THERE will be but two Eclipfes this year, and both the SUN, as follows, viz.

I. The first will be February 2tfl, 4h. 21m. in the evening; no part of which will be visible in the northern Star of United Columbia; but total and visible to the inhabitar of the Marquesa and Society Isles, in the South Pacif Ocean, in longitude 65° W. of Boston, and latitude 11°. Moon's latitude 64° S.

II. The fecond will be August 17th, 3h. 35m. in the morning, and confequently invisible to all on the continer of *America*.

Summary of the Method of Treatment, to be used with Persons apparently dead from Drowning, Bc. **NONVEY** the perfon to the nearest convenient house with his head raifed : Strip and dry him 28 quick as pofe fible ; clean the mouth and noitrils from froth and mud--If a child, let him be placed between two perfons, naked, in a hot bed-If an adult, lay him on a hot blanket or bed, and, in cold weather, near a fire-in warm weather, the air fhould be freely admitted into the room. The body is next to be gently rubbed with warm woolen cloths, fprinkled with fpirits, if at hand, otherwife dry. A heated warming-pan may be now lightly moved over the back, properly covered with a blanket; and the body, if of a child, is to be gently thook every few minutes : Whilft these means are using, one or two affiftants are to be employed in blowing up tobacco-Imoke into the fundament, with the inftrument provided for the purpole, or a tobacco-pipe, if that cannot be hidthe bowl filled with tobacco and properly lighted, being covered with a handkerchief, or piece of linen, to as to defend the mouth of the affiltant in blowing : Bathe the breaft with hot rum, and perfift in the ufe of thefe means for feveral hours. If no figns of life fhould then appear, let the body be kept warm feveral hours longer, with hot bricks, or veffels of hot water, applied to the palms of the hand, and foles of the feet, for a longer or fhorter time, as the circumstances of the case may be.

The too cuffomary method of rolling on a barrel, fufpending by the feet, and every other violent mode of agitation, particularly in removing the body from the water, fhould be most carefully avoided.

The above mentioned method of treatment is to be made ufe of with vigour for feveral hours, although no favourable circumfances fhould arife; for it is a vulgar and dangerous opinion, to fuppofe perfons are irrecoverable, becaule life does not foon make its appearance; and upon this opinion, an immenfe number of the fremingly dead have been committed to the grave, who might have been *reflored* to *life* by *refolution* and *perfeverance* in the above plan of treatment.

For regulating the Sums the feveral Officers, &c. in the Commonwealth, are to receive for their Services, after the first day of April, 1796, a: established by Law.

Juffice's Fees.

FOR every blank writ of attachment and fummons thereon, or original fummons, feventeen cents.

For the declaration in each writ of attachment and fummons thereon, or original fummons, forty cents.

Every fubpœna, for one or more witneffes, ten cents.

For the entry of an action, or filing a complaint in civi caufes, examining, allowing and taxing the bill of cofts, entering up judgments and recording, fixty-one cents.

The trial of an iffue, fifty cents.

Copy of every evidence, original paper, or record, if under a page, ten cents; if upwards, twelve cents per page.

Writ of execution, twenty-five cents.

A recognizance to profecute an appeal, twenty cents. Taking affidavits out of court, twenty cents.

For the Juffice's travel therefor, going out and returning home, at the rate of fifty cents for every ten miles.

For writing the deposition, caption, and notification, at the rate of twelve cents per page.

Taking affidavits, in perpetual remembrance of the thing, to each Juffice, twenty cents, and for his travel and the writing, the fame as in the cafe laft mentioned.

counted as one day; no allowance to be made for travel to or from the Clerk's office to take out a writ or fummons, and no plantiff to be allowed for more than three day's attendance when the defendant is defaulted, unlefs the defendant appears in Court and makes anfwer to the plaintiff's fuit; in which cafe, if the defendant is defaulted, after the expiration of three days, no attendance is to be taxed for the plaintiff after the day the default happens.

In a criminal caufe, where one or more are tried by the jury at the Supreme Court, or determined by an iffue in law, for the Attorney General, or perfon attending for the Commonwealth, two dollars and fity cents; and if there be no trial by the jury, but determined by an iffue in law, one dollar and twenty-five cents; and in all caufes in the Court of Seffions, one dollar and twenty-five cents.

Drawing an indictment in the Supreme Judicial Court, one dollar and twenty-five cents, and in the Court of Seffions of the Peace, fixty-five cents.

Witneffes in civil and criminal caufes, in any Court, feventy-five cents for each day's attendance, and four cents for each mile's travel, going out and home: And before a Juftice of the Peace, Referees or Arbitrators, thirty-three cents per day, and for travel the fame as at other Courts.

Sheriff's and Conftable's Fees.

For the fervice of an original fummons or fcire facias on a defendant, thirty cents.

For the fervice of a capias or attachment with a fummons, thirty cents: And if the Sheriff fhall make a fpecial fervice of any fuch writ by direction of the plaintiff, agent or attorney, either by attaching property or taking the body, fifty cents.

