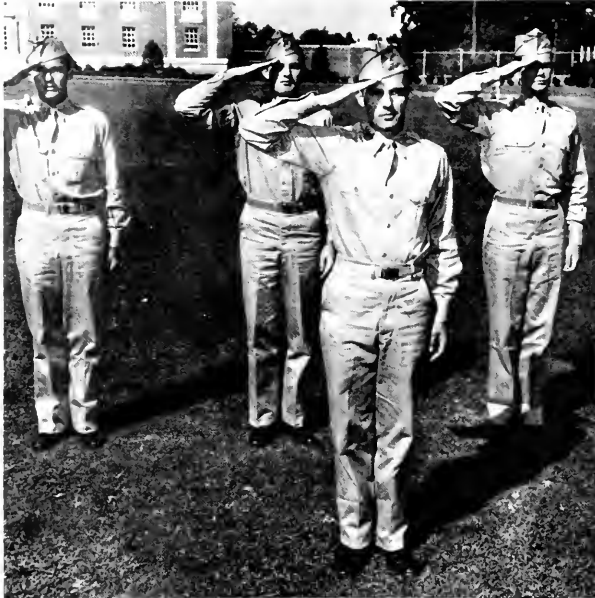

This year the *Davidsonian* has acted as a sounding board of both student and faculty opinion, carrying such live issues as the controversies over the date of return from Christmas vacation and the recommendation that Freshmen eat at the College Union.

The editorial page has been lively with the varied discussions on student life and other topics by John Outley, in "Free Lance," T. Alden Williams, in "Cabbage Planter," and Ronny Wilson, not to mention the timely cartoons by Don Mahy.

Improvements this year center around the new bold face type used in the format of the paper. The staff has been more efficiently organized, with a better make-up program installed. In this respect

Bob Owen, as the managing editor in charge of the editorial page, and Jim Moore on the front and back, have been efficient. There has been an all round news and organization coverage, including sports, fraternity news, and administration and student committee reports.

Besides the regular writers for the editorial page, student participation and voicing of opinion was also contributed through the Letters to the Editor column, which allowed members of the student body to present their views on some current issue of importance.

The sports page made a thorough coverage of both fraternity and college athletics, and Sports Editor Dick Roper gave his views of athletic policy and coming events in his editorial column, "Cat Tales."

During the year *The Davidsonian* has contained special attractions such as the Election edition, the Barium Springs history in conjunction with the Christmas parties, and the April Fool Issue.

The nearest he willingly came was in the campus' first parody, a take-off on TIME called SLIME with "clever" literature. By this time Myers and Cannon were having more meetings in Treasurer Martin's office than in their own new office. For the final issue, partly through financial necessity and partly to quiet the howl of the literatti, we got a serious issue . . . and it wasn't as bad as many of us thought it would be. This change in policy to a 3:1 ratio of humorous issues over literary met with widespread approval and a similar program plan is predicted for the future.

The change in policy and the increase in pictures, supplemented by clever advertising, smart make-up, and a hard-working editorial staff made possible *Scripts'* most popular year in some time.



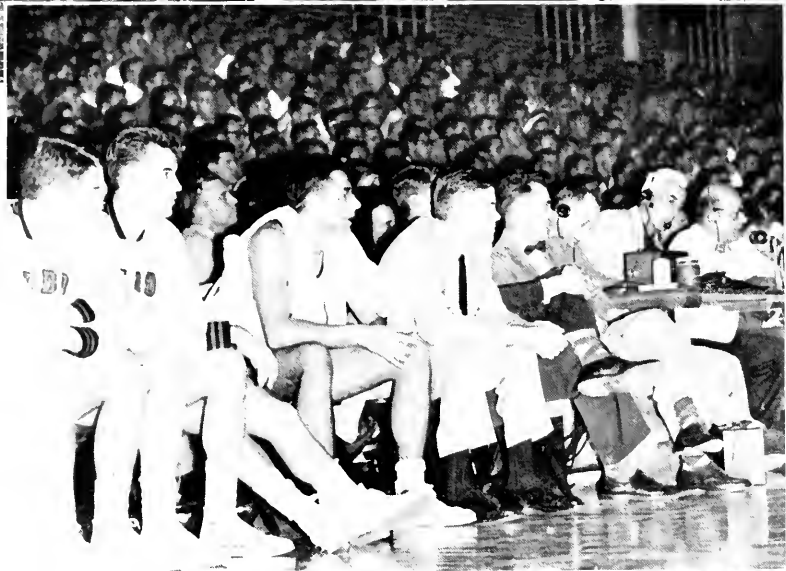
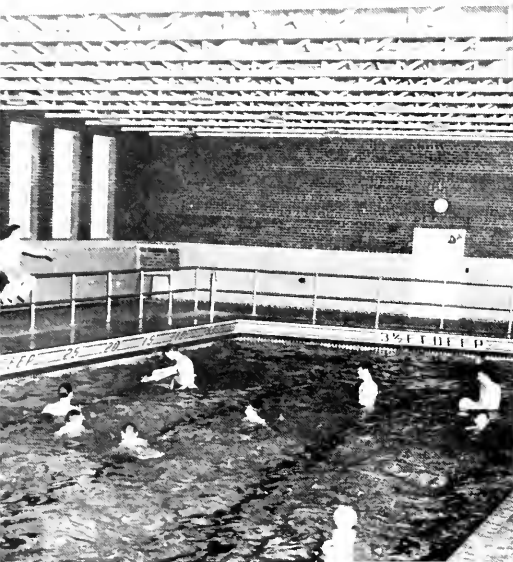

