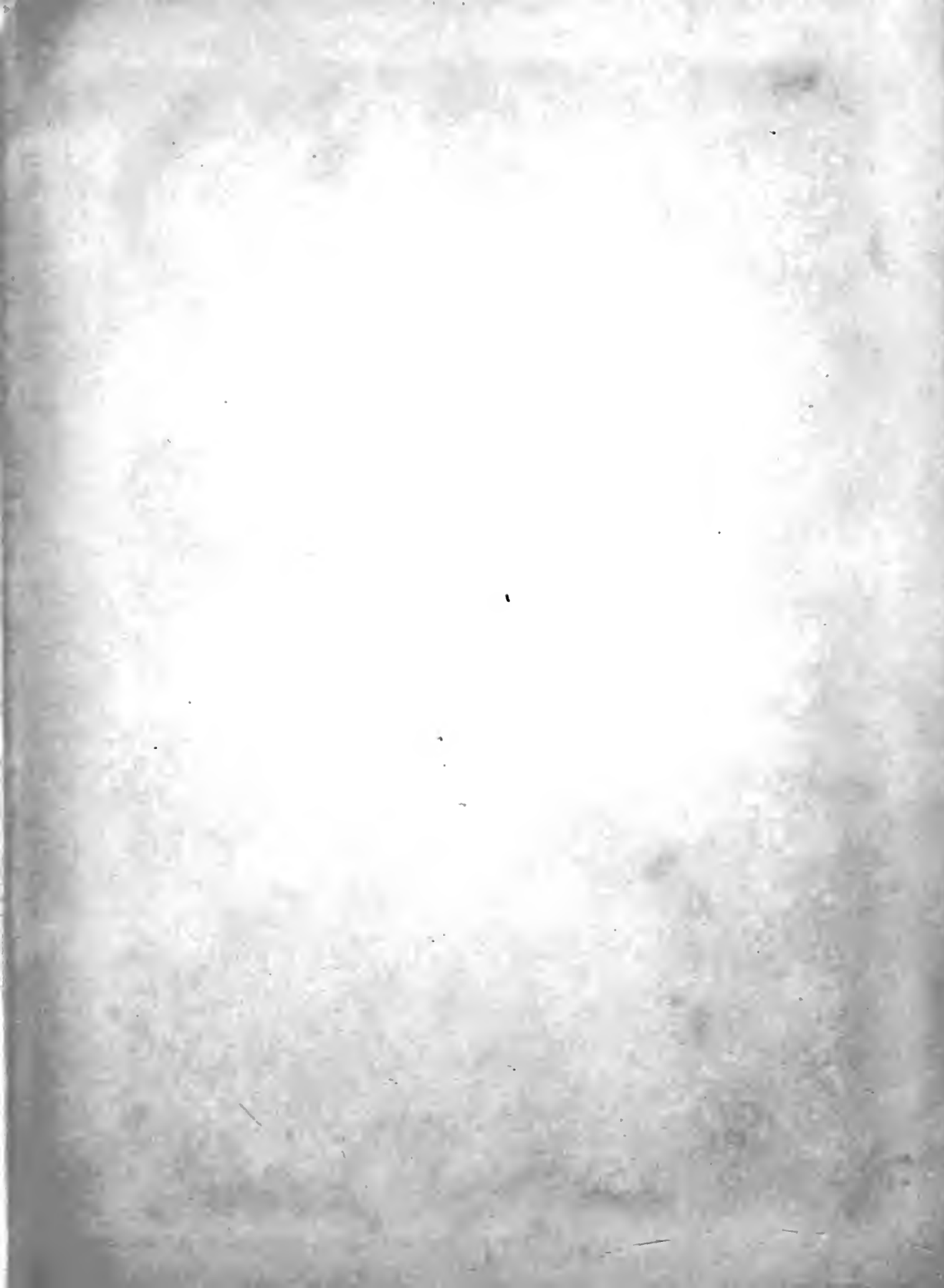

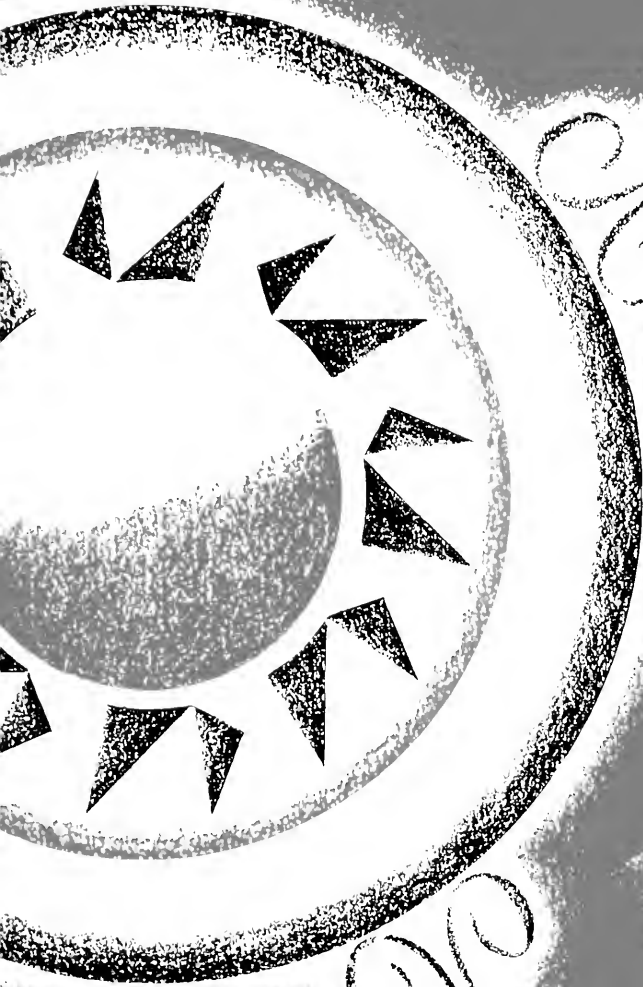

PREFACE

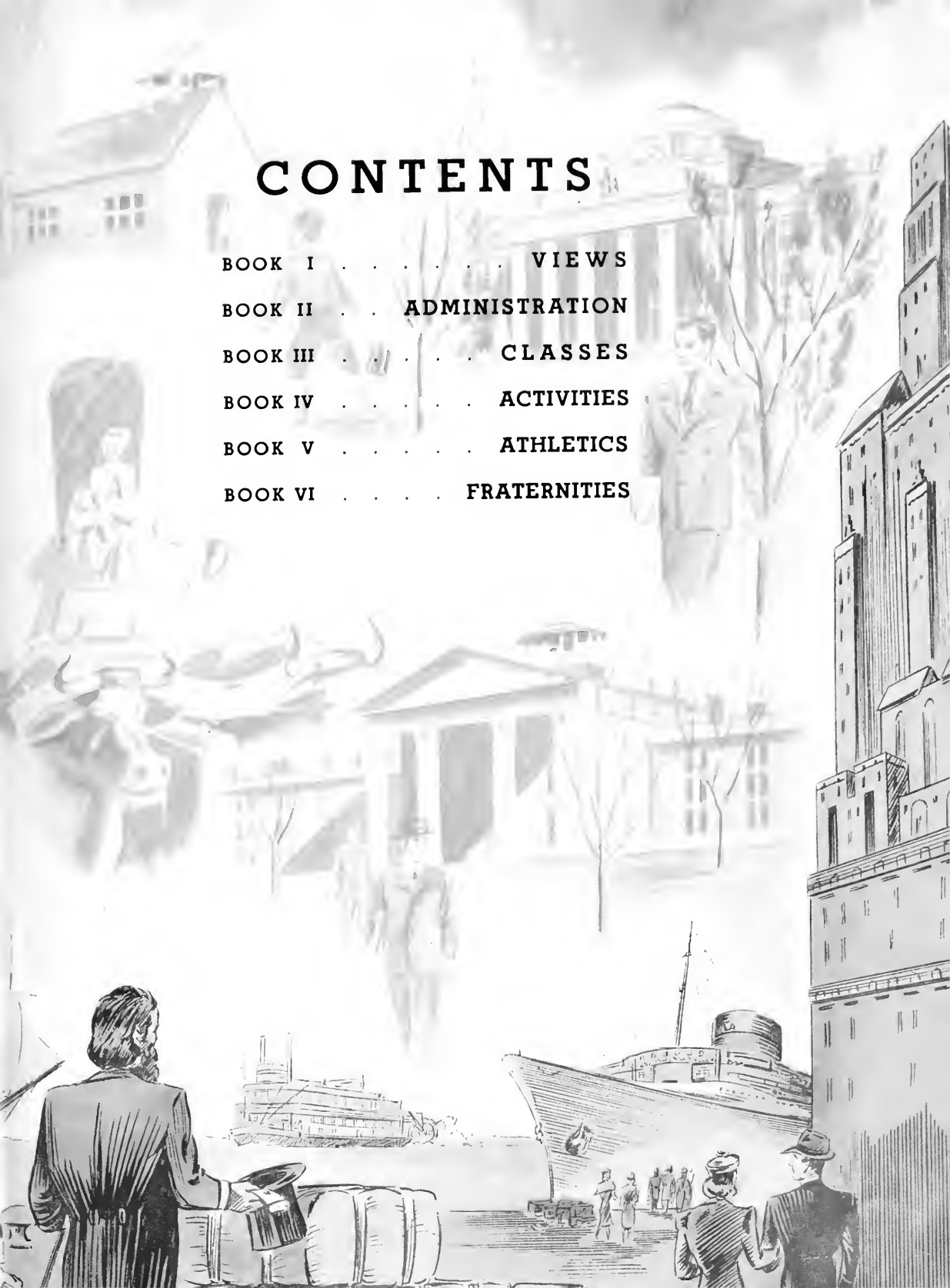

VIEWS

PRE-HISTORIC MAN *knew nothing of education as we know it today. His attempts at mastering surroundings were directed solely toward self-preservation. But time caused him to see, in his daily life, chances for the improvement of his surroundings, and with him began crude attempts to master the waters. At the same time he taught his children and encouraged their learning the requisites of existence. The Student Council, the most esteemed body on the campus, continues with the creation of its long time record of successful enforcement of the Honor System. Fourteen members compose this group. Included in it are the President of the Student Body, the Presidents of the three upper classes, and ten councilmen of whom five shall come from the Senior Class, three from the Junior Class, and two from the Sophomore Class. A secret ballot from a vote of their respective classes is the method by which these councilmen are elected.

The Council is kept constantly at work with its many diversified duties, and it is a vital ele-

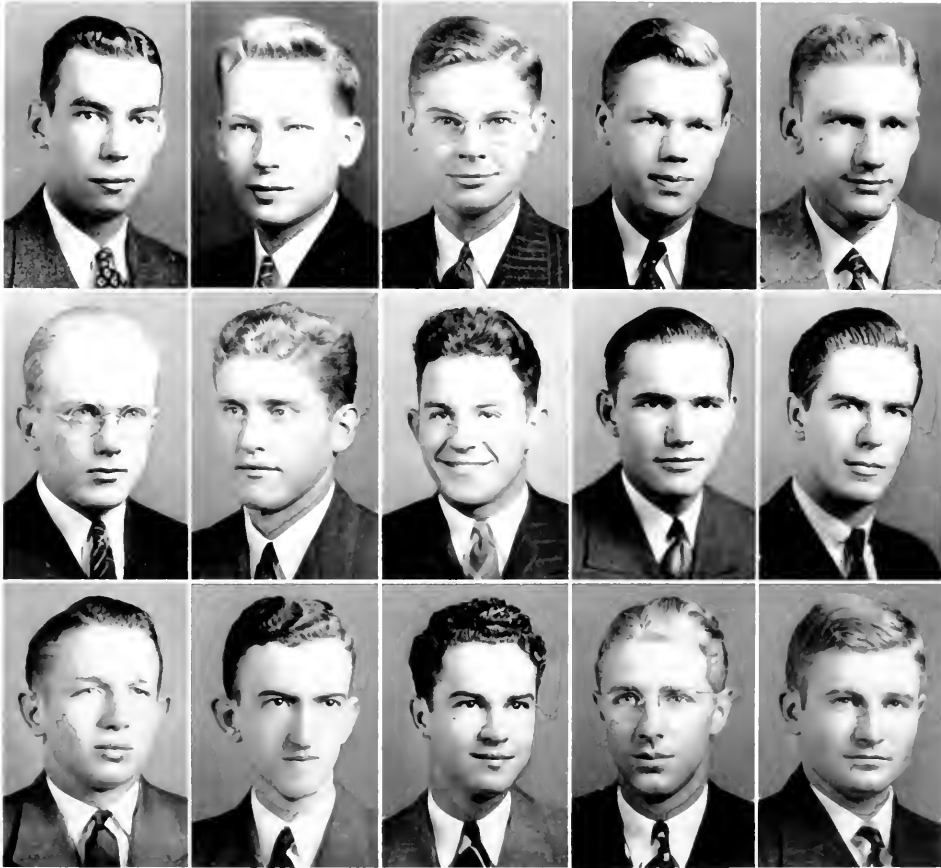

