

#### STAMP DUTIES.

ACT 17 & 18 VICT., CAP. 83. DATED AUGUST 9, 1854.

## HINTS RELATING TO SOME FEW POINTS USEFUL IN MERCANTILE TRANSACTIONS.

Copies of Letters referred to in the following Remarks are given pages ix., &c., and numbered consecutively.

#### I.—FOREIGN BILLS OF EXCHANGE.

1.—Bills drawn in, but payable out of the United Kingdom. If purporting to be drawn in a set, the whole number must be issued and stamped, under a penalty of £100, and persons knowing that the whole set is not drawn, and receiving the same, are deprived of all title to recover. Sec. 6. Does not apply to No. 3 below.—Vide letter of T. Keogh, Inland Revenue, 16th October, in Times, 18th October, 1854. (Letter No. 1.)

2.—Bills drawn out of, but payable in the United Kingdom. Only that bill of the set which is negotiated or paid needs a stamp, but that Stamp must be to the full amount of the Bill. Vide letter of T. Keogh, 3d November, in Times, November 6th, 1854. (Letter

No. 4.)

Penalty for negotiating such a Bill without a Stamp, or not effacing it, £50; and a party receiving such a Bill cannot make it avail-

able for any purposes. Sec. 5.

3.—Bills drawn abroad endorsed to parties in the United Kingdom, but payable abroad, must be stamped as if they were drawn in England and payable abroad. See Schedule, Sec. 3.—Vide illustration in letter of T. Keogh, Times, October 19th, 1854. (Letter No. 3.)

4.—A Bill remitted to a Merchant, drawn upon himself, must be stamped, even though it should never leave his hands, or it would be unavailable as evidence.—Vide Economist, 16th September, 1854.

#### II.-INLAND BILLS OF EXCHANGE.

The difference in Duty on Bills under and above 2 months' date and 60 days' sight is now abolished. - Vide Schedule.

#### III.—CHEQUES.

1.—Unstamped Drafts on Bankers not to be circulated beyond 15 miles in a direct line from the place where payable, under a penalty of £50.

It has been held, however, that Cheques, though drawn beyond that distance, if presented by the Drawer or his Servant, and not paid away, require no stamp.—Sugar. 21st Man 1847

paid away, require no stamp.—Swan, 21st May, 1847.
2.—A Cheque payable to A B or his order (viz., not the bearer),

though not sent beyond the said distance, must be stamped.

3.—Unstamped Cheques lawfully issued within 15 miles may be remitted beyond said limit, on affixing and cancelling a proper adhesive Stamp. Sec. 8.
4.—Cheques on Bankers may be issued for less than £1. Sec. 9.

Although prohibited by 17 Geo. III., Cap. 30.

#### IV.—DRAFTS.

1.—A penny adhesive "Receipt Stamp may be used for a "Draft," without regard to the word "Receipt" written on it. Sec. 10.

2.—A letter to a Debtor requesting him to pay what he owes the writer to the bearer, the writer's clerk, does not require to be stamped. *Economist*, 21st October, 1854.

#### V.—RECEIPTS.

1.—The word "Receipt" is made of much wider signfication than hitherto. The exemption of letters acknowledging receipt of Bills, &c., is repealed, but receipt for monies paid to the Crown still exempted. Sec. 13 and 14.

2.—A penny adhesive "Draft" Stamp may be used for a "Receipt"

without regard to the word "Draft" written upon it. Sec. 10.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

All Bills, Drafts and Notes, which are deemed by the Acts to be Bank Notes, excepting Bank of England Notes, are to be liable to the Stamp Duty. Sec. 12.

Instruments liable to Stamp Duty are to be admitted in evidence

in any criminal proceedings, although not stamped. Sec. 27.

Two Stamps, making together full amount of Duty, may be affixed instead of one of the required value. Vide letter of Chairman of Inland Revenue, Times, 18th October, 1854. Vide same letter for Remarks on Cancellation of Stamps. (Letter No. 2.)

