I. RATES OF POSTAGE.

*Inland Letters.**

1. With the exceptions afterwards specified, the rate of postage on all inland letters is regulated by weight irrespective of distance; and is as follows:—

If paid in advance—

Letter weighing not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.	-	-	-	-	-	1d.

and so on; twopence being charged for every additional ounce.

2. Except on re-directed letters, the postage, if not paid in advance, is double the foregoing; and if the payment in advance be insufficient, double the deficiency must be charged. An inland letter, for example, weighing more than half an ounce, and not exceeding one ounce, if bearing a penny stamp only, must, on delivery, be charged twopence. The unpaid *additional* postage on re-directed letters, however, is not doubled, being the same as if such postage were prepaid.

Colonial and Foreign Letters.

3. The rates of postage on letters to foreign countries and the colonies are entered in the Table of Foreign and Colonial Postage.

Addresses to the Queen, and Petitions to Parliament.

4. Petitions and addresses to Her Majesty, forwarded direct, are

* Inland Letters are those which pass between places in the United Kingdom, including the Orkney, Shetland, Scilly, and Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man.

exempt from postage; and such petitions and addresses, as also petitions to either House of Parliament, if sent to a member of either House, are likewise exempt, provided they do not weigh more than two pounds, and are without covers, or are in covers open at the sides. No letter or other enclosure, however, must be inserted, and if one be found, such enclosure, unless it bear the proper number of postage stamps, is charged as an unpaid letter.

Newspapers and other periodical Publications bearing the Newspaper Stamp.

5. Although provision is made for forwarding newspapers, books, and money through the post, it is not compulsory on any one to employ this mode of transmission; everything except letters may be sent in any other way.

6. All periodical publications, including newspapers published in the United Kingdom, at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days, and which bear an impressed stamp or stamps denoting the stamp duty (of the kind formerly confined chiefly to newspapers), may be transmitted and re-transmitted through the post within the United Kingdom free from postage under the following regulations, viz. :—

1. They are subject to the same restrictions with regard to the number of sheets and superficial extent as were lately applicable only to newspapers properly so called.
2. No publication, or portion thereof, can pass through the post unless the impressed stamp which it bears be at least a stamp of the value of one penny.
3. The title and date of the publication must be printed at the top of every page.
4. The publication must be folded in such a manner that the whole of the stamp or stamps, denoting the full duty, shall be exposed to view, and be distinctly visible on the outside, except that where there are more than two publications in the same cover, it will be considered sufficient if the stamps are so arranged that they can readily be examined.
5. It must not be printed on pasteboard or cardboard, or on two or more thicknesses of paper pasted together, nor must any pasteboard, cardboard, or such pasted paper be sent with it as a back or cover thereto, or otherwise.
6. It must be posted within fifteen days from the date of publication.
7. It must either have no cover or a cover open at the ends.
8. It must contain no enclosure.
9. It must have no writing or other mark thereon, but the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, nor anything on the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the publication, and the printed name and address of the publisher or vender who sends it.
10. If the publication be addressed to any person within the free delivery of the place where it is posted, it becomes liable to a postage of one penny, which must be prepaid by affixing a postage stamp.
11. When a newspaper, &c. is so folded as not to expose the

stamp or stamps, a postage of one penny is charged in addition to any other postage to which the publication, if properly folded, would have been liable; and if the newspaper, &c. be addressed to any person within the free delivery of the place where it is posted, and do not bear a penny postage label, it will be charged 2d. In case of any other irregularity, the publication is dealt with in accordance with the regulations of the book post.

12. It is suggested that every publication should have a notice to purchasers conspicuously printed, pointing out the necessity of exposing the stamp or stamps to view whenever the publication is sent through the post.
 13. Unstamped publications, or stamped publications which have been issued more than fifteen days, can be forwarded within the United Kingdom and to most of the colonies under the regulations of the book post.
7. Newspapers sent abroad are liable to the same regulations as newspapers passing (under the newspaper privilege) between different parts of the United Kingdom, except that, before going abroad, the name of the newspaper must have been registered at the General Post Office; and that, instead of requiring to have an impressed stamp, each newspaper, if sent to a British Colony, is liable to a postage of 1*d.* (which must be prepaid by a postage label or in money), together with an additional postage (as shown in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage) when the newspaper has to pass through a foreign country. In the same table will be found the postage of newspapers sent to foreign countries. In all cases of newspapers going abroad the impressed stamp stands for nothing.