The won-lost record of the 1952 Davidson Wildcats in no way shows the whole story or the real outcome of the past season. The Cats won only two games while dropping seven to their opponents, but an air of near-satisfaction was apparent on the campus during the entire fall, for "something new had been added," and the effect was felt by everyone even remotely connected with Davidson College athletics.

The "something new" was a spirit and fight and a love of the game which was probably instilled in the boys by Head Coach Bill Dole. Coach Dole came to Davidson from East Carolina College, where he was in the midst of a rebuilding program after coaching at Fayetteville High for several years. He brought with him two fine line coaches in Chuck Clements and Carroll Hambright, and, along with Tom Fetzer and Danny Miller handling the backfield, turned out a team that played a fine brand of ball until Ole Dame Injury struck while the Cats were touring New England.

The first two games of the season were played right in Davidson and the local fans were happily surprised, for the Cats displayed a new type of football and a new spirit to win. Both V.P.I. and W. & L. brought down strong ball clubs and initiated the Wildeats rather harshly to the 1952 season, but there was a spirit and fire in the team that was lacking before. The visiting teams were hard pressed to overcome the Cats, and many stars began to break forth on the Davidson team. Many of the freshmen turned in top-flight performances, with Tal Broughton and Bobby Remm as the outstanding performers in the defensive backfield.

Probably the best game of the season was one that the Big Red lost to the Harvardites in Boston. The Cats led the Crimson for three periods and it was not until the closing minutes of the game that the hosts were assured of a win. Harvard was perhaps the strongest team on our schedule, and had made such light of having to play "Davidson University" that the boys got hopping mad and set out to show those cold Yankees how Southerners play football. Roy White at his halfback post starred on offense for the Cats with two TD's, one of which was a 100 yard runback of a kickoff. Even the last minute loss of the game after such a fine showing was not nearly as bad as the resulting injuries incurred by the Ivy Leaguer's fight for a win. Thacker, Gray, Fargason and Whisnant all took to the bench with a variety of aches.

Lady Luck's unabated disfavor with the Wildcats was tragically evident when Furman became the twelfth team in a row to drop the Wildcats before the eyes of the win-starved Alumni. Davidson switched her offense during the second half and taught Furman a thorough lesson about the intricacies of the Notre Dame Box, but a missed extra point cost us the satisfaction of a tie, and we were on the short end of a 14-13 score. Lonnie McMillan of Presbyterian must have smiled broadly at that, because Davidson had downed his Blue Hose by a 13-12 score the previous week.

In the PC game a new runner came to the fore in Leroy Ferguson, who replaced the injured Henry Brown at fullback, and promptly gained 127 yards plowing through the line. Jimmy

Thacker, who later made All-State, began to show his stuff with 96 yards gained, and scored both the markers of the Wildcats.

The most crippling injuries occurred when Henry Brown was injured in practice right after the first game, which he had really started in with 109 yards and a touchdown against V.P.I. in a losing cause. And then Jack Ruth entered the hospital with glandular fever right after the Harvard fray, never to don a uniform again. Arnold Whisnant aggravated an old knee injury, and had to be used sparingly after that. Not only was the team minus its first-string quarterback, but in the first game that Johnny Gray led the Red, he separated his shoulder and sat out the rest of the season.

