

In behalf of the Committee the undersigned begs leave to report: That the matter intrusted to the Committee has been attended to, in accordance with the instructions of the Synod. A seal has been prepared which is herewith passed over to the Synod's officer, the Stated Clerk. It was thought best to have it attached to a hand press, by which a clear impression can be given to any Synodical document on fair stout paper.

The name of the Synod is in the margin of the seal. The device of the symbol is an "open Bible resting on the cross;" the emblem of our redemption supporting the Word of Life; the motto over the cross, In hoc signo vinces, and that under the Bible, "Preach the Word," indicate our hope and duty as a Church.

Trusting that the efforts of the Committee will meet with the approbation of the Synod your Committee respectfully begs to be discharged.

Item 2. The Committee presented the following report upon it,

which was adopted:

The Committee have been co-operating during the year with the Committee of the Eastern Synod, allowing them to continue as they have begun to arrange the general plan for the proper celebration of the grand event. Nothing very material has been added to the general order adopted for that occasion, as given in our last

year's report.

The subjects to be treated of and discussed have been assigned to distinguished men in both Europe and America. Some six or more of the most celebrated Reformed scholars in Germany, among whom are Drs. Ebrard, Hartzog, Hundeshagen, etc., have already consented to contribute essays and memoirs. Those engaged in our own land are such as are likely to add much interest and spirit to this great movement.

It remains for us as a Synod to take such action as will bring the subject home to the hearts of all our people. The whole Church should be called to take a real part in the matter. In this way only it may become, as it is designed to be, a monumental

occasion resulting in great good to our Reformed Zion.

Our Synod should act on the following points:

1. Resolve to unite in the general convention of the whole Church to be held at some central place on the 19th of Jan., 1863, when the celebration will be formally inaugurated and opened. To this meeting, every minister and at least one elder or other lay member from every congregation or pastoral charge in the whole Church should be delegated.

2. Send a suitable delegation to the general Synod of the whole Church, which is expected to be held in the month of October of the same year; at which the services of the tricentennial festival

shall ie brought to a solemn close.

3. Take such measures as will bring the matter to the attention of all our people. To reach this end, we would suggest that our Church Papers publish articles on this subject in explanation of the character and design of the celebration; and that the several pastors bring it publicly before all their congregations.

4. A particular season should be appointed in which to receive free will offerings to God. from every man, woman and baptized

child in the Church. Of all such offerings a record book should be kept in each pastoral charge, from which a full copy could be made in a register for the whole Synod.

5. The objects to which these contributions are to be devoted should be specified, whether to Missions, Church Extension, Beneficiary Education, or Theological Endowment.

6. As the whole year of 1863 is to be regarded as a continued celebration, it would seem well to set apart some stated time on which to hold befitting exercises, not only by the Synod, but also in a similar way by each Classis, and as well also by each charge, and by every congregation.

7. In accordance with the above, at our next Annual Meeting of Synod, some part of its sessions should be devoted to exercises having reference to the tricentennary. The same should also be provided for at the meeting of the several Classes, and by these directions given to all the pastoral charges in their bounds.

8. Other provisions, such as fixing the place of meeting, etc., which can more properly be arranged jointly by the two Synods, ought to be made by the Committee acting on behalf of this Synod, with a similar Committee from the Eastern Synod Respectfully Submitted,

## 1. IRREGULARITIES.

1. Iowa and Tiffin Classes do not state whether all their members were present at their Annual Classical Meetings, nor state names of absentees. Adopted.

2. St. John, Illinois, and Indiana Classes failed in furnishing their minutes on royal letter paper, as required by a standing rule

of Synod. Adopted.

3. All the Classes, except the Sandusky, failed in furnishing separate Reports on Religion and Statistics. Said Classes were censured for their neglect.

# 2. REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. Miami Classis regrets the action of Synod in the case of the Western Missionary, believing it to have been inadvertent.

Referred to the Committee on Publication.

2. Westmoreland Classis requests Synod to call the attention of the Classes to the fact that none other than the Heidelberg Catechism may be used constitutionally in the instruction of our children.

In reference to this item the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That the request of Westmoreland Classis he approved, with the proviso that Synod does not so interpret the Constitution as to exclude all helps, except the Heidelberg Catechism from the Sunday School in the instruction of children; but only as applied to the youth of the church, or such as may be candidates for confirmation.

3. Westmoreland Classis requests Synod to provide a suitable Hymn Book for our Sunday Schools. Adopted.

4. Sheboygan Classis requests permission to apply its missionary funds within its own territory.

Referred to the Board of Missions.

5. Tiffin Classis requests Synod not to specify any particular amount of money to be raised or apportioned for missionary purposes.

Referred to Committee on Apportionment of Benevolent Contri-

butions.

6. Tiffin Classis requests Synod to pay for both the English and German Minutes out of the treasury of Synod. Adopted.

7. Indiana Classis desires the Western Missionary to remain

in Dayton as heretofore. Sandusky Classis requests that no change be made before the meeting of Synod.

Referred to the Committee on Publication.

Indiana Classis protests against Synod's proceedings in

reference to the Corydon Mission.

Referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Revs. M. Kieffer and F. Wall, and Elder R. Miller. This committee subsequently presented the following report, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Corydon Mission is within the bounds of the Indiana Classis, which is unwilling that it should remain in connec-

tion with the Miami Classis; therefore-

Resolved, That it be placed in ecclesiastical connection with the

Indiana Classis.

9. Iowa Classis objects to certain unsuitable and objectionable phraseology in a part of the Report of the Board of Missions on page 34 of Minutes of Synod, and requests that it be so altered as to read "those Classes and Charges," &c. Adopted.

James receive licensure to preach the gospel with instruction to make diligent application in the further prosecution of their Theological studies; and that the officers of Synod give them the testimonial of their licensure upon signing the constitutional Formula, which was done in the presence of Synod.

#### ARTICLE XII.

#### REIGION AND MORALS.

The Committee on Religion and Morals presented the following report, which was received and adopted:

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN IN THE LORD JESUS CHRIST:-It becomes us, as individual under-shepherds of the great Head and Bishop of the entire Fold of Christ, first and foremost to give thanks unto God for his care over us, and his grace toward us during the year which has passed away; a year of great danger, trial and difficulties, both temporal as well as spiritual.

All the Classes within the bounds of this Synod speak of this fact, and wonderful to contemplate, not a single minister in this great Western field has during the past year fallen from his post through death. "Praise the Lord O! our souls" for this.

In representing the state of Religion, (for Religion defined, is a knowledge of God, and of his true service according to his word,) we would but reflect the sentiments expressed in the reports before us, wherefrom we are warranted in saying that religion is advancing. The evidence of this may be learned from the facts contained in the reports from the different Classes in connection with and constituting this body. They all testify to the good attendance of the people upon the public service of God's sanctuary; which evinces a growing anxiety to know the Lord, and if by the preached word they learn his divine and holy attributes, they will surely by his grace then fear and serve him.

Another evidence of growth is, that in many parts of our Western Zion, new congregations have been organized, and even in missionary fields new houses of public worship have been built, or are in a state of preparation for building New charges have been established, and the call is still, we want knowledge, "that we may

rightly know God our Creator, heartily love him, and live with him in eternal happiness to glorify and praise him." One Classis says: "We can also boast of having now a regular chartered college, which through its able president, has fair prospects of becoming, if it is not already, an honor to our Classis, as well as a blessing to the church." A third reason for saying that religion within our bounds is on the advance, is the fact, that peace and concord dwell in all our Classes and Charges, and we have felt its precious effects on the floor of this Synod: "Behold how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." May we realize the promise: "They shall prosper that love thee." Yea, we have the evidence within us, that religion is advancing, for we have increased during the year in the number of our Ministers, Congregations, Unconfirmed Members, Confirmed Members, Communicant Members, Baptisms, and in contributions for benevolent purposes. All this we learn from the reports before us, compared with those of last year; and by the fruits, says the Saviour, "Ye shall know the tree." Whilst this is enough to fill all our hearts with ecstatic joy, let us look at the other side, which is calculated to reduce this joy, and cause us, with the prophet, to weep day and night over the desolations of his people. All the Classes complain of a want of family religion—sympathy with Sabbath School instruction, as well as attention to the Lamb of the Fold of Christ—all complain of a lack of a benevolent spirit. O! when will we as a Church arise from our lethargy, and take hold, strong hold, and give to the benevolent abjects of our beloved Zion that encouragement by our prayers, and those gifts which they demand, in order to our successful progress along by the side of our sister denominations. Let us do it, brethren, or cease to pray—"Thy kingdom come." Respectfully Submitted,

# THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

1.—Report of the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary makes the following report:

The Board has endeavored to be faithful to the trust committed to its care. But little of the permanent-endowment has been paid, and what has been paid has been safely invested. The Board has had its usual difficulty in collecting the interest due on Plainfield Bonds. A very large amount is still due from the bond-holders, which is much to be regretted, as it always embarrasses the Board, inasmuch as most of the endowment is in this form. Comparatively few have also taken collections for the immediate use of the Seminary, and some who did take collections for the benevolent

objects of the Church have not paid over the proportion designed

by Synod for the Seminary.

In view of these things the Board has found it impossible to meet the Professor's salary in quarterly payments; yet we are gratified to be able to state to the Synod that we have closed the entire salary of the last year.

The Board would further report that no additions have been made to the library, as no funds have been placed in our hands for

this purpose.

The repairs of the property in Tiffin, to which Synod called the attention of the Board, were made, as will be seen by the Treasurer's report.

# 3.—Report of the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary.

While there is much to encourage us, when we compare the state of affairs now, with what it was in former years, the work of your Board is not by any means free from difficulties; and we mention some of these, not to promote discouragement, but, if possible, to excite to efforts for their removal. Some hearts and some churches have felt decidedly the influence of revival, but there has not been that general crucifixion of the world and unreserved consecration to Christ, that is necessary to produce abundantly a self-denying godly ministry. The branches will partake of the nature of the vine from whence they grow, and until that is more vigorous and healthy, the branches cannot be so abundant and strong as we There is a lamentable absence of deep and prayerful could desire. concern for the cause of education in our Church. Without intending any disrespect, it is not going beyond the facts to say that but few ministers and members live and preach and pray and labor for this object, in any degree commensurate with its importance. The difficulty in increasing the ministry, growing out of the absence of a judicious arrangement on the part of our Churches and pastors for the support of our young men, is very considerable. Discouragement and consequent failure on the part of many who promised well, hinder others from making the attempt, and under Churches indifferent to aiding them.

The want of adequate support must be again and again mentioned. God has ordained, that they who preach the gospel, shall live by the gospel, and indifference on the part of his people to his ordinance may be one cause why he does not increase the ministry. Our view of these difficulties would be one-sided, if we should neglect to say, that the want of a cheerful, self-sacrificing and uncon-

querable devotion to their work, despite its trials and hardships on the part of many, is a great barrier to the increase of the ministry. The Church will not concern herself to raise up a ministry in which self-seeking and consequent place-seeking reign, and in which worldliness supercedes spirituality, and the great work of saving souls is subordinate to other objects.

In our last report to Synod, we made the following recommen-

dation

"That Synod should make it a rule, that all recommendations for Licensure on the part of the Faculty of the Seminary, should be referred to the Board of Visitors for confirmation; and that no student be allowed to enter the Seminary without permission of the Board."

This recommendation, to our surprise, was not noticed by the Committee to whom our report was referred, nor acted upon by Synod. Events that have occurred during the present year, which have greatly grieved the Board as well as injured the cause, make it necessary for us again to call the attention of Synod to this point, and to request that an express rule of this character be passed; and unless such a regulation be adopted, the present members would prefer not being on the Board. In concluding this report, the Board would earnestly exhort Ministers and Churches to awake to this great subject. As a denomination, we were never more in need of faithful men to enter the ranks of the Sacred Ministry. Our country never more loudly called for increased exertion to spread the Gospel. The Word and the Providence of God both combine to urge us to exertion. The zeal of other denominations, who are enticing our young men by promises of assistance, should provoke us to activity. God himself will honor those who honor him, by persevering effort to spread his gospel.

The Committee on the Theological Seminary would respectfully report, that the following documents have been placed in their hands:

Board." Adopted.

Second, The Report of the Trustees of the Theological Seminary, from which we learn that notwithstanding the hard times and the difficulty to collect money, the Trustees have been able to pay the Professor his whole salary for the past year. Adopted.

It is to be hoped so soon as our national difficulties may subside, I may again be able to prosecute my labors with the usual success. I have traveled during the year three thousand eight hundred and ninety-five miles Total miles traveled since the 22d of January, 1857: Twenty thousand four hundred and four miles.

# MISSIONS.

### 1.—Report of the Board of Missions.

REV. FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—Amidst the waves of trouble and affliction, with which our country has been surrounded for more than a year, it is a source of great rejoicing that God in his mercy has abundantly blessed the labors of those missionaries who entrusted themselves to the care of your Board. That you may the

better judge of this, we, as usual, present a brief synopsis of the state of things in each field.

#### ENGLISH MISSIONS OF CINCINNATI.

But few changes have marked the progress of this mission since our last report. Quite a number have been added to the church; but almost an equal number have enlisted in the service of their country, among whom were some of its most prominent young This mission had but few Reformed members with which it began its work; hence the slow progress that has attended its efforts. Here we have again demonstrated the extreme difficulty of building up a church in a large city, without having the material of one's own church with which to begin. In course of time, however, there must of necessity be the flowing out of at least a com-paratively English element, from our German churches; and it is to be hoped that it will find its natural home in this mission.

We visited this mission several times during the year and were much pleased with the spirit of devotion that seemed to characterize this little flock of Christ. Arrangements are now being made for commencing the work of erecting their new church edifice, which, should a favorable response be received from those ministers and charges, already interested in this work, will be completed this summer. Located, as it will be, in a most beautiful and thriving part of the city, it will at once give permanency to the whole enterprize. The Rev. S. Mease still continues the missionary of this field, with an appropriation of \$200.

#### CORYDON, IND.

A few weeks since it was our privilege to visit, in person, this beloved people. We found among them an interesting state of things, especially as regards the attendance upon the regular service of the Sabbath. Our missionary is highly esteemed, and his preaching seems to be appreciated by all; but as in many other places, by far too many hear the preached word, even with gladness, but they do it not.

Brother Rike has here a few members who seem to be a host in themselves. The addition of a few more like them will firmly establish the mission. The parsonage referred to in our last report, located on six acres of ground lying two miles from town, has been completed, where a site has already been selected for a church In town we have no house of worship of our own, nor does there seem to be a call for another among the number already there; hence an organization here may draw the entire congregation to this point.

The health of our missionary has greatly improved since he moved to the country. He added to the church during the year 9, baptized 2 adults and 4 infants. Whole number of members 71.

The appropriation has been reduced to \$150.

#### SHELBYVILLE, ILL.

The Rev. H. K. Baines still continues to labor with much acceptance in this field. During the last two quarters his health had failed to such an extent as to lead him to fear that he would never again be able to resume his labors. But through the mercy of God, he says, his health has improved, and he is now full of hope that it will again be entirely restored. "My field," he writes, "is fall of hope, and I have no doubt but that, in due time, as the country becomes more thickly settled, our church will improve accordingly. I think I can now say that my field is as prosperous as any other church in the country outside of town. My congregation of hearers is large, and I feel sure that all that is wanted to establish our Zion here is perseverance and patience."

For a while, after Brether Baines commenced his labors in this field, he preached in the town of Shelbyville; and though his preaching always drew large congregations of hearers, yet he found it impossible, for the present, to organize a church in the midst of other congregations already established. At one of his points they greatly need a house in which to worship; but, for the present, they

far to begin the work of building.

During the last quarter 11 persons were received into the church, thus making the whole number of members 45. The appropriation to this field is still continued at \$200.

Lately this missionary has been visiting surrounding counties, where his labors are received with joy and abundantly blessed of God.

#### COLUMBUS CITY, IOWA.

The Rev. J. H. Buser, on receiving a call, left Oskaloosa six months since and entered this field. Here he had one congregation of 42 members, organized by himself while a missionary at the The town of Columbus, composed of a population former place. of 800, is located in a fine, central and healthy part of the State, of which it has a good chance of yet becoming the capital. have no house of worship of our own; hence the congregation has rented one for \$25 per annum. The average attendance of public worship on the Sabbath is about 200. They have lately organized a Sabbath School, which promises to be an important auxiliary to the congregation. Another congregation of 10 members and 8 baptized children has, with flattering prospects, lately been organized in a fine country, about ten miles from Columbus. Our missionary also preaches as a supply at Wilton Junction, 36 miles east. Under the extreme labor and exposure of the winter, his health gave way, so that for several months past he could not, at times, fill his regular appointments. We are glad, however, to This mission has two congregalearn that he is now recovering. tions; members, 83; added by confirmation, 20; by letter, 10; infants baptized, 13; deaths, 1.

"A dear and beloved elder," says the missionary, "who, when

I came first to this city, was a man of the world;—now, blessed be God, through the preaching of the gospel and the influence of the Holy Spirit, he is a child of glory and immortality."

### TERRE HAUTE, IND.

We have nothing of special interest to note of this field since our last report. The Rev. H. Kortheur still continues to labor with acceptance, and with some degree of success, among this people. The church is gradually gaining the esteem and confidence of the entire community. The Sabbath School has numbered as high as 80 children in attendance. The members have built a school-house by the side of their church, in which the pastor teaches four days in the week. This increased the debt still resting upon the church property; but it is hoped that, with the return of business, they will be able to cancel the whole amount. The appropriation has been reduced to \$80.

### DAYTON GERMAN CHURCH.

The pastorate of this mission was vacated last fall by the resignation of the Rev. E. F. Loeders, who received and accepted a call to Lafayette, Ind. Since then the Board, in connection with the congregation, have been laboring, in vain, to secure the services of another acceptable pastor. The congregation is an important and interesting one. They have a fine new church building, located in a pleasant part of the city. We are, at present, in correspondence with a young man, now in the Theological Seminary at Mercersburg, whom we trust the Lord will speedily call to labor among this beloved people.

### OSKALOOSA, IOWA.

Six months since this field was vacated by the Rev. J. H. Buser. The Board has been laboring faithfully to secure the services of another for this important mission, but all attempts have hitherto failed. Unless a proper man and the means to support him can soon be secured for this place, the most of our former labor to build up and establish the church here will soon be in vain.

### ASTORIA, ILL.

On account of the ill health of our beloved missionary, the Rev. J. Stoneberger, and a failure of the congregations to comply with some of the conditions of the Board's Commission, no application was made for a continuation of the appropriation. Bro. Stoneberger says, in his last report: "My resolution is to remain in this field, and, if not supported, to try and do something to make up the deficiency. My health is too poor to venture into a new charge. I know not how soon my labors will end, and I may as well resolve to stay and die here as to make new acquaintances. With a

sorrowful heart that I have no better report to make, I bid you, dear brother and the members of the Board, farewell.
"Yours till death and glory."

### ZWINGLE, IOWA.

An appropriation of \$25 was granted to the Rev. F. C. Bauman, pastor of this church, upon the condition that the amount be mised in his own charge. This brother has made many sacrifices in his present field of labor. The charge numbers 100 members.

### CUMBERLAND, MD.

At the request of the Westmoreland Classis the Board gave a commission, dated June 22d, to the Rev. Henry Losch, pastor of the New Mission at Cumberland. This mission was organized under the jurisdiction of said Classis, though it was partially transferred to the Board. An appropriation of \$300 was made and the commission given, with the condition that the whole amount should be received from the Westmoreland Classis. These conditions were complied with, and at the end of the year the missionary resigned his mission, leaving it in a healthy and properous condition.

### LICKING COUNTY MISSION.

At the earnest request of the Lancaster Classis the Board received under its care the Licking County Mission and gave a commission to the Rev. W. Alspach, dated April 1, with an appriation of \$125.

### MARSHALL COUNTY, IND.

The officers of congregations in this county petitioned the Board to send them a missionary (the Rev. J. Schlosser), with an appropriation of \$150. With this amount for two years they were confident they could become not only self-supporting, but, in a short time, pay back, with interest, all they might receive from the Board. The Board, however, have thus far failed in accomplishing this much-desired object.

Petitions have also been received from St. Joseph, Mo., Fulton County, Ind., and Tazewell County, Ill. These are all fields represented as being ripe for the harvest. But we have not the men nor the means with which to employ them to thrust in the sickle and

Finally, we would again call the special attention of Synod to Cedarville, Ill. There we have a church worth \$3,500, and a few members among the best citizens of the place. But they are without a shepherd.

### GENERAL MISSIONARY.

In consideration of the fact that the membership of the German Reformed Church is scattered through all parts of the Western

States, and on account of the scarcity of ministers residing within the bounds of those States to care for our destitute people; therefore the Illinois and Iowa Classes petitioned this Board in connection with the Board of the East to appoint a general missionary, to take under his care and supervision all the missionary operations of the West, and form and supply such missionary stations as shall be considered important to the future prosperity of the Church.

This petition received much favor at the hands of the Board; but for want of a proper man and means to support him we felt our-

selves constrained to lay it over for the present.

### FINANCES.

The past has been a year of much embarrassment to the Board. A smaller amount of funds has been received than usual; thus compelling us at times to borrow from the bank, that we might meet the just claims of our devoted missionaries. The Macedonian ery was again and again heard, but the strength of the Board had been shorn by the Church, so that no help could be given. times we were in debt to our laboring and toiling missionaries to the amount of \$250. It is not a small thing to be separated far away from friends and ministerial associations; but to be foresaken by the Church at home, and thus left to suffer all the inconveniences of piercing, pinching poverty, is scarcely endurable. Classis after Classis seems to have adopted the general, but to our mind, erroneous principle that "charity begins at home," hence nearly all their funds have been appropriated either by or for themselves. Others again attempt to justify their slothfulness with the plea: Our country is distracted and we must first accomplish the work of its restoration; thus leaving the Church of the West to the cultivation of other hands or to utter destitution and want. They are rendering "unto Casar the things that are Casar's," while they are forgetting, almost entirely, to render unto God the things that are But how can the Government be more effectually and permanently established than by spreading the light, not of civilization simply, but of the Gospel of the Grace of God. this alone can men be brought to realize, that there is power above us and around us, that teareth down one Government and setteth up another, in whose hands the nations, with all their boasted strength, are as nothing, yea, and even less than nothing.

A little while ago our sons were growing up in their youth, and our daughters as corner stones polished after the similitude of a palace. There was no breaking in nor going out,—no complaining in the streets. "We washed our steps with butter and the rock poured out rivers of oil." Unto us the nations gave car and waited and kept silence at our counsel. And had we been a people perfect and upright, fearing God and eschewing evil, we might, according to the promises and often experienced truth of God with his people, have continued and increased in all that happiness unto this day. But our sins have put a sword into the hand of God.

And God in justice hath put a sword into the hands of unjust men,-men skillful to destroy; and our young men are slain by the edge of the sword, and the desolations of war the most unatural and wicked are blasting many portions of our once happy and peaceful land. God, however, never sends such evils and troubles upon a nation—he does sometimes upon a person as he did spon Job,—without cause; that is, without respecting sin as a cause. Hence we must say: "Our ways and our doings have pro-cured these things upon us." As long as sin is in the world men and nations will be compelled to pass through such conflicts. But we are constrained to believe that there is mercy to us from all these evils. Only let us as Christian men and as a Christian nation maintain our integrity and whatever evils are among us, let us repent of and reform them speedily. It is true, God never delivers any people for their repentance, but rarely, if ever, without repentance. Let us get rid of our sins, far better have our troubles continue than our sins. To have our peace return and our hearts unturned were infinitely worse than war. Let us then look to our sins that they may humble us and to God that he may forgive and strengthen us for his work. Could we but see the repentance of this nation, all the world would hear and wonder at the end which the Lord would make. Then would be make "the light of our moon to be like the light of the sun and the light of our sun to be seven fold as the light of seven days in the day in which he would bind up our outward breaches, and heal the stroke of our wound." Then, when our officers shall have become peace and our exactors righteousness. "violence will no more be heard in our land, wasting nor destruction within our borders;" but men shall call our walls salvation and our gates praise.

### SUGGESTIONS.

Inasmuch as many of the Classes continue to show their want of confidence in Synod Board, thus leaving other Classes to serve alone in the general work of missions; therefore the Board would again repeat its suggestion to Synod, to either require all the Classes to operate through the Board of Synod, or at once dissolve the same and substitute something that will recommend itself more generally to the mind and heart of the entire Church.

Collected by Rev. C. W. Hoyman in the Somerset charge, \$70.00, and retained by him to be applied to the Licking County Mission.

In connection with the above the Missionary Board of Tiffin Classis disbursed \$258.04 in the support of the Upper Sandusky, Findlay, Kenton, Fremont, Hessville, Middleberry, etc., missions under its care, leaving a balance in the Treasury of \$15.21.

### 3.-Report of the Committee on Missions.

The Committee on Missions respectfully offer the following

report:

The only documents placed in our hands were the reports of the President and Treasurer of the Board of Missions and that of Tiffin Classis as auxiliary Board. From these it appears that the work entrusted to them by Synod has been carried forward with considerable success. The Board has taken under its care two new fields, by request of these Classes, (Westmoreland and Lancaster,) within whose bounds these said fields are located, which are in a very prosperous and promising condition. Six missionary stations, within the bounds of Tiffin Classis, are under the care of the Board of said Classis, inasmuch as said Classis organized a society of its own. Eight fields are still under the care of the Board, all

of which are more or less promising, with an appropriation of From the Treasurer's report it appears that the whole smount received was \$1297.80, while it was expected that \$8000 would be at the command of the Board according to apportionment of Synod at its last meeting. But inasmuch as nearly all the Classes have failed to meet their apportionment, hence it has made this great deficiency of \$1702.20. There have, however, also been moneys received and paid out for missions by the Classical Boards of Tiffin and Sandusky within their bounds; the former \$273.25, and the later \$275.00, and Rev. C. W. Hoyman has also retained \$70.00 for the Licking County Mission, hence the whole amount appropriated for domestic missions is \$1916.05. This, dear brethren, ought not to be, if we expect the Board to carry forward the great work which has been committed to its care. From the pressing wants of the Board during a part of the year, and from the discouragement with which the Board has met, it has been constrained to suggest a change of Synod's policy in carrying forward the great missionary work of the church.

But your Committee feels that such a change is not necessary, for the fault is not in the policy of Synod, but in the want of its being carried out. Therefore, your Committee would offer the fol-

lowing:

WHEREAS, Some of the Classes have refused to operate through the parent Board of Missions as requested by Synod, and have formed Classical Boards, and thereby have, to some extent, affected the operations of the parent Board, in properly carrying out its designs: And, WHEREAS, so long as the Classical Boards continue, and the Classes refuse to operate through the parent Board, they will, to some degree, defeat the main object of said Board, therefore

Resolved, That those Classes which have independent or auxiliary missionary boards be requested to dissolve them, and in place thereof elect a committee whose duty it shall be to correspond with the Board of Synod.

### 3. SUBJECTS REFERRED TO CLASSES.

1. Sandusky, Lancaster, Westmoreland, St. Joseph, Illinois, Tiffin, and Miami Classes approve of the changes Synod proposed in reference to the formation of a Triennial General Synod. Iowa Classis, by a majority of one vote, does not approve of such proposition. Adoped.

2. Indiana and Sheboygan Classes concur with Synod in the constitution of a Triennial General Synod, on condition that a

seperate German Synod be instituted. Adopted.

8. Lancaster and Iowa Classes concur with Synod in her action with reference to the Triennial Celebration of the Heidelberg Cate-

chism. Adopted.

4. Sandusky and Tiffin Classes deem it inexpedient to comply with the request of Synod, in regard to the carrying on of their Missionary labors through the General Board.

These Classes were referred to the action of Synod on this sub-

ject, under the general head of Missions.

### 4. RECEPTIONS AND DISMISSIONS.

1. Miami Classis received the licentiates, H. M. Herman from the Clarion, L. H. Leonard from the Tiffin, and Richard Schweedes from the Mercersburg Classis, and ordained H. M. Herman, G. H. Leonard and J. Scott.

2. Lancaster Classis received Rev. J. McConnell from the Miami and dismissed Rev. J. C. Klar to Iowa Classis; also licensed and ordained Joel W. Alsbach to the Gospel Ministry.

8. Westmoreland Classis licensed Joseph H. Johnston to the

Gospel Ministry.

4. Tiffin Classis ordained the licentiates, S. Shaw and J. Winter; licensed C. Martin, and dismissed Rev. M. Stern to Indiana, and Rev. C. Bank to St. John's Classis.

5. St. Joseph Classis received Rev. D. Groh from the Illinois, and Rev. C. Jackel from the St. Joseph Classis; for specified reasons suspended Rev. D. Lantz indefinitely from the Gospel Ministry, and reinstated W. Spiess, who had formerly been suspended.

6. Illinois Classis placed the name of Rev. J. P. Decker, as a superannuated minister on their statistics, and examined and

licensed Jacob Burkholtz to the Holy Ministry.

### ARTICLE XVIII.

### PUBLICATION.

### Report of the Board of Publication.

The Board of Publication of the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, would make the following report:

That immediately after the adjournment of the Synod which met at Delaware, Ohio, last year, the Board learned that great dissatisfaction existed on the part of the membership of the church in reference to the action of Synod in regard to the Western Missionary. Individuals, Consistories, Charges, and a majority of all the Classes belonging to this Synod remonstrated against the action of Synod, and requested the Board of Publication to interfere, and The Board not feeling authorized to stay the aforesaid action. interrupt the action of the highest judicatory of the church, it only being a creature of the Synod, awaited the time when such action was to take place, and then addressed a letter to the Rev. G. B. Russell, of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, the editor elect, inquiring of him whether he, in view of these remonstrances, intended to hold the Synods to its contract? He replied that "under the circumstances he declined the Synod proposition."

The Board then had no alternative, but to enter into an arrangement with the present editor, Rev. G. W. Williard, to continue the publication of the Western Missionary under the old form, price, and at the same place, until this meeting of Synod, with the assurance that Synod would not abruptly break off the

arrangement to the injury of either party.

From the report of the editor to the Board of Publication it appears that the present number of subscribers is 2,505; a decrease of about 300 during the year, which has resulted mainly from the financial embarrassment of the country, arising from our unhappy national troubles; the action of the late Synod which met with epposition in some portions of the church; and from the erasure of a number of names from the list, which names, in consequence of their delinquency, were a dead loss.

The Committee on Publication presented their report, which

was received, amended, and adopted. It is as follows:

The only subject referred to your Committee relates to the Western Missionary; and the principal document in our possession is the report of the Board of Publication. It appears from it that the action of the last Synod in regard to the Western Missionary has been practically rendered void, owing to remonstrances coming from a number of individuals, consistories, charges, and classes. In view of these remonstrances, officially communicated by the Board to the editor elect, and of the injury done to the paper by opposition to Synod's action, the editor elect declined the position tendered him. It became necessary, in consequence, for the Board to continue the old arrangement with the former editor, on the terms before existing, until the present meeting of Synod. As some thing definite will now have to be done in this matter, and as the want among the membership of the church for a religious paper equal to our great work in the West is urgent, we submit the following:

Resolved, That the Missionary be published weekly from the first of January, 1863, at \$1.50 per annum, provided 2,000 cash subscribers be obtained in the meantime; otherwise the present

arrangement be continued.

Resolved, That Synod during its present session elect a permanent editor.

On motion it was resolved that in adopting the above report, Synod accept the declination of the Rev. Geo. B. Russell, who was elected editor one year ago. The following declination was ordered to be published:

To the Board of Purlication of the Symod of Ohio and Adjacent States—Dear Brethren:—Your official note in regard to the Western Missionary is before me for an early answer, and I hasten to reply.

Allow me to say, first of all, that the Board was heretofore recognized as the organ of Synod, rather than the servants of indi-

viduals, congregations, or classes.

It would doubtless as such, have been proper for them to see that the action of Synod, in a matter over which they had, by virtue of their appointment, special control, should not be allowed to be misrepresented continuously in the very publication issued under their direction, without at least an effort on their part as the representatives of Synod, to prevent so gross a violation of privilege.

Misstatements were allowed to be made and published in Synod's own organ in regard to her action on the proposed transfer of that paper; and these were repeated and retailed so long without contradiction that it is no wonder at all, many being thus prejudiced should come to oppose what Synod meant for the good of the church

When it was found that those directly representing Synod's interest in the matter refrained from making a single correction, or uttering one word in her defense, or entering at least their protest against such prostitution of the Synod's paper published under their direction, and used at the same time to assail her action; it was not for me to enter the list in the one-sided "controversy" (as it is called by one Classis) so bitterly provoked to the detriment of Christian charity. It was at once plain to me, that what was acknowledged to be a risk under the best auspices with the hearty cooperation of the church, would not be improved by discord and stout opposition from those who had been mislead by such as were interested in frustrating the plan and defeating the purpose of Synod.

Although there seems now to be a very general opposition in some of the Classes, yet it is hard to see on what good ground it is based. No reason has been assigned except their mere declaration that the paper would suffer. Of course, if this be true, there

must be some assignable cause, which has not transpired.

Such opinions of classes, congregations, and individuals, coming up to the Synod as counseling advice are to be respected for what they are worth. But as decrees and laws intended to thwart and set aside Synodical action, they only represent blank independency, which is not recognized as the form and order of our church government, where authority goes from above downward, not vice versa.

The Synod, as our constitution provides, is above the Classes, and exercises the highest ecclesiastical powers. Lower judicatories certainly have no right to interfere presumptuously with what belongs exclusively to the Synod, and which she has not referred to

them, either for counsel or decree.

As it was no special desire on my part to assume the management of Synod's paper,—the publishing and editing of which was voted me with singular unanimity, in a session counting the same number of voting members as given in the election of Theological Professor after a two day's notice had been given to the Synod; still less have I a desire as the case now stands, to "hold the Synod to its engagement, and go forward with the publication."

Knowing this, that those in our Western Synod, who desire a good Reformed Church Paper, weekly and cheap, will not at least hold me accountable for the fact that they, for the present, will be deprived of that great desideratum; I therefore hereby respectfully beg leave to decline the responsible appointment offered me by the

Synod.

Praying our Divine Lord, who makes all things work together for good to them that love God, and even the wrath of man to praise him, that he would control this result for his own glory and the good of our church.

### ARTICLE XX.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

### On the State of the Country.

Believing there is a God in history, who controls the affairs of nations, as well as defends his Church against the assaults of earth and hell; and that the cause of every just constitutional government is the cause of God, in which the interests of the Church and State are so closely identified, as to mutually affect and condition each other; and whereas, these important interests, have been jeopardized by a most stupendous and unholy rebellion, waged upon the freest and best government on earth, and for which our fathers fought and bled and died; therefore,

Resolved, That the German Reformed Church, as well as in obedience to the spirit and letter of the apostolic injunction,-"Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers," and, "I exhort first of all, that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for kings, and all that are in authority,"—as from sentiments of genuine patriotism, has ever been most heartily loyal to the great and good government, whose protection, under the Lord Jesus Christ, secures us in the unmolested enjoyment of our high religious privileges, and cheerfully gives her sons for the defense of that government, against the fierce assults of the most wicked rebellion ever known in the history of nations.

Resolved. That we will not cease to pray fervently to that God to whom our fathers cried in the day of their sore tribulation, that he would endow our rulers with wisdom, inspire our generals and army with courage, confound the counsels and machinations of our enemies, and thus mercifully favor the efforts put forth to suppress the rebellion, and restore peace and prosperity to our distracted

country. And finally,

Resolved, That whilst we have such faith in the Divine promise, respecting the perpetuity of the Christian Church, that she will come forth from the contest and smoke of battle, like gold tried in the fire, renovated and purified; we also have such faith in the righteousness and final success of our cause, that these malignant assaults made upon the foundations of our national prosperity, will only tend to increase their strength and confirm their perpetuity.

Action on the Name of the Church, to Evangelical Reformed.

It is a well known fact of history that our branch of the Church Catholic, having been reformed and developed in strict conformity with the Word of God, was originally called "Evangelical Reformed Church;" but after her transition from the old country, and in consequence of her peculiar relation to the Reformed Dutch Church she gradually received the name "German Reformed," by which she is now known. It is the experience and conviction of a large number of ministers and members in our communion, that this national name is really a source of much misunderstanding and a serious obstacle in the way of our progress. Hence we feel it our solemn duty to remove this obstacle, by reassuming our original name—"Evangelical Reformed," therefore

Resolved, That this important subject be again handed down to the different Classes, for their solemn consideration and adoption.

Resolved, That the Eastern Synod be kindly requested to cooperate with us in this important movement.

### Publication of the Minutes of Synod.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be authorized to publish 1900 copies of the Minutes of Synod in the English language, and that the Treasurer of Synod pay for the same at the rate of ten cents per copy, charging the Classes at the same rate according to the number of copies ordered.

There not being a sufficient number of copies ordered in the German language by the Classes to justify their publication, no action was taken.

### Testimonial of Licensure and Ordination.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be authorized to have blank certificates, or testimonials of licensure and ordination, (one hundred each,) printed for the use of Synod and the Classes.

### Action on the Liturgy.

WHEREAS, the Synod of the German Reformed Church of North America has prepared a Provisional Liturgy with the intention of making it the Liturgy of the entire Reformed Church in this country; and, WHEREAS, said Provisional Liturgy has been referred back to the original Committee for revision, and WHEREAS

said Committee in their published report ask of the Church instruc-

tion as to the kind of Liturgy wanted, therefore

Resolved, That it be the sense of this Synod that we desire the Liturgy now before the Church so modified as to omit the responsive part as it has respect to the people in the ordinary service of the Church and such phrases as may be in conflict with the generally received doctrines of the German Reformed Church.

### Reporter.

A request having been received from the Dayton Daily Journal for a report of the proceedings of Synod, Rev. R. P. Thomas was appointed reporter for said paper.

### The Delegate from the East.

Rev. Dr. J. H. A. Bomberger, delegate from the Eastern Synod, took his leave by making some appropriate remarks expressive of the gratification which he had in meeting the Synod and partimipating in its business, in the intercourse he had with the members of Synod, and gave strong assurance of the deep and abiding interest which the body he represented has in the success and prosperity of the Church West. His remarks were briefly responded to by the President, who expressed the pleasure which Synod had in meeting him and have him participate in the transaction of our business, and requested him in turn to bear with him the greetings of our Synod to the body he represented.

### Thanks to Rail Roads.

A vote of thanks was returned to the Pittsburg, Ft. Wayne & Chicago Rail Road, and the Dayton & Western Rail Road for the privilege of a free pass back to those members of Synod who had paid full fare in coming, and to the Stubenville Rail Road for excursion tickets.

### Thanks to the Dayton Journal.

A vote of thanks was returned to the Dayton Journal for publishing tickets for the use of Synod, and for the copies of the Journal sent to the Synod every day during its sessions.

### Vote of Thanks to the Choir.

Resolved, That Synod returns thanks to the Choir of the 1st German Reformed Church for their excellent, soul-inspiring music during the religious exercises held in connection with the sessions of this Synod.

### Vote of Thanks.

Resolved, That having as a Synod, received and enjoyed the fraternal Christian hospitality of the good people of Dayton, we hereby return to them through the Pastors loci the hearty thanks of the members of this Synod; and our prayer is to him, who gives a rebard for the gift of only a cup of cold water to one of the least of in disciples, that he will still more richly reward their greater hidness so freely bestowed upon us.

### STATE OF RELIGION.

Report on the State of Religion within the Bounds of the Eastern Synod for the year 1861.

FATHERS AND BRETHERN IN CHRIST:—Under a deep sense of our obligations for that continued goodness, which has distinguished the past Synodical year, and moved by a feeling of generous love and grateful affection toward Him, who is the Author of all our mercies, we cordially greet you, the representatives of our beloved Zion, on this festive occasion; and we also earnestly wish you, in your collective and individual capacity, to unite with us in rendering thanks to Almighty God for His kind care over us in the past and invoking His paternal favor upon us in the future.

To specify all the instances of God's Fatherly goodness would be not only useless, but in the nature of the case, also impossible. Enough that all our ministers, with but two exceptions, have been spared, and graciously permitted to discharge the duties of their high and holy calling. For this striking instance of the divine benignity we are bound to bless and humbly to adore the eternal Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In connection with this long suffering and sparing mercy of our God, we should also gratefully acknowledge the riches of His grace as seen in the abundant success which has attended the labors and efforts of our several minis-All the reports furnish satisfactory evidence of essing of God with his servants. The eternal ters and classes. the presence and blessing of God with his servants. word, which liveth and abideth forever, has been statedly and faithfully preached—the sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper believingly administered—the worship of the public assemblies and of the social and more retired circle cheerfully attended to on the part of pastors and people—and the consequence has been, that these labors of love and works of faith have been crowned with abundant success. Evidences of this success are found in the erection of new churches, the organization of new congregations, the increased attention on the preached word, the observance of the sealing ordinances of God's house, the seriousness and attention with which the word of Life is heard, and the duties of religion performed, and in the general progress of the kingdom of God in our midst. The number of ministers has also been increased, and thus the places of the two deceased brethren-Rev. Jesse Stroud Weber, of the Philadelphia Classis, and Rev. David Heffelfinger, of the Mcrcersburg Classis—have been filled up again, and some other posts occupied besides. Have we not reason to bless God for these evidences of His presence and active co-operation with His Church? True there may be such an external growth of the church, where there is but comparatively little accomplished for the inward, spiritual, and true growth and edification of the body of Christ. Outward growth and prosperity, in themselves and separate from a corresponding inward growth, are of small account; but when

coupled with this, they become immensely important.

In this connection we must also notice the encouraging fact, that during the past year, the number of the church's members has been greatly increased. Some eight or nine thousand souls have been added to the infant membership of the church by baptism-receiving thus the sign and seal of the covenant of grace and the pledge of an immortal life. By confirmation and certificate some five or six thousand souls have been added to the adult membership—thus either renewing or for the first time making a confession of their faith in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only begotten Son, our Lord, and in the Holy Ghost, the Comforter and guide of His saints. May we not hope, that a large proportion of these have also been truly born of God, justified by the blood and Spirit of Jesus Christ, and by the Holy Ghost sealed unto the day of Redemption? And if so, have we not much reason to bless God for these thousands that have been thus added to the sacramental hosts of the Lord?

In this external way already much has been accomplished; but we have still better news to present for our mutual edification. The spiritual training of the young, as also of the old, has apparently kept steady pace with the outward enlargement of the church. Many of the reports speak with great assurance of the good that has been accomplished in this way. If the statements there given are to be relied on, the brethren have learned the meaning and import of the great commission, as requiring them to go forth and make disciples of all nations, "baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost," and then completing this discipleship by teaching the baptized ones to observe all things whatsoever Christ has commanded them. things must always go together if the gospel is to make steady and successful progress. Both word and sacrament are necessary to realize the idea of God's kingdom. So, likewise, private instruction in the doctrines and practices of religion and the public preaching of the word, are duly effective only when in union with each And, for this reason, we have great cause to rejoice in the statements made in the several Classical reports.

It would be palpably unjust to conceal the fact, that in connection with the cheering statements, there are also others of an entirely different character. So long as Zion dwells in the tents of Kedar, the inward aspect of the church only is "like the curtains of Solomon," while the outer covering will necessarily be soiled and som-

bre in appearance. The dust of earth settles upon and cleaves to the church of Christ, and cannot be wholly shaken off until the chills of death and the taking down of the earthly tabernacle shall

accomplish the work.

Another cause of congratulation is the attention which Sunday Schools have received at the hands of the brethren. Notwithstanding the general acknowledgment of vast defects in the Sunday School system as it now stands, the benefit of careful instruction in the case of the young, has given rise to a very large number of schools in our connection. Many of them are conducted in the ordinary way; but others have assumed a more specific and churchly form—the catechisms and other publications of the church having been substituted in place of the books of other establishments. Much may be expected from these schools if judiciously and piously conducted. Every new school, therefore, should be hailed as a aursery of piety, and especially of youthful piety!

Looking at the facts now stated, we have much reason to be thankful to the Great Head of the church. He has thus far made good His promise: "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." He has afforded us repeated evidences of his pre-ence in the public assembly—in the family circle—in the secret chamber—in the pious and devoted heart. He has been our God in generations past, and will be our God in generations to come—our friend in time of need—our shield and hiding place in seasons of

sorrow and adversity.

With feelings of sincere regret we notice the absence of some of our brethren, who, by the disturbed state of the country, have been prevented from being present and taking part with us in our business transactions. Mysterious are the ways of God. We know

not what a day may bring forth.

Let us then, as a Synod, and as individuals, dedicate ourselves anew to the service and honor of our covenant keeping God. Let us confidently rely upon the promises of God, and go to work with new courage and a firm hope, preaching the gospel, administering the sacraments, and leading precious souls to the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world—waiting for a blessed resurrection and the life everlasting—Amen.

In this way the time-honored custom of teaching our children the fundamental doctrines, precepts and duties. We know that the wants the church are many and great, but we have little will to less We are often free in advancing political as and lighten them. worldly enterprises, but we vainly excuse ourselves when the Le demands our money, our time, and our labor. And the result ! that our missionary and other benevolent operations are circus scribed, crippled and unsuccessful. O! that we would bear mind that "the Lord leveth a cheerful giver;" that "he that give eth to the poor lendeth to the Lord;" and that "the liberal seal shall be made fat."

And why is it that, while a good degree of progress and presperity is attending our church, we after all are doing and accomplishing so little in the sphere of Christian benevolence, missionary enterprise, church extension, meral achievements, and spiritual activity and triumph? Is it not because we still lack, to a great extent, the true spirit of Jesus Christ, and the unction of the Holy Ghost? Are we not in want of more copious showers of reviving and animating grace? Does not our piety need more depth, vitality and self-denying earnestness? Are we not too much conformed to the world, and to its order of thinking and practice? ### ARTICLE XIII.

### THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

1.—Report of the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary would respectfully report, that they have endeavored to be true to the truet. committed to their care by Synod. Having two Professors in the Seminary since last November, the responsibility of the Board head increased. We have endeavered to awaken an interest in behalf of our Seminary, by addressing appeals through the papers of the church, and in different other ways, so as to provide promptly fee; the payment of the salaries of the Professors, and have measurable, succeeded. The salary of the German Professor has been paid. for the six months he has been laboring in the Seminary, as also his removal expenses. This the Board has been able to do, as. there was a considerable balance in the treasury of this fund when the Professor entered upon his duties. There is, however, a larger, amount due the English Professor than there has been for several years past, which is certainly a matter of serious regret in this tercentennary festival. This arises from the fact that only a few of our pastoral charges have taken collections for the immediate use of the Seminary, whilst a very large number have failed to pay the interest on their bonds. This should not be, as such delinquency must necessarily cripple the operations of our Seminary. A larger amount of the permanent fund of the Seminary has been paid in during the year than in any former one.

As soon as the Professor elect for the German department entered upon his duty, the Board took measures to secure an endowment, so as to give permanency to it. Thus far we have suc-

sided in raising \$3,000, which may be regarded as a good beginag. The Board contemplates raising \$15,000 by the assistance
the Agent—the Professor and others who may be enlisted in
s important work—and would suggest the propriety of Synod
commending the project to the church, and aiding the Board in
accomplishment. There is no reason why this Professorship
y not be fully endowed during this ter-contennary jubilee,
any of the wealthy members of the church ought to come
ward and give their hundreds and thousands toward this object.
For a full exhibit of the finances of the Seminary, as it respects

It is located in the southern part of Indiana, twenty miles west of New Albany. The work of building ap the church here, as in many other places, has been comparatively slow; but the field is important, and will, we think, in time, become an important auxiliary to the church. Here there two organized congregations, and three preaching points, likely, in time, may become congregations. The mission has 67 timbers; added one during the year; baptized one; has two thath-schools. The missionary receives \$250 from the charge, and \$150 from the Board. Collected during the year for missions, 13. The mission is English.

### COLUMBUS, IOWA.

This mission is located about twenty miles from the Mississippi for, in a most flourishing part of the state. It was organized ythe Rev. J. H. Buser when he was yet in Oskaloosa. He was the missioned to this place eighteen months since, during which he has extended his labors over a very large field. He has bready three congregations, with 90 confirmed members, 40 of hem he received during the year. He has two Sabbath-schools,

and expects soon to organize the third; has no catechisms, but endeavoring to raise a class; has no houses of worship, but my gards the prospects of the mission as quite flattering. He receive from his people a salary of \$200, and \$150 from the Board; but this falls short of meeting his current expenses. The mission English.

### SHELBYVILLE, ILLINOIS.

Here the Rev. H. K. Baines has labored under the care of the Board for three years and six months; here, too, the work building up the church has been but slow, and yet the missional feels confident of success. He has two congregations—both the country—with a membership of 44 persons. Confirmed defing the year, 1, and baptized 8; has one Sabbath-school. In receives from the mission \$250, and \$150 from the Board. Having no congregation in the town of Shelbyville, and but had prospect of soon establishing one, our missionary left the paradage and moved into the country, nearer his congregations. The mission is English.

### TERRE HAUTE, INDIANA.

The Rev. H. Kortheuer was commissioned to this place for years since. When he came here, he found the church great discouraged, with a membership of 35 persons. Since then has added 26, making, in all, 61. He has one congregation; received, during the year, 12 members, and baptised 32 children; has a Sabbath-school of 100 scholars; contributed for missions \$5,00. He receives a salary of \$200 from the mission, and \$112 from the Board. We have here another evidence of the fact that large self supporting congregations are not always gathered together in a few years. The mission is German.

### DAYTON GERMAN OHURCH.

On the first of July last, the Board commissioned to this comgregation, made vacant by the resignation of the Rev. Loeden Rev. W. Wittenwieler, late of the Theological Seminary of Me cersburg. He reports the field, when he entered it, not the me inviting; but, by the blessings of God, he has been enabled effect a better state of things. His congregation has, for a numb of years, been a separate organization; but having no church a their own in which to worship, and laboring under the disadvantages incident to A frequent change of pastors, it has not yet become self-supporting. ### LAFAYETTE, OHIO.

Through the division of the charge, this portion of it became a mission under the care of the Eastern Board. We received it than their hands on the 1st of last October. It has four congressions, with 100 confirmed members. The Rev. G. M. Albright, is present missionary, organized during the year one congregation; received by confirmation 24 members, and baptized 18 chillian; has one Sabbath-school, and a catechetical class numbering members. His salary this year will amount to \$350, one hundred of which is paid by the Board. He writes that the condition of the mission is good,—that the ordinances of the church are well attended, and the people seem greatly encouraged.

### LICKING COUNTY MISSION.

Last April, a year since, the Lancaster Classis sent the Rev. J. W. Alspach into this county to labor as a missionary in gathering tegether our hitherto neglected people. After the meeting of sysod last year, they referred him to our Board, by which he was regalarly commissioned, with an appropriation of \$125. Owing to local difficulties, the mission has not proved the most encouraging. The missionary, however, writes that there is material there for a self-supporting charge, and that the mission is not without hope. At the end of the year he resigned his field, having received from it a salary of only \$100. It has one organized congregation with 16 members; received 2 during the year, and baptized 3; has no Sabbath-school, but a catechetical class of 20 members.

### LANCASTER, OHIO.

This field having long since been weakened by a division of the charge, and the want of a regular pastor, was taken up by the Language Classis and referred to the Board. A commission was

accordingly given to the Rev. M. H. Hockman, dated with an appropriation of \$150. Will the Lord speedily revive his work amid the desolations of this part of his Zion?

### ZWINGLE, IOWA.

The Rev. F. C. Bauman has been laboring here for ten year with much acceptance and success; during this time he has added to the church by confirmation, 65, by letter, 52, and baptized 15. He has now 105 members. But his salary being only \$175 year, he asked permission to retain \$25 collected in his own charfor missions, which, under the circumstances, has been granted him.

### LANESVILLE, INDIANA.

This is a small town situated midway between New Albany as Corydon. Through the earnest efforts of the Rev. Max. Stemissionary at Louisville, this promising field was explored, a arrangements made for the settlement of a pastor. Hence Board commissioned to this place the Rev. Mr. Martin, with a appropriation of \$100 dated April 1st, 1863.

We are sorry that we are again compelled to report the Oalloosa mission, in Iowa, without a pastor. In the month of Masswe received a communication from the Rev. J. J. Excell, treasure of the Board of Missions of Sandusky Classis, stating that he have received, from the different charges within the bounds of the Classis, \$180 40, and that he had paid out the same amount to the Rev. Wm. McCaughey.

### CHURCH EXTENSION FUND.

No interest seems to be taken by the church in this subject The only amount that ever came into the treasury of the Boundary was \$65, which still continues as a lean to the Terre Haute mission.

### THE STATE OF FINANCES.

The Board is still in debt to her missionaries to the amount of \$150. This amount may yet be met at the present meeting Synod; for, notwithstanding the urgent appeals made by the Board upon the necessity of having all moneys paid into the treatury before the meeting of Synod, many retain their collections and bring them in only at the latest hour.

We can not close our report without again urging the church the necessity of greater diligence in the holy cause of mission. If our beloved Zion is ever to arise and shine in the great kingdom of our blessed Lord on earth, it will only be when she shall have put on her strength and girded herself for her work,—when her priests, clothed with salvation, shall go forth bearing the peoples' offering—their gold and their silver—and present it hely unto the Lord.

The Committee on Missions would respectfully submit the fol-

wing report:

, The report of the President and Treasurer of the Board of Resions are all the documents that have been placed in the hands d your Committee. From these documents we are lead to believe that the Board has carried the work forward with encouraging because which Synod has intrusted into their hands. Through the est Synedical year, notwithstanding the difficulties that must have mented themselves to those who have been commissioned by the leard to labor in the respective fields under their care on account wour national troubles, they all are more or less encouraged to continue the work in which they are engaged. During the year, he Board had eleven missionary fields under its care, three of which were taken up during the last year-these are, however, not all the fields that should, and could receive aid from the Board. The Macedonean cry, it appears, often comes to the ears of the Beard, "Come over and help us"-but the Board can only supply **the** wants of our destitute brethren so far as the church supplies them with the necessary means. The means, we believe, have never satisfied the demand. This is so, because we are never of ene mind; and therefore do not labor to bring about the same impertant end. But we hope, in this Synodical year upon which we are now about to enter, which is the year of Jubilee in our beloved Zion, that we will make a united effort in raising funds to fill the Treasury of our Board, that they may gladden the hearts of many of our destitute who have long wanted to have the church of their fathers, and their choice, established in their western homes.

Your Committee learns, with regret, that so many separate Boards have been formed throughout the church, independent of Synod's This assuredly is not calculated to work for good; therefore, such Classes should desist in this, and work through the proper Board, for through it all can be accomplished that can posmibly be accomplished through a Classical Board; and then the benevolent operations in this direction can be properly presented before the church and the world. As we have been working, we ma not possibly place the correct amount collected on record. This year it will appear in the minutes of Synod that some of our Classes did little or nothing in this direction. Let us therefore have more system in our missionary operations, and with one secord lay hold of this work, ever looking to the great Head of the shurch for direction, and grace to perform the duties resting upon us in this respect, and the waste places of our beloved Zion will be supplied with the means of grace.

WHEREAS, Some of our Classes have refused to work through Synod's Board; and, whereas, Tiffin Classis has sent up a request to have their Classical Board recognized as an auxiliary Board;

therefore,

Resolved, 1. That the request of Tiffin Classis be not granted for reasons already given, and that the other Classes having sufficiently be earnestly requested to dissolve them, and work through

Synod's Board.

Resolved, 2. That Synod recommend the appointment of Local Agents by the Board of Missions to organize new fields, where is thought advisable, and encourage such as have already been exganized, and also that each Classis appoint an agent within their own bounds to attend to their missionary interests.

Resolved, 3. That this Synod, in this Jubilee year, make a united effort to raise missionary funds, so as to enable the Board.

### STATE OF RELIGION.

Report on the State of Religion within the Bounds of the Eastel Synod for the year 1862.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Morals, with the bounds of the Eastern Synod, respectfully beg leave to sal mit the following report:

Beloved Fathers and Brethern in the Lord;—Withe disciples on the mount of transfiguration, it is to be hoped, whave all had occasion, in some measure at least, during the session through which we have now passed, to say, "It is good for us be here." Once more has the Master whom we serve permitting us to greet each other in the bonds of Christian fellowship, mingle our counsels and prayers in behalf of the progress of a kingdom, and to labor unitedly and in the spirit of harmony is love for the glory of His name and the spiritual good of more for this privilege, connected with all other blessings which have made to crowd our lives during the past Synodical year, would here, and in this solemn way, lift our hearts to God in a vout gratitude, saying individually—"Bless the Lord, O my so and all that is within me bless His holy name; bless the Lord, my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

Occasion for this feeling of gratitude has indeed not be wanting at any point between the present and our last meeting? a similar capacity. Though we have all been made to see, and some extent also to feel, God's severity, still His goodness hat no time been wholly withheld. Justice and mercy, harmoniou related in God, have been equitably meted out to men; and even where the former seemed to have preponderated in our individu experience, it was to prepare the way for a more enlarged received tion and a more comfortable enjoyment of the latter. of day is only the more cheering for the darkness of the night which it penetrates and drives away. As did the apostles, so t also reckon that our light afflictions, which are but for a moment are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be re vealed in us hereafter. Thus we are patient in adversity, an thankful in prosperity, believing that both states look to, and, un der Providence, prepare the way for a still higher, holier and more blessed condition.

In this spirit do the reports, which have been placed into our hands, generally regard the calamity which has overtaken our beloved country. God's hand is devoutly acknowledged in it; and it is believed that His purpose is to separate us from our national sins, and then to unite and elevate us again, and thus make us a stronger, more prosperous and happy people than we have ever

is before. Though the reports in this view evince a subdued first, it is not in any of them the spirit of despair. Hope, arising from the Christian faith and sustained by the promises of ed's Word, is always the stronger feeling; and however dark the interest to the purely natural mind, for the mind of the church, which is the from the different points from which these reports we been gathered, it is both penetrated and bordered by rays of the Accordingly, wherever God, through this affliction, has alged up the way to fields of usefulness which seemed ready to sentered and occupied, and wherever He has modified hitherto beessful activity in fields already possessed and in the process of divation, it is felt to be only for a time, in order to make way a more successful, radical, and, in the end, speedy subjugation the world to the reign of Christ—the Prince of Peace. But for a few exceptional cases, our ministers have all been swed to retain their positions in their charges, and to continue air efforts to advance the great interests of the Church of Christ. It igratifying to state that we have lost none by death, and that walth and vigor have been preserved to a remarkable degree. Thile a few, with staff in hand, having borne the heat and burden the day, are almost ready to impart to us their last blessing and in their companions in heaven, it is cheering to behold the large number of young men, so fully equipped for the contest, crowding meand them anxious to receive their mantle, and willing to take their places. The prospect of the church, in this view, has never them better than it is at the present.

The reports all speak of silent, steady and sure progress. Notwithstanding the war, and the excitement necessarily incident
thereto, the churches, generally, are well attended; the attention
to the word preached is marked and solemn; and not unfrequently
in it found that individuals are willing to act now in regard to the
great matter of salvation, who were utterly incorrigible in times
of peace and prosperity. A growing attachment to the church on
the part of her membership, is encouragingly spoken of in most of
the reports. As the light of the gospel is poured upon the Lamb's
Bride, her beauties are made to appear more and more, and her
attractive power, as the living, loving mother of us all, is felt more
deeply. Here are provisions when famine is abroad. Here is
leace when war is in the land. Here are hopes and comforts when
lespair and sorrow crowd upon the soul. Here are the means of
prace, and here starts the hope of glory.