ment in the promotion of higher ideals on the campus. The aforementioned Honor System is strictly adhered to by the Council, and all violations of this code are tried by them. Conviction is made possible by at least a two thirds vote of members present at trial.

The Student Council is also empowered with the task of supervising the Court of Control. If in the opinion of the Court any freshmen conduct is serious enough to warrant suspension or dismissal from college, the matter is referred to the Council for action.

In order to amend the Constitution of the Student Government, the amendment must first be passed upon by the Student Council. The proposed amendment is then read before the Student Body, after which it is tabled for a ten day period, at the end of which time a vote of the Student Body is taken. A two thirds majority is necessary for adoption.

In summation the Student Council represents an organization instituted for the fostering of an idealistic Davidson.



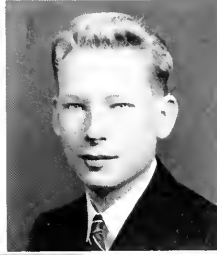

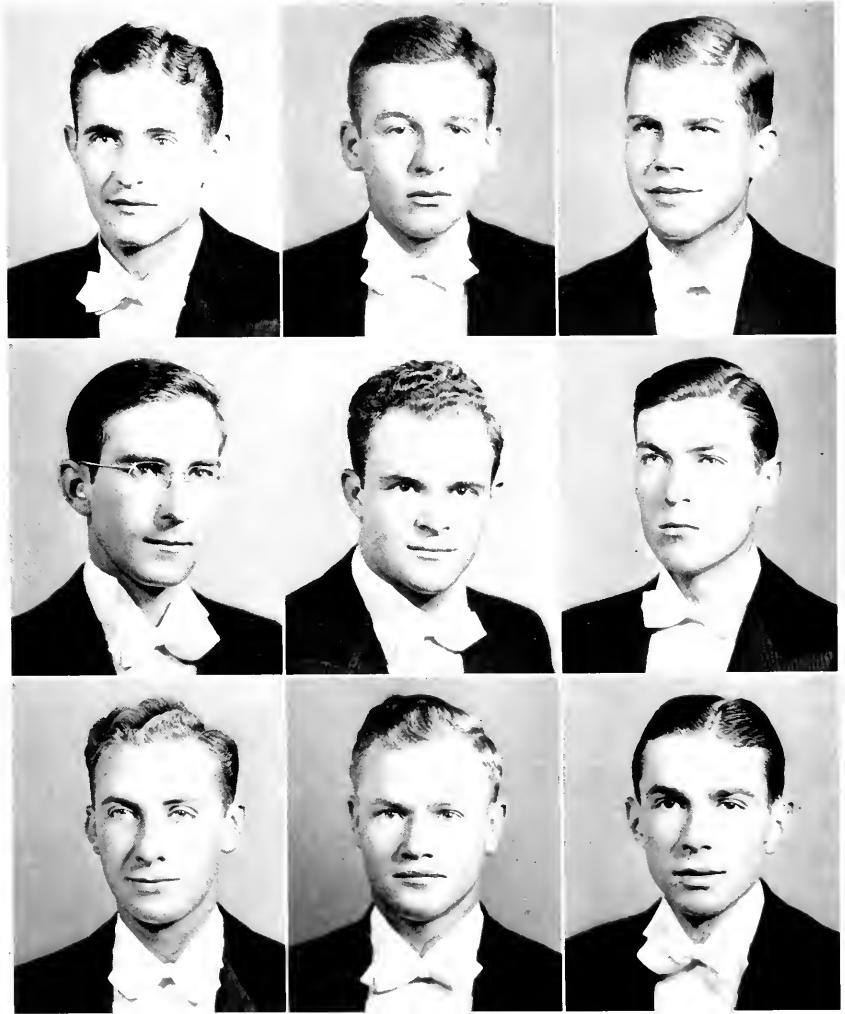

Taken in a sweeping glance, the Y. M. C. A. constantly aims to uphold the religious traditions of the college and further its every worthy cause.



