fine silver therein contained, or of less value or weight than the same ought to be, with fraudulent intent, or shall embezzle any of the metals or coins, will be deemed guilty of felony, and suffer Death.

A quantity of Copper, not exceeding 150 tons, is to be coined into Cents and half Cents, and after the expiration of six months from the time 50,000 dollars of the same has been delivered into the Treasury of the United States hence to issue into circulation, of which notice is to be given in the news papers, that no copper coins, except said cents and half Cents, are to pass in payment for any debt, and if offered to be paid or received in payment, to be forfeited, besides incurring a penalty of ten dollars.

Continental Scale of Depreciation,

As established by the late united Provincial Congress, at their session at Philadelphia as a Rule for settling the Rate of Depreciation on all publick Contracts made from the Year 1777 to the Year 1780, and which hath not since been altered.

THE Senate is the first branch of the Legislature, and to be elected by the qualified inhabitants on the first day in April annually, forever; and their names returned by the Town Clerk of the respective towns, listed by the Selectmen, into the Secretary's office seven days at least before the last wednesday in May.

No person is capable of being elected a Senator who is seized in his own right of a freehold of the value of £100, or possessed of personal estate to the value of £1,000, and has been an inhabitant for the space of five years.

The Senate is to be a court with full authority to hear and determine all impeachments made by the House of Representatives, against any officer of the Commonwealth, for misconduct or mal-administration in their office;—

its judgment, however, is not to extend further than removal from office, and disqualification to hold or enjoy

any place of honor, trust or profit; but the person so convicted, is nevertheless, liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to the laws of the land.

Not less than sixteen members of the Senate are to constitute a quorum for doing business.

The Senate are to choose its own President, appoint its Officers, and determine its own Rules of proceedings.

No Gun-Powder imported into the Town of Boston is to be landed in any part thereof, except at Hatch's or Tilden's wharf, at the South Easterly part of the Town (unless prevented by the Ice) and from thence to be carried through Summer-street and Winter-street, by the most direct passage to the Powder Magazine at West Boston, in carriages without iron on any part thereof, and closely covered with Leather or Canvas, on penalty of forfeiting all such Gun-Powder.

No Person in Boston is to keep in any Building, except the Magazine, more than 25lb. weight of Powder, on penalty of forfeiting the same; and for every half barrel, (exclusive of the forfeiture thereof) they are to pay a fine of 20s. and so in proportion for a greater quantity, and to pay a double fine on the second offence.

This being the whole number of Men fit for bearing Arms, it is computed, that from the Gulph of Mexico, to the Lakes of Canada inclusive, there may be about 35,000 Warriors.

The Indian languages are almost as numerous as their Tribes; those indeed which border upon each other, by means of their intercourse, retain a general affinity: but there is no affinity betwixt the language spoken by the Western Indians, and that used at the Eastward.

Amongst the various Tribes of Indians scattered upon this immense continent, there is a great similarity in their mode of government, all being of the patriarchal kind.—

The Indians, by long Wars, have, in some measure, learnt the European manner of fighting, and use it alternately with their own; the knowledge of which, in a number of instances, of late years, America has fatally experienced the unhappy effects.

Public Town Officers in Boston.

BOSTON is the Capital of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. It is built upon a peninsula, of an irregular form, at the bottom of a large bay; the length, running about N.N.E. at the entrance from Roxbury, exclusive of the Neck leading therefrom (which is about one mile to the extremity at Winnisimmet ferry, is 1 mile, three quarters, and 199 yards. The breadth of the Town is various; near the entrance it is narrow, but passing thro' it widens; and the greatest breadth is from Fort-Hill (near the centre) to the utmost point at the West part of the town, which is 1 mile and 139 yards. The breadth towards the northward diminishes, for from the Mill-pond on the west (thro' Cross-street) to the sea on the east, it is but 275 yards; however, it increases again to the northward, for from Charles's river bridge to Gov. Hancock's wharf, it is upwards of 730 yards. The whole length of the Town including the Neck which joins Boston to Roxbury (being 1 mile and 39 yards) is 2 miles, 3 quarters and 232 yards. The number of acres upon which the Town is built, has never been ascertained, but suppose to be about one thousand.

Directions for sailing in & out of Boston Bay.

THE *Light House* stands on a small Island, on the north entrance of the channel (Point Alderton and Nantasket heights being on the south) and is about 65 feet high: To steer for it from Cape Cod, the course is W. N. W. when within one league of the Cape. From Cape Cod to the Light House is about 16 leagues: From Cape Anne to the Light House, the course is S. W. distant 10 leagues. After making the Light, and the wind fair, you may bring it to bear W. by N. or W. N. W. and then run for it, till you come within two cables length of it. If the weather is so bad that a Pilot can't get off (as is sometimes the case) after running a-breast of it, so as to bring it to bear N. by E. you may run W. by S. about a mile and an half, to Nantasket road, where you may anchor in from 7 to 5 fathoms in safety.

