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PREFACE

-5-10-42

I T is the intention of the LINCOLN RECORD SOCIETY to issue a series of volumes containing abstracts of wills relating to the diocese and county of Lincoln. These ancient testamentary documents are of value because they throw much light upon the language, the religious customs and observances, and the manners and social life of our forefathers. Moreover, they are of very great service for genealogical purposes since, in the period prior to the institution of parish registers, they are often the only available source of information relating to families which did not hold land or use armorial bearings; and even when they relate to the same period as extant parish registers, they are no less important to the genealogist, for experience proves that, while it is generally impossible to compile a pedigree from either wills or parish registers alone, it is generally easy to do so when both these classes of records are available.

In 1888 the late Mr. Alfred Gibbons, edited a volume of Early Lincoln Wills: an abstract of all the wills and administrations recorded in the Episcopal Registers of the old Diocese of Lincoln, 1280-1547. The volume is full of interest, though some names, and also many details which are important as illustrating ancient manners and customs, have been omitted.

The late Canon A. R. Maddison, F.S.A., in 1888 and 1891, edited two volumes of *Lincolnshire Wills*, A.D. 1500–1600, and A.D. 1600–1617, containing abstracts of wills preserved in the Lincoln District Probate Registry. These volumes give abstracts, generally short, of some 550 wills out of the tens of thousands which are deposited in the Registry. The present work supersedes no more than three or four pages of Canon Maddison's first volume.

The disadvantages attaching to the method of selection are so serious that it has been considered desirable to make this book exhaustive for the period which it covers. Every will, therefore, in the District Probate Registry from 1271, the earliest date, to 1526, has been included, with the exception of the following wills which lie entombed in later volumes in the Registry, and were found too late to be included—

- Mauncer Marmyon of Ryngesdon [in the parish of Rippingale], esquire, dated 8 November, 1505 (Book 1532-4, folio 40).
- James Washyngbourgh of Wyberton, maryner, dated 3 April, 1525 (Book 1520-31, folio 334).

John Warnar of Buknall, dated 6 July, 1526 (Book 1520–31, folio 396d.).

PREFACE

It is probable that a few more wills of the period may be discovered from time to time, and these, together with those just mentioned, will be printed in the next volume of this series. Further, this volume not only contains every will but also deals exhaustively with each one. Nothing has been omitted except that the substance of a document has sometimes been given in a shorter form in, e.g., devises of real estate with various remainders, and in some other cases where there is much verbiage or needless repetition. Further space has been saved by omitting, in most cases, the usual preamble; the commendation of the soul to Almighty God, blessed Mary, and the whole company of Heaven; the words, 'Item, I bequeath', etc.; and the subject matter of many unimportant bequests, as *e.g.* a cow, a ewe, a lamb, a pot or a pan, which recur with a monotonous frequency. The wills, before A.D. 1500 however, have been given in full, and in those from that date to 1510, the compression is very slight indeed. In all the wills special care has been taken to include all names of persons and places, obsolete words, curious or unusual expressions, and also the preambles and commendation clauses, etc., when they depart from the common form. The editor has erred rather on the side of inclusion than on that of exclusion, since it is in the statement of minute details that much of the value of these early wills consists. When the wills of the next period come to be edited it will probably be found possible to use greater compression in many of the documents. The spelling of the original has been carefully followed. The grammar is, in many cases, indefensible, but the sentences are given as they appear in the wills. Many of the words might suggest that there has been an obvious mistake in copying or printing, but it may be said that great pains have been taken to ensure accuracy, and that where a word has been open to suspicion the original has been consulted again. Such words occur too often to admit of sic being printed after them.

It would have been possible to have illustrated the text with notes from many sources, but it has been decided to confine the notes to necessary explanations of the text. There are at Lincoln probably no fewer than 40,000 wills prior to the year 1600 and, with this vast mass of material awaiting publication, it has seemed the wiser policy to devote the funds of the Society to the printing of as much as possible of the original documents, and to leave students to make use of the raw material thus provided for them. In two instances of early and exceptional interest the editor must plead guilty to having departed from this decision, and perhaps the length to which the notes have run in those cases may be taken as illustrating the soundness of the general rule.

A glossary has been provided with a view to explaining some of the more difficult words and subjects. It may contain little that is new to scholars, but it may, perhaps, be found helpful by those members of the Society who, without being experts, feel a general attachment to antiquities.

Some explanation of the long delay in the appearance of this volume is due to members of the Society. The original arrangement was that the Society's fifth volume should be the ancient Cartulary of the Vicars Choral of Lincoln Cathedral, but Canon Maddison's untimely death made this impossible. It was then decided that the vacancy should be filled with a volume of wills, which was, in its turn, delayed by the long illness of the editor.

The thanks of the Society are due to Mr. Gordon L. Simpson, until lately H.M. Registrar of the Lincoln District Probate Registry, and now district Registrar at York, for the facilities which he willingly gave for access to the wills under his charge; and to the clerks of the Registry, Messrs. Panton and Handley, and especially Mr. Smith, for their invariable courtesy and helpfulness.

In the preparation of the volume the editor has availed himself of help and advice which he wishes thankfully to acknowledge. In the first place, he is very deeply indebted to Miss Rotha Mary Clay who, with a generous sacrifice of leisure, compiled the valuable Subject Index. To Mr. A. Hamilton Thompson, F.S.A., whose wide and accurate knowledge of mediæval literature is well-known, the editor has turned in many doubts and difficulties, and has always received prompt and willing help. The Rev. Andrew Clark, LL.D., has most kindly read the proofs, and given valuable help in connection with some of the entries in the Glossary. Dr. Henry Bradley, one of the editors of the New English Dictionary, and the Rev. J. T. Fowler, canon of Durham, have supplied notes about some obscure words. Dr. M. R. James, provost of King's college, Cambridge, and Mr. G. G. Coulton have helped in identifying ancient The editor wishes also gratefully to acknowledge the help books. which he has received throughout the preparation of the work from his clerks, the Misses R. E. and F. E. Thurlby and E. Kettleborough.

[HENRY DE COLEBI OF LINCOLN, A.D. 1271.]

[D. & C., MISC., NO. 56.1 Translated from the Latin.]

.... Amen. This is the testament of Henry de Colebi² in Lincoln, who, though weak in body, is of good and sound mind, etc. certain than death, nothing more uncertain than the hour of death, and gave and bequeathed his soul to God, and his body to be buried after the manner of the Church (ecclesiastice) in the churchyard of the church of the Blessed Mary of Wykeford, his parish church of the same church for his mortuary his best garment. Also he willed and enjoined that his horses, cow (vacca), pigs and utensils should be discharged (acquietarentur), and the residue of that money, after the payment of his debts, he left to his wife and John his son. Also Also to Thomas makait one sword from Scotland (de scotia). Also to John nephew of Roger son of Benedict one sword his silver seal. Also he bequeathed to John his son all his books except the book of bucolics, which he bequeathed to John Bacheler. Also Maud Bacheler another red carpet. Also to Juliana his tunic (tunicam) of green all his houses, except that in which he lives, shall be sold, and what is received for them for his soul as far as it can be made to extend according goods which are not contained in this schedule, nor bequeathed to any one to pious uses his beloved William de Coleby his brother, Thomas makait of Lincoln, and his wife executors of this his testament. Mary, this will was made.