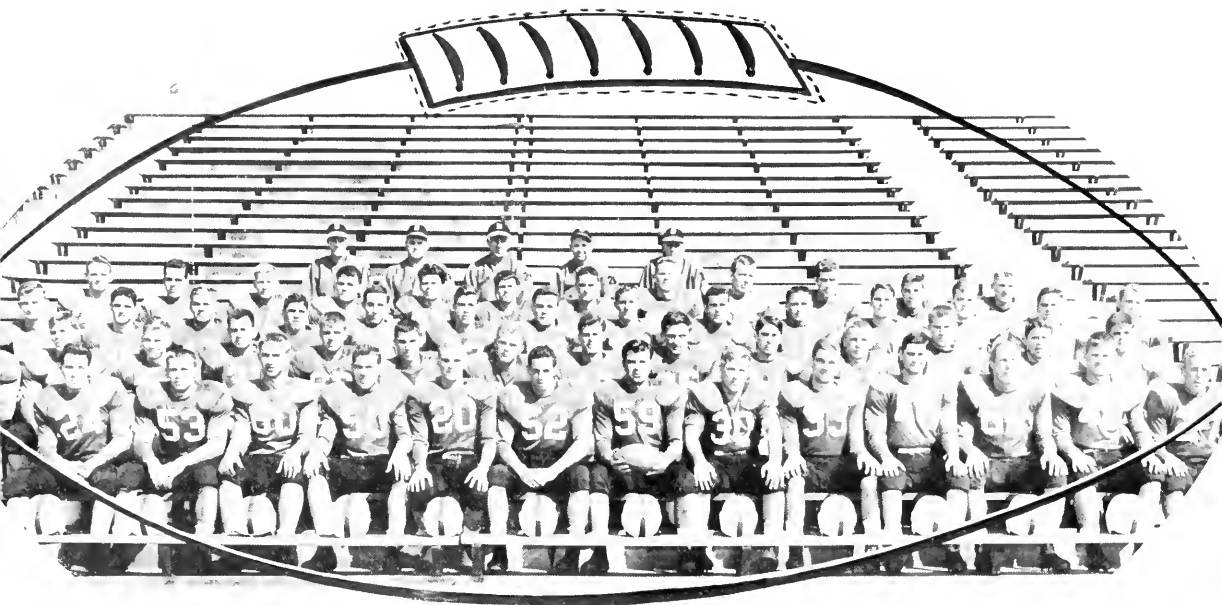

pound frame carried the ball 82 times for 546 yards and a 6.6 yard per carry average for the season. Not only that, but he caught passes and even had a 40 yard punting average. He was a jack-of-alltrades and held the team together wonderfully when the baling wire gave out.

Not enough can be said for the fine work done by the seniors on the squad, for they formed the hub around which the team functioned. At ends Dick Kelley and Gene Pierce developed into the pass-catchingest duo that Davidson has produced in years. Bob Tucker played a big game at tackle and will be the only tackle that doesn't return next year. At center and linebacker, where could you find a more indispensable man than Arnold Whisnant, who has been in the center slot for three years and then this year backed up the line so admirably. And veteran Dick Perkins was always on hand when the "Whiz" was relieved. "Ole Reliable" Jack Ruth developed into one of the smoothest quarterbacks in the league, and his untimely attack of glandular fever may have been the reason for the failure of the team to even up the won lost column. Roy White has been one of the finest runners on the turf, scoring 4 tallies this season, and a bulwark on defense. And Clay Fvatt, the Charleston product who overcame his short stature with guts and fight, turned in a shrewd and hard-hitting job at linebacker.

You could close this chapter with "Davidson would have won at least half its games, had it not been for the crippling injuries in the worst spots," but let's say that the Cats played inspired ball generally, and that everything should be left to the future, for Davidson is ready to rise again and command a position of respect among her Southern Conference neighbors.

Attentive ears listened anxiously last spring for the announcement of the successor to Coach Boyd Baird, now at William and Mary. The news that Danny Miller had been signed brought instantaneous and enthusiastic applause. No man, it was agreed, could be more suitable for the rough task of shaping a winning basketball team, and no man could have had a rougher task. Miller's achievements at Wingate were ample proof that if given the material he could produce the goods. The tough part of his first year at Davidson was the obvious scarcity of material. No doubt it will be the determinant of all future success or failure.

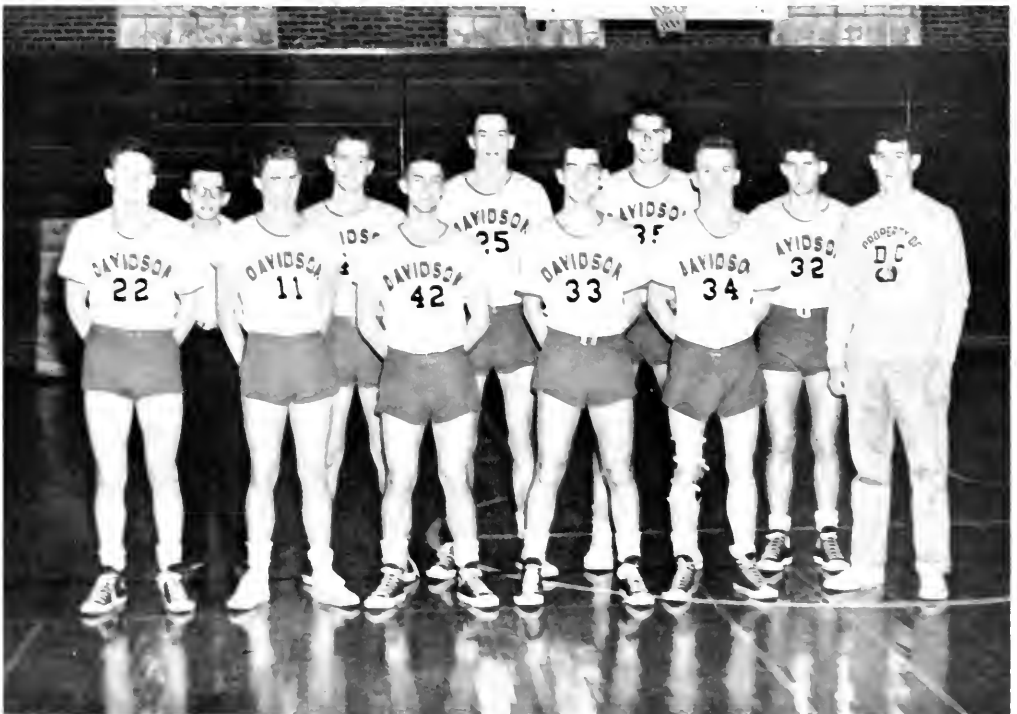
From the outset Miller exploited every possible combination in an effort to find a real scoring punch, but the Wildcats, weakened by the loss of '52 grads Bill Brooks, Mac McLean, Al Fitz-

gerald, and Bob Turk, and hampered all the while by lack of height, managed to win but four of a twenty-one game schedule.

