
















The sorrow was a disgusting four game losing streak while the joy was turning everything around and winning the last five games in a row.


Callahan and the rest of the team put everything together for IBC's Homeciming game against Eureka and clobbered them 54-24. After that, the Eagles were off.











We're sorry it happened but there was nothing we could have done differently. Instead of looking for what is missing or any other faults, look at the 1976 "EAGLE" as a stepping stone for future books. Everything needs a base to build from, let this book be that base. For that reason, "CELE-BRATE". We have a new beginning.

No 1973 yearbook, an irreplaceable loss

As things stand right now, there will be no yearbook for 1973-74 and there may not be another for some time to come.

The reasons for the death of the book are many and varied. When one tries to find out who is to blame, students point at the faculty, the faculty points at the students and everyone chimes in, "There is a lack of interest."

No matter who is to blame, the fact remains that the yearbook is gone. At first this may not seem to be any consequence, but when one considers what a yearbook is and does, the loss becomes truly tragic.

First of all, a yearbook is an enduring record of the people and events of a school year. It is a quick reference when a person needs to know something about another member of his particular class. Its pictures provide clear memories of important events or memorable occurrences. The names and faces of every member of each class are recorded in a yearbook along with the activities of the various clubs and organizations. The school's athletic teams are honored in the yearbook. It also serves as a place for the praise or open criticism of the accomplishments and techniques of faculty members.

Perhaps the greatest loss of all comes to the seniors. Their achievements and activities are the feature of the yearbook. Only through such a book is a school able to honor and thank every individual for their contributions. As college is probably the most memorable part of many people's lives, the yearbook is, in essence, a memory book. It allows a person a place to show himself and others "what it was like" in his senior year.

Aside from being strictly a record, a yearbook is just as important as an educational aid and a creative outlet. Credit is (or was) given for work on the yearbook. It served as a training ground for journalism students in learning layout, writing and living with the difficulties of producing a manuscript for publication. Photographers and artists are also important to a yearbook. The pages of a yearbook provide a place for artists, photographers and writers alike to display and publish their works without the hassle or bitter disappointment found frequently in commercial publications.

A yearbook also serves as good relations for a school in building the school's image. It presents a school's strengths and weaknesses. A well done yearbook is, in itself, a testimony to the talents and spirit of a school.

It is the opinion of some that the "FLUX" can fill the role of the yearbook, but the truth is that our purpose is to inform and entertain, not to be a lasting record of the people and events of a school year. The newspaper that you are holding now will probably be reduced to rubbish within a week's time. In short, we cannot take the place of the yearbook, as can nothing else. The passing of the yearbook is an irreplaceable loss.
























