In the Name of the Father and the Son, etc. First I bequeath my soul to God, my Creator, and Blessed Mary, and my body to be buried in the churchyard of Bennington, with the best beast belonging to the house, that is, one horse. Also to the fabric of the mother church of Bennington half a mark. Also to the lamp before the cross xijd. Also to the lamp before the altar of St. Mary xijd. Also to the lamp of St. 'Nicholay' vid. Also to the lamp of St. Leonard vjd. Also to the high altar iiijs. for oblations. Also to the work of the chapel of St. Mary vs. Also to the chalice of Bennington xijd. In the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost. On Thursday the morrow of St. Mark the Evangelist, in the year of the Lord m.cc. and ninety six, I Henry Illuminator make my testament in this manner. First I commend my soul into the hands of the Crucified who redeemed me with his precious blood, and my body to be buried in the churchyard of St. Rumwaldin Butwerk, and with my body my best garment. Also I bequeath to my daughter Beatrice a certain chest ; and to Osb[e]rt my son one ark. Also I bequeath to Beatrice my daughter all my land, with the buildings upon it, which I have and hold of the fee of Thomas de Faxflet for one pound of cummin in the parish of Bouon with all its appurtenances and the easement of the garden as it is contained in the charter of feoffment in length and breadth, saving the moiety of the aforesaid land to Cecily Baundeney my wife for her dower while she shall live. And I will that after the decease of the said Cecily it shall revert wholly to the aforesaid Beatrice my daughter by hereditary right, and by virtue of this testament, well and in peace; rendering to the lord of the fee one pound of cummin for all secular service. Also I bequeath to Beatrice my daughter one selion of land in the fields outside Lincoln towards the black monks, which I bought of Roger de Sutterton, which was formerly of John Fattimouth, rendering to Richard Fattimouth one halfpenny yearly, and saving the dower in respect of the moiety of the said selion to Cecily my wife. Also I bequeath to Henry Baundeny a certain plot (*placeam*) of land in the parish of St. Bouon in length and breadth as it is contained in a charter of feoffment which I have of Robert Oyler and Emma his wife, rendering yearly to the lord

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of the fee one halfpenny at Easter for all secular service. Also I appoint and grant all my principal messuage which I bought of Hell' in the parish of St. Rumwald, which land was once of Maud Drincalhout, to Cecily [Baun]deney my wife for the whole after the death of the said Cecily the said messuage shall revert to the right heir. Also I bequeath to Osbert my son my five houses in with their appurtenances to him and his heirs and assigns, saving the dower of Cecily Baundeney my wife. Also I will and grant Beatrice my daughter die without an heir, that those lands which are bequeathed to her shall revert wholly to O his heirs and assigns, so that Osbert shall be bound to maintain the aforesaid Beatrice if need shall press upon her shall revert wholly to Nicol' son of Osbert de la Gild Sancti Roberti pro quinque solidis in quibus la Gild. Et ut hec ta ministrandi.

[AVICE DE CROSSEBY OF LINCOLN, WIDOW, A.D. 1327.]

In the Name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, Amen. I Auice, the relict of Adam de Crosseby, formerly citizen of Lincoln, etc., make my testament on Tuesday the morrow of St. Bartholomew the Apostle, in the year of the Lord one thousand, three hundred and twentyseven. First, I bequeath my soul to Almighty God and Blessed Mary and all Saints, and my body to be buried in the church of St. Cuthbert in Lincoln near the tomb of Adam de Crosseby, formerly my husband; and with my body I bequeath to the said church my best super-tunic (supertunicam) in the name of my mortuary. I bequeath to the fabric of the same church half a mark of silver. To the fabric of the mother church of Lincoln two shillings. To the friars of the order of St. Augustin of Lincoln half a mark. To the canons of St. Leonard of Torksey half a mark. To the canons and convent of Barlynges one mark. To the friars Minors, the friars Preachers and the friars Carmelites, Lincoln, xijd. each. To Sir William, parochial chaplain of the church of St. Cuthbert, xijd. To Robert de Mumby, clerk, of the same church, xijd. and one board (tabulam) suitable for making wax tapers. To Agnes my niece, wife, that is, of William de Thame in Lincoln, one better brass jar (ollam). To Alice wife of William de Hull in Lincoln one robe of cloth mixed of brown colour. To Alice wife of William le Verrour in Lincoln my slashed (pannet') robe, and one brass jar (ollam) containing two gallons (lagenas). To each of my godchildren in Lincoln vjd. I bequeath xs. to be distributed in bread to the poor of Lincoln on the first day of my burial. To brother Simonde Baumburgh, canon of the house of Barlinges, one pece or goblet (ciphum)

of silver. To the church of St. Cuthbert aforesaid one carpet of 'Raynes' to cover the bodies of the dead. To Auice daughter of William de Hull aforesaid three ewes. To Alice my niece, wife of John de Broughton in Lincoln, ten shillings. To Alice daughter of Alice de Cotum twenty shillings, one carpet, one feather-bed, and two linen sheets. I bequeath forty shillings to make an assemblage of my friends and neighbours on the first day of my burial. To Sir Robert de Brunne in Lincoln, chaplain, ten shillings. I bequeath one mark to make an assemblage of my friends and neighbours on the seventh day of my burial, and half a mark to be distributed in bread amongst the poor in the city of Lincoln on the To Auice daughter of Isabel de Glentham two carpets and same day. two linen sheets. To Alice wife of William de Hull aforesaid one stuffed 'Materace.' I bequeath ten pounds of silver to celebrate three anniversaries in the church of St. Cuthbert, Lincoln, for my soul, and the souls of Adam de Crosseby, late my husband, and all the faithful dead. To Isoude my maid one courtepye and one hood of green cloth. To Isabel, mother of the same Isoude, my belt (cinctorium) without the appendages. To a certain widow of Glentham my old blue tunic. To Maud my laundress (lotrix) one carpet of a close texture (spissum). To Margaret my maid one carpet and one linen sheet. To Isoude my maid one 'Materace' on which she was wont to lie. To the high altar of St. Cuthbert aforesaid a towel of four ells. To the altar of the Blessed Mary in the same church a towel of three ells. To John de Essex, formerly my servant, one old carpet. I bequeath one very little leaden vessel (*plumbum*) to mend the eaves (*stillicidium*) or gutter of the church of St. Cuthbert. To William de Hull one leaden vessel for the hands containing two tubs To each of the sons of William de Humberston the younger (tvnas). a silver spoon. To Sir John de Ouneby, chaplain, a silver spoon. To Walter my shepherd xijd. To Elen Crippe, formerly my servant, and to her son each a silver spoon. Also I give and bequeath all my tenement situate on the east side of the church of St. Cuthbert in Lincoln together with the garden adjoining and with the buildings and their appurtenances, which tenement lies between the highway on the south side and the tenement of John son of Richard de Burton on the north side, and abuts upon the land of John de Drax, rector of the church of Colyngham towards the east, and the churchyard of St. Cuthbert towards the west, and also two other tenements situate together on the south side of the said church, and lying between the highway towards the north, and the tenement of Gilbert de Humberston towards the south, and the tenement of William de Snartford the elder towards the east, and the tenement of William de Bliton and John de Draz on the west side, with