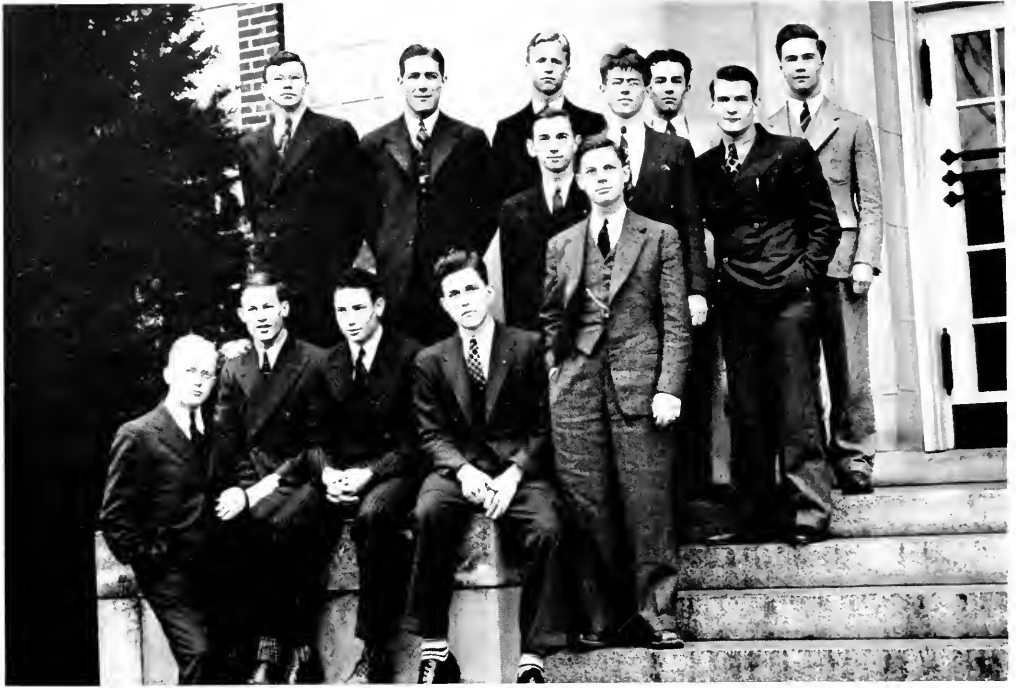

It is the duty of the Court of Control to maintain Freshman discipline.

The Court is composed of eight members who are appointed by the President of the Student Body after

conference with the Senior members of the Student Council. Its officers include a judge and a recorder.

The Court's function is "to hear, investigate, and deal with charges of the upperclassmen against Freshmen of improper conduct, violating Freshman Regulations, or breaking college traditions."

It is not the duty of the Court to convict, but to seek out and administer justice.

The Court has the "power to confine to the campus any Freshman found guilty of an offense not serious enough to warrant his suspension from college. Any matters of conduct that, in the opinion of the Court, are serious enough to justify suspension or dismissal from college are referred to the Student Council for action."

Every week *The Davidsonian* appears as the official newspaper of both the college and the village. On each Monday night of the college year, the editorial staff—consisting of the editor in chief, six managing editors, and the freshman and sophomore reporters—meets in its office on Elm Row to synthesize news of the previous week and to make up copy for the printer. The paper comes out on Wednesday afternoon, and the business staff attends to the circulation of the paper, sending copies to alumni and parent subscribers as well as distributing the paper to student and faculty post office boxes.

The Davidsonian has long been recognized as one of the most progressive college papers in the South and for a number of years has been ranked as a first-class honor newspaper by the National Scholastic Press Association in nation-wide competition. Last

year it won the signal honor of being voted one of the 28 college papers in the United States to receive the All American Honor rating.

The Davidsonian receives financial support from two major sources, the funds of the Publications Board and advertising. The soliciting of advertisements comes under the duty of the business staff, which includes the business manager, one assistant business manager, two advertising managers, two circulation managers, and a collection manager.

Each year in the spring elections, the editor-in-chief is chosen by the student body from the six managing editors. The business manager is selected from the six aforementioned members of the business staff by the Publications Board. Both must be members of the rising senior class.

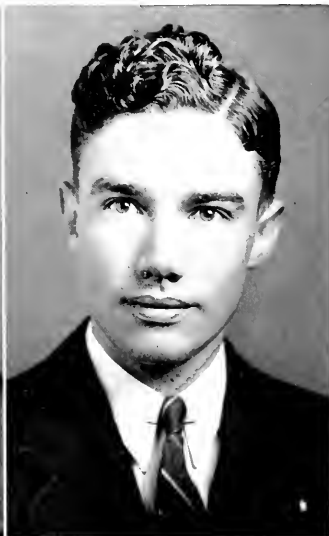

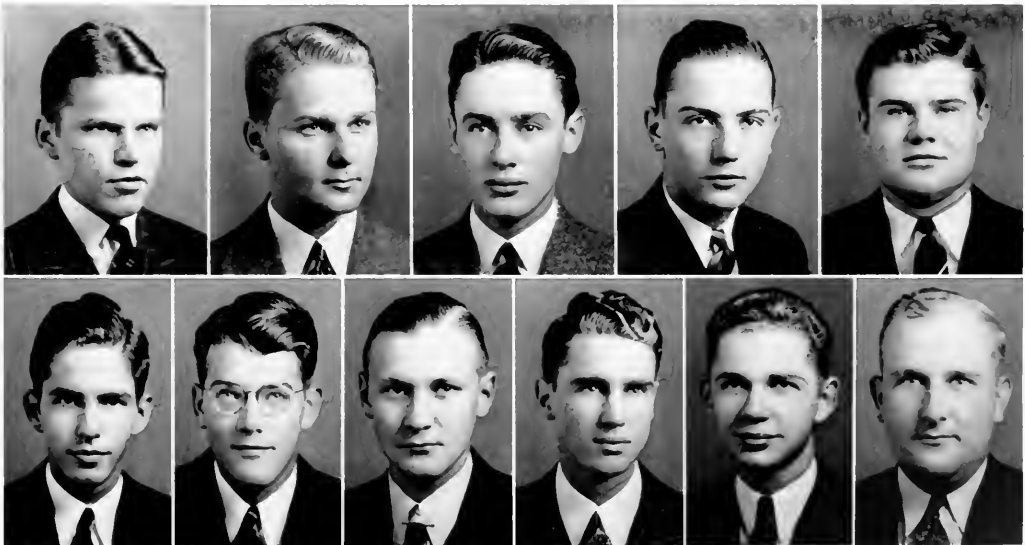

The Forensic Council, acting in conjunction with a faculty committee, of which Professor C. K. Brown is chairman, has charge of all the intercollegiate debating at Davidson. The council is composed of six men, chosen each year from the ranks of those who have shown special interest in debating. For the year 1938-39, the council was composed of Joe Calvin, president; John Reisner and Sherrard Rice, vice-presidents; Richard Kenyon, secretary; Locke White, treasurer; and Robert Ramsey, debate manager.

Among other duties, the Forensic Council works out a budget and a schedule of debates for the year, acts as a host to visiting debating teams, selects the freshman debating team, and conducts a tournament for this group.

Three trips are made each year by the debating team. First they go southward to match their ability with the corresponding teams of the Citadel, College of Charleston, University of South Carolina, Georgia School of Technology, Emory, and the University of Alabama. The northern trip takes them to Rutgers, Bard, Washington and Lee, and Lafayette; while later they travel northwest, to Centre, University of Louisville, Oberlin, Denison, and Ohio Wesleyan.

This year, for the first time, the Freshmen are given a debating trip, on which they will probably visit the following schools: McCallie and Baylor, at Chattanooga, Tennessee, and Darlington, at Rome, Georgia.

DEBATING TEAMS

The Davidson Debating Teams this year upheld the high standard set by debaters of previous years, although an accurate record is hampered by the fact that practically all of the debates were non-decision. This type of debating has proved itself very popular in college debating.

Joe Calvin, John Reisner, Sherrard Rice, Richard Kenyon, Locke White, and Robert Ramsey composed the principals of the team, while Warren Ludlam, William Loftin, and Drury Thompson made up the alternates. This group is selected by the faculty committee on debating after hearing the five-minute-trial speech of each candidate. The squad is then divided into three teams of two principals and an alternate each. Professor Brown coaches the entire squad before debates with other colleges are held.

The two principal subjects debated this year were: RESOLVED: That the United States should cease spending public funds for the purpose of stimulating business; and RESOLVED: That the United States should establish an alliance with Great Britain. Davidson defended the affirmative and negative side of each question.

