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# CONSTITUTION.

I. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of three representatives from each white Association in the State, of annual representatives for every \$10 contributed to its funds, and of such life members as have been, or shall be made so by the payment of \$30 at any one time to the Treasurer. No one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member, in good standing, of a Baptist Church.

2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the churches to which they belong: to support the Gospel in destitute sections of the State; to assist Baptist churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship; to encourage the study of the Bible in Sunday Schools; and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor.

3. The President shall preside when present, and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

4. There shall be three Vice-Presidents, one of whom shall preside in the absence of the President.

5. The Recording Secretary and his Assistant shall record the proceeding, publish the minutes, and collect and preserve correct statistics of the denomination.

6. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention, make public acknowledgment of the same every week, forward all contribution to their destination, and, at every meeting of the Convention, make a full report of his receipts and disbursements.

7. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Board in the employment and payment of Missionaries, and labor to promot, the cultivation and development of Christian benevolence. 8. The Boards of the Convention shall be appointed annually.

9. The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.

10. The Mission Board shall, so far as the means at its disposal will allow, supply all destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient ministers of the Gospel; shall give pecuniary aid, so far as can be secured, for building houses of worship at proper points in the State, and in cases where pecuniary aid cannot be extended, shall commend them to the beneficence of the churches. This Board shall co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all the departments of its labor.

11. The Sunday School Board shall encourage the study of the Bible in our churches, and co-operate with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

### PROCEEDINGS.

EDENTON, N. C., Nov. 14th, 1883.

At half past ten o'clock, this morning, Bro. J. C. SCAR-BOROUGH, former President of the Convention, called to order the Fifty-third session of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

After singing "There is a Fountain filled with blood," Elder R. R. OVERBY read the 121st and 122d Psalms, and offered prayer.

Elder C. DURHAM and Bro. N. L. SHAW were appointed a committee on Credentials, who reported from time to time the delegates, whose names appear on pages 6, 7 and 8.

The President announced as the next business, the election of a President, and appointed Elders O. F. GREGORY, W. A. POOL and Bro. W. J. PEELE, as tellers.

Elder J. D. HUFHAM moved the appointment of a committee to nominate the remaining officers of the Convention.

The motion was adopted, and the President appointed Elders HUFHAM, OVERBY, A. G. MCMANAWAY, brethren P. A. DUNN and W. C. PARKER, as the committee.

Elder GREGORY, for the tellers, reported the election of Bro. JOHN C. SCARBOROUGH as President.

Bro. SCARBOROUGH returned his thanks for the honor conferred.

Elder HUFHAM, for the committee to nominate the remaining officers, reported as follows:

The report was adopted.

Elder R. VANDEVENTER, pastor of the church, extended a cordial welcome to the delegates and visitors present in a short address of beauty, eloquence and tenderness.

The President, on behalf of the Convention, returned thanks for the welcome offered.

Visiting brethren were invited to seats with us.

Rev. Dr. G. A. NUNNALLY, of Georgia, representing the Building Department of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, was introduced by Elder A. G. MCMANAWAY.

Dr. NUNNALLY expressed his gratification at being present. He felt more like a returning relative, and, like the prodigal, he had been received with joy and given the good things of the old home.

Bro. C. L. SMITH, representing the *Wake Forest Student*, was introduced.

The President extended a welcome to these brethren.

After some discussion about the hours for meeting and adjourning, a committee was appointed to report on the same, consisting of Elder A. G. MCMANAWAY, Dr. T. E. SKINNER and Elder R. VANDEVENTER, pastor of the church.

Elder HUFHAM moved the appointment of the following committees: On Periodicals; Obituaries; to nominate Board of Education; to nominate Board of Missions; to nominate Sunday School Board; on Time and Place of next meeting. and to select a preacher to preach the Introductory Sermon at next Convention.

The motion was adopted.

The committee on hours for the sessions of the Convention reported as follows: Sunrise prayer meeting. Convention meet at 10 a. m., adjourn at 2 p. m.; meet at 7:30 p. m.; adjourn at pleasure.

The report was adopted.

On motion of Elder HUFHAM, the pastor and deacons of Edenton church were requested to arrange for preaching every afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

The President appointed as committee of Finance, Brethren A. B. ADKINS, W. C. PARKER, and Elder E. A. WOODSON.

The report of the Board of Missions was then read.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina :

### STATE MISSIONS.

Another year of unprecedented success has crowned the efforts of God's people in the prosecution of the State Mission work. A wave of enthusiasm went out from the late Convention in Warrenton which has widened as it has swept all over the State; and the work has grown so upon the hearts of the Lord's hosts that it is only necessary to make known the needs of the Board to insure prompt and ready responses from the thousands of friends all over our Zion.

In accordance with the instructions of the last Convention, your Board went forward and appropriated the whole amount pledged, \$4,300, to the Missionaries direct, granting every request made, and depending upon increased contributions sufficient to meet the other expenses, such as postage, rent, &c. Upon reaching home, two or three more applications were made of so much importance to the denomination that we felt constrained to grant them. The results show how grandly the brethren have come to our assistance. Nearly every one of the pledges made in support of the work has been paid, and most of them have been considerably overpaid, so that we now have about \$300 in the treasury. We thank God for such noble workers, and are sure that they are already well rewarded, for they realize that their "labor is not in vain in the Lord."

### DESTITUTION.

Much has been accomplished for the Master this year, but there is yet much more to be done. The destitution in Ashe and Alleghany counties, with that along the Piedmont section in Surry, Stokes, Guilford, Randolph, Cabarrus, Mecklenburg and other counties, as well as the vast territory all along the Atlantic coast, from Virginia to South Carolina, and from the W. & W. R. R. to the ocean beach, cries aloud to us for the bread of life. All that is needed are men and money, with the blessings of the Ahnighty. Shall we have them?

### OFFICE.

By a special arrangement, we have not had to pay any office rent this year. This has somewhat diminished our expenses; but as the correspondence has increased, we have been called upon to make greater outlays in that direction. Our Corresponding Secretary, too, has travelled more than usual. He has attended eleven Associations and several Union Meetings, visited quite a number of churches, delivered 37 addresses, and collected in cash and pledges, \$2146.49 for the objects of the Convention. And where he was unable to attend Associations, on account of his other duties, he has had representatives present to plead the cause of State Missions.

### SUGGESTIONS.

There are three matters to which we desire to call the attention of the Convention : 1. There is a pressing need for the right kind of a man to labor among the colored people of the State, as a special missionary, holding institutes and giving general instruction. Several of our leading brethren have seen the importance of this measure, and brought it to the attention of your Board. Besides, the Home Mission Board stands ready to pay one-half the salary of such a man. The plan is already in successful operation among the brethren in Georgia.

2. It has also been suggested that it might be wise to appoint a missionary to the inmates of our State and county prisons. Some of our best brethren think it eminently proper and practicable.

3. We would respectfully suggest that the Convention ask the churches throughout the State to release their pastors at least 10 days during the year to go out and hold meetings in destitute sections.

