

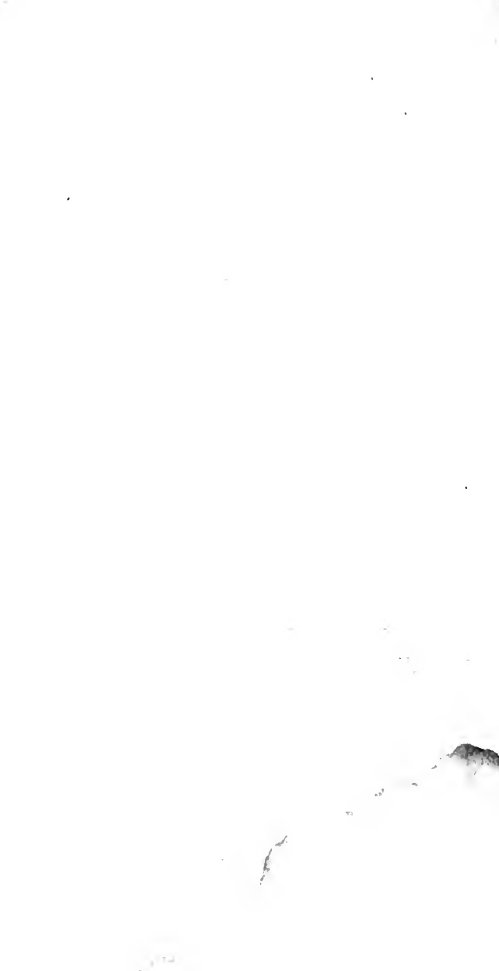

THERE will be but two *Eclipses* this Year, both of the SUN, and both invisible.

I. The first will be on the fourth day of May, at 32 minutes past 7 o'clock, afternoon, in the fifteenth degree of *Taurus*. This Eclipse will be annular and central on the Meridian, in long. 78 deg. 15 min. West of *Boston*, and latitude 8 degrees North. D's latitude 7 min. South.

II. The second will be on the twenty-eight day of October, the conjunction will be at oh. 58 min. afternoon, in the sixth degree of *Scorpio*. Moon's lat. 8 minutes North. The SUN will be totally and centrally eclipsed on the Meridian 54 minutes afternoon, in long. 12 deg. 8 min. West of *Boston*, and lat. five & a quarter degrees South.

THE PLANET MERCURY will this year transit the SUN's disk, on Tuesday the 7th day of May; when at 51 minutes past 6 o'clock in the morning, apparent time, the Planet Mercury will be so closely in conjunction with the Sun, as to be seen within his disk in the form of a small black spot, about 6 minutes to the southward of the Sun's centre. The calculation of this remarkable and curious phenomenon, is as follows, viz.

The Sun will rise at 56 minutes past 4 o'clock, when Mercury will have entered on the face of the Sun the space of one hour and 50 minutes, and at sunrise, may be seen on the eastern limb of the Sun, a little distance from the margin of its disk. As Mercury will be 7h. 3 m. in passing the Sun's disk, the transit will be visible to us, if the air be clear, for the space of 5 hours 41 minutes. Those who wish to view this entertaining spectacle, and are not furnished with proper instruments, may do it with ease by looking through a piece of smoked window glass.

The Powers of Congress.

CONGRESS has power to lay taxes, impose an excise---to pay the debts and provide for the common defence and general welfare of the United States---to borrow money on the credit of the United States---to regulate commerce---to coin money---to provide for the punishment of counterfeiting public securities and the current coin---to establish post-offices and roads---to promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing to authors and inventors exclusive right---to constitute tribunals---to punish piracies and felonies---to declare war, grant letters of marque, and make rules concerning captures---to raise and support armies---to provide & maintain a navy---to make rules for the regulation of the land and naval forces---to provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections, and repel invasions, and for arming and organizing the same---to exercise exclusive jurisdiction over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may become the seat of government; and like authority over places granted or purchased for the erection of forts magazines &c. &c.---and to make all laws that may be necessary carrying into effect the foregoing and other powers vested by the Constitution in the Government of the United States.

Vessels built in, and belonging to citizens of the United States, in the coasting trade or fishery, pay once a year if licensed, *six cents per ton.*

If not licensed, having goods taken in one State, to be delivered in another, except the adjoining State, each entry, *six cents per ton.*

Allowances to Importers for Leakage, Draught and Tare.

For leakage on all liquors, upon which duties are payable by the gallon, there is an allowance of *two per cent* according to the gauge of the casks containing the same.

For draught on any quantity, to the amount of 100 or 112 pounds, *one pound.*

On any quantity from 1 to 200 weight, *two pounds.*

From 2 to 300 weight, *three pounds.*

From 3 to 1000 weight, *four pounds.*

From 10 to 1800 weight, *seven pounds.*

On any quantity above 1800 weight, *nine pounds.*

For tare on every whole chest of bohea tea, *seventy pounds.*

On every half chest of ditto, *thirty six pounds.*

On every quarter chest of ditto, *twenty pounds.*

On every chest of hyson or other green tea, of the weight of 70 pounds or upwards, gross, *twenty pounds.*

On every box of other tea, not less than 50 pounds, nor more than 70 pounds, gross, *eighteen pounds.*

All other boxes of tea, according to their invoice.

