











# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE QUEST CLUB OF FORT WAYNE, INDIANA

### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I.

#### Name and Object

Section 1. This Club shall be known as Quest Club,

located in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Section 2. The object of this Club shall be the study and discussion of the application of the scientific principles of salesmanship, advertising, sales-management and business management in its various forms; to study the economy of improved methods of business management; to develop a closer relationship amongst its members and to promote harmony and co-operation in improving the efficiency of each one in his line of business endeavor. And to that end it shall be the intent and purpose of this Club to avoid taking part in the discussion of political issues or questions of a partisan character.

### ARTICLE II.

### Membership

Section 1. The membership of this Club shall consist only of active members and membership shall not be transferable.

### ARTICLE III.

#### Government

Section 1. The government of this Club shall be vested in a Board of Governors consisting of fifteen members to be elected for a term of two years at the annual meeting of the Club. It shall be the practice to elect eight and seven governors at each election in alternate years. The term of office of each governor shall begin immediately upon his election and continue until his successor is elected and qualified.

Section 2. The Board of Governors shall have the power to fill vacancies occurring on said Board during any year, with the provision, however, that a person so elected as a governor shall be elected only to hold office until the next

regular election of governors.

Section 3. The Board of Governors shall mect within ten days after adjournment of the annual meeting of the Club, at which time they shall elect from their own members a president, vice-president, a treasurer and the chairman of each of the standing committees. They shall also elect

from the membership of the Club a secretary. These various officers shall be elected for a term of one year or until their successors are elected and qualified.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Meetings

Section 1. The regular meetings of this Club shall be held as often as and at such time and place as may be specified in the By-Laws.

### ARTICLE V.

#### Amendments

Section 1. The constitution of this Club may be amended at any regular meeting of the Club by a vote of two-thirds of all of the votes cast. Proposed amendments shall be furnished to the Secretary, signed by at least six members and mailed to each member at least one week before action is taken.

#### BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I.

Membership

Section 1. Suggestions of names of desirable prospective

of Governors by any membership may be presented to the Board of Governors by any member of the Club. This Board shall first pass upon the qualifications of such proposed candidates and, if considered favorably, the membership committee shall invite such person to become a member. Two negative votes, however, shall reject. The membership fee shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) and shall be paid to the Secretary of the Club by any applicant for membership before he may be declared a member by the Board of Governors. When such declaration shall have been made, the Secretary shall enter upon the roster of membership the name of the applicant as a member of the Quest Club.

Section 2. Any member who shall be guilty of misconduct thay may compromise his Club associates or bring disgrace upon the Club, or injure its reputation, or frustrate its purpose, or who shall violate its constitution and established rules, may be suspended or expelled by a vote of the majority of the members of the Board of Governors, but not until he shall have been given due notice of the Board's intention to consider the question of his expulsion or suspension. Such notice shall include an invitation to be heard in

his own defense. And if he desires it, he shall be given an

opportunity for such hearing.

Section 3. The resignation of a member shall be made in writing to the Board of Governors, but no resignation shall be accepted unless the member presenting it has paid all current dues to the Club.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### **Duties of Officers**

Section 1. President: It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Club and of the Board of Governors; to enforce these By-Laws; to cast the deciding vote in case of a tie; to call special meetings of the Club or of the Board of Governors, and to perform such other dutes as pertain to his office.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside at any meeting of the Club or of the Board of Governors; and shall be vested with all the powers of the President when the latter is absent or incapacitated.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep an accurate account of the proceedings of all meetings of the Club; to countersign all contracts and documents entered into by the Club; collect all funds due the Club and remit them to the Treasurer; to draw disbursement orders on the Treasurer as directed by the Board of Governors; see that the Club receives suitable publicity in the local press and in any other way that is in accordance with the tone and objects of the Club; and to perform such other duties as usually and regularly devolve upon the office of Secretary.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to deposit in a national bank or trust company all the funds of the Club received for its uses and disburse them only on orders drawn by the Secretary; he shall make an annual report of the financial condition of the Club; or oftener at the request

of the Board of Governors, or of the President.

Section 5. The Board of Governors shall have general charge of the affairs, funds and property of the Club.