Receipts given to manufacturers by their own workmen in pass-books, require to be stamped.—Vide letter of T. Keogh, 29th Nov.,

in Times of 1st December. (Letter No. 5.)

#### COPIES OF LETTERS REFERRED TO IN ABOVE "HINTS."

No. 1. From Times of 18th October.

Inland Revenue, Somerset-house, London, Oct. 16. Sir,—I have to refer to the Board's communication to you, dated the 28th of August last, in answer to your letter of the 26th, containing several questions relative to the Stamp Act, 17 and 18 Victoria c. 83, in which communication it was stated that section 6

of the act applies to foreign bills drawn and payable abroad, if nego-

tiated in the United Kingdom.

I beg leave to acquaint you that the matter has since undergone further consideration, and, having been submitted to the law officers of the Crown, they have advised that the operation of the clause in question is confined to bills drawn and issued within the United Kingdom, and payable abroad.

No. 2. Inland Revenue, Somerset-house, London, Oct. 16.

MY DEAR SIR,-In reply to your letter of the 14th and of this date, inquiring, first, whether the Board consider that the printed form adopted by the Bank of England for the cancellation of adhesive foreign bill stamps be a sufficient compliance with the Act of Parliament, and, secondly, whether the amount of duty to which a bill of exchange is liable may be denoted by two or more stamps. I beg to state, in reference to the first question, that, so far as the Board is concerned, the use of the printed form in question will be considered a sufficient compliance with the act.

The Board will not require that the whole of the name, or firm, or date shall actually be upon the stamp, and will esteem it sufficient if these particulars be written or printed across the stamp, notwithstanding a portion of such writing or printing may not be actually

upon it.

The object of cancellation is to prevent the use of a stamp for more than one bill; and, provided this be effected, even by initials and date, the Board certainly will not prosecute, and no prosecution can be instituted, excepting by the Board.

I must, however, distinctly state that the Board cannot by any regulation, or the expression of any opinion, remove difficulties that may arise between the parties to a bill. Its validity, so far as the parties are concerned, must, in case of doubt, depend on the interpretation which may be put by a court of law on the terms of the act.

In reply to the second question, I have to state that there is nothing in the act to prevent the required amount of duty being made

up by several stamps.

SIR,—We enclose the annexed correspondence to serve for general information. You will observe that the third question has been misunderstood, but is satisfactorily disposed of by the previous answers.

6, Copthall Court, Throgmorton Street, Oct. 12. SIR,-We request your interpretation of the effect of the new Stamp Act in the following cases which have actually occurred, and are pressing for decision :-

1. Amsterdam remits to London second and third of bill on Madrid

(£600), drawn from Iserlohn in Prussia-the drawer having sent the first for acceptance to be claimed by endorsed second and third,

The Spanish post being considered unsafe, the buyer in London

requires both second and third.

Will the rate of the Inland stamp suffice for the second, delivering

and marking the third (second stamped 7s 6d)?

2. Amsterdam sends to London, in same remittance, a similar bill of £300, first and second. Will a copy of the first, stamping each 1s, fulfil the intention of the law as to the third, or may it be treated

as in the first case?

3. In the first or second cases, having only two bills of a set, can the inland rate of stamp be divided in halves to be applied to eachsay on 350, two at 2s, instead of three at 1s 4d? (There are no exact equivalents in some cases.) The most practicable method, if it is consistent with the law, will be the full stamp to one of the set, and the annotation on the other as practised abroad.

GENTLEMEN, -I have laid before the Board your letter of the 12th inst., requesting information on three questions therein submitted. In reply to the first, I am directed to acquaint you that the proper stamp is 2s 6d on each of the two bills. To the second, that the proper stamp is 1s on each of the two bills. To the third, that if a bill be drawn in a set of two, each part is liable to the same duty as on an inland bill of that amount.

#### FROM Times OF 6TH NOVEMBER.

The following further correspondence regarding the Stamp Act has passed between the Bank of England and the Board of Inland Revenue, from which it will be seen that, upon reconsideration, the Board have modified their views expressed to Mr Grain, the notary. and published in the Times of the 25th ult., to the effect that each part of the bill drawn abroad in sets, and payable in this country, is liable to the duty on an inland bill :-

Bank of England, Oct. 26, 1854.

