# CONSTITUTION

1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of three representatives from each white Association in the State, of annual representatives for every \$10 contributed to its funds, and of such life members as have been, or shall be made so by the payment of \$30 at any one time to the Treasurer. No one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member, in good standing, of a Baptist Church.

2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the churches to which they belong; to support the gospel in destitute sections of the State; to assist Baptist Churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship; to encourage the study of the Bible in Sunday Schools; and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor.

3. The President shall preside when present, and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

4. There shall be three Vice Presidents, one of whom shall preside in the absence of the President.

5. The Recording Secretary and his Assistant shall record the proceedings, publish the minutes, and collect and preserve correct statistics of the denomination.

6. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention, make public acknowledgment of the same every week, forward all contributions to their destination, and, at every meeting of the Convention, make a full report of his receipts and disbursements.

7. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Board in the employment and payment of Missionaries, and labor to pro-

mote the cultivation and development of christian benevolence.

8. The Boards of the Convention shall be appointed annually.

9. The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.

10. The Mission Board shall, so far as the means at its disposal will allow, supply all destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient ministers of the gospel; shall give pecuniary aid, so far as can be secured, for building houses of worship at proper points in the State, and in cases where pecuniary aid cannot be extended shall commend them to the beneficence of the churches. This Board shall co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all the departments of its labor.

11. The Sunday School Board shall encourage the study of the Bible in our churches, and co-operate with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

## PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

OXFORD, N. C., Wednesday, Nov. 5th, 1879.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina met in its Forty-Ninth Annual Session with the Church at Oxford, at 11 o'clock A. M.

In the absence of the President, brother W. A. GRAHAM, the Convention was called to order by the 1st Vice-President, Elder N. B. COBB.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

#### To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina:

It is with peculiar pleasure and a deep feeling of gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the unusual manifestations of His favor to us in our efforts to advance His kingdom that we present this, the annual report of the Mission Work among the Baptists of North Carolina. Scarcely ever before have such efforts been put forth by the laborers in the Master's vineyard, and never have we witnessed greater willingness, on His part, to bless and crown with success the labors of His servants. A greater work has been accomplished by the Baptists of the State, within the past year, than has ever been done in our history. Old churches have been revived, new ones built up almost by the score, and hundreds and *thousands* added to our membership. Brethren, let us praise God for His unspeakable blessings, and go back to our homes determined to do more for His cause.

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

As it was left discretionary with the Board, at the last Convention, we thought wise, under the circumstances, to appoint no traveling Corresponding Secretary, but try to prosecute the labors of the mission work as best we could by other means. As to the result, we refer you to reports of the work herewith presented.

#### PERSONAL MENTION.

We are under special obligations to bro. John Armstrong who furnished us, along with the Sunday School Board, an office free of charge, in the rear of his book store. Also to Rev. H. Hatcher, Agent for the *Biblical Recorder*, who, by his appeals in our behalf at several Associations, which he attended, materially aided us.

Bro. John E. Ray, our Secretary, spent six weeks traveling and visiting Associations in behalf of the Sunday School Board and Board of Missions, and did telling work for the cause. We are under special obligations to him for this service, as he did it free of charge, save his actual expenses. The correspondence and office work of the Board has been done by bro. Ray. We paid him for his services \$10.00 per month, but he made no charge for services while traveling, hence we have only paid him since last Convention \$100.

#### THE DESTITUTION.

Besides the fields already occupied by our missionaries and those partially supplied with preaching by our Associations, there are three or four sections in the State that peculiarly claim our attention. We refer to the region formerly occupied by the old Pamlico Association, along the Nense, Tar and Roanoke rivers, and the valleys of the Yadkin and Catawba rivers, the richest, wealthiest, most fertile, most neglected parts of the State, where there are hundreds and hundreds of square miles almost entirely destitute of the truths of God's Word as we hold them. We are trying to occupy these fields and the Lord is richly rewarding our efforts, as you will see from the following

#### REPORTS FROM OUR MISSIONARIES.

#### BEULAH ASSOCIATION.

Rev. W. S. Fontaine, labors at Sharon church, in the Beulah Association, which is newly constituted, and the result of his own efforts at that place. There are now about 40 or more members, and it will not be very long before this church will be entirely self-sustaining.