The benevulences of the church, though somewhat dimb during the past year, have yet continued to flow into the res treasuries. We have not, as yet, been compelled to withdre of our missionaries now in the field. Many of them, he are greatly in need of aid which the Missionary Board finds possible to render. With anxious hearts we inquire, He shall this cry for help be unheeded? God, in the lessons terrible Providence around us, is beginning to teach the the best objects on which to expend her wealth,-if not 1 reign of peace and happiness, then for that of war, deva and wretchedness. In the view of our benevolences, it m confessed that we have never been, and are not now, by any t what we should be; nor should any seek to rest, with a goe science, until the last effort is made to elevate the church, inrespect, to the high position to which her wealth and dignity other views, both call and entitle her.

The spiritual training of the young, by means of the Catecha class and the Sunday-school, has gone forward with usual se and success. Increasing confidence seems to be manifested the ministers and members, both in this educational type of ligion, and in the means thus employed, so far as they read cultivate and confirm it. It is felt, however, pretty generally, in regard to the order of the Sunday-school internally, and its lation to the church, several very material improvements might made, which would greatly increase its efficiency in the way giving greater reliability and permanency to its influence and sults. This subject has already been recommended to the cart consideration of the General Synod; and it is hoped that a gree increased power for good in the case of the Sunday-school; date from that meeting.

It is an occasion of special gratitude to God that the College Lancaster, and the School of the Prophets at Mercersburg, been during the year, and are now, notwithstanding the distract troubles of the country, in a highly prosperous condition. July the College graduated the largest class that has ever a forth from the institution since its location in Lancaster city; what is more cheering still to the church, is the fact that oneof the young men of this class have in view the gospel minis is a fact also that the Seminary has been more numerously ataded during the past year than at any previous period.

As a church, therefore, though in the midst of great civil and litical commotion, we have much that should inspire, not only yout feelings of gratitude to God, but also hope and confidence relation to the future, and enkindle at the same time new zeal the Master's work. All things conspire to make us humble and mest—to impress upon us the great importance of our mission, braids of the cross, and to induce us to be faithful, in season dout of season, to the precious trust which has been committed our hands.

And now, Fathers and Brethren, we are about to launch our lats once more upon the greatsea of divine and human activities. In meeting has been pleasant—let the parting not be sad. Peraps the night has never been as dark before, nor the ocean as exply stirred and restless. We know not what tempests may tak upon us, or how we shall be able to weather the storm. But ding in the vessel, with the faith of our heart fixed on Him he said to the waves of Galilee—"Peace, be still," we may have a consciousness of knowing that all will be well in the end. To see God of our fathers we here again consecrate ourselves in body, all and spirit, praying that He will make us, Ministers and Elemants, abundantly instrumental in the promotion of His glory and setablishment of His kingdom in the world. It is proper, I presume, to remind Synod, that the time of Mr. Brewer, as a member of the Board of Trustees, expires with the present year; and if it is desired to retain his services as Treasurer, it will be necessary for Synod, at its present meeting, to reelect him as Trustee; since, by the Constitution of the College, the Treasurer can be elected only from among the members of the Board.

Any monies that may be ready at Synod to be paid over for the College, will be taken in charge by Professors Kieffer and Rust.

### 3. Report of the Committee on Heidelberg College.

From the papers given into the hands of the committee, the Bellege, with its appurtenances, are found in good condition. Early in the past Synodical year the Board of Trustees elected the Rev. 4. W. Aughinbaugh to the Presidency of the College with great transmity; and it has since learned that he has accepted of the Position thus tendered him; so that ere long the college will have a full corps of teachers, by which the prosperity of the institution will be the better insured. The report also desires Synod to urge all who have given their obligations by note or otherwise, to come to its help promptly, since its expenses will necessarily be greater than heretofore; and also to urge a greater interest in behalf of the College by efforts to increase the number of its students.

The number of graduates since its organisation is 36. Of these, 19 are in the ministry, 9 practising law, and 2 practising medicine.

The number of students in attendance last year was 70.

The Agent of Heidelberg College reports two thousand two handred dollars raised during the year for the endowment of the

College. The reason why the Agent secured this comparative small amount, is owing to the fact that during the greater part, the year his labors were confined to the Eastern portion of church, engaged in behalf of the College and Seminary located the Synod of North America.

The prospects of the mission seem encouraging, as an opening now seems to present itself for the oganization of a congregation in the town of Shelbyville, which if successful, as we believe it will be, if properly managed, will contribute greatly to its speedy establishment. To aid in the accomplishment of this desirable object, the Board has concluded to send one of its members to this point as soon as possible, to give all the encouragement in its power to this important movement.

### NEW MISSIONS-MARSHALL COUNTY, INDIANA.

This field has long since been imploring the Board to send them a man to labor among them. Lying as it is, remote from any other pastoral charge, it suffered for the want of more pastoral labor. In view of this, and the urgent entreaties of our destitute brethren in this field, the Rev. G. A. Fickes was commissioned to labor here with an appropriation of \$100 the first of last January. The mission is composed of three organized congregations and one preaching point, which it is hoped with proper cultivation and attention, will become self-supporting in a few years.

### CEDARVILLE, ILLINOIS.

After repeated failures to get a minister for this field which has been vacant for some time, the Board commissioned the Rev. H. K. Baines, at the urgent request of the mission, on the first day of January 1864, with an appropriation of \$150. The field was necessarily scattered, having been without a minister for some time, and will require a few months labor before every thing can be made to assume its regular form. Hence the missionary cannot at this early date give a full report of its numerical strength and future prosperity.

### UPPER SANDUSKY, OHIO.

From statements made to the Board in reference to the encouraging prospects of our church in and around Upper Sandusky, Ohio, the Rev. J. Klingler was commissioned to this field the first of last April, with an appropriation of \$150. As there seemed to be an urgent desire on the part of a number of prominent citzens for us to occupy this field, the Board entertains the hope that it will soon become self-supporting.

### DEFIANCE, OHIO.

An urgent request having been made to the Board, with the assurance that help would be needed only for a comparatively short

Past experience proves that the greatest difficulties in the way of our missionary operati pecially in large cities, is the want of a fund from which h be obtained by weak points in the erection of churches, until terial may be gathered together. A few hundred or a th dollars loaned to such points for a few years at a time whe most need assistance free of interest, would be of incalculable efit. It is to be hoped therefore, that the church will soon to the importance of this subject, and that those who are with an abundance of this world's goods, will contribute land create a church extension fund, as has been done by other of who have enagaged largely in the missionary work.

### GENERAL REMARKS.

Its weekly issue the Board now submits to the wisdom of the Synod.

The Committee on Publication have had the subject of the weekly issue of the Western Missionary under serious consideration. The wish that has long been expressed for a weekly issue, has become so general, that to delay action on this subject, would result injuriously to the enterprise. The receipts and expenditures for the year, will be furnished by the Treasurer in his report. The receipts have been very encouraging, and have enabled us to discharge the debts that had accumulated during the several past years. It is to be hoped, that the streams flowing into the Treasury will not diminish, or rapidly dry up with the end of the present year, but rather continue to flow on for the future with increased volume. We have applications to assist additional worthy and pious young men, and considering the actual wants of our Synod, it would be a pity if we were compelled

to refuse assistance in any case.

Properly considered, the work of Beneficiary education may be regarded as the most important interest of the church at the present day. It is the centre from which the other interests and movements of the church derive their vitality and power. Of what valne were the Seminary, or the College, or the Missionary Board, if it were not that by means of the Education Society, the church is enabled to furnish the men to educate for the missionary and pastoral work. We must not forget that three-fourths at least of all that enter the ministry in our church, are such as are assisted in whole, or in part, by this, or some similar society. The Board has observed, with great regret, that some brethren who have obtained their education through its assistance, fail to interest themselves in the cause after they enter the ministry, either in obtaining pecuniary contributions to its support, or repaying their loans when able, or seeking out pious young men for the ministry. This If every one who has in this manner been asshould not be so. sisted, would make it a sacred duty, to aid the work, in every possible way, realously and continuously, the operations of the Synod's Board could soon be doubled, or even quadrupled.

# STATE OF RELIGION.

Report on the State of Religion within the Bounds of the Eastern Synod for the year 1863.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Morals, within the bounds of the Eastern Synod, respectfully beg leave to submit the

following report:

Through the great goodness of God, our Heavenly Father, have been permitted to assemble ourselves together once more Synod, to review the labors of the past year, to point out the dences of the Divine Presence in our churches, humbly to come our sins and shortcomings, and devoutly to thank God that we still permitted to labor as co-workers with Christ, in building

his kingdom on earth.

In all the reports on the state of religion, as they have come to us from the different Classes, reference is made to two facts. War and the Jubileum of the Catechism. These are represent as having exerted an important influence on the churches and cause of religion generally among us. They, no doubt, have h important factors concerned in modifying the general progress the Church, and as such, must be regarded as permanent point of view, from which we may make a survey of our history daris

the past year.

Owing to the civil war, we have no delegates among us from the Classes of Virginia and North Carolina, and no communication any kind to inform us of the condition of our congregations in those States. Sufficient is known to fill us with sorrow, in view of the moral blight which has fallen upon them, and of the severe trials through which they have passed. It is hoped that they may yet emerge from the deep tribulation into which they have falled, and again become flourishing branches of our Reformed Zion. I is gratifying to know, that at least some of our brethren south if the Potomac, sigh over their separation from us, and, in solitude. mourn that they are not enabled to unite with us in the festivities of the present year.

The remainder of our churches, which are farther removed from the seat of war, have been permitted, with slight exceptions, to continue their appointed work, but, in the nature of the case, they have suffered more or less in consequence of the commotions, which have been convulsing our land from one end to the other, The Classes, generally, complain of the evil, which the churches have suffered in this way. In times like these, when the very foundations on which we stand are shaking and threatening give way, many of the restraints which men are accustomed to respect in ordinary times, are too weak to keep them within the bounds of ordinary morality. Thus one of the Classes says that ofanity, intemperance, Sabbath desecration, and kindred sins, ive been on the increase in the community, and, in general, creed an unfriendly atmosphere on the outside of the Church, hich has seriously interfered with the progress of the gospel. len now swear and get drunk, who, at other times, would have een ashamed to have been found guilty of such vulgar sins. This ostile atmosphere of the world, has, moreover, in many cases, enered the Church, and polluted the Sanctuary. The general exitement in the public mind, the intense interest aroused by the tirring events of the day, as well as the evil passions elicited by olitical or partisan rancor, have kept many from the house of od and carried them along in the whirlwind excitement of the our. A morbid taste, a never satisfied thirst for sensational news as been formed, and the peaceful, lovely ways of Zion have lost heir attractions. The newspaper and the bulletin-board have in nany cases, supplied a more acceptable aliment for the mind and he heart, than the ministrations of God's house. Political feelng has been allowed to divide and lacerate the body of Christ, and, as we are told, some of our ministerial brethren have been everely tried in their efforts to preserve the unity of the spirit in he bonds of peace.

But however great the temptations may be, such and other evils that might be mentioned, ought not to be the results of the fearful struggle through which the nation is at present passing. As Christians, we are bound to regard the war as a judgment sent upon us for our sins, as a means of our purification, and as a way for the future progress of the Redeemer's kingdom on earth. "When these things begin to come to pass," says Christ, "then look up, and lift up your heads: for your redemption draweth nigh."

The troubles and calamities, that have come upon us as a nation, should be the means of humbling all true Christians in the dust, in view of our sins as a people; should draw them nearer to Christ, and more frequently to the sanctuary, as the most blessed retreat from the passing storm, and should call into active exercise all the graces of the Christian life. This is a time when the most expansive charity should abound, when the lamp of faith should be bright and burning, and when the churches of the land should be more intensely engaged in their Master's work than in ordinary times. Whilst we should discharge our duties faithfully as citizens, as Christians we ought to be especially engaged in prayers and supplications to Almighty God, that he may remove the scourge from us, and open up the way for the return of peace and harmony to our distracted land. There could be no better occason for the exercise of faith and prayer, and we know that there is so agency which can accomplish more for the suppression of the mesent rebellion and the restoration of civil order, than ardent, mited, persevering prayer in the churches. If the night be dark. the storm high, and fearful waves dash upon our vessel, we are not to suppose that Christ has forsaken His Church, or that it is

destined to be swallowed up by the yawning billows; on the contrary, we are rather to believe that He is nearer to us than at other times, and that with a sleepless eye, He stands ready to interpose in our behalf, and, with a word, to calm the troubled elements of discord and confusion. But He will not interpose in our behalf, except as we are duly exercised by our afflictions, and so feel the pressure of the occasion, as to be compelled to exclaim in our anguish, Lord! save us or we perish! This is a Christian land, and we have become a mighty nation, because God has assigned to us a great work to perform, and not that we should simply realize certain favorite political theories of our own. Hence as Christians, not as politicians or statesmen, or political thesrizers, we cannot fail to feel and believe, that the Church has at this crisis a most responsible work to perform, greater than that d the army or navy, to stand in the breach, and by humble supplications and prayers to save us from anarchy, and restore to us the civil order. How far our own denomination has been exercised in this way, and how far we as a people have brought forth the peaceable fruits of righteousness in consequence of our afflictions, is difficult for us to say. From the general progress of the Church which is noticeable in all the reports from the Classes, we may hope that our public calamities have in many cases been over ruled for good; that if some have relaxed in their seal for Chris and His cause, others have been drawn nearer to him, and sought a higher standard of faith and devotion. In any view of the case, there is no doubt good reason that the Church should send out from this our annual assembly an urgent entreaty to our brethren everywhere to watch and pray.

If the duties of loyalty and patriotism have called forth the highest exemplifications of heroism, of courage, of zeal and love for the principles which lie at the foundation of our government, why should there not be in the churches some corresponding manifestations of a noble and generous devotion to the cause of Christ, which in these times suffer with the civil order?

The other fact, to which we have adverted as having made adecided impression on the Church during the year, is the Ter contenary Oelebration of the formation and adoption of the Catechism. It is something remarkable, that we have been brought providentially to celebrate this interesting event in the midst of war and trials of every kind. It might appear at first view as if the year set apart for this purpose was unsuitable and uncongenial. So it was supposed by many when it commenced, but our fears have not been realized. Whilst in the affairs of the nation God has hidden himself behind a frowning Providence, in the Church He has lifted upon us the light of His countenance, and caused us to rejoice in His favor and smiles. All the Classes have united in this joyous festival, and they all speak of its happy effect upon our people. Only one Classis complains of a want of interest in it.

This is doubtless owing to a misunderstanding of its nature and

We are not using the language of exaggeration, we think, when we say, that no event has occurred in our Reformed Zion since it was planted in this western world, that has exerted such s wide reaching influence. Never before have our people united so generally or so cheerfully in the same good work. The full fruits of this festive year will no doubt be seen after many days. Thus far, we may hope, we have only gathered the first fruits and devoted them to the Lord. The occasion has served to excite a lively interest in our own branch of the Reformed family. It has made us familiar with its origin and history, with its doctrines and customs, with its heroes and saints, and especially with the spirit and genius of our venerated Catechism. This has had the effect to a greater or less extent to create a proper Church-consciousness, and made us to feel that we have a distinct work and mission to accomplish among other Churches of the land. In tracing back our history to the Reformation period, we have also learned how closely we are related to other Churches of the Reformation, and we have been drawn closer to our sister Churches in the same great Protestant family. The celebration has thus her been kept remarkably free from a sectarian character or bias, and car brethren of other denominations have witnessed this whole movement with interest and bidden us God-speed: so that love for the Church of Christ generally is, we hope, promoted, rather than retarded by this revival of denominational love and attachment. The truth is, its direct tendency is towards a greater unity among the divided members of the Christian family, for which we should continually strive and pray.

It is with pleasure we advert to the part which the children of the Church, especially in our Sabbath-schools, are permitted to take in this solemnity. No doubt the impressions made on their yeuthful minds during the present year will be as good seed cast into good soil, which will spring up and bring forth fruit abund-

antly in years to come.

The occasion, as is well known, has been employed for the purpose of calling into active exercise the liberality and benevolence of the Church. An opportunity is extended to our entire membership, old and young, to present a free-will offering to the Lord. A fair beginning has already been made in this way. The liberal contributions which have been made towards the permanent endowment of Franklin and Marshall College by some of the more wealthy members of the church, has taken many of us by surprise. When we remember how difficult it was, not many years ago to induce our people to devise liberal things for our Literary and Teological Institutions, it is truly refreshing to hear of the prompt responses which have been made to the appeals of the College Agent. We thank God and take courage by the way. The other institutions of the Church are also receiving attenion, but it

is to be feared that thus far they have not been remembered with such enlarged and liberal views as they deserve. The College's secondary in importance to the Seminary, and was established in order that the latter might render a more efficient service. It is hoped, therefore, that the Seminary, as well as other general interests, may become the object of similar munificent benefactions. In order that this may be the happy result, much labor must be performed, so as to call forth the charity of every part of the Church, before the close of this year of thanksgiving and rejoicing. Our wealthier members have shown a noble example of benevolence, the little children are bringing up their offerings to the Lord; now let all others follow in their footsteps, so that rich and poor, young and old, may be united in the same good work.

Thus whilst the dark cloud of civil war has been hanging over our beloved land, and our cars have become familiar with reports from the battle-field, the lamps in the sanctuary have been trimmed and burning, and the Great Head of the Church has been passing by diffusing throughout our borders the odor of his presence, and calling us as a denomination to rest safely under his protection. Truly He giveth us signs in the night. Beautiful for situation, the joy of the whole earth, is Mount Zion, the city of the great king. God is known in her palaces for a refuge. Mark well her bulwarks, consider her palaces, that ye may tell it to the generation following. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not

all His benefits.

Apart from the leading facts in our history during the year, which have been considered, the general progress of the Church has been very much of the same kind as it has been for a number of years past. There has been no decline, but rather an onward The Classes report an increased interest in the means movement. of grace, especially as it regards the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. The importance of these sealing ordinances has been generally urged by our pastors and with good effect. Infant Baptism, it seems, is more generally attended to than formerly, and has been a source of comfort to parents, and of spiritual advantage to their children. The religious education of the rising generation, which flows as a necessary consequence from the covenant relation established in baptism, has been faithfully urged by our pastors; still complaints are made of the want of proper religious training in the family, so that many of our youth are not sufficiently prepared to receive the full benefit of catechetical instruction from the pastors. It is, therefore, to be feared, that however correct our views may be in regard to the religious training of our children, the duty itself is not by any means as generally discharged as it should be. This is a vital point to our existence and prosperity as a denomination, and it doubtless calls for increased attention on the part of pastors and congregations.

The additions to the churches by confirmation has been encouraging, showing that whilst the turbulence of the times and other

mes have diminished our membership, or caused the love of the togrow cold, others in the youth and vigor of life have come bract to take their places. The progress, however, of which we hat, is not so general as it should be. There are still portions the Church, in which the true light shines but dimly, and has the evidences of a new life are only beginning to manifest masters. There are also many in all parts of the Church, who to the form of godliness, but are without its power. Many have tyst learned to answer, experimentally and practically, the first material of the Catechiam, that they belong to the Lord Jesus his, in body and soul, in life and death. If the past year has been one of growth and prosperity in the list of trials and tribulations in Church and State, it has been a trof suffering as well as of rejoicing. Many of our youth, and

Many of our families the clothed in the habilaments of mourning. REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE LITURGY.

The special Committee appointed on the subject of the Liturgy, would report:

That we, as far as time and circumstance permitted, have extended the Report of the Liturgical Committee placed in our lands, and are pleased to bear testimony to the diligence with which they have prosecuted the work entrusted to them. From the examination we have been able to give the Report, which embedies forms for the regular Lord's Day service, baptism, the lard's Supper. &c., we are favorably impressed; and believe that they, after a little correction in phraseology and arrangement, will the with general approbation, and if introduced in the church, will secure a greater uniformity in our worship than exists at the bresent time.

Being thus favorably impressed with the Report of the Combittee, as far as they have gone with the work, and having still back matter in their hands, which has not yet been put in proper transby them, we would recommend to the Synod to re-commit the Phole subject to the Committee, requesting them to go forward that the work as rapidly as possible, and submit a report to Synod turing its next annual meeting.

Moreover, in order that the church, as a whole, may be able to term a proper judgment of the work, and that the Synod may be ventually able to arrive at a correct conclusion in the case as to be Liturgy to be adopted, we would suggest that our ministers be termitted to introduce the forms embodied in the report in our terming, and that the printed report of the Committee be referred to the several Classes for examination, and that they be required a report a minute thereon to the next Synod.

And, in order to place one copy of the printed report in the hands of each minister and congregation within the bounds of our Synod, we would recommend that 600 copies be apportioned among the Classes. And, as the Liturgical Committee, in the prosecution of their work, have incurred \$186.50 expenses, we would also recommend that of this amount \$144 (being the cost of printing 600 copies of the report) be apportioned among the Classes, and that the balance of \$42.50 be paid out of the Synodizal Treasury.

Your Committee of the Theological Seminary would respectfully present the following Report:

The papers placed in our hands are the report of the Board of

Trustees, the Board of Visitors, and Treasurer.

From these papers we learn that the finances of the Seminary and in a prosperous condition. The salaries of our Professors been regularly met during the year, leaving a balance in the Treasury of \$71 80.

We have examined the Treasurer's Report and find it corrected.

The Committee takes great pleasure in noticing the beneveled contribution of Five Hundred Dollars, to the Library of the Serinary, by Wm. E. Schmerts, Esq., of Pittsburg, Pa. It is to fendly hoped that this example may find many imitatore during the coming year.

From the Report of the Board of Visitors, we learn the fact that the Seminary is almost destitute of students, the number being so very small that the time and toil of the Professors, and the expenditure of the funds of the church, in this direction, are to a great extent in vain.

But 1,464 were again lost by deaths, removals, and excemmunications, thus leaving as an actual increase to the church, only 885. If what we have already said be true, then may not the small increase to the church have resulted, at least in part, from a want of faithfulness on our part to declare, in these

times of trouble and trial, the whole truth of the gospel.

Three thousand one hundred and forty-eight children were baptised, and only 1,409 persons were confirmed, thus leaving a balance of 1,739. Deducting again the difference between the number new beptized and the number baptized from fourteen to eighteen years since, and the number is still quite too large for a supposition that all these died in childhood But, to make the calculation still more accurate, we must again add to this, the number of those who were received by letter, and from families outside of the charch, who were never before baptized From this it is to be fored that there are very many baptized children of the church selling their precious birthright for even less than a mess of pettage, while at the same time they themselves are feasting upon This may result from a want of faithfulness on the husks of sin the part of parents or of pastors, or of both Whilst we rejoice that increased attention is being paid to catechetical instruction, jet it is to be feared—awfully feared—that very many of our precons youth are growing up in unbelief and sin, without ever laving impressed upon their minds and hearts the fact that they we in the church—that, in view of their baptism, they are the property of the church, and subject to its care and discipline, and that they have upon themselves not only the sign of God's cove sant, but also the seal of his promise and grace

The reports speak of the Sabbath-schools of the church as being full of promise and hope. But with all this apparent confidence, one can hardly fail to mark the misgivings of many of her more devout and intelligent members. There is no complaint that Sabbath-schools are wanting in interest, or that the children refuse to attend them; but the complaint is rather that with all this, too many regard the Sabbath-school as above the catechetical class, and equal to the church, and the religion there taught sufficient to satisfy all the wants of the soul. As a remedy for this, we would suggest that the church should supply the Sabbath-school with a literature based upon the Lord's Prayer as a form of prayer, the Apostle's creed as a rule of faith, and the ten commandments

as a rule of life

We regret very much to find in the reports so little reference to family worship, and to weekly meetings of prayer and praise. Religion, to be sound and vigorous, can not do without the sanctifying influence of these particular forms of worship.

We are glad to learn that the spirit of alms-giving and of Christian charity is being still more and more cultivated; yet the wants of the church with respect to this subject are still in advance of her supplies. To remedy this, we want a higher standard of Christianity, one which will lead us to feel that in view of the consecration of ourselves to God, through the church, the things which we possess are no longer ours, but his. We need to recognize more fully that great principle so prominently presented by the Apostle James, "Faith without works is dead."

With all these apparent defects in the development of Christianity in our church, the tardiness with which many of our members come up to the true standard of Christian piety, and the small increase of church membership, yet we have great reason to lift up our heads and rejoice that in the midst of the severe afflictions of our Government, that part of the church represented by us has not only, under Christ, its Great Head, maintained its original piety and strength, but is even now stronger and more active than it was at any previous period of its history. The Lord prepare her for a faithful discharge of her part in the great and glorious work that now seems to be before the church of this country

We can not close our Report without referring to the departure of one of our number The Rev. G. A. Fickes, of the St Joseph Classis, having finished his work in the church militant, was called into the enjoyment of the church triumphant. May the mante of his faithfulness fall upon us.

Rettig received an accepted a call here, and entered upon his labors on the first a November. Since then be has received 24 members into fall communion, and baptised 16 children. The mission has been in existence eight years, with a small appropriation from the beginning. Its present appropriation is \$75, most, if not all of which the mission itself proposes to collect. It has now a membership of 200 persons, all of whom were in regular attendance at the becommunion. Quite a number in the catechistical class will see be ready for confirmation. The missionary writes that his past poots are truly encouraging; that if his congregation continues increase they will soon be under the necessity of enlarging their house. His salary, including missionary aid, is \$600. This is quite too small to support a family in the city of Dayton.

## LANCASTER, OHIO.

This field was also made vacant, for a short time, by the rest nation of Rev. M. H. Hockman. By the action of Lancia Classis, the Rev. J. I. Swander became his successor, with an propriation from the Board, of \$150.

The missionary writes that he is not too sanguine of successibility the Board feels assured that the choice of a pastor for a place, was a happy one; and that, through his earnest efforts are the hearty co-operation of his people, this church, so long is a state of comparative weakness, will yet arise and shine among the churches of that city.

### COVINGTON, KY.

The Rev. R. Sweedes has just closed his third year in this mission. He began here with 16 members. The whole now numbers
90; 33 of whom were received within the last year. Baptismess

in a most flourishing condition, with an excellent corps of youngs

### LICKING COUNTY MISSION.

The Rev. J. McConnell still continues in this field, under the appointment of Lancaster Classis. Having received no official apport of this year, we are unable to sketch its condition and prospers. No appropriation, however, was asked for, hence none was given.

# LAPAYETTE, OHIO.

The success of the Lafayette mission has been greatly retarded, by a series of troubles through which it has just passed. But new that a new morning has dawned upon it, we trust that it will become ready for every good word and work. It has four organized congregations, some of which however, are very weak. The thele membership numbers about 100. Five were added in the year, by confirmation, and 16 were baptized. Collected for missions, \$7 84. The salary paid by the mission is only \$300; hence the Board has lately renewed the commission to the Rev. Seriah May, with an appropriation of \$100. The mission has three church edifices. The missionary thinks the prospects for building up the Church of Christ in this section of the country are much better now than they were; and that with the aid of a parsonage, which they already have, the charge will soon become self-supporting.

### SHELBYVILLE, ILL.

This mission was organized about five years since. The Rev. W. W. James has lately been re-commissioned to it, with an apprepriation of \$150. When he entered this field, one year since, it had but two organized congregations, and these were both in the country. The Board has frequently urged upon the former missionary the necessity of organizing in the growing town of Shelbyville; but all to no purpose. Finally, the appropriation was conditioned upon an attempt, at least, at such an organization. We knew the time had come for such a work to be done; and had car missionary proved as true to his own, as he did to another denomination, we might long since have had a church unsurpassed by any other in the place.

Bro. James, however, is trying to redeem that which was lost. He has succeeded in organizing a congregation in town. Lately they dedicated a very neat and comfortable church edifice, which has just been completed. The mission is completed of 33 meabers, 13 of whom were added within the year. It pays a salary of \$280. It was visited by the President of the Board last fail, and by another of its members this spring, who assisted at the dedition of their church. Both of these report that they were much pleased with the mission, that its prospects are encouraging, and that it is a field which promises to be of much importance to enchurch.

# MARSHALL COUNTY, IND.

The Rev. G. A. Fickes, lately deceased, resigned this charge the first of last October. Since then its members have failed correspond with the Board; hence, but little or nothing is known of its condition.

# CEDARVILLE, ILL.

At the earnest request of the missionary at Cedarville, President of the Board, at the close of last November, paid if mission a visit. The missionary had become somewhat discor aged, because, as he urged, of the limited territory to which t mission was confined, as well as on account of the necessity increasing his salary. We, however, found the mission in a go condition. Confidence had been restored to our church in the community. Prospects for its future growth were bright, and the people seemed to delight in doing honor to their new pastor. succeeded, without any difficulty, in getting the consistories if promise to raise, in addition to the \$100 appropriated by the Board, quite a sufficient amount of salary to justify him in remaining with them. But, oh! the depravity of our human nature and the deceitfulness of the heart. Their brightest hopes and fondest anticipations were all suddenly struck down, by the far and deposition from the gospel ministry of their under shepherd, H. K. Baines. In this the mission has received a shock, from which, it is feared, it will not soon recover. It has two organized congregations and one preaching point. The people are kind hearted and devoted to the church. They deserve a good missionary, but the Board has, as yet, failed to secure one for them, They are, however, supplied for the time by an arrangement of Illinois Classis.

### UPPER SANDUSKY.

The first year of the Rev. J. Klingler, missionary in this field, ended April 1st. Since then the appropriation has been reduced from \$150 to \$100. This reduction seemed to disturb the mind of the missionary, to such an extent, as to lead him to think seriously, of resigning. His whole support he reports at \$375. Living, however, as he does, upon his farm, the Board failed to see it way clear to make a larger appropriation. He reports the field in

## NEW MISSIONS.

# THREE RIVERS, MICHIGAN.

The Bev. H. E. C. Shutte was commissioned to this field, with appropriation of \$100, dated May 1st, 1864. At the close of year he resigned; but not until he had secured a supply for mission people. The field is promising.

### GREENVILLE, OHIO.

The Board at length turned its attention toward this long negated place, and after several months of labor succeeded in organing a charge, and in securing for it the service of the Rev. W. Caughey, with an appropriation of \$250. The commission is be October 1st, 1864. With the congregation organized in the the of Greenville are connected two old organizations, lying a

short distance in the country. These afford sufficient phen to compy the whole time of a minister; but the New Madison charge becoming vacant, it was thought advisable to permit our missionary to supply them for the time. The town congregation was expanized with 11 members. Since then 6 more have been added to this church, 17 to Beamsville, and 12 to Creager's congregation, thus making a membership in the mission of 111 persons. But tized since then, 18 infants. The missionary reports that he has two large catechetical classes. Salary from the mission, besides the amount received as supply, \$300. Its prospects for future growth are truly encouraging. No missionary money collected has yet been reported.

### FINDLAY MISSION.

The Board finally succeeded in getting a missionary again for this field. The Rev. J. G. Ruhl was commissioned, with an appropriation of \$80, dated January 1st, 1865. Since then success has been all that could have been anticipated. Number members, 139; received into full communion, 3; and baptised children. The mission pays a salary of \$200.

### KENTON.

This mission has again been re-occupied. The Rev. G. Kuhlan received and accepted a call, with an appropriation, from Board, of \$100. This Brother has labored under many discussing ments, and his prospects, even now, are not the most flattering. "Some unwilling to hear the truth," have refused to subscribe this salary for the second year. The mission is in such a condition that he has not yet been able to give a full statistical report. In pays him a salary of \$171.

# LANESVILLE, IND .- WITHOUT A PASTOR.

This promising field was vacated by the resignation of the Bev. O. T. Martain, which resignation took effect at the end of November last. Not being in correspondence with any of its members, we know but little of its condition since then.

## CIRCLEVILLE, OHIO.

This long neglected field of work, and of usefulness, at length received the attention and action of Lancaster Classis. This bely having explored and organized the mission, appointed as its missionary the Rev. H. Williard, and petitioned the Board for an appropriation of \$250. The petition was granted, and a commission issued, dated April 1st, 1865.

### GENERAL REMARKS.

From the above it will be seen that the Board has hed underleave twenty missionaries, with an appropriation of ever state

This is an advance over any previous year of its history. And yet, there are many other fields, all over/our land, which, at this very hour, are calling loudly for help. Had we the means, we would have no difficulty in planting our church in almost every city and county town in the West—especially among the German population. One, in traveling through our country, cannot but e struck with the neglect which our church has suffered itself to fall into with respect to its scattered members. We often find in cities and places in the country, where we have no church, congregations of other churches, composed largely of persons either con-armed or baptised in the Reformed Church. Many of these will never come back to us again; but there are hundreds of others who are continually changing their homes, yet would gladly remain in their own church could they but find one in which to worship. Does it then not become us, Dear Brethren, to bestir ourselves and redeem the time we have lost, and the many precious epportunities of doing good which we have so long neglected? Repecially now should we gird on the whole armor for the interesting work before us. Our beloved country has just passed through a baptism of blood. For four long years it has been called to grapple with a rebellion as formidable as it was iniquitions. For magnitude and fierceness history furnishes no parallel in any country. The heart of every Christian patriot, as well as the minds of all true lovers of their country, was turned toward this terrible struggle, with the most intense interest. During all this time—and how could it have been otherwise—we have lived in a state of constant excitement; no matter whether we were at home or in the field, it was all the same. But the God of battles, who reigns not only in heaven, but who also controls and governs the nations of the earth, signally blessed his own instrumentalities, and peace has again taken the place of war. For this let w praise and magnify the Lord. Our thousands and hundreds of thousands of soldiers are already coming back from the field. They will soon mingle with us again in the scenes of home and home life. But can the patriotic mind and heart of this great nation of ours at once settle down again into the quietude of common life? No, never! When war ceases to become the field of action, of thought and of excitement, whither will it turn for relief? but to the religion of Jesus Christ and to His Church, whose cause is aggressive, whose whole life is a warfare, and whose band ner is the cross.

The Lord stir up "the camp of His Saints," that they may be lead at once to send forth their recruiting officers and fill up the army, so that the triumphs of the Redeemer's kingdom may speedily be complete. In this revival of religion, which the church is now anticipating, and for which we most earnestly pray, our missionaries will have an important part to perform. Let us send them forth fully equipped for their work.

Emigration from the North, too, which is already beginning to pour itself down into the South, will open up to our church a new field of usefulness. Having no churches in many of the Southern States, we ought to be able to send our missionaries at once with

those who emigrate.

If we have at all properly interpreted the signs of the times, we will need next year at least \$3,000. We can find young men who have just completed their academical course, as well as tried men of strength, who are willing to go anywhere, at the call of the church; but this call, to be regarded as earnest and real, must be accompanied with a proper support. Will the Lord open our eyes to behold the magnitude of the work which he has committed to our hands?

### DELINQUENT CLASSES.

We cannot close our Report without again referring to the fact, that in the face of all the resolutions and recommendations of Synod, there are several Classes which still refuse to co-operate

with Synod's Board of Missions. They seem to regard the interests of self as paramount to the interests of the whole, thus reversing the very order of Christ's kingdom.

"The powers that be" carry with them no authority for them. They are slow to acquire wisdom from the great lesson which our country has just learned. And even now, when we so much need union of effort to accomplish the work before us, they are found spending their labor and means upon what may, with propriety, be called sectional interests. Perhaps it would be well, if the church has any jurisdiction, to exercise it toward these delinquent Classes.

## ACTION OF THE GENERAL SYNOD AT PITTSBURG.

From our experience, of the past year especially, the conclusion forces itself upon our minds, that the action of that Synod was characterized with wisdom. And we only regret that the Eastern Synod overlooked it altogether, thus preventing the Board, then elected, from going into an organization. No minister can serve a charge, attend to all the correspondence of one of the Boards, and absent himself from his people as often as his position would require him, and yet do justice to all. Our missionary work is assuming a magnitude and importance sufficiently great to claim the whole time and service of the President or Secretary of the Board. It is to be hoped that such service will soon be secured for it, as it needs only the action of the Eastern Synod to complete this arrangement.

### CHURCH EXTENSION.

No funds for this object came into our hands during the year. The small amount at the disposal of the Board is still invested in the church at Terre Haute.

# 3. Report of the Committee on Missions.

The Committee on Missions presented the following Report, which was adopted with great unanimity:

We have in our hands a full Report of the President on the different missions under the care of the Board, and of the Treasurer on the financial affairs, both of which are very satisfactory, and go to show that the Board has been diligent and conscientious in the discharge of its duties.

The amount contributed for this object during the year is, according to the Treasurer's Report, \$1,465 22, which is \$440 less than the preceding year, owing, no doubt, to the fact that the receipts of the preceding year were unusually augmented by the tercententry festivities. The number of missions, however, has been intreased from fifteen to twenty. As a natural consequence, there is

but a small balance (\$124) in the hands of the Treasurer, so that becomes our duty earnestly to call upon our people for an increase of their contributions.

The Board still complains, as it has been doing for a number of years, that a number of Classes continue their own missionar operations independent of, and unconnected with, the Synodics Board. We can not suppose that there is a real difference of opinion on the subject. All that is wanting seems to be to adopt plan harmonizing the views of the brethren on this subject. The wishes of Synod need only to be understood to be appreciated All Synod wishes is to have advisory committees substituted for the Classical Boards, with this understanding, that the Genera Board will make no missionary appointments or changes in the several Classes without the advice of such Classical Committee We would, therefore recommend the following action:

Resolved, That the Classes of Iowa Westmoreland, Sheboygan, and Sandusky are requested not to make any new missionary appointments within their bounds, but to refer all such applications to the General Board, with a full statement of their views and desires respecting them. And, furthermore, that said Classes be requested annually to report to the General Board those missions that they desire to retain under their care, with the receipts and expenditures connected with the same.

Regarding the formation of a General Board of Missions, the sentiment in favor of such a Board, controlling the missionary operations of the whole church, East and West, is general. Nothing, therefore, remains for us but to recommend the following action:

Resolved, That our delegate to the Eastern Synod be instructed to inform that body that we had last year resolved to dissolve our Board of Missions in favor of the General Board, provided the Eastern Board takes the same course, and to request them, as soon as possible, to complete this arrangement.

# Report of the Board of Fublication.

The Board of Publication in making its Annual Report, respectly states, that, soon after its organization, there was a full meetof its members, to consider the important enterprise committed is supervision, by the Synod at Canton, Ohio, to wit: The Mication of the Western Assionary as a weekly after the 1st of mary, 1865, at one dollar per annum.

At that meeting it was found to be altogether unadvisable to inh the Missionary according to the letter of the Synod's inpotions. At one dollar a year, owing to the high prices of , composition, and press-work, it could not be issued of a size

Det the expectation of the church.

Under a solemn view of its duty in the premises, which, whatthe difficulties surrounding the movement, demanded a forstep, the Board resolved to advance the subscription price to odollar and a half, and issued an Explanatory Circular and Appeal, inviting both ministers and laymen to interest themselvin running up the subscription list to 3,000. This appeal with some very favorable responses. And, inasmuch as it appealed to be the only feasible alternative, an arrangement was made December, with the present Editor and Publisher of the Missions to publish it weekly for the ensuing year, at one dollar and is cents.

Up to this time about five hundred new subscribers have be added, making the total number to the paper about 3,000. the old lists had need to be purified. One hundred names ha been dropped, and there are a hundred more of whom nothing o be expected, leaving the whole number of bona fide subscribers The cost of publishing the paper, at present price abou t2.800. is \$3,540-losses and incidental expenses about \$160-making total in round numbers of 3,800, which deducted from 2.800 st scribers at \$1 50, leaves a margin of \$400 for the labors of Three thousand bona fide subscribers would not nett h mere than \$600. These figures need no comment. One thing clear, that there should be a very considerable increase of pay subscribers, so as to render the business part of the enterprise STOCESS.

It is also manifest that the church wants the Missionary week—wants it larger and proportionately better. Its present size felt to be too small. Serving, however, to indicate what is of want, and what will be satisfactory to our people, it may help to Synod to take definite action now in regard to this very importainterest.

At \$2 00 per annum, the size of the Missionary can be increased one column in width, and in length corresponding; and with 5,000 subscribers its prosperity and usefulness can be immeasuably enhanced. The Board would recommend to Synod this is crease in size and in subscription price, believing that such activated materially assist in extending its circulation.

It thinks that something of this very desirable, and also attainable. Two thousand dollars it d a sufficient amount with which to purchase this home. It that there is a permanent fund of \$325 in its own hands, and Lancaster Classis has an Education Fund of \$350 on int both of which amounts, it thinks, (with the consent of Least Classis as to the latter) might be used for the purpose of ing the proposed home. The remaining sum of \$1,275 the thinks might be easily collected from benevolent members church. The Board suggests that the Trustees of Synocki be very suitable persons to purchase the home and hold trust for the church.

From the Transpier's Repert we learn the sad fact, that the amount contributed for Beneficiary Education during the present year, is much less than it was during the previous one. The spirit of the Ter-centenary Year has to a great extent died out, and it is to be feared that some, as to their benevolence, have even fallen below what they were before the Ter-centenary effort. Surely this is wrong; for it is the duty of each one to do what he can for the terms of Christian education. In view of what is here presented, year Committee would propose the following action:

Resolved, 1. That Synod regards it as an important duty, resting especially on the ministry, but also on the laity, to do all they possibly can to have our institutions filled with young men who

may be trained up for future usefulness in the church.

The following is the extract of the report above referred to:

DEAR BRETHREN: -At the last meeting of Synod, I requested you to give me a letter of greeting to our Reformed Brethren in Germany, which I intended personally to present to them. This request I made more from a sense of politeness than from any expectation of permanent results. For I had been lead to believe, with most of our Brethren, that we could hardly expect to form a regular connection with our Brethren in Germany, because again and again we had been assured that in reality there was no Reformed Church left in Germany, but that it had been absorbed entirely in the union established there of the Lutheran and Reformed Churches. But to my great joy and astonishment I found that these preconceived ideas are not in this general sense sustained facts. Although the union of the Lutheran and the Reformed Church has been accomplished in most places, and although other tendencies of the age have done a great deal to obliterate the disfactive features of the Reformed Church, there is still left a coniderable number of congregations that call themselves Reformed, are acknowledged as such by the Government. They number more than four hundred. It is true, that many of them are Rearmed more in name than in spirit, but I have also found large communities which cling to the symbols of their Reformed fathers with a full consciousness and with heartfelt affection. And these have received our greetings with deep interest and with the most lively sympathies.

The faith of these truly Reformed ministers and congregations has rather gained than otherwise by their being forced into the esposition against a union, which they had to reject. By these struggles their convictions have been so deepened and strengthened, that to me communion with them was a constant source of joy, and often when I heard their decided testimonies against the errors of modern theology, did the desire arise within me, that all my American Brethren could be present with me and partake in this communion. It is, after all, a privilege of incalculable value to be deeply rooted and grounded in doctrine and in discipline upon a historical foundation. And the more we grow conscious of this iving connection between our present Church and that of our s forefathers, the richer we feel ourselves over against the subjective innovations and artificialities of the modern Church, which has so frequently sold terrritory defended by our fathers' blood for ingenious speculations of human origin.

These Reformed Brethren in Germany attach special importance to the doctrine of sovereign grace. They love to confess that man does not accept of salvation by his own will, but only through the

mercy of God, according to His eternal community and that this mercy alone that preserves him in the communion of gri. In their ferms of worship they love simplicity above all this they avoid pomp and outward ornament, and they look upon the preaching of the living Word as the most important and promined feature of all religious exercises. They prefer free prayers to livingies; and it is only after severe struggles that some of the have yielded to forms of prayer forced upon them by their state Government. In their government they lay great stress on a strid discipline, and they look upon this as an essential qualification a truly Reformed Church.

When I reported to our Reformed Brethren in Germany the American Government does not interfere with the administration of Church discipline; that here we are not necessitated admit unworthy persons to the sacrament of the Lord's supper, to confirm, indiscriminately, multitudes of children; that we appreach and pray according to the dictates of our conscience, and the Holy Word of God, they would often lift up their voiced thanksgiving and praise to a merciful Lord who has granted privileges of such immeasureable value, and they would arden pray for the time to come when they would enjoy similar merciful.

They received, with special interest, the account I gave them our Presbyterian form of Government. When they underst how firmly our Churches are organized, and how by our Board Domestic Missions we are enabled to plant amongst our Gerr people congregations that do not consist of disorderly and unsai tified multitudes, but are carefully gathered into a communion, men who fear God and love his law; and when I further inform them how urgently we need more faithful fellow laborers in the missionary work, they assured me that they were both able willing to supply us with pious young Brethren, who might, us, be educated for the gospel ministry. For this purpose, and order to carry on a regular correspondence with our Church in t country, commissions have been formed at different central place. Thus the Presbytery of Elberfield, representing more than 24.6 members of the Reformed Church, have, after mature deliberation elected a Committee of the most influential men for this purpose In the principality of Lippe a similar Committee was formed, a sisting of the chief officer of the Church there, and other men high standing. The same was done in the cities of Brewen's Emden. In Mulheim on the Ruhr, Pastor Strusburg has promi to act in a similar manner; in Halle, Pastor A. Zahn; in View Prof. E. Boche. The Northern Lloyd, a mercantile company trade between Bremen and New York, have agreed to furnish their steamers transportation to all the young men, to be sent i by these commissions, at one-half of their rates.

It remains now to thank the Lord for His great mercies shows

us in this enterprise, and to take such measures, that we may, as a Church, follow up these advantageous openings in order to reap their benefits.

In regard to certain of these financial transactions, the Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That Synod ratify the sale of the aforesaid real estate.

Resolved, That Synod approves the management of the finances for the past year.

Resolved, That our thanks are due to the friends of the Seminary, who have paid their bonds and notes so timely.

#### INCREASE OF SALARY.

The Board of Trustees recommend an increase of the Professors' salaries. Both the credit of the Church and justice to "the laborer," who "is worthy of his hire," would seem to demand this forward step. The Committee, therefore, submit in this connection, the following.

Resolved, That a sufficient endowment be added to the present fund, so as to meet, by the accruing interest, an increase of salary equal to \$175 to each Professor.

#### DUTIES OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

In this report, also, the Synod is requested to define the duties and obligations of the Board of Trustees to the Seminary, whether they refer merely to the finances, or embrace also a supervision over the institution itself. The request is made in view of an interruption in the recitations of the Seminary, through the protracted illness of one of the Professors. The loss was sensibly felt by the students; but, in the effort to provide a temporary Professor, there was no authority found to do so outside of the Synod. Hence, this Board wishes to have its duties defined, and if the legitimate Body to provide for any such-like contingency which may hereafter occur, that it be empowered to act accordingly. The Committee would, therefore, suggest the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees is judicial and executive, not only in financial matters, but also, in connection with the Faculty of the Seminary, in providing for necessary teaching force, and such other wants of the Seminary as may providentially arise between the intervals of Synod.

Resolved, farther, That the interests of the Seminary require the full services of the German Professor, as soon as the arrangements can be made therefor, and that the attention of the Board of Trustees be called to this matter.

#### INCREASE OF ENDOWMENT.

From the report of this Board, we learn, also, the great need of increasing the Endowment Fund, and of urging upon pastors promptness in taking collections for the immediate use of the Seminary.

The present endowment pays little more than the 2d and 4th quarters' salaries, the 1st and 3d installments being necessarily dependent upon collections taken for immediate use of the Semmary, which may be seen from the following exhibit of her finansial condition:

Investment in U. States Bonds and Loans......\$8,600 00 (b) Plainfield bonds and notes, not available and worthless....... 2,000 00 On which there is \$1,500 interest due.

Some of this unavailable fund, by judicious effort, may be colleted. It is in the hands of our own people. They are now mable and unwilling to pay, but some of them may yet be able to discharge part of their indebtedness, at least. There is a reasonable expectation of realizing \$100 per annum from this quarter. Now, taking this, with the interest on the \$11,000 available endownent, and the \$850 of interest back-standing on bonds and notes of the first class, the Seminary has an annual income from these sources, sufficient, perhaps, to meet the salary of one Pro-

The Synod may see from this, that to meet the salaries of two full Professors, the necessity of urging upon the various pastoral charges prompt and liberal collections for the "immediate use," or, what is more desirable, a large increase of the endowment fund, so as to place the Seminary on a solid financial basis.

Under this topic of the report, the Committee would suggest,

for adoption, the following resolutions:

Resolved, That all our pastors take up collections for the immediate use of the Seminary, and that they remember with fresh interest the claims which the Theological Seminary has upon the liberality of our people.

Resolved, That the Faculty of the Seminary and Board of Trustees, be authorized to make such efficient efforts to increase the Endowment Fund, as to them may be most expedient and desirable.

#### INCREASE OF CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

From the report of the Board of Visitors, we learn that the examinations in the Seminary were satisfactory. Eight young men, Messrs. E. D. Miller, Em'l Shultze, W. C. B. Shulenberger,

Chas. Schaaf, S. C. Goss, J. B. Shumaker, L. Crist and F. Merkens, were in attendance during the year; one of whom has entered upon the work of the ministry, and two others were licensed to preach the gospel by this Synod.

The lamentation of last year over the paucity of candidates for the gospel ministry, is repeated, and the attention of Synod called to it. Provision has been made for the theological training of pious young men, yet but few of them are found preparing for this department of Christian labor. Our College and Seminary are languishing for the want of young men looking forward to the ministry—just that class of students to fill their halls as will make these institutions best subserve the interests of the Church.

The main features of this report may be embodied in the following resolutions, which the Committee submit for adoption:

Resolved, That the carnest attention of our churches be called to the small number of candidates in course of preparation for the gospel ministry.

Resolved, That our ministers and elders should seek out young men of piety and talents, and urge upon them personally to consecrate themselves to the service of God in this highest of all callings.

Resolved, That we bescech the Great Head of the Church, in fervent prayer, in behalf of our Institution, that the Theological Seminary may become a center of attraction, as a school of the prophets, a fountain of blessedness for our Western Zion; and that the spirit of God may be so graciously poured out upon all our congregations, that not only may our sons prophesy, and our young men see visions, as on Pentecost, but that from their number may be brought into the College and Seminary many who shall become priests of priests and prophets of prophets.

### LIRRARY

We are also pleased to learn, from the report of the President of the Board of Trustees, that a valuable addition to the Theological Library, of standard English and German works, has been made during the year. Three hundred dollars have been expended for this purpose, and it is thought wisely expended.

Therefore, Resolved, In view of the importance of a full Theological Library, and of additions being made thereto from year to year, we commend this matter to the friends of the Seminary, for their favorable consideration and contributions.

Rev. M. Kieffer, D. D., at his request, was relieved from further duties in the Seminary for the remainder of the present session, in order that he might rest, so as to regain his health, which, for some months past, was so feeble as to prevent him from attending to his duties.

### ARTICLE XIV.

### HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

The Committee, to which all the documents pertaining to Heidelberg College were referred, presented the following report:

That the documents placed in their hands were the report of the Board of Trustees; the report of the Board of Visitors; and certain resolutions respecting our institutions, prepared by the Theological Alumni of the West. The report of the Board of Trustees, repared by the Treasurer, N. L. Brewer, Esq., and containing important information to the Church, is herewith submitted:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, OF HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

A few weeks after the annual meeting of the Board, in June, 1865, Rev. Geo. W. Aughinbaugh, President of the College, tendered his resignation, alledging as reasons therefor, insufficient malary, (\$700) and the delicate health of wife and family.

The Board desiring to retain his service, at a special meeting called for the purpose, offered an increase of salary, and gave him have of absence, to try the effect of change of climate, &c., with the understanding, that if the change were beneficial, that he would withdraw his resignation.

Some weeks thereafter he insisted upon an acceptance of his resignation at once. A special meeting of the Board was, there-

fore, called, and his resignation accepted.

At the same special meeting, Prof. J. F. Kieffer tendered his resignation, although he had taught a week or ten days, at the beginning of the Fall session of 1865, and left his Classes unsupplied After deliberation his resignation was also accepted.

Thus, at the opening of the Fall session, 1865, the College was, at once, deprived of the services of a President and Professor of

Languages.

The Board at once endeavored to fill these vacancies. Accordingly, Rev. Geo. W. Williard, of Dayton, O., was unanimously elected President.

A Committee of five was appointed to make an immediate effort to raise the sum of \$15,000, to furnish the proper salary for the President. The President elect is chairman of that Committee, and I leave him to report his action to Synod.

The place of Prof. J. B. Kieffer has been well supplied during

the year, by Joseph A. Keller, A. M.

The services of the President are very much needed, and it is hoped that Synod and the Church will enable the Board at once to provide the proper salary, and secure his personal presence and direction.

The number of students in attendance upon the College during the year, has been larger than for several years past; and the Board feel assured that the number would be largely increased if a larger corps of Professors were secured.

The situation of the Endowment Fund remains the same as last year. Some has been paid in and invested. The amount does not vary from last year.

There has been a marked improvement in the payment of interest upon the out-standing Endowment Fund. Special efforts have been made by the Treasurer, and many have responded in full. There is still a large amount outstanding. Each one has been notified during the year of the amount due from each. We will be able, from present indications, to reduce the indebtedness to the Professors during the year. We refer to last year's report for the amount and condition of the Endowment Fund, value of coupons, &c., and the indebtedness to Professors.

Bro. Henry Leonard is still unable to operate as our agent, owing to the sickness of his wife. May a kind providence soon restore her to health, and him to the important labor of endowing our College.

The Board of Visitors having been appointed and requested by Synod, at its last annual meeting, to visit the College and inquire into its general character and condition, it is proper that the following report, made through its President, Rev. T. P. Bucher, should be published in full

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF VISITORS OF HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

Three members of the Board made an official visit to Tiffin, at the close of the collegiate year, and attended the examinations in Languages, Natural Sciences and Mathematics, and would report that they were generally well sustained by the students, and satisfactory.

The Commencement exercises passed off with considerable eclat. An address before the Literary Societies occupied Tuesday evening, and on Wednesday evening a large and enthusiastic audience was present to listen to the speeches and essays of the graduating class (four in number), and witness the Inauguration of the President of the College.

As to the internal condition of the Institution, which was also made the subject of inquiry by the Synod, the Board feels unable to express any satisfactory opinion. A superficial visit of a few days, at the examinations, precludes anything like a thoughtful view of the cultus, discipline, etc., lying back along the avenue of the past year's life. Of this we were quite well satisfied, that the condition of the College, internal and external, was much better than was anticipated, even by the more careful members of the Board.

As affording some sort of ground upon which this Synod may

judge of the condition of Heidelberg College, during the present

year, we offer the following report;

The average number of students in attendance is 89, a number greater than has been in attendance for many years. Of this number, the Senior class has five, Junior class two, Sophomore class five, Freshman class seven, and the rest are Preparatorians.

Their conduct and studiousness is reported by the acting President, to be a very decided improvement over the previous year. After having been relieved of one or two disorderly young men, the discipline of the College has been administered with vastly more success, and the moral bearing and studiousness proportionately advanced. It is not apparent how many of these students

are looking forward to the gospel ministry.

This success is the more remarkable when the teaching force of the College is rightly understood, and the fact that there has been so proper governmental officer at its head for an entire year. The Professors have been in turn discharging the duties of the Presidency, and dividing his classes among them, in addition to their other labors. They have been burthened thus during a whole year, and yet have reached results that are worthy of being noticed by those who are accustomed to think that to teach in, and watch

ever, the interests of a College is a mere sinecure.

The chair of Mathematics is filled by Rev. Prof J. H. Good. The chair of Natural Science is occupied by Rev. Prof. R. Good. The chair of Gorman and History by Rev. Prof. H. Rust, and Languages by Mr. J. A. Keller, A. M., a graduate of the Institu-The Board incorporate the Faculty of the College in their report, with a view to draw the attention of Synod to the limited teaching force now in the Institution. Four Professors are doing the work usually committed to six Professors in other Colleges; and these four Professors are expected to maintain the reputation, m well as to advance the interests of the College. But can this be done? If Synod can do anything to make the way open, and the path of duty clear for the Rev. G. W. Williard, President elect, to accept and assume the duties of the position to which he has been elected by the Board of Trustees, it will in so far add an efficient and essentially necessary member to the Faculty. an additional Professorship should be provided for before we have, as a Synod, a right to claim for our Institution that efficiency and success which, for the last few years, have been so generally snimadverted upon There is a duty we owe to the College, as well as a service which the College owes to the Church.

In concluding this report, the Board suggests the importance of cherishing the Institution with a fresh interest and affection. It has already been a great benefit to the Church, notwithstanding its short comings and defects, which, of itself, is a guaranty of what yet may be done, when properly nourished by the Synod, whose

shild it is.

It also suggests the importance of moderating our expectations with respect to its immediate success. Rome was not built includy. Yale, nor Harvard, nor Princeton were not first-class Issue tutions at once. They became such only in a long process expears. We must expect to move slowly. The addition of a President and of another Professor will be valuable; but even the we must not dream of raising it in a year or two to the highlest prosperity. Our expectations will be realized the sooner, head ever, if the Professors themselves will work a little more for the Institution outside of their professorial duties, and the Chusch will cherish it the more with a constant and careful effort on their part to promote its prosperity.

From these papers it appears that the average attendance students during the year was eighty-nine. This number is large than that of several years previous. The general condition of the College, both as regards the conduct and application of the student and the discipline and moral bearing of the Institution, is considered in advance of the former year.

But, notwithstanding, there is still room for improvement, and the wants and deficiencies existing demand the earnest attention and mutual co-operation of the Synod, the Trustees, and the Church. The services of a regular President are imperatively needed; the teaching force should be enlarged; the amount of \$15,000, proposed to be raised for the endowment of the Presidency, should be secured without delay; and efforts should not be wanting to perfect that which is incomplete, to correct that which is wrong, and to supply that which is deficient, with the view making Heidelberg College a first-class Institution, and falls adapting it to the wants of the Church.

In view of the premises deduced from the documents placed in the hands of the Committee, and with a sincere desire of elevating Heidelberg College to the position of a first-class Institution, so to meet the reasonable wants and expectations of the Church, the following action is recommended to Synod:

Resolved, 1. That the Professors should give their undivided attention to all the duties to which they have been called by the Synod and the Trustees.

Resolved, 2. That it be regarded the duty of the Professors, not only to teach the various branches prescribed in the College, but also to pay particular attention to the Christian morality and social training of the students.

Resolved, 3. That we, as a Synod, approve the action of the Trustees of Heidelberg College respecting the election of the Rev. George W. Williard, A. M., to the Presidency, and, having full confidence in him as an earnest Christian, an efficient governor, and a practical worker, hope that he may see his way clear soon to

The Board continued its usual work of collecting funds, staining and encouraging old fields, exploring and establishing a Missions, until in the month of November. At this time yet Board was notified that the Synod of the East, in compliance with the request of the General Synod, had resolved to dissolve it particular Board. This opened up the way for the organization the Board of the General Synod. Accordingly, the members that Board met in Philadelphia, on the 25th of November, as effected an organization, by the election of Rev. J. H. A. Bus berger, D. D., President; Rev. P. C. Prugh, Vice President; Res. Giesy, Secretary, and Charles Santee, Treasurer. Follows the instructions of Synod, your Board now handed over all he moneys and liabilities to the officers of that Board, acquaintis them, at the same time, with the number of her Missions, as with the condition of each one, and then dissolved its organization.