And where an Officer leaves a copy to complete the fervice, or gives a copy of any precept upon demand thereof, he may charge at the rate of twelve cents a page.

Serving a writ of poffeffion, exclusive of fees for collefting on the coffs, one dollar and ten cents, and if on more than one piece of land, feventy-five cents for each piece of land after the first.

The fees for collecting the costs on a writ of possellion the fame as on execution in perfonal actions.

Serving a warrant, thirty cents.

Sheriff's aid in criminal cafes, to each perfon for every twelve hours attendance, one dollar, and four cents for each mile's going out and returning home.

Summoning witneffes in criminal cases, ten cents each, and travel as in civil causes.

For the Sheriff's or Constable's attending the Court, and keeping the prifoner in criminal cafes, feventy-five cents for every twelve hours.

Levying executions in perfonal actions, for the first one hundred dollars, four cents; for every dollar above that, and not exceeding two hundred dollars, two cents for every dollar, and for all above two hundred dollars, one cent for every dollar; travel for the fervice of fuch executions, four cents a mile.

Serving an execution upon a judgment of Court for the partition of real cflate, or affigning of dower, one dollar a day, and four cents a mile from the place of his abode.

No fheriff is to receive from any of his deputies more than at the rate of twenty-five per cent. on the amount of fees for travel and fervice.

Every trial in a court of record, fifteen cents.

Every default, eight cents.

For returning the certificates of votes for a Governor, Licutenant-Governor, Counfellors and Senators, to the Secretary's office, eight cents a mile.

To the Officer attending the Grand Jury, for each day's attendance, feventy-five cents.

To the Officer attending the Perit Jury, for every caufe, to be paid with the Jury fees, twenty-five cents.

For difperfing venires for Jurymen, Treasurer's warrants, and Proclamations of all kinds, eight cents each.

To each appraifer of real effate, for extending execution or affigning dower, one dollar a day, and travel at the rate of four cents a mile going out and returning home.

For every Deputy Sheriff or Conftable attending any of the Courts, by order, feventy-five cents a day.

To the Sheriffs in each county for their care and diligence for the fafe keeping of priloners, to be allowed luch falary as the Court of Setfions for the county fhall order, not exceeding forty dollars a year for the county of Suffolk, and not exceeding twenty dollars for any other county.

To the Conftables for the fervice of venires, twenty-five cents, and four cents for travel to the Clerk's office.

To the Minifter or Juffice who fhall lawfully folemnize s'marriage and certify the fame, one dollar and twenty-five cents.

To the Town Clerk for recording births and deaths, eight cents each.

For a certificate of a birth or death, ten cents.

For a fubpœna for one or more withelfes, ten cents.

Fees in the Secretary's Office.

For a certificate under the feal of the Commonwealth for the benefit of particular perfons, one dollar.

For every order of notice from the General Court upon petition and every other order, forty cents.

For all copies for the benefit of particular perfons, at the rate of twelve cents a page.

Fees to the Meffenger of the General Court.

Serving every warrant which the General Court may iffue for taking into cufledy any perfon, forty cents. For travel therefor each mile out and in, fix cents. Keeping and providing for fuch perfon, forty cents a day. For the difcharge of fuch perfon, forty cents.

County Register's Fees.

For entering and recording a deed or other paper of the length of one page or under, twelve cents.

And for certifying on the original the time when, and the book and page where the fame is recorded, five cents.

If the inftrument recorded exceed the length of a page, at the rate of fourteen cents a page.

For all copies, at the rate of fourteen cents a page.

For entering in the margin a difcharge of a mortgage, twelve cents.

Allowance to Jurors.

To the Grand Jurors and Jurors for trial attending any of the Courts of law, each to be allowed ninety cents a day, and four cents a mile for travel out and home.

And there fhall be paid to the Clerk of the Supreme Judicial Court, and to the Clerk of the Common Pleas, and to the Clerk of the Seffions refpetively, by the plaintiff or appellant, fix dollars for the trial of each civil action, for the use of the county.

Conftables are authorized to ferve any writ, fummons or execution, in any perfonal action, where the damage fued for or recovered, does not exceed feventy dollars.

Clerks of the Courts, and other perions keeping public offices, are conflantly to have a lift of the fees, to far as relates to them, hung in fome confpicuous place in their refpective offices.

Every Officer upon receiving his fees, if required by the perfon paying the fame, is to make out an account thereof, in writing, upon pain of forfeiting to the party paying fuch fees, treble the fum by him fo paid.

And if any perfon shall demand and receive any greater fee for the fervices afore-mentioned, he is to forfe t and pay the fum of thirty dollars for every offence, if complaint is made within the space of one year.

All the Laws heretofore made for regulating and establishing Fees for the fervices of the respective Ossicers, GC. above mentioned are repealed, except so far as respects profecutions for offences committed against the former Ast before the first day of April, 1796.