On coffee in bags, *two per cent.* In bales, *three per cent.*

On coffee in bales, *twelve per cent.*

On pepper in bales, *five per cent.*

On pepper in casks, *twelve per cent.*

On sugars, other than loaf, in casks, *twelve per cent.*

On sugar in boxes, *fifteen per cent.*

On all other goods, according to the invoice thereof.

Custom House Matters.

"Ships and vessels of the United States, going to a foreign country, are to have a passport in a form approved by the President, before she departs, to be furnished by the Collector of the District where such vessel may be, for which the master is to pay *ten dollars*. And in order to be entitled to such passport, the master must be bound, with sureties, in the sum of 2000 dollars, that the said passport shall not be applied to the use or protection of any other vessel than the one described in the same.

And if any vessel of the United States departs therefrom, and bound to any foreign country, other than some place in America, without such passport, the master is to forfeit and pay 200 dollars for every such offence.

Likewise there is to be paid on every vessel of the United States, sailing or trading to any foreign country, other than some place in America, for each and every voyage, the sum of *four dollars*.

The Collector of every District, at the request of any seaman, producing proof of his citizenship, is to deliver him a certificate, certifying that he is an American seaman, together with his age and height, and describing him as particularly as may be, agreeably to an act of Congress for the relief and protection of American Seamen.

The Collector who grants the certificate is to file and preserve the proofs of citizenship produced; and for each certificate delivered, the Collector is entitled to receive from the seaman applying for the same, *25 cents*.

No ship or vessel which has been, or shall be registered and which shall be seized, or captured and condemned, under the authority of any foreign power, or shall by capture become the property of any foreigner or foreigners, shall be entitled to receive a new Register, notwithstanding such ship or vessel should afterwards become American property, but all such ships or vessels are to be considered as foreign vessels.—But it is provided, that the person or persons owning any ship or vessel, at the time of capture of the same, in case he regain a property in the ship or vessel, so condemned, by purchase or otherwise, may claim and receive a new register for the same.—

"From the Cape of Good-Hope or beyond, 20 per cent is added to the cost of all goods paying an additional duty, and 10 per cent if from any other place."

By a late Act for the relief of sick and disabled Seamen it is enacted, That the master or owner of every ship or vessel of the United States, arriving from a foreign port into any port of the United States, shall, before admitting an entry, render a true account of the number of seamen who have been employed on board such vessel since she was entered at any port in the United States—and pay to the Collector 20 cents per month for every seaman so employed. And no new enrolment or licence of a vessel for carrying the coasting trade shall be granted, before the master first render a true account of the number of seamen, and the time they have severally been employed on board, during the continuance of the licence which has expired, and pay 20 cents per month for every month such seamen have been employed as aforesaid.—Which sum the said masters are authorized to retain out of the wages of such seamen.—The master rendering a false return forfeits 100 dollars.—

Domestic Duties.

LICENCES. For each Licence for retailing wines and spirits, *five dollars,*

Note. All are called Retailers, who sell less than thirty gallons of wine, and twenty of spirits, otherwise than in the original casks in which they were imported, except innkeepers, apothecaries, &c.

AUCTIONS. Sales of land, &c. farming utensils and stock, or of ships and vessels, *25 cents per 100 dollars,* of the purchase money; and on the sale of other property (not exempted by law) *50 cents per 100 dollars.*

Rates and Duties on Carriages.

By an act of Congress, passed May 28, 1796, it is acted that the following yearly rates and duties, are to be paid upon all *Carriages* for the conveyance of persons, which shall be kept for his or her use, or to be let out to hire, or for the conveyance of passengers, viz. For every *Coach* the sum of *fifteen dollars*: For every *Chaise* & *Post Chaise*, the sum of *twelve dollars*: For every *Wagon*, for the conveyance of one or more persons, with or without a top: and for every *Coachee*, or other carriage having panelwork with blinds, glasses or curtains in the upper division of the sides, front or back thereof, the sum of *nine dollars*: For every four wheel carriage, having framed posts and top, and hanging on steel springs, whether drawn by one or more horses) the sum of *six dollars*: For every four wheel carriage hanging upon wooden or iron springs or jacks (whether drawn by one or more horses) and upon every *curricule, chaise, chair, sulky* or other two wheel top carriage, and upon every two wheel carriage hanging or resting on steel or iron springs, the sum of *three dollars*: and upon every other two wheel carriage, the sum of *two dollars*: and upon every four wheel carriage, having framed posts and tops, and resting upon wooden spars, the sum of *two dollars*.

Carriages usually and chiefly employed in husbandry, for the transportation or carrying of goods, wares, merchandise, produce or commodities, are exempted from the above duties.

STAMP Duties on Paper, Parchment, &c.

From and after the 1st day of July, 1798.

