ECLIPSES in the Year 1797.

THERE will be four *Eclipses* this Year, viz. two of the *SUN* and two of the *MOON*, in the following order.

I. The first will be of the *Moon*, on Friday the 9th Day of June, at 48 min. after 6 o'Clock, A. M. invisible.

II. The second will be of the *Sun* on Saturday the 24th Day of June, at 44 min. after 11 o'Clock in the morning, invisible in these Parts; but in the northern Parts of Europe, it will be visible in the 4th degree of the *Crab*.

III. The third will be of the *Moon*, in the 13th deg. of the *Celestial Twins*; visible and total on Sunday the 3d of December, and by Calculation as follows, viz.

IV. The fourth will be of the *Sun* on Monday the 17th of December, at 57 min. after 1 o'Clock in the morning, in the 27th degree of the *Celestial Archer*, invisible. The *Moon's* lat. 1 deg. 13 min. south.

Besides the *Eclipses* of the *Sun* and *Moon* this Year, there will be an *Occultation* * of the Planet *Saturn* by the *Moon*; the *Immersion* will be 2 min. after 6 o'Clock, and the *Emersion* will be at 53 min. after 6 o'Clock in the Evening of the 2d Day of April. There will also be an *Occultation* of the Planet *Venus* by the *Moon*, on the 25th Day of June, but it will be invisible to us in these Parts of America.

* *Occultation signifies, in Astronomy, the time a Star or Planet is hid from our sight, by the interposition of the Body of the Moon, or of some other Planet.*

Massachusetts new FEE Bill.

For regulating the Sums the several Officers, &c. in the Commonwealth are to receive for their Services after the 1st Day of April 1796, as established by Law.

Justices Fees.

FOR every blank writ of attachment and summons thereon, or original summons, *seventeen cents.*

For the declaration in each writ of attachment and summons thereon, or original summons, *forty cents.*

Every subpoena, for one or more witnesses, *ten cents.*

For the entry of an action, or filing a complaint in civil causes, examining, allowing and taxing the bill of costs, entering up judgments and recording, *sixty one cents.*

The trial of an issue, *fifty cents.*

Copy of every evidence, original paper, or record, if under a page, *ten cents*; if upwards, *twelve cents per page.*

Writ of execution, *twenty five cents.*

A recognizance to prosecute an appeal, *twenty cents.*

Taking affidavits out of court, *twenty cents.*

For the Justice's travel therefor, going out and returning home, at the rate of *fifty cents*, for every ten miles.

For writing the deposition, caption, and notification, at the rate of *twelve cents per page.*

Taking affidavits, in perpetual remembrance of the thing, to each justice, *twenty cents*, and for his travel and the writing, the same as in the case last mentioned.

Administering an oath to appraisers, together with certificates of the same, *twenty cents.*

Administering an oath to witnesses before referees and arbitrators, *twenty cents*, and pay for travel.

To each Justice who shall travel more than ten miles to the Court-house, at the rate of *one dollar* for every twenty miles out and home, except such Justices as are attorneys at law, or clerks of the Court of Sessions.**Fees of the Clerk of the Court of Sessions.**Entering an indictment, presentment, complaint or information, including the recording, examining the bill of costs, and filing the papers, *sixty five cents.*Discharging a recognizance, *ten cents.*Each warrant for a criminal, *twenty cents.*Each subpoena for witnesses, *ten cents.*Each recognizance for an innholder or retailer, and for transmitting their names to the Selectmen, and recording the license, *fifteen cents.*A warrant for County Tax, *twenty cents.*Warrant to lay out or alter a road, *twenty cents.*Examining and casting the grand juror's account yearly and the order thereon, *thirty cents.*Examining any other account, *eight cents.*Recording the reports of high ways and other matters by order of the Court, *twelve cents* a page.Copies of all papers or records, *twelve cents* a page.Entering an appeal and recognizing, *twenty cents.*Keeping an account of the attendance of the Justices of the Court of Sessions, each term, *seventy five cents.***In the Supreme Judicial Court.***Justices Fees.*Entering an action or complaint, including the taxing of a bill of costs, *one dollar and twenty cents.*Taking special bail, *forty cents.*Allowing a writ of error, granting certiorari, habeas corpus or other writ, *forty cents.*Granting a writ of protection, *thirty cents.*Proving a deed, *twenty cents.*Entering a petition and making order thereon, for the sale or partition of real estate, *one dollar.*Accepting a partition of real estate, *forty cents.*

Allowances to Parties and Witnesses.