Rev. H. A. Brown reports that the church at Winston has become selfsustaining and will employ him all his time next year. Has preached there every week this year; held 52 prayer meetings; baptized 4; received quite a number by letter; made 200 pastoral visits. The outlook is encouraging, indeed. Congregations good; Sabbath School large.

Rev. J. B. Richardson says: "During the Conventional year, I have labored one-fourth of my time at Waughtown. \* \* \* \* During this time I have preached 42 sermons, and baptized 23. There are 18 copies of the *Biblical Recorder* and *Examiner and Chronicle* taken at Waughtown Our Sabbath School (*evergreen*) numbers over 100 and is supplied with Baptist literature. This church was organized about sixteen months ago with 26 members. It now numbers near 60.

"During the year I have given two weeks or more to destitute points; one of which I consider of great importance, namely Lexington, where I labored for nearly a week. My congregations here were large, though I had to preach in the *Court House*. We have no church house or organization here, though I found some thirteen resident Baptists, members of churches."

Bro. R. has also been laboring at Marion one-fourth of his time, a most interesting and important point just this side the Blue Ridge.

Rev. Pinkney Oliver, who labors in the same Association at Pleasant Ridge School House, gives a very encouraging report of his labors: "The people seem anxious for Baptist preaching, I mean a portion of them. \* \* \* \* The prospect is better than when I began. I think we could have a church organized before a great while." Bro. O. held a protracted meeting in August, assisted by brethren Brown and Gourley, which resulted in good.

#### SOUTH YADKIN ASSOCIATION.

Rev. J. B. Boone is still earnestly pushing forward the Master's work at Statesville and Salisbury. At the former place he reports: Prayer meetings 21; religious visits 80; additions 7; sermons 46; one church supplied and one out-station. Our house is nearly completed. \* \* There is a manifest improvement in the working spirit of our church. The congregations are large and increasing. They have a good Sunday School. At Salisbury they are trying to commence building. The lot is paid for and they have some money on hand. Prayer meetings 21; pastoral visits 135; baptized 6; additions by letter 1; sermons 58. Bro. B. also preaches at two out-stations that promise well.

#### MT. ZION ASSOCIATION.

Rev. Jesse Howell labors in the bounds of the Mt. Zion Association, and reports one or two churches organized, and a house or two built. This Association is doing a successful work for Jesus.

#### BRIER CREEK ASSOCIATION.

Rev. E. N. Gwyn is at work in the interest of the Master's cause along the Northern side of the Yadkin River, a region whose beauty, fertility and destitution are scarcely surpassed by any other in North Carolina. This mission is rapidly gaining ground, and promises soon to spread over that vast country of the Yadkin valley.

#### LIBERTY ASSOCIATION.

Rev. Henry Sheets, who labors in the Liberty Association, speaks very encouragingly of his field. He says: "We will organize a new church at the Union Factory (perhaps) this fall. The company donated a nice lot, and contributed \$100 for the erection of a Baptist church. \* \* The churches have sustained the work by their contributions to an encouraging degree. I think that Old Liberty, after a long tlme, is determined to do more than ever." Sermons 132; churches supplied 2; outstations 10; funds collected \$200. Besides the place mentioned above, there are two or three places in this field where there is a prospect of the organization of new churches soon.

#### SANDY CREEK ASSOCIATION.

Rev. J. L. Smith labors one-fourth of his time in the Sandy Creek Association, and reports a good work going on. Between 15 and 20 baptized, with three churches and six out-stations supplied with preaching. His field is in Randolph, Moore, Guilford and Chatham counties, and embraces some of the most destitute sections of the State.

#### KING'S MOUNTAIN ASSOCIATION.

Rev. J. H. Boothe has been preaching at Dallas, in Gaston county, onefourth of his time this year. As a result of his labors, a church was organized there in September last, consisting of nineteen members; when, on the next Friday he baptized seven more, the fruits of a meeting held at the new church, which makes twenty-six members that we now have in the Dallas church. \* \* \* The church is going right to work to build them a good house—one that will be an honor to them and the denomination. With \$50 given them by the Board next year, they will become self-sustaining.