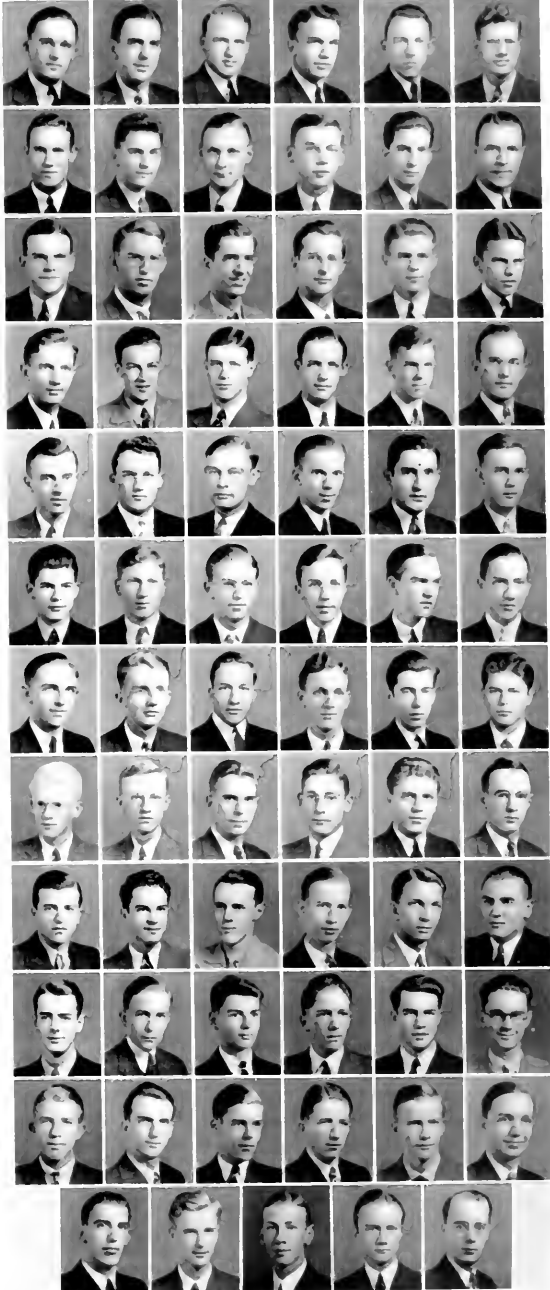

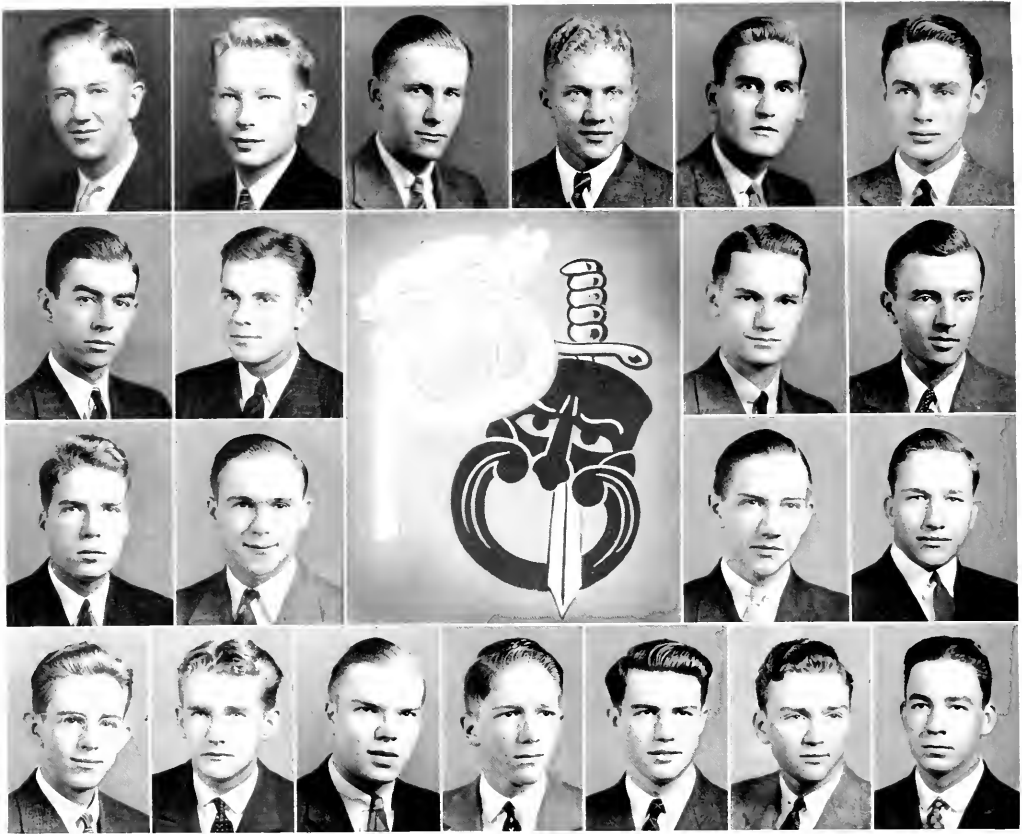

DAVIDSON COLLEGE SYMPHONIC BAND

The past school year has been an extremely busy one for the Davidson College Department of Music. The highlight of the Department's work for the year was the presentation of the First Annual Davidson Music Festival on February 12th, 13th and 14th. This event took a great amount of extra effort on the part of all concerned but was considered worthwhile and successful in every respect. The Festival, however, was just one of the many presentations by the Department. The various musical organizations have carried through an extremely busy schedule of radio programs and concerts, both on the campus and in cities of this and adjoining States. Let us look at the record of each group.

The first organization to swing into action this year was the Football Band. This group of 68 men performed at all but one of the Football Games, making trips with the team to Charlotte (2), Sumter, S. C., Greenville, S. C. and Durham. Led by its four drum-majors, this organization attracted much favorable comment by the intricate marching maneuvers that it performed. This year's Football Band upheld in every respect its reputation as one of the outstanding College Bands of the South.

The Symphonic Band members 46 boys in its membership. This organization has been the busiest of all the groups, having played twenty radio programs over station WBT in Charlotte and concerts in Davidson (2), Sumter, S. C., Florence, S. C., Hartsville, S. C., Winston-Salem, and Morganton. This group has full symphonic instrumentation and has become known as a true Symphonic Band.

The Little Symphony Orchestra has perhaps shown more improvement this year than any other group. Held back in past years by lack of sufficient string material, this group has this year, with the help of a few outside string players from Charlotte, taken its place as a collegiate musical organization of the first rank. It appeared jointly with the Glee Club on most of its concerts although the Orchestra presented programs of its own in Spruce Pine and Fayetteville.

The Concert Series presented 8 concerts this year and 4 musical Vespers have been presented. In addition to these programs the Department has been responsible for the music at the daily Chapel programs and the Sunday Evening Vespers.

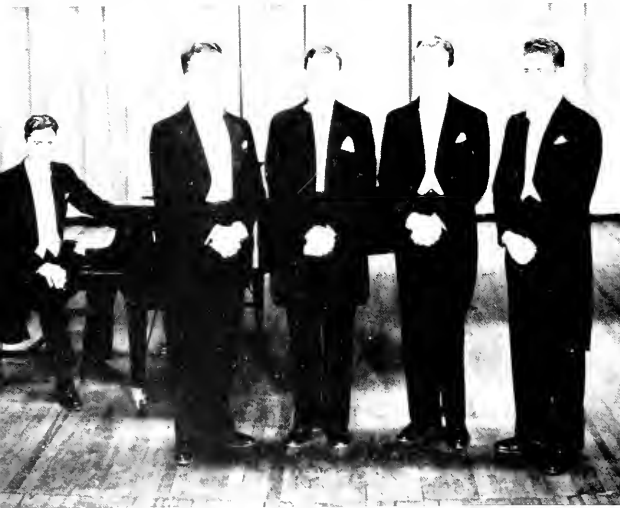




GLEE CLUB

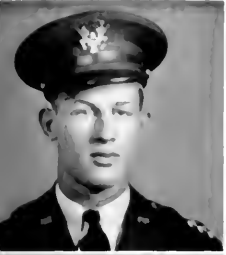

That is a record of contribution to the country's permanent defensive forces which would do credit to a much larger institution.

The battalion, too, has its honorary military fraternity, Scabbard and Blade. Members are elected into Scabbard and Blade in spring and fall. Requirements for membership are outstanding ability in military science and tactics, high scholastic standing in other departments, and an interest in extra-curricular activities. To become a member of the organization a man must have demonstrated those qualities which characterize a fine officer, for the aim of the fraternity is to uphold the high ideals of military men.