A glance at their season's record fails to do justice to the work of an excellent coach and the efforts of a scrappy team whose fighting courage and determination made them a group never to be taken lightly. Although their unusually tough schedule forced them to spend the greater part of the season battling the hottest teams in the conference, they entered the year with high hopes and breezed past opponent number one, Erskine, by a thirteen-point margin. Fans began to look for a good year when after three games the Cats had lost only to N. C. State, perennial loop power. Then Duke inaugurated a nine game losing streak which spelled disaster to early season aspirations.

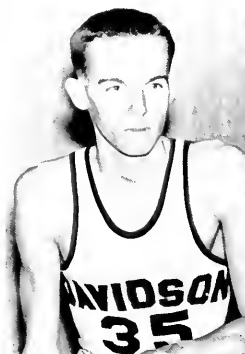

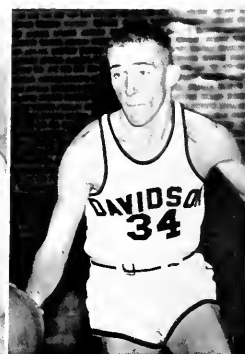

These early hopes were not altogether unfounded. One reason was a sophomore guard named Gerald King. A good floor-man and play-maker, Jerry scored twenty points in each of the first two games and seemed destined for great things. Though his average slumped somewhat toward midseason, he was easily the Cats' second highest scorer with 153 points for little better than a 13 point average. At the half-way mark, unfortunately, academic troubles caused him to bid farewell to Davidson, leaving Miller to re-juggle his lineup once more.

Another reason was the December win over highly favored Furman University. Although they were to finish the season as the nation's top offensive team, Lyles Alley's Purple Paladins found the Wildcats more than their match in going down to a 71-67 defeat. All-American Frank Selvy garnered 35 points that night, but his teammates found themselves tightly guarded while Davidson's King and Dudley were combining their 15 and 28 points scoring barrages to erase a three-point half-time deficit and spark the Cats to a rousing victory.

Victories over Erskine and Furman, however, seemed to be eclipsed by defeats at the hands of State, Duke, Tennessee, South Carolina, U.N.C., Wake Forest, Clemson, V.P.I., and a rejuvenated Furman club, and two eleventh hour wins over The Citadel contributed only partial relief. The bright side of this otherwise gloomy picture was the brilliant role of Captain Joe Dudley, playing his final and best year as a Davidson cager. Alternating the center and forward positions, the "human test tube" amassed a seasonal total of 375 points to lead the Wildcat scoring attack. With one of the highest averages earned by a Davidson player in a number of years, Joe was third best in the Big Five individual scoring honors at 17.8, a feat which won him berths on All Big Five teams selected by the *Charlotte News* and the *Greensboro Daily News*. In spite of the sickness which plagued him throughout most of the season, he netted twenty points or more in better than a third of the games and was always the most consistent point-maker.

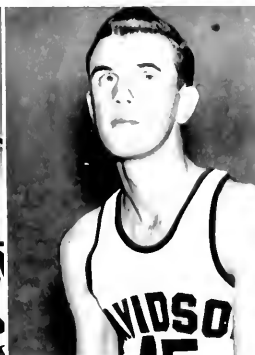
Dudley and J. V. Howell, the only seniors on the squad, will not be easily replaced next year. Sophomore Ish Bennett's 128 points mark him as a man to be watched, along with freshmen Hobby Cobb, Ray Harding, and Dickie Adams, whose emergence toward the close of the season was very encouraging. In spring practice Coach Miller divided duties at center between George Melton and Graeme Keith, while Edson Weeks and Pappy Fowle worked in the guard slots. These men will certainly show their followers next year a fast and hard-played brand of basketball.

For the third consecutive year the Davidson baseball team started the season with a new coach. This year the big job was handled by Coach Charles "Chuck" Clements.

The schedule seemed to be more rugged than in the past, evidenced by the fact that the opening game was with Duke, defending Southern Conference champions. The Cat team also signed to meet such clubs as North Carolina, North Carolina State, Furman, and Clemson. The inter-sectional games included Wesleyan, Ohio University, and Williams.

As the opening date neared, the team began workouts in the gym because of inclement weather. This hindered the choosing of a starting team, although Coach Clements had thirteen returning lettermen from which to pick. Last year's diplomas did away with Johnny Guiton, the hustling second sacker, and Jack Branch, the hard-hitting out-

fielder. However, with the returning lettermen and freshmen turnouts, the team was in a better position than the '52 squad, which had only eight lettermen.

