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

Opening Exercises.

The hour having arrived for the convening of the Grand Council, the Grand Officers and Representatives assembled in the lobby of the Chittenden Hotel, and were escorted to the Masonic Temple, by a delegation of the Companions of Columbus Council No. 8, Royal and Select Masters, where the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio, was, after devotional exercises by the R. Ill. Grand Chaplain, Companion John L. Roemer, declared opened in Ample Form, at 9:30 A. M., by the following corps of Grand Officers, viz.:

Address and Report of the Most Illustrious Grand Master.

To the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

ILLUSTRIOUS COMPANIONS:

With hearts full of gratitude to the Supreme Grand Master of the Universe for the manifold blessings we daily enjoy, and for the privilege of again meeting in Annual Assembly, after a year of healthfulness and prosperity, we convene to review the past, and legislate for the future.

At a glance back, the time seems short since we parted at Akron at the close of the Seventy-fourth Annual Assembly, yet another year, with its changes, has passed into history and we are again reminded that life is short, and ours is rapidly drawing to a close.

To this Seventy-fifth Annual Assembly, the diamond anniversary of the organization of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio, do I extend a most cordial greeting, and welcome you to hear an account of the manner in which the trust you placed in my hands, one year ago has been cared for.

To the representatives of sister jurisdictions, I also give that word, so potent and full of love:—Welcome, and with it Fraternal greetings and good will to the Grand Councils they represent, and trust that the universal peace and harmony, which now prevail between us, will continue to the end of time.

NECROLOGY.

While the Grim Reaper has spared the members of our official family, during the year just ended, a number of faithful Companions of Subordinate Councils have been summoned to the place of refreshment and rest and official notices have come to hand, with the sad intelligence that sister jurisdictions have suffered the loss of eminent and beloved fraters, all of which will be submitted, by the committee on obituary, with suitable memorials and printed in our annual proceedings.

Two, however, I will briefly mention here on account of their active Masonic career, and former official connection with this Grand Council.

Companion S. Stacker Williams, died April 3rd, 1904. He was born at Dover, Tenn., March 20th, 1836. His Masonic labors extend back over a period of forty years and his legion of friends and acquaintances well knew of his great love for the order, and punctual attendance at the annual meetings. For eighteen years he held the responsible position of Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, which gave him an extended acquaintance abroad, as well as at home, and I feel that we have their sympathy in the great loss this jurisdiction has suffered by his death.

Companion Abner Royce, died December 1st, 1903, after a long, lingering illness. He was appointed Illustrious Grand Captain of the Guard of this Grand Council at the Annual Assembly, held at Cincinnati in 1898, he also was a lover of the rite, and his numerous friends in Northern Ohio know that he was always ready to labor for its interests, on account of its elevating influences toward mankind, and his name will long be coupled with the growth and prosperity of Masonry, at Cleveland, the city of his adoption, toward which he contributed so much.

Council Instituted.

On December 7th, 1903, I visited Marysville and instituted S. S. Jewell Council No. 89, to which a charter was granted at the last Annual Assembly. This being the date of their Annual Election, I also had the pleasure of installing the officers elected to serve the ensuing year. On account of the absence of some of the old officers, no degrees were conferred, although a candidate was in waiting, so I occupied the time in giving the Companions such instruction, in Council work, as I thought might benefit them in the future. Judging from appearances I am led to believe that the members of this young Council will take hold in earnest and in time have an organization worthy of the name.

New Councils.

On December 18th, I received a petition, signed by eighteen Royal and Select Masters praying for a dispensation to establish a Council at Greenville, Darke County, Ohio, to be known as Matchette Council U. D., accompanying the petition was the consent and recommendation of Franklin Council No. 14, and the consent of Sidney Council No. 70, Van Wert Council No. 73, and Reese Council No. 9. After a careful examination of the situation I became fully satisfied that it would be for the best interests of Cryptic Masonry to have a Council there and on January 1st, 1904, issued the dispensation asked for, with Companion J. I. Allread as Thrice Illustrious Master. On January 19th the organization was effected under the supervision of the Right Illustrious Deputy Grand Master, Companion Nelson Williams, to whom I issued my proxy for that purpose. On September 14th, I visited them and found that a reasonable amount of work had been done and that the prospects for the future were good. They are as yet only partially provided with the necessary paraphernalia, but promise to secure the balance as soon as the finances of the body will permit. All the papers in the case are herewith submitted for such action as the Committee on Charters and Dispensations may recommend.

On August 2nd, I received a petition from Ironton, Ohio, signed by nine Royal and Select Masters, asking for a dispensation to establish a Council in that place, to be known as Ohio Council U. D., the consent and recommendation of Solomon Council No. 79 of Portsmouth, and the consent of Moriah Council No. 32 of Gallipolis, accompanied the petition, together with a draft for fifty-three dollars (\$53.00). Information on the subject from zealous Companions, who were conversant with the situation in that section, convinced me that the establishment of a Council in that city would be for the best interests of Cryptic Masonry. I therefore granted the dispensation, with Companion J. D. Foster as Thrice Illustrious Master, and the Council was organized on August 31st, Companion Andrew J. Fuller, Thrice Illustrious Master of Solomon Council No. 79, acting as my proxy on the occasion. All the papers in the case are herewith submitted for proper reference and action.

Inspection of Councils.

In arranging for the inspection of Subordinate Councils, I reserved Fostoria Council U. D., Matchette Council U. D., Cleveland No. 36 and Conneaut No. 40 for my personal supervision, and divided the balance into nine Arches, which I placed in the hands of the other Grand Officers, except Companion Henry True, R. Ill., G. Treas., who asked to be excused from the work, as he expected to be absent from home a part of the year, on account of ill health, and at my request Most Illustrious Companion William T. McLean consented to assist, but duties in other directions prevented him from taking on an equal share, which accounts for the Ninth Arch—assigned him—being composed of but two Councils.

In accordance with the foregoing, the following circular was issued and distributed as usual:

The Inspectors will take up this work immediately, and arrange with the Thrice Illustrious Masters of Councils within their districts for as early dates as possible, in order that each and every Council may be inspected before July 1st. Officers assigned to this duty will make out and forward to this office, a report of each Council as inspected, with bill of expenses.

The Thrice Illustrious Masters will cause this circular to be read in Council at the first regular Assembly after its receipt and make all necessary preparation, and arrangement for such Visitation and Inspection.

The fact that this Grand Jurisdiction now leads the Cryptic Rite Column of the world, is a just cause for rejoicing, not as much that we have overtaken and passed another Grand Council that has held the place for so many years with honor to itself and the fraternity at large, as the knowledge it affords of the zeal and devotion displayed by our Companions who participated in the labors of the Secret Vault which brought about this result, and I would urge upon all a continuance of this activity in the work so that we may maintain the position with credit, and enjoy the honor as long as possible.

In addition to other details, in connection with the inspection of Councils, I requested the Officers to take up the question of suspension for N. P. D. and see if some plan could be adopted that would reduce this continual drain on our membership. I am well aware that it cannot be eliminated entirely. but a united effort all along the line will do much toward it, and I suggested that Recorders be requested to send out notices. annually, or oftener, if necessary, to their members, stating when dues should be paid, as some people are afflicted with a poor memory, while others note not how swiftly time flies and the years are recorded on the pages of history. I was present at an Assembly, a short time ago, when two members approached the Recorder's desk to pay their dues, each of them brought forth a dollar to settle the bill when to their surprise the Recorder informed them that one owed three, and the other four dollars. that seven dollars would balance both accounts. They balanced and took their seats among the faithful, and went into a brown study over the fleetness with which years pass over the head of a craftsman who forgets to pay his dues at the proper time, or in their mind charge the Recorder with computing time by some lightning system of his own. The incident caused others who were present to inquire how they stood, all of which goes to prove that many such suspensions are due to forgetfulness. hence I am convinced that if the Recorders of Subordinate Councils will adopt the plan of sending out notices when payment is due, it will, at least, save the forgetful ones and add materially to the final figures on the balance sheet of the Grand Recorder.

Another matter, I requested the Inspectors to take up, was the habit some Councils have of holding meetings only when there is work. I am pleased to state, however, that this is not generally the case and the bodies that follow this course are among the exceptions, but nothing short of a flood or fire should prevent holding regular assemblies at the time named in the By-Laws. What would we think of a merchant, who only opened up his place of business when he felt like it or when customers appeared, and then complained of poor business? Compare his chances of success against a competitor who opened regularly. There would be but one outcome to such a course. Failure in one case and success in the other. It is much the same in our work, and I would admonish Subordinate Councils, that have been conducting their business in this way to change at once.

SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

1904, January 8th.

To Wooster Council No. 13, to elect and install officers. May 3rd.

To Wyoming Council No.17 to elect and install officers. May 20th.

To Solomon Council, No. 79, to elect and install officers. Good and sufficient reasons being given, in each case, for failure to elect at the proper time.

May 3rd.

To Canton Council, No. 35, to remove to apartments in the new Masonic Temple.

June 21st.

To Chillicothe Council, No. 4, to remove to apartments in the new Masonic Temple.

September 19th.

To Warren Council, No. 58, to remove to apartments in the new Masonic Temple, all of which were about completed on the dates mentioned, and speak well for the growth and prosperity of Masonry in those places.

September 22nd.

To Toledo Council, No. 33, to remove to the rooms of Yondota Lodge, No. 572, F. & A. M., on account of the expiration of lease on the building occupied since the fire, which destroyed the old temple.

July 2nd.

To Warren Council, No. 58, to hold a Special Assembly in the Masonic Lodge rooms at the city of Youngstown, Mahoning County, which is within its jurisdiction, for the purpose of conferring the degrees of Royal and Select Master on a class of candidates, resident in and about that city.

DISPENSATIONS REFUSED.

December 6th, 1903.

To Wyoming Council, No. 77, to hold the Annual Election of Officers at a Special Assembly, on December 16th, eight days prior to the date specified in the By-Laws, which was December 24th.

Dispensations to ballot on candidates at Special Assemblies were asked for and refused, to two Councils.

In this connection I would advise all Thrice Illustrious Masters to familiarize themselves with the Code, reference to its pages will clearly indicate how to proceed in many cases, and frequently save the Grand Master the unpleasant duty of refusing to grant dispensations asked for.

But points on which the Code is silent, or not understood, and new questions that may come up in Subordinate Bodies, are proper subjects for official decision, and reference of all such to the Grand Master is the proper course to take.

DECISIONS.

Questions—Is it proper for a new Council U. D. to receive petitions, ballot on candidates, and confer degrees on the date named in the dispensation for organization?

Answer—Yes, after the Council has been organized under its dispensation.

Question—Is it proper for a Council U. D. to receive applications for affiliation on demit?

Answer-No.

Question—Can a Council open and transact business, without either of the first three officers being present?

Answer—No. Not without a dispensation from the Grand Master.

Question—If for any reason, a demit granted is dated back, to a period previous to a Recorder's term, whose business is it to sign it, the old or the new one.

Answer—The Recorder in office at the time the demit was granted.

A Recorder of a Council U. D. wanted to know what Grand Dues his Council should pay, to which I replied as follows: One dollar each for all advanced since organization, or last report, and fifty cents each on all members who were not paying dues in other Councils.

A Thrice Illustrious Master, who found difficulty in creating an interest in the work among the members of his Council, thought something a little different would accomplish it and requested permission to use the ritual of the General Grand Council for that purpose. I replied, I had no discretion in the matter, that the ritual adopted, and now in use by the Subordinate Councils of this Jurisdiction, would have to remain as the standard until changed by order of the Grand Council.

To a Thrice Illustrious Master, who asked if it was necessary to hold an Annual Election of Officers, when their re-election was intended, I replied by referring him to Article 2, Section 5 of the Constitution of the Grand Council, which states that the officers of the several Subordinate Councils shall be chosen annually.

On May 4th, 1901, I received a communication from the Recorder of Lima Council, No. 20, for my approval of certain changes in their By-Laws, which provided for the appointment of the Capt. of the Guard, Conductor of Council, Steward and Sentinel, by the Thrice Illustrious Master. To which I replied that I would place the matter before the Grand Council at this session, for reference and action. It conflicts with Article 2, Section 5 of the Constitution of the Grand Council, and I could not approve it.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

That Resolution No. 14 on page 23 of the Code, adopted twenty-one years ago, as a measure to increase the interest in the Annual Assemblies of the Grand Council, and which provides that the degree of Super-Excellent Master be conferred annually in connection with the Annual Assembly, be so amended as to provide for conferring the Degrees of Royal and Select Master instead; the work to be rendered by the local Council at the place where the Annual Assembly is held, as the conditions have so changed in the decades that have passed, since this rule went into effect, that it no longer requires any special effort to create an interest in these annual gatherings. What the Representatives desire most is to witness the work in the Degrees of Royal and Select Master rendered by a well-informed Council, for comparison and information; besides many Councils do not confer the Super-Excellent, hence the knowledge gained is of no immediate benefit.

That a supplement containing the resolutions and decisions approved and adopted by the Grand Council, since the publication of the Code January 1st, 1889, be issued and distributed.

That the triangular pedestals, behind which the three principal officers of a Council are seated, be covered with purple, instead of crimson as at present.

That hereafter, Recorders of Subordinate Councils be required to make out three copies of their Annual Report, and send one to the Grand Master, one to the Grand Recorder and retain the other himself.

That the sum of five hundred dollars be given to the Ohio Masonic Home, to be added to the endowment fund.

VISITATIONS.

The greatest event in Cryptic Masonry, that has ever been my privilege to attend, in the twenty years that I have been in the work, occurred on January 15th, on the occasion of the inspection of Warren Council, No. 58, by Illustrious Companion Charles H. Giessen, Inspector of the Eighth Arch. The Companions of that Council planned to make it the Masonic event of the year, and they fully succeeded in so doing. Companions

from many surrounding cities were present. Cleveland, sixty miles distant, sent a delegation. The local committee met all incoming trains and escorted all arriving visitors to the Hotels. Invitations had been sent to all the Officers of the Grand Council, and six of them were in attendance.

The degrees of Royal and Select Master were conferred on a class of twenty-two and the work, in keeping with the general arrangements, was perfection itself; too much cannot be said in praise of it and the enthusiasm manifested by the Officers and Companions of this live Council.

After the Council was closed, one hundred and twenty-five Companions formed in line and proceeded to the Opera House, where one hundred and two resident and out-of-town ladies had a Council of their own, which they closed on our approach. and all repaired to the apartments of the W. R. C., which were beautifully decorated, to partake of a sumptuous banquet, while a fine orchestra discoursed appropriate selections, after which Companion Wilkins, as toast-master, in his happy, humorous way, introduced the speakers, who held forth for an hour or more. Among those who responded to toasts was Mrs. Fred W. Adams, wife of the Thrice Illustrious Master, who proved herself equal to the occasion in a witty and entertaining speech that brought forth liberal applause from the audience. After this we again repaired to the Opera House, where the light fantastic, and entrancing strains from Strauss and other celebrated composers, reigned supreme until tired nature called a halt. It was an occasion long to be remembered by those who were present, and Warren has shown to the world that the possibilities of a Council are equal to those of any Masonic body. A few years ago this Council, after a period of depression, which nearly ended its existence, took on new life, put Companions in office, who could and would work for its interest. From a weak, struggling Council, with little hope for the future, it now holds the ninth position in this Jurisdiction in members, and ranks with the best in excellence. Their net gain the past year was 55, and all this success is due to the fact that officers and members, under the direction of Companion Fred W. Adams, T. Ill. Master, and Right Illustrious Companion William A. Spill, faithfully discharged their duty to the craft.

FOSTORIA.

January 8th, 1904, I visited and inspected Fostoria Council U. D. and was much pleased with the progress this young Council has made. The apartments are appropriate, and paraphernalia, so far as provided, good; but best of all, every officer seemed to have been selected on account of his peculiar fitness for his work, which was exemplified in a way that would do credit to any Council. Every part was well done, showing careful study and deep interest throughout and it gives me pleasure to recommend a favorable consideration of their case at this time.

CONNEAUT.

On March 1st, I made an official call on Conneaut Council, No. 40; as this is my home, and my first light in Cryptic Masonry was gained here I am naturally friendly towards it: but in truth and justice to its officers and members, must say that it is entitled to favorable mention. It has a full equipment of everything needed in the work, which is in the hands of a capable set of officers, who take pride in rendering it in the best possible manner. In the last few years, it has gained much in favor with the craft outside, as well as within the fold. With a steadily increasing membership from a field now forming a large class, with more promised later on, it may be ranked with the best.

CLEVELAND

On April 12th, 1904, I visited and inspected Cleveland Council, No. 36, which has the honor of being the largest in the state. The apartments occupied by it are beautiful, commodious and appropriate. The equipment is complete and the degrees were conferred with a view of impressing candidates with their beauty and importance. I have had the pleasure of visiting this body, officially, on several occasions and always found it maintaining a high standard of perfection.

SALEM.

On May 26th, by invitation of Companion R. V. Hampson, I visited Omega Council, No. 44, located at Salem. It was on

the occasion of the inspection of that body by Illustrious Companion Charles H. Giessen, in whose company I made the journey. Companion Hampson met us at the station on our arrival, and except while we slept, was at hand until our departure for home late the following morning, and to him and the Companions there, we are under obligations for many courtesies. The degrees of Royal and Select Master were conferred in an excellent manner, and evidence on every hand went to show that only a place near the right of the line would satisfy them. A delightful carriage ride about the city the next morning, in company with Companions Hampson and Dr. Yenkling, Principal Conductor of the Work, which included a visit to one of the large manufacturing plants, was a pleasant ending to a most enjoyable visit.

LOGAN.

Having learned that a delayed train prevented the regular inspector from making Bellefontaine, on the night appointed for the inspection of Logan Council, No. 85, and the possibility that it might be passed, I arranged to perform the duty myself, August 10th, and am glad that I did so as it afforded me an opportunity of meeting Companions who had held twelve regular and four special assemblies in the past year, during which time they had advanced thirty-five, making a membership of eighty in four years, fully one-half being present. The Royal and Select Master's degrees were conferred in a very impressive manner. This Council is well supplied with everything necessary in the work and are deserving of praise for the progress made since organization.

ELYRIA.

August 31st I visited Elyria Council, No. 86, and found the same degree of enthusiasm existing there as has marked that body since its organization. It is well located in a thriving city, with a great future before it and there is every reason to believe that this vigorous young Council will gain in strength and importance with age.

Notwithstanding the fact that some of the Subordinate bodies failed to make a good showing, yet I am pleased to state surprising results have been attained in places, where judging from the past, it was least expected, and a review of the records, show the number of what might be termed weak Councils, are gradually growing smaller, that one after another are taking on new life, gaining strength, courage and position and giving object lessons to the less favored ones to copy and follow after. This leads me to believe, that in time, with such attention as each case demands, prosperity will attend every constituent of this Grand Council.

While the outlook today is brighter than ever before in the annals of this Jurisdiction, we must recollect that this condition of the Rite is the result of many years of earnest and constant labor, that it was not brought about by any sudden awakening of interest or sentiment, and as one by one gradually came to the front in the past, so must others follow in the same order in the future. We cannot expect every Council to show an increase each year, as the tide ebbs and flows in fraternity, as in nature, and we have every reason to look forward with confidence to the ultimate prosperity of every Subordinate Council in this Iurisdiction. I would suggest, to the members of all Councils, the benefit of judicious missionary work among eligible and desirable Companions, many of whom have been led to believe that the capitular degrees complete Ancient Craft Masonry, and without investigation pass on to the Commandery. To whisper good counsel in the ear of such Companions and advise them that the thrilling events enacted in the third and seventh were further detailed and explained in the work of the Council, would be simply performing a duty we owe to the Craft. Aside from this laudable effort we ask nothing. Cryptic Masonry has long since passed the stage of possibility, each year finds it more firmly established. No influence other than its own merit accomplished it, and the ranks are filled with a free will and accord membership.

While we may look with satisfaction on the past and pleasure on the present, it is well to remember that only continued activity will preserve what we have, or gain additional honors. The history of the world proves that former greatness alone never assured a like future. Experience and observation, during the past year, has convinced me more than ever of the great benefit annual inspections are to Subordinate Councils and the high standard Cryptic Masonry has attained in this Jurisdiction, is largely due to this influence. The inspection of a Council is always a pleasant event, and brings out a large attendance, and I am strongly in favor of inspecting each and every Council at least once a year, of making a positive rule that it must be done, and if no candidate is available, use a substitute.

CONCLUSION.

Illustrious Companions:—The time is near at hand, when I shall surrender to another the important trust you placed in my keeping one year ago.

I appreciate the high honor conferred by electing me to this exalted position, and I sincerely hope I have performed its duties to your entire satisfaction. I assure you I have used my best judgment and ability in their discharge.

I desire to return my heartfelt thanks to all who have assisted me in this great work and for courteous treatment and high honors received wherever I visited. Special thanks are due the Grand Recorder for valuable assistance cheerfully rendered. To all the Grand Officers for the prompt and cheerful performance of the duties assigned them, to Past Grand Officers and Officers of Councils for assistance given when called upon, and finally to the Companions at large for manifesting so deep an interest in the work as to make this the greatest year in the history of Cryptic Masonry in this Jurisdiction. Companions, I thank you all.

Masonic Home.

To the M. Ill. Grand Council R. & S. M. of Ohio:

COMPANIONS: -

As your representative on the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home I take pleasure in submitting to you the report of the Trustees and recommend that a summary of the same be printed in the Proceedings of the Grand Council for this year.

From this report you will perceive that the number of inmates in the Home is now greater than at any previous time and that it is occupied to its full capacity. The good work has been continued under the able management of our Superintendent, John W. Parsons, and the Home is accomplishing the work for which it was created.

The expenditures for the past year have been unavoidably greater than during any previous year, principally for two reasons: First, the increase in the number of inmates which would naturally entail additional expense, and second the fact that the cost of all articles going into the ordinary maintenance account has been considerably higher than before. Coal, food and clothing are among the items which constitute the largest part of our expenditures and it is in these items chiefly that we have had our increase of cost.

The improvement of the grounds has been carried on by means of funds specially donated for that purpose and the grounds are now assuming an appearance of finish and completeness befitting the magnificent building which they surround.

The Board of Trustees recognize the liberal support which has been accorded to this great charity and have no reason to doubt that it will be continued. We hope the day is not far distant when the income from the permanent fund will be sufficient to render unnecessary any special donation. The natural increase in the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter will give an everincreasing per capita income for the current expenses and our wish is that any donation which may be made out of the funds of the Grand Council this year shall be contributed to the permanent fund. This fund is invested in safe securities, the income of which already amounts to a considerable sum, and the principal of which is not encroached upon for any purpose. It now aggregates over \$40,000.00.

Thanking the Grand Council for what it has done in the past, we fraternally request that out of the abundance which has blessed the Grand Council this year you will donate such amount for this worthy object as you may be able with due regard to the estimated expenses of the Grand Council for the coming year.

Herbert R. Whiteman, June 14, 1904, of apoplexy, age 66. It is a singular fact that four of these seven deaths occurred in the short month of February, just one week apart, and all on Friday.

Bro. Agler and Mrs. Cady were buried in the Home cemetery, the others having been taken to their former homes for interment.

On January last we were saddened by receiving intelligence from Columbus of the hopeless illness of our beloved Brother, ex-Governor Asa S. Bushnell, who had been for a number of years one of the Trustees of our Home and Chairman of our Executive Committee. Bro. Bushnell died on the 15th of January. His remains were brought home and, after lying in state at Christ Church, Episcopal, and being viewed by thousands of sorrowing friends, was, on the 18th, borne to his last resting-place in beautiful Ferncliff, many State officials and other distin-

guished men being present. Our Board of Trustees attended the service in a body, and on their return to the hotel a meeting was held, a committee consisting of Bros. William B. Melish, W. J. Akers, and J. H. Bromwell was appointed to prepare and submit appropriate resolutions expressive of the feelings of the members of the Board in this mournful event. The committee subsequently reported the following preamble and resolutions, which were unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home, held in Springfield on Monday, January 18th, 1904, a committee consisting of William B. Melish, William J. Akers, and Jacob H. Bromwell was appointed to present a tribute of respect to the memory of Asa S. Bushnell, 33d Degree. The committee presented the following, which was, on motion, ordered spread in full upon the minutes of the Board and a copy sent to the family of our late Trustee:

ASA S. BUSHNELL, 33°,

The insatiate conqueror of mankind, Death, has taken from the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home our beloved associate and co-worker in the cause of Masonic Charity,

ASA S. BUSHNELL, 33°.

Our harp is tuned to mourning and our organ unto the voices of those who weep.

Again we are reminded that Death reigns in all the portions of our time. Death regards not the sacred engagements and the pleasant intercourse and those improving joys which are known to Free Masons. Summoned in the midst of his usefulness, our beloved Brother has entered the Home above. We behold his sun at meridian and rejoiced at its brightness, but, alas! it soon set and the evening shades of existence closed around him forever. In our companionship of years we have enjoyed with Asa S. Bushnell the charms of a friendship founded upon the principles of religion, morality, and philanthropy. Bro. Bushnell

was an ideal Free Mason, a man of honor and of conscience, prefering his duty to everything beside, even to his life; independent in his opinions and of good morals; submissive to the laws, devoted to his family, to his country and to humanity, kind and indulgent to his Brethren; a friend to all virtuous men, and ready to assist his fellows by all means in his power. Our beloved frater died as becomes a Christian knight, with his armor on, in fullness of years and fullness of strength.

While we his memory cherish, let us his virtues imitate and his death improve. The grave does not end all. We are heirs of a large and fruitful hope. "Thy dead men shall live" in holy memories, in widening influence, in higher ideals of human life, in the perpetuated sanctities of true Christian knighthood. Our saddened hearts reverently cherish the memories of our dead with divinely-inspired longings and anticipations. We join our tears with that loved and loving wife who was the inspiration of his life, and with their children, but we mourn not as those who have no hope. The night of sorrow may be long and dark, but joy cometh in the morning. The shadows chase the sunlight here, but with the dawning of the new and immortal day the shadows will forever flee away.

We place upon our records this tribute of our love and admiration for one who was faithful, in season and out of season, in all the cares and responsibilities of the management of the Ohio Masonic Home.

We can say no more. God buries his workmen, but He carries on his work, and, after depositing the sprig of acacia and the wreath of melancholy ivy at the tomb of our Brother, let us turn to our temporal duties of carrying on that work of charity, the Masonic Home of Ohio, with which the name of Asa S. Bushnell must always be associated in loving recognition.

Believing that a few words concerning the early history of the Home would be of interest to the Craft, I beg leave to offer the following:

The first suggestion of a Masonic Home in Ohio on which official action was taken came from M. E. Grand High Priest W. B. Hillman, in his address to the Grand Chapter at the session held at Springfield, October 3d, 1888. The matter was referred to the Committee on Charity, which reported in favor of the project and recommended the appointment of a Committee of three to confer with like Committees from the Grand Lodge, Grand Council, and Grand Commandery.

The recommendation was adopted, and the following Companions were appointed by M. E. Grand High Priest J. W. Iredell, Jr.: W. B. Hillman, W. W. Savage, and J. H. Bromwell.

At subsequent meetings of the Grand Bodies named, like Committees were appointed as follows: From the Grand Lodge—J. W. Iredell, Jr., Henry Perkins, C. C. Kiefer. From the Grand Commandery—Samuel F. Forbes, G. B. Harmon, Edwin Morrell. From the Grand Council—Levi C. Goodale, J. W. Chamberlin, T. S. Matthews.

This Joint Committee reported in favor of the project and in inviting the Scottish Rite Bodies to unite in the enterprise, all of which was approved by the various Grand Bodies, and the following appointed as members of the first Board of Trustees. viz.: C. C. Kiefer, J. H. Bromwell, J. W. Iredell, Jr., John M. Stull, Charles A. Woodward, George D. McBride, W. B. Hillman, Leander Burdick, Levi C. Goodale, J. W. Chamberlin, G. B. Harmon, S. F. Forbes, Edwin Morrell, William B. Melish, W. J. Akers.

Of these fifteen Brothers, eight are still serving as Trustees, viz.: John M. Stull, J. W. Iredell, Jr., W. J. Akers, J. H. Bromwell, William B. Melish, Levi C. Goodale, George D. McBride, Leander Burdick.

The following Brethren have been appointed members of the Board since that date, Max J. Mack, of Cincinnati, appointed in 1890 and serving until 1896; Edward Harford, of Springfield, appointed in 1890 and still serving; Brenton D. Babcock, of Cleveland, appointed 1892 and serving until 1895; Asa S. Bushnell, of Springfield, appointed in 1893 and serving until his death in January, 1904; Gibson H. Robinson, of Cleveland, appointed in 1903 and still serving; Dr. E. J. Cutler, of Cleveland, appointed in 1896 and serving until his death in 1903; John P. McCune, of Columbus, appointed in 1896 and still serving; Henry Perkins, of Akron, appointed in 1896 and serving until his death in 1901; Nelson Williams, of Hamilton, appointed in 1899 and still serving; Martin J. Houck of Davton, appointed in 1901 and still serving; E. L. Lybarger, of Spring Mountain, appointed in 1901 and still serving; A. F. Vance, Jr., of Urbana, appointed in 1904 and still serving.

Of the original members the following have since died, viz.: W. B. Hillman, G. B. Harmon, J. W. Chamberlin, C. C. Kiefer, Samuel F. Forbes.

Of those subsequently appointed the following have passed away: Henry Perkins, Dr. E. J. Cutler, Asa S. Bushnell.

The corner-stone of the Home was laid October 19th, 1892, M.:W.:Bro. Levi C. Goodale, Grand Master, presiding.

Dedicated October 23d, 1895, M.:W.:Bro. Carroll F. Clapp, Grand Master, presiding.

Opened for residents, April 1st, 1897:

The first year 47 persons were admitted. In 1898 the number was increased to 77, in 1899 to 115, in 1900 to 138, in 1901

to 145, in 1902 decreased to 136, in 1903 decreased to 132. This year we have increased to 149, the largest number yet reported.

Three years ago the Board of Directors of Wittenberg College, of this city, very kindly offered scholarships to any two of our children. We were not, at that time, prepared to avail ourselves of the offer. Last year, however, we sent one of our girls, Ursula Heileman, who will attend again this year, and one of our boys, Dyke Wetherell, will start in with the opening of the fall term.

Nelson's Business College, of this city, has also favored us with a scholarship for the past three years. Ada Hawx will be the student this year, commencing in September.

We very much appreciate the educational advantages thus afforded our children through the generosity of the local colleges.

We are gratified to say that while writing this report the contract for the Hospital to be erected at the Home by the Order of the Eastern Star of Ohio has been let and the foundation commenced. It is expected that the building will be under roof before cold weather sets in.

Your Committee on Jurisprudence offers the following resolution, and recommends its adoption, viz:

"Amend Article XI of the By-Laws, by inserting after the word 'Council' on line 3, the following, 'including, in the case of Councils under Dispensation, all who have been Advanced to the Degree of Select Master, and also the Petitioners for the Dispensation, who are not members of consenting Councils."

And your Committee also recommend the adoption of the following By-Law, to be known and numbered as Article V of the By-Laws:

ARTICLE V. By-Laws.

"The Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder, shall each, within twenty days after his Installation, enter a good and sufficient Bond to be approved by the Grand Master, in the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars, payable to the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio, conditioned that he shall faithfully account for all moneys and effects of the Grand Council, that may come into his hands, and shall otherwise perform the duties of his office, as prescribed by the Constitution, By-Laws and Resolutions of the Grand Council."

"Such Councils under Dispensation shall have all the rights and powers of regularly Constituted Councils, except, that of receiving and acting upon Petitions for Affiliation and of collecting dues from petitioners for the Dispensation who are members of consenting Councils."

Your Committee moves that said proposed amendment shall be laid over in accordance with the provisions of Article I, Section II, of the Constitution, to the next Annual Assembly of this Grand Council.

Our hope in the face of the certain fact of death is being clothed with immortality when our mortality is stripped from us. The familiar faces vanish only awhile. Companionship ceases with us only for a period. In the assemblage of the Grand Council above there will be no obituary committee for the vocabulary of death shall have forever perished.

OHIO.

Within our own Jurisdiction many have bowed to the behest of the Sovereign Grand Master of the Universe. The limited space of the printed record, and the limited knowledge of your Committee of the lives, makes mention of every deceased Companion impossible. Of the number there is one, S. Stacker Williams, who, having served with distinction his beloved order is specially remembered in our printed pages by one who is more familiar with his life and Masonic record, than your committee.

NEW YORK.

The vacant chair, the extinguished light once so brightly burning, the unfinished designs upon the trestle-board left for other hands to finish, reminds us of the departure of Right Illustrious Companion, Benjamin Strasser. He was born at Easton, Pa., February 18th, 1849, died at his home in Albany, N. Y., February 28th, 1904. In Cryptic Masonry, Companion Strasser was an earnest and very active worker. He was Grand Conductor of the Grand Council. At home, where he was best known, he is spoken of in the most endearing terms as a Brother, Friend and Citizen.

ARKANSAS.

One of the oldest members of Cryptic Masonry in Arkansas, Companion W. K. Dobbins, Past Grand Principal Conductor of the Work, for the year 1870, passed away at Little Rock, June 24th, 1904, in the eighty-third year of his age. In fraternal reverence for his memory appropriate resolutions and records were made in the state where he had so long labored. His re-

mains were conveyed to Conway, Ark., which had once been his home, and were buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, attended with reverent affection by members of his Lodge, Chapter and Council.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Ferdinand Ulrich, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council of North Carolina, died suddenly at Johns Hopkins' Hospital, Baltimore, Md., August 8th, 1904, after an illness of short duration. He was born in the City of New York and went to North Carolina with his parents, early in life. His Masonic career began in 1875 and at his death he had received all the degrees, save one, in the York Rite and Scottish Rite Bodies. His career was that of a Christian, God-fearing man. Firm and decided in his views, he has left a record worthy of imitation.

MISSOURI.

With Masonic honors the mortal remains of Past Grand Master Elijah H. Phelps were laid to rest in Kansas City. February 21st, 1904, dissolution having taken place the 18th inst. Companion Phelps was a product of New England, hailing from Hadlyme, Conn., where he was born January 4th, 1840. Wending his way westward he earned a livelihood by teaching, entered journalism for a period of twelve years, was a clerk in the Legislature of Illinois during the notable strife for a seat in the Senate between Richard Oglesby and John A. He found a resting place in Kansas City in 1882, engaging in business in that city until his death. He entered the Secret Vault in Shekinah Council, No. 24, and was greeted a Select Master, January 29th, 1892. In 1892 he was elected Thrice Illustrious Master. He served the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters as Marshal in 1894, Principal Conductor of the Work in 1895, Deputy Grand Master in 1896, and Grand Master in 1807.

S. STACKER WILLIAMS

S. STACKER WILLIAMS.

Born March 20th, 1836—Died April 3rd, 1904.

After a long and hopeless illness, our beloved Companion, S. Stacker Williams, has responded to the summons for which he has been so patiently waiting for several years. Stricken years ago with a fatal illness, he did not lay aside his working tools as many others would have done in like physical condition, but with that indomitable will which has been one of his distinguished characteristics he labored on and on, until the palsied tongue refused to speak, and the palsied hand refused to obey the dictates of the brain, and then, and then only, did he confess that he was mastered. This was some two years ago and since that time he patiently awaited the end.

He was born on March 20th, 1836, at Dover in Stewart County, Tennessee. He subsequently removed to Ohio and made this State his home until the time of his death. His Masonic record is as follows:

On March 17th, 1864, he was made a Master Mason in Center Star Lodge, No. 11, at Granville in Licking County, and in 1867 he became Worshipful Master of said Lodge. He was made a Royal Arch Mason in Warren Chapter, No. 6, at Newark, on February 6th, 1865, and became High Priest of the Chapter in 1881. He was made a Royal and Select Master in Bigelow Council, No. 7, at Newark, on February 8th, 1865, and became Thrice Illustrious Master of the Council in 1880. He was created a Knight Templar in Clinton Commandery, No. 5, at Mt. Vernon, on April 22nd, 1865; became a member of Newark Commandery, No. 34, at Newark, by affiliation, on May 25th, 1880, and on October 15th, 1886, he became a charter member of St. Luke's Commandery, No. 34, at Newark. He was Eminent Commander of his Commandery in 1882 and 1883.

He became a member of Ohio Consistory, S. P. R. S. 32nd Degree, at Cincinnati in December, 1865, and was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General 33rd Degree, and honorary member of the Supreme Council, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, at Providence, R. I., on September 20th, 1887.

He was appointed Senior Grand Deacon of the Grand Lodge

of Ohio in 1867. In 1881, and again in 1883 and 1884 he was elected Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, and in 1885, and again in 1886 and 1887 he was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge. It was during the time of his service as Grand Master that the Cerneau troubles in Ohio culminated, and while there has been, and will continue to be differences of opinion as to whether the best methods were employed in the settlement of that troublesome controversy, the fact remains that, having adopted the open combat policy, no man in Ohio was so well qualified to lead the forces of legitimate Freemasonry to a successful issue, as was our lamented Companion and Brother. He never did things by halves, and in that controversy, having satisfied himself that he was right in his position, he marshaled his forces, and, swerving neither to the right nor to the left, he drove spurious Freemasonry out of the Grand Lodge and all of its subordinates, and by aid of the courts, established the doctrine that a Masonic Grand Lodge is an authority supreme in itself, touching all matters of purely Masonic nature.

He was a great Masonic student and acquired a large Masonic library which he donated to the Grand Lodge when he found that his days of usefulness were ended. He served many years as chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence in the Grand Council of Ohio, and his reports were widely read and favorably commented upon by prominent Masons throughout the world. He was the Venerable President of the Masonic Veteran Association for twelve years, and was also President of the National Association. He died at Washington C. H. in this state, and was buried in the cemetery of his home city of Newark on April 5th, 1904.

Companion Williams was not a man of negative character, pliant, without opinions and convictions, fearing to give offense or in some way lose by forcibly speaking his mind; on the contrary, he was a man of fixed and firm convictions and was at all times obstinate in the advocacy of what he thought to be right. He was sometimes sharp and severe in his denunciation of those who seemed to him to be in the wrong, but he was devoted in his friendship, had a generous heart and quick sympathies, and

the remembrance of fraternal affection and kindly deeds will keep his memory green in the hearts of his brethren.

And now we close this brief memoir with the solemn thought that the way appointed for our deceased Companion to the realms of the hidden mystery, is the way appointed for each one of us, and that sooner or later we must obey the dread summons of the grim messenger Death, and go to be numbered among the countless throng which ever increases on the unseen shore.

INTRODUCTORY.

The outlook for Cryptic Masonry is growing brighter in every Grand Jurisdiction in which its beautiful and most important Grades are worked with that degree of enthusiasm to which they are so justly entitled.

The absence of the pre-requisite feature to further advancement, so long deplored, and in many instances in mournful cadences, is more than offset by the select character of its membership. The true votaries of Freemasonry are not among those who would use its degrees merely as stepping stones to a grade that would give them an opportunity to pose in public in the showy dress to which their ambition only aspires—and the absence of all such from its arches is no loss to Cryptic Masonry.

The fact that the gain in membership in the Councils of the United States has been for the past twenty years more than one thousand each year should inspire every Royal and Select Master with renewed zeal in the propagation of the Rite.

Without further prefortory remarks the report of your committee is submitted in the following order:

ARKANSAS, 1903.

Proceedings, 8vo., pp 48. Little Rock, 1903.

A special Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the state of Arkansas was held in the city of Little Rock, October 5, A. D. 1903. A. Dep. 2903, for the purpose of receiving and welcoming the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the United States at its Eighth Triennial Assembly.

The Grand Master, M. Ill. S. D. Dodge, presiding.

"The Grand Council was opened in ample form with prayer by the Grand Chaplain."

The officers and members of the General Grand Council being in waiting in an adjoining room, were escorted into the hall and received with Grand honors.

A cordial and hearty welcome was extended to the officers and members of the General Grand Council by the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. S. D. Dodge, and after a brief response by the M. P. Grand Master, Comp. William H. Mayo, the Grand Council was closed.

The Forty-first Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Arkansas was held in the city of Little Rock, November 19th, 1903, M. Ill. Comp. S. D. Dodge, Grand Master, in the Grand East. Five Past M., I. Grand Masters were in attendance and six Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Twelve Chartered Councils on the roll.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master was a concise report of Official Acts. In it he congratulates the Companions that peace and harmony prevail within that Grand Jurisdiction and "that a new interest has been awakened in the Cryptic Rite that may in the future result in a better understanding and appreciation of its privileges and teachings."

The Grand Representatives of ten Grand Councils were present. The Grand Representative of the M. I. Grand Council of Ohio, Comp. Edgar E. Bryant, of Fort Smith, was not in attendance.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. John Brodie, reported a balance of \$159.48 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Fay Hempstead, Grand Recorder, reported number of greeted current year, 17; affiliated, 2; reinstated, 2; dimitted, 4; died, 5; and suspended for non-payment of dues, 3. Net gain current year, 9. Total number of members, 263.

Four Councils are reported as having paid no dues for some years, but one of which, however, was in the list of Councils reported.

The Proceedings do not contain any Report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. I. Comp. G. W. Skidmore, of Little Rock, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Fay Hempstead, of the same city, was reelected Grand Recorder.

Six Companions received the Degree of Royal and Select Master in the Grand Council.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Arkansas will be held in the city of Little Rock, November 18, 1904.

CALIFORNIA, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 94. San Francisco, 1904.

The Forty-fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of California was held in the City of San Francisco, April 18, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, R. Ill. Comp. David M. Sutherland, Deputy Grand Master, presiding.

Nine Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council. Number of Councils making returns, thirteen.

Number of Chartered Councils enrolled, sixteen.

Ten Past Grand Masters were in attendance.

Number of greeted current year, 198; affiliated, 9; reinstated, 3; number dimitted, 14; excluded or suspended, n. p. d., 4.; died, 29.

Net gain current year, 163.

Total number of members, 1,658.

Seventeen Grand Councils were represented by the presence of their accredited Grand Representatives.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. James Hedges Hall, of Santa Ana, was not in attendance.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. A. H. Merritt, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, was read by the Deputy Grand Master. In his Address the Grand Master depreciated his unavoidable absence and submitted a brief report of his official acts and also congratulated the Companions upon the prosperity of Cryptic Masonry and upon the renewed interest manifested in the Rite.

M. I. Comp., Past Grand Master Edward Richards Hedges, being absent on account of his serious illness, a resolution of sympathy was unanimously adopted and sent to him by the Grand Council.

The Grand Treasurer, M. I. Comp. Franklin H. Day, reported a balance of \$1,735.70 in the Grand Treasury.

M. Ill. Comp. William A. Davies, Grand Recorder, submitted his usual complete report of all matters pertaining to the clerical department of the Grand Council. The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Grand Council:

"Resolved, That henceforth the use of any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors by Councils of this Jurisdiction be and the same is hereby prohibited."

The Report of Correspondence is a very interesting resume of the Proceedings of thirty-one Grand Councils submitted by the Chairman of the Committee, Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. James Bestor Merritt.

The printers are doubtless at fault for substituting the word Chapters for Councils, in his "Salutatory," and making a "mix-up" of Massachusetts with Kansas and Kansas with Louisiana under the head, respectively, of Kansas and Louisiana.

Companion Merritt justly believes that levity or horse play has no place in the Masonic system and in his review of Indiana says in reply to the Chairman of the Correspondence Committee:

"Under Massachusetts Companion Mordhurst thinks it difficult to confer the S. E. Degree without levity. Now, believing as we do, that Masonry is one of God's ways of communicating religious knowledge, we see no reason for levity in any degree. We have conferred the R. A. and the S. E. without any and see no difficulty in so doing. All that is necessary is to call the attention of the Companion to the real nature of the degree and the lesson it is intended to teach. Even the P. M. in "long form" can be conferred without the slightest breach of decorum. Confusion and perplexity do not necessitate ungentlemanly or unmasonic conduct."

And in the same connection under the head of Massachusetts:

"More than thirty years' continuous experience on the floor and in the East of every legitimate Masonic body has taught us that horse-play and nonsense have no proper place therein, and that a candidate can, and should be, conducted from the door of the E. A. Lodge to the Altar of the Thirty-third Degree and the Triangle of the Temple without the slightest experience, physical or mental, which would tend to lower his estimate of the high and holy lessons intended to be taught. Masonry teaches our duties toward God and man, and should increase our love and respect for both and never ought to be turned into a circus for the amusement of spectators."

Ohio for 1902 receives fraternal review. Courteous mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer and

the affairs of the Grand Council, with very complimentary allusions to the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence, for which the writer begs to make due acknowledgments.

Our esteemed Companion has no use for the "pre-requisite" excuses of pessimistic Companions for the non-success of their Councils because they "are not taken under the wing of the Grand Encampment," and says in his review of Minnesota:

"We have in Oakland Council shown what can be done by a little system of prerequisition of our own. Instead of inviting R. A. Ms. to join the Council before going into the Commandery, we have petitions in their hands when they take the R. A. Degree and inform them that they are not yet R. A. Ms., and we are assured that they never will be till they have labored in the S. V."

And in his conclusion in the same connection he forcible says:

"We can find no plan so perfect—theoretically and practically—as the one we use in California, and ably expressed by our predecessor, Companion Bishop, in one word—Work.

"That is the secret. Half a dozen workers in a Council or Grand Council will do more to extend the Order, and exemplify its principles, than weeks of discussion as to methods.

"If every one of the 6,000 Council members would do a little work we would soon occupy the position we so much deserve."

M. Ill. Comp. David M. Sutherland, of Los Angeles, was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. Wm. A. Davies, of San Francisco, re-elected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence, M. Ill. Comp. James. Bestor Merritt, of Oakland.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of California will be held in San Francisco, April 17, 1905.

COLORADO, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 40. Denver, 1903.

The Ninth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Colorado was held in the City of Denver, September 16, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903; M. Ill. Comp. James H. Peabody, Grand Master, in the Grand East.

Eight of the nine Chartered Councils on the roll were represented in Grand Council. Four Past Grand Masters were present and fourteen Grand Councils were represented by their accredited Grand Representatives.

M. Ill. Comp. John Humphreys, of Trinidad, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, was in attendance.

In his interesting Annual Address Grand Master Peabody congratulates the Companions of that Grand Jurisdiction upon the harmony and prosperity prevailing therein and forcibly says:

"If we would but put forth the same zeal, and exercise the same earnest ambition to memorize the ritualistic work of the Council Degrees, and confer them with the same realistic effect as is employed in the other branches of Masonry, a very large percentage of the Royal Arch Masons of our country would, I firmly believe, hasten to complete their chain of Masonic knowledge by becoming possessed of the beautiful allegory of Royal and Select Masters, and become efficient Craftsmen in the several arches."

This has been fully demonstrated in Ohio, after the adoption of the system of Annual Official Visitations, a better rendering of the work was soon inaugurated and the monthly meetings of the Subordinate Councils more regularly held—many Councils having previously thereto been in the reprehensible habit of omitting their regular meetings if there was no candidate at hand. It will without doubt be found that dormant Councils are invariably the result of such causes and the Companions permitting this state of affairs are usually loudest in their complaints of "no work," and, instead "of getting a move on themselves," are earnest in their supplications for a pre-requisite panacea or the introduction of mergers or other fads as an excuse for their own supineness.

R. Ill. Comp. Arthur E. Jones, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$814.65 in the Grand Treasury.

The Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Ernest Le Neve Foster, reported that all of the Subordinate Councils had "made returns and paid dues" and that current year there were 36 advanced, I affiliated, 5 reinstated, 5 died, 5 dimitted and 11 suspended, leaving a net gain of twenty-one in membership.

Total number of members, 463.

No Report on Foreign Correspondence contained in the pamphlet under review and the Proceedings were mostly of local interest.

M. Ill. Comp. Marshall H. Dean, of Glenwood Springs, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Ernest Le Neve Foster, of Denver, re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

"The Tenth Annual Grand Assembly will be held in Denver, Wednesday evening, September 21, 1904."

CONNECTICUT.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 93. Hartford, 1904.

The Eighty-sixth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Connecticut was held in the City of Hartford, May 11, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904. Th. Ill. Comp. Edward E. Fuller, Deputy Grand Master, in the Grand East.

The twenty-two Subordinate Chartered Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Seven Past Grand Masters were in attendance and ten Grand Councils were represented.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. Dwight Waugh, of Stamford, was not present.

The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Charles A. Jones, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, was prevented by illness from being in attendance, and the following was adopted by the Grand Council:

"Resolved, That the heartfelt sympathies of the Grand Council be extended to M. P. Grand Master Charles A. Jones in his illness, which prevents his presence at the Grand Council to-day. And we extend to him our sincere hopes and prayers that the Supreme Grand Master may in his own good time restore him to health."

In his Annual Address the Grand Master submits a concise report of his Official Acts and makes appropriate mention of the demise of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. William Wallace Lee, of that Grand Jurisdiction.

In his report of the restoration of the Charter of a Subordinate Council he says that upon that occasion "the Degrees of Royal and Select Masters were conferred upon a candidate whose application had been held in abeyance for over twenty years. The Committee to whom this petition was originally referred, and

who were unable to report, owing to the revocation of the Charter of this Council, was the same Committee that finally reported favorably in his behalf, after many years.

"The old saying that 'All things come to those who will but wait' was never more vividly illustrated than on this occasion."

The Reports of their Official Visitations by the Deputy Grand Master, the T. I. G. M., and P. C. W., show that the Companions of Connecticut are kept in close official touch.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Isaiah Baker, Jr., reported a balance of \$754.10 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. James McCormick, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced current year 267, affiliated and re-instated 7, number dimitted 5, stricken from roll n. p. d. 22, suspended 3, died 75.

Net gain in membership current year, one hundred and sixtynine.

Total number of members, 4,020.

On report and recommendation of the Committee on Charters—to whom the petition therefore had been referred—a Charter was granted for the establishment of a new Council.

The portrait of Past Grand Master Joseph S. Stokes is contained in the Proceedings.

The Report on Foreign Correspondence, submitted by Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. John H. Barlow, the able Chairman of the Committee, is a concise review in forty-three pages of the Proceedings of thirty-one Grand Councils. In his review of Illinois he says in relation to the formation of the Grand Council of Colorado:

"We do not, nor have we ever, admitted that there was anything clandestine in the formation of this Grand Council. They had a perfect right to form themselves as they did into an independent Grand Council, and that Grand Body at their last Triennial Assembly at Little Rock, we are pleased to note, so decided, which we think settles the question."

Ohio for 1903 receives courteous notice. Fraternal mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer and of the Proceedings of the Grand Council. The Report of your Com-

mittee on Foreign Correspondence is kindly commended with an excerpt approvingly made therefrom.

M. Ill. Comp. Edward E. Fuller, of Tolland, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. James McCormick, of Hartford, re-elected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence, M. Ill. Comp. John H. Barlow, of Hartford.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Connecticut will be held "in New Haven, on the Wednesday succeeding the second Tuesday in May, 1905."

ENGLAND AND WALES.

The Annual Meeting of the Grand Council of Royal and Select and Super Excellent Masters of England and Wales was held in London, March 10, 1904, A. Dep. 2904, R. Ill. Comp. Frank Richardson, P. D. G. M., in the Grand East as M. I. Grand Master in the absence of the Earl of Euston.

The usual attendance of Officers of the Grand Council and Companions from Subordinate Councils is reported. Number of chartered Councils enrolled, twenty-eight.

Representatives from thirteen Grand Councils were present. The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. C. F. Matier, P. D. G. M., was in attendance in the discharge of his Official Duties as Grand Recorder. In his Annual Report the Grand Recorder says:

"During the year ending 29th February, 1904, 21 Certificates have been issued, a number but little short of that issued last year, thus clearly showing that the interest in these beautiful Degrees, which are so closely connected with the Craft and Royal Arch, still continues, and that our active Councils lose no opportunity of pressing their claims on every earnest student of Freemasonry. It is sincerely to be hoped that this interest may long continue, and that during the coming year increased progress may reward the exertions of those energetic Companions who so ardently labor in the cause of the prosperity of the Cryptic Rite in England and Wales, etc."

"The total number of registered members is now 1,051."

The business of the Annual Assembly was of the usual routine character, relating to local affairs.

A balance of £66.19.4 was reported in the Grand Treasury.

Announcement was made that the M. Ill. Grand Master "had appointed Bro. Sir Reginald Hanson, Bart, as Deputy Grand Master, whereupon the Grand Dictator of Ceremonies proclaimed:

"Be it known that Colonel Sir Reginald Hanson, Bart., Past Grand Warden, Provincial Grand Master of Mark Master Masons for Middlesex, a member of the Supreme Council, 33°, is appointed Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of England, etc., etc."

The Grand Council was closed in Ample Form.

GEORGIA, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 29. Macon, 1904.

The Sixty-first Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Georgia was held in the City of Macon, April 26, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, M. Ill. Comp. Robert L. Colding, Grand Master, presiding.

Fifteen of the twenty-three working Chartered Councils of that Grand Jurisdiction were represented in Grand Council.

Two Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of sixteen Grand Councils were in attendance.

The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Colding, of Savannah, is the Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master is a thoughtful Masonic paper, with no pessimistic fears for the future of the Rite. In its Introductory he devoutly says:

"Through the infinite wisdom of Almighty God, whose gracious kindness knows no end and of whose manifold mercies and blessings we are daily recipients, we are permitted once more to meet together in Annual Assembly to renew our associations, profit by the experiences of the past, legislate for the future, and in every way do all that we can to assist in upbuilding this noble

institution which has been the pride of past generations and which must continue in its noble and glorious work until the sun of human intellect shall set forever. Peace, harmony and good will pervade within our Jurisdiction, not one question in Masonic law has been submitted to me for a decision, which speaks eloquently of the intelligence of the presiding officers of Subordinate Councils, and of the fraternal spirit of the Companions who compose them."

Under the head of "Necrology" he makes sympathetic mention of "the removal to the world beyond" of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. William A. Graham, of that Jurisdiction.

He reported the issue of Dispensations for the establishment of two new Councils and the resuscitation of one dormant Council.

The Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. W. A. Wolihin, reported that twenty-two of their "twenty-seven working Councils had reported current year, but he submitted no report in detail of 'work in the Rite.'"

Number of Companions on the roll of Councils reported, 781.

On Report and Recommendation of the Committee on Charters and By-laws, Charters were voted to the two Councils working under Dispensation.

In concluding their Report the Committee on Jurisprudence "congratulates the Grand Council on the condition of Cryptic Masonry in its Jurisdiction. United and prosperous, its possibilities for good in the future are unbounded, and too much praise cannot be given to our retiring Grand Master for the great part he has had in bringing it up to its present high standing."

In his "Address of Acceptance" the Grand Master-elect forcibly says:

"The cause of lapse of interest in any organization is more often than otherwise the fault of the officers. They must make the meetings attractive, the lodge room cheerful. Then the Companions will gladly come and the officers will receive that support without which they will become disheartened and ready to give up hope."

And "let the officers see that all the necessaries for a proper presentation of the Degrees is at hand. Let them elevate the mental as well as the moral tone of their membership, read and study our ritual and history, attend the Assemblies, make them interesting and instructive, and when the next Grand Assembly is opened in this hall, it will be before the representatives of an

enthusiastic, earnest and aggressive body of devoted Cryptic Masons."

No Report on Foreign Correspondence. M. Ill. Companion Joseph C. Greenfield, of Atlanta, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. W. A. Wolihin, of Macon, re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Georgia will be held in the City of Macon, April 25, 1905.

ILLINOIS, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 90. Peoria, 1903.

The Fifty-first Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Illinois was held in the City of Chicago, October 28, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. John C. Hallenbeck, presiding.

Thirty-eight Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, fifty-two.

Fifteen Past Grand Masters were in attendance. Thirtythree Grand Councils were represented by the attendance of their Grand Representatives.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, Ill. Comp. George W. Curtiss, of Peoria, was reported among those present.

The Annual Address of Grand Master Hallenbeck, whose portrait follows the title page of the Proceedings, is a concise report of his official acts and recommendations. He reports—very wisely in the opinion of your Committee—that he had "sent a letter to the Thrice Ill. Masters of the various Councils located in Chicago, forbidding them conferring at the same Assembly the Super Excellent Degree with the Royal and Select Master Degrees without permission from the Grand Master."

The Companions are congratulated upon their harmony and prosperity. He believes in the efficacy of Official Visitations and that "it is the duty of the Grand Officers to visit the Subordinate Councils" for their encouragement and instruction.

R. Ill. Comp. John C. Smith, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$770.96 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Gil. W. Barnard, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced current year, 357; affiliated, 17; reinstated, 9; number of dimitted, 43; suspended, 80; died, 48. Net gain at date of report, 213. Additional membership in subsequent reports, total gain, 415.

Total number of members, 3,764.

The Obituary Committee in their report make fitting mention of the demise of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. Wilbur F. Bromfield, of that Grand Jurisdiction.

The minutes of the "Eighth Mass Convention" of the Rite in Illinois were read in Grand Council and suggested changes in Ritual were referred to the "Committee on Condition of the Rite."

The following, in recognition of the literary services of M. Ill. Comp. George W. Warvelle, was unanimously adopted by the Grand Council:

"Resolved, That the thanks of this Grand Council are due and are hereby extended to M. Ill. Comp. George W. Warvelle for the admirable book from his pen on the "History of the Rite," a work that has not only taken much time, but shows no small amount of research in its compilation. His love for the Craft, his zeal in its behalf, are characteristic of that Companion which this Grand Council delights to honor."

A Past Grand Master's Jewel was presented to the retiring Grand Master.

The Report on Foreign Correspondence, submitted by M. Ill. Companion George W. Warvelle, Chairman of the Committee, is a very interesting paper of twenty-eight pages. In it twenty-eight Grand Councils are concisely reviewed, with brief papers on "The Sleepers," "A Question of Legitimacy," "Cryptic Nomenclature," "Historical Notes," "The Bath Kol," and the "Broken Triangle." The writer concurs in the views of Companion Warvelle in relation to the "Broken Triangle," although dissenting from a too literal construction of Cryptic history.

Fraternal notice is extended to Ohio for 1902 with a liberal quotation from the views of the writer. Upon the subject of "Cryptic Nomenclature" Comp. Warvelle says:

"I have several times adverted to our present clumsy and inexpressive name of Royal and Select Masters, and the propriety of such a change as shall indicate a distinctively Masonic character for our Degrees. The name that suggests itself is 'Cryptic Masons.' This term has received the approval of our best writers, and is now extensively employed, in an unofficial way, by a very large portion of the Craft. The subject of a change has many times been mooted in this Jurisdiction and a strong sentiment seems to have developed that such change is desirable if not necessary. But the strong conservative feeling that has ever characterized the Masons of Illinois has thus far prevented us from taking so radical a step as to discard the name bestowed upon the Rite by the fathers who founded it, and, as a consequence, we still carry the old and cumbersome title."

