



### MINUTES

DURHAM, N. C., November 16, 1887.

The Baptist State Convention met this morning at 10 o'clock in the Baptist Church of Durham. The delegates joined in singing "Jesus, lover of my soul." Elder C. T. Bailey, of Raleigh, the President of the last session, called the Convention to order, and asked Elder R. R. Overby, of Camden county. to conduct devotional exercises. Elder Overby read the third chapter of Colossians, and the Convention sang "Am I a soldier of the cross?" Elder Overby then led in prayer.

The following were appointed a Committee on Credentials: Elders W. R. Gwaltney, W. B. Pope, J. F. Love, and Brethren A. C. Parham and J. B. Holman, who subsequently reported 129 delegates, a list of whose names will be found in the proper place.

Elders B. Cade and J. S. Hardaway, and Brethren P. A. Dunn, J. D. Boushall, O. P. Middleton and J. K. Tucker were appointed tellers for the election of President. Bro. W. H. Pace, of Raleigh, was elected.

Pending the ballot for President, on motion a committee, consisting of Brethren J. H. Mills, E. Frost and Elders W. A. Pool, R. R. Overby, G. P. Hamrick, C. C. Haymore and A. G. McMannaway, was appointed to nominate the remaining officers, who reported as follows:

Pending the enrollment of delegates and the election of officers, the Convention engaged in devotional exercises, during which Elders W. P. Jordan and R. H. Marsh led in prayer.

President-elect Pace was conducted to the chair, and briefly thanked the Convention for the honor conferred.

Elder C. Durham, pastor of the Durham Church, was introduced, and delivered an address of welcome in behalf of the church and community of Durham.

Elder R. VanDeventer, pastor of the Henderson Church, by request of the President, replied for the Convention.

On motion of pastor Durham, the hours of meeting were fixed as follows:

Meet at 9:30 A. M.; adjourn at 12 M. Meet at 2 P. M.; adjourn at pleasure. Meet at 7 P. M.; adjourn at pleasure.

Brethren G. B. Taylor, Jr., pastor of Chapel Hill church, and G. W. Gardner, pastor at Hickory and Morganton, having recently come into the State, were introduced to the Convention.

Corresponding Secretary Durham read parts of the report of the Board of Missions relating to Foreign Missions, Home Missions and Woman's Work, and also the report of the Sunday School Board, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS,

#### BY ELDER THEO, WHITFIELD.

To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina:

The last report of the Foreign Mission Board was exceedingly encouraging. We give the following summary:

Brazil: Missionaries, (native and foreign), 14; churches and stations, 6; baptisms, 30; members, 175.

Mexico: Missionaries, 17: churches and stations, 21: baptisms, 100; members, 350; contributions, \$823.

Italy: Missionaries, 15; churches and stations, 14; members, 306; baptisms, 26. Africa: Missionaries, 16; baptisms, 26; members, 138.

China: Missionaries, 54; churches and stations, 24; baptisms, 46; members, 677; contributions \$699; besides a chapel built at Shanghai by Deacon Wong, costing about \$1,000.

Our Foreign Missionaries are 58; of whom 24 are ministers and 34 ladies. The baptisms for one year were 228; and the contributions in mission fields, \$3,012.61.

The receipts of the Foreign Mission Board were \$87,830.53, the largest in its history. Of this amount North Carolina contributed \$7,242.34. The amount contributed in this Convention during the year ending November 10th, 1887, is \$6,428.53.

It is cause for thankfulness to God that our contributions to Foreign Missions have steadily increased. But we have not yet reached that amount which is our proportion of the whole sum needed for our Foreign Mission work.

A few months ago, the life of our beloved Yates was seriously threatened, but he has so far recovered that we may hope to see his face again. Our brethren Herring and Bryan have made unusual progress in their work, and their health continues good.

We devoutly hope that the interest in Foreign Missions will continue to extend until all our churches shall be contributors to this grandest christian ente prise—the evangelization of the heathen world.

#### HOME MISSIONS.

#### BY ELDER A. G. M'MANNAWAY.

The work of the Home Mission Board during the past Conventional year was as follows:

Missionaries	25 I
Places occupied	822
Baptisms	3,923

Twenty-five of its Missionaries have labored among the colored people of the South, six are at work in Cuba, and the rest are preaching the gospel as we hold it to our fell wecitizens of the Southern States and Territories.