Rev. A. L. Stough. No field occupied by any of our missionaries this year have yielded a richer harvest than that eultivated by bro. Stough at Lincolnton. At the beginning of the year there were scarcely any Baptists to be found in the community. Now they have a church organization of 40 or 50 members, 26 having been baptized as the result of the meeting held in Angust, in which Rev. F. M. Jordan did most of the preaching. They are now at work to build a house, and the brick will soon be ready. They have a flourishing Sunday School, numbering over 100, and a prayer meeting conducted by the members, which is doing grand things for the cause. Besides the work in town, there are several out-stations at which bro. S. has been preaching with encouraging prospect.

#### CATAWBA RIVER ASSOCIATION.

Rev. J. R. Jones is stationed at Hickory, Newton and Morganton, besides supplying two or three out-stations in the country. At Hickory we have a good house of worship, finished except painting, and there is enough money subscribed to paint it. They have had five additions. They also have a good Sunday School which is kept up during the entire year. At Morganton we have a house nearly completed and \$65 subscribed towards painting it. A church has been very recently organized there with several members, and upon the whole, the prospects are good. At Newton we have a small organization, but it is very weak. However, they have the *push* in them, and we may yet expect good things to come of this field.

#### PEE DEE ASSOCIATION.

Rev. W. T. Jordan has preached once a month at Shoe Heel, in Robeson county. No organization. Only four Baptists in the place. Expects to build a church here before next Convention. At Laurinburg preached one-fourth of his time. In March assisted in a meeting by Eld. F. M. Jordan. Baptized sixteen as result of meeting. Church organized one year ago in September; now numbers 33. Just completed the best house of worship in the county, 40x70, steeple 88 feet high. Cost 82,300. Debt only 86.00. "We beg the Convention to help us." At Rockingham has to preach in the Court House. Held a meeting in April, assisted by bro. F. M. Jordan. Organized a church with 23 members from Cartledge's Creek Church, and baptized 17 converts from the meeting. Now numbers 49. Arranging to build church. Lumber on the yard; \$900 subscribed; \$900 more needed. Capt. Everett, a generous Methodist, gave a lot. "We also beg the Convention to help us." Polkton.

#### CAPE FEAR ASSOCIATION.

Rev. A. R. Pittman reports from his labors in the Cape Fear, as missionary, that "the people are intelligent and intellectually cultivated. My congregations are large and attentive, and the prospects are favorable to accomplish something for the Master. \* \* \* \* Trust that the church can live and sustain itself soon. The station assigned me is now a church. It now numbers ten, and several others will yet come in. \* \* Other denominations are kind and attentive to the word preached. One Methodist brother has given us a lot of land to build a church."

#### TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION.

Rev. A. McA. Pittman was appointed to labor at Hamilton, Pine Forest and adjoining country, and gives the following report of his labors for three quarters, (he having gone to the Theological Seminary at the elose of the third quarter): Churches supplied, 2; out-stations, 2; weeks of labor, 34; sermons preached, 80; baptized, 24; prayer meetings attended, 15; families religiously visited, 114. "The prospects for our new church in this place (Hamilton) are now pléasing. Bro. Salisbury, our main stake here, and bro. Noah Biggs, of Stoekland Neck, have pledged \$500 each.

"My congregations at Pine Forest continue to increase in number, and, from external appearance, in seriousness. \* \* \* \* At Poplar Point, about five miles below Hamilton on the river, I preach to a very attentive congregation every second Sunday. \* \* \* \* For nearly two years I have lived and labored among this people, and brighter manifestations of God's favor and willingness to bless will hardly ever be witnessed by me on earth."

Rev. W. B. Knight labors at Jamesville, Plymouth. Mt. Lebanon and Mt. Pleasant, right at the mouth of the Roanoke river, and along the Albemarle Sound. He reports: Churches, 4; out-stations, 3; prayer meetings. 25; families religiously visited, 120; weeks of labor, 52; sermons, 145; Sunday School lectures, 4; baptized, 24; added by letter, 11; Sunday Schools. 5; collected on field, \$77.64. "I think after a year or two they (the churches) will be self-sustaining.

The prospects are encouraging at all my places of preaching."

Rev. R. T. Vann has spent all of his time since last January in laboring at Weldon, Halifax, Enfield and Conoconary, together with occasional labors at ten other points. He tells us of 170 sermons preached; prayer meetings, 20; pastoral visits, 120; baptized, 13; church constituted, 1; church reorganized, 1; churches built, 2; Sunday Schools, 3; pupils, 100. Church debt, \$500.