Section 6. The Secretary and Treasurer shall each be required to furnish a Surety Company's bond in such amount as ordered by the Board of Governors, the premiums to be paid by the Club.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Committees

Section 1. The standing committees of the Club shall be the "Committee on Program for Luncheon Meetings," the "Committee on Program for Evening Meetings," and the "Membership Committee," the "House Committee," the "Library Committee," and the "City Interest Committee."

Section 2. The Board of Governors shall elect the chairman of each standing committee. The President of the Club shall, with the advice of the Chairman, appoint two

other members of each committee.

Section 3. The Committee on Program for Luncheon meetings shall have charge of all arrangements of programs for club meetings and shall determine the topics to be discussed, assign them to speakers and, as far as possible provide for an intelligent discussion of the subjects presented.

Section 4. The Committee on Program for Evening Meetings shall have charge of all arrangements for programs for such meetings and shall determine the topics to be discussed, secure speakers of note, see that they arrive at the meetings at the proper time, and as far as possible provide for an intelligent discussion of the subjects presented.

Section 5. The Membership Committee shall investigate the character of all proposed candidates for membership, pass upon their desirability as members, and in accordance with their findings, make suitable recommendations to the

Board of Governors.

Section 6. Subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, the Library Committee shall have charge of the selection, purchase and installation of books, maps, charts and other appropriate educational matters that may be deemed of value to the membership of the Club. This committee shall provide rules governing the use of such property.

Section 7. The House Committee shall have charge of all the furniture and fixtures and the purchase of and care of the same and shall arrange for the luncheons and banquets for the meetings of the Club as directed by the President

and sanctioned by the Board of Governors.

Section 8. The City Interest Committee shall have charge of all public questions relating to the welfare of the city and public unless otherwise ordered by the Club when it may be preferred to refer any public question to a special committee.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Finances

Section 1. Each member of the Club shall pay dues amounting to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) a year, payable semi-annually in advance April first and October first. Dues

shall be pro-rated to each member beginning with the first of the month, following his admission and shall be payable

in advance for the fractional term of six morths.

Section 2. Any member whose dues shall remain unpaid for six months shall then be in arrears and shall forfeit the privilege of membership and, if he neglects or refuses to pay his delinquent dues within 30 days after notice from the Secretary, his name may be stricken from the roll by a majority vote of the Board of Governors. Any member so suspended may be reinstated by majority vote of the Board of Governors by payment of all arrearages and current dues.

Section 3. Any member of the Club who shall refuse to prepare a paper when so requested by the program committee, or who shall absent himself from five consecutive regular meetings, without a reasonable excuse satisfactory to the Board of Governors, shall be deemed an undesirable member and shall be dropped from membership at the expiration of the term of six months for which his dues shall

have been paid.

#### ARTICLE V. Meetings

Section 1. The Club shall meet at 12:15 p. m. or at another hour named by the Program Committee on each Friday of each week, during the months of October to April, inclusive, in the club rooms or other designated place.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Club may be called for the transaction of business upon call of the President by

giving three days' notice of same.

Section 3. The annual meeting shall be the last meeting in April of each year, at which time annual reports shall be made by the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer and the chairman of each standing committee.

Section 4. Twenty per cent. of the membership shall constitute a quorum to do business at either regular or

special meetings.

Section 5. Eight members of the Board of Governors shall constitute a quorum to do business at either regular or special meetings of the Board of Governors.

Section 6. The fiscal year of the Club shall run from

April 1st to March 31st of each year.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### Elections

Section 1. Nominations for the Board of Governors shall be made at the annual meeting. Vote shall be by

secret written ballot and the seven or eight (as the number to be elected may be) receiving the highest number of votes cast shall be elected.

Section 2. No proxies shall be allowed at any meeting

or election of the Club of the Board of Governors.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### Order of Business

Section 1. At business meetings the order of business shall be as follows:

3. Unfinished Business.

#### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE QUEST CLUB OF FORT WAYNE, INDIANA CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I.