Three of the members elected, from the Western Synod, we present and participated in the organization and other business the new Board. The meeting was a spirited and harmonicus on each member realizing the fact that additional responsibilities not

rested upon him.

After adopting a Constitution for its government, the Board proceeded to carry out the instruction of the General Synod, by the election of a Corresponding Secretary, whose chief duty should be, 1. To visit the different parts of the Church, and as many Classical and Synodical meetings as possible, for the purpose of awakening a deeper and more ardent spirit of Missions in the Church; and also for the purpose of maturing plans, and collecting funds for the use of the Board. 2. To explore new fields and locate Missionaries, and to visit old Missions, wherever and whenever his presence may be required.

It was readily felt by the Board, that this work was entirely too vast and laborious to be accomplished by one man; but as the movement was, to some extent, experimental, it was decided to appoint but one such Corresponding Secretary or Superintendent for the present. After addressing a throne of Heavenly Grave, for wisdom to direct in the choice of such an officer, the Board elected the Rev. L. D. Leberman, of Meadville, Pa., who has since accepted his appointment, and entered upon his work, with encouraging

prospects of success.

The missionary work of our Church being now concentrated, throws double the amount of labor upon the new Board; hence, it is to be hoped, that each Synod and Classis, with all their respective pastors and charges, will, to the utmost of their ability, aid the Board in accomplishing that work. These, by giving the Board

her influence and hearty co-operation, can do much in carrying country this great interest of our Church in this country. The bard has now under its care seventy-five Missions. These are extered over Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carlina, New York, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and ora. From this it may be inferred that no Mission or part of the barch will be left to suffer, if it be in the power of the Board to lieve it; but to do this, it must be furnished with the means he present year will require not less than \$16,000. About 350 new subscribers have been obtained up to this distribution which would have swelled the whole number to 3,150 had the been no discontinuances. But including, with the latter, the measurement of the lists, we have really gained but little of the subscription list of last year. Where the ministry and have men made efforts to circulate the paper, such efforts as were enjoint by the last synodical action, the results have been encouraging where indifferent in this important duty, unfavorable. The legislimate inference from these facts must be apparent to all; and the point now is, for the future, shall we or shall we not deserve the cess by taking this whole subject into more serious consideration?

That the Missionary is generally acceptable to its readers, the granted. Resolutions respecting a union with the Reformed Protestant Duff Church, passed unanimously:

WHEREAS, The unity of the Christian Church is a fund mental principle of Christianity, and is alike taught in the we of God and the Apostles' creed; and,

WHEREAS, Division in the Church, the mystical body of Jest Christ, is an acknowledged barrier to her progress in the word as well as an occasion of stumbling to many souls; and,

WHEREAS, It is the Scriptural duty of all Christians to laber in every possible way, to promote the unity and harmony of the Church; and,

WHEREAS, In the providence of God, the tendencies of the present age, as well as the formal action of some denomination are towards a closer Christian union; and,

WHEREAS, The German Reformed and Reformed Protestant Dutch Churches have a common origin, history and ecclesiastical polity, and alike cherish and use the same venerable symbol of faith, the Heidelberg Catechism; and believing there is no good reason why they should not be ONE Church, under the proper and revered name, REFORMED; and that by such a union, efficiency in Christian labor would be greatly promoted, especially in the sphere of Church extension in our vast territory, and thus become, under the blessing of God, a well organized agency in the blessed work of human salvation; therefore,

Resolved. That the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States would most heartily concur in any movement or action, having for its object the formal union of the German Reformed and Reformed Protestant Dutch Churches

Resolved, That we, as a Synod, do hereby respectfully request the General Synod to take into consideration the propriety of adopting such measures, at its next triennial meeting, as may best promote, and most speedily bring about, such a desirable result.

### RESOLUTION RESPECTING THE GENERAL SYNOD.

Resolved, That, as it is desirable to have the General Synod meet annually, instead of triennially, the subject of such annual meeting of said Synod be referred to the consideration of the the Classes, at their next annual meetings.

### RESOLUTION RESPECTING A CONSOLIDATION OF THEOLOGICAL SEMINABLES.

WHEREAS, The consolidation of the two Theological Seminaries of our Church, in some central locality, would be, in minds of many of her most active ministers and laymen, van beneficial to both Institutions; and,

WHEREAS. The judicatories of our Church now center in a common head, thus making such a union entirely practical; therefore,

Resolved, That this Synod petition the General Synod to take such steps, at its next annual meeting, as will most speedily self-effectually accomplish this much desired end.

### RESOLUTION BESPECTING A UNION OF CHURCH PAPERS.

Resolved, That we request the General Synod to take into essideration the propriety of uniting the German Reformed Messeger and Western Missionary; the Kirchen Zeitung and Evangelist, and the German Sunday school papers.

### A PROPER OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

Resolved, That in view of the growing and shameful desceration of the Lord's Day, in some portions of our Church, the minister of this Synod be requested to preach on the subject during the year, and use their influence in all proper ways to promote a better observance of Sunday.

### DELEGATE FROM THE EAST.

According to a resolution, the Rev. Geo. B. Russell, delegated from the East, presented on Saturday morning, the congratulati of his Synod, and the various objects of general interest connec with it. He also made some appropriate remarks shortly be the adjournment of Synod, testifying to the deep interest he a in the West, especially as the first years of his ministry were specially in connection with it, and his present residence is on the bord of this Synod. 

# ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS

Of the Synod of Ohio and adjacent States, of the German Reformed Church, which met in Fairfield, Ohio, (the place of meeting having been changed from Cleveland to Fairfield, according to the standing rule,) on Wednesday, the 22d of May, at 8 o'clock P. M., in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and closed its sessions at a late hour on the following Tuesday night.

#### ARTICLE L

#### THE OPENING OF SYNOD.

In the absence of the President, the synod was opened with the usual religious exercises by the Stated Clerk, whereupon Rev. P.C. Prugh was appointed President pro tem., and the Rev. T. P. The above report was received and acted upon item by item. Item 1. The Committee on the Liturgy reported as follows:

At the last Synod, the Committee on the Liturgy was somewhat changed, in consequence of several members resigning, and others being added thereto, and instructed to prosecute the work Under the peculiar circumstances, however, which the Committee was placed, but little has been accomplished. A meeting of the Committee was called in Dayton, Ohio, last August; but in consequence of the prevalence of cholera, the chairman and several other members could not attend, so that there was no quorum present. Those who met, spent a short time in consultation as to what the Committee should do, and agreed to give a thorough revision of the forms previously prepared, so as to make them better adapted for the use of the Church, prepare new forms, and report the result thereof at a subsequent meeting. In the mean time, the Chairman of the Committee, having received and accepted a call to another Church, resigned his position, and withdrew from the Committee; so that no meeting was held for some months, when several members agreed to call a meeting in Tiffin, Ohio, on the 14th of May, to further the Object of their appointment, and prepare a report for Synod. At this meeting Rev. J. H. Klein was ap-Pointed Chairman in the place of Rev. J. Lichtenstein, who had resigned; whereupon it was agreed to make the following recommendations to the two district Synods interested in this work:

1. That the Synod be requested to go forward with the pre-Paration of a Liturgy for our Church as rapidly as possible, "Pon the basis upon which the work has been begun; and 2. That a Committee of six members be appointed, three from each Synod, to whom this important work be intrusted, and that care be exercised in their selection, so that they may be able to meet as often as necessity may require, and also act with as much harmony as possible.

The traveling expenses of the different members of the Committee, in attending its sessions during the year, amount to \$20.00

The report was adopted, and the old members of the Committee, in the bounds of this Synod, were constituted the Committee on the part of the Synod of Ohio and adjacent States, viz: Revs. George W. Williard, D.D., M. Kieffer, D.D., and J. H. Derr.

Item 2. The following report was received from the Committee and adopted; the bill of expenses ordered to be paid, and the Committee discharged.

The Committee appointed in 1864, and subsequently continued, to transcribe the tercentenary reports, as furnished by congregations and charges, within the bounds of the Synod of Ohio and adjacent states, would ask to submit their final report.

After a careful and impartial study of the subject in hand, we have come to the conclusion that no plan of systematic benevolence can be proposed, that can lawfully take the place in the church of the divinely appointed custom of alms-giving, which has the sanction of the Savior, the Apostles, and the Primitive Church, as well as the Church of the Reformation. No scheme of mere human invention, however feasible it may appear, can find its genus relation in the Lord's Sanctuary; consequently it must always be regarded as a down-right intruder by the people of God. They will ever regard it as an effort to get the money, which in their opinion, they have a perfect right to withhold. The history of the benevolent operations in our own church is an ample verification of this statement. far as practicable, in the Sunday school.

Your committee are of the opinion that this plan can be introduced and carried into effect with the best practical results.

In the bounds of our small Synod we have about 150 ministers. Suppose they average three services a week only, and the efferings do not amount to more than one dollar for each service, the aggregate amount at the end of the year, would be the nice sum of \$23,400. Then let the other Synods do likewise, and at least \$200,000 will flow into the Lord's treasury in our Church yearly, and all this without any expense for agencies, without any criminations or complainings about apportionments, begging, etc. The whole, more than five times the amount our church has been giving, would be the free outflow of Christian charif, that grace which if a man do not possess, he is but a sounding brass and a tinkling cymbal.

Item 2. Illinois Classis requests Synod to have the territory of Miami Classis within the State of Illinois ceded to the Illinois Classis. Referred to the Miami Classis with the request that it acquiesce therein.

Item 3. Illinois Classis requests Synod to call the attention of those Classes, which have ministers in their connection, who are laboring within the bounds of other classes to dismiss them to the bodies within whose bounds they reside. Adopted.

Item 4. Illinois Classes has silenced the Rev. H. Knepper, and refers his case to this Synod for investigation and final action. See action under item one in report of Committee on Vertures.

#### SUBJECTS REFERRED TO CLASSES.

That they had examined the applicant in the different branches taught in our Seminary, and required by the constitution of the Church, and are pleased to say it was satisfactory.

The report was adopted, whereupon, it was

Resolved, That the applicant, Lewis Christ, be licensed to preach the Gospel, and that the officers of Synod furnish him his testimonial of licensure, upon his signing the constitutional formula, which was done in the presence of Synod.

On motion the licentiate was placed under the care of the Tiffin Classis.

# ARTICLE XII.

#### RELIGION AND MORALS,

The Committee on Religion and Statistics presented the fol-

lowing report, which was adopted:

May grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost, be multiplied among us, and abide with us all, now and forever, world without end, Amen.

REV. FATHERS AND BRETHREN IN THE LORD:

The report on the subject entrusted to our consideration, is generally looked forward to by the members of Synod and the Church, with great interest. This is entirely natural. As ministers of our Lord Jesus Christ, co-workers with him and workmen upon the walls of Zion, we are often so entirely absorbed in the details of our immediate labors, and so covered and blinded by the dust of toil, that we do not observe the progress of our own work, nor the beautiful proportions it is assuming, nor the human defects which, by reason of our manifold infirmities, cleave to it. It is only when the various portions, wrought out separately, are brought together, and the whole is fitly framed, that we can see fully what we have accomplished under God, and how far we have realized our divine Redeemer's promise: "Son, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We watch for this report in the hope that it will furnish us the evidence of the divine faithfulness, and the encouragement needed for the endurance of future toils and trials. Your committee, in this view, is happy to be able to

say in advance that it can present an encouraging view of the results of our last year's labors and efforts. The reports of the various classes have been carefully read, their contents analysed, and an effort has been made to bring the whole together into

appropriate paragraphs.

First, then, it may be noted that all the reports breathe the spirit of gratitude to God, for his mercies shown to our ministers and people generally. The lives of all our ministers have been mercifully spared. Only in two instances, it would seem, were ministers prevented, for any considerable time, by sickness, from actively prosecuting their great work, and in these instances, God has mercifully granted restoration. Special mention is made of the blessings of health granted to all our missionaries. The ratio of mortality among the people, too, seems to have been less the past year, than during some former years. When we consider our widely extended fields, our destitutions, our vacancies, and the relative thinness of our ministerial ranks, it is truly a cause for gratitude, that the great Shepherd has mercifully spared our under shepherds. All likewise testify their gratitude to God for grace to advance in spiritual growth of both minister and people.

The Gospel was faithfully preached by our ministers. A growing clearness in the apprehension of the great fundamental and historical doctrines of our church seems to obtain, and the firm attachment of ministers and people to these doctrines, is declared. Love for the "old landmarks," such as the old creeds, old customs and old worship, is expressed. Great self-denial in the promotion of these happy tendencies, and in the procla-

mation of the word, has been manifested.

The sacraments have been faithfully administered. It is especially mentioned, as a favorable indication, in this direction, that the ratio of infant baptism is on the increase. The number of hearers of the word, and the relative attendance upon the holy sacrament of our Lord's body and blood, has also increased. These facts give evidence of the power of the gospel, and of the growth of faith in the gracebearing ordinances, and thanks are expressed for this manifestation of God's presence with his ministers and people.

Political divisions and alienations are happily abating, former wounds are being healed, and strife between brethren, which resulted from these sources, is made to cease. Inward peace and

unity, with few exceptions, are coming to prevail.

The catechization of the young, seems to receive universal attention. Greater faithfulness and earnestness, in this direction, are coming to prevail. There is a growing disposition on the part of parents, to co-operate with the pastors in this matter. This springs from an increasing conviction of the efficacy of this means, in awakening and developing the new life commu-

nicated or implanted in holy baptism, and from a growing consciousness on the part of children that the church is their true spiritual mother.

In close connection with this subject, the cheering fact of the increase and great efficiency of Sunday schools is reported. The introduction of the catechism, in some instances, as a text book, is mentioned as a favorable circumstance, and as having the happy effect of making these more immediately nurseries of the charch.

As a still further and very important means for the promotion of the religious education of the rising generation, Parochial schools are, in some cases, maintained, and the necessity of such is coming to be still further felt. This attention bestowed upon the religious education of the young, is truly a cheering evidence of progress in the great interests entrusted to our care. These efforts cannot but be fruitful of great good, and we should labor for the restoring and invigorating, everywhere, of these evangelical, tried and time-honored means.

Another of the great means of promoting the interests of the kingdom of Christ, is free, confiding intercourse, in the family, between pastors and people. In this manner, ties of the strongest kind are formed, and blessings inconceivable dispensed. The true sense of the relation of minister to people, shepherds to the flock, can in this way alone be brought to a full realization. The desponding are cheered, the children are drawn toward the pastor, the sick and dying are comforted in the midst of their sufferings and in their approaching dissolution. In this respect, also, our pastors have been faithful and the results have been happy.

Family altars, also, are being erected, where heretofore the morning and evening orisens did not arise. The cheering results upon the inmates of households, brought under such influences, are evident on every hand, and we should never cease laboring in this direction, until every household should be turned into a Church of God, and all fathers and mothers into priests and priestesses in their families. From this source, influences would flow out to bless the state and especially the Church of God. Many a herald of the cross would be awakened, and our spare ranks of reapers in our fields, white for the harvest on every hand, would be filled up.

As a further result of the more faithful use of the means of grace, it is only natural to hear all the reports bear testimony to an increase of piety and individual devotion to God. The sanctifying power of the Holy Ghost, is evidently doing its gracious work among our people, through the divinely appointed channels.

This is still further manifested, in the increase of our benevolent contributions, and in the prayers which are continually being offered up by our people for the success of our educational and missionary operations. The subject of beneficiary education is receiving far more attention than heretofore. As a part of the happy fruits, the report of the Treasurer of the Board of education, shows a decided increase of funds on previous years, and a handsome amount has also been secured toward the erection of a home for our beneficiary students. Contributions are also flowing more liberally into our missionary treasury than heretofore. These twin subjects are of the highest importance and it cannot but be regarded as a good omen, when these continue to receive the increased and more prayerful and liberal attention of our people.

Quite an accession to the number of our congregations has been made during the year. This is an evidence that God has blessed the means employed on our part, in various directions, for the extension of his kingdom in the world, and is also an encouragement to all, for entering upon the year of toil next before us, with good heart. The number of our ministry has also increased. Though the increase is small, and falls far short of our actual wants, something, nevertheless, has been accom-

plished in this direction.

There is also an evident improvement among us in Christian architectural taste. It is more and more coming to be felt among our people, that the place for the common worship of God should be appropriate for its design. This is leading our people to build tasteful and appropriate houses of worship. They are becoming far more willing than formerly, to devote their means to the erection of substantial and becoming temples to the living God, in which they and generations after them may worship Him. This adds to the permanency and solid evidence, inspiring hope for the future. A number of the classes report progress in this direction. New churches have been erected during the year, even by small missionary congregations, and many others have been repaired and remodeled.

No allusion is made in any of the reports to an increase of candidates for the ministry. This your committee regard as an unfavorable omen. It is true, we know from other sources that the number of candidates has considerably increased during the year, but the reports of the classes are silent on this subject. It would seem that the fruits of our labor and Christian life should also be looked for in this direction just as much as in any other, and we would surely have cause for rejoicing, could we report a large increase of candidates. It is to be hoped that all our congregations and classes will hereafter look to this source for fruits and evidence of progress in all our Christian activities.

Here and there, too, complaints are made on account of the still too inadequate contributions to the benevolent objects of the Chusch, especially to the cause of missions. Want of missionery real is lamented, and surely this is still too much a cause for lamentation. In almost every state of this great natica, the children of our church are wandering about without shepherds, and are perishing for want of the bread of life, or standing out to view like waving harvest fields, ripe for the sinkle. Where these circumstances do not yet appeal to the heart, as to move to deeds of benevolence and acts of self-sacrifics, the love of God cannot yet be fully shed abroad in the heart. Here is cause for humiliation and prayer.

some of the reports also complain of unhappy strife and division existing in some congregations. We are thus reminded that the Church as compared with her future perfection, still dwells in the tents of Keder. Her true glory and beauty are still often obscured by the shadow cast upon her from the empire of darkness. This should cause her true children to mourn and the more carnestly to pray for the peace of Jerusalem.

Some of our over burdened workmen, too, sigh for the bread for themselves and theirs. Too many, still, are overburdened with cares of this life, because those to whom they minister in holy and eternal things, do not minister to them in temporal things as they should. This in many instances, is evidently a great hindrance to the progress of the Gospel. It consumes a large portion of the precious time, and of the physical, mental and spiritual strength of many of our ministers, causes frequent changes and vacancies, and losses thereby to the church of precious materials. and causes brethren to spend their strength in extended fields, in which the houses of worship are thus closed almost three fourths of the year. This is a great hindrance to the inward and outward progress of our beloved Zion. Our congregations sertainly would find it to their great and unspeakable benefit, should they but take courage, in reliance on the presence with them of the Great Head of the Church, and in obedience to the repeated injunctions of his holy word, and attend more liberally to the wants of those who labor among them in holy things, and would endeavor to divide their charges so as to confine the labors of their pastors to narrower limits.

Lastly, all the reports look forward hopefully into the future. Whatever the trials, difficulties and discouragements of the past may have been, all feel that they have unmistakable evidence in the encouraging facts stated, that the Lord has been with us and has helped us hitherto. We are all authorized to look forward to a better state of things in store for us in the future than the past has yet brought us. Greater labors and trials, indeed, we may be called to endure, but greater victories and briumphs are awaiting us. That same pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night, which has hitherto guided the fortunes of par Church, will also guide her in the future. This is the spirit

of confidence and hope which animates all the reports of the Classes.

From the foregoing review, we as a Synod, have also abundant reason for unfeigned thanks to almighty God, Father, Sen and Holy Ghost, for his great goodness to us. Our growth in all directions, both outwardly and inwardly, is unmistakable. We are authorized to say, that the advances in all departments of Christian life and activity of the past, far surpass that of any previous year, especially in solid, substantial results. The voice of complaint, it is true, is also still heard, but this becomes far more faint, than heretofore. Our imperfections and manifold shortcomings, cannot be denied nor concealed, but our gracious Lord has also given us grace to amend our ways in many respects. All advances and improvements are due to his sovereign grace helping us, and to him shall be all the glory; to him let all thanks and praises be given.

Let us also humble ourselves before God on account of our infirmities, shortcomings and willful neglects, that seeing our contrition, he may have mercy upon us and not withhold his favor in the future, but may grant us his merciful presence as

he has done in the past.

Important and far reaching subjects will claim our attention as a church for years to come, such especially, as relate to the general question of the church, and our own cultus as a branch the Holy Catholic Church of Christ. These subjects cannot help but deeply engage earnest and thinking minds among us, as well as lay a deep hold upon the hearts and minds of our people. Deep and earnest thought must be given to these subjects in the study, the committee room, and in the family. Discussion and investigation of a more public character, on the floors of our Classes and Synods, and in the periodicals of our Church, will have to be expected. Differences of opinion will arise, as long as even christian men are burdened with the imperfections of this life, and continue in that state in which they see things darkly as in a glass. Strong and powerful convictions may come to exist in precisely opposite tendencies. Under all these circumstances already beginning to exist among us, and still more to arise in the future, let us only earnestly seek for the truth. Let us be truthful in the representation of each other's views. Let all mere appeals to prejudice be far from us. Let all passion, and bitterness, and proscription for opinions' sake, as long as we know each other as brethren holding fast to the great fundamental doctrines of the christian system, be turned away from us, as with a "Satan get thee behind me." Let us guard with sleepless jealousy against the erection of mere parties, and tumult and din of party strife, amid which the voice of truth is silenced and the spirit of love is banished. Let us not grieve God's Holy Spirit, and let us not lay unsanctified effinings and strangs fire upon our altars, only to be consumed thereby. Let us go forth from this place with the eye of faith lifted to the Great Head of the Church, and with the spirit of prayer in our hearts, and the voice of supplication in our lips, that God may grant unto us the Spirit of His dear Son, and guide us in the way everlasting, so that, having passed the waves of this troublesome world, we may be received into glory, where perfect peace forever reigns.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

### THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Committee on the Theological Seminary to which all the decuments pertaining to this subject were referred, presented the following report:

#### 1. PINANCES.

The financial engagements of the year have been fully met, and a balance of \$65 25 remains in the Treasury for the next year. The salary of Prof. Rust has been fully paid up, and that of Dr. Kieffer was also settled, in full, up to the time of his resignation, on November 1st, 1866. The Endowment Fund has been increased during the year in the amount of \$173 19. The Committee regret that the Treasurer of the Board did not report the amount of Endowment Fund on hand, and its increase in sets during the year. The Synod is to be congratulated that the financial affairs of the past year have been so prosperous; and with renewed activity and energy we hope this state of things may be continued in the future.

# 2. RESIGNATION OF DR. M. KEIFFER AND FINANCIAL ASSESSE:

The following report of the President of the Board of Truetoes has been referred to the Committee by the Synod:

Report of the Board of Trustees of the Theological Suminary, to the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States.

The Synod having, at its last meeting in Galion, Ohio, given this Board a general supervision over the Theological Seminary it is proper that we should embrace in our report, not only statement of its finances, but a full account of its operations during the year. No interest can be of more importance, er have a more direct bearing upon the prosperity of any defect nation, than an efficient and well-conducted Seminary, as it # here that the men, who are to occupy its various fields of labor. are to be trained. And when we look at the pressing demand there is in our own church, for an increase of ministerial labor, it must be apparent to all, that new seal and interest ought be awakened in every part of our Zion to increase the number of young men in our school of the prophets. It is indeed and to contemplate the small number that are now in a course of preparation for this work, when we think of the vast numbers that are needed to occupy all our vacant and destitute places. It is to be feared that the church has become remiss, and failed to come up to the full measure of her duty in this respect; so that it may be well for the Synod to call special attention to the subject and urge all our ministers and people to renewed seal and efforts in behalf of our Seminary, so that instead of having four, we may have at least a score of young men within its walls. In this respect it is gratifying to know that the prospect for an increase the coming year is encouraging.

As the number of students in the Seminary during the year has been so small, there is little that the Board has to report other than to express the hope that there may soon be a marked

improvement in this respect.

As a matter belonging properly to this Board, in view of the late action of the Synod, it becomes our duty to notify you of the action taken upon the resignation of the Rev. M. Kieffer, D. D., Senior Professor, which he handed in during the most of September, 1866, to take effect the following November. The Doctor having for some time previous been indisposed, and fear-

that a resumption of his labors might result in a complete stration of his system, urged upon the Board his resignation, take effect at the above named time, so that he might be free enter upon some pastoral charge, or other sphere of usefulse, less confining and laborious, with the hope of recruiting a health. After mutual consultation the Board consented to a withdrawal from the Seminary as requested, without a formal herence to the constitutional requirements in the case, as the imber of students in the Seminary was small and could easily attended to by the remaining Professor, and resolved to refer a resignation to Synod for its final action through the Presinat; to whom said resignation was addressed as its organ.

Shortly after the above transaction, the Doctor feeling that he ight advance the interest of the Seminary by increasing its downent, suggested to the Board a willingness to act as a sancial agent in its service, receiving a certain per centage on moneys received. The suggestion was favorably received by a Board, and accepted, the result of which is that about \$5,000 we been added to the endowment of the Seminary in interest-

aring notes.

The receipts of the Board have not been as large during the st year as usual, owing in a measure, perhaps, to the fact that ere was only one Professor in the Seminary, and that there was a therefore as much need for collections for its immediate use, formerly. There is still a very large amount of interest due notes and bonds given years ago to the Seminary. The Board in various ways urged the payment of the dues, with commatively little effect. It is sad to see the little interest which any take in meeting their just obligations to the church, as lough they might be disregarded with impunity.

For a full exhibit of the finances, the Synod is referred to the

Trustees, under the peculiar circumstances of the case, carried ato practical effect his resignation, (by settling in full and losing his account as Professor with the Treasurer, by entire meation of the perfermance of all his duties in the Seminary ince that time, and by accepting and still holding the position f Financial Agent of the Board,) your committee are of the pinion that it is necessary for this Synod to decide the question whether that resignation shall be accepted. For the surpose, therefore, of bringing it up in a definite form, we seemmend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resignation of Dr. M. Kieffer, as Senior Professor in the Theological Seminary, at Tiffin, be, and is

hereby accepted, and said Professorship declared vacant,

We recommend, also, the adoption of the following additions:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees be directed to make this necessary provision, that a proper teaching force be maintained in the Theological Seminary, until this Synod to able to fill the professorships necessary for an efficient Theological Statement.

Resolved, That we half with joy the indications that with school of the prophets will seen increase in the number of the students; and to this end it be urged upon all the classes, and through them upon the pastors and churches; that continued all earnest efforts be made to seek out properly gifted young mile who will devote themselves to the work of the Gespel Ministry.

# 3. BOARD OF VISITORS.

From the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary in report has been received. It is understood that individual members of the Board attended the Theological Examinated but that no quorum has at any time been present to adopt formal report. Your Committee are of the opinion that great care in the election of members of the Board of Visitors should be taken by this Synod, so that brethren who live in or suffifin, and are able and willing to attend, be selected. This is the more necessary, as this Board is also the Board of Education, a Board whose operations are of vital and fundamental importance to the success of our cause.

ADDENDA:—Since the preceding report was adopted by the Committee, a report from the Board of Visitors has been referred to this Committee, which is hereby inserted as a part of this report.

The report was presented through Rev. J. H. Derr, President of the Board.

The Board held two meetings during the year. At the first meeting, held in June last, at Tiffin, there was no quorum present, and consequently, no business could be transacted in a legal way. As, however, the interests of Beneficiary Education required immediate attention, those in attendance assumed the responsibility of providing for this cause, as far as in their circumstances they could. The members present attended the examination in the Seminary. Dr. Kieffer having obtained leave of absence at the Synod of Galion, was not in attendance, giving attention to the increase of the endowment fund of the Seminary. Prof. Rust examined the only two students in attendance, in Church History and Catechetics, and the young men acquittal themselves well, the Board regarding the examinations satisfictory. It was evident that the Professor's time was two much taken up to do full justice to his duties as Theological Professor. This difficulty, however, is now removed, and he devotes his time

relunively to the Seminary, and we have reason to hope that we change will result beneficially to the Church, and especially the interests of the institution.

As a Board of Education, we have to report to this Synod, hat several beneficiaries were received under its care at the sesting in Tiffin, and several more at its meeting in this place, taking the whole number now receiving aid in this manner, welve. The increased expense of living making the former appropriation to beneficiaries, wholly inadequate, the Board mised the amount of annual appropriation to one hundred dollars be each beneficiary student. This will require for this year at east twelve hundred dollars. The Board, upon auditing the amount of its Treasurer, Rev. J. H. Good, found it correct. The amount of receipts from all sources was \$956 58. The dispersements of the Board were \$851 35, leaving a balance in the freezery of \$165 23, at the close of the second term.

On account of the important relation in which the operations of our beneficiary system stand to our missionary work, and the mats of our Church generally, as far as filling up and increasing be ranks of its ministry is concerned, it should receive the most briest and active attention of the various pastors and congregations; and it is to be hoped that the Synod will adopt means to using this subject to the earnest attention of all concerned.

The Board, at its recent meeting, during the sessions of this

The Board, at its recent meeting, during the sessions of this lynod, at which a quorum was in attendance, having perfect knowledge of the circumstances under which its members acted in June last, approved their action, and assumed the same as its two.

The Board would further add, that through the personal efforts of Prof. Rust, a handsome pmount has been secured for the exection of a home for our beneficiary students. We hope this amount will soon be so increased as to enable those concerned to go forward in the erection of such a home.

The committee to which all the documents pertaining # Heidelberg College were referred, reported as follows;

The report of the Board of Trustees of Heidelberg College, prepared by N. L. Brewer, Esq., containing valuable information for the Church, is herewith submitted:

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF HEIDELBERG COLLEGE

According to the requirement of the Board of Trustees of Heidleberg College, I herewith submit my annual report to your reverend Body, and in doing so it affords me pleasure to say, that the past year has been one of more than usual success, both as it respects the number of students in attendance, and the finances of the institution. The Rev. Geo. W. Williard, D. D. President elect, entered upon his duties at the beginning of the College year, and has, by constant and close attention, in connection with the other members of the Faculty, greatly improved the general character of the institution, so that we have good reason to hope for the future. The good order, gentlemanly deportment, and studious habits of students, during the year, have been very commendable. The attendance upon the lastitution has been larger than in any previous year, as appears from the catalogue of 1867, according to which there

re been one handred and seventy-eight students in the several partments of the College, with an average attendance of about hundred and six. It is also to be noted that the number of idents in the Classical and Scientific Departments is greater me at any previous time, which affords reason to hope that her views are entertained of the importance of a thorough legiate education. From present indications, there will be a sedly number of applicants for the Freshmen class next year. The Board of Trustees did all in its power to carry out the semmendations of the Synod at Galion, in reference to increasthe teaching force of the institution. Prof G. W. Ruby, of erk, Pa., was called to a Professorship, but declined. Subsesently several other gentlemen were elected, but likewise deined, mostly, we presume, for the reason, that the finances of se College did not allow the Board to offer as high salary as mld be obtained in other positions. Being thus foiled in suring a regular Professor, the Board, in connection with the senity, employed Mr. Fred. Moyer, a student of the institution, a Tutor, and thus met the pressing wants of the case. rangement has worked well, and proved satisfactory all around. The greatest want now felt, and which should, if possible, be revided for at once, is a regular Professor for the German deertment. Considering the large German membership of our burch, and the importance of a thorough acquaintance with e German language and literature, the Board has requested resident of the College to open correspondence with the ading German ministers of the Church, and to endeavor, in all mitable ways, to enlist their interest and co-operation in establishg a German department in organic connection with the College. mes far the project meets with the hearty concurrence of many he have long since felt the need of more thorough provision r this important and growing interest of the Church. mesure, it is true, will add considerably to the current expenses f the College, but it is believed that its adoption will bring seh favor and support to the institution that will more than met the increased liabilities that will be incurred thereby. Lat least, worthy of a fair trial, in view of the importance of be interest contemplated. The Professor who may be elected r this department, can afford great assistance in securing an adowment sufficient to meet the increased expenses of such a spertment.

The endowment contemplated for the Presidency of the Colega, it is hoped, will be completed by the close of the present eliegiate year. The greater portion of the amount thus far mind, has been secured by the President, in connection with his ther duties. Our indefatigable agent, H. Leonard, has also matributed to this object, as will be seen by his report; but has been employed mostly in the collection and settlement of out-

standing dues, and in the collection of what is yet due to the College from "the society of the East, for the promotion of collegiate and theological education in the West." Severa months were spent in New York and other places East for the accomplishment of this object which was done only in part from the pressure in financial quarters, and the demands which

they had for their benevolence at home.

In consequence of having had no agent in the field for some three or four years past, occasioned by the severe and protracted domestic afflictions of the general agent, the finances suffered considerably, and the indebtedness of the College was increased. Much has been done by the President and agent during the past year in the improvement of the finances, and making what endowment we have as productive as possible. At least \$3,000 of the debt of the College will be paid by the close of the present year, in addition to the increase that has been made to the

endowment, besides meeting all the current expenses.

A large amount of the endowment of the College, consisting in notes given for scholarships, has been unproductive, as the interest has not been paid. These notes are scattered all over the Church, making it very difficult for the officers of the Board to collect the interest without incurring considerable expense is so doing. If the ministers of the Church would take the matter in hand, and see to the collection of these dues in their respective charges, as some have done, they would in this way render an important service to the institution. The College greatly needs what is thus due, amounting to thousands of dollars, and, were it paid, it would of itself go far towards meeting all our liabilities.

For a more general detail of matters pertaining to the Cellege, a catalogue for the year 1867, which has just been pub-

lished, is herewith submitted.

The finances of the institution, are about the same as reported last year, with the addition to the endowment as above reported.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF VISITORS.

The Board had two meetings during the year. At the first meeting were present, Revs. J. H. Derr, F. Strassner, and J. G. Noss. The Board organized by choosing Rev. J. G. Noss, Chairman, and Rev. J. H. Derr, Secretary. This meeting took place in connection with the Commencement Exercises in June last. The students were examined in the presence of the Board on Natural Sciences, Mathematics, History, and the German, Latin and Greek languages; the examinations were all satisfactory, showing diligence on the part of the Professors, and application on the part of the students. The usual Commencement Exercises were also observed in the presence of the Board, and of a large and interested auditory. A Biennial Oration was delivered before the Literary Societies of the Institution. Two young ladies and three young gentlemen were graduated at this time, all of whom closed their academic course with a highly creditable public literary effort.

The second meeting of the Board was held in March last, in connection with the close of the winter session of the College. The students were again examined in the usual College Branches; the examinations on this occasion were also satisfactory, evidencing very commendable progress. This being the first occasion on which examinations were conducted by the new

President of the College, it may not be out of place to remark that his examinations in Psychology and Moral Philosophy, were highly satisfactory, and very creditable to him, as evincing his

faithfulness, and also to his student.

The number of students in attendance during the year is 178, distributed among the various departments and classes as follows: Seniors 4, Juniors 4, Sophomores 12, Freshmen 21, Classical Preparatory 23, English course 114. The fact that the lower classes in College are well filled up, gives the friends of the College hope that we shall soon see an increased number of graduates going forth for usefulness into all spheres of professional life.

The behavior of the students is represented by the faculty as having been very commendable. No complaints have come before the Board in this report. Regular divine worship is observed every Sabbath in the College Chapel, which has been fitted up by the introduction of seats and a pulpit suitable for this purpose. The work of every day is commenced with divine worship. A well attended weekly prayer-meeting is held among the students. From all the religious influences thrown around our rising youth in our College, much good is to be hoped for. About twenty-five of the young men in our Institutions, Semi-

nary included, expect to enter the holy ministry.

The faculty of our College is still too small in numbers to meet the wants of the Institution and the Church. A Professor of the German Language and Literature is especially needed at this time. Prof. Keller, professor of ancient languages, at present, discharges the duties which should be fulfilled by such a special incumbent. The department of Natural Sciences, and of the Latin language should each be committed to a separate professor. At present Mr. Frederick Moyer, by request of the Board of Trustees, and at the suggestion of the Faculty, is supplying the position of Tutor in the lower classes in the languages.

In conclusion, we would say that we are glad to be informed that the Board of Trustees of the College has in contemplation

and in hand now, the election of a German Professor.

## REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE ABOVE.

From the documents placed in our hands, we learn that the institution is in a most flourishing condition. The average attendance of students during the year has been 106; a number far in advance of any previous year, whilst the discipline and moral bearing, industry and interest of the students manifested

is highly encouraging, giving unqualified testimony to the ability

and efficiency of the Faculty.

The President-elect entered upon his duties with the commencement of the Collegiate year, since which time he has labored with signal success in the immediate duties of his office, as well as in securing the endowment of his chair.

The Agent, too, has been, by the providence of God, permitted to labor in behalf of the College, in securing its endow-

ment, in which effort he met with encouraging success.

There is, notwithstanding the present prosperous and flourishing condition of affairs, a felt want of greater improvement, and a more earnest and hearty co-operation of the Synod and Church in behalf of the College.

The teaching force is insufficient, especially so in view of the large and important interest of the German portion of the

Church.

In order to satisfy this pressing want, the endowment must be largely increased; and, at the same time, means be devised by which the large amount of interest due the College on the present secured endowment be made available.

In order to accomplish the end in view, viz.: a sincere desire to elevate the College to a first-class institution, so as to merit the full confidence of the Church, and to be commensurate to the great wants of the Church, in her great and pressing wants, the Committee would offer the following suggestions for the action of Synod:

Resolved, 1. That the report herewith submitted be adopted. Resolved, 2. That Synod sanction the action taken by the Board of Trustees in reference to the election of a German Professor

Resolved, 3, That earnest efforts be made to fully endow the

mid Professorship.

Resolved, 4. That Synod enjoin upon the several Classes of the Synod to call the attention of the ministers to the necessity of collecting the interest due the College in their respective fields.

Resolved, 5. That the College merits the entire confidence and sympathy of the Church, and she should, therefore, extend its influence and means to advance its interests and place it upon a permanent basis.

## ARTICLE XV.

## MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions presented the following report which was adopted:

The Great Head of the Church has entrusted us as a denomination with a work upon this continent which cannot well be done by any other. To us have been given peculiar talents and resources for this end, and we stand responsible to Almighty God for the faithful improvement of the same. Thousands of immortal souls have been gathered through our missionary efforts, and organized into congregations which need continued help, and will continue to need it until they are able to become self-supporting. Thousands are still uncared for, who are also committed to our care by affinity of blood and a common Chris-They, like we, need and are entitled to means of grace. tian life. The relation which they sustain to us as a branch of Christ's Church should call forth our warmest sympathy in their behalf. Every minister, church officer and member, should have a heart and a hand for this great and important work. The mission work is the life work of our church. When this ceases stagmstion and death will result.

It is very true that our church is just now engaged in an internal missionary work—the work of establishing herself more firmly and surely in the older parts of the country, and also in determining and fixing her order of worship and her doctrine and life. One of the very objects of Christ's mission into this world was to destroy the works of the devil; hence we. as his servants, must strive to invade the kingdom of darkness, pull down its strong towers, and erect upon their ruins the temples of the living God, and from there unfurl the banner of the cross.

No period in the history of our church in this country called louder for activity than does the present. Doors are opening for us all over our country and the "Maccdonian cry" is coming up

m every quarter. But we want men properly qualified and ling to enter these doors, and means with which to send and

he great question then is, how are these wants to be met and fied? We are glad to learn that out of the number of who lately graduated in our Theological Seminary at mesburg, several are willing and ready to enter western ismary fields. Will the great and good Shepherd qualify richly imbue Others with the same spirit? But what we need most, are funds. The Board has nearly one hundred see under its care. The very existence of many of these ad upon the means received from the Board. This tuality on their part, which is surely praiseworthy, has not entirely exhausted the treasury, but left it deficient to the mt of about three thousand dullars. The only remedy for all this would a to be the entire awakening of all our ministers and elders his important work, that they may encourage the people to pt some efficient and systematic plan by which every member e church may be induced to give not only a small mite, or much as they may feel willing to give away, but to Lord according as he has prospered them. We who are in self-supporting fields, should not be willing that the laboring sionary should make all the sacrifice and enjoy, eventually, the glory which the Great Master is ever ready to bestow as reward of true faithfulness. But we should rather labor ; we may share a part in the final triumphs of their rejoicing. Only as we are true to the church, can the church be true to her solemn mission.

To properly conduct the general correspondence of missions, visit mission fields occupied as well as those unoccupied, as necessity may require, and by every means in his power create as increased interest in this cause over the entire church, we still feel the necessity of having a Corresponding Secretary in fact. Is view of the whole subject now under consideration, your committee offer the following resolutions:

Resolved 1, That we recognize the cause of Missions to be of paramount importance in the development and permanent life of

the church.

2, That the past efficiency of the Board of Home Missions is our guaranty that our confidence will not be misplaced in the future.

3, That this Synod earnestly recommends the several Classes within her bounds to take into serious consideration the clauss of the missionary cause, and put into operation, as soon as possible, some systematic plan whereby every member of the Reformed Church, (within our bounds,) may regularly contribute to this noble cause.

4, That the Board be requested, as soon as practicable, to carry into effect the instruction of the General Synod and elect a Corresponding Secretary, whose time shall be devoted exclusively to the duties of his office, and thus allow the present corresponding officer to continue his work of collecting funds.

## PUBLICATION.

The Committee on Publication reported as follows:

The only document which came into our hands, is the repest of the Board of Publication which is as follows:

The Board at their first regular meeting, November 9, 1886, took into consideration the matter referred to them by Synod, respecting the publication of the Western Missionary. At this meeting, agreeably to Synodical instruction, and his own request, the resignation of the Editor, Rev. George W. Williard, D. D. was accepted, and he, by the close of the year, retired from the editorial management of the paper, with the "hearty goodwishes" of the Board, and general favor of the Church, to devote his undivided attention to the duties of the Presidency of Heidelberg College.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board, November 23d, the whole subject involving the publication of the Western Missionary until a permanent editor could be chosen, was still further considered, with the view of arriving at conclusions that might operate for the welfare of the Church. It was ascertained that no financial arrangement, properly subserving the interests of the paper, could be made for a shorter period than one year; not was it regarded advisable for the Board, as a whole, to assume the editorial control thereof. Hence, after due deliberation, and the best course to be adopted, the Board unanimously elected Rev. Theodore P. Bucher, as editor of the Western Missionary for the entire year 1867. He formally accepted the position on the 13th of December, and, having entered upon the practical

ties thereof, issued the first number in quarto form on Thursy, the 3rd of January, 1867, regularly continuing the weekly me ever since.

As may be seen, the size, style, and general appearance of the sper, bearing the impress of adapted ability, and worthy enterme, have been greatly improved, and the amount of reading after much increased. All this, too, has been done without ditional expense to the subscribers. The paper now ranks mong the best and cheapest of the religious periodicals of the sed, and while it is heartily welcomed in many families of our household of faith," it is deserving of a more extensive circuttion and the generous support of the Church.

As regards the financial condition of the Western Missionary, t may be stated that it has been sustaining itself as well as bald be expected under the financial embarrassment of the suntry. The statement here given embraces a period of four souths, extending from the first of January to the first of May. In the first of May the weekly issue numbered 3,600 copies. the increase of subscriptions in four months was 1,050 copies, md the discontinuances and erasures, 250, leaving an actual min or net increase of 800 copies. The expenses of issuing the seper per week are \$120, making the actual cost of publishing t per annum, a little over \$6.000; and, so far, there are about 1,000 actual paying subscribers with which to meet current mpenditures, leaving the increase of subscriptions between the but of May and the first of next January as forming the basis If salary for the editor, together with the small income from dvertising.

Finally, taking the foregoing statements as a basis, with the riew of making the Western Missionary an amply self-sustaining paper, we would respectfully ask the earnest attention of the symod to the following items:

- 1. That the Board request the Synod to confirm their ac ion respecting the election of Rev. T. P. Bucher as Editor for 1867, and the publishing arrangement adopted.
- 2. That we recommend to the Synod the election of a Permanut Editor of the Western Missionary, and that he be required to devote his whole time to the paper and its interests.
- 3. That, in view of the decided and valuable improvements made in its size, appearance and style, as well as of its general thattoin to the wants of the Reformed Church, we heartly tummend the Western Missionary to the special attention and fattering care of the Synod, and to the favor and patronage of the Church.
- 4. That, inasmuch as it will require about 4,000 paying submibers to make it a properly self sustaining paper, there should be agencies and efforts set in motion to increase its circulation

to at least that number, and thereby give the seal of perm encouragement and prosperity to the whole enterprise.

I suggestions were favorably received, and referred to a special committee, consisting of Rev. D. Winters, S. Mease, J. H. Good, P. C. Prugh, and Bider J. Poorman; which committee, subsequently submitted through the Chairman, the following report, which was adopted:

Inasmuch as Rev. T. P. Bucher has laid before the Synod the plan of establishing a joint Publishing Establishment in Cincinunti, for five religious periodicals; and as the success of this caterprise would be of great benefit to our church,

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BENEFICIARY EDUCATION.

Pathers and Brethren: The Committee on Beneficiary Education, to whom was referred the report of the Treasurer of Beneficiary Education Funds, (the only document that has been paterred to your Committee), beg respectfully to report that they liste carefully examined this report, and believe it to be correct. The report shows that the total income, from all sources, from the patern of the cents, (\$956 58); of which eight dollars and fifty-eight cents, (\$956 58); of which eight landred and fifty-one dollars and thirty-five cents (\$851 35) have been paid to the beneficiary students in the College and Seminary, for the first two terms of the present year, leaving a balance of the hundred and five dollars and twenty-three cents, (\$105 23),

lewards paying the appropriations of the last term.

When it is borne in mind that at the beginning of the period there referred to, vis., on the 26th of May, 1866, there was fenal in the Treasury \$46 61, (forty-six dollars and sixty-one conts;) it will readily be seen and understood that this Treasury is now only fifty-eight dollars and sixty-two cents richer than it was one year ago. When it is also borne in mind that the Synod me informed yesterday, through Dr. Williard, that there will needed by this Board, within six weeks from this date, between three and four hundred dollars, or roundly stated, four handred dollars, to meet certain engagements; it will readily be sees, and ought not to be ignored nor forgotten, that there is st and urgent need that the friends of Beneficiary Education thin the bounds of this Synod, should bestir themselves, and that without delay, in order that these pressing obligations be remptly and fully met. The poor students have difficulties neach which they must encounter; their appropriations are magre enough as things are; they ought to receive their ap-Descriptions on the day on which they are due, in order that the De deferred " may not "make their hearts sick," and constant deft repeated disappointment may not utterly extinguish the spark of ardor and determination which are so essentially Mesary to their success.

Your Committee would, therefore, recommend that the Synod

take such action as will secure the needed funds at an early day, and within the specified time. It is not sufficient to secure the "promise of aid" at some dimly distant and future day. It is not the "promise of aid," but the aid itself, and that in a tangible and current form, that is needed.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SYNOD OF OHIU AND ADJACENT STATES AND THE SYNOD OF THE MORTH WEST.

It being desirable that proper relations be established and maintained between this Synod and the Synod of the North West, a Committee of one from each classis was appointed to draw up articles of agreement. The following is the Committee appointed for this purpose: Revs. G. Weber, J. McConnell, I. Reiter, J. H. Good, F. C. Bauman, and S. C. Goss, Elders J. Truxel, and A. Boucsien.

The Committee presented the following report which was adopted:

Inasmch as the Classes and Churches heretofore constituting the Synod of Ohio and adjacent States have now been divided into two bodies by the establishment of the North Western Synod, and the various enterprises in which they have heretofore been conjointly engaged will still be, in a great measure, it is hoped, carried forward by united and harmonious co-operation, it is proper that a clear and definite arrangement should be made between the Synods, so that no difficulties may hereafter arise as to the rights, privileges and duties of the two bodies in relation to the work prosecuted in common for the upbuilding of our Reformed Zion.

## WESTERN MISSIONARY.

- 1. Whenever an Editor of the Western Missionary is to be elected, the Board of Publication shall notify both Synods. Whenever the Synod of Ohio and adjacent States shall elect as Editor, and the North Western Synod confirm the same, the election shall be valid.
- 2. This arrangement to hold good until the North Western Synod shall proceed to establish an English Religious Newspaper under its own control; until which event this agreement cannot be abrogated, amended or changed, except by mutual agreement between the Synods.

## EDUCATION.

1. Each Synod shall elect its own Board of Education. But the North West Synod, if it so desires, can carry forward this work, in whole or in part, through the Board of Education of the Synod-of Ohio.

## INVALID FUND.

1. The two Synods shall have equal power in the administration of the Invalid Fund, and each Synod shall elect annually three Directors for this purpose.



The above report was received and acted on item by item.

Item 1. The following report from the joint Committee on the Liturgy, was received and adopted.

The joint Committee of the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, and of the Synod of the North-West, had two meetings in Tiffin, Ohio, during the year, and have given the attention to the subject which its importance demands. At the first meeting, which was held in the fall, the general outline of the work was agreed upon, and portions of it assigned to the different members of the Committee, so as to gather the material

necessary for its construction.

At the second meeting which was held in the early part of May, but few of the members of the Committee were in attendance. Those present had labored faithfully in the work assigned them, whilst a few of the members made no report. Feeling the importance of the work assigned us, and knowing that the Synods interested in it, expected us to go forward with it as rapidly as possible, we have given much labor and attention to it, and have now collected most of the material necessary for the completion of the work. We have also learned by the investigations we have made, that there is material enough in Reformed Liturgies, which, if properly reproduced, will enable us to complete the work on the basis laid down in the beginning, and approved by the Synod.

We have now the prayers for the Lord's day, and for the different festival occasions; also formulas for infant and adult Baptism, Confirmation, Preparatory Service, the Lord's Supper, Ordination and Installation, nearly completed; whilst the remaining part of the work is in such a state of progress as to lead us to entertain the hope of completing it in the Fall or Winter. some of the members of the Committee have not labored with us, it might be well for the Synod, in view of the difficulty and responsibility of the work, so to change the Committee as to have such persons on it as will unite in accomplishing the work

as speedily as possible.

Yet as a Synod we cannot but feel the necessity of urging to a speedy completion the work of the Liturgy now in progress under the auspices of the Synods. A reconstruction of the Committee being called for, we submit the names of the following persons to constitute that portion of the Liturgical Committee from the Synod of Ohio, viz.: George W. Williard, D. D., Prof. J. H. Good, Revs. T. P. Bucher and I. H. Reiter.

We confidently anticipate that under the present arrangement, the work of the Liturgy will be brought to as rapid a comple-

tion as possible.

Item 2. The following is the report of the Commissioner, which was received and adopted, and the Treasurer authorized to pay the traveling expenses.

The undersigned Commissioner, as your first delegate to the North-Western Synod of the Reformed Church, would respect-

fully report:

That he attended the North-Western Synod, held in Fort Wayne, Indiana, commencing on Tuesday, May 28th, and continuing in session until June 1, 1867. This, as authorized by the General Synod, was its first meeting, and, on the day after its convening, it was formally organized by the election of officers.

Your delegate met with a cordial and corteous reception, and was made to feel that he was among brethren, who cherished the same faith, and whose hearts were pervaded with the same love and zeal for the peace and prosperity of our Zion. The attendance was tolerably full, and there was a commendable interest and earnestness manifested in the work of the Lord.

Your delegate, according to instruction, laid the Articles of Agreement, prepared and adopted by our last Synod, before the North-Western Synod, and explained that the object thereof was to establish and maintain a proper relation between the

Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States and the North-Western Synod. These Articles, after having been duly considered, were all adopted, excepting those relating to the cause of education, and the publication of the Western Missionary (now Christian World), which were laid on the table until their next annual meeting. And as proper mutual relations of an ecclesiastical and fraternal character, are now formally established between the two Synods, it is believed that if these relations are reciprocally maintained, the most happy results will be realized.

The brethren of the North Western Synod have not only an extensive territory to possess, and an important field to cultivate, but, with God's blessing upon them, they have, on the whole, an encouraging and hopeful future before them. They have already accomplished a good work, especially in the way of church extension and missionary labor. And, while there still remains much to be done, the dawn of a brighter and better

day is approaching.

On leaving that reverend body, with assurances of our frateral feelings and of our interest in their welfare, I was requested by the President to assure our Synod of their brotherly leve and abiding interest in our success and prosperity, and to bear back with me to you their kind Christian greetings. Item 9. The Committee presented the following report:

In the absence of the Chairman of the Committee, I beg leave to report to the Synod that, during the past synodical year, the building of the Students' Home has been pushed forward as rapidly and successfully as circumstances permitted. In reliance on the promises and providence of God, and trusting to the good will and liberality of the members of our church, we bought a suitable lot of good land, containing nearly eleven acres, at a cost of \$2,280.00. At the beginning of August, we made a con-

tract with Seemuth & Stern for the erection of the back building of the Home, which they promised to finish before the opening of the Winter Session in the College, for the sum of \$1,289.50, including all the material, except the brick, and the digging of the cellar and well. In consequence of unfavorable weather, they were unable to fulfill their promise, but have inished the house in a satisfactory manner early this Spring. Four of the rooms have been occupied by Beneficiary Students since last fall; the fifth room was taken possession of this Spring, and the sixth would also have been occupied, if the promised furniture had come to hand. The young brethren living there are so well pleased with their new home, that many others have made application for admission, and it has often made us feel sorry to refuse them; but we had to do so, for want of room. Instead of six rooms, we ought to have at least fifteen, which would all be filled in a short time, and then one of the Professors, or some disabled minister could live there, and furnish the students with cheap boarding, and keep the whole establishment in proper order. This was the original plan, and it has been our aim all along to carry it out. But we cannot undertake the building of the front house, until we can see our way clear to pay for it. If Synod can give us some light on this subject, and devise means by which this important enterprise can be carried to full completion, we shall be very thankful, and will cheerfully follow the instructions that may be given.

Besides this there is a furniture bill, lumber bill, hardware bill, lightening rod bill, and a few other small bills still unpaid, so that the whole indebtedness will run up to about \$950,00. The greater portion of this amount is covered by subscriptions, mostly in small sums, many of which will, however, not be paid before September, 1869. Hence it is very desirable that some

provision should be made to liquidate this debt, and also to provide for the erection of the front building. The Lord grant that this may be done.

The above report was received and referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Revs. P. C. Prugh, Geo. W. Williard, D. D., T. P. Bucher, and Elder H. Leonard; which Committee subsequently presented the following, which was received and adopted.

The Special Committee to which the report on the Students' Home was referred, would state that it appears from the report placed in their hands, that this institution, as far as completed, is in full operation. A valuable lot of eleven acres has been purchased, and a brick building of six rooms and good cellar has been erected upon it. The students living in the Home have, to some extent, improved the grounds around it, and everything is beginning to assume a cheerful and happy aspect. The whole amount of money already expended upon it is, in round numbers, \$3,000; and the amount received, \$2,000; thus leaving a balance of \$1,000. This is covered in part by subscriptions, which will, however, come due in the latter part of 1869.

But the original plan of Synod has thus far been carried out only in part. The main building which should contain at least twelve or fifteen additional rooms, in order to meet future, as well as present existing wants, is yet to be erected. Indeed all the beneficiary students, as well as any others studying for the gospel ministry who might desire to avail themselves of its advantages, should be provided with comfortable rooms and boarding in the Home. This would give life and character to it, and at the same time enable many with limited means to prepare for the gospel ministry. That this may prove a Home, indeed, to many students of the present and future generation, and that the original design of Synod may be met, we would append the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee be continued with such changes in it as may be necessary, and that the cause be, and is hereby, heartily recommended for sympathy and support to the entire Church. P. C. PRUGH, Chairman.

Item 5. The report of the President and Treasurer of the Israelid Fund" was adopted, and is as follows.

The following report on the *Invalid Fund* was read, and referred to a Special Committee.

Your Board adopted measures more than a year ago, to make the "Invalid Home" a permanent relief to invalid ministers. To reach that object, time and means are necessarily required, as all know, who are acquainted with the grape culture. Hence, we were compelled to contract still more debts during the past year. The investment, however, is secure, and (we believe) fully justified. And not only were we necessitated to make investments in the way of converting the land into a vineyard, but we also had to build a house for our tenant, which cost, notwithstanding the greatest economy, the sum of \$369.74.

On the apportionment made by your Synod in May, 1866, \$385.07 are still unpaid. Of this amount, \$204.32 are apportioned within the bounds of your Synod, as at present constituted, viz.:

Your Synod, at the last annual meeting, passed a resolution, requesting each postor to take up a collection for the benefit of Bro. Tendick. This was in response to our request. Whether that part of our suggestion was adopted, your Minutes say not; from the fact, however, that several

Classes of your Synod have thus sent in contributions in aid of Bro. T, we infer that the request was granted. The following moneys have been thus forwarded:

throne of grace in his behalf.

Fund on the part of this Synod.

Resolved, That the matter be commended to the kind attention and christian sympathies of our Pastors and Churches, and that they be requested, as far as possible, to assist in the support of these brethren.

### ARTICLE XL

# Examination, Licensure and Ordination.

Application having been made in behalf of Samuel B. Yockey and Jacob Kuhn, students of the Theological Seminary at Tifin, Ohio, for examination and licensure, they were referred to the Committee on Examination, &c., which Committee subsequently reported through the Chairman, Rev. H. Williard—

That they had examined the applicants in the different branches taught in our Seminary, and required by the Constitution of the Church, and are pleased to say that the examination was satisfactory.

The report was adopted and the following resolution passed.

Resolved, That the applicants, Samuel B. Yockey and Jacob Kuhn, be and hereby are licensed to preach the gospel, and that the officers of Synod furnish them their testimonials of licensure, upon their signing the constitutional formula, which was done in the presence of Synod.

On motion Samuel B. Yockey was placed under the care of the Lancaster Classis, and Jacob Kuhn under that of the Tiffin Classis.

Application was also made in behalf of Rev. E. Sauvain of the French Reformed Church, for admission into Synod. His application with all the papers pertaining thereto was referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Revs. H. Rust, J. H. Good, and Elder H. Leonard, which Committee subsequently presented the following report, which was adopted.

Your Committee have carefully examined the different papers presented to them by Mr. Sauvain. From these it is evident that he was educated in the Pilgrim Mission Institute at St. Chrishona, near Brasil, and was regularly ordained as a missionary in 1856; that as such he labored successfully for ten years in South America, principally in the French Language. It appears also from these papers that he comes well recommended by Rev. J. Emanuel Voelter, Inspector of the Mission House, and several other prominent christian men in different parts of the world. And, besides this, he has a letter from the Consistory of the Mt. Eaton congregation, addressed to this Synod, praying for the reception of Rev. Sauvain into our connection, in order that they may keep him as their pastor.

In consideration of these facts, your Committee would recom-

mend the following:

Revised, That the Rev. Eugene Sauvain be received as a member of this Synod, and that he be placed under the care of Classis of St. John's, to be by them properly installed in his present field of labor.

### ARTICLE XII.

# Religion and Morals.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Statistics presented the following report which was adopted.

DEAR BRETHREN IN THE LORD:

God in his goodness has permitted us once more to assemble together in Synodical capacity. His holy name be praised for this mount of privilege.

From the Classical reports we learn:

That the lives of the ministers in our territory have all been spared, and health and strength given each one to labor at his post in the Master's vineyard. Their zeal for the prosperity of Zion has not abated in the least, and their fidelity to her interests has not come behind that of former years.

That the membership generally has been blessed with a large measure of health, and so enabled to be active in their efforts in behalf of the Church, and to attend upon the precious means of grace. Our membership, we are happy to report, is becoming more and more devoted to God, and deeply interested in the welfare of Zion. In the language of one of the reports "there is visible a firmer attachment to the doctrines of the Church, greater love for the old landmarks and customs of the fathers."