Rev. J. D. Hufham, D. D., has been preaching at Williamston and Hamilton with splendid success. To no other man do we, as a denomina-tion, owe more than to bro. H. for the grand success of our mission in the Roanoke and Tar River section. Through his instrumentality old churches have been revived, new ones built up, and the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ preached throughout this whole section, the fruits of which eternity alone can compute. No part of our Baptist Zion is making greater strides towards the immediate and complete accomplishment of our desires. The Tar River Association, at its last session, reported \$1,250 in cash for this field, and pledged themselves for \$1,500 next year.

Besides these eighteen brethren who have been working under the Besides these eighteen brethren who have been working under the general supervision of the State Board, there are a great many others who have been a work under Associational Boards, and whose labors have not been reported to us. Some of these are brethren Allen Betts, of the Raleigh Association; J. E. King and E. L. Davis, of the Brown Creek; J. H. Lewellyn, of the Yadkin; the three brethren Pool of the Brushy Mountain; W. S. Melvin, David Newton and J. B. Downing, of the Cedar Creek; L. P. and J. P. Gwaltney, of the Brier Creek; Thos. Carrick, of the Tar River; W. J. Fulford, of the South Yadkin; R. D. Harner, of the Cane Fear, and J. B. Oliver, W. M. Kennedy and G. S. Harper, of the Cape Fear, and J. R. Oliver, W. M. Kennedy and G. S. Best, of the Eastern.

#### REPORT ON VOLUNTARY MISSIONARY WORK.

Brother President :-- Your committee, to whom was referred this department of Christian labor, report, as a result of their efforts, the following :--

1st. Rev. A. C. Dixon aided Rev. R. T. Vann at Halifax Court House, and although none as yet have been baptized as a result of the meeting. we are persuaded that great good was accomplished.

2nd. Rev. C. C. Haymore held a series of meetings at West Field; a point about half way between Mt. Airy, in Surry county, and Danbury, in Stokes county, in which he was aided by his brother, R. D. Haymore. They report, as a result, over twenty professions of faith, a majority of whom were baptized, and a church has been organized there.

3rd. Rev. G. M. Webb held a meeting of several days at Thessalonica church, in Catawba county, assisted by Rev. A. L. Stough. This was a very weak church, but has been strengthened by a goodly number of additions made, as a result of their labors.

4th. Rev. T. H. Pritchard aided Rev. J. H. Boothe in a series of meetings held at Dallas, Gaston county, which resulted in seven professions of faith, and as many additions to the little band of Baptists at that place.

5th. Rev. J. M. Holleman and Rev. Allen Betts preached thirteen days at Cannon Place, seventeen miles south of Raleigh. They report as a result nine professions of faith and three baptisms. Steps are being taken to organize a church there, and to build a house of worship. Rev. Allen Betts has preached there once a month during the past spring and summer.

6th. Rev. W. M. Kennedy held a meeting of five days at a weak church in the Eastern Association. No professions are reported, but some tokens of good are seen as the result. He has promised to make another effort at the same place at an early day.

7th. Rev. N. B. Cobb preached several days in Pittsboro, Chatham county, with much encouragement. Sickness prevented him from prosecuting the work as effectually as he had anticipated.

Sth., Rev. W. A. Barrett has preached once per month at two destitute points during the year, and has held a meeting near Kittrell's, which has ed a week and resulted in twenty-two professions. He also held a meeting of ten days at a destitute point in Moore county, and reports as a result of said latter meeting ten professions.

9th. Rev. W. R. Gwaltney held a meeting, lasting nearly two weeks, at Burns's School House, ten miles southwest of Raleigh. Eleven made a credible profession of faith-one old man 69 years of age. On the 31st day of October a presbytery, consisting of Elders H. Hatcher, J. M. Hol-leman, J. G. Dowell and W. R. Gwaltney, with brother N. B. Broughton as secretary, organized a church, consisting of sixteen members-one was received for baptism.

Besides the report as above made, the following named brethren were assigned to the fields annexed to their names, but as yet we have not had any definite report of their labors :

That portion of the report having reference to Foreign Missions was referred to a special committee of three, consisting of Elders T. H. PRITCHARD, T. WHITFIELD and T. HARRISON.

