HAWORTH was a mighty good end when he got a chance to play. He was especially adept at pass-receiving.

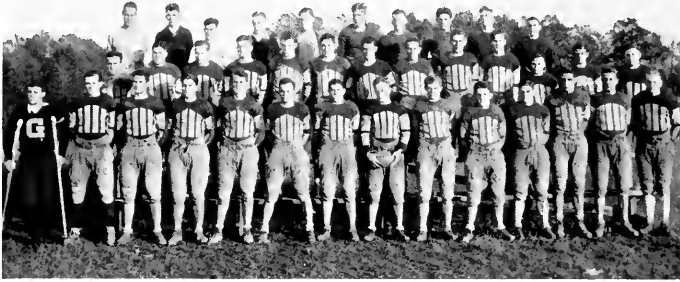
COBB was a star at fullback in several games during the year. He was a bear on defense and he picked his holes and went through on offense.

Football Squad

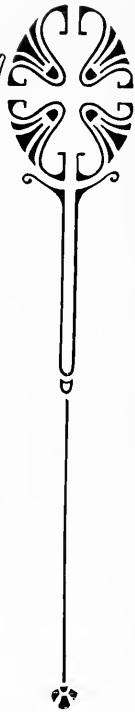

The Football Season

The Quakers faced one of the toughest football schedules ever played by a local eleven this year but from this list of tough opponents they were able to secure an even break in games won and lost.

The opening game with Emory and Henry was the first college football for several of the Guilford players and this crack bunch of Virginia veterans scored a 27-0 victory.

William and Mary came next on the schedule and this team also added a victory for the Old Dominion by the count of 24-0.

The following Saturday the Quakers invaded the den of the highly rooted Deacons and held the near-conquerors of Carolina to a 20-0 score.

The next encounter was with another Virginia eleven and this time the locals managed to secure an even break with Randolph-Macon as both teams failed to score.

The Naval Apprentice School, still another Virginia institution, proved the first victim. The initial Quaker victory was won, 14-6, in a night game at Newport News.

And then came the massacre. Guilford met Atlantic Christian College in their first Conference game at the Memorial Stadium and handed the Little Christians an awful drubbing, 69-0.

The following week-end Elon rallied in the last half to beat the local eleven in a game which resembled the one between the two schools last year, the fortunes being reversed on this occasion to the tune of 12-9.

To win back the confidence of her followers, however, Guilford beat the Lenoir Rhyne team 25-0 at Hickory in another night game.

The glory of this victory was short lived, however, as the Catawba Indians, under the direction of Charlie Moran, beat the Quakers in a mud battle at the stadium, 18-0.

To regain the confidence of her backers once more, the Quakers topped off the season with a brilliant victory over Lynchburg College, of Virginia, here on Hobb's Field, 39-0.

Two interesting things were true in connection with the season. In the first place, six of the games were played at night, the first that Guilford had ever played after dark, and secondly, five of the teams on the schedule are Virginia institutions.

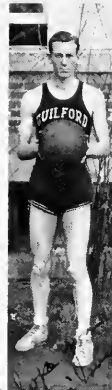
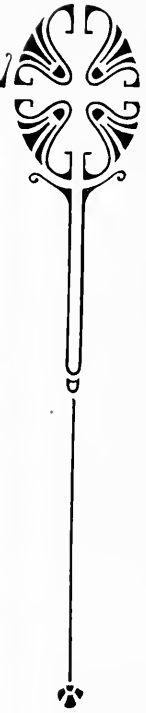

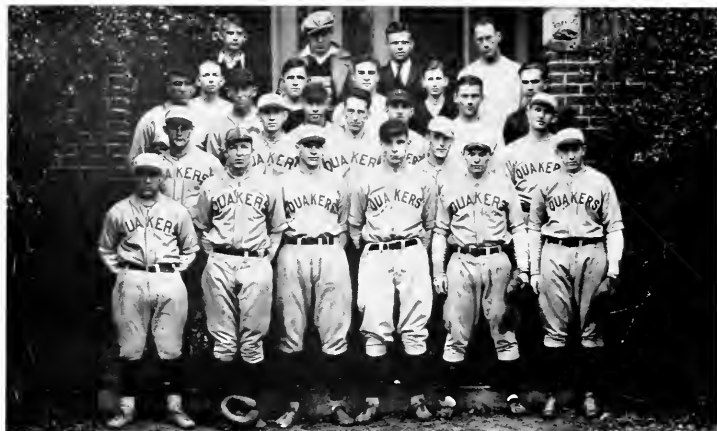

The Quaker nine of the past season did not come up to advance notices and in most ways the season was one of doubtful success.