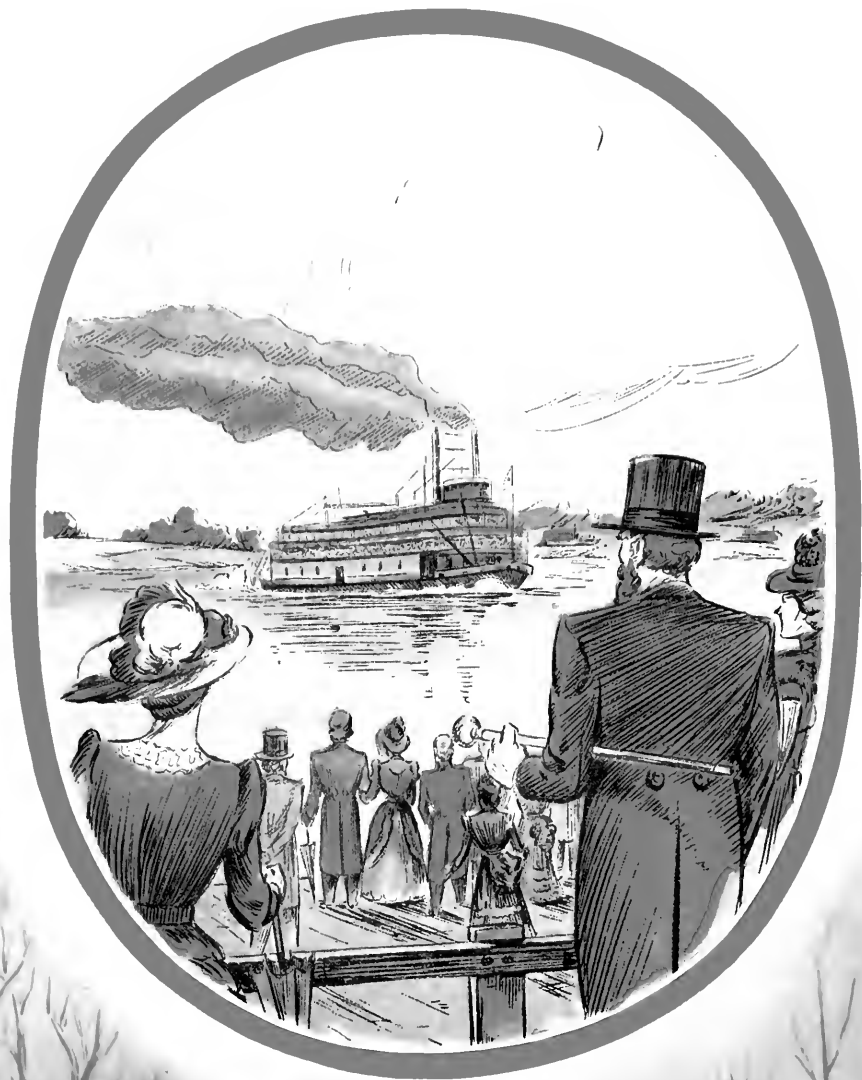

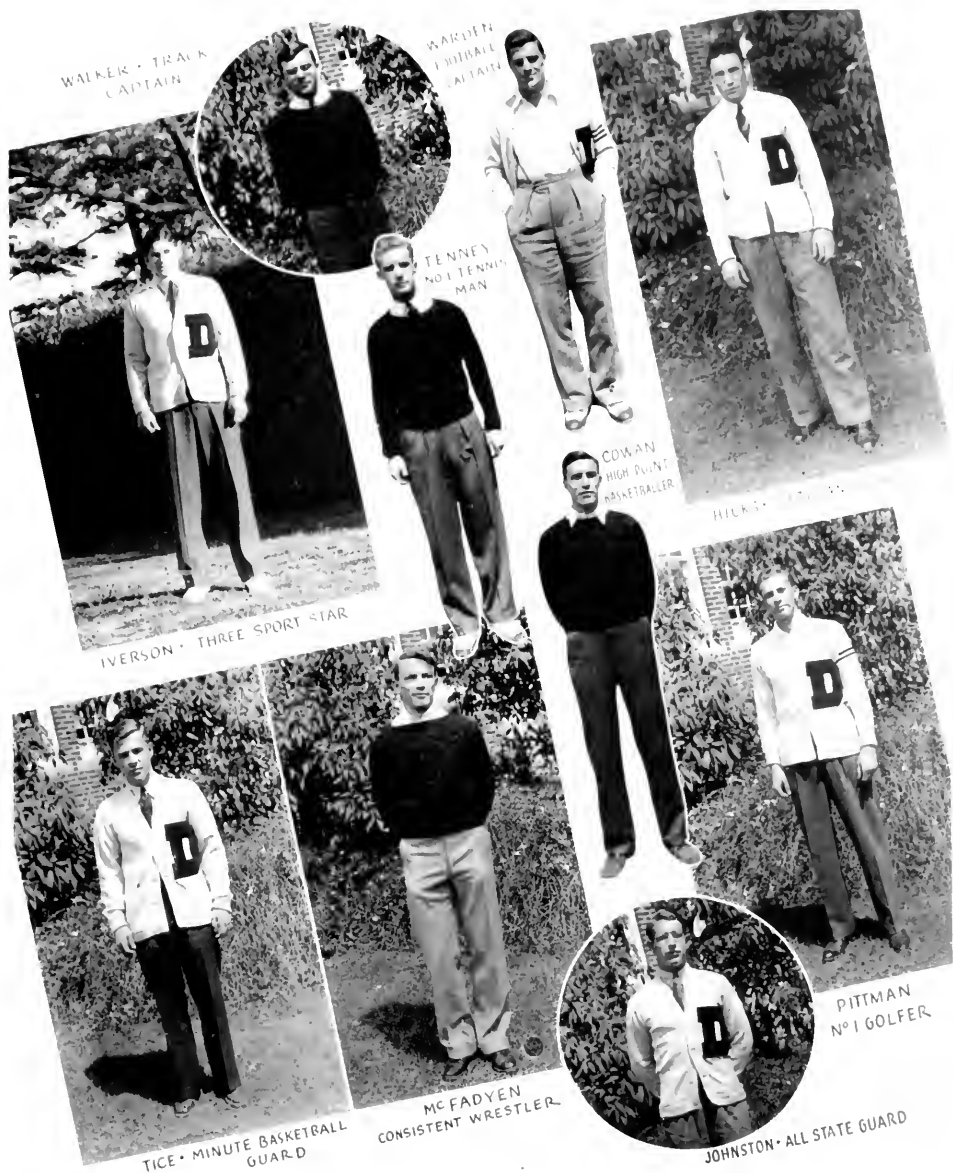

SOUTH CAROLINA 25; DAVIDSON 0

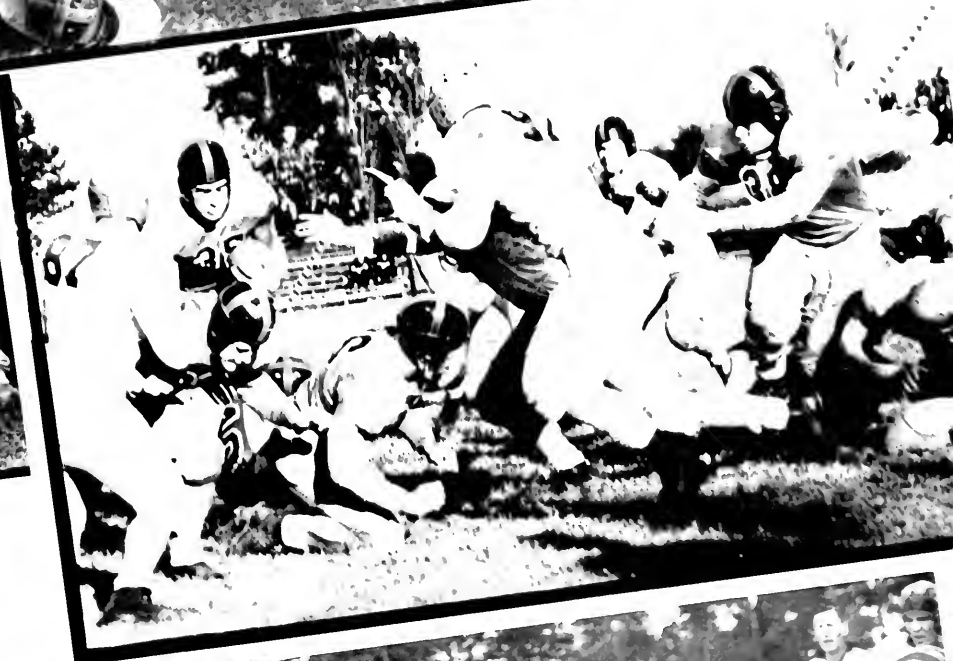

cock attack, fell under numerous Carolina marches and allowed them to score three additional times.