To parties recovering costs for an attorney in all cause where an issue in law or fact is joined, in the Supreme Judicial Court, *two dollars fifty cents,* and in all other causes in said court, *one dollar twenty five cents.*

And in all causes in the Courts of Common Pleas, and Courts of General Sessions, where an issue is joined, *one dollar fifty cents;* and in all other causes, *one dollar.*

For the declaration in each writ, *fifty cents.*

Allowances to Parties, &c. continued.

For parties recovering costs, in the Supreme Judicial Court, Court of Common Pleas, General Sessions of the Peace, or before a Justice of the Peace, *thirty three cents* for each day's attendance and travel, ten miles to be accounted as one day; no allowance to be made for travel to or from the Clerks office to take out a writ or summons, and no plaintiff to be allowed for more than three day's attendance when the defendant is defaulted, unless the defendant appears in Court and makes answer to the plaintiff's suit, in which case, if the defendant is defaulted after the expiration of three days, no attendance is to be exacted for the plaintiff after the day the default happens.

In a criminal cause, where one or more are tried by the jury at the supreme court, or determined by an issue in law, for the Attorney General, or person attending for the Commonwealth, *two dollars and fifty cents*; and if there be no trial by the jury, but determined by an issue in law, *one dollar and twenty five cents*; and in all causes in the Court of Sessions, *one dollar and twenty five cents*.

Drawing an indictment in the Supreme Judicial Court, *one dollar and twenty five cents*, and in the Court of Sessions of the Peace, *sixty five cents*.

Witnesses in civil and criminal causes, in any Court, *seventy five cents* for each day's attendance, and *four cents* for each mile's travel, going out and home: And before a Justice of the Peace, Referees or Arbitrators, *thirty three cents* per day, and for travel the same as at other Courts.

Sheriffs and Constables Fees.

For the service of an original summons or scire facias on a defendant, *thirty cents*.

For the service of a capias or attachment with a summons, *thirty cents*: And if the Sheriff shall make a special service of any such writ by direction of the plaintiff, agent or attorney, either by attaching property or taking the body, *fifty cents*.

And where an Officer leaves a copy to complete the service, or gives a copy of any precept upon demand thereof he may charge at the rate of *twelve cents* a page.

For a bail bond, *twenty cents*.

Serving a writ of possession, exclusive of fees for collecting on the costs, *one dollar and ten cents*, and if on more than one piece of land, *seventy five cents* for each piece of land after the first.

Sheriffs and Constables Fees continued.

The fees for collecting the costs on a writ of possession the same as on executions in personal actions.

Serving a warrant, *thirty cents*.

Sheriff's aid in criminal cases, to each person for ever twelve hours attendance, *one dollar*, and *four cents* for each mile's going out and returning home.

Summoning witnesses in criminal cases, *ten cents* each and travel as in civil causes.

For the Sheriff's or Constable's attending the Court and keeping the prisoner in criminal cases, *seventy five cents* for every twelve hours.

Levying executions in personal actions, for the first one hundred dollars, *four cents*; for every dollar above that and not exceeding two hundred dollars, *two cents* for every dollar, and for all above two hundred dollars, *one cent* for every dollar; travel for the service of such executions, *four cents* a mile.

Serving an execution upon a judgment of Court for the partition of real estate, or assigning of dower, *one dollar* a day, and *four cents* a mile from the place of his abode.

No Sheriff is to receive from any of his deputies more than at the rate of *twenty five per cent*, on the amount of fees for travel and service.

Every trial in a Court of record, *fifteen cents*.

Every default, *eight cents*.

For returning the certificates of votes for a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Counsellors and Senators to the Secretary's office, *eight cents* a mile.

To the Officer attending the Grand Jury, for each day's attendance, *seventy five cents*.

To the Officer attending the petit Jury, for every cause, to be paid with the Jury fees, *twenty five cents*.

For dispersing venires for Jurymen, Treasurer's warrants and Proclamations of all kinds, *eight cents* each.