Well! whether cumbersome or otherwise, the old designation of a "Royal and Select Master" without "prefix or affix" is good enough for the writer.

Of the Rite Comp. Warvelle says:

"A survey of the past year discloses the fact that the Cryptic Rite of Freemasonry has made substantial advances over previous years, and that at no time in our history have we been stronger or more influential than at present. I note also another, to me at least, significant fact, the men who are prominently identified with this branch of Masonry, are, as a rule, the earnest, zealous, and learned members of the craft—the select, if you please, in fact as well as in name."

M. Ill. Comp. A. M. Hallowell, of Jacksonville, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Gil. W. Barnard, of Chicago, re-elected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Correspondence, M. Ill. Comp. George W. Warvelle, of Chicago.

INDIANA, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 111. Indianapolis, 1903.

The Forty-Eighth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Indiana, was held October 20, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, in the City of Indianapolis.

The Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. George F. Keiper, Sr., in the Grand East.

All of the fifty-four Chartered Councils in this Grand Jurisdiction were represented in the Grand Council.

Seventeen Past Grand Masters were in attendance and Grand Representatives from twenty-six Grand Councils were present.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, Ill. Comp. Simeon P. Gillett, of Evansville, was not in attendance, but sent a letter through the Grand Recorder "expressing his regrets at being unable to be present at this meeting and extending greetings."

The Annual Address of Grand Master Keiper is an interesting report of the official acts and recommendations of an efficient energetic Grand Officer. His encyclical to the Companions of that Grand Jurisdiction upon the assumption of the duties of Grand Master was of that enthusiastic character calculated to inspire zealous effort upon the part of every Companion. In it he says:

"When a Companion has been exalted to the degree of Royal Arch Mason, you are still under obligation to him to give him all the Masonic Light which you possess, in the lawful way, of course. See that he petitions your Council for it forthwith, and "don't wait for your Thrice Illustrious Master to solicit you to attend the stated communications of your Councils. Hold up his hands by attending the meeting and giving him such help as he may need and solicit."

Appropriate mention is made of the demise of Past Grand Master of the late M. Ill. Comp. John J. Richards, of that Grand Council.

Dispensations were issued for the establishment of two new Councils and Grand Master Keiper congratulates the Companions of Indiana upon the prosperity of the Rite within that Grand Jurisdiction.

The Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. Martin H. Rice, reported a balance of \$1605.07 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Calvin W. Prather, Grand Recorder, reports number advanced, current year, 285. Affiliated, 17. Re-instated, 26. Number died, 40. Dimitted, 43. Suspended, n. p. d., 26.

Suspended, u. c., I. Expelled, 3. Net gain for current year, two hundred and fifteen. Total membership reported, 3357.

On report and recommendation of the Committee on Dispensations, charters were granted to the two Councils working under dispensation.

A Past Grand Master's Jewel was presented to the retiring Grand Master.

M. Ill. Comp. Henry W. Mordhurst, General Grand Recorder in General Grand Council, Chairman of the Committe on Foreign Correspondence, submitted a courteous review of the printed proceedings of thirty Grand Councils. Under the head of New York he reproduces the "interesting report on the early history of the Grand Council" of New York, by Past Grand Master George McGown.

Ohio for 1902 receives fraternal notice, and commendatory mention is made of the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

In his conclusion Comp. Mordhurst says:

"Cryptic Masonry has made wonderful strides since this writer submitted his first review to the Grand Council of Indiana, fifteen years ago, and if financial prosperity continues, can be depended upon to make even greater gains. Indiana is not only holding its own, but will soon advance from seventh to sixth in number of members, while Ohio is crowding Massachusetts for first place."

The Annual Proceedings of Massachusetts and Ohio for 1903 show that Ohio now has first place.

M. Ill. Comp. Joseph I. Schumacher, of Anderson, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Calvin W. Prather, of Indianapolis, reelected Grand Recorder.

INDIAN TERRITORY, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 49. Denison, 1904.

The Tenth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Indian Territory was held in Mucogee, April 13, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, Rev. Comp. Joseph Samuel Murrow, M. Ill. Grand Master, in the Grand East.

Eight Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, eight.

Number of Councils U. D., one.

Seven Past Grand Masters were present.

The Grand Representatives of twelve Grand Councils were in attendance.

M. Ill. Companion William L. Eagleton, of Pawnee, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, was present as Deputy Grand Master and was at this session advanced to the Grand East. The congratulations of Ohio are extended to our M. Ill. Companion.

The reminiscent character of the Annual Address of Grand Master Murrow makes it of especial interest. In this connection he says:

"Had anyone prophesied to me when I first came to this Territory, nearly forty-seven years ago, that I should live to witness such a condition of material wealth and development as we now see, I should have replied that the age of Methuselah has long since passed. Little did I think when I used to jog along on my pony from old North-Fork town on the Canadian, over this very prairie, on preaching trips to old Creek Agency, an all-day ride, that I should ever witness here a great city, with its blocks of brick buildings, its schools, its colleges, its churches, its big hotels, its railroads, its oil wells and its ten thousand people. Then glad was I to stop all night with old friend Job, and stake my pony on the grass. Those were good old times, my brethren. There were no lawyers, nor grafters, nor speculators, nor editors to worry us to death. Poor Lo was monarch of all he surveyed. He knew nothing of the black diamonds and oil and asphalt and natural gas that lay concealed in the bowels of his country, which in the near future would make the white people rich. His own natural gas in the councils of his people was something he highly esteemed, and this he spouted and gushed forth at every opportunity. In those good old times we never heard the slogan, "remove the restrictions.' On the contrary, I have heard white people, as they passed through the Territory, declare: 'I would not live in this God-forsaken land if the government and the Indians would give me the whole of it.' Now they are moving—well, the other place—to get a little spot of this 'God-forsaken land.'"

He also gives an interesting recital of the introduction, through his efforts, of Cryptic Masonry in the two Territories. In his conclusion he says:

"I am old, but I hope to see the day when the Cryptic Rite will be as popular and as much sought after as the other branches of Masonry. The Degrees and their teachings are as beautiful and valuable as any taught in Masonry."

R. Ill. Comp. Ira B. Kirkland, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$146.65 in the Grand Treasury.

In his Annual Report the Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. R. Y. Morrison, pays the following beautiful tribute to Grand Master Murrow, viz.:

"I would signally fail in my duty if I allowed this opportunity to pass without paying a just and well-earned tribute to our Grand Master, Joseph Samuel Murrow, 'the Patriarch' of Indian Territory Masons. To this grand and good old man is due the most sincere respect and truest loyalty that exists in the breast of every Mason in this Jurisdiction. Long and faithfully has he served the Fraternity in the Indian Territory. He has enjoyed, and justly, its highest honors, and now to that white hair and snowy beard is due the most sublime tribute our noble Fraternity has to bestow. Ours has been the privilege to serve under him, to shake his hand, and for this we are greatly honored, and when it pleases the Divine Architect to call our beloved brother to his reward, he will leave a vacancy in our ranks and an ache in our hearts that will remain with us for many years to come. May God bless him!"

He reports number advanced current year, 21; affiliated, 3; number dimitted, 2; suspended, 5; died, 3. Net gain current year, fourteen.

Total membership reported, 224.

No Report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. William L. Eagleton, of Pawnee, was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp., Rev. Joseph S. Murrow, of Atoka, elected Grand Recorder.

"The Eleventh Annual Assembly of the Royal and Select Masters of Indian and Oklahoma Territories will be held, D. V., in Oklahoma City, O. T., on Wednesday after the third Tuesday in April, 1905."

IOWA, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 58. Oskaloosa, 1903.

The Fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Iowa was held in the City of Oskaloosa, September 2, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. F. W. Craig, presiding.

Nine of the sixteen Chartered Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Two Past Grand Masters were present and eighteen Grand Councils were represented by the attendance of their Grand Representatives.

M. Ill. Comp. A. R. Dewey, of Washington, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, was present and an active participant in the legislative affairs of the Grand Council.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. F. W. Craig, is a succinct report of official duties discharged. In it he extols "the beautiful ceremonies and valuable lessons" of the Cryptic Rite and congratulates the Companions of Iowa upon the success of their labors in the S. V. He issued Dispensations for the establishment of five new Councils and believes the outlook to be favorable for the establishment of others in very desirable localities if zealous efforts are made upon the part of the Companions.

R. Ill. Comp. R. C. Hoffman, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$774.38 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Alf. Wingate, Grand Recorder, reports number advanced current year, 111; affiliated, 21; number dimitted, 20; suspended, 3; died, 4; net gain current year, 105.

Total number of members reported, 734.

On report and recommendation of the Committee on Councils, Charters were granted to four Councils working under Dispensations.

Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Wm. F. Cleveland, Chair-

man of the Committee on Correspondence, concisely and courteously reviews in twenty-four pages the Proceedings of twenty-seven Grand Councils.

In his Introductory he says: "Encouraging reports come to us from nearly all of the Grand Jurisdictions reviewed, and the day is not far distant, we hope, when it will command that attention and recognition from the Masonic world that its rare ritualistic beauty and intimate connection with Ancient Craft Masonry richly entitles it."

Fraternal notice is extended to the Proceedings of Ohio for 1902. The method of official opening mentioned was one of those errors that sometimes inadvertently occur from really zealous efforts, but has since been corrected.

Of the Report of Your Committee on Foreign Correspondence, forgetting evidently that Ohio is officially represented by M. Ill. Comp. A. R. Dewey, he says:

"Iowa is not even mentioned; perhaps he did not get a copy of our Proceedings, but he must have known that we had a new Grand Council in Iowa. For twenty years the Cryptic Rite was controlled by the Chapters, for which deplorable condition the Grand Council of Ohio was primarily the indirect cause; but now that we have asserted ourselves, established Chartered Councils throughout the Jurisdiction, and have a full-fledged Grand Council, we rather look to the Grand Council of Ohio to extend to us at least a formal recognition. He presents a good report and seems very much encouraged with the outlook, and truthfully says: "The prosperity we enjoy, as a body, is measured largely by the amount of interest we take in it ourselves."

In reply, first—If Comp. Cleveland will refer to the Report of the writer for 1901, he will find due notice given to the Organization of the Grand Council of Iowa, with the Congratulations of the Grand Council of Ohio, etc. Second, As the Chairman of the Ohio Committee was not favored with a copy of the 1901 Iowa Proceedings, its review was necessarily omitted in the 1902 Report of the Ohio Committee, much to the regret of the writer.

Third—As the Grand Council of Ohio has always maintained its autonomy from the date of its organization over sixty years ago, the writer fails to see how the Iowa merger was in any manner due to Ohio. The efforts to disrupt the Grand Council of Ohio by the concerted action of its enemies were signally defeated

and their action and delusive arguments certainly should not be charged to the Grand Council of Ohio.

M. Ill. Comp. Charles O. Greever, of Des Moines, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Alf. Wingate, of the same city, re-elected Grand Recorder.

KANSAS, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 120. Leavenworth, 1903.

The Thirty-fifth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Kansas was held in the City of Wichita, February 16, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, M. Ill. Comp. Thomas G. Fitch, Grand Master, presiding.

Representatives were in atendance from eight Subordinate Councils.

Number of working Chartered Councils on the roll, ten.

Eight Past Grand Masters were present and Grand Representatives were in attendance from twenty-one Grand Councils. The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. Thomas L. Bond, of Salina, was among the number present.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Thomas Geyer Fitch, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, is a brief recital of Official Acts and Recommendations. In it he expresses his regrets at the apparent apathay in their Crypic Circles, but is hopeful for the future. He makes appropriate mention of the demise of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. Archibald Argyle Carnahan, of that Grand Jurisdiction. Companion Carnahan was born at Loudonville, Ohio. He also mentions the demise of the late M. Ill. Comp. Andrew M. Callahan, also of that Grand Jurisdiction. Portraits of these eminent Companions are contained in the pamphlet under review.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Peter J. Freling, reported a balance of \$608.77 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Wm. M. Shaver, Grand Recorder, reports that:

"An examination of the returns received from the nine Councils shows the following facts: Only four of the Councils report work, twenty-six Companions being greeted; two Companions were admitted, and two restored, making a gross addition of thirty. To offset this were the following deductions: Dimitted, thirty; died, twelve; suspensions, non-payment of dues, forty-five; total, eighty-seven. The net loss in membership is fifty-seven; two Councils report slight gains, one maintains its last year's enrollment, and six show net losses."

Of their commendable plan for a membership at large, he says:

"The lists of membership in defunct Councils, which constitute the roll of Cryptic members at large of this Grand Council, are not in good condition. Notices of dues have been sent to such of the lists as are now available, where the postoffice addresses could be ascertained. It will take some little work to get this provision of our law running smoothly, but we are convinced that this method will prove successful in straightening out a number of Cryptic records. We hope to make a more satisfactory showing of this matter during the coming year."

The Report on Foreign Correspondence submitted by the Grand Recorder, as Chairman of the Committee, is a careful and courteous review of the Proceedings of thirty Grand Councils in an interesting paper of fifty-six pages.

In his review of Illinois he expresses the belief that three-fourths of the Subordinate Councils "in the various Jurisdictions are in a state of 'innocuous desuetude,' " and that "the thoughtless aspirant for the waving plume and glitering sword of the Templar looks upon the Cryptic Degrees as a sort of insignificant, harmless side-show, and the average Royal and Select Master acts as though he was afraid this was true, or dared not set his face indignantly against such a thought."

The leaven of energy and zeal infused in every Council by but one or more enthusiastic, intelligent Companions, with occasional Official Visitations, would soon change any camatose condition in Subordinate Councils.

Under the head of New York he says in re to the proposed change of name:

"We must confess that we are not impressed with the desirableness of the amendments offered by Comp. Osgoodby. The

change in name recommended is like attempting to change the names of the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter to the 'Grand Lodge of Symbolic Masons,' or 'Speculative Masons,' and to the 'Grand Chapter of Capitular Masons.' We admit the desirableness of the word 'Masons' in the title, but the phrase 'Royal and Select' has become firmly fixed, and we believe it would be far better to change to the 'Grand Council of Royal and Select Masons,' or 'Royal and Select Master Masons,' than to the term 'Cryptic Masons.'"

The term "Mason" is "understood," although not expressed and therefore would be but a useless change.

Ohio for 1902 receives fraternal notice and commendatory mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Copeland and of the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Wm. C. Reichenbach, of Topeka, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Wm. M. Shaver, of the same city, re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

"The Thirty-sixth Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Kansas will be held in the City of Topeka, Kansas, on Monday, February 15, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904."

KENTUCKY.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. . Frankfort, 1903.

The Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Kentucky was held in the City of Louisville, October 19, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, Companion Eusebius S. Mayes, M. Ill. Grand Master, in the Grand East.

Eleven Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, twenty.

Number of Chartered Councils reporting current year, fifteen.

Seventeen Past Grand Masters were in attendance.

The number of Grand Councils represented is not stated.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. Charles Henry Fisk, of Covington, was in attendance.

The Annual Address of Grand Master Mayes is a succinct report of official duties discharged.

In it he appropriately says of our loved friend, the late M. Ill. Companion James W. Staton, whose demise was noted in the Report of your Committee last year—

"On the 27th day of June, 1903, the gate of that undiscovered country where we are to receive our wages, was open for our Very Illustrious Grand Recorder James W. Staton, who was one of the brightest stars in the Constellation of Kentucky Masons, having worn the highest honors of Symbolic, Capitular and Cryptic Masonry. In 1893 he was the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky; in 1876, Most Excellent Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter; in 1889, Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council, and at the time of his death he was Very Illustrious Grand Recorder and Chairman of the Committee of Foreign Correspondence of the Grand Council, which office he has occupied since 1898. In every position he occupied he performed the many duties devolving upon him with zeal and fidelity and honor to the Fraternity."

M. Ill. Comp. William Ryan, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$442.37 in the Grand Treasury.

The Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Henry B. Grant, reported number advanced current year, 76; affiliated, 6; reinstated, 12; number died, 13; dimitted, 11; suspended, 17; net gain reported, forty-three.

Total number of members reported current year, 916.

The Constitution of the Grand Council of Kentucky is published as an Appendix to the Proceedings. In Sec. 8 of Article I, the Grand Council—loyal to Craft Masonry—designates the several Masonic Bodies officially recognized as Masonic, and denounces Cerneauism and all of its illegitimate progeny. Membership in, or co-operation in any manner therewith by any Royal and Select Master, subjecting such Companion to expulsion.

MAINE, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 104. Portland, 1903.

The Forty-ninth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Maine was held in the City of Portland, May 6, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Charles E. Meservey, presiding.

Representatives were in attendance from thirteen of the sixteen Chartered Councils on the roll of the Grand Council.

Thirteen Past Grand Masters were present with the Grand Representatives of twenty-four Councils.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. Webster Hazlewood, of Andover, Mass., was not present.

Fourteen pages were required for the Annual Address of Grand Master Meservey—a very complete report of the Official Affairs of that Grand Council. In it he pays a fitting tribute to the memory of Past Grand Masters, the late M. Ill. Companion Josiah H. Drummond, the late M. Ill. Companion Edward P. Burnham—whose obituaries were published in your Proceedings of last year—and of the late M. Ill. Comp. Denison E. Seymour, all of that Grand Jurisdiction.

The Official Visitations of the three principal Grand Officers show that close official relations are maintained with the Subordinate Councils.

In his Report of Visitations the G. P. C. W., R. Ill. Comp. Albro E. Chase, expresses the belief that all Subordinate Councils should hold their regular Assemblies, and work at each when possible, instead of doing class work on special occasions. The experience in Ohio fully sustains the necessity of regular meetings.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Leander W. Fobes, reported a balance of \$562.88 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Stephen Berry, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced current year, 262; affiliated, 5; reinstated, 5; number dimitted, 13; suspended from membership, 15; expelled, 1; died, 48. Net gain current year, 195. Total number of members, 3,057.

R. Ill. Comp. Albro E. Chase, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, in a well-written paper of forty-three pages, fraternally reviews the Printed Proceedings of thirty-two Grand Councils.

Ohio for 1902 receives courteous notice. Of its Annual Assembly he says:

"Just how a Mayor of the city, not a Mason, could be introduced into a Grand Council we do not understand. But he made a most pleasing address of welcome to the members of the Masonic Order."

In reply: The reception was in a congregated Assembly of the officers and members of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio and *not* in open Grand Council. (This may be done before the regular opening or by "calling off" for that purpose after the opening.)

Commendatory mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Copeland and of the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence. In his conclusion Companion Chase pertinently says:

"We have quoted quite liberally from the conclusions of many of the Correspondents, so that it is hardly necessary to call your attention to the fact that Cryptic Masonry flourishes just so far as those interested therein make themselves felt in the performance of duties severally enjoined upon them. We, in Maine, are among the first in activity—we have only one Council that lags, and that more from its location, perhaps, than for any other reason. But we must not allow our interest to wane, and that it may not we must labor upon many of the lines indicated in the excerpts that have been made."

M. Ill. Comp. Wm. Freeman Lord, of Auburn, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Stephen Berry, of Portland, reelected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence, R. Ill. Comp. Albro E. Chase, of Portland.

"The Fiftieth Annual Assembly will be held at Masonic Hall, Portland, on Wednesday, May 4, 1904, at 2 P. M."

MASSACHUSETTS, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 117. Boston, 1908.

The Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Massachusetts was held in Boston, December 9, A. D. 1903, A. L. 5903, M. Ill. Comp. Forrest E. Barker, Grand Master, in the Grand East.

"The entrance of the Most Illustrious Grand Master and Grand Officers was proclaimed by Illustrious Companion Fred M. Sampson, Grand Master of Ceremonies, at nine o'clock and twenty minutes A. M., and the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form, Illustrious Companion James E. McCreery officiating at the Altar."

Nineteen Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, twenty-seven.

Four Past Grand Masters were in attendance and Grand Representatives were present from nineteen Grand Councils.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. J. Gilman Waite, was in attendance in the discharge of his official duties as Grand Recorder.

The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Barker, in his Annual Address forcibly says in relation to Official Visitations:

"In my judgment too much cannot be said in praise of this portion of the work of the Grand Council or of the value of this system of annual inspection now, through the activity and wisdom of my predecessors, so firmly established in the policy of this Grand Council. When effectively conducted these visits afford an invaluable means for aiding and inspiring the officers and members with broader and higher conceptions of our sublime degrees and for encouraging them to more assiduous devotion to the general welfare of the Rite. To this constant supervision and the regular Exemplifications, hereinafter referred to, are due in the greatest measure that strength and vigor in the Subordinate Councils which is so flattering to this Grand Body."

M. Ill. Comp. William B. Lawrence, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$686.11 in the Grand Treasury.

The Board of "Trustees of the Funds" reported total investments of \$4,048.43.

The Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. J. Gilman Waite, re-

ported number affiliated, reinstated, etc., current year, 338; number dimitted, 80; suspended, 38; died, 103.

Net gain current year, 116.

Total number of members, 6,661.

As the membership in Ohio, reported by Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. William E. Evans, Oct. 13, 1903, is shown to be 6.827. Ohio now heads the list, with Massachusetts the close second.

A portrait on steel of Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Charles H. Norris, is a frontispiece to the Printed Proceedings.

The application for a Charter by the Council working under Dispensation was referred to the Grand Master with power to act.

R. Ill. Companion J. Gilman Waite, Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, devotes sixty pages of the pamphlet under review to a courteous resume of the Printed Proceedings of twenty-eight Grand Councils. Ohio, much to the regret of your Committee, not being among the number under review.

In concluding his very interesting report, Companion Waite pertinently says:

"The varying condition of the Rite, in different Jurisdictions, seems to be largely dependent upon the administration of the Grand and Subordinate Officers of their respective offices. One of the greatest drawbacks in the advancement of the standing of the Rite is the too rapid promotion of all officers. How frequently we read, at the end of a year entered upon with high and lofty intentions, of failure in their accomplishment, regrets over the failure, and little left but appreciation of 'the high honor conferred' and some good advice given to an aspiring successor, as 'the Emblem of authority' is yielded up to him. Yet this is no picture of the imagination. The result may be seen in the incomplete Returns of Subordinate to Grand Councils; lack of interest in the officers of subordinate bodies, because of the great neglect of those who are placed as the overseers of the Work; all tending to a general loss of interest; Councils becoming 'dormant,' Charters surrendered or arrested, ending in a somewhat disintegrated situation of the whole Jurisdiction.

"We have read considerable about 'Pre-requisites,' etc. The inference drawn from what we have read is that the first is Work; the second is like unto it, Work, and the Grand Officers who are trying to throw a rope (or straw, if you please,) up to the Grand Encampment in the hope that it will make an application for the Orders of Knighthood dependent upon membership in the Coun-

cil, as well as Lodge and Chapter, we believe, will accomplish far more for the Rite by encouraging the officers of Subordinate Councils to Work."

M. Ill. Comp. Forrest E. Barker, of Worcester, was reelected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. J. Gilman Waite, of Boston, re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of Committee on Correspondence.

MICHIGAN, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 136. Port Huron, 1904.

The Forty-sixth Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Michigan was held in the City of Lansing, January 18, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. John H. Kingsley, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, presiding.

Fifty-two of the fifty-eight Chartered Councils of that Grand Jurisdiction were represented in Grand Council. Fourteen Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of twenty-two Grand Councils were in attendance.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. George A. Cross, of Lawrence, was one of the number present.

In his Annual Address Grand Master Kingsley thoughtfully says in its introductory:

"The power and influence of Masonry for good seem boundless. As a social and fraternal organization it reaches out to every part of the globe. Everywhere we find evidence of its presence. The modest lodgeroom in the smaller towns and the magnificent structures in the great commercial centers, were all inspired by the same motives. Every man who crosses the threshold of one of these as a candidate for Masonic mysteries, from the smallest to the most imposing, conforms to the same ceremony. Within their walls every man is another's equal. The wealthy manufacturer sits at the banquet table with the man who works at the forge or lathe in his factory; the banker, beside the laborer; the scientist and the mechanic, the architect and the builder, the clergy and the layman, all meet on the same level, all are bound by the same ties."

His report of visitations and other official acts show a zealous interest in the Cryptic affairs of that Grand Jurisdiction.

M. Ill. Comp. Charles M. Norton, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$2,164.25 in the Grand Treasury.

The portrait of the Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Chas. A. Conover, precedes his Annual Report, in which he says:

"The net gain in membership is almost double what it was last year, showing an increasing interest in Council work throughout the State. Several localities are considering the formation of Councils, and the future looks exceedingly bright. The statistics show that one out of every three Royal Arch Masons in the State take the Council Degrees, and as only 40 per cent. of the Chapter members take Commandery Orders it is a highly satisfactory condition, showing that dependent Council membership would be of little benefit, as the extra members gained would use the Degrees only as stepping stones to something beyond, and have no special interest in the Council. Now, those taking the Council Degrees do so because they want them, not because they think they are obliged to."

Number advanced current year, 468; affiliated, 28; reinstated, 6; number died, 68; dimitted, 58; suspended, 54. Net gain current year, 322.

Total number of members, 5,130.

After an Official Reception of Grand Representatives, our Eminent "Companion Francis A. Blades, Grand Chaplain, extended congratulations to the M. Ill. Grand Master on the excellent attendance at this Annual Assembly, one hundred and five Companions being present, and recalled the time when the Grand Council was a mere handful of Companions struggling to advance the principles and teachings of Cryptic Masonry. Now Michigan is surpassed in numbers only by Ohio and Massachusetts."

· A Past Grand Master's Jewel was presented to the retiring Grand Master.

A portrait and biographical sketch of the late Eminent R. Ill. Companion Jefferson S. Conover, for several years Grand Recorder of the Grand Council of Michigan, is contained in the pamphlet under review.

R. Ill. Comp. Charles A. Conover, as Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, in an interesting report of seventy-two pages, submits a courteous summary of the Proceedings of the Grand Councils under review. Of Ohio he says:

"The Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Ohio was

held in September, 1903, but as the Proceedings have not yet reached this office, we are obliged to close our report without a review of Ohio, much to our regret."

The absence of the Ohio Proceedings is equally regretted by your Committee.

Companion Conover is to be congratulated "upon his work" and his appreciation of the duties of Correspondent. In his conclusion he modestly says:

"Here ends this my first Report on Correspondence for the Grand Council, and it is hoped that it will prove not altogether uninteresting to the Fraternity of this Grand Jurisdiction. The complaint has been not so much about the kind of a report, as that the Companions do not give time to reading them that they should. Certainly there is no way in which the Companions of this Jurisdiction can become familiar with the doings and methods of other Jurisdictions as well as by reading the Correspondence Reports published in the Proceedings of the various branches of the Craft. There is without a shadow of doubt a growing interest manifested in Correspondence Reports. I do not suppose the report just completed will exactly suit every reader, as each necessarily has his own idea of what a Correspondence Report should be, but it is now on record and must stand for what it is worth."

M. Ill. Comp. Dallas B. Alton, of Fremont, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Charles A. Conover, of Coldwater, elected Grand Recorder and Committee on Correspondence.

The Grand Officers were installed by the Venerable M. Ill. Comp., Past Grand Master Hugh McCurdy.

"The Forty-seventh Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Michigan will be held in the City of Detroit, on Monday, preceding the third Tuesday in January, 1905, (being the 16th), at 7 o'clock P. M."

MINNESOTA, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 55. St. Paul, 1903.

The Thirty-fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of the State of Minnesota was held in the City of Minneapolis, Oct. 12, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903. The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Eben E. Corliss, whose portrait faces the title page of the Printed Proceedings, in the Grand East.

Representatives were in attendance from the seven Chartered Councils of that Grand Jurisdiction.

Thirteen Past Grand Masters were present and Grand Representatives were in attendance from twenty-seven Grand Councils.

The Grand Representative of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery, was in attendance in the discharge of his official duties as Grand Recorder.

In a brief Annual Address the Grand Master reminds the Companions that their Councils "have made a satisfactory increase in the number of their members," and that "Cryptic Masonry is beautiful in itself; it is instructive and elevating to its members, who are all honored by having been received within its circle. We should be content that our Order is select, and that its doors are not open, but only ajar, to those who have the subordinate as well as the higher degrees of Masonry, and who evince some interest in the great truths and lessons of ancient Masonry. Cryptic Masonry does not need or desire great numbers; it wants and needs only the noble Adonirams, who possess zeal and genuine worth."

The Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. G. W. Merrill, reported a balance of \$265.27 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced current year, 89; affiliated, 4; reinstated, 1; number dimitted, 8; stricken from roll, 13; died, 8.

Net gain in membership current year, sixty-five.

Total number of members, 742.

A very interesting sketch of the early history of Cryptic Masonry in that State is contained in the pamphlet under review. The Convention of Delegates for the formation of a Grand Council, was held in St. Paul, December 12, 1870, and after the necessary preliminary legislation the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Minnesota was formed and its first Annual Assembly held. At this session it was

"Resolved, That St. Paul Council No. 11, Minneapolis Council No. 15, and Rochester Council No. 16, whose Charters were granted by the Grand Council of Iowa, now constituting the Grand Council of Minnesota, shall hereafter be designated in this Jurisdiction as St. Paul Council No. 1, Minneapolis Council No. 2, and Rochester Council No. 3, of Royal and Select Masters, and the Grand Recorder is hereby directed to endorse on the back of the Charters of said Councils a copy of this resolution."

In thirty pages of the Proceedings, R. Ill. Comp. Thomas

Montgomery, as Chairman on Correspondence, submits a courteous abstract of the Printed Proceedings of Grand Councils under review.

Fraternal notice is accorded to the Proceedings of Ohio for 1902 and commendatory mention made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Copeland and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Thomas G. Lee, of Minneapolis, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery, of St. Paul, re-elected Grand Recorder and Committee on Correspondence.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Minnesota will be held in St. Paul, October 10, 1904.

MISSISSIPPI, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 59. Vicksburg, 1904.

The Forty-ninth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Mississippi was held in the City of Greenville, February 17, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, Companion Phineas M. Savery, M. Ill. Grand Master, presiding.

Twenty-five Subordinate Councils were represented in Grand Council.

Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, forty-four.

Number of Councils reporting, thirty-three.

Number of Past Grand Masters present not stated.

The Grand Representatives of twenty-one Grand Councils were in attendance.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, Ill. Comp. S. M. Roane, of West Point, was one among the Companions who "responded to the last summons and passed out through the Arches into the Grand Council on high."

In his Annual Address the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Sanery, succinctly reports in seven pages the official transactions pertaining to his office. Sympathetic mention is made in his address of the demise of their Grand Lecturer, the late R. Ill. Comp. John Lloyd Spinks, and of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. John Riley, of that Grand Jurisdiction. The Grand Master having requested, through an official circular letter, that each

Grand Representative near the Grand Council of Mississippi should make an Official Report in re the Grand Council officially represented, the reports of eleven Grand Representatives are appended to the Address of the Grand Master.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Gus J. Bahin, reported a balance of \$611.98 in the Grand Treasury.

M. Ill. Comp. Frederic Speed, Grand Recorder, in his statistical summary, reports number advanced current year, 161; affiliated, 10; reinstated, 8; number demitted, 17; died, 25; suspended, n. p. d., 30. Net gain current year, 107.

Total number of members, 1,385.

Of the condition of the Rite Comp. Speed says:

"The number of Greeted, although not so large as in former years, has been sufficient to give us great encouragement and, not-withstanding the number of Returns of Councils is smaller, up to the same time than last year, the outlook is altogether favorable."

The Law Committee reported that jurisdictional lines between Subordinate Councils had been abolished "some years since" by the Grand Council in that Grand Jurisdiction.

Representatives were in attendance from thirteen Subordinate Councils.

Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, fourteen.

Thirteen Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of twenty-four Grand Councils were in attendance.

M. Ill. Comp. John R. Parson, of St. Louis, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, was present.

The portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Robert F. Stevenson, is a frontispiece to the Proceedings.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master is a very complete report of his Visitations and other Official Acts. Of his visitations he says:

"I have visited eleven out of the fourteen Councils in the Jurisdiction, encouraging each to the performance of duty. I regret my inability to have personally visited all. I have written letters to the Deputies in charge of Districts, but without encouragement or results. The District system is a failure. The Councils appreciate the visits of the Grand Council Officers and will recognize none other. Missionary effort alone can place Cryptic Masonry in its proper position, and it is useless to establish weak Councils and depend on the locality to furnish the stimulant necessary to raise them into vigorous growth."

Under Necrology he says:

"Our Jurisdiction has not been spared from the invisible hand, and it is well repeated that there are no distinctions between those upon the checquered pavement or upon ivory thrones. Three Past Most Illustrious Grand Masters have finished life's work and gone to their reward. Companions Reuben Barnsy, Elijah H. Phelps and Thomas Seal, honored, while living, by your suffrage and elevated to the highest position within your gift, were called during the year just passed. The Councils are draped in mourning for those who have led them into the ninth arch and the ranks of those who wrought with swords and trowels present no unbroken front."

He recommends that young men should be put in official positions and that Official Visitations should be made to every Subordinate Council.

The Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. Noah M. Givan, reported a balance of \$1,353.65 in the Grand Treasury.

M. Ill. Comp. Wm. H. Mayo, Grand Recorder, in his "Tabular Statement" reports number of advanced current year, 152; affiliated, 11; reinstated, 4; number dimitted, 23; suspended, n.

p. d., 21; died, 11. Net gain current year, 112. Total number of members, 1,084.

A biographical sketch and portrait of Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. William Raens Stubblefield, is contained in the pamphlet under review.

A brief Report on Foreign Correspondence was submitted by M. Ill. Comp. William H. Mayo, whose interesting table of statistics is appended to this report and due acknowledgments therefor herewith extended to our M. Ill. Companion.

M. Ill. Comp. Gib. W. Carson, of St. Louis, was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. Wm. H. Mayo, of the same city, reelected Grand Recorder.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 39. Omaha, 1904.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Nebraska was held in the City of Omaha, December 16, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, M. Ill. Comp. William L. Ritter, Grand Master, in the Grand East.

Twelve of the sixteen Chartered Councils on the roll were represented in Grand Council.

Eight Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of seventeen Grand Councils were in attendance.

The Forty-second Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of New Hampshire was held in the City of Concord, May 18, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Benjamin F. St. Clair, in the Grand East.

Eleven of the fourteen Chartered Councils of that Grand Iurisdiction were represented in Grand Council.

Seven Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of fifteen Grand Councils were in attendance.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. George H. Everett, of Laconia, was not reported present.

A portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. B. F. St. Clair, faces the title page, and a photogravure group of the Elective Officers of the Grand Council is also contained in the Proceedings.

Eleven pages sufficed for the Annual Address of the Grand Master, in which he concisely reports his Visitations and other Official Acts.

During his term of office he visited every Subordinate Council in that Grand Jurisdiction.

He makes appropriate mention of the demise of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. Waldo Adolphus Russell, one of the constant attendants and "very active members" of that Grand Council. He congratulates the Companions upon their prosperity and urges zealous active work upon the part of each for the furtherance of the interests of Cryptic Masonry.

The Report on Foreign Correspondence is an interesting paper of forty-four pages, submitted by the Chairman of the Committee, M. Ill. Comp. Frank D. Woodbury, in which the Printed Proceedings of twenty-eight Grand Councils are courteously and concisely reviewed. Ohio for 1902, among the number, receives fraternal notice. M. Ill. Comp. Charles Belcher, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted in thirty-three pages a succinct and courteous review of the Printed Proceedings of twenty-six Grand Councils.

Your Committee regrets that Ohio was not among the number under review.

The Ninety-fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of New York was held in the City of New York, August 25, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, M. Ill. Comp. Willard S. Brandt, Grand Master, presiding.

Representatives were in attendance from twenty-three Subordinate Councils.

Number of working Chartered Councils on the roll, 25.

Nine Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of twenty-two Grand Councils were in attendance.

A portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Willard S. Brandt, and also one of Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Gliddon precedes the title page of the Printed Proceedings.

The opening exercises were of the usual very impressive character customary in that Grand Jurisdiction.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, R. Ill. Comp. Irving L'Hommedieu, of West Medina, was present in the discharge of Official Duties as Grand P. C. W. in that Grand Council.

The Annual Address of Grand Master Brandt is a concise report of his Official Acts. In its Conclusion he pertinently says:

"The Cryptic Rite is steadily advancing, and the reports will show a steady growth and increase in membership. And, while some may think the only hope for the Councils is in making the Degrees pre-requisite, I believe, Companions, if our zeal was only commensurate with the beauty and worth of the Cryptic Degrees, our beloved Rite would occupy the high position in Freemasonry to which it is entitled, and with a cultivation of its social feature, a careful rendition of the work and a good attendance at the meetings, the future of Cryptic Masonry is assured.

"No Royal Arch Mason should be permitted to advance to the Orders of Knighthood without having his attention called to the beauty of the Council Degrees, and the necessity of being acquainted with them in order to have a full and intelligent understanding of Freemasonry. And I believe, Companions, if the effort is made, many candidates may be secured for the Councils."

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Peter Forrester, reported a balance of \$1,447.65 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Geo. Van Vliet, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced current year, 344; affiliated, 8; reinstated, 11; number suspended, 75; dimitted, 15; died, 56.

Net gain in membership current year, 217.

Total number of members, 4,604.

The efficient work of the Grand Recorder is apparent throughout the handsome volume of Proceedings issued by that Grand Council.

The Report on Foreign Correspondence, submitted by the able Chairman of the Committee, M. Ill. Comp. George M. Osgoodby, is an interesting paper of one hundred and three pages, in which the transactions of thirty-five Grand Councils are judiciously reviewed. In his Introductory he forcibly says:

"The year just past has been a remarkable one in Cryptic Masonry. Its prosperity seems to have been unbounded in every Jurisdiction where zealous, live working officers have been in control of the helm, and this, without regard to the fact whether the Jurisdiction is usually a large and prosperous one, or more limited in size, or limited in material from which to draw for its membership. It is different in those Jurisdictions where the Presiding Officer has taken his position with such 'good intentions,' and then failed to materialize in work; such Jurisdictions cannot pros-

per, unless by a miracle, but this day and age is not one of miracles. It is the earnest, zealous and enthusiastic Grand Master, who loves the Cryptic Rite and appreciates the responsibilities of his station, and the trust reposed in him by his Companions, who becomes the powerful lever by which the temple is up-builded, and devotees made to throng its gateways. It is the 'hustler' who wins in the every-day business battle of life, whilst the negative ones stand by in open-eyed wonder and astonishment at the results achieved by the worker. Drones do not count for anything in business life and much less do they amount to in Masonic Work."

Ohio for 1902 receives over six pages of courteous comment. Fraternal commendation is extended to the Annual Address of Grand Master Copeland and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence. The liberal excerpts approvingly made from the Report of your Committee by the Veteran among Cryptic Correspondents is certainly most fully appreciated.

In his Conclusion Companion Osgoodby thoughtfully says: "We have made a serious and interested study of what is known as Cryptic Masonry for over thirty years past; year by year have examined the Printed Proceedings of such Grand Councils as print their Proceedings, and for other Jurisdictions have by correspondence ascertained the conditions prevailing with them. The result is most satisfactory, and at the present time, this branch of Masonry is prosperous and advancing in power, influence, financial standing and membership, and so long as the several Grand Councils keep from serious disagreement in their home bodies and from a harsh aggressive spirit towards each other, and harmoniously work together in unity of spirit and fraternal concord, so long will that prosperity and advancement continue. Nothing can work the destruction of any social organization easier than by having internal dissensions and outward expressions thereof. Avoid this fatal rock."

The writer regrets to notice the retirement of our esteemed Companion and "friend of many years" from the field of labor, and all who know him will most heartily reciprocate the sentiments of the concluding paragraphs of his report:

"To our loved Companions of other Jurisdictions, with whom we have labored in this field of Masonry, we desire to express our deep and ever abiding appreciation of their kind thoughts, expressions and love so often given vent to by their writings and in our associations. We thank them, one and all, and shall cherish these pleasant memories of the past during life. With our retirement from this field of labor, we do not retire from our love of Cryptic Masonry or from the lively interest in it, which will be with us constantly during life.

And now with love, and the best wishes of our heart towards all, unkindly thoughts towards none of our loved Companions, we repeat the prayer of Little Tim, 'God bless everybody' and 'Mizpah.'"

M. Ill. Comp. John R. Gardner, of New York City, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. George Van Vliet, of the same city, re-elected Grand Recorder.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. W. S. Liddell, of Charlotte, was not in attendance.

gain of members the past year was four hundred and eleven. But few Grand Councils had larger gains. The Annual Address of the Grand Master is a brief recital of his Official Acts. In it he makes sympathetic mention of the demise of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. William Tully Branch, of that Grand Jurisdiction.

R. Ill. Comp. C. F. Jackson, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$64.42 in the Grand Treasury.

The Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Zimmerman Davis, reports number advanced current year, 10.

Total number of members reported, 156.

No Report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. James R. Johnson, of Charleston, was reelected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Zimmerman Davis, of the same city, re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of South Carolina will be held at Charleston, February 14, 1905.

TENNESSEE, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 31. Nashville, 1904.

The Fifty-fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Tennessee was held in the City of Nashville, January 25, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, M. Ill. Comp. Rodney Blake, Grand Master, presiding.

Fourteen of the seventeen working Chartered Councils of that Grand Jurisdiction were represented in Grand Council.

Ten Past Grand Masters were present.

The Grand Representatives of sixteen Grand Councils were in attendance.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. T. W. Crutcher, of Nashville, was present.

"Their labors are ended, their light extinguished, their seats vacant."

The Committee on Accounts reported a balance of \$344.35 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. W. A. Clendenning, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced, 50; affiliated, 6; number dimitted, 15; suspended, 8; died, 9.

Net gain current year, twenty-four.

Total number of members, 492.

No Report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Chas. H. Goodlett, of Nashville, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Proceedings, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Wm. A. Clendenning, of Nashville, re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Tennessee will be held in Nashville, January 23, 1905.

VERMONT, 1903.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 114. Windsor, 1903.

The Fiftieth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Vermont was held in the City of Burlington, June 9, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. William H. Brewster, in the Grand East.

The Representatives of sixteen Subordinate Councils were in attendance.

Eighteen Chartered Councils on the roll.

Four Past Grand Masters were present.

Twenty-one Grand Councils were represented by their accredited Grand Representatives.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, Comp. Frank A. Phillips, of Randolph, was not reported present.

The portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. William H. Brewster, is a frontispiece to the Printed Proceedings.

The Annual Address of Grand Master Brewster is a brief but thoroughly concise paper, reporting his Visitations, Recommendations and other Official Acts.

He is a believer in the necessity of Official Visitation and Inspection of Subordinate Councils and says in this connection:

"I am a firm believer in the absolute necessity of a thorough system of inspection of the Subordinate Councils. Infinitely more good can be derived from that than from bewailing the fact that the Council Degrees are not pre-requisite to the Orders of Knighthood. This is simply wasting time. I believe that the Grand Council is actually to blame for the easy going and careless way in which many of the Subordinates discharge their duties. Once let the officers of the several Councils understand that they are to be subject to the same system of rigid inspection that the Symbolic Lodges are, and I am convinced that you will see the same splendid results that have come from the District Deputy system in the Grand Lodge."

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Charles H. Heaton, reported a balance of \$503.75 in the Grand Treasury.

M. Ill. Comp. Henry H. Ross, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced, 50; affiliated, 1; number died, 20; suspended and dimitted, 3.

Net gain current year, twenty.

Total number of members, 1,268.

M. Ill. Comp. Marsh O. Perkins, the able Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submits, in fifty-one pages, a succinct and conservative review of the Printed Proceedings of the twenty-five Grand Councils under consideration.

The Proceedings of Ohio for 1902 receive courteous notice, and he says that "the Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. George D. Copeland, is the report of a busy year and reflects conspicuous administrative ability."

He endorses the recommendation of the "Committee on the Good of the Order" in re the Inspection of Subordinate Councils, and fraternally commends the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence. He does not believe in any compulsory method of securing candidates and says in this connection under Pennsylvania:

"By far better to impress upon him the beauties of the Rite, and their intimate connection with Ancient Craft Masonry, that he may enter the arches with a full-fledged, voluntary desire to associate himself with his Companions in the work."

In his Conclusion Comp. Perkins justly says:

"Wherever a consistent degree of effort animates and actuates the workmen in the arches, there has been found activity, growth and development. Where too any deplorable degree of lassitude manifests itself there is found a measure of quietude not even disturbed by sleeping Ahishars. Upon the whole, however, one will not err in concluding that the Rite is progressing, is more aggressive and has brighter prospects in view than ever before. May the hopes thus aroused be rewarded by a complete fruition."

M. Ill. Comp. Charles L. Robinson, of Rutland, was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. Henry H. Ross, of Burlington, re-elected Grand Recorder.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 54. Tacoma, 1903.

The Eighth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Washington was held in the City of Seattle, June 8, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, Comp. George E. Cleveland, M. Ill. Grand Master, presiding.

Six of the seven Chartered Councils of that Jurisdiction were represented in Grand Council.

Seven Past Grand Masters were present and the Grand Representatives of nineteen Grand Councils were in attendance.

Past Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. John B. Romans—now a resident of that State—the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, was among the number present.

The portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. George E. Cleveland, precedes the title page.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master is a brief report of Official Duties discharged.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Henry L. Kennan, reported a balance of \$182.20 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Edward R. Hare, Grand Recorder, reported number advanced, 56; affiliated, 2; number dimitted, 3; died, 7.

Net gain current year, forty-eight.

Total number of members, 456.

A portrait of the late Th. Ill. Comp. Elijah Mount Beatty, the first T. I. Master of Tacoma Council, of that Grand Jurisdiction, is contained in the Proceedings.

The Proceedings of thirty-one Grand Councils are concisely and carefully reviewed in the interesting Report on Foreign Correspondence submitted by the Chairman of the Committee, R. Ill. Comp. Edward R. Hare.

The Proceedings of Ohio for 1902 receive courteous notice and fraternal mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Copeland and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Frank P. Weymouth, of Spokane, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Edward R. Hare, of Tacoma, re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

WISCONSIN, 1904.

Annual Proceedings, 8vo., pp. 48. Milwaukee, 1904.

The Forty-seventh Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Wisconsin was held in the City of Milwaukee, February 16, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, M. Ill. Comp. William H. Howieson, Grand Master, in the Grand East.

Twelve of the nineteen Chartered Councils on the roll were represented in Grand Council.

Two Past Grand Masters were present and thirteen Grand Councils were represented by the attendance of their Grand Representatives.

The Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, M. Ill. Comp. Fred Ring, of La Crosse, was not present.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Wm. H. Howieson, is a brief report of all official matters pertaining to his office.

R. Ill. Comp. David H. Wright, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$659.30 in the Grand Treasury.

The Grand Recorder, M. Ill. Comp. W. W. Perry, reported number advanced current year, 159; affiliated, 2; number died, 29; dimitted, 15; suspended, 3.

Net gain current year, one hundred and fourteen.

Total number of members, 1,677.

The portrait of the late Past M. Ill. Grand Master John M. Evans, Sr., is contained in the Proceedings.

Owing to the ill health of the Chairman of the Committee, R. Ill. Comp. Wm. C. Swain, there was no Report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Jacob Dreher, of Milwaukee, was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. Wm. W. Perry, of the same city, reelected Grand Recorder.

Committee on Correspondence, R. Ill. Comp. Wm. C. Swain, Milwaukee.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Wisconsin will be held in Milwaukee, Feb. 21, 1905.

GENERAL GRAND COUNCIL, 1903.

Triennial Proceedings, 8vo., pp 160. 1908.

The Eighth Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Council of the United States of America was held in the City of Little Rock, Arkansas, October 5, A. D. 1903, A. Dep. 2903, M. Ill. Comp. William H. Mayo, of Missouri, General Grand Master, presiding.

Ninety-seven members and delegates were in attendance.

The Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Arkansas having been convened and opened in Special Assembly for their reception, an Address of Welcome to the officers and members of the General Grand Council was delivered by M. Ill. Comp. Samuel D. Dodge, Grand Master of Royal and Select Masters of Arkansas, and an appropriate response thereto was made by M. Ill. Comp. Wm. H. Mayo, General Grand Master. On behalf of the citizens of Little Rock an Address of Welcome was delivered by

the Mayor of the City, Hon. William E. Lennon, to which a happy response was made by M. Ill. Comp. Graff M. Acklin, of Ohio.

On behalf of the Grand Council of Arkansas a very handsome Apron for the use of M. Ill. General Grand Master was presented to the General Grand Council by M. Ill. Comp., Past Grand Master Fay Hempstead. M. Ill. Comp. Andrew P. Swanstrom, Deputy General Grand Master, made an appropriate response on behalf of the General Grand Council. After the conclusion of these preliminary ceremonies the Grand Council of Arkansas was closed and the General Grand Council was opened in Ample Form.

The Address of the General Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Wm. H. Mayo, is an interesting recital of Official Duties discharged, Visitations made and other affairs pertaining to his office.

The General Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. Charles H. Heaton, reported Securities and Cash in General Treasury, \$1,960.67.

M. Ill. Comp. Henry W. Mordhurst, General Grand Recorder, reports the present Cryptic Membership at 37,702, "a gain of 23,111 in twenty years." The statistical tables of Comp. Mordhurst are of especial interest but want of space prevents their insertion in this report. He reports that a new edition of the Ritual had been published and that "Constituent Grand Councils who have adopted the General Grand Council Ritual" would on application be furnished with the necessary copies free of charge.

Ohio was prominently represented in General Grand Council, M. Ill. Comp. Orestes A. B. Senter, Past General Grand Master, being in attendance as one of the members, and subsequently, Chairman of the Law Committee. M. Ill. Comp. Jewett Palmer, of Ohio, was Chairman of a Special Committee and M. Ill. Comp. Graff M. Acklin was promoted from G. G. Captain of Guard to the office of General Grand Principal Conductor. Ohio's Grand Principal Conductor of Work, R. Ill. Comp. Nelson Williams, Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Wm. E. Evans, and Past General Grand High Priest Reuben C. Lennon were noted as being in attendance. A portrait of the late Past General Grand Master M.

Ill. Comp. Josiah H. Drummond, with a brief In Memoriam biographical sketch, is contained in the Proceedings. A biographical sketch is also published of Past General Grand Marshal, the late George Lewis McCahan, of Maryland, and a Memorial page is inscribed to the memory of the late M. Ill. Comp. John W. Chamberlain, of Ohio, who was General Grand Chaplain of the General Grand Council at the time of his removal to the spiritual world.

The business of the Triennial Assembly was mostly of the usual nature, its sessions harmonious and of the most pleasant character.

As the writer was one of them in attendance upon the first convention assembled in New York City to consider the subject of establishing a General Grand Council, it is a matter of personal gratification to note the success that has attended this Grand Body since its establishment, but it is sad to note the removal to the world beyond of so many of those who were present at that interesting assembly, prominent among whom were the late M. Ill. Companions, Josiah H. Drummond and Albert G. Mackey.

M. Ill. Comp. Andrew P. Swanstron, of St. Paul, Minn., whose portrait is contained in the Proceedings, was elected General Grand Master, and M. Ill. Comp. Henry W. Mordhurst, of Fort Wayne, Indiana, re-elected General Grand Recorder.

CONCLUSION.

In the foregoing Report your Committee has endeavored to show the condition of Cryptic Masonry as indicated in the Printed Proceedings of each Grand Jurisdiction under review; to this end excerpts have been freely made of the views of Eminent Companions of those Grand Councils.

Whilst the origin of Cryptic Masonry is in doubt, yet so also is the origin of the Royal Arch and other prominent grades. The lessons taught in the Council degrees and their symbolic features are to the writer a sufficient evidence of their antiquity and Masonic character. The known existence of the grades of Cryptic Mas-

onry for a hundred years is sufficient to establish their just claim as an essential part of Freemasonry and therefore entitled to recognition in the order assigned them.

The Concise History of Freemasonry, by Robert Freke Gould, recently published, is of more than ordinary interest to the Masonic student, especially in the study of the origin and evolution of its grades. From 1740, the date suggested for the first known mention of the Royal Arch, for a quarter of a century there was an influx of degrees in Great Britain and Continental Europe. Out of these degrees have doubtless been evolved the different Masonic systems and grades other than Craft Masonry however now denominated.

The hour having arrived for the convening of the Grand Council, the Grand Officers and Representatives assembled in the lobby of the Arcade Hotel, and were escorted to the Masonic Temple, by a delegation of the Companions of Springfield Council No. 17, Royal and Select Masters, where the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio, was, after devotional exercises by the R. Ill. Grand Chaplain, Companion V. F. Brown, declared open in Ample Form, at 9:30 A. M., by the following corps of Grand Officers, viz:

Address and Report of the Most Illustrious Grand Master.

To the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

ILLUSTRIOUS COMPANIONS:

The wings of time grow stronger day by day,
And swifter is his flight as years roll on;
His fateful course no mortal hand can stay,
And e'er we know it another year has gone.

Life's heavy load grows heavier day by day;
Our bodies bend beneath the weight of years;
Our friends are ever falling by the way,
But through the mists the dawn of rest appears

Our mortal end draws nearer day by day,
For in our flesh Death's deadly seed is sown;
'Twill ripen soon, and we shall pass away
To realms where dread disease will be unknown.

The light of Faith grows brighter day by day;
Its calming influence no tongue can tell;
A while and we shall hear the angels say
"We bid you welcome", and "all is well".

In the good Providence of Almighty God we are permitted to assemble in our Seventy-sixth Annual Assembly, in this beautiful "Home City" so enthusiastically devoted to the exemplification of practical Masonic Charity. Let us unite in a tribute of thanksgiving to Him whose unerring hand has so safely guided us through the experiences of the past year. When we pause to contemplate the wonderful opportunities that are daily being unfolded to man, and the constantly increasing responsibilities that are placed upon him; the brain-racking complications in business; the ever increasing demands of society, and the prevalence of accidents and disease, we should indeed be thankful that through it all we are permitted once more to assemble around our common altar, and, while devoting ourselves to the business in hand, renew old acquaintances, form new friendships, and draw a little nearer to the hearts of our Companions. I bid you all a cordial, fraternal greeting and welcome to this Annual Assembly. The past year has been one of unusual national peace and prosperity, and everything redounds to the credit and glory of our great and beloved Country.

The principle of arbitrtion now seems to be well established, and is not only permeating every business industry where differences or disagreements may arise, but is to-day determining the fate of empires. Our country is regarded as the leader in the cause of Arbitration, and our President, who has himself tasted the bitter experiences of war, and witnessed the terrible carnage of battle, and whose name but a short time ago was considered a synonym for combativeness, is to-day looked upon by the old world as a messenger sent from God, bearing the olive branch of peace to belligerent powers. As he has knelt at a Masonic Altar, and taken the Masonic vows, may we not fairly assume that the lessons of charity, brotherly love and respect for the rights of others, taught him in the Masonic Lodge room, were to some degree responsible for his friendly interference in the war between Russia and Japan, and in some measure helped him to bring about a permanent peace between these great powers. In this Grand Jurisdiction, Cryptic Masonry has been fairly prosperous, and peace and harmony everywhere prevail. Not a single note of discord has disturbed our relations with sister jurisdictions, and so far as I am advised they have domestic peace and tranquility.

The net gain in membership this year is considerably less than last year, and I am unable to give the cause. However the report of the Grand Recorder will show a net gain of 662 during the fiscal year, which I think is quite a satisfactory increase. No grievance has been reported to me during the year, and I have made no decision on Masonic law of sufficient importance to be embodied in this report.

Our Dead.

Before asking your attention to a report of my stewardship for the past year, let us turn our thoughts for a moment to those Companions who, wearying of life's heavy burdens, and unable longer to stand the fatiguing pilgrimage, have entered the Secret Vault of Death. We are thankful to Almighty God that none of our official family have been taken during the past year, and that our Grand East is still spared to counsel, guide and direct us. But 93 good and loyal Companions of this jurisdiction, toiling faithfully and well in the unfinished arches of life's temple, have laid aside their working tools and responded to the summons of the Grim Reaper. Since the close of the fiscal year one light of more than ordinary brilliancy in the Masonic world has gone out, and Most Excellent Companion Reuben C. Lemmon, lives now only in the hearts of those who knew him, and in that higher life for which he was so well fitted. Judge Lemmon died at his home in Toledo on the sixth day of September, 1905, full of years, full of honors, and mourned by all who knew him. He had not been closely identified with the Cryptic Rite, but in Symbolic and Capitular Masonry he had reached the very topmost rounds I shall do nothing more than mention his death, leaving to the proper committee the duty of extolling his virtues and graces, and perpetuating his memory by suitable memorial. Being unable to attend his funeral, I requested Most Illustrious Companion Graff M. Acklin to procure and present to the widow on behalf of the Grand Council, a suitable floral offering. Companion Acklin performed this duty, and I have approved an order on the Grand Treasurer for \$10.00, in payment of the bill. I have also directed the Grand Recorder to procure from the Grand Secretary of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F. and A. M. of Ohio, the necessary number of half tone prints of our deceased Companion to insert in the printed proceedings of this Grand Council for this year, all of which I trust may meet with your approbation. I have received memorials announcing the death of the following distinguished Companions of other jurisdictions:

Jacob D. Rush, Past Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Kansas, died at his home in San Diego, California, on October 26, 1904.

Charles A. Jones, Past Most Puissant Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Connecticut, died at his home in Hartford, on October, 27, 1904.

Seymour Chipman, M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council of Oregon, died at his home in Corvallis, on December 15, 1904.

William Ryan, Grand Treasurer and Past M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council of Kentucky, died at Louisville on November 13th, 1904.

Edward Ernest West, Past Most Puissant Grand Master of the Grand Council of Connecticut, died at his home in Meriden on January 25th, 1905.

Calvin Edgar Reed, Past Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Colorado, died on February 27, 1905.

Almon R. Dewey, Past M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Iowa, died at his home in Washington, Iowa, on April 15, 1905.

A Prince in Israel has fallen! Companion, or "Judge" Dewey as he was familiarly called, was for a third of a century a potent power in the Masonic bodies of Iowa, and was also prominent in General Grand Chapter and General Grand Council. We saw him last at Little Rock, and it is hard to believe that the vigorous man we saw there is no more.

Byron C. Hill, Past M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Michigan, died in the City of Jackson, on April 15, 1905.

William W. Austin, Past M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Indiana, died at his home in Centerville, on April 25, 1905.

Robert Wilkinson Furnas, Past M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Nebraska, died in the city of Lincoln on June 1, 1905.

Thomas Elwood Garrett, Past Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Missouri, died on June 29, 1905.

Lewis Cass Goodrich, Grand Lecturer of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Michigan, died at Sault Ste. Marie, on August 7, 1905.

These memorials have been turned over to the proper committee, and I am confident they will receive proper consideration at their hands.

Bonds Renewed.

