Snapshots of Half Century at Davidson

By Professor E. J. Lewis

A bugle sounded the assembly call. The excited crowd, which had been scattered over the campus watching the spectacular fire, gathered about Dr. Martin.

"My friends," he said, "this is a serious blow. Chambers lies in ashes. We must staunchly face conditions. I am not cast down or discouraged."

I hear a rumor that the College will be disbanded and that some are preparing to leave for their homes. Nothing is farther from the truth. The College will not disband, and College exercises will continue without interruption.

"I now call the faculty to meet in my office at ten o'clock this morning to arrange schedules and recitation rooms and to provide quarters for every student.

"I confidently rely on every member of the faculty and the student body to rally to the College in this day of her distress and support me in every effort to advance her interests. I am confidently counting on every one of you.

"Chambers is no more. But I here and now pledge that, with God's help, before I quit, a finer and more serviceable building shall take its place.

"The sun is just rising. A new day is begun. Let us face a new and better day for Davidson."

The burning of Chambers Building was the most dramatic incident in the history of Davidson College. The date, November 21, 1921, almost the mid-point of the past half century, may serve as a guide-post for some heterogeneous and fragmentary but more or less chronological recollections.

In 1900 all classrooms, laboratories, dormitory rooms concentrated in Chambers Building . . . Rooms lighted by oil lamps . . . Open fires . . . Coal bins in the rear of Chambers . . . 


Student Government


Little Symphony Orchestra





The Rifle Team


The Rifle Team was coached this year by Sergeant First Class Butts. It is composed of members of the R.O.T.C. unit, and includes several returning lettermen.







Davidson Wildcats


The best material in over a decade greeted Coaches Charlie Jamerson, Dick Redding, Ray Brown, and Boyd Baird as the Davidson football squad prepared for the 1949 grid wars. Spirits were high and the best season in years was in prospect, but before the campaign was scarcely started, it became apparent that all the predictions and hopes were for naught. Playing ten games, the Cats could salvage only two victories from the group.

The schedule, including intersectional foes St. Louis and mighty Army, was the hardest that the Davidson squad had faced since before the war but was not as tough as the won-lost record would ordinarily indicate. The single-wing attack employed by the squad could never start running smoothly and it lacked power in the line to make it click. The team was constantly plagued with injuries; there was hardly a man who was not sidelined at least once during the season, and as a result spirit and morale sagged sadly.

However, there was one bright spot in an otherwise drab season—the victory over N. C. State, 20-14, which was the biggest upset in the conference during the whole campaign. State could make no excuses. Davidson was the better team that memorable night. Few will forget little Jake Wade's 95-yard sprint after intercepting a pass. Nor will they forget the brilliant punts and smashing plunges of fullback C. L. Runyan.

It was a rocky road between the State win and the win over Rollins for the Cats fell victim to St. Louis VMI, Richmond, and W. & E. However, in the fading weeks of the season, the team found itself winning over Rollins and falling to The Citadel in the finale after playing a good game.

Fullback Auburn Lambeth, the slim passing ace from Decatur, Ga., was the spark plug of the Cat offensive. Although slowed down considerably by injuries, he was able to complete 78 out of 148 passes, six for touchdowns, and led all the players in the state in total offense. For his feats, he was named to the Greensboro News All State team. Fullback C. L. Runyan won conference wide recognition when he was voted Sophomore of the Week in the Southern Conference for his performance against State. Center Johnny Richards was the recipient of the Ed Armfield Blocking Trophy, awarded annually to the best blocker on the team as selected by the coaching staff.

DAVIDSON 7—ARMY 47

In the opening game of the football season, Davidson College's Wildcats went out of their section of the country to encounter the mighty West Point Cadets. Although the favorites ran up an expected score of 47-7, there were some enlightening statistics which give a truer picture of the contest. The boys from the South ate up a gross total of 277 yards, net of 233, against a team which is known for its stout defense. Another revealing fact is that the losers rang up 16 first downs to Army's 14. The majority of Davidson's gains came on forward passes, with Auburn Lambeth on the throwing end much of the time.

After the Cadets had scored twice in the first period on a 46 yard march and a blocked punt, the fighting Wildcats came back strong. They drove all the way to the Army 18, but it was a recovery of a fumble on the 15 that set up the lone Davidson score. Hard-driving C. L. Runyan crashed over from one yard out, and after Hal Mapes' conversion the score stood 13-7, Army leading. Heralded Gil Stephenson then scored his second TD, followed by two pay-off tosses from All-American Arnold Galiffa.

The Cadets came back in the second half, scoring on passes by Galiffa, with the final tally coming from Bob Blaik, son of the West Point coach. The Wildcats threatened again in the fourth, but were finally stopped deep in Army territory.

