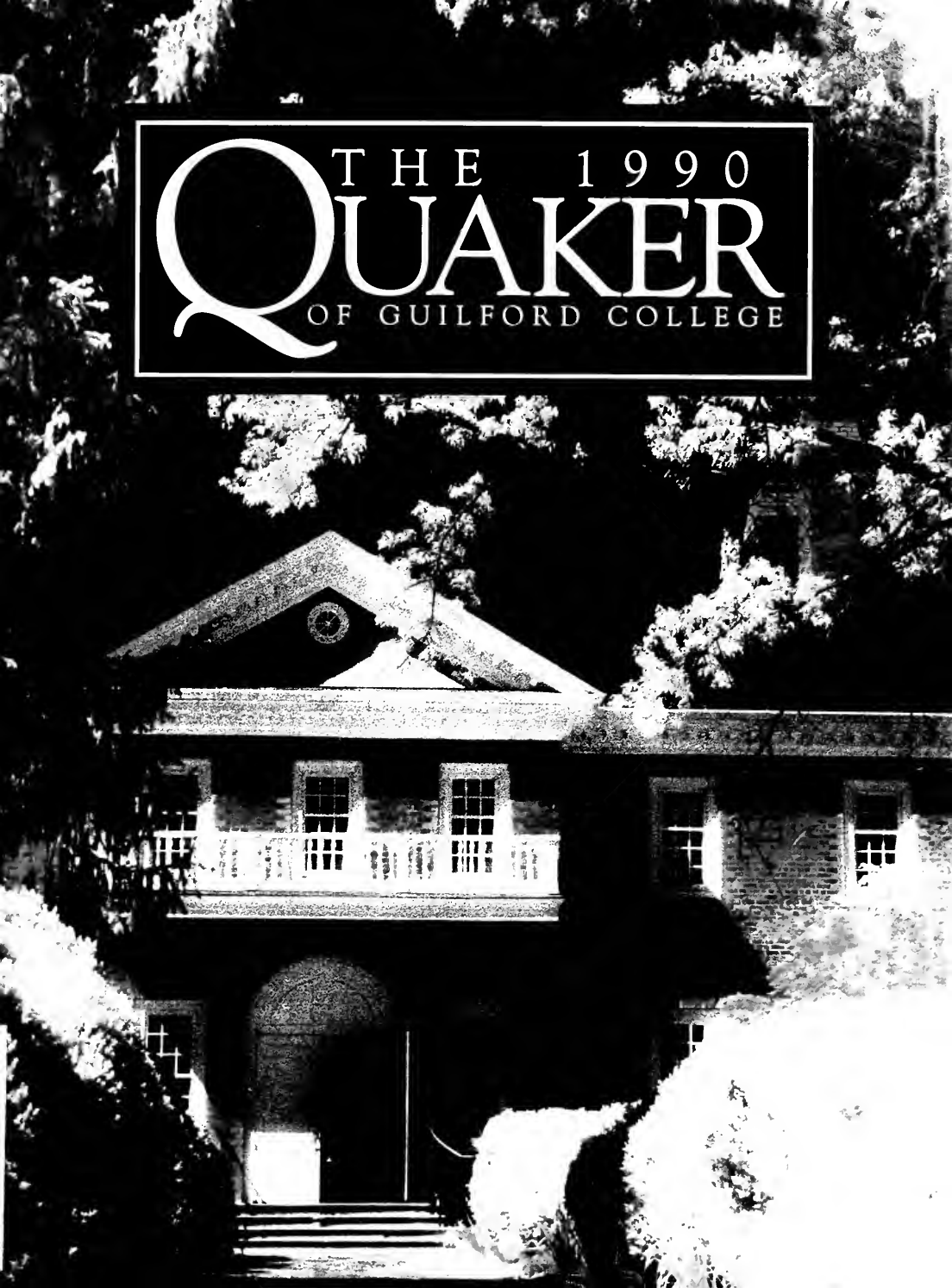

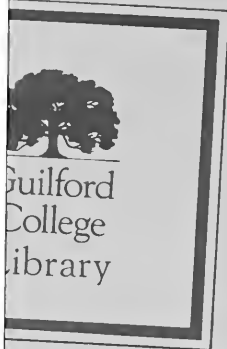

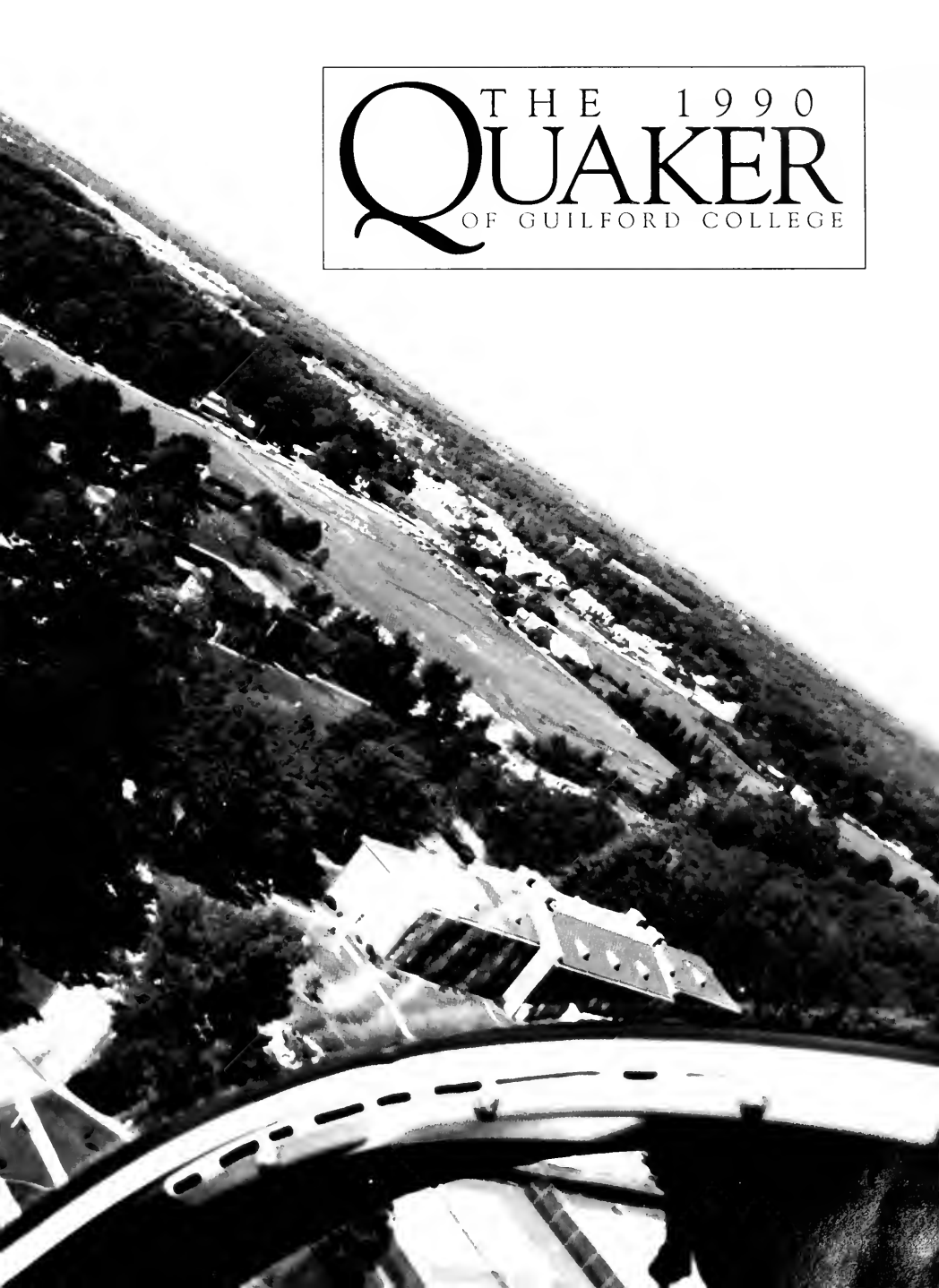

When September 1989 rolled around and all of the Guilford students from all over the world returned in full force, two great questions arose in the minds of about twenty people gathered on the second floor of Founders Hall late one Sunday night: What is Guilford College, and *how do you do a yearbook?* Those have been—and probably will remain—unanswered questions. We spent a great deal of time trying to conceive of a way to encapsulate the very essence of life at this college over a period of nine months.

