


just get ice cream. All of us would talk and run around trying to meet as many people as possible.

The people that I met during those first few weeks of school at hall mixers may not have become my greatest friends at Davidson, as we all began to





came to Davidson in 1983 as a visiting professor, expecting to be here for nine months. I applied for the tenure track position for the following year, so I am completing my eleventh year here at Davidson.'

"In terms of what's special about Davidson for me, what's most special for me are my students, and my colleagues that I work with as well. I particularly like the smallness of Davidson and the emphasis on teaching and interaction with students. I like the fact that teaching doesn't end in the classroom, and the fact that I learn as much from my students as they learn from me. It's a continual process of growth for me, and it's important to my life.'

"There's a lot that I would like to see kept [at Davidson], such as size and interactions with students. I have seen over the last eleven years, Davidson open to the international community, largely on the part of Jack Perry who is retiring this year. l would like change to continue in this direction of self-criticism in the positive sense. We should concentrate on what we can do to improve aspects of student life and faculty life, to incorporate issues that are important to wider American society. A good deal of this is part of what I am working on currently with my coach here, Tom Shandley, and a wonderful committee on the self-study of which our focus is on the student experience here at Davidson."

"Overall, probably my most vivid memories of Davidson take place off campus with the Davidson Outdoors. I've had such a wonderful experience getting to know students before they even know me as a professor."





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
grew up in Davidson, so I had always been close to the college. I came back as a visit-


ing professor from '82-84, largely on the part of Herb Jackson. 1 wanted to be in a place where I could really say to students that what you see is what you get. That is, that Davidson really tries to fulfill its mission to the students. to put them in a position where they can be successful. I think Davidson is a place that really does that because it allows students and faculty to be participants rather than spectators in an academic situation. It's a college that tends to say "yes" rather than "no."

"If I had select an area of change, the first thing I would like to see changed is for us to talk more about the work we're doing than about how much work we have to do. I'd like to discuss the issues rather than the workload. I'd like to see a shift in the conversation. Also, I think we have to recognize visual culture on equal footing with word culture. We need to develop a campus sculpture program. From a visual culture point of view, the lack of sculpture is like not having a library."

"The arrival of the Rodin to me is one of the great moments of this institution. I never expected to have that in our little area of North Mecklenberg, and when it arrived here and the packing crating parted to reveal that signature on that sculpture, I must admit, I just about lost it!"







hat brought me to Davidson is the fact that I wanted to be at a small college where I knew

that close relationships between faculty and students existed, and where there was a sense of collegiality amongst the faculty, yet the students were very strong academically. Also, I wanted a place where I could do a certain amount of research with undergraduates, because that is important to the education of any scientist."

"Let me cite one very recent example from alumni weekend. We had an alumni symposium in which we brought back to campus a lot of chemistry alumni, who are now doing things like practicing law as it relates to science and patent law. Physicians came back who are doing research in medicine, and most of them are chemists who are doing research in chemistry. The symposium was designed to honor our three recent retirees and Dr. Burnett, who is about to retire. The thing that struck me was that for all of us as faculty, one of the biggest rewards we have in teaching is seeing the success that our students have after they leave Davidson. And it struck me that we have a large number of very successful people who came through the department as a result of the teaching of these four retirees. One of the highlights of my years at Davidson was seeing these people again because it's fun to reminisce. And my having been there twenty years, I knew most of these people myself. In addition to seeing the success that they had, that makes a faculty member feel very good about what one has done. I was delighted to see the success that these four retiring faculty members have had, in that they are largely responsible as well for the success that these alumni have had."

came to Davidson in 1979. I was primarily attracted to the fact that it was a small school with a


highly competitive academic program, but one that also lies great emphasis on personal values and honor, to a humanistic use of education. All of that was very clear from the beginning."

he thing that first impressed me about Davidson was the enthusiasm of the stu-

dents and the gratification which I have teaching first-rate students. The whole range of my experience at Davidson has been very special. The thing that I remember most, and sticks out in my mind, is the real warmth with which I was greeted when I came to Davidson in 1968. I was taken right into the bosom of the history department. People went out of their way to make me feel welcome, and not just people in my department, but people across the whole spectrum of the faculty."