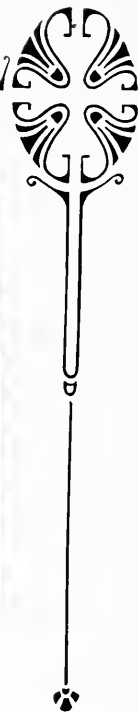
The seven lettermen in camp sounded like more strength than they ever exhibited and the additions to the team during the season proved better fielders than hitters.

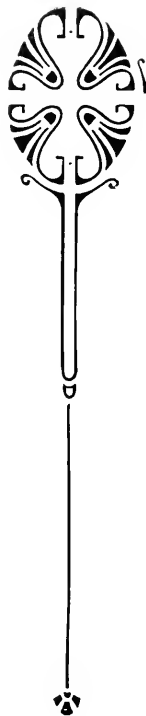

Men's Athletics

Although a successful athletic team is much to be cherished, it is the primary object of the Guilford physical education program to give every boy a chance to develop physically as well as mentally during his stay here.

The maintenance of five inter-collegiate athletic squads offers ample opportunity for every boy to find some sport for which he is fitted. The football squad maintains an average of around forty men during the season; fifteen men usually remain out for basketball; baseball attracts a squad of thirty men; track a similar number; and tennis takes up the time of a dozen or more.

For those who do not wish to make a bid for a varsity team there are regularly supervised inter-class games which provide plenty of exciting competition.

Naturally, there are some boys who make outstanding records as athletes. There are four three-letter men in school, Chisholm, Check, Jamieson, and Haworth. Several of the boys develop to the extent that they gain outside recognition as in the case of Jackson and Check in football when they were selected on all-Conference teams, Haworth, selected on the all-Conference basketball team, and Zachary, who has become one of the most talked of college baseball players in the state.

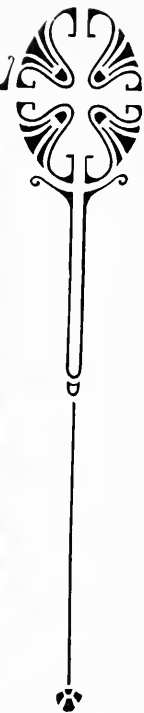
There has been a conscious effort made here to avoid over-emphasis on athletics and the prominent place which Guilford has gained among the small colleges of the state has come from willing, co-operative work, from a group of boys who have had as their primary objective a college education.

Under the financial direction of Professor Carlyle Shepard the athletic association is gradually freeing itself from debt and at the same time is building up the physical equipment of the athletic teams.

Coach Anderson, in his second year at Guilford, has been successful with his teams, the football season being somewhat over-shadowed by the brilliant work of the basketball players the latter part of the season.

Coach Anderson is also at the head of the efforts to create an interest among the whole student body in athletics and he has two experienced helpers to aid with the non-varsity work.

In addition, Professor Pancoast and Professor Furnas help the players with their tennis game, while Professor Shepard spends a great deal of his spare time in organizing and working with the track squad.

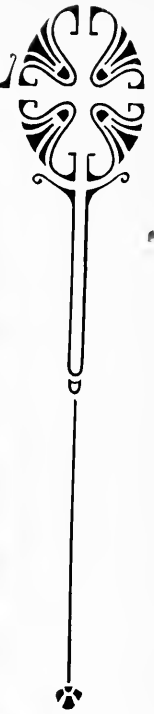

Women's Athletics

The athletics of the Quaker maidens begin with the opening of school and continue, three times a week, throughout the year. Physical education is a required course, but a variety of sports are offered to hold the interest of the groups. The Women's Athletic Association, composed of students and advised by Mrs. B. M. B. Andrews, arranges interclass games and tournaments which replace the usual intercollegiate sports.