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all their buildings, rights and appurtenances, to be sold for ever [sic] by my executors, after the custom and use of the city of Lincoln, to perform therewith divine offices for my soul and the soul of Adam my late husband and the souls of all the faithful dead. I will that the residue of my goods be at the disposition of my executors to do for my soul and the souls of all the faithful dead in the city of Lincoln as it shall seem expedient to them. I ordain as my executors of this my testament, Sir Robert de Brunne of Lincoln, chaplain, and Hugh le Bower in Lincoln. In witness whereof my seal with the seals of my executors is appended. Dated and signed in my house at Lincoln before witnesses called and if it happen that any one of the executors aforenamed refuse to undertake the burden of execution, I ordain that Richard Gunne of Lincoln shall be added in his place.

[On the dorse] The present testament was proved before me, the dean of the Christianity of Lincoln, in the church of All Saints, Lincoln, iij Ides September, m.ccc. xxvij, and administration of the goods of the defunct was granted to Sir Robert de Brume [sic], chaplain, and Richard Gunne of Lincoln, the executors, Hugh Bower the co-executor refusing for certain and lawful reasons to undertake the burden of administration. In witness whereof I have to these presents appended the seal of my office.

[On the dorse] The present testament was lawfully proved in respect of the lay fee before William de Bliton, mayor of the city of Lincoln, Hugh de Belyngton and Robert de Bellafago, bailiffs of the said city, and other trusty persons, in full court of the same city, on the Monday next before the feast of the Apostles Simon and Jude, I Edward III, according to the custom of the said city; wherefore the said testament was accepted by the court as rightly proved, and the executors were directed to execute it according to the last will of the testatrix, and the custom of the city of Lincoln thus far preserved.

Also I bequeath cs. ad emendum oi'm lapidem [blank] pro terre [sic] of Master Henry de la Dale * formerly canon of Lincoln. Also to John de Wellyngham, reeve (preposito) of Normanby, xxs. Also I bequeath to William Erl xiijs. iiijd. And I will that my executors have my chest in the treasury hitherto locked with two keys of different patterns, of which the one shall be in the charge of Sir Hugh de betonia, rector of the church of Netilton, and the other in the charge of Sir Thomas palmer and John Baker; and in that chest shall be placed all the money to be raised in respect of my goods without abatement for the sake of exchange or otherwise, to be kept in order that, when opportunity offers, they may have it ready in the said chest for buying possessions for chantries and other works of piety to be done for my soul; and I will that in respect of the making of my chantries the one shall be a perpetual chantry of the Blessed Mary for my soul in the prebendal church of Empyngham, and the other a chantry of the Blessed Mary in my church of Swaltelyff, if it can conveniently be done. Also I bequeath to John Louereys xls. sterling to be received yearly of the rents of Normanby by the hands of my aforesaid executors for the term of the lady Margaret Comyn's life. Also I bequeath to William brys xiijs. iiijd. to be received yearly of the rents of Normanby of the hands of my executors as long as the lady Margaret and Sir William shall live. Also I bequeath to John de Southo xiijs. iiijd. to be received yearly of the farm of Normanby for the term of the life of the said lady Margaret and her [husband.4] Also I bequeath to William de Salteletby [sic] xxvjs. viijd. to be received yearly of the farm of Normanby, until he come to the age of xxiiij years, in order that he may be able to be ordained to the priesthood, so that in the meantime he may stay at the schools. Also I bequeath to Richard Elys xxv[j]s. viijd. to be received yearly of the rents of Normanby, until he come to the age of xxiiij years, in the same way as William de Salfletby. Also I will that if Richard Elys or William de Salfletby [folio 24d.] absent themselves from the schools in any year, they shall go without the legacy for that year and for the whole time of their absence. 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with the whole residue of all my goods, together with xxl. sterling yearly of the rent of xl marks of Normanby, due to me from the dean and chapter of the church of Lincoln for the term of the life of the lady Margaret Comy [sic], new acquisitions of lands and rents be made by my executors as often as opportunity offers; and when the acquisitions shall have been made, I will that the whole sum of money together with the money remaining from my rents which have already been acquired for my chantries, beyond the yearly charges expressed in the ordination of the chantries for ever, shall be distributed on the day of my obit (obitus), or as soon as conveniently may be, among the poor of my family (de parentela mea), if any there be, and among poor nuns and other poor mendicants, according to the discretion of my Chaplains after the death of all my executors, for my soul and the souls of my parents, friends and benefactors, by the oversight of the clerk of the commons; this being always excepted, that if perchance the rents assigned in the first foundation of my chantries in the church of Lincoln for the maintenance of all things contained in the ordination of those two chantries shall in any respect decrease so that they cannot fully support the charges, then I will that the amount of the decrease of the first rents shall be taken out of the rents acquired by me and my executors, as is premised, or to be acquired, in order to fulfil the charges, until the aforesaid old rents shall have recovered (respiraverint). And I will that if any one or more of my executors shall be of a contrary opinion to his or their co-executors in making distributions or in acquiring possessions or in any other matter touching the said testament and not expressed in the same, then the advice of my lord John de Welburn the Treasurer shall be obtained. And for the execution and performance of this testament I make, ordain and constitute as my executors Sir Hugh de betonia aforesaid, Master John braunspache, Sir Thomas Palmere, rector of Blaunkneye, Sir John Staple, rector of the church of St. Mary Magdalene, and John baker. In witness whereof my seal is affixed to the presents. And because to many people my seal is unknown, I have arranged that the seal of the venerable chapter of the church of Lincoln shall be affixed. And we the aforesaid chapter at the request of the said Sir Richard have caused our seal to be affixed to these presents. In the name of God, Amen. I Geoffrey lescropp', canon of the cathedral church of the Blessed Mary of Lincoln, on the viijth of the

kalends of February, namely, the day of the Conversion of Paul the Apostle, in my lodging within the close of the church of Lincoln, in the year of the Lord one thousand ccc and eighty-two, make my testament in this manner : First, I bequeath my soul to God and Blessed Mary and all His saints, and my body to be buried in the church of Lincoln, near my sister, under the bell-tower, but so that my body may not by any means be kept above ground beyond the space of three days, in which I leave the matter of food to the judgement of my executors. I do not wish them, however, to exceed the measure. Also I will that two tapers of xx pounds weight of wax shall then be burnt about my body and, at the end of mass, shall be placed on the right and left of the high altar to be burnt according to the disposition of the warden of the said altar. Also xx torches of the length of xij feet by the ell, of which ij shall remain to the high altar, and ij to the altar where mass of the Blessed Mary is celebrated in honour of *Corpus Christi*, and j to every altar in the church. Also five marks for distribution amongst the poor lying in