We would also mention the indication that the holy sacraments are receiving more of that attention which their importance demands, and that, as a Church, we are arriving at a deeper consciousness of what our venerable symbol of faith declares, when it says that "we are made partakers of Christ and all his benefits, by faith only, which faith the Holy Ghost works in our hearts by the preaching of the gospel, and confirms it by the use of the sacraments;" and that these sacraments "are holy visible signs and seals appointed of God for this end, that by the use thereof, he may the more fully declare and seal to us the promise of the gospel; namely, that he grants us freely the remission of sin and life eternal, for the sake of that one sacrifice of Christ accomplished on the cross."

In this connection, why should we not speak of the attention which the catechizing of the children is receiving, both on the part of parents and pastors, and again commend to them an increased fidelity to this important time-honored and greatly blessed custom of the Church; and why should we not rejoice

in the increased number of young men who are becoming inclined to the gospel ministry, and are now entering the schools of the prophets with the view to prepare themselves for this high and holy calling. Let the leaven of benevolence, which is gradually working amongst us, more thoroughly pervade our people, and we may hope for still greater prosperity in those interests so vital to the extension and upbuilding of the Church of Christ. Something has already been accomplished in the cultivation of benevolence and the application of its offerings; but there is room for improvement in both directions. We need greater love for Christ and his cause.

In view of these facts gleaned from the Classical reports placed in our hands, auspicious as they are in the main, let us take courage and go forward in the work of the Lord, entrusted to our stewardship, and let us unite here in a solemn record of thanksgiving to the Great Head of the Church, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, for his mercy and goodness vouchsafed during the past year. Let us praise him for the constant verification of his promise, "Lo! I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

# The Theological Seminary.

The following documents pertain to this subject.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary held a meeting immediately after their election at the last annual meeting of Synod, and organized by the election of the Rev. P. C. Prugh as President, the Rev. I. H. Reiter, Secretary, and the Rev. D. Winters, Treasurer.

In the month of January, a communication was received from Rev. M. Kieffer, D. D, dated January 7th, 1868, notifying the Board of his intention to vacate his Chair as President of the Seminary on the first of February. A meeting of the Board was then called, which convened in Xenia, January 24th. There were present at this meeting P. C. Prugh, I. H. Reiter, A. H. Baughman, B. Kuhns and B. C. Taylor. A communication had also been received by the Treasurer from Prof. H. Rust, asking for an assistant teacher for the time, whereupon the Board placed the government and instruction of the Seminary under the care and supervision of Rev. Prof. H. Rust, from February 1st, until the next annual meeting of Synod. The Board also,

at the same meeting, elected and appointed Rev. Prof. J. H. Good to render the required assistance in teaching ad interim, with a salary of one hundred dollars. Rev. Prof. J. H. Good subsequently notified the Board of his acceptance of the appointment, and accordingly entered upon the discharge of his duties on the 3d of February, 1868.

The annual meeting of the Board was held in Dayton, May

13th, at which time the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That inasmuch as the endowment fund of the Seminary, amounting to \$15,000, will, at most, not yield over \$1,200 interest; and in view of the limited number of students now in attendance at the Seminary, the Board will leave with the Synod the whole subject of the propriety of electing a professor at the present time to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Prof. M. Kieffer, D. D.

For an exhibit of the financial condition of the Board, the Synod is directed to the subjoined report of the Treasurer.

# REPORT OF BOARD OF VISITORS OF THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Board was organized on the 26th of June, 1867, at Tiffin, by electing Rev. L. H. Kefauver, President, and Rev. T. P. Bucher, Secretary.

There were present at the annual meeting the Revs. N. H. Loose, T. P. Bucher, and L. H. Kefauver, of the Synod's Board, and the Rev. J. B. Thompson, representing the Eric Classis.

According to the Catalogue recently published, there have been nine students connnected with the Seminary during the last year. The most of these are taking an irregular course of studies. Their names are as follows: Emanuel Schultz, J. Ruhn, F. Moyer, S. B. Yockey, Ed. Herbruck, L. M. Karshner, 8. N. L. Kessler, H. D. Houtz, and C. Doerner. Messrs. Schultz, Kuhn and Yockey have been regularly dismissed from the Seminary, with the view of being licensed to the ministry. On account of some unpleasant relations growing out of some irregularities by Mr. Doerner, he withdrew from the Seminary during the winter session. This leaves but five students in the Semi-Dary. The prospects for comparatively large accessions next term, are favorable. The Professors report the students, for the most part, as being diligent, and as making commendable prog-This was manifest to the Board at the examinations. The branches usually taught in similar institutions are taught in our Seminary.

During the year the Rev. M. Kieffer, D.D., resigned the chair of Didactic Theology, which has been filled temporarily, with acceptance, by Prof. J. H. Good. In accordance with a resolution passed at the last meeting of Synod, the Board of Trustees are to provide the teaching force in the Seminary, and we consequently leave it with them to offer suggestions in this impor-

tant matter.

Notwithstanding the extreme need of ministers, the Board would recommend to the Synod to devise some more stringent measures by which candidates for the ministry would feel the necessity of taking the full course recommended. There are but

few who prosecute their studies the full time required.

The theological Library numbers at present 2,094 volumes. Prof. J. A. Keller is the Librarian, and discharges the duties of his office with fidelity. The Library room is opened once a week for the distribution of books, etc. No rules have yet been adopted with respect to the library, as to who shall have access to it, and on what conditions. As some complaints have been made by the Seminary students, that there are encroachments made on the library by persons not connected with the Seminary, we would recommend that Synod either adopt, or instruct the Board of Trustees of the Seminary to adopt, rules by which the Librarian may be governed in conducting the affairs of the library.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

Your Committee would suggest, in view of the facts contained in the above documents, the propriety of Synod devising such means as will further the efficiency of our Theological Seminary, so that it may more fully answer the end for which it was established. The teaching force is inadequate, and the endowment not sufficient to meet the Profesors' salaries; besides, the course of studies as laid down in the catalogue seems to be rather indefinite.

Dr. Kieffer tendered his resignation about one year ago, since which time, by the request of the Board of Trustees, the Chair was filled by Rev. Prof. J. H. Good.

The Committee would offer the following suggestions:

1. That Synod sanction the action of the Board of Trustees in appointing Prof. Good to fill the vacancy during the year, occasioned by the resignation of Dr. Kieffer.

2. Resolved, That the resignation of Dr. Kieffer be accepted,

and his chair declared vacant.

3. That hereafter, the Professorship now vacant be denominated the Professorship of Dogmatic and Practical Theology.

4. That the Chair now filled by Prof. Rust shall be known as the Professorship of Exegetical and Historical Theology.

5. Resolved, That the vacant Professorship be filled by an elec-

tion at this Synod.

6. That the Board of Trustees be instructed to take measures to have the Professorship of Exegetical and Historical Theology

fully endowed as soon as possible.
7. That the Faculty of the Seminary be authorized to lay down a more definite course of studies, subject to the approval of the Board of Visitors and the Synod.

8. That the ministers be requested (until the second Professorship be fully endowed) to appropriate a portion of the funds devoted to benevolence to this object, so as to meet the deficiency

in salary.

9. That the Professors of the Seminary be authorized to raise a permanent fund for the regular increase of the Theological Library, the proceeds of this fund to be appropriated under their supervision for the purchase of books.

Item 9. Adopted.

The election of a Professor called for in the fifth item of the above report was made the order of the day for Saturday morning, when, after solemn prayer for divine guidance, Synod proceeded to the election. The following nominations were made: Revs. J. H. Good, Dr. J. H. A. Bomberger and Dr. D. Gans.

Rev. J. H. Good receiving a majority of all the votes on the first ballot, he was declared duly elected.

The officers of Synod in connection with the officers of the Synod of the North-West were instructed to make out a call to the Professor elect, and the Stated Clerk instructed to notify the Synod of the North-West of the result of the above vote.

On motion the Synod of the North-West was requested to call a special meeting to act in the case as called for by the articles of agreement.

The officers of this Synod, with such persons as may be appointed by the Synod of the North-West, are to constitute the Committee for the inauguration of the Professor elect, in case he accepts.

The report of the Committee, with those of the President and Treasurer of Board of Trustees, and the report of the Board of Visitors, were all adopted.

# ARTICLE XIV.

# Heidelberg College.

The Committee to which all the documents pertaining to Heidelberg College were referred reported as follows:

The reports of the Board of Trustees of Heidelberg College, and that of the Agent, H. Leonard, are herewith presented as containing important information concerning our institution.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTÉES OF HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

The College year which closes the 24th of June has been one of unusual prosperity. The number of students in attendance has been larger than in any proceeding year, as will be seen by a reference to the catalogue which has just been published, from which we gather the following facts: In the senior class there are 13 students, 9 of whom will graduate, the others being irregular; in the junior class, 2; in the sophomore, 16; in the freshman, 40; in the classical preparatory, 32; and in the English course, 124; making 227 in attendance during the year. The general deportment of the students has been good, and

their progress in their studies commendable.

The teaching force the past year has been the same as it was during the last, except that we employed a tutor in the German department a part of the year. The Board has not felt itself justifiable in calling any additional professors, much as it might be desired to have a professor for the German department, and also one for History and Elocution, in view of the inadequate endowment of the College, and the indebtedness incurred during former years. The expenses during the year, including the salary of the Agent, will be about \$5,000. This amount we hope to realize, and so meet all the current expenses. We have also paid about \$600 of the indebtedness of the College, so that the finances are gradually improving.

The Agent, H. Leonard, has met with very good success during the year, as will be seen by a reference to his report. Should he meet with equal success the coming year, the Board may feel itself justified in calling an additional professor. The Synod may rest assured that the Board will do all in its power to meet the increasing demands of the College, and make it subserve the best interests of the Church and of the cause of education in general. As it is we have much reason for thankfulness in view of the success that has thus far attended our efforts.

The Board is compelled to express its regret, as it was done in former years, that there are so many who do not pay the interest as it becomes due on their notes to the College. In consequence of this there is a large amount of the endowment which is unproductive, making it impossible, notwithstanding all our efforts, to state in exact terms what the endowment of the College is. A comparatively small amount of interest has been collected on the notes of former years. Were the ministers of the Church to take the matter in hand much valuable assistance could be given. Some have rendered valuable service in this way, for which the Board returns its thanks. We hope by the close of another year to give some proximate estimate of what the endowment is.

Were all those who have taken scholarships to pay the interest on their notes punctually as it becomes due, the College could in this case meet its current expenses as they become due with the present teaching force; but as it is the salaries of the professors is not always sure, small as it is. There are, perhaps, \$15.000 of the endowment on which no interest is punctually paid. Not a few have never paid any interest at all, so that a large portion of the endowment is not productive. The Board intends employing the Agent the coming year in assisting to collect the interest now due the College, so as to make the entire endowment productive if possible.

For a full statement of the financial condition of the College, the Board will ask the attention of Synod to the report of its Treasurer, which will be made at its regular annual meeting, the 23d inst., a synopsis of which will be published in the periodicals of the Church for the information of those whom it may concern.

This took time and money, all of which might have been saved had these brethren who are in arrears been more punctual to pay as they promised, to wit: "Interest to be paid annually." It would be well if the several pastors were to call the attention of such delinquents to this important matter. As it is we may have a large paper endowment fund based on broken promises to pay; and it will not be any more benefit to our institution than to lock up so many dry leaves in the Treasurer's iron safe at Tiffin,

I am often asked: "Leonard, what in this world are you going to do with all this money you are raising for the College?" I hope and pray that soon some rich brethren will follow the example of some of our sister denominations and give largely. I am still willing to continue in the work assigned me.

In conclusion, I would return thanks in behalf of the College to all the pastors and people who have been so kind to the Agent

## REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON THE ABOVE REPORTS.

H. LEONARD.

The Committee to whom the foregoing documents were referred, would report that the College is in a prosperous condition. The last year has been one of more than usual success, the attendance having been larger than in any previous year. The finances also seem to be improving. The Board has been able from its various sources to meet the current expenses, and also to pay a part of the indebtedness of the College. The expenses of the present year, which will end the 24th of June, are put down at about \$5,000. This includes the salary of the Agent, H. Leonard, as well as that of the professors and incidental expenses of the institution. The endowment has also been considerably increased, as will be seen by the report of the General Agent, which has been read before this Synod.

From the above it will be seen that the Synod and Church have great reason to rejoice in the growing prosperity of our institutions at Tiffin, Ohio. For years past the Church has

looked with interest at the prospects of our College, having to lepend upon it to a great extent for a supply of ministers to fill her waste places in the West. Its past history, like most colleges, has been one of financial trouble, and at times of financial struggle. So that there were periods when its friends had serious fears whether it would be able to weather through the storms that assailed it, or be involved in hopeless embarrassment. Your Committee, therefore, take pleasure in stating that a hopeful and bright future opens for our College, such as ought to encourage its friends, and lead to renewed and united efforts to establish it upon as broad and permanent basis as that of any other college around us. It is true our numerical strength and wealth are not equal to that in some other churches; but by continued and persevering efforts we may hope to add gradually to our endowment as we have done in the past. Our position in this respect seems different from that of some of our sister churches; whilst their institutions are endowed by large contributions from wealthy and liberal minded men, our lot seems to be to secure this end by a gradual and slow process, so that there is great need of persevering efforts on our part.

Too much importance cannot be attached to the institutions of a Church. Past experience proves that they are always great centers of influence and power, and perhaps contribute more to the growth of the particular churches under whose auspices they are established than any other single cause. Had we taken measures to establish a college and seminary in the West years before we did, and then done what we might in our limited circumstances, it is easy to see that our condition as a Church would to-day be greatly in advance of what it is, which should teach us the great importance of coming to the support of our

College as a brighter day begins to dawn upon us.

Your Committee would suggest the following resolutions for

adoption:

Resolved, That we rejoice in the evidence we have of the growing prosperity and usefulness of our College, and pledge

our continued support and co-operation.

Resolved, That the Synod extend its thanks to Agent H. Leonard, for self-denying and persevering efforts to endow the College, and pray that his life and health may be spared to complete this desirable end.

Resolved, That we will aid all we can in collecting the outstanding dues of the College, and by increasing its endowments.

# ARTICLE XV. Missions.

The Committee on Missions presented the following report, which was received, discussed at considerable length, and adopted in the following form:

The only document placed in the hands of the Committee is a letter from the Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, Rev. L. D. Leberman, calling the attention of this Synod to the present financial condition of the Board. From this communication, and from the report of the Treasurer of the Board of Home Missions, presented to the Synod of the German Reformed Church of North America, at its last annual meeting at Baltimore, to which the Secretary makes reference in this communication, we learn the following facts:

The missionary work of the General Board extends (or at least did extend in the month of October, 1867) over fifteen States of the Union, from Massachusetts to Minnesota, and from the Canada line to North Carolina. Within these limits nearly one hundred missionaries are employed. Of these we think we may say that the larger number is laboring within the limits of this

and the North-Western Synod.

The operations of the Board are, however, at present very much embarrassed by the want of funds. The treasury is, at this time, not only exhausted, but indebted to the treasurer to the amount of \$4,000. The Board has reached a financial crisis, and must receive immediate help, or be obliged to discontinuous

many of the missions now under its care.

One statement of the Corresponding Secretary seems to demand our special attention, namely, that within the last year only little over \$1,000 were contributed to the treasury by the two Western Synods together. Referring to the report of the tresturer, as presented to the Synod of Baltimore last fall, we see that there were contributed during the year \$11,547.35. money, 10,109.96 were contributed by the Eastern Synod, while only \$1,437.39 were contributed by the two Western Synods together. This is certainly a humiliating fact, especially so, since the larger number of missionaries are laboring within the bounds of these two Synods. Evidently the cause of missions has not received the attention that it demands. The church has not done her duty in this solemn matter. Much more could have been done, and should have been done, for this cause. The Committee does not undertake to say why this has been so; but the Committee does say, that, if we would be able to stand in the day of judgment, this must be so no more. While the past is past, and while we cannot now make that better, we must now resolve to do better in the future.

The Committee, in conclusion, would offer the following resotions for adoption:

1. Resolved, That we acknowledge with deep humility and shame, our past neglect of the important work of Home Missions.

2. Resolved, That we, as a Synod, in the fear and by the help of God, will do all in our power to raise men and means for the furtherance of this great cause, and that we commend this matter to the earnest attention of the Classes.

3. Resolved, That the different Classes be instructed either to carry on their missionary work through the General Board of Home Missions, or to enter into an arrangement with the Board to have their contributions acknowledged by the treasurer thereof,

4 Resolved, That during the present sessions of Synod an hour be devoted to the discussion of the general subject of Mis-

sions.

It is due to remark, in connection with the above, that a considerable amount has been raised and appropriated to Missions, that does not appear in the report of the treasurer, several Classes having supported missions in their own bounds, which were not under the care of the Board.

the means of grace;
AND WHEREAS, The longing eyes of many of them are turned toward the church East, from which they still expect and pray to receive the public ministrations of the means of grace and the ordinances of the church of Christ, by ministers of the church of

their fathers, and of their own choice and adoption;

AND WHEREAS, We cannot yet send them ministers to break

unto them the bread of life; therefore,

Resolved, That this Synod expresses its most tender and devoted sympathies with all such children of the church, and would assure them, and the toiling frontier missionaries of the church, that they are still remembered by their former pastors and Christian friends at a throne of grace, and that the members of this Synod will exert themselves to do all they can to have the great West, in all its waste places, speedily occupied by faithful servants of the church, to minister to the wants of our dear Chaistian friends who have waited so long and so patiently for these great privileges and blessings.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

oon after the adjournment of Synod last year, the Board of collication held a meeting in Cincinnati, and organized by cinting V. C. Tidball President, and N. B. Collord Secretary. The subject of taking an interest in a Printing and Publish-Company in connection with several other religious papers, presented to the Board by the Editor of the Western Missery, Rev. T. P. Bucher, for their consideration; and also a position for changing the name of the paper.

It a subsequent meeting of the Board the following resolution

adopted:
Believing that the plan proposed by the Editor and by Synod rred to this Board, of securing stock in a Printing and Pubing Company in Cincinnati, is safe and judicious, therefore:

Resolved, That the Editor, Rev. T. P. Bucher, he recommended to secure the amount of \$3,000 for said purpose, and that his application be commended to the favorable regard of them having means to advance."

After the consideration of many different names proposed for the Western Missionary, it was decided to change the name of the paper, and "The Weekly Christian World" was selected as

its future title.

The paper has enjoyed a good degree of prosperity during the past year, its circulation having been considerably extended, and its advertising patronage largely increased, until it now stands financially on a comparatively independent basis.

The present circulation of the CHRISTIAN WORLD is 4,248;

actual increase of subscribers during the year, 1,018.

It will be observed that the circulation of the paper fixed by the Board of last year, as necessary to make it self-sustaining (4,000), has been reached, and its advertising patronage and revenue have been increased. The expenses, however, have been swelled by the new arrangements in its publication.

It is indeed gratifying to the Board to be able to make a favorable a report respecting the prosperity and permanent success of the Christian World. It is looking upward. But there is still room for further improvements and greater success. It is now very desirable that the subscription list of the paper be made large enough to sustain it independent of advertising as much as possible, that the Editor may be able still further to improve the character of the World and enhance its value to the reader by devoting only a limited space to advertisements, and by admitting none but short ones, and those of general interest and utility.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION.

The Committee on Publication beg leave respectfully to report:

That owing to some peculiar circumstance the annual report of the Board of Publication failed to reach this Synod. We have ascertained, however, that during the past year marked and gratifying progress in our publication operations has taken place. The circulation of the Christian World is now 4,248 copies, being an increase during the past year of 1,018 copies. And all must admit that in respect to its neat form, ample coatents and its cheapness, the paper is an honor to our denomination, and an index of the growing strength and efficiency of our Western Church.

In our day and in our age, the importance of the press, of a sound religious literature, and of a weekly diffusion of the news

of the churches cannot well be overestimated. Not as a substitante of the preached word, but as an auxiliary of the same; as a means of awakening the whole church to a proper self-consciousness of its missions; as a medium of diffusing the blessed teachings of the gospel on a wide and enlarged scale; and as a bond of union between christians, do we give this department of our work our warmest sympathies and most earnest prayers for its continued success.

We think the time is near at hand when the work of publication in our Western Church should be still further enlarged so as to embrace the publication of Catechetical and Doctrinal Works, Hymn and Sunday school books, such as shall be true exponents of our ancient faith, and shall enable us to supply our growing field readily and properly, and under our own supervision and control. There is no sound reason, for instance, why the hymn books for our Western Church should not be published in our own office. And we think the time has fully some when our Board should take into consideration the propriety of issuing an English Edition of the Heidelberg Catechism, with the proof texts printed in full. At any rate we think the Board of Publication should keep this end steadily in view, and whenever it can be done without incurring pecuniary risks, they should not hesitate to issue such works.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That the thanks of this Synod be returned to the Editor and Publisher of the CHRISTIAN WORLD for his enterprise in pushing forward the permanent establishment and

increased circulation of our Church Paper.

2. Resolved, That the CHRISTIAN WORLD be commended to the confidence and support of the Church, and since it is now on a fair basis, and is eminently a paper that meets the wants of the Church, and is generally read with interest and profit by the people, we urge that every exertion should be used to still further increase its circulation, and so also its means of usefulness.

- 3. Resolved, That this Synod expects the paper by its growing patronage and circulation to become a tower of strength in defense of the well-established historical doctrines and usages of the German Reformed Church.
- 4. Resolved, That to increase the efficiency of our paper, it is deemed highly desirable to enlarge as rapidly as its means will allow the amount of its Editorial and original matter.

# Beneficiary Education.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF BENEFICIARY EDUCATION.

This Board held its annual meeting on the 26th of June, 1867, at Tiffin. The Rev. L. H. Kefauver was elected President; Rev. T. P. Bucher, Secretary; and Prof. R. Good, Treasurer. There are at present twenty-seven beneficiary students in our College and Seminary. Three of these are supported by the "Boston Board of Education," leaving twenty four to be provided for by our Church Board.

Although the amount paid into the Treasury exceeds that of evious years by several hundred dollars, still it is in debt 3.82. In addition to this, there will be required about \$550 meet the appropriations up to the close of the summer term

the college and seminary.

Special efforts have been made during the year to collect ads to supply the demand in this direction. A circular was dressed to all the pastoral charges throughout the Synod. sides many to private individuals, which received favorable sponses in some instances, while in others it failed. The burch must either increase her contributions to this cause, or Il some of the beneficiary students to withdraw from the Board,

d seek aid from some other quarter.

The field still grows whiter for the harvest, and if parents, essed with an abundance of this world's goods, will not educate eir sons for the ministry, to reap this harvest, the church has alternative than to seek out worthy young men in her comunion, and educate them for this important work. We should, erefore, not only "pray the Lord of the harvest that he will nd forth laborers into his harvest," but also do something at they may be properly qualified for the responsible work, Respectfully submitted,

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Beneficiary Education would beg leave to let the following report:

We have carefully examined the report of the President, and so that of the Treasurer of the Board of Education; the only spers submitted to our consideration. From these documents, appears that during the past year the Board has had twenty-ven students under its care; twenty-four of whom have been ovided for by the Board, the remaining three being sup-

ported by the Boston Board of Education." It also appears that the income of beneficiary funds during the year from all sources has been \$1,678.05; the outlay \$1,771.87; thus leaving a balance due the Treasurer of \$93.82. The amount of the permanent fund is \$325, of which the amount of \$300 is invested in Government Bonds. We further learn that in addition to the above mentioned deficiency in the Treasury of \$93.82, there will be needed to cover the expenses of the scholastic year soon about to close the amount of \$550.

To facilitate the benovolent operations of the Church in the direction of Beneficiary Education, we would recommend to

Synod the following action:

1. Resolved, That we authorize the Board of Education to make a temporary loan to cover the total deficiency of the pres-

2. Resolved, That in the opinion of this Synod at least \$3,000 should be raised for the cause of Beneficiary Education during the coming year; and that the Classes and Ministers be requested

to keep this aim steadily in view.

3. Resolved, That, in addition to the above recommendation. we respectfully request the members of the Synod of the North-West, as well as other friends of the Beneficiary cause beyond our bounds, to help forward this good work under our care by their prayers and their material aid.

4. Resolved, That we again urge upon the several Classes the necessity of keeping before the people the duty of consecrating

their sons to the work of the Gospel Ministry.

### ARTICLE XX.

### Miscellaneous.

#### EXCHANGE OF DELEGATES.

The following resolutions respecting our exchange of delegates with the Eastern Synod and the Synod of the North-West were offered, but as there was a diversity of opinion about the propriety of passing them at this Synod, action on them was deferred to the next Synod, and the attention of the Synods referred to, called to the subject, so that there may be harmony of action.

WHEREAS, the plan of union entered into 1842, between the Ohio Synod and the Synod of North America, and which provided for a mutual interchange of delegates, has been superseded be any warrant in the Constitution for the continuance of this trangement in its present form; and whereas such arrangement is likely to become a great pecuniary burden on the Church in

onsequence of the growing increase of the Synods:

1. Resolved, That we elect no further delegates to the Eastern synod, or the North-Western Synod, believing that all the beneits of the former arrangement have been fully met by the formation of the General Synod, and on special occasions can be met by the appointment of special commissioners, who shall have the right only of Advisors Members.

2. Resolved, That the Eastern Synod and the Synod of the

North-West be kindly requested to agree with this action.

## NEW STANDING RULE.

The following Standing Rule was adopted:

In addition to a Board of Visitors, Synod shall annually elect Board of Education, consisting of five members, whose duty it shall be to superintend the educational operations of the Church. The Professors in the Theological Seminary shall ex-officio be members of this Board. This Board shall annually report to synod.

#### PUBLICATION OF THE MINUTES.

The Stated Clerk was instructed to have 1,400 copies of the Minutes published in the English, and 700 in the German language. He was also authorized to secure some one to translate them into the German.

### THE DELEGATES FROM THE EAST AND FROM THE NORTH-WEST.

The Delegates from the East and from the Synod of the North-West, each took his leave of the Synod with appropriate remarks, expressing the pleasure they had by their presence and their participation in the transactions of the Synod, and gave assurances of the kind and fraternal feelings of the Bodies they represented. Their remarks were responded to by the President, who, in the name of the Synod, expressed the pleasure experienced by their presence, and assured them of the interest felt in the success and prosperity of their respective Synods.

### VOTE OF THANKS.

On motion it was resolved, That we tender our sincere thanks to the members of the Reformed Congregation and citizens of Shelby and vicinity, for the kind hospitality with which they intertained the Synod during our stay in their midst, and that

the Paster Loci be requested to read this resolution from the pulpit at his next regular appointment.

### PAY TO THE SEXTON.

The Treasurer of the Synod was authorised to pay ten dollars for services rendered by the Sexton, and printing tickets.

### BAILBOAD PASSES.

Rev. T. P. Bucher was appointed to secure, if possible, free return passes for the members of Synod on the different Railroads over which they paid full fare in coming. He reported subsequently that no road granted the favor.

### ARTICLE XXI.

### CLOSE AND ADJOURNMENT.

Delaware, Ohio, having been selected as the place of the next annual meeting of Synod, and the first Wednesday after Whitsuntide, in the year of our Lord, 1869, as the time; it was, on motion,

Resolved, That we adjourn to the above named time and place.

The Synod adjourned on Monday afternoon, the 8th of June, after a pleasant and harmonious session. The Minutes were read and approved; the roll called and all the members were found present, except such as had been excused. The Synod was closed with prayer by Rev. D. Winters, and the Apostolic Benediction by the President.

It gives us pleasure to state that all the rooms have been, and still are, occupied by worthy and promising young brethren who will be, with the help of God, of great service to the Church. But, instead of twelve, we ought to be able to accommodate twenty-five or thirty young men, and for this reason the front building ought to be erected, which can, however, not be done without the necessary means.

Resolved, 4. That the charges of Rev. J. W. Hamm, the German Church of Akron, and the German minister of Massillon shall constitute exceptions to the above defined boundary, and that the ministers of said charges shall continue to hold their connection with the St. John's Classis.

Resolved 5. That we mutually recommend to our assumption Classis.

Resolved, 5. That we mutually recommend to our respective Classes the adoption of the above recommendations, and to unite in requesting Synod to

sanction the same, and constitute the boundaries as herein defined.

Sandusky Classis asks Synod for change of name, and offers the following memorial to Synod:

WHEREAS, The Sandusky country no longer constitutes any portion of our territory, so that the title-Sandusky-to us is without significance; there-

Resolved, 1. That our name be changed to that of Tuscarawas. Resolved, 2. That we pray Synod to sanction and confirm the same.

Adopted.

3. Tiffin Classis requests the publication of the Minutes of Synod at an earlier date.

Adopted.

4. Iowa Classis inquires of Synod why it was not furnished with its portion of Minutes of Synod; and requests that the proper officers of Synod send to each minister of Iowa Classis his stated portion of Minutes.

Adopted.

5. Westmoreland Classis respecfully requests to be excused from contributing to Synod's Invalid Fund; assigning as the reason their provision for invalid ministers within their own bounds.

Adopted.

6. Whereas, Westmoreland Classis has literary institutions within its own bounds; and whereas, all its theological students are pursuing their studies in Eastern institutions, therefore, said Classis respectfully requests to be relieved from contributing to the pecuniary support of the Theological Seminary at Tiffin, as enjoined by Synod's action.

Adopted.

7. Westmoreland Classis requests to be relieved from Synod's requisition -- circulate the Uhristian World, giving as the reason for said course the Christian World's antagonism to the doctrines of General Synod.

A special committee, consisting of G. W. Williard, D. D., D. Van Horne and Elder J. Cort, was appointed to prepare a minute on this item, whose report was as follows:

Resolved, That we disapprove of the action of the Westmoreland Classis, in deciding that the Christian World, the organ of this Synod, is in antagonism to the General Synod on the fundamental principles of Reformed Theology; thus attempting to define the position of this body itself, and thereby showing its disrespect to this Synod which is the higher judicatory.

Adopted without a dissenting voice.

8. Westmoreland Classis requests Synod for dismissal, for the purpose of uniting with Clarion, St. Paul's and West New York Classes, of the Eastern Synod, so as to unite in petitioning General Synod for the formation of a District Synod out of the above-mentioned Classes.

Adopted.

9. St. John's Classis earnestly requests the publishing of the Minutes at an earlier date than heretofore.

Adopted, and the attention of the Stated Clerk called to this subject.

### SUBJECTS REFERRED TO CLASSIS.

1. Whereas, the records of Sandusky Classis show the payment of the Invalid Fund within a small amount; and whereas, Synod charges said Classis with an indebtedness of \$58, Synod is informed that the said indebtedness is more fully paid than the amount demanded, p. 256, and instructs the Treasurer of Classis to make final settlement.

Sandusky, Miami and Lancaster Classes adopt Synod's instructions to carry on its missionary operations through the General Missionary Board.

Adopted.

5. Illinois Classis desires to carry on its operations in its own way, as hitherto.

Adopted.

6. Iowa Classis desires to carry on its missionary operations through its own Classical Board, and instructs said Board to make the necessary arrangements to report through the Treasurer of the General Board of Missions.

Adopted.

### ARTICLE XI.

### APPEALS.

The items 1, 2, 3 and 4 of the report of the Committee on Minutes of Classes, under the head of Appeals and Complaints, were referred to a special committee consisting of Revs. S. B. Leiter, J. H. Good, P. C. Prugh, G. H. Johnson and Elder J. Ryder.

The Committee in submitting their report announced that they were divided in their apprehensions of the subject committed to them. The majority of the Committee presented the following report:

In the case of Appeal of Rev. Geo. Rettig and others against the action of Iowa Classis with reference to the reception of Rev. C. Cort, your Committee, without expressing any opinion on the merits of the case itself, would report that they have found in order only so much of the Appeal as relates to the justice and constitutionality of the action of Classis in the circumstances of the case, and give it as their opinion that nothing in the nature of a process or trial against Rev. C. Cort is in order at this time. A process and trial can not be instituted by the Synod into whose bounds he may have come, but such process and trial can be instituted only by the Classis, in the first case, to which he has been dismissed (see Sec. II. Art. 53); and that in presenting their evidence and arguments both the appellants and the counsel for Iowa Classis shall confine themselves strictly to the merits of the Appeal itself. Your Committee recommend that after the documentary and verbal evidence has been presented, both parties shall have one hour for argument, the appellants to open the case, and the time to be distributed by the parties themselves. When the arguments are concluded the votes shall be taken by the Synod without discussion.

1. The Committee furthermore recommend that the Ap-

peal No. 2 be taken up in the following order:

(a) The minutes of Classis, the letters of the candidates, and such other evidence as the parties may desire, shall be read and given. (b) The appellants shall have fifteen minutes to open. (c) The respondents shall have thirty minutes in which to reply. (d) The appellants shall be permitted to close with fifteen minutes. (e) The vote shall be taken without discussion.

- 2. The Committee furthermore recommend that the items referring to irregularity of action in that Classis is charged in taking action on subjects not included in the call for the special meeting, be referred to the Committee on Classical Minutes.
- 3. And the Committee further recommend that all the items, complaints and documents, referring to the application of the candidates for examination and licensure, be referred to the Committee on Examination and Licensure for decision, as to whether the examination shall proceed or not.

That the case be opened by the appellants, and that for this purpose they be allowed thirty minutes. (4.) That they be responded to by the Committee of Classis for eixty minutes. (5.) That the appellants be permitted to reply for thirty minutes. (6.) When they have concluded the vote shall be taken without any discussion upon the appeals and specifications.

2. The Committee further recommend that Appeal No. 2

be taken up in the following order:

(1.) The minutes of Classis, the letters of the candidates, and such other evidence as the parties may desire, shall be read and given. (2.) The appellants shall have fifteen minutes to open. (3.) The respondents shall reply for thirty minutes. (4.) The appellants shall be permitted to reply for fifteen minutes. (5.) The vote shall be taken without discussion.

3. The Committee further recommend that all the items referring to irregularity of action in that Classis is charged with taking action on subjects not included in the call for the special meeting, be referred to the Committee on Classi-

cal Minutes.

4. And the Committee further recommend that all the items, complaints and documents referring to the application of the candidates be referred to the Committee on Examination for decision, as to whether the examination shall proceed or not. Respectfully submitted,

In this connection the following preamble and resolutions were offered and adopted:

WHEREAS, An appeal has been taken from the action of this Synod in adopting the report laying down the order

to be observed in considering the Appeals of Rev. G. Rettig,

and others, from the action of the Classis of Iowa.

Resolved, That Revs. J. H. Good, D. D., Geo. W. Williard, D. D. and I. H. Reiter, be appointed a Committee of Synod to defend the action of this Synod before the General Synod.

Resolved, That in consequence hereof, further action upon these Appeals of G. Rettig and others be postponed until

the next meeting of the Synod of Ohio.

### ARTICLE XII.

### EXAMINATION AND LICENSURE.

The Committee on Examination and Licensure report: .

That four applicants, J. J. Janett, John Ardueser, E. F. Augustus Schade and Carl G. Ziph, recently under the tuition of Rev. Geo. Rettig, of Dubuque, were referred to it for examination. In the case of E. F. A. Schade and Carl G. Ziph, who were resting under some implied censure on the part of Iowa Classis, the Committee, to whom the case was referred for decision, by the action of Synod, having read the papers bearing on the matter, and heard statements from different members of Classis, resolved to admit these two gentlemen to examination.

The Committee examined the applicants in Dogmatics, Church History, Homiletics and Catechetics, the principal branches taught in our Seminary, and required by the Constitution of the Church, and are pleased to say that the ex-

amination was satisfactory.

On motion, the four brethren were placed under the care of Iowa Classis.

### ARTICLE XIII.

### RELIGION AND MORALS.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Statistics presented their report, which was adopted:

### Beloved Brethren in the Lord:

Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ, and from the Comforter the Holy Ghost. Amen.

Through the kind guardian care of our Heavenly Father, we, as an ecclesiastical body, have again been permitted to assemble ourselves in annual session to recount the mercies of our Lord, to review our labors of love, and to unite our hearts and voices in rendering praise unto God for his manifold goodness.

From the several reports of Classes placed in our hands, it appears that we have much cause for gratitude to God for both temporal and spiritual blessings; and for the general progress and prosperity of the interests and enterprises of the Reformed Church within our Synodical bounds.

Outwardly considered, our borders are enlarging, and new and promising territory is being taken possession of. "Waste places" and neglected points are being sought ought and occupied. New houses of worship have been erected and consecrated; old ones remodeled and beautified; and others are either being planned or in course of erection. New congregations have also been organized and old ones reconstituted.

Inwardly contemplated, it may be stated that there have been no extraordinary manifestations of the Spirit, yet, in view of his abiding presence with the Church, his sanctifying power has been experienced, to the peace and joy of the heart, the deepening of piety, the growth of the Church and the quickening of Christian life and activity.

But, more particularly and broadly, the internal state of a Church at any given time will mainly depend upon the nature of the general Church spirit and life that are existing in the communion. For the blessing of God always rests upon the Church when she comes up to the proper measure of her duty and her privileges. The founding of the Reformed Church in the West was commenced (and for a while carried forward) by pioneer ministers, who inherited in a traditional way much of the original spirit of the age of the Reformation. They were churchly, faithful to the

customs of the Church, to catechisation, to the use of the means of grace; and they sought for growth in the new life, through the appointed ordinances of the Church. deep antipathy to the errors and corruptions of the Popish system, and far removed from the disease of ultra High Churchism, they were yet equally removed from the errors of the opposite extreme—from sectarianism, new measurism, and unchurchism, in all its forms. But, through influences incident to a new country, and originating from outside of our Church, a period of considerable fermentation succeed-Nearly a quarter of a century has now elapsed since the highly necessary work of establishing Literary and Theological Institutions, Church papers and Church enterprises of various kinds was commenced; and the great and blessed results of developing the original life of our Church, and of overcoming foreign influences, are now apparent throughout all our borders, and in the reports of the Classes generally.

On the one hand, we have fairly outgrown the unchurchly spirit. We recognize the value of the historical "Church of the living God." The disease of sectarianism, with all its symptoms of subjectivism, has lost its vitality. We are an aducational Church, attached not only to the Heidelberg Catechism and its well-tried doctrines in the historical sense of the Fathers, but to the system of catechisation, of churchly worship, and of the order of salvation, as understood by the

Fathers of the Reformation age.

And while this is the case on the one side, we have reaions for devout gratitude to God that we have been measarably saved from falling in the opposite and worse extreme. For the history of the Church proves that no state an well be worse than where a Church, proud of her mere hurchliness, and holding on to her outward forms only, and seing satisfied thereby, neglects and contemns the inward vork of the Spirit in calling forth and preserving vital re-The reports of the Classes and the state of our conregations prove that we have lost no confidence in the scripural conception of religion, as revived in the Confessions of the Reformation period, and especially of the Heidelberg Latechism. The Reformed Church of the West has no idea hat the work of the Reformation, either in the sphere of loctrine, government, or worship, was incomplete and deective, and it is now necessary greatly to modify the riginal principles of that movement. We have the presyterial and scriptural organizations of the Church, wherein he rights of the elders, deacons, and private members, as rell as the ministers, are not only theoretically but pracically recognized, and the effort is constantly made to call orth and maintain a healthful and vigorous congregational life. We rest upon the doctrines of grace, the central position of the atonement, of justification by faith, and of the sacraments as the seals of the covenant of grace. And we think we do not err in saying that a healthful liturgical spirit, such as was embodied in the Liturgies of the age of the Reformation, is the ruling spirit in our midst. For proof of this, we point to the fact that the Western Synods have for six years been engaged in the preparation of a Liturgy, based upon the Reformation conception of a Liturgy, and that not only almost the entire body of our churches await this work with anxiety, but not a single voice has been raised in opposition to the propriety of the preparation of such a work. The chieffestivals of the Church, such as Christmas, Easter and Whitsunday, we recognize heartily and almost unanimously observe, though not in such a form as to make an idol of the Church year, and to exalt the institutions of men to a par with the institutions of God.

Moreover, we congratulate the Synod upon the very general harmony that exists among us in respect to doctrine, government and worship, not only throughout our own churches, but also the churches of our sister Synod of the Northwest.

The ordinances of divine appointment are generally appreciated, and the attendance upon the means of grace is commendable. The word is faithfully preached, and the sacraments are regularly administered. Family religion is spoken of as being on the increase, but there are still many families where Christian nurture and religious instruction are much neglected, and where the voice of prayer and praise is not heard! The Sunday-schools, existing in connection with many of our congregations, are mostly in a good condition and carried forward with happy results; and the Catechism has been introduced with profit in many of them.

We have a great work to accomplish, and we have not only a number of vacant congregations, but a wide and inviting field before us. The Macedonian cry, "Come over and help us," is heard from different points. The harvest is truly plenteous, but the laborers are few. Our trust and help are in God. Let us have confidence in our well-tried educational, churchly system; and as the Lord has hitherto blest us, brethren, let us take courage, labor faithfully, fulfill a good mission, and stand firmly by the landmarks our fathers set us.

In conclusion, we regret to report that during the past year, Licentiate Frederick Moyer, one of our most promising and devoted young brethren, just ready to enter upon the practical duties of the ministry in an important charge, was suddenly called away by death. The ways of Providence are mysterious, and it becomes us to be resigned to the divine will. He has gone on before to his rest, having exchanged the cross for the crown. Let us all be ready also, for in an hour when we think not, we may hear the cry, "Behold, the Bridegroom cometh!"

Nothing has occurred during the year to make our report of special interest to the Synod. The professors' salaries have been promptly paid. The property of the Seminary remains, since the last meeting of Synod, unchanged. Through the earnest efforts of our worthy Treasurer, some of the notes and bonds falling due have been collected and judiciously invested; and with the same earnest effort in the future, that has been given to this subject in the past, our Theological Seminary may be kept entirely free from embarrassment.

We would, however, call the attention of Synod to the necessity of completing, as soon as possible, the endowment scheme, so that the burden of keeping the Board free from debt may not continue to rest upon the few charges that have always shown themselves willing to work for our institutions.

The Board feels that too much credit can not be given to its Treasurer for his untiring and efficient efforts in collecting interest on notes, and in urging pastors to the dis٠,

charge of their duty in lifting special collections for the immediate use of the Seminary.

## REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE.

From the papers placed in our hands, we learn that the professors in the Seminary have been faithful in the discharge of their duties, and that the students have made proficiency in their studies, and are, for the most part, commended by the professors for their diligence and Christian deportment.

The number of the students in the Seminary, during the current Synodical year, is twenty, some of whom have already left, and are now engaged in the active duties of

the ministry.

By the untiring efforts of the Treasurer, the salaries of the professors have been fully paid, with prospects that, by similar efforts, the same may be done in the future. The prospects for our school of the prophets look more encouraging now than at any former period in its history.

The Synod, at its last annual meeting, suggested a course of studies to the Board, which met their approval, was also

and opted by the Seminary faculty, and is now recommended by the Board to this Synod for adoption.

Resolved, That Synod adopt the course of studies suggested to the Board at its last annual meeting.

## ARTICLE XIV.

## HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

The documents appertaining to this subject are:

## 1. REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTERS.

The undersigned present the following report of the state and condition of Heidelberg College in order that the Synod may see how the Board has fulfilled the trust committed to its care. As the collegiate year will not close before the 29th of June, at which time the Board will hold its regular annual meeting and balance its accounts, it will not be possible to give a full statement of the receipts and expenditures for the present year. As these will not vary much from those of last year, we will here state that the receipts of the contingent fund, ending June 24, 1868, were \$3,887 22, whilst the disbursements were \$4,606 47; leaving a balance against the Treasury of \$719 22. This deficiency, it may be proper to state, arose mostly in consequence of the Board having during the year paid a portion of the old debts of the college. It is believed that the deficiency will be mostly, if not altogether, made up during the present year.

The Agent, H. Leonard, has been indefatigable in his work, and has met with encouraging success, as his report to Synod will show. It is a matter of congratulation to the Board, and will doubtless be such also to the Synod, that the financial condition of the college is improving. The endowment has been increased very considerable during the last three years, during which time the Board has met all the current expenses of the institution.

Not wishing to incur any debt the Board has not appointed any additional professors during the year, but has, in connection with the Faculty, employed tutors for the lower classes, which arrangement we are pleased to say has worked well and given general satisfaction. The professors

have willingly performed a very large amount of labor, at low salaries, in view of the comparatively small income of As soon as the finances will justify, the the institution. Board will increase the teaching force, and so relieve the professors of some of their extra labor.

The attendance during the year has been very encouraging, there having been 182 students enrolled, as will be

seen by the catalogue which accompanies this report.

It is to be regretted that so many of those who have given notes for the endowment of the college fail to pay the interest accruing thereon. It is in consequence of this that the Board is embarrassed as it is for the want of funds. Were all the interest punctually paid as it becomes due, the college might be made much more efficient. As it is a very large number of students are on scholarships, and a considerable portion of the endowment unproductive, so that the income of the institution is comparatively small, which makes it necessary for the Board to exercise great economy, not to incur any debt. If the Synod could in any way aid the Board in the collection of its dues, scattered all over the Church, it would be very gratifying. Much of the time of the Agent will necessarily be consumed in the cellection of the college dues. We ask for him, in his selfdenying and laborious work, a cordial welcome.

The Board is also pleased to inform the Synod that a house for the President of the college has been erected during the past year, on the campus, well-adapted to the purpose for which it is intended. This has been accomplished wholly by the President of the college, who has, by appeals, and visits in different pastoral charges, raised more than half of the funds necessary for this improvement. The balance will have to be raised hereafter, as the endowment is too small to allow any funds to be taken from it for such The Board would commend the enterprise to the purposes. Synod, with the hope that wherever an effort is made for this desirable purpose a liberal response will be given.

For an account of the operations of the Agent, H. Leonard, the Board refer Synod to the report which he will make, in accordance with his usual custom.

Another dear brother, without my soliciting him first to do so, said: "I want to give you two hundred dollars in addition to the one hundred paid some time ago, so as to secure a perpetual scholarship."

I have the pleasure now to state that this came to hand while here at this meeting. There seems to be a growing feeling in this direction, that is, to give again.

I am glad to find that the people are growing more and

more in favor of Heidelberg College.

I have great reason to be thankful to God for the continued good health which I am blessed with. And my heart feels to rejoice that I have reason to believe that I have the confidence of not only the ministers of the Gospel, but also the membership in general. And I pray God that it may never be said that I have proved untrue to my calling.

May the good Lord keep and preserve me by his Almighty power to go forth in his fear, and enable me to continue in the work assigned me thirteen years ago by the

Church.

I traveled, during the year, five thousand one hundred and seventy-six miles; of this I traveled one hundred and forty-four miles on foot. Total miles traveled since the 22d day of January, 1857, is forty-seven thousand nine hundred and forty-four.

I have three requests to make: First, Brethren, remember me in your prayers. Second, Let all the ministers aid.

## 4. STANDING COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

٧.

The Committee on Heidelberg College beg leave treport that they have considered the items contained in th reports of the President and Agent of the College, and the Boards, and are gratified at the result. Though the at tendance and the finances did not appear to be in a prosperous a condition as they were at the time of last year's report, still, when the matter was more fully investigated, it was found that there was no material decrease There has been a smaller attendance in the primary department, but not in the College proper. And as this primary department is dependent upon local patronage and so is liable to fluctuation, the Committee consider that this is no evidence of lack of success in the Institution. On the other hand, the attendance in the College proper shows slight increase over that of last year. And when it is remembered that the last year was one of unprecedented enlargement, it will be gratifying to the friends and patrons of the Institution to learn from this year's report that the increase was not transient, but indicated a healthy and permanent growth. The same is true with respect to the finances. As the fiscal year is not yet closed, it is impossible to forecast what the total receipts will be. But it appears upon comparison that the returns are considerably less at the present time than they were at the meeting of

the last Synod. But as the future financial condition of the Institution must be decided by the new endowments secured each year, there is good ground for encouragement. Through the exertions of the faithful and experienced Agent the endowment has again been increased upward of eight thousand dollars. To obtain this he has traveled far and labored hard, as his report will show. And he has endured many things not set forth in his written statement, which might be sufficient to discourage a less determined and faithful solicitor.

The Committee desire to express their approval of the management of the College as it is set forth in these reports. The College has never, in its previous history, enjoyed the prosperity that it has attained during the past two years. A few more years of earnest effort and the Institution will be placed upon a firm basis, and all doubts in reference to

its permanent success will be set aside.

It is to be noted that Heidelberg College is not sustained by the munificence of a few wealthy men; it is the Institution of the Synod and the Classis, and the congregations own the stock. Many hardly earned and "widows' mites," consecrated by faith and prayer, have, in the main, filled the treasury, and these engage the continued interest of its friends. Still there is more to be done. The President and Agent both request that the Synod lend assistance in collecting the dues scattered all over the Church. And there is still opportunity before the close of the fiscal year to increase the receipts, so that the income may be as great as is was in the year 1868. Therefore, the Committee suggest the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved, That we indorse the management, and are greatly encouraged at the prospects of our College at Tiffin, and recommend its appeals to the ministers and churches of this Synod.

Resolved, That we extend our thanks to Agent Henry Leonard, and pray for his safety and success; while we will regard his requests in respect to the assistance he needs in his work, and the introduction of the Church papers into every family.

Resolved, That to the best of our ability we will aid in the collection of College dues, and labor for the enlargement of the Endowment Fund.

## ARTICLE XVI.

## EDUCATION.

## 1. GENERAL REPORT.

The Board of Education called a meeting on the 24th of June, 1868. The following officers were elected: Rev. L. H. Kefauver, President; Rev. S. C. Goss, Secretary; and Prof. R. Good, Treasurer.

There were several meetings of the Board held during the year, for the purpose principally of receiving new applicants, and arranging for the payment of appropriations.

The whole number of beneficiary students that have received aid from the Board during the present year is twenty-three. In addition to this number, three more have been added recently that have not yet received assistance. And if the means could be had, the list of beneficiary students might be greatly increased. The Board has been compelled to turn a deaf ear to some applications that have been made.

The Treasurer's Report that accompanies this will give a statement of the finances of the Board.

At the close of the present college session, which will take place in the latter part of June next, \$600 more will be required in order to meet the appropriations. Unless the Church comes up to the help of the Board, its work must be necessarily limited to a smaller sphere of usefulness than at present. The Synod should take such measures as will not only relieve the Board of its embarrassment, arising from a depleted treasury, but also place at its disposal the means by which to enable it to take under its care other indigent young men that have the ministry in view.

## 3. REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Committee on Education respectfully report:

That the only documents placed in their hands are the

That the only documents placed in their hands are the reports of the President, Rev. L. H. Kefauver, and the Treasurer, Rev. R. Good, of the Board of Education. From the former it appears that the Board has had twenty-three young men under its care during the year, and has recently taken three more, making the present number twenty-six; that the want of funds has prevented the Board from receiving other young men who would give their attention to the ministry, if they could be assisted in their preparation for the work; and that about \$600 will be necessary to meet the obligations of the Board at the end of the present collegiate year.

From the report of the Treasurer we learn that the receipts of the Treasury for this special object during the year from collections and individual contributions, were \$1,440 87, which although a larger amount than usual, is

not sufficient to meet the obligations of the Board.

From these statements, although in some respects encouraging, it is apparent that the Church is not sufficiently awake to the importance of the cause of beneficiary education. The great scarcity of ministers in view of the vast territory and wants of the Church gives special importance to this department of benevolent operation; for should we fail to raise up a ministry in the course of a few years to supply our many vacant charges, together with the vast missionary field that stretches out before us, the Church will necessarily suffer serious loss. Hence new interest should be awakened in this cause, and the means provided for the support of every pious indigent young man that is willing to give himself to the work of preaching the Gospel. The Church is doubtless able to provide the means if only all will do their duty. The reason why we fall so far short in our funds for this object, is because there are so many members and congregations that do nothing for it. It is certainly and to be under the necessity of reporting such dereliction of duty on the part of some of our old and established charges for severel years in succession. This is not as it should be, and requires the special attention of Syned, so that measures may be adopted, if possible, to enlist the interest and liberality of our people generally. If we could only secure an average contribution of fifty cents from each member, within the bounds of this Synod, the Board would be enabled to enlarge its operations greatly, and might thus soon provide a ministry adequate to our wants.

Your Committee would, in view of these things, recom-

mend the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That this Synod indorse the course of the Board in its management of the educational interests of the Church during the past year.

2. That we continue our efforts and prayers that the great Head of the Church may incline the heart of many more of our pious, indigent young men to devote themselves to the ministry .

3. That the different Classes be requested to take such action at their approaching annual meetings as will be calculated to create a more general interest in reference to this cause, and give all our people by some feasible plan an opportunity to contribute to this object, so that the necessary fundament of the provided to enable the Board to enlarge its operations.

4 That the report of the Treasurer of the Board be incorporated in the proceedings of Synod, so that those who have given to this object may see that their contributions have been properly applied.

Resolved. That we instruct the different Classes of this Synod to take such measures at their next annual meetings as will tend to awaken a more lively spirit for this cause, and secure such material aid to it as will raise the work above its present crippled condition.

Resolved, That we would especially remind each individual minister of the Ohurch that by virtue of his office and position in the Ohurch he counts to feel himself morally bound to do all in his power to assist the General Board, in whose judgment and operations we have full confidence, to carry on this great work in the most successful manner. ## ARTICLE XVIII.

## PUBLICATION.

## 1. REPORT OF THE BOARD.

The Board of Publication appointed by the last Synod have transacted no special business during the past year. But a single meeting was held, at which only three members were present, viz: Rev. S. Mease, Elders A. H. Baughman and V. C. Tidball. From a report of the Editor of the Christian World, Rev. T. P. Bucher, the following facts respecting the paper were gathered: Its total circulation amounts to 4,472, which is a gain over last year of 254 subscribers. In the early part of the year there were some falling off in subscriptions. The controversies existing at the time occupying so large a space in the paper exerted an unfavorable influence upon its circulation. But the present prospects are not discouraging. Since the opening of the year 1869 the number of new subscribers is in handsome excess of the number of discontinuances.

The greatest drawback upon that prosperity to which the Christian World is justly entitled, by reason of its vigorous editorial management, is the slowness with which subscriptions are paid. A larger amount of outstanding subscriptions remain on the books this year than last. The price of the paper is so small that there ought to be much greater promptness in payment. The Board are of opinion that if an arrangement were made whereby every minister became a regular agent of the paper, not only for extending its circulation, but also for collecting and forwarding the money of old subscribers, receiving a stipulated compensation therefor, it would result to the benefit of the publisher, be much more equitable than the premium system, and increase the usefulness of the paper to the Church. That the Christian World is a power for good in our Western Zion is felt by all who read its well-filled and instructive columns. Respectfully submitted,

## 2. REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Annual Report of the Board of Publication, which is hereby appended and made a part of this report, presents

some encouraging features.

The total circulation of the Christian World amounts to 4,472, being a gain of 254 over the number of subscribers of last year. The publisher manifests great energy and industry, and really publishes a very handsome sheet, and deserves great credit for having been able to place o the Church paper upon a permanent basis, under such comparatively unfavorable circumstances and surroundings.

The Board of Publication are of opinion that the Publication Cause could be materially aided by some system of appointing the ministers agents in their respective fields, a substitute for the present plan of premiums. If some good and practical plan could be devised by the Boar of your Committee believe that it would meet the gener

approbation of the Church.

The Committee are of opinion that the time has fully come when the Ohio Synod should make a decided advance in its general publication interests and enterprises. The seems to be no good reason why the profits of the publication of the hymn-books and catechisms used in the Wester Church should not inure to the benefit of the Wester Synod instead of to the Eastern Synod exclusively, as he seems the case for more than thirty years. We think the measure is one of such obvious justice that the Easter Synod if requested, would readily give its consent to the publication of these works by the Western Board of Publication.

We recommend, therefore, the adoption of the followings resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the Eastern Synod be requested, through the General Synod, to give to this Synod the right to publish or republish the hymn books and catechisms in general use in the Church.

Resolved, 2. That the Board of Publication, including the Editor of the World, be authorized, whenever they deem the step judicious, to commence collecting funds, according to such plan as they may deem judicious, for permanent Publication Fund; and to appoint an agent or agents for the collection of the same.

Recolred, 3. That we renewedly commend the Christian World to the confidence and support of the Classes and the members of the Church.

Resulted, 4. That the Editor be instructed to make the paper, as far appossible, a positive power for the inculcation and defense of the true, historical faith of the Reformed Church.

Resolved, 5. That the Board of Publication be authorized to mature and put in operation some plan for the appointment of pastors and others as agents of the publications of the Western Church.

## ARTICLE XXI.

## COMPLAINTS.

- Rev. J. Riale gave notice of his intention to complain to the General Synod of the non-admission of Rev. C. Cort as a member of this body, and of the manner in which his case was disposed of.
- Rev. J. Riale also gave notice, in another paper of similar import, of his intention to complain to the General Synod of the action of this body in Rev. C. Cort's case.

The President took from his table the following paper. bearing the date of May 24, 1869, and presented it to Synod:

The undersigned, having given notice to the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, at its morning session in Delaware. Ohio, on the 21st of May, 1869, that they would complain to the General Synod against the action in the matter of the indefinite postponement of a motion to correct the Minutes of the preceding day by inserting the following words: "The President, with the acquiescence of Synod, decided that the Rev. C. Cort could not be recognized as a member of this body until after hearing an appeal from the action of the Iowa Classis, of which notice had been given in an informal way;" also that "Rev. C. Cort gave notice of his intention to appeal from that decision to the General Synod," would respectfully submit the following as the reasons of their complaint:

1. This action of Synod violates Articles 26, 65 and 75

of the Constitution of the German Reformed Church.

2. This action of Synod served to embarrass, if not prevent, the Rev. C. Cort from bringing up the matter of his appeal to the General Synod in the regular way provided for in the Constitution. See Articles 29, 30, 36 and 37.

JOHN I. SWANDER, CYRUS Cort, D. S. Fouse, J. RIALE.

This paper was referred to a Special Committee, which subsequently made the following report, which was adopted:

The Special Committee to whom was referred the notice

of Complaint of Rev. John I. Swander and others, would report that certain facts are therein incorrectly stated.

1. In the process of organizing the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, some member announced that Rev. Cyrus Cort, from the Classis of Iowa, was present. Whereupon Rev. John Rettig, a member of Iowa Classis, arose and objected to the enrollment of his name, on the ground that an appeal from the act of the Classis receiving him was at Synod, and that the same had been already published officially in the Christian World, and appeared in the Minutes of the Classis (and was seen by the President ruled that "the Rev. Cyrus Cort could not take a seat as a regular member until after the decision of Synod in respect to the appeal."

2. Thereupon the Rev. Cyrus Cort announced that he would appeal from that decision to the General Synod. The President ruled that this appeal was out of order, at this stage of the proceedings, on the ground—1. That it was irregular to take an appeal from the decision of a President of a Synod to the General Synod, without first having taken an appeal from such a decision of the Synod; and, 2. That the Rev. Cyrus Cort was not a member of this Synod. The Stated Clerk, therefore, did not record the

appeal.

3. With reference to the complaint, notice of which is said to have been given on the 21st of May, 1869, your Committee are of opinion that no such notice of complaint was given, although something may have been said about an appeal, but not to any definite or positive form or shape.