CONVENTION

Of the CONGREGATIONAL MINISTERS in the Commonwcalth of Maffachufetts.

THEIR Meeting is held in *Bofton*, in the afternoon of the L laft Wednefday in May (or day of Election) annually; and on the following day at noon, after tranfacting the ufual bufinels of Convention, a fermon is delivered in public before them, and a collection made for the charitable purpofe of relieving the indigent widows of deceafed Clergymen.

The Rev. Thomas Prentifs, of Medfield, is chosen to deliver the Convention Sermon in May, 1803: but, in cafe of failure, the Rev. Dr. Emmons, of Franklin, is to officiate in his flead.

The Convention is a voluntary Affociation, embracing all the Congregational Clergy of the Commonwealth, and vefled with no particular authority or control over the Churches. They have opened a friendly correspondence with the Generol Affembly of the Proflecterian Church, in the Middle and, Southern States, and with the reprefentative bodies of the Congregational Miniflers in Connecticut, New-Hampfhire and Verment, for the purpoles of communicating and receiving from them whatever may tend to promote the common interest of Chriftianity.

A Standing Committee of Convention have been appointed for the purpole of certifying the good charafter and qualifications of Miniflers and Candidates who may travel into other States; and an agreement has been entered into between the Convention and the other reprefentative bodies of Minifters in other States, mutually to communicate the names of their Committees for this purpole. Every certificate mill be figured by one gentleman at leaft of that Committee, from whole bounds the perfor recommended travels.

The Covention "earneftly recommend to all young gentlemen, who defign to devote themfelves to the work of the minifity, to fpend that perion of time in the fludy of divioity, which improved and judicious advifers fhall think neceffary to qualify them for public teachers."

The Congregational Miniflers throughout the Commonwealth, with fome exceptions, are affociated, and have regular and flated meetings for fellow fhip and mutual improvement. The Convention, have palled a vote, requefling the Moderator or Scribe of the leveral Affociations throughout the Commonwealth, to forward to the Scribe of the Convenion, a correct lift of the members of their refpective Affociaions, with the name of the Scribe of each, and of the Canlidates licenfed by them; and have directed that the Scribe of the Convertion procure the infertion of the leveral lifts in the Maffachufeus Regifter.

The Convention, folicitous to colleft and preferve accurate documents for a *Hiftory of their Churches*, have paffed a rote, that each of the Congregational Minifters in Malfachuletts be requefted to compile a hiftory of his own Church, and of thole in his vicinity which may happen to be vacant, and to make returns to the Scribe of the Convention. It is hoped, this important requeft will not pafs unnoticed, but be roductive of great good.

The Governor and Council determine and fix the fees a pilotage of the feveral pilots for the harbour of Bofton, fro time to time, having refpect to the different rifk and hazar of the inward and outward divisions, and according as the circumstances of peace or war, and the feasons of the yea may feverally require; and the fame to be specified on the respective warrants. A fchedule of their fees to be hur up in the Custom-Houfe for the port of Bofton and *Charle toom*, for public infpection and information.

A NEW COMET.

ON the 28th of August, 1802, about 9 in the evening, Citizen Mechain, Member of the French National Inflitute and of the Board of Longitude, discovered a new Comet in the confiellation of Serpentarius. It was a few degrees below the two nebulous lipots which are on the left fide of that figure, and near the equator. He afcertained its pofition, and found that it was rapidly afcending towards the north. It continued obfcure the following days. The light of this flar did not appear to receive any fenfible augmentation. Its nucleus does not become more luminous ; nor does the nebulofity which furrounds it acquire great extent. The following are the first and last observations which Citizen Mechain communicated to the National Inffitute, on the 2d September. Mean time, 9 hours, 24 min. 6 fec. Right afcention, 340 deg. 18 min. S. Declenfion, 6 deg. 11 min. 31 fec. From the prefent polition of this Comet, it may be remarked, that its diffance from the Sun is neceffarily greater than that of the Sun from the Earth. It afcends towards the North Pole, following the left fide of Scrpentarius, and the oppofite fide of the Hercules. Though vifible only with a telefcope, it may be observed for a prety long period, if its lights do not fuffer any diminution.