MY DEAR SIR,—I am quite sorry to trouble you further on questions arising under the new Stamp Act; but I am rather puzzled at the answer you have given to Mr Grain with respect to bills in sets

drawn abroad, and payable in the United Kingdom.

Will you, therefore, allow me to ask if you mean that each bill of the set is liable to the full duty on a single inland bill of the same amount? In other words, supposing that I am the holder of two parts of a bill for £1,500, are both these parts liable to the full duty of 15s, or only to 5s each? If you hold that they are both liable to the full duty of 15s, then double duty is exacted, and in the latter case one-third of the duty would be lost to Government.

I raise this question simply on this ground :- It is the most common of practices to draw bills abroad in sets, send the first for acceptance, and negotiate the second or third, affixing a note at the

bottom that the first is with "A.B."

The first is claimed by the holder of the second, and, as the latter contains all the endorsements, the two are pinned or wafered together, and form one bill, liable, I think, as in the case of a £1,500 bill, to the duty of 15s. The third probably never makes its appear-

Now, we hold a large number of bills in this condition, on one of which the full duty as for a single inland bill is indicated by the appropriate stamp, and, as they are maturing every day, and paid without hesitation on presentation, it is of importance that the point I have raised should be clearly understood.

subject has been carefully reconsidered.

I have now to acquaint you, that it is the opinion of the Board. that, although a bill drawn abroad, and payable in this country, may be in duplicate or triplicate, it only represents one transaction, and that it is liable to the duty on one inland bill of the same amount. The practice of the Bank as described by you is, therefore, correct.

I am further directed to state that, although the Board desires to pay the most respectful attention to every question, and give all the information in its power, yet that the public ought to recollect that the opinion of the Board can have no authority in a court of law, and that it would be safer and more expedient on every ground for parties to apply to their own legal advisers for the solution of doubts on the construction of Acts of Parliament.

## RATES OF POSTAGE.

## Inland Letters.\*

1. With the exceptions afterwards mentioned, the rate of postage on all inland letters is regulated by weight, irrespective of distance, and is as follows:

2. Except on re-directed letters, the postage, if not paid in advance, is double the foregoing; and if the payment in advance be insufficient, double the deficiency is charged. An inland letter, for example, weighing more than half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, if bearing a penny stamp only, on delivery, is charged twopence. The unpaid additional postage on re-directed letters, however, is not doubled, being the same as if such postage were prepaid.

<sup>\*</sup> Inland Letters are those which pass between places in the United Kingdom, including the Isle of Man, the Orkney, Shetland, Scilly, and Channel Islands.

## Colonial and Foreign Letters.

3. The rates of postage on letters to foreign countries and the colonies are entered in the Alphabetical List of Foreign Countries.

## Addresses to the Queen and Petitions to Parliament.

4. Petitions and addresses to Her Majesty, forwarded direct, are exempt from postage; and such petitions and addresses, as also petitions to either House of Parliament, if sent to a member of either House, are likewise exempt, provided they do not weigh more than two pounds, and are without covers, or are in covers open at the sides. No letter, or other enclosure, however, must be inserted, and if one be found, such enclosure, unless it bear the proper number of postage stamps, will be charged as an unpaid letter.

# Newspapers and other periodical Publications bearing the Newspaper Stamp.

5. Although provision is made for forwarding newspapers, books, and money through the post, it is not compulsory on any one to employ this mode of transmission; everything except

letters may be sent in any other way.

6. All periodical publications, including newspapers published in the United Kingdom, at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days, and which bear an impressed stamp or stamps denoting the stamp duty (of the kind formerly confined chiefly to newspapers), may be transmitted and re-transmitted through the post within the United Kingdom free of postage under the following regulations, viz.:—

 They are subject to the same restrictions with regard to the number of sheets and superficial extent as were lately applicable only to newspapers properly so called. These restrictions are shown in the following Table:—

No publication, or portion thereof, can pass through the post unless the impressed stamp which it bears be a stamp of the value at least of one penny.