The report of the Board of Education was read as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Since our last report we have helped in the education of seventeen young men. Three of this number completed their course at Wake Forest College last session. There are twelve at present for whose support the Board is pledged, and others are asking for aid. It may be well to mention, as indicative of an awakening on the subject of ministerial education, that there have been in all, during the past year, thirty young men at the College who believe they have been called to preach. Several Associations are nobly co-operating with the Board by raising funds sufficient to pay the expenses of brethren whom they have sent from their own churches and placed under its care. Others are taking steps in the same direction.

The course of Bible study, inaugurated a year ago, is now in successful operation. By reference to the last catalogue of the College it will be seen that this course constitutes a School comprising: (1) Biblical Introduction; (2) Biblical History; (3) Biblical Doctrines; (4) Ecclesiastical History; (5) Preparation and Delivery of Sermons. Those pursuing this course are carefully advised with reference to the study of other branches; and special arrangements are made for instruction in English Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography and History.

It would hardly seem in place to present in this report any plea for the education of those whom God has called to preach the gospel of His Son or to discuss the obligations resting upon all who love the cause of Christ to help in this work. For those who really wish to know their duty it is enough that they remember that the preaching of the Word is God's appointed way for saving the world, and that no true disciple of Christ can be indifferent as to the faithful and efficient performance of this responsible work. Every believer, as often as he hears of the proclamation of the glad tiding, should be impressed most of all with the thought that it is his Lord's message to a guilty world. Should the delivery of this message be impaired by physical infirmity, and could this infirmity be removed by his agency, he would be unfaithful to his vows did he not unfetter his Lord's servant. Not less binding is the obligation to render the same message more effective and far reaching by seeking to remove the trammels that ignorance imposes. Through this Board much has been done to this end. In no work of the Convention has the blessing of God been more signally displayed. In every part of our State and beyond her borders are to be found men of God, full of faith and the Holy Ghost, who were its beneficiaries. Ten thousand times have many of them repaid all that was expended in their behalf. The influence they are exerting time cannot unfold. The very names of some of them are sweet in Zion. Wrest from the work done by the Baptists of North Carolina so much of it as has been, under God, accomplished by them, and there would be lamentation among our Israel.

An examination of our financial report will show a falling off in the amount of money collected during the year. This is due largely to the fact that our agent, Prof. L. R. Mills, has been prevented by protracted sickness in his family from doing much of the work he has hitherto done in the way of visiting churches and associations.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board embraces all the Southern States and the Indian Territory. It was organized in 1845. If it was an absolute want *then*, it is much more needed *now*. The Baptists deserve much credit for the great work which they have done in the country, but they made a great mistake in not cultivating *towns*. Christ and His Apostles cultivated the towns as well as the country. Of all the Epistles in the New Testament addressed to *places*, only one is addressed to *country* churches. That is the Epistle to the Galations. The Home Board, not neglecting the country, has also cultivated towns. They are so numerous, that we can mention only a part of them. It has helped the 1st Church in Raleigh, besides other towns in the State; has helped Leigh Street Church in Richmond, with many others in Virginia; has helped the 1st Church in Atlanta, Ga.; it has assisted the 3rd Church in St. Louis, the church in Jefferson, Texas, the Collisseum Place in New Orleans. This Board has sent the gospel to the poor Indians. It is a great blessing to them in the present and future life. The ratio of conversions among the whites is said to be 1 to 11; of the Indians, 1 to 8. Once this Board had 72 Missionaries, now it has about 20. The abolition of this Board would throw the cause of Christ in the South 25 years backward, ruin the poor Indian and cripple forever the Southern Baptist Convention. The life of this is the life of State Missions, of Foreign Missions and of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

The contributions have been in most cases quite small, but the Lord of the harvest has been pleased to smile upon the "widow's mite;" and while we could have judiciously expended thousands more in the work, but here inverted we dolt account will see from the face from the work, yet we have incurred no debt, as you will see from the financial statement.

#### OFFICE.

Through the kindness of Bro. John Armstrong, who gave us a room in the rear of his bookstore *free of charge*, we have had to pay no rent for office during the entire year. The room is very conveniently situated on Fayetteville Street, just opposite the State National Bank.

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY,

We deem ourselves very fortunate in securing the services of our brother John E. Ray as our Corresponding Secretary; he is certainly the right man in the right place. He has given the Sunday School work a careful study, and has made himself well acquainted with the same in our State. He has visited several portions of the State in the interest of our cause, and we regret very much that he has not been able to do more of that kind of work, as he has made a favorable impression on all with whom he has come in contact. And to those brethren whom he has not been able to see but has formed an acquaintance by letter, we would say, please answer his letters and let us know what you are doing in this great work and what your needs are, perhaps we may be able to help you.