To each appraiser of real estate, for extending execution or assigning dower, *one dollar* a day, and travel at the rate of *four cents* a mile going out and returning home.

For every Deputy Sheriff or Constable attending any of the Courts, by order, *seventy five cents* a day.

Sheriffs Fees continued.

To the Sheriff in each County for their care and diligence for the safe keeping of prisoners, to be allowed such salary as the Court of Sessions for the County shall order, exceeding *forty dollars* a year for the county of Suffolk and not exceeding *twenty dollars* for any other county.

To the Constables for the service of venires, *twenty cents*, and *four cents* for travel to the Clerks office.

Crier's Fees.

Calling a Jury, *eight cents*.

A default or non suit, a judgment affirmed on complaint, a verdict or demurrer, *fifteen cents* each.

Discharging a recognizance by proclamation, *eight cents*.

Said fees to be paid to the Clerk for the Crier.

Gaoler's Fees.

Turning the key for each prisoner committed or discharged, *twenty cents*.

Dieting each prisoner, such sum weekly as the Court Sessions shall from time to time judge reasonable.

Fees for Marriages.

To the Town Clerk for publishing the banns of matrimony, recording, giving a certificate of the publishment, and recording the marriage, *fifty cents*.

To the Minister or Justice who shall lawfully solemnize marriage and certify the same, *one dollar and 25 cents*.

To the Town Clerk for recording births and deaths, *eight cents* each.

For a certificate of a birth or death, *ten cents*.

For a subpoena for one or more witnesses, *ten cents*.

Fees in the Secretary's Office.

For a certificate under the seal of the Commonwealth or the benefit of particular persons, *one dollar*.

For every order of notice from the General Court upon petition, and every other order, *forty cents*.

For all copies for the benefit of particular persons, at the rate of *twelve cents* a page.

Fees to the Messenger of the General Court.

Serving every warrant which the General Court may issue for taking into custody any person, *forty cents*.

For travel therefor each mile out and in, *six cents*.

Keeping and providing for such person, *forty cents* a day.

For the discharge of such person, *forty cents*.

County Register's Fees.

For entering and recording a deed or other paper of the length of one page or under, *twelve cents*.

And for certifying on the original the time when, and the book and page where the same is recorded, *five cents*.

If the instrument recorded exceed the length of a page, at the rate of *fourteen cents* a page.

For 1^l copies at the rate of *fourteen cents* a page.

For entering in the margin a discharge of a mortgage, *twelve cents*.

Allowance to Jurors.

To the Grand Jurors and Jurors for trial attending any of the Courts of law, each to be allowed *ninety cents* a day, and *four cents* a mile for travel out and home.

And there shall be paid to the Clerk of the Supreme Judicial Court, and to the Clerk of the Common Pleas, and to the Clerk of the Sessions respectively, by the plaintiff or appellant, *six dollars* for the trial of each civil action, for the use of the County.

Constables are authorized to serve any writ, summons or execution, in any personal action, where the damage sued for or recovered does not exceed *seventy dollars*.

Clerks of the Courts, and other persons keeping public offices, are constantly to have a list of the fees, so far as relates to them, hung in some conspicuous place in their respective offices.

Every Officer upon receiving his fees, if required by the person paying the same, is to make out an account thereof in writing, upon pain of forfeiting to the party paying such fees, treble the sum by him so paid.

And if any person shall demand and receive any greater fee for the services afore-mentioned, he is to forfeit and pay the sum of *thirty dollars* for every offence, if complaint is made within the space of one year.

All the Laws heretofore made for regulating and establishing Fees for the services of the respective Officers, &c. above-mentioned are repealed, except so far as respects prosecutions for offences committed against the former Act before the first day of April 1796.

Money Accounts of the United State are to be expressed in *Dollars* or *Units*, *Dimes* or *Tenths*, *Cents* or *Hundredths*, and *Milles* or *thousandths*. A *Dime* being the tenth part of a *Dollar*, a *Cent* the hundredth part of a *Dollar*, and a *Mille* the thousandth part of a *Dollar*.

Useful and necessary TABLES.