On the eighteenth of October, 1904, I caused the bonds of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder for three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) each, to be renewed for one year in the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company of Baltimore, and on October 22, 1904, I approved an order on the Grand Treasurer for twenty-four dollars (\$24.00) in payment of the premium therefor.

Inspection of Councils.

Prior to the time of arranging for the inspections of the Subordinate Councils of the State, and the dividing of the State into nine Arches, as required by Resolution No. 20 of the Grand Council, Companion Henry True, Right Illustrious Grand Treasurer, informed me that on account of ill health he would be absent from the jurisdiction a part of the year, and requested to be excused from duty as an inspector. Being satisfied as to the sincerity of his request, I was pleased to excuse this worthy and willing Companion, and personally assumed the inspection of as many Councils as would have been assigned to him, had he been physically able to make the inspections. I was also advised that Companion John It Roemer, Right Illustrious Grand Chaplain, was about to remove from the jurisdiction of this Grand Council and would not be able to inspect any Councils if they should be assigned to him. I thereupon requested Companion Abram C. Kopp of Chillicothe, Past Thrice Illustrious Master of Chillicothe Council No. 4, to inspect the Councils that would otherwise have been assigned to Companion Roemer. This he consented to do, and I thereupon issued a circular addressed to all Royal and Select Masters of Ohio, of which the following is a copy:

Companion Henry True, being physically unable to undertake the work of inspection, and desiring to be relieved of that duty, I was pleased to excuse this worthy and willing Companion, and have assigned the Ninth Arch to myself. Ill. Comp. Rev. John L. Roemer, R. Ill. Grand Chaplain, having removed to another Jurisdiction, I have assigned his Arch to Ill. Companion Abram C. Kopp, Past Thrice Ill. This announcement has been delayed because of the failure of some Subordinate Councils to hold their elections at the time fixed by their by-laws, and the neglect of others to report the result of the election held. It is therefore important that the Inspectors take up the work of inspections at once, and communicate with the Thrice Illustrious Masters in their respective Arches to the end that an early inspection may be had of all the Councils in the State. While it is desired that the inspections shall be made so far as possible by the Companions herein appointed, vet the inspection is the thing desired, and if any of the Companions herein named are unable for any reason to inspect one or more of the Councils assigned them, they are authorized to delegate their authority to some suitable Companion or Companions in whose wisdom, judgment and integrity they have confidence, and whose report they are willing to subscribe. It is desired that the inspections be made before July 1st, and Inspecting officers will promptly forward to this office, a report of each inspection with a statement of their expenses.

The Thrice Illustrious Master will cause this circular to be read in Council at the first Stated Assembly after its receipt, and, upon notification by the Inspecting Officer, will promptly arrange for the Visitation and Inspection.

As our Grand Jurisdiction now has the proud distinction of leading the Cryptic forces of the world in numerical strength, let us not only endeavor to maintain this position, but let us see to it that our standard of excellence, our devotion to duty, our earnestness and zeal are second to none.

Notwithstanding the late date at which this circular was issued, I have much pleasure in reporting that all the Councils in the State, except two, were inspected. One of these, Union Council No. 2, of Steubenville, I had assigned to myself, and antici-

pated much pleasure in making the inspection. But it proved impossible for me to leave home at the time set for the inspection, and I was thereafter out of this Grand Jurisdiction until too late to make the inspection. The other Council was Delphos No. 72, of Delphos. This Council was assigned to Illustrious Companion Warren J. Baker for inspection, and from correspondence submitted to me by Companion Baker, as well as from correspondence between the Thrice Illustrious Master and myself, I am satisfied that Companion Baker made every possible effort to bring about an inspection of this Council. In this connection permit me to say that a few Councils in the State apparently do not understand that the annual inspection of Councils is required by the law of the Grand Council, and that the inspectors are the proxies of the Grand Master and are entitled to the same courteous treatment and thoughtful consideration usually accorded him. It has been the custom of this Grand Council for many years, in making the assignment of inspectors, to publish with the list of Subordinate Councils and the names of the inspectors, the names of the Thrice Illustrious Masters and Recorders of Subordinate Councils for the current year. Because of the failure of many Councils to elect officers at the time fixed by their by-laws, the assignment of inspectors is necessarily delayed. Then there is a disposition to postpone the inspections to the latest possible date without reference to the convenience of the inspector. The reason usually assigned is lack of proficiency in the Ritual, but sometimes the delay is asked because there is no candidate in sight. Neither of these is a good excuse. In this day of almost perfect ritualism there is no reason why the Officers of a Council should not be prepared to confer the degrees within thirty days after their election, and as to the candidate, while it is preferable to have a real candidate, it is better to use a substitute, than embarass the inspectors, and retard the business of the Grand Council.

I extend to the Inspectors my sincere thanks for the unusual amount of energy displayed by them in the inspection of the Councils assigned to them, which was necessitated by the lateness of their appointment.

Councils Instituted.

The Grand Council having at its last Annual Assembly, granted a Charter to Matchette Council No. 91, located at Greenville, and the Companions of said Council having expressed a desire to have me present at its institution, I visited Greenville on November 9, 1904, for the purpose of instituting the Council. The night was disagreeable and only a small number of the Companions were present. I opened the Grand Council in Special Grand Assembly, the stations being filled by the Companions of the Council to be instituted, and the Council was thereupon instituted in due and ancient form, and in accordance with the forms and ceremonials prescribed by this Grand Council.

On November 11, 1904, I visited Fostoria, and instituted Fostoria Council No. 90, located in that city, to which Council a Charter was granted at our last Annual Assembly. This was an occasion of great interest to me and one which I shall long remember. After a pleasant afternoon spent with the Companions, I proceeded to open the Grand Council in Emergent Assembly in the room adjoining the Blue lodge room, in which the Assemblies of the Council are held, and appointed the following named companions to fill the offices of the Grand Council pro tempore.

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Council having been opened in due form, the Grand Council was received with the grand honors and its officers assumed their respective stations, after which the Council was instituted in accordance with the forms and ceremonials prescribed by this Grand Council.

After the institution of the Council, I installed the officers

elect thereof, after which the Grand Council retired, closed in due form and the officers thereof returned to the Council Chamber. After the routine business of the Council was transacted one Companion Royal Arch Mason, being in waiting, was received and advanced to the degrees of Royal and Select Master in due form. The work was well rendered and I am satisfied that no mistake was made in granting the Charter for this Council. The occasion ended with a banquet provided by the ladies of the Eastern Star, and a social session, which we were compelled to leave before the end in order to catch a train.

SPECIAL DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

During the year I have granted the following Special Dispensations to Subordinate Councils:

1904, November 28th.

To Toledo Council No. 33, to hold the Stated Assembly of December 8, 1904, in the rooms of the Masonic Club, on the fourth floor of the Valentine building in the city of Toledo. This became necessary because of the inability of the Council to secure proper accommodations in the apartments of Yondota Lodge, which it was occupying under Dispensation from this Grand Council.

1904, December 13th.

To Union Council No. 2, at Steubenville, to elect and install officers at the next Stated Assembly of said Council to be held on December 15, 1904.

1904, December 20th.

To Hock Hocking Council No. 39, at Logan, to elect and install officers at the next Stated Assembly of said Council to be held on January 3, 1905.

1905, January 7th.

To Toledo Council No. 33, to hold its Stated Assembly of January 12, 1905, in the Masonic Club Rooms in the Valentine Building in the city of Toledo, and to install officers elect of said Council, and transact such other business as might regularly come before the Council.

1905, January 11th.

To Wyoming Council No. 77, to elect and install officers at the

next Stated Assembly of said Council to be held January 26, 1905. 1905, January 14th.

To Hillsboro Council No. 16 to elect and install officers at the next Stated Assembly of said Council to be held on January 19, 1905.

1905, February 18th.

To Toledo Council No. 33, to hold its Assemblies, confer Degress and transact business in the Blue Lodge Room of the New Masonic Temple in the city of Toledo, until further Dispensation should be granted or this Dispensation revoked.

1905, May 3rd.

To Gebal Council No. 56, at Uhrichsville to remove its Charter, properties and paraphernalia to the new Masonic Temple in the village of Uhrichsville, and to henceforth hold its Assemblies in said new Temple.

1905, May 11th.

To Toledo Council No. 33, to elect and install a Conductor of Council at the next Stated Assembly of said Council to be held May 11, 1905.

DISPENSATIONS FOR NEW COUNCILS.

On April 5, 1905, I received a petition from Companion C. B. Jamison and ten other Companions, all Royal and Select Masters, residing at Piqua, Miami County, Ohio, praying for a Dispensation empowering them to form, open and hold, according to the usages of the Order, a regular Council of Royal and Select Masters, to be located at the city of Piqua and to be known as LaFayette Council. This petition was accompanied by the necessary fee and the consents of the neighboring Councils whose Jurisdiction would be affected. There also accompanied this petition a written pledge signed by a very large number of Companion Royal Arch Masons of Piqua and vicinity, agreeing, in the event of the establishment of a Council of Royal and Select Masters at Piqua, to petition for the degrees within a reasonable time thereafter. Having knowledge of the zeal of the petitioners and information concerning their energy, pluck and perseverance of the Royal Arch Masons of the vicinity, and believing that it would be for the best interests of Cryptic Masonry in this State to establish a Council in the City of Piqua, on April 19, 1905, I issued a Dispensation to Companion Jamison and the ten other Companions empowering them to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said City of Piqua, the same to be known as LaFayette Council, U. D., and appointed Companion William H. Swift to be the first Thrice Illustrious Master; Companion Reed D. Burnham to be the first Deputy Illustrious Master, and Companion Judd L. Palmer to be the first Principal Conductor of Work of said Council.

Said Council was subsequently organized under the direction of Most Illustrious Past Grand Master William T. McLean, and subsequent to its organization it was my pleasure to visit the Council and witness the conferring of the Royal and Select Masters Degrees. The work of the Companions merited and had my highest commendation. The statistical report made by this Council shows that fifty-five Companions were advanced prior to July 31, the end of the fiscal year, and I believe this of itself is sufficient to justify the wisdom of granting the Dispensation.

The fee accompanying the petition was turned over to the Grand Recorder and the petition, consents and other papers are herewith submitted.

On August 22nd I received a petition signed by Companion Frank H. Marquis and twenty-eight other Companions, all Royal and Select Masters, residing at or in the vicinity of Mansfield, in Richland County, Ohio, praying for the establishment of a Council in the City of Mansfield to be known as Mansfield Council. This petition was accompanied by the necessary fee and the consents of neighboring Councils whose Jurisdiction would be affected by the establishment of a new Council at Mansfield. Fourteen of the Companions who signed this petition were members of a former Council located in the City of Mansfield which had surrendered its charter, but the city is one of the best in the state, its Jurisdiction is a large one, the remaining petitioners are active, energetic and zealous Select Masters of neighboring Councils, and I felt that it was my duty to grant a Dispensation for the establishment of the Council as prayed for.

Accordingly on August 22, 1905, I issued a Dispensation to

Companion Frank H. Marquis and the other twenty-eight Companions who signed the petition, empowering them to form, open and hold, according to the usages of the Order, a regular Council of Royal and Select Masters to be located at Mansfield in the County of Richland and State of Ohio, and to be known as Mansfield Council U. D.

I appointed Companion Frank H. Marquis to be the first Thrice Illustrious Master; Companion John Weil to be the first Deputy Illustrious Master; and Companion Elmore H. Lindsay to be the first Principal Conductor of the Work of said Council.

Knowing that Most Illustrious Past Grand Master William T. McLean had relatives as well as a large circle of acquaintances and friends in the City of Mansfield, I requested him to be present on the night appointed for the organization of the new Council and lend such assistance as might be necessary or proper in the premises. Companion McLean reported to me that the Council was duly organized under Dispensation on September 8th and that they were successfully launched upon their career.

Companion McLean's report is so complimentary to the Companions of this new Council that I am constrained to print it as made. It is as follows:

SIDNEY, O., Sept. 21, 1905.

Nelson Williams, Esq., Hamilton, Ohio:

M. ILL. AND DEAR COMPANION:

I am pleased to report to you that by your direction under date of September 6th inst. I proceeded to Mansfield on Friday the 8th inst. and saw the Companions there to whom you were pleased to issue a Dispensation to open a Council of Royal and Select Masters, successfully launch the same upon what I am satisfied will be a creditable career.

I saw the Council opened in Due and Ample Form and as near letter perfect as any old Council could have done, showing the interest and spirit of the Fraters in the new venture.

Their minutes are entered upon the records in correct form,

and the by-laws adopted, the same, with necessary local changes, as those adopted by Gwynn Council at Bucyrus, and which have been approved by the Grand Council, thus assuring them to be of the right stamp. Paraphernalia purchased is of the best, and they will have all modern and necessary furniture required to conduct an up-to-date and live Council—Arches included.

I will be able to make a recommendation to the Committee' on Charters and Dispensations, most favorable to this new Council.

Thanking you for the honor conferred by your request and the opportunity afforded me to visit my old residence city and renew my acquaintance of a quarter of a century before, I beg to remain, with assurances of my most high esteem,

Ordinarily I would not have granted a Dispensation so late in the year, but believing that the Companions would be able to make a satisfactory showing to the Committee on Charters and Dispensations, even in so short a time, I felt justified in issuing the Dispensation.

The fee accompanying the petition was turned over to the Grand Recorder and the petition, consents and other papers are herewith submitted.

GRAND REPRESENTATIVE.

Shortly after the close of our last Grand Assembly, Companion Jacob H. Bromwell, Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Kansas, tendered his resignation to the M. Ill. Grand Master of that Jurisdiction, which was accepted. In tendering his resignation, Companion Bromwell took occasion to suggest to the M. Ill. Grand Master of Kansas, the appointment of Illustrious Companion George P. Conner, Thrice Illustrious Master of Lima Council No. 20, as his successor. This suggestion was referred to me by the M. Ill. Grand Master of Kansas, and, heartily approving and confirming the same, I was pleased to recommend the appointment of Com-

panion Conner to this position of trust and confidence. I was subsequently advised by our Grand Recorder that the appointment had been made.

JEWEL PRESENTED.

By resolution of the Grand Council, adopted at our last Annual Assembly, a committee consisting of Companions Jacob H. Bromwell, W. A. Spill and Lewis P. Schaus, was appointed to procure the usual jewel for presentation to the retiring Most Illustrious Grand Master, and to present the same to him at some favorable opportunity.

I was later advised by the committee that the jewel had been procured and presented to M. Ill. Companion Lane, and I accordingly approved an order in payment of the bill therefor.

WAIVER OF JURISDICTION.

On October 25, 1904, at the instance of the Conneaut Council No. 40, I requested the Most Puissant Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Pennsylvania to grant a waiver of jurisdiction over Companion Kent E. Lyman a Royal Arch Mason residing at Jamestown, in that Grand Jurisdiction, and who desired to be advanced in Conneaut Council No. 40.

On November 2, 1904, I received from the Most Puissant Grand Master, Companion David O. McCollum, a most cordial and gracious letter in which he granted the waiver asked for.

RESIGNATION OF THE GRAND CHAPLAIN.

On March 15, 1905, I received a letter from Companion John L. Roemer, Right Illustrious Grand Chaplain of this Grand Council, announcing his intention of removing from the Jurisdiction, and tendering his resignation. While I had been informed of the possibility of such action on the part of our Illustrious Companion, I had hoped that he would decide to remain in our Jurisdiction. His letter, however, determined the matter, and is as follows:

CHILLICOTHE, O., March 14, 1905.

MR. NELSON WILLIAMS, Hamilton, Ohio.

MOST ILLUSTRIOUS COMPANION:

This day I sever my connections with the Church and this community and go not only beyond the bounds of Chillicothe but the jurisdiction of the Grand Council R. & S. M. of Ohio. My future home will be in St. Louis. Before leaving here I want to express my heartfelt thanks for the courtesies and the many kindnesses which have been received be me at your hand. It will be necessary for me under the circumstances to formally announce to you my resignation as the Chaplain of the Grand Council. In doing so I further desire to state that I shall ever recall with pleasure my association with the Illustrious Companions of the Grand Council to whom I extend my best wishes.

On March 16th I replied to the foregoing letter, accepting the resignation of Right Illustrious Companion Roemer, expressing the regrets of the officers and Companions of the Grand Council, at his removal from our jurisdiction, tendering him our best wishes, and bidding him God speed in his new field of labor.

Our loss is Missouri's gain, and we congratulate our sister Grand Jurisdiction on the fact that they now have within their borders this affable, courteous, zealous Companion, and polished Christian gentleman.

Having no occasion to use a Grand Chaplain, I did not appoint a successor to Rt. Ill. Companion Roemer until September 26th, when I tendered the position to Rev. Companion V. F. Brown of Dayton. Companion Brown expressed a willingness to accept, and on September 28th I appointed him Grand Chaplain of this Grand Council pro tempore. The Rt. Ill. Companion is with us to-day in the discharge of his duties, and when you have met him, I am quite sure it will not be necessary for me to urge your approval of my action.

ABSENCE OF CHARTER IN CINCINNATI COUNCIL NO. 1.

On the twenty-fourth day of October, 1827, John Barker, a Sovereign Grand Inspector General of the thirty-third degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, and acting as general agent of the Supreme Council in the United States, granted and issued to a requisite number of Companions, residing in Cincinnati, a Charter authorizing and empowering them to form themselves into a just and legal Council of Royal and Select Masters by the name of Cincinnati Council No. 1, to be holden at Cincinnati, in the State of Ohio. The Council organized under this Charter was one of the five Councils represented at the Convention held at Worthington, Ohio, on January 6, 1830, at which the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio was organized. It appears that after the organization of the Grand Council of Ohio. the Charter issued by John Barker to Cincinnati Council No. 1, was either surrendered or taken up, and that no Charter has ever been issued to Cincinnati Council No. 1, by this Grand Council. This oversight appears to have been discovered in 1862, but instead of then applying for a Charter, the Companions of Cincinnati Council procured from R. Ill. Companion John D. Caldwell, Grand Recorder, a certificate under date of June 1, 1862, certifying that Cincinnati Council No. 1 "was one of the five original subordinate Councils which organized the Grand Council of Royal and Select Master Masons of the State of Ohio," and that it "is a legal Council in this Jurisdiction." This certificate was framed and hung on the wall, and, dingy with age, it has been looked upon by succeeding generations as the Charter of the Council. This certificate has no authoritative weight however, and if it could be construed into a Dispensation, it would have expired at the next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council. The fact therefore is that for three-fourths of a century the oldest Council in the state has been existing without a Dispensation or Charter. It has done so well that it seems almost unnecessary to worry about its parentage. The Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite long ago abandoned its claim to jurisdiction over the Royal and Select Master degrees, and therefore a restoration of the original Charter issued by John Barker could not be obtained. I am therefore of the

opinion that this Grand Council should at this time grant to the Companions of Cincinnati Council No. 1, a Charter or Warrant continuing them as a legal Council, and embodying therein a reference to the facts herein stated, and I submit the matter for your consideration.

ABSENCE FROM THE JURISDICTION.

In the early part of May an opportunity was opened to me to visit California and the Northwest. I regretted very much to leave my post of duty, but I had long desired to see the portion of our great country lying west of the Rocky Mountains, and set foot on soil made memorable by the men of '49, who endured hardships, trials and privations, and spent their vital energies, as men are still doing to-day, in an attempt to satisfy the insatiable greed for gold. Being satisfied that the affairs of this Grand Council would be as faithfully, intelligently and properly administered by my subordinate Grand Officers in my absence as if I were personally present, I accordingly placed them in charge of the Rt. Ill. Deputy Grand Master, and on May 21st left Ohio for California. I was absent six weeks and on my return I became satisfied that my absence from the Jurisdiction had in no way retarded or affected the business of the Grand Council. During my absence I was everywhere received by my brethren and Companions with hearty hand clasps, pleasant smiles and cordial words of welcome. The only Masonic bodies visited by me were Symbolic lodges, one of which I visited in each of three Grand Jurisdictions, and I was greatly surprised and almost dumbfounded in each instance when I called for a committee to test my right to sit in their midst, to have a brother step forward and vouch for me. Every Companion knows what this means, and these incidents only tend to show that after all this world of ours is not very large.

On my return home the Right Illustrious Deputy Grand Master made report to me in detail of all that had transpired during my absence. His report was very full and complete, but I think the only portion of it which is of such importance to the Companions of the State that it should be embodied in this report, is that portion relating to the dedication and consecration of the rooms in the new Masonic Temple at Toledo which are to be occupied by To-

ledo Council No. 33. This portion of the Deputy Grand Master's report is as follows:

"The matter of procuring a proper service for the dedication and consecration of the rooms to be occupied by Toledo Council No. 33, R. and S. M. in the new Temple, just erected in Toledo, proved to be difficult. I had but fifteen days notice and so far as I knew, or could learn, such a service was not in existence.

There was no time nor opportunity for consultation, and with much trepidation I prepared a form of service which was used.

Agreeably to the request of the Companions at Toledo, I opened the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio in emergent assembly in the City of Toledo on Tuesday, June 6, 1905, for the purpose of dedicating and consecrating the Tabernacle in the magnificent Temple erected by the craft in that city, with the following officers:

The Grand Council then proceeded to the Tabernacle and conducted the services as per the form attached after which the Grand Council was closed. In accordance with the proceedings of the other bodies, each officer in attendance was allowed an order for his transportation and one day per diem, which in no instance was equal to the expenditure of the Companion receiving the same. The Companions at Toledo are to be complimented and congratulated on the elegance and completeness of their splendid new home."

Accompanying the report of the Right Illustrious Deputy, was a copy of the ceremonial prepared by him and used on this occasion. It seems to be full and complete, and I suggest that one or more copies be filed with the Grand Recorder for future use, until such time as this Grand Council shall deem it advisable to have a Code of Laws, with forms and ceremonials, as have the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter, at which time it can be embodied therein.

VISIȚATIONS.

During the year I have visited the following Councils in this Jurisdiction: Cincinnati No. 1, Columbus No. 8, Reese No. 9, Lima No. 20, Cleveland No. 36, Gebal No. 56, Gwynn No. 83, Fostoria No. 90, and Matchette No. 91. I had planned to visit many more, but sickness and death in my family and absence from the Jurisdiction must be my excuse. In the Councils visited I was everywhere received in the most cordial and fraternal manner, and with the honors due the station I occupy.

CONCLUSION.

And now Companions my report is before you. I know there is but little to commend, and trust you may find but little to criticise. The ideal Grand Master would be the man, who, otherwise competent, was so happily situated in life as not to be under the necessity of constantly striving for bread and butter. He would thus have ample time to devote to the business of the Grand Council and for the visitations which always result in much good to the subordinate bodies. I am under lasting obligations to the subordinate officers of the Grand Council for assistance rendered during the year. To the R. Ill. Deputy Grand Master and R. Ill. Grand Recorder, I am specially indebted for their co-operation during the year, and particularly while I was absent from the Jurisdiction. And companions what farewell word shall I speak to you before I surrender the gavel to my successor at the close of this Assembly. You have been so kind, courteous and considerate in all of our associations in Grand Lodge, Grand Chapter and Grand Council, that it is impossible to make proper recognition

in words. I trust that God may give me strength and life, that I may be able to show you by my actions how highly I appreciate your great kindness.

Report of the Grand Recorder.

Springfield, Ohio, October 3rd, 1905.

To the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio.

ILLUSTRIOUS COMPANIONS:

I have the pleasure of submitting herewith my Thirteenth Annual Report, and it is a source of satisfaction to be able to report to you that returns have been received from all Councils, and the Grand Dues paid in full, for the year ending July 31, 1905, and that these returns were all received in good time, with one exception only, viz: London Council No. 41, which I regret to inform you was not received until September 26th. No excuse was made by this Council for this delinquency, nor any reason why they did not comply with the rules of this Grand Council. I leave the matter of enforcing the penalty with you.

This year I adopted a new plan in sending out the blanks for Annual Reports, sending them by registered mail; while the postage was somewhat more than the old way, I had the satisfaction of receiving a receipt for the package from each Recorder, so that none had the old time excuse of saying that the blanks had not been sent; in this way reports were more prompt than in form-

er years, and I desire to compliment the Recorders for the uniform neatness and correctness of their reports, very few were returned for corrections.

We have now on the rolls, 60 Chartered Councils and 3 Councils Under Dispensations, and a total membership of 8,252.

MASONIC HOME HOSPITAL.

Diseases incident to children making it necessary to isolate the sick ones, and temporary ailments among the adult inmates requiring a "Sick Bay" where they can be treated, has heretofore taxed the facilities of the Home to the utmost. This necessity for hospital facilities attracted the attention of Brother John Blyth and others prominently connected with the Order of the Eastern Star, who appealed to their order for funds with which to erect a hospital to meet the needs of those of the Home who may become temporarily ill. The appeal met with a hearty response and resulted in the erection, under the direction of the trustees, of a hospital for the purposes above named, at a cost of some \$14,000.

The corner stone of the building was laid with appropriate ceremonies by the Grand Lodge F. and A. M., of Ohio, October 26, 1904, Past Grand Master O. P. Sperra acting as Grand Master, assisted by a full corps of officers and in the presence of the officers and members of the Grand Chapter, O. E. S., of Ohio (which body came over from Columbus 700 strong), and many other interested spectators, Clark and Anthony Lodges and Palestine Commandery of Springfield acting as escort for the Grand Lodge and the Grand Chapter.

A beautiful address was delivered by Mrs. Alice Smith, Grand Matron of Cleveland, to which a fitting response was made by Past Grand Master Sperra; after which the corner stone was laid in accordance with Masonic form, followed by appropriate addresses by able speakers; the children of the Home rendering the vocal music for the occasion, the exercises being further enlivened with music by the Cadet Band of Springfield.

The work on the building proceeded rapidly during the winter and spring, and on the 10th of May, 1905, occurred the dedication, the following program being observed:

"The Grand Master and the Deputy Grand Master shall have authority during the recess of the Grand Council, to grant letters of Dispensation, under their respective signatures and private seals, to a competent number of duly qualified petitioners, empowering them to open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters for a specific term of time, not extending beyond the next Assembly of the Grand Council, such Councils under Dispensation shall have all the rights and powers of regular Constituted Councils, except, that of receiving and acting upon Petitions for Affiliation and of collecting dues from petitioners for the Dispensation who are members of consenting Councils.

PROVIDED, That the same fees as are required for a Charter shall be first deposited in the hands of the Grand Recorder; and in all cases when such Dispensation is granted, the officer granting the same shall make a report thereof at the next Stated Assembly of the Grand Council, and the Grand Council may continue or recall such Dispensation; or may, upon application for the same, grant the petitioners a Charter; and in case a Charter be so granted, the fees first deposited with the Grand Recorder shall be credited in payment for the same."

On motion, the amendments to the By-Laws and the Constitution, were unanimously adopted as a whole.

"FORM OF CHARTER FOR CINCINNATI COUNCIL NO 1."

The Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio assembled in the city of Springfield, Ohio, send fraternal greetings:

Whereas, By Warrant of Charter issued on the 24th day of October, A. D. 1827, Y. D. 2827, by Illustrious Companion John Barker, K. H. 33°, acting on behalf of the Supreme Council 33° of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. which then claimed and exercised jurisdiction over the Degrees of Cryptic Masonry, in the United States, certain Companions, Royal and Select Masons, towit: Robert Punshon, Robert T. Lytle, Joseph Jonas, Arva Wilson, William Wallace, Jebediah Banks, Elias Dudley, David Urner, Samuel Lovejoy, Francis Reed, Augustus D. Ehrich, Stephen Burrows, and William Green were, as such duly authorized to Assemble and to form themselves into a just and legal Council of Royal and Select Masters, under the name of Cincinnati Council No. 1 to be holden in Cincinnati, in the State of Ohio; and

Whereas, Said Companions in pursuance of the provisions of said Charter, and by virtue of its authority, organized and conducted said Council of Royal and Select Masters until the sixth day of January, A. D. 1830, Y. D. 2830, at which time the said Council, together with four other legally Chartered Councils, organized the Grand Council of Royal and Select of the State of Ohio; and

Whereas, Upon said Grand Council being organized, said Cincinnati Council No. 1 surrendered its Charter to said Grand Council; and

Whereas. Said Grand Council has not, to this time issued any new Charter to said Council in lieu of the original Charter so surrendered by it, said Council having continued to work under and by authority of said Grand Council, but without any Charter as evidence of such authority.

Now Therefore, By these presents, be it known that this Grand Council has, upon application therefor, Granted and Does Hereby Grant and Confirm unto the Companions who are now members in good standing of said Council and unto their successors, the rights and privileges of a Council of Royal and Select Masters, ratifying and confirming all and several the acts and doings of said Council since the organization of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio.

And Said Grand Council Does Authorize and Empower them and their Successors to Assemble and to Exercise all the Prerogatives of a Regularly Constituted and Legal Council of Royal and Select Masters in the city of Cincinnati, county of Hamilton, and the state of Ohio, by the name, style and title of Cincinnati Council No. 1, holding rank from the 24th day of October, Y. D. 2827, A. D. 1827.

The following named Companions are hereby recognized as the three principal officers of said Council:

WILLIAM JOSEPH STRAUSS, Thrice Illustrious Master.
FRANK WALLACE HENDLEY, Deputy Illustrious Master.

GRENVILLE WEEKS WERDEN, Principal Conductor of the Work.

The said officers, their associate Companions, and their successors are hereby enjoined and required to conform strictly to the Constitution. General Regulation and Rules of this Grand Council and to the Constitution of the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the United States of America, under a penalty of a forfeiture of the Rights and Privileges hereby granted, for failure therein.

Given by the authority, and under the seal of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio.

And done at Springfield, Ohio, this 3rd day of October, Y. D. 2905, A. D. 1905.

Good of the Order.

Companion Orestes A. B. Senter, Chairman of the Committee, reported as follows, which was, on motion, adopted.

To the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Officers and Companions of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

Your Committee on the Good of the Order respectfully report that our Grand Council yet occupies the proud position of having upon its rolls a greater number of Cryptic Masons than that of any other Grand Council in the United States.

That our Grand Council has more zealous, able and distinguished Companions than other Grand Councils is because there are more of us. We do not arrogate to ourselves a greater proportion of such Companions to our total membership than that of any other Grand Council.

Your Committee have carefully examined the reports of the inspecting officers referred to it, and find in them many evidences of prosperity, nearly every Council having conferred the degrees of our Rite during the year, and in a creditable manner.

But what is more gratifying, the reports of the inspecting officers also give evidence that harmony and good will exist among our Companions, and that they are actuated by an earnest desire to promote the welfare of their respective Councils.

That the official visits of our inspecting officers are in no small degree conducive to this encouraging condition of the Cryptic Rite in our state, is plainly apparent.

Your Committee therefore recommends the continuance of the system of annual inspections.

The General Grand Council of the United States of America of Royal and Select Masters will hold its next Triennial Assembly in the city of Boston, Mass., beginning June 18, 1906, and your Committee trust that this Grand Council may be represented by its Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and Grand Principal Conductor of the Work, so that they may assist in the deliberations and legislation of the General Grand Council. Your Committee therefore recommend that the necessary expenses of said Grand Officers for such attendance be paid by this Grand Council.

Annual Proceedings.

On motion, the Grand Recorder was instructed to have the usual number of the Proceedings of this Assembly printed, and to distribute them as usual.

Report of the Committee on Obituaries.

To the Grand Council Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

With steady and unfaltering step we are marching toward the grave, and ere we are aware, the narrow house of clay will receive all that is mortal of us; even now, this old gray earth is wrinkled o'er with the graves of her children. "In the midst of life, we are in death."

Constantine with his sword, drew the outlines of a grave upon the ground and said, "In a few days this will be my empire," and the herald Saladin, by his own ordering, stood daily before him with shroud uplifted on a spear, saying, "This is the end of the glory of Saladin, the Great!" Death is no respecter of persons:

"The tall, the wise, the reverend head, Must lie as low as ours."

It was Voltaire who said, "Life is a vast ocean. We are all struggling for the shore. He who cries, 'There is no shore!' deprives me of strength, and I sink. But he who cries, 'I see the shore!' animates me with new courage to struggle on."

During the past year within our own jurisdiction, many familiar faces have passed from view,—but is it not for a time only? Many have outstripped us on the voyage of life's ocean—but do they not await us on the immortal shore? Man was made for two worlds, and as I listen I hear one greater than man way, as He stands with the sorrowing and dying of earth, "He that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me, shall never die." Not only have many from our own jurisdiction passed away, but some who have served the craft with distinction, and brought honors to Masonry, and who have been honored by Masonry, have been called from labor to refreshment, and left the unfinished designs upon the trestle-board. We note briefly the following:

MISSOURI.

Thomas Elwood Garrett departed this life June 29, 1905, after an earthly sojourn of almost eighty years. Companion Garrett entered the fraternity of Free Masons in St. Louis, 1861, and devoted more than forty years of his life to its advancement. R. Ill. Comp. Garrett was honored with the office of Grand Master in 1870 and 1871, Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons in 1865, and President of the Grand Convention of High Priests from 1868. He was the oldest living Past Grand Master of the Cryptic Rite in Missouri. The vows of Knighthood he took in 1862, and in 1868 was crowned an honorary 33 degree of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. But now his labors are finished, and the working tools have fallen from his hands, and while his body rests in mother earth, his spirit has returned to God who gave it.

KANSAS.

One of the pioneers of Masonry in Kansas has been removed in the person of R. Ill. Comp. Jacob D. Rush, Past Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Kansas. Comp. Rush was born in Indiana in 1840, and at the age of twenty-five removed to Leavenworth, Kansas. His Masonic record extends over a period of two score years. Always enthusiastic in the work, his very presence was a great inspiration to the Companions.

COLORADO.

Most keenly does the order throughout the Centennial state feel its loss in what seems to them, the untimely death of R. Ill. Past Grand Master Colvin Edgar Reed. He was the first of the Past Grand Masters of the state to go to his reward. At the time of his death, he occupied the office of Junior Grand Deacon of the Grand Lodge of Colorado. He it was who was one of the most active spirits in the formation of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the state, some ten years ago.

KENTUCKY.

After a Masonic experience of more than forty years, R. Ill. Comp. William Ryan, Grand Treasurer and Past Grand Master of the Grand Council of Kentucky, Royal and Select Masters, ceased his labors November 13, 1904, at the advanced age of seventy-six. Companion Ryan had received all the degrees not only in York Rite Masonry, but in the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, having been crowned Honorary Inspector General 33° in 1879. He was especially proficient in the monitorial work in both branches, seldom using ritual or note. He is credited with having conferred more Masonic degrees and participated in more Masonic ceremonies than any other Mason in the state.

IOWA.

Cryptic Masonry in Iowa suffered a great loss in the death of R. Ill. Comp. Almon R. Dewey, Grand Past Master. It was his high and unusual honor to have presided over all the Masonic

Grand bodies of the state, and for more than thirty years was active and aggressive in them all. "In the beautiful cemetery adjoining the city of Washington, he sleeps under God's Arch of Blue," having passed away April 15, 1905.

MICHIGAN.

Past Grand Master, R. Ill. Comp. Byron C. Hill, answered the summons of the Grand Architect of the universe, April 15, 1905, at the early age of fifty-four. His service to Cryptic Masonry dates from 1891. He became one of the Grand Officers in 1898, steadily climbing the round of offices until he reached that of Most Ill. Grand Master in 1902.

Michigan also suffered in the death of R. Ill. Comp. Lewis C. Goodrich, Grand Lecturer for the state, to which office he had been elected in 1896, and in which he served until the day of his death, August 1905.

NEBRASKA.

With Masonic honors, the remains of R. Ill. Comp. Robert Wilkinson Furnas, Most Ill. Grand Master, were laid to rest in June, 1905. For quite three years he served the craft with distinction in the capacity of Grand Master. Comp. Furnas was a Buckeye by birth, having been born in Miami Co., O., 1824, and received his Council degrees in Franklin Council at Troy, Ohio. Was a charter member and T. I. M. of Furnas Council No. 3 at Brownville, Neb. For two terms he served his state as Chief Executive, and bore an honorable part in the Civil War, having been commissioned a Colonel in the regular army by President Lincoln.

INDIANA.

In the 82nd year of his age, R. Ill. Comp. Past Grand Master William W. Austin of Ind. passed to his reward, April 25, 1905, having been a Mason for more than fifty years, and a R. & S. M. for forty-eight years. Faithfully and efficiently did he serve the Order in every department thereof, and the Companions of Indiana most keenly feel his taking off.

OREGON.

R. Ill. Comp. Seymour Chapman, Grand Master of Oregon, ceased his labors December 25, 1904, at the age of seventy-two. "In moral tone, fidelity to duty, strict integrity and truth, his career constitutes a bright example, worthy of admiration and emulation." Peace to his ashes.

CONNECTICUT.

Cryptic Masonry in the Nutmeg State with keen sorrow and a sense of deep loss, records the death of two of her Most Ill. Past Grand Masters, R. Ill. Comp. Edward Ernest West, and R. Ill. Comp. Charles N. Jones. They were devoted and zealous Companions, and their memory will long be cherished by the Craft in the jurisdiction where they were so well known and wrought so faithfully.

In compliance therefor with the time honored custom in our Masonic Bodies, your Committee on Obituaries herewith concludes its labors and submits its report, comforted in the thought that,

"The grave can naught destroy,
Only the flesh can die,
And e'en the body triumps o'er decay;
Clothed by thy wondrous might
In robes of dazzling light,
This flesh shall burst the grave at that last day."

REUBEN C. LEMMON.


Born May 12th, 1825—Died September 6th, 1905.

After a pilgrimage of four score years our highly revered and beloved Brother and Companion, Reuben C. Lemmon, has answered the inevitable summons of the Grim Reaper, and is resting from his labors. It is to be greatly regretted that one who was so richly endowed with all the accomplishments that go to make a true and courteous gentleman, and a loyal, sincere and faithful friend and brother, should be called from earth and earthly associations, even at so ripe an age. The world is always better because such men live, and their going hence must leave a void ever difficult to fill.

Most Excellent Companion Lemmon was born in Seneca County, New York, on May 12th, 1825, and came west and located in the city of Toledo in the year 1853, and died in said city on September 6th, 1905.

He was made a Master Mason in Toledo Lodge No. 144 F. and A. M. on November 17th, 1855; a Royal Arch Mason in Fort Maigs Chapter No. 29 on July 28th, 1857; a Royal and Select Master in Toledo Council No. 33 on January 15th, 1858; and was created a Knight Templar in Toledo Commandery No. 7 on February 5th, 1858. He received the 32nd Degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in February, 1875, and was made an honorary member of the Supreme Council of that Rite in 1890. In 1874 he was elected Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Ohio and was re-elected for three successive years. In 1879 he was elected Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Ohio and was re-elected in 1880. In 1886 and 1887 he was the Most Excellent President of the Grand Council of Anointed High Priests, and in 1897 he was elected General Grand High Priest of the General Grand Chapter, R. A. M. of the United States.

In civil life he was a lawyer by profession and served for twenty years as Judge of the Common Pleas Court of Lucas County, Ohio, where he displayed marked ability, and knowledge of the law, as well as a thorough comprehension of the rules of equity and their proper application.

In private life he was an exemplary man. He really seemed to enjoy life to its fullest extent and God granted him many years in which to enjoy it. He was a man of splendid social powers; there was a genial magnetism in his presence and a frankness and openness of manner that attracted men to him. He was a man of sound discretion and clear discernment; was a store-house of good common sense and had great honesty of purpose. Guided by his high sense of justice, his reasoning faculties rarely failed him in the attainment of what he conscientiously believed to be the right. While he was not an orator and did not possess those graces of oratory which captivate and conquer public assemblies of men, yet, he had a faculty of putting his thoughts into compact expression and uttering his ideas with a force and clearness which carried conviction.

With these admirable endowments were blended the kindlier affections and feelings of the heart that endeared him to those who knew him, and made him within the pale of our Fraternity the loved Brother and Companion, and in private life the excellent citizen, the affectionate husband and father and devoted friend. He was ever kind to young men and the beacon light of his Masonic intelligence has guided many a young and inexperienced Mason over the shoals of uncertainty, who otherwise would have gone down in embarrassment and distress.

But he has gone from us forever. His tall familiar form, his happy face and genial smile will no more be seen, and his gentle voice will no more be heard on earth. In his death the State and the community in which he lived have lost one of their most honored and valued citizens and our Fraternity one of her brightest, purest and most faithful members; but, with a knowledge of the splendid record he has made in his long pilgrimage of life, and the honor, esteem and satisfaction which have crowned his efforts here, we must all feel assured that in calling him from labor to refreshment, the Almighty has provided for him an abiding place in a Temple not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens.

INTRODUCTORY.

The congratulations of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio are respectfully extended to all other Grand Bodies of the Cryptic Rite upon the prosperity now generally prevalent in the Subordinate Councils of this and other Grand Jurisdictions.

It is, of course, a matter of pardonable pride with its membership to know that the Grand Council of Ohio now occupies the first place among its compeers.

In its historical relations the researches of Masonic scholars now very satisfactorily show the pre-American existence of Cryptic Masonry. Gould in his history of the Royal Arch Degree says of degrees worked in Scotland prior to those of the Grand Chapter erected in 1818.

"Besides the Supreme Grand Chapter erected (as above stated) in 1818, there is another organization which claims the right of controlling the Royal Arch Degree in Scotland. This is the Early Grand Scottish Rite, formerly called the Early Grand Mother Encampment of High Knight Templars, Scotland.

"The laws of the Rite are entitled the 'General Statutes and Ordinances enacted for the government of Red, Black, Green, and White Masonry' (in Scotland)."

"The third of the Statutes and Ordinances of the Early Grand Mother Chapter is as follows: "The Early Grand Mother Chapter recognizes the Degrees of Funeral Master, Fellow Craft Mark, Master's Mark, Architect, Grand Architect, Master of the Blue, Past Master, Royal Ark Mariner, Fugitive Mark, Link and Chain, Jacob's Wrestle, Scarlet Cord, Brotherly Love, Royal Master Select Master, Most Excellent Master, Excellent Mason, Superexcellent Mason, Holy Royal Arch, and the installed degrees of Noah, J., H., and Z."

As the Grand Body referred to claims even an earlier existence than 1750 it is at least another corroborative link in the historical chain of Cryptic Masonry and at least shows conclusively, in the opinion of your committee, the pre-American existence of the Council Degrees.

ALABAMA, 1894 TO 1904 INCLUSIVE.

Annual Proceedings, Pamphlet, pp. 126. Montgomery, 1905.

The Proceedings from 1894 to 1903 are of the usual routine character and not now of sufficient interest to review herein as it would be but a repetition of statistical information.

The Sixty-seventh Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Alabama was held in the city of Montgomery, December 5, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904. M. I. Comp. Jacob D. Bloch, G. M., in the Grand East.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, six.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, six. Number of "Advanced" current year, 74; affiliated, 5; number of demitted, 2; died, 3; suspended, n. p. d., 23.

Net gain current year, fifty-one.

Total number of members, 357.

Number of Past M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, two. Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, not reported.

No Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council is on the list of Grand Representatives in the Proceedings of Ohio, and no complete list seems to be contained in the Alabama Proceedings.

"The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form. Prayer by the Grand Chaplain."

The portrait of Comp. Jacob D. Bloch, M. Ill. G. M., faces the title page of the brochure under review.

The address of the M. Ill. G. M. is an exhaustive statement of official acts. Of the condition of Cryptic Masonry in that Grand Jurisdiction he says:

"It is with pleasure that I state that the general condition of the Grand Council of Alabama is greatly improved. Our Grand Recorder will make report of the exact increase of membership from his returns just in, and while not giving you the exact number I can assure you of a healthy increase. Interest seems to have been aroused in Cryptic Masonry, and it is but just, proper and natural that it should be. An improvement in Masonry means an improvement in the general condition of the civilized world." The Committee on Finance reported a balance of \$350.65 in the Grand Treasury.

The Proceedings were of routine legislation. A committee on a Revision of the Constitution was appointed and their Constitution of 1892 is published in the Appendix.

M. Ill. Comp. Jacob D. Bloch of Mobile, was re-elected Grand Master, and M. Ill. Comp. George A. Beauchamp of Montgomery, re-elected Grand Recorder.

No report on Correspondence is contained in the Proceedings. The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Alabama will be held in the city of Montgomery on Monday before the first Tuesday in December, 1905.

The M. I. Grand Master Comp. G. W. Skidmore, was pre-

vented by illness from being in attendance. His Annual Address, a brief summary of official acts, was read by the Grand Secretary: In it he pathetically says of himself:

"I regret more than I can express that ill health prevents me from being in attendance at your session. Very early after the beginning of my term I was stricken with paralysis which impaired my speech, and my locomotion, to such an extent as to render it impracticable for me to fully discharge the duties of my office, and which prevents me from being with you today, but I am with you in spirit and my heart and my interest is in the cause of Cryptic Masonry."

The Grand Recorder M. I. Comp. Fay Hempstead in his Annual Report states that:

"I may say, in general, that this year has proven to be a most prosperous year, and with more advancement in our Council affairs than I have ever known concerning it; equalling, I verily believe, if not surpassing, that of any previous year. I attribute this happy result to the coming of the General Grand Council into our midst, and the inspiration which their session, held in this city last year, furnished to Councils and to individual Companions."

On recommendation of the Committee on Charters and Dispensations a Charter was granted to a Council working under Dispensation, and one dormant Council was resuscitated.

The Committee on Recorder's and Treasurer's Books reported a balance of \$256.48 in the Grand Treasury.

On motion it was ordered that the "Grand Recorder express to Companion G. W. Skidmore, Past M. I. Grand Master, our sincere sympathy in his affliction, and our hopes for his early and permanent recovery, and it was further ordered that the sum of \$25.00 be sent him out of the funds of this Grand Council."

Comp. Nick Kizer of Eureka Springs, whose portrait faces the title page of the Proceedings, was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and M. Ill. Comp. Fay Hempstead of Little Rock re-elected Grand Recorder.

No report on Foreign Correspondence published in the Proceedings of current year.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, thirteen. Number of Councils under Dispensation, two.

"The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form with prayer by the Grand Chaplain and music by the Choir."

The portrait of the Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. D. M. Sutherland is a frontispiece to the Proceedings.

In a brief Annual Address the Grand Master concisely reports his official acts. He issued Dispensations for the establishment of two new Councils, and in his conclusion says:

"In my official capacity, I have tried to teach that the G. C. has ever in mind the necessities and best interests of the craft, and is ever mindful of the high aims and ends we have in view; the beautiful and sublime teachings of the Cryptic Degrees are peculiarly fitting as the end and summit of perfection in Ancient Craft Masonry and appeal to the highest ideals of human wisdom. If we acknowledge, as we must, that man is a progressive being, we must also acknowledge that there are heights to which he has not yet risen, and it is along the lines of higher thought and human interests that we desire to direct the minds of this great fraternity, as well as the novitiate, and we must not stop at any one degree,

for the limit of his intelligence is the only limit of our usefulness to our fellow man.

"The sublime teachings of brotherly love are everywhere apparent in the Cryptic Degrees. They appeal to us to have faith in God, and love for our fellow beings, to learn of those capable of teaching the higher truths, to regard education as the great standard of manhood, and the equality of man, the true intent of nature."

The Grand Treasurer, M. I. Comp. Franklin H. Day, reported a balance of \$2,002.81 in the Grand Treasury.

M. I. Comp. William A. Davies, Grand Recorder, reported that fourteen of their fifteen Subordinate Councils had made returns.

The following was unanimously adopted by the Grand Council, viz:

"Resolved, That the uniform ritual promulgated by the General Grand Council for the Degrees of Royal and Select and Super-Excellent Master be and is hereby adopted as the ritual to be used by the Councils under the jurisdiction of the Grand Council of California."

On recommendation of the Committee on New Councils a Charter was granted to each of the two Councils working under Dispensations.

M. Ill. Comp. James Bestor Merritt, Chairman of the Committee, submitted a brief report on Foreign Correspondence in which he concisely reviews in twenty-eight pages the printed Proceedings of twenty-eight Grand Councils.

In his review of Indiana he states that the Triangular Apron in California "We hold to be the correct thing." That it is the correct form has never been successfully disputed and it was largely the influence of regalia manufacturers that caused the change to be made, for their convenience.

Under Michigan he says in the action of the Grand Lodge of Wyoming in designating the legitimate bodies of Free Masons: "We do not think that any of us good Cryptics need feel any apprehension. It is only the naughty Cerneaus who are struck at, and they cannot get a lick amiss."

Of the Proceedings of the Grand Council of Ohio for 1904 he says: "Ohio, bearing the banner of Cryptic Masonry, greets us with a volume of 200 pages, all of interest."

Fraternal mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand

The portrait of M. Ill. Comp. Edward E. Fuller, Grand Master, faces the title page.

In his Annual Address the Grand Master says of the Rite:

"Cryptic Masonry in this jurisdiction, is in an exceedingly healthy and flourishing condition. We have now twenty-three Councils—one having been instituted the present year—within our borders, containing more than four thousand members,—one-fifth of the entire Masonic membership of our state. Only four States—Ohio, Massachusetts, Michigan and New York, in the order named—exceeding Connecticut in membership, according to the latest available statistics of a year ago."

He makes sympathetic mention of the demise of Past Grand Masters M. Ill. Companions the late Charles A. Jones and the late Edward Ernest West of that Grand Jurisdiction. Portraits of these eminent Companions are contained in the "Proceedings."

He made eleven official visitations to Subordinate Councils and reports that no questions had been referred to him for decision.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Isaiah Baker, Jr., reported a balance of \$890.87 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. James McCormick, Grand Recorder, submitted complete reports of all matters pertaining to his office.

The Law Committee reported that no business had been submitted for their consideration and no appeals or grievances having been submitted the Annual Session was brief in matters of business but had an exemplification of the Ritual by one of the Subordinate Councils on actual Candidates.

A Past Grand Master's Jewel was presented to the retiring Grand Master.

Past M. Ill. Grand Master John H. Barlow, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted his usual interesting digest of the transactions of the Grand Bodies under review (twenty-nine current year and reviewed in forty pages of the Connecticut Pamphlet).

Of Ohio for 1904 he says:

"This is the largest Cryptic Jurisdiction in the United States, and publishes the largest pamphlet of Proceedings, which is over 200 pages, and is ornamented by the portrait of Comp. John F. Lane, the retiring Grand Master."

He makes fraternal reference to the demise of the late Ill. Comp. S. Stacker Williams and commends the report of the Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home.

The report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence is courteously noticed and its "introductory" is quoted with approval. He appends a carefully prepared statistical table to his report and in his conclusion says:

"We are pleased to find the several Grand Councils enjoying a fair degree of prosperity and in most Jurisdictions, a healthy increase of members. We present our usual statistical table, which shows a net gain in members the past year of 4,362, and total membership (including the 12 Councils and 322 members under the Jurisdiction of the General Grand Council) of 62,444."

M. Ill. Comp. Charles B. Chapman of Norwich was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. James McCormick of Hartford re-elected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Correspondence, M. Ill. Comp. John H. Barlow of Hartford.

"The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council will be held in the city of Hartford on the Wednesday succeeding the second Tuesday in May, 1906."

ENGLAND AND WALES, 1905.

The Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of England and Wales was held at Mark Mason's Hall in London, England, March 9, A. D. 1905, A. Dep. 2905. The P. G. P. C. of W. as M. I. Grand Master presiding in the absence of the Grand Master.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, not stated.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, twenty-eight.

Total number of members, 1,079.

Other statistical matter not reported.

Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, six.

Ill. Comp. C. F. Matier of Great Queen Street, London. England, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was in attendance, in the discharge of his official duties as Grand Recorder.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, twenty-two.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, thirty.

Number of "Advanced" current year and other statistics not stated in the printed Proceedings.

Net gain current year, one hundred and nine.

Total number of members, 887.

Number of Past. M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, two.

M. Ill. Comp. Robert L. Colding of Savannah, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was in attendance.

The Grand Council "was opened in Due and Ample Form with prayer by the Grand Chaplain."

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Greenfield, is an able Masonic paper of twelve pages. In it he says in relation to Grand Representatives, that the office

"Is a courteous recognition of the fact, that we are all members of one great fraternal family, are all actuated by the same lofty motives, and labor for the accomplishment of the same great ends. It may only be a sentimental office, yet in this hard and dry, materialistic age, we may get matters down to a too business like basis. And after all, even now, sentiment in one form or another is the most potent influence in this world of ours."

He issued a Dispensation for one new Council and the usual Dispensations for other Masonic purposes. In his conclusion he thoughtfully says:

"Hold out to your members the attraction of pleasant surroundings, coupled with an intelligent rendition of the Ritual, or a discourse on the history and teachings of the Craft that dignifies you by accepting you, and you will find your enthusiasm contagious, your activity infectious and your Council will flourish like a green bay tree. Let this be done throughout the length and breadth of this Grand old State of Georgia, and you, your Councils, your Companions, will dwell in such an atmosphere of Masonic fervor, that our Royal Craft will attain heights of glory and grandeur beside which its past achievements will sink into insignificance.

"Then as the glorifying and uplifting influence of Masonry falls like a benediction on the hearts of man, will come back again that reverence which once marked the attitude of the profane toward the initiate, but which the hurly-burly of these latter days has lessened and weakened. Then will the good man seek us, the bad man shun us, the strong man come to us for praise, the weak man for strength. I have unbounded and absolute faith in the future of our great fraternity. It needs not the gift of prophecy the see the Spirit of Masonry, standing as the strong right arm of the religion of the living God, shining like a great beacon light over the curling waves of ignorance, falsehood and vice, now frowning with stern disapproval on immorality and debauchery, anon bending in sympathy over the bier of an humble brother, and again, its duty to the dead performed, turning to the living left behind, and slowly, tenderly, lovingly, supporting with bountiful hands the widow and the orphan, and teaching the world that with us, brotherhood is more than a name — that it is a living, breathing, working entity."

The Committee on Finance reported an estimated balance of \$245.01 in the Grand Treasury.

On recommendation of the Committee on Charters a Charter was granted to the Council working under Dispensation.

No report on Foreign Correspondence is contained in the Proceedings.

M. Ill. Comp. L. W. Burkett of Macon was elected Grand Master and Ill. Comp. W. A. Wolihin re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Georgia will be held in the city of Macon, April 24, 1906.

Annual Proceedings, Pamphlet, pp. 89. Peoria, 1904.

The Fifty-second Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Illinois was held in the city of Chicago, October 26, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. A. M. Hallowell, presiding.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, thirty-nine.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, forty-two. Number of "Advanced" current year, 431; affiliated, 20; reinstated, 9; number of dimitted, 31; died, 58; suspended, 39.

Net gain current year, three hundred and thirty-two.

Total number of members, 4038.

Number of Past M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, sixteen.

Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, twenty-five.

M. Ill. Comp. George W. Curtis of Peoria, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was not in attendance.

"A constitutional number of Councils being represented, the Grand Council of Illinois was opened in ample form, the Grand Chaplain leading the devotions."

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. A. M. Hallowell, is a concise statement of official duties discharged.

The Grand Treasurer, Ill. Comp. John C. Smith, reported a balance of \$1,219.77 in the Grand Treasury.

Ill. Comp. Gil W. Barnard, Grand Recorder, submitted his usual complete report of all matters relating to the clerical department of the Grand Council.

The business of the Annual Assembly was brief, relating to local affairs.

M. Ill. William H. Mayo, Past M. Ill. Gen Grand Master, was in attendance as a visitor and accorded the usual honors.

A Past M. Ill. Grand Master's Jewel was presented to the retiring Grand Master.

M. Ill. Comp. George W. Warvelle, Chairman of the Committee, submitted as heretofore, a very interesting report on Foreign Correspondence.

In its introductory he says of his report:

"In general structure it does not differ much, if any, from former reports. I have tried to make it interesting; even instructive. But I realize that there is a wide gulf between hope and fruition. Few of us can span it.

"If it shall be objected, that my jurisdictional reviews are thin and attenuated, I must justify by the fact that in most cases the subject reviewed was only a skeleton. A meager outline of routine business. I cannot pad the bare bones of a session with a flesh it did not possess, and I know that you are not craving for knowledge that neither informs nor educates, and which leaves you no wiser after it has been imparted than you were before. I am aware also, that many accomplished reviewers do not agree with me in this particular. But I am preparing this report for the Companions of Illinois. I have been doing this sort of work long enough to have acquired a fair idea of what they want."

The Transactions of thirty Grand Councils and the Proceedings of the General Grand Council are courteously reviewed. The Proceedings of Ohio for 1903, the Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence received fraternal mention. The Ohio system of Official Visitations is commended, of which he justly says:

"An efficient system of inspection is employed in this jurisdiction and much of the present prosperity of Grand Council may be attributed thereto. This is something I have been persistently preaching to you for years, and from my survey of all of the jurisdictions I find that, without exception, the Grand Councils which are enjoying the largest amount of prosperity are those which provide for visitation and inspection."

His conclusion of his reviews of Cryptic affairs in Texas meets the concurrence of your committee.

The Grand Chapter of Texas having declined to release its control of the Council Degrees Comp. Warvelle says:

"It would seem, therefore, that, for the present at least, no hope can be entertained of Cryptic autonomy in Texas, and probably for years to come the degrees will continue to occupy the same relative position in that jurisdiction as is sustained by a tin can tied to a dog's narrative.

"And, notwithstanding the assertions of the committee, the action seems ill-advised. The Capitular degrees are flourishing. A large and strong Grand Chapter exists. Masonry in general seems in good condition, and while the Cryptic degrees might not attain the same importance as other branches of Masonry, they would undoubtedly assume the same relative position with respect to the Chapter that they hold in other localities. What Texas needs is a Moses that will be able to lead the Rite from the house of bondage and into the light of freedom. Such a leader must come from within its own fold, as the G. G. C. seems utterly with-

out power or influence in a matter of this kind. Someone has a chance to immortalize himself in the Lone Star State."

In his conclusion he says that:

"The notable event of the year was the change of premierships of Grand Councils. For a number of years Massachusetts has held of right the proud position of first among its equals. This position, together with whatever prestige may have accompanied it, has been won and is now occupied by Ohio, and as Ohio is only two states away from Illinois, I am emboldened to hope that in good time we shall be able to wrest the sceptre from the Buckeyes. As it is, Ohio holds the fort by a small margin only, not to exceed 300, and it is just among the possibilities that those Massachusetts fellows may spit on their hands and take a new hold and so regain their old standing. Still, now that the star of empire has started toward the West, I should be sorry to see it recede and go back to the bleak and barren shores of the Atlantic."

If the interest in Cryptic Masonry is maintained in the future by Ohio Masons as in the past decade there is no probability that Ohio will ever "lose its grip."

M. Ill. Comp. C. W. Hollandsworth of Canton, whose portrait faces the title page of the pamphlet under review, was elected Grand Master, and Ill. Comp. Gil. W. Barnard of Chicago, was re-elected Grand Recorder.