#### Name and Object

Section 1. This Club shall be known as Quest Club.

located in Fort Wayne, Indiana.
Section 2. The object of this Club shall be the study and discussion of the application of the scientific principles of salesmanship, advertising, sales-management and business management in its various forms; to study the economy of improved methods of business management; to develop a closer relationship amongst its members and to promote harmony and co-operation in improving the efficiency of each one in his line of business endeavor. And to that end it shall be the intent and purpose of this Club to avoid taking part in the discussion of political issues or questions of a partisan character.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### Membership

Section 1. The membership of this Club shall consist only of active members and membership shall not be transferable.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Government

Section 1. The government of this Club shall be vested in a Board of Governors consisting of fifteen members to be elected for a term of two years at the annual meeting of the Club. It shall be the practice to elect eight and seven governors at each election in alternate years. The term of office of each governor shall begin immediately upon his election and continue until his successor is elected and qualified.

Section 2. The Board of Governors shall have the power to fill vacancies occurring on said Board during any year. with the provision, however, that a person so elected as a governor shall be elected only to hold office until the next

regular election of governors.

Section 3. The Board of Governors shall meet within ten days after adjournment of the annual meeting of the Club, at which time they shall elect from their own members a president, vice-president, a treasurer and the chairman of each of the standing committees. They shall also elect from the membership of the Club a secretary. These various officers shall be elected for a term of one year or until their successors are elected and qualified.

## ARTICLE IV. Meetings

Section 1. The regular meetings of this Club shall be held as often as and at such time and place as may be specified in the By-Laws.

## ARTICLE V. Amendments

Section 1. The constitution of this Club may be amended at any regular meeting of the Club by a vote of two-thirds of all of the votes cast. Proposed amendments shall be furnished to the Secretary, signed by at least six members and mailed to each member at least one week before action is taken.

#### BY-LAWS

## ARTICLE I. Membership

Section 1. Suggestions of names of desirable prospective candidates for membership may be presented to the Board of Governors by any member of the Club. This Board shall first pass upon the qualifications of such proposed candidates and, if considered favorably, the membership committee shall invite such person to become a member. Two negative votes, however, shall reject. The membership fee shall be twenty-five dollars (825.00) and shall be paid to the Secretary of the Club by any applicant for membership before he may be declared a member by the Board of Governors. When such declaration shall have been made, the Secretary shall enter upon the roster of membership the name of the applicant as a member of the Quest Club.

Section 2. Any member who shall be guilty of misconduct that may compromise his Club associates or bring disgrace upon the Club, or injure its reputation, or frustrate its purpose, or who shall violate its constitution and established rules, may be suspended or expelled by a vote of the majority of the members of the Board's Governors, but not until he shall have been given due notice of the Board's

intention to consider the question of his expulsion or suspension. Such notice shall include an invitation to be heard in his own defense. And if he desires it, he shall be given an opportunity for such hearing.

Section 3. The resignation of a member shall be made in writing to the Board of Governors, but no resignation shall be accepted unless the member presenting it has paid all current dues to the Club.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### **Duties of Officers**

Section 1. President: It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Club and of the Board of Governors; to enforce these By-Laws; to cast the deciding vote in case of a tie; to call special meetings of the Club or of the Board of Governors, and to perform such other duties as pertain to his office.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall, in the absence of the President, preside at any meeting of the Club or of the Board of Governors; and shall be vested with all the powers of the President when the latter is absent or incapacitated.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep an accurate account of the proceedings of all meetings of the Club; to countersign all contracts and documents entered into by the Club; collect all funds due the Club and remit them to the Treasurer; to draw disbursement orders on the Treasurer as directed by the Board of Governors; see that the Club receives suitable publicity in the local press and in any other way that is in accordance with the tone and objects of the Club; and to perform such other duties as usually and regularly devolve upon the office of Secretary.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to deposit in a national bank or trust company all the funds of the Club received for its uses and disburse them only on orders drawn by the Secretary; he shall make an annual report of the financial condition of the Club; or oftener at the request of the Board of Governors, or of the President.

Section 5. The Board of Governors shall have general charge of the affairs, funds and property of the Club.

Section 6. The Secretary and Treasurer shall each be required to furnish a Surety Company's bond in such amount as ordered by the Board of Governors, the premiums to be paid by the Club.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Committees

Section 1. The standing committees of the Club shall be the "Committee on Program for Luncheon Meetings," the "Committee on Program for Evening Meetings," and the "Membership Committee," the "House Committee," the "Library Committee," and the "City Interest Committee."