Geoffrey, the testator, was a lawyer and ecclesiastic, and is said to have been LL.B., probably of Oxford (*Dict. Nat. Biog.*, art. Sir Geoffrey Le Scrope). He held many ecclesiastical preferments. On 6th February, 1334-5, at York, Geoffrey, son of Sir Geoffrey Lescrop', knight, was collated to a canonry in Lincoln cathedral, and to the prebend of Haydor cum Walton in the same (mandate to induct, 11th February), on the death of Geoffrey Les Geoffrey Les (*Reg.*, *iv*, folio 410*d.*), who had previously, on 2nd October, 1334, exchanged the wardenship of the free chapel in the castle at Marlborough for this prebend with Pigellus de Manetti (*Ibid.*, folio 409*d.*-410). Le Neve (*Fasti*, ed. Hardy, vol. ii, page 155), seems to be mistaken in saying that Godhyue exchanged the prebend for the wardenship. On 24th February, 1334-5, it was ordered that the next vacant stall at York should be conferred on Geoffrey le Scrope, clerk (*Reg. Melton* at York, folio 112*d.*). On 9th January, 1337-8, he was collated to the prebend of Portpool in St. Paul's cathedral, London (Hennessy, *Novum Repertorium*, page 45). On 7th April, 1340, he was presented to the church of Bolton Percy in the diocese of York, and on the same day a like presentation was granted to John Pulhore, chaplain (*Calendar of Patent Rolls*, 1338-40, page 447). Pulhore held the benefice from 1340 to 1345, and Geoffrey was never instituted to it.

On the 2nd of August following, Master Geoffrey Lescrope, king's clerk, received a grant of the prebend of 'Apelthorpe' in the church of St. Peter, York, which was also in the king's gift for the same reason (*Ibid.*, 1340-43, page 19). Le Neve (*op. cit.*, vol. iii, page 166) says that he was collated to the prebend 3rd November, 1346, but this is probably a mistake, for the collation does not appear in Archbishop Zouche's Register.

Also I bequeath to the altar where mass of the Blessed Mary is celebrated one red chasuble with a great 'orfray' of gold, with two tunicles and dalmatics to the same chasuble belonging. Also I will that there be placed in the custody of the vice-chancellor and

Scrope appears several times in the patent rolls in conveyances of land for the benefit of Lincoln cathedral. Thus, on 16th October, 1363, he and others had a licence to alienate in mortmain to the dean and chapter certain premises in the city and suburb of Lincoln and in Burton by Lincoln, in aid of the sustenance of certain chantries (*Calendar of Patent Rolls*, 1361-4, page 397). Again, on 24th October, 1378, the dean and chapter received a licence for a similar alienation of property in the city and suburb of Lincoln by Master Geoffrey Lescrope and Agnes late wife of Thomas Caus, knight, for the performance by the dean and chapter of certain works of piety in accordance with the ordinance of the said Master Geoffrey and Agnes (*Ibid.*, 1377-81, page 279); and, on 10th June, 1380, the dean and chapter obtained another licence for the alienation to them in mortmain by Scrope and another of 26s. 8d. rent due to Scrope and others from Robert Douce of Wolyngham for a messuage and land in Wolyngham, which he held for life, and the reversion of the premises after his death (*Ibid.*, page 499). Once more, John de Welbourne, clerk, and Master Geoffrey Lescrope, on 20th February, 1379-80, had a licence to alienate in mortmain the advowson of the church of Irby by Braytoft, not held in chief, to John de Warsop, master of the choristers of St. Mary's cathedral, Lincoln, and the commonalty of those choristers, in aid of their maintenance (*Ibid.*, page 438).

Scrope died between the 25th and the 31st of January, 1382-3, and was buried in Lincoln cathedral under the bell-tower, as he directed in his will. The word 'Stanfordie' in his epitaph is probably a copyist's mistake for 'Lincolnie.' Perhaps Beatrice Lutterell (see page 16, note 16), who was commemorated with him at Haydor, was the sister near whom he wished to be buried. In 1641, Bishop Sanderson found ' near the choir door [of the cathedral], under the lanthorn, on a marble, this circumscribed on brass'—

Also I give to the vicars of the second form living together x marks in order that there may be done therewith in all things as it has been ordained above for the superior vicars in respect of the money given to them by Sir Henry de Edenstowe and Master William de Burton; and they shall be brought to the vice-chancellor and the succentor, and shall be kept by them as a provision for the future. Also I bequeath to my two chaplains, that is, Sir Hugh Bussy and Sir John Vaux of Quadryng, cs. each every year to celebrate for v years for my soul and the souls of all my benefactors, and especially of John de Fandon and Sir Lambert de Irnham. Also I bequeath to the church of Boudon to the use of the high altar my greater chalice with leaves on its foot. Also my best corporas. Also to the church of the Blessed Mary in Little Boudon in the fields my white vestment with all its equipment (apparatu). Also I bequeath to the chapel of Herbergh one orphray [of cloth] of Cologne (de colonia) for one cope because they say that they have a vestment (pannum) of silk. Also I bequeath to the church of the Blessed Mary of Oxford my best whole vestment of gold with ' orphrays ' of red velvet embroidered with golden lilies with all its equipment. Also one amice of red velvet embroidered with three fft's in entire letters * to put on with the cope of the vestment aforesaid (unam amitam de rubeo velueto broudatam cum tribus M literis integris ad induendam cum capa vestimenti supradicti). Also I bequeath to the hall of Balliol xxl. of good money order that necessary books for the said house may be bought in therewith and applied to the perpetual uses of the fellows living there. Also I bequeath to the abbot and convent of Chouerham⁴ x marks. Also I bequeath to the house of Beauvale (Bellivallo) my best chalice with great silver cruets (*fiolis*) and xls. for a pittance on the day on which they shall cause a commemoration for my soul to be celebrated among them. Also I bequeath to the house of Haynton of the same order⁵ xls.