To Bro. Ray in a great measure is due the success that has attended our labors. He is always ready and willing to help both by advice and something more substantial all who may apply to him. Write to him, brethren, and give him all the information you can, it will help him and may help you.

On the entrance upon our labors we found that there was an old outstanding debt contracted by a previous Board with the American Baptist Publication Society, about thirteen years ago; and feeling that the reputation of North Carolina Baptists abroad should not suffer, we proceeded to settle the same, which amounted to \$250.78, without interest.

#### ASSISTANCE RENDERED.

Through the kindness of the publishers of *Kind Words*, our excellent Suaday School paper, who have supplied us with more than 1,200 copies of the paper gratis, we have been enabled to assist more than 40 schools; besides we have aided 20 or 30 other schools in the way of Testaments, Bibles, Catechisms, &c.

In accordance with previous announcement the subject of Foreign Missions was considered, and the committee to whom was referred that portion of the report of the State Mission Board, having reference to Foreign Missions, submitted the following report :

The committee to whom was referred that part of the report of the Board of Missions which relates to Foreign Missions, beg leave to state that they note with peculiar regret, that while the Richmond Board are calling for an increase of at least one third larger contributions to meet the present imperative demands of the cause, North Carolina has decreased one thousand dollars in her gifts to Foreign Missions. This falling off is due to the fact that during the past year no Agent has been at work in this State in behalf of this interest.

Your committee would express the opinion that no one of our benevolent enterprises is dearer to the hearts of the Baptists of North Carolina than Foreign Missions, and that it will only be necessary to inform the

churches of the needs of the Board to have its wants supplied, and that this Convention is ready to co-operate with the Board in Richmond in any measure they may propose to increase the contributions from this State.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention was called to order by Vice President A. McDowell.

The Committee on Periodicals submitted the following report:

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

The *Biblical Recorder*, the organ of the Baptists of North Carolina, has for over forty years ably and faithfully "contended for the faith once delivered to the saints."

Under its present management, your Committee is of opinion that it deservedly ranks among the foremost expounders of Baptist faith and practice. It is a sound, vigorous, fearless, faithful, and able defender and promoter of our denominational interests. It could not be otherwise while conducted by such brethren as Bailey, Pritchard and Hatcher. Every Baptist family in the State needs the *Recorder*, and every Baptist who aims at a high degree of influence and usefulness, must have it. We deem it not simply a powerful instrumentality, but an absolute necessity in the proper maintenance and prosecution of our church enterprises. #### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.

REV. W. M. WINGATE, D. D.

On the 27th of February last, Rev. W. M. Wingate, D. D., President of Wake Forest College, passed away to his rest and his reward.

For twenty-five years he presided over the destinies of our College, of which he was a graduate; and by his ability, wisdom, patience, conservative character, and self-denying labors, contributed more, perhaps, to its success and prosperity, than any other man His deep insight into human nature qualified him for the successful management of boys, and his amiable disposition attached them to him in confidence and love. His metaphysical cast of mind, and his marked analytical power admirably fitted him to impart instruction in the department over which he presided.

He was also distinguished as a preacher of the gospel, and a large part of his usefulness was in the ministry, for which he had gifts surpassed by few men. He loved the Bible, and loved to preach; and such was the deep picty of his heart, and the spirituality of his mind, that he seemed in sweet accord with the meaning of the divine word. He appeared under commission to preach at all times—around the fireside, with the companion by the way, and before the public congregation. This generation will pass away before his labors as a herald of the cross will be forgotten.

He possessed a combination of great and noble qualities, which made him a leader among men. No man has lived among us who has so lastingly impressed himself upon the denomination, though so quiet and unobtrusive.

His presence was always greeted with joy by the brotherhood, in whatever portion of the State they assembled, in Association or Convention. Often did it fall to his lot to pour oil upon the troubled waters, and to bring his brethren to see eye to eye, when misunderstandings seemed almost inevitable. The loving words he would speak, so full of the spirit of the master, seldom failed to restore harmony and peace. His own spirit was pervaded by the love of Christ, and his highest joy was to see his brethren exemplifying the blessed religion of his Saviour in their fellowship one with another. His heart was a fountain of charity, and all who knew him loved him; and he so incorporated himself into the affections of his brethren, that it is not strange they should feel, as many of them do, that the better part of themselves has been taken away

Of whom, among the departed of our Zion, can it be said with such emphasis as of him: "He being dead yet speaketh." Whose presence, though he is gone, is so much felt among us? Whose absence is so hard to realize?