A small effort, on the part of the Illustrious Master, never fails to enlist some of the uninformed in his community into our fold; therefore let us be up and doing, there being over 5,000 R. A. Masons in the great State of Indiana who have as yet not received these beautiful degrees. In order that you may know who some of them are, obtain from the secretary of your Chapter an alphabetical list of all Royal Arch Masons, compare the same with a list of your Council members, and you will likely see some of your personal friends among them. Call upon them, impress them with the fact that it is necessary to receive the Council Degrees in order to complete the uniform system of "American Masonry," that without them the chain is broken and no one can be a complete York Rite Mason."

He issued Dispensations for the establishment of three new Councils and of the Rite in Indiana he says:

"It affords me a great deal of pleasure to be able to say to you that the condition of Cryptic Masonry was never better, the outlook never more favorable for our beloved Rite than it is at the present time. Peace and harmony prevail, zeal and good fellowship predominate in all the Councils of Indiana. Our ritualistic work is of a high character, the degrees being conferred in a dignified and appropriate manner and the material received of the highest character and standing, which enables us to congratulate ourselves upon the happy conditions throughout this Grand Jurisdiction."

there are few reading Masons, yet once in a while one finds an inquiring mind anxious to cultivate a knowledge of the doings of the Craft without the confines of his own jurisdiction, and it was a distinct pleasure of this writer to receive two letters during the past year commending his reviews in most flattering terms."

He also states that his statistical report

"Shows that Indiana is still seventh in membership, while Ohio has crowded Massachusetts out of first place."

M. Ill. Comp. Robert R. Whitrett of Logansport, whose portrait is a frontispiece to the Pamphlet under review, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Calvin W. Prather of Indianapolis re-elected Grand Recorder.

DEAR BROTHERS — I beg leave to apologize for the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter, Grand Commandery and Grand Council Territory for 1905. I am very much ashamed of these books. They are incomplete and incorrect, and the printer's work is very poorly done. The fault is not mine. This work was done in a Muskogee printing office. Last year, and for several years, this house has done us good work. This year the Union Printers went out on strike while the first book, the Grand Chapter Proceedings, were being printed. The strike was not settled. Some of the copy was misplaced and lost and when the Grand Chapter Proceedings came out I was very much disappointed, and requested a brother Mason in Muskogee to go to the Times office and get all the MS. of the Grand Commandery and Grand Council and send it to me. He wrote that the proprietor was doing his best to get out the other books in good shape, and advised me to let it remain. But it was a miserable job. Some of the Reports are incomplete; some placed out of order and the Grand Council Proceedings have no tables at all.

I am very sorry for Mr. Greer because of his sore trouble with the Union printers, but I am more sorry for myself because my brethren expect me to have good work done for them.

M. Ill. Comp. A. R. Dewey of Washington, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was in attendance.

"Grand Master Charles O. Greever, with the assistance of his Grand Officers, opened the Grand Council in ample form at 9 o'clock A. M., with prayer by the Illustrious Grand Chaplain, J. M. Pearse."

The portrait of the Grand Master is a frontispiece to the Proceedings.

In his Annual Address— a concise report of official duties discharged — the Grand Master says of Cryptic Masonry in Iowa:

"As the first Council in Iowa, Alpha, No. 1, was organized April 7, 1899, Cryptic Masonry in this state has had an independent existence of a little more than five years. It will be both interesting and instructive to review the numerical progress made in this period. On September 1, 1899, there were ten Councils, with a membership of 461. The Grand Council of Iowa was organized October 15, 1900, and at the close of that year there were twelve Councils, with a membership of 583. On December 31, 1901, there were thirteen Councils, with a membership of 629; on December 31, 1902, sixteen Councils, with 734 members, and on December 31, 1903, twenty Councils with 883 members. These figures show a healthy increase, and though some of the Councils are not as prosperous as they should be, the record thus far made indicates a like progress in the future."

He issued Dispensations for the establishment of two new Councils.

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. R. C. Hoffman, reported a balance of \$1,203.28 in the Grand Treasury.

A full report of all matters pertaining to the clerical department of the Grand Council was submitted by the Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Alf. Wingate.

Past M. Ill. Grand Master Comp. William F. Cleveland, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, in twenty pages of the pamphlet under review, submitted a concise summary of the Proceedings of twenty-two Grand Bodies.

In his review of New York he says in re change of the name of the Cryptic degrees:

"We notice that the amendment offered by Comp. Osgoodby to change the title of the Grand Council form 'Royal and Select Masters' to 'Cryptic Masons' was rejected. We are not surprised; in fact we should have been very much surprised if the amendment had been adopted. While the present name may not be quite as expressive as it should be, we believe it would have been a misfortune for New York to have cut loose from the nomenclature by which our rite has been known throughout the world, even if Companion Warvelle, of Illinois, did advocate the change and promise that the Grand Council of Illinois would fall in line. Better not tinker with the name, else confusion will surely follow."

Your Committee fully concurs in the impropriety and uselessness of any change. The present designation has been used for a century and a half and doubtless from their organization.

The Proceedings of Ohio for 1903, the Annual Address of Grand Master Jewett Palmer and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence are fraternally commended.

In his conclusion Comp. Cleveland thoughtfully says:

"The printed Proceedings of sister jurisdictions bear evidence, with but very few exceptions, that Cryptic Masonry is on the upgrade, steadily growing in membership, in importance, and in the hearts of its votaries. Occupying the peculiar position that it does in our Masonic system, its steady increase in membership is due almost entirely to the beauty of its ritual and its intimate connection with Ancient Craft Masonry."

A portrait of Past Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. Frederick W. Craig is contained in the Proceedings.

M. Ill. Comp. George R. Turner of Waterloo, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Alf. Wingate of Des Moines re-elected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Correspondence M. Ill. Comp. W. F. Cleveland of Harlan.

The portrait of the M. Ill. Grand Master, John C. Postleth-waite, faces the title page.

"A severe storm with snow, wind and very low temperature had been raging for the preceding forty-eight hours, delaying and blockading trains, and interfering greatly with railroad traffic. Many members of Grand Council were deterred from leaving home; some were snow-bound on trains, and several failed to reach Wichita until after the close of the Assembly. Among these was the Grand Master, his train not reaching Wichita until the morning after the close of the Grand Council.

"By order of the Acting Grand Master, the Grand Recorder called the roll of the councils, and it appearing that a constitutional number of Councils were represented, R. Ill. Charles J. Webb, Deputy Grand Master, acting as Grand Master, opened the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Kansas in due form, after prayer by the acting Grand Chaplain."

In his Annual Address the M. Ill. Grand Master congratulates the Companions upon the harmony and prosperity of the Rite in that Grand Jurisdiction, and in that connection says:

"Whenever a Council has been fortunate to secure earnest and zealous officers, a new era has dawned upon that Council and prosperity has abounded within its gates. An earnest, zealous devotion on the part of the officers of any Council, with the assistance of its membership will bring about such a revival that every Crypt will give forth the sound of renewed work, and the light of a new day will dawn upon the sleeping Council.

"I am pleased to report that this Grand Council contains some very lively Councils, which by the efficiency of officers, and zeal of members have exerted influence in the Crypt, locally and throughout the Grand Jurisdiction."

A sympathetic tribute is paid to the memory of Past Deputy Grand Master, the late R. Ill. Comp. Jacob D. Rush, whose portrait is contained in the Proceedings.

M. Ill. Comp. Aaron H. Connett, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$701.78 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Wm. M. Shaver, Grand Recorder, reported that "Annual Returns and Dues" were received from all of the subordinate Councils on their roll.

The Committees on Appeals and Grievances, Jurisprudence and New Councils reported that no business had been submitted for their consideration.

A proposition to reduce the fees of the Council degrees to \$5.00 was very wisely rejected "by nearly a unanimous vote."

R. Ill. Comp. William M. Shaver, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted a very interesting report courteously reviewing in a paper of forty-seven pages the Proceedings of thirty-three Grand Councils. In reply to Comp. Merritt of California, in relation to the "Membership at large" feature in Kansas Cryptic Masonry he says:

"Well, we do not want any more of this class than we are compelled to have, but they are worth just a dollar more a year to the Grand Council and more to the 'Craft in general' than if they were lost on the rolls of a defunct Council. Once a year at least they are reminded that they have received the Cryptic degrees. We might remark to our Comp. Merritt that we never lose an opportunity to say to a companion of this class: 'Obtain your Grand Recorder's certificate and affiliate with a live Council,'—in fact, the plan is designed to emphasize just this course and to avoid the absolute loss to the rite that usually results from an arrested charter. The financial item is merely a practical argument."

As suggested by the writer a number of years since, a "membership at large" feature in all Masonic Grand Bodies would doubt-

less largely lessen the non-affiliate evil and its fees would add to the Charity Funds of the Grand Body.

The Proceedings of the Grand Council of Ohio for 1904 are courteously reviewed. He says that

"They have a pretty custom in the Grand Bodies of Ohio, namely, that of receiving with Masonic honors Grand and Past Grand Officers of other co-ordinate Masonic Bodies of the state."

He commends the Annual Address of Grand Master Lane. In relation to the unwise habit in some Councils of only "holding meetings when there is work," he quotes the views of Companion Lane, and says:

"We might go farther. There is a growing disposition in some Councils to hold only one or two Stated Assemblies in a year, call all others "Specials" and hold them only when there is work. We believe it is a mistake. The remarks of Grand Master Lane fit this condition admirably."

Mention is approvingly made of the Annual Report of Grand Recorder Evans and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Charles J. Webb of Topeka, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. William M. Shaver of the same city re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

The Seventy-seventh Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Kentucky was held in the city of Louisville, October 17, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, M. Ill. Comp. Guy Barrett, Grand Master, presiding.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, twelve.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, twenty-two.

Number of "Advanced" current year, 87; affiliated, 1; reintsated, 6; number of dimitted, 5; died, 12; suspended, 8.

M. Ill. Comp. Charles H. Fisk of Covington, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was in attendance.

The Grand Council "was opened in Ample Form at 8 o'clock P. M."

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Guy Barrett, was very brief. In it he regretfully says:

"There have been no evidences of activity in Cryptic Masonry in Kentucky during the past year, and the duties of the present Grand Master have not been burdensome. We have in Kentucky about 25,000 Blue Lodge members. Four thousand seven hundred are Chapter Masons. There are three thousand Templars. Dues are paid on less than one thousand Council members. A deplorable lack of interest is evidently taken in this work."

Missionary visitations by the Grand Officers to the Subordinate Councils would doubtless soon cause a different showing to be made — a labor of love that would be self-remunerative from the "happy satisfaction of having faithfully performed" a voluntary duty for the benefit of the Craft.

M. Ill. Comp. William Ryan (since deceased), Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$345.42 in the Grand Treasury.

In his Annual Report V. Ill. Comp. H. B. Grant, Grand Recorder, recommends the publication of portraits of the Grand Master and Past Grand Masters of that Grand Council and has had inserted in present pamphlet a photogravure of Past Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. Eusebius S. Mayes.

An appropriate eulogy of the late M. Ill. Comp. J. Soule Smith was reported by the Committee on Necrology. In it it is sympathetically said:

"Comp. Smith was a man destined by nature for eminence in any pursuit to which he chose to devote his attention. He was at once recognized as a lofty spirit, from whom it was impossible to withhold recognition and regard. He had in him such a combination of good gifts, of great endowments, that his Companions knew him at once as a leader of men, whose birthright it was to excel. In Masonic circles he was particularly esteemed. Sound judgment, wide knowledge, a gift of expression that did not stop short of the phenomenal, made him the object of general esteem and often the idol of his brethren and Companions. To the literature of Masonry he has contributed strong and able papers, marked by that originality and charm of style which were his notable characteristics.

"We mourn Comp. Smith as one whose column was broken when his work was not yet done. It is true that he had toiled long and faithfully, and that his work was such as passed the trying square, but when he last met with us, a year ago, his natural force seemed not abated, and we were led to hope that he would long remain to cheer us by his presence and aid us with his counsel. Alas! it was not to be. As suddenly as the lightning from the cloud, the summons came, and our Companion went to death's mystery when scarcely past the meridian of manhood. His Companions, bereft, mourn his untimely going, but will cherish his memory as a precious legacy."

The personal recollections of the writer of our late eminent and genial Companion are especially delightful reminiscences.

In an interesting paper of twenty-six pages M. Ill. Comp. James W. Hopper, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submits a concise abstract of the transactions of twenty-one Grand Bodies.

Of Cryptic Masonry in Kentucky he says in his review of Illinois:

"Cryptic Masonry receives less attention in this jurisdiction than its merits would justify, but the Councils have a number of faithful members devoted to the rite who are doing the best they can."

Ohio for 1903 receives courteous notice and the Annual Address of Grand Master Jewett Palmer and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence receive fraternal mention.

M. Ill. Comp. Joseph H. Ewalt of Paris was elected Grand Master and V. Ill. H. B. Grant of Louisville was re-elected Grand Recorder.

In it he pays a well deserved tribute to the memory of that eminent Mason, the late M. Ill. Comp. Samuel Manning Todd, who was summoned to the world beyond, February 1, 1905. Of Comp. Todd Grand Master Levy says:

"Past Grand Master Todd was known either personally or by name to every member of this Grand Jurisdiction. His labors in the advancement of Freemasonry extended over a period of more than half a century; how he succeeded has been proved by the fact that every branch of our Ancient and Honorable Fraternity, in both the Grand and Subordinate Bodies, honored him by calling him at different times to preside over them. Of him it can be

truly said that round by round, he climbed the ladder that leads to fame in our Mystic Circle, and the purple of our fraternity fell upon his honored shoulders.

"Cryptic Masonry had in him a most ardent supporter. While on a visit to him shortly before his death, in congratulating me upon my advancement to this high and honored station, he informed me that of all the Masonic degrees he had received, none had impressed him more than did the degrees conferred within our Cryptic Circle.

"His life was a shining example of the teachings of our Fraternity; his death leaves us a memory that should prove an incentive for our emulation."

"The Grand Council was opened in full and Ample Form."

In his Annual Address the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Wm. Freeman Lord, says:

"There is no discord in our ranks, everything has been in perfect harmony throughout this jurisdiction the past year. The councils of this state are in the main doing good work and are showing marked improvement in the past three years which I have had the pleasure of witnessing."

Appropriate mention "in memoriam" is made of Past Grand Master, the late M. Ill. Comp. Algernon M. Roak of that Grand Jurisdiction, who had been summoned to the world beyond within the past year.

He reports that within the past year he had made an official visit to all of the Subordinate Councils in that State.

R. Ill. Comp. Leander Fobes, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$736.01 in the Grand Treasury.

The Law Committee and Committee on Dispensations reported that no business had been submitted for their consideration.

Companion Albro E. Chase, the Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, having been elected M. Ill. Grand Master, the Grand Council, "on motion of Comp. Hugh R. Chaplin, voted, that for the present year the Grand Master be requested to serve as correspondent."

In a paper of forty pages M. Ill. Comp. Chase submits a careful digest of the Proceedings of twenty-nine Grand Bodies. In his review of California and in his conclusion special reference is made to the old cry of the "pre-requisite for the Orders of Knight-

hood" theory as a necessity for Crpytic existence — still made in a few Grand Jurisdictions, as an excuse for lack of interest in the beautiful and instructive grades of Royal and Select Master. Your Committee, and we infer that our M. Ill. Companion also, is not in sympathy with that played-out doleful refrain. The facts, easily substantiated, are that whenever the officers of Grand and Subordinate Councils take a lively interest in the Rite, in its work, in official visitations, and in an effort to impress upon the Craft at large the beauty of the degrees and their necessity for a correct understanding of Craft and Capitular Masonry—there the Council degrees flourish. It is also as well to consider the very important feature that as at present worked. Councils are not troubled with a class of members who have made use of the grades for the purpose only of Commandery membership. Cryptic Masonry, therefore, is indeed largely benefitted thereby in the select feature of its membership. The writer does not believe in either the necessity or expediency of any Grand Encampment pre-requisite legis-The success of Cryptic Masonry and its high standing regardless of the many adverse circumstances with which it has had to contend and also with the supineness and defection of its pretended friends, is a sufficient guaranty of its ability to maintain its independent existence so far as any so-called higher grades are concerned and the title of a Royal and Select Master should become a true characteristic of all those who are advanced to its degrees the summit of Ancient Craft Masonry.

Courteous notice is extended to the "Proceedings" of Ohio for 1903 and commendatory mention is made of the Annual Address of M. Ill. Comp. Jewett Palmer, the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence, and of the Ohio Masonic Home.

M. Ill. Comp. Albro E. Chase of Portland was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Stephen Berry of the same city re-elected Grand Recorder.

The portrait of M. Ill. Comp. James F. Allen, Grand Master, is a frontispiece to the Pamphlet under review.

In his Annual Address Grand Master Allen says:

"While we are making an advance from year to year, the progress and interest are not so great as could be desired, nor so great as the beauties of the work of the Secret Vault merits, or as the importance of these Degrees in the superstructure of Masonry demands.

"Several suggestions have been made in other Jurisdictions for the benefit of Cryptic Masonry, most of which are more or less impracticable.

"The system of Grand Visitations is generally commended.

"The most practicable method, in this Jurisdiction at least, seems to be a greater activity on the part of the officers of the Subordinate Councils and greater zeal in making known to Royal Arch Masons the importance and beauty of the Royal and Select Degrees, and finally greater devotion to the noble principles of our Art and greater care to show forth those principles in our daily walk and conversation."

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. Gustav A. Eitel, reported a balance of \$224.32 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Graham Dukehart, Grand Lecturer, reported that he had made an official visit to each one of the Subordinate Councils of that Grand Jurisdiction.

R. Ill. Comp. John M. Carter, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Corerspondence, reported the receipt of the Annual Proceedings of twenty-five Grand Councils and says:

"Their perusal has been interesting and instructive, showing the Cryptic Rite to be in a flourishing condition throughout the country, and it would be a pleasure to comment upon them if our finances would admit of publishing a report of correspondence."

The Grand Master reported that one of their Subordinate Country Councils (King Solomon No. 13) had a larger membership "than the Chapter located at the same place."

M. Ill. Comp. James F. Allen of Rockville was re-elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. James Bowers re-elected Grand Recorder.

The Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Massachusetts was held in Boston, December 14, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, M. Ill. Companion Forest E. Barker, Grand Master, presiding.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, twenty-eight.

Number of Councils under Dispensation, one.

Number of "Advanced" current year, and affiliated, 387; number of dimitted, 85; died, 117; suspended, 276.

R. Ill. Comp. J. Gilman Waite of Medford, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was in attendance as Grand Recorder.

"The entrance of the Most Illustrious Grand Master and Grand Officers was proclaimed by Ill. Comp. Fred M. Sampson, Grand Master of Ceremonies, at 9 o'clock A. M., and the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form, Ill. Comp. M. Perry Sargent officiating at the Altar."

In his Annual Address Grand Master Barker says of their loss in membership:

"We have had an anomalous experience in respect to our membership. Although the number affiliated during the year has been unusually large, the number of members at the close of the year is nearly one hundred less than at its beginning, owing entirely to the extraordinary number of suspensions reported. Nearly one-half of these were due to the judicious pruning of the membership in a single Council which, however, still remains the largest in the Jurisdiction, and probably in the world. Until a few years ago this Council had no annual dues, a portion of its membership had become widely scattered and all trace of them lost. It now reports its present membership to be 'all present or accounted for'."

In relation to the establishment of new Councils he justly says:

"The location of a new Council not only calls for the exercise of a sound discretion as to Masonic needs in any particular locality, but there should be ample evidence that those seeking the privilege of a new charter fully recognize the financial burdens which such Masonic relation imposes and are ready and willing to assume them. The time for a full and careful consideration of these facts is when the Grand Body is considering the issue of a dispensation rather than a charter, as the conditions are simpler, and much more easily dealt with at that time before many new interests become involved."

M. Ill. Comp. William B. Lawrence, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$1,125.44 in the Grand Treasury and the Trustees of the funds reported total securities on hand \$4,191.34.

The Grand Recorder, R. M. Comp. J. Gilman Waite, reported that "an abstract of the Returns of the several Subordinate Councils indicates a healthy condition of the Rite."

The Grand Council voted its approval "of the practice of calling Special Assemblies for the purpose of exemplifying the work of the Degrees, and consider that the money spent for this purpose is well expended."

The Report of Foreign Correspondence submitted by R. Ill. Comp. J. Gilman Waite, Chairman of the Committee, is an interesting paper of sixty-six pages in which the transactions of twenty-seven Grand Bodies are concisely and courteously reviewed. Ohio, it is to be regretted, is not among the number under consideration.

In his review of Tennessee he pertinently says in relation to officially conferring degrees for Subordinate Councils:

"We have not a very exalted opinion of the Grand Bodies either as a body or by its Grand Lecturer, doing the ritualistic work of the Subordinate Bodies. As men learn things by doing them, so let the Councils learn the Ritual by rendering it."

As he says of the Correspondence Report of Comp. Cleveland of Iowa that:

"The closing paragraphs of his conclusion indicates his belief in the ability of Cryptic Masonry to sustain itself upon its own merits."

So, too, the following from his conclusion indicates his faith in the independent character and permanence of Cryptic Masonry: "Notwithstanding the impediments which lie in the way of the greatest success and advancement of the Rite, it is encouraging to see and mark the steady gain that is making all along the line. With the weeding out of the weak, and the survival of the fittest, must come ultimate success of a high order."

M. Ill. Comp. Forrest E. Baker of Worcester was re-elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. J. Gilman Waite of Boston re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of the "Committee on Correspondence."

MICHIGAN, 1904.

The Forty-seventh Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Michigan was held in the city of Detroit, January 16, A. D. 1905, A. Dep. 2905, the Deputy Grand Master, R. Ill. Comp. Bayard A. Church, in the Grand East.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, fifty-four.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, fifty-eight.

Number of "Advanced" current year, 509; affiliated, 8; reinstated, 9; number of dimitted, 25; died, 77; suspended, 45.

Net gain current year, three hundred and seventy-nine.

Total number of members, 5498.

The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form and the companions were led in devotional exercises addressed to the Throne of Grace by the Grand Chaplain. While all remained standing the following hymn was sung by all: "My Country, 'tis of thee,
Sweet land of liberty,
Of thee we sing:
Land where my fathers died!
Land of the Pilgrim's Pride!
From every mountain side
Let freedom ring.

"Our fathers' God, to thee,
Author of Liberty,
To thee we sing.
Long may our land be bright,
With Freedom's holy light,
Protect the "Cryptic Rite,"
Great God our King.'

The portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Dallas D. Alton, faces the title page of the "Proceedings."

In his Annual Address the Grand Master says:

"The year about to close has been one of steady and conservative growth and one in which the utmost harmony prevails in all matters relating to the Cryptic Rite in this Grand Jurisdiction."

And also justly says:

"The life of every Council rests with its officers. Companions, learn the work, and learn to do it well. Hold regular meetings and work at every one of them. If not favored with a candidate, select one of your number and work one of the degrees. This will create interest and interest will bring new work."

And ---

"Initiation in Masonry must be sought by the profane, but having been gained it is your duty to lead the younger brother to further light. Each and every one of you know some Companion who would gladly receive these blessings if you would but present the subject to him in a proper manner and it is your duty to him and to your Council to do so."

M. Ill. Comp. Charles M. Norton, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$2,587.42 in the Grand Treasury.

The Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Charles A. Conover, in his Annual Report states that returns and dues had been received from each Subordinate Council, and that:

"There is no question but that if we put our energy into the work that our membership could be doubled. There are over 10,000 Royal Arch Masons in this state and more making, who ought to have the benefit of these beautiful degrees to completely round the Masonic story they have been learning, and it is the manifest duty of each of us to interest them in the work."

As Michigan is already the third in numerical strength in its membership among the Grand Councils of the world — following Massachusetts, a close second to Ohio, which holds first place — the official spirit of interest and enthusiasm manifested will doubtless enable that Grand Council to maintain its acquired place.

A portrait of Past M. Ill. Grand Master Comp. John Clark and Past. M. Ill. Grand Master Seaman L. Dart are contained in the Proceedings.

In an interesting paper of sixty-eight pages the Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, R. M. Comp. Charles A. Conover, submits a courteous summary of the "Proceedings" of thirty Grand Bodies.

In his introductory Comp. Conover says:

"In spite of the extraordinary effort put forth by New York, we in Michigan have our 'claws' on third place yet, and if the ratio of gains continues we need have no unnecessary alarm, but we must push ahead and like the good soldier, never look behind but keep our eyes on the collar of the fellow ahead. At present that fellow is Ohio."

Under Kentucky he justly expresses his disapproval of any "free list" for the Cryptic degrees.

Nearly four pages of his report are accorded to a fraternal review of the Proceedings of the Grand Council of Ohio. Commendatory mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Jewett Palmer, the Annual Report of Grand Recorder Evans, the Report of the Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home, and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

In his review of Vermont he says of Grand Master Robinson:

"He thinks Vermont is the only Grand Council having so low a fee and recommends it be increased to \$10.00. Michigan still gets along with the small fee of five paltry dollars for three degrees and vet who says Masonry is expensive?"

Ten dollars is certainly a small enough fee, and it is to be hoped that it will soon be generally recognized as the minimum fee for the Grades. The low price at which these beautiful degrees

were held has doubtless been largely the cause of their not having been more popular with the Fraternity.

M. Ill. Comp. Bayard A. Church of St. Louis was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Charles A. Conover of Coldwater re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Committee on Correspondence.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Michigan will be held in the city of Saginaw, May 14, 1906.

R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery of St. Paul, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was in attendance.

All the Councils being represented the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form.

M. P. Comp. A. P. Swanstrom, General Grand Master, was called to the East and given the Grand Honors in recognition of his exalted official position.

The portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Thomas G. Lee, is a frontispiece to the pamphlet under review.

Grand Master Lee in his Annual Address states that "Council Masonry is slowly but steadily growing throughout the country."

Of the Rite he justly says:

"The Cryptic degrees form with those of the Blue Lodge and Chapter a trinity whose parts are so closely interwoven and interrelated that no man can rightfully be considered a well informed and fully equipped Mason without possessing all these degrees. I speak from experience, and I believe many other Companions present will corroborate me when I say that nowhere among all the beautiful and instructive degrees conferred in either the York or Scottish Rites are there any more beautiful degrees than those given in the Royal and Select Master's degrees, or more impressive lessons taught. This being the case, why should we need to try to increase our membership by making those degrees pre-requisite to the so-called 'higher degrees.' Rather let us endeavor to work them in so impressive, elaborate and perfect a manner that we will draw to us all those who love Masonry for its own sake; these will come to us with true and squarely cut blocks to fit into the arches of our crypt, and much more durable and permanent will be the results obtained from these faithful and skilled workmen than can possibly be gotten by the transitory assistance of a larger number of inefficient craftsmen who are hastening along to don the panoply of war, or are seeking ease under the palms in some oasis in the desert."

With all of which your Committee is heartily in accord.

The Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. G. W. Merrill, reported a balance of \$786.54 in the Grand Treasury.

- R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery, Grand Recorder, reported that returns had been received from each of the Subordinate Councils of that Grand Jurisdiction.
- M. P. Comp. A. P. Swanstrom, General Grand Master, addressed the Grand Council in the interest of Cryptic Masonry in general, and made a special appeal that earnest efforts be made during the next two years to increase the membership in this Grand Jurisdiction. Grand Master Lee seconded his request."
- R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery, Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, submits, in forty-two pages a concise review of the Proceedings of the Grand Councils under consideration. The Proceedings of Ohio for 1903 receive courteous notice. Commendatory reference is made to the Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence. In concluding his report Comp. Montgomery says:

"Cryptic Masonry is certainly growing in all sections of the

country, but it flourishes in some states far more than in others. It seems destined to not only hold its own, but to grow as rapidly, if not more so, than the other branches of Masonry."

M. Ill. Comp. Charles J. Bevan of Minneapolis was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Thomas Montgomery of St. Paul re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of Committee on Correspondence.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Minnesota will be held in St. Paul, October 8, 1905.

MISSISSIPPI, 1905.

Annual Proceedings, Pamphlet, pp. 45. Vicksburg, 1905.

The Fiftieth Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Mississippi was held in the city of Jackson, February 21, A. D. 1905, A. Dep. 2905, the Deputy Grand Master, R. Ill. Comp. John S. Cable, presiding.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, thirty-one.

Number of Chartered Councils making returns, twenty-nine. Number of Chartered Councils on the roll, forty-three.

Number of "Advanced" current year, 125; affiliated, 8; reinstated, 17; number of dimitted, 40; died, 23; expelled, 1; suspended, n. p. d., 32.

Net gain current year, fifty-four.

Total number of members, 1439.

Number of Past M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, two.

Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, eighteen.

Ill. Comp. S. M. Roane of West Point, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was not only not in attendance, but a black line in the Mississippi list of Grand Representatives, instead of his name, would indicate his demise although not stated in the Proceedings.

The Grand Council was opened in Due Form, with prayer by the Acting Grand Chaplain.

M. Ill. Comp. Phineas M. Savery, Grand Master, being prevented by illness from being in attendance the Grand Council by a

unanimous standing vote, before proceeding to business ordered the following telegram sent, viz:

"The Grand Council offers its most affectionate sympathy and condolence to its beloved Grand Master, upon whom it prays God's love may abound."

The Annual Address of the Grand Master was read by the Deputy. In it he says of the early history of that Grand Body that in 1855 twenty-nine Companions assembled in the city of Jackson and formed a Grand Council, and

"The Grand Council thus formed, held but one other assembly at which Amos R. Johnston was elected 'Grand Thrice Illustrious Grand Master and with it the record, or at least all that has been preserved of it, stops. The degrees had prior to this time been in the custody of the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem, which body immediately issued an address 'to the Royal and Select Masters and Royal Arch Masons of the State of Mississippi' proclaiming it a clandestine body and in rebellion against legally constituted authority over the Rite, a copy of which was included by Companion Speed, in the Reprint of our early proceedings.

"January 2, 1856, a convention of Royal and Select Masters was conveyed at Natchez, pursuant to 'the mandate of the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem,' over which Companion Benjamin Springer, presided and adopted a constitution which was submitted for ratification to the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem, which 'ordained and decreed' that on the final adoption of the constitution proposed by the convention, to 'convey to said Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters all the right, title and interest of said Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem, in and to said Royal and Select degrees and full and independent jurisdiction over the same in the State of Mississippi.'

"The Convention then adjourned and met in Vicksburg, January 18, 1856, and finally adopted the constitution and on January 19th organized this Grand Council, electing Benjamin Springer Most Puissant Grand Master, Giles Mumford Hillyer, Deputy Puissant Grand Master, and Charles Kopperl, Grand Thrice Illustrious. William P. Mellen, who was the Grand Chancellor of the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem, being chosen Grand Recorder. From a resolution of thanks to Companions Hillyer, Mellen and Springer, in healing 'dissentions and producing order out of confusion,' it is presumed that they prevailed upon the Jackson, or first, Grand Council, to give up its organization."

The foregoing is an interesting episode in Cryptic history in the United States.

R. Ill. Comp. Gus J. Bahin, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$818.61 in the Grand Treasury.

The General Grand Council ritual was adopted by the Grand Council.

The business of the Annual Assembly related to local affairs. No report on Foreign Correspondence.

As the Installing Officer, M. Ill. Comp. Frederic Speed, very appropriately "expressed the sentiments of love and sympathy which went out from the hearts of all the Companions toward the Grand Master of the Grand Council, Companion Phineas M. Savery, in this his hour of deepest affliction, when death had robbed him of the companion of his bosom for fifty years and he himself lav upon a bed of sickness and said, it seemed as if there had been no Grand Council in the absence of the central figure around which it revolved and towards whom they all looked with implicit confidence for guidance. He said that but for Companion Savery's endeavors the Royal and Select degrees would in all probability be still reposing 'within the bosoms of the Chapters,' and that it was owing to his faithfulness and zeal that we owe our present degree of prosperity. May our Father, which is in Heaven, throw around him the sheltering arms of His love and ever be a shield and defence against every stormy wind that blows to him-and long preserve him in strength and usefulness to the Craft he has served so long and well."

M. Ill. Comp. Phineas M. Savery, of Tupels, was reelected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. Frederic Speed, of Vicksburg, reelected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Mississippi will be held at Brookhaven—date to be hereafter stated.

The portrait of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Gibbon W. Carson, faces the title page of the Printed Proceedings.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master is an enthusiastic business paper reciting his official acts and recommendations. Under the head of Necrology he appropriately says of the late Eminent Comp. Rev. Dr. John C. Vincil:

"Our loss was irreparable in the death of Brother and Companion John D. Vincil; the benefits of his labor for Masonry, the broad scope of his charity for mankind, the influence of his Christian teaching on the community, the uprightness of his character, and the simple purity of his private life, entitles him to the high commendation of 'a man among men, a Mason true, a Christian ever.' His death occurred October 12th, 1904."

R. Ill. Comp. Noah M. Givan, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$1,854.15 in the Grand Treasury.

The Committee on Appeals and Grievances reported that there was "Nothing claiming their attention."

A Resolution was adopted providing for the purchase of Jewels for Past Grand Masters.

A portrait of the late M. Ill. Comp. William R. Renick is contained in the Proceedings.

M. Ill. Comp. William H. Mayo, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted a very interesting review in

thirty pages of the Proceedings under consideration and also the usual carefully prepared table of statistics, which your Committee, if space permit, will append to this report and due acknowledgements are herewith extended to our M. Ill. Companion therefor.

In his review of Illinois he quotes Comp. Warvelle's views of Cryptic Masonry in Texas says that:

"Masonry in general seems in good condition, and while the Cryptic degrees might not attain the same importance as other branches of Masonry, they would undoubtedly assume the same relative position with respect to the Chapter that they hold in other localities."

Ohio for 1904 receives courteous notice and commendatory mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Lane, the Ohio Masonic Home and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence. Of Cryptic prosperity in Ohio he says:

"Intelligent, educated, zealous officers and Grand Officers, who know and appreciate their duties and will perform them, can soon enthuse the membership in any organization and can build it up in membership and influence, and particularly so is this the case in Freemasonry."

And in his conclusion he says that -

"Ohio leads all the rest, both in membership and net gains, by several hundred in each. Michigan, with no very large metropolitan cities, and a comparatively small total population, is making wonderful strides, distancing many of her older and more populous sisters, being third in membership and fourth in net increase. New York is fourth in membership and sixth in net increase. Missouri, while having steadily increased for the past decade, is yet in a class with Kansas, Mississippi and Vermont, being a star of the sixteenth magnitude only."

Of his own work as correspondent he says:

"We now rest from our labors in this field of the moral vineyard, and in bidding au revoir to our many friends and co-workers, we must thank them from the depths of a grateful heart for the many, many kind things that they have said and written of us, our labors and our Jurisdiction."

With regrets at losing the valuable services of our M. Ill. Companion in this field of Masonic labor your Committee begs to extend him fraternal regards and best wishes.

Ohio, for 1903, was courteously reviewed by Grand Representative M. Ill. Comp. Charles J. Phelps.

The Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer, the Ohio Masonic Home and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence receive commendatory mention.

M. Ill. Comp. Gustave Anderson, of Omaha, was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Francis E. White, of the same city, reelected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Nebraska will be held at Omaha, December 12, 1905.

The Forty-third Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of New Hampshire was held in the City of Concord, May 16, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904, M. Ill. Comp. J. Brodie Smith, in the Grand East.

"The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form by the Grand Master, Most Illustrious Companion Samuel Glover Rudderow, assisted by his Associate Grand Officers. Divine blessing being invoked by the Grand Chaplain, M. I. Companion Daniel Demarest."

The Annual Address of the Grand Master is a concise business paper reporting his official acts. In it he justly says of his official visitations:

"My impressions found from inspections are that the absence

of quorum so often recorded on the Council records could be avoided if officers would impress upon the minds of the Companions the importance of holding stated assemblies.

M. Ill. Comp. G. B. Slack, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$135.17 in the Grand Treasury.

M. Ill. Comp. John B. Berkholf, Grand Recorder, reported that annual returns and dues had been "received from all the Councils."

The Committee on Appeals and Grievances, Warrants and Dispensations and Charity reported that no business had been submitted for their consideration.

M. Ill. Comp. Hiram E. Deats, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted a concise and interesting review of the Proceedings of the Grand Bodies under consideration. Ohio for 1903 and 1904 receives courteous notice. The Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer, the Annual Address of Grand Master Lane and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence are fraternally commended.

In his reviews of Illinois he quotes Comp. Warvelle's opinion concerning the form of the Cryptic Apron, viz:

"I note that in New Hampshire they still preserve the ancient form of a Select Master's apron—the triangle; also, the old symbolic colors: black and red. I sincerely trust the spirit of uniformity, or conformity, or deformity, or whatever else you may choose to call it, will never succeed in seducing the Companions of New Hampshire from the old way or cause them to abandon that time-honored apron in favor of the style now worn in our own and many other jurisdictions. I thought we made a poor move when we discarded the old form and colors, and I think so still."

In the opinion of your Committee the change was very unwise, and in Ohio, where it originated probably, was principally advocated in the interest of regalia manufacturers to avoid, as stated, "the necessity of carrying in stock such a variety in style and shape of aprons." The opinion of Companion Mordhurst of Indiana, in favor of the change, is also quoted in the same connection. The emblematic triangle or delta is inseparable from the symbolism of Cryptic Masonry and also of Capitular Masonry, and its form given to the Council Apron was doubtless not in any sense the invention of Mackey as suggested by Comp. Mordhurst, but originates in the M. M. degree. The change is but another instance in which commercialism was permitted to supersede Symbolism.

M. Ill. George W. Morrow of Jersey City, was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. John B. Bertholf of the same city reelected Grand Recorder.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Gardner whose portrait with that of Past Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. John N. Macomb precedes the title page of the Proceedings, is an interesting Masonic paper of twenty-one pages. Of their place of meeting he says:

"We are met upon historic ground, Saratoga is inseparably linked with a memorable epoch in the struggle for American independence, now surrounded by fields big with promise of immeasurable harvest, then a tractless wilderness.

In the second year of that conflict the British by one overwhelming blow contemplated the complete overthrow of the Colonists, the capture of the yeomen comprising the Continental forces, and their subjugation to the Crown. For that purpose it was planned to concentrate at Saratoga by way of Canada, an army sufficient to sweep all before it and with resistless force march down the Valley of the Hudson and end the war. The God of battles willed otherwise. The British column approaching from Bennington was intercepted by Stark, the column approaching from Oswego, met its doom at Oriskany under Herkimer, while the column

under Burgoyne was signally defeated by Gates. If there had been no Bennington, no Oriskany, no Saratoga, there would have been no Yorktown. The three patriots, Stark, Gates and Herkimer were members of our Fraternity."

In his Conclusion he says:

"During my term of office I have endeavored to work with one object constantly before me, that of increasing our membership, and making our position in this great State, equal in proportion to the other Grand Bodies of New York. In all branches of Freemasonry, in point of membership, the Empire State "leads the world," and although it is progressing and increasing yearly, the Cryptic Craft in this State has still to acknowledge the numerical superiority of several other jurisdictions, not of the same relative strength in the prerequisite Bodies."

M. Ill. Comp. George A. Newell, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$1199.25 in the Grand Treasury.

The supervision of the Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. George Van Vliet, is in evidence in the handsome appearance of the Annual Proceedings.

"M. Ill. Companion George A. Newell, as Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons of the State of New York, as well as General Grand Marshal of the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the United States, was welcomed by the M. Ill. Grand Master."

The Committee "on Warrants, Grievances and Appeals," "on Constitution and Laws" and "on Unfinished Business" reported that no matters of business had been submitted for their consideration.

Past Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. John W. Coburn Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence in an interesting paper of fifty pages courteously and carefully reviews the "Proceedings" under consideration. Ohio for 1903 is accorded four pages of fraternal mention and the Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence are commended.

Conservative in his views, the judicious criticism and brief comments of M. Ill. Comp. Coburn are not suggestive of discussion.

The Resurrection Morn seems to have dawned upon the Degrees of Cryptic Masonry in this country. From every direction we see signs of the "coming forth" from long years of lethargy and inaction, workmen ready to enter the vaults for new discoveries. Even Florida is showing signs of life, and will, ere long, we trust, be strong and vigorous. We send greetings to all our Companions, especially those who have thought well of our efforts, in keeping our Grand Council informed through their reports of the workings of the Rite in our Country, and may the prospects grow brighter as the years come and go, and may the harbinger of peace and good-will ever rest upon us."

"A Companion meets business reverses, and requires every penny to meet his obligations and sustain himself and those depending upon him in the necessities of life, and this brother must either publicly humiliate himself by an open confession of hard times, slack business or bad judgment, before his social and business associates in an open Masonic body, or feign an indifference toward the institution which he loves. The class of men of whom Free Masons are made should never be forced to suffer humiliation at the hands of the craft, either individually or collectively.",

The Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. S. Bullock, reported a balance of \$251.85 in the Grand Treasury.

R. Ill. Comp. Seth L. Pope, Grand Recorder, reported that one Dispensation had been issued for the establishment of a new Council.

A Charter was granted to one new Council.

No report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Octavius A. Dearing of Portland was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Seth L. Pope of the same city re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of Committee on Correspondence.

Portraits of Past Grand Masters M. Ill. Companions Charles Cary and Charles K. Francis are contained in the Brochure under review.

A Testimonial was voted to be procured and presented to the retiring Grand Master.

The Semi Centennial Address, contained in the Proceedings, of Past Grand Master Charles K. Francis is an interesting historical paper. In it he says:

"As Dr. Albert G. Mackey is credited with giving to the Chapter degrees the designation of 'Capitular Freemasonry,' so it appears that Dr. Rob. Morris, universally recognized as the poet of Freemasonry, and the author of that greatest of Masonic songs, "We meet upon the level and we part upon the square," is entitled to the distinction of giving to the Council degrees the title of 'Cryptic Freemasonry.' In an article in the American Freemason, published at Louisville, Ky., and of which Dr. Morris was the editor,

bearing date of December 1, 1855, (Vol. IV, No. 4, p. 31,) I find the following statement, viz: 'We have long cast about for a proper adjective to express the degrees of the Council (Royal and Select Master) as those of the lower and higher orders are expressed. Cryptic, of course, relates to crypt, and may be defined 'relating to a subterranean cave.' Then the Cryptic Order of Masonry must signify that which relates to subterranean Masonry, which is exactly appropriate to our subject. It was considered a happy expression of Dr. Mackey's to express the Chapter degrees by the word 'Capitular.' Give us then the credit of 'Cryptic.' We now have the circle complete—(1) Symbolic, (2) Capitular, (3) Cryptic, (4) Chivalric."

"The Premier Council of Pennsylvania, Washington Council No. 1, of Washington, Washington County, began its existence November 10, 1847, antedating our Grand Council a little more than seven years. The next Council organized in the State, Mt. Moriah Council No. 2, of Pittsburg, dates its establishment from June 5, 1848. Our Grand Council came into being December 30, 1854. It appears that an effort had been made at Pittsburg, a few years previous, to create a Grand Council but it failed of success. Our Grand Council constituted two Councils in New Jersey, one at New Brunswick in 1856, and the other at Trenton in 1860. In November, 1860, these two Councils united with a Council established by the Grand Council of New York, and organized the present Grand Council of New Jersey. Our Grand Council has under its jurisdiction at the present time twenty-four Councils with over three thousand members. The oldest Grand Council in the United States is that of Connecticut, established in the year 1819. There are at present in the United States thirty-five Grand Councils with six hundred and sixty Subordinate Councils, embracing about sixty thousand members."

Past Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. Frank W. Martenis, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, in a well written paper of forty-six pages concisely and carefully reviews the "Proceedings" of thirty-three Grand Bodies.

In his review of Massachusetts he says of meeting regularly and rehearsal of Ritual when there is no work:

"This is what we are getting the officers of our Subordinate Councils to do, and that we are getting there is shown by a net gain in membership for the past year of fifteen per cent."

The Proceedings of Ohio for 1904 receive courteous notice. The Annual Address of Grand Master Lane and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence are fraternally commended. In his conclusion Comp. Martenis says:

"In concluding this, our first report on Foreign Correspondence, we have tried to review each Grand Jurisdiction as presented to us through their printed proceedings, extracting what we think would be interesting to the reader, and we hope our efforts will be appreciated. As we grow older, of course, we expect to do better and ask our worthy Companions in this line to bear with us—Cryptic Masonry in Pennsylvania was never in better condition than at the present time, our gain last year of 449 increase in membership was only exceeded by one Grand Jurisdiction in the United States and that one is our good neighbor, Ohio. We expect to continue on in the good work and from present indications our increase the coming year will be fully as large as the past year."

M. Ill. Comp. George Albert Gorgas of Harrisburg was elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Comp. Frank W. Martenis of South Bethlehem re-elected Grand Recorder and appointed chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council will be held at New Castle, February 27, 1906.

Number of "Advanced" current year, 140; affiliated, 2; number of dimitted, 5; died, 21; dropped, 6.

Net gain current year, one hundred and ten.

Total number of members, 1723.

Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, thirteen.

Ill. Comp. Rev. Henry W. Rugg, D. D. of Providence, the

Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was in attendance.

"The Grand Council is opened in Ample Form with prayer at the Altar by the Ill. and Rev. Grand Chaplain."

The record of the transactions of the Grand Council of Rhode Island for the vears 1902 and 1903 are also contained in the Pamphlet under review. The Proceedings however, of those years are now only of local interest as matters of history in that Grand Council.

The Annual Address of the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. George C. Knight, whose portrait is in the Proceedings, is a very brief recital of his official acts and recommendations.

M. Ill. Comp. Frank S. Congdon, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$394.91 in the Grand Treasury.

Ill. Comp. Rev. Dr. Henry W. Rugg, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted a brief report of which he says:

"This paper does not assume to be a review of the printed transactions of sister Grand Councils. I have read a considerable number of such Proceedings, issued since the date of the last printing by the Grand Council of Rhode Island, 1901, and I have been interested in the reading of the pamphlets which have come into my hands. Were it not for existing conditions and limitations I should be glad to present a detailed review, following the method pursued in the larger jurisdictions.

"While I do not attempt to render this large service, I still hope to be able to present a just estimate of the condition of the Cryptic Rite, to note some of the manifestations of its organic life, and to call attention to some of the topics which are timely and interesting. My desire is that this paper should convey information and helpful suggestions to the Brethren to whom it is addressed.

"One thing more. I would like to have my associates of the Reportorial Guild believe that I am in hearty sympathy with them and their work. With several of these writers I have a personal acquaintance; I am in special touch with some of them by reason of our preparing Correspondence reports in other fields; to these and to all I proffer the word of fraternal greeting. I am glad, Brother Reviewers, to be counted of your number. I appreciate your kind references to myself and my home jurisdiction, although I may fail to make the acknowledgements which, under another form of report, would naturally find expression."

Again he thoughtfully says:

"Intrinsically the Cryptic Rite has much to commend it to the intelligence and moral sense of Brethren familiar with primary Masonic teaching. Its reference to historic personages are both interesting and suggestive; its forms and ceremonies take on many impressive features; while the ethics which pervade the whole system are of such a character as to entitle it to respect. It has legend and symbolism which appeal to the imagination and the conscience, and its history and traditions traverse the lines of Freemasonry at numerous points.

"The Cryptic Rite is a link in the Masonic chain. It is an essential part of a complete system. The Master Mason desires very properly to go forward to that increased light and knowledge which are revealed in the Chapter; and, as already intimated, the Royal Arch Mason may well take the Cryptic degrees in order that he may better comprehend Ancient Craft Masonry: so to analyze, harmonize, and use the entire system, to preserve the degrees—to teach the truths—there must be the organization. The Council is essential for the Rite. What can be better than to stand by the organization and plan for its growth and increased usefulness."

Portraits of Past Grand Masters M. Ill. Companions S. Penrose Williams and Charles Augustus Gillen are contained in the Pamphlet under Review. M. Ill. Comp. William H. Scott of Providence, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. William R. Greene of the same city re-elected Grand Recorder. Chairman of Committee on Foreign Correspondence, Ill. Comp. Rev. Dr. Henry W. Rugg of Providence.

The Forty-sixth Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of South Carolina was held in the City of Charleston, February 14, A. D. 1905, A. Dep. 2905, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. James R. Johnson in the Grand East.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, five.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, six.

Number of "Advanced" current year, 17; affiliated, 1; number of dimitted, 8; died, 1; suspended, 1.

Net gain current year, eight.

Total number of members, 206.

Number of Past M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, not reported.

Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, sixteen.

Ill. Comp. J. T. Barron of Columbia, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was in attendance.

"The Grand Council was opened in Due Form by M. Ill. Grand Master Jas. R. Johnson."

In his Annual Address the Grand Master reports in detail his official acts and recommendations. Of one of which in re Foreign Correspondence, he says:

"There is no one influence that I know of more conducive to awaken life and to promote good fellowship, than the fostering of the friendly and fraternal correspondence conducted year by year in the majority of our sister jurisdictions. As one reads the bright and sometimes sharp criticisms of the various correspondents, it opens before him a flood of information, otherwise not obtainable, and the general uplifting of the craft is the ultimate result. I am extremely sorry that our State has never joined in this work, and I firmly believe it will be most advantageous for this Grand Council to enter this field."

The Grand Treasurer, R. Ill. Comp. C. F. Jackson, reported a balance of \$53.70 in the Grand Treasury.

The Grand Council concurred in the report of the Committee in Approval of the recommendation of the Grand Master in relation to an Annual Report on Foreign Correspondence.

In accordance with the action of the Grand Master the Grand Recorder, R. Ill. Comp. Comp. Zimmerman Davis submitted a brief Report on Foreign Correspondence in which, in twenty-two pages, he courteously and thoughtfully reviews the Proceedings of twenty-five Grand Bodies. The Proceedings of Ohio for 1904 and the Annual Address of Grand Master Lane receive fraternal mention.

M. Ill. Comp. F. E. Harrison of Abberville was elected Grand

Master and R. Ill. Comp. Zimmerman Davis of Charleston reelected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of South Carolina will be held at Charleston, February 13, 1906.

The Fifty-fifth Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Tennessee was held in the City of Nashville, January 23, A. D. 1905, A. Dep. 2905, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Charles H. Goodlett presiding.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, fifteen. Number of Councils under Dispensation, one.

M. Ill. Comp. T. W. Crutcher of Nashville, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was not only not reported as in attendance but his name is not in the list of Tennessee Grand Representatives.

"There being present the Representatives of a constitutional number of Subordinate Councils, the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Tennessee was opened in Ample Form, after prayer by the Grand Chaplain."

The Annual Address of Grand Master Goodlett is a concise report of official duties discharged. In it he pays an appropriate tribute to the memory of Past Grand Master the late M. Ill. Comp. Angel S. Myers of that Grand Jurisdiction.

The Committee on Accounts reported a balance of \$314.47 in the Grand Treasury.

On recommendation of the Committee on Dispensations a Dispensation was granted for the establishment of one new Council.

Fifty dollars was voted to the Endowment Fund of the Tennessee Masonic Home.

The Committee on Appeals reported that no matter of grievance had been submitted for their consideration.

In accordance with the regulations of that Grand Council at an evening session the Council degrees were conferred in Grand Council upon nineteen candidates at the minimum fee of five dollars.

In the opinion of your Committee a fee less than ten dollars is an unwise cheapening of these necessary and beautiful degrees and naturally gives the impression to those who should apply for them that their merit corresponds to the price at which they are held. Past Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. M. F. Flenniken, Chairman of the Committee, submitted a brief report on Foreign Correspondence, concisely reviewing in ten pages the Proceedings of nineteen Grand Councils.

The Proceedings of Ohio for 1903 receive courteous notice and fraternal mention is made of the Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer and the report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. William A. Smith of Columbiana, whose portrait faces the title page of the Pamphlet under review, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. William A Clendening of Nashville, reelected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of Committee on Correspondence, M. Ill. Comp. M. F. Flenniken of Knoxville.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council will be held in Nashville, January 29, 1906.

The Fifty-first Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Vermont was held in the City of Burlington, June 14, A. D. 1904, A. Dep. 2904.

The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Charles L. Robinson in the Grand East.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, fifteen.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the roll, eighteen. Number of "Advanced" current year, 103; affiliated, 5; number of dimitted, etc., 11; died, 31.

Net gain current year, sixty-six.

Total number of members, 1334.

Number of Past M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, three. Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, twenty-one.

Ill. Comp. Frank A. Phillips of Randolph, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was in attendance.

"There being a constitutional number of Councils represented, the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form, at eight o'clock P. M., with prayer by Companion Rev. Charles F. Partridge, as Grand Chaplain."

The Annual Address of M. Ill. Comp. Robinson is an interesting report of official duties discharged. In it he makes appropriate mention of the demise of Past Grand Masters, the late M. Ill. Companions W. H. S. Whitcomb and Myron J. Horton of that Grand Jurisdiction. He deservedly commends the Annual Reports of R. Ill. Comp. Marsh O. Perkins, on Foreign Correspondence to that Grand Council.

The official visitations of the Grand Master and of the inspecting officers show that the Subordinate Councils have careful supervision.

R. Ill. Comp. Charles J. Heaton, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$879.19.

The Committee on Grievances reported that:

"Nothing has been presented for consideration and that peace and tranquility seem to prevail in Cryptic Masonry in Vermont."

The Report on Foreign Correspondence submitted by R. Ill. Comp. Marsh O. Perkins, is an able review in fifty-five pages of the Proceedings of thirty-three Grand Councils and of the General Grand Council. Of the prerogatives of a Grand Master in

Cryptic Masonry or of a Grand High Priest he justly says in his review of Georgia:

"A Grand Master of Masons may be, and probably is, possessed of the prerogative, because of ancient usage, but in no official constitutionally created, is it inherent, or by him possessed through any fancied inheritance. Chapters and Councils may possibly be offshoots in some sense from Lodges, but their grand bodies are constitutionally organized, and their officers are but legislative creations. Certain powers and recognized authority are theirs by constitutional enactment, but among them is not that of making Capitular and Cryptic Masons at sight."

Of Ohio for 1903 he says:

"In 1864 the 'Merger' succeeded in securing a vote of three-fourths of the subordinate councils for the dissolution of this Grand Council. Six subordinate bodies, however, refused to acquiesce, and M. I. William M. Cunningham, then Grand Master, held the vote although large to be insufficient to dissolve the Grand Body. Dark days for the Rite in the jurisdiction followed, but through them all the Grand Body was loyally sustained, and within a few years afterward an era opened of activity, continuous and constantly increasing, until 1903 finds Ohio displacing Massachusetts in the numerical leadership of the Rite. With a membership of 6,827, a net gain of 560 for the year, the Grand Council now has a greater number of Royal and Select Masters on the rolls than any other Grand Council in the world. While rejoicing over this, it is a pleasure to note that their leadership is assumed with a modesty most becoming to our companions of Ohio."

The Annual Address of Grand Master Palmer, the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence, and the Proceedings of the Grand Council are fraternally commended.

In his conclusion Ill. Comp. Perkins thoughtfully says:

"With rare exceptions the year has been one of substantial prosperity, the measure of which has been determined invariably, not so much by surroundings, as by continuous, persistent effort for the advancement of the Rite. This has been especially noticeable in a few jurisdictions. May their numbers be greatly increased and abundantly rewarded, may their success incite others in different parts of the various arches to a better realization of the duties devolved upon watchful, zealous workmen."

The Annual Address of Grand Master Weymouth is a concise report of official duties discharged.

Appropriate mention is made of the demise of Past Deputy Grand Master, the late R. Ill. Companion David H. Shaw, of that Grand Jurisdiction.

He reports that he had issued a Dispensation for the establishment of one new Council and that he had "issued an order changing the date of meeting" of a Subordinate Council at its request and also that he had "issued to Illustrious Companion J. E. Cates a dispensation authorizing him to communicate the Degrees of Royal, Select and Super Excellent Master to a sufficient number of Royal Arch Masons to give a constitutional number of Royal and Select Masters to open a Council at Vancouver."

Unless the constitution of the Grand Council of Washington

confers specifically "the power to act," as above reported upon the Grand Master, your committee fail to see wherein or how he becomes possessed of any such authority, the exercise of which is of such doubtful propriety.

M. Ill. Comp. Henry L. Kennan, Grand Treasurer, reported a balance of \$244.11 in the Grand Treasury.

On recommendation of the Committee on Councils U. D., the Council working U. D. was continued under Dispensation.

The Committee on Jurisprudence, Grievance and Examination of Visitors "reported that nothing had been presented to them for consideration."

A portrait of Grand Master Weymouth, Grand Recorder Hare, Past Grand Treasurer Demorest, and Honorary Past Grand Masters Upton and Darby are contained in the Pamphlet under review.

R. Ill. Comp. Edward R. Hare, Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, in seventeen pages concisely and courteously reviews the transactions of thirty-one Grand Bodies.

Fraternal mention is made of the Proceedings of the Grand Council of Ohio for 1903 and the Report of your Committee on Foreign Correspondence is courteously commended.

M. Ill. Comp. J. Edmund Cates of Tacoma, was elected Grand Master and R. Ill. Comp. Edward R. Hare of the same city, reelected Grand Recorder and appointed Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

The Forty-eighth Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Wisconsin was held in the City of Milwaukee, February 21, A. D. 1905, A. Dep. 2905. The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Jacob Dreher in the Grand East.

Number of Subordinate Councils represented in Grand Council, eleven.

Number of Working Chartered Councils on the Roll, nineteen. Number of Councils under Dispensation, one.

Nnumber of "Advanced" current year, 158; affiliated, etc., 2; number of dimitted, 6; died, 32; suspended, 26.

Net gain current year, ninety-six.

Total number of members, 1811.

Number of Past M. Ill. Grand Masters in attendance, two.

Number of other Grand Councils represented by the attendance of Grand Representatives, nineteen.

M. Ill. Comp. Fred Ring of La Crosse, the Grand Representative of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was not in attendance.

"The Grand Council was led in prayer by the Grand Chaplain."

M. Ill. Comp. Dreher, Grand Master, in his Annual Address pays an appropriate tribute to the memory of the Deputy Grand Master, the late R. Ill. Companion W. E. Beebe, whose portrait is in the printed Proceedings:

"Companion Beebe was a young man, being only 36 years of age at the time of his lamentable death by drowning in the Lemonweir River, on October 16, 1904, by the capsizing of his launch.

"He was elected County Judge of Juneau County when only 30 years of age and held the position to the day of his death."

A Dispensation was issued by the Grand Master for the establishment of one new Council and of the Rite in Wisconsin he says:

"The Cryptic Craft in this state is prospering and though our numbers are few comparatively, yet, with proper rendering of our beautiful ritual, and practicing the virtues inculcated, we may hopefully look for an increase in membership, to the future, which I trust and pray, has in store for Cryptic Masonry, and for all our companions, Plenty, Health, and Peace."

The Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Comp. David H. Wright, reported a balance of \$899.65 in the Grand Treasury.