Also to the house of Witham of the same order xls. Also to the house of London of the same order xls. Also to the house of Hull of the same order xls. Also I bequeath to every order of mendicant friars dwelling in the city of Lincoln xxs. Also I bequeath to four houses of nuns, that is, to Irford, Gaukewell, Heynenges, and Fosse, to each house v marks. Also I bequeath to brother William de Hebden xls. Also I bequeath to Sir William, parish chaplain of Boudon, xls. Also I bequeath for distribution among the poor of that parish of Little Boudon and Herbergh according to the appointment of Sir William aforesaid xls. Also I bequeath to my church of Frampton my cross of silver-gilt set with stones, to be kept as shall seem best to the chaplains governing the church. Also I bequeath to the church of Haydour my everyday chalice. Also I bequeath to the church of St. Margaret within the close of Lincoln my embroidered (stragulatum) vestment of gold and velvet with the whole equipment. Also to the church of Apulthorpp an alb and an amice with apparels (paruris) with a stole and maniple (fanone) stitched together (consutas) of silk with divers arms, and that there may be bought one chasuble, as I have appointed for my own chapel, and handed over to the same church of Apulthorpp. Also I bequeath to my brother Sir Henry⁶ my best silver cup (*cupam*) with an ewer gilt of the same set. To the lady Joan his consort my second best cup. To Sir Stephen le Scropp⁷ my third best cup inwrought (incertam) with roses, and gilt. Also I bequeath to the same and to Maud his consort twelve silver dishes which I bought of the executors of the lord de Huntyngfeld. Also I bequeath to Sir John le Scropp⁸ vj godets (goddetis) inclosed within a seventh with a cover. Also I bequeath to Sir Richard le Scropp' my breviary according to the use of York which he has at his house. Also I bequeath to the gild of Corpus Christi my girdle (certum) of velvet with 'perles,' and xxs. Also I bequeath to John Petre one goblet (ciphum) called 'nut' with a cover and foot gilt. Also I bequeath to Sir Robert de Plumton and the lady Isabel¹⁰ his consort two peces with covers inclosed

⁶ He was the first baron Scrope of Masham, and died 31st July, 1391. His wife's parentage is unknown.

⁷ He was nephew to the testator, being the third son of Henry first baron Scrope of Masham, and he succeeded as second baron in 1391. He was born *circa* 1345, and died 25th January, 1405-6. He married Margery daughter of John fourth baron Welles, and widow of John baron Huntingfield ; and she survived him. in one boiled skin. To Sir Henry Fitz Hugh¹¹ one pair of enamelled (aimelitarum) tablets which I had from the archdeacon¹². Also I bequeath to Master Richard le Scropp¹⁸ ostiensem in lectura which he has in his possession, and my book of Berenger (Beringarium). Also I bequeath to Master Henry Gategang my great ring with a great peridot (peridod'), and my great goblet called 'Boll' with the arms of the lord my brother's on the top of the cover. Also I bequeath to Peter de Halton, rector of the church of Claypole, a round pece with a cover, which belonged to Master John de Kellesey. Also I bequeath to John de Apulthorp x marks and my best horse, the one which he likes to choose. Also I remit to William his brother the whole sum (solidum) due to me. Also I bequeath to William de Plumpton one pair of 'plates' covered with red velvet, and the best helmet (cassem) with the best aventail (eventali). Also to John Bawtre a small book which begins with the rubric, '*Cum cubas dicas, etc.*',¹⁵ and v marks. Also to Walter Warner xxs. Also to Sir John Burgh, chaplain, my breviary of the use of Sarum with notation (notatum), so that after his death it may remain to the prior and convent of the house of Kirkeby for the souls of my sisters of Luterell and Hotham¹⁶ and my soul for ever. Also to Sir Robert a

The first of the two books bequeathed to Richard is the *Lectura in quinque*

Decretalium Gregorianorum Libros of Henry of Susa (de Segusia), cardinal bishop of Ostia, one of the greatest medieval canonists, who died in 1271. His best-known work was his *Summa*. Also I bequeath to William the cook the great pot which Harpham gave me, and one jar according to the disposition of the executors, and viij marks of silver. Also to William the miller xls. Also to Maurice of the kitchen and Robert Balme of the bakery xxs. each if they are in office with me at the time of my death. Also I bequeath to Thomas of the stable xiijs. iiijd. Also to Thomas Lillyng xiijs. iiijd. Also I bequeath to John the page (garcioni)¹⁸ of the kitchen vjs. viijd. Also to little William of the kitchen vjs. viijd. Also to little John Broune and John son of Robert the carter iijs. iiijd. each. And I will that all my servants, both greater and lesser, shall receive a full fee at the day of payment next after my death however long before it I may happen to die. Also I bequeath to the anchorite of Hampole xxs. Also I bequeath to the anchorite at the church of the Holy Trinity of Lincoln, xxs., with a tunic (tunica) of russet furred with calaber with a double hood and a cloak (armilausa) of the same suit furred with 'grice.' Also I bequeath to the anchorite of Kirkbey Wysk xiijs. iiijd. Also I bequeath to the anchorite at the church of St. Paul of Staunford xiijs. iiijd. Also to the anchorite of Doncaster vjs. viijd. Also to Beatrice de Estlyngton xls. Also I bequeath to Cecily Whatlous xiijs. iiijd. Also I bequeath to Robert the carter and Walter Mathewe vjs. viijd. each. 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of Welton beyond Humber, Sir John, sacrist in the cathedral church of Lincoln, Sir William de Fiskerton, vicar in the choir of the same church, Sir John Ingham, chaplain and fellow in the Burghersh chantry, and John de Apulthorp, my esquire, the executors of this testament, to whom I bequeath the residue of my goods to dispose of them as before God shall seem to them most expedient. And I bequeath to my executors, that is Master Henry Gategang, Sir John the sacrist, John de Fiskerton and John de Ingham, chaplains, and John de Apulthorp, v marks apiece for their labour. On Friday, that is the tenth day of the month of April, in the year of the Lord one thousand ccc. and eighty-three, the present testament was exhibited before us the chapter of the cathedral church of St. Peter, York, the dean of the same being engaged in distant parts, in our chapter house there, and was by us approved and published; and administration of the goods of the said Master Geoffrey lescropp, deceased, being within our jurisdiction, was by us then and there granted to John de Apulthorp, an executor named in the said testament, according to the form of the constitution of the legate in this behalf provided. In witness whereof we have to the presents appended our common seal. Dated at York in our chapter house, the day and year above-said. We have, however, reserved power to grant like administration to the other executors named in the said testament in case they wish in the future to take it up. Dated by us the place, day and year above-recited¹⁹.