The pitching staff was stronger than at any time in the past, with three vets back. These included Jim Smith, Ish Bennett, and Lindley Beardsley. Also Johnny Smith, who was ineligible last year, showed much promise at early practices. Fresh standouts were Bill Faylor, the only south paw, and Corky Burdette. From the sophomores came Roger Little. Paul Eastman, who had been one of the starters last year, was plagued with a sore arm which greatly cut down his playing time.

Receiving the power of the mound crew were three returnees who divided the backstop duties. The main catchers from last year, Bill Glidewell and Shorty Saelos, were back doing as polished a job as ever. Also helping with the chores behind the plate was Bert Downs.

Buzz Hope, Johnny Gray, and Jim Feeter seemed determined to more than fill the vacated position, and all were hustling for the position during early practice. For the infield, the big question mark was shortstop. This most important post looked as if it would be filled by Max DeVane, who was the utility infielder last year, and saw much action. The Cats were banking on an efficient keystone combination in order to better their 4-17 record of last year. The hot corner was a merry-go-round as to who would be the starter with Bob Southwell, Billy Morris, and George Lippard fighting it out for the job. At press time the lean seemed to be in favor of freshman Morris. Fast fielding seemed to show early potentialities for giving us one of the best defensive infields in the Southern Conference.

The outfield was set with eagle-eye Fred Stowe, Al McCall, and Jerry Morrow. All of these men were heavy hitters in the Cat lineup and without them the team's offensive punch at the plate would have been badly impaired. Stowe was the leading hitter of last year with a batting average of .457. Having played ball with the Southern Conference aggregation in Canada last summer, Stowe was indeed one of the big men in the lineup. Tim Gilley, another letterman of last year, was also ready for action at any time in left field, while Morrow, along with Captain Whisnant, was a valuable long ball hitter for the team.

The main problems of the '53 team were to make a tight infield and to develop an experienced pitching staff, which Coach Clements said had many potentialities. As a whole, the 1953 Wildcat baseball team was an experienced group with veterans at nearly every post, and it seemed certain that the previous year's record would be bettered.

The only cloud on the horizon was the loss of Frank Cenezy at midsemester; he was the number one man in the shot-put and the discus. By the time the first meet with Roanoke College had rolled around, the team seemed to be in high gear with most of the positions solidly filled.

In the 100 yard dash, Frank Mitchener was holding the same top spot which he won last year, and looking forward to an even better record this year. Backing him were Phil Koonce and Bill Morris, both of whom pushed Mitchener to the limit to stay out in front. Mitchener drew the num-

ber one spot in the 220 yard dash also, with teammate Koonce and erratic Tommy Breeden filling in the other lanes.

Both Bill Shipley and J. V. Howell were back to take over the killing 440 yard dash again this year. Shipley also anchored the mile relay team, with Bob Henry, Bill Russell and J. V. Howell running the I, II, and III positions respectively. In the 880 yard run, Captain Bob Henry had two new running mates in Clark Reed and Bill Jenkins. There was an outside chance that Henry

would break 2 minutes in the remaining track meets of the season.

In the one mile grind, Homer Sparks, the co-captain of next year's cross country team, and Bill Russell teamed up as a hard-to-beat pair. They were ably supplemented by freshman Archie Jovner. And in the two mile, Floyd Feeney, Andy Turner and Steve Gooding carried the load for 8 long laps.

Roy White and Charlie Robinson were carrying a double in the obstacle races. They were holding down the number one and two slots in the 120 yard high hurdles, and were assisted by Bill Morris in the 220 yard low hurdles.

In the field events, Jack Huffaker and Ted Oldenburg sailed over the bar in the high jump, and Mike York, Dave Pfaff, Tommy Breeden, and Jon Regen showed well in the broad jump. In the pole vault, the team had three aspirants—Bob Poston, Jim Speed and Bill McNair.

The 16 pound shot had its propulsion provided this year by Harry Petersen and Ralph Petree. Petree was a standout in the discus, too, and he had men like Don Lazenby, Tim Gilley, and Corky Clark to contend with in this event. With Bob Hoover and Tim Gilley throwing the javelin, the 1953 edition of the Davidson track team presented a full slate, and in retrospect it seems that Pete Whittle had excellent reasons for smiling broadly to himself at the beginning of the season.

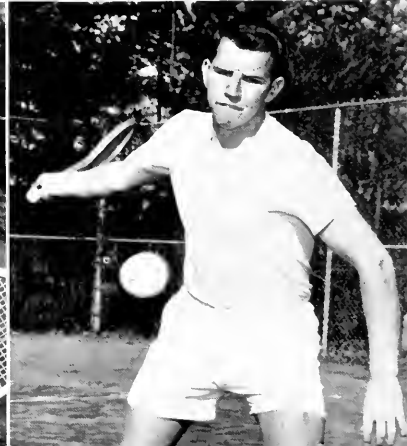

WRESTLING

CHARLIE PARKER, *Coach*

The Wildcat grapplers under Coach Charlie Parker completed another season of stiff competition in Southern Conference Wrestling with a record of one conference win and five defeats. For most of the season Davidson was without the services of Captain Morley Vail, who left school after Christmas to enter the service.