Section 2. The Board of Governors shall elect the chairman of each standing committee. The President of the Club shall, with the advice of the Chairman, appoint two

other members of each committee.

Section 3. The Committee on Program for Luncheon meetings shall have charge of all arrangements of programs for club meetings and shall determine the topics to be discussed, assign them to speakers and, as far as possible provide for an intelligent discussion of the subjects presented.

Section 4. The Committee on Program for Evening Meetings shall have charge of all arrangements for programs for such meetings and shall determine the topics to be discussed, secure speakers of note, see that they arrive at the meetings at the proper time, and as far as possible provide for an intelligent discussion of the subjects presented.

Section 5. The Membership Committee shall investigate the character of all proposed candidates for membership, pass upon their desirability as members, and in accordance with their findings, make suitable recommendations to the

Board of Governors.

Section 6. Subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, the Library Committee shall have charge of the selection, purchase and installation of books, maps, charts and other appropriate educational matters that may be deemed of value to the membership of the Club. This committee shall provide rules governing the use of such property.

Section 7. The House Committee shall have charge of all the furniture and fixtures and the purchase of and care of the same and shall arrange for the luncheons and banquets for the meetings of the Club as directed by the President

and sanctioned by the Board of Governors.

Section 8. The City Interest Committee shall have charge of all public questions relating to the welfare of the city and public unless otherwise ordered by the Club when it may be preferred to refer any public question to a special committee.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Finances

Section 1. Each member of the Club shall pay dues amounting to Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) a year, payable semi-annually in advance April first and October first. Dues shall be pro-rated to each member beginning with the first of the month, following his admission and shall be payable in advance for the fractional term of six months.

Section 2. Any member whose dues shall remain unpaid for six months shall then be in arrears and shall forfeit the privilege of membership and, if he neglects or refuses to pay his delinquent dues within 30 days after notice from the Secretary, his name may be stricken from the roll by a majority vote of the Board of Governors. Any member so suspended may be reinstated by majority vote of the Board of Governors by payment of all arrearages and current

dues.

Section 3. Any member of the Club who shall refuse to prepare a paper when so requested by the program committee, or who shall absent himself from five consecutive regular meetings, without a reasonable excuse satisfactory to the Board of Governors, shall be deemed an undesirable member and shall be dropped from membership at the expiration of the term of six months for which his dues shall have been paid.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### Meetings

Section 1. The Club shall meet at 12:15 p.m. or at another hour named by the Program Committee on each Friday of each week, during the months of October to April, inclusive, in the club rooms or other designated place.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Club may be called for the transaction of business upon call of the President by

giving three days' notice of same.

Section 3. The annual meeting shall be the last meeting in April of each year, at which time annual reports shall be made by the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer and the chairman of each standing committee.

Section 4. Twenty per cent. of the membership shall constitute a quorum to do business at either regular or

special meetings.

Section 5. Eight members of the Board of Governors shall constitute a quorum to do business at either regular or special meetings of the Board of Governors.

Section 6. The fiscal year of the Club shall run from

April 1st to March 31st of each year.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### Elections

Section 1. Nominations for the Board of Governors shall be made at the annual meeting. Vote shall be by secret written ballot and the seven or eight (as the number to be elected may be) receiving the highest number of votes cast shall be elected.

Section 2. No proxies shall be allowed at any meeting or election of the Club of the Board of Governors.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### Order of Business

Section 1. At business meetings the order of business shall be as follows:

Reading of Minutes. 1.

Reports of Standing Committees.

Unfinished Business. 3.

- 4. New Business. 5. Suggestions for the Good of the Club.
- 6. Program of the Day.

7. Question Box.

8. Adjournment.
Section 2. The order of business may be suspended by a majority vote of the members present.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

#### Rules of Order

Section 1. Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern this Club, except when inconsistent with the Constitution of the Club.

#### ARTICLE IX.

#### Amendments

Section 1. The By-Laws of this Club may be amended at any regular meeting of the Club by majority vote of the members present, providing a notice of the proposed amendment shall have been read at the previous meeting and recorded in the minutes of the Club.