We decided that the 1989-90 school year should be portrayed as a living thing—a chronicle of the events and people of Guilford as they occur throughout the Fall, Winter, and Spring. All too often we found ourselves immersed in this spontaneous energy that we were trying to record, the very fabric of memory. It was our challenge to try and get this energy down on film and paper—to trap it between the cover of a bound volume and preserve it for a lifetime. The product of our year-long endeavor is a volume that could be called *radical* in the world of yearbook journalism. We have ignored the standard yearbook formats involving trite themes that can easily be tagged-on to the events that make up a year. We felt that such an approach was much too simple—dividing the book into sections that cataloged the people and organizations like an encyclopedia. Our year here em-

bodied more than such an easy angle on friendship, learning, and living. What we sought to capture was the essence of our good times, as well as our less than good times.

Seeking new insights into our friends, our faculty, and ourselves required a frame of mind in which we not only recorded events but developed instantaneous retrospection. We learned to see not only the people we knew, but also the people we didn't. Time became precious as we roamed around with cameras, observing all and living in the here and now, yet knowing that what was seen and photographed would not happen again.

How can one sift through the mounds of photographs and the multitudes of ideas of all that remains special about one's school? It is not impossible. It is not boring. It is enlightening and beautiful to say the very least. We tried to capture the essence of all that is Guilford: to walk through campus on a winter morning—the sky a crystalline azure deeper than can ever be remembered, the air so cold and crisp that it was a rush just to breath it; to feel like a part of the trees as the wind brushed them, wanting to feel that way for the rest of our lives; to walk to Founders Hall after the Christmas Concert and see the luminaries in the night-time haze, anonymous figures passing between them on the walk, enjoying with everyone the ethereal Christmas atmosphere that this creates for the campus; to be





down at the lake on late Saturday afternoons when the sun is setting, watching the light set the trees ablaze across the water— feeling a warmth in knowing that when you return you will be among friends; to feel the kinship of people we always knew we would one-day meet, and accompany them down their paths of personal discovery and awareness— finding not only them, but ourselves; to savor the moment that a professor helped us discover and recognize beauty in previously unknown areas— finding new media and tools for personal expression of every feeling imaginable; to discover a sense of heritage within ourselves, a new bond with our parents who made us the people we are— learning to seek the good within all people and helping others to find good within themselves, making friends as close as sisters, brothers, mothers, and fathers— friends who will be within our hearts and memories for a lifetime— never once leaving us alone; to understand this magnificent thing called life and learning how to make it truly exceptional, gaining an awareness of the world that we all want to see, and understanding not only our place within it but our personal commission to change it for the better; to learn to recognize the needs of society and the less fortunate; to prepare for a future which we all learn not to fear, but to embrace, being guided by confidence in ourselves and each other; to recognize our mortality, and breath every breath and live every day with fervor, awareness, and conscience.

Our publication is not just a book. The 1990 *Quarter* is a living thing. It hopes to capture the brief combination of 1200 lives into a common union called Guilford College. In this sense, it is by no means complete. This book is a celebration of life at Guilford, and life everywhere else where people can come together as a caring whole. We did not create this book—we let the book reveal itself to us as the year unfolded. This happy group of twenty people who gathered together at the the beginning of the year have expressed a common appreciation for all that makes this campus unique. We each had a common vision and learned to seek its articulation together. We feel we are better people and better students, better friends and human beings as a result. So much more than a book indeed...a feeling...an attempt at embracing the quintessence of life.