FOR every skin or piece of vellum or parchment, or sheet or piece of paper upon which shall be written or printed any or either of the instruments or writings following viz. Any certificate of naturalization, *five dollars*; and license to practice, or certificate of admission, enrolment or registry of any counsellor, solicitor, attorney, advocate or proctor, in any court of the United States, the sum of *ten dollars*; any grant or letters patent under the seal and authority of the United States, except for lands granted for military services, *four dollars*; any exemplification or certified copy of such grant or letters patent, *two dollars*; any charter party, bottomry, or respondentia bond, or *dollar*; any receipt or other discharge for or on account of any legacy left by any will or other testamentary instrument, or for any share of a personal estate divided by force of any statute of distributions, other than to the wife, children, or grand children of the person deceased, the amount whereof shall be above the value of 50 dollars and not exceed the value of 100 dollars, *twenty five cents*; when the amount thereof shall exceed the value of 100, and not exceed 500 dollars, *fifty cents*; and for every further sum of 500 dollars, the additional sum of *one dollar*; and policy of insurance or instrument in nature thereof on any ship, vessel or goods, insured, from one district to another in the United States, *twenty five cents*; from the United States to any foreign port or place, when the sum for which insurance is made shall not exceed 500 dollars, *twenty five cents*; when the sum insured shall exceed 500 dollars, *one dollar*. — Any exemplification of what nature soever, that shall pass the seal of any court, other than such as it may be the duty of the clerk of such court to furnish for the use of the U. States, or some particular state, *fifty cents*. — Any bond, bill single or penal, foreign or inland bill of exchange, promissory note or other note, other than a recognizance, bill, bond, or other contract, made to or with the United States, or any State, for their use respectively, if above 20 dollars and not exceeding 100 dollars, *ten cents*; if above 100 and not exceeding 500 dollars, *twenty five cents*.

above 500 and not exceeding 1000 dollars, *fifty cents*; above 1000 dollars, *seventy five cents*: *Provided* that if any bonds or notes shall be payable at or within 60 days, they shall be subject to only *two fifths* of said duty, *viz.* if above 20, and not exceeding 100 dollars, *4 cents*: above 100, and not exceeding 500, *ten cents*: above 500 and not exceeding 1000, *twenty cents*; if above 1000, *thirty cents*.—

—Any notes issued by any of the Banks now established or that may be established in the United States, otherwise than the notes of such banks as shall agree to an annual composition of one per centum on the annual dividends made to their stockholders respectively, according to the following scale, *viz.* On all notes not exceeding 50 dollars, for each dollar *6 mills*; above 50 and not exceeding 100 dollars, *fifty cents*; above 100 and not exceeding 500 dollars, *one dollar*; above 500 dollars, *two dollars*.—*The Banks in this District have agreed to a composition.*—

Any protest or other notarial act, *twenty five cents*. Any letter of attorney, except for an invalid pension, or to obtain or sell warrants for land granted by the United States, as a bounty for military services performed in the late war, *twenty five cents*. Any note or bill of lading for goods or merchandize to be exported, if from one district to another district of the United States, not being in the same State, *ten cents*; if from the United States to any foreign port or place, *twenty five cents*. Any inventory or catalogue, of furniture, goods or effects made in any case required by law (except goods and chattels distrained for rent or taxes, and goods taken in virtue of any legal process by any officer) *fifty cents*. Any certificate of a share in any Insurance company, or in any Bank, if above 20 dollars, and not exceeding 100 dollars, *ten cents*; above 100 dollars, *twenty five cents*; if under 20 dollars, at the rate of *ten cents* for 100 dollars.

No deeds, instruments, or writings whatsoever, charged with a duty, which shall be written or printed by any person upon vellum, parchment or paper, *not stamped* according to the act, can be marked or stamped at the Supervisor's office, after being executed or completed, without the sum of *ten dollars* being first paid, over and above the duty charged thereupon, for stamping such instrument.—

At the office in Portland, of John Frothingham, Inspector of the Revenue for Survey No. 1.

At the office in Medford, of John Brooks, Inspector of the Revenue for Survey No. 2.

At the office in Boston, of Ebenezer Storer, Inspector of the Revenue for Survey No. 3.

The Supervisor's office, in Tremont Street, Boston, will at all office hours be open also for the distribution of Stamps; where any persons may have any vellum, parchment, or paper stamped, upon paying the duties thereupon. —

Valuation of Lands Dwelling-Houses, &c.

BY the Act to provide for the valuation of lands and dwelling-houses, and the enumeration of slaves within the United States, the several States are designated and established by particular divisions, respectively.—

The State of *Massachusetts* is to contain nine divisions, as follows: The First Division to consist of the counties of *Suffolk, Washington* and *Lincoln*; the Second Division to consist of the counties of *York* and *Cumberland*; the Third Division to consist of the county of *Essex*; the Fourth Division to consist of the counties of *Suffolk* and *Norfolk*; the Fifth Division to consist of the county of *Middlesex*; the Sixth Division to consist of the counties of *Windsor, Plymouth, Barnstable, Duke's-County & Nantucket*; the Seventh Division to consist of the county of *Worcester*; the Eighth Division to consist of the county of *Hampshire*; the Ninth Division to consist of the county of *Berkshire*.