4. The name of Rev. Cyrus Cort appears among the signers of the document containing the complaint. The Synod has repeatedly decided that Rev. Cyrus Cort is not a member of this body. This additional effort to act as a member is regarded as not respectful to the proper authority of this Synod. The fact that his name is allowed to stand on the document is not to be taken as a recognition of his right to a seat.

MINUTES.—The Stated Clerk was authorized to have 1,300 English and 700 German copies of the Minutes of Synod published.

THANKS.—Resolved, That we, as a Synod, return our sincere thanks to the citizens of Delaware for their kindness and hospitality in entertaining this body, and that the pastor loci be requested to read this resolution at his next appointment.

Resolved, That we, as a Synod, return our thanks to the Cincinnati, Columbus and Cleveland, and the Columbus, Chicago and Indiana Central, and Little Miami Railroads, for their favor in returning members of Synod over their roads

at half-fare rates.

ORDERS.—The Treasurer was instructed to pay the printing of tickets, the sexton of the church for services rendered, and the traveling expenses of the delegate to the Eastern Synod.

ABSENCES.—The Committee on Leave of Absence, through Rev. J. Heffley, Chairman, reported those who were excused, and on motion the Committee was discharged.

When we presented our last report to the Synod of Delaware, about a year ago, it was our sincere hope that during the past year not only the debt then resting on this Institution would be removed, but that we should be enabled, by additional contributions, to make preparations for the erection of the main building. But in this expectation we have been sadly disappointed. The notes which we had obtained in 1867, and which were all due on the first of Sept., 1869, are still unpaid, notwithstanding the repeated efforts to have them collected. Not being able to visit the different contributors in their distant homes, I sent the notes to a ministerial brother, a warm friend of the Home, who had given me the promise that he would cheerfully collect them, thinking that it would be easy for him to do so, because they were of small amounts, and were given by reliable Christian men. But the scarcity of money has been so great in that region of the country, that he has thus far collected only about \$50. and has assured me in several letters, that nothing more could be done before harvest, but he confidently hopes that after harvest the good friends will soon fulfill their promises.

A collecting trip during our last summer's vacation resulted in the collection of \$79.50. Financially the Institution stands now as follows:

The Board of Directors representing the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, of the Invalid Fund for Disabled Ministers, beg leave to report as follows: Our report is substantially the same as offered to the Synod of the North-West at its late annual meeting.

I. The money invested in certain grape lands in the town of Huron, O., as a home for disabled ministers of the Reformed Church, has proven to be a sad failure, for the following reasons:

1st. The moneys required to make it a success were not

furnished as promptly as they should have been.

2d. Additional expenses had to be incurred. (a) A new street had to be opened through the land. (b) Railroad bonds, given by the corporation of Huron, had to be canceled, and we had to bear our part. (c) The old house being in a dilapidated condition, a new one had to be built. Heavy interest on the remaining debt largely consumed the principal.

II. In order to meet the pressing claims of our creditors, we were compelled to sell a portion of the land, for which

we received \$550 cash. This sale is valid only on the conditions that the Synods interested give it their sanction.

III. A debt of about five hundred dollars is still resting on the property, which could be sold now for eight hundred dollars. If the present year will be a successful one in the grape culture, as appearances now indicate, we may realize more than this amount.

Your Board of Directors would ask the sanction of the sale already affected, and also permission to sell the balance of the property as soon as, in our judgment, we deem it advisable. This has been granted by the North-Western Synod as we have learned through one of the members of the Board representing her interests.

floor of this Synod.

### ARTICLE XIII.

### RELIGION AND MORALS.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Statistical

Reports, submitted their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows:

To the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States:

Brethren in the Lord,—According to the progress of "pure and undefiled religion" among men, are we to judge of the efficiency of the service rendered in our Master's cause, and also to judge of the measure of success which must attend such service in the future. It is to this end that the Church exists with all her provisions and means. From the documents placed in the hands of your Committee, and from facts known to us through other channels, we are authorized in making the following presentation of the "State of Religion" within the bounds of our Synod:

A considerable number of new congregations have been organized in different parts of our territory, which new stand in proper ecclesiastical relation with us. This fact is significant, not merely as adding numerically to our congregations and membership, but as expressive of an active zeal for the onward progress of the Church. A disposition of indifference to denominational claims has long been a matter of complaint, and certainly not without great reason. In the past it has permitted much of our material, especially in new localities or where our Church was weak in numbers and influence, to add to the strength of other denominations rather than prompt it to the establishing and encouragement of our own. This seems to be gradually counteracted. It will be in proportion as an earnest religious life and culture are awakened and disseminated. beget an attachment to the Church to which they are due and naturally excite a preference for her fellowship and a zeal for her welfare. One of the best evidences of increasing piety in the Church is Church Extension. It is necessarily followed by a reconstruction and division of Charge and Classes, all of which are recorded in the Minutes of our Classical proceedings.

We are correct in affirming that in the history of our Synod no single year was marked by so general and numerous an accession to our membership as the past. Nearly all the Classical reports speak encouragingly in view of the numbers who through the influence of the gospel have been brought to a profession of faith in Christ. Since these reports were prepared, religious interests have been still more prevalent throughout our charges, in many instances resulting in accessions of unusual numbers to the household of faith. The Lord made bare his arms, subduing the strong, giving strength to the weak, and tenderly enfolding little children as lambs of the flock. The simple but divinely ap-

pointed means which at other times seem powerless for the accomplishing of their designed purpose, were seen to be all-sufficient for awakening conviction of sin and affording comfort in believing.

We have reason to believe this gracious work has tended in no small measure to check the rising of differences in our midst, and to aid in directing all things to the end of prevailing agreement and peace. While not in every locality we can say "peace reigns supreme," yet. generally speaking, there are but few scenes and sounds of disorder and discord. Congregations and charges mostly have remained free from strifes and disagreement in spirit and council. The lesson which man is so little able to teach and so inapt to learn, towit, that good-will, peace and love are requisite to the accomplishing of God's work, grace may instill silently and irresistibly. It is gratifying that in this period of our history as a denomination we can contemplate so largely prevailing agreement respecting the doctrine and worship of the Reformed Church. To no considerable extent do we see a desire to advocate and press forward a theory or practice to the disturbing of unanimity among ministers and people. God grant that it may continue so in the future, and that difference of view, if it must exist, may be held subject to the well-being of the Church and the advancement of Christ's cause.

The increase of our ministerial force has also been consid-This is due to no great extent to accessions from other ecclesiastical bodies, but mostly to the consecration of young men to the "Ministry of the Word." Congregations have been more "fruitful in good works" in the form of sending out young men willing to assume the solemn responsibilities of the ministerial office. The presence of a proper religious character and life must show itself by directing the minds of young men to this means of usefulness in the Church. We have reason to be thankful for this favorable sign of future good, and to hope the time is past when it will be possible for congregations and charges to enjoy the services of a minister years upon years without themselves encouraging young men, gifted, educated and set apart to the work of preaching the gospel of the Son of God.

Our literary and theological institutions have made progress fully commensurate with our religious life. They are in a healthy and growing condition, which reflects much credit upon the Church, not only for its liberal contributions, but also for its increasing patronage. A large number of students are availing themselves of their advantages to acquire an education fitting them for various callings and positions of usefulness and honor. During the last year the Theological Seminary has sent out a goodly number of ministers to labor in the vineyard of the Lord, who already occupy promising and important field of usefulness. Both the seminary and college have open before them an encouraging future.

Other benevolent enterprises in the Church's work, while they have been in part sustained, have not received that increased attention which their importance demands. ficiary Education, Home and Foreign Missions, which are vital interests in the Church, have been left to languish to a degree that causes us to express our sincere regret, and to make confession of a sense of shame and guilt. Especially the few missionaries we have been able to send into the field, the manner they are left to suffer in their work, the many localities that are destitute, and the great loss of advantage entailed on the Church, ought to be sufficient to arouse at once throughout the entire Synod a zeal and liberality more becoming and corresponding to the means with which Would we could say a word sufficient to God has blessed us. remedy this screet evil of which we have to lament—unwillingness to give to the Lord.

To sum up: let us say that as a Church during the past year God has highly favored us. We have received abundantly good at his hands. Far beyond our deserts he has propered the work of our hands whereof we are glad and exceedingly rejoice. On our part much is yet lacking. Unprofitable servants are we, ever failing to come up to the measure of our privileges and responsibilities. It is our part to be better, do better, and seek by prayer the abounding mercy of God and his all-sufficient help to direct us in his service to the advancement of his kingdom among men, and

to his eternal glory.

It yet remains for us in sadness to record the fact that during the past year several of our brethren in the ministry, having finished their work on earth, have been called to their reward in heaven. The Minutes of St. John's Classis inform us of the death of Rev. John Ackeret, a faithful and efficient laborer in the vineyard of the Lord. Since the annual meeting Rev. E. F. Loeders, of the Classis of Miami, is also numbered with the departed. Just a few days before our assembling here in synodical meeting, Rev. William Witzgall, of the Classis of Tiffin, was called away to that greater assembly of the saints above. The rest of us are yet spared a little longer to bear witness among men of the grace which is in Christ Jesus. How long none can tell. Let us continue to labor till our work is done, that we, too, with joy may enter into the heavenly rest, where "the smile of the Lord is the feast of the soul."

### ARTICLE XIV.

#### THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY, .

## I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

#### 1. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary would submit the following report:

The Board convened at Dayton, Ohio, June 7, 1869, and organized by electing Rev. Isaac H. Reiter, *President*, Rev. David Van Horne, *Secretary*, and Rev. David Winters, D. D., *Treasurer*. Several meetings were subsequently held.

As regards the property of the Seminary, there have been no changes made during the year. The Students' Home remains the same as heretofore. It has been used by some of the students, but, in its present limited capacity, it can accommodate only about ten of the young men preparing for the ministry. It stands in need of additional buildings, but there are no funds at hand for this purpose. Its entire cost thus far has been about \$4,500, including the land and the improvements.

It is believed that the time has come, when the Theological Seminary, as a separate and distinct institution, should endeavor to occupy an advanced position, and when a new impetus should be given to its various interests, its vital forces, and its practical operations. It is doing a good work, but it should be placed in a position and endowed with facilities to do more. Its present accommodations in the College building are insufficient. It should have its own building. But how is this desirable object to be accomplished? There are two ways in which it may be reached:

1. A Seminary building may be erected on the lot on which the Students' Home stands, and in connection with it. In this event, the total amount of funds required for the erection of the building would have to be in some way provided by the Church, which, at present, when different interests are pressing their claims, would perhaps be difficult to accomplish. Hence, the feasibility of this plan is involved in doubt.

2. There is another plan suggested, by which a Seminary building might be erected. It is this: The whole of the Students' Home property might be sold, and the entire proceeds invested in the erection of a suitable building on the College Campus, by permission of the proper authority.

This building could be so constructed as to contain a sufficient number of recitation or lecture rooms, and, also, if deemed necessary, rooms for the accommodation of theological students. As the Students' Home is half a mile distant, which is rather too far away from the recitation rooms in the College building and as it is thought that the said property can be sold within a year or two at an advance of at least fifty per cent., this plan is regarded feasible, and is

presented to the earnest consideration of the Synod.

During the whole of the past year, for the first time in the history of the Theological Seminary, we have had the full services of two professors. This is an encouraging fact. But, as the second professorship is only endowed in part, requiring an additional amount of at least \$6 000 to complete it, the annual proceeds of our endowment fund lack about \$600 of being sufficient to meet the payments of the salaries of the professors. How is this deficiency to be made up? The Synod has requested special collections for this purpose in all our pastoral charges, but it is found that this plan is carried into effect by but few of the charges, and therefore furnishes inadequate means. Hence, during the year, it required special and laborious efforts on the part of our efficient Treasurer to pay the salaries as they became due. He did not only urge the importance of special collections, but he put forth renewed endeavors to collect the interest on notes and bonds, especially on such as were given years ago to the Seminary. Thus, through his laudable efforts, notwithstanding the difficulties in the way, the professors' salaries were paid for the last year, except about \$150, which it is hoped the Board will be able to meet before long. The plan of special collections should be continued during the next year, and its importance urged upon our congregation.

It is, however, very obvious, viewed in the light of facts and experience, that the only safe and reliable plan by which to meet the current expenses of the Theological Sem inary, is to establish a compelet endowment fund. To this end. the Board of Trustees of the Seminary, believing it to be the best and most economical plan, have formally entered into arrangements with the Board of Trustees of Heidelberg College to raise a joint endowment for the Seminary and College, to the amount of twenty-six thousand dollars, through Elder Henry Leonard as Agent, with the proviso that one fourth of all the moneys and notes collected shall revert to the Theological Seminary, and that one-fourth of the expenses of the Agent shall be deducted from the Seminary funds. This plan, it is confidently believed, will speedily secure the needed endowment. The Agent has already commenced the work, and is meeting with encourage

We have been gratified to learn, that during the past year

a liberal donation of valuable books, numbering 528 volumes, has been made to our Theological Library, by the Rev A libert Helffenstein, Jr., of North Wales, Pa. This venerable servant of the Lord and devoted friend of the Reformed C hurch, now near the close of his labors of love on earth, has felt moved by a generous Christian impulse to assist the rising generation of ministers by this excellent gift, which is very commendable on his part, and worthy of imitation others.

It is also encouraging to learn that other friends of our institutions are thinking of devising liberal things in aid of their efficiency and success. There ought to be many more ch. There is no reason why many of the comparatively rich men of our Church should not awaken to a true sense of the privilege and duty of efficiently aiding in this way in carrying out the noble spirit and practical design of the great commission of our Lord: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

It may be proper yet to state here, that the Theological Seminary has still further needs, which may not require immediate attention, but which should be kept steadily before the mind of the Synod and of the Church, namely:

1. The Theological Seminary stands in need of its own building. We have already pointed out a plan by which this

end may be probably reached.

2. The Seminary needs a Library Fund, for the regular and steady increase of its Library. The Library has been materially increased during the past year by the donation of Rev. A. Helffenstein, Jr., but, while such noble gifts are always acceptable, a permanent fund is needed, in order that a reasonable number of theological works, as they issue from the press, may be brought in reach of the professors and students.

3. The mind of the Synod and of the Church should be solemnly impressed, that the Seminary will need, at no distant time, the services of two additional professors, and therefore, also, the endowment of two additional professorships, in order to keep pace with other institutions, and with the general progress of Theological Science. It is with pleasure that we here record the fact, that the third professorship is in a fair way of being fully endowed erelong through the kind liberality of devoted friends of our institutions.

4. And above all, our Seminary needs a larger number of theological students. It is perhaps forgotten by many, that during the late war we had a very small number of students, and, therefore, but a slight increase in our ministry. Hence, since that time, there have always been many vacant charges and missions, and the more so as a large number of new congregations and charges have been organized. We

still have a number of vacant charges, and encouraging openings in new fields. And though the number of students, in the preparatory stages of education for the ministry, is now larger than ever, it appears that the number is yet insufficient. It therefore becomes a solemn question for the Synod: What can be done to increase the number of candidates for the gospel ministry, and to secure the necessary means for their support?

## 3. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF VISITORS.

The Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary, respectfully submit the following as their annual report:

A meeting of the Board was held June 30th, 1869, at which were present Revs. T P. Bucher, J. B. Shumaker, and L. H. Kefauver. T. P. Bucher was elected President, and L. H. Kefauver Secretary. At this meeting it was

Kefauver, Secretary. At this meeting it was Resolved, That the examinations of the Theological Seminary, hereafter be held on Wednesday, the last day of the Spring term, commencing at 9 o'clock A. M. and continue during the day. The Rev. J. B. Shumaker was instructed to report to the Synod the propriety of having but one term, and consequently but one vacation each year. At another meeting of the Board, held June 22d, 1870, the following business was transacted: In the absence of the President, the Rev. H. Williard was called to the chair. Mombers present, Revs. H. Williard, J. B. Shumaker and L. H. Kefauver. Having attended the examinations of the tudents in the various branches of Dogmatic and Historical Theology and Hermeneutics, the Board expressed its tisfaction with the examinations.

There have been connected with the Seminary during the year, twenty one students, only seven of whom are remaining. The others have been called to fields of labor, and are now in the ranks of the ministry. While the Board rejoices in the fact that the deman is of the Church for ministers are being met from our Seminary, it can not but regret that so many are leaving it without having complied with the requirements

Of Synod in two particulars, viz:

1. The resolution adopted by the Synod of Dayton, "That Synod should make it a rule, that all recommendations for licensure on the part of the Faculty of the Seminary should be referred to the Board of Visitors for confirmation, and that no student be allowed to enter the Seminary

without permission of the Board."

2. The time that is required of the students, in order to go over the full course of studies as prescribed by the Synod. Out of the fourteen that have been recommended for licensure by the Faculty, but three of those have been regularly dismissed by the Board. And the time that they were in the Seminary varies from six months to two years (the last but seldom reached), when the time required is two and three-fourth years.

Another evil which is very perceptible is the want of proper intellectual culture on the part of many, which doubtless results from students entering the Seminary while they are yet prosecuting their collegiate course. This evil exists to the extent that when the students graduate in the collegiate department they are almost, and, in some instances, entirely ready, in point of time, to leave the Seminary.

## II. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Standing Committee on the Theological Seminary, to whom the foregoing reports were referred, submitted their

report, which was received, and taken up item by item, and adopted.

The Committee on the Theological Seminary, to whom all the documents pertaining to this subject were referred, would present the following report:

That the past year has been one of encouragement and progress, as is evident from the report of the President of the Board of Trustees.

In reference to the above reports, your Committee would suggest the following action on the different items presented:

## 1. The Seminary Building.

Upon this point the Board proposes, as the most desirable plan, for reasons which it gives, the sale of the Students' Home, so as to secure the funds necessary for the erection of a building more conveniently situated. As this is a matter of great importance, and requires much care and consultation, your Committee recommend that it be placed in the hands of a committee of three, in connection with the Board of Trustees, to suggest such action as in their judgment will most effectually subserve the interest of the Church, and that they report at the next annual meeting of the Synod.

#### 2. The Endowment.

As the increase of the Endowment of the Theological Seminary is greatly to be desired in order that the Board may promptly meet the salary of the professors without the special collections of the Church, which should be devoted to other objects, the plan referred to in the report of the President of the Board should be indorsed by the Synod, and the Agent, Henry Leonard, recommended to the favor and liberality of the Church, in the hope that the full amount specified be speedily secured.

# 3. The New Professorship.

As the Synod has already taken action upon the liberal donation of Valentine Hay, Esq., who has generously given his obligation for a large amount (\$5 000), of the funds necessary to endow a new professorship in our Theological Seminary, your Committee deem no further action necessary than to call the attention of the wealthy portion of our membership to this subject, in the hope that others may be stimulated by this noble example to do likewise, and thus complete the endowment of this professorship at an early day.

It is gratifying to know that the Library of the Theological Seminary has been so kindly remembered during the year. As the Synod has already expressed its thanks to the donor for this timely gift, your Committee does not regard it necessary to report any further action. The interest, however, is one that should not be overlooked, as the increase of our Library has an important bearing upon the efficiency and prosperity of the institutions of the Church. It would, therefore, be desirable could there be an addition of several hundred volumes annually to the Library.

## 5. Finances.

As the report of the Treasurer gives a full account of the finances, it is hereby recommended that it be printed in full

in the Minutes of Synod.

According to the Treasurer's report, it appears that there was a deficiency in the Treasury at the time he made his report. Your Committee, however, is glad to learn that funds have since come into the hands of the Treasurer, so that he has been able to pay the Professors in full, with a balance of some twenty dollars still in the Treasury; a result very gratifying to this Synod.

# 6. Report of the Board of Visitors.

From the report of the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary, it appears that there were twenty-one students in attendance, a number of whom have been dismissed and licensed by the different Classes, and are now in the active

duties of the ministry.

From the same report, it also appears that the rule adopted by this Synod some years ago, in regard to the dismission of students from the Seminary and their recommendation for licensure, has, for reasons not necessary to refer to, not been properly observed. Your Committee, therefore, would recommend that hereafter all dismissions from the Seminary for licensure be referred by the Professors to the Board of Visitors.

# III. LIBRARY AND ENDOWMENT OF THIRD PROFESSORSHIP IN THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The following report, pertaining to the Theological Library and the Endowment of the Third Professorship in the Theological Seminary at Tiffin, was received and adopted; and then referred for further consideration to a Special Committee, consisting of Revs. D. Van Horne, H. M. Herman, and Elder A. H. Baughman:

Report of Rev. J. H. Good, D. D., on Library and Endowment:

At the meeting of the Synod of Ohio, in 1868, at Shelby, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Professors in the Seminary to raise a Library Fund, for the regular increase of the Library of the Theological Seminary.

During the first year after the passage of this resolution the way did not seem open for successful operations. But during the past year a very handsome addition to the Seminary Library has been made.

In March of the present year I received a letter from Rev. Albert Helffenstein, Jr., of North Wales, Montgomery Co., Pa., conveying the gratifying intelligence that he had made a donation of 300 volumes of valuable books to our Library. In his first letter he wrote:

"I inclose in this letter a list of books to be the property of your institution. I have long held them in reserve for that purpose, thinking that you would prize them on account of their contents and spirit. I purchased them at first with a view of aiding young men in the ministry. I now leave them to the disposal of a kind and wise Providence, for further use . . . . . I have more volumes which in due time you may expect to receive, by the permission of the great Head of the Church."

This led to a further correspondence, in which Rev. Mr.

Helffenstein expressed the liveliest interest in the prosperity and success of our Western Institutions. He also increased his donation, as intimated in his first letter. These books have now all been received, in good order, and are on the shelves of our Library. They number 528 volumes.

They are valuable works, and fill up a want that really existed in our Seminary Library. The Synod will see that they form especially a large and excellent collection of Sermons in the English language. The donation is a very liberal one, as many of the works would now be difficult to obtain at any price. It is hoped that the pious wishes of the kind donor will be reached, in the use that will be made of them by our young men preparing for the ministry. If we wish our young men to be thoroughly furnished for their work, they must have a good library at hand during the whole of their years of preparation.

It is hoped that this donation may stir up other friends, and especially ministers, not to forget that the shelves of our Theological Library are the proper place where their valuable theological works will do most good, when they themselves have ceased making use of the same.

It may not be improper to mention, in this connection, that Rev. Mr. Helffenstein is now one of our oldest ministers, having been born March 14th, 1801; that he pursued his studies in the University of Pennsylvania, graduating in the year 1820, and that he proposes devoting the means, with which a kind Providence has favored him, to the support of the institutions of the Reformed Church.

2. In addition to the above donation by Rev. Mr. Helf-fenstein, it gives me unfeigned pleasure to include in this report, although not strictly belonging to it, another most liberal donation to our Theological Seminary, by Val. Hay, Esq., of Somerset, Somerset County, Pa. Mr. Hay has for some time felt an earnest desire to aid in the great work of our Reformed Church. He has felt that a favorable time has arrived for giving a new impetus to our institutions and to the cause of education in our midst. He is anxious that our Church should not continue to move at so slow a pace, but come up more fully to the measure of her duty. He is willing to do as the Lord has prospered him. I am authorized, therefore, on his behalf, to make the following offer:

"If the Synod will establish a Professorship of Exeget-

"If the Synod will establish a Professorship of Exegetical Theology in the Sominary, and elect a third Professor to fill this post, either at this Synod or at the next annual Synod, he will obligate himself to furnish the sum, of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) toward its endowment.

paying the interest annually (\$300) until the principal be paid. And furthermore, that he will make use of every exertion, in connection with other members of the Hay connection, to obtain the full sum necessary for the endowment of the Professorship within the present synodical year. And that during the first year of the incumbency of this Professor, if the endowment be not fully made up, he will stand personally responsible for the full salary (\$900) for one year. It is his hope and expectation that in the course of the year he will be enabled to place the Professorship upon an independent basis."

The Synod will perceive, that this is the largest sum ever-contributed by any one individual to any of our institutions. That we shall ultimately need four Professors in our Seminary, to fill the Professorships, respectively, of Dogmatic Theology, Practical Theology, Historical Theology and Exegetical Theology is evident enough. Most of the Theological Seminaries of the land have this number of Professors. When one year ago the Synod succeeded in obtaining the full services of two Professors, it was little expected that the way would so soon be opened for the founding of a third Professorship. We should all greatly rejoice in this result. And if some other individual or family shall be moved to endow the fourth Professorship, within a year or two, doubtless the hearts of all would greatly rejoice.

The idea of this gift is certainly a noble one. It grows out of the conviction that the time has arrived when the Reformed Church should receive some gifts in large amounts. And this gift is in fact not from a superabundance of means but from an earnest desire to do something valuable and permanent. I earnestly hope, therefore, that Synod will not only accept this proposition, but that its influence will be such as to stir up the pure minds of others by way of remembrance, so that our different institutions and enterprises will continually grow in prosperity and power, until the Reformed Church, once small and weak and comparitively inefficient, will take the place rightfully belonging to her, as one of the pillars of our Protestant Christianity.

In this connection, it seems to me to be no more than proper to put upon record here some extracts from private letters from the donor, expressive of his teelings, sentiments, and hopes with reference to our Church, as explanatory of this donation. He remarks:

"It has been my heart's desire for some time to see our institutions at Tiffin fully endowed. I should like to see fifty ministers go out from the Seminary annually, instead of five or ten at most. We have been content to move along at a snail's pace in the past. It is time that we arouse

ourselves and throw off the lethargy that has shackled our movements. If the subject is properly presented and pressed upon our members within the bounds of the Synod of Ohio, our institutions at Tiffin can be converted into a University before three years have elapsed."

In a subsequent letter he remarks:

"I have not yet broached the subject to any of my friends, except one, that I expect to join in the project, and therefore do not know what sum they would be willing to contribute, and that is another reason why I can not at this time, fix upon the precise form of the donation. whether they join me or not, I have determined to dedicate a specific fund for the permanent benefit of the Church, not from the superabundance of my means, but because of a sense of duty to give to the utmost of my ability. It occurs to me that much more might be done in the Church if some systematic plan were pursued with regard to benevolent Many persons could and would give their operations. hundreds and thousands who give nothing worth mentioning now, were the importance of the subject pressed home upon them in the proper manner. They see calls through the Church organs, from week to week, for contributions to benevolent purposes, but they regard them as calls to the Church at large, and not to them as individuals, and in consequence nobody responds.

"Now, if instead of this impracticable mode, of operations, men could be induced to set apart a certain portion of their annual means, whether it be the Jewish portion or any other, to a specific purpose, the matter of giving would become a pleasure, instead of a burden, for then it would seem that they were living to some purpose in the world; they would have an ever present consciousness that they were instrumental in doing some good for the cause of Christ and his Church."

There are many generous and noble-hearted men in our Church, who have the welfare of the Church at heart, and would give liberally for her benefit if they were made to see, that by dedicating or setting apart a specific fund for the permanent use of the Church, the interest of which alone should be used, and the principal remain intact, that they would be the instruments in the hands of God for doing much good not only while they live to see the fruits of their labors, but after they are gone to receive their eternal reward . . . I wish your Seminary would turn out fifty ministers every year. The question of the strength or weakness of an institution rests altogether with the Church. She could have fifty students at the Seminary all the time, as well as twenty. There is a large amount of latent strength in our

Church, and whenever a systematic plan is put into operation to arouse and develop that strength, the small German Reformed Church, that in the past has been stigmatized for its smallness, will spring forth like a giant in strength.

# 2. Report of the Special Committee on Library and Endowment:

The Special Committee on the Theological Library and the Endowment of the Third Professorship in the Theological Seminary, submitted their report, which was received and adopted:

Your Committee take great pleasure in responding to the communication made by Rev. J. H. Good, D. D., stating that the Library of our Theological Seminary had increased by the donation of a large and valuable collection of books, by a venerable and beloved minister in the Church.

It is also a most welcome duty to acknowledge the commencement of the endowment of a new professorship in our Seminary, through the liberality of an Alumnus of Heidelberg College, who assures us that he expects to secure the whole amount needed for the endowment of this chair.

In view of these encouraging facts, your Committee would respectfully suggest the following resolutions for adoption

by Synod:

I. WHEREAS, This Synod has been apprised by Valentine Hay, Esq., of an intention on his part to contribute the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5.000), toward the endowment of a third professorship in the Theological Seminary; and, whereas, some action is necessary on the part of the Synod to meet his conditions; therefore,

Resolved 1. That we accept this endowment, and return

our sincere thanks to the brother for his beneficence.

Resolved 2. That a Professorship of Exegetical Theology be established, and a third theological professor be elected to this chair at the next annual meeting of Synod, in case the professorship be fully endowed.

Resolved 3. That this example of self-sacrificing benevolence be commended to the whole membership of the

Church for imitation and practical regard.

II. WHEREAS, The Rev. Albert Heiffenstein, Jr., of North Wales, Pa., has presented to the Theological Seminary at Tiffin, Ohio, a very valuable collection of books, amounting to 528 volumes of choice literature; and, whereas, this gift meets a long-felt want in our Seminary; therefore,

Resolved 1. That we receive these books and return our heartfelt thanks to Bro. Helffenstein for his timely aid to our beloved institution.

Resolved 2. That this collection of books be placed in the hands of the Librarian of the Theological Seminary, to be properly arranged and numbered for the use of the professors and students.

Resolved 3. That as our Library is still greatly in need of enlargement, we commend the generous act of Rev. Mr. Helffenstein to the notice of the ministry and membership of the Church, in the hope that many donations of books or funds may speedily follow for this most worthy object.

#### ARTICLE XV.

#### HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

## I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

## 1. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of Heidelberg College, in presenting their report to the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, do not deem it necessary to be as particular as in former years, in view of your meeting in Tiffin, where the College is located, which affords all present an opportunity to see

fer themselves the working of the institution.

The Board rejoices in the growing prosperity of the College, and the gradual improvement of its finances. All the expenses of the College were paid for the current year, with a small amount in the Treasury. The receipts on the contingent fund were \$4,985.66, of which amount \$4.808.51 were expended, including a balance of \$287.25 against the Treasury last year, leaving a balance of \$177.15 on hand for the next year.

The Board elected at its late meeting the Rev. P. Greding, of Detroit. Mich., to the Professorship of the German Language and Literature, which it is hoped will be gratifying to the German portion of the Church, as well as meet what has, for years past, been regarded as a pressing want in the institution itself. Looking at the great importance of the study of the German language and literature as it respects our Church, this must be regarded as a step in the right direction.

It is also gratifying to report that the Alumni of the College have undertaken to establish, at as early a period as possible, a professorship in the College to be known as the Alumni Professorship. Considering the interest and seal with which the Alumni have undertaken this important work, there is good reason to believe that it will be completed at no very distant day.

The Agent, H. Leonard, is prosecuting his work with

much zeal and success as will be seen by his report.

The Board, in connection with the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary, has undertaken to raise the sum of \$26.000, the one-fourth of which is to be added to the Endowment of the Seminary, and the remainder to that of the College; which, if the scheme is successful, will raise the Endowment of the College to about \$80,000, a result devoutly to be desired.

The attendance during the year was one hundred and

eighty one, according to the catalogue, a copy of which is herewith presented to the Synod. There were ten graduates at the commencement, on the 29th of June: five in the

Classical, and five in the Scientific department.

Looking at the progress which has been made during the last few years, there is much reason to hope for the future. The Board feels thankful to the Synod for its co-operation in the past, and hopes to enjoy it to a still greater extent in the future, which, with the blessing of God upon our efforts, can not fail to place our institutions, in the end, upon a solid and sure foundation, such as will realize the hopes of their friends.

### 2. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF VISITORS.

The Board of Visitors of Heidelberg College, respectfully report as follows:

The Board takes pleasure in being able to state to the Synod, that Heidelberg College is in a growing and healthy condition. The professors are laboring earnestly to increase its efficiency. The students under their charge are making progress in their studies, as is plainly manifest from their examinations and the late commencement exercises. The number of students in attendance during the past year is encouraging. From the catalogue we learn that there are eighty-five in the College proper. Thirteen of these are Seniors, seven Juniors, twenty-five Sophomores, and forty Freehmen. There are ninety-six in the Preparatory department; twenty-eight of which are in the Classical course, and sixty-eight in the English course. The number of Classical students is greatly on the increase. The total number in attendance during the past year is one hundred and eighty-one.

At the late meeting of the Board of Trustees, provisions were made for additional teaching force, which will greatly increase the efficiency of the College, and be calculated, also, to increase the number of its students. We commend the College to the prayers and sympathies of its patrons and friends, hoping that it may receive from them the patronage

it justly merits.

### 3. REPORT OF AGENT OF HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

I have the pleasure once more to report the result of my

labors for the past year.

In the first place I desire to return my sincere and devout thanks to my Heavenly Father; net only for the continued good health and success in my mission, but more especially would I try to be thankful for the comforting presence and influence of the Holy Spirit, leading and gui ding me often in a most mysterious way. Indeed, sometimes what at first would seem to be a disappointment, the Lord overrules it for good. So that I never have more precious hours than when I can put my trust in my Savior and say, "Thy will be done."

I begin to put less confidence in myself, and try to look more to the Lord to open the hearts and hands of the people. I have abundant reason for so doing, for I trust I am His servant, and called by the Church to this work; and then my past experience, too, has taught me that I must not be indolent, but must work; I try as much as in me lies to ascertain what is my duty, then go and do it. O, that I could always, by faith, lean John-like on the Master's bosom! How much easier my work would be. True, I often go and tell Him my troubles, and by so doing have found Him near.

Beloved brethren, the work is progressing. The people here and there are beginning to take more interest in

Christian and Classical Education.

When I first entered upon this work, over thirteen years ago, it was then a comparatively new enterprise. In fact, many persons then did not know but what this College might "go down;" consequently, what they paid would be lost.

But now Heidelberg is a fixed fact. And so long as our Church exists our institutions at Tiffin will live. Whether the Fisherman is "on top or underneath the ground," and when the Master calls him home, the Lord will send another into the field.

The new scheme of Rev. Dr. Williard, President of Heidelberg College, seems already to meet with favor. That is, that we, in the shortest period possible, raise \$26,000 And, according to an arrangement entered into between the two Boards of Trustees of the College and Theological Seminary, that one-fourth of this amount be for the Seminary, and three-fourths go to the College.

The brethren of the Miami Valley have the honor to lay the foundation. So far our most sanguine expectations have been realized. True, it is only a little over a month since this new "ball" has been set in motion. I found during

the past year that a number of aged persons were willing to subscribe more largely, payable after death and without interest. One of these subscriptions amounts to three thou-Three hundred dollars of this amount only is sand dollars. interest bearing.

I would again refer to the fact that the Christian World is a great help to me. It is a forerunner or messenger going

before me preparing the way.

Persons who read the Church papers are most enlightened in Church matters and more approachable. Yes; and I might say, most liberal too. The paper should be in every

family.

I traveled during the year, four thousand eight hundred and ninety miles. Total miles traveled since the 22d of January, 1857, fifty-two thousand eight hundred and thirty-

I hope that the people will welcome the Fisherman this

coming synodical year and contribute liberally.

O, that we might soon hear the glorious news that some rich individual or family would feel constrained by the love of God to endow a professorship; that is, a sum large enough, that the interest of the same would support one professor. How easy we could find a suitable name for such a big fish.

It will be seen that the amount subscribed this past year exceeds the amount of the former year, not even including

the Seminary subscriptions.

On the other hand, I have not been as successful in collecting outstanding interest this year as I was the previous Your Agent would here call the attention of ministers and elders, who might, in each Charge, take the matter in hand and put the delinquents in remembrance of this fact, and save the Agent much time and money. The sums each are, comparatively speaking, small. But then if each one would pay when due, it would relieve the different Boards of much embarrasement.

In behalf of Heidelberg, then, I return my sincere thanks to all who have remembered our College and Seminary dur-

ing the year with their liberal contributions.

In conclusion, I feel grateful to the friends and brethren for their continued confidence in my integrity, and by the help of God I shall always endeavor to maintain the same. Hoping to receive the continued prayers of the Church and good will of the people.

## II. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

The Standing Committee on Heidelberg College, to whom the several reports pertaining thereto had been referred, submitted their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows: The Committee on Heidelberg College beg leave respect-

fully to report:

That the reports of the President of the College, of the General Agent, of the Catalogue of the Institution, recently issued, personal attendance upon the examinations, and investigation into the actual condition and working of the institution, all testify to the fact of growing prosperity in this school of the Church. We have reason to feel greatly encouraged in view of the operations of the past year and the promises for the future.

The College is now twenty years old. It was commenced on a very small scale, by a Church comparatively weak, surrounded with unusual difficulties, and inspiring at the time but little confidence in its ultimate success, except in the case of those who, in faith, were looking into the future, and saw the evident indications of Providence, that the Western Reformed Church should go forward and found independent institutions. Should this not be done, it was plain that the Western portion of the Church would rapidly disintegrate and be swallowed up by surrounding churches.

Now, after a period of struggling against difficulties, of great self-denial on the part of the professors, and of perseverance on the part of both the Church and the authorities of the College, we may regard it as standing upon a stable basis. It is no longer an experiment, but an established

institution.

The College has a good property and buildings. Its endowment funds amount to about \$60,000, not all of which has, however, been paid in. It has supported five professors and teachers, and instructed one hundred and eightyone students, during the past year, without incurring any debt.

Among the gratifying facts of solid progress in the case of

our College, the following are to be noted:

1. The election of Rev. P. Greding, of Detroit, Mich., to be Professor of German Language and Literature. The filling of this professorship has long been desired from many quarters. The North-Western Synod has hesitated in the matter, because of fear of becoming involved in pecuniary liabilities. It is true that this department has not been unattended to, and that it has at times had the services of different professors and teachers; but it has been felt all along that it needed the services of one who would devote his whole and undivided time to its duties. Many, if not most of the future ministers of the German churches must here obtain their preparatory training. There is a demand for the thorough study and teaching of our noble mothertongue by a large number of our students. Although in a land prevailingly English, yet it is desired and desirable

that this study should be diffused as far as possible among all the students, as far as time will permit. The problem hitherto has been, to obtain the services of one thoroughly qualified for the post, having the full confidence of the German portion of the Church, and willing to fall in with the general design and policy of the institution. The election of Rev. P. Greding, now President of the Synod of the North-West, it is hoped, will meet all these requirements, and as there seems to be no obstacle in the way of his immediate entrance upon the duties of his office, it is confidently believed that the hopes of the Church will be realized by his election and labors.

2. The resolution of the Alumni to endow a full professorship (to be designated hereafter), is also an event of great significance. It is believed that this body has sufficient strength and sufficient force of will to carry out this project to a successful issue, at a day not distant. If so, a great deal will be gained for the institution, and it will show that

their Alma Mater lives in the hearts of her children.

3. The success which has attended the efforts of H. Leonard, Esq., thus far, in securing the sum of \$20,000 at once, for the endowment of the College, under the combined arrangement with the Seminary Board, is very encouraging. It proves that those persons and congregations who were instrumental in contributing the first of the Endowment Fund, have still a disposition to crown their original contributions and sacrifices by additional gifts, and that they will continue to aid until the work be brought to a higher measure of success.

We would, therefore, offer the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we express our gratitude to the great Head of the Church, for the manifest blessings and favors vouchsafed to this important enterprise of our Western Church.

2 That we earnestly commend our general Agent, H. Leonard, Eq., to the confidence and support of the Classes and Congregations, and request the Classes to take such action as will further him in his work.

3. That we extend the thanks of the Synod to the Alumni, for the determination at which they have arrived to endow a full professorship in Heidelberg College.

#### I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

## 1. REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education would respectfully offer the following as their annual report:

During the past year the Board had quite a number of meetings, which were held principally for the purpose of receiving applicants and making appropriations. Special efforts were made to secure funds, which met with only partial success. From the report of our Treasurer, you will learn that the Board is in debt to the amount of \$501.95. There were received during the year \$2,358.08; and paid out \$2 739.80.

In order that this debt may be canceled, the following resolution is recommended to the Synod, by the Board:

Resolved, That the Synod be requested to ask the Classes to increase their contributions to the cause of Beneficiary Education.

As the subject of systematic benevolence, in a general way, has already been referred to the Standing Committee on Education, we will offer no suggestions on the best method of meeting our financial wants, hoping that the Committee will be enabled to recommend such a plan as will result in filling the depleted treasuries of the different Boards.

In order that the different Classes, under whose care the beneficiary students have been placed, may be kept posted as to the progress they are making in their studies, and, also, in religion and morals, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the attention of Synod be called to the importance of adopting some rule, which will apply to all students that are under the care of the Board, and which shall require the Faculties of the College and Theological Seminary to report the progress and conduct of the Beneficiaries to the Classis to which they belong.

# II. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Standing Committee on Education, to whom the foregoing reports, together with a resolution on the subject of General Benevolence, were referred, submitted their report; which was received and adopted:

The Committee to whom all the documents relating to

The Committee to whom all the documents relating to the subject of Beneficiary Education were referred, would

respectfully report as follows:

5

That they have properly examined the report of the Board and of the Treasurer, and given the general subject due consideration.

As to the finances of the Board, they would suggest that the Treasurer's report be printed in full in the Minutes of Synod, in order that the Synod and the Church generally may see what has been done for this particular object.

From the report of the Treasurer it will be seen that the receipts of the Board of Education during the year were \$2,358.08, and that its disbursements were \$2,860.03, leaving a deficiency in the Treasury of \$501.95, which amount the Board had to borrow to pay the appropriations of the Beneficiary students. The Synod should, if possible, provide for this deficiency before its adjournment, so that the Board may be free from all embarrassment in entering upon a new year. Your Committee would suggest the propriety of different members of Synod voluntarily assuming the debt, or of the Synod apportioning it among the different Classes.

It is also evident, in view of this deficiency, that some action should be taken that will increase the contributions to this particular object; for should this not be the case, we will hereafter be met with the same difficulty that now stares us in the face. There is also a necessity for this, as the number of indigent young men under the care of the Board is larger than at any previous time, with the probability of still more applications at the beginning of the Fall Term of the College and Seminary. To refuse support to any worthy young men, when the Church is needing ministers so much as at present, would be a shameful dereliction of duty. The only alternative, therefore, is for this Synod to adopt such measures as will, in all probability, provide the funds necessary for this object. The Church is doubtless able to meet the demand in the case, if all will only contribute as they should. There are many individuals and congregations that give nothing at all from year to year to this cause. Were those who do nothing to give equally with those whose sympathies are enlisted in behalf of our indigent young men, the funds would be sufficient to meet all our present liabilities. It should, therefore, be the object of this Synod to awaken a new interest in this cause, and to secure such united action as will hereafter embrace the entire membership of the Church, and wipe away the reproach of non-contributing members and congregations. To secure this end, we would recommend the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved, That we commend this cause anew to the liberality and support of our people, in the hope that each member of the Church will make a contribution according to his

or her means.

Resolved, That each Consistory solicit some one of its members, or of the congregation, with whom the Board of Education may enter into correspondence whenever it may

be necessary.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Board of Education open an account with each congregation in this Synod; and that when no contribution is received from it by the close of the first of January of each year, he forward a circular to the Consistory, reminding them of the fact and exhorting them to their duty.

Resolved, That the ministers and Classes that have no definite plan of action for this cause, be requested to co-operate with the Board of Education, by forwarding to its Treasurer (Rev. R. Good, Tiffin, Ohio), the name and post-office address of some one that will act as agent in the congregation.

Resolved, That any student, who has received aid in the prosecution of his studies, shall be entitled to a credit on his obligation to the Board, equal to whatever amount he may contribute individually to this cause, or collect from his Charge.

The following resolutions are recommended to this Synod by the Board of Education:

Resolved. That the attention of this Synod be called to the importance of adopting some rule which will apply to all the students under the care of the Board, making it the duty of the Faculty of the College and Seminary to report to the several Classes the progress and conduct of the beneficiaries, whenever it may be requested by the Classes.

Resolved, That the Synod be requested to ask the Classes to increase their contributions to the cause of Beneficiary

Education.

As your Committee deem the adoption of these resolutions calculated to advance the cause of Beneficiary Education, they hereby recommend them to the favorable notice of Synod.

Hoping and praying that the great Head of the Church may direct the Synod in its deliberations to such plans as may most effectually promote the cause of Beneficiary Education, we respectfully submit the above report.

## ARTICLE XVII.

## MISSIONS.

## 1. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Standing Committee on Missions, to whom was referred item fifth in the report on Overtures, asking this Synod to co-operate with the North-Western Synod in securing the services of Rev. Dr. M. Stern as Missionary Superintendent, as well as in the missionary work in general, submitted their report, which was received, amended and adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Missions would respectfully report that the only item which came into their hands is the one from the North-Western Synod, through its delegate, asking this Synod to co-operate with them in the call of a Superintendent of Missions, and the work of Missions

generally.

We need not say again to this Synod that which it so well knows, but hardly acknowledges, that the great cause to which our Church, in the spirit of her Heavenly Father, should direct her efforts, is the work of Missions. The whole far West is reaching out to us her hands imploringly for help, while many erganized Missions, in our very midst, some of which are of much importance, not only to a part, but to the whole Church, are suffering for want of proper support to such an extent even as to endanger their very existence. Other interests of the Church seem to have received their proper attention, while this has been almost entirely neglected.

In view of the above facts, your Committee would offer

for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Synod expresses its willingness to co-operate with the North-Western Synod in the work of Home Missions by welcoming into our German fields the Missionary Agent appointed by the General Board from their Synod.

Resolved, That we very much regret that the Board of the General Synod has failed to acquaint, in any way, this Synod with the condition and operation of its work within

our bounds.

Resolved, That the cause of Home Missions be earnestly recommended to the attention of each Classis, and that they be requested not only to meet its claims within their own respective bounds, but that they also endeavor, by every

available means, to meet the urgent calls and claims of the General Board.

Resolved, That we appoint a Board of Home Missions, Consisting of four ministers and two elders, as auxiliary to the General Board.

## 3. STATEMENT AND ACTION RESPECTING FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Rev. John Mason Ferris, D. D., Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Reformed Church in America, appeared in Synod during the first day of its sessions, and asked permission to make some statements on the subject of Foreign Missions. The hour of three o'clock in the afternoon of that day was fixed for that purpose. At the appointed hour, he made some interesting statements in regard to the work of Foreign Missions, as prosecuted by the Board of Foreign Missions of the Reformed Church in America, and solicited this Synod to co-operate with them in this special work.

On motion, the subject involved in his statements was

referred to a Special Committee to submit a report thereon. The Committee consists of Revs. Dr. G. W. Williard, C. Schaaf and J. Reinhart.

This Committee subsequently submitted the following

report, which was received, amended and adopted:

The Committee to whom the subject of Foreign Missions, presented in the statements of Rev. Dr. Ferris of the Reformed Church in America, was referred, respectfully sub-

mit the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved, That we have heard, with much pleasure, the remarks of Rev. Dr. Ferris respecting the success of the Foreign Missionary operations of the Reformed Church in America, and of the indications of still more extensive usefulness in the future.

Resolved, That this Synod expresses its thanks to the Board of Foreign Missions of the Beformed Church in America, for the invitation it has extended through its Corresponding Secretary to co-operate with it in this branch of

Christian activity.

Resolved, That we petition the General Synod at its next triennial meeting to change its action on this subject, so as to carry on its Foreign Missionary operations in the future in conjunction with our brethren of the Reformed Church in America, and that in case it does not see its way clear to do so, in its synodical capacity, it grant permission to this Synod to do it.

## ARTICLE XIX.

#### APPRALS.

This Committee subsequently submitted the following

report, which was received and adopted:

Your Committee to whom was referred the appeal of Rev. Gotlieb Ziegler and his Joint Consistory, from the decision of the St. John's Classis, refusing to allow said Rev. G. Ziegler to withdraw his resignation of the Paris charge, would report as follows:

That the appeal, as directed to the present Synod, is in order, and in accordance with the constitution.

On motion the following was adopted as the order in which the above case of appeal was to be considered:

Resolved, That the appeal be heard on Monday at 10 o'clock, A. M., and the following order be observed:

1. The reading of all the documents in the case.

2. That the appellant be allowed half an hour to argue his case with sufficient time to translate the same into German.

case, with sufficient time to translate the same into German.

3. That the Classis be allowed forty minutes, with sufficient time to translate the same into German.

4. That the appellant have ten minutes to reply.

The Rev. Joshua H. Derr acted as counsel in behalf of the appellant, and Revs. Herman Kortheuer, Christopher Schiller and Frederick Schaad, as counsel in behalf of the Classis.

The consideration of the case then proceeded according to the order adopted, and, after hearing the documentary evidence and pleading on both sides, the vote of Synod was taken by calling the roll, and the appeal was sustained. 2. In regard to the action of this Synod respecting the appeals of Rev. George Rettig and others from the action of Iowa Classis, which had been postponed by the last Synod until its present annual meeting, see Article VIII., Report on Synodical Minutes, and action on Items 4 and 5.

## ARTICLE XX.

#### COMPLAINTS.

On the adoption of the report of the Special Committee on Contested Seats of Delegates from Iowa Classis, recognizing and acknowledging the minutes of the meeting of Iowa Classis, held at Wheatland, Iowa, April 20, 1870, as the only minutes of the Iowa Classis which should pass into the hands of the Committee on Classical Minutes, and the delegates elected by that body, as the only delegates from Iowa Classis entitled to seats in this Synod, the Rev. Joshua Riale arose and stated that he would appeal to the General Synod from the action of this Synod, in adopting the aforesaid report.

The President of Synod ruled that the appeal was out of order, inasmuch as the vote adopting the report did not involve a judicial process; but that he could enter a complaint.

The Rev. Joshua Riale then announced that he, in behalf of himself and the body he represented, would complain of this action to the General Synod.

The President announced the names of Revs. John H. Buser, John Rettig and Augustus Bletsch, would now be enrolled as delegates from Iowa Classis.

The Rev. Joshua Riale then stated that he would also enter a complaint to the General Synod against this action.

It will be noticed from the above that there is a balance due from Sandusky (or Tuscarawas) Classis of \$13.45; and from St. John's of \$94.70. Also that nothing has been paid in directly from Eastern Ohio Classis. It will be remembered that Eastern Ohio Classis was formed out of the other two one year ago. It is probable that a portion of the balance due from the two Classes ought to be paid by Eastern Ohio; yet how much your Treasurer is unable to say. From the imperfect data in his possession the Treasurer is of opinion that Eastern Ohio Classis ought to pay \$17.25 of the debt reckoned to St. John's, and \$5.50 of that reckoned to Sandusky. It will be necessary for the delegates from those Classis, or the Committee on Finance, or the Synod itself, to settle this point definitely.

The Treasurer would also direct the attention of Synod to the fact that the General Synod (see Minutes, page 44) has assessed the Synod of Ohio in the sum of \$590, and that it will be necessary to apportion this amount among the

Classes.

The Treasurer would also call attention to the fact that the translation of the last Minutes into the German language was made by Rev. J. Kuelling, and that Synod should decide upon the compensation to be allowed for this service.

It would also aid greatly in the prompt publication of the German Minutes, if Synod would at once designate a trans-

lator.

#### I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

# 1. Report of the Board of Publication.

The report of the Board of Publication was received, read and referred to the Committee on Publication. The report is as follows:

The members of the Board of Publication held a meeting in Cincinnati, October 16, 1869, and organized by the election of V. C. Tidball, President, and Rev. G. Z. Mechling, Secretary.

The Rev. T. P. Bucher, editor of the Christian World, then presented his resignation, as follows:

CINCINNATI, Oct. 15, 1869.

To the Board of Publication of the Synod of Ohio:

BRETHREN-It is known to some of you that months ago I contempleted resigning the editorship of the Christian World. A recent threatened pulmonary attack has has ened my purpose to tender my resignation; and I do this with the greater freedom at this time, that such opportune and favorable arrangements can be made for carrying forward our publication matters. Three years ago the Board intrusted into my feeble hands our Western Church paper, an investiture of responsibility which the Synod afterward confirmed with remarkable unanimity, and which the people have indorsed with generous support and co-operation. The complex duties and peculiar labors of the position are much to my liking, though heavier in the present enlarged condition of our publication matters than anticipated. Among the perplexities of the post, the controversies in which we are engaged are the least to my teste, interfering, as they do, so

much with the actualization of that ideal of a Church paper which I had proposed in the beginning. But the paper has grown in size, widened its circulation and influence, and today stands as one of the cherished interests of Zion. For this we are thankful to the great Head of the Church, who has smiled upon our efforts, and to the body of the elect, who have rendered such efficient service in its behalf.

Gentlemen, in giving over to you again the interest you were pleased to commit to my charge, I am glad to report that the *Christian World* has attained its largest subscription list and widest circulation. Hoping that you will foster its

interests in the future as in the past, I remain,

The resignation of Bro. Bucher was accepted, and in view of the business interests involved, it was determined to appoint an editor to the position until the close of the year 1870. Rev. S. Mease was then chosen as editor.

At a subsequent meeting of the Board, held October 18.

the following resolutions were adopted.

Resolved, That in accepting the resignation of Rev. T. P. Bucher as editor of the Christian World, the Board of Publication deeply regret the circumstances which have compelled him to offer it. The success of the Christian World during the term it has been under the conduct of Bro. Bucher has been unprecedented in the history of our Western Church paper, and has exceeded the most sanguine expectations of its friends; and it is with great reluctance that the Board of Publication now yield to the imperative demands of his impaired health, under the arduous labors of the position.

Resolved, That the Board tenders to Bro. Bucher their sincere thanks in behalf of the Church represented in the paper; hoping that his services may still be available to her interests, and in whatever capacity these may be rendered,

we shall wish and pray for his success.

Bro. Mease presented to the Board a formal acceptance of his appointment, and immediately entered upon its duties.

The Christian World has continued to make steady progress, the circulation being one hundred and twenty-eight more than it was one year ago; the number of papers now sent out weekly is four thousand six hundred. The Board, as well as the editor, are of opinion that our publication interests should be conducted upon sound business principles, and accordingly a just compensation is now charged for publishing marriage and obituary notices.

Hoping that a more efficient organization may be estab-

lished at an early day, with greater resources at its command for carrying forward the publication interests of the Reformed Church in the West, the present Board have taken no steps in the direction indicated by the last Synod for extending its operations; and trusting our action may meet the approval and ratification of the Synod, this report is respectfully submitted.

The Committee on Publication submitted their report which was received, taken up item by item, and adopted and is as follows:

The Committee on Publication would respectfully report: That the only document placed in their hands is the report of the Board of Publication. In regard to their report, your Committee would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the report of the Board be adopted, and that the course pursued by the Board, in the acceptance of the resignation of Rev. T. P. Bucher, as editor of the Christian World, and in the appointment of Rev. Samuel Mease as editor temporarily, be approved.

Resolved, That this Synod proceed to elect an editor for

the Christian World.

Resolved, That this Synod commends anew the Christian World to the support and increased patronage of the Church. Respectfully submitted,

# II. ELECTION OF EDITOR OF "CHRISTIAN WORLD."

Immediately after the adoption of the report of the Committee on Publication, the Synod, in accordance with the recommendation of the report, proceeded to the election of an editor of the Christian World.

On motion the Rev. Samuel Mease was elected to that position by acclamation.

#### III. WESTERN REFORMED PUBLICATION SOCIETY.

The Committee on the Publication Interest of the Reformed Church submitted the following report, which was received and taken up item by item and adopted:

The Committee to whom the documents pertaining to the publication interest of the Church were referred, would respectfully report:

That they have given the subject the serious consideration which its importance demands, and have concluded to recommend the formation of a publication society. After consulting with different brethren on the subject, we find that there is a feeling widely prevalent in the western portion of the Church that this matter should be delayed no longer, and that such preliminary steps as may be necessary to inaugurate the movement should be taken by this Synod.

Your Committee have also come to the conclusion, after discussing the different ways in which this interest might be carried forward, that it can the most effectually be done by a voluntary association, and they are glad to report that a sufficient number of persons have expressed a willingness to enter into such an association. That this Synod may give proper encouragement to the movement, your Committee would suggest that it recommend the following articles as proper to be incorporated in the constitution of said association.

#### CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE '.

This organization shall be called the Western Reformed Publication Society of the Reformed Church.

## ARTICLE II.

The object of this Society shall be the publication and sale of religious books, tracts and papers, suitable for circulation in the families and Sunday-schools of the Reformed Church. In the selection of works to this end the Society shall be true to the historical faith of the Reformed Church.

#### ARTICLE III.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually and perform the duties usually belonging to these offices.

#### ARTICLE IV.

There shall be a Board of Directors, three of whom shall be elected by this Synod at its present meeting, one to serve one year, one two years, and one three years, and annually thereafter one shall be elected to serve three years, or until their successors are appointed. These Directors, in connection with others who shall be elected by the Society as it shall provide for, shall constitute the Board of Directors, who shall invest and hold the funds of the Society, declare dividends, publish and sell books, tracts and papers, and establish depositories through such agencies as the Society or they may employ, adopt by-laws, and have the general control and supervision of the officers of the Society, so that

it may provide a suitable religious literature for the Church and thus accomplish the end of its organization.

#### ARTICLE V.

To add still greater efficiency to the Society, it shall elect a Superintendent who shall devote his whole time to its interest in the publication and sale of books, under the direction of the Board of Directors, to whom he shall make a quarterly report of his operations, and an annual report by the Society, or whenever he shall be requested to do so to the Directors or President of the Society.

#### ARTICLE VI.

The Society shall hold its annual meeting during the early part of the annual meeting of the Synod of Ohio, or at such time and place as the stockholders may prefer, and shall make out a report of its operations, which it shall submit to the Synod in order that it may give such advice and direction as may further the interest of the Society, and secure the good will and co-operation of the Church.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The capital stock of the Society shall consist of 100 shares of fifty dollars each. Members shall be entitled to as many votes as they hold shares of stock, and the profits of the association shall be divided pro rata among the stockholders. As soon as \$2,000 of stock are taken the Society shall organize and proceed with its work.

## ARTICLE VIII.

The Board of Directors shall hold regular quarterly meetings on the first Monday evening of the months of January, April, July and October, or at such times as may be most convenient for them for the transaction of such business as may claim their attention. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

## ARTICLE IX.

No book shall be published at the expense of the Society unless approved by the Directors and Superintendent, or Book Agent, or by a Committee whom the Directors may appoint to examine it.

#### ARTICLE X.

This constitution may be altered, or amended, at any regular meeting of the stockholders by a majority of the votes cast.

The Committee, to whom was referred Item 20 in the report on Synodical Minutes, having reference to the action of the General Synod, in regard to this Synod's request to the Eastern Synod, through the General Synod, to give it the right to publish or republish the hymn-books and catechisms in use in the Church, submitted the following report, which was received and adopted:

Your Committee to whom was referred the action of the General Synod, in regard to the request of this Synod to be allowed the privilege to publish or republish the hymnbooks and catechisms in use in the Church, would submit he following minute expressive of the sense of this Synod:

WHEREAS, The above-named books are published by one synod of the Church to the exclusion of the right to the ther Synods, and that Synod being distantly located and llowing the books to be deposited for sale only on its own erms, when perhaps they might be furnished more convenently and cheaply; and

WHEREAS, This Synod has in contemplation, as soon as no way is properly open, to establish a Publication Interest, hich it is believed the circumstances of the Church require, needs the advantage which the privilege asked for would

ford; therefore

Resolved, That this Synod regret the action of the General ynod not acceding to its request, regarding it a discrimination in favor of one Synod to the disadvantage of the others, Resolved, That the request of the last annual Synod, resecting the publication of these books, be renewed.