The Board claims that after all the State Boards have done what they can, there are still at least ten millions of our Southern population among whom it may find an appropriate field for its labors. To this number is to be added the seven millions of colored people who are largely dependent upon us for religious culture and training. This already large field for usefulness is continually growing larger as the population increases, and the people are much more susceptible to the influences of the gospel now than they will be after the isms and errors of the outside world shall have been brought to them by the tide of emigration. In view of these facts the Board asks for an increase of fifty per cent. upon the receipts of last year.

Last year North Carolina raised \$1,620 31 for this Board. Let us make it \$2,500 this year. The receipts for this object since May 1st, 1887, have been more than fifty per cent. larger than for the corresponding period of last year. As the work is now better organized than ever before, and as there are nearly 800 brethren and sisters in North Carolina who are the appointed and recognized representatives of this Board in their respective churches, may the Board not confidently rely on \$2,500 from our State for the year ending May 1st, 1888? The amount given this year is \$2,038.35.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF MISSIONS, TO THE STATE MISSION BOARD.

The second year's work of the Woman's Central Committee of Missions has been one of marked increase in all of its departments. The 114 Societies reporting in 1886, have grown to 171, and the contributions of the present year exceed those of last year by more than \$700.

One of the most interesting features of the year's work has been the publication and free distribution of a little missionary paper, The Missionary Talk, devoted to the interest of the Woman's Mission Societies, giving the latest missionary news and items of State work, thereby drawing the societies together in that sympathy and union that gives strength to all. We feel that to this department of labor is largely due the growth of our work.

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina:

DEAR BRETHREN:—While the work of the Sunday School Board has not been as aggressive during the year just past as we had hoped it would be, there has been progress. Year by year the Sunday School work is taking deeper hold in our churches, and gradually we are realizing that it is no longer to be regarded as a separate department of church work, but an important part of it. The history of the revival seasons gives the brightest evidence of the Sunday School as the great gospel plant bed. Look at the number of conversions reported from the churches during the past year—inquire how many of these came from the Sunday School, and no further argument is needed to urge the importance of increasing the number and extending the work.

At the last session of the Convention a resolution was adopted, requesting each Sunday School to contribute to our Board one cent per member each month; the purpose being to create a fund with which to establish new schools and in extending the work generally as they may direct. We regret that so few of the schools responded to this call. The whole amount received from this source was \$340.71. Of this amount \$324.58 has been expended as originally designed. If the resolutions had met with a hearty response, a great work might have been accomplished.

Sunday School Institutes, under the direction of the Board, were held during the past year at a number of important central points, and their influence, we are led to believe, was widespread and helpful.

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During the year the Board has been enabled through its Supply Store, to extend much valuable aid to ministers (in the way of commissions on books, discounts, etc.), and to Sunday Schools unable to buy Bibles, Testaments, Sunday School helps and song books. This Supply Store has become a necessity and is doing a good work. Following is a statement of its present condition. Our churches should not fail to contribute to it, our schools should not fail to purchase their supplies from it:

#### STATISTICS.

The Board respectfully offers the following suggestions:

- 1. During the year we have seen, more than ever before, the necessity for a general system of colportage in the State. The demand is now imperative. Longer delay is dangerous. God has given us, in the printing press, a great opportunity. It is quite impossible, now, for a Baptist preacher to be located in every neighborhood in the State. The supply of preachers is inadequate, and in thousands of neighborhoods there are no Baptist churches. These neighborhoods may be reached by colporters with Bibles and other Baptist books and papers. They can organize Baptist Sunday Schools. They can supply other Baptist Sunday Schools with literature, keep them alive in winter, urge collections, and in many other ways stimulate and encourage the work. Such a system would be the salvation of our Supply Store, the growth of which has been far too slow. This store should do ten times the business it now does. It should receive ten times the aid it now receives, and will receive, from the Publication Societies, if the matter is properly pushed. This will come as the business increases. The business will increase with the multiplication of colporters. When the time comes that shall see the Baptist preachers buying their books, all our Sunday Schools buying their books and papers, Baptist families supplying their family libraries with religious works, and Baptist colporters filling their boxes through this one agency, the Supply Store, it is safe to estimate that its annual business will be at least \$50,000. With an organized system for the distribution and sale of religious literature behind this store, we see great hope for it and the denomination. Let the Convention take hold of it.
- 2. We ask the Convention to come to our aid by recommending that the Sunday School workers in the State have a great Sunday School Convention on the first Sunday in July next, at some central point in the State, and that the Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist State Convention use his best efforts to secure a large attendance at said Convention.