M. Ill. Comp. W. W. Perry, Grand Recorder, submitted his usual complete reports of all matters pertaining to the Secretareate.

On recommendation of the Committee on Charters and Dispensations a charter was granted to the Council working under Dispensation.

No Report on Foreign Correspondence is contained in "Proceedings."

M. Ill. Companion Jacob Dreher of Milwaukee, was re-elected Grand Master and M. Ill. Companion Wm. W. Perry of the same city, re-elected Grand Recorder.

Chairman of "Committee on Correspondence," Ill. Companion William C. Swain of Milwaukee.

The next Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Wisconsin will be held at Milwaukee, February 20, 1906.

L'ENVOI.

In a retrospect of Cryptic Masonry in Ohio for the past fifty years of personal recollections, the writer is more than ever convinced that the degrees of Royal and Select Master are now upon a deservedly higher plane in the mind of intelligent Masons than if their possession had been made a pre-requisite for the Commandery Grades. Its select character is better than numbers in its membership, or an excess of dollars in its Treasury.

In this connection also regardless of reverses, opposition and adverse circumstances, from a membership of but five hundred and ten in 1855, it has increased to over eight thousand in 1905, a gain of sixteen times its number in fifty years, whilst the Templar membership in Ohio in 1855 was six hundred and five, yet with all of its accessories and incentives its membership is but twelve thousand and upwards, an increase only of twenty times its original number in the same half century.

As other duties may prevent the writer from occupying the Chairmanship of this Committee the ensuing year the occasion is opportune for a personal reminiscence that may possibly be of interest, at least, to Ohio Companions.

In 1855 the Chairman of your Committee, as the Th. Ill. Master of Bigelow Council No. 7 of Newark, attended the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio in its Twenty-fifth Annual Assembly held in Mansfield, Ohio.

One among the youngest members of the Grand Body, in looking over the names of those in attendance, he is saddened by the thought that he appears to be the only survivor of that coterie of Companions by whom he was so fraternally welcomed, many of whom were eminent in public as well as Masonic affairs.

At the meeting following his advancement in Cryptic Masonry the writer was elected to preside in Newark Council, now Bigelow No. 7, Royal and Select Masters of Newark, Ohio, and it goes without saying that his love for these important grades and a belief in their right to a place in Ancient Masonry has never waned.

In his attendance upon the Grand Council of Ohio, in which he is now the Senior Past Grand Master, he does not recall of but one instance of absence from its Annual Assemblies.

The Session of the Grand Council in 1855 covered four days, the legislation of all of the Masonic Grand Bodies in Ohio prior to the Civil War were of a very deliberative character requiring from three to four days for each annual meeting. The brotherly love and good fellowship prevailing in each are among the happiest memories in the half century of Masonic experience. Loving friendships involved only ended by "passing over the dark river."

It is to be earnestly hoped that all Grand Councils will join with one accord in upholding the dignity, worth and independence of the Rite and that no fee for the degrees less than ten dollars will in any instance be permitted or any inconsiderate innovations be tolerated. However much Companions, Councils or Grand Councils may differ in matters of polity or ritual loyalty to each other and loyalty to the Rite will assure Cryptic Masonry of the high standing to which it is entitled in the Masonic Institution.

My Illustrious Companions: I greet you. There is no need to welcome you here. This Grand Council, and all for which it stands is yours. If it be true that the Great Architect has drawn His plan on the Trestle Board of Time, it is equally true that your exertions constitute the instrument by which He has converted His divine plans into the human edifice. And so, at this time, there is no need that I should welcome you to your own. Whether it be the senior Past Grand Master or an officer of the youngest Council, coming today to sit for the first time in this fellowship, a welcome is alike unnecessary. Welcome finds expression in your hand-clasps; it vibrates in the tones of your voices; it glows in your faces, — the reflection of that ardent fire of love for the Cryptic Rite, which blazes upon the altars within the secret vaults of your hearts.

Necrology.

Before submitting the year's work for your examination let us turn backward the 365 pages of the year, to read, if we may, the farewells of those, who since last we met, have passed the tomb's low arches, and have been admitted to participate in the ineffable

mysterics of Heaven. One year ago ten Companions knelt at the Altar, pledging themselves to serve you faithfully. Today, one is missing. Right Illustrious Companion Henry True, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Council of Ohio, resigned the cares and duties of office, at the bidding of the Supreme Grand Master, Monday, April 30, 1906. Proper notice was given the craft, of which the following is a copy;

It is my painful duty to inform you that Right Illustrious Companion

HENRY TRUE

Grand Treasurer of the Most Illustrious Grand Grand Council, was raised to that lodge to which we are all advancing on Monday, April 30, A. D. 1906, A. Dep. 2906.

Henry True was of New England parentage. He was the only son and child of the late Dr. Henry A. True and was born in the City of Marion on January 26, 1848. He was educated in the schools of his native city and later at Harvard University, at which institution he spent two years. In 1871 he engaged in the retail drug business, in which he continued ten years. In 1881 he became the Cashier of the Marion County Bank, an institution founded by Messrs. Reed and Johnson. Under his wise and conservative guidance the institution broadened the field of its labors until it became one of the most reliable and vigorous financial institutions in Central Ohio. He later became its President and served in this capacity until the day of his death. Our Companion, while a quiet and retiring man was a man of wide interests, whose counsel and assistance were much sought after by his friends and neighbors and at the time of his demise he was Trustee and Treasurer of the Waddel Ladies Home: Treasurer of The Home Building, Savings and Loan Co.; Treasurer of The Norris and Christian Lime and Stone Co.; Treasurer of The Central Ohio Loan and Trust Co. and Trustee of the University of Wooster as well as Ruling Elder and Clerk of the Session of the First Presbyterian Church and an officer in numerous smaller enterprises.

One must have known this quiet, strong man in his home city, to understand all that he was to Marion and how truly and keenly they miss him from their midst. I can do no better than to quote the following paragraph from an editorial in The Marion Star concerning him:

"Knowledge of the real Henry True makes is difficult to estimate the measure of loss which his death brings to Marion. A great, big, clean, generous, moral and manly man is gone—a Christian gentleman and useful citizen, whose example is worthy of emulation and whose memory will linger in sweetest bloom so long as there is fidelity in friendship and inspiration in unsullied manhood."

The record of Companion True as a Mason is as follows: Raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in Marion Lodge No. 70, F. A. M., May 17, 1872; exalted to the most sublime degree of a Royal Arch Mason in Marion Chapter No. 62 R. A. M. April 8, 1873; passed the circle of perfection as a Select Master in Marion Council, No. 22, R. and S. M. January 9, 1874; constituted and created a Knight Templar in Marion Commandery, No. 36 K. T. May 9, 1878; received the Scottish Rite grades from the 4° to 32° in Ohio Sovereign Consistory at Cincinnati, Ohio, in April, 1887. He was elected Grand Treasurer of this grand body, September 13, A. D. 1902, A. Dep. 2902 at Linia, and filled the position until his death.

We shall miss him from our fellowship and our councils. But we shall not mourn as those without hope, for we know that though the strong arm of death has leveled him in the silence of the grave, yet the almighty arm of the Supreme Grand Master shall prevail to raise him to the fellowship of that Eternal Lodge, where the noon-tide of bliss shall eternally shine. Though the fog of human blindness causes those who are left to stumble and perhaps at times to question the Master's plans, the scales of doubt and darkness have fallen forever from his eyes and he sees the wise designs of the Supreme Architect displayed in all their beauty. Let us emulate his example and thank the Giver of all good that He was pleased to youchsafe us the comradeship of such a good man and Mason as Henry True.

In token of our respect for his memory I direct that this announcement shall be read in the various Councils in Ohio and suitable record made upon their minutes and that for a

and the assurance of our deep sympathy sent the bereaved family. I directed Right Illustrious Companion Dickerson to procure a suitable floral offering and inform the family that this Grand Council and its officers were at their service in any manner desired.

In accordance with the wish of the family, the Masonic services at the funeral were limited to the presentation of the Scottish Rite Ring to his son, Harry, a member of Marion Lodge, No. 70, F. and A. M. by Illustrious Companion David N. Kinsman of Columbus. Thursday, May 3, 1906, in company with Most Illustrious Past Grand Master Copeland, the Right Illustrious Deputy Grand Master, Right Illustrious Grand Principal Conductor of the Work, and Right Illustrious Grand Chaplain, I attended the funeral services at the First Presbyterian Church of Marion, of which the deceased had been long a devoted member and officer. Little as this was, it was all that I could do to express our grief. Words ever fail us at times like this. The human heart refuses to be drawn into expression. Our Companion was such a quiet, unassuming and even reserved man that the vacancy will grow with the passing days. Not only will he be missed in the family circle and here, but his business associates, the City of Marion and countless interests, with which he was allied will know better in the future the large measure of the modest man we called "Harry True".

This body is not alone in its bereavement. Other branches of Ohio Masonry have been bereft. In the death of Companion Brenton D. Babcock, of Cleveland Council, No. 36, on January 10, 1906, the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in Ohio lost its loved chief; the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons lost a Past Grand High Priest and the Grand Commandery of Knights Templars lost a Past Grand Commander. January 30, 1906, the news came from Jacksonville, Florida, that Companion John M. Stull of Warren Council, No. 58, was no more. The Ohio Masonic Home is most bereft in this, for not only had that great Masonic institution been the recipient of a whole-hearted love and care from Companion Stull but it had honored him. Almost since the inception of that institution he had been President of the Board of Trustees.

I keenly feel my own inability to frame a fitting tribute to these distinguished Companions. Their worth and their work are alike too well known, that words of mine could magnify them. Ohio, indeed, has lost these and 105 other Companions, but their work and their memories are ours and neither Time nor Death shall wrest these from our grasp. Notices and memorials from sister jurisdictions inform us of the death of Illustrious and beloved Companions, and remind us that "death is the common doom of man." All of these have been placed in the hands of the Committee on Obituary, and will be by it submitted with suitable memorials and printed in our annual proceedings.

Foreign Correspondence.

Some Masons thoughtlessly pass over the report of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, as being of little value. I have always deemed these a very valuable part of the various annual proceedings, written by able and distinguished Masons, who freely spend their time and energy in compiling the story of the year's progress in the Cryptic Rite for the edification and enlightenment of their Companions. I was sorry to receive from most Illustrious Companion Cunningham on October 25, 1905, his resignation as Chairman of this Committee. I knew not then of his proposed change from "foreign correspondence" to domestic bliss or I might not have acquesced so readily in his suggestion to accept his resignation and appoint Most Illustrious Companion Nelson Williams as his successor.

While we are entitled to the sympathy of our sister jurisdictions in losing so doughty a champion, we are to be congratulated that we have such an able successor.

Councils Instituted.

October 18, 1906, I issued my proxy to Most Illustrious Past Grand Master Nelson Williams for the constitution of Lafayette Council, No. 93, at Piqua. Later he advised me of the discharge of the duty intrusted to him.

October 30, 1905, I issued my proxy to Right Illustrious Grand Recorder Evans for the constitution of Ohio Council, No. 92 at Ironton, and soon thereafter received his report which showed that he had performed the work in his usual prompt and energetic manner.

October 30, 1905, I issued my proxy to Right Illustrious Deputy Grand Master Archer for the constitution of Mansfield Council, No. 94, at Mansfield. Due report was made by him of the discharge of the duty so imposed.

Each of these Councils commence their chartered existence under good prospects and will undoubtedly prove strong and valuable members of this Grand Council. All interpret the degrees accurately and intelligently and have the proper conception of the dignity and merit of the Cryptic Rite. This is especially true of the youngest of the three. Mansfield No. 94 is assuredly an infant of the greatest promise.

The quality of its work is perfection itself. The quantity of the work is vouched for by the report of the Grand Recorder. The net gain made by this splendid, aggressive Council is not only the largest made this year in Ohio, but has I believe, no equal in all our history.

Inspections.

Ohio's rank among the Grand Councils of the world has been attained by work. It can only continue to hold this rank as it continues to work. The whole secret of success is contained in that one word WORK. No single element that has entered into our work has brought, or in my opinion, can bring us such rich fruitage of reward as the annual inspection system. This system should never be discontinued, even for a single year. In prosperity. this system is the best insurance of continued prosperity we can obtain. In adversity the inspection system is the air line route to prosperity. I am not only a firm believer in annual inspections but I believe it is one of the greatest duties incumbent upon a Grand Master that he give the Councils of Ohio "inspections that inspect." The present standing resolution on this subject directs the Grand Master to divide the State into nine arches as soon as possible after his installation. This was the first duty I attempted to discharge as Grand Master. Owing to the ill health of Right Illustrious Companion True and sickness and death in the family of Illustrious Companion Olney, I was pleased at their request to relieve them from the duty of inspection and assigned their Arches to Most Illustrious Past Grand Master Lane and Thrice Illustrious Past Master C. C. Bliss of Delphos Council, No. 72. These Companions have rendered service this year that was both effective and willing. The old blank in use for inspections did not appeal to me. After the expenditure of time and money for inspections, it seemed that the situation imperatively demanded a blank that would give the Grand Master as full and comprehensive a report as it would be possible for him to obtain except by a personal visit. A new blank was therefore prepared and used, of which the following is a copy:

This early division is made that every possible good desired from the system of annual inspection by the Grand Council may be obtained.

The close and careful attention of every Thrice Illustrious Master, Officer and Companion of Subordinate Councils in Ohio is directed to the terms of this circular, which with the exception of the portion naming Inspectors and Officers of other Councils in Ohio, is ordered to be read in *full* in open Council at the next Stated Assembly succeeding its receipt.

The names of Officers of Subordinate Councils given in this circular are those serving, at present, in those capacities. The Recorder of every Council in Ohio will be furnished with three postal card blanks. At the approaching election the newly elected Recorder will fill out all three blanks, giving the names of the new Officers, and immediately upon leaving the Council Chamber after installation will mail the blanks, one to the Most Illustrious Grand Master, one to the Right Illustrious Grand Recorder and one to the Inspector of the Arch, in which your Council is located. Do not neglect to do this or fail to give on each blank the correct postal address of the new Thrice Illustrious Master and Recorder.

Subordinate Councils must not neglect the holding of the annual election as prescribed by their by-laws, as this practice is most reprehensible and leads to interminable confusion and delay in the year's work in both Grand and Subordinate Bodies. The proud distinction which we now enjoy, of being the largest grand jurisdiction of Royal and Select Masters in the world, can only be maintained as it has been won, by hard work. In line with this, it has been deemed wise to lay aside the inspection blank formerly used and substitute one more searching and rigid.

A copy of the new blank is furnished herewith, in order that each Council may know that which will be required and strive to make the very best possible showing, of which its Officers and Members are capable. Do not forget, in view of this, that the Inspectors are your friends and Companions who will hope and work as earnestly as you that your Council may make a good showing. While these Companions are your friends, in all that the word implies, they are also the personal representatives of the Most Illustrious Grand Master and clothed with all his authority and you should not fail in showing them all the honor, consideration and courtesy which you would show the Most Illustrious Grand Master could he have the pleasure of being your guest on the occasion of your inspection.

Your attention is especially directed to Article II, Section 9 of

the By-Laws of the Most Illustrious Grand Council and the enforcement of its provisions. Many Councils suspend Companions for non-payment of dues and mistakenly allow them to remain in this state without further consideration. This should not be permitted. With the utmost charity and consideration for those with whom the battle of life has gone heavily, these lists should be wiped out by securing collection or expelling obstinate delinquents. If your Council is negligent appoint a committee forthwith, with positive instructions, to collect where possible, advise remission where proper and just, and failing in these, to prefer charges. Do not compel the Inspector to report your Council as having any Companions on your books "suspended for non-payment of dues". This law is a wisely framed and planned enactment and if strictly enforced will entirely stop the most serious drainage upon our membership.

In conclusion allow me to urge upon your Councils to make every effort to secure a large percentage of members at the annual inspection. Make this especially true of those members who are not in the habit of attending Assemblies. Hold every Stated Assembly this coming year and have work if possible. If candidates are not obtainable, hold your Stated Assemblies. An Assembly could scarcely be spent to better advantage than for mutual counsel and planning for larger things. The signs are propitious that the Cryptic Rite in Ohio stands on the verge of the greatest growth and progress given any branch of Masonry in years.

If our work but match our faith in this coming year there will be none who dare place a limit upon the magnificent total which shall grace our roster one year hence. May every Companion in Ohio be so personally interested in this year's work, every Council so prompt, so energetic and so diligent and every Grand Officer so loyal and faithful to you, whom he serves and the Cryptic Rite which we love that every Grand Council shall be proud to acknowledge Ohio, the peer in quality, as it now is in numbers, of every other Grand Jurisdiction in the world.

More or less confusion has existed in Subordinate Councils in the past, as to the correct interpretation of the ritual. This has arisen from two sources. One source was the lack of careful study of the ritual on the part of inspectors and the other was begotten of this — inspectors being unwilling to direct Councils to render the work correctly and desist from giving erroneous renditions. It is to the credit of the Subordinate Councils of Ohio that every one has been eager for inspectors with the courage and authority to freely, frankly and fearlessly point out every error and the knowledge to teach the correct method.

Appreciating this I called the inspectors together at Cleveland, November 14 and 15, 1905, for the purpose of making a thorough study of the ritual and receiving such instructions as to their powers and duties as would fit them to meet this demand. November 14, 1905, the officers of Cleveland Council, No. 36, very kindly conferred the degrees of Royal and Select Master before us. This was done that we might have ample opportunity to make notes and dissect the degrees for a thorough study and was not given as a possible standard. All day on November 15, 1906, was spent in close, careful study of the ritual and the discussion of every mooted point until a uniform rendition of the degrees was agreed upon as correct to every detail. The Grand Recorder kept such record of the meeting as was proper to be written for future reference and guidance. Written instructions were given each inspector for his

guidance as to matters not coming under the general head of ritual. I proceeded upon the theory that the interpretation of the ritual was in the hands of the Grand Master and that the interpretation promulgated by him, through his proxies the Inspectors of Arches, should be required as correct until a different version was ordered by this Grand Council. This method insures uniformity in every Council in Ohio. I would suggest that it would be an excellent idea for the inspecting force to meet the Deputy Grand Master, each year, shortly before the Annual Assembly and at the place where it is to be held for a similar conference. Vouchers on the Grand Treasurer for the actual expense of each inspector were duly approved and I trust this action will in turn be approved by you as the inspections in Ohio this year demonstrate that it was money wisely expended.

Each of the sixty-seven Councils has been inspected this year. Most of the inspections have been held several months earlier than usual. Six inspections were held prior to January 1, 1906.

Inspections are for the double purpose of perfecting and encouraging the Subordinate Councils in the work and advising the Grand Master of their condition. If this be true, inspections should be held at the earliest practicable moment. There is little chance to correct errors in May or June when the officers making them have ground them in by constant repetition and will go out of office with little or no chance for correction.

The Grand Master is in even a worse plight with a lazy or discouraged Council on his hands with reports coming to him in June or July. No amount of activity on his part can reach back into the past. The mill will never grind with the water which has passed. There is one great obstacle to progress in this direction. Experience in the work and close contact with Councils as Grand Master, have only served to deepen and strengthen the conviction I had when I first came to this body as to its duty in the premises. I shall speak further of this matter under the head of "Recommendations".

I have prepared a tabulated statement of the reports made to me by the inspectors and submit the same herewith, as I believe it should have the publicity afforded by being included in our printed annual proceedings as follows:

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A study of this table discloses that seventeen out of sixty-seven Councils have held every Stated Assembly.

In other words nearly seventy-five per cent, have failed to hold Stated Assemblies as they fell due. This practice is most pernicious and should be corrected. The "pre-requisite" feature is something, as to the value of which, there may be much honest difference of opinion. This much is true, we have managed to exist very comfortably for Seventy-Six years without it and possibly could manage to exist for a number of years further, but the Councils of Ohio that do not hold their Stated Assemblies are losing their grip on existence with every one that is missed. No Council can be either successful or prosperous and neglect to hold its Stated Assemblies. The missing numbers on our list of Councils remind This truthful epitaph might be written on the us of "the dead". tombstone of each: "It failed to hold its Stated Assemblies". This also explains the very small attendance at Assemblies. Companions will not leave their families and their firesides for a trip in a winter storm to attend an Assembly, when they know that the chances are more than even that there will be neither Officers nor Assembly at the end of the trip. It is a mistaken idea that Candidates make Assemblies. Assemblies make Candidates. A study of this table will demonstrate that the Councils, rendering the best account of themselves during the past year, are not those who have been negligent in this regard.

Trustee Ohio Masonic Home.

December 6, 1905, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home informed me that the term of Illustrious Companion Jacob H. Bromwell, representing this Grand Council, as Trustee would expire December 31, 1905. Being assured of his acceptance I was pleased to appoint him to succeed himself for a term of three years ending December 31, 1908.

Past Grand Master's Jewel.

Under date of May 27, 1906, the special committee appointed to procure and present to Most Illustrious Past Grand Master Nelson Williams the usual jewel reported that it had performed that duty at the rendezvous of Ohio Consistory, A. A. S. R., at Cincinnati, May 24, 1906.

Dispensation for Councils.

March 8, 1906, an application was received from Companion Joseph T. Croxall and eight other Companions, all Select Masters holding dimits from Union Council, No. 2, residing in East Liverpool, Columbiana County, praying for a Dispensation empowering them to open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in the City of their residence to be known as Keramos Council. The dimits, necessary fee and consents of neighboring Councils accompanied the application. There was also filed a statement of the prospects for the welfare and growth of this Council and the earnest recommendation of the nearest Council, Union, No. 2, at Steubenville, that the prayer of the petitioners be granted. Accordingly the Dispensation was issued March 14, 1906, and empowered Companion Croxall and his associates to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said city of East Liverpool under the style of "Keramos Council, U. D.," with Companion Joseph T. Croxall, Thrice Illustrious Master; Companion Frank E. Groshaus, Deputy Illustrious Master, and Companion Will A. Rhodes, Principal Conductor of the Work. The same date I issued my proxy to Illustrious Companion B. Frank Murphy, Master of Union Council, No. 2, to organize the new Council, which duty he faithfully performed.

March 29, 1906, I received a petition signed by Illustrious Companion Lewis H. Whiteman and twelve other Companions, all Select Masters residing at Xenia, Greene County, praying a Dispensation empowering them to open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in Xenia. Illustrious Companion Whiteman was the last Master of the former Wright Council in that City.

• He, with four others, presented Grand Recorder's certificates. The remaining eight were members of Reese Council, No. 9, at Dayton, which recommended them as such. The fee and all necessary papers accompanying the application a Dispensation was issued March 29, 1906, empowering Illustrious Companion Whiteman as Thrice Illustrious Master, Companion Eber Reynolds, Deputy Illustrious Master; Companion George C. Barns, Principal Conductor of the Work, and their ten Companions to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in Said City of Xenia to be known as "Wright Council, U. D." Right Illustrious Grand Recorder Evans accepted my proxy to organize this Council, and all concerned assure me that his discharge of that duty proved the wisdom of the selection.

August 18, 1906, Companion Andrew J. Baggs of Barnesville, Belmont County, in person handed me the petition of himself and twenty-six other Select Masters, all members in good standing of Belmont Council, No. 54, asking for a Dispensation for a Council of Royal and Select Masters in that city. Accompanying the application was the recommendation and consents of all Councils whose territory would be affected, with a blue-print map showing changes in jurisdiction, a written transcript of the minutes of meetings held by the applicants for the purpose of procuring Dispensation and the fee. I had consulted with many Companions in regard to this matter and from their hearty approval had no hesitation in issuing a Dispensation for Companion Baggs and his twenty-six associates to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said city under the style of "Barnesville Council, U. D." I issued my proxy to Most Illustrious Companion Edwin Morrell to organize the Council with Companion Andrew J. Baggs as Thrice Illustrious Master; Companion Josiah W. Doudna, as Deputy Illustrious Master and Companion Parren U. Hawkins as Principal Conductor of the Work. This duty he reported to me was discharged August 23, 1906.

September 17, 1906, I received from Companion J. W. Byers and thirty-one other Companions, all of whom were Select Masters and residing in and about the City of Upper Sandusky, Wyandot County, an application for a Dispensation to form, open and hold

a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said city of Upper Sandusky to be known as "Upper Sandusky Council, U. D." The recommendation and consent of the Councils, viz., Marion, No. 22; Findlay, No. 50; Kenton, No. 65; Gwynn, No. 83; and Fostoria, No. 90, together with the fee and a list of some thirty or more Royal Arch Masons who pledged themselves to petition for the degrees if the application was granted, were filed with it. I hesitated to issue this Dispensation because of a number of reasons, among them the nearness of the time for the Annual Assembly of this body, but after some ten days of careful investigation I felt convinced that it was my duty in the premises to issue the Dispensation. I have urged upon Subordinate Councils during the entire year that there was no time nor place to work like "here and now" and accordingly on September 28, 1906, a Dispensation was issued to Companion Byers and his thirty-one associates empowering them to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said City of Upper Sandusky under the style of "Upper Sandusky Council, U. D.," with Companion J. W. Byers as Thrice Illustrious Master, Companion James W. McDermott as Deputy Illustrious Master, and Companion G. W. Simpson as Principal Conductor of the Work. And on the same day I went to Upper Sandusky and duly organized this new body and set it to work upon what I trust will be a long and prosperous career. The new Council is partially equipped with paraphernalia and has already ordered from reliable manufacturers a full and complete equipment of paraphernalia. Upper Sandusky is the County seat of Wvandot County and the new Council will have two Royal Arch Chapters from which to draw membership. In all of these cases the fees have been turned over to the Grand Recorder and the papers and memoranda are in my hands subject to your orders.

Waiver of Jurisdiction.

February 17, 1906, Most Illustrious Companion Martin T. Balsley, Grand Master of Missouri, requested a waiver of jurisdiction over Alexander P. Bunker, a Urichsville Royal Arch Mason, temporarily in St. Louis, who desired to receive the degrees in

Hiram Council, No. 1, of St. Louis. Gebal Council, No. 56, was the only power that could waive jurisdiction and I referred the request to it. It waived jurisdiction which I was pleased to approve and thus comply with the request of our sister jurisdiction.

Charter of Cincinnati Council, No. 1.

The charter ordered for Cincinnati Council, No. 1, was duly drawn and signed and confided to the keeping of Illustrious Companion Frank W. Hendley, Master, as directed by you one year ago.

Appontment of Grand Treasurer.

The vacancy caused by death in the office of Grand Treasurer was filled by the appointment of Illustrious Companion Robert V. Hampson, Past Master of Omega Council, No. 44, and his installation into office by the Grand Master at an emergent Assembly of that Council May 28, 1906. Official notice was given all Councils of the appointment as follows:

True. The newly appointed Grand Treasurer will hold office until his successor is elected and installed by the Grand Council.

Dispensations Granted.

This year I warned Councils that neglect of Annual Elections would not be tolerated and that Councils guilty of this practice would not be encouraged in the practice by the granting of Special Dispensations to hold their Annual Elections at a later date. I am happy to say that no Dispensations were asked or granted by reason of failure to elect or install on time. All requests for Dispensations to confer degrees at Assemblies held in the jurisdiction of the requesting Council but in some city other than that of its location were granted. In every such Dispensation the place of Assembly was limited to the Lodge room of the Blue Lodge, designating it by name and number, in the city to be visited. But one request for a Dispensation was refused. This was a request for permission to entertain and act upon petitions for the degrees at other than a Stated Assembly.

The list of dispensations granted follows:

February 6, 1906. To Gebal Council, No. 56, to hold a Special Assembly at New Philadelphia, March 24, 1906, to confer degrees.

February 16, 1906. To Delaware Council, No. 84, to elect and install a Conductor of Council to fill a vacancy at the next Stated Assembly.

February 27, 1906. To Guernsey Council, No. 74, to remove its property and effects to and hold its Stated Assemblies in the new Masonic Temple in Cambridge.

March 14, 1906. To Companion Joseph T. Croxall and eight others to form, open and hold Keramos Council, U. D.

March 29, 1906. To Illustrious Companion Lewis H. Whiteman and twelve others to form, open and hold Wright Council, U. D.

May 31, 1906. To Omega Council, No. 44, to hold a Special Assembly at Lisbon, June 8, 1906, to confer degrees.

June 21, 1906. To Elyria Council, No. 86, to remove its property and effects to and hold its Stated Assemblies in the new Masonic Temple in Elyria.

June 6, 1906. To Belmont Council, No. 54, to hold a Special Assembly at Barnesville, July 27, 1906, to confer degrees.

July 16, 1906. To Elyria Council, No. 86, to open and hold a Stated Assembly of said Council, in the absence of the three principal officers, Illustrious Companion Clark Laughrey acting as Master.

August 8, 1906. To Companion Andrew J. Baggs and twenty-six others to form, open and hold Barnesville Council, U. D.

September 28, 1906. To Companion J. W. Byers and thirty-one others to form, open and hold Upper Sandusky Council, U. D.

Decisions.

Question — Are members of a Council, whose names are signed to a petition for a Dispensation for a new Council, entitled to vote on a motion pending in such Council to grant its consent and recommendation to the establishment of such new Council?

Answer — Yes. The members signing such petition are members of the parent Council and retain all their rights and privileges as such until the Dispensation for the new Council is granted.

Question — May the officers of a Council be publicly installed, and if so, what is the proper procedure?

Answer — Yes. The Council must be opened in the Select Master's degree, work should then be suspended temporarily while

those not Select Masters are admitted and seated, and then labor is resumed at the sound of the gavel. At the close of the service the Companions are called up at sound of the gavel, further labor is suspended, to be resumed after those not Select Masters have retired. The Council upon resumption of labor must close in due form in the Select Master's degree.

Question — May a Council of Royal and Select Masters receive and entertain the petition for the degrees of a non-affiliated Royal Arch Mason, provided the petitioner is otherwise in good standing, and has resided for the twelve months preceding the date of such petition within the jurisdiction of the Council to which it is presented?

Answer - No.

Question — How may a Royal Arch Mason, who has received the degrees of Royal and Select Master in a Chapter in the jurisdiction of a Grand Chapter, exercising control over those degrees, become a member of a Council in Ohio?

Answer — He must first be formally Healed, after which he may petition for and be admitted to membership under the usual conditions imposed upon a dimitted Select Master, save that, instead of presenting the usual dimit with the petition and fee, he must present satisfactory evidence that he has received the Royal and Select Master's degrees and has been formally Healed.

Recommendations.

Heretofore allusion has been made to an obstacle seriously interfering with the commencement of work in both Grand and Subordinate Bodies. This is the present law requiring Subordinate elections held in December. Every reason seems to demand a change. The year in Grand and Subordinate Bodies should be identical, if possible. One now ends in July, the other in December. Councils frequently do little work in summer and active labor is not resumed until after the election and installation of officers. This halts progress until January or February and from three to four of the best working months of the year are lost. Elections

at the end of the fiscal year instead of in its opening months eliminate the delay while new officers are mastering the ritual. The Masters who represent Councils in this body should be the men beginning, not the men ending their term in office. In Ohio it is the general rule that merchants are free from business cares save in the December holiday season. The present system deprives us of the help of this large part of our membership by requiring elections at the only time in the year when they can not be present. Many other reasons urge a change. I would therefore recommend that Article II, Section 5 (page 15), of the Constitution of the Grand Council be amended to read substantially as follows:

"Section 5. The officers of the several Subordinate Councils shall be chosen annually, by ballot, without nomination, at the State Assembly, immediately preceding the Festival of St. John, the Baptist, and be installed before the first day of August, next thereafter."

This would place all Subordinate elections in June, make Grand and Subordinate years identical and greatly ease the work of the Grand Recorder by eliminating the present postal card election returns and ritual receipts. Annual returns would show the new and correct list of officers and the ritual receipt could be incorporated in the annual return.

Three years ago the Grand Master, then serving, recommended a new Code. This was referred to the Committee on Accounts which overlooked the reference. The present Code is old and for the large part obsolete. I would therefore recommend that this Body prepare and publish a Code embodying the Constitution, by-laws, decisions to date, resolutions, consecration service, installation service and monitorial work with a complete set of forms and such other matter as it deems proper, the whole properly indexed and issued to replace the outgrown pamphlet now in use.

I am opposed to ritual "tinkering". But at present we have a very small number of rituals on hand and many in use are much the worse for wear and will soon need to be exchanged. A new edition is required for the near future. When the new edition is issued there are a few minor details in which it should be improved over the present. Every Ohio Council changing from one degree to the other adds a formula for informing the Sentinel of the change. It is also the practice to illustrate the means of recognition after explaining it. Masters in the second section rightly direct the admission of Candidates for the Royal Master's degree although the ritual does not. The ritual nowhere specifically directs that monitorial readings be given, and the cypher in several instances is misunderstood because of its obscurity. Beside this there are too many rituals afloat in this jurisdiction, authorized, partly authorized and unauthorized. This has resulted in gross carelessness and many rituals belonging to this Body have been lost. I would therefore recommend that a new edition of the ritual be issued, with changes that will make it clear and standard and that this edition be consecutively numbered and but one given to each Council, the Master to be held rigidly responsible for its safe keeping.

I would recommend that when the new edition of the ritual is issued that all other editions be called in and destroyed and that this Body provide legislation making the dissemination, possession or use of anything purporting to be a copy of the work of these degrees save by lawful authority, a Masonic offense and subject the offender to expulsion.

I would recommend that we change our law to conform to our practice and that instead of the Grand Master distributing rituals that this work be done by the Grand Recorder upon the Grand Master's requisition, and that the Grand Recorder make and keep in his office a record of all rituals loaned, with name of recipient and date, together with signed receipts for the same. Masters should be required to obtain receipts from their successors for all rituals before installing them and in case the proposed change in the time of annual elections is made these receipts should be incorporated in the annual Council returns to the Grand Recorder and required to be signed as a part thereof.

This year vigorous attention has been given the question of suspensions for non-payment of dues. I have striven to force upon Councils an absolute compliance with Article II, Section 9, of the Constitution of the Grand Council. Most Councils labor under the impression that there is some better method of correct-

ing the heavy drain on the membership made by suspensions than in the observance of this law. There is nothing more pitiable than the way some Councils flounder along from year to year in the financial mire when obedience to this law would place them on a sound footing. I have heard much talk about the "cruelty" of driving Companions out because they could not afford to pay their dues.

This is sheer nonsense. If any Companion has been so unfortunate that the payment of the small sum required for dues would be burdensome, our Masonry is a shame and a mockery, if we even permit him to be suspended for non-payment when the dues may be so easily remitted. Our knowledge of our Companions and the Masonic principle of "Brotherly Relief" should be broad enough to cover all cases of this kind. The other fellow who can pay and will not, is entitled to no consideration, and the sooner such barnacles are scraped from the ship, the sooner will our rate of speed increase. There are a few Companions who can pay but do not because of the failure of Recorders to make an attempt to collect. The present law is weak in not being mandatory, as it is in other Ohio Masonic bodies, and in allowing Recorders, of the family of Ahishar, to punish absent Companions for the result of their own incompetency and neglect. I therefore recommend that Article II, Section 9, of the Constitution, be amended to read substantialy as follows:

"Subordinate Councils shall have authority to assess, upon their membership from time to time, such dues, not less than one dollar per annum, as they deem proper, and the by-laws of the Council shall designate the amount of dues so assessed and the time for payment thereof, which shall be considered sufficient notice to each member; and it is hereby made the imperative duty of the Thrice Illustrious Master to cause the Recorder to enter suspended, every member who is now, or hereafter may become in arrears for dues for six months after the time fixed for payment; and within ten days from the date of such entry, and forthwith in the case of Companions heretofore suspended for non-payment of dues, notice of such suspension, under seal of Council, giving amount of dues owed and a copy of this law shall be sent by the Recorder by registered mail to the last known address of such delinquent, and the registry receipt thereof shall be kept on file as evidence of the service of such notice. If the dues of such suspended member are

not paid within three months from the date of mailing such notice, or have not been remitted for good cause, then charges must be preferred against such member for contumacy and trial had. If the dues are unpaid the finding of a verdict of "not guilty" upon the charges, shall remit all dues of the delinquent to date and the Recorder must enter said dues remitted. If the delinquent is found guilty he shall thereby be expelled and the Recorder shall forthwith enter him expelled."

Given a law such as this and a Grand Master who will compel the enforcement thereof, suspensions for non-payment of dues will be practically eliminated as an annual source of loss in membership in Ohio.

A number of Councils have no fee for membership but have been advised to charge a sum equal to the amount of one year's dues.

I would recommend legislation, making the minimum fee for membership, the amount of annual dues in the Council petitioned.

I would recommend that such Companions as serve as Inspectors in any year, who are not otherwise entitled to mileage and per diem, be allowed the same for attendance upon the Annual Assembly at the close of the year in which they served.

I would recommend that this Grand Council appropriate annually the sum of \$120.00 to be paid quarterly in advance for the use of the Grand Master as a contingent fund, out of which he may defray actual expenses incurred by him in the discharge of the duties of his office.

Bound copies of the Annual Proceedings of the Grand Council should be sent each Subordinate Council for its use. This has not been done every year as the idea has gained ground that the three copies sent Subordinate Councils for their use were for the personal use of the three principal officers. I would recommend that at least one copy, so sent, be substantially bound and plainly marked "For the use of the Council. Not to be taken from the Council Chamber." Many Councils are desirous of having complete sets of the Annual Proceedings but are unable to do so because the proceedings for a number of years are out of print. The proceedings of the missing years are small and it might be proper for this Body to consider the advisability of reprinting.

I would recommend that at least \$500.00 be appropriated at this Assembly for the current expense fund, and at least \$1500.00 for the endowment fund of the Ohio Masonic Home.

San Francisco Disaster.

When the news came of San Francisco's disaster our hearts went out to our brethren of the Pacific Coast. No formal call was issued to the Councils of Ohio as arrangements by national, state and city authorities seemed ample. I thought if any call was issued to Masons it should come from the Most Worshipful Grand Master and therefore deferred to him. Many Ohio Councils contributed, Reese Council alone voting \$50.00, and the Companions individually gave as they could. I know that I voice your sentiments, when I say, that our California Companions have our genuine sympathy in the loss of the old San Francisco, and our earnest hope and prayer for the Greater San Francisco, which is to be.

Visitations.

During the year I have visited personally every Council I could and have everywhere been received with the honor and consideration due your Grand Master. Any attempt to particularize as to work, reception, banquet or enthusiasm would be sure to work injustice since all were equally excellent. Had time and business served I should have been glad to have visited others and undoubtedly would have found the same excellent conditions. The Councils visited were Cincinnati, No. 1; Columbus, No. 8; Cleveland, No. 36; Conneaut, No. 40; Warren, No. 58; Akron, No. 80; Gwynn, No. 83; Elyria, No. 86; Mansfield, No. 94; Keramos, U. D.; Wright, U. D. and Barnesville, U. D.

I take great pleasure in stating that each of the three Councils Under Dispensation is fully equipped for work, with all necessary paraphernalia, including good Arches, are well officered, render the ritual properly and give good evidence that they are entitled to receive Charters at this time.

General Grand Council.

During the entire year sickness in my family has interfered greatly with my absence from home for any length of time and this with business cares has operated to prevent visitations. In June, much to my regret, I was compelled to absent myself from the Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Council. After consultation with fellow officers I gave my proxy to the Grand Recorder, and am indebted to him for his acceptance of the same. Ohio was ably represented by Past Grand Masters Senter, Acklin, Lane, McLean, Lea, Palmer and Williams, Deputy Grand Master Archer, Grand Principal Conductor of the Work Dickerson and Grand Recorder Evans. Twenty-seven Grand Councils are now constituents of the General Grand Council, while eight, viz., Connecticut, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Rhode Island are without the fold. Michigan was represented by a committee of three, who were to investigate and report. Upon their report depends the question of Michigan becoming a constituent. It is probable that another year will see this neighbor of ours a constituent Grand Council. Most Puissant General Grand Master Andrew P. Swanstrom of St. Paul, Minnesota, presided and delivered an able report of his stewardship. Ohio, as usual, was much in evidence. The present membership of the rite is 45,746. This was a net gain for the past three-year period of 7,941, which was an increase over the net gain of the preceding three years of 3,031. This proves very conclusively that the Cryptic Rite is making wonderful progress.

It gives me the greatest pleasure to say to you that the tables disclose that Ohio, alone, was responsible for over twenty-five per cent. of that net gain of 7,941. More funds being needed the dues from Grand Councils were changed from fifty cents for each Chartered Council to two cents per capita on the membership in good standing. This will change Ohio's dues for next year from \$33.00 to \$183.34. A matter of local interest and pride was the election of our Past Grand Master Acklin to the office of Right Puissant General Grand Deputy Master. While we heartily congratulate him upon his advancement we cannot be blind to the fact that the General Grand Council is entitled to congratulations

upon its wise selection. If there is one thing the average Ohio man can do better than anything else it is filling an office. All indications point to the continuation of the present strong and healthy growth of the Cryptic Rite everywhere. I regret very much my inability to be present but expect my proxy will later make further report to you.

Invitations.

Beside invitations from Ohio Councils to visit them that I would gladly have accepted could I have done so, I was favored with similar invitations from neighboring Grand Councils. The Grand Council of Indiana extended a very cordial invitation to attend its Fiftieth Annual Assembly and Semi-Centennial at Indianapolis, October 17 and 18, 1905. I was also invited to attend the Fiftieth Anniversary of Chicago Council, No. 1, R. & S. M., on October 24, 1905, when sixty-two candidates received the degrees, and remain over the following day for the Fifty-Third Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Illinois. To Most Puissant Companion Gorgas, Grand Master, and Puissant Companion DuShane, Grand Sentinel, I am indebted for very urgent invitations extended on behalf of the Grand Council of Pennsylvania to attend its Sixtieth Annual Assembly at New Castle, Pennsylvania, February 27, 1906. Although I greatly appreciated the kindly fraternal spirit which prompted the invitations, and would have been glad to enjoy the pleasure of being present at all of these pleasant occasions, I felt that every second I could spare from my personal affairs ought to be used solely for the advancement of the Cryptic Rite in Ohio. I, therefore, sent my regrets and best wishes to these splendid neighbors of ours.

Super Excellent Degree.

In 1867 this Body recognized the existence of the Super Excellent Degree by permitting it to be conferred as an honorarium without charge. Later arrangements were made by which it was conferred by this Body at Annual Assemblies. A form of ritual was provided, but the degree is not a part of the Cryptic Rite, and is in no wise connected with the Crypt or any of its legends. Subordinate Councils, and even this Grand Body itself, have not adhered to the ritual. My predecessors have apparently refused to exercise anything more than the most general control over the degree. Subordinate Councils have been allowed a free hand, as I believe they ought, to work out the details. This evening this degree will be conferred by a corps of officers under the direction of Most Illustrious Past Grand Master Nelson Williams. During the ceremonies Cincinnati Council, No. 1, and Marion Council, No. 22, will each confer their respective "Babylonish" sections on a portion of the class. The work of these two Councils, each the best in its class, represent the two types of additions to the ritual in use in Ohio Councils. I trust you will find them worthy of your consideration. At present 33 out of 66 Councils confer this degree at least once a year or oftener, 2 communicate it to all candidates receiving the Cryptic degrees, 6 are arranging to confer it annually and 25 disregard it altogether. Each Council given a Dispensation is furnished with three copies of the Super Excellent ritual.

General Conditions.

Although Ohio does lead all other jurisdictions we should be sensible as Select Masters that our obligations are increased in proportion to our privileges. During the year I have striven faithfully to gain new workers in our Crypts and at the same time more firmly unite and cement the brotherhood. All mail that came to my desk has received a prompt and full answer. Every Council has been freely given all the help and assistance that lay in my power to bestow. I have found the question of "pre-requisition" a fruitful one. Almost all of our Councils have a little local system of their own which works admirably. I believe in the "pre-requisite" feature. Any Mason who is so blinded by the flash of swords and the tossing of plumes that he needs must rush through the Sublime Degrees of Ancient Craft Masonry with eyes that see not and ears that hear not the eternal verities upon which

the entire structure rests, is no more fit for the accolade of Christian Knighthood, than he was fit to be made an Entered Apprentice. There is force in the argument that such material will only add weakness if forced into the walls of the Crypt, but our institution, as at present governed, forces this material into Lodge and Chapter, and the strength of this argument goes to the need for fearless and unprejudiced use of the black ball in the election of Entered Apprentices. The question is one which the Templar authorities must settle and I doubt not that the time is rapidly approaching when the Grand Encampment will guard the interests of the Council as it now does those of Lodge and Chapter. Meanwhile Select Masters must never forget that the commanding position attained and held by the Cryptic Rite has been by internal rather than external means. Let us examine ourselves and by the elimination of weakness hasten the day when the Cryptic Rite will be in law as it is in fact a rightful part of the American or York Rite.

Some Councils still indulge in the idea that offices in a Council are "honors" to certain Companions because they are "good fellows", "old members", etc., etc. Offices in a Subordinate Council are opportunities to work and the only honor that is attached to any of them is that which arises from the faithful discharge of duty. The designation "Past Master" carries no honor for any one save what the wearer made for himself by hard work and conscientious endeavor in building up and strengthening the Council during his term of office. At annual elections we should ask but one question, "Who can and will render this Council the best year's work in this office?" The answer should go on our ballots in spite of personal leanings or prejudice and in spite of whether the answer names the youngest or the oldest man in the Council.

A habit among a very few Councils is that of saving all candidates for one or two gala Assemblies during the year. This is a decided mistake. The proper way is to hold Stated Assemblies and confer the degrees upon at least one candidate at every Stated Assembly if possible. It is infinitely better for the Council, the officers, and the candidates that you have one candidate at each of twelve Assemblies than twelve candidates at one Assembly. The

latter method is productive of poor work, faulty ritual, stumbling rendition of the degrees and a host of ills which Councils that faithfully and promptly advance candidates as elected, escape. Large classes of 20, 30 and even 40 are both desirable and commendable, but not at the expense of the remainder of the year.

A Council unable to properly handle one candidate has no business attempting to advance a class. When a candidate pays his money for the degrees and he and his fee are accepted by a Council, a moral as well as a legal duty demand that he be given value in the shape of degrees accurately and intelligently conferred. Councils should remember this and above all else strive to give honest value for the consideration passing to them from their candidates. Negligence of this simple rule of business honesty will do more than any other thing to bring the Cryptic Rite into disrepute and create in our newly-acquired material the idea that the Cryptic Rite is a "side issue" or a "hold-up".

Every Council should have a complete, alphabetical list of Royal Arch Masons in its jurisdiction eligible for the degrees with the address of each. With the many Masonic directories it should be an easy task to compile such a list for any Council. Having compiled it, the Council should keep it corrected to date and by systematic, energetic, judicious missionary efforts reduce it materially from year to year.

A number of Councils are keeping close watch on material in their jurisdiction with splendid results. Sandusky City Council, No. 26, has now no Royal Arch Masons in its jurisdiction who have not received the degrees, unless it be that there may have been two or three very recently exalted. Occonnoxee Council, No. 55, has a membership which is larger by three than that of the Chapter located in the same city, — Defiance.

These are splendid records and not only should but can be equaled by many other Ohio Councils.

The Cryptic Rite contains two of the most beautiful degrees in Masonry. Their teachings are sublime. Even were there no historical basis for the claim, their own intrinsic merit demonstrates the justice of their proud claim to complete the circle of perfection in Ancient Craft Masonry. How intimate is their connection with the sublime degree of a Master Mason! How they blend into the setting of the Holy Royal Arch! How beautifully is friendship's blue woven and threaded into the warp and woof of zealous scarlet to make the Royal Purple which clothes the friend and companion of kings! In all Masonry there is no place save here where we may meet Israel's matchless Master Builder face to face.

Here and here alone do we hear from his lips the simple but eloquent evidence which settles forever any question as to the right of the widow's son to rank as one of the ancient three. Is it possible that we who have been admitted to this royal fellowship shall prove insensible to our duty to bring others into the same clear light which it gives to illumine our Masonic system?

There are nearly twenty-four thousand Royal Arch Masons in Ohio, of whom, but a bare third have penetrated the Ninth Arch and learned the true significance of the ceremonies through which they have passed as Capitular Masons. It is true that Ohio has accomplished much. It is true that Ohio is the world's premier Grand Council. It is true that in numbers we are far in the lead of all our sister jurisdictions. But in view of the great work which yet remains to be accomplished have we any time to waste in idle flattery or vain self-gratulation? Ought we not rather to consider in view of the past that much more will be required of Ohio in the future by the world of Cryptic Masonry?

I have known the spirit of helpful, hopeful, confident earnestness which has taken deep hold on the Cryptic Rite in Ohio. My associations with you have taught me to love and respect the Select Masters of Ohio and I believe I much mistake your zeal and your enthusiasm if what is past be aught but an earnest of what the future holds.

Conclusion.

The time is nearly come when I shall return into your hands the authority with which you vested me one year ago and resume my place among the workers in the ranks. While I have made mistakes you have been ever kind and patient and this encourages the hope that you will accept the service rendered, as a discharge of the solemn vow assumed to serve you faithfully and to the best of my ability. The measure of your loyalty has never lessened. The zeal of your devotion has never abated. I trust it has taught your Grand Master the lesson of united service. The results vouchsafed us this year are the work of your hands, not his. Thanks are due to every one of my fellow-officers and inspectors for help that was given freely upon all occasions. Especially is this true of our able Grand Recorder. The strength and support which I have found him can not be expressed in mere words. May his shadow never grow less! I might name our Past Grand Masters and many others, but why particularize? Each and all of you in your several stations have given help, assistance and counsel, according to the full measure of your ability. Companions, from my heart I thank you all.

The Cryptic Rite flourishes today as never before. The days have been long and the labor hard but at last this beautiful rite is coming unto its own. For a time despised and rejected, the missing work is at last convincing the builders that this rite of such singular form and beauty, but by them deemed unfit for use is in very truth "the head stone of the corner." The rubbish of prejudice and ignorance is being swept away and every day discloses more surely not only that it bears upon its face the mark of the craft but that it is indeed the handiwork of the Matchless Ohio has been active in preparing the rite for Master Builder. its proper place in the Temple of American Free Masonry. Its speedy restitution to its rightful place and dignity depend now more upon the measure of zeal displayed here than elsewhere. The world of Cryptic Masonry is looking toward Ohio. And so realizing our duty and our responsibility let us enter upon the business of this our Seventy-Seventh Annual Assembly resolved that

"Death shall not challenge, nor delay,
No records of the Past — nor deeds —
Shall measure what the Present needs:
The men who now are only clay
But set the mark for Yesterday —
And they who set, Today, the guage
(If what shall be, must turn the page —
Not backward, toward a dead Past's tomb —
But forward, toward the light and bloom
Of better things."

As Trustee for this Body of the Ohio Masonic Home I beg to submit the formal printed report of the Trustees of August 1, 1906, and to ask that such portions of it as may be thought expedient shall be printed with the proceedings of this year.

I shall use no rhetorical or oratorical devices to stir up your enthusiasm for the great Charity which you are carrying on so successfully. The Home itself and its record of good work speaks more forcibly than any words, however eloquent, which I might use. I hope that the members of this Body who have not already visited it may take the first opportunity of doing so and seeing with their own eyes the good work that is being done for the aged and infirm, the widow and the orphan.

The Most Illustrious Grand Master has suggested in his address that a liberal appropriation be made from the funds of this Grand Council as a donation to the Home. As your representative I sincerely hope this will be done. We are trying to build up a large endowment or permanent fund which, being judiciously invested, shall add its increment from year to year until the income so obtained shall make the institution self-supporting.

We now have a larger number of inmates than ever before and the buildings, including the Hospital, are taxed to their utmost capacity. The management of Bro. Parsons as superintendent and of Mrs. Parsons as matron is giving satisfaction. Year by year the grounds are becoming more beautiful and the enterprise of caring for those who are dependent upon us is bearing richer and richer fruit.

Death has claimed two of our most zealous friends in the persons of our President, John M. Stull, and our Companion, John Blyth. It is not necessary that I should in this Body enter into any eulogy of the character and merits of these Companions. Their works live after them and suitable reference to their lives and deeds will no doubt be made in the records of this Grand Council.

IN MEMORIAM.

JOHN M. STULL, DIED JANUARY 30, 1906.

On the thirtieth day of January, 1906, in the city of Jackson-ville, Florida, whither he had journeyed in search of health, the finger of God touched John M. Stull, and he slept the sleep of death. Born in Liberty Township, Trumbull County, Ohio, on May 16, 1823, he spent a long, busy, useful and upright life of nearly eighty-three years in the same county in which he was born. His was a many-sided life, replete with acts of usefulness to his fellowmen. As an attorney of over fifty years' standing at the Trumbull County bar, he held a deservedly high position. His professional brethren have paid their tribute to his memory in words which record their appreciation and grateful remembrance of his ability and industry as a lawyer, and of his many virtues as an officer, legislator and public-spirited citizen.

Especially do they recall his readiness, as all times to enlist with all his ability, strength and means, in behalf of the poor and oppressed, so that no suitor whose cause had any appearance of merit was ever turned away or denied his most vigorous and able advocacy because of his poverty or want of other friends.

In the church of his choice, the First Methodist Church of Warren, he was known as one of the most earnest, efficient and faithful members. There was not an honor or office within the gift of the church that was not bestowed upon this worthy brother, and in turn graced by his consecration and ability.

John M. Stull became a Free and Accepted Mason when, in the strength of young and vigorous manhood, he was initiated in Old Erie Lodge No. 3, at Warren, in 1855. He received the Chapter degrees in 1866, in Mahoning Chapter No. Council degrees in Warren Council No. 58, in 1871. In 1867 he was constituted a Knight Templar in Oriental Commandery No. 12, K. T., of Cleveland, and in 1884 he dimitted to become a charter member of Warren Commandery No. 39, K. T., in which body he served as Prelate for several years. It was not until 1886 that he applied for and received the grades of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Receiving the first eighteen degrees in Cleveland, and the Consistorial grades in Ohio Consistory, in Cincinnati. In 1896 he received the thirty-third degree, and was created an honorary member of the Northern Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. It may well be noted that our brother progressed in his Masonic journey in the same deliberate, earnest, conscientious manner in which he did all things, studying and appreciating each branch of Masonry as he entered it, and journeying onward and upward only as he felt the need of more light. John M. Stull had many opportunities to do good during the nearly eighty-three years of his busy life, and firm and quick was his grasp upon them, always reaching out with impulse to a noble end. He could never confess himself baffled in life's race, but with hope and aspiration still pursued, through storm and night, his upward path until the light of God's sun struck full upon his face. He was richly endowed with all the attributes of a noble and honorable manhood. He was in all respects a most worthy and estimable

citizen, who lived up to all his obligations to his neighbor, his city, his state and his country. Honor, integrity and duty were to him living principles, and he faithfully applied them to the daily routine of his life. Of him it may be truthfully said that the world is better for his having lived in it. Such men, when they depart, leave behind them a bright example for their fellows. The death of John M. Stull will long be felt as a serious loss to the community in which he lived, but more particularly and keenly will this loss be felt by his associates on the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Masonic Home.

On the 28th of March, 1890, he was appointed a trustee of the Ohio Masonic Home, representing the Grand Lodge of Ohio on our Board, and since 1892 he has been the honored, zealous and faithful president of the Home and its Board of Trustees. In him we have always found a true sentiment and faithful devotion, a well-equipped and many-sided intellect, and a ready will and hand to serve and help. We gratefully remember the voice of cordial welcoming salutation so familiar to our ears, the handclasp that was never feeble or cold; the mind that had quick response and ample resources for our aid and counsel; the man who made our lives somewhat brighter and more companionable on the way. With the simplicity of childhood he loved his home, his family, and his friends. With the fidelity of the strong man he was loyal to private and public trusts. He was true to those elemental instincts of the human heart whence spring simplicity, justice, honor, good faith and humanity. A public-spirited citizen, a loving father and husband, a true man, he leaves us the priceless legacy of inspiring memories. We ask that this memorial be inscribed upon our records as an appreciation of the man and his character, and as an assurance of the sympathy felt for his family by each member of our Masonic Home family, and by each Mason of Ohio who was privileged to call John M. Stull his friend, and more especially by each member of our Board of Trustees, who knew him but to love him. We also ask that a copy of this memorial report be sent to the family of our lamented friend and brother.

DEATH OF BRO. JOHN BLYTH.

While attending the funeral of President Stull we were further saddened by being advised of the sudden death of that splendid type of manhood and firm friend of our Home, Bro. John Blyth, that generous, great-hearted, genial gentleman who never tired in good works and through whose persistent efforts our hospital was erected and furnished. We all feel that in his death the Home, the Order and community has lost an invaluable friend. We sincerely mourn his departure.

Cryptic Jurisprudence.

Companion Graff M. Acklin, Chairman of the Committee, made report of the Committee as follows:

To the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Officers and Companions of the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

Your Committee on Jurisprudence beg leave to report as follows:

We recommend the approval of the action of the Most Illustrious Grand Master in granting the several Dispensations to Subordinate Councils to meet and confer degrees in places other than their regular places of holding Asemblies.

We recommend the approval of all of the decisions of the Most Illustrious Grand Master.

We recommend that the consideration of the recommendation in reference to changing the time of holding elections in Subordinate Councils be laid over until the next Annual Assembly of this Grand Council. We recommend the approval of the recommendation of the Most Illustrious Grand Master in reference to suspensions for nonpayment of dues, and charging a minimum fee for membership of not less than the amount charged for annual dues, and therefore offer for adoption the following amendment to the Constitution:

Article 11, Section 9, of the Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

Subordinate Councils shall have authority to assess, upon their membership from time to time, such dues, not less than one dollar per annum, as they deem proper, and the by-laws of the Council shall designate the amount of dues so assessed and the time for payment thereof, which shall be considered sufficient notice to each member; and it is hereby made the imperative duty of the Thrice Illustrious Master to cause the Recorder to enter suspended, every member who is now, or hereafter may become in arrears for dues for six months after the time fixed for payment; and within ten days from the date of such entry, and forthwith in the case of Companions heretofore suspended for non-payment of dues, notice of such suspension, under seal of Council, giving amount of dues owed and a copy of this law shall be sent by the Recorder by registered mail to the last known address of such delinquent, and the registry receipt thereof shall be kept on file as evidence of the service of such notice. If the dues of such suspended member are not paid within three months from the date of mailing such notice. or have not been remitted for good cause, then charges must be preferred against such member for contumacy and trial had. If the dues are unpaid the finding of a verdict of "not guilty" upon the charges, shall remit all dues of the delinquent to date and the Recorder must enter said dues remitted. If the delinquent is found guilty he shall thereby be expelled and the Recorder shall forthwith enter him expelled.

IN MEMORIAM.

Report of the Committee on Obituaries.