By an Act of the Commonwealth of *Massachusetts*, all Money Accounts after the 11 Day of September 1795, are to be the *Dollar, Cent & Mille*; the following TABLE shewing the Number of Cents, and Decimal Parts of Cents (or Milles) in any Number of Shillings and Pence to the amount of a *Dollar* at 6*s.* being the Currency of said Commonwealth, is therefore very useful for that Purpose.—The Act is not to nullify any Account originally made, or to be made or any Note, Bond, or other Instrument, expressed in any Money of Account, but are to be reduced to Dollars and its parts, before any Suit at Law can be had thereon.

The Fee Bill, in taxing Costs, till revised, may also be reduced to the Money Account by the Act established.

An easy Method of reducing Pounds, Shillings and Pence, into Dollars, Cents and Mills.

RULE, To the pounds annex the figure, which expresses half the number of shillings; to these annex the decimals of the pence, as set down in the following Table, observing if the number of shillings in the sum given be odd, to increase the decimals by adding five to the left hand figure. Divide the whole by 3. The three right hand figures of the quotient will show the *mills* (or *cents and mills*) and the figures at the left hand the *dollars* of the sum given.

INFORMATION *about the Eastern Country.*

A Petition has been presented to the Legislature from the Inhabitants of a number of Towns and Plantations in the upper or northerly part of the Counties of *York* and *Cumberland*, praying to be made a new County—the subject has been acted upon and referred to a future Session. The boundaries of the new County, it is expected, will for the present extend East and West the width of both Counties—and North to the *HIGHLANDS*, until there shall be inhabitants enough to erect another new County north of *Amariscogin*, which will then probably be the northern boundary of the County now intended, which it is proposed shall be bounded in the following manner, viz. “By the *New Hampshire* line on the West, and then beginning where said line crosses the river *Amariscogin*, and following the course of the main stream down as far as the mouth of *Little Amariscogin* river, then some miles up said *Little Amariscogin* to the outlet of *Thompson's Pond*, then through said outlet and by a line drawn through the middle of said *Thompson's Pond*, then through the town of *Raymond* by the shortest line to *Sebago Pond*, then through said *Sebago Pond* by the shortest line to *Saco River*, then up said *Saco River* to the mouth of *Great Ojipee River*, then up the main stream of said *Great Ojipee* to the line of *New Hampshire*.”

These bounds will include a tract of about 40 miles square, and comprize the following Towns and parts of Towns and Plantations, viz. *Flintstown*, *Porterfield*, *Brownfield*, *Hiram*, *Fryeburgh*, *Bridgetown*, and *New Suncock*—*Poland*, part, *Turner* and *Livermore*, part, *Jay*, part, *Plantations No. 1, 2, 3, 4, and No. 5*, south of *Amariscogin* river, *Bethel*, *Oxford*, *Waterford*, *Paris*, *Otisfield*, *Buckfield*, *Butterfield* and *Butterfield Slip*.—North of the above described tract there are laid out ranges of Townships, extending nearly 50 miles, equal to 50 Townships, most of them equal to 6 miles square each and some of them more.—If the above described new County should be found to be inconveniently or disproportionately large, it may be divided nearly equal, by the *Little Amariscogin*, or by *Songo River*, which runs into *Sebago Pond*.—No description, however laboured or exact can be half so clear or explanatory, as by tracing these lines on the Map, and with such assistance, it is hoped, it will be sufficiently plain for the purpose to be understood.

Each State, as also the district of Maine, forms a district, and is denominated by the name of the State which composes it. Of these districts, excepting Maine & Kentucky, are formed three circuits, called the Eastern, Middle, and the Southern circuit. Each district has a Judge, called a district Judge, who, without any associate Judge, forms a district court. He is required to hold, within his district, four sessions annually, and is also empowered to hold special sessions, if occasion requires, either at the places required by law, for holding the stated terms, or elsewhere, at his discretion.

The Circuit Court is composed of one of the Judges of the Supreme Court (or in some special cases, of two) and the district Judge of any district where it is, *hoc tempore*, to be held. This Court must hold two sessions annually in every district of each circuit, except Vermont, where it holds but one. Special sessions may also be held.

For the several jurisdictions of each of these Courts, see the 9th, 10th, 11th and 13th sections of the Act of Congress, entitled, "An act to establish the Judicial Courts of the United States," passed Sept. 24, 1789.