In conclusion, we feel it proper that we should say that the loss of our beloved brother John E. Ray, from this State, will be felt in no department more than in that of our Sunday School work. His warm heart, and ready, intelligent suggestions will be missed by nearly if not all of the Schools and workers throughout our borders. Leaving us at the time he did, prevents our giving to

you as full and complete a report as desirable. To no man under God do we owe so much of love and gratitude as to John E. Ray, for the great march of our Sunday School work during his labors as Secretary of our Board, and we pray for our Heavenly Father's richest blessing upon him in his new field of labor.

On motion, adjourned to 7 P. M., with benediction by Elder B. Griffith.

#### NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention and a large congregation met at 7 o'clock to hear the introductory sermon. The choir and congregation sang "Stand up for Jesus." Elder T. H. Pritchard led in prayer. Elder Battle read first chapter of II. Peter. Pastor Durham read and the congregation sang, "My hope is built on nothing less."

Pastor Durham then introduced Elder H. W. Battle, of Wadesboro, to preach the introductory sermon.

• The preacher announced as his text, II. Peter 1: 1, "Like precious faith with us."

At the conclusion of the sermon, Elder J. William Jones led in prayer. "Give me the wings of faith to rise," was read by Pastor Durham and sung by the congregation. Benediction by Pastor Durham.

#### SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, November 17.

The Secretary read the minutes of yesterday, which, after correction, were approved.

On motion, Elder G. P. Bostick was requested to reply in the name of the Convention. He reported the reply to be II. Corinthians 13:14.

The special order, the report of Sunday School Board, was called, and the report was read by the Secretary. Pending the motion to adopt, remarks were made by Brethren N. B. Broughton, G. B. Taylor, Jr., C. A. Woodson, W. C. Powell, J. S. Purefoy, N. L. Shaw, B. Griffith, and

On motion of Elder J. M. McMannaway, so much of the report as refers to Colportage was referred to a special committee. President appointed J. M. McMannaway, C. S. Farriss, J. W. Gore, R. T. Vann, J. H. Mills, A. G. McMannaway, R. VanDeventer, R. H. Marsh and G. M. Tolson.

The remainder of the report was then adopted.

A telegram was announced from John E. Ray, late Corresponding Secretary of the Convention: Colossians 2:5-7, Philippians 1:2-11.

Elder John Mitchell was requested to reply, who replied, Philippians 4:4-6, 19.

On motion of Elder Cade, Elder W. A. Patillo, Superintendent of the Colored Orphan Asylum at Oxford, was invited and addressed the Convention.

On motion, the subject of Ministerial Education was made the special order for Friday night, and that of the Baptist Orphanage the special order for Saturday at 10 o'clock A. M.

The Committee on Colportage offered a report, which after remarks was postponed till 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Brother J. H. Mills offered the report from the committee appointed by the Convention of last year to suggest some plan for the relief of aged and infirm ministers, which, after discussion, was adopted, as follows:

#### REPORT ON INFIRM AND INDIGENT PREACHERS.

We recommend that this Convention hereby request the North Carolina Baptist Orphanage Association to make provision, so far as practicable, for the worthy and needy wornout ministers of our State.

Resolved, That we recommend to our churches to take at least one collection a year for such ministers as were once faithful and efficient, but are now disabled by age and disease.

Resolved, That we hereby cordially invite our brethren of the Western Baptist Convention to extend to this department of Christian charity a hearty and liberal coöperation, such as they have already extended to the Orphanage.

At 2 o'clock the Convention re-assembled. Elder Tolson led in prayer.

The report of the Committee on Colportage, postponed from the morning session, was announced as the special order. Remarks were made by Brethren J. M. McMannaway, E. G. Harrell, J. M. Broughton, A. G. McMannaway, C. B. Justice, N. B. Cobb, T. H. Pritchard, W. H. Pace, and the report was adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on Colportage make the following recommendations: .

- 2. That the Board of Missions and the Sunday School Board be consolidated and that this work be committed to the consolidated Board.
  - 3. That this Board be named the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools.

The hour for the special order having arrived, Elder B. Griffith, Corresponding Secretary of the American Baptist Publication Society, was introduced and addressed the Convention concerning the work of that Society.