"One of my fondest memories involves a little joke plaved in one of my classes, which took place during one of my lectures. Anyone who knows me knows that when I give a lecture I get rather absorbed with it, and with myself. I expose theatrics, and it's perceived singlemindedly and relentlessly. Well, two Seniors were inspired to decorate the inside back of the door, room 318, with nude and lewd pictures, derived from what source I cannot imagine. They pasted these up, and there was a door full of these things. Of course, when I got to class to make my grand entrance, everybody in class had seen these, and was sitting, waiting to see what the old man would say. Well, since I came in towards the front side of the door, and the pictures were on the back side . I just came in and closed the door. Of course, they were there, but I didn't see them. I gave a whole lecture with these nude pin-ups on the door, in various poses. And I kept Bynum

wondering, what is this giggling about, these secret titters. And not until I finished the lecture and turned around to open the door, did I see the pictures, and I almost fainted. I said, "Oh, Lord," and of course the class just erupted, all in good fun. I didn't know what to do; I thought it was the funniest thing I had ever seen. But what was really funny was that they had probably expected some great reaction on my part, and they had to sit there for fifty minutes before I even saw what they had done. The two people involved had to come by and confess later, and I thought it was just hilarious. It was a good piece of student humor which was not maliciously meant at all."

"I think one of the strengths of Davidson is that it's often depicted by some elements of the faculty and the student body as being ten years behind every other place. I think that's a great strength, this sort of building a resistance, by some of the faculty, students and administration. of adopting every latest, chic fad in education or in the design of the calendar, or anything else. I think it's great to be six years behind. The larger universities pick up ideas and try these programs, and within five years, many of them are discredited. We didn't go through the process, or the money and time, of investigating tnk that bedrock stability that one finds in students, faculty and administration, in the long run, is beneficial. There's a sort of resilience about Davidson."





his is the end of my seventeenth year at What Davidson. brought me to David-

son was primarily its size and the quality of its students. I started out teaching at a state university where 1 had lecture classes of 175 students. I never really got to know the names of any of my students because all I did was lecture them and graduate students did everything else. I decided that's not where I wanted to teach college."

"Most [of my special memories] have to do with students, and how well they've done, both majors and non-majors. For example, whenever students have really worked hard to learn the material, instead of just striving to get good grades. Also, the students who have struggled in courses and haven't gotten great grades, but feel that they have come away satisfied that they learned something - even the student who gets a bad grade and talks to you later about how much they got out of the course. It's an honest attempt to get a good edu-

cation on the part of my students."

"One change that our students could make is to drink less alcohol. I see all sorts of problems with some students who probably abuse that privilege. I think it affects all kinds of social interactions among students, particularly interactions between men and women. I think there is too much of an emphasis placed on drinking in the student body. I think that one attitude is that you have to drink to do anything, and it's very debilitating to the whole social life on campus. I wish we had a way to address the situation which the students could accept as a valid attempt to control a situation which is out of control. That whole ethos that seems to pervade the student party atmosphere, that somehow you've got to be willing to imbibe huge amounts of alcohol to be part of a group - 1 wish there was a way to address that."

fter about thirty-six hours on campus. 1 fell in love with it. If you said to me, what is the most important thing about Davidson, and why is it a good place to teach. I'd say it's the stu-

dent body."

"Davidson tells perspective students, 'This is a place where you can get to know your professors.' That's not an empty promise. We have created an environment here where students are encouraged to get to know professors, and professors are encouraged to make themselves available to students. Every year I've been at Davidson, I have competed with students in intramural sports. We [professors] probably don't have as many opportunities for social interaction as I'd like, but Davidson does that better than many other schools do."

"One of the really nice aspects of the Davidson College experience is the fact that barriers between faculty and students aren't very high. The other aspect of Davidson that I value highly is the real commitment to excellence. I see that [commitment] in our recruitment of students. I see that in our recruitment of faculty. I see that in our recruitment of staff and administrators. A value is placed on bringing people in who really have a lot to contribute to the community. I think it's a wonderful faculty."

"You have at Davidson a desire to do something that is

probably more difficult to do than at almost any other kind of school. That is, schools like Davidson want to bring faculty in who are excited about teaching, and see that as their number one obligation, but who are also really scholars, committed to scholarship. We see the life of the mind as being a very real thing. In other words, we want to have our cake and eat it too. We want to bring in people who are great teachers and great scholars."

"At Davidson we have a teaching load that is manageable, so that we can do research, but at the same time there is no moving back from our expectation that the major thing we do at Davidson is to teach and to teach well. We've been able to pull that off. That allows us to then recruit those great students that I mentioned because they come on campus, they visit, they meet the professors, and they see that these are people who are excited about what they are doing. It's circular because then those professors we're recruiting come to campus, meet students, and say, 'You have really bright students here,' who they would like to teach."

"Davidson's also a nice town to live in. It has really been the kind of community that you want to raise a family in.

I would like to see students more engaged with open, questioning minds about the political process in the United States and relationships abroad, rather than simply accepting at face value who we say we are as a nation."