The present testament was exhibited before us the vicar general of the reverend lord the archdeacon of Richmond, and was by us approved; and administration of the goods of the deceased being within the jurisdiction of the said lord archdeacon of Richmond was committed to the aforesaid John de Apulthorp, an executor named in the

Also I wyll that my sonne Thomas hawe xxl. Also if my wyfe be wyth a sonne thenne I will that yt have xxl. Also I will that my dowghter Elizabeth hawe to hyre mareage c markez. And if she be disposed to be a woman of religion I will she have xx markez or more os yt schall be thowthe resnabull by the discresson of myn executores. Also I will that Cecyll my dowghter have to hir mareage c markez. And if my dowghter Elizabethe dy or sche be maryed, or yf she be a voman of religion, thenne I will that my dowghter Cecyll have of hyr mareage mony l markez; also if my wif be with a dowghter, I will yt have c markez. And if my dowghter Cycill dy or sche be mareed, thenne I will that my dowghter Elizabeth hawe to hir mareage yf sche be mareed of hyr sister Cecyll mareage mone I markez. And if my seid dowghteres Elizabeth and Cecyll dy or they be mareed thenne I will that yf my wif be with a dowghter that yt have 1 markez of ther mareage mony. Also I will that my broder James hawe to a rewarde xls.; also I will that my broder leonard haw to a reward xls.; and all this mone unto my seid chylderyn and broder to be had [folio 5d] of all my landes and tenementes, etc., beyng in the handes of my feoffez. And also I will that the seid landes rest seyll [sic] in the handes of my seid feoffez to this my last will be performed, and after my will be performed, I will that my feoffez make a state of all my seid landes to my sonne John and to his heres male of his bode lawfully begoten; and for defawte of isew male, to remayne to my sone hamond and to his heres male of his body lawfully begoten; and for defawte of herez male of me the said William Cupuldyke I will all the said landes remayne to my next heres in fee. Also I wyll that the sayde Sir William and hys successors shall have libertie to go pilgramege to Rome, to seynt James or any oder pilgramayge when he or they be disposyd, so that he or they be vertuowse and goo in good intent.

in every yere to go to his frendes and make merie with them inhoneste. Also I wyll that the sayde Sir William and hys successors beyng ons promotyd unto thys service shall never be putte owte frome thys servyce, neyther for seikness nor for none oder debilite of hys body except for shuche causys if they may be fun' in them and evydently provyd before theyr ordinary where by they may or awght to be putt frome theyr servyce by the lawe and good concience. And if that so oftyn the saide prest by the bysshoppe be not promotyd to the servyce as is afore saide within the space of one monethe next after, then it shall be lawfull to the chyrche wardyns of Crofte that tyme beyng to promote all [sic] able prest to syng and say dyvyne servyce in the chyrche of Crofte for all the lyffe and soles aforesaide. Also I wyll that when it shall fortune any of my feffes to discesse or go away to the number of ij persons, Then thos ij persons remaynyng shall infeffe agayn beforelsdars makyndg' [sic] in the Corwte other xij persons wonnyng in Crofte In fee symple withoute any fien makyng for the space of iiij score xix yeres, licence had of the lorde, and so to contynew for ever so oftyn as the saide feffis discesse or go away to the number of ij persons, and to continew in every articole as is before wrytting. cane, and the rente off them to be put in a stoke to bie other kye with, if it fortune the said kye to fall in decay. I will that the soule off mye Richard Segreave and Margarete my wyffe aftyr hyr deceasse, and the soules off Robert Segrave and Elizabeth his wiffe and the soules of John Toly and his wyffe, with the soule off Robert Segrawe, be rehersed bi the vic' off Threkyngam, and he to have for hes labour after the deceasse of me and my wyffe xijd. and vij masse penys with iiijd. for the dirige perpetually to be kepte by myn executors or the churche wardens the Tewysday next after passion sonday. Lincoln, make my present testament, containing my will, etc. To be buried within the parish church of St. Martin of Welton, with that which is right in the name of my mortuary. To the high altar of the cathedral church of St. Mary of Lincoln xijd. To the fabric of the parish church of Welton vjs. viijd. I will that all my household utensils be divided into two equal parts, that is, one part to Joan my wife, and the other part equally amongst my three daughters at the discretion of my wife and my executors. I will that Joan my daughter have after my decease xxl. to be raised and taken out of my debts if it can be done; and that my wife have all my beasts and cattle for herself, her sons and daughters, with the wagons, two-wheeled carts (bigis), ploughs and implements (phallaris) to them belonging, to be divided according to her discretion. I will that Alice daughter of Joan my

wife have cs. to be received out of my said debts, etc., in respect of the legacy of her father, besides xxxiijs. iiijd. to be received of George Rodeslay of Burnethorp in respect of so many pennies due from him. I will that Agnes my wife's other daughter have besides xiijs. iiijd. to be received of Sir John Davy, late vicar of Aby, vjl. To John Clercke, my kinsman, bachelor in decrees, all that is owing by John Fowler of Stepyng and Thomas Kyllok of Waynflet St. Mary, as appears by their two bonds, if it can be raised, that he may pray especially for the health of my soul and the souls of my parents, kinsmen and friends and all the faithful who are in the pains of purgatory. I will that all those feoffees shall stand and be seised of all the lands, tenements, etc., which I have within the town and fields of Welton aforesaid to the use of my wife for the term of her life, and after her decease to the use of Joan my daughter her heirs and assigns for ever. To John my son three pastures in Winthorp which I lately bought of Thomas Russhe, gentleman, to him his heirs and assigns for ever; with remainder, if he die before he come to the age of xxj years, to his right heirs; with remainder to Joan my daughter and the heirs of her body; to hold of the chief lords of that fee by the services thence heretofore due and of right accustomed, for ever. And failing such heirs, the three pastures shall be sold by my executors or feoffees, and the moneys arising therefrom be disposed for the health of my soul and the souls of my parents, kinsfolk, friends and benefactors, and all the faithful in Christ, in the salary of a chaplain to celebrate for the said souls, and for other charitable gifts (donis caritatiuis), according to their discretion. I will that the feoffees of all my lands, etc., lying within the town and fields of Winthorp, which I lately bought of Richard Arlyk alias Arleryk of Boston, mercer (marcero), [shall stand seised] as they are enfeoffed and seised to the use of Joan my wife for the term of her life, and afterwards to the use of John Clercke my son, his heirs and assigns for ever, as is aforesaid of the three pastures lately bought of Thomas Russhe, gentleman. The residue of my goods I bequeath to John Cocke, rector of Kettesby, Master John Clercke, bachelor in decrees, Martin Wymbyshe of Hamby and Robert Whallay of Dryby, whom I make my executors, to dispose for the health of my soul and the souls of my parents, etc., as they will answer before the supreme Judge. I make Master John Parker of Spillesby, gentleman, supervisor of this testament; and I give him for his pains xs.; and to each of my executors vjs. viijd. Witnesses, William Hall chaplain of the parish of Welton aforesaid, George godeall, William Hudson, Thomas Brewster of the same, and Thomas Fobbe of Slotheby in the parish of Willughby, and many others.