In a renewal of old time rivalry the Wildcats played hosts to their denominational brethren from South Carolina, the Presbyterian Blue Hose. P.C., relying on the championship South Carolina relay team for a backfield, unleashed a lightning fast attack which caught their hosts somewhat off their guard. The first score of the game came on a fumble which P.C. back George Fleming picked up and carried around right end to pay dirt. Before the quarter was up Blake Watts, another of Coach Lomie McMillian's 10-second backfield men, took a hand-off from quarterback Bill Jolly and went the distance for the second P.C. score. Davidson came back on a beautiful pass by Lambeth, followed by an even more beautiful 46-yard run by Jim Sifford. Another pass to Mott Price put the ball on the 5 yard line, where Sifford went the remaining distance for the score. The third Blue Hose TD followed a few moments later and the final score came on a Jolly pass.

Sifford was the Wildcats' top ground gainer, clipping off 121 yards for the night.



DAVIDSON 12—ST. LOUIS 41







tinued a late season scoring spree in the final games, turning in 22 points against The Citadel, the last game of the season and the last for Whit as a Davidson cager.





righthander was looked for to enjoy his best year yet on the hill for the Davidsons.

Torrence, the Gastonia swiftie who ruled the roost on the slab last spring, was forced to take a back seat due to recurring trouble from a shoulder dislocation received back in the fall intramural football. Hunter and Whiteheart, both seniors with three years' experience behind them, served advance notices that this season would bring the best from both of them. Each evidenced more speed and control, the latter a factor which had hampered their effectiveness in the past. Smith, a standout last year as a freshman, brought the added depth Jamerson needed to strengthen his mound staff for the full slate on tap. The smooth working Ellington sophomore promises to be one of the conference's best in a year or so.

An infield solid in seniors gave the Wildcats an inner works comparable with the finest in the loop. Fredericksburg, Va.'s Bill Bird was back on third for the third straight year, a veteran performer who wears the tag of one of the league's best. One of the better hitters on the squad, Bird's consistency adds punch to the Cats' ability for base knocks. At shortstop, Captain Charlie Pearson was rounding out his fourth year of varsity ball, certainly as one of the steadiest, most dependable infielders the school has turned out. Both he and Bird were semi pro operators throughout the summer months, and the experience was evidenced in their polished performances.

Little Jake Wade, a speedy hustler who has held a starting post since midway his sophomore year, was back at second as the vital cog in the Cat double-play killings, with big Hal Mapes stationed at the terminal end on first. Mapes, a long ball hitter, connected hard and often and was one

Bunting close behind Wade at second was Billy Houck, another senior with two years experience. Although more often than not yielding to Jake for the starting job, Houck saw considerable service covering the keystone sack. Husky sophomore Brady Osborne, who, like Mapes, is tall and heavy, worked behind the Bellerose, Long Island, senior, and gained the experience he'll need in inheriting first base duties next spring. Utility man was Jay Roberts, Gastonia product, who was slated to see most of his action as a relief at third for Bird.

With a strong arm and plenty of speed, Jervis held an inside edge on Big Red, who did not muster quite the speed of the smaller backstop on the basepaths. C. L. Runyan, another Gastonia lad, was expected to give Jervis and Wilson a hot scrap for the post, but was forced to retire for the season due to a football injury which did not allow him to whip his throws at full power.

In the outfield, Jamerson had his fill of heavy hitters. The starting threesomes usually saw Doug Rice in left, Auburn Lambeth in center, and Mae Erwin in right. Lambeth and Erwin were probably the most powerful hitters, along with Mapes, on the squad this year, and parked many a ball in the east stands of the stadium. Three hard-hitting sophs who need only seasoning, and senior John Rose supplemented the aforementioned trio. Of Tom Craven, Lee Talbert, and Jack Branch, the latter probably saw more service, but each powdered a ball mercilessly and undoubtedly will move into the outer garden next spring, at least into the posts to be vacated by Rice and Erwin.

On the whole, the club had the finest baseball material assembled on the North Mecklenburg campus in recent years. Even with Torrence out, the pitching staff was producing. The infield could be put up against the best of them. The question lay in hits and hits when the chips were down.

If the Cats were improved, they were only in a league which was fast enough to wipe out any advantage the improvement might have wrought. Meeting Wake Forest's 1949 NCAA finalists twice in the southern division play was typical of the fast company the Cats traveled in this spring.

GOLF

The golf team, led by lettermen Monty Hill, Ben Vernon and Cecil Brandon, are undefeated thus far. They have turned in four victories already, defeating South Carolina twice, and Fort Bragg and Catawba once each.

Six matches and the Southern Conference tournament remain on their schedule. Judging from their performance thus far this season, this should be one of the best links teams Davidson has fielded in years.

With lettermen returning in every event, Coach Pete Whittle seems optimistic and expects his team to gain more points in the distances, the hurdles, and the high jump. There are no worries about the discus, which will be handled by Captain Jim Vann. Vann grabbed a third place in this event in last year's conference meet and a third in the Florida Relays. 


Because of the outstanding performances turned in by junior Blake Bradley, he has been elected to lead the harriers when once again they hit the open country next fall.






The council, headed by J. William Bird, may be justly proud of its fine record this year. Its first duty was the supervision of the rushing season in the middle of September.