Elder W. C. Durham offered the following resolution, which, after remarks, was adopted under a call for the previous question:

Resolved. That we sympathize with and heartily endorse the efforts of our colored brethren to found an Orphanage at Oxford, as represented before this Convention by Rev. W. A. Patillo.

The subject of Foreign Missions was made the special order for Friday 2½ P. M.

President announced the following committee to nominate Board of Education: W. R. Gwaltney, E. A. Covington, T. D. Lattimore, O. T. Edwards, D. W. Allen.

Elder Hufham, for committee, offered the following report, which was adopted:

#### ON PERIODICALS.

Our fathers were wise when they provided for the establishment of a weekly newspaper as one of the agencies for doing the work committed to them of the Lord. Through the infancy of this body it did indispensable service in making known the real aims of the Baptists and in correcting misrepresentations which

were industriously circulated in every part of the State. In every crisis of our denominational history since, the RECORDER has been one of the most efficient instrumentalities employed by us in defending and propagating the truth as held by us. It is difficult to see how our work could have been done without the paper.

The need for a journal which shall express the thought of the Baptists of the State; shall strongly but courteously and prudently set forth and maintain their principles; and shall explain and advocate the great enterprises in which they are engaged; having also the largest possible circulation, has not passed away. Indeed it is more urgent than ever.

The Foreign Mission Journal is devoted specially to the work of Southern Baptists in foreign lands. It is published in Richmond, Va., at 35 cts. a year for a single copy; four copies for one dollar; twenty-five copies for five dollars.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, furnish Kind Words, our well known Sunday School paper, published weekly, at 50 cents per copy in packages of eight copies or more. They also furnish a full line of Sunday School helps at moderate prices. The Young Reaper, a beautifully illustrated Sunday School paper, is furnished by the American Baptist Publication Society at 10 cents per copy for the monthly and 20 cents a copy for the semi-monthly edition in packages of five copies and upwards. The same Society also furnishes all needed Sunday School helps of excellent quality and at small cost.

On motion, Convention adjourned with benediction by Elder Gwaltney.

#### HIGHT SESSION.

Vice-President Blount called the Convention to order. "Coronation" was sung by the choir and congregation. Elder R. T. Vann led in prayer.

#### THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, November 18th, 1887.

At the appointed hour the Convention assembled, and devotional exercises were conducted by Elder G. W. Gardner, of Hickory, who read Psalm 31st and led in prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of yesterday, which were corrected and approved.

Elder A. E. Dickinson, editor of the *Religious Herald*, was introduced as a visitor.

Secretary Durham read the report of the Board of Missions on State Missions and the Treasurer's report, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

With acknowledgments of God's goodness, and profound gratitude for his abundant mercies on us, and all the work committed to our hands during the past year, the Board of Missions presents this, its annual report.

This has been a year of great trials and of great blessings. Never, perhaps, in the history of the Convention have our missionaries made greater sacrifices to do their work, and never have the Lord's blessings been more abundant.

#### DEATH.

At the last Convention Elder J. F. Moore was with us, and we expected him to be with us many years. But not so. On the 9th of January, 1887, the Lord said to our brother: "Thy work is done. Come up higher." He was ready, and gladly obeyed. He was young and well prepared for life's work. Elder J. F. Moore was one of the most godly, active and successful missionaries in the employment of this Board.

#### DEPARTURE OF BRO. RAY.

John E. Ray, so long the Corresponding Secretary of this Convention, left us for his new home in Colorado September 13th, 1887. His work in our churches, Sunday Schools, mission fields, Associations, Conventions and Boards, will continue to live and bring fruit to the Master's glory. May the blessings of God be upon him and his work here and there, evermore.

#### THE NEW SECRETARY

On September 12th, 1887, the Board was called together to select a successor to fill out the unexpired term of Bro. Ray. Elder C. Durham was unanimously elected to this position, and at once entered upon the work.

#### STATE MISSIONS.

The great need of every one is the gospel, and the great privilege of every one knowing its power is to give it to those who have it not. The gospel, in consecrated lives, is the light to guide, the salt to preserve, and the leaven to elevate the people of our State. We live in the world that we may live for the world. The object of our being is to think the thoughts of God, and to unite with our Lord Jesus Christ in his purposes of human redemption. The best of time, of means and of life should be used in this work. The human soul is the soil into which God permits us to plant the seed which transforms the life into the image and glory of our Redeemer.