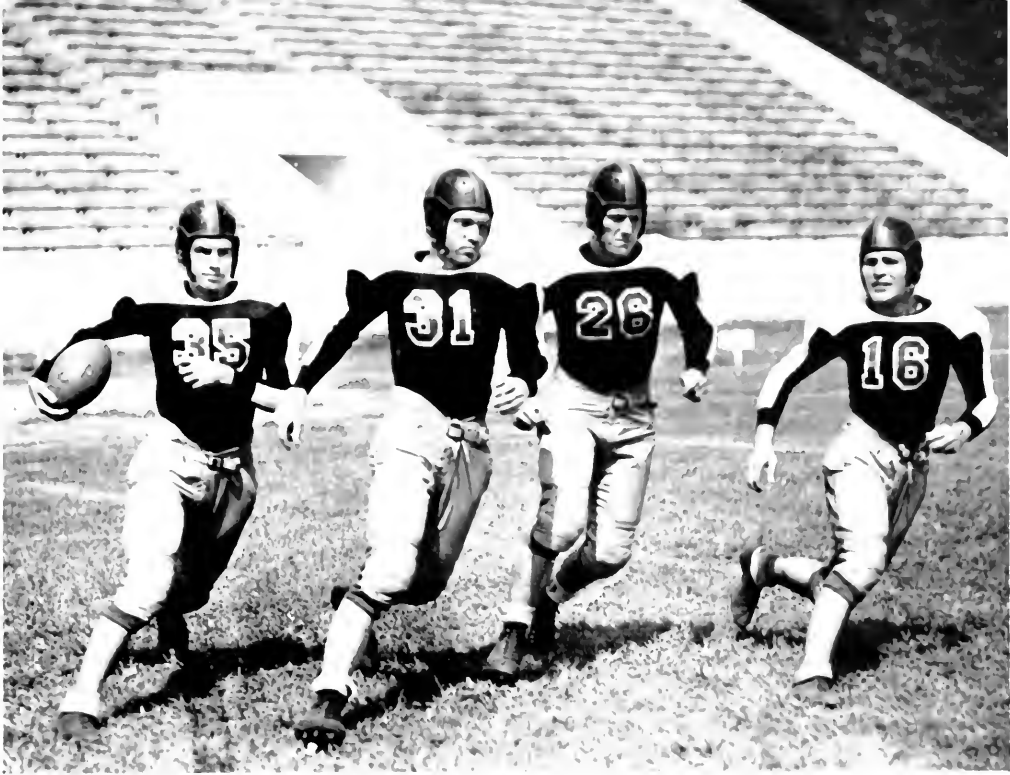
Archie Steed, in the waning moments of the affray, ran and passed desperately but the 'Cats started too late as the game ended with them in possession of the ball on the Gamecock five.

Apparently stung by two straight defeats, the 'Cats invaded South Carolina again and played the best game of the year in licking a favored Furman eleven. Led by diminutive "Pepper" Martin, the Hurricane ran over for a score before the half-time, but the 'Cats came back to even things up with Tubby Hand plunging over from the 20-yard stripe. Martin again put his team out in front with another score featured by several nice runs but Davis tied things up again with a neat pass to Iverson. A place-kick from the toe of Davis, his first attempt at such, skimmed over the bar to give Davidson a well-earned victory.

Fred Stair stepped off 59 yards for the longest run of the day that featured good blocking by the 'Cat machine. Bill Johnson's work at guard was outstanding.

DAVIDSON 29; WOFFORD 0

Davis, Hand, and Frank Harrison, combined to pace the 'Cats as they romped rough-shod over a decidedly outclassed Wofford team. Coach McEver used every man on the bench during the course of game that was played before a host of bands from over the State.

The 'Cats tallied in each quarter on passes and running attacks. Twice during the fray, the 'Cat forward wall, very stingy with yardage, surged

through and blocked Wofford kicks for safeties. Davis crashed the Conference scoring list with two touchdowns added to his total.

V. M. I. 19; DAVIDSON 6

Swivel-hipped Paul Shu proved poison to the 'Cat defense as the Keydets ran over three markers to lick the 'Cats 19-6 before a large Homecoming crowd. Three times during the game did Shu strike and three times he carried the pigskin into pay dirt.

Davidson's passing attack, sadly off form, clicked only once as Davis tossed to Jim Cowan in the end zone for the lone 'Cat score, early in the first half before Shu started his one-man show. Immediately after the kickoff Shu stepped 65 yards on a brilliant run to start the fireworks and twice later he struck, both times resulting in scores.

WAKE FOREST 21; DAVIDSON 0

Davidson's arch-rivals, Wake Forest, presented a smooth-working sophomore combination that was decidedly too much for the crippled 'Cats. Led by Gallovitch, Mayberry, and Wirtz, the Deacons depended solely on ground plays in scoring their three markers. The Thanksgiving Day crowd, chilled to the bone by a cold drizzle, were well satisfied, however, as the 'Cats continually stabbed the Deacons' line for numerous gains and passed occasionally for neat yardage. Edwards, Deacon fullback, twice stopped 'Cat threats as he intercepted Davidson tosses.

FOOTBALL

The 'Cats will miss several stalwarts next year as graduation takes them on, but Head Coach Gene McEver is not too gloomy as the Spring Training program brought forth numerous prospects. Bob McClellan, Bill Davis, Fred Stair, Bill Beaty, Frank Harrison and Rufus Plonk, all backs, leave a gap that seems hard to fill with only Bill Bolin and Tubby Hand remaining to carry on.

The line will suffer considerably as Ned Iverson and Bob Benfield, at ends, Captain Dave Warden and Luke Graham, at tackles, Bill Johnson and Harry Gasteiger, at guards, will not be available next year. All of these boys played regular in the brilliant 'Cat line that held opposing backs to little yardage during the year. Line Coach Chet Chapman, however, will build around several reserve men from this year's varsity and some likely looking yearlings.

The end posts, with two lettermen, Gales McClintock and Fotsie Cowan, returning looks fairly well taken care of. Frank Niven, up from the B team, and Charles Alcott, John Strandwitz, up from the yearling squad, add strength to the department. The tackle posts, left vacant by Warden and Graham who served three years as regulars, will suffer most through graduation. Fine showings of Don Bell and Elmer Knoeller, two hefty freshmen, during Spring training, stamps them as the probable starters, but Hank Bahnson, a reserve, will be giving one of them a merry battle for the posts.

The return of Marvin Pennington, and George Richmond, two lettermen, gives the 'Cats plenty of experience at the guard positions. Both men, although small and light, make up what they lack along these

lines, with their speed and deception. Dick Arnold, junior reserve, George Marsh, Captain of the yearlings, and Ben Moore, another frosh, will add strength. Bob Johnston's return to school also aids the department.

"Poss" McLean and Horace McCall, who shared the snapper-back duties last year, will return to give the 'Cats plenty of power in the center of an inexperienced line. Frank Caldwell, looms as the best threat to give these boys a race for the position.

The backfield will be a light, fast, and deceptive quartet built around the two returning lettermen, Tubby Hand and Bill Bolin. Spring Training practice brought forth many candidates, but it seems as if Granville Sharpe, who spent the year with the B team, will run in the tail back post left vacant by Davis, Hand and Stanley Yoder, big, bruising freshman, sharing the number three back slot, with Jay Bolin on hand as a reserve. Bill Bolin should fit into one of the remaining posts while Shannon, a small, speedy, flash, Shaw, Hackney, another fine runner, Aarseth, Hunter, Winters, Jonas, Spencer, tailback on the frosh squad, and Billy Pharr, will all be battling it out for the remaining post.

On the whole, the 'Cats should be as strong as ever. Lack of experience hurts the line, especially at the tackle slots, but with two or three games under their belt the 'Cats should howl louder than ever. Backfield talent is especially bright with such promising runners and passers as Hand, Spencer, Hackney, Shannon, Sharpe, Pharr, Hunter and Winters on hand, aided by the blockers and defense stalwarts who are: Yoder, the Bolin brothers and Shaw.

Davidson's basketball team this year overcame a jinx that has been handicapping them for years, that of qualifying for the Southern Conference Tournament. Last year six games were lost by one point margins, but this year the Wildcats won 18 and lost 9 to place them high in conference standing. Certainly this record will reveal the strongest team of the college, completing its 24th season of basketball. At the end of the season they placed well in conference standing.

The highlight of this season was the tourney at Raleigh, where the Wildcat's won over Washington and Lee, runner-up last year, by the score of 43 to 32. Johnny Tice, the smallest player in the Conference, won an ovation from the crowd for his ball hawking and guarding during this game. Jim "Apex" Cowan paced the team. Meeting Clemson in the third round, the Davidson team lost 33 to 49 in a game which found the first half nip and tuck, but during the second half, Clemson, which later won the tournament, swept into the lead.