One Commissioner is appointed for each division in each State, who are authorized, when convened in general meeting, to divide their respective States into convenient assessment districts, in each of which they are to appoint a principal assessor, and such a number of assistant assessors as they may judge necessary.—They are also required to establish all such rules and regulations as to them, or a majority of them, shall appear suitable and necessary for carrying the said act into effect. —The assessors are to inquire after and concerning all lands, dwelling houses and slaves in their respective assessment districts, and to value and enumerate the same, in manner prescribed by the act.

And all Slaves, whether negroes, mulattoes or mestizos, above the age of twelve, and under the age of fifty years, are to be enumerated in the assessment district in which they may respectively be kept or employed, at the time of the enumeration, except such as from fixed infirmity or bodily disability may be incapable of labour.—Provided, That all property of whatever kind, coming within any of the foregoing descriptions, and belonging to the United States, or any State, or permanently exempted from taxation by the laws of the State wherein the same may be situated or possessed, shall be exempted from the aforesaid valuation and enumeration.

DIRECT TAX.

By an Act of Congress passed July 8, 1798, a Direct Tax of two Millions of Dollars was laid upon the United States, and directed to be apportioned to the States respectively, in the following manner:—

The said Tax is to be collected by the supervisors, inspectors and collectors of the internal revenues, under direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, according to valuations and enumerations made by the act providing the valuation of lands &c. and enumeration of slaves, &c.

Upon every dwelling house which with the out-houses appurtenant thereto, and the lot whereon the same is erected, not exceeding two acres, shall be valued, in manner as aforesaid, at more than 100, and not more than 500 dollars, there shall be assessed a sum equal to *two tenths* of one per centum on the amount of the valuation; upon every dwelling house valued at more than 500, and not more than 1000 dollars, a sum equal to *three tenths* of one per centum: --upon every dwelling-house valued at more than 1000, and not more than 3000 dollars, a sum equal to *four tenths* of one per centum: ---upon every dwelling house valued at more than 3000, and not more than 6000 dollars, a sum equal to *one half* of one per centum: - upon every dwelling-house valued at more than 6000 and not more than 10,000 dollars, a sum equal to *six tenths*

one per centum :---upon every dwelling house valued more than 10,000, and not more than 15,000, dollars, a sum equal to *seven tenths* of one per centum :---upon every dwelling-house valued at more than 15, and not more than 20,000 dollars, a sum equal to *eight tenths* of one per centum :---upon every dwelling-house valued at more than 20, and not more than 30,000 dollars, a sum equal to *nine tenths* of one per centum : --upon every dwelling-house valued at more than 30,000 dollars, a sum equal to *one per centum* on the amount of the valuation.

And upon every Slave which shall be enumerated according to said act, there shall be assessed *fifty c nts.*

The whole amount of the sums so assessed upon dwelling-houses and slaves, within each state respectively, is to be deducted from the sum apportioned to such state, and the remainder of said sum is to be assessed upon the lands within such state, according to the valuations made according to the act aforesaid, and at such rate per centum as will be sufficient to produce the said remainder.

The Supervisors are authorized to appoint so many suitable persons in each assessment district within their respective districts, as may be necessary for collecting said Tax, and assign to them their collection districts; which persons are to be Collectors within their respective collection districts, and to collect the said tax under the direction of the Supervisors respectively.----

If any person shall deliver or disclose to any assessor, appointed in pursuance of said act, and requiring a list or lists, any false or fraudulent list, with intent to defeat or evade the valuation or enumeration, directed to be made, such person is offending, and being thereof convicted before any court, having competent jurisdiction, shall be fined a sum not exceeding five hundred, dollars, nor less than one hundred dollars, at the discretion of the court, and shall pay all costs and charges of prosecution.

Every Collector, who shall be guilty of any extortion or oppression, or demand other or greater sums than are authorized by law, will be liable to pay a sum not exceeding 300 dollars, for the use of the party injured, with costs of suit; and each collector, if required, must give receipts for all sums by them collected and retained.----

Description of the NEW STATE-HOUSE.

THE new *State-House* is an oblong building, 173 feet front, and 61 deep, it consists externally of a basement story, 20 feet high, and a principal story 30 feet. This in the centre of the front is crowned with an Attic 60 feet wide, 20 feet high, which is covered with a pediment: Immediately above this rises a dome 50 feet diameter and 30 high, the whole terminated with an elegant circular lanthorn, supporting a gilt pine cone, an emblem of one of our principal staples,

The basement story is finished plain on the wings with square windows. The centre is 94 feet in length, and formed of arches which project 14 feet, they form a covered walk below, and support a Colonade of Corinthian columns of the same extent above. The outside walls are of large patent bricks, with white marble fascias, imposts and key stones.

The lower story is divided into a large hall or public walk in the centre, 55 feet square and 20 high, supported by Doric Columns—two entries, each 16 feet wide, with two flights of stairs in each, and at the ends Offices for the *Treasurer* and *Secretary* of the Commonwealth.