### CONCLUSION.

There is no more encouraging feature in our work than the fact that there is a continually increasing demand for more men, larger appropriations and more extensive operations; and the additional fact that the Baptists of the State are coming to see so much the importance of this department of our labor that they are becoming more and more liberal, and seem ready to meet any reasonable demands made upon them for its support. God is giving us great success wherever the proper efforts have been put forth, and the way keeps opening up to more enlarged and inviting fields. Last year, after granting every request that was made at the Convention, we thought that we had been enabled to occupy all the fields that were available, and we went home happy. But we soon met the stern fact face to face, that there were six or eight more just as important points which needed and were asking for our aid. We met as many as we thought wise, and you have ratified our action by your solemn seal of liberality.

This year the demands are even larger, and we should thank God forit. Quite a number of applications have come up from new fields, and a large proportion of the old ones are still claiming our attention. Shall we send them the everlasting Gospel, or shall we deny them the privilege of hearing the glad news of salvation?

### FIELD NOTES.

The increasing number of missionaries (54) render it impracticable that we should give more than a line from each one's field of labor. Itemized statements will be found annexed.

### EASTERN SECTION.

Elder W. L. Maget gives very encouraging reports of his labors in Currituck county. Baptized 21.

Elder F. R. Underwood has done a good work on his field in Martin county. Four additions.

Elder T. T. Speight has failed to send in his report.

Elder R. E. Peele, the only Missionary Baptist preacher in Beaufort county, says: "The Lord is with the Baptists of Eastern Carolina." He needs help to finish paying for his church.

Elder C. A. G. Thomas was at Washington nearly four months, but resigned because of ill health.

Elder Thomas Carriek has organized a church and built a house of worship at Pactolus. It is an encouraging field.

Elder W. B. Knight writes: "I think the prospects on my field are more encouraging than at any time since I came here."

Elder T. A. Reid is much encouraged at the prospects before the newly organ. ized church at Morehead City, where they are trying to finish their house.

Elder W. T. Jones labored half the year at Toisnot with gratifying success.

Elder G. M. Duke's preaching at Battleboro has been well attended, though no members have been added.

Elder G. W. Newell has been preaching at Fishing Creek since the retirement of Bro. Freeman. There is promise of an abundant harvest.

Elder C. A. Woodson says: "I have been greatly encouraged and blessed on my field during this quarter especially." This you will see by examining the Tabular Statement herewith.

Elder W. P. Blake continued his labors at Weldon until he decided to give himself to the work among the Indians.

Elder A. G. Willcox reports one house finished, and another nearly so. One church organized two years ago with nine members, now has more than forty. This is one of the most promising fields in the State.

Elder R. D. Harper has preached once a month at Free Chapel, and has added two members.

Elder G. W. Coppedge has spent much time in the mission work in Franklin and Nash counties with considerable success. He has organized one new church,

Elder M. V. McDuffle has fine prospects before him of building up a self-sustaining church at Middleburg at an early day.

Elder J. K. Howell has labored at several stations in Johnston county with much success. He has done a grand work in the way of distributing literature among the people.

Elder J. H. Booth has given a part of his time to the mission work in the lower part of Wake county, where there is much destitution.

### MIDDLE SECTION.

Elder A. D. Cohen, in addition to the work done as missionary of the Board, has preached 106 scrmons, attended 45 prayer-meetings, and made 100 religious visits. Laurinburg is now self-sustaining.

Elder J. M. Bennett says: "I have during the last quarter organized a new church about eight miles from Hamlet, and they are hard at work trying to build them a house."

Elder T. Harrison has continued his efforts at Rockingham, and has planned for an outstation a few miles away, where there is much encouragement offered.

Elder W. L. Wright gives a very encouraging report of his labors at Swepsonville and all over his field generally. Great success has attended him, and one or more of the churches organized recently is self-sustaining.

Elder C. E. Gower has awakened much interest at Mebaneville and revived the work at Graham, and the results of his year's labors have been quite good.

Elder R. A. Patterson has also been laboring in the Mt. Zion Association, but has failed to send in his reports.

Elder F. H. Jones has built one house and has put out the contract for another-He says: "The outlook is encouraging."

Elder B. H. Phillips has sent us a very interesting report of his labors, and adds: "The field is encouraging. We greatly need more men."

Elder W. H. Wilson says of one of his stations: "The congregations are so large that we shall be compelled to build us a new house." He has preached at three mission points.

Elder R. W. Crews writes: "We have good congregations and a Sunday School numbering 40. \* \* \* We expect to organize a church soon."

Elder E. F. Baldwin has had fine success at Greensboro this year. Thirty or forty have been added to the church, and a protracted meeting held, in which some 80 persons professed conversion.

Elder J. B. Richardson, who stands in a destitute section embodying 1,500 square miles, says: "Our church was constituted about 15 months ago, with 18 members; we now have 40 and prospects for seven or eight more. We have a splendid new house."

Elder Henry Sheets has still been actively engaged as one of the missionaries of the Liberty Association, and he is doing much to develop the Association.

Elder H. Morton, another one of the Liberty Association missionaries, has put in some good work in destitute sections.

Elder D. C. Culbreath has done some telling work within the bounds of the Liberty and Sandy Creek Associations.

Elder B. F. Copple has been going to school a part of his time, trying to better prepare himself for this work ; but he writes : "I have been encouraged on my field."

Elder S. H. Thompson writes: "Our church (Lexington) is nearly done. We are desirous of having preaching twice a month." At High Point the work is slowly progressing.

Elder A. C. Davis says that "the future of the church at Benton's X Roads is bright and the congregations good."

### WESTERN SECTION.

Elder J. B. Boone was manfully prosecuting the Lord's work at Salisbury, Concord and one other point until he was called to another field. The churches are now without a pastor and need the aid of the Board.

Elder W. L. Brown says: "Now is the time to press the work here (Statesville). We are slowly gaining ground. To falter now will be to lose all that has been done. We must go forward."

Elder T. J. Rooke writes: "We have had refreshing meetings at three points on my field. \* \* \* The interest in the Sunday School work is unabated."

Elder S. F. Conrad says: "God has greatly blessed me in my field. We have organized a new church at Lewisville of ten members and added two. At West Bend added 23," which is now self-sustaining. Also organized a new church at Huntsville.

Elder J. H. Caudle tells us that he has been laboring as voluntary missionary at three points besides his regular station. There are two Sunday Schools on his field.

Elder W. H. Beamer has done a good work near the Pilot Mountain, where he has organized a new church of 15 or 20 members.

Elder T. D. Castephens has been laboring not very far from the same point, with gratifying success.

Elder C. C. Haymore says: "I have witnessed the conversion of nearly two hundred souls since the middle of last July, and about one hundred and twentyfive baptisms."

Elder J. K. Faulkner is putting forth every endeavor to complete the new house of worship at Lincolnton, and the efforts have been considerably blessed. They still need aid. At Newton the prospects are brightening.

Elder J. F. Morris, missionary of the South Fork Association, writes: "Have organized one church and hope to be able to work to better advantage here after."

Elder J. B. Marsh has been enabled to occupy two stations by the appropria-

tions made by the Board to this field, and he tells us of good work among his charge.

Elder W. J. Bumgarner has baptized 50 persons during the last two quarters and greatly strengthened the cause in the Brushy Mountain Association.

Elder W. A. Pool, our missionary at Lenoir, says: "I have good congregations and fine attention. We worship in the Court House. We are trying to raise money to buy a lot and build a house."

Elder E. N. Gywn has done as much for Christ's cause in the Brier Creek Association as any man in it. He goes about from house to house and preaches the Gospel around the fireside. Grand results follow his labors.