The duties specified in the above list respect goods, &c. imported in vessels of the United States. An additional duty of ten per cent is imposed on all goods, wares and merchandize imported in foreign vessels.

All dutied Articles, imported into the United States, not having been landed more than one year, are allowed a drawback of the duties, subject to a deduction of one per cent, except spirits, which is half per cent per gallon.

Excise Duties, &c. *continued.*

On all goods, wares and merchandize, imported from the Cape of Good Hope, or beyond, 20 per cent is to be added to the cost, ad valorem.

After December 1794. no refined loaf or lump Sugar is to be imported from any foreign place, except in vessels of 120 tons and upwards, & in casks or packages of not less than 600 pounds each, on forfeiture of the vessel, and the loaf and lump sugar imported therein, except in such casks or packages as above mentioned.

By an Act of Congress, passed May 28. 1796, it is enacted that the following "yearly rates and duties are to be paid upon all Carriages for the conveyance of persons, which shall be kept for his or her own use, or to be let out for hire, or for the conveyance of passengers, v z. For every Coach, the sum of fifteen dollars: For every Chariot and Post Chaise, the sum of twelve dollars: For every Phaeton, for the conveyance of one or more persons, with or without a top; and for every Coachee. or other carriage, having panelwork, with blinds, glasses or curtains in the upper division of the sides, front or back thereof, the sum of nine dollars: For every four wheel carriage, having framed posts and tops, & hanging on steel springs, (whether drawn by one or more horses) the sum of six dollars: For every four wheel top carriage hanging upon wooden or iron springs or jacks (whether drawn by one or more horses) and upon every curricule, chaise, chair, sulky, or other two wheel top carriage, and upon every two wheel carriage hanging or resting upon steel or iron springs, the sum of three dollars: and upon every other two wheel carriage, the sum of two dollars: And upon every four wheel carriage, having framed posts and tops, and resting upon wooden spars, the sum of two dollars.

Carriages usually and chiefly employed in husbandry, or for the transportation or carrying of goods, wares, merchandize, produce or commodities, are exempted from the above duties."

The duties laid upon Mills and Implements employed in the manufacture of Snuff, and the drawbacks allowed upon the exportation of Snuff manufactured within the United States, are suspended for the present.

Custom House *Matters.*

“Ships and vessels of the United States, going to a foreign country, are to have a passport, in a form approved by the President, before she departs, to be furnished by the Collector of the District where such vessel may be, for which the Master is to pay *ten dollars*. And in order to be entitled to such passport, the Master must be bound, with sureties, in the sum of 2000 dollars that the said passport shall not be applied to the use or protection of any other vessel than the one described in the same.

And if any vessel of the United States departs therefrom, and bound to any foreign country, other than some place in America, without such passport, the Master is to forfeit and pay 200 dollars for every such offence.

Likewise there is to be paid on every vessel of the United States, sailing or trading to any foreign country, other than some place in America, for each and every voyage, the sum of *four dollars*.”

The Collector of every District at the request of any seaman, producing proof of his citizenship, is to deliver him a Certificate, certifying that he is an American seaman, together with his age and height, and describing him as particularly as may be, agreeably to an Act of Congress for the relief and protection of American seamen.

The Collector who grants the certificate, is to file and preserve the proofs of citizenship produced; and for each certificate delivered, the Collector is entitled to receive from the seamen applying for the same, *25 cents*.

For carrying into effect the Treaty of Amity and Commerce with Great Britain, *eighty thousand eight hundred dollars.* The compensations to Commissioners who shall serve in Great Britain, *six thousand six hundred and sixty seven dollars, and fifty cents*, per annum; and to those who shall serve in the United States, *four thousand four hundred and forty five dollars* per annum.

For carrying into effect the Treaty made with Algiers, *twenty four thousand dollars* per annum are appropriated for the payment of the annuity stipulated in the said Treaty.

For carrying into effect a Treaty made with certain Indian Tribes, north-west of the River Ohio, *9000 dollars.*

For carrying into effect the Treaty made with the King of Spain, *sixteen thousand six hundred and eighty three dollars.*

Appropriations *continued.*

Including the appropriation of 500,000 dollars, made for the military establishment, there is further appropriated for that and the naval establishments, the sum of one million, three hundred and eighteen thousand, eight hundred and seventy three dollars.