To work into Boston bay, you may stand to the Southward till you bring the Light to bear W. N. W. and to the Northward till you bring it to bear W. S. W. till you come within one league of the Light; then you must *not* stand to the Northward any further than to bring it to bear W. by N. and to the Southward to bring it to bear W. N. W. You may anchor in the Bay in safety, if the wind is off shore.

The Lights at Cape Anne stand on an Island called Thatcher's Island; the two Lights bear of each other when in one, S. S. W. a quarter S. and N. N. E. a quarter E. To go on'fide the Londoner, or Thatcher's Island Ledge, you must give the Light one League distance.

ALL letters and packets, passing by sea to and from the United States, or from one port to another therein, in vessels the property of, or provided by the United States, are to be rated as follows; for every single letter, 8 cents; for every double letter, 16 cents; for every triple letter or packet, 24 cents. For every letter or packet brought into the United States, or carried from one port therein to another by sea, in any private vessel, 4 cents, if delivered at the place where the same shall arrive, if to be sent to any place, the postage is to be added.

The compensation to any one Post-Master is not to exceed the sum of 1800 Dollars per annum.

EXPLANATION.

Look for the Dominical Letter for the Year, and underneath it stands the Day of the week, which all the figures in the Table shew to be such days of the month under which they stand; so that whatever day stands under the Dominical Letter, all the figures in the Table will be the same day of the week in each month under which they stand respectively. But it must be observed that in Leap Years there are two Dominical Letters, the first of which serves for January and February only, and the other to the Year's end. In the present Year, 1793, it not being Leap Year, E is the Dominical Letter; under which for the Month of June stands *Tuesday*, which shews that all the figures in the Table are *Tuesdays* through out the Year; by the knowledge of which the date of the Day of the Month in the preceding or following Week may be easily known by reckoning from *Tuesday*.

Fees of Consuls from the United States.

For authenticating under seal, every protest, deposition, or other act, which captains, mariners, passengers, merchants, or other citizens of the United States may chuse to make, the sum of *two dollars*.

For the taking into possession, settling and paying the balance due on the personal estate left by any citizen of the United States who shall die within the limits of his consulate *five per centum* on the gross amount.

For taking into possession any such estate, which shall be delivered to the legal representative before a final settlement, *two and an half per centum* on such part as shall not be in money, and *five per centum* on the gross amount of the residue.

Consuls are to notify the death of any person belonging to the United States, within his consulate; also to take proper measures in regard to stranded vessels of the U. S.

BY an Act of Congress for regulating intercourse with the Indian Tribes, no person is to trade with them without licence, and entering into bond in the penal sum of 1000 Dollars, on penalty of forfeiting his merchandize, and being liable to a fine of 100 Dollars, and thirty days imprisonment.

BY the xviiith section of the last Militia Act every non-commissioned officer and private of the Infantry is constantly to keep himself provided with a good musket, with an iron rod, bayonet and ball, two spare flints, a priming wire, brush and knapsack, a cartridge box to contain 24 cartridges with ball suited to his musket.

HARVARD UNIVERSITY at *Cambridge.*

THIS Seminary was founded in the Year 1636, the Massachusetts General Assembly having that year granted a sum of money for its establishment, and in the year 1638, was added a generous donation, bequeathed by the Rev. *John Harvard*, of Charlestown, and the name of the College was given to perpetuate his memory: The funds not being sufficient for its support, about two years after the income of the Ferry between *Boston* and *Charlestown* was added thereto, and since the erecting the Bridge across that Ferry, and the other from West Boston to *Cambridge*, a sum equal to the former income is allowed.

The Library now consists of upwards of 13,000 volumes, with a very ample apparatus for experiments, &c. in every branch of Philosophy, Astronomy, &c.

Since its establishment to July 1793, about 3560 students have been admitted to academical degrees; near 1050 of whom have been ordained to the work of the Gospel Ministry.

Persons of any denomination may have their children educated there, but all are obliged to give bond at admission for the payment of the College dues.

This Seminary at its first institution consisted only of a Preceptor, two Uthers, and a Treasurer. Mr. Nathaniel Eaton was the first Preceptor, and continued till 1640, after which the following Gentlemen succeeded as Presidents to the present time, as vacancies took place, viz.

In Boston, Suffolk County.

First Church, in Cornhill, *John Clarke*, founded in 1630.