Elder G. II. Church says of the interest in Sparta: "Our prospects are growing better there. We will be able to organize a church there soon. They need help on their church house very much."

Elder J. R. Jones reports thirteen baptisms, three protracted meetings and 32 professions during the last quarter alone. The new church at Star-town will be a blessing to the cause in that section.

Elder G. W. Harman tells us that the new railroad projected to pass through Marion will greatly enhance the interest at that point. The church in Ohl Fort "is in a good condition."

### OUTSIDE MISSIONARY WORK.

Besides the 54 missionaries who have reported their labors to us, quile a number of others have been actively engaged in the different Associations. In the Beulah, as follows: Elder D. G. Taylor has preached 18 sermons at Rierson's School-house, and baptized three. Elder R. R. Moore has preached at three stations southwest of Greensboro, at one of which there is good promise of an early organization. Elder E. M. Poteat labored during his vacation as general missionary for Caswell county, preached 40 sermons, aided in three protracted meetings, where there were 58 professions of fuith.

In the Anson Association, at Morven, Bro. D. M. Austin did good work during his vacation.

In the Eastern, Bro. C. S. Cashwell has travelled as general missionary, built a good house at Pollockville, and organized a fine church. Brethren Leary and Aman have also done missionary work, as has Bro. W. M. Kennedy in the destitute parts of Pender county, where he has baptized between 30 and 40 persons, and organized a new ehurch at Maple Hill.

In the Flat River Association Brethren T. J. Horner, J. S. Hardaway, G. N. Piltard and C. F. Humphries have done some good work. A church has been organized, a house built and several souls baptized.

Elder Allen Betts has been devoting a part of his time to the work in the Raieigh Association, and reports 50 days' labor, two protracted meetings, eight professions and two baptisms.

Elder D. Gilliland has been acting as voluntary missionary and colporteur, and has distributed quite a lot of Eaplist literature and preached several sermons.

Others still have been at work for the Master at destitute points, among whom are Drethren W. J. Fulford, of the South Yadkin Association; J. A. Rector and D. W. Conway, of the Catawba River; P. R. Elam, J. A. Hoyle, G. M. Webb and G. P. Hamrick, of the King's Mountain; J. L. Smith, of the Sandy Creck; E. W. Wooten, D. J. Ray and others in the Cape Fear; and in the Cedar Creck, W. W. Willis, J. G. Fisher, W. R. Johnson, E. J. Edwards, I. T. Newton, and James A. Smith, altogether performing 108 days of hobor, organizing two churches and three Sunday Schools, baptizing 32 and paying 23 religious visits, These, with the 54 who have reported to us, make in all 83. Who can estimate the results of the cornest labors of these s3 men?

### FOREIGN MISSIONS.

By request Bro. O. F. Gregory has furnished us with the following part of our report:

The Conventional year has been marked by an increased interest in the work of Foreign Missions, as evidenced both by larger contributions, and the number of laborers offering themselves for the work.

The number of missionaries now employed by the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Eaptist Convention is 38, who have 30 native assistants laboring with them, making a total of 68. The members of native churches number 1,032. Pupils in the schools, 564. Baptisms reported last year, 124.

CHINA .- The station at SHANGHAI, under the superintendence of Dr. M. T. Yates and wife, has regular worship maintained in five places, two in Shanghai. one five miles from the city, and the others at Kwin San (Rev. See Tay San pastor,) and Soo-Chow, (Teung Tsoong Oh, supply.) In Shanghai the mission has five services a week-congregations on Sunday vary from 59 to 150. The church numbers 110, and contributed for mission work \$216.84. When the baptized believers of North Carolina equal this proportion of giving, there will be no lack of funds for mission work at home and abroad. Bro. W. S. Walker is beginning to preach in the Chinese language. Rev. W. J. Hunnex and wife have been added to this mission and are stationed at Ching-Kiang, a city of 150,000 inhabitants. Miss Ruth McCown is now preparing in Philadelphia to join Dr. Yates, as a medical missionary. Three other native assistants besides those named are also laboring under Dr. Yates' direction. Dr. Yates has pub. lished his translations of Mark and Lnke, so that his people now have all the Gospels, the Acts, and Romans in their vernacular. He has translated Galatians, and is working on Corinthians.

At TUNG CHOW, are stationed Dr. T. P. Crawford and wife, Mrs. S. J. Holnies, Miss Lottie Moon (who has a school of 25 girls, and has besides visited 227 villages.) and Bro. N. W. Halcomb, and C. W. Pruitt and wife, (the latter, formerly a missionary of the Presbyterian Board, has recently been baptized). Native membership, 106; baptisms, 13. Miss Mattie Roberts has just sailed for China to join this station.

At CANTON are Dr. R. H. Graves and wife, Miss Lula Whilden, Bro. E. Z. Simmons and wife, and Miss Sallie Stein, with 11 native assistants. Miss Emma Young is ready to sail to this mission, but is detained on account of the impending war with France. Preaching is maintained at SZNE and NG CHAW-Our missionaries have been stoned and persecuted at the latter place. Three of the ablest native assistants have died during the past year. Six schools, with an average attendance of 125, two Bible classes for women, and one for native assistants are kept up. Nine out-stations have the Gospel preached to them.

AFRICA.-Our mission work here is located in Yomba; and the stations and missionaries are as follows: LAGOS, W. J. David and wife; ABBEOKUTA, P. A. Eubank and wife; OGBOMOSHAW, M. L. Stone, native pastor; GAUN, S. L. Milton, native evangelist; HAUSSEO FARM, Albert Eli, native evangelist. Converts, 11; pupils, 194; church members, 100; contributions, \$179.02.

ITALY.—The following are the stations and preachers: ROME, Geo. B. Taylor, Mrs. Taylor, J. H. Eager and Mrs. Eager; TORRE PELLICE, Signor Cocorda; PINEROLO, Signor Ferraris; MILAN, Signor Paschetto; VENICE, Signor Belondi; BOLOGNA, Signors Columbo and Torre; MODENA AND CARPI, Signor Martinelli; BARA AND BARLETTA, Signor Volpi; NAPLES, Signor Basile; ISLAND OF SARDINA, Signor Cossu. Number in Sunday Schools, 112; contributions, §238; membership of churches, 220; baptized, 39

BRAZIL.-W. B. Bagley and Z. C. Taylor and their wives occupy Santa Barbara and Bahia; they report five baptisms; church membership, 50;.

MEXICO.—Our missions are located in the State of Coahuila. At PROGRESSO, are W. M. Flournoy and wife; at SALTILLO, W. D. Powell and wife, and Miss Annie Mayberry. Native assistants Juez Castillo, Profirio Rodsquez and Cheneta Reutena. The work has been wondefully prosperous ever since the establishment of the mission.

"The Mexican Government has offered to give to the Baptists of America land valued at \$157,000, provided they will establish a \$40,000 school at Saltillo, and four other High Schools at other important points. This looks well, but Baptists have not liked the plan of accepting gifts from States or Governments heretofore. The Board in Richmond, V.a., accepted this gift with much enthusiasm, and the churches in Richmond promptly subscribed \$2,000 for the object."