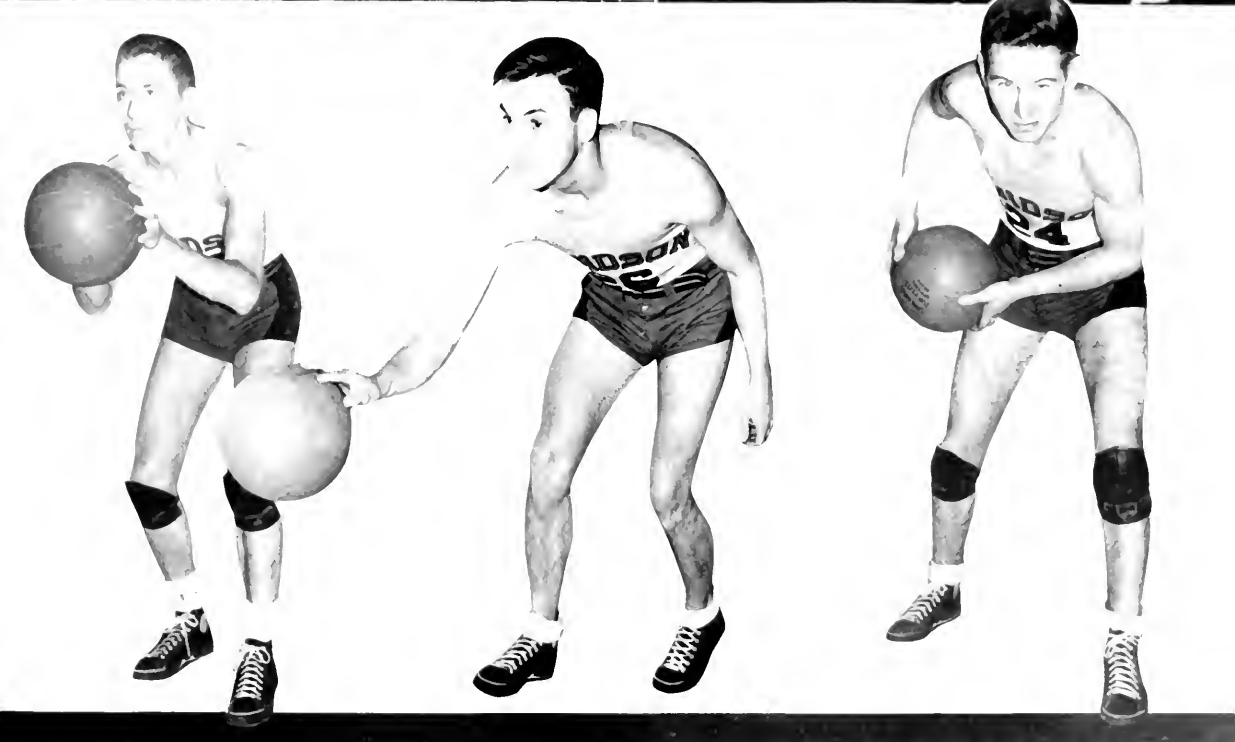

RESUME OF BASKETBALL SEASON

The team was made up of Juniors and Seniors for the most part with Hicks, Cowan, Iverson, Hogg, Harrison, and Tice carrying most of the burden. Duke University bowed twice to the Wildcats and North Carolina once during the season. Wake Forest and State both won over Davidson in their two games.

Before the holidays at Christmas the team moved rapidly over Hampden-Sydney, William and Mary, and Randolph-Macon, but bowed to the University of Baltimore and Maryland. After the mid-term examinations, the 'Cats won five straight games by decisive scores and then were defeated by North Carolina State in a hotly contested game on the Davidson court to

the tune of 36 to 40. Out of the remaining twelve games the Shepardsmen were able to win eight, losing to Wake Forest, State, Citadel, and Clemson, the latter being in the tournament.

"Footsie" Cowan and J. D. Hicks were well up in the scoring in the league which was paced by Jim Waller and Boyd Owen both of Wake Forest. Davidson has been in the league for twenty-four years and in this intercollegiate competition they have a record of 221 wins over 198 losses. During this time the Davidson teams have totaled a score of 13,390 points to 12,552 of their opponents. A complete resume of the season's record follows.

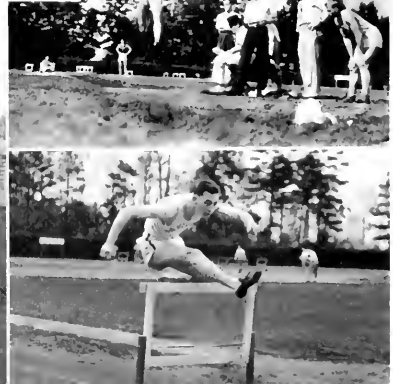

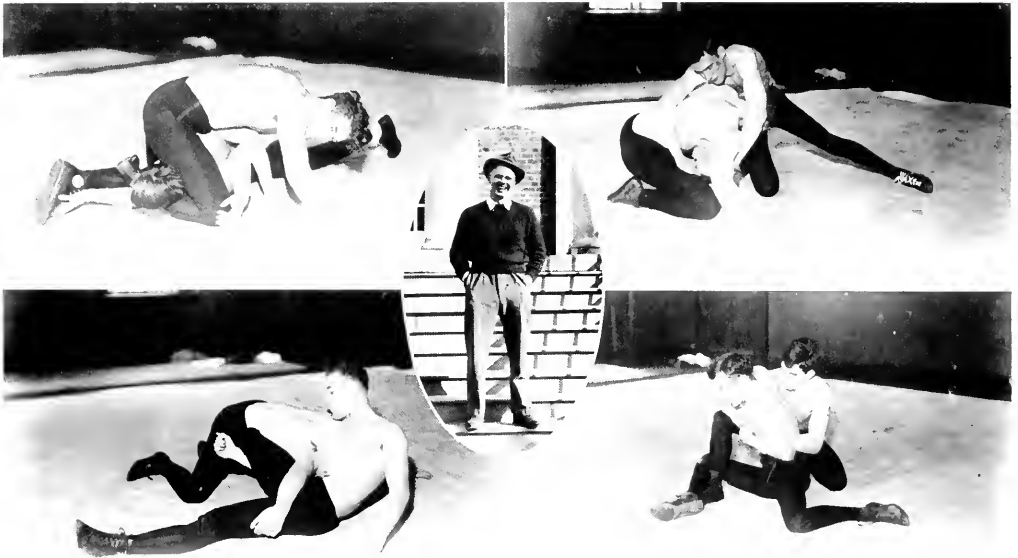

TENNIS

Davidson's varsity racquet wielders of 1939 give evidences of duplicating the record of last year's crack team, if their first eight matches are a fair sample of what they can accomplish.

Beginning their schedule by defeating five of the six opponents met during a southern tour which extended to the state of Texas, the netmen at this writing hold a record of seven won and one lost. They are favored to take the remainder of their matches with the exception of the one against the mighty Carolina team.

Emory was the first team met, and the Cats gained sweet revenge for their defeat last year by trouncing the Atlantans six to three. Penetrating further into the deep South, they swept four more matches with the University of Mississippi, Southwestern, Southern Methodist, and Baylor before they were finally stopped by the University of Texas, Southwestern Conference champions. 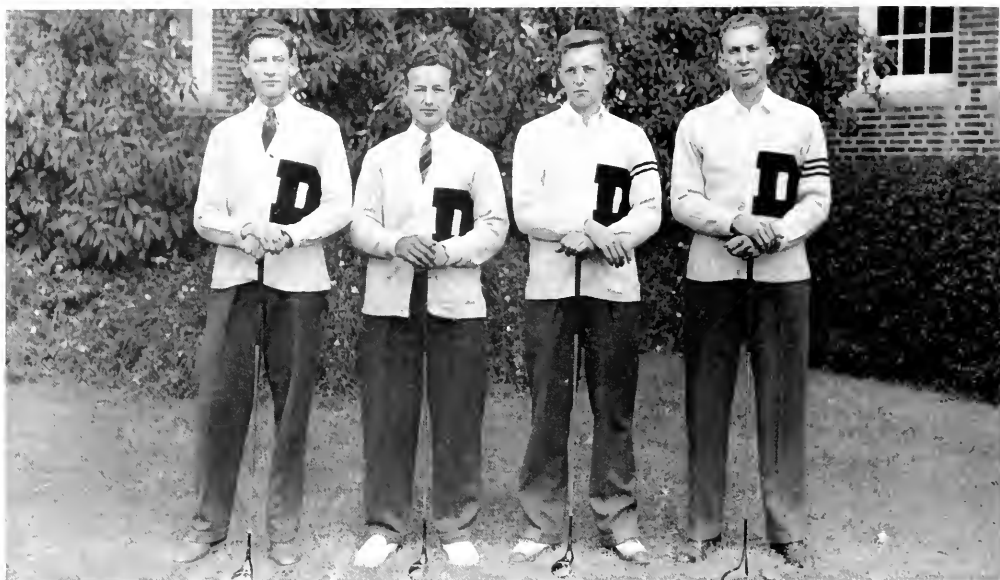

GOLF

After a week of intensive qualifying the Davidson golf quartet was found to be composed of the three returning lettermen and one sophomore. Jimmy Cooper, a member of the junior class, was medalist, closely followed by Granville Sharpe, the sophomore standout, who served the freshman team as number one man last year and has this year made one of the best records in the conference by losing only $2\frac{1}{2}$ points out of a possible 24. The third and fourth positions were filled by Manager Charlie Pegram, who has another year of eligibility, and Captain Ray Pittman, a senior who has served his last year.