To the Grand Council Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

"Man's life is but a working day,
Whose tasks are set aright;
A time to work, a time to play,
And then a quiet night.
And then, please God, a quiet night,
Where palms are green and robes are white,
A long drawn breath, a balm for sorrow,—
And all things lovely on the morrow."

It is now twelve months since the last Grand Council adjourned and its members went forth to a new year of toil, but during those short swiftly flying months no less than one hundred and eight of the Companions from our Jurisdiction of Royal and Select Masters, men good and true, who had wrought their hours in the Secret Vault, have passed through the Last Arch, the gateway of death to the Grand Council, where the Grand Master of the universe presides. Among them, some whose names have long been as household words among Masons, and whose memories will be cherished

as the years go rolling on because of their faithfulness and efficiency with which they wrought for the Craft.

How impressive the lesson. Imagine if you please the almost one thousand noble Companions of Ohio passing with steady step in procession before you; and yet from that procession every ninth man has fallen from the ranks. Well may we pause and pay loving tribute to their memories, and breathe an earnest prayer to our Heavenly Father that He will comfort the widow and fatherless, and give us wisdom and grace to number our days aright.

Beyond our jurisdiction, — and yet in heart and purpose we are one, bound together by ties which only death can sever, some whose fame is world-wide, — lights of the first magnitude in Masonry, have closed their Masonic labors with their lives crowned with honor, and may we not hope ere this heard the Grand Overseer of all of life's labors say, "Well done, good and faithful servant". Their virtues and excellencies I'm sure the Companions will seek to emulate, as we continue to labor to accomplish the work assigned us, ere the day of opportunity and privilege shall forever close. Time and space forbid us speaking at great length of the many who rightly deserve mention in this report.

Since last we met, and after years of efficient service to the Order, our own Right Illustrious Companion, Henry True, Grand Treasurer of this Most Illustrious Grand Council; has passed to the reward of the faithful. His presence and words of wisdom we shall greatly miss, but his memory we shall tenderly love and cherish. So manly, so clean, so generous, a citizen interested in all that was good, a Christian gentleman.

Perhaps the most conspicuous personage to be removed from our ranks this past year, was Most Excellent Companion Brenton D. Babcock, who died at his home in Cleveland, January 10, 1906, in the seventy-sixth year of his age. His name has long been a familiar one to the members of the Craft, not only in Ohio, but throughout the land. His interest in the Order was profound, dating from his admittance into Rising Sun Lodge, No. 234, in New York in 1856. He successively passed through the branches of Masonry, having in November, 1873, received the 33rd or last degree, and at the annual meeting of the Supreme Council in 1881

was created an active member, and since 1899 had been the Illustrious Deputy of that Body for Ohio. He was a deep student of Masonry, possessing an extensive Masonic library, which he presented to the Scottish Rite Bodies at Cleveland some years ago. His person and wisdom will be greatly missed in all Masonic gatherings, but his memory will ever be cherished.

Another loss, perhaps not one whit less severe than that which came to the Craft in the death of Comp. Babcock, was that which it sustained in the death of Companion John M. Stull, who passed to the great beyond January 30, 1906, from Florida, whither he had gone in search of health. His earnestness and zeal for Masonry had been a striking characteristic of his years of service to the Craft. beginning with his entrance into the Order in Old Erie Lodge, No. 3, at Warren, O., in 1853. In 1866 he received the Chapter degrees. and in 1871 the Council degrees. In 1867 the Knighthood was conferred upon him, and in 1886 he was advanced to the Scottish Rite degrees, and in 1896 was advanced to the 33rd degree and created an honorary member of the Northern Supreme Council. In 1890, representing the Grand Lodge of Ohio, he was appointed a trustee of the Ohio Masonic Home at Springfield, Ohio, and for fourteen years, beginning in 1892, served as the honored President of the Board of Trustees. Faithful, true and devoted to the last, he will be greatly missed by the Companions.

November 13, 1905, James W. Underhill, Past Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Ohio, at the ripe age of eighty-seven, passed within the veil, and in August last, Past Grand Master, J. Kelley O'Neil was gathered to his eternal rest.

ALABAMA Crytic Masonry has been sorely bereft in the death of Past Grand Master, Most Illustrious James Tait Beck. He was a man of many excellent qualities; an earnest and zealous Mason, manly, generous, sympathetic and tender and sincerely devoted to the highest interests of the Order.

ARKANSAS shares in our sympathy in the great loss that has come to them, in the death of Samuel Delano Dodge, Most Illustrious Past Grand Master, who passed away in January last. In his death the state lost a zealous and devoted Companion. From

his entrance into Masonry in 1866, he advanced steadily in all Bodies, receiving the Consistory degrees in 1901. He is said to have been one of the gentlest of men.

In March, Past Most Illustrious Grand Master of Arkansas, Companion Omer J. Short, at the early age of forty, passed to his reward. His interest in the work had been particularly marked, and his loss correspondingly great.

Most Illustrious Past Grand Master, John Humphreys of the Grand Council of Colorado, died April 25, 1906. Companion Humphreys was an Ohioan by birth, having been born near Cincinnati in 1856. His Masonic record, though brief comparatively, was an active one, being always in demand both in Subordinate and Grand Bodies. He took an active part in the formation of the Grand Council of Colorado, receiving at the time of its formation the appointment of Illustrious Grand Captain of the Guard, and was successively raised until in 1898, when he was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master. He was Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, near this Grand Council, having been first appointed thereto in 1898, and occupied this honorable position at the time of his decease.

Massachusetts has been sorely bereft in the closing year of three of her Past Grand officers. Rev. Thomas Elliott St. John, A. M., Most Illustrious Grand Master 1873-5, at the age of seventy-five, died February 25, 1906. Charles M. Avery, Grand Principal Conductor of the Work 1874-5, died January 22nd, having passed his more than three score and ten. David L. Hodges, Grand Principal Conductor of the Work 1898, closed his earthly journey, April 14, 1906, in his sixty-fifth year, and Charles A. Skinner, D. D., Grand Chaplain 1891-1906, at the ripe age of eighty-two, passed from labor to reward April 22, 1906.

MICHIGAN, our adjoining jurisdiction to the north, has been peculiarly afflicted during the past year in the loss of her eminent Companions. On November 10, 1905, Most Illustrious Grand Master Andrew Jackson Utley closed an active Masonic career, having been initiated into the Masonic mysteries in 1862, in Worthington, Ohio. He became a Royal and Select Master in 1870, and served as Most Illustrious Grand Master in 1878.

February 19, 1906, at the age of seventy-seven, D. Burnham Tracy, who had served as Most Illustrious Grand Master in 1862, passed to the Grand Lodge on high. For several years he served as an itinerant Methodist preacher. Later, he gave up the itineracy, but was appointed a supply preacher for Grace Methodist Church, Detroit, serving the church twenty-seven years in all in such capacity, and forty years he filled the position of agent for the C. H. & D. Ry. in Detroit. He organized River Raison Council, No. 4, at Monroe, Mich., also Mosaic Council, No. 22, at Petersberg. He helped to organize the Scottish Rite Body in Michigan, and for eighteen years was Commander-in-Chief of Michigan Sovereign Consistory.

On April 24, 1906, at the advanced age of eighty-five, Rev. Francis Asbury Blades, Grand Chaplain of the Grand Council of Michigan 1880-1906, twenty-six years, was gathered to his reward. A native of Maryland, but an early settler of Michigan, and for years served most effectively as a Methodist preacher in some of the leading charges of the state. The life of Companion Blades is closely interwoven with the history of Michigan, having been a close friend and associate of its chief executives and prominent men. He became a Mason in 1850. A Royal and Select Master in 1859, and a Scottish Rite Mason in 1862. For twenty-eight years he was Grand Chaplain of the Grand Chapter of the state, and as Grand Chaplain of the Grand Council he served for twenty-six years, and as Grand Prelate of the Grand Commandery of the state, he served twenty-six years, thereby becoming greatly endeared to all Masons in the state, so that his loss is felt quite universally.

MISSOURI CRYPTIC MASONRY has suffered a great loss during the year, in the death of her noble Companion, Most Illustrious Past Grand Master, Joseph H. Browne, who efficiently served in that capacity during 1873, and who for nearly half a century was an earnest and zealous Select Master. He died Feb. 12, 1906.

Also, Allan McDowell, Past Grand Master for 1872, entered the Secret Vault at the age of seventy-three.

New Jersey Companions have been saddened by the death of John A. Parker, Most Illustrious Past Grand Master for 1893, which occurred Jan. 8, 1906, aged fifty-eight. He was an ideal

Mason; an ornament to the Craft. His friendship was helpful and constant. His morality was a religious force giving direction to his daily duty, making him a positive factor for the right in the world. At the time of his death, he was Grand Chancellor of New Jersey Consistory.

To the memory of the noble dead, monuments of marble may be erected, but one grander and more enduring that architect or scupltor or money can devise or hands erect, is the universal tribute of the moral honesty and uprightness and integrity of their lives.

"If so men's memories not thy monuments be,
Thou shalt have none. Warm hearts and not cold stones,
Must mark thy grave, or thou shalt lie unknown.
Marbles keep not themselves: how, then, keep thee?"



FOREIGN CORRESPONDENCE

To the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio.

Your Committee on Foreign Correspondence, after much effort, has brought forth the following report which is submitted for what it is worth, but which we feel is not worth very much. After our first year's journey over the field of Correspondence we are of the opinion that constant travel along these lines, even though it be over beaten paths, is of great advantage to the reviewer. However, there must be a beginning somewhere, and while this may be both beginning and end of our reportorial labors, yet, we feel that the experience has been of much benefit to us. We are sure that it has been quite a pleasant experience.

ALABAMA, 1905.

The Sixty-eighth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Alabama was held in the Masonic Temple in the city of Montgomery on December 4th, 1905, Companion Jacob D. Bloch, Most Illustrious Grand Master presiding. There are seven chartered Councils in this Grand Jurisdiction and one Council working under dispensation, all of which were represented at this Grand Assembly. The report made as to the progress of the work during the preceding year shows a net gain of 16 and a total membership of 373. The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hands of \$338.38.

The Grand Master of that Grand Jurisdiction reports that the general condition of the Grand Council continues to improve, and regrets that he had not accomplished all that he had expected to during the year. He says

"It should be a pride to every Cryptic Mason in Alabama to see the renewed interest manifested, for indeed these beautiful and sublime degrees should not and must not be neglected, for the inquiring mind must realize and know that Cryptic Masonry is the key that unlocks the door to the hidden mysteries and sciences of our rite."

He granted seven Dispensations to receive petitions and ballot out of statutory time. He says they were all granted for "good cause shown" but fails in each instance to state what that good cause was. He issued a Dispensation to "re-organize" one Council. We do not quite understand what is meant by reorganizing a Council under Dispensation. If the Charter has been arrested surrendered the council is dead and cannot be re-organized. If the Council is in fact dead and its Charter has not been arrested or surrender, it cannot be brought to life by a Dispensation. We presume that what they in fact do in Alabama is to issue a Dispensation for a new Council, giving it the name and number of some former Council at the same place.

The Grand Master repeats his former recommendation that a Committee on Foreign Correspondence be appointed, but we notice that the Grand Council did not concur in his recommendation, giving as a reason that it would incur too great an expense on the Grand Council. The Grand Council showed its good judgment

and fraternal spirit by the adoption of a resolution rescinding its former resolution adopted in 1888, severing its connection with the General Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the United States of America, and resuming its former connection with the General Grand Council.

M. Ill. Companion Jacob D. Bloch the representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was in attendance.

There is of course no Foreign Correspondence report, and there is not likely to be for sometime unless somebody replenishes the exchequer.

Ben M. Jacobs of Birmingham was elected M. Ill. Grand Master and George A. Beauchamp of Montgomery was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the city of Montgomery on Monday before the first Tuesday in December, 1906.

ARKANSAS, 1905.

The forty-third Annual Assembly of the M. Ill. Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Arkansas was held in the Masonic Temple in the city of Little Rock on November 24th, 1905. The Grand Master, M. Ill. Comp. Nick Kizer presided and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Captain of the Guard, were in their respective stations. 7 Subordinate Councils out of 14 in the State, were represented, and the report of the Grand Recorder is based upon the returns from these seven Councils which he says show a net gain of 22 and a total membership in the State of 309. 5 Past Grand Masters were in attendance but Ill. Comp. Edgar E. Bryant of Ft. Smith, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was not present so far as shown by the proceedings. The Committee on Grand Recorder's and Treasurer's books reported a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$230.50.

The Grand Master in his address reports that the duties of his office have been light and that therefore his report is brief. He recommended the appointment of a Committee on Foreign Correspondence, but the Committee on Jurisprudence reported that the financial condition of the Grand Council was such that The address of the M. ILLINOIS, 1905.

The fifty-third Annual Assembly of this Grand Council was held in the city of Chicago on October 25th, 1905 with all of the Grand Officers present. Thirty-eight out of the forty-five working Councils in the state were represented and the Grand

The address of the Grand Master is a statement in detail of his official acts during the year. He constituted Tyrian Council No. 11 at Idaho Springs and expresses the belief that it will be an honor to Cryptic Masonry in Colorado. He issued a circular letter to Subordinate Councils which has the true ring in it, and in which he urges renewed energy and zeal upon the part of the Companions in an effort to place the beautiful work of the degrees amongst the foremost in Masonic Ritualism. He recommends the appointment of a Grand Lecturer and that jewels and aprons for the Grand Officers be procured. In conclusion he makes the mistake, as we believe, of urging that the Cryptic Degrees should be made compulsory for advancement.

The proceedings are in the shape of a nicely bound pamphlet of 48 pages showing careful attention to detail on the part of the Grand Recorder.

There is no report on Foreign Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. George A. Reese of Trinidad was elected Grand Master and Rt. Ill. Comp. Ernest Le Neve Foster of Denver was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held under the provisions of the constitution on Wednesday evening September 19th, 1906, in the City of Denver.

GEORGIA, 1906.

The Sixty-third Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Georgia was held in the city of Macon on April 24th, 1906 with M. Ill. Grand Master L. W. Burkett presiding, and 8 other grand officers present. The Grand Council was opened in ample form. 22 out of the 31 Chartered Councils in the state were represented. Three Past Grand Masters and representatives from 24 other Grand Jurisdictions were in attendance. Our genial friend M. Ill. Comp. Robert L. Colding of Savannah, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was present. We wonder if "Bob" ever misses anything.

The report of the Committee of Finance shows a balance in the Treasury of \$431.90.

ILLINOIS, 1905.

The fifty-third Annual Assembly of this Grand Council was held in the city of Chicago on October 25th, 1905 with all of the Grand Officers present. Thirty-eight out of the forty-five working Councils in the state were represented and the Grand

Council was opened in ample form with M. Ill. Companion C. W. Hollandsworth presiding. Representatives from twenty-three other Grand Jurisdictions were in attendance among whom was George W. Curtiss of Peoria the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council. To show that their interest in Cryptic Masonry had not abated, fifteen Past Grand Masters were in attendance. The net gain in membership during the past year was 364 and the total membership 4335. The treasurer reported a balance in his hands of \$1845.20 of which \$531.18 was immediately appropriated for the payment of various salaries and expenses. A fine portrait of the newly elected Grand Master faces the title page of the proceedings which, with the report of the committee on Foreign Correspondence make up a pamphlet of 126 pages.

The Grand Master reports the division of the state into nine arches which is the plan we have adopted in Ohio, but they go farther and require reports from the Companions in charge of the arches to be made quarterly to the Grand Master and Grand Lecturer.

He appointed Illustrious Companion Chester S. Gurney to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Companion Archibald McLellan, Grand Steward. He reports that during the year he was called upon to make no decisions and thinks that therefore the Companions are dwelling together in peace and unity. On the condition of the Rite he says:

"Reports received from the Grand Lecturer and Companions in charge of the Arches, show that we have made a substantial increase in membership during the past year. The strong and active Councils have grown in strength, some of them showing large gains, and although the accessions throughout the state have not been as large as hoped for, the year has been a profitable and successful one and the prospects for the future are bright, nearly all the active Councils reporting plenty of work in sight and much enthusiasm manifested."

A Past Grand Master's Jewel was presented by Ill. Companion George W. Warvelle, Past Grand Master, to the retiring Grand Master.

The newly elected Grand Master before closing the Grand

The Grand Treasurer's Report shows a balance in his hands of \$2399.19 on October 14th, 1905.

The address of the Grand Master is a plain, common sense statement of his official acts during the year. He says in an opening paragraph:

"This is a year of abundance in everything essential to man, and our beloved State has enjoyed the common prosperity. The beautiful Rite has grown much stronger in all her lines. The secrets of the Crypt have been unfolded to a greater number of sterling Masons than in the course of any year since we were organized in 1855."

He reported the constitution, either by himself or proxy, of the Councils receiving Charters at the last Annual Assembly, and the issuing of Dispensations for four new Councils. He refused a Dispensation to a Subordinate Council to remove from its old hall to a new Temple in the same city, holding that the permission of the Grand Master is not necessary in such a case where the jurisdictional lines are not interfered with.

He granted Dispensations to two Councils to receive petitions at special Assemblies, and gives as his reason that they were clearly cases of emergency. We submit, however, that the facts he furnishes hardly make them "cases of emergency." He required that all the members be notified of the meetings, and the purpose for which they were called, and this helps the matter somewhat. If we understand him correctly they have a law in Indiana which requires "a heavy quorum of actual members to transact any business." If this were the law in Ohio, there would be but few meetings where business could be transacted, for it would be difficult for our large Councils, numbering into the hundreds, to secure the attendance of even a bare quorum, let alone a heavy quorum, of actual members. The Grand Master strongly recommended a reduction of the dues, or per capita, which the Grand Council exacts from her constituent Councils, but his recommendation was not concurred in by the Grand Council.

He mildly rebukes the lazy Master who fails to answer letters promptly, as follows:

"There are quite a few of you Masters who are using a brand of

In his conclusion he says:-

"That which most attracts attention is the rapid gait at which Ohio seems to be traveling. As stated in last year's report it now stands at the head of the line, and if it shall continue to maintain its present pace it will always stay there."

What will he say about our pace when he reads our last report showing a gain of 900 last year?

Comp. Raymond L. Leonard of Chicago was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and Ill. Comp. Gil W. Barnard of Chicago was reelected Grand Recorder.

Companion Geo. W. Warvelle is continued as the Committee on Correspondence.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Chicago on October 24th, 1906.

INDIANA, 1905.

This Grand Council convened in its fiftieth Annual Assembly in the city of Indianapolis on October 17th, 1905, the M. Ill. Grand Master Robert B. Whitsett, presiding, and all the other Grand Officers in their stations. Representatives from 54 of the 58 Chartered Councils being present, the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form, after prayer by the Grand Chaplain. Much interest attached to this meeting from the fact that it was the semi-centennial of the organization of this Grand Council, and it had been arranged to properly observe the event. The printed proceedings of this Annual Assembly are before us in a neatly prepared volume of 191 pages, of which 41 pages are devoted to portraits of present and past Grand Masters from the organization of the Grand Council down to the present time. There were seventeen Past Grand Masters in attendance as well as the Representatives from twenty-five other Grand Jurisdictions. We fail to find the name of Ill. Comp. Simeon P. Gillett of Evansville, the Grand Representative from Ohio near the Grand Council of Indiana, in the list of those who were in attendance.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 434 during the year, and a total membership of 4199. He says:

"The fiftieth year of the existence of the Grand Council of Indiana, finds us in splendid condition financially and numerically, with much interest and zeal manifested by the Subordinate Councils."

The Grand Treasurer's Report shows a balance in his hands of \$2399.19 on October 14th, 1905.

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He mildly rebukes the lazy Master who fails to answer letters promptly, as follows:

The ceremonies of the celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Grand Council of Indiana, which took place on the evening of October 17th in Grand Lodge Hall, was certainly well arranged and well conducted. The addresses were made by men all of whom are prominent in the York Rite of Masonry in that state, and were each and all entertaining and instructive. From one of the addresses we learn that the first Dispensations for Councils in Indiana, were issued by Most Puissant Grand Master John M. Barrere of Ohio, to Companions at Indianapolis and Shelbyville, respectively.

Illustrious Companion Henry Mordhurst presents his sixteenth Report on Correspondence, reviewing the proceedings of thirtythree Grand Councils, three of them for two years.

Ohio for 1904 receives courteous mention, and the Reviewer quotes largely from the Report of the Obituary Committee on the death of Companion S. Stacker Williams, and from Comp. Cunningham's Report on Correspondence. M. Ill. Comp. Cyrus Cline of Angola, was elected Grand Master and Rt. Ill Comp. Calvin W. Prather of Indianapolis, was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in Indianapolis on October 16th, 1906.

INDIAN TERRITORY, 1906.

The Twelfth Annual Assembly of the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Indian Territory and Oklahoma was held in the Masonic Hall at Ada, Indian Territory on April 18th, 1906, and was opened in ample form with M. Ill.

Companion William, Henry Essex, Grand Master, presiding and ten of the Grand Officers in their stations. There are nine working Chartered Councils in this Grand Jurisdiction and two Councils under Dispensation. Nine Councils were represented at this Grand Assembly. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of seventy-seven during the last year and a total membership of 260. From the figures given we are unable to make the total membership over 248. He seems to be a very conscientious Companion and is satisfied that he has fallen far short of the standard set by his predecessors, in fact he pleads guilty to neglect of duty. Well, here is candor and modesty galore, but his admission is hard to explain on the ground that he is possessed of even a super-abundance of modesty, for a man would hardly be so excessively modest as to confess the crime of horse stealing unless he actually stole the "hoss." However, it is refreshing to find an occasional Grand Master who is willing to admit that he is not the whole "procession." This Grand Master granted Dispensations for two new Councils, one at Ardmore and one at Durant. The reports made to the Grand Council by these Councils U. D. show that no mistake was made in granting the Dispensations. He granted several special Dispensations to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees out of time, and gives the following as his reason therefor:

"I find that Cryptic Rite Masonry is very inactive, and practically dormant, almost over the entire Jurisdiction, and for that reason I have granted every Dispensation asked for, and called them 'good and sufficient' reasons."

During the work of the Grand Assembly word was received of the terrible earthquake and destruction at San Francisco, and business was suspended by common consent while the Companions mingled their sympathies and regrets.

There is no report on correspondence.

Charles C. Kneisley of Guthrie, Oklahoma, was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and Joseph S. Murrow of Atoka was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Assembly will be held at El Reno, Oklahoma, following the meeting of the Grand Chapter of Indian Territory.

IOWA, 1905.

This Grand Council held its Sixth Annual Assembly at Iowa City on September 27th, 1905, with Comp. George R. Turner, M. Ill. Grand Master presiding, and all other Grand Officers except one in their stations. Fifteen of the twenty-two Subordinate Councils of the State were represented. Three Past Grand Masters were in attendance, as well as the Grand Representatives from sixteen other Grand Jurisdictions. There seems to be a vacancy in the office of Grand Representative from Ohio.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 117, and a total membership of one thousand. The Grand Treasurer reported a balance on hands of \$1,326.70.

A fine engraved portrait of the Grand Master introduces us to the neatly printed proceedings of 100 pages. Companion Alf Wingate, besides being a good fellow, and knowing how to make others happy, knows how to get good work out of the printer.

The Grand Master presents an address covering a dozen pages of the record in which he reports his official acts during the year. He seems to be one of the thinking Masons, and introduces his address with a number of interesting paragraphs. In speaking of the time-honored institution of Freemasonry he says:

"It is in all respects unique. It draws and inculcates beautiful lessons from both analogy and contrariety; from matters equivalent and having like power and import, and from matters altogether discrepant, and inconsistent as well. It abhors darkness and makes of it a symbol of ignorance and error. It glorifies light and makes of it a symbol of enlightenment and truth. Yet, strange anomaly, out of the darkness of the secret vault, it emanates and radiates no less a light' than the tangible blessedness of friendship; that sentiment of esteem, respect, and affection proceeding from familiar acquaintance which developes favorable opinion of estimable qualities and relations of intimacy that unite to form ties that time will ever strengthen and eternity will not sever."

He pays a glowing tribute to the memory of M. Ill. Comp. Almon R. Dewey, Past Grand Master, who died on April 15th, 1905. Those of us who knew this dearly beloved Companion, can testify to his sterling worth and honor as a man and Mason.

He reports the constitution of two new Councils to which Charters had been granted, and the surrender by one Council of its Charter. Some question having arisen as to the distribution of the Super-Excellent Ritual, he directed that the same be placed in every Council in the state, which we believe is right. He says of this degree that it is largely a dead letter in Iowa, and suggests that some one be authorized to visit the various Councils, giving instructions and if necessary, communicating the degree. This might bring the desired result, but we suggest that you make it obligatory on the Subordinate Councils to confer the degree at least once a year, climinating all "horse-play", and bringing out its real beauties, and then watch the result.

The Correspondence Report is from the pen of our good friend and Companion, William F. Cleveland, and is his fourth report, in which he reviews forty-three Annual Proceedings of thirty-two Grand Jurisdictions. Ohio for 1904 is given two pages of review and gets off without a word of criticism. Companion Cleveland does go after our predecessor, Comp. Cunningham, on the question of whether we did or did not do something way back about war times, but having, as he believed, spiked the guns of Companion Cunningham by publishing the "record" on him, he generously proposes to bury the hatchet, presumably because he had no further use for the hatchet.

But, Companion Cleveland, why did you not publish the whole record? It is probably true as you say that the Grand Master of the Grand Council of Ohio, wrote the letter on February 21st, 1865, (not 1866) which you set out in your review. But we question whether this letter "resulted in the sowing of the seed of discord", which you say forced your Grand Council to "yield up the ghost", for on March 23rd, 1865, only twenty-two days later, the Companion addressed answered said letter as follows:

"IOWA CITY. March 23rd, 1865.

"DEAR SIR AND COMPANION — I have delayed an answer to your communication of the 21st of February, that I might com-

municate with several eminent Masons of our State, and now, having so done, I am prepared to say that our Grand Council will disband, provided all other Grand Councils will do the same. The fact is, we are compelled to form a Grand Council in self-defense. Previous to the formation of our Grand Council the degrees of Royal and Select Master were conferred by the Chapters, but we were not recognized as Council Masons by any sister states; therefore we were compelled to go through a process of healing, and to organize a Grand Council and Subordinates. We are of the opinion that a Grand Council is like the fifth wheel of a wagon—entirely useless.

"With much respect, I remain."

Now, either the "seed of discord" which you say our Grand Master sowed in your cabbage patch, was mighty well sprouted, or you had wonderfully fertile soil, for twenty-two days is a short time to breed discord in a great jurisdiction like yours, and especially so in the war times before we had perfected telegraph and telephone systems, fast mails and limited trains.

We are now willing, Companion Cleveland, that you bury the hatchet, and when we meet again, while renewing our pledges of friendship over a glass of lemonade, we will unite our best thought in an earnest endeavor to promote the best interests of Cryptic Masonry in our respective jurisdictions.

Companion Amos N. Alberson of Washington, was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and Companion Alf Wingate of Des Moines, was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Marshalltown during the first week in October 1906.

KANSAS, 1906.

The Grand Council of Kansas convened in its thirty-eighth Annual Assembly in the city of Topeka on February 19th, 1906, M. Ill. Comp. Charles J. Webb, presiding as Grand Master, and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Chaplain, in their stations. Representatives from nine of the ten Subordinate Councils of the State, eleven Past Grand Masters, twenty-three Past Thrice Illustrious Masters, and Grand Representatives from twenty-eight other Grand Jurisdictions, together with a number of Companions without rank, official honor or authority, were present, and after

The address of the M. Ill. Grand Master is a concise statement of his official acts during the year. He reports the death of the Grand Chaplain of that Jurisdiction, Companion J. J. Hyman, and says of him that he was not only a shining mark in the church, but in Masonry as well. He reports the arresting of the Charter of one Council, and the "reorganization" of another, whatever that may mean. He held that a Council can only be represented at the Assemblies of the Grand Council, in the absence of its three first officers, by a Past Thrice Illustrious Master. We can think of no good reason for such a decision, but it is probably in accord with some law of that Jurisdiction, as it was approved by the Jurisprudence Committee. He speaks in glowing terms of the Masonic Home and recommends an appropriation for its maintenance. He feelingly refers to the San Francisco disaster, and recommends an appropriation, which was made.

In closing he pays a beautiful tribute to Freemasonry in the following language:

"While I yield the 'palm of oratory', there is one thing that I yield to no man, and that is my love and zeal for Masonry. An institution which throws it protecting care around the poor and needy, no matter from what clime he may come; an institution in whose temples the "weather beaten mariner on Life's stormy ccean" finds a protecting harbor, within whose walls the son of wretchedness is sheltered from the swelling tide of bereaving sorrow, where he may seek, and seeking, find a solace in his afflictions, although deserted by a pitiless world; an institution that enters the heart and implants therein a love for the virtues, the charities and the graces of life."

There is no correspondence report.

Thomas F. Moody of Cuthbert was elected Grand Master, and W. A. Wolihin of Macon was re-elected Grand Recorder. The next Annual Asembly will be held in the City of Macon on April 23rd, 1907.

ILLINOIS, 1905.

The fifty-third Annual Assembly of this Grand Council was held in the city of Chicago on October 25th, 1905 with all of the Grand Officers present. Thirty-eight out of the forty-five working Councils in the state were represented and the Grand

Council was opened in ample form with M. Ill. Companion C. W. Hollandsworth presiding. Representatives from twenty-three other Grand Jurisdictions were in attendance among whom was George W. Curtiss of Peoria the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council. To show that their interest in Cryptic Masonry had not abated, fifteen Past Grand Masters were in attendance. The net gain in membership during the past year was 364 and the total membership 4335. The treasurer reported a balance in his hands of \$1845.20 of which \$531.18 was immediately appropriated for the payment of various salaries and expenses. A fine portrait of the newly elected Grand Master faces the title page of the proceedings which, with the report of the committee on Foreign Correspondence make up a pamphlet of 126 pages.

The Grand Master reports the division of the state into nine arches which is the plan we have adopted in Ohio, but they go farther and require reports from the Companions in charge of the arches to be made quarterly to the Grand Master and Grand Lecturer.

We notice, however, that Rt. Ill. Comp. Webster Hazelwood of Andover, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was not in attendance. The Grand Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$838.02.

The Grand Master commences his address with a reference to the death of two Past Grand Masters of that Jurisdiction. M. Ill. Companions Marquis F. King and Horace H. Burbank, both of whom died during the year. He reports the granting of Dispensations to nearly every Council in the State to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees at Special Assemblies, but says he believes that Degrees should be conferred at Stated Assemblies instead of Special Assemblies. Then why grant the Dispensations? He visited a number of Subordinate Councils during the year at all of which he was received with honors befitting his station. He says of the Subordinate Councils that with one exception they are in fair condition. In conclusion he makes the surprising statement that in completing his term as Grand Master he has finished his course as a presiding officer of every Masonic body, both Subordinate and Grand, in York Rite Freemasonry. Truly a wonderful record, and one which at once stamps Companion Chase as one of the shining lights of the Order.

From one of the addresses we learn that the first Dispensations for Councils in Indiana, were issued by Most Puissant Grand Master John M. Barrere of Ohio, to Companions at Indianapolis and Shelbyville, respectively.

INDIAN TERRITORY, 1906.

The Twelfth Annual Assembly of the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Indian Territory and Oklahoma was held in the Masonic Hall at Ada, Indian Territory on April 18th, 1906, and was opened in ample form with M. Ill.

The Grand Master granted six special Dispensations, two of which were to receive petitions and ballot for candidates at Special Assemblies. He issued Dispensations for three new Councils to be organized at Houghton, Marquette, and Howell respectively.

He appointed Rev. Charles A. Lippincott of Flint, Grand Chaplain to supply the vacancy caused by the death of Comp. Francis Asbury Blades. He reports a number of visitations during the year, says that 23 schools of instruction were held by the Grand Lecturer prior to his death, and indicates a degree of prosperity which ought to be satisfactory. This Grand Council lost by death during the year two of its active officers, three Past Grand Masters and two Past Deputy Grand Masters. This is truly a severe affliction. KANSAS, 1906.

The Grand Council of Kansas convened in its thirty-eighth Annual Assembly in the city of Topeka on February 19th, 1906, M. Ill. Comp. Charles J. Webb, presiding as Grand Master, and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Chaplain, in their stations. Representatives from nine of the ten Subordinate Councils of the State, eleven Past Grand Masters, twenty-three Past Thrice Illustrious Masters, and Grand Representatives from twenty-eight other Grand Jurisdictions, together with a number of Companions without rank, official honor or authority, were present, and after

prayer by the Grand Chaplain pro tempore, the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form. The proceedings are before us in a neat pamphlet of eighty pages, with a fine portrait of M. Ill. Comp. Webb facing the title page. One of the first things to attract our attention is the mention made of the reception and welcome tendered to Rt. Ill. Comp. George P. Conner, now the Representative of the Grand Council of Kansas near our own Grand Council, but formerly a resident of that state. Comp. Shaver says that Comp. George P. "demonstrated" that he was still the enthusiastic Cryptic worker as of yore. Well, having had occasion to inspect the work of Comp. Conner's Council, we are prepared to testify to his enthusiasm, and also to his ability and willingness to demonstrate.

The report of the Grand Recorder is not very encouraging in tone. But 51 Companions in all were greeted during the year, and the net gain is but three.

The Grand Treasurer's Report shows a balance on hand of \$841.03.

The address of M. Ill. Grand Master Webb is a pleasing paper of but little more than two pages. He plainly indicates that he is not entirely satisfied with the work of the year in that Jurisdiction, and leaves the impression that he believes the cause is the fact that the Cryptic Degrees are not pre-requisite to the Order of the Temple. He is, however, opposed to the pre-requisite idea. On this point he says:

"We cannot even expect to secure for our Rite other than the patronage of those loyal and zealous Companions who are not attracted by the glamour of the multiplicity of degrees; wherefore, it is not only unwise, but beneath the dignity and importance of the Rite, either to complain of conditions existing in Kansas at the present time, or to urge measures which might require those seeking Masonic light to pass through the circle of the Cryptic Rite before attaining that which they seek. The true lover of the rite must be a patron of our art as found within the Secret Vault. The Cryptic Degrees have lived longer than other Degrees which many of us possess, and which have claimed consideration at the hands of petitioners through more spectacular, commercial and thrifty processes than those which ordinarily obtain in the realm of Cryptic Masonry".

No matters were referred to either the Committee on Appeals and Grievances, or Jurisprudence.

The Correspondence Report is from the pen of Rt. Ill. Comp. William M. Shaver and is his eighth report. He reviews the proceedings of thirty Grand Councils.

Ohio for 1905, has a pleasing and courteous review. He pays the writer of this report the compliment of publishing the little poem with which he introduced his address as Grand Master at Springfield. But how in the world did you get that "B" in our name Comp. Shaver? We disclaim it. We may sometime have had a "bee in our bonnet", but never a "B" in our name. You were probably thinking of Boston, or Bestor Brown, but you should remember that the initial stands as well for Boodler, Booze or Blockhead.

In closing his report the Reviewer says:

"There is nothing new or startling. With a few notable exceptions, the Councils are doing as we do in Kansas, sleeping peacefully; sixteen of the Grand Councils report over 100 greeted, ten of these over 200, six over 500, and one, Ohio, leads with 830. Possibly an earthquake would be a blessing".

Following this report, there is a very complete table of the latest Cryptic Statistics which is compiled by Comp. Shaver, as Grand Recorder, and not as Chairman of the Committee.

M. Ill. Comp. Charles S. Bixby of Osawatomie was elected Grand Master and Rt. Ill. Comp. William M. Shaver was re-elected Grand Recorder. He is also Chairman of the Correspondence Committee again.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at Wichita on February 18th, 1907.

KENTUCKY, 1905.

This is one of the "Sovereign Grand Councils", and if we mistake not they prefer to have considerable emphasis put upon the word "Sovereign". Well, we are willing to write it in italics or even in small caps. They are about three years older than we are, and this entitles them to be called by any old name they choose. Then, we learn from the Correspondence Report, that they are the father (or is it mother) of Illinois, which is another "Sovereign Grand Council", and as we have the father (or mother) and the son, — the North and the South, — joining hands on this "State

The report of the Grand Recorder shows that 163 "passed the circle", 14 affiliated, 2 were reinstated, 22 expelled, 45 suspended for non-payment of dues and 1 suspended, no cause given. This made a net gain for the year of 95 and made the total membership 1325.

The report of the Grand Treasurer showed a balance of \$1967.25 on hand.

The Grand Master pays tribute to the memory of two Past Grand Masters who died during the year, M. Ill. Companions Thomas E. Garrett and Joseph S. Browne.

He reported the appointment and recommendation for appointment of a number of Companions as Grand Representatives to and from that Jurisdiction; issued a number of Dispensations, some of which were to receive and ballot upon petitions at Special Assemblies.

He appointed Companion Robert F. Stevenson as Correspondence Committee in place of Companion W. F. Kuhn, resigned.

He made a number of visitations, and organized one Council.

One of his concluding paragraphs is worthy of being quoted in full. He says:

"I made a special effort to knock at the door of every Council in the state of Missouri, and I find that wherever a Council has been fortunate in securing earnest and zealous officers, prosperity abounds within its portals. When you visit a Council without such officers, you find it sleeping at its post. Duty is the first law of nature, but when neglected, or performed with motives unworthy, or purposes insincere, the strong arm of its protector, with sure and vigorous reach, will halt the faithless servants, turn from them the blessing of his face, and on the arid sands of disappointment, with blasted hopes and thwarted purposes, they will pass from his presence as the waters fail from the sea, and there will be no longer pleasant memory of them among men or Masons."

The Grand Master appreciating the services of the Grand Recorder, recommended that his salary be raised, and the Grand Recorder offering no objection thereto, the By-Laws were amended so as to fix the salary at \$150.00 per annum.

He also recommends that the further power be given Grand Masters to permit Subordinate Councils to be placed upon wheels to be moved around from place to place within their jurisdiction, for the purpose of receiving and acting upon petitions and conferring Degrees. They probably have some good timber in the outlying "deestricts", and they propose to move the mill to it.

their stations. There are 19 Chartered Councils and 4 Councils U. D. in this Grand Jurisdiction, 12 of which were represented in this Grand Assembly. The proceedings contain a fine portrait of the presiding Grand Master. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 102, and a total membership of 948. The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance of \$810.61.

The address of the Grand Master is a short business paper giving an account of his stewardship during the year. He reports that with a few exceptions the several Councils of the state are enjoying a full measure of prosperity, and says that the increase for the year is sufficiently large. He believes that slow and steady growth is preferable to large accessions followed by years of inactivity. He continued the Dispensation of one Council and issued a Dispensation for another. He issued a number of special Dispensations to receive and ballot on petitions without regard to time, and recommended an appropriation of \$50.00 to the Nebraska Masonic Home. MASSACHUSETTS, 1905.

This Grand Council convened in Ionic Hall in the Masonic Temple in Boston on December 13th, 1905. The Grand Master M. Ill. Companion Forrest E. Barker presided and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Conductor, were in their stations. Representatives from twenty-two out of the twenty-eight working Charters in the State, were present, together with four Past Grand Masters and representatives from twenty other Grand Jurisdictions, among the latter being Ill. Companion J. Gilman Waite of Boston, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near the Grand Council of Massachusetts.

The printed proceedings come to us in a pamphlet of 133 pages and have for a frontispiece a fine portrait of the presiding Grand Master. In addition to the proceedings of the Annual Assembly, the pamphlet contains the printed proceedings of three Special Assemblies.

Companion William, Henry Essex, Grand Master, presiding and ten of the Grand Officers in their stations. However, it is refreshing to find an occasional Grand Master who is willing to admit that he is not the whole "procession." D. show that no mistake was made in granting the Dispensations. He granted several special Dispensations to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees out of time, and gives the following as his reason therefor:

"I find that Cryptic Rite Masonry is very inactive, and practically dormant, almost over the entire Jurisdiction, and for that reason I have granted every Dispensation asked for, and called them 'good and sufficient' reasons."

During the work of the Grand Assembly word was received of the terrible earthquake and destruction at San Francisco, and business was suspended by common consent while the Companions mingled their sympathies and regrets.

There is no report on correspondence.

Charles C. Kneisley of Guthrie, Oklahoma, was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and Joseph S. Murrow of Atoka was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Assembly will be held at El Reno, Oklahoma, following the meeting of the Grand Chapter of Indian Territory.

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attached. He followed what appears to be a growing custom in the Cryptic Rite, and issued a number of Dispensations to receive petitions, elect candidates and confer degrees at Special Assemblies. We cannot understand why the rule which is so generally followed in other Masonic Bodies, that petitions can only be received and balloted for at Stated Meetings, should be so persistently broken in the Cryptic Rite. A member of a Subordinate Council has the same right to know who are applying for the degrees as has the member of any other Masonic Body. He knows the time of the Stated Meetings, and if petitions can only be received and acted upon at those meetings, he has an opportunity to exercise the prerogative of every Mason. But if Dispensations are to be granted to receive and act upon petitions, and confer degrees at Special Assemblies, of which the rank and file have no notice, then is his prerogative of little avail, because before he knows anything about it the candidate is railroaded through and is giving him the laugh instead of the warm hand of true fellowship.

The report of the Committee on Fraternal Dead is a most beautiful and appropriate pen picture, and we cannot resist the temptation to make an extended quotation therefrom. In speaking of the clouds of sorrow and anguish that have darkened the homes of many Companions during the year, the Committee say:

Sovereignty" question, surely no one ought to object to their fealty to Sovereignty.

The Seventy-eighth Annual Assembly of this Grand Council convened in Louisville on October 16th, 1905, and was opened in Ample Form. M. Ill. Grand Master Joseph H. Ewalt presided and all the other Grand Officers except the Grand Captain of the Guard, were present. They have in old Kentucky 23 Chartered Councils and 6 Councils are under Dispensation, and representatives from 14 of these were in attendance.

The net gain for the year, as shown by the Grand Recorder's Report, was 101, and the total membership 1190. The total resources were \$658.92. Ohio's Grand Representative, M. Ill. Comp. Charles H. Fisk was not present. The Grand Master in his address pays a tribute to the excellence and worth of their deceased Grand Treasurer, M. Ill. Past Grand Master William Ryan, who died on November 13th, 1904, and reports the appointment of his successor in the person of M. Ill. Comp. Frank H. Johnson, who is also a Past Grand Master. He directed the Grand Recorder to prepare a pamphlet containing the constitution and approved decisions, which the Grand Recorder did, and gave to it the name of "Pandect". We thought Justinian had copyrighted this title in the long ago. He issued commissions to three Grand Representatives near other Grand Jurisdictions, and recommended the appointment of Companions of their own Jurisdiction as Grand Representatives from fourteen other Grand Jurisdictions. He arrested the Charter of one Council, issued Dispensations for six new Councils, and a like number to old Councils to resume labor. They seem to have a way in Kentucky of allowing inactive Councils to remain on the rolls until they become so weak and debilitated that they cannot feed themselves, in other words cannot get a quorum so they can take in new members, and then the Grand Master gives them a dose of croton oil in the shape of a special Dispensation to get busy, and they get busy. This Grand Council met in its fifty-first Annual Assembly at the Masonic Hall in the City of Portland, on May 3rd, 1905, with M. Ill. Comp. Albro E. Chase Grand Master, and all the other Grand Officers, as well as Representatives from 14 of the 16 Subordinate Councils of the State, in attendance. The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 274 during the year and a total membership of 3738. 11 Past Grand Masters were in attendance and the Representatives from 24 other Grand Jurisdictions. We notice, however, that Rt. Ill. Comp. Webster Hazelwood of Andover, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was not in attendance. The Grand Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$838.02.

The Grand Master commences his address with a reference to the death of two Past Grand Masters of that Jurisdiction, M. Ill. Companions Marquis F. King and Horace H. Burbank, both of whom died during the year. He reports the granting of Dispensations to nearly every Council in the State to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees at Special Assemblies, but says he believes that Degrees should be conferred at Stated Assemblies instead of Special Assemblies. Then why grant the Dispensations? He visited a number of Subordinate Councils during the year at all of which he was received with honors befitting his station. are now on a stable foundation. It would, I think, be humiliating to ask the Grand Commandery to make our Degrees prerequisite after we have shown the Masonic world that we can succeed by simply explaining to our brethren that their Masonic knowledge is incomplete without the Chapter and Council, and that in having these they secure all the essentials of Ancient Craft Masonry."

The Grand Master says that he does not approve of granting Dispensations to act upon petitions without waiting the usual time, and that he dislikes very much to do it, and he then makes the mistake, as we believe, of granting twenty-eight such Dispensations.

He recommended that the Grand Council adopt a rule that no Companion should be permitted to vote, hold office, act as recommender, serve on committees or perform any of the ordinary duties of membership save those of an observer and an assistant in conferring Degrees, until after he had taken the Royal, Select and Super-Excellent degrees. We note however that this recommendation was not concurred in.

SOUTH CAROLINA, 1906.

E. Harrison. All of the Subordinate Councils of the State, being six in number, were represented, and the Grand Council was opened in due form. The report of the Grand Recorder

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 307 during the year and a total membership of 5802. His report also states that there are in that Jurisdiction 149 Emeritus members. If we understand this expression it means that they have 149 Companions who have been excused from further service, but we don't quite understand just what amount of service, what years of membership or what qualifications would entitle a member to this honorary and honorable distinction.

The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hand of \$3005.52, which is a snug balance.

The address of the Grand Master, besides being a report in detail of his official acts during the year, contains some beautiful thoughts which it would be well for every one to treasure in his memory.

Among other things he says:

"Masonry means much. It seems to cover the whole range of human knowledge, and in an especial and particular manner is designed to prevent those struggles and contentions which seem almost inevitable under the conditions of our active life. It makes it easier to forgive a wrong done us or lend a helping hand to some struggling Brother. The Grand Recorder, Comp. Charles A. Conover, reports that every Council has made returns and padd dues in full. He recommended that the Council legrees be taken from the bargain counter where they have been so long selling at \$5,000, and placed on a higher shelf at a minimum proce of \$10,000, and this recommendation was subsequently approved by the Grand Council.

He says, in closing, that there should be no reason why Michigan should not stand as the first Grand Council in the United States. Why, Comp. Contver. how can you thus overlook Ohio?

A pathetic incident in connection with this Annual Assembly was the report made by Mrs. Eva Sprague Goodrich, widow of Comp. Lewis C. Goodrich, late Grand Lecturer, who died during the year and before his work of inspections had been finished. The report was prepared by the widow from brief memoranda left by the deceased.

The letter addressed by the General Grand Master Comp. Andrew P. Swanstrom to the different Sovereign Grand Councils, of which Michigan is one, was read by the Grand Recorder, and on motion the same was received and "placed on file". This action

was cool enough to suggest that the letter should have been received and placed on ice.

It occurred to the Grand Recorder that this was hardly treating the communication of the General Grand Master with that courteous and fraternal spirit which is characteristic of our Fraternity, and he requested that some definite action be taken and a courteous reply made to the letter.

Comp. John H. Kingsley, Past Grand Master, moved that the Grand Council should accept the invitation and unite with the General Grand Council. This provoked a lengthy discussion, and, on motion, the whole matter was referred to a committee of three, to be appointed by the Grand Master, who should visit, at the expense of the Grand Council, the Triennial Assembly in Boston, and give the subject a thorough investigation, and report their finding and recommendations at the next Annual Assembly.

The committee appointed by the Grand Master was present in Boston and will undoubtedly be prepared to report at the next Annual Assembly of their Grand Council. From personal observation we are confident that the committee were courteously received by the General Grand Council and that they had a good time. They certainly must have been impressed by their reception and welcome, and while we cannot anticipate their report, we predict that the time is not far distant when this great Jurisdiction will lay aside its mantle of "Sovereignty", and take its position, which will be an important one, among the Constituent Grand Councils.

Comp. Charles A. Conover presented his third report on Correspondence, in which he reviews thirty-seven annual proceedings. Ohio for 1905 is given six pages of interesting review in which Comp. Conover shows clearly that he carefully reads what is before him. He quotes approvingly from the address of the writer of this report, who was then Grand Master, which of course tickles us in the vanity spot.

Comp. Arthur H. McCloud of Detroit was elected M. Ill. Grand Master and Comp. Charles A. Conover of Coldwater was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly of this Grand Council will be held in the city of Port Huron on May 20th, 1907.

The half-stone but of Franci Master Bevan which faces the proceedings is the picture of a hamiscone man if the camera has been true to the original, and we are sumprised that the Companions of Minnesota would allow such a good looking fellow to get away from them. And yet, since Past M. P. General Grand Master A. P. Swanstrom has abandoned that mustache, they are not without handsome men in Minnesota.

The Grand Master regrets that he cannot present the results which he had hoped to accomplish. He reports the death of their Grand Chaplain, Ill. Comp. Norman I. Colburn, and M. Ill. Comp. John Richard Carey, Past Grand Master. He recommends that the Companions of the Cryptic Rite in that Grand Jurisdiction work in harmony with other Masonic Bodies to bring about the erection of a home for the aged Masons, their widows and orphans. He also recommends the adoption of the "Ohio idea" that of dividing the state into districts, or Arches, to be under the supervision of Inspectors.

The report of the committee on Foreign Correspondence is from the pen of III. Comp. Thomas Montgomery and is his fifteenth report. He states that because of the necessary outlay of money in other directions his report has been made as short as possible. Ohio has a pleasing notice occupying a page, and Companion Montgomery expresses some pride at having the privilege of representing so vigorous a Grand Council as that of Ohio. We notice in the list of officers elected and appointed three whose names are Johnson, but we are quite sure that the old song "Too Much Johnson" was inspired long before these Companions were installed.

Companion Charles S. Schurman of St. Paul is M. Ill. Grand Master, and Companion Thomas Montgomery also of St. Paul is Rt. Ill. Grand Recorder, and also Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in Minneapolis on the second Monday of October, 1906.

MISSISSIPPI, 1906.

The Fifty-first Annual Assembly of this Grand Council convened in the city of Brookhaven on February 21st, 1906, the Grand Master, M. Ill. Companion Phineas M. Savery and a majority of the other Grand Officers being present. 36 out of 44 of the Chartered Councils of the state were represented. Grand Representatives from 25 other Jurisdictions were in attendance, among the number being Ill. Companion Frederick Speed of Vicksburg, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, he having been appointed during the year to succeed Companion S. M. Roane, deceased.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 131 and a total membership of 1570, while the report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance of \$1365.12.

The Grand Master, who a year previous was walking in the heavy shadow of a personal sorrow and bereavement, expresses his heart-felt gratitude to his Companions for their fraternal messages of sympathy and good will, and in connection therewith says:

"O! Companions, words or messages of sympathy, one to another when we are in sorrow, trouble or distress, are surely golden, the recollection of which will be as priceless jewels in our memories. A fraternal message of sympathy, or an act of kindness will strengthen and brighten each link in the chain of the living and cause our love for one another to enfold us as a garment."

He feelingly refers to the passing out of the earthly shadows into the glorious light of heaven of Ill. Companion Andrew Hanna Barkley, who died December 9th, 1905. He seems to have had some difficulty in carrying out the directions of the Grand Council in the matter of the division of the state into Arches for the purpose of Inspection, — in fact he seems to have completely failed in this respect.

He did, however, subsequently appoint seven expert Inspectors without assigning any special territory to them, only three of whom seem to have performed any of the duties assigned to them. He notes some dissatisfaction among the Companions on account of the substitution of the ritual of the General Grand Council, and shows an inclination to compromise matters with the Companions by stating that it is optional with them whether they use the ritual of the General Grand Council or that promulgated by the New York Convention in 1873. Why, this compromise? The Grand Council of Mississippi had the right to designate the ritual to be used, and having designated the ritual of the General Grand Council, that is the ritual that ought to be used. Especially is this true if an effort is made to have the work made uniform in the state by appointing a corps of Inspectors. We have had the same difficulty in Masonic Bodies in Ohio. There are always a few fellows who think that their knowledge of the esoteric work is the only true knowledge, but they usually go farther back than 1873 for their standard. We are not speaking in favor of the General Grand Council Ritual, but having adopted it, the Grand Council of Mississippi should see that its edict is enforced. The Grand Master reports the communications received from the General Grand Master urging the Grand Council of Mississippi to become a constituent member of This portion of his address was the General Grand Council. referred to a special committee which gives our good Companion Frederick Speed an opportunity to once more mildly rebuke the General Grand Council for its audacity in asking them to become a member of the common household. This Triennial spanking of the General Grand Council by the so-called "Sovereign Grand Councils" comes no longer as a surprise but rather as a thing to be expected. Companion Speed says:

"From a purely sentimental standpoint and a natural desire to

form a closer bond of union between ourselves and the great body of Cryptic Masons of the country, we are strongly moved to advise your uniting with the General Grand Council, but here the reasoning begins and ends, as we see it, for there is nothing which seems to us to call for the existence of a General Grand Body in Cryptic Masonry from a practical and Masonic standpoint."

Well, Companion Speed, we believe this is a little more liberality than you have shown in the past, and if you can attend a few more Triennials where they have luncheons served in sub-basements, with fresh lobster salads, crab meats and sea foods and plenty of apollinaris to wash it down, as you had in Boston lately, we believe you will come to the conclusion that the sentimental and fraternal side of the question is at least of equal importance to the purely practical side. The fact is that there are many bright brainy men in these so-called Sovereign Grand Councils whose wisdom and service would be highly appreciated by the General Grand Body, and their influence would be much greater if they were in the General Grand Council, than it is by their looking in through the rear door.

There is no report on Foreign Correspondence, but the reason therefor is not stated.

M. Ill. Companion Phineas M. Savery of Tupelo was re-elected Grand Master, and Ill. Companion Frederick Speed was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at Natchez on February 20th, 1907.

MISSOURI, 1906.

The Forty-first Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Missouri was held at Kansas City on April 24th, 1906. M. Ill. Grand Master Comp. Martin T. Balsley presided, and all the other Grand officers, except Grand Steward, were in their stations. There are fourteen Chartered Councils and one Council U. D. in this Grand Jurisdiction, and thirteen Councils were represented. Six Past Grand Masters and Grand Representatives from twenty other Grand Jurisdictions were in attendance, among the latter being Ill. Comp. John R. Parson of St. Louis, Ohio's Grand Representative near the Grand Council of Missouri.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at Louisville on October 15th, 1906.

MAINE, 1905.

This Grand Council met in its fifty-first Annual Assembly at the Masonic Hall in the City of Portland, on May 3rd, 1905, with M. Ill. Comp. Albro E. Chase Grand Master, and all the other Grand Officers, as well as Representatives from 14 of the 16 Subordinate Councils of the State, in attendance. The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 274 during the year and a total membership of 3738. 11 Past Grand Masters were in attendance and the Representatives from 24 other Grand Jurisdictions. We notice, however, that Rt. Ill. Comp. Webster Hazelwood of Andover, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was not in attendance. The Grand Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$838.02.

The Grand Master commences his address with a reference to the death of two Past Grand Masters of that Jurisdiction, M. Ill. Companions Marquis F. King and Horace H. Burbank, both of whom died during the year. He reports the granting of Dispensations to nearly every Council in the State to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees at Special Assemblies, but says he believes that Degrees should be conferred at Stated Assemblies instead of Special Assemblies. Then why grant the Dispensations? He visited a number of Subordinate Councils during the year at all of which he was received with honors befitting his station. He says of the Subordinate Councils that with one exception they are in fair condition. In conclusion he makes the surprising statement that in completing his term as Grand Master he has finished his course as a presiding officer of every Masonic body, both Subordinate and Grand, in York Rite Freemasonry. Truly a wonderful record, and one which at once stamps Companion Chase as one of the shining lights of the Order.

His closing words are:

"I assure you, my brethren, as I retire from this position, even as I have retired from others, that I shall not cease to labor for

the interests of Masonry as a whole, and of Cryptic Masonry in part; for in it and of it, as a part and parcel of Freemasonry, are Degrees not to be excelled in beauty, in sublimity of thought, and calling for nicety in action, and also worthy of the most careful attention and earnest thought of every true Mason".

The Deputy Grand Master and Grand Principal Conductor of the Work report in detail the visitations made by them respectively during the year. In Maine the first three Grand Officers make the visitations and inspections; in Ohio we divide this duty and its accompanying responsibilities and pleasures among all our Grand Officers. The M. Ill. Grand Master Comp. Albro E. Chase, submitted the Report on Correspondence. To Ohio for the year 1904, is given a pleasing review of two pages in which he makes several quotations, with approval, from the address of M. Ill. Comp. John F. Lane and the Report of M. Ill. Comp. Cunningham on Correspondence.

M. Ill. Comp. Charles B. Adams of Portland was elected Grand Master, and Stephen Berry of Portland was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly was held in Portland on May 2nd, 1906, the proceedings of which are not yet before us.

MASSACHUSETTS, 1905.

This Grand Council convened in Ionic Hall in the Masonic Temple in Boston on December 13th, 1905. The Grand Master M. Ill. Companion Forrest E. Barker presided and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Conductor, were in their stations. Representatives from twenty-two out of the twenty-eight working Charters in the State, were present, together with four Past Grand Masters and representatives from twenty other Grand Jurisdictions, among the latter being Ill. Companion J. Gilman Waite of Boston, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near the Grand Council of Massachusetts.

The printed proceedings come to us in a pamphlet of 133 pages and have for a frontispiece a fine portrait of the presiding Grand Master. In addition to the proceedings of the Annual Assembly, the pamphlet contains the printed proceedings of three Special Assemblies.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the last year of 311, an actual net gain for the last three years of 335 and a total membership of 6882.

The address of the Grand Master is a short business paper in which he reports his doings during the year. Of the progress made during the year he says:

"Never before, so far as I can learn, have the Subordinate Councils teen so generally presperous or the standards of work everywhere so high".

He further states that for the first time in many years the Grand Council had on hand ample funds to meet all the ordinary expenses of the year to come. This amount as shown by the Grand Treasurer's report was \$2409.63.

The report on Fraternal Correspondence is from the pen of Companion J. Gilman Waite and is his eighth report. Ohio for 1904 and 1905 is reviewed. The committee quotes freely from the addresses of the respective Grand Masters with favorable comment thereon. The writer also quotes from Companion Cunning-ham's report on Correspondence and especially the retrospect which our venerable Companion gave us in his report for 1905.

Companion Edwin S. Crandon of Cambridge was elected M. Ill. Grand Master and Companion J. Gilman Waite of Boston was reelected Grand Recorder, and reappointed as Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

We fail to find anywhere in the proceedings a statement as to the time when the next Grand Assembly of this Grand Council will be held, but from the remarks of the Grand Master in his address we presume the time is fixed by the constitution. Even if this be true it strikes us that the time should be stated somewhere in the proceedings, so that those of us who desire to do so may know when we can drop in and break bread with the Companions of this old commonwealth.

MICHIGAN, 1906.