The wide open spaces attract in the early autumn, and most of the work is done on the athletic field. Hockey has been a major sport for several years and soccer was recently introduced for the upper classmen. Volley ball, in the gymnasium, is scheduled regularly, and intensive work shapes new material and polishes up the old, producing four crack teams which offer keen competition. Feature games, in which the faculty or a squad of Quaker males indulge, offer some diversity in this department.

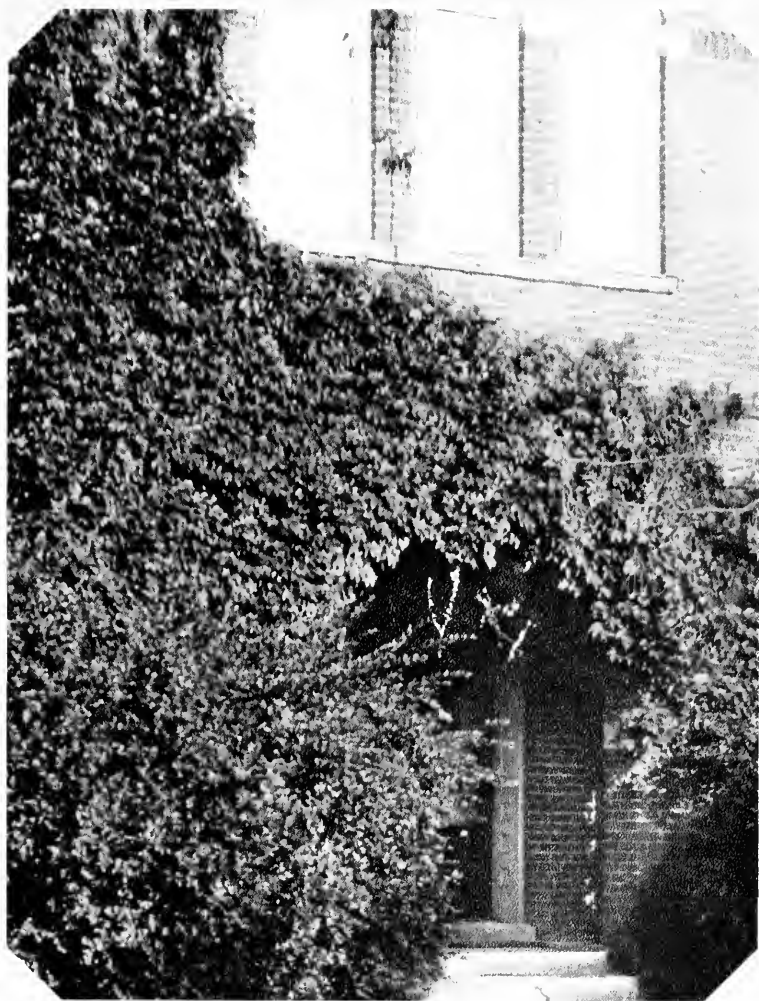
Paddle tennis—indoor tennis “gone miniature”—is another addition to this year's curriculum. Small courts are marked off in the gym, and regular tennis rules are followed in the miniature style. Doubles or singles might be played and interest in gym classes, during the period devoted to paddle tennis, took a noticeable leap.

Routine gymnastic work is developed during the late winter and early spring. Stunts, drill work, aesthetic and folk dancing are the regular parts of the curriculum. The stunts include apparatus work and novelty exercises, while the drilling is mainly for the development of muscle co-ordination. The annual gym meet features this type of work, including marching and class group stunts.