### THE COST OF THE WORK.

The cost of the work for the past year was \$56,801.71. For this year the Board ask \$100,000, and the quota for North Carolina is \$8,000. The Vice President of the Board has, either in person or through proxy, visited nearly all the Associations, and feels hopeful that, although this amount is nearly twice as much as we gave last year, yet our apportionment may be met. There will be no difficulty in doing so, if every pastor will see that a collection is taken in each of his ehurches before April 1st, next, and urges every member to give as God has prospered him.

### WOMAN'S WORK,

About the lst of August the Central Committee of Women's Mission Societies in North Carolina was located in Charlotte, with Mrs. O. F. Gregory as President, Mrs. A. B. Todd as Corresponding Secretary, and Mrs. W. F. Williams as Treasurer. They report as received up to Oct. 16th, \$56.16. The Pastors are earnestly urged to organize the women of their churches, and to give them encouragement in this laudable endeavor.

### MONEY AND MEN.

Money and men are needed by our Foreign Mission Board, and when our churches are awakened by the Holy Spirit, they will realize the obligation rest ing upon them to give the gospel to the heathen. Oh for the Spirit of Christ which is the spirit of missions to abide within each one of us.

### CONTRIBUTIONS.

The contributions sent up by the churches of North Carolina to the Treasurer for Foreign Missions have been \$4,041.62; besides this there was sent direct to Dr. Tupper \$496.36, making in all \$4,537.98.

### HOME MISSIONS.

This is a department of our labor that is of vital importance. What the State Mission Board is to North Carolina, the Home Mission Board is to the Southern States, and we cannot over-estimate its value as a factor in Christianizing the inhabitants of our "Southern sunny clime." Thousands of immigrants are pouring in among us every year from almost every nation under heaven. These are bringing with them the idol-worship of China, the ignorance and superstition of Italy and Ireland, with the thraidom of Popery and the bondage of Catholicism, the "free-thinking" and infidelity of Germany, and the atheism of France. What these influences will have to do with the morals and religion of this country depends much upon what we do to bring these people "to a knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus." And the only effectual bulwark against such a tide is christianity.

Who will constitute the legislators and national representatives from the

Western States and Territories twenty-five years from to-day? What classes of people are filling them at such an enormous rate? This will answer the ques" tion, and unless something is done to change their hearts, we shall be deluged in a sea of infidelity and idolatry, as black as the pall that veils the Sun of Righteousness from the shores of many parts of the old world.

This Home Mission Board has had under its employ ninety-five persons, who, during the past year, have done a grand work in many important places in the South and West. One of these missions is among the Chinese in California. And God has shown His willingness to bless the efforts so faithfully put forth there. And the Board is casting an anxious look over into New Mexico and Arizona, and longing for the means and men to send the Gospel among this rapidly growing people.

And then the important and increasing work among the Indians, for which our sainted Brother Podson used to plead so earnestly, and for which he spend his time, his means and his life, is still claiming the attention of the Home Board,

Besides these, this Board has earnest, devoted men laboring in Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, including the promising missions in New Orleans, Tennessee and Florida, and it is necessary that the work at these points be vigorously prosecuted. There is also a movement on foot to send a missionary among the Cherokee Indians of Western North Carolina, as well as into some other parts of our mountain country.

### THE COLORED PEOPLE.

"The Eoard greatly desires to extend its missions among the colored people of <sup>45</sup> The Hoard greatly desires to extend its missions among the courde people of the South. Among this class of people in Georgia br. Melntosh is laboring with gratifying success as Theological Instructor. At some central point he gathers tegether, from a circuit of some twenty or thirty miles, the preachers and hading mea of the churches. These he calculty instructs in theimportant doctrines of the Gospel, church order and discipline. If our means would per-mit we could not do for this needy face among us a better work than to employ a good man for a similar purpose in every State in the South."

### CHURCH BUILDING DEPARTMENT.

"A new department of missionary work has been organized by our Home Mission Board, namely: 'The Church Bullding bepartment.' It is new to the Baptists of the South, but it is *not or experiment* by any means. Other denominations and cur Baptist brethren of the North have been prose-cuting this work for years with eminent success. The experience of all those who are engaged in it has demonstrated its practicability. The result of its operations prove its great value. The support which it receives shows that it is in accord with the true Christian heart. The project addresses Itself with great force to the mind and conscience of every follower of Jesus.

This new department of our work has already received the full endorsement This new department of our work has idready received the full endorsement of our religious press and of leading brethren throuthout the south, and we are organizing the most efficient plans for its presention. Rev. G. A. Nunnally, of Rome, fa. has been elected Secteary for the states east of the Mississippi river. A brother, who has not yet signified his acceptance, has been elected for the States west of the Mississippi. The board hopes to be able to make a good report of this work an endowment of not less than Stou,000, is needed. This the Board hopes ultimately to secure." hopes ultimately to secure.

We desire to mention the arduous labors performed and the self-sacrificing interest manifested this year by Bro. O. F. Gregory, of Charlotte, and Bro. A. G. McManaway, of Louisburg, the former Vice President of the Foreign Mission Board, and the latter Vice-President of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, for North Carolina, who have visited many of the Associations in person in behalf of their respective Boards, and where they could not be present, they have generally been represented by proxy. They have done much to inform our people and advance the cause of missions among us, and all without any remuneration.

### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

### To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina:

We are thankful to God for the success which has been achieved in this department of our labor this year. No more pleasing results have ever greeted us than we have to record now. An earnest enthusiasm and hearty zeal have characterized the laborers and their efforts and the hand of our "bountiful Father" has again shown His willingness to add His blessings. We are sorry that every Eaptist in the State is not fully engaged in the work. If we could marshal all our hosts against the powers of sin, a victory would crown us which would fill us with astonishment.

This year tells us of *fifty-four new Sunday Schools* which have been organized in various parts of the State, many of them at the stations occupied by the missionaries of the Convention. This is very encouraging, for we know that wherever a good Sunday School is successfully carried on for any considerable length of time, a church is almost sure to spring up. God is always pleased to honor His Word, whether proclaimed from the pulpit, or by the weak, faltering *laypracher*, who gathers a class around him on Sunday morning and lays before them the good news of salvation, the story of Jesus' love.

### OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

At our annual Sunday School gathering, held this year at Shelby, N. C., a larger number of representatives was present than at any of our previous meetings. Interesting and able discussions were had upon quite a number of topics relating to our work, and all seened happy and went away profited. Much interest was added to the occasion by the sweet, spiritual music contributed by Bro. Fish, of Nashville, Tenn., who was present by special invitation, and by the presence and aid of some other brethren from a distance. Arrangements for holding the next meeting were left to the new Board to be appointed by this body. Let us insist that the matter is not overlooked.

### THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPPLY STORE.

This comparatively new enterprise, inaugurated two years ago, has grown very considerably, and so great was the labor in connection with it, that it was necessary to call in some additional aid. This was happily secured in the person of Bro. James W. Denmark, who rendered very valuable service for eight months, and at a cost to us of only §10).

The year's work was begun with a capital stock of only \$300.25, not including the \$90.25 in outstanding claims, much of which has not yet been collected. This small amount has been used again and again, until, with the contributions which have since come in, we now have in stock the following:

### OUR OFFICE.

By renting a part of our office room to J. W. Denmark & Co., a portion of the year, we were relieved of a very considerable expense. Whole expense of office \$300. Of this, \$100 was contributed by the owners, brethren Williamson & Up-church. For eight months we rented a part of the room for \$133.33½, which reduced our actual rent to \$66.6654.