N Executor flould notify the heirs, or perfons interest L ed in a will, of the day he intends to offer it for particular to offer i bate, that they may have opportunity to conteff the proba thereof, if they fee caufe : otherwife the Judge may 1 obliged to postpone proving the will, and to cite the heir An executor, knowing of his appointment, must caufe th will to be proved within thirty days after the death of th teftator, or prefent the faid will to the Probate Court, at in writing declare his refufal : otherwife he may be ful jected to a heavy fine. When a perfon dies inteflate, th widow, or next of kin to the deceafed, (if of age) should within thirty days, take out a letter of administration, or i writing decline the truft. Guardians muft be appointed t minors, before the effate is diffributed, and before the ac count of administration is allowed. When executors an administrators are prepared to exhibit their accounts of ac ministration to the Judge for allowance, they should invar. ably notify the perfons interefted therein, or their guardian: to be prefent in Court at the examination thereof; unlet the heirs and guardians will previoufly examine the account to be exhibited, and will certify thereon their approbatio: of it. This method may fave much trouble and expense The fame fleps fhould be taken with creditors, when an el tate is infolvent : that is, they muft be notified as aforefaid or they muft certify as aforefaid. Administrators who will not to account with the Judge of Probate for the perfona eftate of the deceafed, as the fame shall be appraifed, should give notice thereof, at the time they return the inventory and then obtain an order for the fale of the whole, or fucl part thereof, as the Judge shall direct ; and the heirs alfo if they apprehend the perfonal effate is appraifed too low fhould reprefent the fame to the Judge, and request 10 have it fold at public auction, or at private fale, as will bed ferry the interest of all perfons concerned.

A Defcription of the Eaftern Coaft of the County of Barnstable, from Cape-Cod, or Race-Point, in lat. 42° 5', to Cape-Malebarre, or the Sandy Point of Chatham, in lat. 41° 33'; pointing out the Spots on which the 'Trultees of the Humane Society have erected Huts, and other Places where shipwrecked Seamen may look for Shelter. By a Member of the Humane Society.

THE curvature of the fhore, on the welt fide of Provincetown, and fouth of Race-Point, is called Herring-Cove, which is three miles in length. There is good anchoring ground here; and veffels may ride fafely in four or five fathoms of water, when the wind is from north-eaft to fouth-caft.

On Race-Point fland about a dozen fifhing-huts, containing fire-places and other conveniences. The diffance from thefe huts to Provincetown, which lies on Cape-Ccd harbour, is three miles. The paffage is over a fandy beach, without grafs or any other vegetable growing on it, to the woods, through which is a winding road to the town. It would be difficult, if not impoffible, for a firanger to find his way thither in the dark; and the woods are fo full cf ponds and entangling fivamps, that if the road was miffed, deftruction would probably be the confequence of attempting to penetrate them in the night.

Not far from Race-Point commences a ridge, which extends to the head of Stout's Creek. With the face to the eaft, on the left hand of the ridge is the fandy thore; on the right is a narrow fandy valley; beyond which is naked fand, reaching to the hills and woods of Provincetown. This ridge is well covered with beach grafs; and appears to owe its exiftence to that vegetable. Beach grafs, during the fpring and fummer, grows about two feet and a half. If furrounded by naked beach, the florms of autumn and winter heap up the fand on all fides, and caufe it to rife nearly to the top of the plant. In the enfuing fpring, the grafs fprouts anew; is again covered with fand in the winter; and thus a hill or ridge continues to afcend, as long as there is a fufficient bafe to fupport it, or till the circumferibing fand, being alfo covered with beach grafs, will no longer yield to the force of the winds.

On this ridge, half way between Race-Point and the head of Stout's Creek, the Truffees of the Humane Society have erected a hut. It flands a mile from Peaked Hill, a landmark well known to feamen, and is about two miles and a half from Race-Point. Seamen, caft away on this part of the coaft, will find a fhelter here; and in north-caft florms, fhould they firike to the leeward of it, and be unable to turn their faces to the windward, by patfing on to Race-Point, they will foon come to the fifthing-huts before mentioned.

At the head of Stout's Creek the Truftees have built a fecond hur. Stout's Creek is a fmall branch of Eaft-Harbour in Truro. Many years ago there was a body of falt marfh on it; and it then deferved the name of a creek is but the marfh was long fince deftroyed; and the creek now fearcely exifts, appearing only like a fmall depreffion in the fand, and being entirely dry at half tide. The creek runs from north-weft to fouth-caff, and is nearly parallel with the fhore on the ocean, from which it is at no great diftance. Not far from it, the hills of Provincetown terminate; and fhould not the hut be found, by walking round the head of the creek, with the face to the weft, the hills on the right hand, and keeping clofe to the fhore on the harbour, in lefs than an hour the fhipwrecked feamen would ecreme to Provincetown.

The Humane Society, feveral years ago, erefted a hut at the head of Stour's Creek : but it was built in an improper manner, having a chimney in it ; and was placed on a fpot where no beach grafs grew. The ftrong winds blew the fand from its foundation, and the weight of the chimney brought it to the ground ; fo that in January of the prefent year, it was entirely demolifhed. This event took place about fix weeks before the Brurus was caft away. If it had remained, it is probable that the whole of the unfortunate crew of that fhip would have been faved, as they gained the fhore a few rods only from the fpot where the hut had flood. The but now crefted flands on a place covered with beach grafs. To prevent any accident from happening to it, or to the other hut near Feaked Hill, the Truffices have focured the attention of feveral gentlemen in the neighbourhood. Dr. Thaddeus Brown, and Capt. Thomas Smalley, of Provincetown, have engaged to infpeß both huts, to fee that they are fupplied with flraw or hay in the autumn, that the doors and windows are kept flut, and that repairs are made, when neceffary. The Rev. Mr. Danon, of Truro, has alfo promified to vifit the hut at Stout's Creek twice or thrice in a year ; and the Rev. Mr. Whitman, of Wellfleet, diftinguifhed through the county for his aftivity and benevolence, has undertaken, though remote from the place, the fame charge.