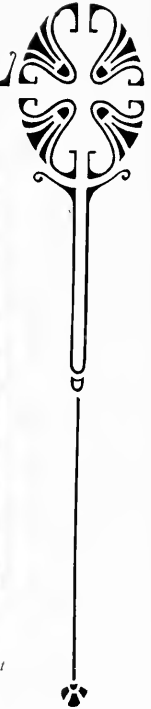
The May festival follows closely on the gym exhibition, and the dancers attempt to carry out the idea of the awakening of Spring. The festival presents a charming scene staged against the naturally beautiful background of the campus. To this gala occasion, the public is invited.

Baseball concludes the scheduled work, but the Athletic Board has worked out a point system for the opportunity of additional physical development and honor awards, numerals, stars, monograms, and loving cups are given for points. Among some of the sports in which one can earn extra points are biking, health habits, tennis, basketball, and archery.

Through conscientious endeavor the Physical Education Department has made broad advancements of which the college may well be proud.

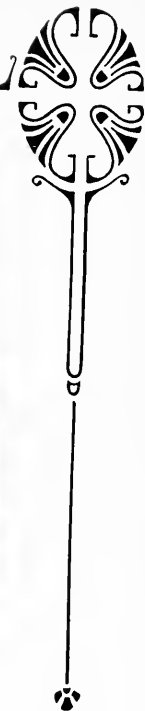

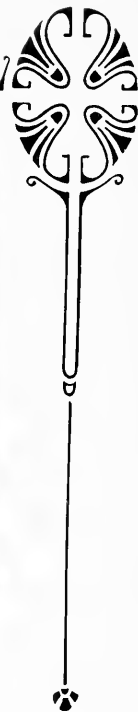

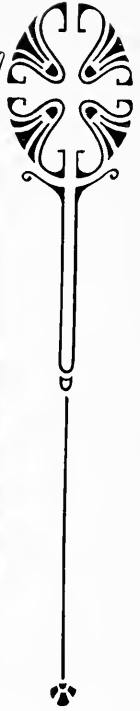

With Miss Wilbur looking after this work Professor Noah was free to devote more time to the development of his organizations and to teach voice.

Two of the students, Georgia Fulk, pianist, and Glenn Robertson, vocalist, plan to give graduating recitals in the spring. Both have been very prominent in all musical organizations since they came to Guilford.

With Horace Brown, student violinist, acting as director, a modest beginning has been made toward the development of a college orchestra. This work has been handicapped by lack of material but it is hoped that through this, a new type of music student may be appealed to.

The work of the Community Choral society in the fall showed marked improvement over that of preceding years and the annual Messiah concert presented at Christmas time was acclaimed the best ever offered here.

It is, however, the work of the A Capella choir that has won the greatest recognition. A greater student interest has been shown in this organization dur-

The loss of Nettie Rayle as brilliant soprano soloist this year is far from a death-dealing blow as Jewell Conrad, her promising successor, possesses the native ability to do quite as well with this work.

By far the most cheering thing which has happened in connection with the group this year was the visit of Dr. John Finlay Williamson, director of the famous Westminster Choir. He directed the choir through three of their numbers and was enthusiastic in his praise of the work that is being done at Guilford. He congratulated the members upon the degree of perfection which has been achieved and pointed out to them their splendid opportunity to popularize music of this nature in the South.

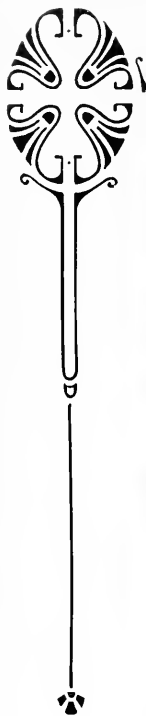


Debating

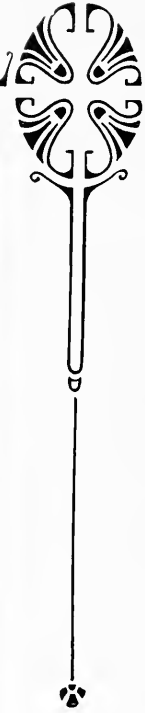
Guilford will enter the field of verbal combat in the annual triangular debate with High Point and Lenoir Rhyne, a dual with Elon, and a single with Appalachian.