The forty-eighth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Michigan was held in the city of Saginaw on May 14th, 1906, with all the Grand Officers present except the Grand Lecturer who had died during the year. There were also present 12 Past Grand Masters, the Representatives from 55 Subordinate Councils, including two under Dispensation, and the Representatives from 22 other Grand Jurisdictions. Ill. Comp. George A. Cross of Lawrence, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, near the Grand Council of Michigan was not in attendance. The printed proceedings which are before us are introduced by a portrait of the retiring Grand Master M. Ill. Comp. Bayard A. Church, which faces the title page. These proceedings are also made more valuable by good portraits of a number of prominent Masons of that Grand Jurisdiction who had died during the year.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 307 during the year and a total membership of 5802. His report also states that there are in that Jurisdiction 149 Emeritus members. If we understand this expression it means that they have 149 Companions who have been excused from further service, but we don't quite understand just what amount of service, what years of membership or what qualifications would entitle a member to this honorary and honorable distinction.

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The address of the Grand Master, besides being a report in detail of his official acts during the year, contains some beautiful thoughts which it would be well for every one to treasure in his memory.

Among other things he says:

"Masonry means much. It seems to cover the whole range of human knowledge, and in an especial and particular manner is designed to prevent those struggles and contentions which seem almost inevitable under the conditions of our active life. It makes it easier to forgive a wrong done us or lend a helping hand to some struggling Brother. The beautiful allegory unfolded to the Fraternity, which to the ignorant may seem but a picturesque story, to those more learned seems to portray a high standard of intellectual life with noble rules of honor and justice, yet, to those keener minds that delve deep under the mysteries of life, Masonry is seen to be concerned chiefly with the spirit and its future activity rather than with its transitory earthly manifestation".

MOST ILLUSTRIOUS GRAND MASTER 1906-1907.

There were eleven Past Grand Masters present and Grand Representatives from 32 other Grand Councils who were courteously and fraternally received. Ill. Comp. James Chambers of New York the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near the Grand Council of New York, was present.

The Address of the Grand Master covers a dozen pages of the printed record and is a statement in brief detail of the work of the year. His opening paragraphs were so appropriate to the occasion, and so inspiring that we quote them as follows:

"Primarily, organized Freemasonry practiced the art of physical building; later it became a symbolic art, teaching the divine doctrines of morality and the universal brotherhood of man. Dangerous Tenets these for public profession in those ages of oppression out of which the race has emerged, but the propagation of those principles, by our craft, and by certain religious sects, made civil and religious liberty possible, and made the settlement of this hemisphere certain, a colonization that has resulted in wonders stupendous. What if some centuries ago the actual Freemasons did build some imposing edifices? Can their glory be compared with the material structure of the present civilization that is builded upon the everlasting foundation of the principles of Symbolic Masonry? Look about us! Today we are met in a city of millions, the metropolis of a free nation — the greatest of earth, but for the adoption of the cardinal precepts of Freemasonry this would not be; precepts which put into practice freed the labor and the genius that has reared the labyrinth of aisles of Masonry that marks the city of this Assembly. We are in one of the greatest temples in the world, here to take advice together, and may the inspiration of the manifold achievements of the past urge us to such practices as shall hasten the coming of the era when universal brotherhood shall be not only an ethical term, but an accomplishment eternal."

In obedience to the provisions of the constitution of that Grand Council, the Subordinate Councils of the State were assigned to the Grand Officers for official visitation during the year, and the Grand Master reports that most of the Councils were visited.

He reports the appointment and recommendation for appointment of a number of Grand Representatives to and from that Grand Council. He made but one decision which was that a summons signed by the Thrice Illustrious Master of a Council, was a lawful summons whether the seal of the Council was or was not

attached. He followed what appears to be a growing custom in the Crystic Rite, and assued a number of Dispensations to receive petitions, elect randiciates and confer degrees at Special Assemblies. We cannot understand why the rule which is so generally followed in other Masonic Bodies, that petitions can only be received and balloted for at Stated Meetings, should be so persistentity broken in the Cryptic Rite. A member of a Subordinate Conneil has the same right to know who are applying for the degrees as has the member of any other Masonic Body. He knows the time of the Stated Meetings, and if petitions can only be received and acted upon at those meetings, he has an opportunity to exercise the prerogative of every Mason. But if Dispensations are to be granted to receive and act upon petitions, and confer degrees at Special Assemblies, of which the rank and file have no notice, then is his prerogative of little avail, because before he knows anything about it the candidate is railroaded through and is giving him the laugh instead of the warm hand of true fellowship.

The report of the Committee on Fraternal Dead is a most beautiful and appropriate pen picture, and we cannot resist the temptation to make an extended quotation therefrom. In speaking of the clouds of sorrow and anguish that have darkened the homes of many Companions during the year, the Committee say:

"Thirsty, after days of uninterrupted sunshine, dusty, after the tread of many feet, careful of the flower children and the food of man which lie upon the nourishing bosom of Mother Earth, she summons the clouds, her sombre and heavily-laden attendants, and bids them slake her thirst, wash away her dust, revive the flagging life of that which sprang into being by the very travail of the patient soil, and through her tears smiles up into the face of her God. But humanity growls on and ceases not, until the sun shines again in the majesty of his golden glory. Humanity sees the change upon Nature's features; how green the grass, how grand the trees, how grateful the grain and the flowers; but says no word of appreciation, utters no word of thanks. Yet great has been the gain which the clouds and the rain have brought, more glowing is Nature as she steps forth from her bath; more striking is the beauty which lifts itself up upon the mount of its transfiguration. more stirring are the wondrous harmonies which rise upon the zephyr, more closely does the earth nestle in the clasp of her loving and watchful Creator. Nature's life is more beautiful because the clouds and rain have visited the earth and blessed it. The summer days are the many days of human lives. The Father gives them freely, beautifies them without stint, weighs infirmities against duties and even selfishness against gratitude, until He sees forgetfulness to become dangerously near to stupor and complaints leavened with rebellion's antagonism, and then sends the clouds of trouble, that the eyes of His creatures may be lifted toward Him, and the thoughts forced to recognize His authority and His power. They descend and surround, they force humanity to come from without and to enter within; and the errand they do and the message they bring, wring tears, human raindrops, from the eyes, and pours them upon hardened consciences and parched souls. Those clouds are dense and chill; they are black and heavy; they chant a solemn dirge as they toll the knell of death: they hear the cry of anguish, mingled with the questionings of pain; they make no answer, and lift only after many days. But the sun will shine again upon as many as will to see it. Blessings forgotten, but still remaining, brighten with a new rediance; reason calms the turbulence of rebellion into the quiet of faith; and humanity goes to God with the outstretched hand of companionship, though the sob of separation is not yet quite stilled, nor the wound within the heart yet quite healed. But the smile of God is upon the soul, and the chords of the song of coming happiness are faintly heard as they are touched by the fingers of the

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M. Ill. Comp. Iving L'Hommedieu was re-elected Grand Master, but declined the further honor, and thereupon M. Ill. Comp. Charles Stewart of Brooklyn was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Geo. Van Vliet of New York was re-elected Grand Recorder.

Companions of our Grand Council. We beg to assure our distinguished Companion that the pleasure of his visit was more than half ours. He was then a stranger and we took him in, the next time he will come as a friend and what we will do to him and for him will be sufficient.

We notice there is a custom in this, as in some other Grand Jurisdictions, of issuing Dispensations to receive and ballot upon petitions at Special Assemblies. In our judgment this custom is a bad one. In this instance that part of the Grand Master's address was referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence, which failed to report, and as "silence gives consent", we presume the action of the Grand Master was approved by the Grand Council.

A. B. Andrews, Jr., of Raleigh, was re-elected Grand Master, and James C. Munds of Wilmington was re-elected Grand Recorder.

There is no report on Foreign Correspondence.

The next Assembly will be held at the city of Charlotte on May 9th, 1906.

NORTH CAROLINA, 1906.

This Grand Council met in its Thirtieth Annual Assembly, in the city of Charlotte on May 9th, 1906. A constitutional number of Subordinate Councils being represented, the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form with M. Ill. Companion A. B. Andrews, Jr., presiding as Grand Master, and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Steward, and Grand Sentinel, in their stations. Two Past Grand Masters were present as were the Grand Representatives from eight other Grand Jurisdictions, among the number being M. Ill. Comp. W. S. Liddell, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 80 and a present membership of 290, while the Grand Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$169.48.

The address of the Grand Master is a brief statement of his official acts during the year. Like some of the rest of us, Companion Andrews is a busy man and he admits that he has not been able

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The fact, however, that he was continued in office four years is a pretty strong molication that the Companions of his state were entirely antisaled with his efforts.

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"The past year has seen much progress in our entire state, and along with it the Crypton Rite has advanced, and we are now stronger both in number of Councils and members of these bodies, as well as there is more entireliasm in Council work by the members of this Grand Body."

As in the previous year, he issued a number of Dispensations to receive and ait upon petitions at Special Assemblies. He made no official visits during the year, which was a matter of great regret to him. He did, however, find time to make visits to the Annual Assemblies of the Grand Councils of New York and South Carolina. Companion James Southgate presents a report on Correspondence in which he reviews the proceedings of thirty Grand Jurisdictions.

Ohio for 1905 has a review of a little over two pages. The address of the Grand Master, who happens to be the writer of this report, is referred to with commendation, as is also the report of Companion Cunningham on Foreign Correspondence. He mentions the case of Cincinnati Council No. 1 which had been in existence for three-quarters of a century without a charter, and puts the question to the "actual presence" Companions, as to the legality of the work done by this Council during all these years. OREGON, 1906.

He calls attention to the fact that the Grand Council of Oregon has now reached its majority in point of years, and congratulates the Companions on the steady and substantial growth that has marked their progress, and the enthusiasm and loyalty which he says is a distinguishing characteristic of the Royal and Select Masters of Oregon.

He very truly says:

"The incomplete structure of Ancient Craft Masonry, built in the Symbolic Lodge and Royal Arch Chapter, can only be completely rounded out and thoroughly understood by those who receive the degrees of Royal Master and Select Master—the eighth and ninth Degrees of the York Rite as given in America with the appendant or honorary degree of Super-Excellent Master, as these Cryptic Degrees furnish the keystone which binds together the Symbolic Arch of Ancient Craft Masonry."

He made a number of official visits during the year, granted two Dispensations to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees out of time, which he says were issued for "good and sufficient reasons."

The committee on doings of Grand Officers reported against

their stations. There are 19 Chartered Councils and 4 Councils U. D. in this Grand Jurisdiction, 12 of which were represented in this Grand Assembly. The proceedings contain a fine portrait of the presiding Grand Master. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 102, and a total membership of 948. The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance of \$810.61.

The address of the Grand Master is a short business paper giving an account of his stewardship during the year. He reports that with a few exceptions the several Councils of the state are enjoying a full measure of prosperity, and says that the increase for the year is sufficiently large. He believes that slow and steady growth is preferable to large accessions followed by years of inactivity. He continued the Dispensation of one Council and issued a Dispensation for another. He issued a number of special Dispensations to receive and ballot on petitions without regard to time, and recommended an appropriation of \$50.00 to the Nebraska Masonic Home. The Committee on Jurisprudence reported that no matter had been referred to it for consideration, and congratulated the Grand Council on the peace, prosperity and harmony that prevails throughout the Grand Jurisdiction.

The report on Foreign Correspondence was prepared by representatives of the other Grand Councils near the Grand Council of Nebraska, the review of Ohio for the year 1904 being from the pen of M. Ill. Past Grand Master, Charles J. Phelps. He seems to have some pride, and we believe it is just pride, in the fact that he represents the largest Grand Jurisdiction of the Cryptic Rite in the world, compliments our Grand Recorder on our published proceedings which he says are up to date in style and character as a Masonic publication. He says of M. Ill. Comp. William M. Cunningham, writer of the report on Correspondence for that year, that he is an able and experienced writer of Masonic reviews, with all of which we heartily agree.

M. Ill. Comp. Lorenzo D. Woodruff of Lincoln, was elected Grand Master, and Rt. Ill. Comp. Francis E. White of Omaha was re-elected Grand Recorder.

NEW HAMPSHIRE, 1905.

Most Illustrious Grand Master, Most Illustrious Companion Orestes A. B. Senter, and Companions of the Grand Council:

We know that the Councils at Cincinnati, Steubenville and Granville held such warrants, signed by John Barker as General Agent of the Supreme Council of the A. & A. Scottish Rite of the United States, and as the Councils at Lancaster and Chillicothe were organized at about the same

There were eleven Past Grand Masters present and Grand Representatives from 32 other Grand Councils who were courteously and fraternally received. Ill. Comp. James Chambers of New York the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near the Grand Council of New York, was present.

In obedience to the provisions of the constitution of that Grand Council, the Subordinate Councils of the State were assigned to the Grand Officers for official visitation during the year, and the Grand Master reports that most of the Councils were visited.

He reports the appointment and recommendation for appointment of a number of Grand Representatives to and from that Grand Council. He made but one decision which was that a summons signed by the Thrice Illustrious Master of a Council, was a lawful summons whether the seal of the Council was or was not

attached. He followed what appears to be a growing custom in the Cryptic Rite, and issued a number of Dispensations to receive petitions, elect candidates and confer degrees at Special Assemblies. We cannot understand why the rule which is so generally followed in other Masonic Bodies, that petitions can only be received and balloted for at Stated Meetings, should be so persistently broken in the Cryptic Rite. A member of a Subordinate Council has the same right to know who are applying for the degrees as has the member of any other Masonic Body. He knows the time of the Stated Meetings, and if petitions can only be received and acted upon at those meetings, he has an opportunity to exercise the prerogative of every Mason. But if Dispensations are to be granted to receive and act upon petitions, and confer degrees at Special Assemblies, of which the rank and file have no notice, then is his prerogative of little avail, because before he knows anything about it the candidate is railroaded through and is giving him the laugh instead of the warm hand of true fellowship.

The report of the Committee on Fraternal Dead is a most beautiful and appropriate pen picture, and we cannot resist the temptation to make an extended quotation therefrom. In speaking of the clouds of sorrow and anguish that have darkened the homes of many Companions during the year, the Committee say:

"Thirsty, after days of uninterrupted sunshine, dusty, after the tread of many feet, careful of the flower children and the food of man which lie upon the nourishing bosom of Mother Earth, she summons the clouds, her sombre and heavily-laden attendants, and bids them slake her thirst, wash away her dust, revive the flagging life of that which sprang into being by the very travail of the patient soil, and through her tears smiles up into the face of her God. But humanity growls on and ceases not, until the sun shines again in the majesty of his golden glory. Humanity sees the change upon Nature's features; how green the grass, how grand the trees, how grateful the grain and the flowers; but says no word of appreciation, utters no word of thanks. Yet great has been the gain which the clouds and the rain have brought, more glowing is Nature as she steps forth from her bath; more striking is the beauty which lifts itself up upon the mount of its transfiguration. more stirring are the wondrous harmonies which rise upon the zephyr, more closely does the earth nestle in the clasp of her loving and watchful Creator. Nature's life is more beautiful because the clouds and rain have visited the earth and blessed it. The sum-

mer days are the many days of human lives. The Father gives them freely, beautifies them without stint, weighs infirmities against duties and even selfishness against gratitude, until He sees forgetfulness to become dangerously near to stupor and complaints leavened with rebellion's antagonism, and then sends the clouds of trouble, that the eyes of His creatures may be lifted toward Him, and the thoughts forced to recognize His authority and His power. They descend and surround, they force humanity to come from without and to enter within; and the errand they do and the message they bring, wring tears, human raindrops, from the eyes, and pours them upon hardened consciences and parched souls. Those clouds are dense and chill; they are black and heavy; they chant a solemn dirge as they toll the knell of death; they hear the cry of anguish, mingled with the questionings of pain; they make no answer, and lift only after many days. But the sun will shine again upon as many as will to see it. Blessings forgotten, but still remaining, brighten with a new rediance; reason calms the turbulence of rebellion into the quiet of faith: and humanity goes to God with the outstretched hand of companionship, though the sob of separation is not yet quite stilled, nor the wound within the heart yet quite healed. But the smile of God is upon the soul, and the chords of the song of coming happiness are faintly heard as they are touched by the fingers of the angels."

The report on Correspondence is from the pen of our able, affable and congenial Companion Most Illustrious John W. Coburn, and is a careful and painstaking review of the proceedings of thirty-one Grand Councils. Ohio for 1904 receives courteous and fraternal notice in a review covering five pages of the printed record. The Committee quotes copiously from the address of M. Ill. Comp. John F. Lane, and seems to find no fault therewith.

He feelingly refers to the death of Comp. S. Stacker Williams and says of him that he was an able, earnest, and faithful worker for over forty years in Masonry.

He justly compliments our beloved Companion Cunningham on his Report on Correspondence for 1904, and quotes his introductory in full.

M. Ill. Comp. Iving L'Hommedieu was re-elected Grand Master, but declined the further honor, and thereupon M. Ill. Comp. Charles Stewart of Brooklyn was elected Grand Master, and R. Ill. Comp. Geo. Van Vliet of New York was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in Troy on August 28th, 1906.

NORTH CAROLINA, 1905.

The Twenty-ninth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of North Carolina was held in the Masonic Hall in the city of Asheville on June 7th, 1905, and was opened in Ample Form by M. Ill. Companion A. B. Andrews, Jr., the presiding Grand Master. All of the Chartered Councils of the state, being five in number, were represented. Two Past Grand Masters and representatives from nine other Grand Jurisdictions were in attendance. M. Ill. Companion W. S. Liddell of Charlotte, Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council, was present. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 23, and a total membership of 210.

The first page contains a portrait of Companion Ferdinand Ulrich, R. Ill. Deputy Grand Master, who died during the year. The Grand Master in his address refers with much feeling to the sudden death of this Illustrious Companion, which occurred in the city of Baltimore on August 8th, 1904, after a brief illness. He reports that the work of the year in that Grand Jurisdiction had not been what it should have been and generously assumes much of the responsibility for the condition of affairs, from the fact that he had not been able to make a single visitation during the year. While the visitations of the Grand Master are usually pleasant affairs in Subordinate Councils, and not infrequently awaken some additional interest in the bodies, yet their prosperity should not depend upon these visitations. It is but seldom that a Grand Master participates in the ceremonies of conferring the degrees, and some of us who have filled that exalted station could not render much assistance if we desired to do so.

We can, however, sit in the East, display our jewelry and look wise, and if the Companions think we are wise, then are our words mighty with them and our visits are not in vain. The Grand Master reports a visit made by him on October 4th, 1904, to the Grand Council of Ohio, at its Annual Assembly in Columbus and seems to have been pleased at the reception accorded him by the

Companions of our Grand Council. We beg to assure our distinguished Companion that the pleasure of his visit was more than half ours. He was then a stranger and we took him in, the next time he will come as a friend and what we will do to him and for him will be sufficient.

We notice there is a custom in this, as in some other Grand Jurisdictions, of issuing Dispensations to receive and ballot upon petitions at Special Assemblies. In our judgment this custom is a bad one. In this instance that part of the Grand Master's address was referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence, which failed to report, and as "silence gives consent", we presume the action of the Grand Master was approved by the Grand Council.

A. B. Andrews, Jr., of Raleigh, was re-elected Grand Master, and James C. Munds of Wilmington was re-elected Grand Recorder.

There is no report on Foreign Correspondence.

The next Assembly will be held at the city of Charlotte on May 9th, 1906.

NORTH CAROLINA, 1906.

This Grand Council met in its Thirtieth Annual Assembly, in the city of Charlotte on May 9th, 1906. A constitutional number of Subordinate Councils being represented, the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form with M. Ill. Companion A. B. Andrews, Jr., presiding as Grand Master, and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Steward, and Grand Sentinel, in their stations. Two Past Grand Masters were present as were the Grand Representatives from eight other Grand Jurisdictions, among the number being M. Ill. Comp. W. S. Liddell, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 80 and a present membership of 290, while the Grand Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$169.48.

The address of the Grand Master is a brief statement of his official acts during the year. Like some of the rest of us, Companion Andrews is a busy man and he admits that he has not been able



to devote as much time to the duties of his office as he desired. The fact, however, that he was continued in office four years is a pretty strong indication that the Companions of his state were entirely satisfied with his efforts.

In opening his address he says:

"The past year has seen much progress in our entire state, and along with it the Cryptic Rite has advanced, and we are now stronger both in number of Councils and members of these bodies, as well as there is more enthusiasm in Council work by the members of this Grand Body."

As in the previous year, he issued a number of Dispensations to receive and act upon petitions at Special Assemblies. He made no official visits during the year, which was a matter of great regret to him. He did, however, find time to make visits to the Amnual Assemblies of the Grand Councils of New York and South Carolina. Companion James Southgate presents a report on Correspondence in which he reviews the proceedings of thirty Grand Jurisdictions.

Ohio for 1905 has a review of a little over two pages. The address of the Grand Master, who happens to be the writer of this report, is referred to with commendation, as is also the report of Companion Cunningham on Foreign Correspondence. He mentions the case of Cincinnati Council No. 1 which had been in existence for three-quarters of a century without a charter, and puts the question to the "actual presence" Companions, as to the legality of the work done by this Council during all these years. As the Grand Council was recognizing this Council from the time of its organization, and was receiving dues from it and profiting by its existence, it could hardly take the position that its work was illegal. In closing his report, Companion Southgate says:

"We have completed a review of thirty states which have come to us, and feel the relief of the way-worn traveler when he reaches his journey's end. We find nothing but hopefulness for the Cryptic Degrees, and we feel sure that the danger line of failure has been passed and that the future is bright with promise of good to them".

Comp. E. B. Neave of Salisbury was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and Comp. James C. Munds of Wilmington was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the city of Greensboro on the 15th day of May, 1907.

OREGON, 1906.

This Grand Council met in its twenty-first Annual Assembly in Salem, on April 11th, 1906. The M. Ill. Grand Master O. A. Dearing being absent, Rt. Ill. Comp. W. W. Dempsey presided in the East. 5 out of 6 chartered Councils in the State were represented and the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form after prayer by the Grand Chaplain. Two Past Grand Masters were present as were 6 representatives from other Grand Jurisdictions. Ill. Comp. A. L. Rumsey of Portland, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, near the Grand Council of Oregon was not present. The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 68 during the year, and a total membership of 357, while the report of the Grand Treasurer showed a balance in his hands of \$326.70.

The address of the M. Ill. Grand Master is very brief, covering but three pages of the record. He calls attention to the fact that the Grand Council of Oregon has now reached its majority in point of years, and congratulates the Companions on the steady and substantial growth that has marked their progress, and the enthusiasm and loyalty which he says is a distinguishing characteristic of the Royal and Select Masters of Oregon.

He very truly says:

"The incomplete structure of Ancient Craft Masonry, built in the Symbolic Lodge and Royal Arch Chapter, can only be completely rounded out and thoroughly understood by those who receive the degrees of Royal Master and Select Master—the eighth and ninth Degrees of the York Rite as given in America with the appendant or honorary degree of Super-Excellent Master, as these Cryptic Degrees furnish the keystone which binds together the Symbolic Arch of Ancient Craft Masonry."

He made a number of official visits during the year, granted two Dispensations to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer degrees out of time, which he says were issued for "good and sufficient reasons."

The committee on doings of Grand Officers reported against

the pre-requisite idea and their report was adopted. \$100.00 was appropriated to defray the expenses of the representative to the General Grand Council.

All representatives of Foreign Jurisdiction who were present were received and welcomed by the Grand Council.

There is no Foreign Correspondence Report.

William A. Dempsey of Portland Oregon was elected M. Ill. Grand Master and Seth L. Pope was re-elected Rt. Ill. Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at Corvallis on April 10th, 1907.

PENNSYLVANIA, 1906.

The Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Pennsylvania convened at New Castle on February 27th, 1906. The Grand Master, Companion George Albert Gorgas presided, and all other Grand Officers were in their stations. Eighteen Subordinate Councils were represented, ten Past Grand Masters were in attendance and representatives were present from twelve other Grand Jurisdictions, Illustrious Companion James B. Youngson of Pittsburg, Ohio's Representative, being among the number.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 275 and a total membership of 3324, while the report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hand of \$2178.16.

If the proceedings correctly report the business of the Grand Council, they were very prompt in refusing the olive branch which was sent out by the General Grand Master, as the proceedings show that his letter was read and the Grand Recorder was ordered to advise him that no action would be taken in reference to the matters referred to in his letter, and all of this before the address of the Grand Master was read, and in fact before the appointment of the committees. How did anybody know at that stage of the proceedings what action might be taken by the Grand Council.

The Grand Master presents a report of great detail covering more that twenty pages which shows that he had a busy year. He reports that the Cryptic Rite in that Jurisdiction has shared in the general prosperity which was manifest throughout the country; that he had visited all but one of the Subordinate Councils of the state and that nearly every one of them had made material progress. He believes that the systematic visitation by the Grand Officers, of the Subordinate Councils of the state has brought about this success. He very truthfully says:

"Those succeed who work and because they work, and the few Councils that are not making material progress are languishing because their officers and members will not work."

In referring to the different ways in which the interests of the Grand Council might be advanced, he very wisely says:

"Another thought is to change the custom of electing a new Grand Master each year. One year's service at the head of the organization is scarcely sufficient to become acquainted with little more than the routine duties. The custom in the other Masonic Bodies is to continue the presiding officer for two years, thus giving him ample time and greater opportunity for advancing the best interests of the Rite."

While we are not in favor of long continued service at the head of Masonic Bodies, we believe that no greater mistake has been made in recent years than the adoption of the modern method of changing the presiding officer of our Grand Bodies, and as well our Subordinate Bodies, every year. It matters not how bright, energetic and ambitious a Grand Master may be, it will take about all of his first year's experience to enable him to properly discharge his trust, and about the time he does become familiar with his duties, he is kicked out and another fellow put in who goes through the same experience. This changing of officers each year is producing more politics in our Grand Bodies than we are accustomed to see in the heat of political campaigns, and we believe that the result is bound to be the lowering of the standard of our official circles.

The state was divided into nine districts and Deputy Grand Masters appointed to supervise them.

In regard to prerequisition he wisely says:

"Frequently during my visitation the question of making the Cryptic Degrees a prerequisite to Knighthood was suggested. To my mind the Grand Council of Pennsylvania should never again suggest that thought. Having passed through the dark and trying years of adversity, we have surmounted every obstacle and

are now on a stable foundation. It would, I think, be humiliating to ask the Grand Commandery to make our Degrees prerequisite after we have shown the Masonic world that we can succeed by simply explaining to our brethren that their Masonic knowledge is incomplete without the Chapter and Council, and that in having these they secure all the essentials of Ancient Craft Masonry."

The Grand Master says that he does not approve of granting Dispensations to act upon petitions without waiting the usual time, and that he dislikes very much to do it, and he then makes the mistake, as we believe, of granting twenty-eight such Dispensations.

He recommended that the Grand Council adopt a rule that no Companion should be permitted to vote, hold office, act as recommender, serve on committees or perform any of the ordinary duties of membership save those of an observer and an assistant in conferring Degrees, until after he had taken the Royal, Select and Super-Excellent degrees. We note however that this recommendation was not concurred in.

The review of proceedings of other Grand Councils is from the pen of Illustrious Companion Frank W. Martenis who is Right Puissant Grand Recorder. Ohio for 1905 receives courteous and fraternal consideration. He publishes a list of Grand Councils showing gains of one hundred or more during the last year. There are sixteen of them with Ohio as usual leading the procession.

Companion Charles W. Wolfertz, of Allentown was elected Most Puissant Grand Master and Companion Frank W. Martenis was re-elected Right Puissant Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at Erie on January 15, 1907.

SOUTH CAROLINA, 1906.

This Grand Council met in its Forty-seventh Annual Assembly at the Masonic Temple in the city of Charleston on February 13th, 1906, and was presided over by the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Companion F. E. Harrison. All of the Subordinate Councils of the State, being six in number, were represented, and the Grand Council was opened in due form. The report of the Grand Recorder

shows a net gain of but one during the year and a total membership of 207. There were representatives present from 12 other Grand Jurisdictions, among the number being Ill. Companion J. T. Barron of Columbia, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council. The committee on Reports of the Grand Recorder and Treasurer, reported a balance in the hands of the Grand Treasurer of \$133.76 and recommended appropriations amounting to \$128.75, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$5.01, not a very heavy balance but probably sufficient.

The Grand Master presents a short address expressing his regret that while Cryptic Masonry seems to be flourishing in most of the other Jurisdictions with whom they have fraternal connections, the progress in South Carolina seems to be slow, and adopts the remarks of another reviewer that "The room for improvement is the largest room in the house." He, however, expresses the hope for better things in the future. He suggests that the companions who hold membership in the Order of Knights Templars use their influence to have the Degrees of Royal and Select Master made a prerequisite to the Orders of Knighthood. This suggestion, however, was not approved by the Grand Council on the ground that the time was not ripe for such a suggestion. The Grand Master was not called upon to render any decisions during the year.

The Foreign Correspondence report is prepared by the Grand Recorder, Ill. Companion Zimmerman Davis, and is a review of the proceedings of 31 Grand Jurisdictions. Companion Davis does not make an extended review of the proceedings which came before him, but he seems to be able to condense what there is in them into a small compass, and gives to the Companions of his Jurisdiction a brief and yet ample report of the doings of other Grand Jurisdictions. Ohio for 1905 receives a full page notice. In speaking of our net gain of 662 the Reviewer says that the Grand Councils of North and South Carolina would be proud if they numbered in all as many members as the net gain in Ohio for one year. Well, Companion Davis, we sincerely wish your membership and that of your sister Grand Jurisdiction, were larger and they ought to be larger than they are, for the Masonic historical associations which cluster about the name of Charleston

ought to be sufficient to inspire every Mason in your state to a notice endeavor to acquire is much knowledge of the fraternity as is possible, and especially not to stop short of the beautiful and Sathime Degrees of the Cryptic Rite. M. III. Companion George S. Mower of Newberry was elected Grand Master and Companion Zimmerman Davis of Charleston was elected Grand Recorder. The Forty-eighth Annual Assembly of this Grand Council will be held at Charleston on February 17th, 1907.

TENNESSEE, 1906.

The Fifty-sixth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Tennessee was held in the city of Nashville on January 29th, 1906. M. Ill. Companion William A. Smith, Grand Master, presided and the other Grand Officers were in their stations. Thirteen out of 18 Subordinate Councils were represented and the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a prosperous year, with a net gain of 107, and a total membership of 662. There were 10 Past Grand Masters in attendance and the representatives of 17 other Grand Jurisdictions, Ohio not being among the number, as our state does not seem to have a Grand Representative near the Grand Council of Tennessee. The Grand Master reports that peace and harmony continue to prevail throughout the Grand Jurisdiction. He issued Dispensations for three new Councils all of which received Charters at this Grand Assembly. He reports visitations by him of all the Councils in Tennessee and says that during the year he assisted in conferring 148 Council Degrees. This is 145 more Council Degrees than we have to confer in Ohio. He recommends appropriations to the Masonic Library Association and the Widows and Orphans Home, which is very commendatory. The Grand Council of Tennessee has a custom of Conferring the Council Degrees at its Annual Assemblies under the authority of some former resolution, and a lengthy communication was received from one of the Subordinate Councils giving, what seems to us very strong reasons, for the repealing of this resolution. The committee on Jurisprudence however, of which M. Ill. Companion Bradford Nichol was chairman, recommended

that the former resolution be continued, with a restriction, that the Grand Council should not receive petitions from or confer Degrees upon Candidates who reside within 25 miles of a Subordinate Council, and that dues be charged by the Grand Council against Companions upon whom it confers Degrees, at such rate as the Grand Council may adopt.

The proceedings show that the report of the Committee on Ways and Means which was adopted, recommended that the minimum fee for the Degrees in that Jurisdiction remain at \$5.00. Immediately following this report is a resolution which was adopted providing that the Grand Council shall charge \$10.00 for the Degrees when it confers them, and that the fee be turned over to the Council to whom the member attaches himself. This seems to have satisfactorily settled the troublesome question.

The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hand of \$385.64.

The Correspondence Report is from the pen of M. Ill. Companion M. F. Flenniken whom we had the pleasure of meeting in Boston lately. The Ohio proceedings for the years 1904 and 1905 are reviewed. He pays the writer of this report a great compliment by saying that the front page of the 1905 proceedings is "adorned" with his photogravure. Thanks awfully.

Referring to our net gain of 662 in 1905, he says that this gain if small for Ohio, is larger than the entire membership of the Grand Council of Tennessee. This is true Companion Flenniken, but your Companions must not get discouraged for you have heard that "Great oaks from little acorns" etc.

In his concluding remarks he says that in his reviews he has been struck with the wide diversity of terms used in designating the Degrees conferred, and suggested that this should have the attention of the General Grand Council at its next Triennial. Our recollection however, is that the General Grand Council did not consider the matter.

Andrew P. Trogden of Sparta was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and William A. Clendening of Nashville was elected Grand Recorder.

The Fifty-seventh Annual Assembly will be held in Nashville on January 28th, 1907.

VERMONT, 1905.

This Grand Council held its fifty-second Annual Assembly in the city of Burlington on June 13th, 1905, the M. Ill. Grand Master, Companion George F. Flanders presiding and all the other officers except two, in their stations. Representatives from fourteen of the seventeen Subordinate Councils of the state were present as were Grand Representatives from eighteen other Jurisdictions. Ill. Comp. Frank A. Phillips of Randolph, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, was not in attendance. The Grand Recorder's report shows a total membership of 1295 and a loss of four during the current year. The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hand of \$951.22. The address of the Grand Master covers but four pages of the record and is a brief statement of the year's work. He reports that owing to sickness he had been unable to discharge his duties as he had hoped to do. He made no decision and no visitations during the year. Of the condition of the Rite in that Grand Jurisdiction, he says:

"So far as I can learn we have not a dormant Council, all are doing a good amount of work and I think the past year shows an average of work equal to almost any other, and peace and harmony prevail throughout the Jurisdiction."

The report of the Committee on Correspondence is from the pen of Companion Marsh O. Perkins who gives to Ohio three pages of courteous review. He quotes from our tribute to the memory of Companion S. Stacker Williams and says of him:

"His reports on Correspondence were not only read and favorably commented upon, but they gave him a commanding position at the round table. He was the Venerable President of the Masonic Veterans of Ohio for twelve years, and was President of the National Association. His loss is confined to no narrow jurisdictional bounds, but is felt and deplored in many a Masonic circle."

Companion Orville C. Baker of Brandon was elected M. Ill. Grand Master and Companion Henry H. Ross was re-elected Grand Recorder, Companion Marsh O. Perkins being continued as Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence.

VERMONT, 1906.

The fifty-third Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Vermont, was held in the city of Burlington on June 12th, 1906 with all of the Grand Officers, except the Grand Marshall, in their respective stations, M. Ill. Companion Orville C. Baker presiding. Twelve Subordinate Councils were represented, twenty-five permanent members were present and nineteen Grand Representatives were in attendance. Ill. Companion Frank A. Phillip of Randolph, Ohio's Grand Representative, not being among the number. We notice however, that our old friend and Companion Martin H. Rice was there. and Martin H. had a great time for he afterwards told us so. The Grand Recorder's report shows a net increase during the year of 24 and a total membership of 1219. The report of Companion Charles H. Heaton, Grand Treasurer, shows a balance in his hands of \$1119.86. The Grand Master presents a very short report of his year's work. Among other things he says:

"One thing needful to a greater success in Council work is work; work of an impressive character that shall awaken the latent energies of every Royal Arch Mason to the beauties and importance of taking the Council Degrees before proceeding to Templar Degrees."

Ill. Companion Marsh O. Perkins presents the report of the Committee on Correspondence and if we are any judge of such matters he presents a very good one. Of Ohio for 1905 he says the printed proceedings have an added interest because they are introduced by a fine likeness of the Grand Master, who happens to be the writer of this report. If Companion Perkins could see the original, the likeness, which seems to have so impressed him, would pale into insignificance. He quotes from the report of M. Ill. Comp. Cunningham on Correspondence and in bidding adieu to our venerable and beloved Companion, says:

"A masterly report on correspondence again appears from the hand of Past Grand Master William M. Cunningham, whom we regret to find now retires, because of other duties, from further activity in this line of Cryptic effort."

While we have succeeded, for the time being, our venerable Companion, we sincerely regret that he felt forced to retire, and we can saidly understand the regret that must come to the members of the Reportural built when one from whom they have so long been underly Massian trads and information, is obliged to attached its work.

Companion decorps F. Boot of Newport was elected M. Ill. Grand Master and companion Henry H. Ross was re-elected Grand Recorder, while Companion Marsh O. Perkins is again Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence.

The next Annua Assembly will be held on Tuesday evening June 11th, 19.7, but where?

WASHINGTON, 1905.

The published proceedings of this Grand Council come to us in a pamphlet of 55 pages, facing the title page of which is an excellent half-tone of the retiring Grand Master. The Grand Council was convened in its tenth Annual Assembly in the city of Bellingham on June 20th, 1905 with M. Ill. Comp. J. Edmund Cates, Grand Master, presiding, and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Chaplain, present. A constitutional number, in fact, of all the Subordinate Councils of the State being represented, the M. Ill. Grand Master, assisted by the Grand Officers, proceeded to open the Grand Council in Ample Form, after which the Grand Representatives, from other Jurisdictions, being 15 in number, were introduced and received with grand honors Our own Past M. Ill. Grand Master, Comp. John B. Romans of Seattle, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio, near that Grand Council, was not in attendance.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 40, and a total membership of 596.

The address of the Grand Master covers 9 pages of the record. He says that in visiting the various Councils he has found a general state of inactivity; that what work is done is by a few earnest Companions who recognize the beauties of the Order. He places the responsibility for much of this upon the Grand Council because of its inactivity. He made a number of visitations during the year, continued the Dispensation of Vancouver Council, U. D. and granted some Special Dispensations. One of these was to a

Council authorizing it to receive and ballot on petitions at a Special Assembly after due notice to all the members. The Committee on Reports of Grand Officers, to whom this part of the Grand Master's address was referred, recommended that his action be not approved, as it was contrary to the provisions of the bylaws, but the matter was subsequently referred to the incoming Committee on Jurisprudence. He arrested the Charter of one Council where it seemed that the Companions were entirely willing to have the arrest made.

The report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hands of \$259.71.

A Charter was granted to Vancouver Council as No. 10.

Ill. Companion Edward R. Hare writes the report on Foreign Correspondence in which he reviews the proceedings of 31 Jurisdictions which he does in 14 pages. Ohio for 1904 is given fifteen lines in which the proceedings of that Grand Assembly are briefly reviewed.

M. Ill. Companion Richard J. Graham of Seattle was elected Grand Master and Rt. Ill. Companion Edward R. Hare of Tacoma was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Spokane on June 19th, 1907.

WISCONSIN, 1906.

This Grand Council convened in its Forty-ninth Annual Assembly in the city of Milwaukee on February 20th, 1906. More than a constitutional number of the Subordinate Councils of the State being represented, the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form by M. Ill. Grand Master Jacob Dreher assisted by the other Grand Officers.

Three Past Grand Masters and the Representatives from thirteen other Grand Jurisdictions were in attendance. We notice, however, that Ill. Companion Fred Ring of La Crosse, the Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Ohio near that Grand Council was not present.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain of 244

during the year and a total membership of 2074, while the report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance on hand of \$800.25.

The Grand Master reports the granting of three Special Dispensations to transact business and confer Degrees, and states that one of them was to hold a "Stated Assembly" for that purpose. We do not quite understand why a Dispensation should be needed to hold a Stated Assembly. He constituted one new Council by proxy, issued one Dispensation for a new Council and called in the Charters of seven old Councils. He reports the printing and distribution to the Subordinate Councils of the Ritual of that Jurisdiction. Under the head of "Dormant Councils", and referring to the difficulty in stimulating them to action, he says:

"In order to avoid all such troubles, and to relieve these Companions from the burden of maintaining Councils, I would recommend that Councils be located at the following places in this Grand Jurisdiction: Superior, Ashland, Beloit, Madison, Milwaukee two, Racine, LaCrosse, Stevens Point, Green Bay, Mauston, Beaver Dam, Hudson, Chippewa Falls, and such other places as may be deemed advisable by the committee; that all Jurisdictional lines be done away with, and that the Charters and property of all other Councils in the State be called in or revoked. In this way the territory of each Council would be widened, and enough material could be procured to maintain live Councils at the places designated".

Well, this might be one way to revive the waning interest in Cryptic Masonry in a Jurisdiction, but we doubt if it is the best way. In the face of this recommendation the Grand Master constituted one Council, and issued a Dispensation for another, at places other than those mentioned by him as suitable places for Councils. This recommendation seems to have been referred to a special committee to report at the next Annual Assembly. A resolution, however, was afterwards adopted giving all Subordinate Councils in the state concurrent territorial Jurisdiction. The constitution was so amended as to give the Grand Master the right to revoke the Charter of any Council which does not confine itself, in the conferring of the Degrees of Royal, Select and Super-Excellent Master, to the dignity and decorum intended by the ritual. This is right, for there is no place in Masonry for "tom-foolery" or "horse-play".

Owing to the illness of Companion William C. Swain, who presented the report on Foreign Correspondence for a number of years,

the report this year is prepared by the retiring Grand Master, M. Ill. Companion Jacob Dreher. There having been no report since 1902, he had a heavy task before him and did not succeed in reviewing all of the proceedings to date. He, however, went through forty-seven of them, which, to say the least, was quite a task.

Ohio for the years 1903 and 1904 receives fraternal mention in a review of three pages. The Reviewer makes no comment either for or against the work of our Grand Council, but confines himself strictly to a brief statement of what was done. He compliments M. Ill. Companion Cunningham on his reports and quotes the conclusion of his 1904 report.

Companion Henry Smith of Milwaukee was elected M. Ill. Grand Master, and Companion William W. Perry of Milwaukee, was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the city of Milwaukee on February 19th, 1907.

CONCLUSION.

In reviewing the foregoing Proceedings, your Committee has been amazed by the number of Dispensations which have been issued to receive petitions, ballot thereon and confer Degrees at times other than those prescribed by law. This has been the case in nearly every Grand Jurisdiction. We do not understand why the rule which is enforced in the Lodge should be set aside in the Council. If it were a question purely of qualification of candidates, it might be said that having passed the test in the Lodge and Chapter, they were certainly qualified to become members of the Council, but it is not solely a question of qualification. Every member of the Council has the same right to say who his associates and Companions shall be as has a member of the Lodge, and if the Grand Master by his Dispensation allows petitions to be received and balloted on at Special Meetings and out of time, a Companion has no protection against the railroading through of candidates which may be objectionable to him.

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

The hour having arrived for the convening of the Grand Council, the Grand Officers and Representatives assembled in the lobby of the Neil House, and were escorted to the Masonic Temple by a delegation of the Companions of Columbus Council No. 8, Royal and Select Masters.

Opening Exercises.

The Seventy-Eighth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio, was held in the Masonic Temple, in the City of Columbus, Ohio, Tuesday, October 1st, A. D. 1907, Y. D. 2907.

The Grand Recorder, as chairman of the Committee on Credentials, reported all the Grand Officers, and Eighteen Past Grand Masters, present, and all but one of the Subordinate Councils duly represented. Whereupon Most Illustrious Grand Master Edward H. Archer, with the assistance of the following Grand Officers, viz:

the Most Illustrious Grand Master declared the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio opened in its Seventy-Eighth Annual Assembly, for the transaction of business.

Address of Welcome.

Most Illustrious Past Grand Master, Orestes A. B. Senter, representing the Companions of the City of Columbus, welcomed the Grand Council of Ohio to the "Capital City" in the following address:

Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companions of the Grand Council of Ohio:

Upon entering the outer door of the Grand Council just now I was informed that the Companion appointed to make an address of welcome to you was absent, and was requested to act in his stead.

No doubt our absent Companion has carefully prepared an eloquent address of welcome, but without preparation and a gift of oratory, on behalf of Columbus Council and of the entire Masonic Fraternity of our City, I do most cordially and sincerely welcome you to our City and Temple.

We trust that our efforts to show our appreciation of your presence, and extend to you our hospitality may merit your commendation. We welcome you as does the bright sunshine of this beautiful October day, and hope your proceedings may be filled with the bright sunshine of harmony and good will, and your legislation prove of great benefit to the Cryptic Rite.

We who have grown gray in the service of our Grand Council extend the right hand of fellowship and encouragement to the younger Companions of the Grand Council, who are just beginning to follow in our footsteps, and we have full confidence in the belief that the younger Companions will extend the warm hand of Companionship to the veteran Companions of our Grand Council who have labored so zealously in its behalf for many years past.

Response

Which was ably responded to by Past Most Illustrious Grand Master Nelson Williams.

Most Illustrious Grand Master, Most Illustrious Companion Orestes A. B. Senter, and Companions of the Grand Council:

In rising to respond to the address of welcome to which we have just listened, and the courteous and fraternal invitation to once more enjoy the hospitalities of our Columbus Companions, it occurs to me that it may not be amiss, or uninteresting to take a brief retrospect of the Grand Body which has thus been welcomed to this hospitable city. It may be a little unusual, but will surely do no harm.

There has been much speculation as to the origin of the degrees of the Cryptic Rite, and the question has not been satisfactorily settled up to the present time. By some it is contended that they were originally under the jurisdiction of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite. Others deny this. Our own M. Ill. Companion Cunningham, in his Masonic research, has discovered what he believes to be evidence of the pre-American existence of Cryptic Masonry. This proposition is strongly disputed by eminent Masonic Scholars, and so it is futile for one of ordinary Masonic information to either assert or deny the correctness of the claims made by those who have made a study of the question. We do, however, know that at about the time of the organization of the Grand Council of Ohio, the Supreme Council of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of the United States of America, was claiming jurisdiction over the degrees of Royal Master and Select Master, and that all of the five Councils which united to form this Grand Council held Charters or Warrants from this Supreme Body there can be but little question. We know that the Councils at Cincinnati, Steubenville and Granville held such warrants, signed by John Barker as General Agent of the Supreme Council of the A. & A. Scottish Rite of the United States, and as the Councils at Lancaster and Chillicothe were organized at about the same

time there can hardly be a question as to their being organized under the same authority. Some of these Councils were organized in the latter part of the year 1827 and others in the early part of the year 1828. The first action taken by either of these Councils looking to the formation of this Grand Council, was on October 20th, 1829, when a resolution was adopted by Cincinnati Council No. 1 declaring it expedient to appoint one delegate to attend a convention to meet at Worthington on the second Thursday of January 1830, in order to form a Constitution for a Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters for the State of Ohio. At the same time a Committee of two was appointed to confer with the other Councils of the State and urge them to send delegates to this proposed convention.

This convention was held on Wednesday, the 6th day of January, 1830, instead of the second Thursday as provided in the Resolution adopted by Cincinnati Council, and was attended by representatives from each of the five Councils in the State.

A resolution was adopted finding it expedient to form a Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters in the State, and a Committee was appointed to draft and report a Constitution for its government and the government of the subordinate Councils within its jurisdiction. The report of the Committee was read, amended and adopted at an adjourned session held the same day. Thereupon the Convention proceeded to the election of Grand officers to serve until the next stated Assembly of the Grand Council in January 1831. These officers took their proper stations, the Convention was dissolved, and a Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters was regularly opened according to ancient form and usage.

The proceedings of the Convention were ratified and confirmed, and the Constitution adopted by it was recognized and received as the Constitution of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio. By-Laws of the Grand Council and General Regulations for the government of Councils of Royal and Select Masters were adopted. A resolution was also adopted directing that the Warrants under which the several

A reference to the report will show that we now have enrolled 156 inmates, and we are now making an addition to our building, the expense of which will be met by contributions from the Scottish Rite Bodies of the State, which will enable us to largely increase the number we can care for without increasing to any considerable extent the cost of their maintenance. This addition we hope to have ready for use by the first of next year.

Thanks to the liberality of the Masonic Grand Bodies, and the individual members of the Order, we are able to report that our income has practically met our expenses, the deficit being much less than heretofore, and that the natural increase of membership and the consequent increase in per capita taxes on members of the Lodges and Chapters of the State will, we believe, prevent any deficit whatever in succeeding years.

I am also pleased to inform you that the permanent or endowment fund has had a very substantial increase since last year and now amounts to \$74,149.33. This is all invested in interest bearing securities and the interest as it falls due is added to the principal, so that the fund ought to grow rapidly if increased from year to year by contributions as liberal as made in the past by the various Grand Bodies.

The Trustees have therefore delegated me to ask this Grand Body to donate out of your abundance from the balance in your treasury such an amount as you feel warranted in giving and particularly to help us in building up the endowment fund to make it some day sufficient to support the institution from its increment alone.

To those of you who have never visited the Home we earnestly urge you to take this opportunity of doing so. It is only a few miles away and a personal visit and inspection will give you a better conception of its beauty and usefulness than any mere report. To one and all we extend an invitation to visit it at any time you can do so. You will come away from such a visit with gladdened hearts that the great fraternity is doing so much to relieve the distresses of the unfortunate and to care for the children of our dead brethren.

1857 to one at San Francisco, California; in 1857 to Councils at Beloit, Janesville and Madison, Wisconsin; and in 1867 to a Council at Virginia City, Montana. The Grand Council of Ohio has, therefore, had much to do in promoting the Cryptic Rite in other states and in the formation of other Grand Councils.

Three-quarters of a century has passed since the handfull of pioneer Companions, having the courage of their convictions, first assembled to form this Grand Council, and today behold the change. The organization which was then only as an unobserved streamlet rippling through the forest groves, has become a great river of light, bearing upon its bosom the hopes and aspirations of this great army of good men and true, and carrying blessings and smiles to all who drink from its swelling tide. It is today the largest Grand Council in the world, and its annual increase in membership is such that it is destined to long occupy this proud position.

The secret of our success lies in the honest, earnest work of our Companions, and in the effort on the part of the officers of our subordinate Councils to establish and maintain the highest possible proficiency in ritualism, never losing sight of the fact that ritualism, even though perfect, is but the shell, and that the substance is in the principles which lie buried deep in the heart.

We are not vain-glorious because of our present proud position, but our earnest wish is that Cryptic Masonry throughout the world may thrive and prosper, and that other jurisdictions may be blessed with abundant prosperity making it necessary for us to be ever on the alert to retain the prestige we now have.

And now Companion Senter, on behalf of the Grand Council to which I have thus briefly referred, and speaking for its Grand Master, I thank you for your words of welcome, and assure you that we appreciate most highly the fraternal consideration which has ever been shown us by the Cryptic Masons of Columbus. We are not strangers to you, for in 1831 we first assembled in your midst, and since its organization the Grand

Council has met twenty-four times in your city. We accept the hospitality you so generously tender and will endeavor to so bemean ourselves while among you as to bring no reproach upon the order and cause you no regret that you have invited us here.

Kindly convey to the Companions whom you represent the fraternal salutations of this Grand Council, and its earnest wish for their continued prosperity and happiness.

It becomes my sad duty to make official announcement that death has entered the circle of our Past Grand Officers, and claimed Most Illustrious Companion,

DAVID C. WINEGARNER

Past Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio, who passed away at his home in Newark, Ohio, June 17, 1907.

Most Illustrious Companion Winegarner was born in Gratiot, Muskingum County, Ohio, November 6, 1833; he located permanently in Newark in 1860. Companion Winegarner was made a Master Mason in Newark Lodge No. 97, October 18, 1878, and at the first election held thereafter, was elected Treasurer of the Lodge. In 1880 he became Senior Warden, and in 1881 Worshipful Master, serving in the latter office for three years; he was then elected Treasurer again, and served until the time of his death.

He received the Royal Arch degree in Warren Chapter No. 6 of Newark on February 3, 1879, was elected King of the Chapter at the ensuing election, and after serving in this office for three years, was in 1882 elected High Priest; at the end of this term he was elected Treasurer of the Chapter and was serving as such at the time of his death.

The order of High Priesthood was conferred upon him in October, 1883.

On March 5, 1879, he was made a Royal and Select Master in Bigelow Council No. 7 of Newark, and in 1880 was elected Principal Conductor of the Work, which office he filled for three years; he was then chosen Thrice Illustrious Master and served two years, after which he was again elected Principal Conductor of the Work and served for twenty years.

In 1882 Companion Winegarner was elected to the third office in the Grand Council, two years later was promoted to the second, and in 1886 was elevated to the office of Most Illustrious Grand Master, and re-elected in 1887.

Companion Winegarner was created a Knight Templar in Newark Commandery No. 34, April 22, 1879, and in 1880 and 1881 served as Junior Warden, in 1882 and 1883 as Prelate, in 1884 became Eminent Commander, serving two years. On the organization of St. Luke's Commandery in November 1886, he was appointed Eminent Commander, and at the next election was chosen Prelate and served as such until his death.

Companion Winegarner received the Ineffable Grades, 4th to 18th inclusive in Enoch Lodge of Perfection, Franklin Council, Princes of Jerusalem and Columbus Chapter of Rose Croix May 18-19th, 1882, and the Consistorial degrees in Ohio Consistory, March 15th, 1883.

At the session of the Supreme Council N. M. J., held at Boston, Mass., September 15th, 1885, he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General (33 degree) and elected an honorary member of that body.

In civil life Companion Winegarner commanded the confidence and respect of his fellowcitizens. For a number of years he held public offices of trust, serving 15 years as a member of the Board of Education of the City of Newark, and as Mayor for four years.

A good man and true has been called to his reward.

Past Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council Royal and Select Masters of the State of Ohio, who passed away at his home in Newark, Ohio, June 17, 1907.

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He received the Royal Arch degree in Warren Chapter No. 6 of Newark on February 3, 1879, was elected King of the Chapter at the ensuing election, and after serving in this office for three years, was in 1882 elected High Priest; at the end of this term he was elected Treasurer of the Chapter and was serving as such at the time of his death.

The order of High Priesthood was conferred upon him in October, 1883.

On March 5, 1879, he was made a Royal and Select Master in Bigelow Council No. 7 of Newark, and in 1880 was elected Principal Conductor of the Work, which office he filled for three years; he was then chosen Thrice Illustrious Master and served two years, after which he was again elected Principal Conductor of the Work and served for twenty years.

In 1882 Companion Winegarner was elected to the third office in the Grand Council, two years later was promoted to the second, and in 1886 was elevated to the office of Most Illustrious Grand Master, and re-elected in 1887.

Companion Winegarner was created a Knight Templar in Newark Commandery No. 34, April 22, 1879, and in 1880 and 1881 served as Junior Warden, in 1882 and 1883 as Prelate, in 1884 became Eminent Commander, serving two years. On the organization of St. Luke's Commandery in November 1886, he was appointed Eminent Commander, and at the next election was chosen Prelate and served as such until his death.

Companion Winegarner received the Ineffable Grades, 4th to 18th inclusive in Enoch Lodge of Perfection, Franklin Council, Princes of Jerusalem and Columbus Chapter of Rose Croix May 18-19th, 1882, and the Consistorial degrees in Ohio Consistory, March 15th, 1883.

At the session of the Supreme Council N. M. J., held at Boston, Mass., September 15th, 1885, he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General (33 degree) and elected an honorary member of that body.

In civil life Companion Winegarner commanded the confidence and respect of his fellowcitizens. For a number of years he held public offices of trust, serving 15 years as a member of the Board of Education of the City of Newark, and as Mayor for four years.

A good man and true has been called to his reward.

These splendid achievements have been aided by the harmonious and united solicitude of Craft, Royal Arch, Cryptic and Templar Masons of this Jurisdiction, and a continuance of these conditions and of this spirit will maintain and increase the standing, worth and opportunities of Cryptic Masonry. Annual Inspections and visits have been productive of much good and have done much to place us in our present exalted position, and, therefore, their continuance is earnestly recommended. All of the Inspectors have promptly and faithfully performed the duties assigned them and have made reports thereof, which are herewith submitted.

The Grand Council having authorized and appointed a committee for the purpose of procuring and presenting to the retiring Grand Master a Past Grand Master's Jewel, Most Illustrious Past Grand Master W. T. Dispensations for New Councils.

On April 17th, 1907, I received a petition from Companion Otto B. Cornell and eleven other Companions, all Royal and Select Masters, residing in Westerville, Franklin County, Ohio, praying for a Dispensation empowering them to form, open and

hold, according to the usages of the order, a regular Council of Royal and select Masters, to be located in Westerville, and to be known as Zabud Council U. D. The petition was accompanied with the necessary fee, dimits and consent of neighboring Councils and the recommendation of Columbus Council No. 8, Royal and Select Masters: also a statement of the possible future prospects.

On April 20th, 1907. I issued said Dispensation to said petitioning Companions to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said village of Westerville, to be known as Zabud Council U. D., with Otto B. Cornell, Thrice Illustrious Master; C. L. Brundage, Deputy Illustrious Master, and E. Horlocker, Principal Conductor of Work. On April 29th, 1907, I visited Westerville and duly organized said Council U. D. with a full corps of officers, on which occasion the officers of said Council U. D. conferred the degrees in a very satisfactory manner. I again visited said Council U. D. on August 7th, 1907, at which time the work was well done. The petition and records are herewith submitted with recommendation for favorable consideration.

On May 22nd, 1907, I received a petition from Companion Walter W. Hamilton and ten other Companions, all Royal and Select Masters, residing in Washington Court House, Fayette County, Ohio, praying for a Dispensation empowering them to form, open and hold, according to the usages of the Order, a regular Council of Royal and Select Masters, to be located in the city of Washington C. H., and to be known as Fayette Council U. D. The petition was accompanied by the necessary fee, dimits and consents of nearest Councils and the consent and recommendation of London Council No. 41, Royal and Select Masters.

On May 24th, 1907, I issued said Dispensation to said petitioning Companions to form, open and hold a Council of Royal and Select Masters in said city of Washington Court House, to be known as Fayette Council U. D., with Walter W. Hamilton, Thrice Illustrious Master; Carns E. Lloyd, Deputy Illustrious Master, and Arthur T. Baldwin, Principal Conductor of the

Work. In due time I issued my proxy to Companion W. E. Evans, R. Illustrious Grand Recorder, to organize said Council U. D., and Companion Evans reported that on June 5th, 1907, said Council U. D. was duly organized with a full corps of officers. It was my privilege and pleasure to meet the Companions of this Council on July 3rd, 1907, and witness the conferring of degrees by the regular officers on twenty-one candidates. The work, paraphanalia and apartments are all up to the requisite standard. The petition and records are herewith submitted with recommendation for favorable consideration.

Ritual Committee.

To assist in the preparation of revision of the Ritual, I requested Companion Lewis P. Schaus to meet with and aid in the work, and have, for that purpose, added him to the committee.