From the head of Stour's Creek to the termination of the falt marsh, which lies on both fides, and at the head of East-Harbour River, the diffance is about three miles and a half. A narrow beach leparates this river from the ocean. It is not fo regular a ridge as that before deferibed, as there are on it one or two hills, which the neighbouring inhabitants call Iflands. It may, without much difficulty, be croffed every where, except over these elevations. By these hills, even during the night, the beach may be diffinguished from those hereafter to be mentioned. It lies from north-weft to fouth-east, and is in most parts covered with beach grafs. The hills have a few fhrubs on the declivities next the river. At the end of the marfh the beach fubfides a little; and there is an eafy paffage into a valley, in which are fituated two or three dwelling-houfes. The first on the left hand, or fouth, is a few rods only from the ocean.

The fhore, which extends from this valley to Race-Point, is unquefitionably the part of the coaft the moft expoled to fhipwrecks. A north-eaft florm, the moft violent and fatal to learnen, as it is frequently accompanied with flow, blows directly on the land : a flrong current fets along the flore : add to which, that fhips, during the operation of fuch a florm, endeavour to work to the northward, that they may get into the bay. Should they be unable to weather Race-Point, the wind drives them on the flore, and a flipwreck is inevitable. Accordingly, the flrand is every where covered with the fragments of velfels. Huts, therefore, placed within a mile of each other, have been thought neceffary by many judicious perfors. To this opinion the Truffeeo are difpoled to pay due refpect; and hereafter, if the funds of the Society increase, new huts will be built here for the relief of the unfortunate.

From the valley above mentioned the land rifes, and lefs than a mile from it the High-Land commences. On the first elevated fpot, the Clay-Pounds, stands the light-houfe. The fhore here turns to the fouth ; and the High-Land extends to the Table-Land of Eastham. This High-Land approaches the ocean with fleep and lofty banks, which it is extremely difficult to climb, efpecially in a florm. In vio-lent tempefts, during very high tides, the fea breaks againfl the foot of them, rendering it then unfafe to walk on the ftrand, which lies between them and the ocean. Should the feaman fucceed in his attempt to afcend them, he mufi forbear to penetrate into the country, as houfes are generally fo remote, that they would efcape his refearch during the night : he must pass on to the vallies, by which the banks are interfected. These vallies, which the inhabitants call Hollows, run at right angles with the fhore; and in the middle, or loweft part of them, a road leads from the dwelling-houfes to the fea.

The first of these vallies is Dyer's Hollow, a mile and a half fouth of the light-house. It is a wide opening, being two hundred rods broad from fummit to fummit. In it stands a dwelling-house, a quarter of a mile from the beach.

A mile and a half fouth of Dyer's Hollow, is a fecond valley, called Harding's Hollow. At the entrance of this valley, the fand has gathered; fo that at prefent a little climbing is necellary. Paffing over feveral fences, and taking heed not to enter the wood on the right hand, at the diffance of three quarters of a mile, a houle is to be found. This houfe flands on the fouth fide of the road; and not far from it, on the fouth, is Pamet River, which runs from eaft to weft through a body of falt marfh.

The third valley, a half of a mile fouth of Harding's Hollow, is Head of Pamet-Hollow. It may with eafe be diffinguifhed from the other hollows mentioned, as it is a wide opening, and leads immediately over a beach to the falt marth at the head of Pamet-River. In the middl of the hollow, the fand has been raifed by a brufh fence, carried acrofs it from north to fouth. This muft be palled; and the fbipwrecked mariner will foon come to a fence, which feparates what is called the Road from the Marfh. If he turns to the left hand, or fouth, at the diffance of a quarter of a mile, he will diffeover a houfe. If he turns to the right ind, at the diffance of half a mile, he will find the fame oule which is mentioned in the foregoing paragraph.

The fourth opening, three quarters of a mile fouth of lead of Pamet, is Brufh-Valley. This hollow is narrow, id climbing is neceffary. Entering it, and inclining to the sht, three quarters of a mile will bring feamen to the oule, which is fituated at the Head of Pamet. By proceedg fitaight forward, and paffing over rifing ground, another oule may be diffeovered, but with more difficulty.

These three hollows, lying near together, ferve to desigate each other. Either of them may be used ; but Head Pamet-Hollow is the fafest.

South of Brufh-Valley, at the diffance of three miles, tere is a fifth opening, called Newcomb's Hollow, eaft of the head of Herring-River in Wellfleet. This valley is a parter of a mile wide. On the north fide of it, near the tore, flands a fifthing-hut.

