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THE POLLARD FAMILY.

The families of Pollard in America are descended from at least two New England stocks. Savage* mentions three early settlers of this name, one of whom, George Pollard of Salem (whose will was proved Jan. 31, 1646), probably left no descendants. William Pollard of Boston had a large family, among whom were the following sons: (1) John, 1644, who had William, 1671; John, 1673, and Samuel, 1680. (2) Samuel, 1646. (3) William, 1653, who had William, 1690. (4) Joseph, 1657. (5) Benjamin, 1663. (6) Jonathan, 1666, who had Benjamin, 1696. (7) David, 1668. Ann —, wife of this William Pollard, was the girl who was in the first boat that crossed Charles river in 1630 to what is now Boston and was the first to jump ashore. Her portrait, painted in 1721, at the age of 100, is preserved in the collection of the Massachusetts Historical society, and a print of it appeared in Harper's Weekly some years ago. We have not attempted to trace the later history of this branch of the family, which, so far as records show, is not related to our own.

The second New England family of Pollard is that descended from Thomas Pollard, who settled in Billerica in 1692. Of this family Savage,† after naming the children, remarks, "We must in vain regret that dates are not given." Later investigations by Hazen‡ and others have brought to light the records of the early generations, from which we have been able to trace the relation of our own branch of the family. From the place of settlement and sojourn of the early family we may speak of the family as

THE BILLERICA POLLARDS.

The early members of this family, so far as we can learn, belonged to the honest yeomanry of New England. Industrious, intelligent and patriotic, they formed a part of that strong middle class from which has originated much of the brain and brawn that has effected the later development of the country. From early times the family has manifested a military spirit. Thomas Pollard, the first of the name in America, was in the Indian wars early in the eighteenth century. Numerous descendants were in the French and Indian

war and the Revolution, and the first man to fall at Bunker Hill was Asa Pollard* (John Thomas), a grandson of Thomas Boston of Billerica, Mass.

WILLIAM POLLARD of Coventry, Warwickshire, England is the earliest ancestor to whom we can trace our line back beyond. So far as we know, he lived and died at that place during the latter part of the seventeenth century. A search of the probate records concerning wills probably yield some facts concerning him. It is known that he married Mary Farmer, daughter of John Farmer and Elizabeth, nee Mary Oliver, of the same county. The sons and daughters of William Pollard were as follows: William, John, Elizabeth, Nathaniel, Thomas, Joseph and James. William and Nathaniel lived in England; John, Elizabeth, Joseph and James in Coventry.

THOMAS POLLARD (William's) was the first of this line who lived in America. He removed to Billerica in the province of Massachusetts Bay, about 1692 and purchased the "piece and right" which had been William Hale's, near the ford of the river, and received in 1708 a grant of thirty acres between the road to the millway and the road which turns east from it. Nov. 6, 1692, he married Sarah, daughter of Edward Farmer,⁸ who was a brother of Mary Farmer, mentioned above. Thomas Pollard and his wife were therefore only second cousins. Their children, born at Billerica, were as follows:

*In a 1899 description of the events of the battle Colonel William Prescott says of Asa Pollard: "He was so brave that not my soldiers were besmeared with his blood and brains, which I would not in some other case with a handful of fresh earth. The sight was so shocking to many of the men that they left their posts and ran to view him. I immediately tried to be taken prisoner. A subaltern officer expressed surprise that I would allow him to be taken without leaving prayers said. I replied: 'This is the time to pray; has been killed' and the only one that will be buried today. God will provide what to bury many of us will fall before it is over."

Thomas Farmer, the early genealogist of New England, makes this note on his grandson and names "Mr. Isabella Wassell was wife of John Farmer of Ansley, in the county of Warwickshire, and came to this country with some of her children after her death, which occurred prior to 1699. It appears from original papers that she was a sister of Mrs. Thomas Moulton, of Wykin, and afterward of Brinklow, England. She married Mr. Thomas Wassell, whose she acquired the name." She died at Billerica, Mass., March 24, 1692.

Billerica is a small town located about twenty miles northwest of Boston. It was originally a part of Cambridge, from which it was set off as a distinct town in 1786.

Edward Farmer came to Billerica probably in 1671. "His house lot was on the east side of Long street and remained in possession of the family until a recent year. The house was a garrison." Mr. Farmer died May 27, 1727, aged about 87. His wife, Mary died March 26, 1719, aged 77.

Edward had his only son (1733-1810) was a soldier in the Revolution. Of his four grandsons bearing his name Edward and Jeremiah lived in Vermont, and Jonathan and William lived in Billerica. A grandson of Jonathan, Rev. George Adams Pollard (Bowdoin 1810), was a missionary A. B. C. F. M. in Asiatic Turkey, 1856-1867, and now lives in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Thomas Pollard served in the Indian wars (1706). Two and possibly three of his sons and four grandsons were in the service during the wars with the French and Indians, and four grandsons and at least four great-grandsons were in the Revolutionary war. Thomas Pollard died intestate§ April 4, 1724. A little more than a year later his wife, Sarah, died (May 3, 1725).

RECORD OF THE FAMILY OF WILLIAM POLLARD³ OF LANCASTER, MASS.

WILLIAM POLLARD³ (Thomas², William¹) was born at Billerica, Mass., Aug. 3, 1698, and settled in early manhood in Lancaster, Mass. He was there married by the Rev. John Prentice on Nov. 23, 1726, to Experience Wheeler, a descendant of Resolved White, who came to America on the Mayflower with his father, William White, in 1620. William Pollard³ was a farmer and, with his father-in-law, Josiah Wheeler, and others, was one

†The will of an Oliver Pollard of Bedford proved in 1831 is recorded in the Middlesex probate.