Most consistent performer of the season was Gene Craven, former regional A.A.U. Champion. Craven and Johnny Buxton, another returning letterman who was outstanding all season, took third place in the Southern Conference meet in the 147 and 157 pound classes, respectively. New lettermen Bill Coe, Nabby Armfield, and Charlie Murray were strong contenders throughout the season. Murray was probably the most improved man on the squad, and his last season's experience together with good coaching and hard work carried him through to an excellent record in the second half of the season.

Intramural wrestling, introduced last year, has provided the Wildcats with some good men who might otherwise have never turned out for the varsity. Notable among varsity men who got started in this way have been Murray, Armfield, and Bobbie Joe Key, who returned for his second year as a letterman.

Next season's squad will be hard pressed to find replacements for several men who are graduating, notably Craven, Roger Wright, and Angus Andrews, but with the return of most of the lettermen and the depth provided by experienced men who have not yet won the "D," a strong team may be expected.

CROSS COUNTRY

Coach Pete Whittle's Cross Country team closed out the season with a sixth place in the Southern Conference meet after winning two and bowing before three teams in regular season meets. Placing third to Tennessee and Marville in a triangular meet, the harriers outran Richmond and then Washington and Lee in dual meets before losing again to the perennially powerful North Carolina State team.

Although weakened by the absence of Tom and Dick Stockton, twin stars of the past three years, the team had two strong leaders in Captain Bob Henry and Bill Shiplev. Henry will be missed next season, but Shiplev, one of the finest young runners Davidson has had, will be back and looking forward to his best season.

Close on the heels of these two has been Homer Sparks, a boy who, by sheer determination and hard work has been one of the steadiest men on the squad.

Five regulars will be returning to action next year, with Henry, Bill Russell and Stuart Plummer the only men lost through graduation. Former cake race champion Floyd Feeney, scoring regu-

larly among Davidson's first five this season, will be back for two more seasons and Coach Whittle expects him to be pushing the leaders in every race. Whittle is looking forward to a strong team and a successful season, and hopes to get some new men next year to support his nucleus of returning veterans.

Meeting Clemson for the second time in the season, Coach Carroll Hambright's tankers splashed out a decisive win, avenging a close defeat earlier in the season. Two other near-wins came against The Citadel, with the cadets edging Davidson on both occasions.

Sophomore Al "Pencil" Ormond repeated his last year's performance in winning high point honors. The versatile Ohio native, swimming the individual medley and the 220 and the 440 yard free-style events, edged out Jim Bryan for the second year. Only slightly less versatile was senior Bryan, captain of the team and a consistent winner in the 200 yard backstroke and member of the free-style relay team. Also consistent in the sprints and relay were Jim Golding and Bob Patten. Patten will be back next year while Golding will leave a place to be filled by one of several men who have shown promise. Davidson's only letterman in diving, Charlie Hull, should have help next year from Jeff Smith, a freshman for whom Coach Hambright has hopes. Also deserving of mention is George Crone, a steady performer in the grueling 200 yard breaststroke event. Diver Hull provided some good support in this event, and the two should both be strong contenders with next year's team.

White also pointed with pride to two outstanding freshmen, Hobby Cobb and Larry Parrott, from whom he expects great things in the future.

The spring tour usually provides a basis for some pre-season predictions, and although the southern swing saw several matches rained out, White's men looked ready to meet a tough schedule.

Questioned as to next year's team, White considered things to look "hopeful" which is just about the extent to which sports Publicity Director White commits himself. With the loss of only two seniors, however, and with the aid of two more freshmen, Skip Hall and Jim Daughdrill, he isn't too worried.

INTRAMURALS

One of the most highly coveted awards that the Greeks from down around Fraternity Court compete for every year is the Interfraternity Sports Championship and the handsome trophy that goes with it. The fraternity that wins this title must necessarily have a very versatile assemblage of athletes, since competition is held in nearly a dozen sports.

As the spring sports were beginning, the Phi Delt's had a slim lead over last year's Champion Kappa Sigs, with the Sigma Chis also within striking distance.

Competition for the interfraternity award got under way with tag football soon after school started last fall. A high-scoring Sigma Chi club moved into an early lead which they were never to relinquish, finishing with 10-1 record for the season. The Phi Delt's finished second, with a 9-2 mark.

Last year's second place Phi Gams pinned and decided their way to the wrestling championship late in November, beating a hard fighting SPE team, 38-31.

The SAE's showed themselves a definite contender for the crown when they copped top honors in the swimming meet of early December. The Phi Delt's took second in this event, as they began to build up their impressive overall total, while the Sigma Chis placed third.

In basketball it was Kappa Alpha almost all the way. The KA's led the pack for the entire season except for a few days, when the one game they lost dropped them into second place. Coming back strongly, they finished with a 10-1 mark, while the Sigma Chis (9-2) and the Phi Delt's (8-3) moved in close as runners-up.