The following action was adopted in regard to the pubshing of a selection of Hymns and Psalms in the Liturgy: Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed by this ynod to make a selection of Hymns and Psalms, not to sceed three hundred or four hundred in number, for proisional use in the Church in connection with the Liturgy, coording to the action of the General Synod of Philadelhia, as recorded on its Minutes, page 65.

Resolved, That, should the Board of Publication deem it esirable, they be authorized to publish the present Liturgy

with the addition of these Hymns; and also to publish a proper selection from the Liturgy in connection with these Hymns, for provisional use in the Church.

Resolved, That the North-Western Synod be requested to

appoint two additional members to the Committee.

The Committee consists of Revs. J. H. Good, D. D., Isaac H. Reiter and David Van Horne.

## VI. PUBLICATION OF LITURGY IN GERMAN.

The Rev. Eli Keller, delegate from the North-Western Synod, having stated that said body had made arrangements to bring out the Western Liturgy in the German language, and requested this Synod to co-operate in this enterprise; it was, on motion,

Resolved, That we unite with the North-Western Synod in bringing out the German Liturgy, and that the Revs. Herman Kortheuer and John Kuelling be appointed mem-

bers of the Committee.

## ARTICLE XXIII.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

#### 1. GENERAL BENEVOLENCE.

On the reading of the report of Rev. J. H. Good, D. D., on Theological Library and the Endowment of the Third Professorship in the Theological Seminary at Tiffin, and its Reference to a Special Committee, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Valentine Hay, Esq., of Somerset, Pa., being present in Synod, be invited to address the Synod on the subject of General Beneficence, this (Thursday) after-

noon, at 3 o'clock.

At the appointed time, Valentine Hay, Esq., appeared and entertained the Synod with an appropriate and suggestive address on the subject of General Beneficence, urging its claims upon the attention and liberality of the Synod and the Church; after which, on motion, the subject of General Beneficence, as presented in his address, was referred to the Standing Committee on Education.

#### · 2. PERTAINING TO THE LITURGY.

The Committee on the Liturgy having verbally stated, through one of its members, that a large number of copies of the work was still on hand; it was, on motion,

Resolved, That the attention of the ministry and membership of the Church be called to this fact, and urged to make

renewed efforts for its wider circulation.

## 3. TIME AND PLACE OF NEXT MEETING OF SYNOD.

During Monday evening session, the Synod decided on the time and place for its next annual sessions. The places proposed were Wheatland, Iowa; Canal Winchester, Columbina, Fairfield and Germantown, Ohio. The roll was called, he election proceeded, and the result was, that the Reformed hurch in Fairfield, Greene County, Ohio, was chosen as the place; and Wednesday evening, the 17th of May, 1871, at half past seven o'clock, was fixed as the time.

# ARTICLE XXIV.

## RESUMPTION AND CLOSE.

The following resolutions were adopted:

# 1. Publication of Minutes.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be authorized to have 200 copies of the Minutes of Synod, duly authenticated, ublished in the English, and 500 in the German language.

# 2. Vote of Thanks.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Synod be tendered to be membership of the First and Second Reformed congressions, as well as to the citizens of Tiffin, for their kindses and hospitality in entertaining its members during its resent sessions, and that this resolution be read from the slipit of said congregations and published in the papers of the place.

The roll was called, and the following members were found absent without permission, viz: Revs. D. Winters, D. D., P. C. Prugh, J. M. Lefever, C. Schiller, F. Schaad, H. Kortheuer, A. Bletsch, and Elder John Zimmerman.

The Minutes were read and adopted, and ordered to be

# ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS

Of the Reformed Synod of Ohio, and the Congregations in connection with it in other States, which convened in the Reformed Church at Fairfield, Greene County, Ohio, on Wednesday, May 17th, at seven and a half o'clock in the evening, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and closed its sessions on the following Monday afternoon at five o'clock.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON A SELECTION OF HYMNS.

At the last Synod (see Minutes, page 75), the undersigned were appointed a Committee "to make a selection of Hymns and Psalms, not to exceed three hundred or four hundred in number, for provisional use in the Church, in connection with the Liturgy, according to the action of the General Synod, at Philadelphia."

The Committee have labored diligently during the year, and their work is now in such a state of forwardness, that a single meeting of the Committee for a week would probably complete it if the Synod is prepared to go forward at once with the enterprise.

They have endeavored from the wide field of Hymnology to select the best Hymns of all ages for the use of the congregation. The collection numbers about five hundred Hymns and Psalms.

It has not been an easy task to make this selection.

Before making a full report of our labors, some preliminary points ought, perhaps, to be settled by the Synod itself. As the General Synod has declined to allow the Western Synod the privilege of publishing the present Hymn-book, and as the necessity of a revision of this book is now universally recognized, it will become necessary to determine upon the form in which the proposed publication shall be made. Three modes have been suggested:

1. To print the Liturgy in full, as at present, and to annex to it a suitable selection of Hymns. If this plan should be adopted, the selection of Hymns will hardly need to be more than one hundred in number, since it could not be used in the regular Sunday service, but only on special occasions. The Committee could not

recommend this plan.

2. To print a collection of four or five hundred Hymns, with selections from the Liturgy, including also some Family Prayers. We believe such a book could be prepared, that would be far superior to our present Hymn-book, and that would not exceed it in size or price. In this case, the collection should be a very complete one, ample provision being made for all the services of the

Church. The Liturgy and Prayers would be annexed to the Hymns, as was the custom in the early Hymn-books of the Re-

formed Church.

3. A third plan, and probably the best of all, would be the same as number two, with this addition, that the tunes should also be printed in the book, to the number of about one hundred. Such a book as this would be a decided advance on anything we have had in our Church for a century; though it would be nothing more than a return to a very old custom of the Reformed Church. Other denominations of later years, in their seal for congregational singing, have adopted this old Reformed plan, and it is becoming very popular. We believe that such a book could be prepared that would be almost universally acceptable to our Churches, including five hundred Hymns and Psalms, one hundred tunes, selections from the Liturgy, and Family Prayers, the whole not materially exceeding the present Hymn-book in size and price. But the publication of such a book would require at least \$1,500 capital to commence with, and the sales could not be expected to pay expenses in less than five or ten years.

We would suggest that Synod continue the Committee, and that in the meantime it be decided which of the above plans Synod pro-

poses to adopt.

After the book was translated, or reproduced in the German language by a member of the Committee of the Northwestern Synod, a joint meeting of the two Committees was called at Crestline, Ohio, on the 17th of January, 1871. The Joint Committee after having examined, in part, the manuscript of the translation, did not want to assume the responsibility of having it published in that form, and divided the different sheets of the manuscript among its members for such corrections and suggestions as each member would have to make. The results of this labor of the individual members ought to have been compared and settled in a final meeting of the Joint Committee, which, however, has not yet taken place. It will therefore be necessary to continue the Committee to co-operate with the one of the Northwestern Synod, in order to have the book published.

That they have carefully considered the important subject urged upon the attention of your Synod, and feel, with the President of said Society, "that there is no object that commends itself more directly to the hearts and consciences of Christians, because the sufferings of the widows and the fatherless touch the Christian sympathies, and call forth a free and liberal response." It is, therefore, to be hoped that this truly benevolent Society will receive every possible encouragement, and that erelong every superannuated minister, and every suffering family of a minister, may enjoy that temporal support which this Society is anxious to afford.

This Society consists of regular members and life-members. It is desired that the ministers of our Synod shall be made life-members by their respective pastoral charges, and that the pastors may explain to their congregations the character and aims of this Society established by our fathers, and to give them an opportunity to contribute to its funds. In view of all this, we would recommend the following to be adopted by the Synod:

Resolved, That we heartily recommend the importance and claims of this Society to the serious attention of our ministers.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

#### RELIGION AND MORALS.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Statistical Reports presented their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows:

#### TO THE SYNOD OF OHIO AND ADJACENT STATES.

Dear Brethren in Christ:—As often as it is our privilege by the grace of our Divine Master to convene in the capacity of a Synod, we feel it our solemn duty first and above all to express our heartfelt gratitude for the preservation of our lives, and for all the countless temporal and spiritual blessings which we have so undeservedly enjoyed. Especially is this the case on the present over

sion, for we have behind us a year of extraordinary excitement and unexpected results; a year of wars and rumors of wars; a year of severe trial as well as of the most glorious triumph for our precious Protestant Christianity. Who would not rejoice and give thanks to God that during the past year He has so unexpectedly and so effectually checked the unbounded arrogance of presumed Papal infallibility, which, if left to carry out its own designs, would undoubtedly have caused incalculable trouble to the entire Protestant household of faith. This great providential victory has suddenly put to shame all those who but a short time previous had openly proclaimed Protestantism a failure, and has infused new life, new courage, and new hopes into all the true spiritual descendants of the great Reformers of the sixteenth century, especially in those countries where the mighty struggle has taken place. chains of religious intolerance by which Romish jealousy and exclusiveness have for centuries past hindered the true development of Reformed Christianity in Italy, Spain, and France, have at last been broken, so that our spiritual brethren in those countries will now enjoy the blessed privilege to propagate their faith without the fear of civil and religious persecution. In view of these wonderful changes during the past year, we, as a Synod, may well exclaim with the Psalmist: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits." Standing in very intimate relation with those people, whom God has thus raised up from the dust, and united them into one of the mightiest nations of the earth, we must naturally and necessarily become more or less affected by their elevated position. Our God-appointed missionary work among the Germans will not only grow in importance, but also in interest and success. An abundant harvest may be expected from this field if only our Church performs her duty faithfully.

In examining the reports of the different Classes, we find in all of them many warm expressions of grateful acknowledgments for the divine goodness and forbearance manifested by the Good Master toward his servants and the churches over which they have been called to preside. Indeed, it is plainly evident from the happy spirit and rich contents of these reports, that the past year has been one of unusual interest in almost every one of our charges. Whilst some of them praise God that all the ministers of the Classes were sustained by Him to preach the gospel without interruption, and that their labors have been crowned with much visible success; others express their gratitude for the abundant prosperity with which the Lord has accompanied their efforts in catechetical instruction; and others still record their thankfulness for the growing interest and participation in the use of the Holy Sacraments; for a marked increase in true piety and devotion to the cause of Christ, and for enlarged feelings and a more lively spirit of disinterested benevolence. Thus the great Head of the Church, ever true to his solemn promise: Lo, I am with you alway—has been with our ministers and people, and has again, by his continued grace and

blessing, proved unto us that in Zion he makes his grace and glory Yes, he has bestowed his grace and blessing not only upon our charges, but also upon our institutions of learning, causing professors and students to rejoice in the apparent prosperity. All this is encouraging to every member of our beloved Church, and should fill the whole Synod with new determination and zeal in the prosecution of our future labors, for the end is not yet reached. By grace we are what we are, but neither we ministers nor our dear people are what we should and might be. Though we have made progress in our great work, yet we have by far not done our duty. As all the Classical reports also confess, with all the rich blessings of God, and the consequent improvement, there are visible also many faults and great infirmities. The powers of darkness have by far not yet vanished from our borders, and much less have we entirely overcome the world. We must, therefore, again and again put on the armor of truth, and with the sword of the Spirit must take our position under the glorious banner of our great Redeemer till our eyes shall be closed in death, like our dear Bro. J. Reinhart, who thus equipped and determined went forth from last year's Synod into his field of labor with very bright prospects before him, but unexpected to us all the Lord soon called him to his reward. So also in the case of our beloved, faithful Bro. Thornton Butler. We all feel their loss, because, as the brethren of their Classes testify, they were workmen approved of God, and their labors were crowned with success. Many now living will hold them in grateful remembrance as the messengers from God to their souls, and who in the last day will call them blessed. Though young in years, they have fought their last battles, they have kept the faith and gone to inherit their crown. With these exceptions all the ministers of our Synod have been permitted to live and labor through the past year. In reliance upon the sure promises of our Lord and Master, we, together with all our absent brethren, will enter upon this new Synodical year of Christian labor with hope and confidence of still greater success.

#### THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

## I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

# 1. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary would sub-

mit the following as their annual report:

The Board, having convened at Dayton, Ohio, July 30, 1870, was organized by the election of Rev. Isaac H. Reiter, President, Rev. David Van Horne, Secretary, and Rev. David Winters, D. D., Treasurer.

In view of the fact that the Board, during the last annual sessions of the Synod, submitted a full and detailed report respecting the condition, wants and prospects of the Theological Seminary, they will briefly confine their statements to a few general facts.

The general financial condition of the Seminary is gradually improving. Under the energetic and persevering labors of our Agent (Mr. Henry Leonard), the endowment has been considerably increased during the year, as will appear by reference to his report. There should be no cessation of effort until the endowment is completed; for until this desirable end is accomplished, we shall be more or less embarrassed in the regular liquidation of the Professors' salaries.

Our efficient Treasurer has continued his valuable services in urging special collections, and in collecting the interest on notes and honds. But with all his endeavors, he has not been able to meet the claims of the Professors as promptly as desired. Hence the importance of continuing the system of special collections on the part of congregations and individuals, as well as of putting forth renewed efforts to complete the endowment fund.

It is with pleasure that the Board would state in this connection, from information received, that Valentine Hay, Esq., confidently expects to have the entire endowment of the third Professorship in the Theological Seminary, requiring \$15,000, made up by the next annual meeting of Synod; and that the whole enterprise will then be in such a state of completeness, as to make it proper for the Synod at that meeting to elect a Professor of Exegetical Theology.

In accordance with the instructions of the last annual Synod, the Board, in connection with the Chairman of Synod's Committee, had a meeting at Dayton, Ohio, March 23, 1871, in regard to the sale of the Students' Home, and the location and erection of a building for the Theological Seminary. After considering the whole subject, as to its importance, expediency and general bearing, the following resolutions embodying the conclusion arrived at, were adopted, namely:

"Resolved, That we, the Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Church, at Tiffin, in conjunction with the Committee of the Synod, in view of the present condition of things, and the opposition on the part of contributors to the sale or removal of it, deem it inexpedient either to sell or change the Students' Home.

"Resolved, That, in consequence of the pressing claims of other interests of the Church, and believing that the proper time has not arrived to commence practical operations, we regard it best-to defer the erection of a Seminary building for the present.

"Resolved, That the interests of the Theological Seminary, together with the interests of the Students' Home, under the management of Prof. Herman Rust, be earnestly commended to the favor and liberality of the Church." Respectfully submitted,

#### 5. REPORT OF BOARD OF VISITORS.

The Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary would respect-

fully report:

That they have endeavored to be faithful to the important interest committed to their care. By the action of the Synod of last year the Board of Visitors of the Seminary, and that of Education, were combined so that we have not only had to provide for the indigent young men who are prosecuting their studies with the view of entering upon the ministry, but also, in connection with the theological professors, of superintending the general interests of the Seminary.

By a reference to the Catalogue, which has just been published, it appears that there were sixteen young men in the Seminary. Two of these have entered upon the active duties of the ministry, and a third dismissed and recommended for examination and licensure at your present meeting. This, although a larger number than usual, is not what it ought to be in view of the great demand there is for ministers in the Church. If the proper efforts were put forth to interest the pious and talented young men of the Church in the ministry there is no reason why we might not have three times the number we now have. Looking at the destitution that

prevails on every side it is surely high time for us to awake to a sense of our duty as a Church, and do all in our power to raise up a ministry equal to the demands that are made upon us. If this be not done we must in the nature of the case lose a large portion of the territory that rightfully belongs to us as a denomination.

The students have been diligent in their studies, and have commended themselves to their teachers and the Board by their gentle-

manly deportment and Christian conduct.

The greatest difficulty the Board has had to contend with has been the want of funds to pay the appropriations of the students as they became due. Having had a debt of several hundred dollars, according to the report of last year, to provide for in addition to the appropriations of this year, it has been with great difficulty that we have been able to retain all the students now on the Board. By making constant appeals to the Church through the Christian World, and to those who take a special interest in our indigent young men, we have been able, by borrowing a few hundred dollars, to pay all the appropriations to the close of the Winter Term. But as the present session will close the 23d of June, at which time \$600 more will be needed, your Board is greatly perplexed to know how to provide for the emergency. The Church owes a lasting debt of gratitude to the American Education Society for the help they have generously afforded us. Had it not been for this timely aid it would not have been possible for us to have retained all our students, the entire number of whom is at present twenty-six. Your Board is of the firm belief that the Church is abundantly able to provide fully for this and every other interest connected with its prosperity, and would do so if the proper efforts were put forth to awaken a general interest, as it is only a portion of the Church contributes to this object, as will be seen by a reference to the Treasurer's report. Quite a number of congregations never contribute anything to this important interest. Were the congregations and members that give nothing to do in proportion to those from whom we have contributions we would not only be able to support the young men now on the Board but greatly increase the

We would, therefore, suggest that the Synod adopt such measures as will in its judgment secure united action in every part of our territory. The interest is too important to be permitted to drag as it has done for the last few years. The voice of God and duty calls upon us to go forward in this work with a zeal and energy never before manifested.

The library of the Seminary, as well as the College, needs to be increased, and made more attractive for the students. We would suggest the propriety of the Synod recommending to the College and Seminary Board to appropriate each \$50 toward the improvement of the library room, so as to adapt it more fully to the purpose for which it is intended.

#### T. REPORT ON LIBRARY AND ENDOWMENT FUND.

In continuation of my report of last year I beg to report to the Synod this year as follows:

1. Library Fund.—After receiving from Rev. Albert Helffenstein, Jr., the donation of 528 volumes for the Library of our Seminary, as reported to the last Synod, a correspondence continued between us, in which he expressed the liveliest interest in our Western enterprises, and in the course of which he expressed the desire to donate to our Western institutions the greater portion of his property, amounting to about \$15,000 or \$18,000. In pursuance of this intention he executed a note of \$4,000 in favor of the Trustees of the Seminary, as a Library Fund, the interest to be annually devoted to the purchase of books for the Seminary Library. While deliberating as to the mode and form in which the remainder of his intended donation should be made, he suddenly expressed an anxious desire that Val. Hay, Esq., should visit him personally (if I were unable to do so), in order to execute the necessary documents. Mr. Hay started to visit him, as soon as it was possible for him to do so; but on arriving at his residence found that the good brother had suddenly been called away by death and was already buried, and that without having been able to put his well-considered plans into execution. Bro. Helffenstein died on the 12th of September, 1870. It is greatly to be regretted that he postponed until too late an hour the disposal of his property according to his pious wishes. Even if Mr. Hay had been able to meet him a week or two earlier, it would have availed nothing, as by the laws of Pennsylvania a donation by will for benevolent purposes must be made one month before the decease of the party, in order to be valid. Let this be a warning to all friends who are purposing in their hearts to aid the institutions of the Church with a portion or the whole of their property. No one ought to postpone so important a matter until the last moment, if he desires to have his wishes carried out in the disposal of the property with which the Lord has blessed him.

The note of \$4,000 will be due in June, of this year, and has been placed in the hands of Mr. Hay for collection. I understand that the heirs intend to resist its payment. I hope, however, and expect, that the wishes of Bro. Helffenstein in this matter will not be frustrated.

The Board of Trustees of the Seminary last year authorized the undersigned to purchase books for the Library, in cost not to exceed the interest of the \$4,000 Fund for the first year. In pursuance of this authority the undersigned has purchased 89 volumes, at an expense of \$120.25. He received a donation from Rev. H. H. Sandoe, of Liberty Center (who I think had the slenderest support of any minister in the Reformed Church), of one dollar toward this fund. The remainder (\$119.25) has been drawn tempora-

rily from the Synodical Treasury, and will be refunded, as soon as the Helffenstein note is collected.

2. Endowment of Third Professorship in the Seminary.—The Church will be gratified to learn, that the promised endowment of a Professorship of Exegetical Theology in our Seminary by the exertions of Val. Hay, Esq., is likely to prove a success. I am advised by him, under date of April 24, 1871, "that the project is progressing favorably, and that within this Synodical year he confidently expects to raise the necessary funds for the com lete endowment of the Professorship." He further requests me to say that, God willing, it shall be an accomplished fact by that time; that Synod may rely upon it, and be prepared to act in the prem-He would also remind Synod and the Church that he is centering all his energies to the accomplishment of this object, and as he does not claim that he is doing more for the Church than he ought to do, or than God requires at his hand, he fondly hopes that the Church at large will evince more beneficence; that many good and liberal minded men may rise up in the Church and throw a. due share of their means into the Lord's Treasury, and thereby advance his kingdom upon earth.

The delay of one year in the carrying out of this enterprise, rests, to my knowledge, upon a good and proper basis, not necessary to refer to more particularly here. If any other friends feel likeminded with Bro. Hay to present a large donation to the Church, I would suggest the importance of a fund of 10,000 or 15,000 dollars for the erection of a Theological Seminary Building, which is greatly needed at Tiffin, and was recommended in last year's report of the President of the Board of Trustees. It was expected that Bro. Helffenstein's intended further donation would be available for this purpose, but the funds must now come from some

other source, if ever we are to have a Seminary Building.

3. Alumni Professorship in the Seminary (that of Practical Theology).—The suggestion that the Alumni of the Seminary should undertake the enterprise of endowing a fourth professorship in the Seminary, has been favorably received, and a number have pledged their hearty and generous co-operation. But to my mind it seems advisable to wait in this matter until the College Alumni Professorship is mainly endowed and out of the way, since a great many of the Alumni of the Seminary are Alumni of the College also. Bro. Hay, who has done very liberally for this College Professorship, suggests that I should make a plea to the Alumni to push on this College enterprise more rapidly; that the College and Seminary must go hand in hand, and that the Alumni of the Seminary should take an active part in this project. I fully agree with him on this point, and hope that the College enterprise, so fairly and hopefully begun, will not be left to languish at this point.

#### II. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Standing Committee on the Theological Seminary, to whom the seven foregoing reports were referred, submitted their report, which was received, and taken up item by item, and adopted.

The Standing Committee on the Theological Seminary respectfully submit the following report:

#### 1. The Endowment.

The endowment of the Theological Seminary, under the agency of Henry Leonard, has continued successful, so far as the enterprise has been carried forward; yet the available endowment fund leaves an annual indebtedness of five hundred dollars. This must be lamented by all the friends of the Seminary. In the present prosperous condition of the College and the number of beneficiary students, who intend entering the Seminary, the teaching force should be increased so that we may not only hold our own students, but that our Seminary be placed upon such a foundation as to attract students from other localities. We would, therefore, recommend concert of action on the part of the ministry with the Agent, so that an adequate endowment fund be placed at the disposal of the Board of Trustees.

## 2. Library.

Your Committee learns with pleasure that Rev. Albert Helffenstein, Jr., of North Wales, Pa., has manifested additional interest in the Theological Library at Tiffin, by donating the handsome sum of four thousand dollars, the interest of which is to be used in purchasing books. (Since the above donation has been made, and while contemplating other and more liberal donations, we regret to say that Rev. Helffenstein has been called home.)

As a good library is of essential importance in our institutions,

we would therefore offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That as the library is still in need we commend the generous act of Rev. Helffenstein to the notice of the ministry and membership, in the hope that many may come forward in this good work and give their assistance.

Resolved, That Synod recommend an appropriation of fifty dollars from each of the Boards of Trustees of the College and the

Seminary to repair the library room.

# 3. Professorship of Exegetical Theology.

As the endowment of this professorship has not been completed during the past year, but as we learn with pleasure that Valentine Hay, Esq., confidently expects that before another annual meeting of Synod he will be able to raise the requisite amount, fifteen thousand dollars, for the full endowment of this professorship; therefore,

Resolved, That the election of a Professor to the Chair of Exegetical Theology be postponed until the next annual session of Synod.

#### 4. Education.

There are at present twenty-six beneficiary students in attendance at the College and Seminary. Those receiving the greatest appropriation get one hundred dollars; the amount is determined by their actual necessities. But, nevertheless, with all possible economy there will be an indebtedness of eight hundred dollars at the close of the spring session.

In order that this debt may be canceled we recommend the fol-

lowing resolutions:

Resolved, That the attention of those Classes, which promised a definite sum and have thus far failed to comply with their pledges, be called to their delinquency.

Resolved, That a special collection be taken in the different congregations, for this purpose, by the close of the present collegiate

year, the 23d of June, or as soon thereafter as possible.

Resolved, That this action be published in the Christian World and in the Evangelist, and that the editors call special attention to these resolutions.

#### 5. Increase of Students.

There have been sixteen students in regular attendance during the past year, two of whom have entered the gospel ministry, and another has been dismissed and recommended for licensure to the present Synod. While the number in attendance has been larger than heretofore, it is yet not equal to the demand. There should be increased interest manifested in this matter, for the growth of the Church materially depends upon the number of her ministers.

In view of the great want of ministers in the Reformed Church

we would suggest the following resolution:

Resolved, That the ministry be urged to use their influence to induce young men of piety and earnestness of character to consecrate themselves to God in the gospel ministry.

#### 6. Finances.

We regret to say here that there is a deficiency in the Treasury of five hundred and seventy-five dollars, for the payment of which the necessary means must be devised. Hence, following the former course, we recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That we urge the taking up of special collections throughout our bounds for the immediate use of the Theological

Seminary.

Resolved, That the different Classes belonging to this Synod be requested to ascertain at their next annual meetings whether the above request of Synod has been complied with.

#### ARTICLE XV.

#### HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

#### I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

#### 1. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

In making our annual report to the Synod of Ohio, it affords us pleasure to say that the college has been in a prosperous condition during the past year. The attendance of students has been very encouraging, there having been 182 during the year in the several departments and classes. The graduating class consists of eight, five in the classical and three in the scientific department.

The Board congratulates the Synod in having secured the services of Rev. P. Greding, who was elected last June to the Professorship of the German Language and Literature, and entered upon the duties of his calling at the beginning of the present collegiate year. It will thus be seen that the long talked-of German Professorship has been filled, which it is hoped will give general satisfaction throughout the Church, and especially to our German brethren, who have long desired a professor in Heidelberg College that would give his entire time to this department. The professor elect has given good satisfaction, and found enough to do, as quite a number of students have given special attention to the German.

There have been five professors and two tutors employed in giving instruction during the year, from which it will be seen that the position which the college now occupies is far in advance of what it has ever been, so that it feels free in asking the patronage of the Church and community in general, as the advantages which it affords for obtaining a liberal education are equal to those of other and older institutions. The Board contemplates, as soon as its funds will justify, to call another professor to the department of History and Belles-Lettres, so as to relieve those who are now per-

forming double duty.

We are also pleased to report that the Board has been able to meet the increased expenditures of the college, so that the endowment fund has remained untouched for the last five years, and has been steadily increasing through the persevering and energetic labors of our agent, H. Leonard, to whom the Church owes a debt of ' gratitude for his toil and self-denial in behalf of her institutions. For a full account of his labors during the past year we refer the Synod to his report, which we submit along with this. We may also add, as an evidence of the favor in which the college is held, that a contribution of \$10,000 was made to the President, to become available and paid over to the Treasurer on the death of the esteemed donor. May the number of such friends greatly increase. We have many more in the Church, who might greatly advance her educational and other interests, if they were to follow the above example, in giving as the Lord has blessed them.

The college greatly needs an increase in its library and cabinet, with such instruments as are necessary to make certain studies in the curriculum interesting and thorough. We think the time has now come when the wealthy and liberal-minded members of the Church should come forward and provide for these interests. would be glad if the Synod would in some way call the attention of the Church to these wants, and aid the Board in meeting them. A few thousand dollars donated for these objects would add greatly to the prosperity and efficiency of our institutions. It also affords as pleasure to report that the scheme adopted by the Boards of the Seminary and College for the increased endowment of these institutions is succeeding very well, and will no doubt be eventually completed.

Important and necessary repairs have been made to the college building during the year. Others should also be made at an early

For a full and particular report of the state and condition of the college, a copy of the catalogue for the year 1870-71 is herewith presented.

Hoping to enjoy the continued favor and patronage of the Synod, we respectfully present the above report.

#### II. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

The Standing Committee on Heidelberg College submitted their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows:

Your Committee on Heidelberg College beg leave to submit the

following report:

The papers referred to this Committee consist of a report of the President of the College in behalf of the Board of Trustees, a report of the Financial Agent, and a catalogue of the Institution just published. From these documents your Committee have been able to learn the following facts:

1. That the attendance of students during the last year has been large, a fact that seems to indicate a growing desire on the part of many of our members and friends to educate their sons and daughters. This fact gives your Committee much pleasure inasmuch as it recognizes the truth that the more intelligent our membership is, the more useful it will be in building up the Church. Beside this, it is natural to expect that many now present at the College will feel it a duty to enter the ministry.

2. The course of study as laid down in the catalogue seems to us to meet a want that has long since been felt. With such a course of study in connection with a corps of efficient instructors we trust that the day is not distant when Heidelberg College will offer advantages equal to those of any other Institution in the State.

3. We are pleased to learn that the financial condition of the Institution is such as to relieve it of much of the embarrassment that has attended it in the past. During the last year a contribution of \$10,000 was received from one person. This is the largest contribution that has ever been made by any one individual to the College. The name of this individual is, at his own request, withheld, showing that what was thus given was given out of love to God and his Church, and not from selfish motives. May this act lead many of our wealthy members to ask themselves the question, "Have we given as we ought to give?"

All this must be gratifying to every minister of Synod, especially when we look at its history during the past ten years, and thus call to mind its trials and struggles, and the perseverance,

patience and faith of its founders.

Your Committee would recommend the following resolutions for

adoption:

Resolved, (1.) That we indorse the management and are much

encouraged at the prospects of our College at Tiffin.

Resolved, (2.) That we extend our thanks to Elder H. Leonard, and pray that his health may be continued and his work abundantly blessed.

Resolved, (3.) That we will labor for the increase of the endowment funds, that we will do what we can in the collection of outstanding dues, and to induce the youth of the Church as far as we can to enter the College.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

#### Missions.

#### 1. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS OF OHIO SYNOD.

DEAR BRETHREN:—The report which we herewith present will necessarily be short. This does not arise from any want of interest or activity on our part in the important work committed to our trust. In this respect your Board has endeavored to do all in its power with the limited means at its disposal; having had two regular meetings, and carried on an extensive correspondence in reference to this great work in our Church. We have indeed been deeply impressed with the importance of more zeal and liberality in be-

half of missions, and have addressed several earnest appeals to the membership of the Church in our different periodicals. Looking at the great destitution that meets us on every side, and the urgent requests that are made for help by those who are destitute of the stated means of grace, it is easy to see that we have come far short

of doing our duty as we should have done.

Having only been appointed to this work the first of last July, the operations of your Board have just properly begun. Most of the Classes, too, it should be remembered, have had missionary boards of their own and have not as yet dissolved them, or made them auxiliary to the Synod's Board. We would suggest that the Synod take such action in this respect as will secure united action in this work. As it is, it is hard to tell what is done for this cause in the Synod, as the operations of the particular boards are not reported. In this way wrong is done to the Church, as it appears that little or nothing has been done for the cause of missions, whereas some of the Classes have done well. It is also believed by your Board that the different classes can as effectually attend to the vacant and destitute fields in their respective bounds by operating through Synod's Board as is done by their independent organizations.

According to an arrangement entered into with the General Board, and the recommendation of the North Western Synod, the Rev. Dr. M. Stern has been employed to superintend the missionary interest of our Church in the West at a salary of \$1,000, to be paid by the three Boards as per agreement. As he has given an interesting report of his labors in the periodicals of the Church we

deem it unnecessary to repeat it here.

Applications for aid have been made from different parts of the Church, but no appropriations have been made except to Liberty Center, Ohio, and Boonesboro, Iowa, as our funds did not justify.

For the state of the finances of the Board we refer the Synod to

the report of the Treasurer.

#### 3. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions presented their report, which was received, amended and adopted; and is as follows:

The Standing Committee on Missions would respectfully offer

the following as their report :

A mere glance at the manifest mission and true destiny of the Reformed Church suggests the necessity of an intelligent and earnest seal in the missionary work. Our large cities, as centers of commercial importance, with their rapidly increasing population, both native and foreign, plainly indicate the necessity of establish-

ing our Reformed Zion in them, in order to maintain our ecclesiastical position among other denominations of the household of God, and to do our part well and according to the measure of our

talent in the great work of human redemption.

Especially does the German population of our country require the particular attention of our branch of the Reformation Churches. The lately constituted German Empire is not only rising in the scale of national importance in the Old World, but is as rapidly advancing as an acknowledged element of national importance in our own country. Other churches around us are not slow in this discovery, and in activity to win to themselves this important element of strength which by nationality, faith and cultus naturally belongs to us, and as naturally knocks at our doors for admission, nurture and spiritual communion. Shall these repeated and earnest calls longer pass by unheeded by a Church so amply able as ours, in its wealth and adaptation, to this particular work? Shall the Church longer go begging with its empty treasuries and self-denying missionaries? Surely such a result is altogether unworthy of our calling when reviewed in the light of Christian charity, obligation and duty so evidently devolving upon us.

Your Committee would further report that the following documents came into their hands, viz: The President's report of the Missionary Board, and the Report of its Treasurer. Also the report of the Joint Missionary Board of the Synod of Ohio and Synod of the Northwest, and a letter from the Consistory of the Reformed congregation at Freeport, Illinois. The two latter re-

ferred as items from the report on Overtures.

The President's report of the Board of Missions declares a want of means in the Treasury, and co-operation in this grace-extending work of the faithful of all ages, notwithstanding that the usual public appeals to the liberality of our people have been made

through the periodicals of our Synods.

The same report also brings to view that some Classes have not dissolved their Classical Missionary Boards, notwithstanding that Synod has repeatedly so requested. This prevents unity of action, and also often prevents correct reports of benevolent contributions, which at best are small enough, so that wrong is done to the Church.

The Treasurer's report shows that but little of the funds, if contributed, have passed through the properly constituted channel, thus miserably paralyzing the legitimate work of the Board. The whole amount received by the Treasurer is only \$381.44.

The report of the Joint Missionary Board of the Synod of Ohio and the Northwest refers the attention of Synod to two special

items, viz:

1. To bring about a more full and satisfactory understanding as regards our missionary organization—from the Classical Committee up to the General Board.

2. To make our general superintendency, as now vested in the

person of Dr. Stern, a success.

The Joint Board of our Western Synods felt itself as holding a medium position in our missionary organization, endeavoring to lay hold with one hand on the shoulders of the Classical Committee, and the other on that of the General Board, feeling all along that its efforts in this way were little better than a failure; having been scarcely recognized by the General Board, and little co-operated with by the Classical Missionary Committee.

In view of the above, the Joint Board, at its last meeting, held April 18, resolved to submit the following suggestions and recommendations to the consideration of this Synod:

- 1. Resolved, That we recommend a continuation of the present arrangement in the appointment of separate Boards that shall unite in the direction of the labors of our Missionary Superintendent, and in the general work.
- 2. Resolved, That we call the attention of the Synods to the importance of requiring the different Classes to co-operate with their respective Boards in conducting their missionary affairs.
- 3. Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of a financial agent (or certain agents) to attend to the collection of missionary funds within the bounds of each Synod.
- 4. Resolved, That we recommend the subject of the specific duties of the Missionary Superintendent to the consideration of the separate Synods.

The last paper referred to your Committee is a petition from the Consistory of the Freeport Church, Ill., asking for an appropriation of \$400.00 to the support of its missionary. Said congregation applied for aid to the General Board, which, for want of means, referred its application back to the Synodical Board under whose jurisdiction it lies.

In view of the above statements, your Committee offers the following resolutions for adoption:

- 1. Resolved, That Synod requests, either the dissolution of all Classical Missionary Boards, or if continued, that they co-operate as auxiliaries through the Synodical Boards so as to procure concentration of effort in this important work.
- 2. Resolved, That Synod, at the request of the Joint Board, authorize its Board to employ the Superintendent of Missions in conjunction with his other duties or any other agent or agents to raise the funds necessary to carry forward successfully the missionary work within our bounds, especially in those Classes, charges, or localities as may not come up to the measure of duty in this respect.
- 3. Resolved, That we refer the application for aid from the Freeport Mission to the earnest attention of the Missionary Board of this Synod, as a point in all respects well worthy of the support of our Church.

4. Resolved, That each Classis be earnestly solicited to increase its missionary contributions so as to meet all claims, at home and abroad, and thus efficiently aid the work of missions under the jurisdiction of the General Board of the Reformed Church in the United States.

# ARTICLE XIX.

#### COMPLAINTS.

1. The Committee on Overtures, Item 7, reported that Rev. Joshua Riale assigned reasons for appealing from the decision of the Synod of Ohio, convened at Tiffin, Ohio, in 1870, to the General Synod, in refusing him a seat as a rightful delegate of Iowa Classis; and Item 8, that Rev. Joshua Riale, as President, and Rev. Frederick C. Bauman, as Stated Clerk, of what they claimed to be the Classis of Iowa, presented reasons for appealing to the General Synod from the decision of the Synod of Ohio, convened at Tiffin, Ohio, June 30, 1870, in not admitting the delegates appointed by the Classis they claim to represent, and in admitting the delegates of another Classis claiming to be the Iowa Classis.

The aforesaid items were referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Revs. John Kuelling, Lewis H. Kefauver, Chas. W.

Hoyman, and Elders Levi K. Basore and Lewis Keller.

This Committee subsequently submitted the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:

Your Committee to whom the so-called appeals of sundry ministers of Iowa Classis, were referred, in order to examine their regularity, would respectfully report:

That the first paper, which came into our hands, contains the reasons of a so-called appeal of Rev. J. Riale against an action of the Synod of Ohio and Adjacent States, convened at Tiffin, Ohio, July, A. D. 1870.

Whilst this so-called appeal is actually no appeal at all, but a complaint, we find that it was made according to constitutional requirements, and your Committee would therefore recommend the

following action:

Resolved, That we appoint a Committee of three to defend the action of this Synod before the General Synod of our Church.

The second paper contained complaints and so-called appeals to General Synod of the Brandon faction of the Iowa Classis, signed by Revs. J. Riale and F. C. Bauman, as pretended officers of said Classis.

The complaints and so-called appeals in this paper, your Committee find to be made in an unconstitutional manner, for the fol-

lowing reasons:

- 1. The paper claims that the Brandon faction of Iowa Classis, convened in annual session at Brandon, Buchanan County, Iowa, October 13, 1869, has given notice, through Rev. J. Riale, of appeal against an action of the Ohio Synod. which convened only on June 30, 1870, anticipating an action of Synod that can not be proper nor constitutional.
- 2. The reasons of complaints and so-called appellation against an action of the Ohio Synod, convened at Tiffin, and rising on the fourth day of July, 1870, were approved at the special meeting of the so-called Iowa Classis, convened at Tipton, Iowa, July 12, 1870, which meeting could not have been constitutionally called, inasmuch as the constitution of the Church requires two weeks notice to be given previous to a special meeting of Classis.

But whilst your Committee find these complaints and so-called appeals to be made unconstitutionally, yet we would recommend to Synod to refer them to the same Committee of Defense, which is

called for in connection with the first paper.

2. Furthermore, the Committee on Overtures, under Items 9, 10 and 11, reported that Revs. Cyrus Cort and Frederick C. Bauman had forwarded copies of appeals and complaints against an action of a special meeting of Iowa Classis, convened at Wheatland, Iowa, August 25, 1869, in regard to their exclusion from the right

of membership in said Classis, stating that said appeals and complaints have been forwarded to the Synod of Ohio, at Tiffin, in 1870, but for some cause or other were not presented to Synod; and that they assigned reasons for appealing from the decision of the said action of Iowa Classis.

The aforesaid items were referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Revs. Lewis H. Kefauver, Nathaniel H. Loose, Levi

Rike, and Elders Adam Hawker and Charles Hart.

This Committee afterward presented the following report, which

was received and adopted:

Report of the Committee on Appeals and Complaints of Revs. F. C. Bauman and C. Cort, from certain action taken by the Iowa Classis.

The Committee to whom was referred the papers containing appeals and complaints from the Revs. Frederick C. Bauman and Cyrus Cort, examined the same, and would respectfully present the following report:

The appeals and complaints are found to be in order.

2. But as the constitutional notice given by the appellants, to the President of the Iowa Classis, with the view of bringing their case before this Synod at its last annual meeting for adjudication, was, for some cause or other (on the part of the agent of the appellants), not attended to at the proper time; and further, that the said appellants in the intervening time did not renew their intention of appealing and complaining against the decisions of the Iowa Classis at the present meeting of Synod, thereby leaving said Classis without any one to defend it in its decision; therefore

Resolved, That the said appeals and complaints can not be enter-

tained by Synod.

#### ARTICLE XXI.

#### PUBLICATION.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

To the Synod of Ohio, Etc:

The Board of Publication appointed by the Synod of 1870, have held but one meeting during the year, and have transacted no business further than to receive a report from the Editor of the Christian World, which is herewith submitted for the information of the

members of the Synod.

It will be perceived that the circulation of our paper is steadily increasing, and we believe it is now larger than that of any other periodical published by the Reformed Church, East or West. This is certainly gratifying to all the friends of the Christian World, and proves that it is a live paper, adapted to meet the wants of our Church. It is evident, also, that its subscribers might be still greatly multiplied if its character and interests were properly presented to the members of the Church. This will appear more clearly by reference to some statistics drawn from the records of the Church.

In the three Synods of the West, estimating five members (confirmed and baptized) to each family, there are twelve thousand families, and in the Eastern Synod, twenty-four thousand families, making a total of thirty-six thousand families. This is rather under than over the actual number. The aggregate circulation of the five papers (three East and two West) is about nineteen thousand. After allowing for a large number which take more than one paper, it will be seen that more than one-half of the families in our Church are without any paper published under its auspices. The World also circulates to a considerable extent outside of our own Church, and this may likewise be extended in the same proportion.

It was recommended last year both by the Board of Publication and the Synod itself, that the Editor endeavor to secure regular agents in all the charges, to advance the interests of the paper. It will be seen by the Editor's report, that this has been accomplished to some extent, and that the plan works well wherever carried out. It is to be hoped that pastors will assist the Editor in this work, and recommend suitable persons when they can not act themselves, until the World shall have a representative in every charge.

#### II. A STATEMENT OF THE PUBLICATION OF THE LITURGY.

The Rev. Geo. W. Williard, D. D., a member of the Committee on the Liturgy, made the following summary statement of the financial condition in regard to the publication of the Liturgy, which was referred to the Committee on Publication:

#### III. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION.

Your Committee on Publication would respectfully report:

That the documents placed in their hands, were the statement of the Editor of the Christian World, the report of the Board of Publication, and the financial report in regard to the publication of the Western Liturgy.

From these documents it appears that the Christian World, under the editorial supervision of Rev. Samuel Messe, is in a prosperous

condition, having received an accession of nearly five hundred new subscribers during the year, and its total issue numbers, now, five thousand one hundred copies, which gives it the largest circulation of any of the weekly religious periodicals published by the Reformed Church. In its editorial department it has received a valuable acquisition in the person of Mr. Louis Melius, the children's friend, as Assistant Editor. The Contributing Editors have also

rendered valuable service by their timely contributions.

As it seems, from calculations made, based on reliable statistics, that about one-half of the families of our Church do not take any of our church papers, the circulation of the Christian World ought to be greatly extended. Indeed, at the low price of \$2.00, it ought to find a place in a large majority of our families. Efforts to this end should be put forth on the part of the ministry and officers of the Church. It is very evident that the general circulation of a good, live religious paper proves an excellent aid to the success of the labors of the watchmen on the walls of Zion.

The system of payment on subscriptions, as well as promptness in renewing subscriptions and meeting dues, are regarded as im-

portant.

Your Committee suggest the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved, That this Synod appreciates the efficient labors of the Editors of the Christian World.

Resolved, That this Synod commends the Christian World to the members of the Reformed Church in the United States as a faithful exponent of the doctrines and truths of the Reformed Church.

Resolved, That Synod calls the attention of all-of its ministers to the condition of the Treasury through a printed circular, and urge upon them the importance of the circulation and sale of the Western Liturgy, so as to liquidate the remaining debt.

## ARTICLE XXII.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

TITLE OF SYNOD AND INCORPORATION, ETC.

The following preamble and resolutions, respecting the title of the Synod of Ohio, and the incorporation of the Synod, and of our Institutions at Tiffin, were adopted:

WHEREAS, It is important that the true official and legal title of this Synod should be clearly defined and permanently maintained; and WHEREAS, from some cause or other, errors do exist in the title; therefore,

Resolved, That until a change or modification in the title be made by the proper authority, the Stated Clerk be directed, henceforth, in the official transactions, and in the printed Minutes of this Synod, to observe the correct designation thereof, namely: "The Reformed Synod of Ohio, and the Congregations in connection with it in other States."

Resolved, That the Synod desires that this title may be legally changed, so as to read: "The Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States."

Ann, whereas, in a matter of so much importance, it is highly essential that the proper steps be taken to make the change; therefore,

Resolved, that a Committee of three be appointed to report to the next Synod, on the following points:

1. How this change or modification may be legally effected.

2. How the Charter of the Synod may be changed, and what the amended Charter should include.

3. How a Charter for the Theological Seminary may be obtained, and what this Charter should include.

4. How the Charter of Heidelberg College may be changed,

and what its amended Charter should include.

The Committee called for in the foregoing action consists of Revs. Isaac H. Reiter, Jer. H. Good, D. D., and Lewis H. Kefauver.

#### II. MODIFICATION OF STATISTICAL TABLES.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the form of our Statistical Tables be so modified as to have the several items appear in the following order, namely:

1. Ministers; 2. Congregations; 3. Members; 4. Members unconfirmed; 5. Baptisms; 6 Confirmations; 7. Certificate; 8. Communicants; 9 Excommunications, or erasure of names; 10. Dismissions; 11. Deaths; 12. Sunday Schools; 13. Sunday-school Scholars; 14 Contributions for Benevolence; 15. English Minutes, and 16. German Minutes.

Resolved, That the attention of the Classes is hereby called to this modification, and that they be requested, hereafter, to observe this order in the preparation of their Statistical Tables.

Resolved, That in order to secure a greater degree of perfection and uniformity in our statistics, the Stated Clerk be instructed to have a suitable number of blanks printed, in accordance with the aforesaid modified form, for the use of Synod.

#### III. CHURCH OF THE CROSS, CINCINNATI.

On motion, the following action was adopted:

WHEREAS, This Synod has learned that the Church of the Cross, in Cincinnati, Ohio, through its Financial Agent, is sugged in an effort, and has made encouraging progress, to remove the debt hitherto embarrassing it; therefore,

Resolved, That this Synod expresses its approval of the efforts of the Financial Agent, and recommends ministers and members to aid him in completing his work according to the plan adopted.

#### IV. BOARD OF VISITORS OF THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The number of its members was defined by the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary shall consist of five members.

#### V. STANDING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION DISPENSED WITH.

The following action was adopted:

Resolved, That in view of the action of the Synod at its last annual meeting, consolidating the Boards of Visitors of the Theological Seminary and of Education, under the title of the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary, the Standing Rules of Synod be so changed that the Standing Committee on Education be dispensed with, and that the Standing Committee on the Theological Seminary be required to perform the duties which heretofore devolved on said Committee.

#### VI. SALARY OF STATED CLERK.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Standing Rules of Synod, in regard to the salary of the Stated Clerk, be so modified, that henceforth he shall be allowed forty dollars per year for his services.

#### ARTICLE XXIII.

#### RESUMPTION AND CLOSE.

The following resolutions were adopted:

#### I. PUBLICATION OF MINUTES.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be authorized to publish 1,200 copies of the Minutes of the Synod in the English, and 500 in the German language.

Resolved, That Rev. John Kuelling be requested to translate the Minutes of Synod into the German language, and that he be allowed twenty dollars for his services.

#### II. VOTE OF THANKS.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Synod be tendered to the members and friends of the Reformed Church of Fairfield, Ohio, for their kind hospitality in entertaining its members during its present sessions, and that this resolution be read by the pastor loci at the next regular meeting of the congregation.

The roll was called, and none were found absent without permission.

The Minutes were read and adopted, and ordered to be engrossed.

#### ARTICLE XXIV.

#### ADJOURNMENT.

Resolved, That we now adjourn to meet in General Convention in the Reformed Church, at Canton, Stark County, Ohio, on Wednesday, May 1, 1872, at 7½ o'clock in the evening.

The Synod closed its sessions on Monday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, with singing, and prayer by Rev. Samuel B. Leiter, and the repetition of the Creed and the Lord's Prayer, and was dismissed with the Apostolic Benediction by the President.

REPORT ON INVALID FUND.

The Board of Directors of the Invalid Home beg leave to

submit the following as their Annual Report:

During the last year the proceeds arising from the rents have just about met the expenses. The prospects of this property growing in value are very poor, and the losses arising from part improvements afford a sufficient reason why none should be made in the future with the view of making it more profitable.

The Board has been trying, for the past three or four years, to dispose of the Home, but without success. It was about to effect a sale a few weeks ago, but upon reviewing the deed, found that it contains provisions which make the Eric Classis, to which it originally belonged, or its Board of Directors, the owners of the property, and said Board alone can order the sale of it and the execution of a good deed.

In view of the circumstances in the case, we would recommend

the following action:

Resolved, That this Synod acknowledges the benevolent design of the Eric Classis in donating to it an equal share with the North-Western Synod in the property under the title of the Invalid Home.

Resolved, That inasmuch as it is to the best interests of the Church to dispose of said property, which can be done only by the aforesaid Classis, we do hereby relinquish all our claims upon it, and that the Board of Directors be discontinued.

The Committee, which was continued by the Synod of last year to co-operate with a Committee of the North-Western Synod in translating and publishing the new German Liturgy of the two Synods, would respectfully submit the following:

The North-Western Synod appointed, at its last annual meeting at Cleveland, O., in the place of its former large Committee,

a smaller one of but two members. This committee, in connection with yours, held two joint meetings during the year, at Cincinnati. At the first of these joint meetings the work of translating, or rather revising, was subdivided among the different members of the joint Committee, with instructions to report to the Chairman as soon as each member's work was completed.

Under this arrangement the translation is now ready for publication, with the exception of a few formulas of the Lord's

Supper, which have yet to be revised.

But while we are enabled to report this state of the work, your Committee has to call the attention of this Synod to several resolutions of the North-Western Synod, on page 9 of its published Minutes of 1871, which will impede the further co-operation of this Synod so long as they remain in force. No. 3 of these resolutions requires that the Faculty of the Mission House in Wisconsin shall examine the new translation, and, in case of its approval, shall publish it, a requirement which your Committee regard as unwise and impolitic. And No. 4 says, that the Committee appointed by the Synod of Ohio shall be consulted, thus practically subordinating your Committee to theirs, which your Committee also regard unwise and impolitic.

Your Committee would therefore recommend, that the North-Western Synod be requested to revoke these resolutions, at its

approaching annual meeting at Galion:

It is the opinion of the joint Committee that 800 copies of the book ought to be struck off, when it is published, and not only 200, as required by a resolution of the North-Western Synod. as the last-named number would not be sufficient to meet the immediate want of the Church.

Believing that the expenses of publishing the first edition will within a short time be covered by sales of the same, we would suggest that this Synod appoint a Committee of two to unite with a similar Committee on the part of the North-Western Synod to proceed with the publication, and report at the next annual meeting.

To facilitate the circulation of an order of worship according to the standard of our Church, and also to supply a long felt want, it is the opinion of this Synod that prayers suitable for the

family should be embodied in the German Liturgy.

The Committee on Minutes of Classes presented their report. which was received, and disposed of item by item; and is as follows:

#### REPORT ON MINUTES OF CLASSES.

Your Committee, to whom were referred the Minutes of Classes, would respectfully report the following:

#### IRREGULARITIES.

1. Lancaster Classis does not give the name of its Treasurer in connection with its President and Stated Clerk; omits to mention the date of its last annual meeting, nor does it state whether the constitutional questions were proposed to the Elders in connection with the reading of the parochial reports.

Iowa Classis states only the date, not the hour of its last annual meeting. Same Classis gives no evidence in its Minutes of the fact, that the regular constitutional questions were proposed to the Elders in reading the parochial reports, nor does it separate the report of State of Religion from its Minutes.

Tuscarawas Classis does not state that its sessions were

opened and closed with religious services.

4. Illinois Classis does not present its proceedings under proper heads, and dismissed Rev. G. Weber conditionally.

5. St. John's Classis organized a congregation on the territory of the East Ohio Classis, and authorized the erection of a church building within a short distance of one of the congregations of said East Ohio Classis.

#### REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. Illinois Classis requests Synod, a,) to overture the North-Western Synod on the subject of gross irregularities and encroachments upon its jurisdiction perpetrated for years by Milwaukee Classis; b,) referred Rev. C. G. A. Hullhorst's case to the Synod of Ohio to determine the validity of his ordination on account of certain irregularities connected with the same.

Miami Classis requests Synod to instruct the Boards of our institutions at Tiffin, O., to make such arrangements that the monies collected and notes taken for endowment be equally

divided between the College and Seminary.

Lancaster Classis requests Synod to give an opinion regarding the ecclesiastical standing of a minister not engaged in the active duties of the ministry, and not in regular church connection with one of its congregations.

- 4. Iowa Classis, a,) recommends the Boonesboro Mission to this Synod with the request that \$150 be allowed the same instead of \$100—\$50 to be raised by Classis; b,) same Classis requires Synod to severely rebuke and condemn the arbitrary action of the Wheatland Convention, and asks to remain undivided for the present.
- 5. Eastern Ohio Classis asks Synod's permission to organize a Classical Missionary Board, within its bounds, auxiliary to Synod's Board.
- 6. St. John's Classis requests to lay before Synod certain difficulties existing between said Classis and the East Ohio Classis.

#### III. APPEALS AND COMPLAINTS.

- 1. Rev. H. Knepper appeals from action of Illinois Classis on deposition.
- 2. St. John's Classis complains of being misrepresented by Synod, a,) concerning the discontinued publication of the Minutes in the German language; b,) regarding the translation of the Liturgy without special cost to Classis.

#### IV. SUBJECTS REFERRED TO CLASSES.

- 1. Tuscarawas Classis accedes to the requests of Synod respecting Missions, giving the name of the Treasurer, taking up special collections for the immediate use of the Theological Seminary and the support of the Students' Home.

Miami Classis complies with the requests of Synod regarding the name of Treasurer of Classis, urging special collections for the immediate use of the Seminary, and ascertaining whether this request has been complied with by the charges. also regarding the Classical Missionary Board and increased missionary contributions.
- 4. Lancaster Classis complies with the requests of Synod regarding the raising of funds for beneficiary education and special collections for the immediate use of the Theological Seminary, as also respecting the relation of the Classical Missionary Boards to the Board of this Synod.
- 5. Iowa Classis accedes to the requests of Synod to give the name of the Treasurer and increased missionary contributions.
- 6. Tiffin Classis complies with Synod's requests regarding the relief of Ministers and their widows, also special collections for the Theological Seminary.
- 7. Eastern Ohio Classis complies with Synod's requests regarding the relief of Ministers and their widows, also special collections for the immediate use of the Theological Seminary.

#### ARTICLE XL

#### CORRESPONDENCE WITH SISTER CHURCHES.

#### I. REPORT FROM DELEGATE TO THE GENERAL SYNOD OF THE REFORMED CHURCH IN AMERICA.

The following report was received, and ordered to be embodied in the minutes, viz:

The undersigned, as the first Corresponding Delegate from this Synod to the General Synod of the Reformed Church in

America, would respectfully report:

That he attended the annual meeting of that Synod, held at Albany, New York, commencing its sessions on Wednesday, June 7th, 1871, and was present from Thursday morning until the following Monday evening. He was cordially welcomed, hospitably entertained, and courteously treated while in attendance. He was made to feel that he was among brethren of a common faith, and found it pleasant to be in their midst.

The most of the subjects claiming the attention of that Body were of an important and interesting character, and, while the deliberations were conducted with dignity and orderly dispatch, the discussions were possessed of ability, animation and interest. And it appeared, from the various reports and discussions, that the benevolent, educational and publication enterprises of our sister Church were in a growing and prosperous condition.

In his address before that Synod, your delegate tendered the fraternal salutations of this Synod, and, in the light of history, gave a statement of the present condition and prospects of the Reformed Church in the United States in general, and of the portion included within the bounds of the Ohio Synod in particular. He also briefly referred to the intimate historical relations of our two Churches, and to the desirableness and importance of a closer or organic union of them. There appeared to prevail, as at the time manifested in open Synod, a decided sentiment in favor of union. The Synod subsequently adopted some action on the subject of union, but as that action was taken after your delegate had left Albany, and as that Synod is officially represented here, it is not deemed necessary to add anything further on the subject in this report.

His address was kindly responded to by the President of that Body, who requested your delegate to bear back with him the Christian greetings and sympathy of the Reformed Church in America to our own, with the assurance that they have a profound interest and lively concern in the prosperity and welfare of the Reformed Church in the United States.

#### II. DELEGATES FROM CORRESPONDING BODIES.

#### 1. From the Reformed Church in America.

On the morning of the third day of the sessions, the Rev. Edward P. Livingston, delegate from the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, appeared in Synod, and, having presented his credentials, took his seat as a Corresponding member. He subsequently addressed the Synod in an appropriate and fraternal manner. His address was cordially and properly responded to by the President.

In connection with the delegate, the Rev. Philip Peltz, D. D. appeared as a Commissioner from that Body to this Synol, and after presenting his credentials and laying on the table of Synod a copy of the Minutes of the Body he represented, stated in a written address "the aspects of the subject of union which strikes their Synod."

Thereupon, on motion, it was

Resolved. That a Committee of one Minister and one Eder from each Classis represented be appointed, to whom the whole subject of union between our Church and the Reformed Church in America, together with all documents—pertaining—thereto be referred.

The Committee consists of Revs. S. Mease, C. W. Hoyman, Dr. S. B. Leiter, Dr. G. W. Williard, Dr. J. G. Zahner, H. Wilson, C. Cort, G. M. Albright, and Elders B. Kuhns, P. H. King, L. Keller, Dr. C. J. Geiger, F. Bolender and J. Greenameier.

This Committee subsequently submitted the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of union between the Reformed Church in America and the Reformed Church in the United States, submit the following report:

That the Synod has heard with pleasure the Rev. Philip Peltz. D. D., who was appointed by the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, held at Albany, N. Y., in June, 1871, a special Commissioner, in connection with its delegate, the Rev. Edward P. Livingston, to state to this Body the aspect of union as it presented itself to their Synod. Having heard the Commissioner, we would say in return, that we regard the union of these two branches of the Church as most important for our common Reformed faith as maintained in our venerable symbol, the Heidelberg Catechism, and that we are ready to co-operate in any and all measures calculated to secure this desirable end, which we believe to be in conformity with the prayer of the great Head of the Church, the spirit of our holy religion, and the wish of all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth.

The Synod is also entirely satisfied with the Christian spirit and sincerity of our brethren of the Reformed Church in America touching the movement, especially since it is assured by the worthy Commissioner that the Synod of Albany had no design to ignore or show disrespect to any Judicatory of our Church. and that the action assumed the shape it did because they were not able at the time to ascertain the exact relation of our District Synods to the General Synod, as our delegate had left before the action was taken. That the movement did not start with the General Synod, is no just reason why it should not be fairly considered in all its aspects, and meet with a hearty cooperation for a satisfactory termination.