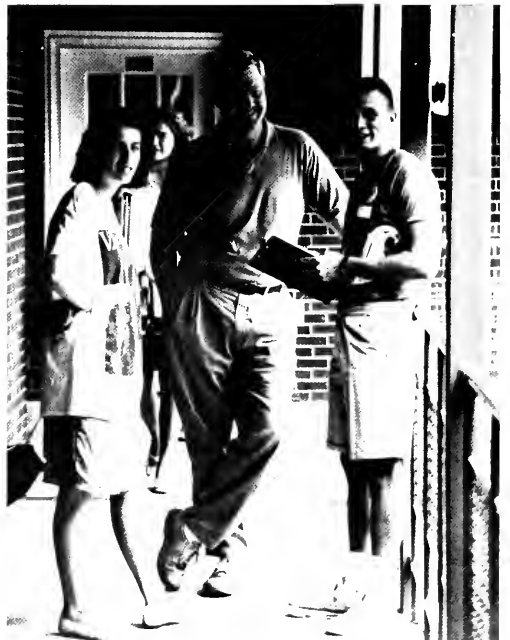

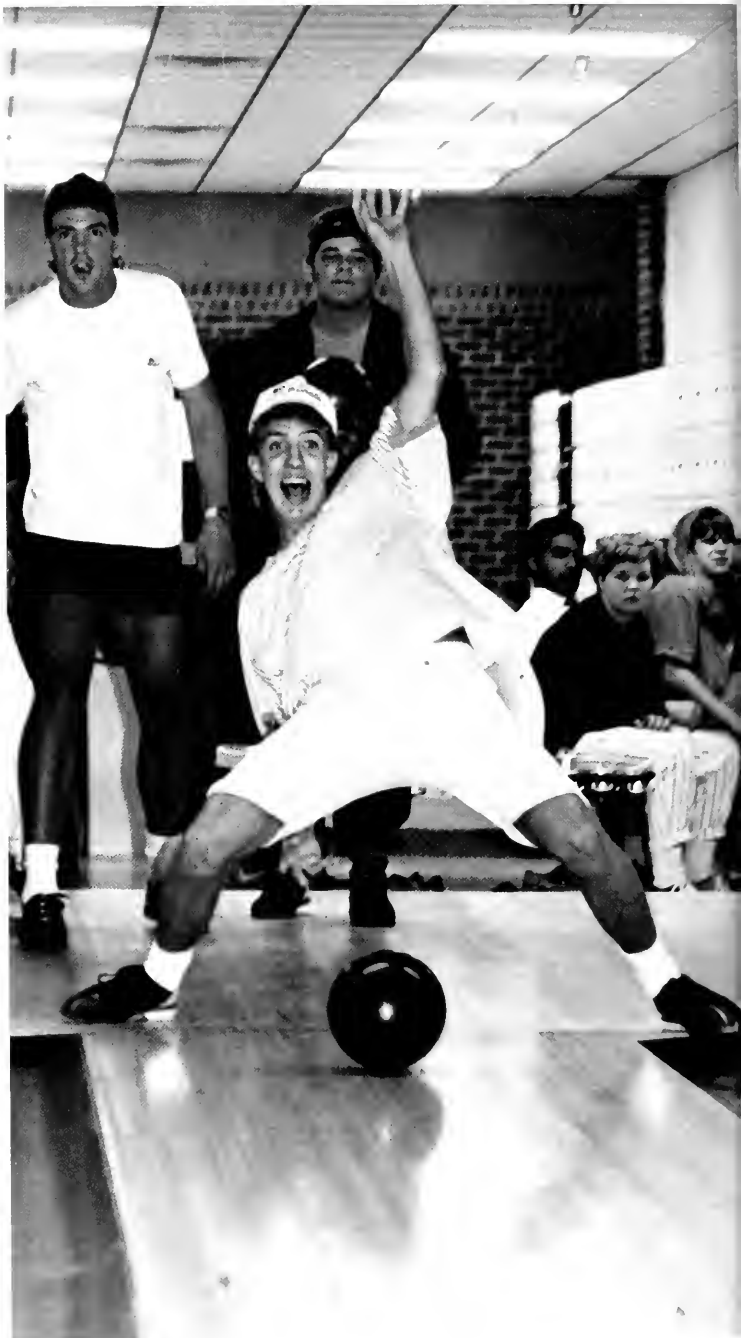

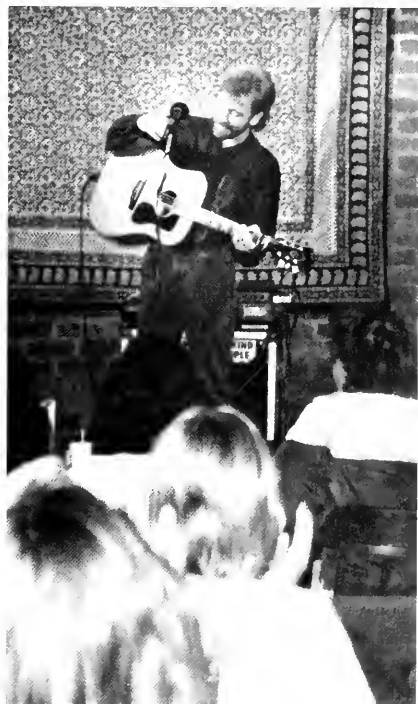

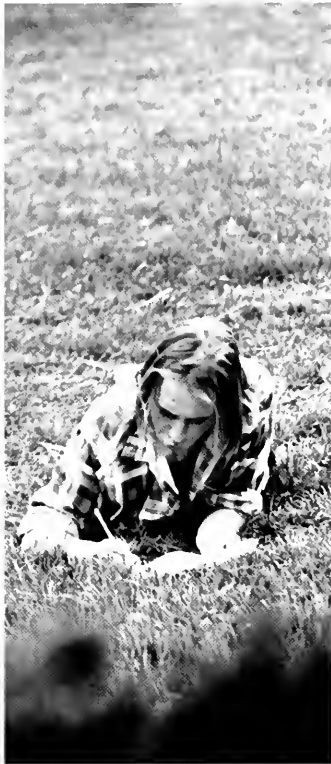

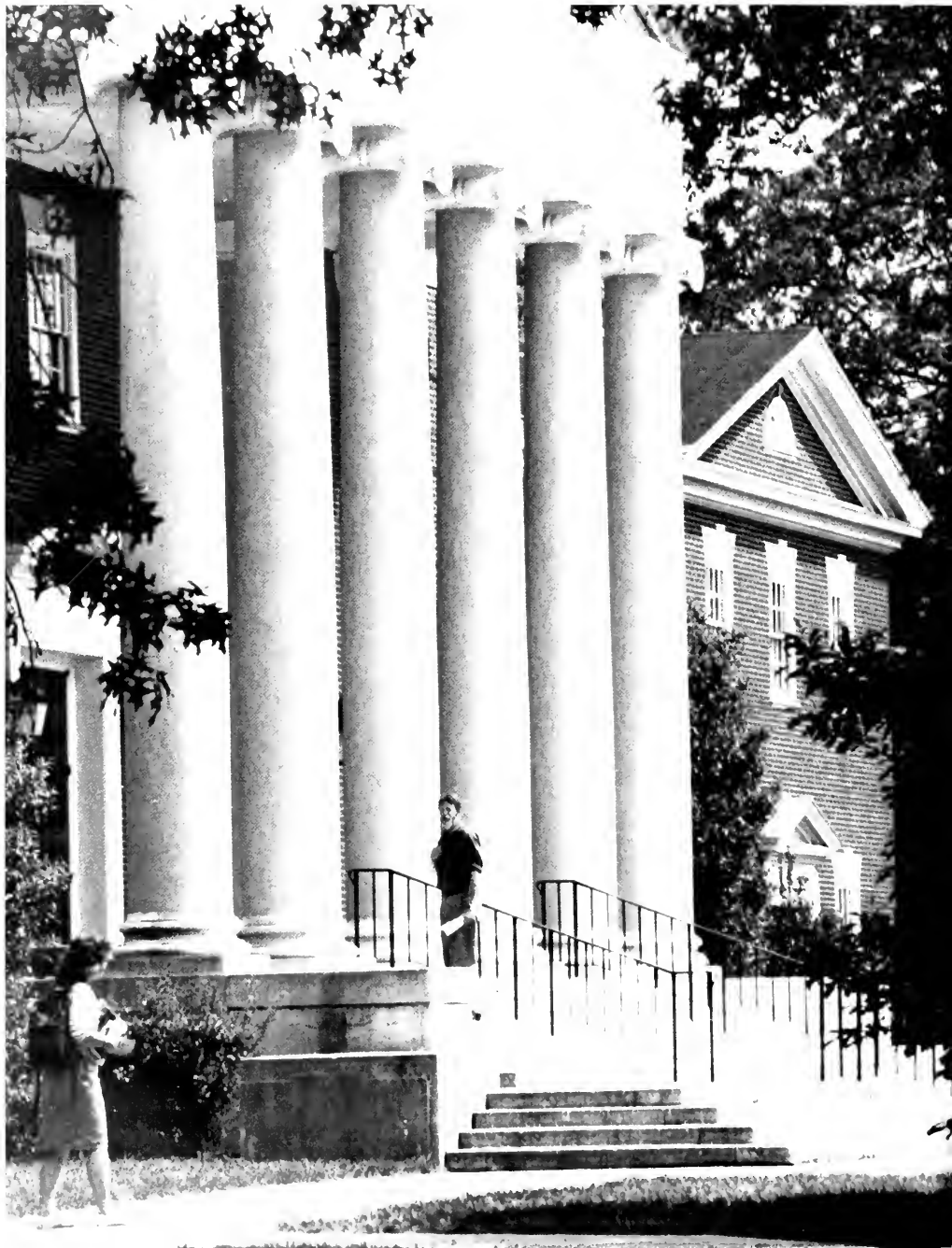

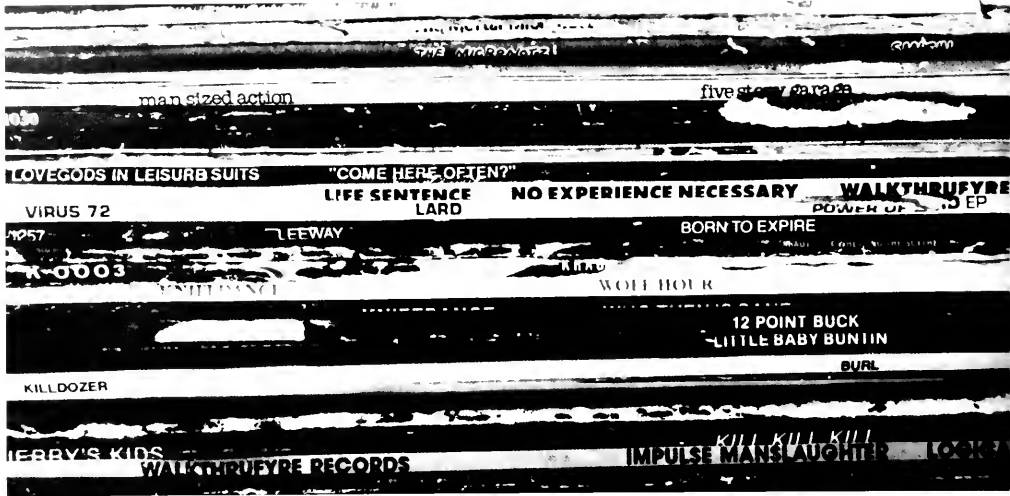

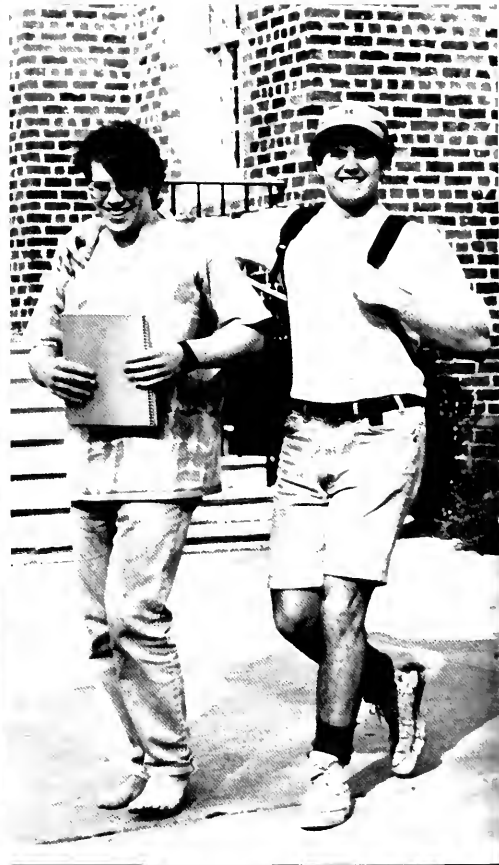

On May 5, 1990, one of the most brilliant sunsets in our memory could be seen from the Guilford campus, it was a fitting way to conclude the lives as well as one of the great times of our lives.

I looked all around me, and found myself a participant in something that wasn't supposed to be happening. Something that I knew was eminent. Something that in the back of my mind I fantasized about preventing by intentionally failing Accounting 201. Yet, here I was under the sweltering roof of the Ragan-Brown Field House in the middle of all the M's, surrounded by herds of relatives and friends. I could look in front of me and just start to make out what pols were near me, but it was difficult to distinguish faces underneath the virtual sea of caps and gowns. It was then that I discovered my close friends weren't necessarily