Between the two laft vallies the bank is very high and eep. From the edge of it, well, there is a larip of land, a undred yards in breadth : then fucceeds low bruthwood, quarter of a mile wide, and almost impalable ; after thich comes a thick, perplexing foreft, in which not a ouf is to be different comment, therefore, though the iftance between thefe two vallies is great, muft not attempt a enter the wood, as in a fnew-florm they would undoubtdly perifh. This place, fo formidable in defeription, will, owever, lofe fomewhat of its terror, when it is obferved, nat no inflance of a fnipwreck on this part of the coast is iccollected by the oldert inhabitants of Wellfleet.

Half of a mile fourh of Newcomb's Hollow, is the fixth alley, called Pearce's Hollow. It is a finall valley. A oufe flands at the diffance of a little more than a quarter f a mile from the beach, well by fourh.

The feventh valley is Cohoon's Hollow, a half of a mile buth of Pearce's Hollow. It is not very wide. Welt om the entrance, feveral houles may be found, at the difnce of a mile. This hollow lies easi by north from Welleet meeting-houfe.

Two miles fouch of Cohoon's Hollow, the eighth valley, Snow's Hollow. It is fmaller than the laft. Weft om the fhore, at the diffance of a quarter of a mile, is the county road, which goes round the head of Black-Fifth reek. Paffing through this valley to the force which parares the road from the upland and marfh at the head O of the creek, a houfe will immediately be found, by tuing to the right hand, or north. There are houfes also the left, but more remote.

The High-Land gradually fublides here, and a mile t a half fouth terminates at the ninth valley, called Fre Brook Hollow, in which a houfe is to be found a r from the fhore, weft.

The tenth, two miles and a half fouth from Frefh-Brc Hollow, is Plum-Valley, about three hundred yards wi Weft is a houfe, three quarters of a mile diftant.

Between these two vallies is the Table-Land.

After this, there is no hollow of importance, to Ca-Malebarre.

From Frefh-Brook Hollow to the commencement Naufet Beach, the bank next the ocean is about fixty f high. There are houfes fcattered over the plain, of country; but none of them are nearer than a mile to fhore. In a florm of wind and rain, they might be c cerned by day-light; but in a fnow-florm, which rages h with exceffive fury, it would be almost impossible to c cover them either by night or by day.

Not far from this fhore, fouth, the Truftees have ereE a third hut, on Naufet Beach. Naufet Beach begins in 1 itude 41° 51', and extends fouth to latitude 41° 41'. I divided into two parts by a breach, which the ocean 1 made through it. This breach is the mouth of Naufet Stage Harbour; and from the opening the beach exter north two miles and a quarter, till it joins the main lar It is about a furlong wide, and forms Naufet Harbour, whi is of little value, its entrance being obstructed by a b This northern part of the beach may be diffinguifhed fre the fouthern part, by its being of a lefs regular form. Ston have made frequent irruptions through the ridge, on whi On an elevated part of the beac beach grafs grows. flands the hut, about a mile and a half north of the mou of Nauset Harbour. Eastham meeting-house lies from weft fouth-weft, diffant a mile and three quarters. T meeting-houfe is without a fleeple; but it may be diffi guifhed from the dwelling-houles near it by its fituatio which is between two fmall groves of locufts, one on the fouth, and one on the north, that on the fouth being thr times as long as the other. About a mile and a quarter fro the hut, well by north, appear the top and arms of a win

The fouthern part of Naufet Beach, most commonly call-Chatham Beach, and by a few perfores Potanum aquut sch, begins at the mouth of Naufel Harbour, and extends ht or nine miles fouth to the mouth of Chatham Herbour. is about fifty rods wide. A regular, well formed ridge, ich, in the most elevated part of it, is forty feet high, is the whole length of it; and, with the exception of a r foots, is covered with beach grafs. This beach forms barrier of Chathaen Harbour, which from Strong Ifland th receives the name of Pleafant Bay. A mile fouth of entrance of Naufet Harbour, it joins the main land of leans, except in very high tides, when the fea flows from north-eaftern arm of Pleafant Bay into the harbour of ufet, completely infulating the beach. By those, who acquinted with the fhallow, it may be fafely forded at time; but frangers must not venture to pais it, when ered with water ; as below, the channel is feven feet deep. this beach, about half way between the entrances of afet and Chatham Harbours, the Truffees have erefted a th hut. The fpot feleded is a narrow part of the beach. the weft, the water adjoining it is called Bafs Hole. : Marsh is north and south of it next the beach, but is e interrupted. Orleans meeting-house lies from it north-1. The meeting-house is without a fleeple, and is not 1; but it is very near a windmill placed on an elevated and, a confpicuous object to feamen coming on the coaft. may be neceffary to add, that there are three windmills Drleans forming a femicircle ; that the mill referred to, n the right hand, or north-caft point; and that the mill the middle point of the femicircle flands on flill higher und. The meeting-house of Chatham is situated from it th-weft. This meeting-houfe is alfo without a fleeple, is concealed by Great-Hill, a noted landmark. The appears with two fummits, which are a quarter of a mile t. The hut lies east from Sampson's Island in Pleafant Timo by Bafcom, Efg. of Orleans, has undertaken 7. ufpect this hut.