The rooms above are—The *Representatives Room*, in the centre, 55 feet square, the corners formed into niches for fire places; this room is finished with Doric Columns on the sides, at 12 feet from the floor, forming a gallery, the Doric entablature surrounds the whole, from this spring four flat arches on the side, which being united by a circular Cornice above, form in the angles four large pendants to a bold and well proportioned Dome. The pendants are ornamented with Trophies of *Commerce*, *Agriculture*, *Peace* and *War*. The Dome is finished in Compartments of stucco, in a style of simple elegance. The center of the Dome is 50 feet from the floor. The seats for the Members are ranged semicircularly, and the *Speaker's* chair in face of the whole.

North of the center room is the *Senate Chamber* 55 feet long, 33 wide, and 30 high; highly finished in the Ionic order; two screens of Columns, support with their entablature a rich and elegant arched ceiling. This room is also ornamented with Ionic pilasters—and with the arms of the State, and of the United States, placed in opposite pannels; it is accommodated with a Gallery for public use.

The *Council Chamber* is on the opposite quarter of the building, it is 27 feet square, and 20 high, with a flat ceiling; the walls are finished with Corinthian pilasters, and pannels of Stucco, these pannels are enriched with the State Arms, with emblems of Executive power, the scale and sword of Justice, and the insignia of Arts and Freedom, the *Caduceus* and Cap of Liberty. The whole decorated with wreaths of oak and laurel.

Besides these principal rooms, there are about 20 smaller plainly finished for the use of committees.

The stairs are spacious, and two flights of them lead to the top of the outer Dome, 170 steps from the foundation. This flight affords an uninterrupted view of one of the finest scenes in nature. Indeed the beauty and advantages of this situation which induced the Legislature to make choice of it for the present building, are acknowledged by both natives and foreigners. It vies with the most picturesque scenes in *Europe*, and will bear comparison with the Castle hill of *Edinburgh*, the famous bay of *Naples*, or any other most commanding prospect.

The foundation of this building is about 100 feet above the level of the harbour, its elevation and size, makes it a very conspicuous object. It is about 60 feet above the level of the Mall, and from this situation it appears to most advantage. — *Inscription on the Corner Stone.* —

The Fees for funeral services are fixed by the Selectmen.

Deaths and Burials are, by law to be recorded by every Town and District Clerk, throughout the Commonwealth.

In the Town of Boston there are upwards of 50 Hackney Coaches; they are very neat and genteel, handsome painted, and are all numbered; they are employed either to attend Funerals, or carrying of Passengers, to or from any part of the town or country at stated Rates.

By a Law of this Commonwealth, The major part the Selectmen are authorized and empowered to make such rules and regulations, establishing the rates and price to be paid for the carriage and conveyance of persons in said Hackney Coaches, within the limits of the town of Boston, as they may from time to time judge reasonable regard being had to the time and distance. And if a owner or driver of a Hackney Carriage shall demand an extort, from any person or persons, a sum beyond the rates which may thus be established by the said Selectmen the licence of such carriage, upon complaint made to the Selectmen as aforesaid, after a due hearing, may be forfeited and revoked, and the owner will be liable to refund the sum thus received and extorted to the party grieved. And all the penalties and forfeitures aforesaid may be recovered in an action on the case before any Justice of the Peace for the County of Suffolk to the use of the person who shall sue for the same.

All Hackney Carriages must be numbered and registered in a book kept by the Town-Clerk, and the number of each carriage fixed on the same, in such conspicuous place or places as the Selectmen shall direct.

Any Person who shall set up or use any Hackney Carriage for the purpose aforesaid, without having obtained a license or having obtained a license, shall continue to keep and use such carriage after said license is revoked will forfeit, for every time such carriage is so used, a sum not exceeding four dollars.

BY a late Law of this Commonwealth, The Pilotage
 of the Harbour of Boston, is formed into two divisions,
 outward and inward; the outward division consists of
 four branches, and the inward division consists of three
 branches; and no person so commissioned as a Pilot or his
 deputy, shall undertake to bring in or carry out of said
 Harbour any vessel drawing nine feet of water, (coasters and
 sailing vessels excepted) except in his own particular branch,
 under the penalty of fifty dollars.

The Governor and Council, determine and fix the fees
 of pilotage of the several Pilots for the harbour of Boston,
 from time to time, having respect to the different risk and
 hazard of the inward and outward divisions, and accord-
 ing to the circumstances of peace or war, and the seasons of
 the year may severally require, and the same is to be speci-
 fied on their respective warrants. A schedule of their fees
 shall be hung up in the Custom House for the Port of Boston
 and Charlestown, for public inspection and information.

Directions for sailing in & out of Boston Bay.

THE *Light-House* stands on a small Island, on the north entrance of the channel (Point Alderton and Nantasket Lights being on the south) and is about 65 feet high: steer for it from Cape Cod, the course is W. N. W. when within one league of the Cape. From Cape Cod the Light House is about 16 leagues; From Cape Anne the Light House, the course is S. W. distant 10 leagues. After making the Light, and the wind fair, you may run it to bear W. by N. or W. N. W. and then run for till you come within two cables length of it. If the weather is so bad that a Pilot can't get off (as is sometimes the case) after running a-breast of it, so as to bring to bear N. by E. you may run W. by S. about a mile and an half, to Nantasket road, where you may anchor in from 7 to 5 fathoms in safety.