Being thus relieved of the difficulties which some supposed to exist at first, and seeing how the Lord seems to be moving the different portions of the Church to seek a closer union, it is believed that the present movement is under His direction, and

should be cordially seconded; therefore,

Resolved, That the subject of union, as presented by our brethren of the Reformed Church in America, be referred to our General Synod for its consideration at its approaching meeting

at Cincinnati, Ohio.

Resolved, That the delegate from this Synod to the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America be instructed to lay this action before that body with proper explanations, and request the appointment of a Commissioner to our General Synod,

with the view of furthering the object of union.

Resolved, That the union here contemplated meets with the cordial favor and approval of this Synod, and that it earnestly requests the General Synod to adopt such measures as will be calculated to effect it as early as possible, upon such a basis as will be just and honorable to all concerned.

Resolved, That we request the North-western Synod to consider the question of union between the two Churches, and that, if it meet their favor, they unite with us in overturing our Gen-

eral Synod to this end.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

#### RELIGION AND MORALS.

The Committee on the State of Religion and Statistical Reports submitted their report, which was received, amended and adopted; and is as follows:

To the Synod of Ohio and Congregations in connection with it in other States: "Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

Dear Brethren in the Lord:

From the reports that came into our hands we can form only a very general idea of the condition of the Church. This much, however, we have learned in the beginning, that there are very many and great reasons why we should thank the Lord for His goodness, in the constant fulfillment of His great and precious

promises given to His Church and people.

But two watchmen from among our entire number, and both from the St. John's Classis, have been called away from their labors by death during the year. The one, Rev. John W. Hamm, only after a long life, great trials, and rich gifts and graces had ripened for the superior heights of that glory which remaineth for the faithful ambassador of the Lord Jesus; and the other, Rev. Eugene Sauvain, after having reached the meridian of life, giving evidence of fidelity and usefulness in the service of his Divine Master, and experiencing great bodily afflictions, entered upon his eternal reward.

The reports speak favorably of the general fidelity of ministers and elders to their great trust in tending the flock over which the Great Shepherd has placed them, using, with a good measure of diligence, the means appointed to this end—such as preaching of the Gospel, administering the sacraments, cate-

chising the youth and pastoral visitation.

They also speak of the general appreciation of these means for the edification and spiritual growth of God's children and of the gradual diminution of the disparagement between the non-communicant and the communicant members of the church. These things are encouraging, especially in these days of infidelity and of want of faith in the grace-bearing ordinances of the Church.

Some of the reports speak encouragingly of the additions made to the Church by the rite of confirmation, of the erection

of new church edifices and the organization of new congregations and pastoral charges; and others of growing interest in the Sabbath-school work, and of increased piety in the family.

One notices, especially, the effects of missionary festivals, in awakening the church, not only to increased efforts in the work of missions, but also, to holier zeal and greater fidelity in the cause of Christ, in general.

It is also worthy of note that both of the reports coming from the Iowa Classis, in which discord so long abounded, now speak

of peace and harmony as much more abounding.

The statistics show too, that several candidates have been ordained to the gospel ministry, and that one thousand, eight hundred and eighty members have been received by holy baptism, and one thousand, four hundred and seventy by the rite of confirmation.

But while in these particulars, we have pleasing and encouraging evidences of the presence and power of the Spirit in the Church, it must not be concealed that there are evils existing which should arrest our attention, and call for deep humiliation as well as for earnest effort to remove. With scarcely an exception, the reports find occasion to state that there has been no marked out-pouring of the Holy Spirit within their bounds, during the year. Many fields are without pastors, while there are pastors without fields. Some reports attempt to account for this upon the ground of insufficient salaries. One thing is sure, these flocks, without shepherds to defend and nourish them, cannot long withstand the evils to which they are constantly exposed.

In many places, the prayer-meeting is habitually neglected and officers of the church fail to meet their responsibilities "in watching for souls and in exercising the proper discipline of the church." "Parents neglect to imbue the minds of their children with Bible truth, by giving line upon line and precept upon precept, according to the abundant opportunities, responsibilities and baptismal engagements."

There is also a growing tendency of allowing the Sunday school to take the place of the catechetical class, thus placing our children under the instruction of, at best, but partially competent teachers, to impart to them a knowledge of the doctrines of our Holy Christianity.

What now is our duty in view of these existing evils, but to humble ourselves under the mighty hand of God, and pray for a permanent revival of religion—a revival throughout our whole bounds, in all our congregations, in the hearts of all our ministers, elders and people; a genuine God-sent revival produced not by human effort or human devices, but by the power of the Spirit through the instrumentality of truth, in answer to believing prayer and the diligent use of the means of divine appoint-

ment. O, that this revival might begin in our hearts, that it would banish all discord and give us peace.

The Church does not need a new ministry, but it does need a ministry full of faith and of the Holy Ghost—a primitive ministry with the true martyr spirit.

It is true we are few and our churches, for the most part, are small and widely scattered and can do, in a temporal way, but little for us. Almost everywhere our work is a missionary work, and almost everywhere we are spoken against. But let us be satisfied in the midst of privation to labor in a good cause, looking to the great and exceeding precious promises of a great and covenant-keeping God, and we shall triumph.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

#### THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

#### I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

#### 1. Report of the Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary hereby present their annual report:

The Board convened at Dayton, O., July 5th. 1871, and organized by electing Rev. Isaac H. Reiter, President, Rev. David Van Horne, Secretary, and Rev. David Winters, D. D., Treasurer.

By authority of the Board, the Treasurer during the year disposed of the United States Bonds, amounting to \$7,150 00, and invested \$7,000 00 in Dayton City Bonds at the rate of eight per cent interest, to be paid semi-annually. The premium derived from this sale amounted to \$865 00, which were appropriated in payment of the Professors' salary. This change of investment is believed to be to the interest and advantage of the Seminary.

The Board appropriated \$50 00 of the fund for the immediate use of the Seminary, for the purpose of properly fitting up the room, which the College Board of Trustees granted to the Seminary for its use; and also \$15 00, on certain conditions, to defray the expenses of publishing the annual Catalogue of the College and Seminary for the current year.

The Board, for want of means, could not see their way clear to comply with Synod's recommendation in regard to the appropriation of \$50 00 for repairing the Library Room in the College Building.

Preliminary negotiations have been commenced with the Mansfield, Coldwater and Lake Michigan Railway Company, respecting the right of way through the Students' Home lot at Tiffin, but as yet no definite conclusions have been reached.

The amount of the endowment of the Theological Seminary has been further increased through the efficient operations of our Agent. Mr. Henry Leonard, and our faithful Treasurer has continued his labors in collecting out-standing dues. The premium received on the sales of bonds and the amounts derived from all other available resources have enabled the Treasurer to meet the claims of the Professors for the current year. But, as there can be no premium on bonds expected during the next synodical year, and as the amount of endowment is

still insufficient to pay the whole of the Professors' salary, it will necessary to continue the system of special collections and to performed the endowment enterprise.

# 4. Report of Board of Visitors. General Statements.

The training of young men for the gospel ministry should claim the serious attention of the Synod, especially in view of the great destitution which prevails all around us. It may indeed be said that the most pressing want of the church at the present time is that of men to occupy our vacant charges and infessionary points. In this view of the subject it is gratifying to know that the Seminary is rising in favor with the church, and that the prospects for the future are very encouraging.

The attendance has been larger during the year than it has ever been in the history of the Seminary. Twenty-two students have been connected with the institution. Of these, seven have been dismissed to the different Classes and Synod for licensure and ordination, and are either in the active duties of the ministry or ready to enter thereon, viz: C. G. A. Hullhorst, J. S. Gough, S. W. McClure, M. Hoernlein, J. M. Kendig, A. F. Zartman and A. Henry.

The examinations evinced diligence and studiousness on the part of the young men, leading the Board to indulge the hope that they will become efficient laborers in the vineyard of our Lord.

The pressing want of the church made it necessary, in the case of several of the young men here referred to, to dismiss them before they had gone through the entire course of study. It is gratifying, however, to know that their examinations were reported as satisfactory by the different Classes to which they were referred. Your Board entertains the hope that the vacant fields which are calling so loudly for laborers will soon be supplied, and that the Treasury of the Education cause will be better provided for, so as to avoid the necessity here referred to.

Beneficiary Education.

The cause of Beneficiary Education is most intimately conmeeted with the prosperity of the Church. The history of the past confirms the fact that the great majority of those who are called to preach the gospel are from among the poor. It was so in the days of Christ and his apostles, and in all subsequent ages. Not many of the great and rich of the world are called, but God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the mighty. Such being the state of the case, it becomes the solemn duty of the church to give aid and support to those who are willing to devote their talent and energies to her advancement, if they are not able to bear the expense necessary to fit themselves for the work of preaching the gospel. The wants of the church as well as the age in which we live demand an educated ministry.

For years past, the great difficulty with which we have had to contend, as a denomination, has been a scarcity of ministers. If we had our missionary treasury full, at the present time, we would still not be able to occupy our territory, as we have not The most pressing want of the church, therethe men to send. fore, at the present time, is the men that are needed to occupy the ground that rightfully belongs to us. The harvest is great but the laborers are few. How then can a sufficient number of pious and talented young men be secured to meet this present and pressing want? Your Board is pleased to say that it can to a great extent be provided for, if the means are furnished to support those who are willing to devote themselves to the work. It seems as if God has answered our prayers in disposing quite a number towards the ministry of the gospel. The applications for aid during the last few years have been more numerous than our means would justify, so that it becomes us, if we would be true to ourselves and the interest at stake, that we enlarge our operation.

There have been twenty-five young men under the care of your Board during the last year receiving aid. Five have been assisted by the American Education Society, making thirty in all.

The Board has had great difficulty to meet the appropriations of the young men in view of the small contributions that have been made to this object. The church is slow in coming up to the full measure of its duty. \$600 will be needed by the 20th of June to pay the appropriations of the young men in full for the year; this should by all means be provided for. Considering the number of delegates present at this Synod, there ought to be no difficulty in raising the amount in contributions and pledges before our adjournment. The Board would strongly recommend that an effort be made for this purpose.

For a full statement of the finances of the Board, we refer the Synod to the report of the Treasurer.

### 6. Report on Theological Library, &c.

In continuation of my report of last year, I beg to report to

the Synod this year the following:

1. The Alumni Professorship in the Seminary.—One of the Alumni of the Theological Seminary, who desires his name to be withheld for the present, has placed in my hands a note of \$300 00, duly executed, which is to serve as a foundation stone for the proposed Alumni Professorship. It bears interest from date. The way does not yet seem fully open to press this interest; still, if any of the Alumni have a mind to work in the matter, I will cheerfully take charge of all that may be contributed.

- 2. The Library Fund.—No additional moneys for this fund have been received during the past year. The note of \$4000 00 for our Library Fund, executed by the late Rev. Albert Helfenstein, Jr., has not yet been paid. The Executors of the estate would have preferred paying the note, but the heirs of the estate resist its payment. Mr. Hay, into whose hands the whole matter has been placed, is of the opinion that we shall succeed in obtaining the money, but it requires certain legal procedures, and may take yet a year or two before a final decision can be had. The matter will be pressed as rapidly as the law will allow.
- 3. Endowment of the Third Professorship in the Seminary.—With reference to the project of V. Hay, Esq., to endow this professorship, I have to report, that he still hopes, in good faith, to complete it, and that he feels quite disappointed that he has not been able to do it as yet. Under date of April 20th, 1872, he writes, "I am sorry to say, that owing to the dullness of the times and the tightness of the money market, I have been unable to put it into practical operation. I have risked a great deal for the sake of it and I still hope to be able to accomplish my purpose at no distant day, the Lord willing. My object and desire is, to have the professorship endowed by the end of another year."

II. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Standing Committee on the Theological Seminary, to whom the foregoing reports were referred, presented their report, which was received and adopted:

Your committee have examined the reports of the President and Treasurer of the Theological Seminary, and also those of

the President and Treasurer of the Board of Visitors.

We would, from them, call your attention particularly to the fact that a suitable room in the College building has been granted by its Board of Trustees for the use of the Seminary. The room, which is on the second floor, is large, properly fur-

nished and adapted to the present wants of the Seminary inregard to recitations and homiletical exercises. This has been accomplished at a cost to the Seminary treasury of only \$50 00, while at least an equal amount was contributed to it by the

professors, students, and other friends.

The regular endowment fund is still inadequate. During the year the Treasurer has been able to meet the arrearage on the Professors' salaries only by a transfer of bonds, thereby gaining a premium. This expedient cannot be resorted to again, and the deficiency must now be met by special collections from the churches. It is evident, to all acquainted with the facts in the case, that this deficiency in making up the salary of our two professors, occurring as it does, year after year, is a great hindrance to the success of the institution; and on the other hand, it is an encroachment upon the cause of beneficiary education and missions, to make this deficit an object of benevolence equal to the above objects in its claims upon the churches. We suggest the following resolution:

· Resolved, That as the Seminary endowment fund is inadequate for the support of the two professors, we urge an earnest

and immediate effort for its increase.

As to Beneficiary Education, it appears that a greater number of young men have made application for assistance than the

Board could help.

Twenty-five young men have been under the care of the Board receiving aid, and five others have been assisted by the American Education Society. Complaint is made by the officers in their reports that the churches have not come up to the help of the Board in its emergency. The Board now owes the College \$300 00, and the Treasurer \$130 00, and it will need for these debts and other expenses \$600 00 by the 20th of June.

In view of this indebtedness, we recommend the following:

Resolved, That the suggestion of the Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary, in regard to raising the funds necessary to meet the appropriation of the students at the end of the year, be adopted by this Synod and that an earnest and immediate effort be made for this purpose.

#### ARTICLE XV.

#### HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

1. Report of the Board of Trustees.

In making the annual report of the Board of Trustees of Heidelberg College to the Synod, we are glad that we can say that considerable progress has been made in our educational interests during the year. The Church has long and anxiously watched the growth of her Institutions. Much solicitude has been felt at different times in regard to

their full establishment. In these circumstances it is but reasonable to suppose that the annual report will be looked for with special interest.

The Catalogue for 1871-72, which is ready for distribution, gives a full exhibit of the present condition and wants of the College. According to this, there have been 144 students in attendance during the year, in the several departments.

A number of improvements have been made in and around the College building at an expense of several hundred dollars. Many of the rooms have been papered and painted, making them much more attractive and comfortable for the students occupying them. Walks have been constructed in the Campus, pavements laid, and flower beds made by the Excelsior and Heidelberg Literary Societies, which have added greatly to the general appearance of things. A Microscope and Telescope of large magnifying power have been purchased, which will enable the Professors to add new interest to a number of the recitations. The cost of these instruments is about \$550, a very large proportion of which has been secured by special effort on the part of the Professors. The library room is being fitted and arranged so as to hold the Libraries of the College and Seminary, together with those of the Excelsior and Heidelberg Literary Societies, making in all nearly 5,000 volumes. The expense of this improvement, when completed. ably amount to \$300, which the Professors and students have resolved to raise by special efforts in different parts of the Church during the coming vacation. Much praise is due to those who have engaged in these improvements for the labor they have voluntarily performed. and the cheerfulness with which they have done it at times that did not interfere with the regular studies of the Institution.

The coming commencement will be one of more than ordinary interest as the class that will graduate will be the largest in the history of the College, including as it does fifteen members, a majority of whom have the ministry in view. It is also a gratifying feature in connection with the College that the number of students in the regular

classes is larger than usual

The endowment, though it has been increased very much within the last few years, is not what it ought to be. A majority of the students being on scholarships, the income of the Institution from tuition is comparatively small so that we are to look mainly to the endowment for the funds with which to pay the salaries of the Professors. The reliable endowment of the College is about \$80 000. Of this not more than \$50 000 is yielding interest, the balance being payable at the death of the donors. As might be expected, many of the notes given at different times to the College have proven worthless, owing to a change

in the circumstances of those who gave them.

The sum total of the expenditures of the College for the last year including the salaries of the Professors and Agent H. Leonard, with the necessary incidental expenses of repairs on the building, &c., was \$5.556.99. Those of the present year will fall short of this amount from which it will be seen that the greatest economy has been practiced in the management of the College. And yet with all this economy and retrenchment, there was a deficiency last year of \$258 50. There is danger that we may fall short this year also, unless those who have given notes to the College are very prompt in the payment of the interest due thereon by the 20th of June, when the current year closes. From this statement of the current expenses of the College, it is

apparent that the endowment must be increased still further, in order that we may provide promptly for all its wants. The only way to do this is to encourage the Agent. II. Leonard, in his ardnous and self-denying labors. The Church owes him a debt of gratitude for what he has already done, and as he is willing to continue his efforts until

the College and Seminary are both endowed, he should receive a welcome wherever he goes.

Those who have given their notes for the endowment, and have not found it convenient to pay the principal, should in all cases pay the interest thereon punctually as it becomes due. The amount in each case being small, it can easily be paid, and if all would do so, it would be a great relief.

There are at least 1,000 scholarships owned by members of the Church. These should not remain unoccupied as is the case with a majority of them. The College would be glad if those who have aided it with their means would reap the advantages to which they are entitled. A little effort on their part would in all probability secure the attendance of some of their descendants that would be glad to go on them.

The most pressing want of the College, at the present, is a boarding house on the Campus, where the students might get their boarding at reduced figures, and so avoid the necessity of boarding themselves. This might be so arranged as to contain a sufficient number of rooms to accommodate the ladies that come from abroad, and also provide for the boarding of such students as room in the College building. The suggestion is made in the hope that it will meet the views of the Synod and members of the Church generally.

We would also request the Synod to make such arrangements as to secure the attendance of a Committee or Board of Examiners at least at the close of each collegiate year. This it is believed would have a very desirable effect both upon the Institution and the Church.

We would also call the attention of the Synod to the fact that the Alumni of the College have undertaken the endowment of a Professorship. As quite a number of the Alumni are members of the Synod, it is hoped the project will be warmly recommended and carried to a successful termination at an early day.

The Synod is referred to the report of the Agent, Henry Leonard, for an account of his operations during the year.

#### 2. Report of Financial Agent.

Fifteen years have elapsed since I entered upon the agency of Heidelberg College, and yet the work assigned me is not completed. This is a matter that I have long since wished to see accomplished. But unless the ministers and membership of the Church will speedily and earnestly lay hold of the matter and aid me in this work, it is to be feared it will not be accomplished during my life-time.

I have sometimes thought that the brethren place too much confidence in me; that is, too many seem to think that I can do the work without any aid. The truth is, at no time did I stand in need of aid more than now. It is well known that the territory has been tolerably well canvassed, but there are still many persons that have never contributed, and others who have given will give again, if the matter is properly presented to them.

I would yet add, that during the winter and spring, while detained at my home. I have been sending out by mail several thousand photographs to our people, and from this source I have a fair prospect of realizing several hundred dollars after all expenses are paid.

I traveled during the year, 3.689 miles. Total number of miles traveled since the 22nd day of January, 1857, is 57,818.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

#### MISSIONS.

#### 1. Report of Board of Missions of Ohio Synod.

The cause of missions is one that should lie near the heart of every true Christian; its object being the spread and upbuilding of the Church. Christianity, although adapted to the wants of man and his fallen condition, and possessing power sufficient to elevate him to his true position, must be made known and brought into contact with those for whom it is designed. Christ himself when here upon earth was diligent in proclaiming the great truths of His kingdom. To do the will of his Father in heaven was not only his great delight, but also his constant work. The spirit which he manifested in the work of saving men is that which should characterize all his people. No church can be true to itself nor faithful to its great Head, if it is not pervaded and animated by the spirit of missions, which is the spirit of Christ.

There are reasons which make it right and proper for our own branch of the church to take a special interest in the cause of missions. Much of our prosperity in the past is to be attributed to the self-denying efforts of our ministers, who have labored with much perseverance

among the poor and destitute. Those who first came to the West and planted congregations over the territory now occupied by our Synod, as well as those who first came from Europe to America, were men of true missionary spirit. To-day we are enjoying the fruit of their labors.

Our success in the future depends in like manner, to a great extent, upon the interest we take in the cause of missions. Much of our territory remains yet unoccupied. The membership, or material that rightfully belongs to us, is unorganized and not able to employ the services of a regular pastor. If aided for a few years, until congregations can be organized and churches built, flourishing charges can in many cases be formed, which will soon return into the treasury of the church all they have received.

It is also the duty of the church to provide the means of grace for those who belong to her, where they are not able to bear the entire burden themselves. The true principle of the gospel is that the strong should help the weak, and that all should unite their means and ener-

gies so that every want may be provided for.

In this view of the case, it is to be regretted that so little interest has been felt in the cause of missions by many of our old and wealthy congregations and charges. There is surely wealth enough in the church to carry on successfully all its benevolent operations if all give according to their ability. The Board has endeavored by private correspondence and appeals in the periodicals of the church, to enlist our people more fully in the missionary work, but are sorry to report that we have not succeeded to the extent we desired. It seems to take time to unite our forces. Different views have prevailed among bretheren, and it would also seem among Classes, as to the best mode of operation, the result of which is that there has not been the concentration of effort which there ought to have been. We are pleased, however, to be able to report that there now seems to be a more general feeling on the part of the Classes to unite with Synod's Board, so that there is every reason to hope for increased activity and liberality in missions in the future.

Aid has been given during the year, to Rev. A. Bletsch, of Boonelowa, Rev. A. Schroeder, of Freeport, Ill., Rev. J. A. Smith, of Altamont, Ill., Rev. J. Michael, Liberty Centre, O., Rev. J. H. Apple, Germantown, O., and the Church of the Cross, Cincinnati, O., and also to the Rev. Dr. Stern, as General Superintendent of Missions, who retired

from the work at the close of the year.

The General Board of Missions also referred to the Board of this synod all the missions within its bounds, the transfer taking effect on the 1st of January, 1872. The missionaries were all notified of the action, and the appropriations made by the General Board continued to the end of the year in the case of each missionary, so as to keep the faith of the church. None of these missionaries have, however reported to the Board, and have in consequence, as yet, received no aid not having complied with the rules of the Board.

To avoid any collision in our operations, your Board, in acceding to the transfer of the missions of this Synod to its care by the General Board, resolved that hereafter no missions should be undertaken with in our bounds without our approval and consent. This action seemed necessary, in order to insure harmony and success in the work, as well

as being just and proper in the nature of the case.

The Board, to secure the co-operation of the different Classes in the work of missions, appointed brethren in the older Classes to aid it in its work. As the field in the West is large and may require some one of give special attention to it at certain times, Rev. H. Wilson was appointed to this work. The plan, it is hoped, will meet with general favor and reach the end desired.

The time has now come for greatly extended operations. The field

is ripe for the harvest. Many are calling to us for help. If we do not go in and possess the land it will be irretrievably lost to us, which would involve a dereliction of duty and reproach that would be a lasting disgrace to us as a church. The Lord, by His providence, seems to say to us, go up and possess the land; I will go with and bless thee, and prosper thee in all thy doings.

We refer the Synod to the Treasurer's report for an account of the finances of the Board.

## 3. Report of Committee on Home Missions.

The Committee on Home Missions submitted their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows:

Missionary work is the fulfilling of the new commandment of Christ—the natural expression of His Church towards a fallen humanity.

If the pulsations of the true life be strong and vigorous, the mission work, having the Divine blessing, will be truly glorious in its increasing preparations and results. Its prevalence will be like the luxuriant vine, climbing over all obstacles and making them beautiful monuments to the honor and glory of the all-prevailing power of Jesus' name.

As members of the Reformed Church in particular, we should not ignore our specific name which has been made sacred by martyr prayer and blood. We should be the leaders of all the other church families in missionary enterprise.

Senior of all the Reformation branches of the Church, and preserving still our identity, we have much of which to boast in this, the Divinely blessed work of our fathers. But their mantle is falling from our shoulders. There is recorded, even now, on the pages of ecclesiastical history, the accusing record that the Reformed Church is among the hindmost in missionary activity. When the press tells to the world that brethren in another church family, near to us in faith and dear in sympathy, have done seven times as much, per member, as we, in the cause of Chrintian benevolence, the record is as that on Belshazzar's wall. It is a time for us to pause and think!

The report of your synodical Board of Home Missions including that of its Treasurer, as referred to us, regrets the fact that so little has been done through it by the majority of our charges, and that there is not yet that union of effort, between the Classes and Synod, which should exist.

For the specific items of the work done, together with the missionaries employed and the fields occupied, during the past year, the Synod is referred to the accompanying report of the Board. The work accomplished indeed appears to be a mere nominal one, when compared with what the resources of the church membership laid it under obligation to do. Your Committee, being in the actual experience of the missionary life would ask your indulgence of a few additional remarks, in order to define some of the more salient features of what they deem a successful missionary work.

The error, that the least educated of our ministry will answer for the specific work in the West, is happily becoming less prevalent. Where this error prevails or such a mistake has been made, the church pays the tuition of such a ministry with the blood of souls.

The West is the great battic-ground where the Church is called to meet, in an especial manner, the great army of Unbeket as it is there boldly marshalled under the various forms of error, from gross, stolid Atheism up to those finer subtilties which are the fruits of intellectual pride. Therefore we must send to the West not only a Christian-hearted, but a well-drilled soldiery. For the Church is and must be aggressive, buckling on the sword of truth, if indeed it would prevail.

A missionary must have a thorough knowledge of the principles of the doctrine of Christ, and dare to stand before all the world in their defense. Yes, he must have above all, the love of one who feels that he himself is a ransomed soul, paid for with the price of Jesus' blood.

The world acknowledges the strength of such, and calls them "live men." It will stop to listen to such men, where the wavering will fail to get a hearing. Indeed, the vaporings of the hirelings, and of the inefficient in the ministry, have but prepared the way for those large results of true missionary labor.

A starving people crowd around the true ambassador of Christ, who, with a little blessed provision, feeds to spiritual satisfaction, a great multitude, and contradicts a flaunting infidelity which would presume to affirm that all the missionary enterprises in their sum total have been a failure.

But the chief cause of our weakness as a church in the missionary work, lies at our own doors. It is a lack of individual Christian liberality, on the part of a great portion of our members.

And your Committee think that until systematic benerolence is explained, exemplified and faithfully preached, we will remain a droning, poverty-stricken church. If we are stewards of the Lord, and have a right to all things in Him, then this waiting until our boards and church institutions come to our doors begging verily for life, should make us blush with shame in the presence of our brethren of sister churches.

Brethren, we are in a stupor; we must arouse! Let us not be dazzled, though we may rejoice at the additions in membership which are being made to our churches. These results are small—the additions few, compared with that natural growth which our Savior has taught us would follow the use of those means and privileges which every one has who has the least hungering or thirsting after righteousness. Let the entire membership of our churches in this Synod, which is roundly estimated at 30,000, give but five cents a week to church benevolence, and with this small sum, we as a Synod may start with \$75,000 00 the first year to its credit. As it is now, our membership gives less than one cent per week.

Again would your Committee emphatically affirm that our Reformed Church will drone and be weak until systematic giving be plainly taught by faithful preaching. The few examples of this Christian way of giving in our church stand by our side ready to prove our doctrine. The fruits of such a liberality grow wherever they can, and if the tree is barren the fault lies at our own doors.

In order to insure the prosperity of this work, your Committee would recommend the appointment, for at least a year or two, of a General Superintendent of this work of missions. And if he is a "live man," you can well afford to pay him a living salary. Put the plan of systematic benerolence into his head and heart, and with our Father's blessing, he'll accomplish wonders for you. Let him come into cvery charge and encourage those that work, and set the work in motion where it is needed. Let him visit the missions too, in a systematic way if you please, and thus he will have room for constant employment in his office.

But all this planning will be useless unless the members of this Synod stand up, as it were, in a solemn vow to God, that they will, by His grace, endeavor to carry out the plan of systematic benevolence. It must be a conscience matter, in order to succeed.

Your Committee would suggest the eminent propriety of this Syrod adopting the following resolution:

Resolved. That this Synod now elect a General Superintendcept of its missionary work in the West, with instructions to visit as far as possible, every pastoral charge and mission under its control, with an aim to their encouragement, and the seconding of the efforts of the pastors thereof, in the introduction and practice by their members of the plan of systematic benevolence.

Your Committee, on the nomination of a Missionary Superintendent, would report:

That they have unanimously agreed to nominate the Rev. Henry Hilbish for election to said office.

Resolved, That the Board of Home Missions be requested to agree with the Superintendent of Missions, respecting the salary to be paid him; and that the Board solicit every minister to subscribe personally towards raising this salary, and if possible, secure the entire amount in this way.

Resolved. That we respectfully request the North-Western Synod to co-operate with us in the employment and work of our Superintendent of Home Missions.

## ARTICLE XVIII

#### ELECTION OF BOARDS.

The Committe on Nominations, on the morning of the third day of the sessions, presented their report through the Chairman, Rev. C. W. Hoyman, which was received and adopted. The election was made the special order of the day for Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, and Rev. J. B. Shumaker and Rev. E. Herbruck were instructed to have a sufficient number of tickets printed for the use of the Synod. At the time appointed, the election was held. Revs. J. May and S. C. Goss were appointed tellers, who received and counted the ballots, and subsequently reported to Synod the following, as the result of the election:

Board of Trustees of Theological Seminary.

#### APPEALS.

The Committee on Minutes of Classes, Item 1st, under Appeals and Complaints, reported that an appeal had been taken by Rev. Henry Knepper, from the decision of the Illinois Classis, deposing him from the gospel ministry, &c. The said Item was . referred to a special Committee, consisting of Revs. L. H. Kefauver, D. Van Horne and Elder John Jackson. mittee subsequently presented the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:

Your Committee, to whom was referred the appeal of Rev. Henry Knepper, from the decision of the Illinois Classis, "deposing him from the office of the gospel ministry and from the privilege of communicant membership in the Reformed Church,"

report as follows:

That the appeal is found to be in order, and would recommend

the following order in the consideration of the same:

- That the appeal be made the order of the day for Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.
  - That all the documents in the case be read.

That the counsel for the appellant and the Classis be allowed half an hour each to argue the case.

That five minutes be given to each member of the Synod

to discuss the matter.

That the Rev. Joshua H. Derr be the counsel for the appellant, according to his own request, and that the Revs. Cyrus Cort and Joseph Sechler be the counsel of the Classis involved, in compliance with its own resolution.

The consideration of the case then proceeded according to the proposed order. After the reading of the documentary evidence in the case, and statements being made by the counsel, the following preamble and resolution were moved for adoption by Rev. Derr:

Whereas, in the case of the Illinois Classis against the Rev. Henry Knepper, important testimony has been presented which was not before the Classis when this case was investigated, and as this testimony might materially change the action of Classis, therefore,

Resolved, That the whole case be sent down to the Classis of Illinois for reinvestigation and readjudication at its next annual meeting.

It was objected by Rev. C. Cort, that, at this stage of the proceedings, such a resolution could not be entertained. After some discussion, the President decided the resolution in order. Thereupon, an appeal was taken by the Rev. C. Cort from the decision of the Chair, and the yeas and nays were called for. The decision of the Chair was sustained by a vote of 46 to 13, namely:

Good), as to what would be the effect of the passage of the resolution in respect to the status of Rev. Henry Knepper. The President decided that its passage would place the Rev. Henry Knepper in the same position in which he was before the passage of the sentence of deposition by the Illinois Classis at Freeport. The decision of the President was acquiesced in without dissent.

That they have carefully inquired into the whole matter and have come to the conclusion that the ordination of Bro. Hullhorst must be pronounced valid. He had received a regular call to the Foreston charge, and the Special Classis was regularly called and convened "to license and ordain him," and be was duly "set apart" by the laying on of hands by a proper judicutory. That the Classis made his examination short, and neglected or overlooked the duty of passing a formal note giving him license, before the act of ordination was completed, was

irregularity, for which the Classis deserves censure, but for ich neither Mr. Hullhorst nor the Foreston charge was in y way responsible. But surely this cannot make the solemn of ordination itself invalid. We therefore recommend the lowing resolutions:

Your Committee appointed to report a minute on the request Lancaster Classis to this Synod, to deliver an authoritative inion on the question, "Can a minister, not engaged in the tive duties of the ministry, and not in regular church connectm with one of its congregations as a member, still hold his ice in the ecclesiastical judicatories of the Reformed Church a minister in good and regular standing?" would respectfully port as follows:

The question submitted to this body in the aforesaid request volves two points:

The first is this: Does a minister hold any congregational imbership at all, according to the polity of the Reformed turch? This question we must answer in the negative. His uncetion with the church in general is through the ecclesiasal bodies to which he belongs, and to which he is amenable his moral and Christian conduct. His not holding connection with a congregation, as a member, being not involved in a nature of his office, cannot invalidate his right to regular nection with the ecclesiastical judicatories of the Church.

The second point involved in the request, is this: Does a nister's right to membership in the judicatories of the church ase with his cessation of regular labor as a minister? This estion we must also answer in the negative. He holds his are as a member of Classis, as long as he is not constitutionly deposed from office. As to the propriety of laying down active duties of the ministry, his Classis must, in the premis, be the judge. If he ceases to labor in the ministry and gages in a secular employment, without permission of his

Classis, or neglects to attend upon the communion of our Lord, it becomes the duty of Classis to inquire into his case and call him to account, according to the constitution of the Church. Until such procedure be had, or until such procedure shall result in deposition or excommunication, he holds his seat in his ecclesiastical judicatory.

Resolved, That this Synod hereby sanctions and confirms the division of the Iowa Classis on the basis of language, to take effect immediately upon the declaration of the amendment

of the Constitution by the General Synod.

Resolved, That the statistical tables of both parties be in corporated in the Minutes of Synod under the common head of Iowa Classis, in order to show the full strength of our Church in the State of Iowa.

#### PUBLICATION.

### 1. Report of Board of Publication.

Your Board held but one meeting during the year, and organized by the election of V. C. Tidball, President, and Rev. G.

Z. Mechling, Secretary.

The publication work, under the auspices of the Board, is yet limited entirely to that of Synod's organ, the Christian World. From our own observation of the paper during the year, and from the report of the editor, we feel enabled to congratulate the Synod upon its continued success. A large number of new subscribers has been received during the year; but this number has been largely counterbalanced by discontinuances, resulting mainly from an effort to prune the list of such as had become far in arrears. This, of necessity, caused a heavy loss to the publisher, and it is very desirable that such attention be secured on the part of pastors, agents and friends of the paper, that such loss may be less in the future.

We take pleasure, notwithstanding these disadvantages, in calling attention to various improvements made in the Christian World since our last report, such as better system in arrangement of contents, new heading, new and some smaller type, increasing the amount of reading, and a better quality of paper. There has also been given an increased amount of editorial labor. These have added considerably to the cost of publication, and furnish another reason for increased effort on the part of

its friends to extend its circulation.

From an examination of the list of subscribers we have evidence that the Christian World represents the views and sentiments of the Church quite largely in other Synods, in which its circulation is quite considerable and increasing. It should be an object to make it truly a paper of the Church, maintaining her doctrines and promoting her interests, and give it a place in all the families of the Church.

In the minutes of the last Synod we find an approving notice of the employment of Mr. Louis Melius as assistant editor, in which capacity he has continued to serve the interests of the

paper in an acceptable manner.

Your Committee on Publication beg leave to report that the only document placed in their hands was the Report of the Board of Publication. From this report it appears that the CHRISTIAN WORLD has met with continued success under the management of its efficient editor, Rev. S. Mease, aided by Mr. Louis Melius, who still continues to serve with acceptance, in the capacity of assistant editor. While a large number of new subscribers have been received during the year, there has at the same time been a larger number of discontinuances than usual. resulting largely from an effort to prune the list of such as have been long in arrears. A little observation must enable every one to see how much remains to be done before the paper, as should be the case, is found in every English-reading family within our bounds. Our duty, then, in this direction, should be self-evident, when we consider the fact that a live religious paper, representing the true interests of the Church in its own denominational life, is the most efficient co-worker which the pastor may call to his aid.

Your Committee would therefore recommend the following:

Resolved. That we commend this organ of our Synod to the members of the Church everywhere, as the faithful exponent of

the doctrines and usages of our Reformed Zion.

Resolved, That this Synod again call the attention of our pastors and people to the importance of lending every possible assistance in the effort to secure a much larger list of permanent patrons and readers of the Christian World, and that we will not cease to join our efforts with the untiring energies of the editors, until the work is accomplished.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

## 1. Action on proposed German Institution.

On the second day of the sessions, the Rev. Prof. Herman Rust made a statement respecting the German Institution, which the North-western Synod proposes to establish, and the desirableness of having it located at Tiffin, O. Thereupon, it was, on motion,

Resolved, That the whole subject involved in the statement presented be referred to a Committee, and that the consideration of their report be made the special order of the day for Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The Committee consists of Revs. Prof. H. Rust, Dr. J. H. Good, J. Kuelling, J. Heller, P. Herbruck, and Elders J. Jackson and Dr. C. J. Geiger. This Committee, at the specified time, submitted their report, which was received, discussed and adopted; and is as follows:

The Committee on the location of the German Institution, which the North-western Synod proposes to establish, would respectfully report:

That in their opinion, this important subject deserves the serious consideration and unanimous action of this Synod. It will be readily agreed by all, that union and harmony in doctrine and practice are most important and desirable, and that, therefore, it is our solemn duty to prevent as much as possible all measures that might tend to cause misunderstanding and separation; and, on the other hand, to improve every opportunity and employ every means to unite all the powers of the Church more firmly for the effectual upbuilding of the Redeemer's kingdom. Your Committee would, therefore, propose the following action:

Whereas, our brethren of the North-western Synod have resolved to establish a collegiate and theological institution for the proper training of German students; and,

Whereas, we have reason to believe that they are able to found such an institution, which shall be second to none in the land, and which will be an honor and blessing to the Church; and.

Whereas, the interest and prosperity of the Church, as well

as principle and wisdom, demand a concentration and more harmonious exercise of our teaching forces; and,

Whereus, the Lord seems to have put it in the power of the Synod of Ohio to do much toward the accomplishment of this desirable object, inasmuch as He has given us the Students' Home property, which in all probability will more fully subserve the purposes of the donors by making it the nucleus of this proposed German Institution; therefore,

Resolved. That we kindly invite the North-western Synod to locate their proposed institution at Tiffin, and bring it into harmonious relation with our present institutions.

Resolved, That to encourage them in their laudable undertaking we authorize and direct the Trustees of this Synod to transfer the said Students' Home property to the Trustees of the North-western Synod, with this proviso: that legal provision be made, either in the deed or by mortgage, that in case said proposed institution should ever be removed from Tiffin, or changed into anything else, then the North-western Synod shall pay the Synod of Ohio the sum of six thousand dollars, the present worth of the property, without interest.

On motion, the following action was adopted:

Whereas, the more general diffusion of the Word of God, both in our own country and in foreign lands, is a matter of paramount importance, and the chief means by which the great work of man's salvation is to be accomplished; therefore,

Resolved, That this Synod heartily endorses the endeavors of the American Bible Society, in its important mission, to secure this great end.

Resolved, That the American Bible Society meets with our cordial approval; and that we have confidence in the work and management of the Society in carrying out its plans and purposes.

## 4. Documents for North-western Synod.

The Stated Clerk was instructed to furnish copies of all the actions of this Synod, which are designed for the consideration of the North-western Synod at its next annual meeting.

## 5. Committee on Leave of Absence.

On Thursday morning, Revs. N. H. Loose, O. E. Lake, and Elder P. Cost were appointed a Committee to report the names of Advisory members present, and to whom all applications for leave of absence were to be made. This Committee reported from time to time the names of persons to whom leave of absence had been granted, and their action was approved.

## ARTICLE XXIV.

#### RESUMPTION AND CLOSE.

The following resolutions were adopted:

## 1. Publication of Minutes.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be authorized to have 1,200 copies of the Minutes of the present sessions of Synod, duly authenticated, published in the English, and 500 in the German language.

Resolved, That the Rev. John Kuelling be requested to translate these Minutes into the German language.

## 2. Vote of Thanks.

Resolved, That we as a Synod express our cordial thanks to the people of our two congregations, and to other citizens of Canton, for their kind reception and generous entertainment of the members of Synod during its sessions, and that the pastores loci be requested to read this resolution from their respective pulpits.

Resolved, That the thanks of Synod are hereby tendered to the Editor of the Stark County Democrat, for gratuitously printing the necessary tickets for the use of Synod.

The calling of the roll was dispensed with. The Minutes were read, and adopted, and ordered to be engrossed.

## ARTICLE XXV.

#### ADJOURNMENT.

Resolved, That we now adjourn to meet in annual sessions, in the Reformed Church, at Shelbyville, Shelby County, Illinois, on Wednesday, May 14th, 1873, at 7½ oclock in the evening.

The Synod closed its sessions on Tuesday afternoon, at half past five o'clock, with singing, and prayer by Rev. David Winters, D. D., and the repetition of the Apostles' Creed and the Lord's Prayer, and was dismissed with the Apostolic Benediction by the President.

## ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS

Of the Reformed Synod of Ohio, and the Congregations in connection with it in other States, which convened in the Reformed Church at Shelbyville, Shelby County, Illinois, on Wednesday, the fourteenth of May, at half past seven o'clock in the evening, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and closed its sessions on the following Monday forenoon, at half past eleven o'clock.

### REPORT ON MINUTES OF CLASSES.

Your Committee, to whom were referred the Minutes of Classes, would respectfully report the following:

#### IRREGULARITIES.

1. Lancaster Classis does not furnish a separate copy of

its Minutes, according to the standing rule.

2. English Iowa Classis failed to furnish the report on the State of Religion and Statistics on a separate sheet, and did not name the hour for its next annual meeting.
3. Tiffin Classis dismissed Rev. Horace Daniel, without

stating to what Classis.

- 4. a,) Eastern Ohio Classis failed to name the hour for holding its next annual meeting. b,) The same Classis defined the constitution to mean that female members of the Church have no right to vote.
- Illinois Classis did not record the call of the special meeting held in Shelbyville, Ill., and also failed to record the evidence on which the restoration of Henry Knepper was based.

German Iowa Classis does not state the hour for holding

its next annual meeting.

7. St. John's Classis enrolled Rev. F. Strassner as a corresponding member from Tuscarawas Classis, whilst he was dismissed from Lancaster Classis to St. John's Classis.

## REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

English Iowa Classis requests Synod to take immediate steps to equalize the traveling expenses of all delegates attending its sessions.

9. Eastern Ohio Classis requests Synod to adjust difficulties

between it and St. John's Classis.

10. St. John's Classis requests Synod to sustain it in its relation to the independent Salem's Evangelical congregation, and to accept that congregation according to their request.

11. Same Classis requests to be dismissed, in order to form a German Synod as soon as the Heidelberg, Erie and Indiana Classes of the North-Western Synod comply with its request to form such Synod.

12. Same Classis requests the Synod to supply in the future a more careful translation of the German Minutes, and that the printing be done at the Reformed Book Concern at Cleveland,

Ohio.

#### COMPLAINTS. III.

13. Illinois Classis complains of the indifference which Synod manifested in regard to the complaint against the Milwankee Classis, North-Western Synod.

14. St. John's Classis complains that the Synod did not notice the striking out of the name of Rev. H. Hunsche from

the roll of its members.

15. Same Classis complains of the deficiency of the German

16. German Iowa Classis complains that the apportionment

of the Ohio Synod was not just in comparison with that of the (Brandon) English Iowa Classis.

### SUBJECTS REFERRED TO CLASSES.

Miami Classis accedes to the request of Synod in regard to the circulation of the Christian World.

Tiffin and Lancaster Classes attended to the request of Synod to come to the help of the Board of Education.

### RECEPTIONS AND DISMISSIONS.

Miami Classis received Rev. S. B. Yockey and Rev. J. Heller from Lancaster Classis, ordained Nicholas Wiers, and dismissed Rev. John W. F. Graham to the Presbyterian church, and Rev. J. H. Apple to the Classis of St. Paul's, Pittsburg

Synod.

Lancaster Classis received Rev. W. A. Hale from Tuscarawas Classis, Rev. W. Gilpin from Illinois Classis, and Rev. Eli Keller from the Erie Classis, North-Western Synod; dismissed Rev. F. Strassner to Tuscarawas Classis, Rev. S. B. Yockey and J. Heller to Miami Classis, and Rev. J. W. ## ARTICLE XI.

#### CORRESPONDENCE WITH SISTER CHURCHES.

## I. REPORT OF DELEGATE TO WITTENBERG SYNOD.

The following report was received and adopted:

Your corresponding delegate attended the sessions of the Wittenberg Synod of Ohio of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, which convened on the 14th day of August, 1872, at Nevada, Wyandot Co., Ohio. He bore to that body the Christian salutations of this Synod, which met a hearty response from the former. The short time he had to spend with them was passed pleasantly and profitably. The reports of their Boards, &c., showed a prosperous condition of their Literary and Theological Institutions, as well as of their missionary and educational operations.

Through your delegate they send their fraternal greetings, and a desire for the continuance of the correspondence, which

has been so happily inaugurated.

### II. COMMITTEE ON UNION OF REFORMED CHURCHES.

On the second day of the sessions, the Committee on Synodical Minutes reported, in Item 12, that the General Synod requested this Synod to appoint a Committee of three members to act with similar Committees of the different District Synods upon the subject of union with the Reformed Church in America.

Thereupon, the Revs. Isaac H. Reiter, Samuel Mease and Geo. W. Williard, D. D., were appointed as said Committee.

### III. DELEGATES TO THE WORLD'S EVANGELICAL ALLIANCE.

During the morning session of the second day (Thursday) of the sessions, the Committee on Overtures reported a communication from Rev. Samuel S. Schmucker, D. D., accompanied by five printed circulars, claiming to set forth "a safe and practical Plan for an Advisory Union among all Evangelical Denominations," which, in its organized character and form, is to be a Branch of and auxilliary to the World's Evangelical Alliance, and requesting the Ohio Synod to appoint delegates to the World's Evangelical Alliance, to meet in the City of New York, on the 2nd of October, 1873.

The aforesaid papers, together with the general subject involved, were referred to a special Committee, consisting of Revs. Peter C. Prugh, Isaac H. Reiter and Elder George Souder.

This Committee, on the third day of the sessions, (Friday), submitted the following report, which was received and adopted:

The Committee appointed to report upon the proposed Ameri-

-can Branch Alliance, auxilliary to the World's Evangelical Alliance, have carefully examined the papers and documents placed in their hands, and would offer for adoption the following:

Whereas, A closer union of the different Evangelical Churches of this country is a subject worthy the most profound attention

and earnest prayers of all true Christians; and,

Whereas, The plan proposed, and signed by eminent ministers of most of the evangelical denominations in this country, for the creation of an "American Branch Alliance," appears

perfectly feasible, safe and important; therefore,

Resolved, That we adopt said plan, and proceed to appoint, according to the basis of representation, five delegates, three clerical and two lay members, to attend the meeting of the "World's Evangelical Alliance," to be held in the City of New York, on the 2d of October next.

Application having been made in behalf of Frederick P. Hartmetz, John H. Beck, John J. Leberman and Michael Loucks, students of and regularly dismissed from the Theological Seminary at Tiffin, for examination and licensure, they were referred to the Standing Committee on Examination, Licensure and Ordination, which Committee, during the Saturday morning session, (May 17th), submitted the following report, which was received and adopted:

The Committee on Examination, Licensure and Ordination

beg leave to submit the following report:

That they have examined the applicants referred to them in the various branches prescribed for the course of studies in the Seminary. It affords us pleasure to report the results of the examination satisfactory.

Messrs. J. H. Beck and F. P. Hartmetz, having commissions from the Board of Missions of this Synod, the former to Hiawatha, Brown Co., Kansas, and the latter to Denver, Colorado, and desiring to be ordained by this Synod at its

present sessions, we recommend them for ordination to the Holy

On motion, the Officers of Synod were appointed a Committee of Ordination; and Michael Loucks was referred to Tuscarawas Classis, John J. Leberman to Eastern Ohio Classis, and

John H. Beck and Fred. P. Hartmetz to Tiffin Classis.

Immediately after the adoption of the second resolution, following the report of the Committee on Examination, Licensure and Ordination, the Rev. E. F. A. Schade gave notice that he would for himself complain of the action of Synod, confirming the said calls, to the General Synod.

The Committee, (Rev. Nathaniel H. Loose, preaching the sermon, and Rev. Isaac H. Reiter, delivering the charge and prayer), appointed by Synod to ordain the aforesaid licentiates, attended to the duties assigned them, on Sunday evening, May 18th, in the First Reformed Church at Shelbyville, Illinois.

### ARTICLE XIII.

## RELIGION AND MORALS.

The Standing Committee on the State of Religion and Statistical Reports, presented their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows:

Report of the State of Religion within the bounds of the

Synod of Ohio.

Rev. and dear Brethren in the Lord: Every annual meeting of Synod, which we, by the Providence of God, are permitted

to attend, constitutes in reality an important epoch in our ministerial life; it is a certain resting-point which bids us to review all the active and passive experience of a whole year, and also to prepare for the solemn responsibilities of the future, And in doing this we are not concerned with our own individual interests, but with the interests of the whole Synod, as they are brought to our notice in the reports of the different Classes within its bounds. To some this may appear an easy task, but whoever truly desires to furnish a full representation of all the realized events, will readily acknowledge, and will never claim to have performed his duty satisfactorily, at least not to himself. It is simply impossible to present in a short report a perfect exhibition of all the occurrences throughout the whole Synod during an entire year. Only in the most general way can we touch upon a few of the most important subjects that have claimed the attention of our Classes, and which deserve the attention of every Christian.

All the Reports on the State of Religion placed in our hands, begin with expressions of devout gratitude to the Lord Jesus Christ, the great Head of the Church, for the goodness and mercy vouchsafed to His ministering servants, and for the apparent success with which their labors have been crowned. This is a glorious fact! because it proves beyond a doubt that our ministerial brethren in the different Classes are fully conscious of their heaven-born relation to the only begotten Son of God, our Lord, and that they fully know and acknowledge their dependence upon His divine grace, and are willing to be used as instruments in His kingdom. Let us rejoice in this glorious fact that the Sun of righteousness has risen upon us as a Church, and that we, together with all our ministerial brethren, are the honored and richly blessed servants of one and the same Lord and Master, whose divine promise: "Lo, I am with you alway," has been verified during the past Synodical year to the fullest extent.

It is true indeed, as several of the classical reports have recorded, that some of our brethren have passed through serious danger, and others have experienced sore afflictions in person, family and charges, but in all of them they have realized also the presence and help of the Lord, so that their temporal and light afflictions have in most cases been turned into spiritual joy. All our watchmen have been permitted to hold their position on the walls of Zion, and as they have raised their voices boldly in proclaiming the sweet and everlasting gospel of salvation to a perishing world, and have administered the holy ordinances of their glorious Commander faithfully, their labors have been crowned with great success, far surpassing, in some instances, their most sanguine expectations. Even from the far distant frontiers, where our zealous missionaries are

toiling to gather immortal souls into the fold of Christ, we have the encouraging intelligence, that during the past synodical year their self-sacrificing labors have received favor and prosperity from on high. Nearly all the reports from the different Classes express satisfaction and pleasure in view of the fact, that their pastors and elders have performed their sacred duties in a proper churchly spirit and manner, preaching and teaching the truth in accordance with our excellent symbol, the Heidelberg Catechism, and administering the Sacraments with a livelier consciousness of their Christ-appointed use and power, to reign over and seal to every believing soul the grace and communion of God. And in consequence of this, "the confirmed membership of the Church"—we are told—"with devout aspirations after higher and higher attainments in the divine life, have sought and obtained spiritual nourishment strength in the Sacrament of the body and blood of our blessed Saviour Jesus Christ.

It is also gratifying to learn from the reports that the pastors and people of our Synod have become more deeply interested, during the past year, in the proper religious training of the youth, and that consequently in some charges unusually large numbers of catechumens have been instructed, and the blessed work of the Sabbath school has received increased attention and resulted in larger benefits to the rising generation. It is being felt more clearly on all sides, that the solemn petition of the Lord's prayer: "Thy Kingdom come!"—must proceed from fervent, loving hearts, and be accompanied with open, active hands, and hence the divine work of missions, at home and in foreign lands, is claiming the attention of our pastors and charges to a greater extent than in years past. The loud and earnest cry:—let us have men and means; comes up to us from every Classis, and in order to have the growing demand satisfied, the Classes take a deeper interest in the support of beneficiary students, and in the upbuilding of our Literary and Theological Institutions.

In all these and other evidences of spiritual life, we, as a Synod, have great reason to rejoice. The Lord has answered the prayers of his servants, and has abundantly blessed the work of his handmaids, which is a sure sign that greater, more happifying results may be expected from our faithful labors of love during the present synodical year. Let us depart, therefore, to our respective fields of labor, with the firm confidence in the pledged help of our Divine Master, and in the regenerating and sanctifying power and efficacy of His Holy Spirit and means of grace. Let us, as a band of Christian brethren, pray with each other and for each other, and pray and labor hand in hand for the temporal and eternal welfare of all the precious souls entrusted to our care. For whilst we have reason to rejoice over much prosperity, we find also

abundant reason for sadness in view of still existing adversity. The peace and harmony in and between some of our charges and Classes have been greatly disturbed; selfish interests and blind party prejudices are still actively at work in various ways, endeavoring to separate and keep apart those that ought to be of one mind and spirit in the great cause entrusted to their care. The graces of love, faith and hope; the virtues of devotion, order, liberality, &c., are by far not yet as strong and extensive as they ought to be. And then, there are also providential afflictions that cause us to lament. With our brethren of Miami Classis, we have to lament the affliction of one of their most active and efficient members, the Rev. Conrad Saure.\* "May the good Lord give him grace sufficient, and soon restore him to health."

## ARTICLE XIV.

### THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

### I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

## 1. Report of the Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees of the Theological Seminary would here submit their annual report:

The Board met at Dayton, Ohio, July 2, 1872, and organized by the election of Rev. Isaac H. Reiter, *President*, Rev. David Van Horne, *Secretary*, and Rev. David Winters, D. D., *Treasurer*; and subsequently held several meetings during the year.

The attention of the Synod has been at different times directed to the subject of the Students' Home property at Tiffin. The total cost of the property, including the land, improvements and contingent expenses, reached the amount of \$4,826 78. The investment, financially, proved profitable to the Seminary, but the main object in securing the property was never fully realized, and the railroads passing through the lot have in a great measure frustrated the benevolent design of the whole enterprise.

Hence, after due consideration, and believing it to be for the best interests of the Seminary, the Board sold the Students' Home property to Nelson L. Brewer, Esq., for the sum of \$7,000, and executed a deed for the same to him, dated March 24th, 1873. The special terms of sale are \$2,000 in cash, and the balance of \$5,000 is to be paid in three equal annual payments, with 8 per cent. interest, secured by notes and mortgage, dated April 1st, 1873. At the time of the sale, there was resting

on the property a debt of \$174 00, which was paid out of the \$2,000 cash received.

There are still some notes in favor of the Students' Home, which the Board will endeavor to collect, but the most of these will in all probability prove unavailable.

In regard to the funds realized from the sale of the Students' Home property, the Board, at their annual meeting at Dayton, April 28th, 1873, adopted the following action:

"Resolved, That the Treasurer of this Board be, and is hereby, instructed to hold in trust, for the purpose for which it was donated, the \$7,000 realized from the sale of the Students' Home property, less \$174 00, the amount of indebtedness on the property when sold.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be instructed to invest the funds now in hand from the said sale, in Dayton City Bonds bearing 8 per cent. interest, payable semi-annually.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be further instructed to apply the interest money, realized from the bonds and notes obtained from the sale of the Students' Home property, for the immediate use of the Theological Seminary."

Under this arrangement, the special collections heretofore applied to the *immediate use* of the Seminary, in view of the incompletion of the endowment of the second Professorship, will not be required for that purpose, as the accruing interest will be sufficient to pay the German Professor; and hence these special collections raised by the congregations can be devoted to the beneficiary cause and missions, and thus afford a larger amount of aid to these important benevolent enterprises.

The Board has agreed to contribute annually ten dollars towards defraying the expenses of publishing the annual Catalogue of the College and Seminary, with the understanding that 100 copies, if desired, shall be placed at the disposal of the Board.

The financial Agent, Mr. Henry Leonard, during the past year, along with his operations for Heidelberg College, has collected "a few special crumbs" for the benefit of the Theological Seminary.

Our efficient Treasurer, during the year, has been diligently engaged in looking after delinquents and in collecting outstanding dues, and has done a good work in promoting the financial interests of the Seminary.

For a financial exhibit of the condition of the Treasury, the Synod is referred to the Treasurer's report, which is herewith submitted.

## 3. Report of the Board of Visitors.

The Board of Visitors of the Theological Seminary had a meeting on the 18th of June, 1872, at which time the examinations of that institution were held. Members present, Revs.

S. Mease, N. H. Loose, C. W. Hoyman, L. H. Kefauver, of the Synod of Ohio. None of the Board of the Synod of the North-West were present. The examinations continued throughout the day. They were interesting and proved satisfactory to the members of the Board. During the last year twenty-four students have been in attendance at the Seminary; seven of these have been regularly dismissed, viz: Charles W. Good, Theodore J. Bacher, William Herr, John H. Beck, John J. Leberman, Michael Loucks, and Frederick P. Hartmetz. The last four have been recommended to this Synod for licensure.

In view of the fact that frequent meetings of the Board would be necessary, an executive committee, to attend to the business requiring attention, was appointed, consisting of Revs. J. H. Good, D. D., H. Rust, D. D., G. W. Williard, D. D., R. Good, and L. H. Kefauver. This executive committee held quite a number of meetings during the year, for the purpose of receiving applicants into, and dismissing students from, the Semi-

nary.

From the facts just stated, it will be seen that the Theological Seminary is in a flourishing condition, and is doing a good work. From it the ranks of the ministry are filling up, and the Church is reaping the fruits of her investments in this direction.

## Beneficiary Education.

The cause of Beneficiary Education is also entrusted to this Board. The whole number of students under our care during the last year is twenty-two. Over two thousand dollars have been appropriated to students now on the Board. The amount due the Treasurer for money advanced, and to students who have not received their full appropriations, is \$663,75. To meet the appropriations for the present term will require about This added to the above deficiency, will amount to \$863,75, which amount should be paid into the treasury by the 18th of June next. And should this not be done, the Board will be greatly embarrassed, and will be compelled to borrow the money which will be due the beneficiaries at that time, thus requiring us to pay interest from our already depleted treasury. As the Church gets most of her ministers from this source, her liberality in this direction should be greatly in-Were it not for a few friends of this cause, the Board creased. would be compelled to refuse support to any further applicants who might wish to be taken under its care, and what would be still more humiliating, to drop some who are now receiving support from its treasury.

In view of our indebtedness we would respectfully request the Synod to take some immediate steps towards having it re-

moved.

### II. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Standing Committee on the Theological Seminary, to whom the foregoing reports had been referred, submitted the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:

Your committee have examined all reports coming into their hands. The reports will be incorporated in the minutes of Synod, so that our only duty is to report items for synodical action.

We congratulate the Synod and Church on the prosperous condition of the Seminary. Twenty-four students have been in attendance, seven having been dismissed, and some of these have entered upon the active duties of the ministry. It is a matter of regret, however, that the beneficiary students have not been paid. There is a deficiency of eight hundred dollars. We recommend the following resolutions:

Resolved, That all the different charges be requested to take collections for beneficiary education before the close of the present college year.

Resolved, That the editor of the "Christian World" call the

attention of the Church to this action of Synod.

Resolved, That no applicant for admission into the Seminary, or as a beneficiary student, be received unless coming under the care, and with the recommendation, of some particular Classis.