Book Post.

8. At the following charges, and on the subjoined conditions, book packets may be sent by the post to any place within the United Kingdom, or to the British Forces at the seat of war:—

Weighing not more than 4 oz.	1 <i>d.</i>
,, more than 4 oz. and not exceeding 8 oz.	2 <i>d.</i>
,, more than 8 oz. „ „ 16 oz.	4 <i>d.</i>
,, more than 1 lb. „ „ 1½ lb.	6 <i>d.</i>

and so on, 2*d.* being charged for every additional half pound or any less weight.

1. The postage must be prepaid in full, by means of postage stamps affixed outside the packet or its cover.
2. Every packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides.
3. If the postage paid on the packet amount to as much as 4*d.*, it may contain any number of separate books or other publications, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum (to the exclusion, however, of letters, whether sealed or open). And the books or other publications, prints, maps, &c., may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book,

- publication, &c., or of a portion thereof, will be allowed, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached; as also rollers, in the case of prints or maps; markers (whether of paper or otherwise), in the case of books; and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto.
4. But if the postage paid be less than 4*d.*, the packet must consist exclusively of printed matter, without restriction, however, either as to the number of publications or separate sheets, or as to whether they are bound or unbound. If any other matter be included, the packet will be subject to the penalty mentioned in the 9th Condition.
 5. A book packet, whatever may be the postage paid thereon, must not contain any letter, closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection; nor must there be any letter, nor any communication of the nature of a letter, written or printed, in any such packet or in its cover. Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, &c., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter, and may therefore be made when any writing is permitted; that is, when a postage of 4*d.* at least is paid.
 6. No book packet can be received, if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth.
 7. Any packet which shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall have any letter or any communication of the nature of a letter, written or printed, in it, or upon its cover, is charged with the "unpaid" or double letter postage.
 8. If a packet be found to contain any letter, whether closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other unauthorized enclosure, the letter or enclosure is taken out and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged with the full postage, as an unpaid letter, together with an additional rate of 4*d.*; and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid with stamps, is then forwarded to its address.
 9. If a packet be not sufficiently prepaid with stamps, but nevertheless bear a stamp of the value of 1*d.*, it is forwarded, charged with the deficient book-postage, together with an additional rate of 4*d.*; but any packet which shall bear no postage stamp, is charged with the "unpaid" or double letter postage.
 10. In every case in which the postage charged upon a packet under these regulations would be greater than the letter rate, the latter postage is substituted.

II. REGISTRATION.

9. By the prepayment of a fee of sixpence (which must be paid in stamps) any letter, book, or other packet on which the postage has been prepaid in stamps, may be registered. This will make its

transmission more secure by rendering it practicable to trace it, when inland, from its receipt to its delivery; and when foreign or colonial, if not to its delivery, at least to the port of despatch. The Post Office does not guarantee the safe delivery of the letter, &c., though the officers are of course responsible to the Postmaster-General, who will call to strict account any one neglecting his duty on this point, and, if his Grace think proper, will require him to make good any loss that may be sustained thereby.

10. The postage of registered letters must be prepaid; and if the letter be inland, it must be prepaid in stamps.

11. Every letter to be registered should not be dropped into the letter-box, but be presented at the window and a receipt obtained for it.

12. The latest time for posting registered letters is entered in the Notice exhibited in every Post-Office, such time, unless otherwise directed by the Surveyor, being half an hour before the closing of the box for the mail by which it is to be despatched.

III. DELIVERY.

13. Letter Carriers and Rural Messengers are prohibited, under pain of dismissal, from demanding or receiving any payment beyond the postage on letters, newspapers, &c. which they are required to collect or deliver; or from distributing any letters, newspapers, &c., whether before beginning their rounds, whilst on their rounds, or after they may have completed them, except such as have passed through a Post Office. The prohibition, however, from receiving payment in addition to the postage does not extend to Christmas boxes.