### RETROSPECT.

In November, 1876, the Sunday School Board was carried to Raleigh. At that time there was an old debt hanging over it amounting to 5280.45, due the former missionary. At the first meeting of the new Board, after permanent organization, the brethren decided that no effective work could be accomplished until this indebtedness was paid and something put into the treasury. Consequently subscriptions were immediately taken, and from the ten members present \$1.995.45 was subscribed. There was also an old claim from the American Baptist Publication Society, amounting to 5250.78, which was settled; in all \$551.23. With the debts all paid and money in the treasury, a new impetus was given the work; an office was rented and a man employed to spend about onehalf his time in the office, attending to the business of the Board.

A vigorous correspondence was immediately begun with the leading Sunday School workers all over the State, and an enterprise was set on foot to organize a Missionary Society in every Baptist Sunday School in North Carolina. This resulted in what is known as the "Little Leader" missionary society movement. This plan operated successfully in many Schools for three or four years, and is now used by several. Since that time other plans have been instituted which, with this, have assisted schools in raising several thousand dollars for the prosecution of the Sunday School work. This, with the present encouraging report from the Supply Store, will show something of what has been done in these six years.

On motion of Bro. P. A. DUNN, a committee of three was appointed to nominate five Trustees of the Convention. The President appointed Bro. P. A. DUNN, Elders C. A. JENKENS and W. P. JORDAN.

The President extended an invitation to visiting brethren to take seats with us.

Elder BAILEY introduced Rev. Dr. TIBERIUS GRACCHUS JONES, of Norfolk, Va.

Rev. Dr. C. C. BITTING, representing the Bible Board of the American Baptist Publication Society of Philadelphia, Pa., was introduced.

Elder REUBEN JONES, of Churchland, Va., was also introduced.

These brethren were welcomed by the President.

Elder E. F. BALDWIN, of Greensboro, stated that he was the bearer of greetings from Elder A. C. DIXON, of Baltimore, who desired to be with us but was called away to an appointment at the Baptist Congress in Boston.

Rev. Dr. MITCHELL, of Asheville, and Rev. JOS. E. CAR-TER, of Hendersonville, were welcomed as Correspondents from the Western Baptist Convention.

The report of the Sunday School Board being the special order for this hour, was taken up.

On motion. the report was adopted.

On motion of Elder VANDEVENTER, to-morrow at one o'clock was set apart as the hour for hearing from Dr. BIT-TING, representing the Bible Department of the American Baptist Publication Society.

The committee on Religious Exercises announced that Rev. Dr. T. G. JONES would preach at the Methodist church and Rev. Dr. G. A. NUNNALLY, at the Baptist church this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

Rev. Dr. J. L. BURROWS, of Norfolk, Va., was recognized and welcomed by the President.

Dr. BURROWS presented the greetings of the General Association of Virginia.

"All hail the power of Jesus name," was sung.

Prof. W. B. ROYALL, of Wake Forest, offered prayer.

The hour for the special order having arrived, Prof. CHAS. E. TAYLOR read the report of the Board of Education, as follows:

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

During the last year forty young ministers have received assistance from the Board. Thirty-four of these have received instruction at Wake Forest College, four at the Louisville Seminary, and two at Wakefield Academy.

The Board is directed by the 9th Article of the Constitution to assist "promising and indigent young ministers" "so far as it is able." The greatest care is taken to afford aid to none but the "promising and indigent." But the decision of the question is, in some cases, a delicate and difficult task. The Board cordially and earnestly solicits information and advice from all who may be in position to impart facts or opinions which may affect its decisions. Candid and intelligent criticism of its work will be gratefully received by the Board,

The churches have thus far enabled the Board to do all the work which it has deemed prudent to undertake. It is, practically, out of debt. But the eye of a prophet is not needed to see that the work of this Board will steadily and rapidly enlarge. The causes are already in existence which will produce this result. But it is also believed that the beneficence of the churches will be commensurate with the demands of the future.

With gratitude to God for what He has enabled it to accomplish, and with a cheerful outlook into the future, the Board of Education submits the above report, and closes the 52nd year of its work.

On the motion to adopt the report, remarks were made by Prof. TAYLOR in explaining the work of the Board; by Dr. T. G. JONES, of Norfolk, Va., in behalf of education, and by Elder C. L. POWELL, showing the importance of training the body as well as the mind and heart.

The report of the Board of Education was then adopted. The Endowment of Wake Forest College was then taken up.

Prof. C. E. TAYLOR addressed the body. One year ago he consented to undertake the raising of the balance needed to make the Endowment Fund one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). The work was not done, but we are in sight of the end. If \$3,000 should be raised here, he felt sure of the remainder.

Elder R. T. VANN addressed the Convention in behalf of the College, eloquently, tenderly and grandly.

Elder C. DURHAM made the statement that the Endowment Fund was invested in only first mortgages; that no member of the Faculty or of the Trustees could borrow any of it. The object was to make the investments as secure as it is possible. That not one dollar of it had been lost since the war, and if careful guarding it would save it, not one dollar of it would ever be lost.

Rev. Dr. SKINNER said he thought it was time for us to commence the work of raising the needed amount.

## THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, November 16th, 1883.

The President called the Convention to order at 10 o'clock.

Elder A. D. COHEN read 4th chapter 1st Corinthians and offered prayer.

Journal of yesterday read, corrected and approved.

Elder J. F. TUTTLE and Elder W. D. PRITCHARD, of the Portsmouth (Va.) Association, were recognized and welcomed by the President.

The special order for this hour being that part of the report of the Board of Missions referring to State Missions, it was taken up.

On the motion to adopt the report, Bro. JOHN E. RAY, Corresponding Secretary, addressed the body. Six years ago, he said, the Board had under their appointment 9 missionaries; two years after, 18; for the past year '54. It had been the policy of the Board during these years not to report any debt to this Convention. He called attention to the statistics as presented in the report of the Board.

Elder HUFHAM spoke to us. He said there is a want of co-operation on the part of some of our bodies for fear that the special work they had on hand would not be properly appreciated, whereas the Board always did its work in conformity to the wishes of the Associations, Union Meetings and churches, if that could be ascertained. He reviewed the work. Nothing was so hard to kill as a Baptist church. He had travelled up and down North Carolina, but had yet to see the first dead Baptist church. As we plant these churches we are doing a work that is to last as long as time lasts. In tears we listened as he told us of the great destitution opening up to us and of the demands that the love of Jesus makes upon us.

Elder HUFIIAM, for the committee on Obituaries, cailed attention to the death during the past year of Elder ELIAS DODSON,Eld.WM. HILL JORDAN, and Rev. Dr.W. T. BROOKS, and said the committee were unable to secure the data needed to write a suitable memorial of these brethren, and recommended, therefore, that the duty be assigned to some brother or brethren who should perform the task and place the same in proper form for the minutes of the Convention.

Rev. Dr. JAS. B. TAYLOR told us of the last hours and death of Elder DODSON, and of the monument crected to his memory in the cemetery in Wilmington, N. C.

Elder REUBEN JONES said Virginia would join us in

honoring the memory of these brethren. They were gone but not dead. They live in the lives and deeds of others.

Dr. PRITCHARD referred to Elder WM. HILL JORDAN.

On motion of Elder T. HARRISON, Dr. HUFHAM was appointed to write the memorials, and empowered to call to his aid two other brethren.