"My most special memories are those times when I have been closely involved with students, such as protesting the Vietnam War, studying and living in India, traveling with students in Central America, and working with habitat housing. Those kinds of involvements with students, where we have time to get to know each other, share our perspectives, and learn from each other, those have been my favorite times."

hen I came to Davidson, I didn't have to apply at the time. I recalled that one of my

professors said he applied to Davidson and he was rejected. and that played on my mind. I came here and the first thing I felt here was the integration of the professional dimension, the personal dimension, and the cultural dimension. For the first time, [my wife and 1] bought a house, we bought a car and we started a family. It was the first time from our experience in the United States that we felt we belonged to a specific community. I feel I grew professionally, personally, and culturally, at Davidson. It allows you to fully be yourself."

"I like the clear concept of university as universality, bringing together differences, different points of view, different styles of life, different ways of seeing the world. Davidson allows this multi-dialogue around culture, people and languages. To be different is something that is not scary, it is something that is challenging."

Davidson is a place that has its own magic. It's a place that has brought people from so many different parts of the world, from so many points of view, and allowed this kind of unusual harmony in which all these things can be together."

"I have not only been teaching, but also learning a lot, with and from the students. The classroom is not a limited space of knowledge. There is a knowing - that is, having a nice conversation, a nice dialogue."



At D.C.

Senators are sworn in almost weekly, but I hope that this is accomplishing more than just enabling me to memorize the oath of office that everyone has to repeat after me. I want to redefine what it is to be an SGA Senator. The days when a meeting every Tuesday night was a Senator's only responsibility are over. We do not want our membership to be composed of popularity contest winners, nor do we want them to act as such. I want to see SGA Senators thoughtfully contributing to discussions about the future of Davidson College. We are making inroads with the Trustees, as they will be allowing student representatives on five of their seven committees starting next fall. We now need to make inroads with those who have elected us, and place their trust in us to lead. Leading does

not entail getting cynical or pompous, but rather taking the pulse of this institution and doing what needs to be done. This will be the year when SGA Senators become the well-connected and hardworking representatives they need to be.

We think that the SGA can be a positive vehicle for change. It has always been more or less reactive. If something happened that students didn't like, they complained, and we passed a strident, stronglyworded, but meaningless resolution. As was said already, students should be contributing thoughtfully to discussions about our future, and looking for equitable solutions and creative compromises to our problems. I have strengthened our committee structure with the addition of Student Advisory Councils to the Director of Campus Safety, the Director of Residence Life, and the Director of Auxiliary Services. As I said in my campaign, I hope that by making a student's tenure on a council permanent, we will see students learning about what it takes to run a college, understanding the rationale behind policy decisions, developing a trusting working relationship with members of the administration, and helping to clearly enunciate student concerns.


At my first faculty meeting, professors and administrators voiced concerns about the way things had been in the past. Many felt that they are accessible to the students and that they have been willing to sit down and talk about policies that affect all of us. They expressed disappointment that the SGA often wastes time arguing and passing a resolution when all we need to do is give them a call to find a workable solution. It is unfair for us to sprint through the resolution process, garner Davidsonian headlines, and drop our complaints in someone's lap expecting change. I have sent out word that this will not happen during my term, and that nothing will reach the floor of the SGA if the appropriate administrator has not been consulted. Credibility is the gateway to influence, and nothing undermines our credibility more that hasty, unin-formed, and ill advised responses to complicated problems.

Enough of what will happen. What is happening now is that SGA is making a grand attempt to improve communications with the rest of the student body. More people ran this year for SGA than I can remember in my time here. An ad hoc committee chaired by Warren Buford has been formed to examine SGA relations with the student body at large. We anticipate some strong recommendations, and we are prepared to adopt internal policies that turn our Senators into the kind of representatives they need to be.



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














oach John Filar knew the first season of full competition in the Southern Conference would be demanding









The 97th Volume of the Davidson College *Quips and Cranks* was published by Walsworth Publishing Company in Marceline, Missouri, The Walsworth representative was Carolyn Henderson, and the in-plant customer service representative was Craig Bonnet. Student portraits were exclusively contracted with Life Touch Studios in Burlington, N.C.

Quips and Cranks 1995 was printed on monarch gloss paper with a press run of 1525 copies. The cover was bound in jet black leather with a corduroy graining, and was embossed in red with a bright silver silk screen.

The endsheets were printed on gloss white end stock, and are in 4-color. The book contained silver and red spot color, and a color section of 24 pages.

All body copy was set in 10 pt. Times Roman, and all caption copy was set in 8 pt. Times Roman. Headlines and other copy were set in a variety of fonts from Walsworth's type styles. Copy was set using Comtran on a Compaq Contura and was submitted on disk.

Quips and Cranks was funded by the Activities Tax Council. Additional funds came from parent contributions, personal ads and company ads raised by Scholastic Advertising. Inc.