14. Except where the number of daily deliveries is considerable, and where, therefore, the Surveyor considers such a regulation unnecessary, letters are delivered at the window after the arrival of every mail (within office hours) as soon as they can be sorted. In all cases, however, when there is a corresponding delivery by Letter Carriers, the window delivery (whether to the holders of private boxes or to the public generally) does not begin till the Letter Carriers have left the office, nor is it allowed in any way to delay the departure of the Letter Carriers.

15. In order to prevent the additional trouble which is sometimes caused by letters being directed to a Post Office, although for persons residing within a free delivery from such office, but who have no private box, a Postmaster is authorized, when such letters arrive by a mail for which there is a delivery from house to house, to refuse to deliver them at the window, and to send them out by the Letter Carriers, except letters addressed to the military in barracks.

16. Any person can have a private box who is willing to pay the appointed fee. Where this fee goes to the Revenue, it is generally fixed at one guinea per annum, to be paid in advance, and for a period of not less than a year; and where it goes to the Postmaster, he may demand the same terms, though he may, at his option, take

less. The same also, in most cases, are the terms for a private bag, except that in addition there is the cost of the bag itself, and a charge for conveyance, the maximum of the latter being half a guinea per annum if by a foot messenger, and two guineas if by a mounted one. As the service of a private bag, however, may possibly delay the despatch of the general bag, none must be allowed without the permission of the Surveyor.

IV. POSTAGE STAMPS.

17. Every Postmaster is required to have on hand a sufficient stock of postage labels and penny stamped envelopes, and to sell them to the public at the following prices:—

18. Every Rural Messenger is authorized and required to sell postage stamps (including stamped envelopes) at the same prices at which postmasters are empowered to sell them.

19. Prepayment of inland letters, &c. must be by stamps, except at the Chief Post Office, London, where prepayment of such letters from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. is permitted in *money*, provided the amount be not less than £1. Letters also to the colonies and foreign countries may be prepaid in money. Except by soldiers and sailors in Her Majesty's service, British postage stamps, however, are not available in the payment of letters, &c. *coming into the country*.

20. Adhesive stamps, before being used, should be examined to ascertain that they will firmly adhere, as in the event of their falling off the letters become charged with postage, which in the case of inland letters and of some foreign letters is double the prepaid rate; they should then be placed on the front of the letter, and upon the right-hand corner of the upper side.

21. Arrangements have been made by which paper and envelopes delivered at Somerset House by the public can be impressed with postage stamps.

V. MONEY ORDERS.

22. Money Orders are issued and paid at the General Post-Office, Perth, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 1 p.m., and from 2 to 6 p.m.

23. The Commission chargeable for Money Orders is threepence

on sums not exceeding £2; and on sums above £2, and not exceeding £5, sixpence. No Order will be given for sums beyond this amount.

24. The Money Order Office, and the system of Registration, have been devised expressly for the security of Money and other valuable property transmitted through the Post-Office. With the great convenience thus afforded for transmitting small sums at so low a charge, and the power given of Registering Letters containing value, it is hoped the Public will no longer forward letters of value, *except in one or other of these methods*.

25. In all cases where personal attendance is inconvenient, if the Money Order is receipted by the person to whom it is made payable, and the party addressing it for payment can afford full information as to the Christian name, surname, address, and occupation of the person *who originally obtained the Order*, payment will be made; but unless these conditions are strictly complied with, it will be refused. Any Money Order presented through a bank, will be paid without the name of the remitter and the signature in full of the Christian name of the payer being insisted upon as a condition of payment, provided that the bank be situated in the town on which the Money Order is drawn, that the Order be crossed with the banker's name, and the party applying at the Money Order Office be known there as in the employment of the bank. It must be understood, however, that in all such cases the liability of the Post-Office will absolutely terminate with the Payment of the Order so presented.