The hour for the special order having arrived, Rev. Dr. C. C. BITTING addressed the Convention in behalf of the Bible Department of the American Baptist Publication Society.

He said, though practically living in Philadelphia, his church membership was in Baltimore with the people of which he was the former pastor, and he expected to remain a member of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Bible is the soul of all our work for Christ. If we are to have a Gospel fruitage, we must sow the word just as it is. If the Bible only was between us and other denominations, it would not be long before the prayer of our Saviour, that we all might be one, would be realized. Eloquently he appealed for the spread of the Scriptures. He asked that the brethren teil their people at home of this Bible work, and urge them to send a contribution for it.

Elder HUFHAM moved that we heartily approve of the Bible work of the American Baptist Publication Society, and pledge ourselves to co-operate in the same.

The motion was adopted.

## FRIDAY NIGHT.

Convention re-assembled at 7:30 p.m., and was called to order by the President.

After singing, Rev. Dr. SKINNER led in prayer.

The report was adopted.

The special order was called, being so much of the report of the Board of Missions as relates to Foreign Missions.

On the motion to adopt the same,

Elder O. F. GREGORV called our attention to the broad field before us, and was followed by Elder E. F. BALDWIN, who directed our notice to the Kabylese, a nation of ten millions or more living in the mountains of Algeria, on the northern coast of Africa, where until lately the Gospel had never been preached, and where the first convert demanded at the hands of his religious teacher baptism by immersion. He believed this a call from God to the Baptists. He coveted for North Carolina the honor of leading off in the work of evangelizing this nation.

Rev. Dr. J. L. BURROWS, of Norfolk, Va., addressed the body in behalf of the foreign work generally. He reviewed the history of the work with the Baptists as one nation after another had come to us with outstretched hands.

Rev. Dr. JAMES B. TAYLOR spoke for a short while on the encouragements of the work; and then of the startling fact that 856,000,000 of souls had never heard of Jesus.

A cash collection was taken amounting to \$21.73.

The report on Foreign Missions was then adopted. On motion, the Convention adjourned.

## FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY MORNING, Nov. 17th, 1883.

President SCARBOROUGH called the Convention to order at 10:30 o'clock.

Elder F. R. UNDERWOOD read the 84th Psalm and offered prayer.

The journal of yesterday was read, corrected and approved.

Rev. Dr. A. E. DICKINSON, one of the editors of the *Religious Herald*, was recognized and welcomed by the President.

We would be glad to know that every Sunday School had a good supply of *Kind Words* and the *Lesson Papers* published in connection with it. The very little ones are provided for by the *Child's Gem*.

Elder BAILEV, editor of the BIBLICAL RECORDER, made a few remarks. He did not expect to make a speech. The Baptists of the State that are doing anything are taking the paper. If brethren desired to see more of their members at work, they could not secure this in any way so effectually as by extending the circulation of the paper.

Elder OVERBY said if he had done any good, or helped others to work in the accomplishment of good, it had been due to the BIBLICAL RECORDER more than anything else.

Dr. C. C. BITTING urged the brethren to preserve their papers. As the pile increases they grow more and more valuable.

Prof. TAYLOR said there was no agency so important to our work in North Carolina as the BIBLICAL RECORDER. Without it, we could not keep the beneficiaries supported at Wake Forest; could not have accomplished the Endowment which we are looking hopefully for. Through its columns, Bro. RAY has been enabled to bring success to the State Mission work; by its aid, we keep up with all our finances. If the RECORDER had 10,000 subscribers, we should see all our work greatly enlarged.

Elder HUFHAM urged the pastors to look after the circulation of the RECORDER among the members of their churches.

Elders C. L. POWELL, T. A. REID, Dr. PRITCHARD, Dr. SKINNER followed.

Dr. NUNNALLY referred to some of the perplexities of an editor. He had tried farming, merchandising, running a saw mill, and a newspaper, and he had never found anything in which he could sink money faster than with a paper. The editor needs our sympathy and he begged for kind and charitable feeling toward Bro. BAILEY.

Dr. BURROWS said some persons objected to the advertisements, whereas, in truth, it was the advertisements that supported the paper, and not the subscription list.

Elder HUFHAM read a letter from Elder THOS. CARRICK, pastor of the church at Greenville, giving the progress of the work in erecting the Memorial Church at that place.

Elder HUFHAM moved that we reaffirm the resolutions adopted at our last session, as follows:

WHEREAS, We have heard with pleasure that our brethren in Greenville contemplate building a house of worship to commemorate the organization of this body in that town more than fifty years ago; therefore,

Resolved, That we do approve the purpose of our brethren in Greenville.

*Resolved*, That we do commend to the liberality of our brethren in the State this effort of the church in Greenville.

Elder HUFHAM addressed the Convention in behalf of aid in the erection of the church at Greenville.

The motion to adopt the resolutions was carried.

The committee on Religious Exercises made the following announcement of appointments for to-morrow (Sunday):

Elder J. K. HOWELL, for the committee on Place of Meeting for next Convention, reported as follows:

The committee to select the place for the next meeting of the Convention respectfully recommend the First Baptist church, Raleigh, N. C.

The report was adopted.

Elder W. R. GWALTNEY offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

*Resolved*, That the Baptist State Convention earnestly recommends that every pastor of every white Baptist church in North Carolina shall take up a collection in each of his churches, before the end of the year, for the immediate completion of the first hundred thousand dollars of the endowment of Wake Forest College.

Bro. JOHN E. RAY, at the request of the Finance Committee, submitted the following report, which was adopted:

Elder HUFHAM moved the appointment of Brethren C. T. BAILEY, C. DURHAM, JOHN C. SCARBOROUGH, W. R. GWALTNEY and C. S. FARRISS, as a committee to revise the Constitution and report at our next session.

Elder JAS. S. PUREFOV opposed the motion. He thought the Constitution was as it should be.

The motion was adopted.

Bro. N. L. SHAW offered the following:

*Recolved*, That the thanks of the Convention be extended to such railroads and transportation companies as have given reduced rates to delegates and friends attending the same.

*Resolved 2d*, That our hearty thanks be extended to Mr. E. L. C. Ward, editor of *Albemarle Enquirer*, for his kindness in issuing and having distributed to the members of the Convention daily proceedings of same.

The resolutions were adopted.

A telegram was received from Elder A. C. DIXON, Baltimore, as follows :

## NIGHT SESSION.

In accordance with resolution passed by the Convention during its session, Bro. N. B. BEOUGHTON announced the object of this meeting—" Mass Meeting in behalf Sunday School Work." Sunday School choir sung " Look ever Upward." Prayer by Rev. A. D. HUNTER.

Rev. Dr. BITTING, of Philadelphia, was introduced as the first speaker, who addressed the meeting eloquently and pathetically, and was followed in short and spirited speeches by Prof. ROYALL of Wake Forest College, Rev. T. W. BABB, Rev. S. H. THOMPSON, Dr. THOS. E. SKINNER, Bro. N. B. BROUGHTON and Dr. TAYLOR.

The beautiful and stirring music from the Sunday School choir, led by Miss WOODARD, interspersed between the speeches, added much interest and pleasure to this very delightful meeting.

The meeting closed by singing "Beulah Land." Benediction by Rev. T. A. REID.

## FIFTH DAY.

MONDAY, Nov. 19th, 1883.