God seems to be turning the people of our State to us more than ever before. Our opportunities are, therefore, being multiplied. The next ten years must tell largely on the religious opinions of our people. One dollar now, in State Missions, is worth more than ten dollars will be worth ten years hence. To fall behind now in the march of events in denominational work is to become powerless for good in the years to come; but to seize and wisely use our present opportunities is to take the State for the Master's glory.

This Board has had during the past year in its employment eighty-two men engaged in preaching the gospel to the people of our own State. These have been located in the towns and country from the mountains to the sea.

This number seems large, but it has not been large enough to meet the very earnest calls that have come to us from many other promising and destitute sections of the State.

#### DEBT.

A few weeks ago we expected to be compelled to report a debt to this Convention. But not so. The churches and individuals, all over the State knowing our needs, come up most nobly to this work. We are, therefore, thankful to report every missionary paid in full for his work, and the Board hopeful and ready for another year's work. The excess of appropriations to missionaries this year, over that paid to missionaries last year, was \$3.728.52. With many of our people there has been, perhaps, no year since 1866 when they have been harder pressed, and less able to give and yet, they have given larger amounts this year than ever before.

#### SUGGESTIONS.

- (I.) Your Board would suggest that such action be taken as will continue the confidence of the missionaries and the churches, and will give hope to all the destitute sections of the State. Our State Mission work is too important, and too intimately connected with all our success, to be in any wise retarded.
- (2.) The Bible and Colportage work can, we think, be made a great power for good in the State. Every Association, church, mission field and neighborhood needs it, and should be touched and stimulated by it. It is, in the judgment of your Board, too important to the prosperity of our churches and the growth of our cause to be neglected.

#### CONCLUSION.

The "fields are white unto the harvest." The denomination is united and hopeful. Every year marks an advance in our work. Let the next year be better than any one in the past. The Lord bids us onward and upward for the glory of his name in the enlargement of his kingdom.

Elder J. L. Stewart, for the committee, presented a report on the suggestion of the Board of Missions as to the time of meeting, which was made the special order for 9:30 A. M. on Saturday.

The Secretary then read as the special order the report of the Board of Education, which, after addresses by Elders Hume, Pritchard, Dickinson, T. Dixon, Jr., was adopted, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

There are now at Wake Forest forty-nine young brethren preparing for the work of the Ministry. Of this number, the Board of Education is aiding twenty-six, the others bearing their own expenses. During the past conventional year thirty-eight beneficiaries, first and last, received aid from the Board. Thirty or forty others, some of them boys of great promise, have asked for assistance, but lack of means compelled us to deny them. This should not and must not be. With our one hundred pastorless churches in the State looking for and waiting for pastors who will be leaders; with a field constantly and rapidly widening through the blessing of God upon the work of the Board of Missions, we must realize still more keenly the importance of the work the Board of Education is trying to do. The voice of God is in the churches calling daily more laborers, in answer to the prayers of his people. His hand is urging us to larger work. Did our means permit, we believe that the next session would find seventy-five young preachers at the college getting ready for their work. While there is, and doubtless always will be, a hearty demand for unlettered preachers, all must see that the need of well trained minds in the pulpit is already greater than we can supply. Let our pastors and churches look at these things and set their hands earnestly to this work.

We are gratified at being able to state, to the credit of the churches, that notwithstanding the distressing times their poverty has abounded to the riches of their liberality; so that their contributions have exceeded those of last year by \$1,000, being some \$500 more than during any previous year. The debt of \$300 reported at your last session has been cancelled and there is a small balance in the treasury.

Bro. G. W. Thompson, one of the first Trustees of Wake Forest College, who has been a trustee ever since and was the first teacher of Matthew T. Yates, was introduced, and briefly addressed the Convention.

The special order, being the report of the committee on the time of the meeting of the Convention, was called, and on motion the report was laid on the table.

G. W. Greene offered the following resolution, which was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That in the opinion of this Convention all the Baptists of North Carolina earnestly desire that Matthew T. Yates should pay an extended visit to his native land, rest from his labors, and see his brethren once more before he finishes his work.

Elder J. F. Tuttle, of Salisbury, read a letter from Elder Crosby, Moderator of the Rowan Colored Association, which was referred to the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools.