26. With a view to simplicity, and economy in the accounts of the Money Order Office, it has been found necessary to lay down the following rules:—

1. Every Money Order issued on or after the 6th October 1848, must be presented for payment before the second calendar month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in October, it must be presented for payment before the end of December), otherwise a new Order will be necessary, for which a second commission must be paid.

2. If an Order be not presented for payment before the end of the twelfth month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in October, and not presented before the end of next October), the money will not be paid at all.

3. As, after once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the Office will not be liable to any further claim, the public are strictly cautioned—

- a. To take all means to prevent the loss of the Money Order.
- b. Never to send a Money Order in the same letter with the information required on payment thereof.
- c. To be careful, on taking out a money order, to state correctly the Christian name as well as the surname of the person in whose favour it is to be drawn.
- d. To see that the name, address, and occupation, of the person taking out the Money Order, are correctly known to the person in whose favour it is to be drawn.

4. Neglect of these instructions will lead to delay and trouble in obtaining payment, and even risk the loss of the money.

27. These instructions, together with some others of minor importance, will be found printed on every Money Order.

28. A Money Order intended for a person residing at a place in which there is no Money Order Office, should be drawn upon the Post-Town nearest to it which may have a Money Order Office.

VI. MISCELLANEOUS RULES.

29. With the following exceptions, no letter, &c. can be forwarded by the post which is more than two feet in length, breadth, or depth, nor any unpaid packet which weighs more than four ounces. The exceptions are :—

1. Packets to or from places abroad.
2. Packets to or from any of the Government Offices or departments, or Public Officers.
3. Petitions or addresses to the Queen, whether directed to Her Majesty, or forwarded to any member of either House of Parliament.
4. Petitions to either House of Parliament, forwarded to any member of either House.
5. Printed Parliamentary proceedings.

30. No information can be given respecting letters which pass through a Post Office, except to the persons to whom they are addressed ; and in no other way is official information of a private character, allowed to be made public.

31. Postmasters are not authorised to return any letter, &c. to the writer or sender, or to any one else, or to delay forwarding it to its destination according to the address, even though a request to such effect be written thereon ; as every letter, &c. must be delivered to the person to whom it is directed and to him alone.

32. Late letters, &c. are received to within five minutes of the despatch of the mails, except in those large towns where the Surveyor may deem an interval of ten minutes necessary, and excepting that no office is to be kept open merely for this purpose after ten o'clock at night.

33. No late letters, &c. are forwarded by the mail preparing for despatch unless prepaid, and that in stamps, so as to include both the ordinary postage and the late-letter fee.

34. With the subjoined exceptions, every re-directed letter, newspaper, or other postal packet is liable to an additional postage (at the prepaid rate) unless the re-direction be made by an officer of the Post Office, and be to a place within the district belonging to the same Head Office. Thus, on a paid or unpaid letter re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office to any other postal district in the United Kingdom, and weighing not more than half an ounce, an additional postage is levied of one penny ; or if the weight be more than half an ounce, but does not exceed an ounce, of twopence ; and so on. Upon a book thus re-directed to any other postal district in the United Kingdom, and weighing above

half a pound but not exceeding a pound, an additional postage of fourpence is levied, or if the book weigh more than one pound but not exceeding two pounds, an additional postage of eightpence ; and so on. A registered letter, when re-directed, is not subject to more additional charge than an ordinary letter. Letters addressed to commissioned officers in the army, navy, or ordnance, employed on actual service in any of Her Majesty's colonies, or on any foreign station, may be re-directed to such officers when removed *upon service* (whether at home or abroad), and are delivered to them for the same amount of postage that would have been chargeable had they been delivered at their original address. The same privilege extends to the letters of the soldiers and seamen described in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage, except as regards foreign postage, which must be paid.

35. Every Postmaster is required to have a notice conspicuously placarded, giving information respecting the hours of attendance, the despatch, and delivery of letters, &c.

36. During the time the office is open on Sunday, the public are allowed to prepay foreign or colonial letters, to purchase postage stamps, and to have letters registered ; and all other duties are performed as usual, except the issue and payment of Money Orders, which, on that day, are wholly suspended.