COMMEMORATION OF THE DEAD. The following account of the usual funeral and commemorative services will serve to explain references which occur on almost every page of the present volume-

(a) FUNERAL SERVICES-

- (i) Vespers of the Office of the Dead, which took place on the evening before the funeral-day, was known as PLACEBO, because the office began with the antiphon Placebo Domino in regione vivorum (Psalm cxvi, 9, in Book of Common Prayer). 24, 27-9, 60, 64, 71, 80, 105, 114, 118-19, 153-4, 175, 177, 181
- (ii) Matins of the Office of the Dead, which began nominally soon after midnight, but in practice considerably later. It was known as DIRIGE, dirge, durge, etc., because it began with the antiphon, Dirige, Domine, Deus meus, in conspectu tuo viam meam (founded on Psalm v, 8). 24-9, 42, 50, 60, 64, 71, 73-5, 79-80, 94-5, 105, 114, 118-19, 122-3, 133, 135, 153-4, 168-9, 171, 175-7, 179, 181, 182
- Sometimes to add to the impressiveness of the service, the reading or the singing of particular antiphons and psalms and the reading of particular collects and lessons was assigned to different persons. Nine lessons are specified in obits on pages 153-4. In one case the testator directs that Placebo and Dirige are to be done in his house where his body lies (p. 24).

It is sometimes specified that *Placebo* and *Dirige* are to be sung 'with COM-MENDATION' (pp. 80, 105, 153), *i.e. Commendatio Animarum*, which consisted of the following—

- In Morley church, near Derby, there is a copy of an inscription on a small brass plate which is above the piscina in the chapel. It is a direction for the *Commendatio Animarum* to be said privately at mass on behalf of members of the family of Stathum, and seems to have been put up by John Stathum (died 1454), who is buried in the north chapel of the chancel— 'Ffor the sowles of Rafe, Godyth, Thomas, Elizabeth, Cecill and John & of theyr suxcessoures & for all cristen sowles : de profundis, &c. : pater noster, &c. : ave maria : et ne nos : requiem eternam, &c. : domine exaudi oracionem : with this orison Inclina domine, &c. John Stathum ordeynd this to be said & more writen in other divers bokes'.
- In modern Roman Breviaries the *Commendatio Animarum* is merged in the ordinary office of the dead as its concluding portion; and the name *Commendatio Anima* is given to the litany and prayers used at the departure of the soul.
- In one passage (p. 175) it is specified that *Placebo* and *Dirige* are to be sung with the 'SUFFRAGE thereoff'. In the second copy of the will in Book 1543-56 (f. 64*d*.), 'suffrages' was first written and then the final s was struck out. 'Suffrage' seems to be used here in a collective sense for a form of prayer largely composed of suffrages, and to correspond to what is elsewhere called COMMENDATION (v.s.).
- (iii) Mass for the Dead, was known as Mass of REQUIEM, owing to its introit *Requiem aeternam dona eis, Domine*; et lux perpetua luceat eis. 24-9, 42, 50, 60, 64, 71, 79-80, 94-5, 105, 114, 118-19, 122-3, 133, 135, 153-4, 168-9, 171, 176-7, 179, 181
- In the foregoing account of the Funeral Services the editor is greatly indebted to Dr. Clark's *Sixty-three Lincoln Diocese Documents*, pp. 8-9 (Early English Text Society); and, in the case of 'commendation', to Mr. A. Hamilton Thompson. (b) COMMEMORATIVE SERVICES—
- (i) The Funeral Services described above were in many cases repeated on the SEVENTH DAY after death (pp. 2, 6, 25, 27, 33, 42, 44, 60, 74, 84, 118, 175-6); on the THIRTIETH DAY or MONTH'S MIND (pp. 25, 27, 33, 42, 44, 84, 175-6, 181); and on the anniversary of death, called the ANNIVERSARY, OBIT, YEAR-DAY, JER DAYE, TWELVE-MONTHS DAY (pp. 2, 3, 6, 11, 14, 20, 26, 28-9, 42, 45, 50-1, 59, 62-4, 66, 71, 77, 80, 84, 88, 94-6, 98, 100-1, 103, 105-6, 110, 114, 118-19, 121-3, 127-8, 130-1, 137, 139, 142-3, 145, 151, 153-4, 157-8, 162, 165-6, 168-9, 171, 176, 179, 181-2). Such obits were often ordered to be continued for a term of years (pp. 6, 51, 59, 101, 143, 153-4, 157); sometimes for long periods, e.g. 80, 96, 98 or 99 years (pp. 114, 139, 154, 157, 162, 179); and frequently in perpetuity (pp. 20, 28-9, 66, 71, 77, 80, 98, 110, 121, 171).

- The rule about saying the thirty masses of the trental of St. Gregory, referred to on page 64, was as follows :--Whoever may desire to keep the trental of S. Gregory must celebrate three masses of the Lord's Nativity, three of the Lord's Epiphany, three of the Purification of St. Mary, three of the Annunciation of the same, three of the Lord's Resurrection, three of the Lord's Ascension, three of Whitsun-Day, three of the Trinity, three of the Assumption of St. Mary the Virgin, three of the Trinity, and let these masses be celebrated within the octaves of the above-mentioned feasts, all as on their day, but with special collects after the collect for the day. Let him also say daily *Placebo* and *Dirige* with nine psalms, lessons and anthems, except in Eastertide, when the service must be said with three ; and let the Commendation of Souls be said so many times, etc.-(*Sarum Missal*).
- (iii) Daily masses for terms of varying length—three months (p. 67), one year (pp. 25, 30, 32, 53, 67), two years (pp. 65, 144, 184), three years (p. 39), seven years (p. 27), forty years (p. 65), from Ash-Wednesday to Low Sunday for sixty years (p. 87).
- (iv) A Chantry was an endowment for the maintenance of one or more priests to say masses daily for the souls of the founder and other persons specified by him. 10-11, 25
- (v) There is a very interesting account of the founding of a 'DONATIVE' in the church of Croft 'for ij speciall causys', namely prayer for the souls of certain persons and 'the mayntenynge of the service of god of the halyday' (p. 70). The priest is to have liberty to go pilgrimage to Rome, or to St. James (SANTIAGO DE COMPOSTELA, q.v.) or elsewhere (p. 71); and to go to his friends and make merry with them one month in each year (p. 72); and his tenure of the office is to be perpetual except in the case of misconduct (p. 72). 70-2. See also BEFORELSDARS, DONATYFFE (vi) A perpetual DEACONSHIP was founded in the church of Bolingbroke 'to have godd the more honorably servyd' and certain souls 'prayed for there fore evermore' (pp. 68-9). The context shows that the office was to be served by a priest, and the term 'deaconship' is unusual in this connection. Its use may be compared with the word 'deaconry', a name given to the chapels and oratories in Rome, under the direction of the regionary deacons or cardinal deacons. There was a deaconship at Sedgebrooke, the incumbent of which was called 'deacon' (Subsidy, p. 70; L.R.S., ii, p. 204; *ibid.*, viii, p. 70).
- The bequests for funeral and commemorative services often include additional sums with a view to adding to the impressiveness of the services and to ensuring a large attendance of worshippers, both of priests (pp. 13, 85, 122, etc.) and of the poor and others (pp. 26-7, 42, 45, 84, 114, 122-3, 153, 177, etc.). Sometimes the church bells are to be rung (pp. 27, 95, 114, 169, 176-7, etc.). Twice deacons are to ring (pp. 27, 169). In some cases the bell-man, 'goyng in the town as is accostomyd', is to summon the worshippers, thus 'doyng his duete' (pp. 27, 169, 176). Sometimes food is to be provided for those who come, e.g. 'bred and drynke' to the value of 2s., which the visiting priests are to have 'with the parishe prest . . . within the churche' (p. 26); 'white breed or kakes' and 'ayle' (p. 29); bread, ale and 'chese' (p. 153). In some cases the services are to be performed *cum nota*, *i.e.* sung to music (see NOTE). Frequently torches, tapers and other lights are to be provided (see TORCH; also INDEX of SUBJECTS, s.v. Wax).