Resolved, That the different Classes be instructed to comply with Art. 3, of the Constitution, licensing none who have not been regularly connected with them during their theological training.

Resolved, That the professors be directed to report annually, in full, the standing of all the theological students, to the different Classes under whose care and supervision they respectively are.

### III. RESPECTING THE STUDENTS' HOME PROPERTY.

The Committee on Synodical Minutes, on the second day of the sessions, reported in item 10, that the Trustees of the Synod of Ohio were authorized, upon certain conditions, to transfer the Students' Home property at Tiffin to the Trustees of the North-Western Synod. The same committee reported, in item 11, that, as appeared from its Minutes, the North-Western Synod declined to accept of the Students' Home property on the terms offered to it by this Synod.

Thereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Synod expresses its regret that the North-Western Synod could not see its way clear to accept the offer of the Students' Home property, made to it by the unanimous vote of this Synod in 1872, and that its request for an unconditional surrender of the property could not be complied with.

## ARTICLE XV.

#### HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

#### I. THE ANNUAL REPORTS.

## 1. Report of the Board of Trustees.

To the Synod of Ohio:-

Having given a full exhibit of the operations and finances of Heidelberg College in our report a year ago, we do not deem it necessary to enter into particulars in the statements we now make. The attendance upon the College has been very encouraging, being a few more than we reported last year. The students have made commendable progress in their studies, and have deported themselves so as to gain the esteem of the Faculty.

The Agent has not been able to devote much time to the endowment of the College, in consequence of domestic afflictions. What little time he was able to operate he spent in the city of Tiffin and vicinity, endeavoring to raise the funds necessary for the erection of a Boarding Hall upon the campus, which is felt to be a necessity in the present posture of things. The beginning that has been made has been encouraging. If nothing interferes, the Hall will be erected in the course of the summer. The funds necessary to complete it will, in all probability, be contributed by the city of Tiffin and county of Seneca.

We are pleased to report a most magnificent and timely gift made to the College a few weeks ago by Mr. R. W. Shawhan, a prominent and highly respected citizen of Tiffin, of 6080 acres of land in Missouri, mostly in the counties of Reynolds and Carter. The object of the respected donor is to found a Professorship in the College. The land was estimated by Mr. Shawhan at \$15,000, which amount the Board of Trustees hopes to be able to realize from it. The sooner the land can be sold and the proceeds put upon interest, according to the intention of the donor, the better it will be for the College, as the endowment is not sufficient to pay the Professors the salaries they ought to have. Members of the Church who may have funds which they desire to invest in some safe and profitable way, may benefit themselves and the College by purchasing this land.

The Synod and Church at large are under many obligations to Mr. Shawhan for the timely and generous gift he has made. Those who intend to remember the educational and other interests of the Church by contributions, would do well to follow

the example of Mr. Shawhan by giving in their life time, sothat they can see that their donations are applied as they desire:

they should be.

We are also pleased to state that the expenses of the College, by great economy and self-denial, have all been provided for, for the last seven years, so that the endowment has remained untouched, and has been steadily increasing. Should the Church continue its support to the College in the future as it has in the past, there is every reason to hope that it will not belong until it will be placed upon a basis equal to that of the

other Colleges of the State.

There is much interest due on the scholarships that have been sold by the Agent in different parts of the Church. As the College is depending in a large measure upon the prompt payment of the interest on these notes to meet its current expenses, it is of great importance that there be no delinquency here. Anything which the Synod may be able to do to aid the Board of Trustees in the collection of these outstanding dues will be thankfully received. Some ministers and laymen have rendered important service in this respect, by collecting the interest in their respective charges as it becomes due; whilst others dobut little for the College, and allow the interest to accumulate from year to year.

The Board of Trustees, at the recommendation of the Alumni-Association, elected Prof. Charles O. Knepper, A. M., an alumnus of the College, who has been engaged in teaching for a number of years, and has therefore much experience in the work, to the Professorship of Belles Lettres. It is hoped that he may see his way clear to accept the position, and enter upon his work by the beginning of next year, thus adding to the teaching force of

the College.

The Synod is referred to the report of the Agent, H. Leonard,, for an account of his operations during the year.

## 2. Report of the Financial Agent.

During the past Synodical year I have not been able to ac-

complish much for our Institutions at Tiffin, O.

Immediately after the meeting of our Synod at Canton, Ohio, in May, 1872, I went east, and labored three months for Urainus College at Freeland, Montgomery County, Pa., where I caught some large fish.

After this I spent one month in the city of Tiffin, O., and vicinity, soliciting subscriptions for the purpose of erecting a Boarding Hall on the College Campus. The result was that,

with the aid of our worthy President, and Professors, and other good friends, I succeeded in raising about two thousand dollars for this object, including three perpetual scholarships.

Afterwards I took a severe cold which kept me at home. After I recovered, I left home to operate again; but took a relapse, and had to return home again; then, on account of the very severe cold weather, I did not think it advisable to leave home. And when I would have been able to travel again, my son Charles came home, sick, in the month of January, and as his sickness has been of a lingering character, I have been detained at home ever since.

And yet, while detained at home I have not been idle. It is known to many that I have been engaged in sending out, by mail, many thousand photographs. The result was, that I have realized from this source, for the benefit of Heidelberg College, over and above all expenses, for printing circulars, papers, postage stamps, envelopes, and photographs, the net sum of \$397,35, besides a few special crumbs for our Theological Seminary.

And I would here add, if all those persons who have received a package of my pictures, but who have not yet answered my "silent call," will only do like all those good friends who have favored me with "crumbs" and kind letters, the result will be that I will be able to pay the entire indebtedness of the College, including the Professors' salaries. But this will depend entirely on the free and good will of the people.

It would be cheering news to all the friends of our Institutions at Tiffin, to learn what great things these small sums did when brought together. Let others do likewise.

I would yet add for the encouragement of the children and young people, that the amount of crumbs received by letter, alone from the children and young people, during the year, was \$418,05. The balance of \$759,55 came from parents and old folks.

I traveled during the year, east and west, 2,625 miles. Total number of miles traveled, from the 22nd day of January, 1857, to May, 1873, is 60,543.

### II. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

The Standing Committee on Heidelberg College submitted' the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:
Your Committee beg leave to submit the following report:

That, from the documents referred to the Committee, we learn that the College is in a prosperous condition. There has been an encouraging increase in the number of students. The progress and deportment of the students have been such as to merit and receive the approval of the President and Professors of the

College.

The finances of the College are well managed. The Agent reports that he has secured an additional amount of funds during the year for the College. Especial mention is made of the liberal donation of Mr. Rezzin W. Shawhan, of Tiffin, Ohio, of 6,080 acres of land, situated in the State of Missouri, and valued at \$15,000. This timely gift will do much towards placing the College on a more substantial basis, and increase its facilities to prosecute its work.

For full particulars of the several matters pertaining to the College, the Synod is referred to the reports herewith sub-

mitted.

We would recommend the following action for adoption:

Resolved, That we, as a Synod, cordially recommend Heidelberg College to the continued favor and liberal patronage of the Church.

Resolved, That, while we highly commend the liberality of Mr. R. W. Shawhan, we would also endeavor to impress upon the minds of our wealthy men in the Church the importance and obligation of giving liberal contributions or donations, toour Institutions, during their life-time.

## ARTICLE XVI.

#### MISSIONS.

### I. HOME MISSIONS.

## 1. Report of Board of Missions of Ohio Synod.

As the time has again arrived for the Board of Missions of the Reformed Synod of Ohio to make its annual report to Synod, and to render an account of its stewardship, we may say that we discharge this duty with mingled feelings of regret and joy. Regret, that our congregations have done so little, during the past year, in the way of contributing towards this sacred object; but at the same time, joy, that we have been en-

abled to make a material advance on former years, and that so many of our ministers are devoting their time and energies to

athis work, without special compensation or appointment.

All must admit, that the experiment of conducting the work of Home Missions through the General Synod, and by means of the General Board, was not a success in the end, and that when in 1870, the two western Synods resolved to revive Synodical Boards, and so also the Eastern Synod in 1872, it was high time for these bodies to do so, if the whole interest was to be revived and carried forward more successfully.

The difficulty which our Board has had to encounter in the way of reviving the work has been very great. In such matters our Church moves slowly, far too slowly. But there has been a steady advance during the last three years, as the following

statement will show:

Contributions in 1870—71..... \$ 381,44 **"** 1871—72..... 857.50 **"** 1872—73..... 2050,50

In estimating the work done in the missionary field, by the Ohio Synod, we must not stop by contemplating merely the small sum of \$2,050 50, as representing the sum total of the work of the year. If this were so, it would be proper for us as a Synod to sit down in sackcloth and ashes, in view of our lukewarmness and inefficiency. But the following must also be taken into account:

Of the one hundred and twenty-eight ministers of which our Synod is composed, fully one-half are really missionaries, doing missionary work, and serving, in reality, missionary fields. That is, although they are receiving no aid from Missionary Boards, they are faithfully devoting their lives to the work of the ministry for salaries fully less, on an average, by \$300, than what they would justly be entitled to receive. we may say, that each one of these sixty ministers makes a voluntary, annual contribution, amounting, on an average, to \$300, to the cause of missions. These brethren ought to be honored for their sacrifices. Their contributions to the cause of missions, in the aggregate amount to a large sum, not less than \$18,000, annually. Would that the congregations could be induced to contribute in like proportion! They would certainly not be doing more than their duty.

It must be remembered, further, that the amount reported by our Treasurer does not include all that has been contributed during the year by the Ohio Synod. The Ohio Synod consists of nine Classes. Fully one-half of these have thus far carried forward their work by Classical Boards, and their contributions are, on this account, not included in our report. The Tuscarawas, Eastern Ohio, St. John, Lancaster, German Iowa and English Iowa Classes, have in this way done an excellent work;

the details we are not able to report.

3. Our wealthiest Classis, Miami, formerly carried on its missionary work in the same way. One year ago it resolved to operate through the Synodical Board; yet thus far we have received almost no help from this Classis, because it was deeply in debt to its own missions, and it has taken almost the whole of their collections thus far to pay off past dues. These debts, we understand, are now about all discharged, and for the future we can reasonably expect to receive at least \$1,000 annually from this Classis alone.

We would report to Synod that, as a Board, we have labored hard, and we believe faithfully, during the year. We have devoted much time and attention to the subject. We have held eight meetings during the year, and contributed a number of articles to the Church paper. The President has written 250 letters connected with the work of the Board. We are only sorry that these letters, circulars and meetings have not met with a more prompt and liberal response from the pastors and congregations.

The Board reports that the Missions under our care are all believed to be very promising, with possibly two exceptions. Some of them will become self-supporting within the year, and we think all of them will become so in the course of three

vears.

The following are Missions that have been under our care:

1. Liberty Ventre, Henry Co., O.—Rev. J. Michael. This mission has now become a self-supporting charge. It illustrates very well what fine openings the Reformed Church has, and how with a very little help, and that for only a brief period, our Church can be securely established in some places. An assistance of \$100 a year, continued for three years only, has served to establish three congregations where there were none before, in a new district, from which as a centre our Church will extend itself in different directions. Yea, Bro. Michael has done more than to establish this charge: his missionary activity has extended itself to Michigan, where two congregations were organized by him, not far from Lansing.

2. Brown County, Ohio.—Rev. Wm. Stechow. The appropriation here has been only \$100 a year, and will be needed, we think, only for the present year. The field is in a prosperous

condition.

3. Church of the Cross, Cincinnati.—An old, but highly important mission, that ought, if possible, to be carried through to a successful issue. The Board has made every possible effort during the year to obtain a regular pastor for this station, but thus far without success. In the meantime it has been supplied by the Rev. S. Mease, and for a short time by Licentiate C. W. Good. Rev. P. C. Prugh has now been appointed to the station, and the Board are encouraged to hope that he will accept. Appropriation, \$500.

4. Galion, Ohio.—Rev. H. Williard. A new mission, commenced within the year, with very good prospects, and thus far reasonably successful. Appropriation, \$300.

5. Germantown, Ohio.—Rev. J. H. Apple. The appropriation for the past year was \$200, paid by the Miami Classis. The

charge will now be self-supporting, from the 1st of April.

6. Hamilton, Butler Co., O.—Rev. G. Z. Mechling. This comparatively new, but important enterprise, became involved in pecuniary difficulties, so that the Board, to save the interest, was compelled to come to its assistance. The appropriation is \$200, which we think will be needed only for a year or two.

7. Bradford, Darke Co., O.—A new mission, recommended by the Miami Classis, and supplied for a while by Rev. J. S. Gough. The mission is now vacant, as the health of the missionary failed, so that he could not supply so laborious a field. Bro. Gough very generously declined to receive any assistance for the time he devoted to this mission.

8. Heidelberg Charge, Hancock Co., O.—Rev. J. May. This charge became self-supporting about the commencement of the year, and has received no assistance from the Board. It is worthy of mention, that this brother spread his labors over a large territory, so that a second charge is now about to be organized from a part of his field, and that probably without any missionary assistance.

9. Freeport, Ill.—Rev. A. Schroeder. This is a German mission in a large city, where an old German Mission had gone down entirely, some years ago. Appropriation \$200. The missionary seems to labor faithfully, but the progress toward

a self-supporting charge seems to be rather slow.

10. Centre Charge, Ill.—Rev. S. P. Myers. This is an off-shoot of the Shelbyville Mission, which latter became self-supporting a year ago. The appropriation is \$300 for the first year. The Board expects the charge to become self-supporting very soon.

11. Sycamore Mission, Ill.—Rev. D. K. Fulcason. This is another off-shoot from the old Shelbyville Mission. The appro-

priation is \$100.

12. Altamont, Ill.—This mission, last year under the care of Rev. J. A. Smith, is understood to be self-supporting now. Rev. L. M. Kerschner has recently taken charge, and has appealed to the Church for help towards building a church at Altamont, which we hope will be liberally responded to.

13. Boonsboro, Iowa.—Rev. A. Bletsch. This mission was understood to be quite successful; but the Board has extended

no help during the past year.

14. Greenville, Darke Co., Ohio.—Rev. W. McCaughey. In this county seat an excellent Reformed church has been erected by a small band of Reformed people. On the recommendation of Miami Classis the Board resolved to make an appropriation of

\$200 per annum. This will be needed, we think, for but a short time.

Denver City, Colorado.—From this large, growing and enterprising city at the foot of the Rocky Mountains a call came to the Board for help. We made an appropriation of \$300 per annum, but after long searching and much correspondence, we have thus far been unable to secure a missionary suited to the field. At the urgent request of the Board, Rev. J. A. Keller made a visit to the field during the winter, and spent three months in Denver. His people generously gave him leave of absence for that period, giving that as a part of their contributions to the cause of missions. Rev. Keller gave his three months' service gratuitously, giving that as his contribution to the work of home missions. On application, we secured half fare on all the railroads, and we may regard the money saved thus as a contribution also to this cause. There are some difficulties yet in the way of immediate success in Denver, but we regard the mission as highly promising, and if we can only secure the proper man for the place, it will not be a burden to the Board for any length of time. On his return, as well as on his way out, Rev. Keller did all that lay in his power to visit promising and important points.

16. One of the points to which he was led was in *Brown Co.*, *Kansas*, near Hiawatha. At this place the opening is so encouraging that the Board has resolved at once to plant a missionary there. Very little, and probably no missionary aid

will be needed.

Since the preceding was written, the Board has selected two brethren from the Theological Seminary, in whom they have the fullest confidence, to take charge of these missions, namely: F. P. Hartmetz for Denver, and John H. Beck for Hiawatha. The appropriation for the latter point is not yet definitely fixed, but it will be quite small, and will not be needed for more than one year. If these brethren obey the call of the Church, which we hope and expect, they will present themselves at Synod for licensure and ordination, and at once proceed to their respective fields of labor.

ter of the election of a General Superintendent of Missions; far more interest indeed than has since been manifested in the work of supporting the missions already established. The brother who was elected to the post found it impossible to screet the situation. We are sorry that this was the case, because we believe that he had special qualifications for the work. Still, it is a question, whether the supply of properly qualified ministers is yet sufficient to make it expedient to enter upon

At the last Synod much interest was manifested in the mat-

in founding many missions, but all these are of little avail unless we have active, devoted, self-denying men to fill the places. We think that when the fullness of time has arrived, such a superintendent should certainly be set at work. But it is plain that Synod should not elect any brother to such a post, induce him to sever his pastoral connection, and then leave him to work on without financial support. This matter should be properly considered beforehand.

In conclusion, we would refer the Synod to the report of the

Treasurer, which is herewith annexed.

We may remark yet, that the success and economy of Rev. Jos. A. Keller's tour to Kansas and Denver City, (which has cost the Board not more than about \$100 in all), suggests that it may be advisable for the Board from time to time to secure the services of regular pastors in this way, at least until a superintendent of missions be obtained. But the Synod will see also the necessity of more funds without delay, so that these missions may be sustained. At the date of closing this report, (April 26th, 1873), we have appropriations due to our missionaries, which we cannot meet, amounting to about \$500. In other words, there is a deficiency in the missionary treasury of that amount, at this date.

## 4. Report of Committee on Home Missions.

The Committee on Home Missions presented the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:

Your Committee on Home Missions begs leave to make the

following report:

That only three documents have come into our hands, namely: the report of the President of the Synod's Board, the report of its Treasurer, and the report of the Treasurer of Home Missions of Lancaster Classis.

When we look at the history of the Reformed Church in this country we are forced to acknowledge that she has been slow, very slow, in extending her borders throughout the land. This sad fact is brought out more prominently when we institute a comparison between our Church and some other denominations. We, however, would not be blind to the fact that the slow growth of our Church in the past is better in kind and quality than that of some other denominations, whose progress and expansion have been more rapid. While her growth has been somewhat slow and gradual, we have reasons to believe that it is of a firm and substantial character; and, in this respect, may not very improperly be compared with the growth of Christianity taken as a whole. This view of the subject affords encouragement and deserves express consideration.

There is another fact which should encourage us in this work. From the report of the President of Synod's Board, it appears that the contributions during the past year are about six times as large as they were only two years ago. If the increase in the future be in the same ratio, then our work will be in a few years about what it ought to be.

Moreover, it seems that the Board has been unusually active and efficient during the year; and the members and constituents of this Synod should manifest their approbation and appreciation of the labors of the Board in the way of larger and more

prompt contributions.

It further appears that one-half of the ministers in this Synod (i. e., about sixty) are missionaries, and that each one of them is virtually giving \$300 to the cause of missions. It seems to us that if this fact, or view of the matter, were more definitely and emphatically presented to the people, the result would be a great increase in the contributions, unless, indeed, the hearts of our people be as hard and cold as a stone—which God forbid!

Another point in the report, which demands the immediate attention of the Synod, is the statement that the indebtedness

of the Board to the missionaries amounts to about \$500.

For a financial exhibit of the Synod's Board and of the Board of Lancaster Classis, we refer the Synod to the reports of the

respective Treasurers, which are herewith submitted.

In reference to the fact that about one-half of the Classes connected with this Synod (Lancaster, Tuscarawas, St. John's, Eastern Ohio, English Iowa and German Iowa) have their own Boards of Home Missions, we suggest that it would be perhaps better if at least the older Classes would dissolve their own Boards and labor conjointly with the Board of Synod. The one great objection to the present arrangement seems to be that, whilst the waste places within the bounds of those Classes can thus be built up, the other points in the far West are necessarily neglected.

Your Committee offers the following action:

1. WHEREAS, The Board of Home Missions is now in debt to the amount of \$500, which must be paid soon in order to avoid great embarrassments to the self-denying missionaries; therefore.

Resolved, That the Synod respectfully requests all our pastors to make special efforts in their congregations to relieve the Board of its financial embarrassments.

2. WHEREAS, We deem it better for the welfare of the whole Church, in all her branches, that all the different Classes should in some way work through the Synod's Board; therefore,

Besolved, That the Classis of Lancaster, Tuscarawas, St. John's and Eastern Ohio, be respectfully requested to report promptly to the Synod's Board, in order to have their reports incorporated in the annual report of the Board to this Synod.

Resolved, That the Freeport Mission, Freeport, Ill., be commended anew to the favorable consideration of the Board of Home Missions of this Synod.

### II. FOREIGN MISSIONS.

On the second day of the sessions, the Committee on Overtures reported, in Item 3, that a Circular had been addressed to the Ohio Synod by the Executive Committee of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Reformed Church in the United States, urging this Synod to take into earnest consideration the matter therein referred to. The Circular was referred to a special Committee, consisting of Revs. Isaac H. Reiter, Lewis H. Kefauver and Elder Jacob Herring. This Committee, on the last day of the sessions, presented the following report, which was received and adopted:

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions.

The special Committee to whom was referred the Circular of the Executive Committee of the Board of Foreign Missions, under Item 3 in the Report on Overtures, would report:

That they have duly considered the subject. They find that, according to the instructions of the General Synod, the Board of Foreign Missions, in considering the importance of the work and the selection of a proper place, expresses the decided opinion that Japan presents the most promising field for foreign missionary effort on the part of the Reformed Church. The Board is also endeavoring to obtain the information necessary to enable it to make an intelligent selection of a base of operations, and to secure suitable persons to engage in the work. It is also urged to be of importance to adopt immediate and energetic measures to raise funds in all our charges, with the view of vigorously inaugurating the blessed work of missions in Japan, which is now providentially open to Christianity.

Your Committee would therefore suggest the adoption of the

following action:

Resolved, That we, as a Synod, hail with pleasure the revived interest of the Reformed Church in the United States in the cause of Foreign Missions, and do most heartily approve of the Foreign Missionary work.

Resolved, That we approve of the action of the General Board of Foreign Missions, based upon the action of the General Synod on this subject, and accept the recommendations and suggestions of the Board.

Resolved, That we call the special attention of the Classes to the importance of the Foreign Missionary cause, and earnestly

urge upon all our charges to raise collections in aid of it; and wherever practical to establish the monthly concert of prayer, to organize missionary societies, and to encourage individual donations and legacies.

They compare very favorably with similar books and papers published by other branches of the Church.

We therefore offer the following resolution:

## Complaint of Illinois Classis against Milwaukee Classis.

The Committee on Minutes of Classes, in Item 13, reported that Illinois Classis complained of Synod's indifference respecting its complaint against the territorial encroachment of Milwaukee Classis of the North-Western Synod. This complaint was referred to a Committee, consisting of Revs. C. Cort, H. M. Herman and Elder George Souder.

This Committee, on the afternoon of the fourth day of the sessions, submitted the following report, which was received

and adopted:

The Committee to whom was referred the complaint of Illinois Classis against the action of the Milwaukee Classis of the North-Western Synod in encroaching upon its territory, would

respectfully report the following action for adoption:

Resolved, That the jurisdiction of the Illinois Classis and the Ohio Synod extends over the entire State of Illinois, and no other Reformed Classis or Synod has a right to organize congregations or supply congregations with pastors in our bounds without full and formal permission of Illinois Classis.

Resolved, That the North-Western Synod be respectfully

requested to prevent its Classes and ministers from encroaching

supon the territory and jurisdiction of Illinois Classis.

Resolved, That we are not opposed to the organization of German congregations within our bounds by the North-Western Synod, but we insist on having it done in a constitutional way. Respectfully submitted,

# Difficulties between Eastern Ohio and St. John's Classes.

During the second day of the sessions, the Committee on Overtures, in Item 4, reported that the Eastern Ohio Classis set forth certain complaints against the St. John's Classis and the Rev. Ernest F. A. Schade, and asked Synod to take action And on the morning of the third day of the sessions, the Committee on Minutes of Classes, in Item 9, reported that the Eastern Ohio Classis requested Synod to adjust certain difficulties between it and the St. John's Classis; and also, in Item 10, that the St. John's Classis requested Synod to sustain it in its relation to the independent Salem's Evangelical congregation, and to accept that congregation according to their re-

These complaints and requests were referred to a special Committee, consisting of Revs. S. B. Yockey, C. Cort and Elder

Fred. W. Fetzer. This Committee, on the fourth day of the sessions, submitted the following report:

Your Committee, to whom were referred the long standing troubles existing between the Classes of Eastern Ohio and St. John's, respectfully report:

We have given the subject a full and impartial investigation, and find it involved in peculiar and perplexing embarrassments.

It is our conviction that both of the aforesaid Classes should be required to confine their operations strictly to their respective territory, as defined by the action of Synod at Delaware, 1869, (see Minutes, p. 13), unless special permission shall be given to the contrary, as regards the formation or supply of congregations along the boundary lines.

In the circumstances of the case we feel constrained to recommend the following action for the adoption of this Synod:

Resolved, That the St. John's Classis be and is hereby directed to prevent any of its ministers from serving the so-called "Salem's Evangelical congregation," without the consent of the Eastern Ohio Classis.

Resolved, That the Eastern Ohio Classis be requested to use all proper means to bring about a reconciliation of the conflicting elements, by securing the withdrawal of the present pastor of the St. Martin's Reformed congregation, and the settlement of a new pastor over that distracted field, or by such other measures as will be calculated to promote the unity and prosperity of the Church in that particular locality.

Respectfully submitted, SAMUEL B. YOCKEY, Chairman.

The report was received and taken up for consideration. The Rev. George M. Albright appeared in Synod as an accredited commissioner of the Eastern Ohio Classis, and, together with its delegates, was heard in behalf of the Eastern Ohio Classis; and Rev. Ernest F. A. Schade appeared in defence of himself and of the St. John's Classis. A few members of Synod were also heard respecting the matters involved and the adoption of the report. The Synod then proceeded to vote on the adoption of the report, item by item, and the report was adopted.

On the adoption of the first resolution in the report, the year and nays were called for, and the result of the vote was as follows:

When the vote had been announced, the Rev. Ernest F. A. Schade gave notice that he would, in behalf of himself and of the St. John's Classis, appeal from this action of Synod to the General Synod.

On motion, Revs. S. B. Yockey, P. C. Prugh and G. M. Albright were appointed to defend this Synod, in regard to the

aforesaid appeal, before the General Synod.

#### ARTICLE XXI.

#### CHURCH GOVERNMENT.

Report of Committee on Charters and Incorporation.

The Committee on Charters, continued from last year, as reported by the Committee on Synodical Minutes, in Item 9, submitted for the consideration of Synod the following report:

The undersigned were appointed a Committee by the Synod

at Fairfield (1871) to report on the following points:

"How the change of the Title of Synod from 'The Reformed Synod of Ohio and the Congregations in connection with it in other States,' to 'The Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States,' may be legally effected.

2. How the charter of the Synod may be changed, and what

the amended charter should include.

3. How a charter for the Theological Seminary may be obtained, and what this charter should include.

How the charter of Heidelberg College may be changed,

and what its amended charter should include."

The Committee have investigated the subject, and beg leave to lay before Synod the following report: In a matter of so much importance, we, however, would not recommend to Synod to adopt the report at once, but to have it printed in the Minutes for examination and further investigation during the year, the same to be acted upon at the succeeding annual meeting. We have also deemed it judicious to extend our investigations beyond the bounds assigned us by Synod, and to propose Forms for Deeds, the incorporation of Congregations, and the incorporation of Classes and Benevolent Societies.

#### THE CHANGE OF NAME AND INCORPORATION OF SYNOD.

If only the Title of the Synod is to be changed, the same may be effected (See Swan and Critchfield Stat. Vol. 1, p. 309.—1 Curwen Stat. 1897) by the filing of a petition to that effect by the Trustees in the Court of Common Pleas, giving 80 days notice in a newspaper; the Court may then decree the same, said decree be filed in the office of the Recorder, and also

published in a newspaper, when the change will be legally effeted. But the same end can be reached by incorporating the Synod anew, under the provisions of the General Statute of the State of Ohio, passed May 1st, 1852, and its subsequent amendments, and that with great advantage to the Synod itself. The original charter of the Synod, granted in 1836, is too restricted in some of its provisions, (the income of the property shall not exceed \$5000; the Trustees must be elected annually on the first day of Synod, &c). We therefore recommend an incor-

poration under the General Law.

To effect this, a meeting of Synod must be called, after due notice, (any day during the annual sessions will do), at which a majority of the members must be present. After the choice of a President, a Clerk shall be elected who shall make a true record of the proceedings, certify and deliver the same to the Recorder of the County in which the meeting is held, together with a certificate of the said Trustees or a majority of them of their acceptance of the provisions of the Act, passed Jan. 26, 1865. (See Swan and Sayler, p. 239). A certified transcript of this record should also be obtained from the Recorder and copied into the Minutes. The Synod is then an incorporated body under the General Statute. We recommend the following FORM:

"At a meeting of the members of the Reformed Synod of Ohio and Congregations in connection with it in other States, held at \_\_\_\_\_, on \_\_\_\_\_ duly called, and at which meeting a majority of the members were present, Rev. \_\_\_\_\_ was elected President, and Rev. \_\_\_\_\_ Clerk. The Synod thereupon resolved, from this time forward, to become a body politic and corporate, according to the provisions of the General Statutes of the State of Ohio, as follows:

1. The name and title of the body shall be "The Ohio Synod

rof the Reformed Church in the United States."

2. Said Synod shall stand in organic connection with the "Reformed Church in the United States," shall be governed in all things by the "Constitution of the Reformed Church in the United States," and shall administer the preaching of the Gospel and the Sacraments according to the Confession of Faith known as the Heidelberg Catechism.

Trustees, who shall hold their offices for three years.

4. All property, real, personal and mixed, that may be obtained by gift, collection, bequest, or otherwise, for charitable, religious and educational purposes, shall be managed by the Trustees, in trust, for the Synod.

5. The object of the Association shall be; to found and organize Christian congregations, in accordance with the Confession of Faith known as the Heidelberg Catechism; to govern and regulate the same; to establish Theological Seminaries, Mission Houses, Colleges and other Institutions; to carry on the work of Home and Foreign Missions, the education of young men for the ministry, and whatever may promote the kingdom of God upon earth.

6. The Trustees of this Synod shall also be the Trustees of "Heidelberg Theological Seminary" located at Tiffin, Ohio, founded by this Synod under its original charter for the purpose of educating pious men for the Gospel Ministry. In administering the property of this Institution they shall be governed by the Laws and Regulations laid down for their

guidance by this Synod.

Note.—Any Classis of the Church may also become a body corporate, in a similar manner.

II. THE INCORPORATION OF THE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The second subject of inquiry referred to the Committee was in respect to the incorporation of the Theological Seminary, and how to obtain it.

It will be easy to effect this incorporation under the same General Law as the preceding, or by accepting under Sec. 71, (See 3 Curwen Stat. 1896), and this can be done whenever Synod shall judge it expedient to do so. But in this case at least five of the Trustees will have to be residents of the County of Seneca. We think that, for the present at least, Synod will prefer greater freedom in the location of the Trustees. We have therefore added the sixth section to the preceding form, so that the Seminary will be carried forward in the future substantially as in the past.

III. THE INCORPORATION OF HEIDELBERG COLLEGE.

Heidelberg College was incorporated by special Act of the Legislature of Ohio, passed Feb. 19th, 1851. This charter is defective, more especially in that it does not define how and by whom the Trustees are to be elected. It will be well therefore, we think, to incorporate the same under the provisions of the General Law. This can be done, if the Synod so directs, by the Board of Trustees, by complying with the provisions of the Statute. It is not necessary here to enumerate the steps that must be taken, as these can be attended to by the Board. We recommend the following

FORM:

1. The name and title of this corporation shall be "Heidelberg University," located at Tiffin, Seneca County, Ohio.

- The following persons are hereby appointed as Trustees of the University: \_\_\_\_\_ to serve for one year; \_\_\_\_ serve for two years; \_\_\_\_ to serve for three years; and to serve for four years. And these Trustees shall hold their offices until their successors are duly elected. "The Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States" shall at each annual meeting elect six Trustees who shall hold their offices for four years, and until their successors are elected. At least five of the Trustees must be resident freeholders of the County of Seneca. At any meeting, duly called, eight members shall constitute a quorum.
- All the property of the University, whether real, personal or mixed, obtained by gift, bequest, from the sale of scholarships or otherwise, shall be managed by the Trustees, in trust, for the Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United . States.
- The object of this Institution is, to found and establish a University for all branches of a liberal education, with such Departments, Courses of Intruction, Degrees and Diplomas, as it may from time to time establish.
- Such other Synods and Classes of the Reformed Church in the United States, as may from time to time unite in the patronage and support of the University, shall be allowed to elect such additional members of the Board of Trustees as may be provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws of the University.

The President and Professors shall constitute the Faculty of the University, and shall have power to enforce the rules and regulations of the Institution.

The Trustees, Faculty and Instructors of the University shall be guided and governed in the discharge of their duties by the Laws of the State of Ohio, and by the Constitution and Laws of the University, as established by the Trustees upon the recommendation of the Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States; and such Constitution and By-Laws may be amended and changed from time to time as may be deemed expedient by the Trustees, upon the recommendation of said Synod.

#### THE INCORPORATION OF CONGREGATIONS.

The proper incorporation of our congregations is a matter of very great importance. Under this view of it, the General Synod in 1869 (See Minutes, p. 85) adopted and recommended a form, which we find not fully adapted to the wants of our congregations in the Western States. That form is good, and well adapted to such States where the incorporation is effected by special Acts of the Legislature. But in Ohio, and probably in all of the Western States, we must now incorporate under a General Law. That General Law is the charter, provided we mply with its provisions. We recommend the following form being in accordance with the provisions of the Statutes of aio. In the other Western States it may be necessary first to amine the laws of that particular State in respect to the steps cessary to be taken to become a body corporate. We will ve such plain and full directions that it will be easy for every ngregation (whether already incorporated or not) to effect an corporation, at no expense except the small fee paid to the punty Recorder.

#### DIRECTIONS.

A meeting of the congregation must be duly called, at which majority of the members must be present. After the choice of President, a Clerk shall be elected, who shall make a true cord of the proceedings, certify and deliver the same to the scorder of the County, together with a certificate of the said rustees or a majority of them of their acceptance of the ovisions of "the Act of the General Assembly of Ohio, passed ay, 1852, entitled "An Act ———, and of the Acts amendatory ereof and supplemental thereto." A certified transcript of this cord, by the Recorder shall be obtained and copied into the arch Book. Or the Recorder may be asked to copy this anscript at once into the Church Record. The congregation then an incorporated body, with perpetual succession, authored to hold property, &c. We recommend that the proceedings id minutes of this meeting be substantially the following:

#### FORM.

At a meeting of the members of the Reformed church of \_\_\_\_\_\_, \_\_\_\_\_ county, Ohio, duly called for the purpose, in cordance with its Constitution and By-Laws, at which meeting majority of the members were present, Mr. \_\_\_\_\_ was chosen act as President, and Mr. \_\_\_\_\_ as Clerk. The meeting ereupon resolved that the congregation become a body politic id corporate according to the provisions of the Statutes of e State of Ohio, passed May 1st, 1852, together with the nendatory acts as follows:

.1 The name and title of the congregation shall be "The lest) Reformed church of (Tiffin, Seneca) county, (Ohio.)"

2. The object of the Association shall be, to provide its embers with the preaching of the Word and the administration the Sacraments, in accordance with the Confession of Faith lown as the Heidelberg Catechism.

3. The property of the congregation, real, personal and ixed, shall be managed by the Board of Trustees. The Elders and Deacons) of the congregation shall constitute the Board of rustees. The following persons, Elders (and Deacons) of the turch, shall be the Trustees, namely: A.—B.—C.—D.—, hold their offices until their successors are elected and in-alled, according to the Constitution and By-Laws of the

congregation, and the Constitution of the Reformed Church in the United States.

4. Said Trustees shall administer the property of the congregation, real, personal and mixed, in accordance with the general "Constitution of the Reformed Church in the United States," and also in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws of the congregation itself, and of the Statutes of the State of Ohio. No alienation of the corporate property to a purpose which is not in strict accordance with the object for which the property was held, or donated to the corporation, shall be valid, except it have the express sanction of the Classis or Synod of the Reformed Church in whose bounds it is located, in accordance with the Laws and Constitution of said Church.

5. This congregation shall be an organic member of the Reformed Church in the United States, and shall be governed by its Constitution and Laws. The spiritual affairs of the Church shall be attended to by the Pastor, Elders and Deacons, forming the Consistory of the same, according to the provisions of the Constitution of the Reformed Church in the United States; and also in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws of the congregation itself, which define the mode in which the Elders and Deacons are elected, for what length of time, and which perscribe in general the government of the Society.

6. And this congregation shall have power from time to time, to adopt, alter and amend such Constitution and By-Laws, as it may see fit—provided that they do not conflict with the aforesaid Articles in the Constitution of the Reformed Church in the United States—the Constitution of the State (of Ohio), and the Constitution of the United States

#### V. FORM OF A DEED FOR CHURCH PROPERTY.

It is a matter of great importance that in the DEEDS by which property is conveyed to congregations, some clause should be inserted which shall forever secure said property to the Reformed Church, so that an unfaithful majority shall not be able to pervert it from the objects for which it was donated or purchased. Upon inquiry we learn, that it is now the current practice, in all denominations, to take a simple warrantee deed of the ordinary form, it being supposed that by the Act of Incorporation the same will be secured not only to the congregation, but to the denomination But Hon. William Lawrence, of Bellefontaine, Ohio, (who is writing a work on the law of religious societies and Church corporations in Ohio, and who has had occasion therefore to examine this subject specially), writes to your Committee, that there is at least a grave doubt whether a deed in ordinary form to a Church incorporated

under our General Law would not allow a majority of members to adopt any doctrine. He says: "Whether in this record" (incorporating under our General Law) "a denominational character can be engrafted upon the corporation, has not been decided. It has been decided in New York, that under a similar Statute there, the corporation cannot be denominational. Hence a majority of a corporation can change their faith and hold the property, and exclude the faithful minority. But it has been decided, both in New York and by the Supreme Court of the United States, that the Deed to a corporation may devote property to a particular faith and form of church government."

We have endeavored to engraft upon the preceding form such provisions as will secure the denominational rights in the property. But if there be the least doubt as to the efficacy of these provisions, it is of the utmost importance that the same end should be reached, by such a clause in the Deeds as will stand the test of litigation. We therefore report the following as suitable forms of Warrantee Deeds. The first form is for a congregation not yet incorporated, but which has chosen Trustees. The second form is for a congregation that has already been incorporated. The words in Italic are intended to secure the denominational character of the property. The words in brackets should state the exact title of the congregation, as fixed in its constitution or articles of incorporation:

Know all men by these presents, that————in consider-ion of————to——paid by A.——B.——C.——, Trustees, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, do grant, bargain, sell and convey to the said A.—B.—C.—, Trustees, in trust for the (first Reformed church of Tiffin, Seneca county, Ohio,)\* standing in organic connection with "The Reformed Church in the United States," governed by its Constitution, and administering the means of grace in accordance with the Confession of Faith known as the Heidelberg Catechism, and to their successors and assigns forever,——— and all the estate, title and interest of the said——either in law or equity, of, in and to the said premises, together with all the privileges and appurtenances to the same belonging, and all the rents, issues and profits thereof: To have and to hold the same to the only proper use of the said——in trust for the uses and purposes aforesaid, their successors and assigns forever. And the said -for——and for—heirs, executors and administrators do hereby covenant with the said A.—B.—C.—, their successors and assigns that——the true and lawful owner of the said premises, and ha-full power to convey the same; and that the title so conveyed is clear, free and unincumbered;

and further, that—will warre all claim or claims of all person	ant and defend the same against as whomsoever.

(See Act of Jan. 3, 1825, 1 Swan and Critchfield Stat. 305, note.) But in States where this is not the case, the following words should be inserted at this point: "and to their successors elected or appointed by said religious society, according to its rules and regulations."

## Form of a Deed

to an incorporated congregation of the Reformed Church.

Know all men by these presents, that——in consideration of——to——paid by the (first Reformed church of Tiffin), the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, do grant, bargain, sell and convey to the (first Reformed church of Tiffin, Seneca Co., Ohio), standing in organic connection with "The Reformed Church in the United States," governed by its Constitution, and administering the means of grace in accordance with the Confession of Faith known as the Heidelberg Catechism, and their successors and assigns forever,——and all the estate, title and interest, &c. (For the remainder, see the preceding form.)

### VI. INCORPORATION OF OUR BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES AND BOARDS.

As the General Law of Ohio applies also to these, we think the time has come when the Synod should direct the Board of Education and the Board of Home Missions to become bodies corporate, in order that they may be able to secure bequests and hold such funds as may come into their hands. This can be done by a record substantially as follows:

At a meeting of the Board of Education (or Board of Home Missions) of the Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States, at which meeting a majority of the members were present, Rev.——was chosen President, and——Clerk. The Board thereupon resolved to become a body politic and corporate, according to the provisions of the Statutes of the State of Ohio, as follows:

## Form for the Board of Education.\*

1. The name and title of this corporation shall be the Board of Education of the Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States.

2. Its object shall be to obtain funds by gifts, bequests, collections and otherwise, for the education of pious but indigent young men for the gospel ministry in the Reformed Church in the United States.

3. All the property of the corporation, real, personal and mixed, shall be managed by the Trustees, in trust for the

Board of Education.

4. The following persons shall be the Trustees: ——for one year; ——for two years; and——for three years, and until their successors are chosen. The Board shall annually, at its first meeting after its election, elect one Trustee who shall hold his office for three years.

5. The members of the Board of Education shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Ohio Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States, according to its own rules and

regulations.

6. The mode in which the income of the Board shall be applied to reach the end in view, and the conditions under which it shall be given, shall be regulated by the Rules and By-Laws of the Board of Education.

\*Note.—This form, with the necessary verbal changes, will also do for the Board of Home Missions.

In conclusion, your Committee would say, that if Synod sees proper to do so, it might be well to continue the Committee for another year, with instructions to report any changes in the above forms that may be deemed proper; and also to report a revised form of a Constitution of a Congregation and a Constitution of a Joint-Consistory, to be published with the preceding when finally adopted. The old forms, published in the Minutes of 1850, admit of improvements and condensation.

The action adopted by Synod in regard to the foregoing

report is as follows:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Charters be received and embodied in the printed Minutes, but that its final adoption be deferred until the next annual meeting of Synod, in order to afford opportunity for further examination and investigation, as well as for suggestions.

Resolved, That the Committee be continued, with instructions to report any changes that may be deemed proper, in the forms now submitted; and that they also report a revised form of a Constitution of a Congregation and of a Joint-Consistory. The Committee, as continued, consists of Revs. Isaac H. Reiter, Dr. Jer. H. Good and Lewis H. Kefauver.

## Committee on Revision of Constitution.

The Committee on Synodical Minutes, in item 5, reported that the General Synod directed each District Synod to appoint a Committee of three members to draft a new Constitution for

On motion, the item was adopted; and Revs. Lewis H. Kefauver, Peter C. Prugh and Dr. Herman Rust were appointed said Committee.

#### Invalid Home Fund.

On the second day of the sessions, the Committee on Overtures, in item 5, reported a statement from Mr. W. C. Heyman in reference to the Invalid Home Fund. It appeared from this statement that the total balance, after all debts and expenses had been paid, was \$170 90, and which amount had been placed into the hands of Rev. Charles Schaaf as one of the Trustees of the Invalid Home. In regard to this matter, the following action was adopted:

The Synod of Ohio, at its last annual meeting, Whereas, relinquished all its claims on the Invalid Home property; therefore,

Resolved, That we are willing that all the money now in the Treasury of the Invalid Home, derived from the sale of the aforesaid property, shall pass entirely into the Treasury of the Erie Classis of the North-Western Synod.

## Knepper and Baines Case.

During the afternoon session of the second day of the sessions, the Committee on Synodical Minutes, in item 7, reported that the case of deposition of Rev. Henry Knepper from the gospel ministry, had been sent back to Illinois Classis for reinvestigation and readjudication.

During the morning session of the third day of the sessions, the Committee on Minutes of Classes, in item 5, reported that Illinois Classis did not record the call of its special meeting at Shelbyville, Illinois, nor the evidence on which the restoration of Henry Knepper was based; and, in item 25, that the same Classis had restored Henry K. Baines and Henry Knepper, who had been deposed from the gospel ministry and excommunicated from the Church.

The matters thus reported were referred to a special Committee, consisting of Revs. P. C. Prugh, L. H. Kefauver and Elder Moses Marquis.

This Committee, during the morning session of the sixth day (Monday) of the sessions, submitted the following report, which was received, amended and adopted item by item, and as a whole:

Your Committee to whom were referred the Items in the reports on Minutes of Synod and Classes, relating to the restoration of Henry K. Baines and Henry Knepper to the gospel ministry, by the Illinois Classis, would submit the following report:

I. The Committee find no evidence that the Illinois Classis transacted any business at its special meeting at Shelbyville that was not in the call, although the call was not recorded in

the Minutes; therefore,

Resolved, That the item be adopted.

II. In the case of Henry K. Baines, we find that in 1864 he was, by the Illinois Classis, deposed from the gospel ministry, for the grievous sin of adultery, committed under the most aggravated circumstances, in his own charge, while pastor at Cedarville, Illinois, and thereby bringing utter ruin on the

congregation.

We also find that the Illinois Classis, in the year 1872, restored Henry K. Baines to the gospel ministry without making it appear that there was anything extraordinary in the case, as required by the Constitution, Article 118. This too was done in the absence of any request, either from the charge or any members of the charge, in which the crime had been committed, for said restoration; therefore,

Resolved, That Synod can not confirm the action of Illinois Classis in the restoration of Henry K. Baines to the gospel

ministry, and declares said action null and void.

III. The case of Henry Knepper, we find to stand as follows:

In the year 1871, the Illinois Classis, after a full and regular trial upon the charge of adultery, in that said Knepper married a woman whose lawfully wedded husband was still living, from whom she had never been divorced on scriptural grounds, deposed Henry Knepper from the gospel ministry, and excommunicated him from the Church. Said Knepper then appealed from the decision of Classis to the Ohio Synod. This Synod, at its annual meeting in 1872, proceeded to take up and try the appeal, pending which, a motion was made, which motion was sustained by the Chair and carried by the Synod, referring the whole case back to the Illinois Classis, for reinvestigation and readjudication. At the same time the President decided that this resolution of reference placed said Knepper in the same position in which he was before the passage of the sentence of deposition,

by the Illinois Classis. Against this action of Synod, and the ruling of the Chair (Rev. Henry Williard) allowing the resolution of reference to be in order, Revs. Cyrus Cort and Joseph Sechler complained to the General Synod. The General Synod at its late meeting in the City of Cincinnati took up the case and made the following disposition of it:

- 1. The General Synod sustained the complaint of Rev. Cyrus Cort against the ruling of the Chair of the Ohio Synod, referring the whole case back to the Illinois Classis.
- 2. Pending the hearing of the complaint of Revs. Cyrus Cort and Joseph Sechler against the action of the Synod, the following paper was submitted to Synod and adopted, as a decisive action, disposing of the whole case:

"In the question before this Synod in reference to the complaints and appeals of Rev. C. Cort and others, and the Illinois Classis, against the Synod of Ohio, this Synod resolves that the judgment passed by the Illinois Classis in the case of Rev. Henry Knepper holds, and that said Knepper stands deposed from the holy ministry, and excommunicated from the Church, and that the ruling of the President of the Ohio Synod in session at Canton, Ohio, May 1-7, 1872, restoring H. Knepper to the ministry, was erroneous."

This action of the General Synod, your Committee regards as

disposing of the whole case, and final.

In regard to the second item of this case, we find that Illinois Classis, at a special meeting held at Shelbyville, February 7, 1873, irregularly and unlawfully, without citation or notice to either the accusers or witnesses, and without recording the evidence either for or against the accused, acquitted Henry Knepper of the charge preferred against him.

In view of all these facts, your Committee would offer for

adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That Henry Knepper, by the action of the General Synod, and of the Illinois Classis held at Freeport, stands deposed from the gospel ministry and excommunicated from the Church.

Resolved, That Illinois Classis be instructed to cause Henry Knepper to cease at once from performing the functions of the gospel ministry within the territory of said Classis.

On the adoption of the first resolution, in part III, in the foregoing report, respecting Knepper's deposition, the yeas and nays were called for, and the result of the vote was as follows:

Herring, Wiley Jenkins, Fred. W. Fetzer, George Souder, Lewis Shriver and Jacob Greenameier.—21.

Nays .- None.

Non-liquets.—Revs. I. H. Reiter, N. H. Loose and E. D. Miller.—3.

Some of the delegates of Illinois Classis, having voted in the lower court, could not vote on the case in Synod.

## Who are Entitled to Vote in Congregational Elections.

During the morning session of the third day of the sessions, the Committee on Minutes of Classes, in item 4, part b.), reported that the Eastern Ohio Classis defined the Constitution to mean, that female members of the Church had no right to vote.

On motion, concerning this decision, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Synod disapproves of this action of the Eastern Ohio Classis, and decides that it is the intent and meaning of the Constitution that all regular communicant members are entitled to vote in congregational elections.

# About Equalizing Traveling Expenses of Delegates.

The Committee on Minutes of Classes, in item 8, reported that the English Iowa Classis requested Synod to take immediate steps to equalize the traveling expenses of all delegates attending its sessions. This request was referred to a Committee, consisting of Revs. T. H. Winters, L. H. Kefauver and Elder Jacob Herring.

This Committee, it would seem, reached no definite conclusion in regard to the matter referred to them, and there was no report received.

# Respecting the Organization of a German Synod.

As reported by the Committee on Minutes of Classes, in item 11, the St. John's Classis requested Synod to be dismissed, in order to form a German Synod as soon as the Heidelberg, Erie and Indiana Classes of the North-Western Synod shall comply with its request to form such Synod.

In regard to this request, the following action was adopted:

Resolved, That, though we regret to part with old friends and Christian brethren, we hereby grant the request of St. John's Classis in this matter.

## 2. Report of Committee on Finance.

The Committee on Finance submitted the following report, which was received and adopted:

The Committee on Finance beg leave to report as follows:

That the papers referred to us were the Treasurer's report, and item 16 in the report on Synodical Minutes, having reference to the General Synod's assessment of \$450 00 on the Ohio Synod for contingent expenses.

We have audited the Treasurer's report, and find it to be correct. The report is herewith prefixed, and explains itself. We, in view of the facts brought to our notice, recommend the

adoption of the following action:

Resolved. That the assessment for this year be made upon the several Classes in the ratio of seven and a half dollars (\$7 50) for each minister, with the exception of the Illinois and the two Iowa Classes, which shall be assessed at the rate of four and a half dollars (\$4 50) for each minister.

Resolved, That the Illinois and German Iowa Classes be enjoined to pay up their remaining indebtedness without delay.

Resolved, That all the Classes be urgently requested to make provision for the payment of their respective dues at or before the time of their annual meetings.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of Synod be and is hereby instructed to notify the officers of the several Classes of the amount of their respective apportionments, and request a prompt compliance with the foregoing action of Synod.

## ARTICLE XXIII.

#### PUBLICATION.

## Report of Board of Publication.

The Board of Publication elected by the Synod at its sessions in Canton, O., 1872, beg leave respectfully to report as follows: The Board held only one meeting during the year, which was at Cincinnati, May 9th, 1873. The members present were Revs. Samuel Mease, David Van Horne, and Elders Andrew H. Baughman and Valentine C. Tidball. An organization was then effected with Rev. David Van Horne as President, and

Elder Valentine C. Tidball as Secretary.

In the stereotyped expression of the former Boards, we must state that the only publication under the auspices of the Board, is the organ of Synod, the Christian World. The editor reports that the subscription-list has been pruned again of nonpaying subscribers, and to a great extent their places have been filled by new ones. Yet there is more earnest effort in behalf of the paper needed now than ever before, since other papers have lately been established within the borders of the denomination, so that the patronage must, to a certain extent, be divided between the older journals and the new competitors.

Those who are friendly to our organ should therefore be called upon to use their best efforts for its increased circulation. Ministers and laity should be invited to co-operate and recommend it to all families accessible, where it has not yet been introduced. In proportion as the subscription-list is increased,

can its successful issue be insured to the Synod.

The editor reports, that Mr. Louis Melius, who, though not elected by Synod, having acceptably filled the position of assistant editor for some two years, has now retired. He departs bearing with him the good wishes of the editor and members of

the Board, and the readers of the paper generally.

The Board must express regret that the publishing interests of the Synod are still carried forward on so limited a scale. And while we feel that we have no right to dictate a course to be pursued, yet we would urge the Synod to consider the importance of founding a Printing Establishment, belonging exclusively to Synod under the limitations of Article 70 of the Constitution, the net earnings of which should be turned into a Ministerial Relief Fund, or appropriated to some of the impor-

tant objects of the Church.

It may not yet be too late to undertake a work that has been eminently successful in other denominations all around us, and which if committed to proper hands for management, would do much toward strengthening the influence of our Reformed Zion, and thus help on the cause of Christ.

## 2. Report of Committee on Publication.

The Committee on Publication presented the following report, which was received, amended and adopted:

Your Committee on Publication beg leave to report:

That the only document in their hands is the report of the Board of Publication. From this it appears that the Christian World, during the past year, has met with its usual success. The same difficulties, however, that formerly hindered its progress had to be combatted the past year. While many new subscribers were added to the list, many old ones were taken off, because they were non-paying. This hindrance, if it is at all possible, ought to be overcome; and it can be overcome, if pastors devote a little attention to it. The influence of a religious paper on a Christian people is incalculable. It interests in Christian work and tends to enlighten, and thus becomes a pastor's most efficient aid. In view of this, it should be made a visitor to every family in the Church.

We learn, also, from this report, that the assistant editor, Mr. Louis Melius, has retired from the office, and that, consequently, the editor, Rev. Samuel Mease, has again the care of the entire work of editing. In view of this, the special assistance of all

interested in the paper's welfare is needed.

Your Committee would propose the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Synod recommends the CHRISTIAN WORLD to all the people of the Reformed Church as worthy of

and claiming their patronage.

Resolved, That this Synod calls the attention of all the pastors of the Church to the necessity of doing all in their power to give this organ of Synod a more extended circulation in their charges.

Resolved, That this Synod considers it of great importance to have a Printing Establishment of its own, and that it, therefore, authorizes the Board of Publication to devise ways by which this end may be attained, and report at the next annual meeting of Synod.

Resolved, That we request the Board of Publication, in conference with the editor, to restrain controversy, as far as possible, especially all such as is of a severe or personal character.

## 3. Publication of Minutes of Synod.

The following action was adopted:

Resolved. That the Stated Clerk be instructed to have 1,500 copies of the Minutes of this Synod, duly authenticated, published in the English language, and distribute them among those entitled to receive them.

Resolved, That we dispense with the publication of the

Minutes in the German language.

#### ARTICLE XXIV.

#### MISCELLANEOUS.

Semi-Centennial of Ohio Synod.

During the afternoon session of the third day (Friday) of the sessions, the following preamble and resolutions, in reference to the Semi-Centennial of the Synod of Ohio of the Reformed Church in the United States, were submitted to Synod and adopted:

Whereas, The Synod of Ohio of the Reformed Church in the United States was organized on the 14th day of June, 1824, and will have existed as a Synod Afty years by the 14th day of

June, 1874; and,

Whereas, The event is full of historical significance, pleasant in its religious associations, and important in its practical

bearing for the Reformed Church; therefore,

Resolved, That we will in some suitable way, under God's blessing, commemorate the Semi-Centennial of the Synod of Ohio.

Resolved. That a Committee be appointed to report the order and manner in which this may be best consummated.

The Committee consists of Revs. Isaac H. Reiter, Lewis H. Kefauver and Elder George Souder.

This Committee, on the last day of the sessions, presented their report, which was received and adopted; and is as follows:

## Report of Committee on Semi-Centennial of Synod.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of the Semi-Centennial of the Synod of Ohio of the Reformed Church in the United States, would respectfully report:

That they have given the subject some consideration, and, believing it to be proper to commemorate that historical event, would suggest as appropriate the following:

- 1. That the leading features of the Semi-Centennial should be to call forth expressions of gratitude to God for past favors and mercies, and for the enjoyment of our present blessings and prosperity; and to lead us to a deeper and more intelligent consciousness of our history, mission, work and obligations.
- 2. That the exercises of the occasion should be, in their essential nature, religious, historical, commemorative and practical, and be carried into effect during the next annual meeting of the Synod of Ohio.
- 3. That, as introductory, the convocation shall commence on Friday evening, June 12, 1874; and the opening proper shall take place on Sunday morning, June 14th, with a sermon by the Rev. David Winters, D. D., and be followed by the holy communion of the Lord's Supper.
- 4. That, as suitable subjects on which to have papers prepared for the occasion, we would suggest the following:
- 1.) A history of the Synod of Ohio, together with brief biographical sketches of the early fathers and founders of the Reformed Church in the West, by Rev. Isaac H. Reiter.
- 2.) Concise histories of the several Classes connected with the Synod, from the commencement to the present time, by Rev. Lewis H. Kefauver.
- 3.) A sketch of the several Boards of Synod, and of the benevolent operations of the Church, by Rev. Henry M. Herman.
- 4.) An essay on the rise, progress and success of the Sunday Schools, by Rev. Peter C. Prugh.
- 5.) A history of our Literary and Theological Institutions, by Rev. Jeremiah H. Good, D. D.
- 6.) A historical sketch of the publication interests of the West, by Rev. Samuel Mease.
- 7.) An essay on the Synodical form of Church Government, considered in its historical and practical aspect, by Rev. John Kuelling.
- 8.) A dissertation on the true idea and importance of Christian benevolence, by Rev. Herman Rust, D. D.
- 9.) A discourse on intellectual culture in its relation to Christianity, by Rev. George W. Williard, D. D.
- 10.) The collection of historical material, and the preparation of historical sketches of all our congregations, by the pastors and officers.

5. All these papers shall be regarded as Semi-Gentennial contributions, and be at the disposal of the Synod.

6. Moreover, with the view of turning the whole occasion to some practical account for the Church, we would suggest that a Semi-Centennial Fund be raised during the year by congregational and individual free-will offerings; and that this Fund, among other objects, be devoted to the cause of Beneficiary Education, Home and Foreign Missions, Church Extension and -our Literary and Theological Institutions.

7. That a Committee of three be appointed with instructions to carry out the measures proposed, and report such suggestions and arrangements as may be deemed necessary to the

next Synod.

## Consideration of Benevolent Interests by Synod.

The following preamble and resolutions, having been sub-mitted to Synod for consideration, were received, amended and

adopted:

Whereas, A great portion of our business is passed by in a manner entirely too hastily for want of time, and the consequence is that such important interests as Missions, (Foreign and Home), Church Extension and Beneficiary Education are overlooked to a great extent; and,

There is a manifest want of interest in these agencies of the Church among the ministers and membership in our

communion; therefore,

That hereafter several evenings during the sessions of Synod be set apart for the consideration of the subjects of Missions, (Foreign and Home), Church Extension and Bene-

ficiary Education.

Resolved, That some ministerial brethren be appointed to prepare papers on the subjects named above, to be read at the next annual meeting of Synod; and that the members of Synod discuss the subjects presented by the essayists in short addresses

not exceeding ten minutes in length.

Resolved, That Saturday evening of this Synod be set apart for the consideration of the subject of Home Missions, and that

Rev. Cyrus Cortilead in the discussion.

The following brethren were appointed to prepare the several papers referred to in the preceding report, namely: on Foreign Missions, Rev. Isaac H. Reiter; on Home Missions, Rev. Charles W. Hoyman; on Church Extension, Rev. David Van Horne; and on Beneficiary Education, Rev. John M. Kendig.