By arrangement of the committee on Religious Exercises, a Prayer and Praise Meeting was held this morning, beginning at ten o'clock, conducted by Rev. Dr. PRITCHARD, reading Matthew 17th chapter, 1st to 14th verse.

Dr. PRITCHARD said he had been connected with this Convention since 1849, when it met in Oxford, and he felt that this session had been the most pleasant and harmonious of all that he had attended. He called attention to the statistics as presented to this body. The aggregate of all the money contributed to the objects of the Convention including Endowment of Wake Forest College, during the past year was \$106,747.58. Bro. RAV said he believed the success of the past year had been because our people had come to look to Christ having confidence in the work of the Convention they gave liberally and followed it up with their prayers. He said that it was surprising to some that there were so many vacant pastorates; to him it was easily understood—the organization of new churches demanded pastors and there had been thirty-two last year.

Dr. SKINNER said the spirit of organization in all our churches was a matter of thankfulness; to this was due our success. He did'nt believe any heretic could come into North Carolina and disturb to much extent the harmony of our denomination.

Dr. TAYLOR said this Convention had been sweet and heavenly. He had never experienced more joy and peace than during the past few days. When the Apostles went down from the Mount of Transfiguration, it was to meet toil, labor and suffering—but Jesus went with them—and so he prayed Jesus might go with us.

Elder E. F. BALDWIN said he felt that the transfiguration scene was very much like these scenes. Jesus was a man, subject to discouragements, and the Father took him up on the Mount to encourage his heart. So we, too, have been permitted to come together on the Mount, and our hearts have been lifted up and encouraged.

Elder JAS. S. PUREFOY said he had been connected with this Convention since 1831, the first year after its organization. Since that time, great changes had been wrought. He attributed our success to the fact of our unity.

Prof. ROYALL prayed.

Dr. BITTING said it had been a great privilege and a spiritual joy to be at this session of the Convention. The great moving impulse apparent was Jesus! He believed the way to prosperity was in standing for God, for Christ, for the Holy Spirit, for truth.

Dr. HUFHAM said with the exception of Elder PUREFOY

he had been with this body longer than any other member. For years we had been struggling towards each other and at last had come together. Our success was due to the selfsacrificing labors of the brethren whose hearts touched with love for Christ had been willing to give all, that the cause of Jesus might be advanced.

Prof. ROVALL said our unifying power was the word of God. To that word he was indebted for all of the goodness and mercy of God as revealed to him. He thanked God for the promises in the Bible. It is not God is a refuge, but God is *our Refuge*. He thanked Him for the encouragement of His word to him as a sinner.

Dr. PRITCHARD alluded to the Scripture lesson read, and the important truths taught us, and from which we are led to believe that we shall know each other in heaven. He called to mind the labors and toils of MEREDITH, WAIT. WALTERS, WINGATE and others.

Bro. HUNTER asked that the students at the Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky, be remembered in the prayers of the brethren.

President SCARBOROUGH made closing remarks. There had not been a sharp word said, not a single disagreement—not even a discussion. He returned thanks for the kindness and patience exhibited to him.

On motion, the Convention adjourned to meet in Raleigh. "Precious Name" was sung, the hand of parting taken and we separated.

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## REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

## ELIAS DODSON

Was born in Virginia, October 27th, 1807. His youth and early manhood were spont on his father's farm, where he received the physical training and development which bore him with uninterrupted good health through fifty years of arduous and incessant toil. He also received such mental training as the country schools of that day could furnish. In 1832 he was converted to God under the preaching of John Kerr, and was baptized by William Blair. In 1835. having decided that it was his duty to preach the Gospel, he entered the Baptist Seminary, now Richmond College, and after completing the course of study went to William and Mary College, from which institution he was graduated in The same year, at Grace Street church, Richmond, he was ordained to 1838. the full work of the ministry. For a few years he was engaged as a missionary of the General Association of Virginia, preaching mostly in the Roanoke Association, which was then pervaded to a considerable extent by the anti-missionary spirit. He and Elder J. J. James prepared the body for the change, effected a few years later by the tact and courage of John L. Prichard, by which it was brought into hearty co-operation with the other Associations of the State in building up the Redeemer's kingdom among men.

In 1844 he accepted an appointment as missionary of the Baptist State Convention for the Beulah Association. In this work he was greatly useful. In one county where there was no Baptist church, he baptized a small company of believers and gathered them into a church. A few years ago thirteen churches had sprung from that parent stem and the work of multiplication was still going on. Under his ministry the gifted and fascinating woman who afterwards married Stephen A. Douglass was converted and baptized. As a memorial of her the great statesman gave to the Baptists the property out of which has come the University at Chicago.

He greatly helped to queil the spirit of Antinomianism which still lingered, arrogant and aggressive, in some parts of the Association, and so bring the churches up to the high standard of liberality and efficiency which they have since maintained. It was he who first prominently and persistently brought before the Baptists of the State the importance of occupying the towns and growing villages. Not only by his pleadings and contributions, but also with the labor of his own hands, he helped to secure the first house of worship owned by the Baptists of Hillsboro. For a considerable time his plea for the towns seemed almost unheeded, but it bore fruit abundantly during the last eighteen years of his life.

Retiring from his position as missionary, he accepted the agency of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention for North Carolina. With the exception of a few years spent in Tennessee he gave his time and strength to this work, continuing in it as long as he was able to travel. He labored on for several months with the consciousness that a fatal disease was on him and rapidly running its course. In Wilmington, towards the close of November, 1882, in the house of Mr. Oldham, the son of an old and cherished friend, he lay down to await the summons from on High. His work was done. On the 6th of December he passed from the tender ministrations of brethren who loved him to the "general assembly and church of the first-born" in heaven.

He was never married. He cared for a widowed sister and her children with the wisdom and tenderness of a father; but the love of Christ filled his whole heart as the preaching and the service of Christ filled up his whole life.

A memorial stone, erected by his brethren in different parts of the State, marks the spot where all that was mortal of him lies buried; faint emblem of their love for him while living, of their sorrow for him now gone from them forever. It was meet that he and the heroic Prichard should lie near each other in their last sleep, since in the earlier years of their ministry they were fellowsoldiers, victors too, on the same field of glory.

As a man his leading characteristic was his genuineness. Through and through he was real; utterly devoid of sham and pretence. His most striking mental trait was strong common-sense. This, joined to a firm reliance on the utterances of his own judgment, an industry that never flagged or intermitted, a store of accurate knowledge which reading and observation were constantly increasing, a love of order which pervaded and ruled his life, a prodigious memory improved by education, a singleness of purpose which nothing could divert, a large acquaintance with men and knowledge of men, and an integrity which was above the reach of corrupting influences, would have made him successful in any business or profession.

Such men are usually considered eccentric, and those who knew him will long continue to tell smilingly, lovingly, of Brother Dodson's peculiarities. He was economical in the use of words; fond of condensing his thoughts into proverbs and short, pithy sentences. Few persons ever heard him without carrying away as a memorial of him some of these sayings. The tone of his conversation was cheerful but dignified; the matter entertaining and instructive. One of the most eminent public men of the State was wont to say that he enjoyed Brother Dodson's visits because he always learned something from them that was worth knowing. No man of his day will be so long or so often quoted by his brethren.