‡His family consisted of three sons and four daughters. His son Benjamin was one of the minute men at Lexington and later served at Saratoga and Bennington.

§The settlement of his property devolved upon his oldest son, Edward. Among the interesting papers connected with the settlement and preserved in the Middlesex probate records (No. 12690) are the inventories of the estate, selections of guardians for the minor children and a receipt signed by the widow and the children, Edward, Barbary [sic], William, John, Josep [sic] and Oliver and by representatives of the remaining children. Among the items in the list of expenses are "Funeral charges for father, £23 5s. 9d.; funeral charges for mother, £15 15s. 4d. 6 far."

Josiah Wheeler, father of Experience Wheeler (born 1708), was a son of Obadiah Wheeler, Jr., of Concord, Mass., who married Elizabeth White in Concord, Mass., July 17, 1672. Elizabeth White was daughter of Resolved White, born in Leyden, Holland, 1614, who came to Plymouth in the Mayflower with his father, William White, one of the signers of the Compact on the Mayflower in 1620. Resolved White married April 8, 1640, Judith Vassal, daughter of William Vassal, deputy governor of Massachusetts Bay Colony and son of Captain John Vassal, alderman of London, England, who commanded his own vessel in the fight with the Spanish armada off the coast of England in the reign of Queen Elizabeth.

of the founders of the town of Bolton (1738), which was taken from the eastern part of Lancaster. Their children were as follows:

OLIVER POLLARD¹ (William², Thomas³, William⁴) was born Sept. 8, 1727, at Lancaster, Mass., and was married to Mary Townsend by the Rev. Thomas Goss in Bolton, Mass., Oct. 25 (N. S.), 1759. It is certain that four children were born to them in Bolton, as follows:

Oliver Pollard¹ was a soldier in the French and Indian wars. The records appear to show that he served in Captain Jeduthan Baldwin's company in the Crown Point expedition in 1755; in Captain John Carter's company in the second Crown Point expedition in 1758, and in Captain Ephraim Wilder's company in 1748. He died (probably in Bolton) Jan. 18, 1812, aged 84 years and 9 months. Mary, his wife, died Sept. 2, 1813, aged 73 years and 6 months. Asa Pollard, who was the first man killed in the battle of Bunker Hill, was a cousin of this Oliver Pollard.

OLIVER POLLARD¹ (Oliver², William³, Thomas⁴, William⁵) was born in the town of Bolton, Mass., Dec. 4, 1766, and was married to Rhoda Longley in Bolton Aug. 27, 1789, by the Rev. Phineas Wright. The following children were born to them:

Oliver Pollard¹ moved to the town of Waterford, Me., about the year 1801. He then moved to Augusta and after a few years to Turner and from there to

Auburn, Me., where he died in June, 1851, aged 84 years and 6 months. He engaged extensively in business enterprises as a merchant, saw and grist mill operator, tavern keeper and farmer. In Turner he conducted a saw and grist mill and in Auburn a store and tavern. He was a commissioned officer of the Sixth division, First brigade, Maine militia, from 1810 to 1822, with the rank of major and division inspector. He served in the war of 1812 as brigade quartermaster of the First brigade, Massachusetts militia, called into the United States service for the defense of the town of Portland in 1814. He became a member of Trinity lodge, A. F. and A. M. (now in Clinton, Mass.) Sept. 5, 1797. He was one of the petitioners (March 9, 1811) to the grand lodge of Massachusetts for the charter of Oriental Star lodge of Livermore, Me. Tranquil lodge of Auburn, Me., was organized in his house in Minot (now Auburn) March 18, 1818, and he was selected the first master. He was also chosen master of this lodge in 1819 and in 1847. In 1820 he served as grand junior deacon of the grand lodge of the state of Maine. The historian of Tranquil lodge speaks of him as follows: "Bro. Oliver Pollard was one of the most active members of this lodge, contributing liberally of time and money to the advancement of Masonry. He possessed such ease and dignity of manner, combined with a correct knowledge of the lectures, that he could not fail to instruct the more advanced and interest the late initiate. * * * His interest did not wane with declining years, but he was very constant in attendance so long as his health would permit." Rhoda, his wife, died June 9, 1851, aged 83.

STEPHEN POLLARD⁹ (Oliver⁸, Oliver⁴, William³, Thomas², William¹) was born in Bolton, Mass., Jan. 26, 1790, and was married (probably in Turner, Me.) on March 5, 1809, to Emmelia Cary, b. March 13, 1789, who was a direct descendant from Pilgrim John Alden.* Her father, Dr. Luther Cary, was a soldier in the war of the Revolution. Children born to Stephen Pollard and Emmelia Cary were as follows:

Stephen Pollard⁹ had charge of his father's sawmill in Turner for a few years and about 1815 purchased and moved on to a farm in the town of Liver-

more, Me., where he lived until about four years previous to his death, which occurred in July, 1853, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Rebecca Ann Leavitt, in Livermore. He was a man of varied pursuits, a farmer, a fiddler, a dancing master and a horse trainer. He was fond of reading and possessed more books than were usually found in the households of that day. His wife, Emma Cary Pollard, died in 1869 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Rebecca Ann Leavitt.

Stephen Pollard⁷ removed to Belmont, N. Y., from Livermore, Me., in the spring of 1859. His family, consisting of his wife and daughter Julia, joined him in the fall of the same year. He built a house in that part of the town of Amity known as Maineville, near Belmont, where he lived until his death in 1899. His occupation was that of a farmer, and his farm is now owned by his son, William A. Pollard.