37. At no office is there more than one delivery on the Sunday ; and any person is at liberty to prevent even this, so far as relates to himself, as shown in the following regulations :—

1. Any person can have his letters, &c. retained in the Post Office on Sunday, by addressing to the Postmaster a written request, duly signed, to that effect.
2. Such request will be held to include newspapers, and all other postal packets, even such as may be marked "immediate," as no distinction can be allowed.
3. No letters, &c. the non-delivery of which by the Letter Carrier on Sunday has been directed, can be obtained from the Post Office window on that day.
4. Private box-holders have the option of applying for their letters at the office while it is open for delivery on Sunday, or of abstaining from so doing, as they may think proper ; but no person can be permitted to engage a private box for Sunday only.
5. To prevent the inconvenience and confusion which would arise from frequent changes in these instructions, no request can be entertained unless it extend to a period of at least three months, nor withdrawn, even after the lapse of that time, without a week's notice.

38. No Postmaster is bound to give change, or is authorized to demand change ; and when money is paid at the Post Office, whether as change or otherwise, no question as to its right amount, goodness, or weight, can be entertained after it has been removed from the counter.

39. Except as regards foreign and colonial letters about to be prepaid in money, a Postmaster is not bound to weigh any letters

or other packets for the public, though he may do so if his duty be not thereby impeded.

40. Postmasters are instructed not to receive any Letter, &c. which there is good reason to believe contains anything likely to injure the contents of the mail bag, or the person of any officer of the Post Office. If such a Letter, &c. be posted without the Postmaster's knowledge, or if at any time before its despatch he should discover any Letter, &c. of the above description, he is directed not to forward it, but to report the case, with the address of the Letter, &c., to the Secretary. The following are examples of the articles referred to:—

A glass bottle, or glass in any form; razors, scissors, needles, knives, forks, or other sharp instruments; leeches, game, fish, meat, fruit, or vegetables; bladders or other vessels containing liquids; gunpowder, lucifer matches, or anything which is explosive or combustible.

41. By the 1st Victoria, cap. 36, sec. 2, any person illegally conveying Letters incurs a Penalty of £5 for every offence, and £100 for every week the practice is continued. The Sender also incurs a Penalty of £5 for every offence, with full costs of Suit.

42. The following are exceptions from the exclusive Privilege of the Post Office, in the Conveyance of Letters:—

1. Letters sent by a private friend, so as such letters be delivered by such friend to the party to whom they shall be directed.
2. Letters sent by a messenger on purpose, concerning the private affairs of the sender or receiver thereof; commissions or returns thereof, and affidavits and writs, process or proceedings or returns thereof, issuing out of a Court of Justice.
3. Letters sent out of the United Kingdom by a private vessel (not being a packet boat).
4. Letters of merchants, owners of vessels of merchandise, or the cargo or loading therein, sent by such vessels of merchandise, or by any person employed by such owners for the carriage of such letters, according to their respective directions, and delivered to the respective persons to whom they shall be directed, without paying or receiving reward or profit for the same in anywise.
5. Letters concerning goods or merchandise sent by common carriers, to be delivered with the goods which such letters concern, without payment for receiving or delivering such letters.

But the following persons are expressly forbidden to carry a letter, or to receive or deliver a letter, even though they shall not receive payment for the same:—

- a. Common known carriers, their servants or agents, except a letter concerning goods in their carts or waggons, or on their pack-horses; and owners, drivers, or guards of stage coaches.
- b. Owners, masters, or commanders of ships, vessels, steam boats, or boats called or being passage or packet boats, sailing or passing coastwise, or otherwise between places within Great Britain or Ireland, or between ports within Her Majesty's

dominions or territories out of the United Kingdom, or their servants or agents, except in respect of letters of merchants, owners of ships, or goods on board.

- c. Passengers or other persons on board any such ships, vessels, steam boat, or passage boats.
- d. The sailors or others on board a ship or boat passing on a river or navigable canal within the United Kingdom or other of Her Majesty's dominions.