Following the order and direction made by this Grand Council, a revised standard ritual of the Council Degrees with the appendant Honorary Degree, containing the Esoteric and Monitorial Work, was by said committee, formulated, printed and bound, and are now in the custody of the R. Illustrious the Grand Recorder. Each Officer of the Grand Council, and each Past Grand Master, have been likewise furnished a copy, for which their receipts are held by the Grand Recorder. Future distributions of the Ritual are to be made on the requisition of the Most Illustrious Grand Master in pursuance of the laws and regulations of this Grand Council.

On July 25th, 1907, I received certified copies of the records of the proceedings and actions of Wyoming Council No. 77, and Cincinnati Council No. 1, Royal and Select Masters, under Resolution Number Fifteen, providing for the consolidation of



Code of Statutes and Regulations.

Proceeding under the authority given by the action of the Grand Council at the Seventy-seventh Annual Assembly, to revise and rearrange the Constitution and By-Laws and prepare a Code of Regulations, I appointed as a committee for that purpose:

Companion Nelson Williams, Past Grand Master, Chairman Companion Levi C. Goodale, Past Grand Master Companion Jacob H. Bromwell, Past T. Ill. Master

Said committee prepared a revision and rearrangement of the Constitution and By-Laws and a Code of Statutes and Regulations for the government of this Grand Council and its subordinates, embodying therein the Forms and Ceremonies heretofore adopted. Said report is herewith submitted with recommendation that the same be referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence for its consideration and report to this Annual Assembly for its action thereon at this session.



Laws or Decisions of this Grand Council, the Rule of the Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons, and Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, in so far as applicable, governs.

Held: That the purpose of a Dispensation is to relieve against some circumstance or event, happening by reason of accident or unforeseen cause or emergency, and cannot be extended to annul the ordinary force of a rule of the Grand Council;

Therefore: The Grand Master cannot, by Dispensation, suspend the rule requiring petitions for the degrees or membership to be received and balloted for at a Stated Assembly.

Nor: To authorize the election of officers at a Special Assembly preceding the time fixed by the Constitution and the By-Laws of a Council.

Nor: By Dispensation, suspend the By-Laws of a Council.

Held: That a By-Law of a Council providing for Annual Election of Officers, other than at the Assembly preceding or succeeding St. John the Evangelist's Day is in conflict with Section Five of the Constitution, and is therefore void.

Held: That the Rank, Title and Prerogative of a Past Thrice Illustrious Master, although acquired as the result of an irregular election, he having served his term for which he was elected, unquestioned and unchallenged, cannot be annulled, rescinded or taken away by any action of a Subordinate body of which he is a member.

Visitations.

During the year I have personally visited the following Councils:

Bigelow, No. 7; Reece, No. 9; Wright, No. 96; Cleveland, No. 36; Steubenville, No. 2; Toledo, No. 33; Marion, No. 22; Dela-

ware, No. 84; London, No. 41; Chillicothe, No. 4; Circleville, No. 60; Kinsman, No. 76; Zabud, U. D. and Favette, U. D.

Very much to my regret I was prevented from visiting Cincinnati. No. 1, by reason of the high water at that time. I have been present at all save one of the Assemblies of Columbus Council No. 8. On the occasion of each and all of my visits I was received by the Companions with the cordial and fraternal greetings due to the honored station of Grand Master. Their hospitality and social amenities evidenced their loyal love and admiration for the pleasures and enjoyments of this select brotherhood and companionship, and evidenced the fact that its true realization can only come to those who are so honored and favored.

Conclusion.

The work of the year is now before you, and, by you, to be reviewed. I wish to extend my most cordial thanks to my associate Grand Officers for their support and hearty co-operation in the accomplishments of the year; especially do I thank the never tiring and always aiding genial Grand Recorder Evans for his able assistance and advice. My association with you all in the service of the year's work never can be forgotten by him whom you have so lovally supported.

To you, the Representatives of the Subordinate Councils, I beg you receive and communicate to your Companions, one and all, my gratitude and hearty thanks for the great work you have, this year, wrought. In a few hours I shall surrender to my successor the trust which has been in my keeping, and I bespeak for him the same unwavering loyal support you have given me, and for the honors bestowed by you, I am, and always will be, yours to command.

ILLUSTRIOUS COMPANIONS:

It is with pleasure I submit my fifteenth annual report to this Grand Body. We have had another prosperous year, with sixty-six Chartered Councils and two Councils Under Dispensation, viz: Zabud at Westerville and Fayette at Washington C. H. now on the rolls, with a total membership of 10,261, showing an increase over last year of 1,094, the largest gain in the history of the Grand Council. All reports were in my hands in good time, a few of them slow, but none delinquent, and only a small per-

centage of them requiring sending back for corrections, which speaks well for the several Recorders; every Council Advanced Candidates this year, 64 Councils show gains over last year, and only 4 Councils show loss, and this loss in two of them was caused by members withdrawing to join some new Council, the loss in the other two was caused by Suspension for Non-payment of Dues. Report of the Trustee of the Masonic Home

To the Most Illustrious Grand Council.
COMPANIONS:

As the printed report of the Board of Trustees for the year ending July 31, 1907, has been placed in the hands of all the members of the Grand Council, it is unnecessary for me to go into any statement of detail or statistics, but I will merely say that the Board hopes you will give it a careful examination and scrutiny and make any suggestions that may occur to you for the betterment of the Home.

Nothing of exceptional interest has occurred in its affairs during the past year but it has gone on in its work of beneficence, doing your mission of assisting the old, the poor, and unfortunate brethren, their wives and widows, who are fast approaching their final journey to the unknown home, and the little children of our brethren are being provided for and trained to meet the care and responsibilities of life which they must assume on leaving the Home. In this great work we have had the conscientious and intelligent superintendence of Brother John W. Parsons and his estimable wife.

A reference to the report will show that we now have enrolled 156 inmates, and we are now making an addition to our building, the expense of which will be met by contributions from the Scottish Rite Bodies of the State, which will enable us to largely increase the number we can care for without increasing to any considerable extent the cost of their maintenance. This addition we hope to have ready for use by the first of next year.

Thanks to the liberality of the Masonic Grand Bodies, and the individual members of the Order, we are able to report that our income has practically met our expenses, the deficit being much less than heretofore, and that the natural increase of membership and the consequent increase in per capita taxes on members of the Lodges and Chapters of the State will, we believe, prevent any deficit whatever in succeeding years.

I am also pleased to inform you that the permanent or endowment fund has had a very substantial increase since last year and now amounts to \$74,149.33. This is all invested in interest bearing securities and the interest as it falls due is added to the principal, so that the fund ought to grow rapidly if increased from year to year by contributions as liberal as made in the past by the various Grand Bodies.

The Trustees have therefore delegated me to ask this Grand Body to donate out of your abundance from the balance in your treasury such an amount as you feel warranted in giving and particularly to help us in building up the endowment fund to make it some day sufficient to support the institution from its increment alone.

To those of you who have never visited the Home we earnestly urge you to take this opportunity of doing so. It is only a few miles away and a personal visit and inspection will give you a better conception of its beauty and usefulness than any mere report. To one and all we extend an invitation to visit it at any time you can do so. You will come away from such a visit with gladdened hearts that the great fraternity is doing so much to relieve the distresses of the unfortunate and to care for the children of our dead brethren.

On behalf of the Trustees I request that you will cause your Recorder to make the usual excerpts from the printed report and publish the same in your Annual Proceedings.

OUR VISITORS

Kilwinning Lodge.

September 2, 1906, we were favored with a visit from the members of Kilwinning Lodge, No. 456, of Cincinnati, accompanied by their families; a large number were present, and so thoroughly enjoyed themselves that they promised to come again soon, which we trust they will do, assuring them of a welcome.

The Grand Lodge.

October 10, 1906, the members of the Grand Lodge, accompanied by their ladies, came over from Columbus by special train, about 800 being present. Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, the visit was a success. They were greeted on their entrance with a song of welcome by the children, and a happy speech from Bro. W. B. Melish, of the Board of Trustees.

- The Home was thrown open in all its departments, and a

thorough nispection made thereof, and, judging from the expressions heard, they were not disappointed, but were, on the contrary, charmed with our beautiful Home. It was the first visit of many of the members, and we are sure that none went away dissatisfied or feeling that their money had not been well invested and bringing in good results.

Reed Commandery, No. 6, K. T., Dayton.

Every summer Reed Commandery honors us with a visit, sometimes in the evening, other years in the afternoon and evening. This was picnic year, when they came early in the afternoon, June 26th, bringing provisions for all in the Home as well as for themselves, in great abundance, prepared by the ladies of the Commandery. Also tobacco for the men, candy for the women and children, all sorts of amusing games for the little ones. These games were played on the lawns, the Sir Knights taking as much pleasure in them as the children themselves. A first class band accompanied the party, giving us excellent music at intervals during their entire stay. Tables were spread on the lawns and at 6 o'clock supper was called, and of course everybody responded promptly. All the good things imaginable were there in plenty, to which full justice was done. In the evening the dining room was cleared of tables and soon filled with merry dancers.

In the midst of the festivities, Grand Master Horace A. Irwin was called upon for a speech, to which he responded in his usual happy manner. Appropriate remarks were also made by Sir Knights Eberhardt, Flotren, Marshall and Johnston, the Superintendent of the Home returning thanks for the visit and the liberality of the members of Reed and their ladies.

These events have become quite a feature of our Home life, and are looked forward to with pleasant anticipation by all of the Home people.

Entertainment by the Children.

The Scottish Rite bodies of Columbus invited the children of the Home to visit that city on the 30th of November, 1906, and give an entertainment in the Masonic Temple, all the expenses of the trip, including transportation, to be borne by those bodies and the entire proceeds to be turned over to the children as a Christmas gift. The invitation was gladly accepted. Committees met them at the depot, and escorted them to the temple, an excellent supper furnished, and a lunch for the return trip. In the evening the show was given, a cantata called the "Queen's Sur prise," to a good house of enthusiastic friends. All seemed pleased, and the children made happy by the liberal applaus and exceedingly kind treatment.

One hundred and ninety-four dollars was realized and places in the Christmas Fund.

Entertainment Repeated.

The children were invited by Clark and Anthony Lodges of this city to repeat their show for the pleasure of their friends in our Home City. The invitation was again accepted, committees were appointed by the Lodges, and hundreds of tickets were sold (one Brother, Charles P. Bruner, alone selling over 600). The entertainment was given on the evening of December 20, 1906, at the Grand Opera House to a crowded house. That the children did well was shown in the very liberal applause and the many nice things said after the performance. One hundred and eighty-five dollars and thirty cents was realized for the Christmas Fund.

The children are trained for these entertainments by Miss Belle Albin and Miss Jessie M. Parsons.

Picnic by Clark and Anthony Lodges.

July 17, 1907, the above Lodges gave a pienic at Spring Grove Park, this city, extending an invitation to the people of the Home to join them as their guests, all expenses to be borne by the Lodges. The invitation was accepted, special cars furnished for their transportation, a splendid supper provided, and all sorts of amusements arranged for the children, and a fine performance given in the Casino to which old and young were admitted. The brethren and their good wives and children took especial pleasure in serving the wants of the Home people and seeing that they had a good time. The whole affair was a great su cess, and we feel under many obligations to the various committees, and all others concerned in giving us this delightful outing.

Additional Story on Dining Room.

Finding our quarters becoming somewhat crowded, the Board of Trustees at the meeting in January last resolved to ask the Scottish Rite bodies of the state to furnish \$15,000 for the purpose of building an additional story on the dining room building and furnishing same, thus adding about thirty bed rooms to our present capacity. The matter was taken up by the Council of Deliberation at the meeting held in Cincinnati in February last. A committee of one from each Lodge of Perfection in the State was appointed to solicit funds from the brethren of the Rite, with Bro. D. N. Kinsman of Columbus, as Chairman. The response has been most generous, \$16,400 being now pledged for the improvement. The work is now going ahead and will be finished this year.

We are grateful to our Scottish Rite friends for their liberal and prompt compliance with the request.

will notice from the ages of our dead that all were advanced in years save two, and these were much afflicted when they arrived here. We have lost but one child in our entire history, and that was caused from disease contracted away from the Home.

Our Home physician, Dr. W. A. Smith, is faithful and skillful in his treatment, but no skill or faithfulness can prevent the infirmities and diseases of old age. We still have on our rolls thirty-four above 80 years, four of them above 90 years, Uncle Joe Byers and his good wife having each reached their 93rd year. The average age of our old folks is 75 years.

Dr. W. A. M. Hadley is still serving us as oculist and aurist without compensation, and is very successful in relieving troubles in that line. We appreciate his services very much.

Report of the Committee on Obituaries.

To the Grand Council, Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:

While sorrows press the soul, how sweet to hear the voice of the Divine Comforter,

> "Peace, troubled heart! A hand divine Moves 'mid this tangled life of thine. Each half-wrought plan, each broken line, Is hid 'neath His all-wise design. Its broken meshes yet shall be Woven with perfect symmetry. Peace, troubled heart! A holy form Walks o'er the waves of life's rough storm. Comes through the midnight clear and dark, And sits beside thee in life's bark: To winds and waves He whispers, "cease," And all within, without, is peace."

While we rejoice in the unprecedented prosperity of the year by which our numbers have been greatly increased, we sorrow because the homes that have been entered by the monster, death, have been increased, for into no less than one hundred and twenty-seven homes has he entered within the jurisdiction of this Grand Council during the past twelve months. Who can weigh the grief or measure the sorrow of these aching hearts: and vet there is One in whom they can confide, and on whose bosom they may lean, who has power to calm the troubled spirit and speak the word of peace. In this long list we note many who have been most efficient in the work of Cryptic Masonry, and who have served their Councils as Thrice Illustrious Masters, and would pay loving tribute to their memories. In this list we note Companion George Stoddard of Cincinnati Council: Companion D. C. Winegarner of Bigelow Council; Companion R. H. McFarland of Zanesville Council; Companion C. A. Woodword of Cleveland Council; Companion Asa M. Hart of Clinton Council; Companion G. A. Ewing of Trowel Council; Companion L. A. Tussing of New Lexington Council; Companion E. F. Everist of St. Mary's Council; Companion Sidney Moore of Delaware Council and Companion M. H. Levagood of Elyria Council. Beyond our jurisdiction, death with his sickle keen has gathered many sheaves.

ARKANSAS—On the 19th day of July last, Ill. Companion Edward Metcalf, Grand Sentinel of the Grand Council, answered the summons. Suddenly and unexpectedly it came, for he was in his usual health, when as a thief in the night the Grand Sentinel of all announced his approach. Companion Metcalf was born in Massachusetts July 15, 1839 and began his Masonic career in 1871, receiving the Council degrees in 1883, and that same year was made Grand Sentinel, and for more than a quarter of a century his kindly smile has greeted the Companions in their Annual Assembly.

CONNECTICUT—Cryptic Masonry in Connecticut suffers loss in the death of Companion Past Most Puissant Grand Master,

Joseph S. Stokes, who died July 20, 1907, in the sixty-second year of his age. Of English birth, he came to this country in 1869, locating in Meriden, where he continued to reside. His advancement in York Rite Masonry was regular and in his death the Rite loses a devoted and zealous Companion.

Georgia,—Wm. A. Davis, M. Ill. Past Grand Master of Georgia, finished his work in the secret vault July 19, 1907. His Masonic services included two years as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, and also two years as the M. Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council. Genial and kind, his work made a deep impression upon the Companions, and long will his memory be cherished.

ILLINOIS—To a very serious degree have our Companions of the prairie state suffered in the losses of the past year. May 15, Ill. Wm. Harvey Paul, Grand Master of the Grand Council closed his labors. An Ohioan by birth, having been born in Richland County April 14, 1848. An enthusiastic and zealous brother, having received all the degrees in both the York and Scottish Rite branches. He was one of the organizers of the Danville Lodge of Perfection A. A. S. Rite, and its second officer at the time of his death. With him, as the end came it was said:

"Life's work well done, Life's race well run, Life's crown well won, And now comes rest."

One month later, Ill. Almond Leroy Hamilton, P. G. P. C. of the Work of the Grand Council, died, at the early age of 49. In all positions, and in all that pertained to the good of Masonry, he was active and earnest.

July 6, last, M. Ill. Philander M. Barclay, P. M. Ill. Grand Master of the State, passed to his reward, in his 76th year. He served most acceptably all branches of Masonry as W. M., H. P., T. I. M., and Eminent Commander. He filled offices in the Grand Bodies as follows: Grand Master of the Grand Lodge; Grand

High Priest of the Grand Chapter; Most Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council, and Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of the State. For years he was an honored member of the A. A. S. Rite, having been honored with the 33 degree in Sept. 1900.

MASSACHUSETTS—Our Companions in New England have been sorely bereaved in the death on Feb. 23, of R. Ill. James Taylor, P. G. P. Conductor of Work, and on Mar. 15, of R. Ill. James Utley, Deputy Grand Master. Companion Taylor had passed the three score and ten, leaving a record of faithful Masonic living, of duty well done and a well rounded life, enriching many by his life of usefulness and truth.

Companion Utley had but recently entered upon his duties as Deputy Grand Master, full of zeal and enthusiasm. But the religion, which with him was his life, the faith that was sight, and knowledge, brought him to the end of life's journey in holy triumph. His life was a sweet benediction and his death a glorious triumph.

MINNESOTA—From Minnesota sorrowful tidings have come of the death of R. Ill. Companion Thomas Montgomery, Grand Recorder of the Grand Council, in which capacity he had served most efficiently and faithfully since 1890. He was also a 32 degree Mason, and Deputy for the Inspector General of Minnesota, the very soul of honor, faithful, steadfast, conscientious and true.

NEBRASKA suffered a severe loss on June 8th, last, in the death of Past Grand Master Companion George M. Mininger, a man of sterling worth, whose Masonic experience extended over a period of more than half a century, during which he had held the highest positions of trust and honor, and in them all, brought honor to himself and the Craft. His Masonic record reads thus: Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge; Past Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter; Past Grand Master of the Grand Council and Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery. He

served as President of the Masonic Home for his State from the time of the organization of the Home until his death.

Ohio—Within our own Jurisdiction the Companions have had occasion for intense grief in the death of Companion David C. Winegarner, Past Most Ill. Grand Master of the Grand Council. His interest in the work of Royal and Select Masters dates from his initiation therein in 1879, March 5. He served as Most Ill. Grand Master two years, 1889-1890. In 1883 he received the Consistorial degrees in Ohio Consistory, and at the session of the Supreme Grand Council in Boston September 1885, he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, (33 degree) and elected an honorary member of that body. A good man and true has gone from our midst.

On the 15th day of February last, Charles Alexander Woodward, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ohio, and Past Grand Generalissimo of the Grand Commandery of Ohio, passed to his reward, leaving an honorable Masonic record of over half a century. In 1870 he was received and crowned a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, (33 degree). He was an enthusiastic and faithful Mason, and his memory will long be cherished.

Washington—Our Companions in Washington have been afflicted in the death of Past Grand Master of the Grand Council, Most Ill. William H. Upton. Always earnest and devoted, a careful, close student of Masonry, he was recognized as an authority in matters Masonic.

Thus year by year the list of our departed Companions lengthens, but while Masonry lives, their memories will be cherished and their virtues emulated.

From all sections of our beloved land the tidings come of Companions who have served well the Craft and closed their brief day of toil successfully. Masonry believes in the best, and urges to the best and highest for time and eternity, not in the sense that she would attempt to assume the work of the Church of God, or substitute her teachings for the precious Word of our Lord, but by good precepts and earnest endeavor, seeks to supplement the lessons of the Church and the Word, thus helping men to make definite work for the life which knows no end; for while

"One ship drives east, and another west,
With the self-same winds that blow;
"Tis the set of the sails
And not the gales,
Which decides the way we go.
Like the winds of the sea are the ways of fate,
As we voyage along through life;
"Tis the will of the soul
That decides its goal,
And not the calm or the strife."

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE

ON

FOREIGN CORRESPONDENCE

To the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Ohio:-

We herewith present our second Report on Correspondence in which we have endeavored to briefly review the Proceedings which have been before us. In a majority of cases our review has of necessity been brief for the proceedings reviewed were brief and it has been difficult to find much that would be of interest to our Companions.

The Proceedings are as follows:

ALABAMA, 1906.

The Gran I Council of Royal and Select Masters of Alabama convened in its sixty-ninth Annual Assembly, in the City of Montgomery, on December 3rd, 1906, Most Illustrious Companion Ben M. Jacobs presiding as Grand Master and all the other Grand Officers, except the Grand Chaplain, in their stations.

A constitutional number of Subordinate Councils were represented, three Past Grand Masters were in attendance and Grand Representatives from nine other Grand Councils were present, among them being Most Illustrious Companion Jacob D. Block, Ohio's Grand Representative.

Much of the Grand Master's address relates to the California earthquake, and the action taken by him, in connection with the presiding officers of other Grand bodies, for the relief of the Companions of that State, or those who were unfortunate enough to live in the territory affected.

He appointed a number of Grand Representatives, among them being Companion Frank H. Marquis of Mansfield, as their Representative near the Grand Council of Ohio. An excellent appointment. He also recommended for appointment as Grand Representatives of other Grand Councils a number of Alabama Companions, among them being Most Illustrious Companion Jacob D. Block as Grand Representative of Ohio near that Grand Council.

He makes appropriate mention of the death of Past Deputy Grand Master E. S. Gatchell, and Past Most Illustrious Grand Master James Tait Beck, both of that Grand Jurisdiction, who had died during the year.

The Grand Treasurer reported a balance in his hands of \$382.98, and the Grand Recorder reported a net gain of ten and a total membership of 416.

There is no Report on Correspondence.

Companion John D. Lyons of Opelika was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master. Companion George A. Beauchamp of Montgomery was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Montgomery on December 2nd, 1907.

ARKANSAS, 1906.

This Grand Council met in its Forty-fourth Annual Assembly in the City of Little Rock on the 23rd day of November, 1906, and was opened in Ample Form. It appears that all of the Grand Officers were present as well as four Past Grand Masters and Representatives from seven Subordinate Councils.

The printed proceedings are embellished by a fine portrait of the Grand Master elected at this Assembly and now serving, Most Illustrious Companion A. F. B. Oden.

The Address of the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Companion Peter Brickey, is a short business paper, in which he feelingly refers to departed Companions, reports the granting of a Dispensation to form a new Council at Jonesboro and a number of special Dispensations, among which we find three to receive and act upon petitions at special meetings. He first refused the request of a waiver of Jurisdiction asked by the Grand Council of Missouri over ten Companions who desired to receive the degrees in a Missouri Council, but upon receiving further light he relented and granted the waiver of Jurisdiction. He appointed a number of Grand Representatives and recommended the appointment of others. He reported his inability to attend the Ninth Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Council at Boston and his appointment of Companion Fay Hempstead as his proxy. He says he feels satisfied that Hempstead and the rest of the delegation had an enjoyable time, and we want to remark that if Hempstead did not enjoy himself then all signs fail in Boston weather. He was either entertaining or being entertained all the time, except when he was being elected to office, and it was difficult to tell from his actions which he enjoyed the most. He seemed to be pleased to entertain; he did not decline the entertainment, neither did he decline the office.

The Grand Master reported that no questions of law had been submitted; that the condition of the Rite in that Jurisdiction was vigorous and progressive and that harmony prevailed throughout the State. This is hardly in line with the conclusion reached by Companion Stevenson of Missouri that the Grand Lecturer carried a bottle of embalming fluid with him to embalm the Councils which had shown no life.

Companion Hempstead presents a very interesting report of his trip to Boston as the proxy of the Grand Master, which is well worth reading: in fact everything Hempstead writes is worth reading. His report as Grand Recorder shows a net gain of thirty during the year and a total membership of 337, and the Grand Treasurer reports that he has a balance in his hands of \$262.92.

Companion Durand Whipple whom we so pleasantly met in Little Rock, introduced a resolution which was adopted, requesting the Grand Commandery of Knights Templars of Arkansas to take action making the Council degrees a prerequisite to the Orders of Knighthood. It is quite probable that the Grand Commandery will take no such action, at least not until after the Grand Encampment of the United States has expressed itself on the matter. We notice that Companion Hempstead in his "Notes" takes occasion to say that the idea finds no favor with him.

The printed proceedings contain a fine half tone of a photograph taken at Boston in which we recognize many familiar faces, among the number, and in the front row as usual, are several Ohio boys. Unfortunately just at this time we were out "Seeing a man" and failed to get into the group.

There is no report on Foreign Correspondence, but as usual Companion Hempstead publishes some interesting notes concerning a number of things of interest to Cryptic Masons.

Most Illustrious Companion A. F. B. Oden of Hot Springs

was elected Grand Master, and Companion Fay Hempstead of Little Rock was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Little Rock on November 22nd, 1907.

CALIFORNIA, 1906.

The Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of California convened in its Forty-sixth Annual Assembly in the City of San Francisco on April 16th, 1906, the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Companion Edward Keil, presiding, and all other Grand Officers, except Grand Chaplain and Grand Steward, in their stations. Twelve of the fifteen Chartered Councils were represented; thirteen Past Grand Masters were in attendance and fifteen Grand Representatives responded to the roll call; all of whom were duly received and welcomed. Illustrious Companion James Hedges Hall of Santa Ana, the Grand Representative of our Grand Council near that Grand Council was in attendance.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain during the year of 143 and a total membership of 1955. The Grand Treasurer reports a balance in his hands of \$2383.91.

The address of the Grand Master is very short and could not be otherwise, because, owing to an accident, he had been disabled during the entire year, so that it was difficult for him to get around. He did however constitute one Council and authorized the constitution of another. He reports as to the business affairs of the Grand Council, that the year has been one of quiet acquiescence in conditions as they were, rather than an attempt to advance by a radical change of their regulations.

The Committee on Jurisprudence offered a resolution which was unanimously adopted, as follows:

"Resolved that a Council of Royal and Select Masters of this Jurisdiction be permitted and encouraged to visit any of the Chapters located nearer to it than to any other Council, take with it its clothing and jewels and in said Chapter Hall confer the Cryptic Degrees; provided, that the candidates upon whom the degrees are to be conferred, shall have been elected prior thereto, at the local place of meeting of said visiting Council."

Ohio has never been obliged to resort to this "Moving picture" business, and yet we have the largest Grand Council in the world. We believe a little more energy and push at the situs of the Council will bring equally good results.

This Grand Assembly was held as above stated on April 16th, 1906, and on the morning of April 18th following, the terrible earthquake, carrying death and destruction in its wake, made its appearance, and not only were homes made desolate and in fact entirely destroyed, but the Masonie Fraternity as well suffered the destruction of its Temple and all its valuable books and records. Among the other things destroyed was the report on Correspondence, which had been prepared by Most Illustrious Companion James Bestor Merritt. After the fire Companion Merritt was in poor health and could not duplicate his report. Thereupon the Grand Recorder concluded to honor the writer of this report by quoting at considerable length portions of our address to the Grand Council of Ohio in 1905. We have often thought that it would take something like an earthquake to make our Companions realize that there was anything in our efforts worth quoting.

At this Grand Assembly Companion Charles Joseph Willett of Pasadena was elected Grand Master and Companion Thomas Abraham Davies of Alameda was re-elected Grand Recorder.

CALIFORNIA, 1907.

The Forty-seventh Annual Assembly of this Grand Council was held in Mission Masonic Temple, San Francisco, on April 15th, 1907. The Grand Master, Most Illustrious Companion Charles Joseph Willett presiding, and all Grand Officers, except the Grand Conductor of Council present. Eleven of the eighteen Chartered Councils were represented; twelve Past Grand Masters were in attendance, as well as fourteen Grand Representatives

of other Jurisdictions, Ohio not being among the number. The Grand Recorder reported a net gain during the year of 52 and a total membership of 2007, and the Grand Treasurer reported a balance in his hands of \$3501.65.

In opening his address the Grand Master said:

"At our last Assembly we met in the Grand Old Temple, at one time considered the finest building in the West, and all about us were edifices the pride of one of the most unique and famous cities of the world. Everything gave evidence of stability and prosperity. How suddenly all was changed! The forces of nature working within the breast of Mother Earth created a convulsion that will go down in history as one of the most destructive earthquakes ever known. The power of fire was exhibited in greater and more tremendous effects than human sight had ever witnessed. But what a revelation this calamity was of the warmth and extent of fraternal sentiment in the hearts of men! The afflicted City became the center of thought for the world, and from every direction came the aid so much needed. I take this opportunity to thank, in the name of this Grand Council all Royal and Select Masters who contributed as individuals or as organizations to the help of the needy of this suffering city. Today we learn another lesson, as we look about us, that the Great Architect of the Universe has implanted in the breast of man an indomitable spirit, before which all obstacles and difficulties disappear. We find now the debris cleared away and the foundations already laid for a greater and more magnificent San Francisco."

He reported his trip to Boston to attend the General Grand Council, and a number of local visitations made by him. He said that he had not been called upon to render any decisions and was satisfied that harmony prevailed in that Grand Jurisdiction. We should think that after the terrible shaking up that California had, everything would be peaceable and quiet for a time at least.

The report on correspondence was again prepared by Most Illustrious Companion James Bestor Merritt, and if we are any judge of such matters, he writes a splendid report. We want to suggest to him however, the advisability of writing his report in duplicate hereafter, keeping one copy at his home, so that when San Francisco shall again be destroyed we shall not be debarred of the pleasure of reading his report. Under Massachusetts he says, of the fact that Cincinnati Council No. 1 had for many years worked without a Charter:

"This brings up the question as to what a Charter is. Is it the paper or parchment with seals, etc., or is it like a franchise which exists and which can be proved by oral testimony, even though the written or printed evidence be destroyed. The San Francisco fire wiped out all the Masonic Charters of the bodies meeting in the Temple, yet they continued to meet and work. Is not a Charter like a deed? My land is mine and I can plow and sow in case of loss of deed until I can get a new one."

He joins Warvelle of Illinois in criticising Companion Conover of Michigan for being too decent and civil in his reports. He says it may be the better way but that when he sees a head he is strongly tempted to hit it. Well, we are not so sure about the best method of preparing a correspondence report. Being still green at the business we have hardly decided as to whether we want to engage in a continual scrap with our Companions of the reportorial field or not. If we should conclude that we do, we shall expose our head just a little to test the hardness of the knuckles of our friend from California. He does not like the Nebraska plan of having the correspondence reports written by the different Companions, neither do we. Speaking of the relief expressed by Companion Southgate of North Carolina at the conclusion of his review. Companion Merritt says:

"Why Companion, this is an invigorating recreation and not a toil. We absorb vitality from every report we review and finish the job with a sense of renewed strength. We hope our gain is nobody's loss. We are no vampire."

To Ohio for 1906 he gives a page and a half of fraternal review. He likes the Ohio method of receiving and welcoming the distinguished men of our various Masonic Bodies and says it is to our credit to thus recognize each others existence. It would seem that they do not do this in California.

To the compliment paid this committee in its first effort we are duly grateful, but we can assure the Companion that it was

absolutely our first effort in this line. In regard to our criticism of Kentucky methods, we have to say that we were not at all afraid of being hurt by our friends and Companions across the river. They are awfully "independent," "sovereign" and sassy, but with all have warm hearts and bright intellects, and the most of them are getting so they would rather shoot-the-chutes than one of their fellow mortals. We are however disappointed that Companion Grant did not feel equal to another report this year.

At the election of officers Most Illustrious Companion Charles Willis Norton of Stockton was elected Grand Master and Right Illustrious Companion Thomas Abraham Davies of Alameda was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of San Francisco on April 20th, 1908.

COLORADO, 1906.

The Twelfth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Colorado convened in the City of Denver on September 19th, 1906.

All the Grand Officers were present and the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form by the Grand Master, Most Illustrious Companion George A. Reese, assisted by the other Grand Officers. Six Past Grand Masters, Representatives from ten Subordinate Councils and twenty-one Grand Representatives were in attendance. Ohio's Grand Representative was not present.

In his address the Grand Master says he had resolved to visit each Council in the State with a view of re-lighting the "smouldering embers of Cryptic Masonry." This sounds very much like the fire was about out. He reports eight visitations but could only get four meetings out of it all. He issued a Dispensation for a new Council at La Junta and the Grand Council approved his action and granted a Charter. He made no decision on Masonic Law during the year and makes the mistake of calling the General Grand Council the "Supreme" Grand Council.

The Grand Recorder reports a net gain of twenty-four and a total membership of five hundred and twenty-two, while the Grand Treasurer reports a balance in his hands of \$704.35.

There is no report on Correspondence and we fail to find anything else of sufficient interest to note, except the gratifying fact that our friend and Companion Ernest Le Neve Foster was elected Grand Master. He lost a salaried job to get there, but some of our Ohio boys have lost their heads to get there and did not.

Companion Charles H. Jacobson of Denver was elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in Denver on September 18th, 1907.

CONNECTICUT, 1906.

The Eighty-eighth Annual Assembly of the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Connecticut was held in Hartford on May 9th, 1906 and was presided over by the Deputy Grand Master, the Grand Master being unavoidably absent. Twenty-three Councils were represented, this being the entire number of Councils in the State; seven Past Grand Masters and twelve Grand Representatives were in attendance. Ohio's Grand Representative was not present.

The printed proceedings which are before us are sadly mixed up in paging. If we understand the tables correctly the net gain for the year was 197 and the total membership 4426. The Grand Treasurer reported a balance of \$910.07.

One of the peculiar things about this Grand Assembly was that as soon as the Committees were appointed, the officers of the Grand Council vacated their stations and the officers of the local Council conferred the Super-excellent degree. It strikes me this is reversing the old saw "Business before pleasure."

The Grand Master issued a number of Dispensations to receive and act upon petitions at Special Assemblies, and made a few visitations and this is all that is covered by his address of three pages. They have a way in Connecticut of assigning the

Councils of the State to the leading Grand Officers for visitation and inspection, and the Deputy Puissant Grand Master, the Thrice Illustrious Grand Master and the Grand Principal Conductor of the Work, each made reports of their visitations.

The communication of the General Grand Master in reference to this Grand Body holding aloof from the General Grand Body. and inviting it into the fold, was read and referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence which presented the letter to the Grand Council without recommendation. It was however voted that the whole matter lay on the table until the next Annual Assembly. We presume it will continue to lie on the table long after the next Annual Assembly, for these independent and sovereign Companions seem determined to remain sovereign and independent. If they sincerely believe that it would be of no advantage to them to continue as they are, we have no objection to their doing so. But it strikes us that a Companion like Most Illustrious Companion John H. Barlow, whose acquaintanceship extends from ocean to ocean, would see the great social advantage of uniting with the General Grand Council. The General Grand Chapter and the Grand Encampment of Knights Templars seem to be all right, and we cannot understand why there should be opposition to a General Grand Council.

The report on Correspondence is compiled by Companion John H. Barlow and is the eleventh Annual Review submitted by him. He gives a fraternal and courteous review of the preceedings of Ohio for 1905, quoting the little poem with which we introduced our address as Grand Master.

He compliments Most Illustrious Companion Cunningham's report on Correspondence. This however is not surprising, for nearly every correspondent whose report we have read emphasizes the marked ability of this Illustrious Companion who has had so much experience in the reportorial field.

Thrice Illustrious Companion John H. Pearce of New Haven was elected M. P. Grand Master and Illustrious Companion James McCormick of Hartford was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in New Haven on the Wednesday succeeding the second Tuesday in May, 1907.

CONNECTICUT, 1907.

This Grand Council convened in its Eighty-ninth Assembly in the City of New Haven on the 15th day of May, 1907, with all of the elective Grand Officers in their stations.

Eleven Past Grand Masters, fifteen Grand Representatives and Representatives from twenty-three Subordinate Councils were in attendance. We notice, however, that the good Companion who represents Ohio was again absent.

The Grand Council was opened in Ample Form by the Grand Master, assisted by his associate officers. A good portrait of the retiring Grand Master faces the title page of the printed proceedings which are before us.

The report of the Grand Recorder shows a net gain in membership of 136 and a total membership of 4527, while the report of the Grand Treasurer shows a balance in his hands of \$1051.51.

The Address of the Grand Master is a short business paper in which he gives a detailed statement of his official acts during the year, none of which seem to call for comment on our part. He made a number of visitations and issued a number of Dispensations, some of which we notice were to receive and ballot upon petitions and confer degrees at Special Assemblies.

He reports that peace and harmony prevail within their Jurisdiction and that he has not been called upon to render any decisions. He takes a stand against affiliating with the General Grand Council unless by so doing the Council Degrees could be made prerequisite to other Degrees.

We think that these are entirely separate and distinct questions. In the first place, the Grand Encampment will probably never adopt legislation making the Cryptic Degrees prerequisite to the Order of the Temple, and the General Grand Council, either with or without Connecticut, is not in a position to demand it if it should be so inclined, and we believe that the

judgment of our best informed Masons is that the question should not be agitated further, and secondly, if any of the Sovereign or Independent Grand Councils do not feel like affiliating with the General Grand Council unless there is some special benefit to be derived therefrom, they ought to stay out until they get good and ready.

We believe it is not argued by the General Grand Council, or those most interested in it, that any great benefit in a financial or numerical way will grow out of affiliation with it, but it is believed that the affiliation of all of the so-called Independent Grand Bodies with the General Grand Council would have the effect of more firmly uniting the bonds of Brotherhood and Companionship between all the Cryptic Masons in the United States. And after all, this is the great purpose of Freemasonry.

We boast of the beauty of our ritualism, and justly so; we boast of our charity, and justly so; but without that great bond of Brotherhood which unites us together and lights up the pathway of life by giving us the warm hand-clasp, the happy smiles and the cheerful words of encouragement of our Companions, the Order would fall far short of its purpose.

The Report on Correspondence is again from the pen of our Most Illustrious Companion John H. Barlow, Past Grand Master. As usual he reviews the Sovereign and Independent Grand Councils first and gets after Companion Warvelle of Illinois for intimating that they are slow in the Nutmeg State. He also calls his attention to the fact that Connecticut, and not Illinois, is fifth in point of membership.

Ohio for 1906 is given two pages of courteous and Fraternal mention, and the address of Grand Master Spill is commended and lengthy excerpts are taken therefrom.

For the personal compliment paid the writer of this Report by Companion Barlow we are duly thankful. We hope that he stant countries of learning of its committee as amy as he has declared in that inverteel and that he had also confirme to their the persons of that control with its Number hadres.

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EN CLAND AND WALES, 1907.

The Mark Present Graph Council of Royal and Select and reject he where Marker of Engaged and Wales occurred at Mark Mark to Hall Greek Greek Street Lendon, in March 21st, 1965. Companied The Earl of Ension presided as Most Illustrates Grand Marker and an other Grand Officers except two were in their statum. The record states that "many other Companies of Schordinate Councils" were present, but who they were and whether they represented any Council is not shown. The record also shows that fifteen other Grand Jurisdiet one were represented. Ohio being among the number and being represented by the Grand Recorder, Companion C. F. Matter. The Grand Recorder, who seems to be the whole show in this Grand Council submits a brief report showing that 42 have been admitted to the Cryptic Degrees during the year, a small increase over last year, and that the present membership is 1188.

He reported the appointment of a Grand Representative near the Grand Council of Florida, and the acceptance by the Grand Treasurer of the office of Grand Representative of the Grand Council of Florida near that Grand Council. He called attention to the death of several "energetic" Companions, all of whom he says, "were old and highly valued friends."

A new Warrant was granted for a Council in the City of York, "under the style and title of Athelstan Council No. 31." and the Grand Recorder conducted the Ceremonies of Consecration. The Record shows that but one of the Grand Officers is elected, and that is the Grand Treasurer. The same Record on the opposite page says that the Grand Treasurer was appointed with all the other Grand Officers, so we give it up.

The Most Illustrious Grand Master appointed as Deputy Grand Master, Right Illustrious Companion Abraham Woodiwiss who has a string of titles which fill twelve lines of type in the Proceedings.

This beats anything we have seen in the United States unless it be the official record of Most Illustrious Companion George M. Moulton of Chicago. However, George is young yet and the opportunities are great for one who has the pull.

Right Honorable, the Earl of Euston is Grand Master and Illustrious Companion C. F. Matier is Grand Recorder.

FLORIDA, 1904-1905-1906.

The printed Proceedings of the Grand Council of Florida, at their Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth Annual Assemblies are before us in a little pamphlet of fourteen pages—not a very extended publication, but much better than none at all. These Assemblies were all held in the City of Jacksonville, that for 1904 on January 20th. 1904, that for 1905 on May 10th, 1905, and that for 1906 on January 19th, 1906.

At the Annual Assembly of 1904 Most Illustrious Companion George S. Hallmark, who had continuously held the office of Grand Master since 1878, presided, and all the other positions were filled by appointment. If we understand the Proceedings correctly, this Grand Council had been dormant, and this meeting was held for the purpose of electing officers and resuming labor. The Grand Recorder announced the appointment by the Grand Master of the Grand Council of Ohio, of Companion Charles L. Smith, as the Grand Representative of this Jurisdiction near that of Florida. We notice that in the election of officers Companion Smith was elected Grand Master and Companion James W. Boyd was elected Grand Recorder.

It seems they have been pretty stiff out there against the granting of Special Dispensations to receive and ballot on petitions at Special Assemblies, so the Jurisprudence Committee came to the relief of the fellow who could not wait till the next stated Assembly for the degrees but who probably had waited until he had taken everything else in Masonry before he petitioned for the Council degrees. They presented a resolution which was adopted, providing that for good cause stated in the Dispensation the Grand Master may grant a Dispensation to receive petitions at a Special Assembly.

Now watch for the reasons which are given.

Companion Edward R. Hare, Grand Recorder, as Committee on Foreign Correspondence presented a short review of thirty-two Grand Jurisdictions, Ohio for 1905 being among the number. He makes complimentary allusion to our Address as Grand Master for which we extend thanks.

Companion Wesley C. Stone of Spokane was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companion Edward R. Hare of Tacoma was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly was to be held in the City of Tacoma on June 15th, 1907.

WISCONSIN, 1907.

The Fiftieth Annual Assembly met in the City of Milwaukee on February 19th 1907, the Most Illustrious Grand Master Henry Smith presiding, and all other Grand Officers in their stations. Five Past Grand Masters, twelve Grand Representatives and Representatives from twenty-three Subordinate Councils were in attendance. We notice that Ohio has no Representative near that Grand Jurisdiction. This vacancy should be filled at once so that the Fraternal relations existing between these two Grand Jurisdictions may be still further cemented. It appears from the address of the Grand Master that the Grand Council of Ohio is largely responsible for the organization of that Grand Council,

Most Illustrious Companion Louis C. Massey of Orlando was elected Grand Master and Wilber P. Webster of Jacksonville was elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Jacksonville on January 18th, 1907.

GEORGIA, 1907.

The Sixty-fourth Annual Assembly of the Grand Council, Royal and Select Masters of Georgia convened in the City of Macon on April 23rd, 1907 and the printed Proceedings are before us. They show that the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form by the Grand Master, Companion Thomas F. Moody, and that all the Grand Officers except one were in their stations. Three Past Grand Masters, one Past Deputy Grand Master, Representatives from twenty Subordinate Councils, and Grand Representatives from twenty other Grand Jurisdictions were present. Among this number was our genial friend and Companion Robert L. Colding who ably represents the largest Grand Council in the world.

The introductory to the Grand Master's Address is a beautiful combination of fact and imagery. Among many other good things he says:

"Masons are no less builders now than in the days of yore. While ancient craftsmen erceted only structures which the ruthless march of Time has utterly effaced, we are building that which the tooth of Time cannot erase, which death cannot dim. We are making, each in his way, a character for eternity; and since man builds his character by the pattern which his ideals furnish him, where in the universe can you find loftier, more inspiring ideals than those inculcated in Masonic teaching? Reverence to God, obedience to law, uprightness of conduct, the helping hand to the needy, each member a life guard over the sanctity of the home, charity to all and malice to none. These are the beautiful garments of perennial youth in which Masonry arrays herself."

He issued a number of Special Dispensations to receive and ballot on petitions at Special Assemblies without waiting the usual time and reported one decision. He issued his proxy to Companions who constituted two Councils and reports the arrest of one Charter. The Grand Master makes appreciative mention of the courtesies shown the Companions of Georgia by the Grand Council of Massachusetts and the citizens of Boston, and is glad that the day is coming when they can reciprocate. The report of the Committee on Finance and Returns showed a balance on hand of \$182.63, while the number on the roll was 1002.

There is no Report on Correspondence.

Companion W. H. Nurnberger of Augusta was elected Grand Master and Companion W. A. Wolihin was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Macon on April .8th, 1908.

ILLINOIS, 1906.

The Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Illinois convened in its Fifty-fourth annual assembly in the City of Chicago on October 24th, 1906. Companion Raymond L. Leonard, Most Illustrious Grand Master, presided and all of the other Grand officers, except the Grand Treasurer, were in their stations. Thirty-nine Subordinate Councils were represented, seventeen Past Grand Masters were in attendance, as well as the Grand Representatives from twenty other Jurisdictions.

The Report of the Committee on Credentials says that twentynine Grand Representatives were present, but we can only count twenty. These Grand Representatives were properly received, and through Companion George W. Warvelle extended the Fraternal greetings of their respective Jurisdictions. The Proceedings do not show whether Ohio's Grand Representative was present or not and we therefore presume he was absent.

The Report of the Grand Recorder showed a net gain during the year of 279, and a total membership of 4335.

The Report of the Grand Treasurer showed a balance in his hands of \$3394.73.

One of the features of the Report of the Grand Recorder is a list of thirty-three extinct Councils, several of which were in good cities that ought to support thriving and prosperous Councils.

The Grand Master in his address reports the issuing of an "Encyclical Letter" of instructions and the dividing of the State into Nine Arches, as we do in Ohio. We notice, however that the Inspectors of these Arches have two Assistants which ought to make the work easy.

The Grand Master well says:

"The Council Degrees stand at the summit of Ancient Craft Masonry and should be the aim and objective point of every Mason; he should not rest content until he has reached the climax and is in possession of our ultimate secrets and a participator in our highest mysteries."

He issued a number of Dispensations some of which we notice were for receiving and balloting upon petitions and conferring degrees at Special Assemblies. He instituted one new Council by telephone proxy, which we suppose is alright in Illinois as it is Sovereign and Independent and has a right to do as it pleases. He issued commissions to twenty-nine Grand Representatives and recommended for appointment an equal number of Grand Representatives.

In reference to his visit to the General Grand Council he says:

"The thought occured to me then and there that we live in a day of consolidation and large work, and while there is a certain charm in standing alone, and independent in a sense, yet it confers no glory or benefits that compare with being identified with our Sister Grand Councils as a whole and enjoying the rank and prestige to which we as one of the older and larger Jurisdictions are entitled."

He then recommended that the matter of affiliation with the General Grand Council be referred to a Special Committee to report at the next session of the Grand Council. We notice, however, that his recommendation was not concurred in by the

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Committee on Topical Reference, the only argument being that the matter had been decided adversely. Perseverance does not seem to be a virtue in Illinois.

We are at least glad that the Grand Master went down to Boston and had his eyes opened, and that he had the courage to honestly express his sentiments. If he and the other Companions of his Jurisdiction who feel as he does about the matter will but keep pegging away, it will not be long until the infusion of new blood into that Jurisdiction will stimulate the action of the stony heart of the Cryptic Masons of that State, and it will begin to beat more warmly for Companions who are under the Jurisdiction of what are called Constituent Grand Councils. He closes his address by stating that Illinois holds her place proudly and moves forward with the hope that she may soon not be the fourth in membership but even perhaps the very first. This is a beautiful dream, but with Ohio gaining at the rate of one thousand per year its realization is a long way off.

We notice that the Committee of Jurisprudence reported that the installation must begin with the "Thrice Illinois Master". Of course, this is a misprint, but as everything in Illinois appears to be illustrious we presume the two words may be used synonymously.

The Report on Foreign Correspondence is from the pen of Companion George W. Warvelle and is his fifteenth Annual Review. He frankly says that he finds very little in the Proceedings which have been before him to merit comment, approval or criticism, and that therefore his reviews are short. Eliminating statistical information, as he does, from his Review, he must find it pretty dry picking to get anything to submit to his Companions.

As things appear to be moving so smoothly in the Cryptic world, our Grand Masters seem to be content with a mere recital of official actions and duties performed, and very few of them drift into the realm of suggestion or recommendation, and fewer still have much to say of historical value.

In his Review of Alabama for 1905 the Reviewer fails to

state the important fact that this Grand Council decided to rescind its former resolution severing its connection with the General Grand Council and become one of its constituents. How so important an action could have been overlooked by the Reviewer we are unable to understand. It looks a little to us as if the lawyer were at work here and not the Reviewer.

Under Indiana for 1905 he questions the expediency of giving numbers of old defunct Councils to new Councils organized in the same places. We think he is exactly right in this position and can see no reason on earth for assigning to a new Council a number which carries with it the false impression, as it were, that it is an old Council when in fact it is still in its swaddling clothes.

He also believes that the ruling in Ohio that Councils U. D. may not alffiliate on dimit is correct.

Under Kansas for 1906 he says that it is a very dry State and everybody cannot afford to go down to the Missouri line every time they need a little spiritual consolation. This is tough on our friend Stevenson and we expect to see him come back with suggestions of "Anheuser-Busch" etc. He says that Companion Grant of Kentucky ought not to complain because his Jurisdiction received but six lines of type in his last Review, for it was a great stretch of imagination to work in even six lines.

If we should have been as saucy as this to our old Mother we should have expected, and would probably have received, some physical demonstration of her displeasure, and if Companion Grant does not do the spanking act he ought to no longer boast of Kentucky being the Mother of Illinois.

It seems that Companion Conover of Michigan, appreciating the fact that Companion Warvelle needed light in the esoteric work, presented him with a cypher ritual, but that his courteous and Fraternal act was not properly appreciated by the Committee on Jurisprudence who recommended that no further courtesies of this kind be extended. Companion Warvelle, therefore, rises to remark that the Fraternal courtesies are mutual, inasmuch as he has generously donated to the Grand Council of Michigan his "Commentary on the Vedic Hymns." We do not know what this is but presume that it is good as is everything that comes from Warvelle's pen.

Under Vermont he says:

"The Proceedings were as brief as woman's love and confined to matters of strictest routine."

This is a very unsatisfactory statement. If the Reviewer would have indicated the length of the Proceedings by lines or pages we would then have had some conception of his idea of the brevity of woman's love.

Ohio for 1905 gets one page of Fraternal comment in which the Reviewer says he thinks it will be some time before another Jurisdiction will succeed in passing us. He also says that the visitations made by our Inspectors are not merely theoretical, as is the case with them. We should think with Inspectors for the Arches and Assistants for the Inspectors there ought to be no difficulty in securing inspection of all the Councils in that Jurisdiction.

We join with him in a regret that Companion Cunningham has retired from the reportorial field and we accept his invitation to a seat at the Round Table of the Guild.

He pays us the personal compliment, which we very highly appreciate, of publishing under a separate head the little poen with which we introduced our address as Grand Master in 1905. We take no credit for this effort, for our appreciation of the privilege we have of living in our beautiful land and of enjoying the companionship and fellowship of so many good men as we find in our Fraternity, always inspires the soul and lifts it to higher impulses, and this is in itself poetic inspiration.

Companion Warvelle, as is usual with him, appends to his Review historical notes and other matters of great interest to the reading Mason.

Companion Albert T. Hey of Springfield was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master, and Companion Gil W. Barnard of Chicago was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the City of Alton on September 11th, 1907.

INDIANA, 1906.

The Grand Council of Indiana convened in its Fifty-first Annual Assembly in the city of Indianapolis on October 16th, 1906, all of the Grand Officers being in their stations, sixty-one out of sixty-two Chartered Councils being represented, sixteen Past Grand Masters being in attendance, as well as twenty-two Grand Representatives from other Grand Jurisdictions, in the list of which we find the name of Illustrious Companion Simeon P. Gillett of Evansville, our Grand Representative near that Grand Council.

The Recorder reported a net gain during the year of 471 and a total membership of 4684. The net gain in membership was larger than for any previous year and the neighboring Grand Councils on the North and West must guard well their laurels. The Grand Treasurer reported a balance of \$2507.19.

In speaking of the peaceful condition of the Craft in that Jurisdiction, the Grand Master well says:

"No greater solace touches the soul than peace. From the time when the lowly Nazerene spoke peace to the troubled waters to this hour, the heart has always sent up its most fervent prayer for peace. Peace and the Liberty that is born of it is the universal center towards which all races and conditions of men tend. When tired and worn and racked with the cares and perplexities of life, we cry for peace; Nations sweep into the maelstrom of war and carnage and cry for relief and then comes peace, profound peace. So over all comes the benign blessing today. Let us lift up our hearts in glad acclaim and thankful praise."

He issued his proxies to four Illustrious Companions as Special Deputies to constitute the four Councils under Dispensation. He granted one Dispensation for a new Council at Martinsville, which subsequently received its Charter at the hands of the Grand Council. He states that he has received some caustic criticism on his action in joining with the other Grand Bodies in an appeal for the San Francisco sufferers, but that his conscience is entirely clear in the matter, even though he may have violated some technical provision of the organic law of that Jurisdiction.

He suspended the functions of one Council and gave them a

chance for their white alley by notifying them to appear at Annual Assembly and show cause why their Charter should be annualled. We notice that the Companions failed to appear and they got the Grand Bounce in due Masonic form. rendered no decisions and closes his address with the admonition

"Put out a hand to humanity everywhere and exemp Masonry."

On petition of Kokomo Council No. 60 praying for the rest tion of their former No. 39, the Committee reported favora but on motion of Past Grand Master Keiper this report was agreed to.

We believe this action right as there is no reason on earth v a new Council simply because it is organized in the same p where some former Council existed should be given the num of the old Council. We believe that the older Masonic Bo as a rule have considerable pride in their numbers, and whet they do or do not, the number imputes age as a rule and i unfair and deceptive that a Masonic Body just organized sho be given a number ahead of Bodies which have been in existe for many years. Some writers contend that if the Charte restored, then the old number may be given. But how on ea can you restore a Charter which has been annulled. If it simply been arrested by the Grand Master, then it may be stored by the Grand Council, but if the action of the Grand Master in arresting the Charter has been approved by the Gra Council, the Charter is then annulled, or in other words is d and no power on earth can revive it or restore it. The momen is annulled, it dies, and the moment it dies, the territory which it stood becomes open territory and when the petition Dispensation is again presented it must be for a new Council a should therefore have a new number.

This is at least the way we look at it and if we are wr there are a dozen fellows slinging ink in different Jurisdicti that will be climbing our anatomy next year.

The Report on Correspondence, in these Proceedings de nated as an Annual Cryptic Review, is from the pen of C

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panion Henry W. Mordhurst and is his seventeenth report. Ohio for 1905 receives Fraternal mention, the Reviewer calling attention to a slip of the pen in writing the word instituted instead of constituted in reporting our constitution of Fostoria Council No. 90. We stand corrected Companion Mordhurst, although the difference between the two words suggests the oft repeated teedle-dum and teedle-dee. This criticism was probably suggested by the search which we instituted in Boston for a dairy lunch, where good looking waitresses were clean aprons, pleasant smiles and some other things, and the rolled oats and New England cream which constituted our breakfast.

Companion James K. Allen of Terre Haute was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companion Calvin W. Prather of Indianapolis was re-elected Right Illustrious Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the city of Indianapolis on the 22nd day of October 1907.

INDIAN TERRITORY, 1907.

The Grand Council of Indian Territory held its Thirteenth Annual Assembly in the Masonic Hall at El Reno on April 17th, 1907. The Most Illustrious Grand Master was sick and could not be present and the Grand Council was opened in Ample Form by the Deputy Grand Master, assisted by the other Grand Officers. Seven Past Grand Masters, Representatives from six Subordinate Councils and ten Grand Representatives were in attendance. The printed Proceedings come before us in a pamphlet of less than thirty pages, which shows that the business of the session was not extensive.

The Grand Master in a three page Address reported that the condition of the Craft was harmonious; that no decision on Masonic law had been rendered; one Council U. D. had been constituted; one Dispensation for a new Council had been granted, and the usual number of Grand Representatives had been appointed or recommended for appointment.

The Grand Recorder reported a net gain during the year of

34 and a total membership of 320. This is not a large membe ship, being only a third of the net gain in Ohio for the preser year, but if the Companions are awake to their duties and hav proper appreciation of the Cryptic Rite, and pluck and courag to persevere, there will come a day when the membership cannot be given with three figures.

The Grand Treasurer reported a balance on hand of \$334.1: There is no Report on Correspondence.

Most Illustrious Companion Robert Y. Morrison of Atok was elected Grand Master and Right Illustrious Companio Joseph S. Murrow of Atoka was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held at McAlister of April 22nd, 1908.

IOWA, 1906.

This Grand Council convened in its Seventh Annual Assembly at Marshalltown on October 2nd, 1906, Companion Amos N Alberson, Most Illustrious Grand Master, presiding, and al Grand Officers, except one, in their stations. The Grand Counci was opened in Ample Form. Eighteen of the twenty-one Chartered Councils were represented. Four Past Grand Master and seventeen Grand Representatives were in attendance. Illustrious Companion Charles A. Dewey, Ohio's Grand Representative near that Grand Council being among the number.

There was a decrease in membership during the year of 1878 as shown by the Grand Recorder's report, which reduced the total membership to 922. We are sorry to note this decrease, but trust that the effect will be to stimulate to greater endeavors in the future. The balance in the hands of the Treasurer was \$1171.54.

When we looked upon the steel engraved portrait of the handsome Grand Master which faces the title page, our first thought was that he must be a native of Ohio, and upon further examination of the Proceedings, we find that we are correct This does not mean that all good looking Grand Masters come

from Ohio but that all Grand Masters which come from Ohio are good looking.

The Address of the Grand Master is a brief statement of his official acts during the year. He appointed Grand Representatives to all Grand Councils of the United States with whom they are in Fraternal intercourse and recommended for re-appointment the Companions representing those Jurisdictions near that Grand Council. We notice that in giving the name of Most Ill. Companion McLean of Sidney as their Representative near the Grand Council of Ohio they spell it "McClean", which is incor rect. We notice also from his report that Most Illustrious Companion W. F. Cleveland returned \$25.00 of the amount given him to spend on his trip to Boston. How on earth could you do this Companion Cleveland? You seemed to be paying your own way and you had about everything that was going. You must have secured reduced prices on fruits and condiments, and could not have put up much for the support which was so unanimously given you for the office which you carried home with you.

Most Illustrious Companion Cleveland presents his fifth report on Fraternal Correspondence, in which he reviews twenty-seven Proceedings in his usual brief, but interesting manner. Ohio for 1905 receives courteous and Fraternal mention. He expresses his regret at the decision of Companion Cunningham to retire from the reportorial field in the Cryptic Rite. We all regret it.

Companion II. C. Shadbolt of Emmetsburg was elected Most Illustrious Grand Master and Companion Alf. Wingate of Des Moines was re-elected Grand Recorder.

The next Annual Assembly will be held in the city of Fort Dodge during the first week in October 1907.