Elder Cade read the following, which was adopted after addresses by J. H. Mills, J. N. Stallings, E. Frost, J. J. Meadows, O. P. Meeks, J. E. Carter, B. Cade, J. D. Hufham, H. W. Battle, A. E. Dickinson:

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage at Thomasville is firmly established; its success vindicates the wisdom of its founders and supporters; it has done a good work; it is doing a good work; it will continue to do a good work.

There are seventy-six children at the Orphanage now, and others will come. These children must be tended, taught, fed and clothed. To do all these things requires money. Our brethren have this money; they can give this money; they ought to give this money; they will give this money.

To make an argument to convince this Convention that these orphan children ought to be tenderly cared for and trained for usefulness, would be to outrage your Christian instincts, and this committee has no ambition to incur your displeasure by any such performance.

Resolved, 1st. That the number of our correspondents to that Convention be increased to nine, as follows: J. M. Heck, W. R. Gwaltney, A. G. McMannaway, C. B. Justice, W. A. Pool, G. W. Gardner.

Resolved, 2d. That these correspondents bear to the Western Convention our fraternal greetings and expressions of our sincere interest in every department of their work, and say to them that, if in their judgment, at any time, the cause of the Lord Jesus Christ and the work of the denomination in the State can be best served by a union of the two Conventions, we are ready to consider such a proposition.

## APPENDIX.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.

We owe it to the dead, we owe it to the living, and we owe it as a sacred inheritance to future generations to commemorate the virtues of our departed worthies. The world has lost much, and the Baptists especially have lost much by the neglect of this duty. It is a matter of regret to your committee that the space allotted our report will permit little more than a statement of facts, without elaboration. The necrology of the year is large, several of our valuable laborers having been called to their reward. First, in the order of age, and certainly, not second in merit, was the

## REV. G. W. HUFHAM,

who died at his home in Sampson county on the 3d of October last, at the ripe old age of 83. The son of John Hufham, a revolutionary hero, he was born in Duplin county, N. C., in 1804; the oldest of a family of thirteen children. He was educated at an academy in Wavne county and at Chapel Hill, and became a fair classical scholar. Proposing to study medicine, the whole course of his life was changed by his conversion and call to the ministry. He began to preach in 1830, and for seven years labored with great acceptance and success in the Eastern Association. In 1838, he removed to Mississippi, when by one effort in a campmeeting he so seriously injured his voice that it never regained its wonted flexibility and power. He returned to his native State in 1845; served as pastor the churches at Magnolia, Johnson, Falling Creek and Mt. Holly; was a liberal helper and wise counselor of young men in the ministry; a faithful friend of Wake Forest College and Warsaw High School, and a warm promoter of all the enterprises of the denomination. In 1831, he married Frances Eliza Dunn, with whom he lived in sweetest domestic happiness for more than fifty years. Their union was blest with nine children, six sons and three daughters, four of whom survive their parents, one of the four being the Rev. J. D. Hufham, D. D., whose praise is known in all the churches.

#### REV. E. A. BEST,

was a cotemporary of brother Hufham, laboring in the same Association for many years. He was born in Hampton, Va., in 1815, professed faith in Christ there and was the Superintendent of the Sunday School; removed to Norfolk in 1849, when he began to preach; was ordained as pastor of the Edenton church, N. C., Revs. Geo. Bradford and West

Leary forming the presbytery; was afterward pastor of the Greenville church, served the churches of New Bern, Kinston and La Grange at different times, and spent the last years of his life in useful labors in destitute parts of the Eastern Association. He died at Richlands, in Onslow county, September 26th, 1887. He was twice married, his second wife being left to lament the loss of a devoted husband and faithful servant of the Lord.

### REV. JOHN E. MONTAGUE

has also been taken from us within the past year. He was born in Granville county. N. C., in 1818; was educated at Wake Forest College, was ordained in 1850, Revs. R. I. Devin and S. Creath forming the presbytery, and was the successful pastor of Mill Creek and Bethel churches, Person county, for more than thirty years. Brother Montague was not a great nor a learned man, but he was a godly man and he loved to preach the gospel, and the Lord greatly honored his ministry.

## REV. J. F. Moore,

who died at Carthage, was a serious loss to the Sandy Creek Association and to the State, as he was a young man of good education, fervent zeal, much power in the pulpit and gave promise of a long life of usefulness; but the Lord saw that he could more perfectly glorify him in heaven than in earth and took him to himself in the beginning of his career.