Some of the owners of these bowls seem to have had a particular affection for them since they gave them names—' Nutte' (p. 6), 'Nut' (p. 16), 'Boll' (p. 16). In the ordinances of St. Michael's gild, Lincoln, mention is made of four of the goblets (ciphos)which are called *fullas* having been filled with ale. Perhaps '*fulla*'= 'olla, and means a flagon. In the ordinances of a Grantham gild there are '*tres ciphos vocatos masers*', which are valued at 40s. These instances suggest vessels of a considerable size (Toulmin Smith, *English Gilds*, pp. 173n, 174n). 5-6, 15-17, 21, 50, 55

When we are handfasted, as we term it, we are man and wife for a year and a daythat space gone by, each may choose another mate, or, at their pleasure, may call the priest to marry them for life--and this we call handfasting'. Brand (*Popular Antiquities*, ed. 1841, ii, pp. 54-5) sees a Danish origin in the custom, and says that strong traces of it remain in the villages in many parts of the kingdom, instancing Portland Island, where 'the young women, selecting lovers of the same place (but with what previous Rites, Ceremonies, or Engagements, I could never learn), account it no disgrace to allow them every favour, and that too from the fullest confidence of being made wives the moment such consequences of their stolen embraces begin to be too visible to be any longer concealed '. The offering was often brought with the corpse and presented at the church door, which practice seems to have led to the name of CORSE-PRESENT or CORPSE-PRESENT being given to it—' my corsepresent to be gyffyn of my best goodes as use and custome requiryth' (Will of Thomas Cowde, 1529, Lincoln Consistory Court, Book 1520-31, f. 259). Selden (History of Tythes, 287, c. 10) says that a mortuary is an offering to the church as a satisfaction for the supposed negligence and omissions that the defunct had been guilty of in not paying his personal tithes; but in the present volume there are very many instances of bequests to the testator's church or its high altar (passim) or to the sacrament (p. 126) for tithes and oblations forgotten in addition to the provision for the payment of a mortuary. In one case only (p. 119) does a testator bequeath his 'best beyst' for his mortuary and 'forgoten tythes.' Passim

Hence, the name was applied to chapels and altars in England, and to the masses said there, to which the same indulgence was attached (see N.E.D.). Among the privileges granted in 1510 by Pope Julius 11 to the members of the gild of our Lady in St. Botolph's church, Boston, were the following-that whosoever should come every Friday to the chapel of our Lady in St. Botolph's church, should have as much remission of sins as if he went to the chapel of our Lady of Scala Caeli; and that whosoever should say or cause to be said in the same chapel at Boston masses for souls departed in the pains of purgatory should have the full remission due to those who visited the chapel of *Scala Caeli* and also obtain full remission for the souls in purgatory (Fox, Acts and Monuments, ed. 1684, ii, p. 420; Thompson, The History and Antiquities of Boston, pp. 136-8).

The present volume contains several bequests for masses at Scala Caelipage 95, where the place of performance is not specified ; page 165, 'att boston or oder place'; pages 106, 142, presumably at Lincoln; page 100, probably at Grimsby; page 116, 'in our ladyes quere in Spillesby . . . if it may be componed for the offering to our ladies gild in Boston', *i.e.* if a composition can be made [by a suitable payment] with the gild for the loss which it would suffer through the saying of the masses elsewhere than in Boston. Other wills in the Lincoln Consistory Court mention masses at Scala Caeli ' in our lady chapell in boston' (Book 1520-31, f. 209d.), at Boston (ibid., ff. 157, 157d.); and at either

SERGES, q.v., and tapers, on the other hand, seem to have been nearly always made of wax. The torches were sometimes of enormous size, as also were the tapers— 'xx torches of the length of xij feet by the ell' (p. 12); 'vij torches and iiij tapurs of vij lib' weight of wexe' (p. 27); 'two tapers of xx pounds weight of wax shall then be burnt about my body' (p. 12). 12, 27, 106

A complete vestment with all its equipment (pp. 14-15) also included one or more copes, and sometimes hangings for the altar, etc. bequeath . . . the complete suit of my vestment of red cloth-of-gold, namely, nine copes, a chasuble, tunicles or dalmatics, a frontal and sub-frontal with the curtains belonging to the same, and a cloth for the lectern, with albs, amices, stoles, and maniples to the same belonging' (*Testamenta Eboracensia*, part i, p. 399, Surtees Society). WIMPLE. A covering for the neck, chin and sides of the face, formerly worn by women out of doors, and still retained by women of some religious orders. 3 WIRTEN. Written. 74

It is probable that 'witt' was originally a perverted form of 'quethe' (obsolete, except in the past tense 'quoth')=to speak, say, declare, bequeath ; but it seems to have become established, at least in Yorkshire and Lincolnshire, as a separate word. Or it may have descended by a process of shortening and corruption from 'bequeath', which appears in old wills under many different forms—'bequeth', 'bequete', 'bewete', 'bewhete', 'bewithe', 'bewite', 'bewit', 'bequit'. The transition from 'bequeath' to 'witt' would not be difficult. First the two syllables of 'bequeath' would be written as separate words, and then the first would disappear. Thus we have 'beqwyet', 'be witt', 'be wytt' (p. 32), 'be queth' (p. 62), 'be witted' (p. 30), 'witt', 'wytt' (p. 32). Numerous instances of 'witt', etc., occur in *Testamenta Eboracensia*—'wit', 'wite', 'witt', 'wyt', 'wyttis'=' bequeath' (part iii, pp. 223, 239; part iv, pp. 13, 24, 41, etc.); 'bewit'=' bequeath' (part iv, p. 30); cp.