This Church is three stories in height, built of brick, with a light handsome steeple, supported by the roof. The upper galleries have been lately taken down, and, above the second range of windows a Corinthian cornice given, which supports four arches, which from each side of the walls, terminate in an oblong square in the centre. The lower galleries are supported by pillars of the Tuscan order. It has an organ and a public clock.

Second, or old North, *John Latbrop*, D.D. founded 1550.

The building was wholly destroyed by the British troops in 1775, and appropriated to the use of firewood, the members, soon after the Town was evacuated, united with the Church in Middle-street, which was founded in 1721. It stands upon a rising ground, and has a decent steeple and a clock.

First Baptist Church, *Samuel Stillman*, D.D. founded 1665.

This Church was handsomely rebuilt in 1771, and has since been much enlarged. It adjoins the Mill Pond.

Old South Church, Marlborough-street, *Joseph Eckley*,

founded 1669. It is a large and handsome brick building; the inside was entirely destroyed by the 17th regiment of British dragoons in 1775, and converted into a riding school; it has since been elegantly repaired.

The lower galleries are finished with the Tuscan entablature and balustrade, supported by pillars of the same order. The second galleries are finished in the Dorick order complete, and a balustrade above the entablature.

The pulpit window & ornaments are of the Corinthian order. The brick tower supports a very handsome tall steeple, 180 feet high, and has therein one of the best clocks in America, with a large library of ancient books.

The Chapel, in Tremont-street, *James Freeman*, founded

in 1688, was rebuilt with hewn stone in 1749. The inside is elegantly finished agreeably to the Corinthian order. The double pillars, which stand upon one pedestal, with the pilasters, support intersected arches over the galleries, finely executed. The Chancel is

highly finished, with carved trifles, festoons, and other ornaments. A colonnade of 12 large pillars surrounds

the tower. The steeple is not yet finished, it was intended to be of two square stories & an octagonal spire, The first story to be of the Ionick order, with 19 fluted coupled columns and pilasters, 19 inches in diameter. The second story to be of the Corinthian order, formed of 8 fluted columns, 14 inches in diameter, all to be finished in the richest manner. In the church is a large and very elegant organ.

The Church in Brattle-street, *Peter Tbacher, D.D.* founded in 1699, was rebuilt with brick in 1774. The inside is richly finished, having large columns agreeably to the Corinthian order, from the entablature of which springs the arch over the centre. The pulpit is of mahogany, and has a large new organ.

Friends, or Quaker meeting house, in Leverett lane, was founded in 1710, is a small decent brick house.

New North Church, North street, *John Eliot*, founded in 1714, is a spacious wooden building, with a tall steeple, supported by a tower, and in good repair.

New South Church, Summer-street, at present Vacant, was founded in 1716, is a well finished convenient wooden building, with a handsome steeple, finished agreeably to the Ionick order entire.

Christ Church, Salem-street, *William Walter, D.D.* is the second episcopal Church, and was founded in 1722, is a handsome brick building, with an elegant lofty steeple, with a ring of eight bells, and a public clock. In the Church is a handsome organ.

Church in Federal-street, late Irish Presbyterian, *Jerem Belknap, D.D.* was founded in 1729, is a neat wooden building, with a steeple in proportion, lately repaired.

Church in Hollis-street, South End, *Samuel West*, was founded in 1732. It was destroyed by fire in 1787 and since elegantly rebuilt on an entire new plan, and finished in the most elegant manner.

Trinity Church, in Summer-street, *Samuel Parker, D. D.* founded in 1734, and is the third episcopal Church. It is a large wooden building, the circular arch on the inside is supported by square pillars of the Corinthian order, with the capitals gilded. In the Chancel there are some very elegant paintings, and is furnished with a large and beautiful organ.

Religious Assemblies in Suffolk continued.

West Church, Lynde-street, *Simon Howard*, D.D. was founded in 1736. It is a well proportioned wooden building. In the year 1775, it was occupied by the British troops, who wholly destroyed the pews, and also took down a handsome steeple. The house has since been very neatly repaired and painted.

Church in Bennet-street. was founded in 1742, under the pastoral care of *Dr. Mather*, but after his decease it was purchased and enlarged for the use of the Universalists, where *John Murray*, of Cape Ann, and *George Richards*, of Boston, alternately officiate. The inside of the Church is neatly painted, and has a small organ.

Second Baptist Church, *Thomas Baldwin*, was founded in 1743, is a commodious wooden building, lately repaired, enlarged, and painted. It adjoins to the Mill Pond.

Church in So. School-street was founded by some French Protestants who fled from their persecutors in France towards the end of the 16th century, & had permission of the General Court to reside in Boston, since which, viz. in 1789, it has been used as a Romish Church, where *John Tbayer*, lately converted to that faith, and *Monf. Matignon*. officiate to those of their persuasion,