He was a man, take him all in all, whose like we may never see againa brother of blessed memory, continually fragrant in all our hearts.

#### HON. JOHN KERR.

Brother Kerr was born in Halifax county, Va., in 1811. He was educated in the schools of the city of Richmond, Va., and then studied law. He settled in Yanceyville for the practice of his profession. His success was such as to justify the confident expectation of his friends that would reach the highest eminence as a lawyer. But he was early drawn into politics, and thence forward, through the best years of his life, he was earnestly engaged in the struggles and excitements of that period. Several times he was elected a member of the House of Representatives in the Congress of the United States. Once he was an unsuccessful candidate for the office of Governor. Twice he was elected a Judge of the Superior Court. He was filling this last named office at the time of his death.

In early life he was made a subject of God's renewing grace. Amid the temptations of his public career, he was for a season drifted away from the steadfastness of his christian profession; but in the main his walk was that of the man of God. The last twelve years of his life were marked by a consecration to the service of his Redeemer such as is rarely witnessed. All his splendid powers seemed to be hell and used for the glory of God, and the good of men. His conversation was full of the fragrance of the gospel. In the prayer meeting and the Sunday School he was a constant and delighted worker. In all our denominational activities, as far as the circumstances and engagements of his public life permitted, he was a cheerful and earnest helper. Twice he was chosen to preside over the deliberations of this body.

His end was peace—a fitting close to such a life. With perfect trust in the Redeemer of men, he passed away in joyful expectation of eternal life.

#### JOHN G. WILLIAMS, ESQ.,

Has died since the last Convention. He was for several years Treasner of this body, and often used his own means to meet its obligations, without interest. He was also a most liberal contributor to the various enterprises of the Convention. One of his last acts of beneficence was the gift of nearly five thousand dollars to aid in the erection of the new Wait Memorial Building at Wake Forest College. This and many other liberal gifts to our benevolent movements, proclaimed him a man of generous heart and noble impulses.

> F. H. IVEY, J. S. PUREFOY, W. H. JORDAN.

After appropriate eulogistic remarks upon the life and character of the subjects of the obituaries by brethren BAILEY, PRITCHARD, DAVIS, DODSON and COOKE, the report was adopted. Elder F. H. JONES stated that about \$140.00 had been raised for the purpose of erecting a suitable monument to the late Rev. JOHN KERR.

The hour of the special order having arrived, the President announced that the claims of Wake Forest College would be considered by the Convention.

Remarks were made by brethren PUREFOY, PRITCHARD, COOKE and MARSH, and a contribution made to the College amounting to \$417.80

A communication was read from Elder J. B. HARTWELL, announcing his speedy departure for California, as Missionary to the Chinese there, and bidding the Convention farewell.

Elder J. A. STRADLEY introduced the following :

Resolved, That we are gratified to learn from the Corresponding Secretary of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention that arrangements have been completed for the immediate departure of Elder J. B. Hartwell for his field or labor among the Chinese in California, and we again commend the Mission to the support of the Baptists of North Carolina.

After remarks by DR. McINTOSH the resolution was adopted. Elder F. R. UNDERWOOD, of the Committee on Devotional Exercises, announced a programme for Sabbath Services.

Convention then adjourned with benediction by the President.

On motion of brother C. M. COOKE, brethren J. H. MILLS and J. A. MUNDY were requested to address the Convention in this behalf.

Adjourned with benediction by the President.

NIGHT SESSION.

Convention called to order at the regular hour. Prayer by Elder J. K. Howell.

In accordance with the resolution previously adopted, the cause of the Oxford Orphan Asylum was considered and addresses made by brother J. H. MILLS and the Rev. Mr. GRAY, of the Methodist church.

A chapter of orphans were present and engaged in singing and other exercises.

Addresses were afterwards made by Elders J. A. MUNDY and R. H. GRIFFITH, and a collection taken up, which, added to the same raised the previous day, made \$115.91 contributed to the Asylum at this session of the Convention.

Adjourned, to meet after the sermon on Sunday night.