eff fearren fhould mift this but, by fluiking to the ward of it, the Truffees have erected another on the ic beach. It flands a mile north of the mouth of whan Hacboun, cafl of the meeting-houfe, and opposite tews. Another foot on the fame beach would be a proper fitution for a hut. It is north of the fourth hut, and eafle the middle of Pochet-Ifland. The higheft part of the ridg is near it, fouth. A break in the ridge, over which the fe appears fometimes to have flowed, divides this high pafrom the northern portion of the beach.

On the beach of Cape-Malebarre, or the Sandy Point Chatharn, the Truftees have built a fixth hut. This bear ftretches from Chatham, ten miles into the lea, toward Na tucket; and is from a quarter to three quarters of a mile breadth. It is continually gaining fouth : above three mil have been added to it during the paft fifty years. On the east fide of the beach is a curve in the shore, called Ster art's Bend, where veffels may anchor with fafety, in thr or four fathoms of water, when the wind blows from nor to fourh-weft. North of the Bend there are feveral bi and fhoals. A little below the middle of the beach, on t weft fide, is Wreck-Cove, which is navigable for boats onl The hut flands two hundred yards from the ocean, fout east from the entrance of Wreck-Cove, a half of a mi Between the mouth of the cove and hut, is Stewart's Kno an elevated part of the beach. The diffance of the h from the commencement of the beach is fix miles, and fro its termination four. Great-Hill in Chatham bears nor by welt, diftant fix miles; and the fouth end of Morri Illand, which is on the weft fide of the beach, north by ea diftant four miles. Richard Sears, Elg. of Chatham, h engaged to vifit the two laft mentioned huts.

Two miles below the fixth hut is a fifting-houfe, built thatch, in the form of a wigwam. It flands on the weft fi of the beach, a quarter of a mile from the ocean. Ann ally in September it is renewed; and generally remains tolerable prefervation during the winter.

Another fpot, a few rods from the fea, four miles fou from the commencement of the beach, and a half of a m north of the head of Wreck-Cove, would be a proper fi ation for a hut. A little fouth of this fpot, in florms a very high tides, the fea breaks over from the ocean in Wreck-Cove.

Cape-Malebarre beach may be diffinguished from 1 two beaches before defcribed, not only by its greater bread but also by its being of a lefs regular form. It is not well covered with grafs as Chatham Beach. From Ste are's Knoll, feach, to the extremity, it is loweft in the mildle. In this valley, and in other low places, frefh water may be obtained, by digging two feet into the fund. The fame thing is true of Naufet and Chatham Beaches.

The fix buts, the fituation of which h s thus been pointed out, are all of one fize and fitupe. Each hut flands on piles, is eight feet long, eight feet wide, and feven feet bigh ; a fiding door is on the fouth, a fliding flutter on the weft, and a pole, rifting fifteen feet above the top of the building, on the coft. Within, it is fupplied either with flraw or hay; and is farther accommodated with a bench.

The whole of the coaft, from Cape-Cod to Cape-Malebarre, is fandy, and free from rocks. Along the fhore, at the diffance of a half of a mile, is a bar; which is called the Outer Bar, becaufe there are finaller bars within it, perpetually varying. This outer bar is feparated into many parts by guzzles, or finall channels. It extends to Chatham; and as it proceeds fouthward, gradually approaches the fhore, and grows more fhallow. It's general depth at high water is two fathoms, and three fathoms over the guzzles; and its least distance from the shore is about a furlong. Off the mouth of Chatham Harbour, there are bars which reach three quarters of a mile ; and off the entrance of Naufet Harbour, the bars extend a half of a mile. Large, heavy flips flrike on the outer bar, even at high water ; and their fragments only reach the fhore : but imaller veffels pafs over it at full lea; and when they touch at low water, they beat over it, as the tide rifes, and feen come to the land. If a veffel is caff away at low water, it ought to be left with as much expedition as poffible ; becaufe the fury of the waves is then checked, in fome meafure, by the bar; and becaufe the veffel is generally broken to pieces with the riling flood. But feamen, flipwrecked at full fea, ought to remain on board till near low water ; for the veffel does not then break to pieces; and by attempting to reach the land before the tide ebbs away, they are in great danger of being drowned. On this fubject there is one opinion only among judicious mariners. It may be necellary however to remind them of a truth, of which they have full conviction, but which, amidfl the agitation and terror of a florin, they too frequently forget.