Your committee are grieved to have to chronicle also the death of two of the most useful laymen of the State, brethren MARK R. GREGORY, of Camden county, and J. T. Webb, of Franklin county. Deacon Gregory died in December, 1886, in the 60th year of his age. He was a man of great liberality and public spirit, having sustained with heart and hand and power, the cause of Sunday Schools, Missions and education all his life. For many years he was a Trustee of Murfreesboro Female Institute and aided it in times of peril not only with wise counsel, but also with the most generous financial support, and he was the unfailing friend of Wake Forest College in all the vicissitudes of its history for the past thirty years.

Brother Webb was repeatedly Moderator of his Association, the Tar River; was at one time a Trustee of Wake Forest College, gave one hundred dollars to its endowment a few years since, and was honored and loved as a faithful citizen and a consistent and useful Christian, by all who knew him. "The memory of the just is blessed."

# CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION.

- 1. The Baptist State Convention shall be composed of three male representatives from each white Association in the State in fellowship with us, or one annual male representative appointed by the churches for every \$10 contributed to its funds, provided that no church shall have more than 10 representatives, and of such male life members as have been made so by the payment of \$30 at any one time to the Treasurer for the objects of the Convention. No one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Baptist church in fellowship with us, and no other life members shall be made.
- 2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to encourage and support Wake Forest College; to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the churches to which they belong; to encourage education among all the people of the State; to support the go-pel in all destitute sections of the State and of the Southern Baptist Convention; to send the gospel to the nations that have it not; to encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and a sound religious literature; to assist Baptist churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship; to encourage the proper care of indigent orphan children and destitute and aged ministers of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor.
- 3. The Convention shall meet annually, on Wednesday after the second Sabbath in November, at 10 o'clock A. M.
- 4. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary and an Assistant, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and five Trustees, all of whom, except the Trustees, who shall serve during the pleasure of the Convention, shall be elected annually.
- 5. The President shall preside and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Mell's Parliamentary Practice. One of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the absence of the President.
- 6. The Recording Secretary and his Assistant shall record the proceedings, collect and preserve statistics of the denomination, and publish and distribute the minutes.
- 7. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention; make publicacknowledgment of the same each week through the BIBLICAL RECORDER; give his bond to the Trustees; forward at least once a month all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention make a full report of his receipts and disbursements; and on retiring from his office turn over to his successor all moneys, papers and books belonging thereto.
- 8. The Trustees shall secure and hold the title to any and all property belonging to, or which may be acquired by the Convention, and take a sufficient bond of the Treasurer. The terms, conditions and amount of the bond shall be fixed by the Trustees, and in case the Treasurer shall refuse or neglect

to give his bond within thirty days after his election, the Trustees shall have power to elect a Treasurer. They shall report annually to the Convention.

- 9. The Auditor shall, prior to each annual meeting of the Convention, examine carefully all the receipts, disbursements, vouchers, papers and books of the Treasurer, and his certificate to the facts in the case shall be attached to the Treasurer's report.
- 10. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools in the employment and payment of Missionaries, and labor to promote the cultivation and development of Christian benevolence.
- 11. The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.
- 12. The Board of Missions and Sunday Schools shall encourage the churches to give liberally to all the objects of the Convention; so far as the means at its disposal will allow, supply all destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient Ministers of the Gospel; give pecuniary aid, so far as can be secured, for building houses of worship at proper points in the State, and in cases where pecuniary aid cannot be given, commend them to the beneficence of the churches; encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and a sound religious literature in the homes, in the churches, and in the Sunday Schools; encourage Sunday School Conventions and Institutes; continue, and, so far as it may be able and the growth of this work shall require, enlarge the Sunday School Supply Store, and co-operate with all Missionary and Sunday School work of the Southern Baptist Convention.
- 13. There shall be an Auditor of the Sunday School Supply Store, who, prior to each annual meeting of the Convention, shall examine carefully all the receipts, disbursements and expenditures, vouchers, papers, books and stock on hand, and his certificate to the facts in the case shall be attached to the report on the Supply Store.
- 14. The Boards shall be appointed annually and report to each session of the Convention.
- 15. The Conventional year shall close one week before the annual meeting of the body.
- 16. The Boards of the Convention shall fix the compensation of their respective officers, and that of the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of the Convention
- 17. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual session by two-thirds of the representatives present voting in the affirmative.