Pi Kappa Alpha, one of the older and larger college fraternities, is the perpetuation of the friendship of six students at the University of Virginia during the college year of 1867-1868. Their problems were in some measure similar to those of the entire South in its woes of reconstruction. Life at the University at that time was simple and devoid of many of the things now considered collegiate. Friendships were peculiarly warm and ideals were deeply cherished. As one of the founders has stated, "They little imagined the tree that would grow from their planting, but they planted well and deeply in the subsoil of friendship and idealism." After its founding on March 1, 1868, growth was rapid. The mother chapter took the designation Alpha, and chartered Beta in 1869 at Davidson College. From the South, Pi Kappa Alpha spread to the Southwest and Pacific Coast. Shortly after the turn of the century, chapters began making their appearances in the East, so that today Pi Kappa Alpha has eighty active chapters distributed through almost every state, with a total membership of over 24,000.

From its birth, Pi Kappa Phi has grown steadily and consistently. It is most pronounced in the South but chapters have been established all over the United States.


Today Pi Kappa Phi is composed of forty six under graduate chapters and twenty seven chartered alumni groups, with a membership in excess of seven thousand.

It was in 1869 at the University of Virginia that five men, having opportunity to join one or more of the fraternities then existing at the university, but wishing to belong to the same fraternity, decided to found a new one and adopt the Greek letters Kappa Sigma as its name. Expansion during the early years was slow and uncertain; however, the early perseverance to establish chapters in the United States has led to a rapid and consistent growth of the fraternity. It is perhaps significant, because of the strength of the fraternity and the care with which chapters have been placed, to note that but few of its chapters are now inactive. There are at present 110 active chapters, which are located in approximately half of the universities and colleges located in the United States and Canada which have chapters of national fraternities. Delta was founded at Davidson in 1890, more than half a century ago, and was among the first active chapters in the country.

Sigma Phi Epsilon was born on November 1, 1901, on the campus of Richmond College in Richmond, Virginia. There were twelve friends who joined together for the sole purpose of friendship and, with their farsightedness, founded a fraternity that has now taken its place among the great ones of the fraternity world. The twelve friends founded a group which they called "The Saturday Night Club," the program of which was "to recruit the best men of the college that they might be more closely bound together." They succeeded finally in the establishment of a new Greek letter group. Thus the infant fraternity grew into the strong, powerful organization it is today, enumerating the birth of all its active chapters in every section of the country and of its alumni members in every part of the world. Its growth has been carefully planned and regulated so that today Sig Ep Chapters are to be found on the campuses of nearly every important college and university in America. North Carolina Epsilon Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity was founded here at Davidson in 1927, the outgrowth of the old Pyramid Club.



On June 28, 1855, at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, six former members of Delta Kappa Epsilon invited an associate to form with them a social fraternity. Out of this union was born Sigma Chi, which has since established itself as a leader in the fraternity world. This founding of Sigma Chi grew out of a dispute in the Kappa Chapter of DKE over an election for poet in a campus literary society. When six of the brothers voted for a more competent candidate than a brother, a split occurred in DKE, and the above six withdrew to end the trouble. Sigma Chi came to Davidson in the spring of 1948 as a result of the dreams and hard work of a group of fifteen who formed themselves into the petitioning group known as Delta Kappa in the fall of 1946. The coming of Sigma Chi to the campus along with Beta Theta Pi and Phi Delta Theta marks the completion of the Miami Triad, composed of the above three fraternities founded at Miami University. Since its formation, Sigma Chi has grown to 118 active chapters with a living membership of over 70,000. With "the girl of my dreams" ringing in their ears, thousands of Sigs all over the land will gather to select their "Sweetheart of Sigma Chi" in the coming spring. Having 115 alumni chapters, more than any other college fraternity, Sigma Chi feels that it must have something in order to hold the loyalty and interest of men long out of college.

Forty men gathered at the Guest House on the evening of October 13, 1947, to organize a new social organization for the students of Davidson College. The purpose of this new group was to extend the benefits of an organized social life to as many men as chose to join. After long deliberation the organization adopted as its name "The Campus Club." At first a very large, loosely knit group, The Campus Club has this year become a more compact and active brotherhood, largely as a result of its new boarding house, opened in November. On the cover of an explanatory pamphlet sent to freshmen this year were the words "Fraternity, Democracy, Frugality." Though not an official slogan, these words perhaps express very well the philosophy of The Campus Club.

Recognizing the changed situation of the Davidson campus, The Campus Club is seeking a more effective means of service to the college and its students.

Seventy-five percent of Campus Club men returning next year are petitioning Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity. Twenty-five percent will continue the Campus Club.

HOW TO MAKE FRIENDS AND KEEP THEM

6. Preserve an open mind on all debatable questions. Discuss, but don't argue. It is a mark of superior minds to disagree and yet be friendly.
7. Let your virtues, if you have any, speak for themselves, and refuse to talk of another's vices. Discourage gossip, and make it a rule to say nothing of another unless it is something good.
8. Be careful of others' feelings. Wit and humor at the other fellow's expense are rarely worth the effort, and may hurt where least expected.
9. Pay no attention to ill-natured remarks about you. Simply live so nobody will believe them. Disordered nerves and poor digestion are common causes of backbiting.
10. Don't be too anxious about getting just dues. Do your work, be patient, keep your disposition amicable, forget self, and you will be respected and rewarded.