To work into Boston bay, you may stand to the Southward till you bring the Light to bear W. N. W. and to the Northward till you bring it to bear W. S. W. till you are within one league of the Light; then you must not stand to the Northward any further than to bring it to bear W. by N. and to the Southward to bring it to bear N. W. You may anchor in the Bay in safety, if the wind is off shore.

The Lights at Cape Anne stand on an Island called Thatcher's Island; the two Lights bear of each other seen in one S. S. W. a quarter S. and N. N. E. a quarter N. To go outside the Londoner, or Thatcher's Island Light, you must give the Light one League distance.

Double letters are double, and triple letters triple of these rates. A packet of the weight of one ounce, avoirdupois weight, at the rate of four single letters; and in the proportion for one of a greater weight.

News papers 1 cent each for any distance not exceeding 100 miles; to any distance in the state where printed, the same; and for a greater distance from one state to another, *one and a half cent*. Pamphlets and Magazines not exceeding 5 miles, 1 cent per sheet; -- 100 miles, 1 and a half cent; and any greater distance, 2 cents per sheet.

Every printer of a news paper may send one paper to another news printer within the U. S. free of postage. —

All packets or letters water borne in packet boats provided by the U. S. for every single letter 8 cents; every double letter 16 cents; every triple letter 24 cents; and every letter or packet brought in any private vessel, 10 cents, if delivered at place where the vessel arrives; and directed to any other place, the additional legal postage.

The master or commander of every vessel arriving in the United States must deliver to the Postmaster at the place where he arrives, all letters under his care; except such as are directed to the owner or consignee. —

Letters must be delivered at the Post-Offices of Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore, one hour before the time fixed for the departure of the mail, and at other places half an hour, or they will lie until the next post.

All letters and packets to and from the President, or Vice-President of the United States; to and from the Secretary of the Treasury, the comptroller, the auditor, the register, the commissioner of the revenue, the treasurer, the secretary of state, the secretary of war, the Postmaster general, his assistant, and deputies, are free of postage. And also all letters not exceeding two ounces in weight to and from any member of Congress, the secretary of the Senate, and the clerk of the house of representatives, during any session of Congress, and twenty days after it. But no public officer can frank any letters except his own.

A regular communication has been sometime established between the Post-Office of the United States and the Post-Offices of Canada, New-Brunswick and Nova-Scotia, it will be continued until further notice.

Those who have occasion to send letters or newspapers through that channel, are desired to pay the United States postage at the Post-office where the letters or newspapers are deposited, and without such payment of the postage they will not be forwarded.

A Post-Office is established at Schoodic in the county of Washington, District of Maine, being the Easternmost Office in the United States, John Brewer Post-master. A Post-Office is at Burlington, in Vermont, westward.

As there are several places of the same name in the United States, the merchants and others are required to be very particular in the direction of their letters, distinguishing the States, and where it would otherwise be doubtful, the counties, in which those places are situated. And when letters are not for a post-town, the nearest post-town to the place ought to be mentioned.

The Post-Office does not insure Money, or any thing conveyed by Post; it is always conveyed at the risk of the person who sends or requires it to be sent.

[The Post-Roads have been of late very much extended throughout the United States. A list of them, with the Post-Towns, would be too prolix here.---The main Road extends from Brewer's at Schoodic, in Maine, to Rock Landing, in Georgia, a distance of more than 1500 Miles. A great number of cross roads are established for a general intercourse with the interior parts of the several States.]

C O N V E N T I O N

Of the CONGREGATIONAL MINISTERS in the
Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

THEIR Meeting is held in *Boston* in the afternoon of the last Wednesday in *May* (or the day of *Election*) annually; and on the following day at noon, after transacting the usual business of Convention, a sermon is delivered in public before them, and a collection made for the charitable purpose of relieving the indigent widows of deceased Clergymen.

The Convention is a voluntary Association embracing all the congregational clergy of the commonwealth, and vested with no particular ecclesiastical authority or control over the Churches. They have opened a friendly correspondence with the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the Middle and Southern States, and with the Representative Bodies of the Congregational Ministers in Connecticut, New-Hampshire and Vermont, for the purposes of communicating and receiving from them whatever may tend to promote the common interest of Christianity.

Convention Matters *continued.*

A standing Committee of Convention have been appointed for the purpose of certifying the good character and qualifications of Ministers and Candidates who may travel into other States; and an agreement has been entered into between the Convention and the other Representative bodies of Ministers in other States, mutually to communicate the names of their Committees for this purpose. Every Certificate must be signed by one gentleman at least of that Committee from whose bounds the person recommended travels.

The Convention "earnestly recommend to all your Gentlemen, who design to devote themselves to the work of the Ministry, to spend that portion of time in the study of Divinity, which improved and judicious advisers shall think necessary to qualify them for public Teachers."

The Congregational Ministers throughout the Commonwealth, with some exceptions, are associated, and have regular and stated Meetings for fellowship and mutual improvement. The Convention have passed a Vote, requesting the Moderator or Scribe of the several Associations throughout the Commonwealth, to forward to the Secretary of the Convention, a correct list of the Members of the respective Association, with the names of the Scribe

and of the Candidates licensed by them; and have directed that the Scribe of the Convention, procure the insertion of the several lists in Mess'rs Fleet's Register.