- 3. The title and date of the publication must be printed at the top of every page.
- 4. The publication must be folded in such a manner that the whole of the stamp or stamps, denoting the full duty, shall be exposed to view, and be distinctly visible on the outside, except that where there are more than two publications in the same cover it will be considered sufficient if the stamps be so arranged that they can readily be examined.
- 5. It must not be printed on pasteboard or cardboard, or on two or more thicknesses of paper pasted together, nor must any pasteboard, cardboard, or such pasted paper be sent with it as a back or cover thereto, or otherwise.
- 6. It must be posted within fifteen days from the printed date of issue.
- 7. It must have either no cover or a cover open at the ends.
- 8. It must contain no enclosure.
- 9. It must have no writing or other mark thereon, but the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, nor anything on the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the publication, and the printed name and address of the publisher or vendor who sends it.
- 10. If the publication be addressed to any person within the free delivery of the place where it is posted, it will become liable to a postage of one penny, which must be prepaid by affixing a postage stamp.
- 11. When a newspaper, &c., is so folded as not to expose the stamp or stamps, a postage of one penny is charged in addition to any other postage to which the publication, if properly folded, would be liable; and if the newspaper, &c., be addressed to any person within the free delivery of the place where it is posted, and do not bear a penny postage label, it will be charged 2d. In case of any other irregularity the publication is dealt with in accordance with the regulations of the book post.
- 12. It is suggested that every publication should have a notice to purchasers conspicuously printed, pointing out the necessity of exposing the stamp or stamps to view whenever the publication is sent through the post.

- 13. Unstamped publications, or stamped publications which have been issued more than fifteen days, can be forwarded within the United Kingdom and to most of the colonies under the regulations of the book post.
- 7. Newspapers sent abroad are liable to the same regulations as newspapers passing (under the newspaper privilege) between different parts of the United Kingdom, except that, before going abroad, the name of the newspaper must have been registered at the General Post Office; and that, instead of requiring to have an impressed stamp, each newspaper, if sent to a British Colony, is liable to a postage of 1d. (which must be prepaid by a postage label or in money). In all cases of newspapers going abroad the impressed stamp stands for nothing.

#### Book Post.

8. At the following charges, and on the subjoined conditions, book packets may be sent by the post to any place within the United Kingdom.

and so on, 2d. being charged for every additional half pound or any less weight.

 The postage must be prepaid in full, by means of postage stamps affixed outside the packet or its cover.

2. Every packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

a cover open at the ends of sides.

3. If the postage paid on the packet amount to as much as

4d., it may contain any number of separate books or other publications, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum (to the exclusion, however, of written letters, whether sealed or open). And the books or other publications, prints, maps, &c., may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, &c., or of a portion thereof, will be allowed, whether such binding, &c. be loose or attached; as also rollers, in the case of prints or maps; markers (whether of paper or otherwise), in the case of books; and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto.

4. But if the postage paid be less than 4d., the packet must consist exclusively of printed matter, without restriction, however, either as to the number of publications or separate sheets, or as to whether they are bound or unbound. If any other matter be included, the packet will be subject to the penalty mentioned in the 9th Condition.

5. A book packet, whatever may be the postage paid thereon. must not contain any written letter, closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection; nor must there be any written letter, nor any communication of the nature of a letter written in any such packet or its cover. Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, &c., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter, and may therefore be made when any writing is permitted; that is, when a postage of 4d. at least is paid.

6. No book packet can be received, if it exceeds two feet in

length, width, or depth.

- 7. Any packet which shall not be open at the ends or sides, . or shall have any written letter or any communication of the nature of a letter written in it, or upon its cover, will be charged with the "unpaid" or double letter postage.
- 8. If a packet be found to contain any written letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other unauthorized enclosure, the letter or enclosure will be taken out and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged with the full postage, as an unpaid letter, together with an additional rate of 4d.; and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid with stamps, will then be forwarded to its address.