No goods, wares or merchandize, of foreign growth or manufacture, fubject to the payment of duties, to be brought into the United States from any foreign port or place in any other manner than by *fea*; nor in any fhip or veffel of lefs than *thirty tons burthen*,—except in certain diffricts on the Northern, North-Weffern and Weffern boundaries of the United States.

No merchandize to be imported in any veffel belonging in whole or in part to a citizen or inhabitant of the United States, unlefs the mafter of fuch veffel fhall have on board a Manifeft in writing, figued by fuch mafter, or other perfon having the command, containing the name of the port or place where fuch merchandize were received, and the port where configned or defined to, within the United States, particularly noting the merchandize defined for each port refpectively; and every package on board fuch veffel to be particularly deferibed ;—to whom configned, or if to order, with the names of all patfengers, diffinguifhing whether cabin or fleerage paffengers, or both, with their baggage, and an account of all remaining fea-flores, (if any.)

"No fhip or veffel from foreign ports, or coming by fea from any port of the United States, fhall be permitted to report, make entry, or break bulk, till the mafter fhall deliver to the poft-mafter all letters under his care or within his power, other than fuch as are directed to the owner or owners of fuch fhip or veffel, and on oath or affirmation, to be taken of fuch delivery, the mafter to receive two cents for every letter fo delivered."

Allowance for Leakage and Breakage.

And in rder to obtain fuch bounty, the exporter to make an entry servefor with the collector—but no entry will be received here fuch pickled fifh or falted provisions have *not been invected* and *marked*, agreeable to the laws of the refpective tates, where fuch laws are in force. Such bounty is payable if is months from the date of the bond to be given; and in 0 cafe, unlefs the certificates of landing at a foreign port, as other cafes, are produced. GFNERAL INFORMATION.

The want of certificates of diffilled fpirits, wines or teas, jeft fuch articles to feizure, and fifty dollars fine, if fuch rificates are not delivered to the purchafer; and if any k, cheft, veffel or cafe, containing fuch articles, fhall be und in due policifion of any perfon, without being marked, and not being accompanied with a certificate, the fame is lible to feizure.

On the fale of any cafk, &c. which has been marked, the marks to be defaced in prefence of fome officer of infpetion or cuftoms; and the certificate of the fame to be delivered up, under penalty of one hundred dollars, with configure

Goods from foreign ports, not to be unladen but betwee fun-rife and fun-fet, without fpecial licenfe, under a penal of four hundred dollars on the mafter, and every other pe fon concerned, difability from holding any office under ti government of the United States for feven years, and h ing advertifed in the newfpapers, with forfeiture of tl goods; and if above four hundred dollars, value of vefl and apparel.

Perfons giving or offering a bribe, forfeit from two hu dred to two thouland dollars. Infpectors and officers revenue cutters may go on board, examine and fearch veffe hwe accefs to the cabin, and feal packages; and after funt fecure hatches, &c. Perfons in charge of veffels, for breaing fattenings, but in prefence of an officer, forfeit ty hundred dollars.

Officers may feize within or without their diffricts. Pe fons refifting or impeding them, forfeit four hundr dollars.

The mafter or commander of any veffel, that fhall c fluct or hinder (or be the caufe thereof) any officer the revenue, in going on board his fhip or veffel, for t purpole of carrying into effect any of the revenue la of the United States, forfeits from fifty to five hundr dollars.

Every owner of a veffel, refiding within the limits of t United States, to fwear to the register within *ninety days*: ter its being granted, or it becomes void, and the veffel a cargo pays foreign tonnage and duty.

Returned Cargo.

(If any articles of an outward cargo are brought back, U are to be detailed, Jpecified by whom shipped outward, and whom configued inward.)

For the Information of Merchants in the Diffria of Bofton and Charlestown.

A LL bonds given on the exportation of inerchandize, entitled to a drawback, muft be put in fuit as they become due, unlefs by prior application to the Comptroller, longer time fhall be given to procure the neceffary evidence that the merchandize exported was landed in a foreign port, captured or loft.

That no document of landing metchandize in a foreign port, entitled to a drawback, can be received, however regular, after the bond becomes due, unleft fatisfactory reafons are affigned for the detzy.

That the exporter of all falted provisions and pickled fifth, entitled to bounty, cannot claim it, unlefs the evidence of the delivery of the fifth and provisions, in a foreign port, is teniered before his bond, given at the time of exportation, becomes due, excepting in those cales where faitsfactory reaions are affigued for the delay, or a further time granted by he Computeller for obtaining evidence of the landing of the provisions or fifth, in a foreign port.

That no debenine can be iffied on the exportation of merchandize, unless the exporter that, within ten days after the clearance of the vefiel, complete those papers which the law makes neceffary to his being enricled to a drawback.

Should any merchant in this diffrict be conficious that he ns bonds in the Cuflom-Houfe, now due, given on the exportation of merchandize, or of pickled fifth, or falted provifpus, he will confider how interefling it is to him, to have hem cancelled without farther delay.

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
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