in alphabetical proximity to me. No one around to pass notes to and try to crack-up in the middle of the ceremonies. Even so, I doubt I could have caught their attention—I wasn't the only senior who appeared dazed. I could feel the cold metal of the spray can of Silly String in my pocket, but dashed my temptation to cut loose early. I hated this. Just when I needed a distraction most, I was alone.

Sitting there among the M's was a kid who experienced a lot in four years and desperately didn't want to leave it behind. As much as I hate to admit it, I can look back now on graduation and see that I was trying to cheat myself, purposefully blocking out the greater significance of what was happening on that Saturday. I guess I didn't want to deal with the questions that kept popping up inside about what I had learned, and what exactly the last four years of my life were supposed to mean. I was one of about three hundred people who would walk out the doors of a very comfortable environment on May 5, 1990 to confront the reality that college *do's* end, and as older sisters and brothers who had been there before reminded us almost gleefully: "Camp's over, kid".

So, I sat there on my wooden lawn chair among the M's, thinking about spending the rest of the day opening graduation gifts and having a terrific lunch in my honor, as most every graduating senior would enjoy; knowing that I could deal with the heavy aspects of leaving my second home and friends at some other time. As engaged as I thought I should have been with what was going on around me, I started to daydream midway through my commencement from Guilford College. It was almost the same as

when you hear that a dying man sees his life pass before his eyes, only I knew that I would probably, in all likelihood, survive the heat of the acetate regalia I was wearing. I went off into lala land right there, right then, back to my arrival as a freshman...

...I remembered silence. We were in the car together for what would be the last time in the then-current chapter of our lives, and I had a lot of trouble bringing forth a single word during the trip. It was just Mom, Dad, and their last child to enter college—me, with nothing to my name but a car full of my worldly possessions and a bad attitude. I was driving, for lack of interest in reading any more of Guilford's "welcome freshmen" propaganda in the back seat. I decided to leave it to Mom. She liked that kind of stuff. I was going to make damn sure that those people at Guilford didn't inoculate me with notions that I could ever have fun with people from anywhere other than my high school, which during this transitional period had become a Mecca-like symbol for me—a temple of salvation that I wouldn't be able to return to until Homecoming '86. And regardless of what anyone said, I was not going to make a home in Greensboro, or much less this itty-bitty little Quaker school that I couldn't really remember why I wanted to attend. I had made up my mind. And *that*, by God, was *that*. Arrival: 3:46pm at Founders Hall. Registration was over at 1:00pm. I was very late, and couldn't have begun to care. A finger reached out from the info desk in Founders lobby, pointing to the rear of the campus, and the utterance of a single, yet notorious word:

"Molner," the desk worker said "is that way."