The President of the United States is authorized to borrow the sum of *five millions* of dollars, to be applied to the payment of the principal of any parts of the debt of the United States now due, or may become due in 1796.

The President is also authorized to borrow the sum of *three hundred thousand* dollars, on loan, for the use of the city of Washington, in the district of Columbia.

The Military Establishment.

THE Military establishment of the United States, after October 1796, is to be composed of the corps of artilleryists and engineers, as heretofore established; two companies of light dragoons, to do duty on horse or foot, and four regiments of infantry, of eight companies each.

Every non-commissioned officer, private and musician of the artillery and infantry is to receive, annually, the following articles of uniform cloathing, viz. one hat, one coat, one vest, two pair of woollen, and two pair of linen overalls, four pair of shoes, four shirts, four pair of socks, one blanket, one stock and clasp, and one pair of buckles.

Suitable cloathing is to be provided for the dragoons, adapted to the nature of the service.

Every non-commissioned officer, private and musician is to receive, daily, one pound of beef, or three quarters of a pound of pork, one pound of bread or flour, half a gill of rum, brandy or whisky; and at the rate of one quart of fat, two quarts of vinegar, two pounds of soap, and one pound of candles to every hundred rations.

The monthly pay of the officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates, is, a major general, 166 dollars; a brigadier general, 104 dollars; quarter-master, inspector, and paymaster general, each, in addition to their pay in the line, 25 dollars; principal artificer, 40 dollars; second artificer, 26 dollars; lieutenant colonel commandant, 75 dollars; major of artillery and of dragoons, 55 dollars; major of infantry, 50 dollars; pay-

master, adjutant & regimental quarter-master, in addition to their pay in the line, 10 dollars; captain, 40 dollars; lieutenants, 26 dollars; ensigns and cornets, 20 dollars; surgeons, 45 dollars; surgeon's mates, 30 dollars; serjeant-majors, and quarter-master serjeants, 8 dollars; senior musicians, 7 dollars; serjeants, 7 dollars; corporals, 6 dollars; musicians, 5 dollars; privates, 4 dollars; artificers to the infantry and cavalry, farriers & saddlers, each 9 dollars; nurses in the hospital, 8 dollars,

No non-commissioned officer or private is to be arrested for any debt under the sum of twenty dollars.

Naval Department.

Three Frigates are to be equipped with all convenient expedition, two to be of 44 guns, and one of 36 guns. For the pay and subsistence of the three Captains, the sum of 5000 dollars is appropriated.

The ships of 44 guns are to be officered each with one Captain, four Lieutenants, one Lieutenant of Marines, one Chaplain, one Surgeon and two Surgeon's Mates; one Sailing Master, and two Mates, one Carpenter and two Mates, eight Midshipmen, one Purser, one Boatswain and two Mates, one Gunner, & two Mates, one yeoman of the Gun-room, and eleven Quarter Gunners, one Sailmaker and one Mate, one Captain's Clerk, one Cockswain, one Armourer, a Steward, a Cooper, a Master at Arms, a Cook, one Serjeant, two Corporals, one Drum, one Fife, 50 Marines, and a sufficient number of seamen.

The 36 gun Frigate to be officered and manned in the same proportion.

The pay, subsistence, rations, &c. of the several Officers are established by Congress; but as it will, probably, be a considerable time before they will be in actual service, (as a Treaty is now settled with the Algerines) it is therefore thought needless they should be here inserted.

This Society was incorporated in 1794, its object is the assistance of young men of that denomination, in a suitable education for the Gospel Ministry; to which purpose the interest of their funds is limited, until the principal shall amount to a certain sum; after which the annual interest, when not expended for the purpose before mentioned, is to be laid out at the discretion of the Trustees in any mode they shall judge most conducive to the general spread of the Christian Religion.

The Warren Baptist Association, is to meet this Year at *Foston*, on the Tuesday after the first Wednesday in September, at 2 o'clock, P.M. at the Rev. Dr. *Stillman's*.

Congregational Convention of Ministers,In the Commonwealth of *Massachusetts*.