☞ So few returns have been made that this request of Convention cannot be answered this year.

The Convention solicitous to collect and preserve accurate documents for a history of their Churches, have passed a Vote that each of the Congregational Ministers in Massachusetts, be requested to compile a history of his own Church, and of those in his vicinity which may happen to be vacant, and to make returns to the Scribe of the Convention. It is hoped this important request will not pass unnoticed, but be productive of great good.

The Grand Lodge of the most ancient and honorable Fraternity of free and accepted Masons, in Massachusetts, was organized April 19, A. D. 1792, being formed by a complete coalition of the late St. John's and the late Massachusetts Grand Lodges.

DIRECTIONS for preventing CALAMITIES by FIRE.

1. **K**EEP your Chimnies and Stove-Pipes clean, by sweeping them at least once every month.
2. Never remove hot ashes in a wooden vessel of any kind, and look well to your ash-hole.
3. After sweeping a hearth, see that the brush does not retain any particles of fire, before you hang it up in its usual place.
4. Oblige all your servants to go to bed before you, every night, and inspect all your fire places, before you retire to rest.—For fear of accidents, let a bucket of water be left in your kitchen every night. The writer of these directions once saved his house from being consumed by fire, by this precaution.
5. Do not permit a servant to carry a candle to his bedroom, if he sleeps in an unplastered garret.
6. Cover up your fire carefully every night in ashes. Let the unburnt parts of the billets or chunks of wood be placed next the hearth, but not set upright in the corners, by which means no sparks will be emitted from the wood. Pour a little water upon the burning ends of the wood which are not completely covered by the ashes. Place before the fire a fender made of sheet iron. This contrivance was well known in England many years ago, by the name of *Coverfeu*. It has lately received (from a top being added to it) the name of *Hood*.
7. Remove papers and linen from near the fire to a remote part of the room.
8. Shut the doors of all the rooms in which you leave fire at night. By thus excluding the supply of fresh air you will prevent a flame being kindled, should a coal or spark fall upon the floor, or upon any of the combustibles matter in the room. The smoke which issues from this smother'd fire, will find its way in every part of the house and by waking the family, may save it from destruction.
9. If sickness, or any other cause should oblige you to leave a candle burning all night, place it in such a situation as to be out of the way of rats. A house was once des-

ed by a rat running away with a lighted candle for the
 e of the tallow, and conveying it into a hole filled with
 s, and inflammable matters.

10. Never read in bed by candle light, especially if
 ar bed be surrounded by curtains.

11. Strictly forbid the use of segars in your family at all
 es, but especially after night. May not the greater fre-
 quency of fires in the United States than in former years,
 ascribed in part to the more general use of segars by
 cles servants and children?—There is good reason to
 ievie a house was lately set on fire by a half consumed
 ar, which a woman suddenly threw away to prevent
 ng detected in the unhealthy and offensive practice of
 oaking.

*In case of fire attend to the following directions, to pre-
 vent or restrain its terrible consequences.*

1. Do not open the room or closet door where you sus-
 ct the fire to be, until you have secured your family,
 and your most valuable effects, nor until you have col-
 lected a quantity of water to throw on the fire, the mo-
 ment a fresh supply of air excites it into a flame. Where
 water cannot conveniently be had, try to smother the fire
 by throwing two or three blankets over it. A British
 captain once saved a king's ship by throwing himself
 with a spread blanket in his arms, upon a fire which had
 broken out near the powder room. He was pensioned
 for life, for this wise and meritorious act.

2. In case it be impossible to escape by a stair-case from
 a house on fire, shut the door of your bed-chamber, and
 sit until help can be brought to secure your escape from
 a window.

3. If safety does not appear probable in this way, wrap
 ourselves up in a blanket, hold your breath, and rush
 through the flames. If water be at hand, first wet the
 blanket.

4. To prevent fire descending from the roof, or as-
 cending from the first story, form by means of blankets or
 ropes, a kind of dam on each of the intermediate stories,
 near their stair-case, that shall confine the water that is
 thrown upon the roof, or into the windows. It will ef-
 fectually check the progress of the fire downwards or up-
 wards in brick or stone houses.

5. To prevent fire spreading to adjoining houses, cover them with wet blankets or carpets, or old sails.

6. To extinguish fire in a chimney, shut the doors and windows of the room. Throwing a quart or more common salt into the fire. Hold, or nail a wet blanket before the fire place. If these means fail, throw a wet blanket down the chimney from the roof of the house.

There is a method used in some countries of glazing chimnies when they are built, by burning common salt upon them, which renders them so smooth that no soot can adhere to them. Chimnies so constructed can never take fire.

Ladders are commonly used as the means of conveying persons from the windows of houses on fire. Would not a long and stiff pole, with a rope fixed on its upper end, more portable, and convenient for this purpose?

The famous Mr. John Wesley when a child, was taken out of a window in his father's house whilst in flame by one man standing upon the shoulders of another. This practice may be used to rescue persons from the fire story of a house on fire, when other means cannot be had with sufficient convenience or expedition.