Optional or Compulsory Prepayment.

a The letter *a* prefixed to a division (as that of Letters or Newspapers) indicates that in such case Prepayment is compulsory. In other cases Prepayment is not compulsory unless the letter be registered. When a Letter or Newspaper, addressed to go by a route that requires Prepayment, is posted unpaid, and there is some other route where payment is not required, it is sent by that route; but if there be none, it is sent to the Dead Letter Office, to be returned to the writer.

Distance to which the Postage carries the Letter, &c.

d The letter *d* prefixed to any division (as that of Letters or Newspapers) shows that the postage there entered carries the Letter, &c., from the place where it is posted in the United Kingdom to its place of destination. In all other cases the postage carries it only part of the way.

Exceptional Rates of Postage, &c.

Periodicals not of daily publication, issued in the shape of pamphlets, may be sent to Belgium, Bremen, Hamburg, Holland, Prussia, and the United States, at the following rate, *which must be prepaid*: not exceeding 2 oz., 1d.; 2 oz. and not exceeding 3 oz., 6d.; 3 oz. and not exceeding 4 oz., 8d.; with an addition of 2d. for every additional ounce, up to 16 ounces, above which weight the privilege does not extend; and at the same rate of postage, pamphlets, not being periodicals, may be sent to the United States if not exceeding 8 ounce.

Newspapers from Belgium pay ½d. each; and Newspapers from Canada 1d. each; Newspapers from Holland are delivered free.

The postage on Newspapers to the parts of Turkey, &c. specified in the Table, as *exceptional rates*, is as follows:—Not exceeding

$\frac{1}{2}$ oz., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.; $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. and not exceeding 1 oz., 3d.; 1 oz. and not exceeding 2 oz., 6d.; with an additional 3d. for every additional ounce.

B. The privilege of the Book Post to and from India and New South Wales is limited to Packages not exceeding three pounds in weight. Any package weighing more than three pounds is liable to the Letter Rate of Postage.

G.U. According to the regulations of the German Customs Union, no Letter exceeding 50 grammes (a little more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz.) in weight, and containing any other enclosure than paper, can be allowed to circulate by the post. Any Letters, therefore, forwarded in the Mail to Prussia above that weight, and containing any other enclosure than paper, will be liable, on their arrival at the Prussian frontier, to be stopped, and sent to the Custom House for delivery as *freight*.

Foreign Newspapers.

With the following exceptions, Foreign Newspapers must be printed in the language of the country from which they are sent:—“Argentine News,” published at Rio de Janeiro: “The Bruxelles Herald,” published at Brussels; and all Newspapers and other printed papers coming from France or through France.

Registration of Letters.

By the prepayment of the usual British Registration fee of 6d. Letters can be registered between this country and the British West Indies, Malta, and Ceylon; and by the prepayment of the British registration fee, and the additional prepayment of a Foreign registration fee, Letters can be registered between this country and France and Prussia, and countries through France and Prussia. Moreover, by the prepayment of the British registration fees, letters can be registered between this country and Belgium and Holland, and countries through Belgium and Holland. Again, by the prepayment of the British registration fee, a Letter addressed to any other place can be registered to the port of despatch, and entered separately in the Letter Bill; it being in these cases left to the postal authorities of the Colony or Foreign Country to carry on the registration, or not, as they may choose. The British and Foreign registration fee on a Letter to France, or to a country through France, is double the rate of Postage, *both British and Foreign*, whatever that may amount to. Thus, the joint British and Foreign postage on a Letter to France weighing not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. being 4d., the Registration Fee on such a letter would also be 4d.

The Foreign Registration fee on a Letter to or through Prussia (except to Russia) is 3d., without regard to weight; making a total fee, British and Prussian, of 9d., in addition to the ordinary postage. The fee on a registered Letter to Russia, via Prussia, is greater by a sum equal to the Russian postage, which, on a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., is $3\frac{1}{2}$ d. The whole charge for a registered Letter to Russia, via Prussia, or, as marked in the Table, via Belgium (which latter country the Letter first passes through), is entered in the Table.