9. If a packet be not sufficiently prepaid with stamps, but nevertheless bear a stamp of the value of ld., it is forwarded, charged with the deficient book-postage, together with an additional rate of 4d. ; but any packet which shall bear no postage stamp is charged with the

"unpaid" or double letter postage.

10. In every case in which the postage chargeable under these regulations is greater than the letter rate, the latter postage is substituted.

9. The regulations of the Colonial Book Post are similar to the foregoing.

10. In no case can a book-packet be sent to the Colonies (except at the letter rate of postage) through a foreign country.

## REGISTRATION.

By the prepayment of a fee of sixpence any letter, book, or other packet on which the postage has been prepaid in stamps, may be registered. This will make its transmission more secure by rendering it practicable to trace it, when inland, from its receipt to its delivery; and when colonial, if not to its delivery, at least to the port of despatch. The Post Office does not guarantee the safe delivery of the letter, &c., though the officers are of course responsible to the Postmaster-General, who will call to strict account any one neglecting his duty on this point, and, if his Grace think proper, will require him to make good any loss that may be sustained thereby.

The postage of registered letters must be prepaid; and if the

letter be inland, it must be prepaid in stamps.

Every letter to be registered should be presented at the window, and a receipt obtained for it, and must on no account be dropped into the letter-box. If, contrary to this rule, a letter marked "Registered" be dropped into the letter-box, it will be liable to a registration fee of one shilling, instead of the ordinary fee of sixpence. No Letter Carrier or Rural Messenger is required to take letters from the Public for the purpose of registering them.

The latest time for posting registered letters is entered in the Notice exhibited at the Post Office, being half an hour before the closing of the box for the mail by which it is to be despatched.

## THE MONEY ORDER OFFICE

is open every week-day, fast-days excepted, from 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. The charge for such orders is 3d. on sums not exceeding two pounds, and 6d. on sums between two and five pounds. No Order will be given for sums beyond this amount; but if the sum to be transmitted exceeds five pounds, as many Orders may be taken out as will make up the sum to be sent.

The public are recommended, when applying for Money Orders, to use printed "Requisition Forms," which save time, and afford greater security, than verbal messages, against mistakes. These Forms are sold by Postmasters at the rate of tenfor one penny, or of five or any smaller number for a halfpenny.

No order is allowed to contain a fractional part of a penny. No Money Order can be issued unless the applicant furnish, in full, the surname and one Christian name, both of the remitter (the person who sends the order) and the payee (the person to whom the money is to be paid), together with the remitter's address; and if the name of either party be tendered at greater length, it must be received and advised accordingly.

## COLONIAL AND FOREIGN MAILS.

A single rate of postage is given for each country. There being no bags despatched for London on Saturday till 10 p.m., when any of the dates for the London, Southampton, or Dover Packets fall upon that day, reference must be made to the Alphabetical List for information, whether the letters should be posted on the previous Friday, or on the ensuing Sunday.

Letters for Foreign Countries, the prepayment of which is required, when put into the unpaid box, or left at the office with less than the full postage, are sent to the Dead Letter Office, and returned to the writer, when his address can be ascertained.

I. No carter, carman, barrowman, or porter, shall be permitted to ply for hire, on or around the quays or piers, without being licensed, by and under authority of the Provost and Bailies, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence.

II. Carters and carmen shall have their name and number marked in legible characters on their respective carts or cars, under a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for neglect thereof.

III. Carters and carmen must have at all times a sufficient number or quantity of waterproof covers, for the protection of goods on their carts or cars, and every carter or carman neglecting to have the necessary quantity of covers, shall forfeit

and pay a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

IV. All fines, forfeitures, penalties, damages, and expenses, mentioned in the preceding regulations, shall (when not otherwise directed) be sued for and recovered at the instance of the Procurator Fiscal of the Police Court of Greenock, before the Provost or any one of the Bailies of the said Town; and upon conviction of any offender, it shall be lawful for the said Provost or any one of the Bailies to pronounce sentence, subjecting such offender to imprisonment in the Prison or Bridewell of Greenock, or to fine, or to such lesser punishment as may be deemed adequate to the offence committed.