The perennially high-ranking Kappa Sigs, slow in getting started this year, came through in a big way in the track meet held just before spring holidays, besting the other eleven contenders by a large margin. The Phi Delt's added another second place to their record in this event, however, and maintained their lead.

Handball was practically a walkaway for the Kappa Sigs, who finished with a 100-point total. Tying for second place with 85 points each were the SPE's and the Phi Delt's.

With the appearance of spring, the Phi Delt's, Kappa Sigs, and Sigma Chis were the leading contenders for the Interfraternity title, but the race was anything but decided. Volleyball and softball, won last year by the Phi Gams, appeared to be wide-open battles, and tennis was another question mark as the season got under way.

A final boost is given at the end of the year to the fraternity which has had the largest number of members out for varsity sports. Last year this proved to be the winning margin for the Kappa Sigs, who stood to benefit greatly by this bonus again this year.

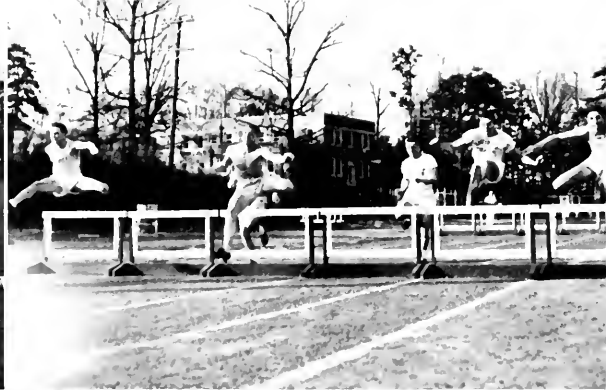

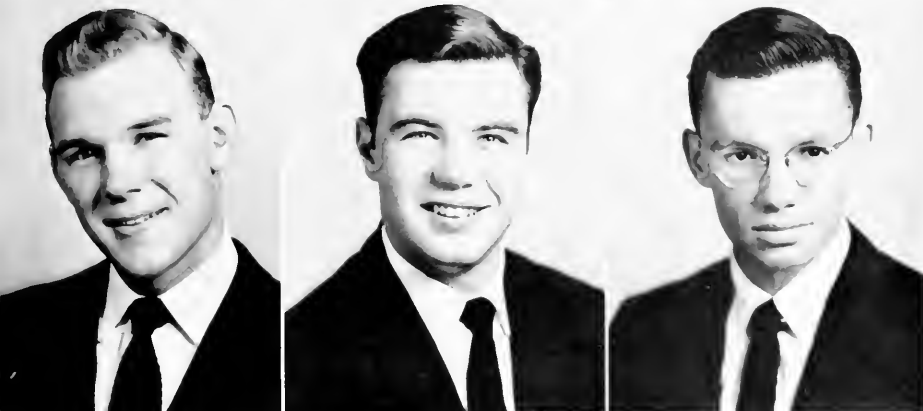

An Armistice Day ceremony was held in the gymnasium on November 11 to honor the Davidson war dead. Lieutenant Colonel Ernest H. Davis delivered the memorial address to the students and faculty assembled.

As a special service to its country, Scabbard and Blade conducted the fall blood drive for the college and community. Cadet Captain Buddy Lamon was coordinator of the drive, which exceeded the past school record with a total of nearly five hundred pints donated.

Spring activities include firing in a national rifle match competition, a chapel program in March commemorating National Scabbard and Blade Day, and a military ball in April in conjunction with Salem Day. Twice-monthly programs feature current films on the world situation, Korean War tactics, and noted speakers.

Believing that military service is an obligation of citizenship, and that the greater opportunities afforded college men for the study of military science place upon them certain responsibilities as citizens, Scabbard and Blade is a national honorary military fraternity which emphasizes and recognizes military achievement. Its purpose is to unite in closer relationship the military departments of American universities and colleges; to preserve and develop the essential qualities of good and efficient officers; to prepare educated men to take a more active part in the military affairs of their communities; and above all to spread more intelligent information concerning the military requirement of our country.

The Beaver Club attempts to recognize leadership in the under-classes. Proficiency in athletics and extra-curricular activities serve as a criterion for admission. Twelve men are chosen from each of the three lower classes to make up the membership. These men are retired from the club upon completion of their junior year.

The Beaver Club seeks to promote better relations with other schools by assisting and entertaining visiting athletic teams. This year the Beaver Club carried on its annual clothing drive most successfully. Each year clothes are collected to be sent to the needy in other areas of the world. The Beaver Club also ushers at certain home athletic contests and annually presents the Senior Auction, which is held in the spring.

Underlying all of the Beaver Club's activities is a concern for the promotion and maintenance of a high level of good sportsmanship, as well as a desire for the welfare of others.

Sigma Delta Psi, which means "The body is the servant of the mind," has as its object the promotion of physical, mental, and moral development of college students.