IV., cap. 58, the *Magistrates of Burghs* are required to meet on the last Tuesday of April and the last Tuesday of October, in each year, to consider the applications for License Certificates within Burgh; and the *Justices of Peace* on the first Tuesday of May and the last Tuesday of October, in the county, with power to adjourn for seven lawful days after each meeting. The applications must be lodged, and a fee of 2s. paid, ten days previous to each meeting; and the Magistrates and Justices are restricted from granting Certificates except at these statutory periods. 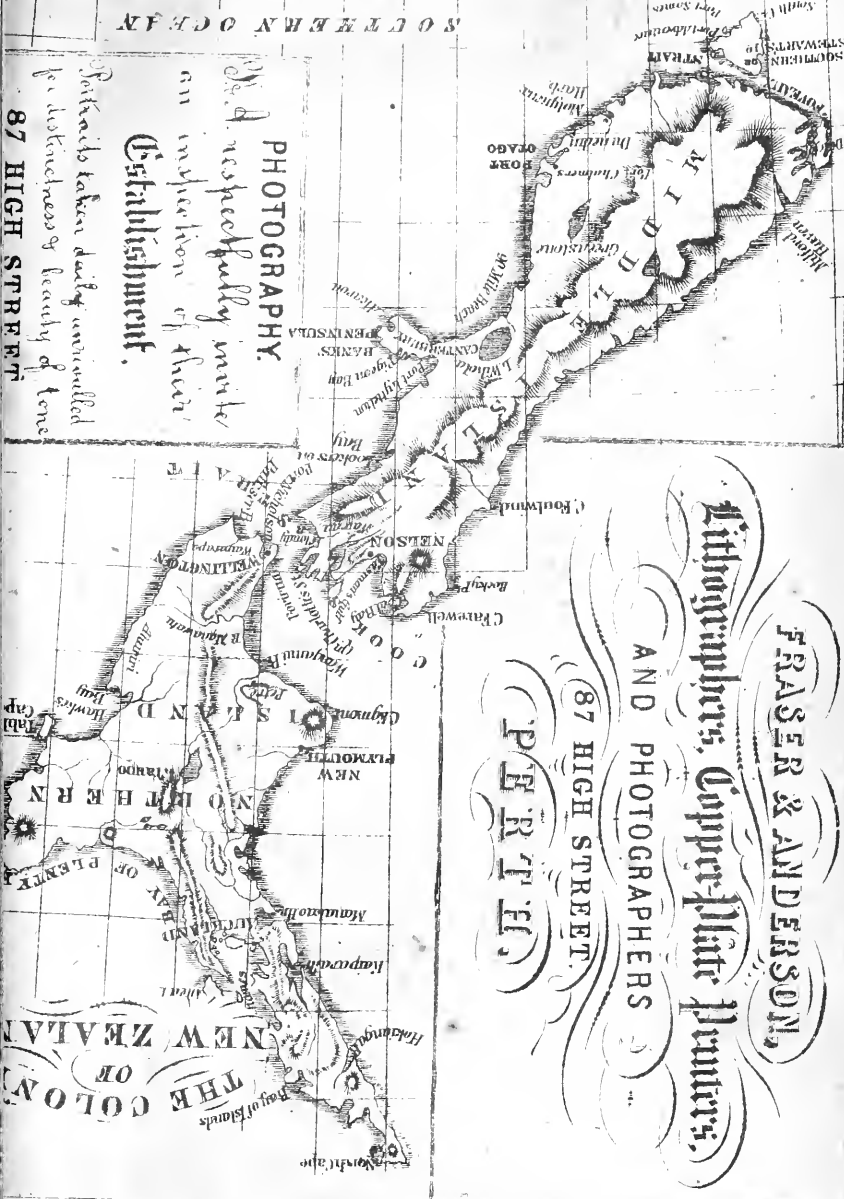

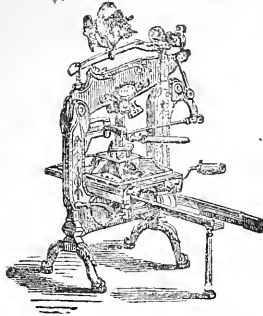