The team has enjoyed a record-breaking year, by not losing a single match out of eight played of a ten-game schedule. The Cats opened their season with an impressive win over the Hampden-Sydney four by a $12\frac{1}{2}$ to $5\frac{1}{2}$ score. Sharpe and Cooper led the way with a pair of 75's and did not allow their opposition a single point.

Then turning southward the Wildcats continued the hot pace set in the first match by a one-sided $14\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ victory over the Citadel Bulldogs. Looping back up to Columbia, the divoters won a hard fought victory over the strong University of South Carolina team by a $9\frac{1}{2}$ to $8\frac{1}{2}$ score.

Again it was a $9\frac{1}{2}$ to $8\frac{1}{2}$ victory the next day over Emory University at Atlanta on the difficult

Druid Hills course. Getting back in top form again it was Davidson's match all the way when they defeated the University of Georgia to the tune of 13 to 5 to top off a very successful southern campaign.

Returning to home grounds the stokers clipped off two more very impressive wins the following week on the Charlotte course. The first win was over the classy Alma College four, from Michigan. The Davidson team allowed them only $1\frac{1}{2}$ points out of a possible 18. Pegram and Sharpe led the way with medal scores of 72 and 73. The second win was another victory over the University of Georgia by a repeated 13 to 5 score.

Journeying south again for the Southern Inter-collegiate tournament at Athens, the undefeated Davidson team added another victory in a pre-tournament match by beating the Citadel $13\frac{1}{2}$ to $4\frac{1}{2}$. In the tournament the following day Captain Pittman led the Cat linksters by qualifying for the championship flight, while Charley Pegram had the honor of making a hole in one. The four entrants as a team captured sixth place.

With meets with Carolina and Duke, and the State Inter-Collegiate and Southern Conference tournaments yet to be played, the Davidson golf team is expected to add further laurels to what has been already one of the best seasons this sport has ever had.

FRESHMAN FOOTBALL

With a bulkier squad and more varied talent than usual the latest edition of the Kitten football team showed itself one of the most impressive in years. Of a schedule of six games against worthy opponents, the Freshmen lost but one—that to Duke's Blue Imps.

The Kittens opened their season by trouncing Wingate 31-0, but dropped their next to Duke by 33-6. The Frosh next tangled with the fast, tough Wildcat B squad and breaking a tradition of long standing came out victorious 13-6. On the following Friday the team rode rough shod over a lighter Presbyterian Junior College team, winning 51-0. Against Blue Ridge's Hilltoppers the Kittens were forced to extend themselves but won 12-7, with Spencer scoring on a brilliant 98 yard sprint. In the remaining game the yearlings crushed the Wofford Frosh by 30-0.

In the backfield was material that the varsity of next year and succeeding years may rely on heavily. Yoder is that rarity behind a Davidson line, a big 210 pound plunging line smasher. Hackney and Spencer showed speed that will be a decided asset and Bob Smith and Bill Shaw have looked good as backs during spring practice.

From the line the varsity may draft Bell and Kneller, weighing 215 and 200 pounds respectively. Caldwell will doubtless see service at center in the near future and Marsh, who served as captain of the Kittens, showed abilities that should make him a valued man at guard.

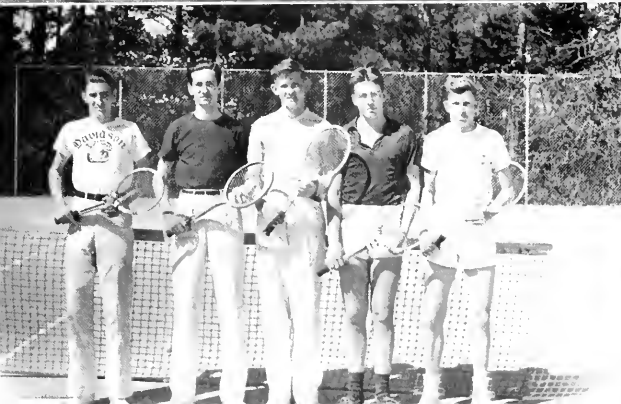
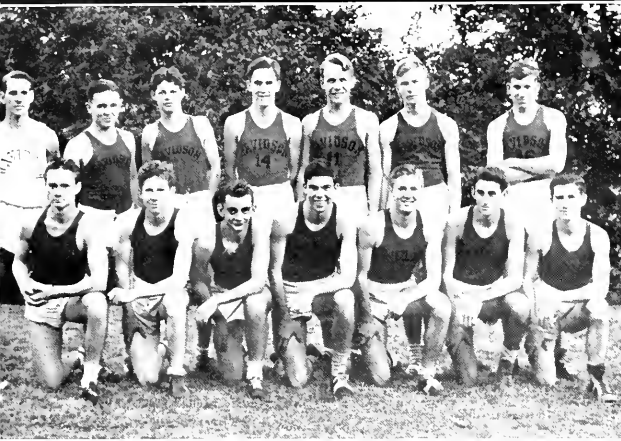

The Wildcats won from Washington and Lee's strong team and from State, losing to the University of North Carolina and by very close scores to Duke and Guilford (2 meets). Woodward and Walker tied for first in two meets, tied for second in two. Others who took part in competition this fall were Chase Brenizer, Bill Lemmon, Reid Patterson, Dan Gilliam, and Bob King.

S O C C E R

Although soccer is yet to be recognized as a sport at Davidson, it gained greatly in popularity during its fourth season of inter-collegiate competition here.

Capably filling the shoes of the graduated Sam Cothran, Oscar Armstrong served as manager during the 1938 season and succeeded in scheduling eight games, the largest schedule ever attempted by a Davidson squad. Of these eight matches the Wildcats won three, lost four, and tied one.

Duke was the first opponent met by the team, the Blue Devils winning by a three to one score. The first Wildcat victim was Appalachian, defeated one to nothing. In probably the best game of the season High Point nosed out the local team, four to three.

Next Catawba was met, the game ending in a one to one tie. Appalachian was defeated

a second time, but the Wildcats again fell victim to the High Point and Duke squads. The season was closed in a whirl-wind rout of the Catawba team, seven to nothing.

The first team was composed of John and Joe Wilson, Bob Washburn, Graham McFadyen, Oscar Armstrong, Pat Rudolph, John Farrior, Tommy Harnsberger, Dave Talmage, Oscar Joyner, and Chal Vinson. Exceptionally large crowds watched all the home matches, and the prospects for the sport's being entered upon the regular athletic program in the near future brightened considerably. The outstanding feature of the season's schedule was the smooth working play of the team as a whole, no one man standing out above all the rest, unless it could be Armstrong, the playing manager.

coming to be recognized as one of the leading programs of its kind in the South.

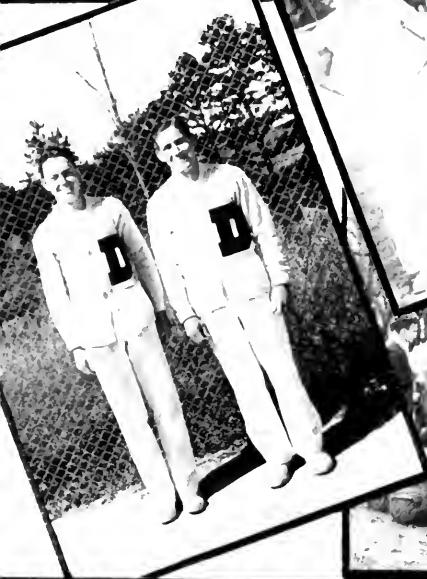