Their Meeting is held in Boston on the Thursday next following the last Wednesday in May annually; on which day, at noon, after transacting the usual business of the Convention, a Sermon is preached in public before them and a collection made for the charitable purpose of relieving of distressed Clergymen or their Widows. The Rev. Dr. Tappan, Hollis Professor of Divinity at the University at Cambridge, is chosen to preach the Sermon at the next Convention; but, in case of failure, by sickness or otherwise, the Rev. Dr. Stephen West, of Stockbridge, is to officiate in his stead.

The Rev. Dr. Morse, of Charlestown, is their Scribe.

The Congregational Ministers, in general, in the several Counties, are associated, and have their stated Meetings; Their principal design is "to open & maintain a friendly correspondence with the representative bodies of the Presbyterian and Congregational Ministers and Churches in other States, and to communicate to, and receive from them whatever may be useful, and promote the interests of the Christian Religion; and to collect an accurate statement of the number and names of the Associations, Ministers, Vacancies, Candidates, and non-associated Ministers and Churches throughout the Commonwealth, and to digest and publish the same, for their own information, and that of their brethren in other States."

The Convention of Congregational Ministers, in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, in May 1795.

Voted, **THAT** a Committee consisting of Members of this Convention residing in different parts of his Commonwealth, be appointed for the purpose of certifying the good character and qualifications of our Ministers and Candidates, who shall pass from our limits into those of our Reverend Brethren in the other American States; and that this Committee take care that such travelling Ministers and Candidates, be regularly handed, and sufficiently recommended, to and by intermediate Ministers or other respectable Characters, till they reach the place of their destination. And the more effectually to secure the object of this Vote, this Convention further agree, mutually to communicate and receive the Names of Committees appointed by ourselves, and our brethren in the other States, for the purpose aforesaid; and that every Certificate be signed by one Gentleman at least on that Committee, from whose bounds the Person certified travels.

"They earnestly recommend it to all young Gentlemen, who design to devote themselves to the work of the Ministry, to spend that portion of time in the study of Divinity, which improved and judicious advisers shall think necessary to qualify them for public Teachers."

Convention *Matters, &c. continued.*

The Convention, solicitous to collect and preserve accurate documents for a history of their Churches, have *Voted*, "That all the Congregational Ministers in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts be requested to give a history of their respective Churches, and of the Churches in their vicinity, if vacant, and to make returns, as soon as may be convenient, to the Rev. Dr. Belknap, of Boston, to be by him kept on file, after having been fairly recorded by the Scribe of the Convention, in a book to be kept by him for that purpose."

The Course of improvement in which the Commonwealth of Massachusetts now is, and the reasonable anticipation of the good effects thereof, is, by noticing the attention of the Legislature, in the course of the last seven years, to the encouragement of Literature, provision for the virtuous and liberal Education of the rising Generation, public Convenience and Utility, and many other valuable objects; for besides the Incorporations in the said period of seven years of upwards of 50 Towns, other Incorporations have taken place for various useful purposes, viz. 17 for Institutions of Education: 38 for the support, &c. of religious Societies of different Denominations: 14 for the building of Bridges: 11 for the Construction of Canals & Locks: 4 for the Interest of Navigation: 15 for the Encouragement of Arts, including Agriculture: and 4 Miscellaneous.

BY a Law of this Commonwealth, passed Feb. 24, 1796, it is enacted, "That no non-commissioned officer or private, belonging to any company of militia, shall be exempted from military duty on account of bodily infirmity, unless he shall obtain a certificate from the Surgeon or Surgeon's mate of the regiment to which he belongs, if either of those Officers are authorized in said regiment, if not, from a reputable Surgeon or Physician living within the limits of the same, that he is unable to do military duty by reason of bodily infirmity, the cause of which is to be described in said certificate; and the Officer commanding said company may upon the back of said certificate, discharge the person named therein from doing military duty in said company for such term of time as he shall judge reasonable; which certificate, if approved and countersigned by the Officer commanding the regiment, battalion or squadron, to which such person belongs, shall intitle him to a full exemption from military duty for the term therein specified."

"No appeal is to be allowed to either party from the judgment of a Justice of the Peace, upon any prosecution or complaint brought by any Clerk of a company of Infantry, Artillery, or Cavalry, which the Militia law requires to be prosecuted by said Clerks."