His whole bearing was that of a man who had seen the Lord; who belonged to the Lord, lived with the Lord. Prayer was to him an unfailing source of strength and joy. The Bible was to him the voice of God. He studied it reverently, lovingly, prayerfully, constantly. More than once in the homes where he was sojourning, when there was insufficient light at the home for family worship, he repeated a chapter from memory and then led in prayer.

In the earlier years of his ministry he was very successful as an evangelist. To a firm grasp and clear presentation of the doctrines of grace were added an earnestness and unction that at times made him irresistible. During the last twenty-five years of his life his preaching was largely on the duty of believers to consecrate themselves and their possessions to the Lord. This duty he enforced by arguments from the Scriptures and by illustrations drawn from every source. But the most effective part of his preaching, as it must be in the case of any man, was that which his own daily life furnished. His invariable rule was to accept only so much salary as sufficed to meet his ordinary wants. It was a favorite saying of his : "Our imaginary wants are many; our real wants are few." Of imaginary wants he had none; even his real wants he studied to make as few as possible, out of his love for God and humanity. He was many-sided in his sympathies. Every form of suffering touched him. Every method of doing good attracted him. Every part and form of the Lord's work engaged his heart, his prayers and his contributions. He entered the ministry in a time of heated theological discussion. As was natural to him he investigated these subjects thoroughly, and on all the lines he had sharply defined views which he was always ready to present and maintain.

In concluding this sketch we quote from Dr. Robert Ryland, for many years President of Richmond College ; "I have often said-and I now say, deliberately, without the exaggerating effect that the death of a friend always produces on our minds-that Elias Dodson was the best man I ever knew. My disposition leads me, perhaps too much, to look closely into the character of men of reputed goodness-men held up as models of excellence. And I have often grieved to see in them qualities and deeds that required to be covered with the mantle of charity and silence. Examples even now rise up to my memory, that I would not mention for a bag of gold. But after long acquaintance and close inspection, I am constrained to say that I have never perceived a fault in Dodson ! The omniscient and infinitely pure Eye did doubtless see defects in him, but they escaped my dull vision. His name is indelibly associated in my mind with these inspired words-'wise unto that which is good, and simple concerning evil.' Rom. 16: 19. He was a man of good sense, of eminent wisdom, but it was all expended-exhausted-on 'that which is good.' When 'evil' came up to solicit his attention and indulgence, he was 'simple'-he seemed not to have sense enough to say, to do, or even to think 'evil.'"

## ELDER WILLIAM T. BROOKS, D. D.,

Was born in Chatham county, N. C., December 9, 1809. He professed faith in Christ at Rives' Chapel in a revival meeting held in connection with, or following immediately upon, the third session of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, and was baptized into the fellowship of this church in September, 1832, by Elder Noah Richardson.

His education being limited, and a new sphere of responsibility and duty opening up now before him, the desire for a liberal education took firm hold upon him. He accordingly sold what property he had, and in 1834, at the age of twenty-four, entered the school at Rives' Chapel. The following year he began his course at what was then Wake Forest Institute, and in 1839 graduated with the first class going out from the College with diplomas. The conviction that he was called of God to preach the gospel of Christ, no doubt intensified the zeal he displayed in acquiring an education. His ordination took place the same year that he entered College.

In 1843 he became a tutor in Wake Forest College, and subsequently a professor, which position he held for a number of years. After his resignation he was appointed a Trustee of the College, and for a long time was President of the Board of Trustees.

In 1869 he was elected President of the Baptist State Convention, and continued to serve in this capacity until failing health at length compelled him to forego the privilege he had always so highly prized of meeting with the brethren in their annual gatherings.

For thirty years Dr. Brooks was pastor of Mount Vernon church, in Wake connty. He was also pastor of other churches, two of which, the one at Henderson and the one at Forestville, he was instantmental in organizing.

His labors as a preacher of the Gospel were blessed to the conversion of many souls. His preaching was thoroughly evangelical. Man's lost condition out of Christ was never put in the background. Redemption by the blood of Chrst was never explained away as a mere figure of speech. Heaven and hell were to him solemn realities. He honored the Holy Spirit. He believed the word of God.

For six years he lingered on the shores of time, though apparently his work was done. But not so. There was fruit to be brought forth in old age under the pruning of the Husbandman, which was to magnify the grace of God in Christ Jesus our Lord, and prepare His servant for the great change awaiting him. "Behold we count them happy which endure." Not till the time comes does the Father take his children home. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints "—the time, the place, and the circumstances.

Gently, as a little child, he fell asleep in Jesus January 16, 1883, at Wake Forest College, which for so many years had been his home, surrounded by his wife and the three children who survive him.

## REV. WILLIAM HILL JORDAN.

This distinguished minister of the Gospel ended his earthly labors and entered into rest on Friday, October 12th, 1883, at his residence in Oxford. It was our privilege to know him and to be numbered among his friends for the last ten years. When we first saw him, he had by reason of age and infirmities, retired from the active duties of the ministry. He still attended the sessions of his Association and aided his brethren in special meetings. The most of these years of comparative inactivity he spent in diligent study and prayerful meditation on the Word of God. We loved him for his stainless purity, his shining character as a Christian, his devout and humble piety, his unswerving loyalty to truth and to God, as well as for his splendid talents and attainments as a preacher. His pilgrimage was long, laborious and eventful. He finished it with honor to himself and credit to the denomination he represented; and waited patiently at the river for the parting of the waters, looking with unclouded eyes to the mountains of joy on the other shore.

We learn from the Baptist Encyclopedia that "Rev. William Hıll Jordan was born in Bertie county, N. C., August 15th, 1803. His mother afterwards married the Rev. Mr. Poindexter, and was the mother of Rev. Dr. A. M. Poindexter. To the piety and force of character of this good woman, who conseerated her sons to God's service at their birth, our Southern Zion is indebted for two of the ablest and most eloquent ministers who have distinguished her annals."

Bro. Jordan was educated at Chapel Hill, professed a hope in Christ on the 9th of December, 1823, preached his first sermon on the 25th of December of the same year, and was baptized by Rev. Reuben Lawrence, Jan. 25th, 1824. It will thus be seen that Bro. Jordan was induced by his brethren to preach before he was baptized. This was to him a source of much sorrow, but it may be doubted whether it should have been, since it is said a great revival began from his preaching, spreading over several counties, and resulting in the conversion of 2,000 souls.

Besides serving a number of churches in the country, Bro. Jordan has been pastor of churches in Raleigh, Wilmington, Lilesville and Wadesboro, N. C., Clarksville and Petersburg, Va., Norristown, Pa., and Sumpter, S. C.

He was for a long time Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist State Convention; he was twice agent of Wake Forest College, giving his time and money for its release from financial distress, and as a trustee worked faithfully for its prosperity. Bro Jordan called himself a High Church Baptist, and spent no small part of his life in vindicating by voice and pen Baptist and Calvinistic principles."

He was a very eloquent speaker and seemed never at a loss for forcible and appropriate words. He walked close with God and talked much with Him. In prayer he seemed to be face to face with his Maker and to lose consciousness of all such matters as time, his position and surroundings. With the affection of a child for a kind and benevolent father and as a devoted subject before his honored and loved king, he made known his wants in words of adoration, gratitude and confidence. He was wonderfully gifted in prayer. For more than fifty years his name has been a household word among the Baptists of North Carolina and his memory will be revenenced as long as those who knew him live.