I expected her to start saying something like *God be with you* after that, but it never came. Instead, Mom, Dad, and I made our way to this mysterious barn nestled watchtully between Founders, the athletic offices, the President's House, and the Ground-keeper's hut...

And now...the whole process was about to happen again. I would once more pack everything I owned into cardboard luggage and become a nomad with an A.B.

What does it all mean? Should we even bother with the

answer? I think asking something like this is akin to the proverbial *What's the meaning of life?* Who knows. I have always liked to think that one of the greatest things Guilford allowed me to discover was a need for true meaning at a time of passage. Maybe the simple fact that I recognized what questions I should be asking was enough to clue me in to the answer.

I started to think about a Confucianism course I had as a junior that introduced me to the concept of *Li*, which basically states that we should affirm through words and actions the special moments of significance in our lives. I am not a religion major, but I had no trouble realizing the importance of this idea: recognizing the importance and significance of certain moments is what invests our lives with meaning.

I knew all that was happening with graduation would fall together at some point, and what I had learned and how I had changed would become evident. I felt that maybe the best thing I could do at the given time was to shelve the questions and just invest the moment with words and actions, confirming it with true significance—although how could I really sit back and absorb all the meaning of graduation? I was zoned—as were many classmates (partially because of the ceremony, partially because of the farewell parties the night before).

It took something close to blind faith for us to arrive here that morning in late August with the family car packed to the point of eruption. It took more than trust to give up our high school friends and home environment—it took courage and self-confidence, to the extent that inserting ourselves in a new world tested our capacities to deal with the awkward moments in new relationships. But basically, we knew that things would work out, as they always had, for the better.

Guilford has presented the the dualities of life to us in our courses. We can't experience beauty without learning to recognize ugliness, joy without recognizing sorrow, or pleasure without recognizing pain. We were exposed to images of the Holocaust and the violence in South America when we arrived as freshmen. We learned how close we stand to the brink of world

destruction. We were forced to confront some harsh issues head-on—kind of a post-induction shock therapy. Guilford inspired a concept of life as a very delicate thing that can only be felt, much the same way that the arts, or athletics, or science puts one in touch, only for a moment, with purity and beauty. The first months here at Guilford were, needless to say, intense. We came to Guilford expecting to find this cinematic "college experience" that we were exposed to since we old enough to go in movie theaters without being in a stroller. Instead, we found that had we taken the *Animal House* route, we would have missed out on a soulful experience that was rich with humanity. We spent the next four years looking at the world, and ourselves, from a variety of different angles. We learned and grew together in areas we won't realize until many years from now.

So in the end, after I finally awakened from daydreams and confusion, I walked across the stage, shook Bill Roger's hand and accepted my diploma. Then I looked out to my left and glanced at my family, thinking to myself how much Mom and Dad were going to hate it when I cut loose with the can of Silly String. I had a terrific lunch. I opened my gifts. I returned later in the day to my room in Bryan to pack all of my things. It was then that the promise of rain that drove the ceremony into the gym came to fruition. There was a severe thunderstorm raging overhead while I was in the room. When I emerged with my bulging trash bags, plastic milk crates, and cardboard boxes, the storm had blown over. All that remained of May 5, 1990 was one of the most incredible sunsets I have ever seen—literally bursting at the horizon—it was almost unbelievable.

I dropped everything at that point and spent some time alone, just sitting on the back steps of Bryan, watching the sunbeams paint the azure sky with the reassurances and hope that bless any new birth.