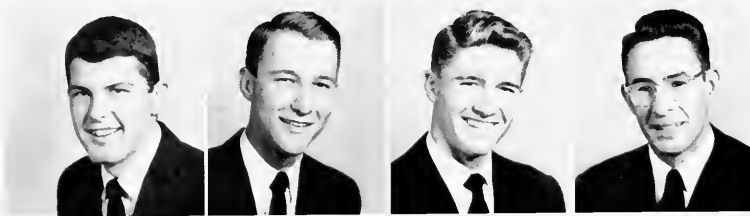

10. Don't be too anxious about getting just dues. Do your work, be patient, keep your disposition amicable, forget self, and you will be respected and rewarded.

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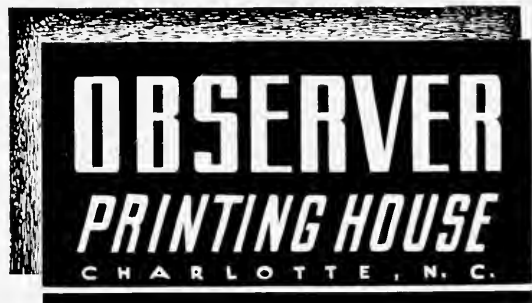
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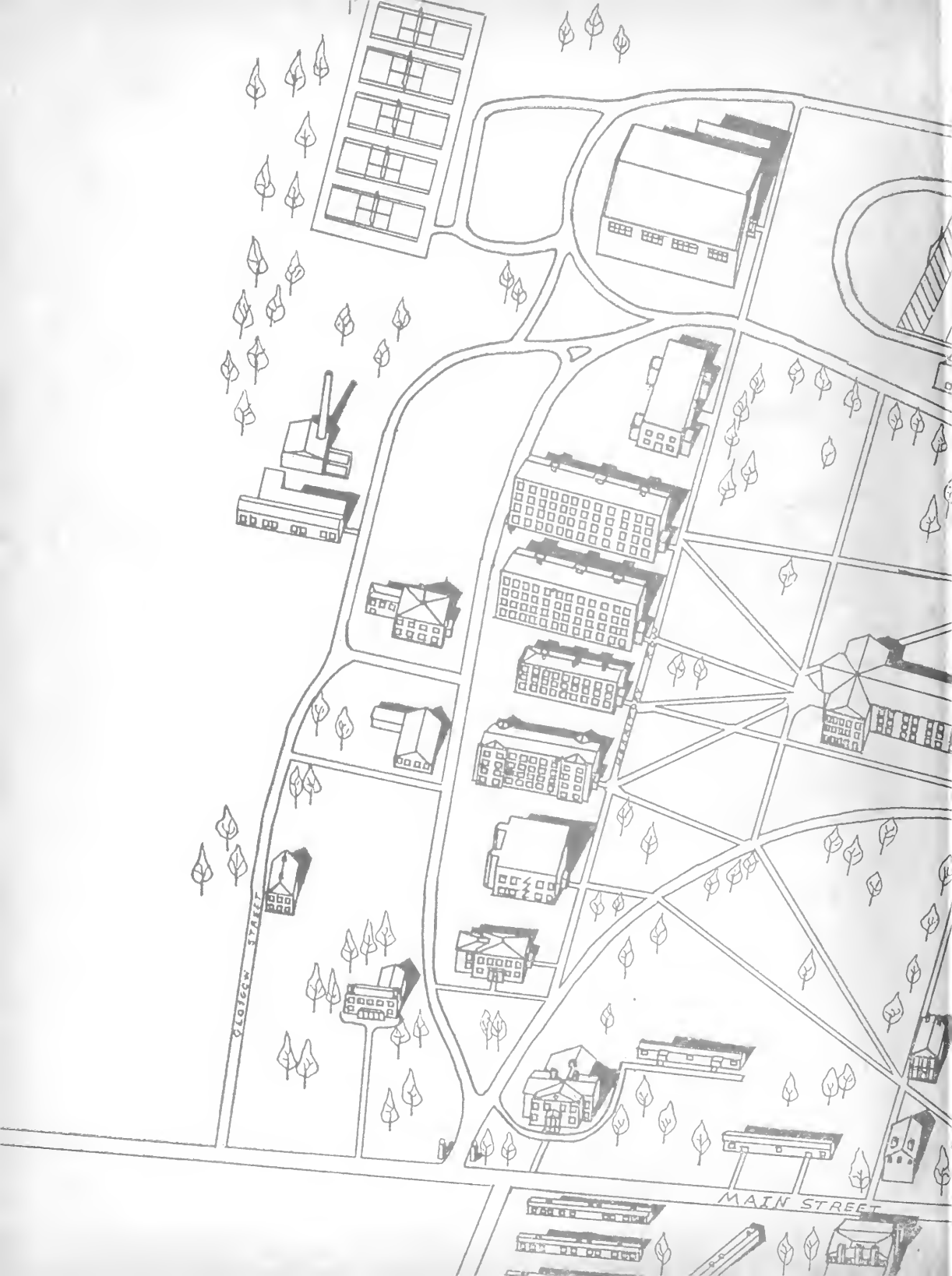
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