DIRECTIONS

for the speedy and effectual extinguishing of FIRE.

1. **L**ET water be impregnated with a solution of one or more of the following fixed salts. (1) Marine Salt. (2) Pot or Pearl-ashes. (3) Allum. (4) Copperas.

2. Let every family keep a hoghead, or at least a barrel of this impregnated water, which should frequently be stirred. It may be kept in warm weather in an open house, in cold weather in a cellar.

3. In every engine house let a large butt mounted on wheels be kept ready for use. This may be drawn by horse to any place where it may be wanted. To the butt let there be fixed one or two large wooden cocks with a short leather hose to prevent waste.

4. Should a fire be of long continuance and in danger of spreading, an additional quantity of those salts pulverised being previously provided, will soon dissolve and mix with an additional quantity of water.

ADVANTAGES of such impregnated water, above common water, are as follows :

- . It will damp or extinguish the fire instantaneously.
- . It will prevent the burnt wood from rekindling, when the water is evaporated the salts remain.
- Note.* To prove this let any person dip a brand of fire common soap lye, and then lay it on the hottest fire, let him take the staves of a leach barrel in which soap been kept, and put them in a glowing oven—and he find that they will not *easily* kindle.
- . By reason of its superior weight it may be thrown a greater force against the wind.
- . A very small quantity will do more execution, than a large quantity of simple water.
- . It may be used with more success in small than in large Engines.

It will save much labour of pumping and handling buckets, and prevent much waste of water as in the common method.

If a perforated plate of brass or copper like those at the extremity of the tube of a watering pot be fixed to a screw to the pipe of an engine, the water may be equally distributed over the surface of burning wood, by one single stream. This can be of use only in large Engines.

PREVENT Flakes of Fire from kindling when they fall on the wooden roofs of buildings.

Take three parts (by measure) of air-slacked lime, one do. of finely sifted wood-ashes, and one do. of fine sand, grind them in oil to the consistence of paint, and rub on the mixture with a brush.

Two coats will be necessary; the first thin, the second thick as it can be conveniently worked. This coating hardens by time, and is impenetrable by flakes or coals of fire falling on it.

SUMMARY of the METHOD of TREATMENT to
used with Persons apparently dead from drowning ;

CONVEY the person to the nearest convenient hou
 with his head raised: Strip and dry him as quick
 possible; clean the mouth and nostrils from froth a
 mud—If a child, let him be placed between two pers
 naked, in a hot bed—If an adult, lay him on a hot blan
 or bed, and, in cold weather, near a fire—in warm weath
 the air should be freely admitted into the room. T
 body is next to be gently rubbed with warm woollen clo
 sprinkled with spirits, if at hand, otherwise dry: A hea
 warming pan may be now lightly moved over the ba
 properly covered with a blanket—and the body, if a
 child, is to be gently shook every few minutes: Wh
 these means are using, one or two assistants are to be e
 ployed in blowing up tobacco smoke into the fundame
 with the instrument provided for the purpose, or a toba
 pipe, if that cannot be had—the bowl filled with toba
 and properly lighted, being covered with a handkerch
 or piece of linen, so as to defend the mouth of the assist
 in blowing: Bathe the breast with hot rum, and persi
 the use of these means for several hours. If no signs
 life should then appear, let the body be kept warm sev
 hours longer, with hot bricks, or vessels of hot wa
 applied to the palms of the hands, and soles of the f
 and this for a longer or shorter time, as the circumstan
 of the case may dictate.

*The too customary method of rolling on a barrel, suspens
 by the feet, and every other violent mode of agitation, p
 ticularly in removing the body from the water, should
 most carefully avoided.*

The abovementioned Method of Treatment is to
 made use of with vigor for several hours, although
 favourable circumstances should arise; for it is a vu
 and dangerous opinion, to suppose that persons are irrec
 erable, because life does not soon make its appearance;
 upon this opinion, an immense number of the seemin
 dead, have been committed to the grave; who might h
 been *Restored to Life, by Resolution and Perseverance*
 the plans of treatment now recommended.

Extract from a late additional Militia Law.

BY a Law of this Commonwealth passed Feb. 24th, 1796, it is enacted, "That no non-commissioned officer or private, belonging to any company of militia, shall be exempted from military duty on account of bodily infirmity, unless he shall obtain a certificate from the Surgeon or Surgeon's mate of the regiment to which he belongs, if either of those Officers are authorized in said regiment, if not, from a reputable Surgeon or Physician living within the limits of the same, that he is unable to do military duty by reason of bodily infirmity, the cause of which is to be described in said certificate; and the Officer commanding said company may upon the back of said certificate, discharge the person named therein from doing military duty in said company for such term of time as he shall judge reasonable; which certificate, if approved and countersigned by the Officer commanding the regiment, battalion or squadron, to which such person belongs, shall intitle him to a full exemption from military duty for the term therein specified. — No appeal is allowed to either party, from the judgment of a Justice of the Peace, upon any prosecution or complaint brought by any Clerk of a company of Infantry, Artillery or Cavalry, which the Militia Law requires to be prosecuted by said Clerks." —
